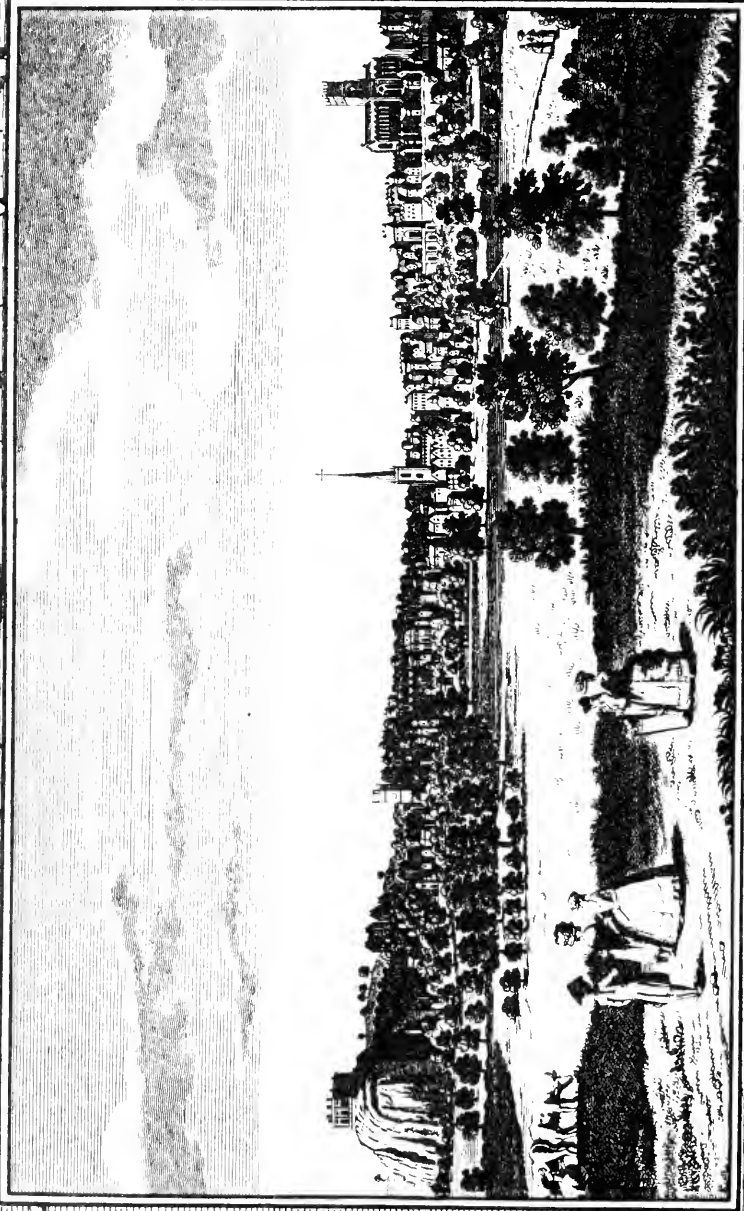

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PREFACE

BETWEEN the publication of volume five and volume six of the *Records of the Borough of Nottingham* there was an interval of fourteen years. This has been much exceeded by the interval of thirty-three years between the publication of volume six and the present volume, and it has been due to a variety of causes, a major one being the two world wars.

The late Mr. E. L. Guilford continued his work on the preparation of a seventh volume, and it was his intention that this should complete the series to the year of municipal reform, 1835; but his departure from Nottingham, when he gave up his appointment as Lecturer in History at University College for an important post with the B.B.C., much curtailed the time he could give to the work of abstracting and editing. The volume as planned by Mr. Guilford was almost completed in the early part of 1945, but as it had also become very necessary to overhaul the many files and boxes of Corporation Records and Charters, it was decided to concentrate the work into the hands of a full time officer of the Corporation. The Finance and General Purposes Committee decided that this officer should be the City Librarian.

Mr. Guilford's manuscript as explained by the Editors in the Introduction, has been considerably expanded, and it has been necessary to divide it into two parts; the first (the present volume) covering the period 1760-1800, and the second (volume eight, in preparation) covering the period 1800-1835.

During my service with the Corporation, as Deputy Town Clerk and then as Town Clerk, there have been many occasions when the published volumes of Records have been of much practical value, and the completion of the series will add to this value. It has also come to my notice that the work has been used considerably by students of history and economics over the English speaking world. It has given me much pleasure, therefore, to watch the growth of the present volume and to take an active part in its publication.

I should like to thank the Chairman and Members of the Finance and General Purposes Committee for their ready assent to the publication of this volume ; Lieut.-Col. W. A. Potter, D.S.O., D.L., J.P., for his personal interest in the printing and publication ; and Mr. Duncan Gray for his expert and practical advice and execution of the records and the matter contained in this volume.

I hope that within a very short period the Records will be complete to the year 1835.

INTRODUCTION

I. In the preface to the previous volume of this work, volume VI, it was stated that the editor, the late E. L. Guilford, M.A., was occupied on a seventh volume "which will complete our Records to the passing of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1835." For reasons given by Mr. J. E. Richards, Town Clerk, in the preface to the present volume, its publication in the form prepared by Mr. Guilford was delayed. It was passed over to the present editors in July, 1945, and, at the same time, the Corporation records in the strong rooms at the Guildhall were overhauled and rearranged. Examination of Mr. Guilford's MS. with the records themselves showed that, in compressing the mass of material for the years 1760-1835 into the compass of a single volume, great accumulations of material had been passed over. The bulk of the MS. consisted of extracts from the Minutes of the Common Council. These minutes are of first importance and, as should be expected from so distinguished a scholar as Mr. Guilford, had been most skilfully abstracted. They appeared to the present editors, however, to be insufficient to present an adequate picture of the manifold activities of the Corporation, so it was decided to expand the MS. to double its existing size by adding new material, and to divide it into two volumes, the first—the present volume—carrying the records from 1760-1800, and the second—volume VIII, which is in preparation—to complete the work to the year of municipal reform, 1835.

II. Close attention has now been paid to the great mass of Chamberlains' Accounts, and sufficient extracts from these are given to enable the forming of a clear understanding of the financial side of the activities of the Corporation. It will be found that in many cases the abstracts from these accounts are complementary to the minutes, but in other cases they supplement them in a most enlightening fashion, and in many cases they present practically the whole story of events and activities. The Corporation, as has been sufficiently explained in previous volumes, was a close body, carrying out its affairs with a masonic privacy, and closely guarding its rights, real and supposed, and its obvious privileges and perquisites. The Corporation controlled the election of Senior Councillors, as new members could only be selected from the Livery, i.e. those who had served the office of Chamberlain, and the Chamberlains were chosen by the Council. It was only with difficulty, and through litigation, that the freely elected members, six

in number and known as the Junior Council, were permitted to be elected at all. How these difficulties were overcome by the main body of burgesses appears in the text. The Corporation was not primarily concerned with the welfare of the Borough, in spite of many pious passages, but with the management of properties and the regulation of privileges. They controlled three estates—the Chamber Estate, the Bridge Estate, and the School Estate—and several charities, including the Sir Thomas White Loan Fund, the Lambley Charity for poor apprentices, the Gregory Charity, and Bilby's Hospital. They were, in addition, charged with the local administration of justice in town court and quarter sessions, presided over by the Sheriffs, elected by the Corporation annually, and by the seven aldermen who were the total bench of justices of the peace. They did not concern themselves with street or road works excepting as these affected their properties, or with scavenging or refuse collection, with similar exceptions. They were not concerned with the poor law, which was the affair of the parishes. In fact, there was little obligation on them other than the payment of their contribution to the national exchequer, so they did pretty well as they pleased, and took care to do it in comfort and in hospitable surroundings, as the many accounts for food and drink, for tobacco and clay pipes, bear eloquent witness. The alderman of those days is usually pictured as full-bodied—there was ample reason.

III. The period covered by the present volume was one of great interest to the social historian of England. It was a period during a century that saw the doubling of the population from five to ten millions; that witnessed the great change in character and importance of the towns, and the decline of the rural population; that ushered in the beginnings of what was to become known as the period of industrial revolution, which might have anticipated the reforms of half a century later had not the French Revolution, which came to be called "the unhappy example of France," intervened; that saw the humanitarian spirit of the nation express itself in the founding by private effort of 154 new hospitals, one of which was in Nottingham; that produced brilliant work by men of surpassing intellect, including Adam Smith, Jeremy Bentham, Edward Gibbon and Samuel Johnson. But it was also the period that saw the increase in the number of offences on the Statute Book which were punishable by death rise to 200; that endured the oppressive poor law activities of parishes, each dealing with its problems in a manner the sole aim of which was to foist responsibility on to others whenever possible, and with complete indifference to the feelings of the individuals concerned; that was so accustomed to public

hangings and whipping at the cart's tail that these were viewed with a casual indifference; that certainly encouraged a limited education, but with decided emphasis that this was designed to fit those who received it to conduct themselves with humility, and with due attention to that state of life unto which it should please God to call them.

IV. Against such background were enacted the events of Nottingham's story, told here so far as they affected the Corporation of the Borough and County of the Borough. The events themselves epitomize the national social history. The rich were rich, and the poor were very poor; so much so, that the freedom of the Borough was a privilege to be sought eagerly, for it might in time bring with it one of the coveted burgess parts—a portion of town land granted to freemen in order of seniority at a nominal rental—or possibly, even, election to the office of Chamberlain, which usually preceded the office of Sheriff, and entry to the select body known as the Livery or Clothing, from whom were selected all candidates for election as Senior Councillors when vacancies occurred. But the lot of the ordinary townsman was not an enviable one and, as the end of the century approached, it became still harder through the effects of the French war and a growing shortage of food, which led to acute personal distress, to be followed by rioting and the destruction of property. Against this, the Corporation had frequent recourse to the help of the Army to put down rioting and to restore order.

Shortage of food was not the only grievance. The entrance of machines into the production of goods which had previously been confined to hand work was an event of the late eighties and early nineties of the century which was feared and fought—the beginnings of Luddism. In the records are to be found indications of unrest among the frameworkknitters, though the most violent manifestations of it belong to a later period.

More heartening are the passages that deal with the beginnings of communal water supply, street lighting, and the watch and ward which was to develop into the police force, though not for many years; but the lot of the prisoner, felon or debtor, was one of unrelieved gloom and tragedy.

V. Special events of the period which are already known in outline from the pages of Bailey and the *Nottingham Date Book* are now described in detail, including the theft of the Corporation mace from the house of the Mayor, the enquiry into the affairs of the Sir Thomas White Loan Fund over a period of about 100 years, the building of the General Hospital, the beginnings of the reforma-

tion of the Free School, and the long drawn out combat between the Corporation and the Gentlemen of the County (who were led by the redoubtable lawyer, J. L. Story) as to the provenance and application of the funds of the Bridge Estate ; and there are many other matters of only less importance to the history of the Borough. There are, indeed, references to occurrences of which no earlier published account can be traced, e.g., the fire at the Guildhall, Weekday Cross, in 1768.

As to the theft of the mace, it is of interest to remember that Shipley, though convicted and transported, managed to obtain escape to freedom and a pardon which allowed him to return to Nottingham ; we must express amazement at his hardihood. The tangled affairs of the White Loan Money must have given much difficulty to the sub-committee charged with the duty of unravelling them. The story of the beginnings of the General Hospital will be read with considerable interest, not least by those who have benefited from its service to humanity over the years ; but on that of the Free School, comment must be delayed until the publication of the next volume, as it is at a slightly later date than 1800 that the very necessary purging of a sad scandal was accomplished. The battle between town and county which tested the claim of the Corporation to the unrestricted use of the Bridge Estate funds, providing they maintained the Trent Bridge, against the claim of the County that the funds should be used not only for the bridge itself but for the flood-menaced road to the bridge through the East Croft, left the honours with the Corporation.

VI. In preparing the work for publication, it has been necessary to follow mainly the plan laid down in previous volumes, as, it must be remembered, this is a continuation volume and not a new work. It is held by scholars of to-day that, in dealing with archives for publication, particularly when the records concerned are modern, selection is inevitably subjective. This may be questioned ; at least it is submitted that the widest view has been taken in compiling the present volume, and what is omitted is mainly matter which would have meant unnecessary repetition. A brief summary of the existing records that have not been abstracted may be of value to research workers.

The Sessions rolls, consisting of schedules of property and goods, certificates of oaths, jury lists, etc., mainly repeat or amplify information printed from the Sessions records books. The Borough Court books contain nothing but the briefest legal notes, without any details of cases. Apart from one roll of doubtful date, there are not any Mickletorn Jury rolls before 1793 ; the roll for Easter,

1800, is printed as a specimen. The Bridgemasters' accounts and vouchers are chiefly for repairs to property, and contain little of general interest, and this applies also to the Schoolwardens' accounts, which cover only the last five years of the period. As a complete transcript of the Chamberlains' rental for the year 1772-3 was made by Miss Walker and published in full in the *Transactions of the Thoroton Society*, vol. 46, 1942, this has been considered a sufficient example of the information contained in the rentals, and further abstracts have not been made. Vouchers for the county rate and Militia certificate books, dating from c. 1794 and 1799 respectively, are being reserved for volume VIII. Records of coroners' inquests exist from 1760 to 1776, followed by a gap until 1815. There are also Sheriffs' bonds, rolls of oaths of supremacy and allegiance, and indentures of apprenticeship and masters' bonds of indemnity under the Lambley and Lady Grantham's charities.

It is held also that an editor's primary function is to present the text so that it is useful both to the ordinary reader and to the scholar—that the former should be able to see the sense of the original, the latter to know with certainty what is the actual text; that the editor should not be guided solely by his own interests, and should remember that, as the record is not likely to be edited again, his edition must be definitive and as complete as possible. This is what has been attempted, careful note having been taken of the similar view of the editor of the first volume of this work, who wrote: "The principle acted upon in the selection of the extracts has been to excerpt not only what is of interest to the curious, but whatever seemed to be of value for the history of the town, its institutions, customs, etc.; and this must be the excuse for the publication of much that may appear dry and worthless to the general reader. The intention held in view has been, therefore, to provide such a body of *Origines* for the history of the town as shall render the principal matter stored up in the records available to the student of local history." In following this counsel much is included, but much also is omitted. There is no purpose to be served by recording in print all the innumerable bills for boulders for repairing roads or making new ones, but one has been included here and there to register prices and wages, a method which has been followed for other articles in common use such as window-glass, house fittings, table furniture, and kitchen utensils. Nor would any useful purpose have been served by including every apothecary's bill for the treatment of sick or ailing prisoners; but a few have been given in full and should be of interest to medical practitioners, pharmacists and all who share their interest in the common ailments of mankind and their eighteenth century

treatment by electuaries, boluses, plaisters and pills. An occasional account for a coroner's inquest seemed enough of this melancholy series ; and only a few of the many and lengthy bills for meat and drink for the Corporation are given to serve as samples and as evidence that the members of the Corporation were very well able to look after themselves. Copies of the fairly frequent effusive addresses to Royal personages are omitted, save for a solitary specimen. One full list of recognisances in connection with licensed houses is given, together with a key map, which show the generous scale of provision for liquid refreshment in the middle of the eighteenth century, and help in tracing those houses which still survive. It must be emphasized that the exact site of many is a matter of conjecture.

As in previous volumes, lists of the members of the Corporation and of freemen as they were admitted are given year by year in full.

The editors have continued the strictly chronological sequence as far as possible (variations in the accounts are inevitable from their original arrangement according to date of payment), and have preserved the phonetic spelling of illiteracy, which is most apparent in the accounts of tradesmen ; the number of different ways of spelling the words "corporation" and "chamberlain" will surprise readers. Words have been printed as written, and explanation is added only when there is sufficient obscurity to warrant it. There are, as might be expected, some interesting examples of local dialect and obsolete, or almost obsolete words. The Chamberlains' accounts contain several examples of the word "rowel," which is defined in the *Oxford Dictionary* as "? a circular drain-cover," the only example quoted being from an earlier volume of *Records of the Borough of Nottingham*. In volume II, however, "The Rowell" was described as a small stream running into the Leen, its course being probably represented by the boundary of St. Peter's parish. Where the word occurs in the present volume, it seems more likely that the entries refer to the actual drains rather than to their covers, and it is probable that the earlier Rowel was a similar open drain and not a natural stream.¹

Abbreviations are also left unextended, although this is not usually approved in printing records ; but the abbreviated words are often picturesque, and any necessary explanations are added.

In adding notes, the view taken has been that these should be as few as possible, first, to link an item with a previous or succeeding one ; secondly, to elucidate an entry not sufficiently explained in the text ; thirdly, to define an unusual word or phrase, particularly

if this has any special local bearing ; fourthly, to add dates or other supplementary details ; fifthly, to explain relationships, or give brief biographical or topographical accounts. The end in view has been to elucidate without being either verbose or fussy.

The index is one unit and comprehensive, which again is not according to the recommended practice of providing separate indexes *rerum, personarum et locorum*. Long experience of both editors in handling reference books has convinced them that duplicate or multiple indexes to the same work are a burden and not a help, as one must examine both or all before being sure that the item sought is, or is not, included. The addition of brief explanatory matter to the index entries helps in finding what is required quickly, and compensates for any inconvenience that may be found in not having adopted the prescribed method. Although every effort has been made to separate entries relating to different persons who bear the same name, some cases are admittedly doubtful, and the grouping of entries under one name should not be accepted as complete proof of identity. References to an official are not, as a rule, indexed also under his personal name unless it appears in the text. Occupations named in the list of burgesses are not indexed.

VII. The editors wish to place on record help received from Mr. J. E. Richards, the Town Clerk ; the City Engineer, Mr. R. M. Finch, and his architectural assistant, Mr. S. V. Cherry, who prepared the key map of licensed houses from that of Badder and Peat ; and Miss P. M. Harris, who assisted considerably in the sorting and arranging of material before selection and abstraction could take place.

[After reciting the provision of the relevant Acts, etc.] This Court doth now hereby rate and Assess upon the said Town of Nottingham and the County thereof the said sum of One Hundred and Forty Two pounds in manner following that is to say upon the parish of Saint Mary . . . the sum of Ninety Eight pounds nine shillings and five pence half penny as and for the share and proportion of such parish towards the said sum of One hundred and Forty Two pounds and upon the parish of Saint Peter . . . the sum of Twenty five pounds Fifteen shillings and Three pence Three farthings . . . and upon the parish of Saint Nicholas . . . the sum of Seventeen pounds fifteen Shillings and Two pence Three farthings . . . which said Several sums . . . this Court doth hereby order and direct shall be forthwith raised Levyed and Collected by the Churchwardens and Overseers of the poor of the said Several parishes of Saint Mary Saint Peter and Saint Nicholas respectively out of the Rates for the Relief of the poor . . . and be forthwith paid . . . to the Treasurer of the County of Nottingham in order that the said Treasurer may pay over the same sum of One hundred and Forty Two pounds to the Receiver General of the said County of Nottingham . . .

The Humble Address of the Mayor and Burgesses of the Town of Nottingham in Common Council Assembled To the Kings Most Excellent Majesty.

We Your Majesties most Dutifull and Loyal Subjects the Mayor and Burgesses of the Town of Nottingham in Common Council Assembled, beg leave to approach Your Royal presence with that Submissive and gratefull Affection which is due to the illustrious Descendant of the House of Hanover and with all humility to supplicate the intervention of Your Majesties Wisdom and Power for the averting those unusual Calamities which hang over our Country, and which affect us with the deepest concern.

In the present critical Situation of these Kingdoms it becomes Britons to drop every consideration but that of Love to their Sovereign and their Country, and to unite as one Man in their endeavours by all lawfull means to stay those Evils which threaten to involve the whole British Community in one general distress. Imprest with this Sentiment permit us Sire, to express our dread of the consequences of those Addresses which making a Shew of peculiar Loyalty to Your Majesty, and of distinguished Zeal for the Rights of the British Legislature, recommend an unyeilding

persuit of measures, which whether Constitutional or not, if we may judge from present appearances are perhaps as impracticable as they are ruinous. We would yield to none in a faithfull Attachment to your Sacred person and Government, or in a zealous concern for the permanence and dignity of our well tempered Constitution ; By these Principles your Majesties Corporation of Nottingham has ever been distinguished, and these Principles would We transmit as the most valuable Inheritance to Posterity. We would meet the best Subjects of your Majesty in all their Loyalty and Zeal, but at the same time Check if possible that Intemperate passion, which for the sake of uncertain and Ideal Advantages would hazzard the dismembering of the British Empire, and the loss of those provinces, to which the dignity of your Majesties Crown and the Prosperity Wealth and Power of these Kingdoms have been so largely indebted and on which our preservation from the ambitious designs of rival Nations may hereafter principally depend.

We wish to see one presiding Spirit actuate the whole British Empire, We wish to see a due Subordination maintained throughout the whole to the Authority of the British Legislature, nor would we be thought to Countenance any Claims that lead to independence, But we fear the hand of force will never answer the wishes of any Friend to this Country We dread even Victory itself, every Victory, but that over the Wills and Affections of our American Fellow Subjects (which Arms and violence are but ill fitted to produce) as any other victory can be but temporary and delusive, since the disunion of Affections with America would rob us of the most valuable advantages of Conquest and no Armed force which this Nation can spare is we apprehend equal to the unwilling subjection of so wide a Dominion.

Permit us gracious Sovereign with all humility to express our concern at seeing our gallant Officers and Soldiers, in whom the generous sence of Duty and honour declines no danger exposed in this unfortunate and unequal Contest, and our regret that their Courage is not reserved for a field in which against the natural Enemies of Britain they might win Honour to themselves and advantage to their Country ; In particular we greive to find absent on such an Errand a Descendant of that Noble Family, which in every walk of glory has equalled the Roman Name, to whom we had intrusted our Representation in Parliament, where, by his services to his Country and to America he might have perpetuated that grateful remembrance which his Brother had so gloriously acquired. ¹

From this melancholly view Sire, we would willingly turn our own Eyes, nor presume to introduce it to your Majesty, if we did not hope that so awful a Schene might draw your Royal attention, and induce to that releif which it is in your Majestys power to bestow. Actuated no less by unfeigned Affection to your Royal Person and Government, and to the true Dignity and happiness of the Throne, than Zeal for the Welfare of our Country and of Posterity, we have ventured to represent these truths in the Serious and affecting light in which we view them. May our Address appear to your Majesty in its honest simplicity and integrity may it contribute with the requests of other your Majestys faithfull Subjects to call forth your paternal regard for your afflicted people.

The first Object of our desires and Wishes is the return of peace and Cordial Union with our American Fellow Subjects, and to this End most gracious Sovereign we make it our humble and earnest request that your Majesty would suspend those hostilities which we fear can have no other than a fatal Issue and in your great Wisdom and goodness restore that better System of Interchangeable Interests and Affections of whose blessing no just Calculation can be formed, and which a long Experience has proved to be an ample foundation for every desirable advantage to this Country.¹

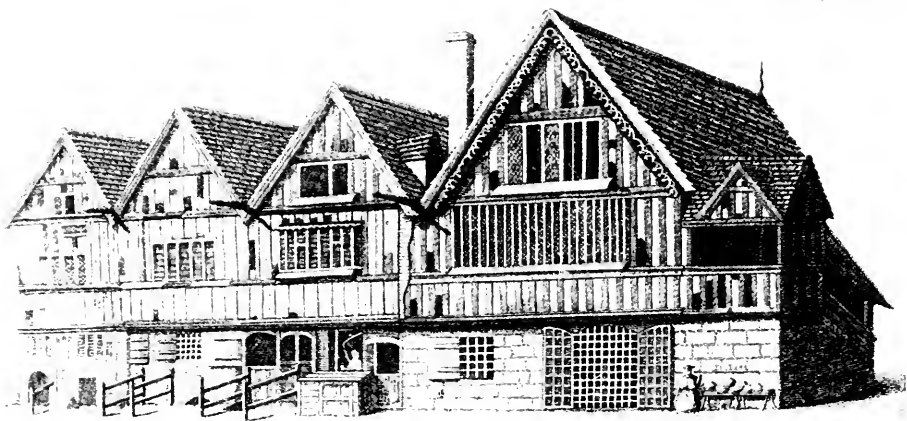

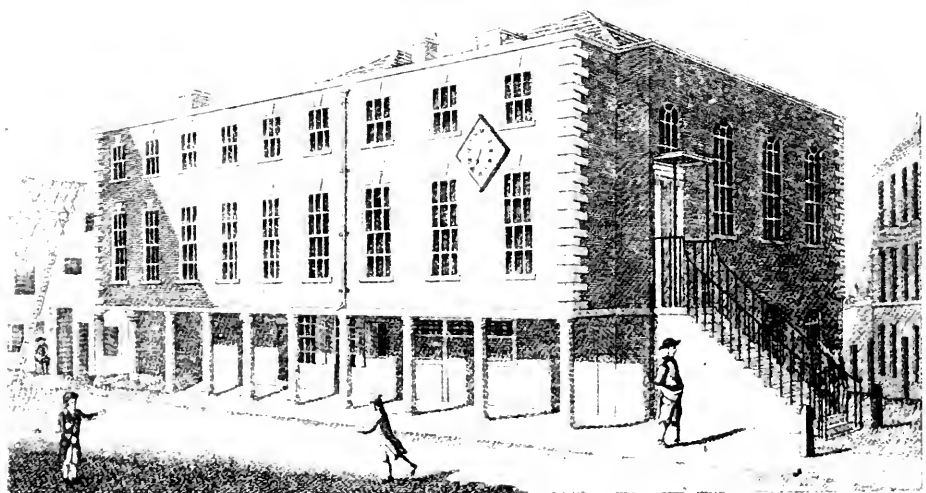

“Sir,

The Gentlemen by whose Order I wrote to the Mayor of Nottingham on the 7th of February and the 21st of March 1789 relative to the repairs of the Trent Lane, have again at a Meeting held for the purpose on Saturday last, directed me to address you on the same subject and to inform you that they have reconsidered my letters and also the Town Clerk's of February the 23rd and April 3rd written to me by order of the Common Hall, and they are of opinion that the promises contained in that of the 3rd of April (on the Faith of which their intended legal proceedings were withheld) have by no means been fulfilled but that both the road and Bridge are now in a very bad state of repair—that several accidents have happened on the new formed road between the Trent and the Pindar's house for want of a Fence which they apprehend is absolutely necessary for the safety of Travellers ; that the road between the Pindar's house and the Town is now in a worse state than before their former Representation ; that during the course of the last winter, when the common road was impassable an arbitrary, and they apprehend, an illegal Toll for passing on the temporary road was by order of the then Mayor demanded of the public going to and from Nottingham which circumstances, collectively considered are indefensible, detrimental to the Town and Neighbourhood and highly dishonourable to the Corporation of Nottingham.

They have directed me further to say, that since their last Meeting they have procured more complete information than they had before,

both of the *Nature* and *Value* of the Trust Estates in possession of the Corporation and under the management of their Officers ; by which they have the greatest reason to think that there is now and has been for many years past a very great Misapplication and Abuse and that 300*£* a year the annual rent of the Bridge Estate (judiciously applied) has long been more than sufficient for keeping the Bridge in good repair and making the road from thence to the Town as safe and commodious as any in the Kingdom ; and if they were not fully convinced of this they would not think themselves authorized to remonstrate on the subject.

To prevent as much as possible every suspicion, or appearance of want of candour in their proceedings on this business they have desired me to give you their Sentiments as above ; hoping that you will order a Fence to be put down immediately on the East side of the new road between the Trent Bridge and the Pindar's ; and on the West side against Mr. Plumtree's Trent Close :—that you will not permit any Toll to be taken for passing on the Trent Lanes at any time in future :—that you will give them satisfactory assurances that at the first proper season, the road between the Pindar's house and the Town shall be perfectly safe and commodious and that particular attention be paid to placing sufficient Guards at places under a state of repair as a security from Danger to passengers which in the Night time is most essentially necessary :—and for the want of which there has been very great and deserved cause of Complaint for these Ten weeks past, as well as for the greatest part of the time of the improvement of the road South of the Pindar's house.

I am ordered to inform you finally that this most likely will be their last representation of the kind to you on the Business ; and that on your Answer (which they hope to receive before the first of December) their future legal proceedings will be directed."

“That whenever any Lease granted by the Corporation shall expire the Corporation do in no case grant any new Lease or even suffer the occupier to continue Tenant at Will thereof previous to a regular investigation having taken place to ascertain whether the Tenant has performed the terms of his Lease.

“That the Corporation do grant no new Lease to any person whatsoever except they have good reason to apprehend that the Tenant will occupy the same himself & every such Lease shall contain a Covenant restricting the Tenant from assigning the same without the Consent of the Corporation.

“That the Corporation do adopt the same Principle with regard to Tenants at Will.

“That the Committee do further recommend it to the Corporation to sell the Land on Tollhouse Hill belonging to them by Public Auction as soon as convenient in two Lots according to the Plan made thereof by Mr Stretton by their direction and now Produced to the Hall for their Inspection.

“That they also recommend it to the Hall to sell the Land on the Sandhills by Public Auction as soon as convenient in seventeen Lots according to the Plan made thereof by Mr Stretton & now produced to the Hall.

“That the Corporation do as soon as they can obtain or give possession thereof let the Ground belonging to the Houses in the occupation of Dance Barlow & Twells in Coalpit Lane and also the House & Garden in the occupation of John Handley by Private Contract on Building Leases for 70 Years on the best Terms they can reasonably obtain for the same—The Persons agreeing for such Leases undertaking to pay for the Materials of the Old Buildings at a fair Valuation.”

And this Hall do authorize and empower the said Committee to carry into Execution the several Businesses recommended to this Hall by the said report and to sell and dispose and lett the several estates in the Manner therein stated under such Conditions of Sale or Terms as the said Committee shall think most conducive to the interest of the Corporation.

Ordered that the report of the School Committee be received and entered amongst the Proceedings of this Hall.

Report of School Committee—

“That the said Committee are of opinion that there should be only one Master and one Usher to teach the Classics in the said school—That the Master should have a salary of £100 per Annum and the Usher a Salary of £70 per annum for and during the life of Mr Wylde ¹ the present Master and upon his Decease the said Salaries to be raised at the Pleasure of the Corporation—And it is the opinion of this Committee that the Head Master of the said School should be permitted to take and educate any number of Boarders not exceeding Ten.

“That it is the opinion of this Committee that the Master and Usher of the Said school should be appointed and hold their respective offices without any other terms or Conditions being required of them than those imposed by the Deed of Foundation or by any subsequent constitution made or to be made by the Corporation for the regulation of the school.

“That this Committee are of opinion that the Election for the Master and Usher of the said school should take Place as soon as possible and that the Rev^d Mr. Forrest, the Rev^d Mr. Beetham & the Rev^d Mr Gilbert Wakefield be recommended to the Hall as the three Candidates who appear to the Committee most eligible.” ²

This Hall do appoint the Election for the Master of the said School to take place on Friday the first day of February next at Eleven O Clock in the Forenoon at the Guildhall of the said Town

That such Capstern was originally erected by your Petitioners or their Lessees and has ever since been maintained by them in consideration of a small but stipulated Gratuity agreed to be paid them for the Use of such Capstern by every Vessel Passing through such Bridge whence from the Number of Vessels contributing thereto your Petitioners have long derived a Considerable Revenue.

That Your Petitioners observe by the Votes that a Bill is depending before your Honorable House (the main Object of which being the further Improvement of the Navigation of the River Trent has the decided Approbation of your Petitioners) under the Authority of which a Cut or Canal is intended to be made from the Trent above the said Bridge at Beeston Meadow into the Nottingham Canal which by diverting the whole course of the Navigation of the River from its present Course through the Trent Bridge will deprive your Petitioners of nearly the whole of the Revenue they at present derive from the Money Payable for the Use of such Capstern.

Ordered by us the Justices of the Peace . . . that Walter Merrey¹ of the said Town and County of the Town of Nottingham Hosier be and he is hereby appointed Treasurer for the Town and County of the Town of Nottingham for the purpose of receiving of and

from the said Joseph Howard or such other person or persons as for the time being may be the High Constable or High Constables of the said Town or be authorized to receive and Collect the same such Sum or Sums of Money as the said Joseph Howard or such High Constable or Constables or such person or persons as aforesaid may Collect and receive of and from the Churchwardens and Overseers of the poor of the respective parishes of and within the said Town by virtue of such rate or Rates as may be from time to time raised and levied within the said Town by us the said Justices in the nature of a County rate or Rates which said Sum or Sums of Money so received by the said Walter Merrey shall be deemed and taken to be a publick Stock and be paid by the said Walter Merrey to such person or persons as we the said Justices at our respective General or Quarter Sessions or the greater part of us shall by our Order from time to time appoint for such Uses and purposes as the publick Stock of the said Town and County of the said Town of Nottingham is or may be applicable by Law.

Your Committee report That Mr. Green, the surveyor, has attended your Committee to advise with them regarding the best Mode of repairing the Damage done by the present very heavy Flood to the Road leading from the Trent Bridge to the Town of Nottingham And Your Committee did depute Mr. Thomas Oldknow, in Concert with Mr. Green, to take the necessary steps towards immediately making a temporary Road from the Trent Bridge to the Pinder's House for the passage of Horses & Light Carriages And did request Mr. Oldknow & Mr. Green to take a View of the Road early enough to make a report thereof to this Hall.

Mr. Green now appearing and making his Report regarding the state of the new Road to the Trent this Hall do now authorize Mr. Green to make a temporary Road as soon as possible for Horses and light Carriages And that in order to make a foot path over the Breach made in the Road by the floods between the Leen Bridge and the new Flood Bridge Mr. Green do take a Boat belonging to Mr. Bourn of Eastwood lying near the new Brewery for which this Hall will make Mr. Bourn Compensation.

This Hall do now authorize the Annual Committee to take such steps as to them may seem expedient towards the Reparation of the Trent Road.

Resolved that this Hall do request Permission of Mr. Deakin the steward of the Duke of Newcastle for Horses and Carriages to pass over the Duke's Land near the Engine House from the Meadows to the Town during the present entire Stoppage of the High Road to the Leen Bridge.

That the Town Clerk be desired to take the Opinion of Counsel regarding the real Disposition of the Bridge Estate Whether it be for the Repair of the Bridges and Roads between them or only for the Repair of the Bridges.

Mr. Huish now moves and is seconded by Mr. Rawson that a Paragraph which Mr. Huish now reads be inserted in the Nottingham Paper calling the Attention of the public to the relief of the many very heavy sufferers by the Present Flood And this Hall do unanimously approve thereof And do resolve that this Corporation do subscribe for that purpose the Sum of Twenty Pounds.

Flood damage and Bridge estate finances

Your Committee report

That having maturely Considered the present ruinous Situation of the road from the Town to the Trent Bridge, and of the

Flood, and Chain Bridges on the same Roads occasioned by the late Floods, are of Opinion that it is essential to the public Interest that a fund should be immediately provided for repairing these Dilapidations, for securing the Road by every possible precaution from similar Accidents in future and for ensuring its permanent reparation; and that such a Fund Cannot be provided without the Aid of Parliament.

That Your Committee Conceive that altho' it is neither within the province or power of the Corporation to supply such a Fund they are loudly Called upon by their former Interference regarding the repair of this road to Contribute liberally to any fund which may be necessary to its future Security & Improvement; the more especially, if such a Fund, under the Wise provisions of an Act upon a large and Comprehensive Plan, can be rendered subservient also to other purposes of the highest public Utility.

Your Committee therefore Submit to this Hall, whether it would not be for their Honor if not for their Interest to give their Consent to a Bill for repairing the Present Road and Bridges and also the Leen Bridge, for widening the Entrance into the Town by Hollow Stone and Chapel Bar, for making a good road from the Leen Bridge to the Mansfield Turnpike, by way of Fishergate and Cartergate, & Broad Lane; and also by way of Bridlesmith gate and Cow Lane; and to the Derby road by way of Parliament Street & for Providing for the future repair of these roads and also for making a Compensation to the Corporation for their Tolls, & exonerating the public therefrom upon the following Terms:—

That the Funds for carrying these purposes into Execution be provided by a Toll to be collected at the Trent Bridge; and by the produce of the Bridge Estate, for which the Corporation are to be rendered accountable to the Commissioners under the Act; amongst whom are to be the Common Hall by virtue of their Office, for the Term & in the Manner hereinafter mentioned.

That the Bridge Estate be under the Management of the Common Hall, & its Committees who are to have the entire patronage and Controul over the same, as at present, and be also empowered to appoint a person to receive the rents of such Estate with a salary not exceeding Twenty Pounds per Annum; such Estate Contributing one fourth part of the Expences of all Committee Meetings for the purpose of managing and conducting the Business of the Corporation Estates, in any manner occurring; the whole of the Expences of the Town Clerk as Solicitor to the Corporation in their Character as Trustees of

this Estate such Expences being to be ascertained by the Annual Committee for the time being signified by Order of the Mayor for the time being directing the payment thereof. That subject to these Deductions & subject to such sums of Money as the Bridgmasters may expend in the repair of the Trent Bridges; the Corporation are to account with the Commissioners under the Act for the produce of the Estate for so long time as by the Operation of the Act they shall Continue liable so to do.

That the Commissioners under the Act shall be at liberty to borrow any sum for the Purpose of Carrying it into Execution on the security of the Tolls and the produce of the Bridge Estate.

That within three Years after the Passing the Act the Commissioners shall take an Account of all sums of Money borrowed for the purpose of Carrying it into Execution & also an Account (as soon as the said Road can be finished) of the produce of the Tolls & also of the first Year's clear produce of the Bridge Estate and from thence to the Debt contracted for these Purposes shall be chargeable separately upon the said Tolls and the Bridge Estate in proportion as they shall be found to have Contributed to the fund then provided for its repayment; the Debt of Six Hundred and seventy Pounds due from the Bridge Estate to Mr. Thomas Pepper being to be accounted as so much paid by the Bridge Estate in part of its proportion of such Debt; and if at any time so long as the Debt shall remain unpaid the Corporation shall provide the proportion of such Debt chargeable upon the Bridge Estate, to be accounted as before mentioned by a Mortgage of the said Estate which they are by the Act to be empowered to make & pay the same into the Hands of the Commissioners under the Bill or their Treasurers, or when, & as soon as the whole of such Debt is repaid with Interest, the Bridge shall be entirely exonerated from any Expences of repairing such road & Bridges and shall revert to the Corporation upon Trust to repair the Bridges over the Trent, according to the Letters Patent of Edward the 6th.

That from thenceforth the Tolls shall Continue liable to repair of such roads & Bridges & the payment of the Compensation after mentioned to the Corporation in lieu of the Tolls to be given up.

That the Corporation of Nottingham shall receive out of the fund provided by the Bill an Annual sum of Sixty two pounds, in lieu of the Sheriff's Toll now payable for the passing over the said Trent Bridge, being the Amount of the Fee farm rent payable to the Crown on account thereof; and also the sum of

Fifty two pounds being the present neat produce of their Toll on Corn as farmed by Mr. Joseph Shore in Consideration whereof the public are to be entirely exonerated from the payment of such Tolls in future.

That after satisfying these purposes, the Surplus of such Tolls shall be funded for the purpose of raising a fund for widening & improving the Trent Bridges.

Resolved that several Gentlemen in the Town having advised that the Corporation should give up certain Tolls in Lieu of the proposed Abandonment of the Bridge Estate, this Hall Do Agree to give up all their Tolls receivable at the Trent Bridge & Payable to the Sheriffs And also the Tolls due to them on all Corn sold or delivered within the Town in Case a Bill should be obtained for repairing the present road & Bridges, the Chain and flood Bridges and also the Leen Bridge and for constructing such other Flood Bridges as may be thought necessary And for making repairing and widening a road from the Leen Bridge to join the Mansfield Turnpike by way of Hollow Stone Church side High-pavement Middle pavement Bridlesmith gate High street, and Cow Lane, for widening the Entrance into the Town by way of Chapel Bar, for paving & improving the same & for Contributing in Common with the Trustees of the other Roads liable to repair the same, to the Improvement of the road from Chapel Bar to the Top of the Sandhills; And that the Annual Committee be requested and authorized to prepare an Address to the public on this subject in the Name of this Corporation in order that the same may be printed & distributed previous to the next public meeting called on this Business.

1795. Thursday, 30 April

Repair of roads damaged by the flood

Resolved that this Hall do agree to offer to the Publick the Alternative of the two Proposals lately made to them regarding the Repair of the Road from the Trent Bridge to the Town of Nottingham (the Report made to this Hall regarding the giving up the Bridge Estate being amended as the same has been now read to this Hall) and that this Resolution be signified by an Address from this Corporation, which the Annual Committee are hereby authorized to prepare and publish in their name as their final determination on this Subject (this Proposal being made upon the express Condition that a Bill be obtained and assented to in the present Sessions of Parliament for the temporary repair of the Road for which purpose a half Toll should be collected at the Trent Bridge the Corporation

contributing eighty Pounds per Annum thereto out of the Bridge Estate) untill the whole of the objects contemplated by the late Publick Meeting can be carried into effect by the Attainment of an Act upon a more comprehensive Scale. And that such Address when prepared be entered by the Town Clerk amongst the proceedings of this Hall and the same is entered accordingly.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Nottingham the Neighbouring Gentry and the Publick in General.

The Corporation of Nottingham immediately after the Damage done to the Road from the Town to the Trent Bridge and the Flood and Chain Bridges on the same Road were convinced that it was essential to the Publick Interest that a Fund should be immediately provided for repairing these Dilapidations, for securing the Road by every possible Precaution from similar accidents in future, and for insuring its permanent Reparation ; and that such a Fund could not be provided without the aid of Parliament.

An Application was made to Mr. Daniel Parker Coke early in the month of February on this Subject, by whom they are informed, on the Authority of the Speaker, that the Day for receiving private Petitions being passed, it was impossible during the present Sessions to obtain any Act of Parliament for that Purpose. On this Account they considered any further Agitation of the Question as useless for the present.

Very late in the month of March several Gentlemen of the highest Respectability in the Town applied to some of the leading Members in the Corporation, and showed them the Votes of the House of Commons ; by which it appeared that under similar circumstances the House had given leave for Bills to be introduced for repairing the Damages done by the late Floods ; and urged in the most forcible manner, that the Corporation, as a Publick body, should and ought to come forward with some Proposal on the subject of the Road and Bridges.

The standing Committee of the Corporation for the Year, was in consequence immediately called together ; and on the first of April last they made a Report to the Common Hall ; by which they recommended to them (provided a Bill could be obtained for repairing the present Road and Bridges and also the Leen Bridge for widening the Entrance into the Town by way of Hollow Stone and Chapel Bar ; for making a good Road from the Leen Bridge to the Mansfield Turnpike by way of Fishergate and Cartergate and Broad Lane ; and also by way of Bridlesmith Gate and Cow Lane, and to the Derby Road by way of Parliament

Street and for providing for the future repair of these Roads) the Propriety of giving up the Bridge Estate to these objects for a time only under certain Limitations and Restrictions.

This Report was printed and submitted on Saturday the fourth Day of April last, to a Select Meeting; at which several of the principal Gentlemen of the Town and Neighbourhood were particularly requested to attend.

At the Suggestion of several Gentlemen not in the Corporation, who were present at this Meeting, and who conceived this Proposal would be attended with many unpleasant Circumstances both to the Corporation and the Publick, another Common Hall was held on this Business on the seventh Day of April; and it was there determined (in lieu of the temporary Surrender of the Bridge Estate) to offer to the Publick to give up for ever the Tolls at present collected at the Trent Bridge; and also the Toll on Corn received in Nottingham; which together produce to the Corporation an actual present Rent of One hundred and Forteen pounds per Annum; and the Amount of which, as payable by the Publick, may be fairly estimated at between Two and Three hundred pounds per Annum.

This Proposal was submitted to a General Meeting of the Gentlemen of the Town and County held at the Guildhall by publick Advertizement on the eighth Day of April; who unanimously agreed to accept of the Proposition made to them by the Corporation and to support an Act to be obtained on the terms thereof, for very nearly the same Purposes, which have been before enumerated.

A Petition has been in consequence presented to the House of Commons for leave to bring in a Bill, which has been referred to a Committee; but the House has refused to permit any other objects to be introduced into this Bill, but such as are strictly connected with the repair of the Road and Bridges. The Attainment therefore of the proposed Improvements at the Trent Bridge, and at the leading Entrances into the Town, are equally impracticable during the present Sessions.

At a Meeting on Saturday last of the Committee appointed by the Publick Meeting of the eighth Day of April for obtaining the Bill contemplated (the Honourable Henry Sedley in the Chair) it was resolved that the Committee was of Opinion, that it was expedient and necessary immediately to Apply for a Bill for repairing the Road from the Trent Bridge to the Town and the Chain Flood and Leen Bridges on the said Road; (the Corporation contributing in proportion to their former Proposal on the subject) and to obtain a small Toll for that purpose untill a Bill could be solicited for

carrying into Execution all the Objects proposed at the former Meeting.

The Corporation, both from the Opinion of Gentlemen upon the Committee and others unconnected with it, have reason for believing that many Persons are dissatisfied with the relinquishment of the Scheme for the partial Abandonment of the Bridge Estate ; and after having held another Common Hall this Day on the same Business and given it the fullest Consideration, they think it expedient to make Publick their final Determination on this Subject.

The Corporation are willing to enter into any Engagement to give up the Tolls mentioned in their former Address to the Publick, or to give up the Bridge Estate, which ever the Publick may think most advantageous to them, upon the terms hereafter mentioned ; upon Condition that the Publick consent to a temporary Bill to be brought into Parliament during the present Sessions, and to another Bill in the ensuing Sessions upon the Terms hereafter distinctly specified vizt.—

That the temporary Bill shall be obtained for the repair of the Road and Bridges (the Funds for that purpose being to be provided by a half Toll at the Trent Bridge, and by an annual Sum of eighty Pounds charged upon the Bridge Estate) that the Commissioners under this Bill shall have power to borrow any Sum necessary for their purposes upon the Security of the Funds thereby provided ; and that Funds shall continue applicable thereto, untill such Sums of Money and the Interest so borrowed shall be repaid, and untill a Fund shall have been provided competent to the future annual Repair of these Roads and Bridges ; and then the Tolls shall cease as well as the payment out of the Bridge Estate.

That the General Bill shall be obtained for enlarging the powers of the Commissioners in the former Bill, by enabling them besides the purposes in the partial Act, to keep in repair and widen where necessary the Road from the Leen Bridge to join the Mansfield Turnpike by way of Hollow Stone, Church side, High Pavement, Middle Pavement, Bridlesmith gate, High Street, and Cow Lane ; for widening and improving the Entrances into the Town by way of Hollow Stone and Chapel Bar ; for contributing in Common with the Trustees of the other Roads liable to repair the same, to the Improvement of the Road from Chapel bar to the Top of the Sandhills ; and for widening or rebuilding, as the said Commissioners may judge necessary, the present Bridges over the River Trent ; and for keeping the same during the time mentioned in the Act in repair.

That the Funds for carrying into Execution these purposes (when consolidated with the objects of the former Bill) shall be provided

by a whole Toll to be collected at the Trent Bridge and by the whole of the produce of the Bridge Estate (after the several payments by way of Fees or Allowances or to Burgesses in lieu of Burgess Parts to which it is at present subject) for which the Corporation are to be rendered accountable to the Commissioners appointed by the act, amongst whom are to be the Common Hall by virtue of their Office as here after mentioned.

That the Bridge Estate shall be under the management of the Common Hall and its Committees, (who are to continue Trustees of such Estate for the purposes mentioned in the Act) and be also Empowred [*sic*] to appoint any person receiver of such Estate with a Salary not exceeding Twenty Pounds per Annum; such Estate being liable to all Expences incurred by the Corporation or their Agents in their Character of Trustees thereof.

That subject to these Deductions, the Corporation are to account with the Commissioners under the Act, for the produce of such Estate during so long time as by the operation of the Act they shall continue liable so to do; but, that they are not to be answerable either by way of Bill in Equity, or in any other way, for any more Rent than has usually been paid by the Burgesses of Nottingham for such part of the Estate as hath usually been called Burgess Parts; nor be compelled or compellable to disturb any such Burgess or Burgesses having Possession of any part thereof.

That the Commissioners under the Act, shall be at Liberty to borrow any Sum of Money for the purpose of carrying it into Execution on the Security of the Tolls and the Surplus Produce of the Bridge Estate.

That the Funds shall continue applicable to the purposes intended to be carried into Execution by the proposed Act of Parliament, untill the whole of such Debt shall be repaid with Interest, and a Fund provided competent to the Annual Repair of the Roads and Flood Bridges. That then the Toll shall cease, and the Bridge Estate shall revert to the Corporation for the Repair of the Bridges over the River Trent according to the Letters Patent of Edward the sixth.

Repair of Trent Road and bridges

This Hall having taken into Consideration the Result of the Publick Meeting held yesterday the fourth Instant [*sic*], on the Subject of the repair of the Trent Road and Bridges, are determined on the part of the Corporation entirely to abandon for the present the Bill intended to be carried into Parliament on this Subject; and to suffer the Road and Bridges to remain in their present State; and they request that the Town Clerk do (with the Sanction of the Annual Committee) prepare an Address or Letter in the Name of this Hall to be sent to the Country Gentlemen explaining to them the reasons of their Conduct upon this Occasion; and that such Letter or Address when prepared be entered amongst the Proceedings of this Hall which is accordingly done.

Sir!

Inclosed you receive an Address from the Corporation of Nottingham to the Publick which will fully explain their Conduct regarding a Bill intended to be brought into Parliament (which has received the cordial and almost unanimous Concurrence of all Ranks Parties and Descriptions in the Town) for repairing the Road from the Trent Bridge to the Town of Nottingham; and other purposes mentioned in that Address, up to the time of the last Publick Meeting held on this Business on Monday last the fourth Day of this Instant May.

It appears by the inclosed Paper, that on Saturday last the second Day of May, the Noblemen and Gentlemen therein mentioned, met by themselves or their Agents and came to the Resolutions therein contained; which were delivered to the Corporation, and which they have desired me to inclose for your Consideration, in order that you may judge concerning the Foundations on which that Address and those Resolutions rest.

On Monday last another Meeting was held at the Instance of the Committee appointed at the former Publick Meeting, to consider whether it was not expedient and necessary immediately to apply for a Bill for repairing the Road from the Trent Bridge to the Town, and the Chain Flood and Leen Bridges on the same Road; at which the Address of the Corporation and the Resolutions of the Country Gentlemen were read. Some of the Gentlemen who signed these Resolutions were present at this Meeting, and the Question of the Claim of the Publick on the Corporation for the repair of

this Road and the Liability of the Bridge Estate thereto having been very fully discussed, it was moved, that the Gentlemen present should come to a Resolution expressive of their Opinion of the Liberality and Fairness of the Proposal of the Corporation ; and of their determination to accept it, but altho' the whole Room (except a few of the Country Gentlemen) seemed cordially to support the motion, it^s was withdrawn at the Instance of one of the Gentlemen who had concurred in the Resolutions, who stated that such a Resolution would be considered as a Declaration of War on the part of the Corporation and of the Town.

Such are the facts which have produced the withdrawing the Bill in Question from the House of Commons during the present Sessions ; but as this Act may be attended with the most serious Inconveniences to the Publick, the Corporation think fit in some degree to explain their Conduct upon the occasion, that these consequences may not be imputed to them.

It has been urged that the Bridge Estate is liable to repair the Road in question, and that it being competent to that purpose, no Toll is necessary. The Corporation have submitted to two publick Meetings the Royal Charter of Edward the sixth, under which they claim this Estate, which distinctly and unequivocally confines this Trust to the repair of certain Bridges upon the River Trent ; the Trust Deed cannot therefore have the smallest reference or bearing upon the Question as far as it regards the Repair of this Road.

The Corporation do not admit themselves in any form liable to the Repair of the Road ; but if the Burthen of it can in any way be fixed upon them, it must rest upon the immemorial usage which is said to have prevailed regarding it. If this be the Basis of that Obligation, and the Resolutions of the Country Gentlemen say that it is, whether it applies to the Corporation in their Corporate Capacity, or as Trustees of the Bridge Estate, it can only extend to charge them with the repair of a Road as it has immemorially existed in the State of a Wash Road, liable at all times to be overflowed ; instead of the present Flood Road which has not existed for more than two Years.

The Country Gentlemen have claimed of the Corporation the repair of the Road in its present State, and have demanded the application of the Bridge Estate thereto. This application being resisted on the part of the Corporation, if both parties persist the Law must determine between them. The first Question must be decided by Indictment at the Assizes, which in the Common Course of Law Proceedings cannot determine it in less than two Years, the latter must be made the Subject of a Chancery Suit which may exist for twenty Years.

The whole Expence of repairing the Road in its ancient State would not exceed Fifty Pounds per Annum. The Charge of making good the present Damages provided it be continued and secured as a Flood Road, will it is feared amount to full Four Thousand Pounds.

The insuring to the Publick the accomodation of a Flood Road to the Town the Improvement of its leading Entrances; and to the Country the widening or rebuilding the Trent Bridge, were on the part of the Corporation the only motives for the giving up the Income of their Bridge Estate, which now amounts to upwards of Three hundred pounds per Annum.

The Equity and Fairness, if not the Generosity of that Proposal, the Corporation submit with the most perfect Confidence to your deliberate Judgement, and that of an impartial Publick. They originally embarked in this Business from a Desire of rendering themselves extensively useful to the Community, and having paid the utmost Attention to every Objection urged against their former Propositions, they published the inclosed Address, under the Conviction that they had obviated every Obstacle to its being received with the most cordial and unanimous approbation.

It has, however, been opposed by the Country Gentlemen; to whom it appears that the same is insufficient and cannot with propriety be complied with by the Publick; and it being inexpedient if not impossible to go into Parliament at this late period of the Session with a threatned opposition, the whole is abandoned: and the Road and Bridges must remain in their present State.

The Corporation have directed me to state these Circumstances to you, in order that their Conduct may not be misrepresented or misunderstood.

This Court in pursuance of the Statute "For the Amendment and Preservation of the Highways" do order that from and immediately after this nineteenth day of April one thousand seven hundred and ninety eight the Surveyors of the Highways within the Parish of Saint Mary in the said Town shall complete and substantially repair a part of the King's High Way commonly called Fishergate and Cartergate situate in the said Parish which is now and for some time last past hath been in a ruinous and dangerous state and that such repair shall be done and completed out of the first Monies that shall come to their hands by virtue of their said Offices.

Whereas Application and Complaint upon Oath hath been made in open Court by the Surveyors of the Highways in the Parish of Saint Mary in the Town of Nottingham that the several Highways not being Turnpike within the said Parish of Saint Mary are very extensive and in bad repair and that a considerable part of the Statute Duty arising within the said Parish of Saint Mary hath been called forth and been required to be applied in the repair of a certain Turnpike Road leading from Nottingham to Mansfield in the County of Nottingham lying within the said Parish of Saint Mary which is in good condition and hath a considerable Revinue for its support arising from the Tolls collected thereupon And We having duly summoned the Surveyor of the said Turnpike Road to appear before us to shew cause why the said Statute Duty called forth and applied by him to the repair of the said Turnpike Road should not be withdrawn therefrom and applied to the repair of the other Highways within the said Parish of Saint Mary and upon hearing the said Surveyor and receiving an Account of the Revenues and Debts of the said Turnpike Road and of the State and Condition of the said Turnpike Road and Highway respectively and it appearing to us upon full consideration had thereupon that part of the Statute Duty hitherto employed by the said Surveyor for the repair of the said Turnpike Road may be conveniently dispensed with

Ordered that Mr. Robert Summers Mr. Samuel Worthington Mr. John Davison, Mr. Thomas Rawson and Mr. Henry Hollins together with such other Members of this Hall as may choose to attend, be a Committee to investigate the state of Sir Thomas White's Loan Money and that such Committee do make their report on that subject upon the next or some subsequent Hall Day.”

Your Committee in consequence of the above order did assemble at different times, but finding that the investigation committed to their charge was of considerable magnitude, and required deep research and therefore could not be so judiciously conducted by numbers as by a few members of the Committee—Mr. John Davison one of the Senior Council, and Mr. Thomas Rawson one of the Junior Council undertook with the assistance of Mr. Coldham the Town Clerk to accomplish the Directions of the Hall, and after a thorough Investigation of Sir Thomas White's Loan Money from it's origin are enabled to give the Statement No. 1. selected from the Mayors year's Books, the Account Books, and other Documents which Statement contains various receipts of Money from the Corporation of Coventry on account of the said Charity of the expences attending such receipts of various law expences respecting the same at the beginning of this century, and of the losses which have arisen by the failure of the Sureties and Principals to whom monies have at different times been allotted.

When these various expenditures and losses are deducted from the whole amount of the receipt, the balance ought to correspond with the amount of the Bonds now in the possession of the Corporation. But that Balance is found to be £9763. 8s. 1½d. and the Bonds being one Hundred and Seventy eight in number

of Fifty Pounds each make only £8900 which together with £200 in Money unallotted make £9100; consequently there is a deficiency of £663. 8. 1½. to be accounted for.

To discover how this deficiency has arisen has been an arduous and troublesome task; but by dint of application it has in a great measure been overcome.

First it will appear by reference to paper No. 2 that there have been from time to time upon receipt of the money from Coventry odd Sums unappropriated and except in one Instance never consolidated and lent out in Bonds of Fifty pounds as they ought to have been when these odd Sums reached to such an amount; but have remained in the hands of the Corporation, by which they have become indebted to the said Charity in the sum of £181. 7s. 4¼d.

Secondly it appears manifest upon an examination of the Lease Book from page 264 to page 312 from which we have extracted the Account now laid before you numbered 3 that the Corporation from the year 1732 to the year 1753 received as they became due Forty three Bonds of Ten pounds each and one Bond of Thirty pounds making together £460 and (as appears equally clear by the Lease Book) had never afterwards appropriated that sum to the purposes of the Charity but had applied it to various occasions of their own. This fact will receive further elucidation by examining the Entries in the Mayor's Books of the 26th July 1737 and the 23rd November, 1744 which we give in paper numbered 4.

Thus your Committee has been enabled to account for the Sum of £641. 7s. 4¼d.¹ which appears to be nearly the amount of the whole deficiency.

It may be proper for your Committee to represent to you that in the prosecution of this Inquiry there appeared to be no money entered in the Mayors Books or in any other as received from Coventry in the Year 1713, the year in which according to regular rotation monies ought to have been received. This Circumstance occasioned the Committee to examine a printed Statement of Sir Thomas Whites Charities with all the proceedings thereon respecting Suits in Chancery &c. from whence they were convinced that the Sum of £405. 4s. 2d. must have been received from the year 1710 to 1715 by each of the Towns to which that Charity appertains, as will appear by the above mentioned Book page 156—But your Committee not considering this printed Book to be sufficient evidence for the actual charging this money to the Account, they caused a Letter to be written to the Town Clerk

of Coventry requesting a Statement of Monies paid to the Corporation of Nottingham from the years 1700 to 1720 on account of Sir Thomas Whites Charity. To which request after various applications and much delay the Committee were at last informed that the Books papers and other documents respecting that Charity were found to be in so confused a state at that period that they were not able to give us a satisfactory answer.

We then applied to the Corporations of Leicester Northampton and Warwick to know if they had received from Coventry the said Sum of £405. 4s. 2d. The Town Clerk of Leicester informed us that they had received exactly that Sum in the year 1712. Northampton informed us that they had received the like Sum in 1711 and from Warwick we have not yet any Answer.

It being manifest from the above mentioned printed Book that the Corporation of Coventry actually did lend out in Bonds of Fifty pounds each the said Sum of £405. 4s. 2d. in the year 1710 and that Northampton has acknowledged to have received the same Sum in 1711 & Leicester 1712 and as the five different Towns receive the Charity Money in the following Order pursuant to the direction of Sir Thomas White first Coventry, then Northampton, Leicester, Nottingham and lastly Warwick, your Committee think this decisive evidence that the said Sum of £405. 4s. 2d. must have been received by the Corporation of Nottingham in the year 1713 the very year in which monies ought in course to have [been] received. This conclusion receives additional force by the consideration that if the Corporation of Nottingham had not received from Coventry the said sum of £405. 4s. 2d. there would have appeared by the Statement a surplus of Money in the hands of the Corporation belonging to Sir Thomas White's Charity which your Committee think highly improbable by any means to have happened.

From these various convincing premises your Committee can have no doubt but that the said Sum of £405. 4s. 2d. was received by the Corporation of Nottingham in the year 1713 and they have charged it in the Account accordingly.

Your Committee having laid before you the various Accounts Extracts and Statements before mentioned think it their duty to inform you that in their judgement the methods heretofore pursued in conducting this Business have been radically defective ; inasmuch as they have not been calculated to prevent abuse or to correct Error so essentially necessary in the management of public concerns. They therefore recommend the following or something like the following System be adopted for the future proceedings and management of this Loan Money.

First that a Committee of three persons be annually chosen by the Members of the Hall out of themselves to be called the Bond Committee who are to have the management of the said Loan Money subject at all times to the direction and control of the Hall. That in case of death resignation or Removal others be immediately chosen so that there be always an existing Committee of three persons.

Secondly that the Bond Committee do meet regularly every three months or oftener if necessary for the conducting of this Business.

Thirdly that the Bond Committee do every year in the first week in January examine that the Bonds in possession do correspond with the Entries of them in the Lease and Bond Books and that the Committee cause a Report of their number value and amount to be entered in the Mayors Book for the time being the first Hall Day after such examination.

Fourthly that a Book be provided to be intitled "The Bond Book for Sir Thomas White's Loan Money", and that the Bonds be all numbered from No. 1 progressively, and entered therein agreeable to a plan agreed upon by the Committee.

Fifthly that when any Bonds are taken for new Money received from Coventry, the number be continued progressively, from the highest number of the former Bonds.

Sixthly that the Bonds (being an increasing object of Importance) it is particularly recommended that an Iron Chest or some place of Safety be immediately provided for their greater security.

Seventhly—The Committee besides the Entry of the Bonds in the Bond Book do recommend that it be continued to enter them in the Lease Book as heretofore with the additional references as lately done by the Committee, and also that the number of each Bond be inserted and that any alterations that may from time to time be made in any of the Bonds, whether as to changing Securities Repayment or in any other way whatsoever, be uniformly minuted in the Mayor's Book for the time being.

Eighthly The Committee further recommend that the Conditions on which this Loan Money is lent as expressed in the Bonds be strictly adhered to in every particular. Many Inconveniences and much Injustice have arisen from various partialities and extension of Time allowed respecting the repayment of Bonds and Sir Thomas Whites Intentions defeated by the allotment of money to persons who have no means of making use of it themselves ; such delusion ought strictly to be guarded against and if at any time practised and discovered the money

should be immediately demanded, And as the Hall seems now pretty generally of opinion that this grievance ought to be done away; the Committee submit it to their consideration whether a Letter of the following nature to be signed by the Sureties may not greatly tend to remove this Complaint.

Sir,

You have agreed to be one of the Sureties for on Account of £50 allotted to him for his use for nine years out of Sir Thomas White's Loan Money upon certain conditions as expressed in the Bond, one of which is, that the Principal shall have the entire use of the said £50 during the said Term of nine years.

It is therefore required of you, testified by your Signature to this Letter, that you do solemnly declare that you have not, nor do you intend to have or take to your own use, by any means either directly or indirectly, any part of the said £50 during the said Term of nine years so lent to

Ninthly. For the better more speedy and correct management of this Business which is already become very important, the Committee recommend that a Clerk be appointed to attend the Bond Committee and enforce their directions and instructions therein with a Salary of a Sum not exceeding five Guineas per Annum.

And Finally, The Committee recommend that this Report together with the Account and all other papers referred to, and such of the Resolutions as may be adopted by the Hall, be entered in the present Mayors Book and at the End of the Bond Book. It would also be very useful to keep the printed Book so frequently mentioned with the Bonds as much useful matter is contained in it respecting all Sir Thomas Whites Charities and proceedings thereon."

Resolved, on the Consideration of the above Report and the papers accompanying the same that the System recommended by the Committee as detailed in the ten Regulations subjoined to the said Report be adopted by this Hall for the future Conduct of this Corporation regarding the said Loan Money and the management of the Trust to which the same have reference And that the Mayor for the time being, Mr. Thomas Rawson and Mr. John Davison be appointed the Bond Committee for the ensuing year and Mr. George Coldham the Town Clerk, Clerk to such Committee with the Salary recommended in the said Report, And that such Committee with their Clerk be empowered by this Hall to act in all respects as recommended by the said Report conforming themselves to the Rules therein prescribed for the Conduct of such Committee.

Resolved that Mr. Alderman Worthington Mr. Hollins and Mr. Summers together with such other Members of the Hall as may choose to attend be a Committee to investigate from the time of the Trust relating to Sir Thomas Whites Loan Money first devolving on this Corporation to the present period what Sums of Money have been Expences or Charges incurred by them on Account of the said Trust which ought to be charged to the Debit thereof over and above the Sums of Money placed to the Credit of the Corporation in the above Account marked No. 1. and to report concerning the same to the next or some other subsequent Hall.

Sir,

I received in due course your Letter of the 7th. Ultimo which I had no opportunity of laying before our Corporation untill Tuesday last the 28th day of January when a Common Hall was held for the very purpose of transacting Business which had relation to the subject of Sir Thomas White's Loan Money. To this Meeting of the Corporation your Letter was submitted and I received from it Instructions to prepare the answer which has since received the Sanction of another Hall held this day.

The Corporation of Nottingham is not placed in circumstances of similar difficulty to those in which you describe your Corporation to be involved in relation to the Disposal of this money. They have applicants adequate to the Sum committed to their disposal who can find Sureties for sums of £50 when bona fide advanced to the Principals to be employed in their Business. So circumstanced none but motives of the strongest and most peremptory nature could determine the Corporation even to deliberate upon any change in their System of disposing of the Money. But as they are ignorant how soon the future may give birth to motives

of this character they have no objection to obtain a power of altering their Conduct so as it does not disable them from adhering to their present line of acting so long as it shall continue to approve itself to their Judgement.

Apart from the considerations which are personal to themselves they can appreciate all the consequences of your peculiar situation & are from thence convinced that you act in the most correct & honourable manner towards those for whom in your Town the benefit of this excellent Charity is intended in determining immediately to apply to the Court of Chancery for the extension of power which you contemplate in your Letter. To this application if confined to yourselves they feel disposed to give no opposition & if extended to the other Corporations they should gladly do anything in their power to assist in procuring it from the Court provided the exercise of it were wholly discretionary. Upon any other terms they would wish to remain confined within their present limits in the distribution of this money.

In order that no misunderstanding may take place they have very freely communicated their Sentiments to your Corporation: but on a subject of so much importance they wish to see Copies of the proposed Bill to be filed in the Court of Chancery before they finally pledge themselves to the part they will take in the progress of the Suit.

I am desired to request that you will be so good as to send me what you promised at Coventry a Copy of Sir Thomas White's Trust Deed for which I shall cheerfully pay you as you may charge it to your Agent in London or in any other manner you may direct.

Draft of a letter from the Town Clerk to the Duke of Portland, then Home Secretary

My Lord,

I am directed by the Magistrates to state to you that last Night a Riot of a very serious nature took place in the Town & has continued to shew itself at Intervals ever since as far as it could be done in the face of the Military whom the Magistrates have been compelled to call to their Assistance. The riot has been occasioned by the Difficulty of obtaining Flour & the price at which the small Quantity that could be procured was obtained. It commenced at 11 o Clock last Night when most of the people in the Town had retired or were retiring to rest & on this Acct. the Mob at first succeeded in doing some mischief at several Bakers Houses & Shops before the civil & Military powers could be brot. into Action against them. With the assistance of a Party of the Blues¹ the Mob were Dispersed for that Night. This Morning they shewed Symptoms of again Disturbing the publick peace & effected some mischief in the Town before the Troops could be assembled.

They seemed Disposed to plunder the Warehouses & some Boats laden with Corn but were prevented except in the first moment of their unexpected appearance near the Canal. The Disposition to Riot & its effects has spread amongst the Villages surrounding the Town & some of the County Magistrates have been kept in a constant State of Alarm & have been called to Radford Wollaton Lenton & Basford to protect the Millers there some of whom have suffered considerable Damage from the Mob. It is now Night & the Tumult in the Town has subsided the Magistrates have taken

every measure to ensure private Property & publick Tranquility—several persons have been taken prisoners but no Blood has yet been shed.

The Magistrates enclose for your Grace's Informatn. Copies of the Hand Bills¹ addressed to the Inhabitants of the Town & of a circular Letter which they have sent to the Country Gentn.—They have taken all the means in their power to probe the causes of the Discontent which rages with particular vehemence amongst all parties of the lower order of the Community in this Neighbourhood. It appears to them from all the Informn. they can obtain on the subject that the poor have struggled with dreadful Hardships from the high Price of Provisions with unexampled Patience up to the period of the Harvest from the hope of the produce of it alleviating their miseries & Corn falling to 4 £ per Qu^r they were Disposed to be content & happy—Unfortunately in consequence of the late Rain Corn rose from the middle to the end of the last Week up to $\text{£}7-10$ —per Quarter & it was with extreme Difficulty that Flour could be obtained in the Town at any price. This appears to have Driven them to absolute Despair & nothing can exceed the violence of their behaviour. From all that the Magistrates can learn on the subject this is the general state of the Country here abts & they are apprehensive that nothing short of some general Regulations by legislative authority will be commensurate to the Magnitude of the Evil They think it their Duty to state these Circumstances for the Informatn of your Grace & the rest of his Majestys Ministers.²

for the present moment but by fixing a permanent price upon corn for a certain time will be putting the Lower class of people upon some certainty and if it is made general through the County will put every farmer upon an equal footing with his Neighbour. Pray lay this before the Magistrates of your Town and say I shall be happy to give my Assistance whenever called upon and hope the above will meet their Apporbation [*sic*]; as I am always sorry to see a necessity of calling in the Military force to protect the Civil power.

I am Desired by the Magistrates to express their thanks to your Grace for the honour of your Letter by the Kings Messr. yesterday & assure you that they feel themselves very very gratified by that approbn. which you are pleased to express of their Conduct upon

this occasion. They have sat without Intermission except for needful rest & refreshmt . . from Monday Morning till last Night. On Tuesday the Riots assumed a still more formidable appearance spreading in every direction & continued untill the lowering of the price of Corn round the Town began to be known amongst the populace.

Early in the Tumult the Justices caused a very accurate Acct. to be taken of the supply of Corn & Flour for the Town which gave them occasion to fear that we should be in absolute want of that Article. the Bakers & Millers were afraid of carrying on their usual Trade & unwilling to carry it on in such a manner as could best enable us to satisfy the People. In this State of the Town the Magistrates called to their Assistance several of the Towns people & sent for all persons who were in possession of Corn & obtained & sent it at some risk & Expence under Escorts to the neighbouring Mills to be ground & sold it out to the Poor under the management of several Gentlemen in the Town who very handsomely came forward to assist them. If these measures had not been actively followed up they are persuaded that the poor long before this would have been in a State of absolute want. The

Magistrates in no case sold out Flour at less than $4\frac{s}{}$ per Stone except where Circumstances had enabled them to purchase it at less than that price or the Flour was of an inferior Quality The Loss upon this Flour must be Defrayed by a publick Subsⁿ. or by the Corporation purse as the County rate is not applicable to such a purpose.—On Tuesday the Magistrates were under the necessity of calling to their Assistance the Bunny Holmpierrepont & Nottm. Troops of Yeomanry Cavalry & all the Volunteer Comps of the Nottm. Infantry as the whole County was in a state of disturbance & this Town was the Head Quarters from whence alone proper Steps could be taken for securing the publick peace, & strong Escorts appeared necessary for the neighbouring Mills for ensuring a regular supply of Corn & Flour for the Town as well as to keep the populace in awe—

They are happy to testify their high Sense of the uniform temper steadiness & firmness of the whole of the Officers & privates of each of these Corps & the willingness with which they have undergone a vast deal of fatigue in the publick Service. The People seem to be returning to peaceable & orderly Habits & the Magistrates think themselves safe this Day in Dismissing all the guards, except those at the County Hall where there are many prisoners. I inclose for your Graces Informn. all the papers Circular Letters publish'd by the Magistrs since their former Communication to you, together

with the Nottm. Journal in which your Grace will find a genl. Statement of the Town proceedings & likewise of the County Meetg. held on Thursday.¹

By a letter received last evening from our friend at Leicester, we learn that the maximum price of Wheat there, is fixed at £5.0.0 pr quarter—To this the farmers have affixed their names & you will easily perceive the pernicious effects this must have upon the Nottingham markt almost immediately—Twenty shillings will convey a quarter of wheat many miles & it is more than can be expected from human nature to flatter ourselves that a farmer will, for the love of charity, bring his grain to Nottm. when at Leicester

he can obtain an advanced price of 20/^s and be equally considered as doing a philanthropic action—The effects of a maximum, unless general thro' the Island, were easily anticipated, & it appears clear to me, that as soon as the general panic subsides, the markt at Nottingham will be unsupplied & fresh commotions arise, unless some measures are adopted to prevent it—

What measures those should be, We presume not to suggest now, but recommend them to your early attention—

Draft of a letter from the Town Clerk to the Duke of Portland

My Lord Duke,

I received by the Messenger this Afternoon Mr Kings Letter of the 14th Instant written by your Grace's direction & have laid the same before the Magistrates who beg to express to your Grace their Thanks for the Attention which you have been pleased to shew to the Security & protection of the peace of this Town.

They have further Comanded me to inform your Lordship that the Town has been entirely quiet since Wednesday Night & that the immediate Neighbourhood has progressively been improving in quietness up to the present period when there seems no occasion to fear any further Tumult altho' it may be necessary somewhat to increase the prices of Bread & Flour. The Magistrates therefore are not desirous that the Military force in the Town should be increased as they have every reason to hope that the full & perfect restoration of peace & Tranquility is very near at hand & even if this should not be the Case they are confident that with the force they have at present & can call in to their aid they ought not fear [*sic*] putting down by force any riot which can happen here. They are apprehensive that additional Troops may increase the Number of the Discontented from the possible conception of their increasing the Scarcity of Provs. They have desired me to inclose for your Graces Information the Papers the Magistrates have published since my last Communication with your Lordship with a view of exhibiting their Determination by the most extreme measures of severity to preserve the peace of the Town, to protect the Freedom of the Market & to shield the Yeomanry Corps by the Arm of the Law. I also inclose for your Grace's further Information the Copy of an Address to the Town upon the measures which are now pursuing for its relief which has b[een] drawn up under the Direction & sanctioned by the authority of a very considerable Meeting of many of the most respectable Individuals in the Town assembled at the Exchange Hall this Evening.

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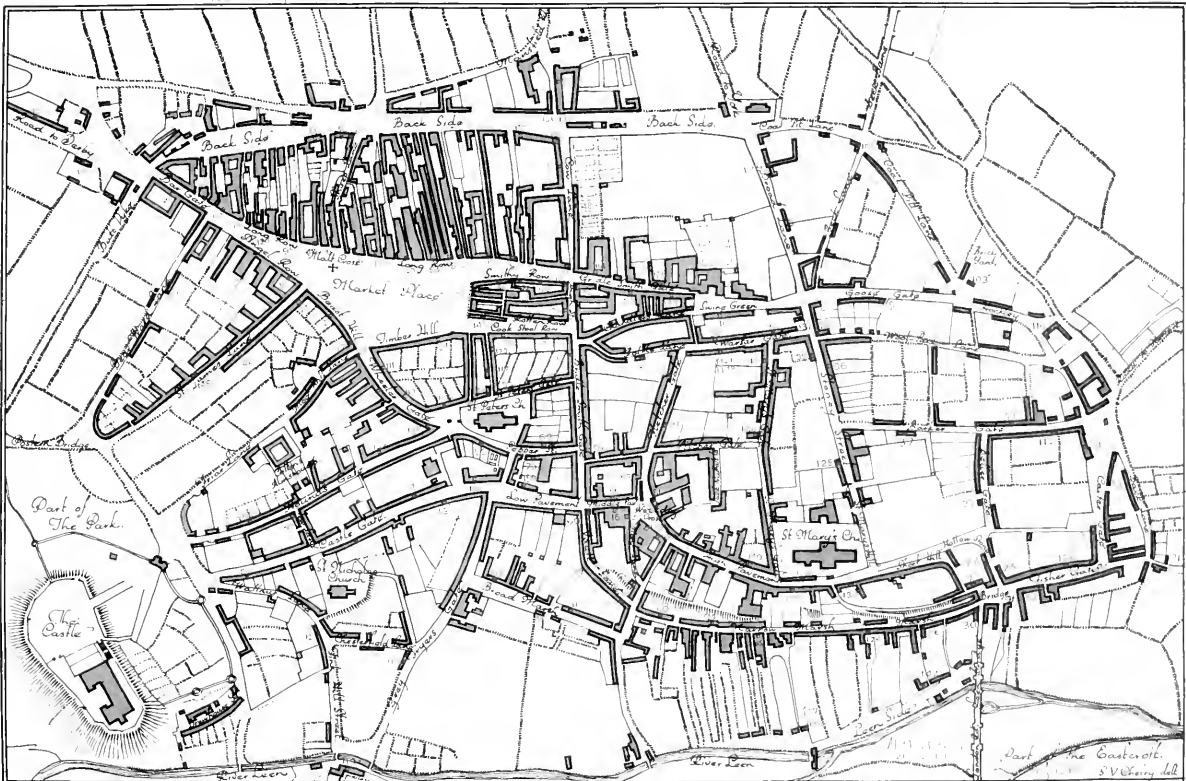
