





















In Memory Of

Salve Regina College

Salve Regina College, an independent coeducational college of arts and sciences, started its educational history in 1947 with a freshmen class of 58 students, an administration of five Sisters of Mercy and a faculty of eight Sisters of Mercy and one priest. Ochre Court was the only building, housing both the administrative offices and class rooms.

Today, the College has expanded to thirty one buildings, many of them nineteenth century mansions, all located on Newport's beautiful seacoast. The institution has experienced a steadily increasing enrollment from fifty eight to over two thousand students and now awards associates, bachelors, masters and doctorate degrees.

As of July 1st, 1991 Salve Regina College will officially be known as Salve Regina University.




















Ochre Court was built in 1888-1891 and was modeled after the French Chateau of the Middle Ages. Originally the building served as the summer residence for Ogden Goelet, but was later donated to Salve Regina in 1947. Today Ochre Court serves as an administrative building and houses offices, a chapel and rooms used for lectures, concerts and social gatherings.
















Wakehurst is almost an exact replica of Wakehurst Place, an Elizabethan House in Sussex, England and was designed by Charles Eamer Kempe. James H. Van Alen, the commissioner, was very specific on details of authenticity, and imported and reassembled the interior rooms to create the look of the antique. Now, the building is used as the campus center, housing a cafe, the campus mail room, a book store, student lounges and administrative offices for student services.











McAuley Hall This summer cottage built for Mrs. Catherine Lorillard Wolfe was completed in 1882. The family sold the building and it became the main house on the Twombly Estate, who donated it to Salve Regina College in 1955. It was renamed after the first Sister of Mercy, Catherine McAuley and after many years of housing the College library, it is now being used as an academic and residence facility.

Senior Class Picnic


























Dance Marathon



For what is your friend that you should seek him with hours to kill?



The men's soccer team finished up their fall season with a 7.10 record, an impressive second most wins at Salve. The team also broke the old goal record of 29 by achieving 32. Keith Cory coached the "very young team'' consisting of mostly freshmen and sophomores and one junior, and he was assisted by Bob Boergesson. Cory says "it was a difficult year because of the number." While the game requires eleven players, the Newporters only had fourteen, and at one point twelve due to injuries. 



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
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Although the Salve Women's Cross Country Team is not in a conference, they participated in three invitationals during their 1990 fall season.






Their main inside force during the season was Steve Soba who provided the team with the best All-time Single Season Point Scoring Leader (441 points) as well as a top rebounder for the team.



With racquet in air and eye on the ball, Chris Urbano gets ready to send the ball back to his opponent during a practice game.









With this emphasis on our need for a sign that reads: "The new frontier of the space age: INNER SPACE." It took our scientists and technologists a long time to develop the sophisticated equipment that put a man on the moon. The astronauts who ventured there showed a personal discipline and a grueling training that defy simple description. But, even in space travel, there are instruments that measure direction. There are indicators of how far along that journey the ship and its passengers have come. When we journey in inner space, we are in uncharted and unchartable territory. Any direction and charting remain somewhat unclear. While we make the journey we understand the importance of companionship. We understand what Gustav Thibon, a French philosopher, meant when he said that when we walk alone, we hardly know if we are climbing. But, almost infallibly, when we give our hand to someone, we immediately know the difference. There are friends in whose presence we can only climb. There are others whose influence weighs us down. It is true that, in order to know well where we are going, we must not walk alone. And, to see most clearly, we must walk with a sense of commitment and trust in the one with whom we walk.

We have had the experience of a conversation on an airplane where we were engaged, either at our initiation or someone else's, in a level of sharing that later surprised us. We wonder why it was so easy to give such confidence to a stranger. We may even be disappointed that we shared something that we have not shared with a friend. We may have put words around some experience that we have never before been able to verbalize. This is surprising only until we remember that strangers ask nothing of us. When the plane lands, the sharing is finished. We walk away from that person, and most often, never see him or her again. Ongoing risk and personal involvement are seldom asked. Refreshing and helpful as such encounters may be, they are not the stuff of which continuing self knowledge is made. Neither are they basic to the fabric of faithful friendship. It is in our ongoing commitment to frame our inner journey in words which we share in friendship that self-discovery happens and friendship deepens.














Dear Graduates of the Class of 1991:

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
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A Graduation Message
