
Casino Night

Year In Review




(Top right) Hurricane Andrew, the most expensive natural disaster ever to hit this country, certainly didn't forget to stop by the Bahamas, South Florida, and Louisiana as the 54 hour rampage left 180,000 homeless in Florida alone. Tens of thousands of people tried to evacuate the Miami area while thousands more rode out the storm in shelters and boarded up homes. Fifty-one deaths were recorded and damage was estimated at \$20 billion.

(Center page) The third bomb of disaster to hit the United States was the three day riot scene in Los Angeles that left 52 dead, 2,383 injured, and 18,507 arrested. Property damage was estimated at \$785 million. Oddly enough, the rioting began when four, white Police officers were found innocent after beating Rodney King, a black man, who was stopped for a road violation on a Los Angeles freeway.












Women's Basketball


The Last Word





About The Artist:

The etching of Ochre Court, shown on the front cover, is the creation of Armond Lamontagne a sculptor-/artist hailing from Scituate, R.I. Lamontagne, a self taught artist, who studied in Italy as the recipient of the Grinell Foundation Award, is mainly known for his wooden sculptures of such Sport personalities as Ted Williams, Larry Bird, Bobby Orr, and Carl Yastrzemski. Lamontagne has also sculpted such historical legends as George S. Patton Jr., and Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt.

Feature bronze busts have been done of former President Gerald Ford and Elvis Presley. Elvis can be seen on display in the Singer's Hallof-Fame in Nashville, Tennessee. Lamontagne has also painted official State portraits for Governor J. Joseph Garrahy and former Speaker of the R.I. House of Representatives, Matthew J. Smith. Armond Lamontagne's daughter, Lisa, is Senior here at Salve Regina University.
