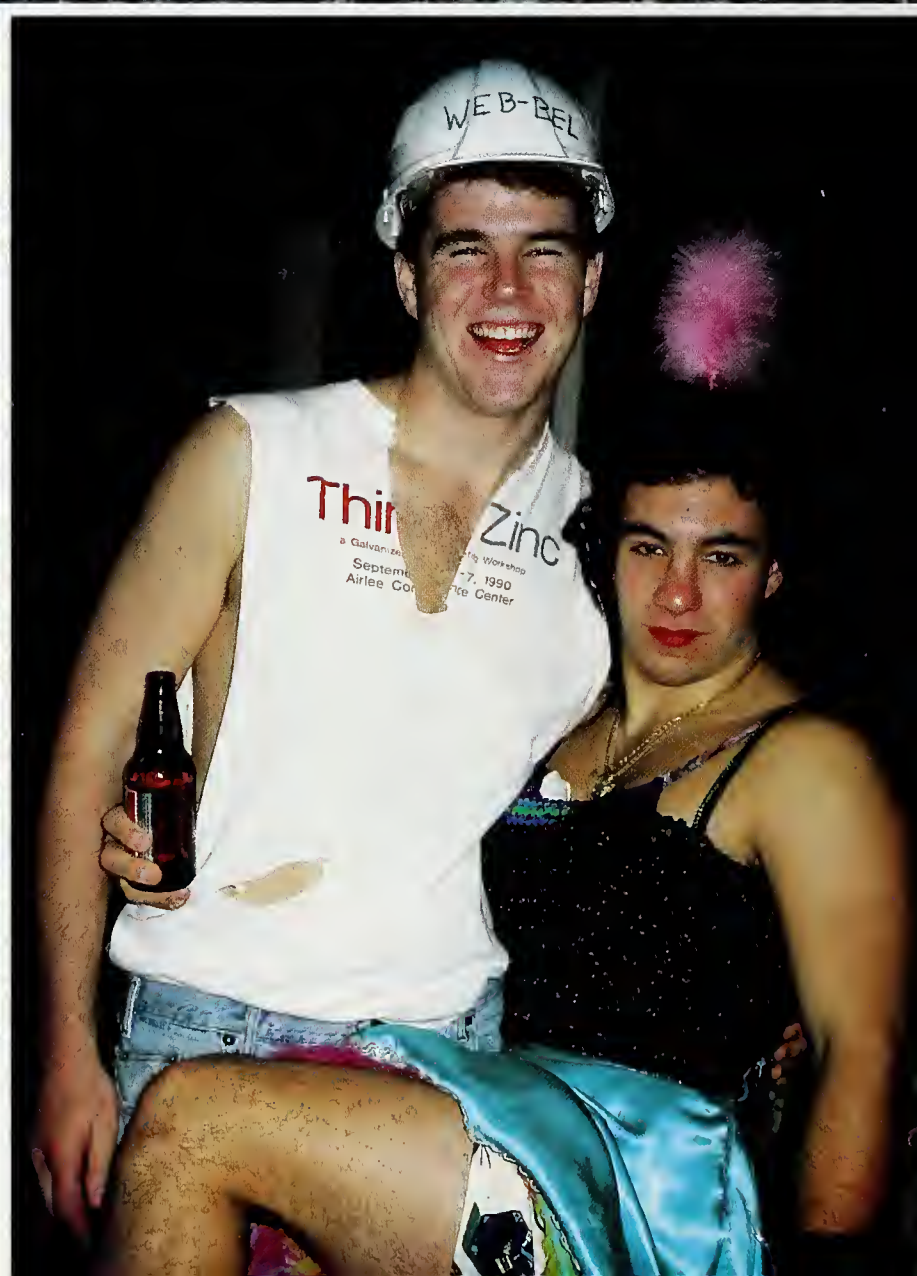

Finally, the evening is punctuated with the balloon drop at the stroke of midnight, signalling the beginning of a new year for everyone at SRU.

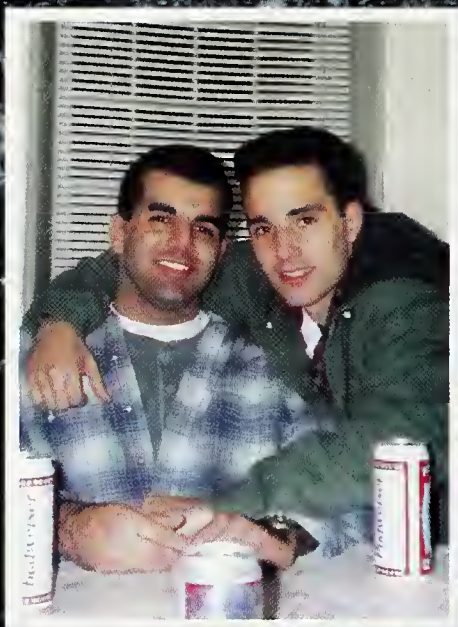

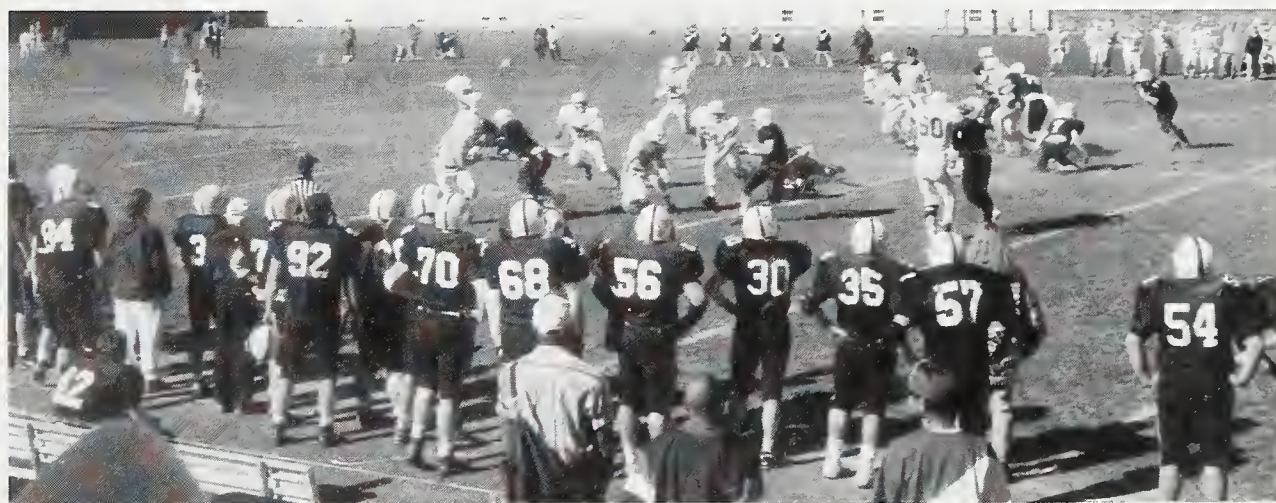

Greeting Families and Meeting Faculty

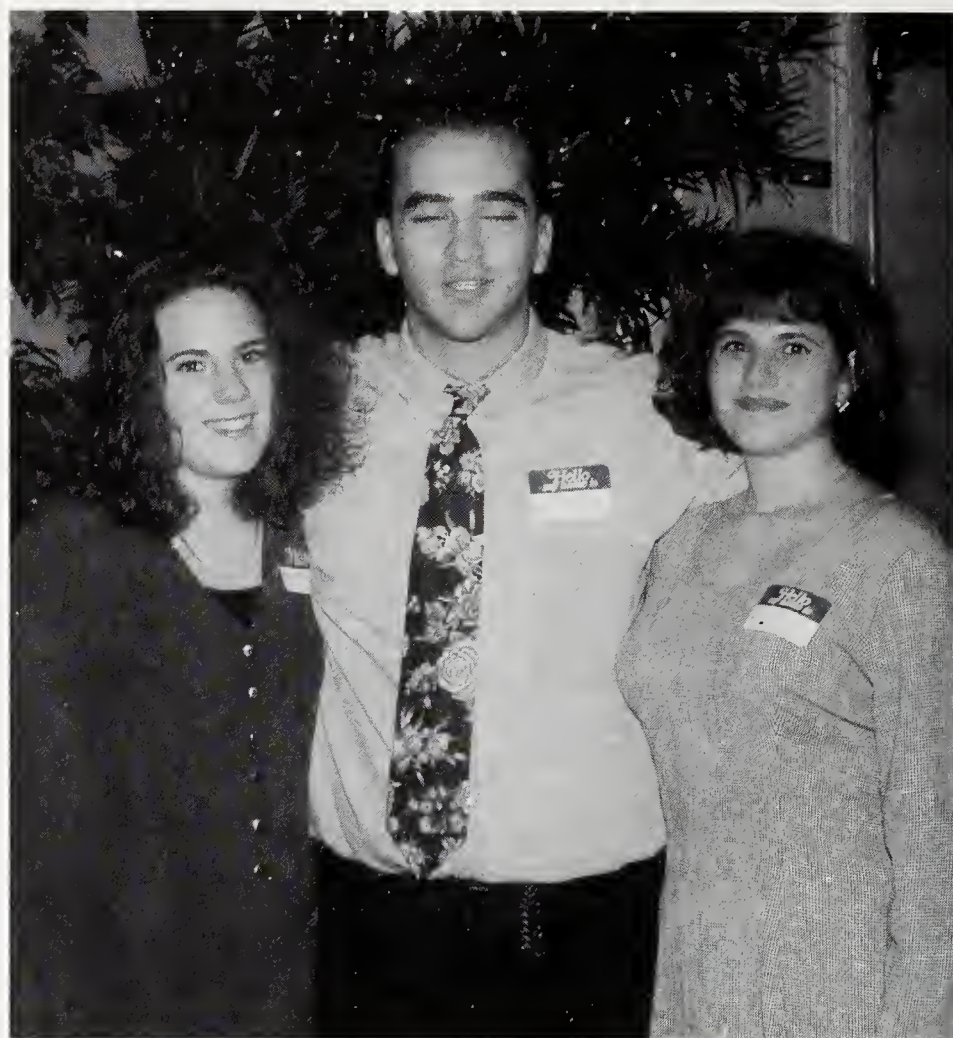

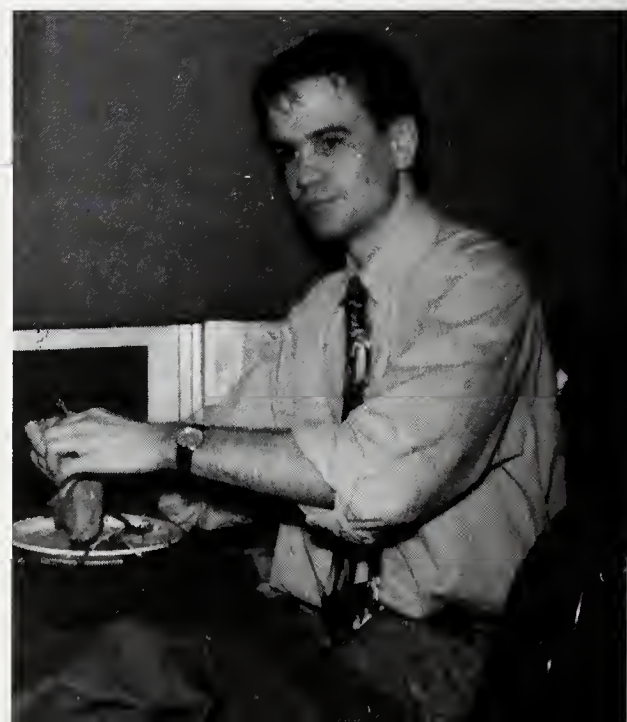

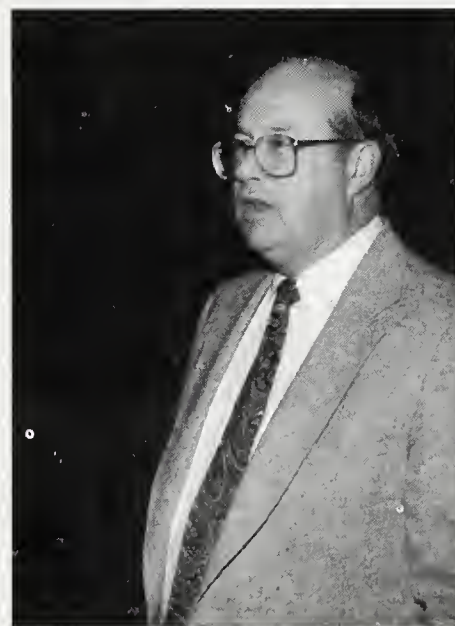

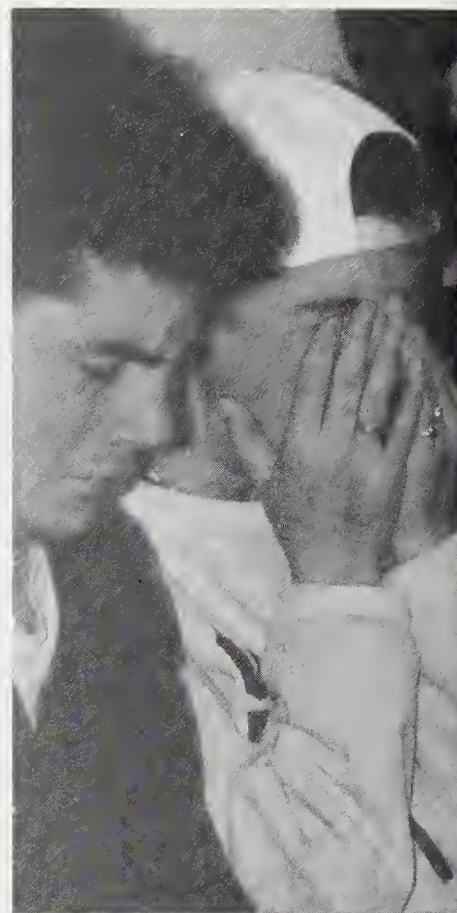

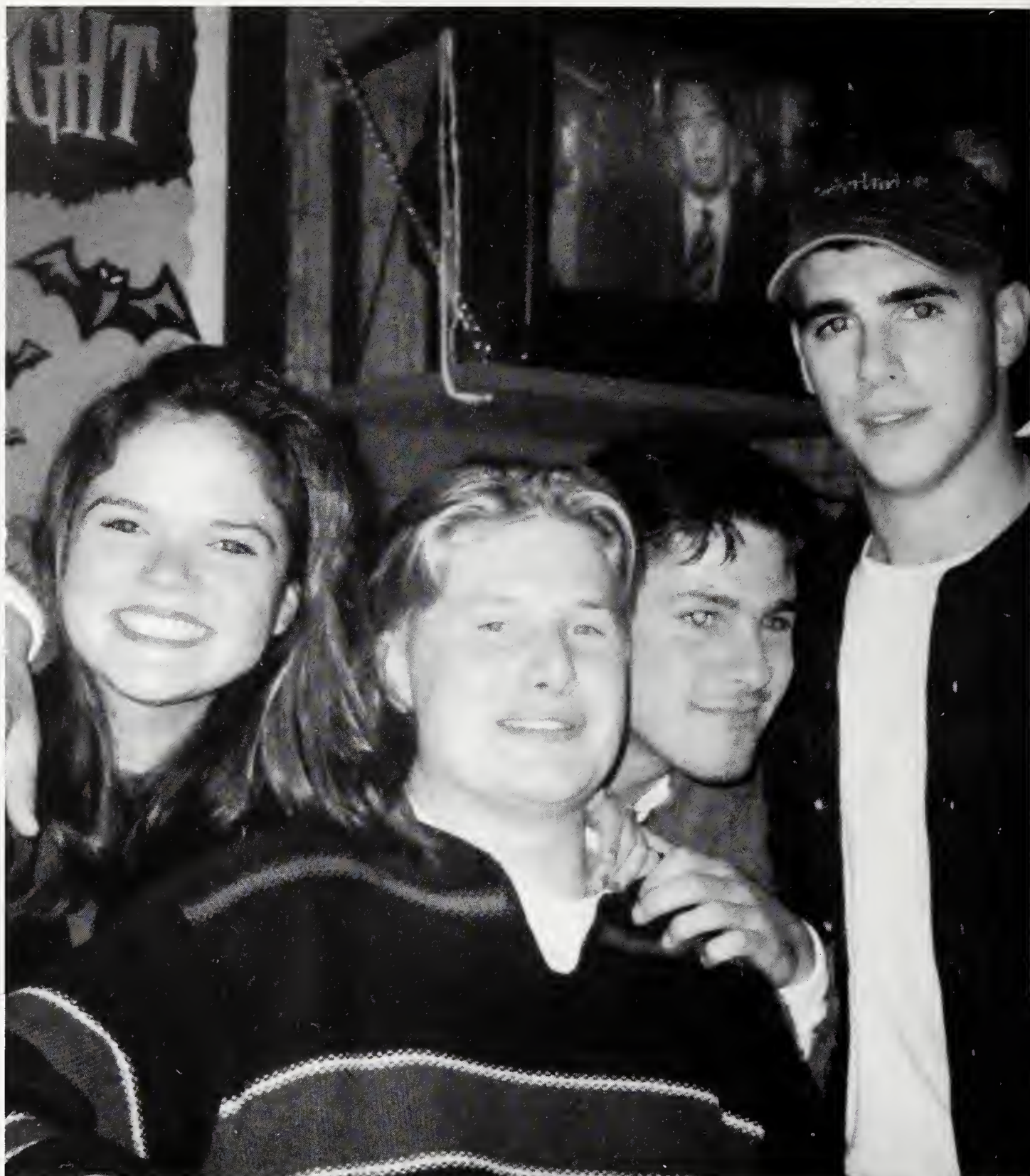
Under His Spell

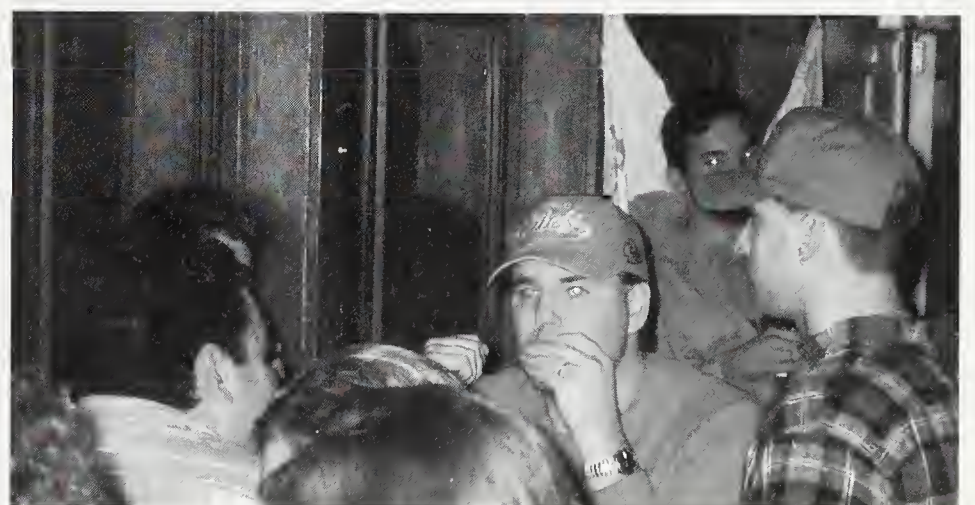

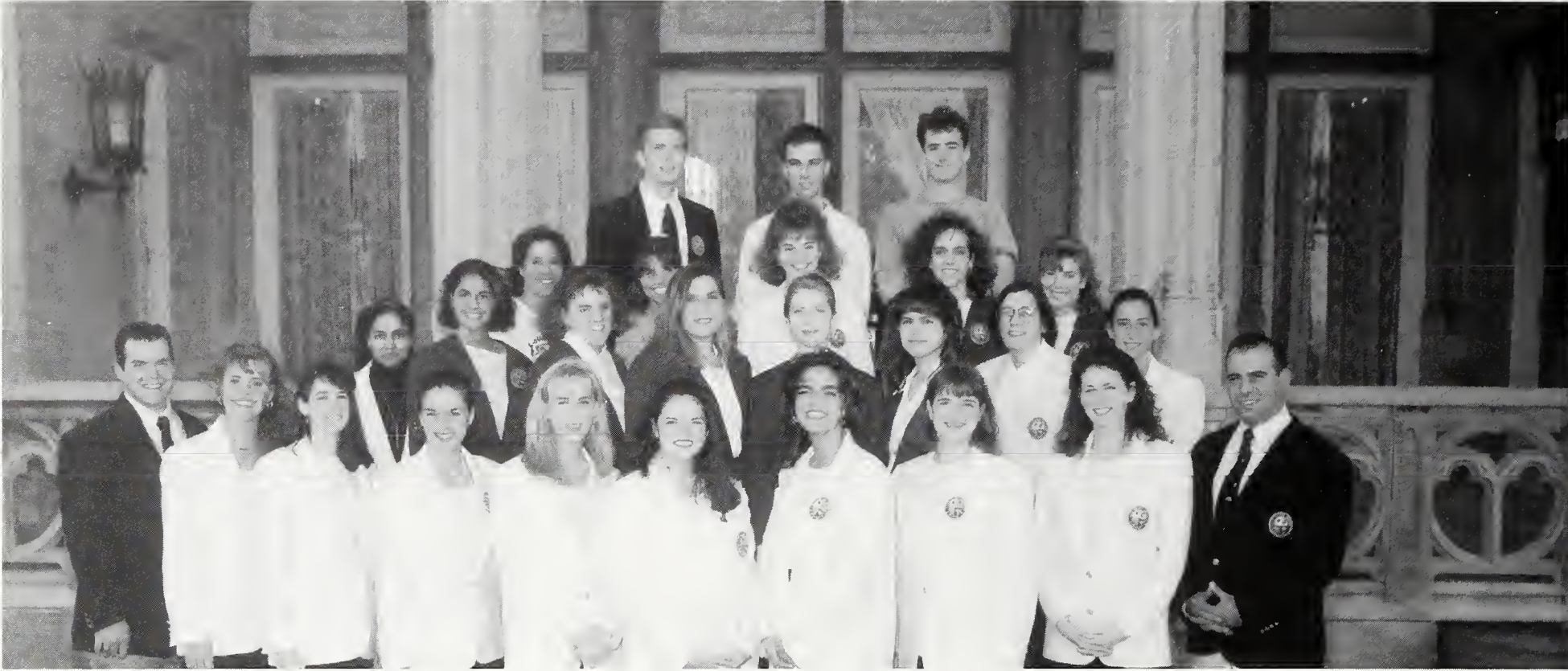

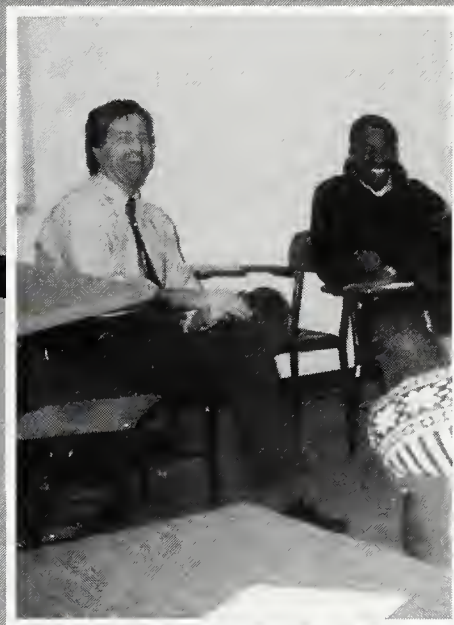
