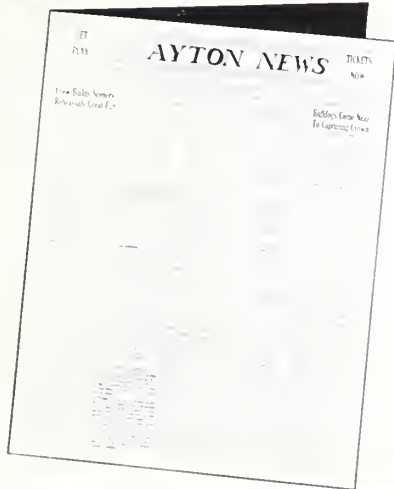

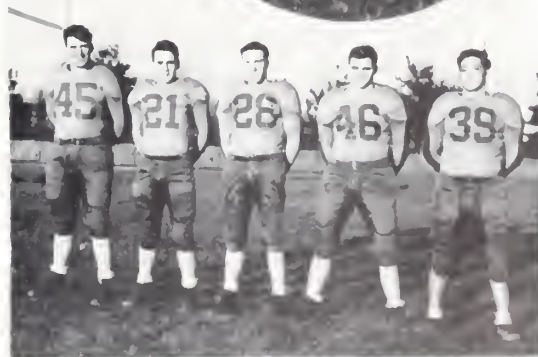

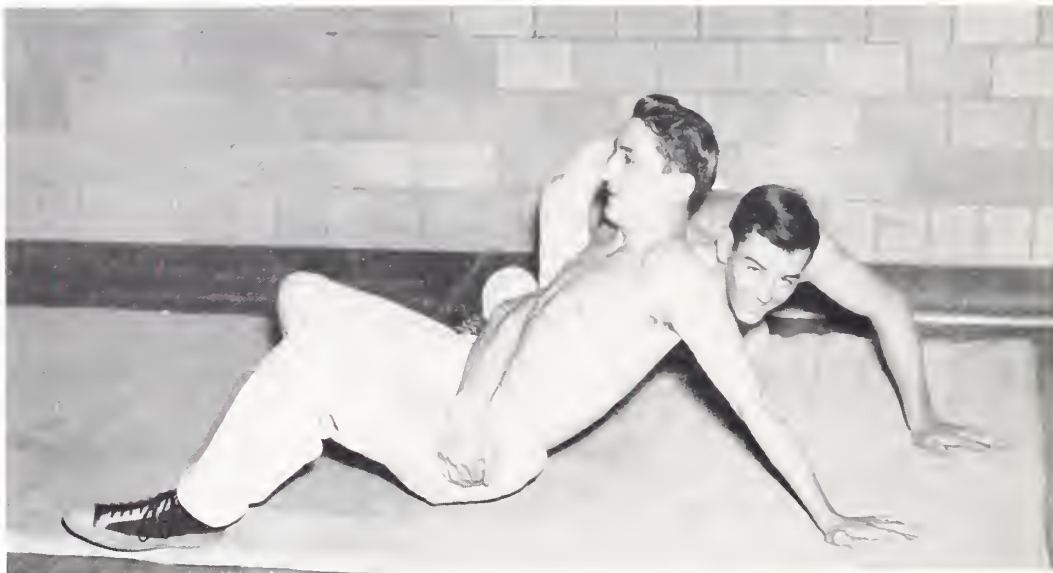

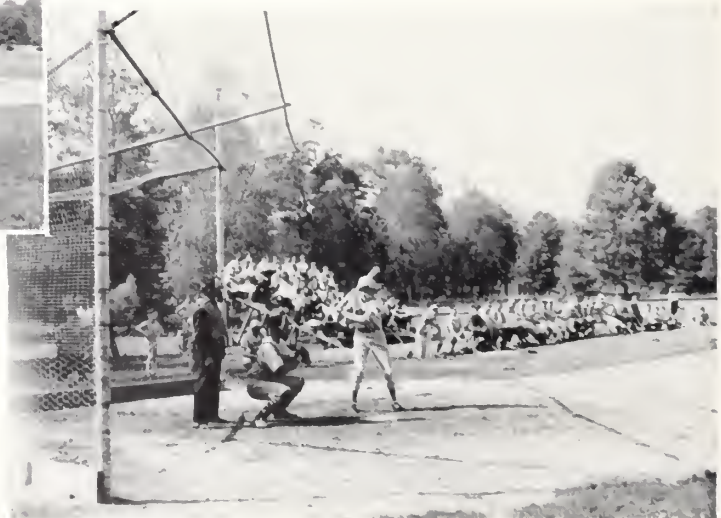


With 21 boys on the squad, Regional concluded its first baseball season, registering 10 wins, 5 losses and 1 tie in 16 games.

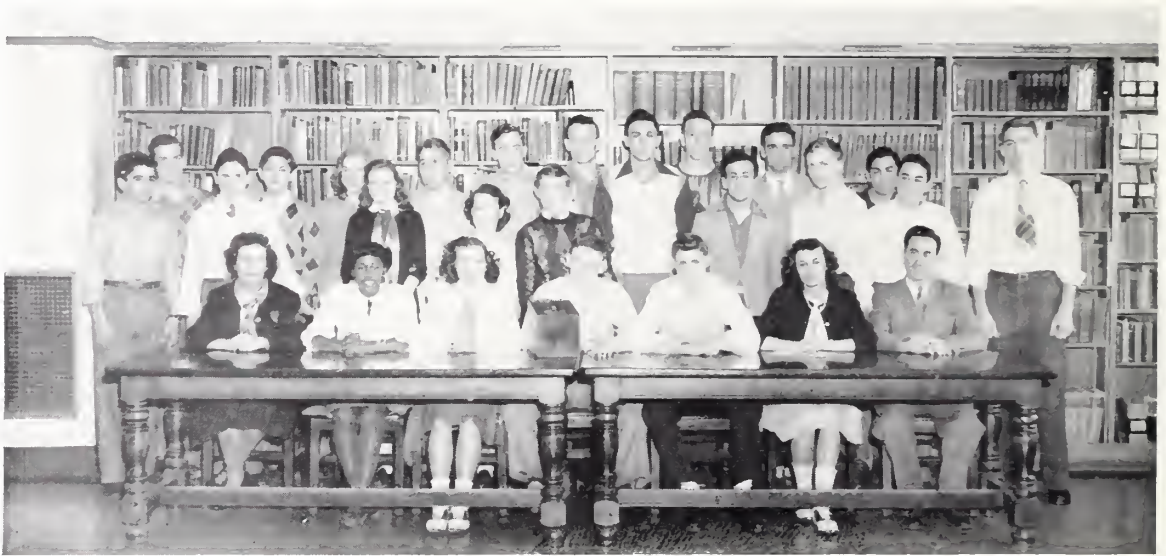

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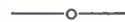
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
