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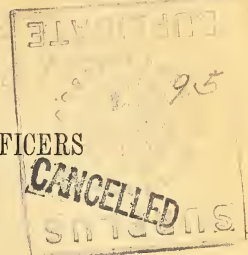

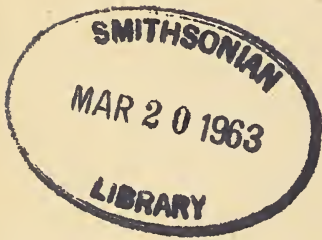

NOTE No. 1.—DOUBLE RATIONS are allowed to commissioned officers of the Marine Corps as follows: When commanding permanent posts; to officers commanding the guard on board of receiving ships at Boston, New York, and Norfolk; to the commanding officer of the guard of a squadron, when the number of marines in the squadron is not less than the guard of a frigate; and to the commanding officer of the guard of a ship-of-the-line, or frigate, when acting singly on separate service.

NOTE No. 2.—CLOTHING RESPONSIBILITY. All commissioned officers of the Marine Corps, when not above the rank of captain, or below that of lieutenant, are entitled to an allowance of \$10 per month for the care and responsibility of marine clothing, when commanding the marines of the squadron having the number of marines allowed to a frigate; of ships-of-the-line or frigates in commission; and at naval stations.

NOTE No. 3.—Where there are no public quarters furnished, a commutation is allowed. Officers on shore duty are allowed a commutation for fuel.

NOTE —The sea and other service affixed to the names of officers in the Register is computed to the 1st January, 1860. As a general rule, the "sea service" with which an officer is credited, is for duty performed under orders from the Department, as part of the complement of a vessel-of-war, belonging to the Navy, in commission for sea service. Officers on the Coast Survey are allowed sea service only for the time they are actually afloat. No credit is given for service in Revenue and Merchant vessels. In the column "unemployed," is included the time between date of warrant and date of first order from the Department for service.

 The attention of officers is particularly called to the Orders and Regulations published in the latter part of the Register.

LAWS.

AN ACT FOR THE BETTER GOVERNMENT OF THE NAVY OF THE UNITED STATES.

SEC. 1. *Be it enacted, &c.*, That from and after the first day of June next, the following rules and regulations be adopted and put in force, for the government of the navy of the United States :

Article 1. The commanders of all ships and vessels-of-war belonging to the navy are strictly enjoined and required to show in themselves a good example of virtue, honor, patriotism, and subordination, and be vigilant in inspecting the conduct of all such as are placed under their command, and to guard against and suppress all dissolute and immoral practices, and to correct all such as are guilty of them, according to the usage of the sea-service.

Art. 2. The commanders of all ships and vessels in the navy, having chaplains on board, shall take care that divine service be performed in a solemn, orderly, and reverent manner, twice a day, and a sermon preached on Sunday, unless bad weather or other extraordinary accidents prevent it ; and that they cause all, or as many of the ship's company as can be spared from duty, to attend at every performance of the worship of Almighty God.

Art. 3. Any officer or other person in the navy who shall be guilty of oppression, cruelty, fraud, profane swearing, drunkenness, or any other scandalous conduct, tending to the destruction of good morals, shall, if an officer, be cashiered, or suffer such other punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge ; if a private, shall be put in irons or flogged, at the discretion of the captain, not exceeding twelve lashes ; but if the offence require severer punishment, he shall be tried by a court-martial, and suffer such punishment as said court shall inflict.

Art. 4. Every commander or other officer who shall, upon signal for battle, or on the probability of an engagement, neglect to clear his ship for action, or shall not use his utmost exertions to bring his ship to battle, or shall fail to encourage, in his own person, his inferior officers and men to fight courageously, such offender shall suffer death, or such other punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge ; or any officer neglecting, on sight of any vessel or vessels of an enemy, to clear his ship for action, shall suffer such punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge ; and if any person in the navy shall treacherously yield, or pusillanimously cry for quarters, he shall suffer death, on conviction thereof by a general court-martial.

Art. 5. Every officer or private who shall not properly observe the orders of his commanding officer, or shall not use his utmost exertions to carry them into execution, when ordered to prepare for, join in, or when actually engaged in battle ; or shall at such time basely desert his duty or station, either then or while in sight of an enemy, or shall induce others to do so, every person so offending shall, on conviction thereof by a general court-martial, suffer death, or such other punishment as the said court shall adjudge.

Art. 6. Every officer or private who shall, through cowardice, negligence, or disaffection, in time of action, withdraw from or keep out of battle, or shall not do his utmost to take or destroy every vessel which it is his duty to encounter, or shall not do his utmost endeavor to afford relief to ships belonging to the United States, every such offender shall, on conviction thereof by a general court-martial, suffer death, or such other punishment as the said court shall adjudge.

Art. 7. The commanding officer of every ship or vessel in the navy, who shall capture or seize upon any vessel as a prize, shall carefully preserve all the papers and writing found on board, and transmit the whole of the originals, un mutilated, to the judge of the district to which such prize is ordered to proceed, and shall transmit to the Navy Department, and the agent appointed to pay the prize money, complete lists of the officers and men entitled to a share of the capture, inserting therein the quality of every person rating, on pain of forfeiting his whole share of the prize money resulting from such capture, and suffering such further punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.

Art. 8. No person in the navy shall take out of a prize, or vessel seized as a prize, any money, plate, goods, or any part of her rigging, unless it be for the better preservation thereof, or absolutely necessary for the use of any of the vessels of the United States, before the same shall be adjudged lawful prize by a competent court ; but the whole,

without fraud, concealment, or embezzlement, shall be brought in, and judgment passed thereon, upon pain that every person offending herein shall forfeit his share of the capture, and suffer such further punishment as a court-martial, or the court of admiralty in which the prize is adjudged, shall impose.

Art. 9. No person in the navy shall strip of their clothes, or pillage, or in any manner maltreat, persons taken on board a prize, on pain of such punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.

Art. 10. No person in the navy shall give, hold, or entertain any intercourse or intelligence to or with any enemy or rebel, without leave from the President of the United States, the Secretary of the Navy, the commander-in-chief of the fleet, or the commander of a squadron; or, in case of a vessel acting singly, from his commanding officer, on pain of death, or such other punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.

Art. 11. If any letter or message from an enemy or rebel be conveyed to any officer or private of the navy, and he shall not within twelve hours make the same known, having opportunity so to do, to his superior or commanding officer; or if any officer commanding a ship or vessel, being acquainted therewith, shall not, with all convenient speed, reveal the same to the commander-in-chief of the fleet, commander of a squadron, or other proper officer, whose duty it may be to take cognizance thereof, every such offender shall suffer death, or such other punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.

Art. 12. Spies, and all persons who shall come or be found in the capacity of spies, or who shall bring or deliver any seducing letter or message from an enemy or rebel, or endeavor to corrupt any person in the navy to betray his trust, shall suffer death, or such other punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.

Art. 13. If any person in the navy shall make, or attempt to make, any mutinous assembly, he shall, on conviction thereof by a court-martial, suffer death; and if any person as aforesaid shall utter any seditious or mutinous words, or shall conceal or connive at any mutinous or seditious practices, or shall treat with contempt his superior, being in the execution of his office; or, being witness to any mutiny or sedition, shall not do his utmost to suppress it, he shall be punished at the discretion of a court-martial.

Art. 14. No officer or private in the navy shall disobey the lawful orders of his superior officer, or strike him, or draw, or offer to draw, or raise, any weapon against him while in the execution of the duties of his office, on pain of death, or such other punishment as a court-martial shall inflict.

Art. 15. No person in the navy shall quarrel with any other person in the navy, nor use provoking or reproachful words, gestures, or menaces, on pain of such punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.

Art. 16. If any person in the navy shall desert to an enemy or rebel, he shall suffer death.

Art. 17. If any person in the navy shall desert, or shall entice others to desert, he shall suffer death, or such other punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge; and if any officer, or other person belonging to the navy, shall receive or entertain any deserter from any other vessel of the navy, knowing him to be such, and shall not with all convenient speed, give notice of such deserter to the commander of the vessel to which he belongs, or to the commander-in-chief, or to the commander of the squadron, he shall, on conviction thereof, be cashiered, or be punished at the discretion of a court-martial. All offences committed by persons belonging to the navy while on shore, shall be punished in the same manner as if they had been committed at sea.

Art. 18. If any person in the navy shall knowingly make or sign, or shall aid, abet, direct, or procure, the making or signing, of any false muster, or shall execute, or attempt, or countenance, any fraud against the United States, he shall, on conviction, be cashiered, and rendered forever incapable of any future employment in the service of the United States, and shall forfeit all the pay and subsistence due him, and suffer such other punishment as a court-martial shall inflict.

Art. 19. If any officer, or other person, in the navy, shall, through inattention, negligence, or any other fault, suffer any vessel of the navy to be stranded, or run upon rocks or shoals, or hazarded, he shall suffer such punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.

Art. 20. If any person in the navy shall sleep upon his watch, or negligently perform the duty assigned him, or leave his station before regularly relieved, he shall suffer death, or such punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge; or, if the offender be a private, he may, at the discretion of the captain, be put in irons, or flogged not exceeding twelve lashes.

Art. 21. The crime of murder, when committed by any officer, seaman, or marine, belonging to any public ship or vessel of the United States, without the territorial jurisdiction of the same, may be punished with death by the sentence of a court-martial.

Art. 22. The officers and privates of every ship or vessel appointed as convoy to merchant

or other vessels, shall diligently and faithfully discharge the duties of their appointment, nor shall they demand or exact any compensation for their services, nor maltreat any of the officers or crew of such merchant or other vessels, on pain of making such reparation as a court of admiralty may award, and of suffering such further punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.

Art. 23. If any commander or other officer shall receive, or permit to be received, on board his vessel, any goods or merchandise, other than for the sole use of his vessel, except gold, silver, or jewels, and except the goods or merchandise of vessels which may be in distress, or shipwrecked, or in imminent danger of being shipwrecked, in order to preserve them for their owners, without orders from the President of the United States or the Navy Department, he shall, on conviction thereof, be cashiered, and be incapacitated forever afterwards for any place or office in the navy.

Art. 24. If any person in the navy shall waste, embezzle, or fraudulently buy, sell, or receive, any ammunition, provisions, or other public stores; or if any officer or other person shall, knowingly, permit, through design, negligence, or inattention, any such waste, embezzlement, sale, or receipt, every such person shall forfeit all the pay and subsistence then due him, and suffer such further punishment as a court-martial shall direct.

Art. 25. If any person in the navy shall unlawfully set fire to or burn any kind of public property, not then in the possession of an enemy, pirate, or rebel, he shall suffer death; and if any person shall, in any other manner, destroy such property, or shall not use his best exertions to prevent the destruction thereof by others, he shall be punished at the discretion of a court-martial.

Art. 26. Any theft, not exceeding twenty dollars, may be punished at the discretion of the captain; and above that sum, as a court-martial shall direct.

Art. 27. If any person in the navy shall, when on shore, plunder, abuse, or maltreat, any inhabitant, or injure his property in any way, he shall suffer such punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.

Art. 28. Every person in the navy shall use his utmost exertions to detect, apprehend, and bring to punishment, all offenders, and shall, at all times, aid and assist all persons appointed for this purpose, on pain of such punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.

Art. 29. Each commanding officer shall, whenever a seaman enters on board, cause an accurate entry to be made in the ship's books of his name, time, and term of service; and, before sailing, transmit to the Secretary of the Navy a complete list or muster-roll of the officers and men under his command, with the date of their entering, time and terms of their service annexed; and shall cause similar lists to be made out on the first day of every second month, to be transmitted to the Secretary of the Navy, as opportunities shall occur; accounting in such lists, or muster-rolls, for any casualties which may have taken place since the last list or muster-roll. He shall cause to be accurately minuted on the ship's books the names of, and times at which any death or desertion may occur; and in case of death, shall take care that the purser secure all the property of the deceased for the benefit of his legal representative or representatives. He shall cause frequent inspections to be made into the condition of the provisions, and use every precaution for its preservation. He shall, whenever he orders officers and men to take charge of a prize, and proceed to the United States, and whenever officers or men are sent from his ship for whatever cause, take care that each man be furnished with a complete statement of his account, specifying the date of his enlistment, and the period and terms of his service; which account shall be signed by the commanding officer and purser. He shall cause the rules for the government of the navy to be hung up in some public part of the ship, and read once a month to his ship's company. He shall cause a convenient place to be set apart for sick or disabled men, to which he shall have them removed, with their hammocks and bedding, when the surgeon shall so advise, and shall direct that some of the crew attend them and keep the place clean; and, if necessary, shall direct that cradles, and buckets with covers, be made for their use; and when his crew is finally paid off, he shall attend in person, or appoint a proper officer, to see that justice be done to the men, and to the United States, in the settlement of the accounts. Any commanding officer offending herein, shall be punished at the discretion of a court-martial.

Art. 30. No commanding officer shall, of his own authority, discharge a commissioned or warrant officer, nor strike nor punish him otherwise than by suspension or confinement, nor shall he, of his own authority, inflict a punishment on any private beyond twelve lashes with a cat-of-nine-tails, nor shall he suffer any wired, or other than a plain cat-of-nine-tails, to be used on board his ship; nor shall any officer who may command by accident, or in the absence of the commanding officer, (except such commander be absent for a time by leave,) order or inflict any other punishment than confinement, for which he shall account on the return of such absent commanding officer. Nor shall any commanding

officer receive on board any petty officers or men, turned over from any other vessel to him, unless each of such officers or men produce to him an account, signed by the captain and purser of the vessel from which they came, specifying the date of such officer's or man's entry, the period and terms of service, the sums paid, and the balance due him, and the quality in which he was rated on board such ship. Nor shall any commanding officer, having received any petty officer or man as aforesaid, rate him in a lower or worse station than that in which he formerly served. Any commanding officer offending herein shall be punished at the discretion of a court-martial.

Art. 31. Any master-at-arms, or other person of whom the duty of master-at-arms is required, who shall refuse to receive such prisoners as shall be committed to his charge, or, having received them, shall suffer them to escape, or dismiss them without orders from proper authority, shall suffer in such prisoners' stead, or be punished otherwise at the discretion of a court-martial.

Art. 32. All crimes committed by persons belonging to the navy, which are not specified in the foregoing articles, shall be punished according to the laws and customs in such cases at sea.

Art. 33. All officers not holding commissions or warrants, or who are not entitled to them, except, such as are temporarily appointed to the duties of a commissioned or warrant officer, are deemed petty officers.

Art. 34. Any person entitled to wages or prize money may have the same paid to his assignee, provided the assignment be attested by the captain and purser; and in case of the assignment of wages, the power shall specify the precise time they commence. But the commander of every vessel is required to discourage his crews from selling any part of their wages or prize money, and never to attest any power of attorney, until he is satisfied that the same is not granted in consideration of money given for the purchase of wages or prize money.

NAVAL GENERAL COURTS-MARTIAL.

Art. 35. General courts-martial may be convened as often as the President of the United States, the Secretary of the Navy, or commander-in-chief of the fleet, or commander of a squadron, while acting out of the United States, shall deem it necessary: *Provided*, That no general court-martial shall consist of more than thirteen, nor less than five members, and as many officers shall be summoned on every such court as can be convened without injury to the service, so as not to exceed thirteen, and the senior officer shall always preside, the others ranking agreeably to the date of their commission; and in no case where it can be avoided without injury to the service, shall more than one-half the members, exclusive of the president, be junior to the officer to be tried.

Art. 36. Each member of the court before proceeding to trial shall take the following oath or affirmation, which the judge advocate, or person officiating as such, is hereby authorized to administer:

"I, A. B., do swear [or affirm] that I will truly try, without prejudice or partiality, the case now depending, according to the evidence which shall come before the court, the rules for the government of the navy, and my own conscience; and that I will not by any means divulge or disclose the sentence of the court, until it shall have been approved by the proper authority, nor will I at any time divulge or disclose the vote or opinion of any particular member of the court, unless required so to do before a court of justice in due course of law."

This oath or affirmation being duly administered, the president is authorized and required to administer the following oath or affirmation to the judge advocate, or person officiating as such:

"I, A. B., do swear [or affirm] that I will keep a true record of the evidence given to and the proceedings of this court; nor will I divulge or by any means disclose the sentence of the court until it shall have been approved by the proper authority; nor will I at any time divulge or disclose the vote or opinion of any particular member of the court, unless required so to do before a court of justice in due course of law."

Art. 37. All testimony given to a general court-martial shall be on oath or affirmation, which the president of the court is hereby authorized to administer; and if any person shall refuse to give his evidence as aforesaid, or shall prevaricate, or shall behave with contempt to the court, it shall and may be lawful for the court to imprison such offender at their discretion: *Provided*, That the imprisonment in no case shall exceed two months. And every person who shall commit wilful perjury on examination on oath or affirmation before such court, or who shall corruptly procure, or suborn, any person to commit such wilful perjury, shall and may be prosecuted by indictment or information in any court of

justice of the United States, and shall suffer such penalties as are authorized by the laws of the United States in cases of perjury, or the subornation thereof. And in every prosecution for perjury, or the subornation thereof, under this act, it shall be sufficient to set forth the offence charged on the defendant, without setting forth the authority by which the court was held, or the particular matters brought or intended to be brought before the said court.

Art. 38. All charges on which an application for a general court-martial is founded shall be exhibited in writing to the proper officer, and the person demanding the court shall take care that the person accused be furnished with a true copy of the charges, with the specifications, at the time he is put under arrest; nor shall any other charges, than those so exhibited, be urged against the person to be tried before the court, unless it appear to the court that intelligence of such charge had not reached the person demanding the court, when the person so to be tried was put under arrest, or that some witness material to the support of such charge, who was at that time absent, can be produced; in which case reasonable time shall be given to the person to be tried to make his defence against such new charge. Every officer so arrested is to deliver up his sword to his commanding officer, and to confine himself to the limits assigned him, under pain of dismissal from service.

Art. 39. When the proceedings of any general court-martial shall have commenced, they shall not be suspended or delayed on account of the absence of any of the members, provided five or more be assembled; but the court is enjoined to sit from day to day, Sundays excepted, until sentence be given. And no member of said court shall, after the proceedings are begun, absent himself therefrom, unless in case of sickness, or orders to go on duty from a superior officer, on pain of being cashiered.

Art. 40. Whenever a court-martial shall sentence an officer to be suspended, the court shall have the power to suspend his pay and emoluments for the whole, or any part of the time of his suspension.

Art. 41. All sentences of courts-martial which shall extend to the loss of life, shall require the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present; and no such sentence shall be carried into execution until confirmed by the President of the United States; or, if the trial take place out of the United States, until it be confirmed by the commander of the fleet or squadron. All other sentences may be determined by a majority of votes, and carried into execution on confirmation of the commander of the fleet, or officer ordering the court, except such as go to the dismissal of a commissioned or warrant officer, which are first to be approved by the President of the United States.

A court-martial shall not, for any one offence not capital, inflict a punishment beyond one hundred lashes.

Art. 42. The President of the United States, or, when the trial takes place out of the United States, the commander of the fleet or squadron, shall possess full power to pardon any offence committed against these articles, after conviction, or to mitigate the punishment decreed by a court-martial.

Sec. 2. Art. 1. And be it further enacted, That the courts of inquiry may be ordered by the President of the United States, the Secretary of the Navy, or the commander of a fleet or squadron, provided such court shall not consist of more than three members, who shall be commissioned officers, and a judge advocate, or person to do duty as such; and such courts shall have power to summon witnesses, administer oaths, and punish contempt, in the same manner as courts-martial. But such court shall merely state facts, and not give their opinion, unless expressly required so to do in the order for convening; and the party whose conduct shall be the subject of inquiry, shall have permission to cross-examine all the witnesses.

Art. 2. The proceedings of courts of inquiry shall be authenticated by the signature of the president of the court and judge advocate, and shall, in all cases not capital, or extending to the dismissal of a commissioned or warrant officer, be evidence before a court-martial, provided oral testimony cannot be obtained.

Art. 3. The judge advocate, or person officiating as such, shall administer to the members the following oath or affirmation:

"You do swear, [or affirm,] well and truly to examine and inquire, according to the evidence, into the matter now before you, without partiality or prejudice."

After which the president shall administer to the judge advocate, or person officiating as such, the following oath or affirmation:

"You do swear, [or affirm,] truly to record the proceedings of this court, and the evidence to be given in the case in hearing."

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That in all cases where the crews of the ships or vessels of the United States shall be separated from their vessels, by the the latter being wrecked, lost, or destroyed, all the command, power, and authority given to the officers of such

ships or vessels shall remain and be in full force as effectually as if such ship or vessel were not so wrecked, lost, or destroyed, until such ship's company be regularly discharged from, or ordered again into, the service, or until a court-martial shall be held to inquire into the loss of such ship or vessel; and if, by the sentence of such court; or other satisfactory evidence, it shall appear that all or any of the officers and men of such ship's company did their utmost to preserve her, and after the loss thereof behaved themselves agreeably to the discipline of the navy, then the pay and emoluments of such officers and men, or such of them as shall have done their duty as aforesaid, shall go on until their discharge or death; and every officer or private who shall, after the loss of such vessel, act contrary to the discipline of the navy, shall be punished, at the discretion of a court-martial, in the same manner as if such vessel had not been so lost.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That all the pay and emoluments of such officers and men, of any of the ships or vessels of the United States taken by an enemy, who shall appear by the sentence of a court-martial, or otherwise, to have done their utmost to preserve and defend their ship or vessel, and after taking thereof, have behaved themselves obediently to their superiors, agreeably to the discipline of the navy, shall go on, and be paid them until their death, exchange, or discharge.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That the proceeds of all ships and vessels, and the goods taken on board of them, which shall be adjudged good prize, shall, when of equal or superior force to the vessel or vessels making the capture, be the sole property of the captors; and when of inferior force, shall be divided equally between the United States and the officers and men making the capture.

SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted*, That the prize money belonging to the officers and men shall be distributed in the following manner :

1. To the commanding officers of fleets, squadrons, or single ships, three-twentieths, of which the commanding officer of the fleet or squadron shall have one-twentieth, if the prize be taken by a ship or vessel acting under his command, and the commander of single ships two-twentieths ; but where the prize is taken by a ship acting independently of such superior officer, the three-twentieths shall belong to her commander.

2. To sea lieutenants, captains of marines, and sailing masters, two-twentieths ; but where there is a captain without a lieutenant of marines, these officers shall be entitled to two-twentieths and one-third of a twentieth, which third, in such case, shall be deducted from the share of the officers mentioned in article No. 3 of this section.

3. To chaplains, lieutenants of marines, surgeons, pursers, boatswains, gunners, carpenters, and masters' mates, two-twentieths.

4. To midshipmen, surgeons' mates, captains' clerks, schoolmasters, boatswains' mates, gunners' mates, carpenters' mates, ships' stewards, sailmakers, masters-at-arms, armorers, cockswains, and coopers, three-twentieths and a half.

5. To gunner's yeomen, boatswain's yeomen, quartermasters, quarter gunners, sailmakers' mates, sergeants and corporals of marines, drummers, fifers, and extra petty officers, two-twentieths and a half.

6. To seamen, ordinary seamen, marines, and all other persons doing duty on board, seven-twentieths.

7. Whenever one or more public ships or vessels are in sight at the time any one or more ships are taking a prize or prizes, they shall all share equally in the prize or prizes, according to the number of men and guns on board each ship in sight. No commander of a fleet or squadron shall be entitled to receive any share of prizes taken by vessels not under his immediate command ; nor of such prizes as may have been taken by ships or vessels intended to be placed under his command, before they have acted under his immediate orders ; nor shall a commander of a fleet or squadron, leaving the station where he had the command, have any share in the prizes taken by ships left on such station after he has gone out of the limits of his said command.

SEC. 7. *And be it further enacted*, That a bounty shall be paid by the United States, of twenty dollars, for each person on board any ship of an enemy at the commencement of an engagement, which shall be sunk or destroyed by any ship or vessel belonging to the United States of equal or inferior force, the same to be divided among the officers and crew, in the same manner as prize money.

SEC. 8. *And be it further enacted*, That every officer, seaman, or marine, disabled in the line of his duty, shall be entitled to receive for life, or during his disability, a pension from the United States, according to the nature and degree of his disability, not exceeding one-half his monthly pay.

SEC. 9. *And be it further enacted*, That all money accruing, or which has already accrued to the United States, from sale of prizes, shall be and remain forever a fund for the payment of pensions and half-pay, should the same be hereafter granted, to the officers and

seamen who may be entitled to receive the same ; and if the said fund shall be insufficient for the purpose, the public faith is hereby pledged to make up the deficiency ; but if it should be more than sufficient, the surplus shall be applied to the making of further provision for the comfort of the disabled officers, seamen, marines, and for such as, though not disabled, may merit by their bravery, or long and faithful services, the gratitude of their country.

SEC. 10. *And be it further enacted*, That the said fund shall be under the management and direction of the Secretary of the Navy, the Secretary of the Treasury, and the Secretary of War, for the time being, who are hereby authorized to receive any sums to which the United States may be entitled from the sale of prizes, and employ and invest the same, and the interest arising therefrom, in any manner which a majority of them may deem most advantageous. And it shall be the duty of the said commissioners to lay before Congress annually, in the first week of their session, a minute statement of their proceedings relative to the management of said fund.

SEC. 11. *And be it further enacted*, That the act passed the second day of March, in the year of one thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, entitled "An act for the government of the navy of the United States," from and after the first day of June next, shall be, and is hereby, repealed.

Approved April 23, 1800.

Extract from the proviso in the act making appropriations for the naval service, September 28, 1850.

"*Provided*, That flogging in the navy and on board vessels of commerce be, and the same is hereby, abolished from and after the passage of this act."

FLEET SURGEON.

From act of May 24, 1828

The President of the United States may designate and appoint, to every fleet or squadron, an experienced and intelligent surgeon, then in the naval service of the United States, to be denominated "surgeon of the fleet," who shall be surgeon of the flag ship, and who, in addition to his duties as such, shall examine and approve all requisitions for medical and hospital stores for the fleet, and inspect their quality ; and who shall, in difficult cases, consult with the surgeons of the several ships, and make records of the character and treatment of diseases, to be transmitted to the Navy Department ; and who, in addition to the compensation allowed to surgeons at sea, shall be allowed double rations while acting as the surgeon of the fleet as aforesaid.

AN ACT TO REGULATE THE PAY OF THE NAVY OF THE UNITED STATES.

SEC. 1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled*, That from and after the passage of this act the annual pay of the officers of the navy of the United States shall be as follows :

THE SENIOR CAPTAIN.

At all times, when in service, four thousand five hundred dollars.

When on leave of absence, or waiting orders, three thousand five hundred dollars.

ALL OTHER CAPTAINS.

When in command of squadrons or foreign stations, four thousand dollars.

When on other duty, three thousand five hundred dollars.

When off duty, two thousand five hundred dollars.

COMMANDERS, OR MASTERS COMMANDANT.

When attached to vessels for sea service, two thousand five hundred dollars.

When attached to navy yards, or on other duty, two thousand one hundred dollars.

When on leave of absence, or waiting orders, one thousand eight hundred dollars.

LIEUTENANTS.

Commanding, one thousand eight hundred dollars.

On other duty, one thousand five hundred dollars.

Waiting orders, one thousand two hundred dollars.

ASSISTANT SURGEONS.

Waiting orders, six hundred and fifty dollars.

At sea, nine hundred and fifty dollars.

After passing and found qualified for promotion to surgeon, eight hundred and fifty dollars.

At sea, one thousand two hundred dollars.

When stationed at navy yards, hospitals, rendezvous, and receiving ships, nine hundred and fifty dollars.

After being passed and stationed as above, one thousand one hundred and fifty dollars.

SURGEONS.

For the first five years after the date of his commission, one thousand dollars.

For the second five years, one thousand two hundred dollars.

For the third five years, one thousand four hundred dollars.

For the fourth five years, one thousand six hundred dollars.

After he shall have been commissioned as a surgeon twenty years and upwards, one thousand eight hundred dollars.

All surgeons of the navy under orders for duty, at navy yards, receiving vessels, rendezvous, or naval hospitals, shall have an increase of one-fourth of the foregoing amount of their respective annual pay, from the date of their acceptance of such orders.

All surgeons of the navy ordered to any of the ships or vessels of the United States commissioned for sea service, shall have an increase of one-third of the foregoing amount of their respective annual pay, from the date of their acceptance of such orders.

All surgeons of the navy, ordered as fleet surgeons, shall have an increase of one-half of their respective annual pay from the date of their acceptance of such orders.

CHAPLAINS.

(a) When attached to vessels for sea service, or at navy yards, one thousand two hundred dollars.

When on leave of absence, or waiting orders, eight hundred dollars.

PROFESSORS OF MATHEMATICS.

(b) When attached to vessels for sea service, or in a yard, one thousand two hundred dollars.

SECRETARIES.

To commanders of squadrons, when commanding in chief, one thousand dollars.

To commanders of squadrons, when not commanding in chief, nine hundred dollars.

SAILING MASTERS.

Of a ship of the line, for sea service, one thousand one hundred dollars.

When on other duty, one thousand dollars.

When on leave of absence, or waiting orders, seven hundred and fifty dollars.

SECOND MASTERS.

When attached to vessels for sea service, seven hundred and fifty dollars.

When on other duty, five hundred dollars.

When on leave of absence, or waiting orders, four hundred dollars.

PASSED MIDSHIPMEN.

On duty, seven hundred and fifty dollars.

Waiting orders, six hundred dollars.

WARRANTED MASTERS' MATES.

When attached to vessels for sea service, four hundred dollars.
When on other duty, three hundred and fifty dollars.
When on leave of absence, or waiting orders, three hundred dollars.

CLERKS.

(c) Of a yard, nine hundred dollars.
(c) First clerk to a commandant of a navy yard, nine hundred dollars
(d) Second clerk to a commandant of a navy yard, seven hundred and fifty dollars.
To commanders of squadrons, captains of fleets, and commanders of vessels, five hundred dollars.

BOATSWAINS, GUNNERS, SAILMAKERS, CARPENTERS.

(e) Of a ship of the line, for sea service, seven hundred and fifty dollars.
(e) Of a frigate, for sea service, six hundred dollars.
(e) When on other duty, five hundred dollars.
(e) When on leave of absence, or waiting orders, three hundred and sixty dollars.
(f) Officers temporarily performing the duties belonging to those of a higher grade shall receive the compensation allowed to such higher grade while actually so employed.
[(g) No officer shall be put on furlough but at his own request;] and all officers so furloughed shall receive one-half only of the pay to which they would have been entitled if on leave of absence.

If any assistant surgeon shall have been absent from the United States on duty at the time others of his date were examined, he shall, if not rejected at a subsequent examination, be entitled to the same rank with them; and if from any cause his relative rank cannot be assigned to him, he will retain his original position on the register.

One ration per day only shall be allowed to all officers when attached to vessels for sea service.

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted*, That no allowance shall hereafter be made to any officer in the naval service of the United States for drawing bills, for receiving or disbursing money, or transacting any business for the government of the United States; nor shall he be allowed servants, or pay for servants, or clothing, or rations for them, or pay for the same, nor shall any allowance be made to him for rent of quarters, or to pay rent for furniture, or for lights or fuel, or transporting baggage. It is hereby expressly declared that the yearly allowance provided in this act is all the pay, compensation, and allowance, that shall be received, under any circumstances whatever, by any such officer or person, except for travelling expenses when under orders, for which ten cents per mile shall be allowed.

Approved March 3, 1835.

EXTRA COMPENSATION—ALLOWANCE FOR NEWSPAPERS, &C.

From the Act of March 3, 1839.

No officer in any branch of the public service, or any other person whose salary or whose pay or emoluments is or are fixed by law and regulations, shall receive any extra allowance or compensation, in any form whatever, for the disbursement of public money, or the performance of any other service, unless the said extra allowance or compensation be

authorized by law. Nor shall any executive officer, other than the heads of departments, apply more than thirty dollars annually, out of the contingent fund under his control, to pay for newspapers, pamphlets, periodicals, or other books or prints not necessary for the business of his office.

NUMBER OF OFFICERS.

From Act of August 4, 1842.

Till otherwise ordered by Congress, the officers of the navy shall not be increased beyond the number in the respective grades that were in the service on the 1st day of January, 1842; nor shall there be any further appointment of midshipmen until the number in the service be reduced to the number that were in the service on the 1st day of January, 1841, beyond which they shall not be increased until the further order of Congress.

EXTRA COMPENSATION, ETC.

From the Act of August 23, 1842.

No officer in any branch of the public service, or any other person whose salary, pay, or emolument is, or are, fixed by laws or regulations, shall receive any additional pay, extra allowance or compensation, in any form whatever, for the disbursement of public money, or any other service or duty whatsoever, unless the same shall be authorized by law, and the appropriation therefore explicitly set forth that it is for such additional pay, extra allowance, or compensation.

AN ACT TO REGULATE THE PAY OF PURSERS AND OTHER OFFICERS OF THE NAVY.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That all purchases of clothing, groceries, stores, and supplies of every description for the use of the navy, as well for vessels in commission as for yards and stations, shall be made with and out of the public moneys appropriated for the support of the navy, under such directions and regulations as may be made by the Executive for that purpose; and it shall not be lawful for pursers, or other officers or persons holding commission or employment in the naval service, to procure stores or any other articles or supplies for, and dispose thereof to the officers or to the crew during the period of their enlistment, on or for their own account or benefit; nor shall any profit or per-centage upon stores or supplies be charged to, or received from, persons in the naval service, other than those which are hereinafter prescribed.

SEC 2. *And be it further enacted,* That it shall be the duty of the Executive to provide such rules and regulations for the purchase, preservation, and disposition of all articles, stores, and supplies for persons in the navy, as may be necessary for the safe and economical administration of that branch of the public service.

SEC 3 *And be it further enacted,* That in lieu of the pay, rations, allowance, and other emoluments authorized by the existing laws and regulations, the annual pay of pursers shall be as follows, viz: when attached to vessels in commission for sea service, they shall receive—

For ships of the line.....	\$3, 500
For frigates or razees.....	3, 000
For sloops of war and steamers of first class.....	2, 000
For brigs, and schooners, and steamers, less than first class.....	1, 500

On duty at navy yards at Boston, New York, Norfolk, and Pensacola.....	\$2,500
At Portsmouth, Philadelphia, and Washington ^c	2,000
At naval stations within the United States.....	1,500
And in receiving ships at Boston, New York, and Norfolk.....	2,500
And at other places.....	1,500

On leave, or waiting orders, the same pay as surgeons.

And it is hereby expressly declared, that the yearly pay provided in this act is all the pay, compensation, and allowance that shall be received, under any circumstances, by pursers, except one ration each per day when attached to vessels for sea service, and except also for traveling expenses when under orders, for which ten cents per mile shall be allowed.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That nothing in this act contained shall be construed to affect the bonds which have heretofore been given by pursers in the navy, but the same shall remain in full force and effect as if this law had not been passed; and the Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized and required to demand and receive from them, or any of them, new bonds, with sufficient sureties, in all cases in which he may consider the same necessary and expedient; and, in case any purser shall neglect or refuse to give such new bond, it shall be the duty of the Executive to dismiss him forthwith from the service.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That the rules and regulations which shall be made in conformity with the provisions of this act, shall be laid before Congress at their next session.

SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted*. That it shall not be lawful for a purser in the navy to advance or loan any sum or sums of money, public or private, or any article or commodity whatever, or any credit, to any officer in the naval service, under any pretence whatever.

SEC. 7. *And be it further enacted*, That the provisions of this act shall go into effect, within the United States, from the date of its passage; and in vessels abroad, at the beginning of the quarter after its official receipt.

SEC. 8. *And be it further enacted*, That pursers attached to, and doing duty in, navy yards at Boston, New York, and Norfolk, and sea-going vessels of a larger class than sloops-of-war, shall be authorized to appoint a clerk, or assistant, to be approved by the commanding officer of such yard or vessel; and the yearly compensation of said clerk shall be as follows, viz: in a frigate, or navy yard at Boston, New York, and Norfolk..... \$500
In a ship-of-the-line..... 700
Said assistant or clerk shall have the privileges which are allowed to the clerk of the commanding officer; and each purser and clerk, while attached to vessels in commission, shall receive one ration per day

SEC. 9. *And be it further enacted*, That all stores of pursers on board ships in commission shall be taken by the government at a fair valuation, under the direction of the Secretary of the Navy.

SEC. 10. *And be it further enacted*, That all acts or parts of acts which may be contrary to, or inconsistent with, the provisions of this act, shall be, and are hereby, repealed.

(a) SEC. 11. *And be it further enacted*, That, from and after the passage of this act, the annual pay of the forward warrant officers of the navy of the United States shall be as follows: for boatswains, gunners, carpenters, and sailmakers, when on duty on board ships of the line, and in the three navy yards at Boston, New York, and Norfolk, eight hundred dollars; on other duty, seven hundred dollars; when on leave of absence or awaiting orders, the said officers shall receive five hundred dollars for the first ten years, and after, six hundred dollars.

(b) SEC. 12. *And be it further enacted*, That whenever an officer shall perform the duty of a higher grade by order of the Secretary of the Navy, or the commander of a fleet or squadron, or ship acting singly on foreign service, such officer shall be entitled to receive the pay of such higher grade during the time he performs the duty in that grade, and no longer; and no allowance shall be made for performing such service hereafter, unless so ordered.

 AN ACT TO ESTABLISH AND REGULATE THE NAVY RATION.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the navy ration shall consist of the following daily allowance of provisions for each person :

One pound of salted pork, with half a pint of peas or beans; or one pound of salted beef, with half a pound of flour, and a quarter of a pound of raisins, dried apples, or other dried fruits; or one pound of salt beef, with half a pound of rice, two ounces of butter, and two ounces of cheese, together with fourteen ounces of biscuit, one quarter of an ounce of tea, or one ounce of coffee, or one ounce of cocoa; two ounces of sugar, and one gill of spirits; and of a weekly allowance of half a pound of pickles or cranberries, half a pint of molasses, and half a pint of vinegar.

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted,* That fresh meat may be substituted for salt beef or pork, and vegetables or sour-kroot for the other articles usually issued with the salted meats, allowing one and a quarter pound of fresh meat for one pound of salted beef or pork, and regulating the quantity of vegetables or sour-kroot so as to equal the value of those articles for which they may be substituted.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted,* That, should it be necessary to vary the above-described daily allowance, it shall be lawful to substitute one pound of soft bread, or one pound of flour, or half a pound of rice, for fourteen ounces of biscuit; half a pint of wine for a gill of spirits; half a pound of rice for half a pint of beans or peas; half a pint of beans or peas for half a pound of rice.

When it may be deemed expedient by the President of the United States, Secretary of the Navy, commander of a fleet or squadron, or of a single ship when not acting under the authority of another officer on foreign service, the articles of butter, cheese, raisins, dried apples, or other dried fruits, pickles, and molasses, may be substituted for each other and for spirits: *Provided,* The articles substituted shall not exceed in value the article for which it may be issued, according to the scale of prices which is or may be established for the same.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted,* That, in case of necessity, the daily allowance of provisions may be diminished or varied, by the discretion of the senior officer present in command, but payment shall be made to the persons whose allowance shall be thus diminished, according to the scale of prices which is or may be established for the same; but a commander who shall thus make a diminution or variation shall report to his commanding officer, or to the Navy Department, the necessity for the same, and give to the purser written orders specifying particularly the diminution or reduction which is to be made.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted.* That no commissioned officer or midshipman, or any person under twenty-one years of age, shall be allowed to draw the spirit part of the daily ration; and all other persons shall be permitted to relinquish that part of their ration, under such restrictions as the President of the United States may authorize; and to every person who by this section is prohibited from drawing, or who may relinquish the spirit part of his ration, there shall be paid, in lieu thereof, the value of the same in money, according to the prices which are or may be established for the same.

SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted,* That the provisions of this act shall go into effect in the United States on the first day of the succeeding quarter after it becomes a law, and in vessels abroad on the first day of the succeeding quarter after its official receipt; that any acts and parts of acts which may be contrary to, or inconsistent with, the provisions of this act, shall be, and are hereby, repealed.

Approved August 29, 1842.

AN ACT TO REORGANIZE THE NAVY DEPARTMENT OF THE UNITED STATES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the act approved February seventh, eighteen hundred and fifteen, entitled "An act to alter and amend the several acts for establishing the Navy Department, by adding thereto a board of commissioners," be, and the same is hereby, repealed.

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted*, That there shall be attached to the Navy Department the following bureaus, to wit:

1. A Bureau of Navy Yards and Docks.
2. A Bureau of Construction, Equipment, and Repair.
3. A Bureau of Provisions and Clothing.
4. A Bureau of Ordnance and Hydrography.
5. A Bureau of Medicine and Surgery.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted*, That the President of the United States, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, shall appoint, from the captains in the naval service, a chief for each of the Bureaus of Navy Yards and Docks, and of Ordnance and Hydrography, who shall each receive a salary of three thousand five hundred dollars per annum, in lieu of all other compensation whatever of the naval service; and shall in like manner appoint a chief of the Bureau of Construction, Equipment, and Repair, who shall be a skilful naval constructor, and shall also appoint a chief of the Bureau of Provisions and Clothing, who shall each receive for his services three thousand dollars per annum;* and shall in like manner appoint, from the surgeons in the navy, a chief of the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery, who shall receive for his services two thousand five hundred dollars per annum.†

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That the Secretary of the Navy shall appoint the following clerks, to wit:

For the office of the Secretary of the Navy, a chief clerk, who shall receive for his services two thousand dollars per annum; one registering clerk, who shall receive for his services one thousand four hundred dollars per annum; three recording clerks, who shall receive for their services each one thousand dollars per annum; one principal corresponding clerk, who shall receive for his services one thousand five hundred dollars per annum; and two assistant corresponding clerks, who shall receive for their services each twelve hundred dollars per annum; one warrant clerk, who shall receive for his services twelve hundred dollars per annum; and one miscellaneous clerk, who shall receive for his services eight hundred dollars per annum.

For the Bureau of Navy Yards and Docks, one civil engineer, who shall receive for his services two thousand dollars per annum; one draughtsman, who shall receive for his services one thousand dollars per annum; one chief clerk, who shall receive for his services one thousand four hundred dollars per annum; and two assistant clerks, one of whom shall receive for his services one thousand dollars per annum, and the other shall receive for his services eight hundred dollars per annum.

For the Bureau of Construction, Equipment, and Repair, one assistant constructor and draughtsman, who shall receive for his services the sum of one thousand six hundred dollars per annum; and four clerks, one of whom shall receive for his services fourteen hundred dollars per annum, and the others shall receive for their services one thousand dollars per annum each.

For the Bureau of Provisions and Clothing, one chief clerk, who shall receive for his services one thousand four hundred dollars per annum; and two clerks, one of whom shall receive for his services one thousand two hundred dollars per annum, and the other shall receive for his services eight hundred dollars per annum.

For the Bureau of Ordnance and Hydrography, one draughtsman, who shall receive for his services one thousand dollars per annum; and three clerks, one of whom shall receive for his services twelve hundred dollars per annum, and the others shall receive for their services one thousand dollars per annum each.

For the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery, two clerks, one of whom shall receive for his services twelve hundred dollars per annum, and the other shall receive for his services eight hundred dollars per annum; and one assistant surgeon, who shall receive for his services not less than the highest pay of his grade in the service.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That the Secretary of the Navy shall assign and distribute among the said bureaus such of the duties of the Navy Department as he shall judge to be expedient and proper; and all the duties of the said bureaus shall be performed under the authority of the Secretary of the Navy, and their orders shall be considered as emanating from him, and shall have full force and effect as such.

SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted*, That there shall be allowed to each bureau a messenger, who shall receive for his services a compensation not exceeding seven hundred dollars per annum.‡

SEC. 7. *And be it further enacted*, That the chief of each bureau hereby established shall be authorized to frank all communications from his bureau; and all communications to his bureau, on the business thereof, shall be free of postage.

* Increased to \$3,500, by subsequent enactments.

SEC. 8. *And be it further enacted*, That the books, records, and papers, now belonging to the office of the Navy Commissioners, shall be distributed among the bureaus according to the nature of their duties, respectively ; and the Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to provide for each bureau such books of record and accounts and such stationery as may be found necessary ; for which purpose the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars is hereby appropriated, payable out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.

SEC. 9. *And be it further enacted*, That the unexpended balance of the appropriation for clerks in the office of the Secretary of the Navy, and the unexpended balance of the appropriation for the Commissioners of the Navy, their secretary and clerks, together with such additional sums as may be necessary to carry this law into effect, be, and the same are hereby, appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.

SEC. 10. *And be it further enacted*, That the Secretary of the Navy shall, if the same can be done without detriment to the public service, appoint, with their consent, officers of the navy, not above the grade of lieutenants, to perform the duties of any clerkship created by this act, (except as herein otherwise provided,) who shall receive each for their services not more than nine hundred dollars per annum, including their regular pay and rations ; but the appointment of any officer in the navy to any of the offices or clerkships in this act shall in no manner whatever interfere with his grade in the service.

SEC. 11. *And be it further enacted*, That all acts or parts of acts authorizing the President of the United States, or Secretary of the proper department, under his direction, to transfer any portion of the moneys appropriated for a particular branch of expenditure in that department, to be applied to another branch of expenditure in the same department, be, and are hereby, so far as relates to the Department of the Navy, repealed.

Approved August 31, 1842.

AN ACT TO REGULATE THE APPOINTMENT AND PAY OF ENGINEERS IN THE NAVY OF THE UNITED STATES.

* *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled*, That the Secretary of the Navy shall appoint the requisite number of chief engineers and assistant engineers, not to exceed one chief engineer, two first assistant, two second assistant, and three third assistant engineers for each steamship of war, for the naval service of the United States, who shall be paid, when in actual service, as follows :

To the chief engineer, fifteen hundred dollars per annum and one ration per day ; to the first assistant engineer, nine hundred dollars per annum and one ration per day ; to the second assistant engineer, seven hundred dollars per annum and one ration per day ; to the third assistant engineer, five hundred dollars per annum and one ration per day. The chief engineer shall be entitled to mess in the ward-room of ships-of-war, and in all cases of prize money he shall share as a lieutenant ; the first assistant engineer shall share as a lieutenant of marines ; the second assistant engineer shall share as a midshipman ; the third assistant engineer shall share as the forward officers ; but neither the chief nor the assistant engineer shall hold any other rank than as engineers.

† SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted*, That the Secretary of the Navy shall be authorized to enlist and employ the requisite number of firemen, who shall receive, each, thirty dollars per month and one ration per day ; and the requisite number of coal-heavers, who shall receive, each, eighteen dollars per month and one ration per day ; and the said firemen and coal-heavers shall, in all cases of prize money, share as seamen.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted*, That the said chief engineer and assistant engineers, when waiting orders, shall be paid as follows : To the chief engineer, twelve hundred dollars per annum ; to the first assistant engineer, seven hundred dollars per annum ; to the second assistant engineer, five hundred dollars per annum ; to the third assistant engineer, three hundred and fifty dollars per annum.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That the Secretary of the Navy shall appoint a skilful and scientific engineer-in-chief, who shall receive for his services, the sum of three thousand dollars per annum, and shall perform such duties as the Secretary of the Navy shall require of him touching that branch of the service.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That the Secretary of the Navy shall be authorized to prescribe a uniform for the said chief engineers and assistant engineers, and to make all necessary rules and regulations for the proper arrangement and government of the corps of engineers and assistant engineers not inconsistent with the Constitution and laws of the United States. The said engineers and assistant engineers shall be, in all respects, subject to the laws, rules, and regulations of the naval service, in like manner with other officers of the service.

SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted*, That the said chief engineer shall be appointed by commission, and the assistant engineers shall be appointed by warrant from the Secretary of the Navy, in such form as he may prescribe.

SEC. 7. *And be it further enacted*, That the Secretary of the Navy be, and he is hereby, authorized to establish, at such places as he may deem necessary, suitable depots of coal, or other fuel, for the supply of steamships of war.

Approved August 31, 1842.

PROFESSORS OF MATHEMATICS—QUARTERS, ETC.

From the Act of August 31, 1842.

Professors of mathematics in the navy of the United States shall be entitled to live and mess with the lieutenants of sea-going and receiving vessels, and shall receive such rations as lieutenants of the same ship or station shall receive.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill approved March 3, 1845.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That no more than one hundred and eighty passed midshipmen, and those senior in rank, shall at the same time receive the pay fixed by law for that class of officers.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That midshipmen shall hereafter be appointed from each State and Territory, with reference and in proportion, as near as may be, to the number of representatives and delegates in Congress; and that, until such a proportion shall have been established, all future appointments shall be made from such States and Territories as have not their relative proportion of midshipmen on the navy list, whenever there are suitable applicants from such States or Territories. *And provided further*, That in all cases of appointment, the individual selected shall be an actual resident of the State from which the appointment purports to be made, and that the District of Columbia be considered a Territory in this behalf.

SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted*, That so much of the act entitled "An act to regulate the pay of the navy of the United States," approved March third, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, as provides that no officer shall be put on furlough but at his own request, be, and the same is hereby, repealed.

SEC. 7. *And be it further enacted*, That in lieu of the mode heretofore provided by law, the engineer-in-chief, and chief engineers of the navy shall be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate. * * * * *

SEC. 8. *And be it further enacted*, That no more than one person doing duty at any navy yard, shall at the same time be entitled to the pay fixed by law for that service.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill approved August 10, 1846.

Passed midshipmen performing the duties of master, under the authority of the Secretary of the Navy, to receive the compensation allowed to such higher grade while actually employed.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill approved March 3, 1847.

SEC. 1. *Be it enacted, &c.* * * * And there shall be allowed, instead of the sum now allowed by law, three cents per day in lieu of the spirit rations in the navy, to be paid monthly to such persons as may elect to receive the same, who shall actually draw their rations in kind.

SEC. 4 *And be it further enacted,* That the pay of firemen and coal-heavers employed in the naval service shall hereafter be fixed by the President of the United States in the same manner as is now provided by law for the pay of other petty officers, and of seamen, ordinary seamen and marines; and so much of the act of Congress approved August thirty-first, one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, entitled "An act to regulate the appointment and pay of engineers in the navy of the United States," as fixes the pay of firemen and coal-heavers, be, and the same is hereby, repealed.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill approved August 3, 1848.

SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted,* That when any master in the navy, or passed midshipman holding an acting appointment as master from the Secretary of the Navy, has performed or shall hereafter perform the duty of a lieutenant, under an order of the commander of the vessel to which he was or shall be at the time attached, to supply a deficiency in the established complement of lieutenants of said vessel, whether belonging to a squadron or on separate service, which order shall have been subsequently approved by the Secretary of the Navy, shall be allowed the pay of a master for the period or periods during which he shall have performed such duty.

SEC. 7. *And be it further enacted.* That in calculating for the pay of surgeons in the navy hereafter, the time upon the graduated scale of pay shall be reckoned from their original entry into the service.

SEC. 12. *And be it further enacted,* That the number of professors of mathematics in the navy shall not exceed twelve; that they shall be appointed and commissioned by the President of the United States, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and shall perform such duties as may be assigned them by order of the Secretary of the Navy, at the naval school, the observatory, and on board ships-of-war, in instructing the midshipmen of the navy, or otherwise. That, when on duty, the pay of a professor of mathematics shall be at the rate of fifteen hundred dollars per annum, with a ration; and when on leave of absence or waiting orders, the pay shall be at the rate of eight hundred dollars per annum.

SEC. 14. *And be it further enacted,* That the proviso of the act of August fourth, eighteen hundred and forty-two, limiting the number of officers of the navy of the grade of midshipmen to the number that were in service on the first day of January, eighteen hundred and forty-one, be, and is hereby, so modified as to authorize the appointment of officers of that grade, to the number of four hundred and sixty-four: *Provided,* That the appointments shall be made according to the directions of the fifth section of the act approved March third, eighteen hundred and forty-five, entitled "An act making appropriations for the naval service for the year ending thirtieth June, eighteen hundred and forty-six;" and in appointing from each State, hereafter, its proportion of officers of that grade, the appointments shall be apportioned, as nearly as practicable, equally among the several Congressional districts therein.

SEC. 15. *And be it further enacted,* That from and after the passage of this act the annual pay of boatswains, gunners, carpenters, and sailmakers at the navy yard at Pensacola shall be the same as now allowed by law to the forward warrant officers at the navy yards at Boston, New York, and Norfolk.

SEC. 16 *And be it further enacted,* That the restriction established by the fourth section of the act approved March third, eighteen hundred and forty-five, whereby no more than one hundred and eighty passed midshipmen, and those senior in rank, shall at the same time receive the pay fixed by law for that class of officers, be suspended in its operation from the passage of this act, until the class of eighteen hundred and forty-one and eighteen hundred and forty-two shall have been examined, and the relative rank established among those who shall pass their examination.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill approved March 3, 1849.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That, in lieu of the pay allowed by law, a purser, when, by order of the Secretary of the Navy, attached to and doing duty at the naval station of California, shall receive the same pay as if attached to a frigate in commission for sea service: *Provided*, That no more than one purser shall, at the same time, be attached to the said station on general or special duty.

SEC. 8. *And be it further enacted*, That from and after the passage of this act all prize money arising from captures made by vessels of the navy of the United States, received by the marshal who shall make sale of such prizes, shall, within sixty days after such sale, deposit the net proceeds, after paying all charges as now provided by law, into the treasury of the United States; and all money now in the hands of prize agents shall also be deposited in the treasury, to be distributed as now provided by law; such part thereof as may belong to the officers and crews of the vessels of the navy shall be paid to them under the direction of the Secretary of the Navy, and the law authorizing the appointment of prize agents is hereby repealed.

Joint Resolution of Congress approved March 3, 1849.

That the accounting officers of the treasury are authorized and directed to credit pursers of the navy with payments made by them for carrying on hostilities against Mexico during the late war with that republic, whether the expenditures were made on land or water: *Provided*, The said payments shall have been made under orders of the naval officer in command, and approved by the Secretary of the Navy; and provided that satisfactory vouchers are produced to establish such payments.

SEC. 2. *And be it further resolved*, That every disbursement of public moneys, or disposal of public stores, made by order of any commanding officer of the navy, which shall be objected to by the accounting officers of the treasury in the settlement of the accounts of any disbursing officer, shall nevertheless be allowed to such disbursing officer; and the commanding officer by whose order such disbursement or disposal was made shall be held accountable for the same: *Provided*, That satisfactory evidence of such order, and of the payments of public moneys, or disposal of public stores under the same, shall be produced.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill approved September 28, 1850.

Provided, That flogging in the navy and on board vessels of commerce be, and the same is hereby, abolished from and after the passage of this act; and that no midshipman in the navy shall be appointed from any Congressional district having at the time of appointment more than two officers of that grade in the navy from such district. And whenever an appointment shall be made from any State, the person so appointed shall be an actual resident of the Congressional district from which the appointment purports to be made: *And provided further*, That such Congressional district of any State as may not have any midshipmen in the navy at the time an appointment may be made from said State shall be entitled to at least one appointment before any other shall be made from any district of the State having one or more officers of that grade in the navy.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill approved August 31, 1852.

And hereafter no appointment of midshipman, acting midshipman, or pupil at any naval school in the navy, shall be made unless recommended by the member of Congress representing the district in which the applicant resides, in the same manner that cadets at West Point are now appointed; and that the Secretary of the Navy is hereby required to report

to Congress, at its second session, the number and names of appointments to the naval school which have been made, and the district and State whence each one comes, and the number of vacancies then existing at said school, with the Congressional districts which may be entitled to supply them; and a statement of the order in which the remainder of the Congressional districts shall be entitled to supply all future and accruing vacancies, so far as it may be determined by existing law, or by circumstances.

NO PERSON TO RECEIVE PAY FOR TWO OFFICES.

From the Act of September 30, 1850.

The proper accounting officers of the treasury, or other pay officers of the United States, shall in no case allow any pay to one individual the salary of two different offices on account of having performed the duties thereof at the same time.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill approved March 3, 1851.

Provided, That no commutation of rations shall be allowed except to officers and their attendants, and for the spirit part of the ration; and no person not actually attached to and doing duty on board a sea-going or receiving vessel, and the petty officers, seamen, and ordinary seamen, attached to the ordinary of the navy yards, shall be allowed a ration. *And provided further*, That no rations stopped for the sick on board vessels shall be credited to the hospital fund, but shall remain and be accounted for by the purser as part of the provisions of the vessel; and that the rations of officers and others of the navy sent to hospitals on shore shall be credited to the hospital fund at the cost only thereof; and the chief of the Bureau of Provisions and Clothing, with the approbation of the Secretary of the Navy, shall prescribe all such regulations in relation to stopping such rations as will insure a faithful accountability for the rations stopped for the sick on board vessels, and to insure due credit to the hospital fund for the rations at cost of those sent to the hospitals on shore; and the said regulations to go into effect on the first day of the succeeding month after their official receipt at yards, stations, and on board vessels.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted*, That if any assistant engineer shall have been absent from the United States on duty at the time others of his date were examined, he shall, if not rejected at a subsequent examination, be entitled to the same rank with them; and, if from any cause his relative rank cannot be assigned to him, he shall retain his original position on the register.

COMPENSATION OF THE OFFICER CHARGED WITH THE EXPERIMENTS IN GUNNERY AT WASHINGTON.

From the Act of March 3, 1851.

The officer charged with the experiments in gunnery at the navy yard at Washington shall hereafter receive the compensation of a commander at sea.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill approved August 31, 1852.

It being provided that so much of the act approved March 3, 1851, entitled "An act making appropriations for the naval service for the year ending June 30, 1852," as provides "that no commutations of rations shall be allowed except to officers and their attendants, and for the spirit part of the ration," be, and the same is hereby, repealed.

The salary of the secretary of the Naval Academy at Annapolis shall be twelve hundred and fifty dollars per annum.

And the pay of chaplains in the navy shall be one thousand dollars on leave, or waiting orders, or fifteen hundred dollars while on duty.

* * * * *

And the navy agent at Memphis, for the time during which he has performed, or may perform, the duties of purser, in addition to his own, shall be allowed and paid the annual salary of a purser on duty at navy yards of the second class, which shall not be in addition to his commissions, but in lieu thereof; and the salary of the assistant to the purser for the navy yard at Kittery, Maine, who also discharges the duties of clerk and steward, shall be seven hundred and fifty dollars; and the pay of the first clerk to the commandant "at the navy yards at Norfolk, New York, and Boston, shall be at the rate of one thousand dollars per annum," and that the "second clerk to the commandant" at the same yards shall be at the rate of eight hundred dollars per annum from and after the passage of this act.

COMPENSATION OF CLERKS AT NAVY YARDS.

From the Act of March 3, 1853.

And the first and second clerks to the commandants of the principal navy yards, viz: Boston, New York, Washington, Norfolk, and Pensacola, shall receive the same pay that the two lowest classes of clerks in the bureaus of the Navy Department now receive respectively; and each "clerk of the yard" in the said navy yards shall receive the same compensation as herein provided for the first clerks to commandants.

PAY OF WARRANT OFFICERS.

From the Act of August 5, 1854.

The pay of the boatswains, gunners, carpenters, and sailmakers of the navy shall be as follows: on leave or waiting orders, per annum, six hundred dollars; shore duty, seven hundred dollars; sea service, nine hundred dollars; an addition of two per centum upon the foregoing rates for every year's sea service, and an addition upon sea pay of ten per centum per annum when serving in ships with four hundred men, and twenty per centum when serving in ships with nine hundred men.

AN ACT TO PROMOTE THE EFFICIENCY OF THE NAVY.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That as soon as practicable after the passage of this act, the President of the United States shall cause a board of naval officers to be assembled, to consist of five captains, five commanders, and five lieutenants, which board, under such regulations as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe, shall make a careful examination into the efficiency of the officers of the grades hereinafter mentioned, and shall report to the Secretary of the Navy the names and rank of all officers of the said grades who, in the judgment of said board, shall be incapable of performing promptly and efficiently all their duty, both ashore and afloat; and whenever said board shall believe that said incompetency has arisen from any cause implying sufficient blame on the part of the officer to justify it, they shall recommend that his name be stricken altogether from the rolls. Vacancies occurring in said board shall be filled by the Secretary of the Navy, who shall preserve the number and grades of its officers, as aforesaid: *Provided,* That no officers upon said board shall examine into or report upon the efficiency of officers of a grade above them.

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted,* That all officers who shall be found by the said board incapable of performing the duties of their respective offices, ranks, or grades, shall, if such

finding be approved by the President, be dropped from the rolls, or placed, in the order of their rank and seniority at the time, upon a list in the Navy Register, to be entitled the reserved list; and those so placed on the reserved list shall receive the leave of absence pay or the furlough pay to which they may be entitled, when so placed according to the report of the board and approval of the President, and shall be ineligible to further promotion, but shall be subject to the orders of the Navy Department at all times for duty; and vacancies created in the active service list, by placing officers on the reserved list, shall be filled by regular promotion in the order of rank or seniority. And officers who may be promoted to fill the vacancies created by the reserved list shall, while unemployed, receive only the "leave of absence" or "waiting orders" pay to which they would have been entitled if such promotion had not been made; but when employed at sea, or on other duty, they shall receive, in addition to such "leave of absence" or "waiting orders" pay, the difference between the "waiting orders" or "leave of absence" pay and the lowest sea-service pay of the grade to which they may be so promoted: *Provided*, That this scrutiny and reservation of officers shall extend only to the grades of captain, commander, lieutenant, masters, and passed midshipmen. *And provided further*, That all vacancies, occurring in the grade of masters shall be filled by the promotion of the senior passed midshipman, to be entitled masters in the line of promotion, who, when promoted, shall receive the pay allowed by law to masters; that the number of masters in the line of promotion shall not exceed sixty, and that nothing in this act contained shall be held or construed to authorize any increase of the aggregate pay of the said grades, or of the naval service, as now allowed by law.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted*, That nothing in this act contained shall be construed to restrict, apply to, or impair the regular promotion of officers in the service list of the navy who may be at any time entitled to promotion—consequent upon deaths, dismissals, or resignations in the naval service—nor in any manner to abridge or impair the right of the Secretary of the Navy to place any officers upon furlough.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That nothing in this act shall be so construed as to increase the aggregate number of officers, and that all laws, or clauses of laws, so far as they conflict with the provisions of this act, are hereby repealed.

Approved February 28, 1855.

AN ACT TO PROVIDE A MORE EFFICIENT DISCIPLINE FOR THE NAVY.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That, from and after the passage of this act, it shall be the duty of every commanding officer of any of the vessels of the navy, on returning from a cruise, to forward, immediately on his arrival in port, to the Secretary of the Navy, a list of the names of such of the crew who enlisted for three years as in his opinion, on being discharged, are entitled to an "honorable discharge," as a testimony of fidelity and obedience; and that he shall grant the same to such, according to the form to be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy.

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted*, That if any seaman, ordinary seaman, landsman, or boy shall re-enlist for three years, within three months after his discharge, he shall, on presenting his honorable discharge, or on accounting in a satisfactory manner for its loss, be entitled to pay during the said three months, equal to that to which he would have been entitled if he had been employed in actual service.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted*, That it shall be the duty of commanders of any vessels in the navy, in granting temporary leave of absence and liberty on shore, to exercise carefully a discrimination in favor of the faithful and obedient.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That summary courts-martial may be ordered upon petty officers and persons of inferior ratings by the commander of any vessel in the navy to which such persons belong, for the trial of offences which he may deem deserving of greater punishment than the commander of a vessel himself is by law authorized to inflict of his own authority, but not sufficient to require trial by general court-martial.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That summary courts-martial shall consist of three officers not below the rank of passed midshipman, and of some competent person to act as recorder. Before proceeding to trial, the members shall take the following oath or affirmation, which the recorder is hereby authorized to administer: "You, A B, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that you will well and truly try, without prejudice or partiality, the case now depending, according to the evidence which shall be adduced, the laws for the government of the navy, and your own conscience. So help you God."

After which the recorder of the court shall take the following oath or affirmation, which the senior member of the court shall administer: "You, A B, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that you will keep a true record of the evidence which may be given before this court, and of the proceedings thereof. So help you God."

SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted*, That the commander of a ship shall have authority to order any officer under his command to act as the recorder of a summary court-martial.

SEC. 7. *And be it further enacted*, That all testimony given before such court shall be given orally, on oath or affirmation, which the senior member of the court shall administer.

That summary courts-martial may sentence petty officers and persons of inferior ratings to any one of the following punishments, viz:

First. Discharge from the service with bad-conduct discharge, but the sentence not to be carried into effect in a foreign country.

Second. Solitary confinement in irons, single or double, on bread and water, or diminished rations, provided no such confinement shall exceed thirty days.

Third. Solitary confinement in irons, single or double, not exceeding thirty days.

Fourth. Solitary confinement not exceeding thirty days.

Fifth. Confinement not exceeding two months.

Sixth. Reduction to next inferior rating.

Seventh. Deprivation of liberty on shore on foreign station.

Eighth. Extra police duties and loss of pay, not to exceed three months, may be added to any of the abovementioned punishments.

SEC. 8. *And be it further enacted*, That no sentence of a summary court-martial shall be carried into effect without the approval of the officer ordering the court, who shall have power to remit in part or altogether, but not to commute, any such sentence. And it shall be the duty of any such commanding officer to remit any part or the whole of any sentence by a summary court-martial, the execution of which would, in the opinion of the surgeon or senior medical officer on board, given in writing, produce serious injury to the health of the person sentenced; or in case he shall refuse to do so, it shall be his duty, without delay, to submit the case again to the same or to another summary court-martial, which shall have power, upon the testimony already taken, to remit the former punishment, and to assign some other of the authorized punishments in the place thereof.

SEC. 9. *And be it further enacted*, That the proceedings of summary courts-martial shall be conducted with as much conciseness and precision as may be consistent with the ends of justice, and under such forms and rules as may be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy, with the approval of the President of the United States; and all such proceedings shall be transmitted in the usual mode to the Navy Department.

SEC. 10. *And be it further enacted*, That any punishments authorized by this act to be inflicted by a summary court-martial may likewise be inflicted by any general court-martial.

SEC. 11. *And be it further enacted*, That any person who shall entice any seaman, ordinary seaman, landsman, or boy, who may have enlisted into the naval service of the United States, to desert therefrom, or who shall conceal any person who may have so deserted, and shall refuse to deliver him up upon the order of his commanding officer, shall, upon legal conviction thereof, be fined, at the discretion of the court, in any sum not exceeding three hundred dollars, or be imprisoned for any term not exceeding one year.

Approved March 2, 1855.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill approved March 3, 1855.

That in lieu of two thousand dollars per annum, the maximum of compensation now allowed by law to navy agents, there shall be allowed two per centum commission on the first hundred thousand dollars, or under, disbursed by them; and one per centum on every succeeding one hundred thousand dollars, or under, disbursed by them, until the compensation reaches the sum of three thousand dollars per annum, which amount shall be the maximum of compensation for said agent: *Provided*, That the compensation named herein shall be in lieu of all extra compensation of every nature and description rendered by navy agents by order of the Navy Department, from and after the passage of this act. *And provided further*, That nothing herein contained shall be construed to reduce the salary to which any navy agent is entitled under existing laws.

* * * * *
That the purser of the navy yard at Washington, District of Columbia, shall, from and after the passage of this act, receive the same pay as is now allowed by law to the purser

at the navy yards at Boston, New York, Norfolk, and Pensacola : *Provided*, That when pursers of the navy shall be appointed inspectors of provisions, clothing, and small stores, they shall, while so acting, receive the same compensation as the pursers of the navy yard to which they may be attached.

* * * * *

And be it further enacted, That the fifth section of the "act making appropriations for the naval service for the year ending thirtieth of June, eighteen hundred and fifty-five," approved August fifth, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, shall not be so construed as in any case to reduce the pay of the boatswains, carpenters, sailmakers, and gunners of the navy, from the passage of said act.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill approved August 16, 1856.

That each purser attached to a sloop of war, or other vessel smaller than a frigate, shall be authorized to appoint a clerk in lieu of the steward heretofore allowed, subject to the approval of the commanding officer of such vessel; and such clerk shall have the privileges allowed to the clerk of the commanding officer, and his yearly compensation shall be four hundred dollars and one ration per day.

AN ACT TO AMEND AN ACT ENTITLED "AN ACT TO PROMOTE THE
EFFICIENCY OF THE NAVY"

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That, upon the written request, made within ninety days after the passage hereof, or within thirty days after the return of any officer absent from the United States at the time of the passage of this act, provided he shall return within one year after the passage of this act, by any officer of the navy who was dropped, furloughed, or retired by the operation of the act of the twenty-eighth of February, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, entitled "An act to promote the efficiency of the navy," the Secretary of the Navy shall cause the physical, mental, professional, and moral fitness of such officer for the naval service, to be investigated by a court of inquiry, which shall be governed by the laws and regulations which now govern courts of inquiry; and the said court shall, in their finding, report whether the said officer, if he has been dropped from the rolls of the navy, ought to be restored, and, if restored, whether to the active or the reserved list, and if the latter, whether on leave of absence or furlough pay; and in case the officer making the written request, as aforesaid, shall have been placed on the reserved list, then the court, in their finding, shall report whether the said officer ought to be restored to the active list, or, if not restored, whether he ought to remain on the retired list on leave of absence or furlough pay; and the finding of the court shall, in all cases, be submitted to the President of the United States, and, if approved by him, in the case of a dropped officer, when restoration has been recommended, such officer may be nominated by the President to the Senate for restoration to the service, according to the finding of the court, as approved by him; and in the case of a retired officer, the finding of the court, when approved by the President, shall be conclusive; and such officer shall be restored to the active list, to occupy that position and rank in the navy which he would have occupied had he not being retired under the action of the late naval board; or he shall remain upon the retired list on leave of absence or furlough pay, according to the finding of the court, as approved by the President: *Provided*, That the officers so restored or placed on the reserved list shall be appointed to their places, respectively, by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate

SEC. 2 And be it further enacted, That the operation of the present law limiting the number of officers of the navy shall be suspended so far as to authorize the restoration, within one year from the passage of this act, by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, of officers reserved or dropped under the operation of the act of the twenty-eighth of February, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, entitled "An act to promote the efficiency of the navy:" *Provided*, That there shall be no further promotions or appointments in any grade after said restoration shall have been made thereto, until such grade in the active

service shall be reduced to the limit now prescribed by law. That when any such officer shall be restored to the navy, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, the officer so restored shall occupy that position and rank in the navy which he would have held had he not been retired, furloughed, or dropped, by the order of the President, on the report of the naval board: *Provided further*, That any dropped officer who may be, in the opinion of said court, entitled to be placed on the retired or furloughed list, may be thus placed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted*, That officers who were dropped, as aforesaid, and who shall not be restored to the naval service within one year from the passage hereof, shall be entitled to receive one year's duty pay of their grades, respectively; and the President shall be, and he is hereby, authorized, with the advice and consent of the Senate, to transfer any officer from the furlough to the reserved pay list, and that so much of the act of February twenty-eighth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, entitled "An act to promote the efficiency of the navy," as renders reserved officers ineligible to promotion, be, and the same is hereby, repealed.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That reserved officers may be promoted on the reserved list, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, but no such promotion shall entitle them to any pay beyond that to which they were entitled when so reserved; nor shall they, by such promotion, take any higher rank than they would have taken had they been retained in the active service of the navy; and nothing in this act, or in the act to which this is an amendment, shall be so construed as to preclude officers on the reserved list from wearing the uniform of their grades, respectively.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That captains in command of squadrons shall be denominated flag officers.

SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted*, That all officers who may be restored to active service, under the provisions of this act, shall be entitled to draw the same pay they were drawing at the time they were retired or dropped, for and during the time of such retirement or suspension from the active service aforesaid.

Approved January 16, 1857.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill approved March 3, 1857.

And be it further enacted, That the acts making appropriations for the naval service of the fifth of August, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, and the third of March, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, shall be so construed as to allow to the boatswains, gunners, sailmakers, and carpenters of the navy, when on shore duty, the same per-centage for sea service as is allowed to them when on sea duty.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill approved June 12, 1858.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted*, That it shall be lawful to enlist boys for service in the United States marine corps, with the consent of their parents or guardians, not being under eleven nor over seventeen years of age, to serve until they shall arrive at the age of twenty-one years; the boys so enlisted to receive the same pay, rations, clothing, and so forth, now received by boys enlisted in said corps, under the authority of the Secretary of the Navy.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That all the steamships of the navy of the United States now building, or hereafter to be built, shall be named by the Secretary of the Navy, under the direction of the President of the United States, according to the following rule, namely: All those of forty guns or more shall be considered of the first class, and shall be called after the States of the Union; those of twenty guns, and under forty, shall be considered as of the second class, and be called after the rivers and principal towns or cities; and all those of less than twenty guns shall be the third class, and named by the Secretary of the Navy, as the President may direct, care being taken that no two vessels in the navy shall bear the same name.

NAVY EFFICIENCY BOARD.

From Act approved March 3, 1859.

4. The sixth section of the act of January 16, 1857, entitled "An act to amend an act to promote the efficiency of the navy," shall be so construed as to include officers who, at the time they were dropped or placed on the reserved list, had been detached from duty or removed from command for supposed inefficiency or unfitness, but who have since been restored to the active list; and such officers shall receive the same pay they were receiving, respectively, when they were so detached or removed, up to the termination of the cruise when they were so detached, deducting any pay they may have otherwise received during the time aforesaid; and that this shall extend to any officer who has been transferred from the furlough list to the leave of absence list by the President, with the advice and consent of the Senate. That such officers of the navy as were dropped from the service by the action of the late "naval retiring board," and who have been subsequently restored to the service and placed upon the "furlough" or "leave pay" list, shall be allowed furlough pay, if placed upon the furlough list, and leave pay, if placed upon the leave list, for and during the time they were so dropped, deducting any pay which they may otherwise have received during the time aforesaid.

5. Such officers as were placed upon the "furlough list" by the action of the said naval retiring board, and who have been subsequently transferred to the "leave list," shall be allowed "leave pay" for and during the time they were on the furlough list, as aforesaid, deducting the furlough pay which they received during said time.

6. In case of the death of any officer after his restoration or transfer as aforesaid, his legal representatives shall be entitled to receive the amount which said officer would have received, under this act, up to the time of his death.

CIRCULAR.

EMPLOYMENT OF MECHANICS TO REPAIR MERCHANT VESSELS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *July, 1840.*

The practice of allowing the mechanics employed at the several navy yards, and on board ships on foreign stations to repair vessels belonging to the merchant service of the United States, will in future be limited to cases where a refusal to do so would of necessity impose injurious delays or greatly increase the expenses upon the merchant vessel. In such cases the mechanics shall make no demand for any compensation, but receive only such as the owner, assignee, or master of such merchant vessel shall choose to give, and their commander is willing they should take. Officers of the navy, in like cases, shall neither claim nor receive any compensation whatever.

In all cases of distress, gratuitous assistance is to be given as heretofore, to the fullest extent practicable.

REGULATION.

PUBLICATIONS IN NEWSPAPERS OF TRANSACTIONS OF A PRIVATE NATURE PROHIBITED.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *December 7, 1841.*

Officers of the navy are strictly prohibited from publishing, or causing to be published in newspapers, pamphlets, handbills, or otherwise, any disrespectful or offensive matter relative to transactions of a private nature, between officers or between officers and citizens; and any officer so offending shall be arrested and tried therefor; and one specification of the charge against him shall be the violation of this regulation.

PRESENTATIONS OF SWORDS, &C., PROHIBITED.

The practice of presenting swords, plate, or other things of value from inferior officers or from crews, to their superior or commanding officer, in the way of compliment; and all votes or resolutions, whether of praise or censure, from inferiors to superiors, are injurious to discipline and of evil tendency in other respects. They are therefore strictly forbidden.

NAVAL GENERAL ORDER.

ARRESTS ON A FOREIGN STATION.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *December 15, 1841.*

Whenever an officer shall be arrested on a foreign station, it shall be the duty of the commander-in-chief of the station to order a court for his trial as soon as possible after he shall be notified of the arrest, and this he shall not refuse or delay, except for imperative reasons connected with the public service.

If such imperative reasons shall exist, so that a court martial cannot be detailed and actually sit for the trial of the accused, his arrest may continue for thirty days after the commander-in-chief of the station shall be notified thereof, and no longer, and the accused shall then be returned to duty, unless, for sufficient reasons, the commander-in-chief shall otherwise direct; but he shall be again arrested, and shall be tried as soon as the condition of the service will admit of it.

No officer arrested on a foreign station shall be confined to his room nor restrained from the proper use of any part of the ship in which, before his arrest, he had a right to be, except the quarter-deck, unless such restraint shall be necessary for the safety of the ship, or the preservation of the good order and discipline, and even in that case, he shall be no further restrained than shall be necessary.

NAVAL GENERAL ORDER.

APPLICATION FOR LEAVE OF ABSENCE ON ACCOUNT OF ILL HEALTH.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *February 11, 1842.*

Officers of the navy applying for a leave of absence or an extension thereof, on the score of ill health, must forward at the same time to the department the certificate of a surgeon in the navy, if there be one in their vicinity, or, if there be no naval surgeon, of some respectable surgeon or physician, of their inability to perform duty.

Such certificates must state the nature of the disease, and the probable duration thereof, as far as can be judged.

RIGHTS AND POWERS OF COMMANDERS OF SQUADRONS AND CAPTAINS OF FLAG-SHIPS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *April 22, 1842.*

The frequent misunderstanding which have occurred between the commanders-in-chief of squadrons and the captains of their flag ships, on the subject of their respective rights and powers; misunderstandings which result only from the fact that their true relation to each other has not yet been properly defined, have suggested to the department the propriety of expressing its own views upon the subject. The following general rule embraces these views:

The commander-in-chief of a squadron, having in command of his flag ship an officer of equal grade with himself, holds the same relation to that ship as to every other ship of his squadron.

While it is impossible to specify all the powers of a commander-in-chief over the ship which bears his flag, or of the captain of a flag ship in subordination to the power of the commander-in-chief, a due observance of the spirit of the above rule will go far to prevent any conflict or collision between those officers.

The dignity of a commander-in-chief is lessened by his engaging in the details of duty of his particular ship, and the respect which ought to attach to the immediate captain of the ship is weakened by any interference with him in the rightful exercise of his authority.

The commander-in-chief of a squadron will find the best support to his own dignity and importance in maintaining the dignity and importance of the officers who are subordinate to him. While, therefore, his superiority must be always admitted, and his authority respected and obeyed, a due and prudent regard to the limitation above indicated, will tend strongly to preserve the discipline and harmony of the service.

REGULATION.

COMMANDER AS EXECUTIVE OFFICER OF A FLAG SHIP.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *December 24, 1842.*

The regulation of the 30th April, 1842, which prescribes that "when a commander shall be attached to a ship of the line or a frigate bearing the broad pennant of a commander of a squadron or station, he shall be considered as the executive officer of the ship, and shall have an apartment and mess in the ward room," is hereby annulled; and in future no ship will be allowed a commander as executive officer, unless a captain will receive him in his cabin.

ADVANCES OF PAY BY A NAVY AGENT.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *October 5, 1843.*

Whenever a navy agent shall be authorized to make advances of pay to officers bound on a cruise, it shall be the duty of the purser of the vessel to furnish to such agent, as his guide, a correct list, signed by himself and approved by the commanding officer, of all the officers entitled to an advance of pay; which list must exhibit their names, rank, and monthly pay.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *November 1, 1843.*

The receiving ships at the several stations are not to be considered "vessels in commission for sea service," except, as may sometimes be the case, while going from one port to another.

REGULATION.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMMANDERS OF STEAM VESSELS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *February 26, 1845.*

Commanders of steam vessels will cause the following orders to be carried into effect in the vessels under their command, in addition to the general orders and regulations which apply to sailing vessels, or to the general service of the Navy.

First. Steam Engineers of the Navy, when embarked in vessels, are to conform to the orders of the commanding officer of the vessel, and of the officer of the watch for the time being; but they are not, except in cases of great emergency, to be ordered to perform other duties than those immediately connected with the preservation, repair, or management of the engines and their dependencies.

Second. When practicable, one engineer at least is always to be on duty *in the engine room* whenever the fires are lighted; and when more than one engineer is attached to the vessel, one must be on board at all times ready for duty.

Third. The engineers, firemen, and coal heavers are to be arranged in watches, and when on watch are to be under the immediate direction of the engineer of the watch, and are not to be ordered on other duties than those connected with the engines, boilers, and their dependencies, except in cases of emergency.

Fourth. The senior engineer is to prepare and submit, for the approval of the commander, bills showing the specific duties of the respective engineers, firemen, and coal-heavers in their watches, for attending to, and for cleaning the different parts of the engines and their dependencies, and he will give particular attention that the prescribed duties are performed in a proper manner, and, in case of misconduct or neglect, report offenders to the officer of the watch, or to the commander of the vessel, as the case may require.

Fifth. When the engines are in operation, reports are to be made hourly to the officer of the deck, whether the engines and their dependencies are in good order, and immediate notice must be given him, at any time, if anything should occur to require a change in the orders under which the engineer is then acting, or special attention to any particular object, to insure safety or more efficiency.

Sixth. The firemen are to be instructed as far as may be practicable, to qualify them for managing the engines and dependencies with safety, in case accident or other cause should prevent the attendance of an engineer.

Seventh. The senior engineer on board must examine daily the engines and their dependencies, and all parts of the vessel which are occupied by them, or by stores for their use, and make immediate report should any defect or danger be discovered. He must give timely notice to the commander of the vessel of the probable wants of his department, and whenever articles are received for it, must carefully examine if they are of proper quality, and report any which, in his opinion, may be objectionable.

Eighth. Upon the arrival of a steamer in port, an early inspection is to be made by the senior engineer, to ascertain if the engines, boilers, or their dependencies require repairs or cleaning, and will report forthwith to the commander of the vessel.

Ninth. When repairs or cleaning are required for the engines or boilers, they are to be made, as far as practicable, by the engineers, firemen, and coal-heavers of the vessel, and they are to be employed on such duties in preference to coaling, if both should be necessary at the same time.

Tenth. The force-pumps, hose, and all other means for extinguishing fires must be always kept in good order and ready for immediate use, and so reported at the end of each watch by the engineer on duty, and the utmost care must be taken at all times in the arrangement of stores, the use of lights and fires, and the adoption of other precautionary measures to prevent the danger from fire, to which steamers are so much exposed.

Eleventh. A steam-log is always to be kept when the vessel is moved by steam, which log is to be signed in the "column of remarks" by the engineers of the respective watches, at the expiration of their watch and at noon of each day by the senior engineer of the vessel.

Twelfth. The engineer of the watch will be careful to note hourly on the steam-log all the information which the columns in it require, and to place in the "column of remarks" full information of the state of the weather and sea, and any accidents to, or defects in the engines or their dependencies, the quality of the coal, or other circumstances, which may be useful for determining the powers and qualities of the vessel, and the engines, under the various circumstances to which they may be exposed. He will carefully note in it the draught of water of the vessel and immersion of the bucket-boards, just before going to sea and on arriving in port, and frequently when receiving coal or other stores.

Thirteenth. The steam log-book is to be handed to the commander of the vessel daily, by the senior engineer on board; and it shall be the duty of the said commander to examine the same, and when satisfied of its correctness to sign it at the end of every calendar month, or oftener should the vessel in the mean time arrive at or anchor in any port.

Fourteenth. Steam log-books, calculated to contain the log for one quarter of a year, and hydrometers, will be deposited at the respective navy yards, for the use of steamers, upon proper requisitions. The commander of the vessel must transmit to the Secretary of the Navy, by the first safe opportunity after the close of the months of March, June, September, and December, the steam log-book for the preceding quarter, and whenever a steamer is placed in ordinary, for the period which has not been previously transmitted.

OFFICERS TO KEEP THE DEPARTMENT INFORMED OF THEIR ADDRESS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *January 30, 1846.*

All officers of the navy not on duty will keep the Department, at all times, advised of their address.

All officers, on being detached from duty, will immediately inform the Department of their intended place of residence, and notice must be given of any contemplated change before such change shall have been made.

All officers will promptly acknowledge the receipt of orders, and inform the Department immediately on their having reported in obedience to them.

GENERAL ORDER.

PROMOTION OF PASSED MIDSHIPMEN.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *August 14, 1846.*

Vacancies in the grade of Masters may be filled by the oldest Passed Midshipmen who are worthy of advancement.

The fitness of the senior Passed Midshipmen for advancement may be established by an examination, or by the records of the Department, or by the testimony of the officers under whom they have served, or in such other manner as may be deemed proper. Those who may be found not suited to be advanced, may be placed on furlough, or dropped from the list.

The masters thus appointed will receive regular warrants, and will also remain in the line of promotion.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *August 17, 1846.*

No person shall hereafter receive the appointment of Naval Constructor in the navy of the United States, unless he shall have been examined and approved by a board, to be designated for that purpose by the Secretary of the Navy.

No person shall hereafter receive the appointment of boatswain, gunner, carpenter, or sailmaker, in the navy of the United States, unless he shall have been examined and approved by a board, to be designated for that purpose by the Secretary of the Navy.

Surgeons of the Fleet, and Surgeons of more than twelve years, will rank with Commanders.

Passed Assistant Surgeons, next after Lieutenants.

Assistant Surgeons, not passed, next after masters.

Commanding and Executive officers, of whatever grade, when on duty, will take precedence over all Medical officers.

CIRCULAR.

ROGERS AND BLACK'S SEMAPHORIC DICTIONARY ADOPTED.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *February 16, 1847.*

In order to facilitate and improve the mode of communication at sea by ships of war with each other and with vessels of the revenue marine, and the merchant service, Messrs. Rogers & Black's Semaphoric Dictionary has been adopted for the use of the navy, copies of which, together with the necessary flags, will be distributed among the public vessels of the United States, as the Department may from time to time direct.

Officers of the navy will embrace every convenient opportunity to familiarize the service with the use of these signals by communicating with other vessels which may possess them, and with semaphoric stations on shore.

 RULES RESPECTING ALLOTMENTS.
NAVY DEPARTMENT, *April, 16, 1847.*

1. Any person belonging to the navy or marine corps may allot a portion of his pay (not to exceed one-half thereof without the special permission of the department) to such attorney as he may think proper, for the benefit of his family or other relatives, for such time as he may be absent from them on public duty.

2. The allotment, after having been signed, must have the approval of the department or of the commander of the station to which the person making it is attached; and will be registered by the purser of such vessel or station, or by the Fourth Auditor of the Treasury. It will be executed in duplicate; and in the case of commissioned officers and midshipmen, one part will be transmitted by the purser to the Fourth Auditor's Office, and in the case of all other persons, both parts will be so transmitted. The purser will send, with allotments registered by him, a general abstract for the use of the Fourth Auditor's Office, and a particular abstract for each of the navy agents by whom they are payable.

3. No allotment will be made payable on any other than the last day of the month.

4. The previous regulations upon the subject of allotments are hereby rescinded.

 REGULATIONS

Respecting the Enlistment of Firemen and Coal-heavers.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *August 1, 1847.*

No firemen or coal-heavers shall be shipped, as such, until they have passed a satisfactory examination, by one or more Medical Officers of the Navy, in respect to their health and vigor; nor shall firemen be so shipped until they have passed a satisfactory examination by one or more Engineer Officers of the Navy, upon their ability to manage fires properly with different kinds of fuel, and to use skilfully smiths' tools in the repair and preservation of steam machinery and boilers.

And be it further enacted
that the two general orders of the
Secretary of the Navy, dated Aug. 31,
1846, and May 27, 1847 - upon relative
rank, shall have the force and
effect of laws. p 140 p 144 p 152

The firemen of the Navy shall hereafter be divided into two classes; and, until further orders, the pay of the first class shall be at the rate of thirty dollars a month; the pay of the second class at the rate of twenty dollars; and the pay of coal-heavers shall be at the rate of fifteen dollars, with one ration a day to each.

Should any fireman or coal-heaver neglect his duties, or be unable to perform them, the commanding officer of the squadron, or, in his absence, the commanding officer of the vessels to which such fireman or coal heaver belongs, may, if he deems it necessary, direct another person to perform them during the continuance of such neglect or disability, or until the place is supplied by a person of the proper rating; and the person so appointed shall receive the pay of the situation which he may thus fill. But the commanding officer shall, when it is practicable, direct second class firemen to succeed or supply the places of the first class; and the coal-heavers, if qualified, shall take the place of the second class firemen in preference to other persons.

Firemen and coal-heavers, when unable to perform their duties, or when they neglect them, shall receive only a reduced pay—that is, firemen of the first class shall only receive the pay of firemen of the second; those of the second the pay of coal-heavers; and coal-heavers the pay of seamen so long as they neglect their duties, or are unable to perform them, or until duly discharged from the service.

*It is to be understood, as a part of the conditions on which firemen and coal-heavers enter the Navy, that, in case any right to a pension should occur before any action of Congress shall be had on the subject, the rate of pension to a first class fireman shall not exceed that to which a boatswain's mate would be entitled; that of a second class fireman, the same as for a quartermaster; and that of a coal-heaver, the same as for a seaman.

Firemen and coal-heavers should be shipped on articles which refer to these regulations, which shall, in all cases, be read to them before they sign the articles.

Firemen of the first class shall be eligible to promotion to the rank of Third Assistant Engineers; second class firemen, to the grade of first class; and coal-heavers, to the grade of firemen.

GENERAL ORDER.

OFFICERS ORDERED FOR DUTY ON RETURNING FROM SEA.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *March 1, 1848.*

All officers of the navy, not on duty, whose names are borne on the books of a naval station for pay, will, on the receipt of orders for duty, enclose a copy of the same to the commandant of the station

And all officers returning from sea, under orders or permission from their commanding officer, will, immediately on their arrival in the United States, report in writing to the Department, enclosing a copy of the order or permission under which they return.

CIRCULAR.

PURCHASE OF ARTICLES IN OPEN MARKET.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *April 17, 1849.*

Whenever it becomes necessary to purchase articles contracted for, in open market, in consequence of the failure of the contractor to furnish them, let the requisition state upon its face, "There is required to be purchased in open market, for immediate use, to supply deficiencies under the contract of (here state the contractor's name,) dated ———, the following articles, which must conform, in quality, as near to the contract as practicable."

The bills must be certified to by the Navy Agent thus: "The above named articles were purchased at the lowest market prices, in open market, for immediate use, to supply deficiencies under the contract of ———, dated ———"

* See Act of Congress respecting Naval Pensions to engineers, firemen, and coal-heavers in the Navy, and to their widows—Sec. 2. Approved August 11, 1848.

The Naval Storekeeper should acknowledge the receipt of the above articles accordingly, and the Inspecting Officer certify the articles to be of good quality.

A record is to be kept by the Navy Agent and Naval Storekeeper, and the excess of cost (showing the aggregate amount) over the contract returned to the respective bureaus quarterly.

CIRCULAR.

EXAMINATION OF A VESSEL ON HER ARRIVAL AT A STATION.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *May 23, 1849.*

You are directed, on the arrival of any and every public ship at the station under your command, to cause a critical examination to be made previous to her being dismantled and before the discharge of her crew, into her condition as an effective ship of war, and fitness for action with an enemy

For this purpose you will examine the condition of her guns, gun-tackling and gun-carriages, cylinders, cartridges, wads and shot, powder, &c.

You will also muster the men and see them exercised at their quarters, and report the result of your examination to the Department.

GENERAL ORDER.

COAST SURVEY.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *July 23, 1849.*

Officers of the navy, while attached to vessels of the Coast Survey in sea service, will be considered as on sea service and entitled to sea pay

Vessels of the Coast Survey will be considered as in sea service only while actually employed as vessels of the Coast Survey.

TRAVELLING ALLOWANCES OF AN OFFICER RETURNING FROM A FOREIGN STATION BY ORDER OR PERMISSION.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *August 31, 1849.*

"An order or permission given by a commanding officer on a foreign station, to an officer to return to the United States and report to the Secretary of the Navy, is regarded as requiring no more than that he should report in writing from the place of his arrival. No allowance for travel to the seat of government will be allowed, unless specially authorized by the Department."

CIRCULAR TO PURSERS.

REQUISITIONS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *February 23, 1850.*

After the first day of March, 1850, all Pursers on duty within the United States will make their requisitions for money direct upon the Navy Department and its Bureaus, instead of upon the Navy Agents, as has heretofore been the practice in some cases.

The approval of Pursers' requisitions by commanding officers will be required as evidence in favor of the wants of the service, and no requisition will be answered unless it bears upon it the signature of the commanding officer.

GENERAL ORDER.

CERTIFICATES IN CASES OF DEATH OR DISABILITY.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *February 17, 1851.*

In *all cases* of death or disability in the naval service of the United States, whether from wounds, injuries, casualties, or disease, it shall be the duty of the senior medical officer of the ship, station, or hospital, to record such death or disability, the facts thereto relating, and whether or not it originated in the line of his duty.

In all cases of death, a certificate shall issue, in which a copy of the Surgeon's record and a statement of service shall be given.

In all cases of disability of a permanent character, which shall have originated in the line of duty, a certificate for pension shall issue, in which, together with a copy of the Surgeon's record and statement of service, the degree of disability shall be set forth.

In all cases of discharge from service by reason of unfitness for the performance of duty from temporary disability, a certificate of ordinary disability shall issue, in which a copy of the Surgeon's record and a statement of service shall appear.

Such certificates are to be signed by the senior Surgeon, countersigned by the Purser, and approved by the commanding officer of the ship, station, or hospital, where such death, disability, or discharge may occur, and must be forwarded in duplicate by the commanding officer to the Navy Department.

GENERAL ORDER.

VESSELS SUSTAINING INJURY FROM HAVING BEEN ON SHORE, &C &C.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *August 16, 1852.*

Instances having occurred of vessels on their return from foreign service being found to have sustained injury from having been on shore, or having struck on rocks, without any report of such circumstance having been made either at the time of its occurrence or at the termination of the cruise, it is hereby ordered and directed that every commander of a vessel of the navy shall report to the Chief of the Bureau of Construction, Equipment, and Repair, immediately on its occurrence, every instance of the vessel under his command touching on a shoal or rock, or sustaining any injury to the hull, lower masts or bow sprit, with all the circumstances attending the accident, and his opinion as to the probable injury sustained; and at the termination of his cruise he will send duplicates of all such reports made during the cruise to the bureau.

BREVET RANK OF MARINE OFFICERS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *November 22, 1852.*

The President directs, until otherwise ordered, that, in determining the relative rank of the Officers of the Navy and the Officers of the Marine Corps, the brevet rank of the latter shall not be considered.

WHEN THE PAY OF AN OFFICER PROMOTED SHALL COMMENCE.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *June 9, 1853.*

When any officer of the navy shall be examined, and shall be found qualified for promotion, such officer will be paid from the date at which his warrant or commission shall issue from the Department, without regard to the date with which he may take rank, unless otherwise specially provided for.

REVOCATION OR MODIFICATION OF ORDERS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *October 17, 1853.*

No application for a revocation or modification of orders from any officer of the navy ordered to report for duty at any place or station, will be considered or replied to by the Department, until such officer, if able to travel, has reported in obedience to such order.

Every communication to the Department from any officer of the navy on duty, or on reporting for duty, must be forwarded by his superior officer. No communication will be considered or replied to unless so forwarded. An officer in command, on forwarding a communication, will endorse on it, over his official signature, the word "*forwarded by.*"

GENERAL ORDER.

ABSTRACT LOG.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *November 3, 1853.*

The form of the "Abstract Log" recommended by the late Maritime Conference at Brussels is hereby approved and adopted for use in the navy of the United States. It is recommended to navigators generally, and will be faithfully kept on board of all vessels in the naval service.

Commanding officers of vessels are especially charged with the execution of this order; and they will transmit copies of the abstract kept on board to the Chief of the Bureau of Ordnance and Hydrography at the end of the cruise, and at such other times as he may direct.

TESTIMONIALS OF ASSISTANT SURGEONS WHO ARE CANDIDATES FOR PROMOTION.

Extract from General Order of the Navy Department of February 1, 1854.

"Assistant Surgeons, who are candidates for promotion, shall present to the board testimonials of correct deportment and habits of industry from the surgeons with whom they have been associated on duty; also, a journal of practice or case-book in their own handwriting. They are expected to be familiar with all the details of duty specified in the 'instructions for the government of medical officers.'"

CIRCULAR.

HIRING STEAM VESSELS TO TOW UNITED STATES VESSELS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *February 16, 1854.*

The department directs that hereafter steam vessels shall not be hired to tow any United States vessels in or out of port, unless circumstances should require it for their safety, or when the full use of all their own means may not be able to prevent injurious delays when ordered on special or urgent service.

EXAMINATION OF ASSISTANT SURGEONS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *September 7, 1854.*

Any Assistant Surgeon in the navy who shall fail to present himself for examination, after having been so ordered, (unless for reasons which may be satisfactory to the department,) or who, after examination, shall be reported by the board as "not qualified" for promotion, shall be dropped from the list of officers of the navy.

GENERAL ORDER.

MEDICAL SURVEYS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *December 22, 1854.*

The 2d section of the General Order of the department, approved September 27, 1851, prescribing the manner of holding medical surveys, is hereby revoked, and the following is substituted in lieu thereof:

Whenever, in the opinion of the commander of a vessel of the navy, any person of her crew is unfit for service, he shall report the same to the senior officer in command, whose duty it shall be to order a survey to be held upon such person by three medical officers, who shall examine and report upon his condition; and if they find him "unfit for service," shall state, as far as practicable, the general character of his disease or disability, its probable duration, as far as can be predicted, and, in all cases, whether "originating in the line of duty." The report of survey to be transmitted, in duplicate, to the Secretary of the Navy or to the commander-in-chief of the squadron, for decision, by whom a copy shall be forwarded to the Navy Department.

DECISION.

EXECUTIVE OFFICERS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *February 14, 1855.*

The exception in favor of "Executive Officers," when on duty, made in the General Orders of the Navy Department of August 31, 1846, and May 27, 1847, which orders were legalized by act of August 5, 1854, is construed to apply to said officers while in the discharge of their military duties on board the vessel at the station to which they are attached, but not on any other occasion.

CIRCULAR.

DISBURSEMENTS BY PURSERS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *March 20, 1855.*

The 2d section of the "Joint Resolution for the relief of Pursers, &c.," approved March 3, 1849, provides "that every disbursement of public moneys, or disposal of public stores, made by order of any commanding officer of the Navy, which shall be objected to by the accounting officers of the Treasury, in the settlement of the accounts of any disbursing officer, shall nevertheless be allowed to such disbursing officer; and the commanding officer by whose order such disbursement or disposal was made, shall be held accountable for the same."

This enactment does not authorize an advance of public money by the purser to the commanding officer, or to any other person, on his order. The disbursement presupposes an indebtedness, and whether the objects for which the indebtedness accrued were sanctioned or not by law or regulation, the purser would be entitled to a credit for payment therefor, when made by order of the commanding officer. But the disbursement must be for some service rendered, or article furnished. For instance: if a clerk, not allowed by law, be employed, or if an excess of the regulation-complement of cabin furniture, or if unauthorized provisions or stores of any kind be purchased, by direction of the commander, and by his order the purser has paid for such unauthorized service or supplies, the purser will receive a credit for the payment, and the commander will be held accountable.

In regard to advances or loans, however, the laws of January 21, 1823, and August 26, 1842, are not repealed or modified by the Joint Resolution of 1849. The 6th section of the act of August 26, 1842, declares, "that it shall not be lawful for a purser in the Navy to advance or loan any sum or sums of money, public or private, or any article or commodity whatever, or any credit, to any officer in the Naval service, under any pretence whatever." To allow a purser to advance or loan to a commanding officer on his simple order the funds provided for the expenses of the ship and wages of the crew, would be dangerous to the service and unsafe for the Treasury, leaving an open door for collusion and fraud. No credits will be allowed to pursers for advances or loans hereafter made by orders of commanding officers, no matter how frequent or peremptory such orders may be.

GENERAL ORDER.

SUMMARY COURTS-MARTIAL.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *April 4, 1855.*

In conformity with the 9th section of the "Act to provide a more efficient discipline for the navy," approved March 2, 1855, the following regulations have been submitted to and approved by the President of the United States, and will be observed by summary courts-martial convened under the authority of the said act:

1. Summary courts-martial will adopt the same forms of proceeding and rules of evidence as naval general courts-martial, so far as they shall be applicable and not inconsistent with the conciseness and precision enjoined by the law, nor with the provisions of this General Order.

2. The form of convening a summary court-martial will be by a brief written order addressed by the commander of the vessel to the senior member of the court, stating the names and rank of the members of the court, and of the recorder, and the time and place of meeting; and by written or verbal orders to the other members of the court and the recorder. The written order to the senior member will be appended to the record of the proceedings.

3. The record will state that the oath prescribed by the law was duly administered to each member and to the recorder, in the presence of the accused.

4. If objection is made by the accused to any member of the court, it will be so stated in the record of proceedings, and made known, if the court think fit, to the commander of the vessel, who will, at his discretion, order another member of the court, or continue the member objected to.

5. The accused shall be furnished, before trial, with a written specification of the offence or offences for which he is to be tried. The specifications shall be as brief as practicable, without unnecessary repetition or circumlocution, or accumulation of epithets, but explicit; and all offences or misconduct committed at any one time by the same individual and intended to be charged against him, shall be comprised in the same specification, which shall be approved, before trial, by the officer ordering the court, and a duplicate of it to be annexed to the record.

6. The accused shall not be required to plead guilty or not guilty to the specification; but if a plea of guilty be made, the court may, at its discretion, admit testimony as to the character of the offender, or in extenuation of the offence. And, in any case, the court may find the accused guilty of the whole or any part of the misconduct charged, according to the evidence, and adjudge punishment for so much as shall be found proved.

7. Witnesses shall be summoned by the recorder through the executive officer of the vessel, and the summons shall be obeyed, unless disapproved by the commanding officer for some reason to be stated in the record.

8. The court, if requested by the accused, may allow a commissioned, warrant, or petty officer to appear as counsel, and cross-examine witnesses in his behalf; but no written defence or argument, nor any protracted oral defence or argument shall be admitted. Nor shall any testimony not clearly relevant be admitted, nor any documentary evidence be read to the court or appended to the record.

9. If more than one case be tried by the same court, the record of each case shall be separate, the order for convening the court shall be appended to the record of the first case, and be referred to in each subsequent record, so as to show that the proceedings of the court are continuous. And in each case the prescribed oath shall be administered anew to the members and the recorder of the court.

CIRCULAR.

AMERICAN CODE OF SIGNALS ADOPTED FOR THE USE OF THE NAVY.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *April 14, 1855.*

In order to facilitate the mode of communication at sea between ships-of-war and the merchant service, the American Code of Signals, by Henry J. Rogers, has been adopted for the use of the Navy, copies of which will be distributed by the proper bureau, among vessels of the United States Navy, as the Department may, from time to time, direct. The flags will be made at the yards or on board ship, as may be most convenient.

Commanding officers of the Navy will embrace every opportunity to familiarize the service with the use of these signals.

GENERAL ORDER.

HONORABLE DISCHARGES.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *April 7, 1855.*

Whenever any seaman, ordinary seaman, landsman, or boy, who shall have received the "honorable discharge" from the navy authorized by the "Act to provide a more efficient discipline for the navy," approved March 2, 1855, (form of which has been prescribed by the Department,) shall, within three months from the date thereof, present said "honorable discharge" at any naval rendezvous, if he shall answer the description of such discharge, and shall be physically qualified, he shall be re-enlisted for three years, and, upon his transfer to a receiving ship, shall be entitled to receive three months' pay equal to that to "which he would have been entitled if he had been employed in actual service" in the rate specified in the "honorable discharge."

If the "honorable discharge" should have been lost, reference can be made to the files of the Department for corroboration that the person presenting himself did receive an "honorable discharge," and for a descriptive list of his person.

The recruiting officer will write on the face of the "honorable discharge," over his official signature, the date of re-enlistment. After the reception on board the receiving ship of the person re-enlisted, the commanding officer, also, will write on the face of the "honorable discharge," over his official signature, that the three months' pay has been credited or paid to him, with the date of such credit or payment, and the amount thereof.

To those re-enlisting under the "honorable discharge," the advance authorized by the General Order of the Department, dated August 11, 1854, will also be made.

Should the person holding an "honorable discharge" prove physically disqualified, it will be so written by the recruiting officer on the face of the discharge, and such discharge shall not entitle the holder to be received under it.

In the re-enlistment of men under honorable discharges, regard will be had to the provisions of the Circular of March 25, 1851, in relation to enlistments.

On the returns now required to be made to the Department of enlisted men from rendezvous and receiving ships, special reference will be made to those men who have been re-enlisted under an "honorable discharge," and from what vessel they received their discharge.

Commanding officers of vessels, upon returning from a cruise, when directed to discharge the whole or any part of the crew, will furnish to those who, in their judgment, are entitled to it under the law, an "honorable discharge," and separate returns will be made to the Department of the names and description of those to whom they have been given.

Blanks for the honorable discharges and return will be furnished by the Department, and great care should be taken that they are both accurately and fully filled out.

A yeoman, however, is not to be discharged until his accounts have been audited and approved of by the commandant of the yard, as required by the Ordnance Instructions and other general regulations or orders. If found correct, the commandant of the yard will then grant the "honorable discharge," if entitled to it in the opinion of the commanding officer of the vessel to which he belonged.

When invalids are sent to the United States from a foreign station, the commanding officer of the vessel to which they belonged will transmit a list of their names to the Department, stating the general character of each, and designating such as, in his opinion, are entitled, under the law, to the "honorable discharge," in order that the commandant of the station at which they may arrive in the United States may be directed to grant the said discharge to those deserving it. A duplicate of this list is to be sent also to the commandant of the station where they are to arrive.

When any seaman, ordinary seaman, landsman, or boy, shall be discharged at his own request, or for his own convenience, before the expiration of his term of enlistment, he shall not be entitled to the "honorable discharge."

REPORT OF SURVEYS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *July 7, 1855.*

Hereafter, in all cases of surveys, it will be the duty of the officer superior in rank on the Board, to prepare the report of such survey.

GENERAL ORDER.

CERTIFICATES OF DEATH OR DISABILITY.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *July 17, 1855.*

In addition to the requirements of the General Order of the Navy Department of February 17, 1851, the medical officers of the navy, in all certificates of death or disability occur-

ring in the naval service, are hereby directed to make a statement, in each case, of the facts connected therewith upon which they base their judgment that such death or disability originated "*in the line of duty.*"

The Attorney General, in a circular of May 17, 1855, defines the term "line of duty" "to denote that an act of duty performed must have relation or causation, mediate or immediate, to the wound, the casualty, the injury, or the disease producing disability or death."

GENERAL ORDER.

"FLEET CAPTAIN"—"FLAG LIEUTENANT."

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *August 31, 1855.*

The attention of the department having been recently drawn to the fact that orders issued by the commanders of squadrons to those under their command are frequently signed by officers designating themselves as "Fleet Captain" or "Flag Lieutenant," purporting to be "by order of the commander-in-chief of the squadron," the department directs that, hereafter, all orders in writing, of whatever nature, emanating from the commander of a squadron, shall be signed by such commander himself only.

COMMENCEMENT OF PAY OF OFFICERS.

Extract from a letter addressed to the Fourth Auditor of the Treasury by the Secretary of the Navy, dated October 23, 1855.

"I find on examination that the rules of this department in relation to the commencement of pay of officers promoted have varied. The prevailing practice seems to be to allow pay from the time to which the commission relates in giving rank. This has long been, and is now, the rule of the War Department, to which there is a determination to adhere. I think there should also, if possible, be uniformity in the rules of the two branches of the service.

"I am of opinion, therefore, that it is better for the present to allow the pay back to the period of rank.

"This need not interfere with the general order of June 9, 1853, applicable to special cases."

GENERAL ORDER.

ALLOTMENT OF PAY.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *January 2, 1856.*

Hereafter, all persons enlisting for the navy, on being transferred to a sea-going vessel, will be allowed to allot *only* one-half of the rate in which they enlisted, without regard to the rating that may be given them on board the vessel to which transferred.

This rule will apply, also, to such recruits as may not have been transferred to a sea-going vessel.

COMMUTATION PRICE OF RATIONS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *August 21, 1856.*

From and after the 1st of July last, the commutation price of rations to the officers and seamen of the navy will be twenty-five cents; also to the officers, non-commissioned officers, musicians, and privates of the marine corps, attached to vessels for sea service, but not on shore or other duty.

AGE OF CANDIDATES FOR ADMISSION INTO THE NAVAL ACADEMY.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *January 15, 1857.*

The regulation for the admission of candidates into the Naval Academy at Annapolis, fixing the limits as to age, are modified so as to require candidates to be over fourteen and under eighteen years of age at the time of examination for admission.

FAMILIES OF OFFICERS NOT TO RESIDE IN PUBLIC VESSELS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *January 21, 1857.*

The families of officers are not allowed to reside in national vessels, nor to become passengers therein, unless by the assent of the Secretary of the Navy, Commandants of stations, commanders-in-chief of squadrons, and other officers in command of national vessels, will enforce this regulation.

STEAMERS-OF-WAR NOT TO BE USED FOR TOWING.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *January 22, 1857.*

It is ordered by the department that steamers of war are never to be used for towing vessels, unless when necessary for aiding such vessels to enter or depart from a port during a calm, or, at sea, in case of distress.

MILITARY HONORS TO SURGEONS AND PURSERS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *January 23, 1857.*

Surgeons and pursers shall be entitled to the same military honors, guards excepted, as the officers of the navy with whom they have precedence.

COMPLEMENT OF OFFICERS AND CREW MODIFIED.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *April 8, 1857.*

The complement of officers and crew for vessels in the United States navy, as established July 20, 1854, is thus modified: After rating the petty officers, the number of seamen allowed each vessel will be reduced twenty-five per cent; the number of ordinary seamen increased five per cent., and that of landsmen and boys, twenty per cent.

LETTERS TO MIDSHIPMEN THAT WILL ENTITLE THEM TO A FINAL EXAMINATION.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *May 17, 1858.*

Hereafter no commanding officer of any vessel of the United States navy, under whom the graduates of the Naval Academy shall serve, will give letters which will entitle them to their final examination if addicted to the habit of intoxication.

FLAG.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *May 18, 1858.*

It is hereby ordered that in lieu of the broad pennant now worn by flag officers in command of squadrons, they shall wear a plain blue flag, of the dimensions proportionate to the different classes of vessels, prescribed for the Jack in the tables of allowances approved July 20, 1854.

Flag officers, whose date of commission as captain is over twenty years, shall wear it at the fore; all others at the mizzen.

CODE OF SIGNALS.

The code of signals prepared under the department order of May 7, 1856, by Commodores Charles S. McCauley, A. E. F. Lavallette, and Commanders John B. Marchand, and Charles Stedman, and reported to the department on 30th March last, is adopted for the use of the United States navy. Any other existing order upon this subject is rescinded.

RANKS OF ENGINEERS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *January 13, 1859.*

Chief Engineers of more than twelve years will rank with commanders.

Chief Engineers of less than twelve years with lieutenants.

First Assistant Engineers next after lieutenants.

Second Assistant Engineers next after masters.

Third Assistant Engineers with midshipmen.

This order confers no authority to exercise military command, except in the discharge of their duties, and no additional right to quarters.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *January 17, 1859.*

It is understood that the Navy Commissioners' regulations of 1818, requiring chaplains "to read prayers at stated periods," have heretofore been construed to require them to offer prayers, and such will hereafter be the construction.

DRESS OF PETTY OFFICERS AND CREW ALTERED.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *March 26, 1859.*

The dress prescribed for petty officers and crew, as approved by the department March 8, 1852, is so far changed as to dispense with white duck cuffs and collars to the blue woolen frocks.

From and after this date the steamers *Susquehanna* and *San Jacinto* will be rated as steamers of the first class.

GENERAL ORDER.

DOUBLE RATIONS TO MARINE OFFICERS. MARINES DOING OTHER DUTY.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *June 7, 1859.*

Double rations will not hereafter be allowed to Marine Officers commanding Guards of the Receiving Ships at Boston, New York, and Norfolk; nor to the Marine Officer in command of the Guard at the Navy Yard gate in the city of Washington, D. C.

Marines serving on board vessels-of-war will not be diverted from their appropriate duties, or called upon to coal ship or work as mechanics, except in cases of emergency.

As occasions may arise when it may become necessary to employ Marines at the great guns, they shall be instructed as full guns' crews by their own officers, and may also be assigned as parts of ordinary guns' crews under other officers of division. But the Commanding Officer will be careful not so to assign Marines except in cases of necessity.

GENERAL ORDER.

PROFESSIONAL AID BY MEDICAL OFFICERS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *August 17, 1859.*

No order will be given to Medical Officers of the Navy to render professional aid to any person who is not attached to the naval service or on board a ship-of-war. The Department will confide in their humanity to respond to any appeal for their assistance whenever the requisite aid cannot be obtained elsewhere.

An exception may be made in favor of vessels in distress, when, if necessary to secure the requisite medical aid, the authority of the commander may be interposed.

GENERAL ORDER.**UNIFORM OF LIEUTENANTS COMMANDING.**NAVY DEPARTMENT, *August 23, 1859.*

Lieutenants, while in command, will wear two stripes of gold lace, of usual width, around the upper edge of the cuff.

GENERAL ORDER.**FLAG.**NAVY DEPARTMENT, *September 26, 1859.*

Captains in command of Navy Yards, who, by order of the Department, have commanded a squadron, will be allowed to wear the Flag authorized by the General Order of May 18, 1858, on the Receiving Ship attached to the station. Should there be no Receiving Ship attached to the station, then at any suitable place in the Navy Yard under their command. The Senior Flag Officer of the Navy will wear his flag at the main.

GENERAL ORDER.**EMPLOYMENT OF PILOTS.**NAVY DEPARTMENT, *December 15, 1859.*

The Regulation of the Department of April 3, 1847, in relation to pilotage is hereby rescinded.

Hereafter ships-of-war will take pilots only when it is deemed necessary, and pay them such rates as the laws of the States, respectively, authorize for merchant vessels. Pilots will not be called on board until the ship is ready to proceed to sea, and will be paid only from that time. In coming from sea, the pilot will be discharged the moment his services are no longer absolutely necessary.


NOTE No. 1.—DOUBLE RATIONS are allowed to commissioned officers of the Marine Corps, as follows: When commanding permanent posts; to officers commanding the guard on board of receiving ships at Boston, New York, and Norfolk; to the commanding officer of the guard of a squadron, when the number of marines in the squadron is not less than the guard of a frigate; and to the commanding officer of the guard of a ship-of-the-line or frigate when acting singly on separate service.

NOTE No. 2.—CLOTHING RESPONSIBILITY. All commissioned officers of the Marine Corps, when not above the rank of captain, or below that of lieutenant, are entitled to an allowance of \$10 per month for the care and responsibility of marine clothing, when commanding the marines of the squadron having the number of marines allowed to a frigate, of ships-of-the-line or frigates in commission, and at naval stations.

NOTE No. 3.—Where there are no public quarters furnished, a commutation is allowed. Officers on shore duty are allowed a commutation for fuel.

NOTE.—The sea and other service affixed to the names of officers in the Register is computed to the 1st January, 1861. As a general rule, the “sea service” with which an officer is credited, is for duty performed under orders from the department, as part of the complement of a vessel-of-war, belonging to the Navy, in commission for sea-service. Officers on the Coast Survey are allowed sea service only for the time they are actually afloat. No credit is given for service in Revenue and Merchant vessels. In the column “unemployed,” is included the time between date of warrant and date of first order from the department for service.

 The attention of officers is particularly called to the Orders and regulations published in the latter part of the Register.

AN ACT FOR THE BETTER GOVERNMENT OF THE NAVY OF THE UNITED STATES.

Act for the better government of the Navy.

SEC. 1. *Be it enacted, &c.*, That from and after the first day of June next, the following rules and regulations be adopted and put in force for the government of the Navy of the United States :

Exemplary conduct incumbent on commanders of vessels.

Article 1. The commanders of all ships and vessels of war belonging to the Navy are strictly enjoined and required to show in themselves a good example of virtue, honor, patriotism, and subordination, and be vigilant in inspecting the conduct of all such as are placed under their command, and to guard against and suppress all dissolute and immoral practices, and to correct all such as are guilty of them, according to the usage of the sea service.

Divine service.

Art. 2. The commanders of all ships and vessels in the Navy, having chaplains on board, shall take care that Divine service be performed in a solemn, orderly, and reverent manner, twice a day, and a sermon preached on Sunday, unless bad weather or other extraordinary accidents prevent it ; and that they cause all, or as many of the ship's company as can be spared from duty, to attend at every performance of the worship of Almighty God.

Punishment for certain scandalous offenses.

Art. 3. Any officer or other person in the Navy who shall be guilty of oppression, cruelty, fraud, profane swearing, drunkenness, or any other scandalous conduct, tending to the destruction of good morals, shall, if an officer, be cashiered, or suffer such other punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge ; if a private, shall be put in irons or flogged, at the discretion of the captain, not exceeding twelve lashes ; but if the offense require severer punishment, he shall be tried by a court-martial, and suffer such punishment as said court shall inflict.

Penalty for breach of duty in battle, or on the probability of an engagement.

Art. 4. Every commander or other officer who shall, upon signal for battle, or on the probability of an engagement, neglect to clear his ship for action, or shall not use his utmost exertions to bring his ship to battle, or shall fail to encourage, in his own person, his inferior officers and men to fight courageously, such offender shall suffer death, or such other punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge ; or any officer neglecting, on sight of any vessel or vessels of an enemy, to clear his ship for action, shall suffer such punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge ; and if any person in the Navy shall treacherously yield, or pusillanimously cry for quarters, he shall suffer death, on conviction thereof by a general court-martial.

Art. 5. Every officer or private who shall not properly observe the orders of his commanding officer, or shall not use his utmost exertions to carry them into execution, when ordered to prepare for, join in, or when actually engaged in battle ; or shall at such time basely desert his duty or station, either then or while in sight of an enemy, or shall induce others to do so, every person so offending shall, on conviction thereof by a general court-martial, suffer death, or such other punishment as the said court shall adjudge.

Cowardice, negligence, or disaffection.

Art. 6. Every officer or private who shall, through cowardice, negligence, or disaffection, in time of action, withdraw from or keep out of battle, or shall not do his utmost to take or destroy every vessel which it is his duty to encounter, or shall not do his utmost endeavor to afford relief to ships belonging to the United States, every such offender shall, on conviction thereof by a general court-martial, suffer death, or such other punishment as the said court shall adjudge.

Paper respecting captures to be transmitted to proper authority.

Art. 7. The commanding officer of every ship or vessel in the Navy, who shall capture or seize upon any vessel as a prize, shall carefully preserve all the papers and writing found on board, and transmit the whole of the originals, unmutilated, to the judge of the district to which such prize is ordered to proceed, and shall transmit to the Navy Department, and the agent appointed to pay the prize money, complete lists of the officers and men entitled to a share of the capture, inserting therein the quality of every person rating, on pain of forfeiting his whole share of the prize money resulting from such capture, and suffering such further punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.

Penalty for pilaging prize.

Art. 8. No person in the Navy shall take out of a prize, or vessel seized as a prize, any money, plate, goods, or any part of her rigging, unless it be for the better preservation thereof, or absolutely necessary for the use of any of

the vessels of the United States, before the same shall be adjudged lawful prize by a competent court; but the whole, without fraud, concealment, or embezzlement, shall be brought in, and judgment passed thereon, upon pain that every person offending herein shall forfeit his share of the capture, and suffer such further punishment as a court-martial, or the court of admiralty in which the prize is adjudged, shall impose.

Art. 9. No person in the Navy shall strip of their clothes, or pillage, or in any manner maltreat persons taken on board a prize, on pain of such punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.

Penalty for maltreating or pillaging prisoners.

Art. 10. No person in the Navy, shall give, hold, or entertain any intercourse or intelligence to or with any enemy or rebel, without leave from the President of the United States, the Secretary of the Navy, the commander-in-chief of the fleet, or the commander of the squadron; or, in case of a vessel acting singly, from his commanding officer, on pain of death, or such other punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.

Intercourse with enemy.

Art. 11. If any letter or message from an enemy or rebel be conveyed to any officer or private of the Navy, and he shall not within twelve hours make the same known, having opportunity so to do, to his superior or commanding officer; or if any officer commanding a ship or vessel, being acquainted therewith, shall not, with all convenient speed, reveal the same to the commander-in-chief of the fleet, commander of a squadron, or other proper officer, whose duty it may be to take cognizance thereof, every such offender shall suffer death, or such other punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.

Letter or message from enemy to be made known.

Art. 12. Spies, and all persons who shall come or be found in the capacity of spies, or who shall bring or deliver any seducing letter or message from an enemy or rebel, or endeavor to corrupt any person in the Navy to betray his trust, shall suffer death, or such other punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.

Spies shall suffer death.

Art. 13. If any person in the Navy shall make, or attempt to make, any mutinous assembly, he shall, on conviction thereof by a court-martial, suffer death; and if any person as aforesaid shall utter any seditious or mutinous words, or shall conceal or connive at any mutinous or seditious practices, or shall treat with contempt his superior, being in the execution of his office; or, being witness to any mutiny or sedition, shall not do his utmost to suppress it, he shall be punished at the discretion of a court-martial.

Mutiny and sedition.

Art. 14. No officer or private in the Navy shall disobey the lawful orders of his superior officer, or strike him, or draw, or offer to draw, or raise, any weapon against him while in the execution of the duties of his office, on pain of death, or such other punishment as a court-martial shall inflict.

Disobedience of orders, and assault of a superior officer.

Art. 15. No person in the Navy shall quarrel with any other person in the Navy, nor use provoking or reproachful words, gestures, or menaces, on pain of such punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.

Quarreling.

Art. 16. If any person in the Navy shall desert to an enemy or rebel, he shall suffer death.

Desertion.

Art. 17. If any person in the Navy shall desert, or shall entice others to desert, he shall suffer death, or such other punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge; and if any officer, or other person belonging to the Navy, shall receive or entertain any deserter from any other vessel of the Navy, knowing him to be such, and shall not, with all convenient speed, give notice of such deserter to the commander of the vessel to which he belongs, or to the commander-in-chief, or to the commander of the squadron, he shall, on conviction thereof, be cashiered, or be punished at the discretion of a court-martial. All offenses committed by persons belonging to the Navy while on shore, shall be punished in the same manner as if they had been committed at sea.

Offenses committed on shore.

Art. 18. If any person in the Navy shall knowingly make or sign, or shall aid, abet, direct, or procure, the making or signing, of any false muster, or shall execute, or attempt, or countenance, any fraud against the United States, he shall, on conviction, be cashiered, and rendered forever incapable of any future employment in the service of the United States, and shall forfeit all the pay and subsistence due him, and suffer such other punishment as a court-martial shall inflict.

Frauds against the United States.

Art. 19. If any officer, or other person, in the Navy, shall, through inattention, negligence, or any other fault, suffer any vessel of the Navy to be stranded, or run upon rocks or shoals, or hazarded, he shall suffer such punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.

Improper navigation of vessels.

Art. 20. If any person in the Navy shall sleep upon his watch, or negligently perform the duty assigned him, or leave his station before regularly relieved, he shall suffer death, or such punishment as a court-martial shall

Negligence in the performance of duty.

- adjudge; or, if the offender be a private, he may, at the discretion of the captain, be put in irons, or flogged not exceeding twelve lashes.
- Murder.** *Art. 21.* The crime of murder, when committed by any officer, seaman, or marine, belonging to any public ship, or vessel of the United States, without the territorial jurisdiction of the same, may be punished with death by the sentence of a court-martial.
- Duties in relation to convoy.** *Art. 22.* The officers and privates of every ship or vessel appointed as convoy to merchant or other vessels, shall diligently and faithfully discharge the duties of their appointment, nor shall they demand or exact any compensation for their services, nor maltreat any of the officers or crew of such merchant or other vessels, on pain of making such reparation as a court of admiralty may award, and of suffering such further punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.
- Penalty for receiving merchandise, &c., on board.** *Art. 23.* If any commander or other officer shall receive, or permit to be received, on board his vessel, any goods or merchandise, other than for the sole use of his vessel, except gold, silver, or jewels, and except the goods or merchandise of vessels which may be in distress, or shipwrecked, or in imminent danger of being shipwrecked, in order to preserve them for their owners, without orders from the President of the United States or the Navy Department, he shall, on conviction thereof, be cashiered, and be incapacitated forever afterwards for any place or office in the Navy.
- Waste, embezzlement, &c., of public property.** *Art. 24.* If any person in the Navy shall waste, embezzle, or fraudulently buy, sell, or receive, any ammunition, provisions, or other public stores; or if any officer or other person shall, knowingly, permit, through design, negligence, or inattention, any such waste, embezzlement, sale, or receipt, every such person shall forfeit all the pay and subsistence then due him, and suffer such further punishment as a court-martial shall direct.
- Burning or destroying public property.** *Art. 25.* If any person in the Navy shall unlawfully set fire to or burn any kind of public property, not then in the possession of an enemy, pirate, or rebel, he shall suffer death; and if any person shall, in any other manner, destroy such property, or shall not use his best exertions to prevent the destruction thereof by others, he shall be punished at the discretion of a court-martial.
- Theft.** *Art. 26.* Any theft, not exceeding twenty dollars, may be punished at the discretion of the captain; and above that sum, as a court-martial shall direct.
- Offenses against people on shore.** *Art. 27.* If any person in the Navy shall, when on shore, plunder, abuse, or maltreat, any inhabitant, or injure his property in any way, he shall suffer such punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.
- Detection and apprehension of offenders.** *Art. 28.* Every person in the Navy shall use his utmost exertions to detect, apprehend, and bring to punishment, all offenders, and shall, at all times, aid and assist all persons appointed for this purpose, on pain of such punishment as a court-martial shall adjudge.
- Muster-rolls.** *Art. 29.* Each commanding officer shall, whenever a seaman enters on board, cause an accurate entry to be made in the ship's books of his name, time, and term of service; and, before sailing, transmit to the Secretary of the Navy a complete list or muster roll of the officers and men under his command, with the date of their entering, time and terms of their service annexed; and shall cause similar lists to be made out on the first day of every second month, to be transmitted to the Secretary of the Navy, as opportunities shall occur; accounting in such lists, or muster-rolls, for any casualties which may have taken place since the last list or muster-roll. He shall cause to be accurately minuted on the ship's books the names of, and times at which any death or desertion may occur; and in case of death, shall take care that the purser secure all the property of the deceased for the benefit of his legal representative or representatives. He shall cause frequent inspections to be made into the condition of the provisions, and use every precaution for its preservation. He shall, whenever he orders officers and men to take charge of a prize, and proceed to the United States, and whenever officers or men are sent from his ship for whatever cause, take care that each man be furnished with a complete statement of his account, specifying the date of his enlistment, and the periods and terms of his service; which account shall be signed by the commanding officer and purser. He shall cause the rules for the government of the Navy to be hung up in some public part of the ship, and read once a month to his ships company. He shall cause a convenient place to be set apart for sick or disabled men, to which he shall have them removed, with their hammocks and bedding, when the surgeon shall so advise, and shall direct that some of the crew attend them and keep the place clean; and, if necessary, shall direct that cradles, and

buckets with covers, be made for their use; and when his crew is finally paid off, he shall attend in person, or appoint a proper officer, to see that justice be done to the men, and to the United States, in the settlement of the accounts. Any commanding officer offending herein, shall be punished at the discretion of a court-martial.

Paying off crew.

Art. 30. No commanding officer shall, of his own authority, discharge a commissioned or warrant officer, nor strike nor punish him otherwise than by suspension or confinement, nor shall he, of his own authority, inflict a punishment on any private beyond twelve lashes, with a cat-of-nine-tails, nor shall he suffer any wired, or other than a plain cat-of-nine-tails, to be used on board his ship; nor shall any officer who may command by accident, or in the absence of the commanding officer, (except such commander be absent for a time by leave,) order or inflict any other punishment than confinement, for which he shall account on the return of such absent commanding officer. Nor shall any commanding officer receive on board any petty officers or men, turned over from any other vessel to him, unless each of such officers or men produce to him an account, signed by the captain and purser of the vessel from which they came, specifying the date of such officer's or man's entry, the period and terms of service, the sums paid, and the balance due him, and the quality in which he was rated on board such ship. Nor shall any commanding officer, having received any petty officer or man as aforesaid, rate him in a lower or worse station than that in which he formerly served. Any commanding officer offending herein shall be punished at the discretion of a court-martial.

Treatment of inferior officers and men.

Art. 31. Any master-at-arms, or other person of whom the duty of master-at-arms is required, who shall refuse to receive such prisoners as shall be committed to his charge, or, having received them, shall suffer them to escape, or dismiss them without orders from proper authority, shall suffer in such prisoners' stead, or be punished otherwise at the discretion of a court-martial.

Master-at-arms.

Art. 32. All crimes committed by persons belonging to the Navy, which are not specified in the foregoing articles, shall be punished according to the laws and customs in such cases at sea.

Crimes not specified.

Art. 33. All officers not holding commissions or warrants, or who are not entitled to them, except such as are temporarily appointed to the duties of a commissioned or warrant officer, are deemed petty officers.

Who are petty officers.

Art. 34. Any person entitled to wages or prize money may have the same paid to his assignee, provided the assignment be attested by the captain and purser; and in case of the assignment of wages, the power shall specify the precise time they commence. But the commander of every vessel is required to discourage his crews from selling any part of their wages or prize money, and never to attest any power of attorney, until he is satisfied that the same is not granted in consideration of money given for the purchase of wages or prize money.

Assignment of wages and prize money.

NAVAL GENERAL COURTS-MARTIAL.

Art. 35. General courts-martial may be convened as often as the President of the United States, the Secretary of the Navy, or commander-in-chief of the fleet, or commander of a squadron, while acting out of the United States, shall deem it necessary: *Provided*, That no general court-martial shall consist of more than thirteen, nor less than five members, and as many officers shall be summoned on every such court as can be convened without injury to the service, so as not to exceed thirteen, and the senior officer shall always preside, the others ranking agreeably to the date of their commission; and in no case where it can be avoided without injury to the service, shall more than one half the members, exclusive of the president, be junior to the officer to be tried.

Appointment of naval general courts-martial.

Art. 36. Each member of the court, before proceeding to trial, shall take the following oath or affirmation, which the judge advocate, or person officiating as such, is hereby authorized to administer:

Oath of members of court.

"I, A B, do swear [or affirm] that I will truly try, without prejudice or partiality, the case now depending, according to the evidence which shall come before the court, the rules for the government of the Navy, and my own conscience; and that I will not by any means divulge or disclose the sentence of the court, until it shall have been approved by the proper authority, nor will I at any time divulge or disclose the vote or opinion of any particular member of the court, unless required so to do before a court of justice in due course of law."

This oath or affirmation being duly administered, the president is authorized

and required to administer the following oath or affirmation to the judge advocate, or person officiating as such:

Oath of judge advocate.

"I, A B, do swear [or affirm] that I will keep a true record of the evidence given to and the proceedings of this court; nor will I divulge or by any means disclose the sentence of the court until it shall have been approved by the proper authority; nor will I, at any time, divulge or disclose the vote or opinion of any particular member of the court, unless required so to do before a court of justice in due course of law.

All testimony to be on oath, &c.

Punishment for refusing to testify, prevarication, or contempt. Perjury.

Art. 37. All testimony given to a general court-martial shall be on oath or affirmation, which the president of the court is hereby authorized to administer; and if any person shall refuse to give his evidence as aforesaid, or shall prevaricate, or shall behave with contempt to the court, it shall and may be lawful for the court to imprison such offender at their discretion: *Provided*, That the imprisonment in no case shall exceed two months. And every person who shall commit willful perjury on examination on oath or affirmation before such court, or who shall corruptly procure, or suborn, any person to commit such willful perjury, shall and may be prosecuted by indictment or information in any court of justice of the United States, and shall suffer such penalties as are authorized by the laws of the United States in cases of perjury, or the subornation thereof. And in every prosecution for perjury, or the subornation thereof, under this act, it shall be sufficient to set forth the offense charged on the defendant, without setting forth the authority by which the court was held, or the particular matters brought or intended to be brought, before the said court.

Exhibition of charges.

Accused to be furnished with a copy.

Treatment of an officer arrested.

Continuance of general courts-martial.

Art. 38. All charges on which an application for a general court-martial is founded shall be exhibited in writing to the proper officer, and the person demanding the court shall take care that the person accused be furnished with a true copy of the charges, with the specifications, at the time he is put under arrest; nor shall any other charges, than those so exhibited, be urged against the person to be tried before the court, unless it appear to the court that intelligence of such charge had not reached the person demanding the court, when when the person so to be tried was put under arrest, or that some witness material to the support of such charge, who was at that time absent, can be produced; in which case reasonable time shall be given to the person to be tried to make his defense against such new charge. Every officer so arrested is to deliver up his sword to his commanding officer, and to confine himself to the limits assigned him, under pain of dismission from service.

Pay and emoluments may be suspended.

How sentences are to be given and confirmed.

Not more than one hundred lashes to be inflicted, except.

Pardon and mitigation of offenses.

Courts of inquiry.

Art. 39. When the proceedings of any general court-martial shall have commenced, they shall not be suspended or delayed on account of the absence of any of the members, provided five or more be assembled; but the court is enjoined to sit from day to day, Sundays excepted, until sentence be given. And no member of said court shall, after the proceedings are begun, absent himself therefrom, unless in case of sickness, or orders to go on duty from a superior officer, on pain of being cashiered.

Art. 40. Whenever a court-martial shall sentence an officer to be suspended, the court shall have the power to suspend his pay and emoluments for the whole, or any part of the time of his suspension.

Art. 41. All sentences of courts-martial which shall extend to the loss of life, shall require the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present; and no such sentence shall be carried into execution until confirmed by the President of the United States; or if the trial take place out of the United States, until it be confirmed by the commander of the fleet or squadron. All other sentences may be determined by a majority of votes, and carried into execution on confirmation of the commander of the fleet, or officer ordering the court, except such as go to the dismission of a commissioned or warrant officer, which are first to be approved by the President of the United States.

A court-martial shall not, for any one offense not capital, inflict a punishment beyond one hundred lashes.

Art. 42. The President of the United States, or, when the trial takes place out of the United States, the commander of the fleet or squadron shall possess full power to pardon any offense committed against these articles, after conviction, or to mitigate the punishment decreed by a court-martial.

Sec. 2. Art. 1. And be it further enacted, That the courts of inquiry may be ordered by the President of the United States, the Secretary of the Navy, or the commander of a fleet or squadron, provided such court shall not consist of more than three members, who shall be commissioned officers, and a judge advocate, or person to do duty as such; and such courts shall have power to summon witnesses, administer oaths, and punish contempt, in the same manner as

courts-martial. But such court shall merely state facts, and not give their opinion, unless expressly required so to do in the order for convening; and the party whose conduct shall be the subject of inquiry, shall have permission to cross-examine all the witnesses.

Art. 2. The proceedings of courts of inquiry shall be authenticated by the signature of the president of the court and judge advocate, and shall, in all cases not capital, or extending to the dismissal of a commissioned or warrant officer, be evidence before a court-martial, provided oral testimony cannot be obtained.

Proceedings to be authenticated.

Art. 3. The judge advocate, or person officiating as such, shall administer to the members the following oath or affirmation:

Oaths.

“You do swear [or affirm] well and truly to examine and inquire, according to the evidence, into the matter now before you, without partiality or prejudice.”

After which the president shall administer to the judge advocate, or person officiating as such, the following oath or affirmation:

“You do swear, [or affirm,] truly to record the proceedings of this court, and the evidence to be given in the case in hearing.”

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That in all cases where the crews of the ships or vessels of the United States shall be separated from their vessels, by the latter being wrecked, lost, or destroyed, all the command, power, and authority given to the officers of such ships or vessels shall remain and be in full force as effectually as if such ship or vessel were not so wrecked, lost, or destroyed, until such ship's company be regularly discharged from, or ordered again into, the service, or until a court-martial shall be held to inquire into the loss of such ship or vessel; and if, by the sentence of such court, or other satisfactory evidence, it shall appear that all or any of the officers and men of such ship's company did their utmost to preserve her, and after the loss thereof behaved themselves agreeably to the discipline of the Navy, then the pay and emoluments of such officers and men, or such of them as shall have done their duty as aforesaid, shall go on until their discharge or death; and every officer or private who shall, after the loss of such vessel, act contrary to the discipline of the Navy, shall be punished, at the discretion of a court-martial, in the same manner as if such vessel had not been so lost.

In cases of shipwreck.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That all the pay and emoluments of such officers and men, of any of the ships or vessels of the United States taken by an enemy, who shall appear by the sentence of a court-martial, or otherwise, to have done their utmost to preserve and defend their ship or vessel, and after taking thereof, have behaved themselves obediently to their superiors, agreeably to the discipline of the Navy, shall go on, and be paid them until their death, exchange, or discharge.

In case of capture by the enemy, pay to continue, &c.

Sec. 5. And be it further enacted, That the proceeds of all ships and vessels, and the goods taken on board of them, which shall be adjudged good prize, shall, when of equal or superior force to the vessel or vessels making the capture, be the sole property of the captors; and when of inferior force, shall be divided equally between the United States and the officers and men making the capture.

To whom the proceeds of prizes shall accrue.

Sec. 6. And be it further enacted, That the prize money belonging to the officers and men shall be distributed in the following manner:

Distribution of prize money.

1. To the commanding officers of fleets, squadrons, or single ships, three twentieths, of which the commanding officer of the fleet or squadron shall have one twentieth, if the prize be taken by a ship or vessel acting under his command, and the commander of single ships two twentieths; but where the prize is taken by a ship acting independently of such superior officer, the three twentieths shall belong to her commander.

2. To sea lieutenants, captains of marines, and sailing-masters, two twentieths; but where there is a captain without a lieutenant of marines, these officers shall be entitled to two twentieths and one third of a twentieth, which third, in such case, shall be deducted from the share of the officers mentioned in article No. 3 of this section.

3. To chaplains, lieutenants of marines, surgeons, pursers, boatswains, gunners, carpenters, and masters' mates, two twentieths.

4. To midshipmen, surgeons' mates, captains' clerks, schoolmasters, boatswains' mates, gunners' mates, carpenters' mates, ships' stewards, sailmakers, masters-at-arms, armorers, cockswains, and coopers, three twentieths and a half.

5. To gunner's yeomen, boatswain's yeomen, quartermasters, quarter gun-

ners, sailmakers' mates, sergeants and corporals of marines, drummers, fifiers, and extra petty officers, two twentieths and a half.

6. To seamen, ordinary seamen, marines, and all other persons doing duty on board, seven twentieths.

Vessels in sight to share.

7. Whenever one or more public ships or vessels are in sight at the time any one or more ships are taking a prize or prizes, they shall all share equally in the prize or prizes, according to the number of men and guns on board each ship in sight. No commander of a fleet or squadron shall be entitled to receive any share of prizes taken by vessels not under his immediate command; nor of such prizes as may have been taken by ships or vessels intended to be placed under his command, before they have acted under his immediate orders; nor shall a commander of a fleet or squadron, leaving the station where he had the command, have any share in the prizes taken by ships left on such station after he has gone out of the limits of his said command.

When commanders of squadrons are not entitled.

Bounty given for each man on board an enemy's ship.

SEC. 7. *And be it further enacted*, That a bounty shall be paid by the United States, of twenty dollars, for each person on board any ship of an enemy at the commencement of an engagement, which shall be sunk or destroyed by any ship or vessel belonging to the United States of equal or inferior force, the same to be divided among the officers and crew, in the same manner as prize money.

Pensions to persons disabled in the service.

SEC. 8. *And be it further enacted*, That every officer, seaman, or marine, disabled in the line of his duty, shall be entitled to receive for life, or during his disability, a pension from the United States, according to the nature and degree of his disability, not exceeding one half his monthly pay.

Money accruing to the United States to remain as fund for payment of pensions.

SEC. 9. *And be it further enacted*, That all money accruing, or which has already accrued to the United States, from sale of prizes, shall be and remain forever a fund for the payment of pensions and half pay, should the same be hereafter granted, to the officers and seamen who may be entitled to receive the same; and if the said fund shall be insufficient for the purpose, the public faith is hereby pledged to make up the deficiency; but if it should be more than sufficient, the surplus shall be applied to the making of further provision for the comfort of the disabled officers, seamen, marines, and for such as, though not disabled, may merit by their bravery, or long and faithful services, the gratitude of their country.

Secretaries of the Navy, Treasury, and War to receive and invest any sums to which the U. S. may be entitled, &c.

SEC. 10. *And be it further enacted*, That the said fund shall be under the management and direction of the Secretary of the Navy, the Secretary of the Treasury, and the Secretary of War, for the time being, who are hereby authorized to receive any sums to which the United States may be entitled from the sale of prizes, and employ and invest the same, and the interest arising therefrom, in any manner which a majority of them may deem most advantageous. And it shall be the duty of the said commissioners to lay before Congress annually, in the first week of their session, a minute statement of their proceedings relative to the management of said fund.

Repeal of act of 2d March, 1779.

SEC. 11. *And be it further enacted*, That the act passed the second day of March, in the year of one thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, entitled "An act for the government of the Navy of the United States," from and after the first day of June next, shall be, and is hereby repealed.

APPROVED April 23, 1800.

Extract from the proviso in the act making appropriations for the naval service, September 28, 1850.

Flogging abolished.

"*Provided*, That flogging in the Navy and on board vessels of commerce be, and the same is hereby, abolished from and after the passage of this act."

FLEET SURGEON.

From act of May 24, 1828.

Duties of fleet surgeon.

The President of the United States may designate and appoint, to every fleet or squadron, an experienced and intelligent surgeon, then in the naval service of the United States, to be denominated "surgeon of the fleet," who shall be surgeon of the flag ship, and who, in addition to his duties as such, shall ex-

amine and approve all requisitions for medical and hospital stores for the fleet, and inspect their quality; and who shall, in difficult cases, consult with the surgeons of the several ships, and make records of the character and treatment of diseases, to be transmitted to the Navy Department; and who, in addition to the compensation allowed to surgeons at sea, shall be allowed double rations while acting as the surgeon of the fleet as aforesaid.

AN ACT TO REGULATE THE PAY OF THE NAVY OF THE UNITED STATES.

SEC. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,* That from and after the passage of this act the annual pay of the officers of the navy of the United States shall be as follows: Pay of the Navy.

THE SENIOR CAPTAIN.

At all times, when in service, four thousand five hundred dollars. Senior captain.
When on leave of absence, or waiting orders, three thousand five hundred dollars.

ALL OTHER CAPTAINS.

When in command of squadrons or foreign stations, four thousand dollars. Other captains.
When on other duty, three thousand five hundred dollars.
When off duty, two thousand five hundred dollars.

COMMANDERS, OR MASTERS COMMANDANT.

When attached to vessels for sea service, two thousand five hundred dollars. Commanders.
When attached to navy-yards, or on other duty, two thousand one hundred dollars.
When on leave of absence, or waiting orders, one thousand eight hundred dollars.

LIEUTENANTS.

Commanding, one thousand eight hundred dollars. Lieutenants.
On other duty, one thousand five hundred dollars.
Waiting orders, one thousand two hundred dollars.

ASSISTANT SURGEONS.

Waiting orders, six hundred and fifty dollars. Assistant surgeons.
At sea, nine hundred and fifty dollars.
After passing and found qualified for promotion to surgeon, eight hundred and fifty dollars.
At sea, one thousand two hundred dollars.
When stationed at navy-yards, hospitals, rendezvous, and receiving ships, nine hundred and fifty dollars.
After being passed and stationed as above, one thousand one hundred and fifty dollars.

SURGEONS.

For the first five years after the date of his commission, one thousand dollars. Surgeons.
For the second five years, one thousand two hundred dollars.
For the third five years, one thousand four hundred dollars.
For the fourth five years, one thousand six hundred dollars.
After he shall have been commissioned as a surgeon twenty years and upwards, one thousand eight hundred dollars.

All surgeons of the Navy under orders for duty, at navy-yards, receiving vessels, rendezvous, or naval hospitals, shall have an increase of one fourth of the foregoing amount of their respective annual pay, from the date of their acceptance of such orders.

All surgeons of the Navy ordered to any of the ships or vessels of the United States commissioned for sea service, shall have an increase of one third of the foregoing amount of their respective annual pay, from the date of their acceptance of such orders.

All surgeons of the Navy, ordered as fleet surgeons, shall have an increase of one half of their respective annual pay from the date of their acceptance of such orders.

CHAPLAINS.

Chaplains. (a) When attached to vessels for sea service, or at navy-yards, one thousand two hundred dollars.
When on leave of absence, or waiting orders, eight hundred dollars.

PROFESSORS OF MATHEMATICS.

Professors of Mathematics. (b) When attached to vessels for sea service, or in a yard, one thousand two hundred dollars.

SECRETARIES.

Secretaries. To commanders of squadrons, when commanding in chief, one thousand dollars.
To commanders of squadrons, when not commanding in chief, nine hundred dollars.

SAILING MASTERS.

Sailing masters. Of a ship of the line, for sea service, one thousand one hundred dollars.
When on other duty, one thousand dollars.
When on leave of absence, or waiting orders, seven hundred and fifty dollars.

SECOND MASTERS.

Second masters. When attached to vessels for sea service, seven hundred and fifty dollars.
When on other duty, five hundred dollars.
When on leave of absence, or waiting orders, four hundred dollars.

PASSED MIDSHIPMEN.

Passed midshipmen. On duty, seven hundred and fifty dollars.
Waiting orders, six hundred dollars.

WARRANTED MASTERS' MATES.

Warranted masters' mates. When attached to vessels for sea service, or at navy-yards, four hundred and fifty dollars.
When on leave of absence, or waiting orders, three hundred dollars.

MIDSHIPMEN.

Midshipmen. When attached to vessels for sea service, four hundred dollars.
When on other duty, three hundred and fifty dollars.
When on leave of absence, or waiting orders, three hundred dollars.

(a) Increased by act of August 31, 1852, to \$1,500 on duty and \$1,000 on leave.

(b) Increased by act of August 3, 1848, to \$1,500 on duty and \$800 on leave.

CLERKS.

- (c) Of a yard, nine hundred dollars.
 (d) First clerk to a commandant of a navy-yard, nine hundred dollars.
 (e) Second clerk to a commandant of a navy-yard, seven hundred and fifty dollars.

Clerks.

To commanders of squadrons, captains of fleets, and commanders of vessels, five hundred dollars.

BOATSWAINS, GUNNERS, SAILMAKERS, CARPENTERS.

- (c) Of a ship-of-the-line, for sea service, seven hundred and fifty dollars.
 (e) Of a frigate, for sea service, six hundred dollars.
 (e) When on other duty, five hundred dollars.
 (e) When on leave of absence, or waiting orders, three hundred and sixty dollars.

Warrant officers.

(f) Officers temporarily performing the duties belonging to those of a higher grade shall receive the compensation allowed to such higher grade while actually so employed.

[(g) No officer shall be put on furlough but at his own request:] and all officers so furloughed shall receive one half only of the pay to which they would have been entitled if on leave of absence.

If any assistant surgeon shall have been absent from the United States on duty at the time others of his date were examined, he shall, if not rejected at a subsequent examination, be entitled to the same rank with them; and if from any cause his relative rank cannot be assigned to him, he will retain his original position on the register.

One ration per day only shall be allowed to all officers when attached to vessels for sea service.

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted*, That no allowance shall hereafter be made to any officer in the naval service of the United States for drawing bills, for receiving or disbursing money, or transacting any business for the government of the United States; nor shall he be allowed servants, or pay for servants, or clothing, or rations for them, or pay for the same, nor shall any allowance be made to him for rent of quarters, or to pay rent for furniture, or for lights or fuel, or transporting baggage. It is hereby expressly declared that the yearly allowance provided in this act is all the pay, compensation, and allowance, that shall be received, under any circumstances whatever, by any such officer or person, except for traveling expenses when under orders, for which ten cents per mile shall be allowed.

APPROVED March 3, 1835.

EXTRA COMPENSATION—ALLOWANCE FOR NEWSPAPERS, ETC.

From the Act of March 3, 1839.

No officer in any branch of the public service, or any other person whose salary or whose pay or emoluments is or are fixed by law and regulations, shall receive any extra allowance or compensation, in any form whatever, for the disbursement of public money, or the performance of any other service, unless the said extra allowance or compensation be authorized by law. Nor shall any executive officer, other than the heads of departments, apply more than thirty dollars annually, out of the contingent fund under his control, to pay for newspapers, pamphlets, periodicals, or other books or prints not necessary for the business of his office.

NUMBER OF OFFICERS.

From Act of August 4, 1842.

Number of officers in the Navy limited. Till otherwise ordered by Congress, the officers of the Navy shall not be increased beyond the number in the respective grades that were in the service on the 1st day of January, 1842; nor shall there be any further appointment of midshipmen until the number in the service be reduced to the number that were in the service on the 1st day of January, 1841, beyond which they shall not be increased until the further order of Congress.

EXTRA COMPENSATION, ETC.

From the Act of August 23, 1842.

Extra compensation for disbursements. No officer in any branch of the public service, or any other person whose salary, pay, or emolument is, or are, fixed by laws or regulations, shall receive any additional pay, extra allowance, or compensation, in any form whatever, for the disbursement of public money, or any other service or duty whatsoever, unless the same shall be authorized by law, and the appropriation therefore explicitly set forth that it is for such additional pay, extra allowance, or compensation.

AN ACT TO REGULATE THE PAY OF PURSERS AND OTHER OFFICERS OF THE NAVY.

Purchases to be made with public moneys under rules prescribed by the Executive. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,* That all purchases of clothing, groceries, stores, and supplies of every description for the use of the Navy, as well for vessels in commission as for yards and stations, shall be made with and out of the public moneys appropriated for the support of the Navy, under such directions and regulations as may be made by the Executive for that purpose; and it shall not be lawful for pursers, or other officers or persons holding commission or employment in the naval service, to procure stores or any other articles or supplies for, and dispose thereof to the officers or to the crew during the period of their enlistment, on or for their own account or benefit; nor shall any profit or per centage upon stores or supplies be charged to, or received from, persons in the naval service, other than those which are hereinafter prescribed.

Executive to prescribe regulations for the purchase of stores. SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted,* That it shall be the duty of the Executive to provide such rules and regulations for the purchase, preservation, and disposition of all articles, stores, and supplies for persons in the Navy, as may be necessary for the safe and economical administration of that branch of the public service.

Pay of pursers. SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted,* That in lieu of the pay, rations, allowance, and other emoluments authorized by the existing laws and regulations, the annual pay of pursers shall be as follows, viz: when attached to vessels in commission for sea service they shall receive—

For ships-of-the-line.....	\$3,500
For frigates or razees.....	3,000
For sloops-of-war and steamers of first class.....	2,000
For brigs, and schooners, and steamers, less than first class.....	1,500
On duty at navy-yards at Boston, New York, Norfolk, and Pensacola.	2,500
At Portsmouth, Philadelphia, and Washington*.....	2,000
At naval stations within the United States.....	1,500
And in receiving ships at Boston, New York, and Norfolk.....	2,500
And at other places.....	1,500
On leave, or waiting orders, the same pay as surgeons.	

* Modified by act approved March 3, 1855.

And it is hereby expressly declared, that the yearly pay provided in this act is all the pay, compensation, and allowance that shall be received, under any circumstances, by pursers, except one ration each per day when attached to vessels for sea service, and except also for traveling expenses when under orders, for which ten cents per mile shall be allowed.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That nothing in this act contained shall be construed to effect the bonds which have heretofore been given by pursers in the Navy, but the same shall remain in full force and effect as if this law had not been passed; and the Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized and required to demand and receive from them, or any of them, new bonds, with sufficient sureties, in all cases in which he may consider the same necessary and expedient; and, in case any purser shall neglect or refuse to give such new bond, it shall be the duty of the Executive to dismiss him forthwith from the service.

Bonds.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That the rules and regulations which shall be made in conformity with the provisions of this act, shall be laid before Congress at their next session.

Rules to be laid before Congress.

SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted*, That it shall not be lawful for a purser in the Navy to advance or loan any sum or sums or money, public or private, or any article or commodity whatever, or any credit, to any officer in the naval service, under any pretense whatever.

Advances or loans.

SEC. 7. *And be it further enacted*, That the provisions of this act shall go into effect, within the United States, from the date of its passage; and in vessels abroad, at the beginning of the quarter after its official receipt.

Act to go into effect, when.

SEC. 8. *And be it further enacted*, That pursers attached to, and doing duty in navy-yards at Boston, New York, and Norfolk, and sea-going vessels of a larger class than sloops of war, shall be authorized to appoint a clerk, or assistant, to be approved by the commanding officer of such yard or vessel; and the yearly compensation of said clerk shall be as follows, viz: in a frigate, or navy-yard at Boston, New York, and Norfolk..... \$500
In a ship-of-the-line..... 700
Said assistant or clerk shall have the privileges which are allowed to the clerk of the commanding officer; and each purser and clerk, while attached to vessels in commission, shall receive one ration per day.

Pursers at certain stations allowed clerks or assistants; their compensation.

SEC. 9. *And be it further enacted*, That all stores of pursers on board ships in commission shall be taken by the government at a fair valuation, under the direction of the Secretary of the Navy.

Pursers' stores on board ships to be taken at a valuation.

SEC. 10. *And be it further enacted*, That all acts or parts of acts which may be contrary to, or inconsistent with, the provisions of this act, shall be, and are hereby, repealed.

Repealing clause.

(a) SEC. 11. *And be it further enacted*, That, from and after the passage of this act, the annual pay of the forward warrant officers of the Navy of the United States shall be as follows: for boatswains, gunners, carpenters, and sailmakers, when on duty on board ships of the line, and in the three navy-yards at Boston, New York, and Norfolk, eight hundred dollars; on other duty, seven hundred dollars; when on leave of absence or awaiting orders, the said officers shall receive five hundred dollars for the first ten years, and after, six hundred dollars.

Pay of warrant officers.

(b) SEC. 12. *And be it further enacted*, That whenever an officer shall perform the duty of a higher grade by order of the Secretary of the Navy, or the commander of a fleet or squadron, or ship acting singly on foreign service, such officer shall be entitled to receive the pay of such higher grade during the time he performs the duty in that grade, and no longer; and no allowance shall be made for performing such service hereafter, unless so ordered.

Officers performing duty of a higher grade.

APPROVED August 26, 1842.

AN ACT TO ESTABLISH AND REGULATE THE NAVY RATION.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Navy ration shall consist of the following daily allowance of provisions for each person :

(a) Modified by acts of August 3, 1848, and of August 5, 1854.

(b) Repealed June 7, 1844.

Navy ration. One pound of salted pork, with half a pint of peas or beans; or one pound of salted beef, with half a pound of flour, and a quarter of a pound of raisins, dried-apples, or other dried fruits; or one pound of salt beef, with half a pound of rice, two ounces of butter, and two ounces of cheese, together with fourteen ounces of biscuit, one quarter of an ounce of tea, or one ounce of coffee, or one ounce of cocoa; two ounces of sugar, and one gill of spirits; and of a weekly allowance of half a pound of pickles or cranberries, half a pint of molasses, and half a pint of vinegar.

Fresh meat to be substituted for beef or pork, &c. SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted*, That fresh meat may be substituted for salt beef or pork, and vegetables or sour-kroust for the other articles usually issued with the salted meats, allowing one and a quarter pound of fresh meat for one pound of salted beef or pork, and regulating the quantity of vegetables or sour-kroust so as to equal the value of those articles for which they may be substituted.

The allowance may be varied by substituting bread, &c., for biscuit, &c. SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted*, That, should it be necessary to vary the above-described daily allowance, it shall be lawful to substitute one pound of soft bread, or one pound of flour, or half a pound of rice, for fourteen ounces of biscuit; half a pint of wine for a gill of spirits; half a pound of rice for half a pint of beans or peas; half a pint of beans or peas for half a pound of rice.

When it may be deemed expedient by the President of the United States, Secretary of the Navy, commander of a fleet or squadron, or of a single ship when not acting under the authority of another officer on foreign service, the articles of butter, cheese, raisins, dried apples, or other dried fruits, pickles, and molasses may be substituted for each other and for spirits: *Provided*, The articles substituted shall not exceed in value the article for which it may be issued, according to the scale of prices which is or may be established for the same.

Daily allowance may be diminished or varied. SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That, in case of necessity, the daily allowance of provisions may be diminished or varied, by the discretion of the senior officer present in command, but payment shall be made to the persons whose allowance shall be thus diminished, according to the scale of prices which is or may be established for the same; but a commander who shall thus make a diminution or variation shall report to his commanding officer, or to the Navy Department, the necessity for the same, and give to the purser written orders specifying particularly the diminution or reduction which is to be made.

No commissioned officer, midshipman, or person under twenty-one to draw spirit ration. SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That no commissioned officer or midshipman, or any person under twenty-one years of age, shall be allowed to draw the spirit part of the daily ration; and all other persons shall be permitted to relinquish that part of their ration, under such restrictions as the President of the United States may authorize; and to every person who by this section is prohibited from drawing, or who may relinquish the spirit part of his ration, there shall be paid, in lieu thereof, the value of the same in money, according to the prices which are or may be established for the same.

When the act shall go into effect; repealing clause. SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted*, That the provisions of this act shall go into effect in the United States on the first day of the succeeding quarter after it becomes a law, and in vessels abroad on the first day of the succeeding quarter after its official receipt; that any acts and parts of acts which may be contrary to, or inconsistent with, the provisions of this act, shall be, and are hereby, repealed.

APPROVED August 29, 1842.

AN ACT TO REORGANIZE THE NAVY DEPARTMENT OF THE UNITED STATES.

Act of February 7, 1815, repealed. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled*, That the act approved February seventh eighteen hundred and fifteen, entitled "An act to alter and amend the several acts for establishing the Navy Department, by adding thereto a board of commissioners," be, and the same is hereby, repealed.

Bureaus attached to Navy Department. SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted*, That there shall be attached to the Navy Department the following bureaus, to wit:

1. A Bureau of Navy-Yards and Docks.

2. A Bureau of Construction, Equipment, and Repair.
3. A Bureau of Provisions and Clothing.
4. A Bureau of Ordnance and Hydrography.
5. A Bureau of Medicine and Surgery.

Sec. 3. *And be it further enacted*, That the President of the United States, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, shall appoint, from the captains in the naval service, a chief for each of the Bureaus of Navy-Yards and Docks, and of Ordnance and Hydrography, who shall each receive a salary of three thousand five hundred dollars per annum, in lieu of all other compensation whatever of the naval service; and shall in like manner appoint a chief of the Bureau of Construction, Equipment and Repair, who shall be a skillful naval constructor, and shall also appoint a chief of the Bureau of Provisions and Clothing, who shall each receive for his services three thousand dollars per annum;* and shall in like manner appoint, from the surgeons in the Navy, a chief of the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery, who shall receive for his services two thousand five hundred dollars per annum.*

Bureaus, how constituted.

Sec. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That the Secretary of the Navy shall appoint the following clerks, to wit:

Clerks in the office of the Secretary of the Navy.

For the office of the Secretary of the Navy, a chief clerk, who shall receive for his services two thousand dollars per annum; one registering clerk, who shall receive for his services one thousand four hundred dollars per annum; three recording clerks, who shall receive for their services each one thousand dollars per annum; one principal corresponding clerk, who shall receive for his services one thousand five hundred dollars per annum; and two assistant corresponding clerks, who shall receive for their services each twelve hundred dollars per annum; one warrant clerk, who shall receive for his services twelve hundred dollars per annum, and one miscellaneous clerk, who shall receive for his services eight hundred dollars per annum.

For the Bureau of Navy-Yards and Docks, one civil engineer, who shall receive for his services two thousand dollars per annum; one draughtsman, who shall receive for his services one thousand dollars per annum; one chief clerk, who shall receive for his services one thousand four hundred dollars per annum, and two assistant clerks, one of whom shall receive for his services one thousand dollars per annum, and the other shall receive for his services eight hundred dollars per annum.

Same in Bureau of Yards and Docks.

For the Bureau of Construction, Equipment and Repair, one assistant constructor and draughtsman, who shall receive for his services the sum of one thousand six hundred dollars per annum, and four clerks, one of whom shall receive for his services fourteen hundred dollars per annum, and the others shall receive for their services one thousand dollars per annum each.

Same in Bureau of Construction Equipment, and Repair.

For the Bureau of Provisions and Clothing, one chief clerk, who shall receive for his services one thousand four hundred dollars per annum, and two clerks, one of whom shall receive for his services one thousand two hundred dollars per annum, and the other shall receive for his services eight hundred dollars per annum.

Same in Bureau of Provisions and Clothing.

For the Bureau of Ordnance and Hydrography, one draughtsman, who shall receive for his services one thousand dollars per annum, and three clerks, one of whom shall receive for his services twelve hundred dollars per annum, and the others shall receive for their services one thousand dollars per annum each.

Same in Bureau of Ordnance and Hydrography.

For the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery, two clerks, one of whom shall receive for his services twelve hundred dollars per annum, and the other shall receive for his services eight hundred dollars per annum, and one assistant surgeon, who shall receive for his services not less than the highest pay of his grade in the service.

Same in Bureau of Medicine and Surgery.

Sec. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That the Secretary of the Navy shall assign and distribute among the said bureaus such of the duties of the Navy Department as he shall judge to be expedient and proper; and all the duties of the said bureaus shall be performed under the authority of the Secretary of the Navy, and their orders shall be considered as emanating from him, and shall have full force and effect as such.

Duties to be distributed among the Bureaus.

Sec. 6. *And be it further enacted*, That there shall be allowed to each bureau a messenger, who shall receive for his services a compensation not exceeding seven hundred dollars per annum.†

A messenger to be allowed each Bureau.

* Increased to \$3,500 by subsequent enactments.

† Sections 4 and 6 have been modified by subsequent enactments.

Franking privilege. SEC. 7. *And be it further enacted*, That the chief of each bureau hereby established shall be authorized to frank all communications from his bureau; and all communications to his bureau, on the business thereof, shall be free of postage.

Books, &c., of Navy commissioners to be distributed among the bureaus. SEC. 8. *And be it further enacted*, That the books, records, and papers now belonging to the office of the Navy commissioners shall be distributed among the bureaus according to the nature of their duties, respectively; and the Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to provide for each bureau such books of record and accounts and such stationery as may be found necessary; for which purpose the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars is hereby appropriated, payable out of any moneys in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated.

Unexpended balances of appropriation. SEC. 9. *And be it further enacted*, That the unexpended balance of the appropriation for clerks in the office of the Secretary of the Navy, and the unexpended balance of the appropriation for the commissioners of the Navy, their secretary and clerks, together with such additional sums as may be necessary to carry this law into effect, be and the same are hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated.

Officers of the Navy to be appointed as clerks. SEC. 10. *And be it further enacted*, That the Secretary of the Navy shall, if the same can be done without detriment to the public service, appoint, with their consent, officers of the Navy, not above the grade of lieutenants, to perform the duties of any clerkship created by this act, (except as herein otherwise provided,) who shall receive each for their services not more than nine hundred dollars per annum, including their regular pay and rations; but the appointment of any officer in the Navy to any of the offices or clerkships in this act shall in no manner whatever interfere with his grade in the service.

Repealing clause. SEC. 11. *And be it further enacted*, That all acts or parts of acts authorizing the President of the United States, or Secretary of the proper department, under his direction, to transfer any portion of the moneys appropriated for a particular branch of expenditure in that department, to be applied to another branch of expenditure in the same department, be and are hereby, so far as relates to the Department of the Navy, repealed.

APPROVED August 31, 1242.

AN ACT TO REGULATE THE APPOINTMENT AND PAY OF ENGINEERS IN THE NAVY OF THE UNITED STATES.

Engineers to be appointed. **Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled*, That the Secretary of the Navy shall appoint the requisite number of chief engineers and assistant engineers, not to exceed one chief engineer, two first assistant, two second assistant, and three third assistant engineers for each steamship of war, for the naval service of the United States, who shall be paid, when in actual service, as follows:

Compensation. To the chief engineer, fifteen hundred dollars per annum and one ration per day; to the first assistant engineer, nine hundred dollars per annum and one ration per day; to the second assistant engineer, seven hundred dollars per annum and one ration per day; to the third assistant engineer, five hundred dollars per annum and one ration per day. The chief engineer shall be entitled to mess in the ward room of ships-of-war, and in all cases of prize money he shall share as a lieutenant; the first assistant engineer shall share as a lieutenant of marines; the second assistant engineer shall share as a midshipman; the third assistant engineer shall share as the forward officers; but neither the chief nor the assistant engineers shall hold any other rank than as engineers.

Firemen and coal-heavers to be enlisted—Pay. †SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted*, That the Secretary of the Navy shall be authorized to enlist and employ the requisite number of firemen, who shall receive, each, thirty dollars per month and one ration per day; and the requisite number of coal-heavers, who shall receive, each, eighteen dollars per month and one ration per day; and the said firemen and coal-heavers shall, in all cases of prize money, share as seamen.

Pay of engineers when waiting orders. SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted*, That the said chief engineer and assistant engineers, when waiting orders, shall be paid as follows: To the chief engineer, twelve hundred dollars per annum; to the first assistant engineer, seven hundred

dollars per annum; to the second assistant engineer, five hundred dollars per annum; to the third assistant engineer, three hundred and fifty dollars per annum.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That the Secretary of the Navy shall appoint a skillful and scientific engineer-in-chief, who shall receive for his services the sum of three thousand dollars per annum, and shall perform such duties as the Secretary of the Navy shall require of him touching that branch of the service. Engineer-in-chief to be appointed. Pay.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That the Secretary of the Navy shall be authorized to prescribe a uniform for the said chief engineers and assistant engineers, and to make all necessary rules and regulations for the proper arrangement and government of the corps of engineers and assistant engineers not inconsistent with the Constitution and laws of the United States. The said engineers and assistant engineers shall be, in all respects, subject to the laws, rules, and regulations of the naval service, in like manner with other officers of the service. Uniform of engineers. Rules to be made, &c.

SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted*, That the said chief engineer shall be appointed by commission, and the assistant engineers shall be appointed by warrant from the Secretary of the Navy, in such form as he may prescribe. Engineers to be appointed by commission—assistant engineers by warrant. Depots of coal.

SEC. 7. *And be it further enacted*, That the Secretary of the Navy be, and he is hereby, authorized to establish, at such places as he may deem necessary, suitable depots of coal, or other fuel, for the supply of steamships of war.

APPROVED August 31, 1842.

PROFESSORS OF MATHEMATICS—QUARTERS, ETC.

From the act of August 31, 1842.

Professors of mathematics in the Navy of the United States shall be entitled to live and mess with the lieutenants of sea-going and receiving vessels, and shall receive such rations as lieutenants of the same ship or station shall receive. = Quarters and rations of professors of mathematics.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill, approved March 3, 1845.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That no more than one hundred and eighty passed midshipmen, and those senior in rank, shall at the same time receive the pay fixed by law for that class of officers. Number of passed midshipmen.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That midshipmen shall hereafter be appointed from each State and Territory, with reference and in proportion, as near as may be, to the number of representatives and delegates in Congress; and that, until such a proportion shall have been established, all future appointments shall be made from such States and Territories as have not their relative proportion of midshipmen on the Navy list, whenever there are suitable applicants from such States or Territories. *And provided further*, That in all cases of appointment, the individual selected shall be an actual resident of the State from which the appointment purports to be made, and that the District of Columbia be considered a Territory in this behalf. Number of midshipmen and manner of appointment.

SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted*, That so much of the act entitled "An act to regulate the pay of the Navy of the United States," approved March third, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, as provides that no officer shall be put on furlough but at his own request, be, and the same is hereby, repealed. Officers put on furlough.

SEC. 7. *And be it further enacted*, That in lieu of the mode heretofore provided by law, the engineer-in-chief, and chief engineers of the navy shall be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate. Engineer-in-chief and chief engineers to be appointed by the President, &c.

* * * * *

SEC. 8. *And be it further enacted*, That no more than one person doing duty at any navy-yard, shall at the same time be entitled to the pay fixed by law for that service. Only one person in navy-yards to be entitled to pay for same service.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill, approved August 10, 1846.

Passed midshipmen acting as masters—pay. Passed midshipmen performing the duties of master, under the authority of the Secretary of the Navy, to receive the compensation allowed to such higher grade while actually so employed.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill, approved March 3, 1847.

Three cents for spirit rations. SEC. 1. *Be it enacted, &c.* * * * And there shall be allowed, instead of the sum now allowed by law, three cents per day in lieu of the spirit rations in the Navy, to be paid monthly to such persons as may elect to receive the same, who shall actually draw their rations in kind.

Pay of firemen and coal-heavers. SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted,* That the pay of firemen and coal-heavers employed in the naval service shall hereafter be fixed by the President of the United States in the same manner as is now provided by law for the pay of other petty officers, and of seamen, ordinary seamen, and marines; and so much of the act of Congress approved August thirty-first, one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, entitled "An act to regulate the appointment and pay of engineers in the navy of the United States," as fixes the pay of firemen and coal-heavers, be, and the same is hereby, repealed.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill, approved August 3, 1848

Masters or passed midshipmen performing duty as lieutenants. SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted,* That when any master in the Navy, or passed midshipman holding an acting appointment as master from the Secretary of the Navy, has performed or shall hereafter perform the duty of a lieutenant, under an order of the commander of the vessel to which he was or shall be at the time attached, to supply a deficiency in the established complement of lieutenants of said vessel, whether belonging to a squadron or on separate service, which order shall have been subsequently approved by the Secretary of the Navy, shall be allowed the pay of a master for the period or periods during which he shall have performed such duty.

Pay of surgeons. SEC. 7. *And be it further enacted,* That in calculating for the pay of surgeons in the Navy hereafter, the time upon the graduated scale of pay shall be reckoned from their original entry into the service.

Professors of mathematics—number and pay SEC. 12. *And be it further enacted,* That the number of professors of mathematics in the Navy shall not exceed twelve; that they shall be appointed and commissioned by the President of the United States, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and shall perform such duties as may be assigned them by order of the Secretary of the Navy, at the Naval School, the Observatory, and on board ships-of-war, in instructing the midshipmen of the Navy, or otherwise. That, when on duty, the pay of a professor of mathematics shall be at the rate of fifteen hundred dollars per annum, with a ration; and when on leave of absence or waiting orders, the pay shall be at the rate of eight hundred dollars per annum.

Number of midshipmen, and mode of appointment. SEC. 14. *And be it further enacted,* That the proviso of the act of August fourth, eighteen hundred and forty-two, limiting the number of officers of the Navy of the grade of midshipmen to the number that were in service on the first day of January, eighteen hundred and forty-one, be, and is hereby, so modified as to authorize the appointment of officers of that grade, to the number of four hundred and sixty-four: *Provided,* That the appointments shall be made according to the directions of the fifth section of the act approved March third, eighteen hundred and forty-five, entitled "An act making appropriations for the naval service for the year ending thirtieth June, eighteen hundred and forty-six;" and in appointing from each State, hereafter, its proportion of officers of that grade, the appointments shall be apportioned, as nearly as practicable, equally among the several congressional districts therein.

Pay of warrant officers. SEC. 15. *And be it further enacted,* That from and after the passage of this act the annual pay of boatswains, gunners, carpenters, and sailmakers at the

navy-yard at Pensacola shall be the same as now allowed by law to the forward warrant officers at the navy-yards at Boston, New York, and Norfolk.

SEC. 16. *And be it further enacted*, That the restriction established by the fourth section of the act approved March third, eighteen hundred and forty-five, whereby no more than one hundred and eighty passed midshipmen, and those senior in rank, shall at the same time receive the pay fixed by law for that class of officers, be suspended in its operation from the passage of this act, until the class of eighteen hundred and forty-one and eighteen hundred and forty-two shall have been examined, and the relative rank established among those who shall pass their examination.

Number of passed midshipmen receiving pay as such.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill, approved March 3, 1849.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That, in lieu of the pay allowed by law, a purser, when, by order of the Secretary of the Navy, attached to and doing duty at the naval station of California, shall receive the same pay as if attached to a frigate in commission for sea service: *Provided*, That no more than one purser shall, at the same time, be attached to the said station on general or special duty.

Pay of pursers in California.

SEC. 8. *And be it further enacted*, That from and after the passage of this act all prize money arising from captures made by vessels of the Navy of the United States, received by the marshal who shall make sale of such prizes, shall, within sixty days after such sale, deposit the net proceeds, after paying all charges as now provided by law, into the Treasury of the United States; and all money now in the hands of prize agents shall also be deposited in the Treasury, to be distributed as now provided by law; such part thereof as may belong to the officers and crews of the vessels of the Navy shall be paid to them under the direction of the Secretary of the Navy, and the law authorizing the appointment of prize agents is hereby repealed.

Prize money

Joint Resolution of Congress, approved March 3, 1849.

That the accounting officers of the Treasury are authorized and directed to credit pursers of the Navy with payments made by them for carrying on hostilities against Mexico during the late war with that republic, whether the expenditures were made on land or water: *Provided*, The said payments shall have been made under orders of the naval officer in command, and approved by the Secretary of the Navy; and provided that satisfactory vouchers are produced to establish such payments.

Pursers to be credited with disbursements made for Mexican hostilities.

SEC. 2. *And be it further resolved*, That every disbursement of public moneys, or disposal of public stores, made by order of any commanding officer of the Navy, which shall be objected to by the accounting officers of the Treasury in the settlement of the accounts of any disbursing officer, shall, nevertheless, be allowed to such disbursing officer; and the commanding officer by whose order such disbursement or disposal was made shall be held accountable for the same: *Provided*, That satisfactory evidence of such order, and of the payments of public moneys, or disposal of public stores under the same, shall be produced.

Disbursements by purser.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill, approved September 28, 1850.

Provided, That flogging in the Navy and on board vessels of commerce be, and the same is hereby, abolished from and after the passage of this act; and that no midshipman in the Navy shall be appointed from any congressional district having at the time of appointment more than two officers of that grade in the Navy from such district. And whenever an appointment shall be made from any State, the person so appointed shall be an actual resident of the congressional district from which the appointment purports to be made: *And*

Appointment of midshipmen.

provided further, That such congressional district of any State as may not have any midshipmen in the Navy at the time an appointment may be made from said State shall be entitled to at least one appointment before any other shall be made from any district of the State having one or more officers of that grade in the Navy.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill, approved August 31, 1852.

Appointment
of midshipmen.

And hereafter no appointment of midshipmen, acting midshipmen, or pupil at any naval school in the Navy, shall be made unless recommended by the member of Congress representing the district in which the applicant resides, in the same manner that cadets at West Point are now appointed; and that the Secretary of the Navy is hereby required to report to Congress, at its second session, the number and names of appointments to the Naval School which have been made, and the district and State whence each one comes, and the number of vacancies then existing at said school, with the congressional districts which may be entitled to supply them; and a statement of the order in which the remainder of the congressional districts shall be entitled to supply all future and accruing vacancies, so far as it may be determined by existing law, or by circumstances.

NO PERSON TO RECEIVE PAY FOR TWO OFFICES.

From the Act of September 30, 1850.

No person to
receive pay of

The proper accounting officers of the Treasury, or other pay officers of the United States, shall in no case allow any pay to one individual the salary of two different offices on account of having performed the duties thereof at the same time.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill, approved March 3, 1851.

Commutation
of rations.

Provided, That no commutation of rations shall be allowed except to officers and their attendants, and for the spirit part of the ration; and no person not actually attached to and doing duty on board a sea-going or receiving vessel, and the petty officers, seamen, and ordinary seamen, attached to the ordinary of the navy-yards, shall be allowed a ration: *And provided further,* That no rations stopped for the sick on board vessels shall be credited to the hospital fund, but shall remain and be accounted for by the purser as part of the provisions of the vessel; and that the rations of officers and others of the Navy sent to hospitals on shore shall be credited to the hospital fund at the cost only thereof; and the chief of the Bureau of Provisions and Clothing, with the approbation of the Secretary of the Navy, shall prescribe all such regulations in relation to stopping such rations as will insure a faithful accountability for the rations stopped for the sick on board vessels, and to insure due credit to the hospital fund for the rations, at cost, of those sent to the hospitals on shore; and the said regulations to go into effect on the first day of the succeeding month after their official receipt at yards, stations, and on board vessels.

Examination
of assistant en-

Sec. 3. *And be it further enacted,* That if any assistant engineer shall have been absent from the United States on duty at the time others of his date were examined, he shall, if not rejected at a subsequent examination, be entitled to the same rank with them; and, if from any cause his relative rank cannot be assigned him, he shall retain his original position on the register.

COMPENSATION OF THE OFFICER CHARGED WITH THE EXPERIMENTS IN GUNNERY AT WASHINGTON.

From the Act of March 3, 1851.

The officer charged with the experiments in gunnery at the navy-yard at Washington shall hereafter receive the compensation of a commander at sea. Pay of officer in charge of gunnery experiments.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill, approved August 3, 1852.

It being provided that so much of the act, approved March 3, 1851, entitled "An act making appropriations for the naval service for the year ending June 30, 1852," as provides, "that no commutations of rations shall be allowed except to officers and their attendants, and for the spirit part of the ration," be, and the same is hereby, repealed. Spirit ration.

The salary of the secretary of the Naval Academy, at Annapolis, shall be twelve hundred and fifty dollars per annum. Pay of Secretary of Naval Academy.

And the pay of chaplains in the Navy shall be one thousand dollars on leave, or waiting orders, or fifteen hundred dollars while on duty. Pay of chaplains.

* * * * *

And the navy agent at Memphis, for the time during which he has performed, or may perform, the duties of purser, in addition to his own, shall be allowed and paid the annual salary of a purser on duty at navy-yards of the second class, which shall not be in addition to his commissions, but in lieu thereof; and the salary of the assistant to the purser for the navy-yard at Kittery, Maine, who also discharges the duties of clerk and steward, shall be seven hundred and fifty dollars; and the pay of the first clerk to the commandant "at the navy-yards at Norfolk, New York, and Boston, shall be at the rate of one thousand dollars per annum;" and that the "second clerk to the commandant" at the same yards shall be at the rate of eight hundred dollars per annum from and after the passage of this act. Navy agent, Memphis, his pay.
Pay of assistant to purser at Kittery.
Pay of first clerk to commandants at Norfolk, New York, and Boston.

COMPENSATION OF CLERKS AT NAVY-YARDS.

From the act of March 3, 1853.

And the first and second clerks to the commandants of the principal navy-yards, viz: Boston, New York, Washington, Norfolk, and Pensacola, shall receive the same pay that the two lowest classes of clerks in the bureaus of the Navy Department now receive respectively; and each "clerk of the yard" in the said navy-yards shall receive the same compensation as herein provided for the first clerks to commandants. Pay of clerks at certain navy-yards.

PAY OF WARRANT OFFICERS.

From the act of August 5, 1854.

The pay of the boatswains, gunners, carpenters, and sailmakers of the Navy shall be as follows: on leave or waiting orders, per annum, six hundred dollars; shore duty, seven hundred dollars; sea service, nine hundred dollars; an addition of two per centum upon the foregoing rates for every year's sea service, and an addition upon sea pay of ten per centum per annum when serving in ships with four hundred men, and twenty per centum when serving in ships with nine hundred men. Pay of warrant officers.

AN ACT TO PROMOTE THE EFFICIENCY OF THE NAVY.

Retiring board,
how constitu-
ted.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That as soon as practicable after the passage of this act the President of the United States shall cause a board of naval officers to be assembled, to consist of five captains, five commanders, and five lieutenants, which board, under such regulations as the Secretary of the Navy may prescribe, shall make a careful examination into the efficiency of the officers of the grades hereinafter mentioned, and shall report to the Secretary of the Navy the names and rank of all officers of the said grades who, in the judgment of the said board shall be incapable of performing promptly and efficiently all their duty, both ashore and afloat; and whenever said board shall believe that said incompetency has arisen from any cause implying sufficient blame on the part of the officer to justify it, they shall recommend that his name be stricken altogether from the rolls. Vacancies occurring in said board shall be filled by the Secretary of the Navy, who shall preserve the number and grades of its officers, as aforesaid: *Provided,* That no officers upon said board shall examine into or report upon the efficiency of officers of a grade above them.

Their duties.

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, That all officers who shall be found by the said board incapable of performing the duties of their respective offices, ranks, or grades, shall, if such finding be approved by the President, be dropped from the rolls, or placed, in the order of their rank and seniority at the time, upon a list in the Navy Register to be entitled the reserved list; and those so placed on the reserved list shall receive the leave of absence pay, or the furlough pay, to which they may be entitled, when so placed according to the report of the board and approval of the President, and shall be ineligible to further promotion, but shall be subject to the orders of the Navy Department at all times for duty; and vacancies created in the active service list by placing officers on the reserved list, shall be filled by regular promotion in the order of rank or seniority. And officers who may be promoted to fill the vacancies created by the reserved list, shall while unemployed, receive only the "leave of absence" or "waiting orders" pay to which they would have been entitled if such promotion had not been made; but when employed at sea, or on other duty, they shall receive, in addition to such "leave of absence" or "waiting orders" pay, the difference between the "waiting orders" or "leave of absence" pay and the lowest sea-service pay of the grade to which they may be so promoted: *Provided,* That this scrutiny and reservation of officers shall extend only to the grades of captain, commander, lieutenant, masters, and passed midshipmen. *And provided further,* That all vacancies occurring in the grade of masters shall be filled by the promotion of the senior passed midshipmen, to be entitled masters in the line of promotion, who, when promoted, shall receive the pay allowed by law to masters; that the number of masters in the line of promotion shall not exceed sixty, and that nothing in this act contained shall be held or construed to authorize any increase of the aggregate pay of the said grades, or of the naval service, as now allowed by law.

SEC. 3. And be it further enacted, That nothing in this act contained shall be construed to restrict, apply to, or impair the regular promotion of officers in the service list of the Navy who may be at any time entitled to promotion—consequent upon deaths, dismissals, or resignations in the naval service—nor in any manner to abridge or impair the right of the Secretary of the Navy to place any officers upon furlough.

SEC. 4. And be it further enacted, That nothing in this act shall be so construed as to increase the aggregate number of officers, and that all laws, or clauses of laws, so far as they conflict with the provisions of this act, are hereby repealed.

APPROVED February 28, 1855.

AN ACT TO PROVIDE A MORE EFFICIENT DISCIPLINE FOR THE NAVY.

Honorable dis-
charges.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That from and after the passage of this act it shall be the duty of every commanding officer of any of the vessels of the Navy, on returning from a cruise, to forward immediately on his arrival in port to the

Secretary of the Navy a list of the names of such of the crew who enlisted for three years as, in his opinion, on being discharged, are entitled to an "honorable discharge," as a testimony of fidelity and obedience; and that he shall grant the same to such, according to the form to be prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy.

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted*, That if any seaman, ordinary seaman, landsman, or boy shall reënlist for three years within three months after his discharge, he shall, on presenting his honorable discharge, or on accounting in a satisfactory manner for its loss, be entitled to pay during the said three months equal to that to which he would have been entitled if he had been employed in actual service.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted*, That it shall be the duty of commanders of any vessels in the Navy, in granting temporary leave of absence and liberty on shore, to exercise carefully a discrimination in favor of the faithful and obedient.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That summary courts-martial may be ordered upon petty officers and persons of inferior ratings by the commander of any vessel in the Navy to which such persons belong, for the trial of offenses which he may deem deserving of greater punishment than the commander of a vessel himself is by law authorized to inflict of his own authority, but not sufficient to require trial by general court-martial.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That summary courts-martial shall consist of three officers not below the rank of passed midshipman, and of some competent person to act as recorder. Before proceeding to trial the members shall take the following oath or affirmation, which the recorder is hereby authorized to administer: "You, A B, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that you will well and truly try, without prejudice or partiality, the case now depending, according to the evidence which shall be adduced, the laws for the government of the Navy, and your own conscience. So help you God."

After which the recorder of the court shall take the following oath or affirmation, which the senior member of the court shall administer: "You, A B, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that you will keep a true record of the evidence which may be given before this court, and of the proceedings thereof. So help you God."

SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted*, That the commander of a ship shall have authority to order any officer under his command to act as the recorder of a summary court-martial.

SEC. 7. *And be it further enacted*, That all testimony given before such court shall be given orally, on oath or affirmation, which the senior member of the court shall administer.

That summary courts-martial may sentence petty officers and persons of inferior ratings to any one of the following punishments, viz :

First. Discharge from the service with bad-conduct discharge, but the sentence not to be carried into effect in a foreign country.

Second. Solitary confinement in irons, single or double, on bread and water, or diminished rations, provided no such confinement shall exceed thirty days.

Third. Solitary confinement in irons, single or double, not exceeding thirty days.

Fourth. Solitary confinement not exceeding thirty days.

Fifth. Confinement not exceeding two months.

Sixth. Reduction to next inferior rating.

Seventh. Deprivation of liberty on shore on foreign station.

Eighth. Extra police duties and loss of pay, not to exceed three months, may be added to any of the above-mentioned punishments.

SEC. 8. *And be it further enacted*, That no sentence of a summary court-martial shall be carried into effect without the approval of the officer ordering the court, who shall have power to remit in part or altogether, but not to commute any such sentence. And it shall be the duty of any such commanding officer to remit any part or the whole of any sentence by a summary court-martial, the execution of which would, in the opinion of the surgeon or senior medical officer on board, given in writing, produce serious injury to the health of the person sentenced; or in case he shall refuse to do so, it shall be his duty, without delay, to submit the case again to the same or to another summary court-martial, which shall have power, upon the testimony already taken, to remit the former punishment, and to assign some other of the authorized punishments in the place thereof.

SEC. 9. *And be it further enacted*, That the proceedings of summary courts-martial shall be conducted with as much conciseness and precision as may be consistent with the ends of justice, and under such forms and rules as may be

SEC. 10. *And be it further enacted*, That any punishments authorized by this act to be inflicted by a summary court-martial may likewise be inflicted by any general court-martial.

Punishment for enticing or harboring deserters.

SEC. 11. *And be it further enacted*, That any person who shall entice any seaman, ordinary seaman, landsman, or boy, who may have enlisted into the naval service of the United States, to desert therefrom, or who shall conceal any person who may have so deserted, and shall refuse to deliver him up upon the order of his commanding officer, shall, upon legal conviction thereof, be fined, at the discretion of the court, in any sum not exceeding three hundred dollars, or be imprisoned for any term not exceeding one year.

APPROVED March 2, 1855.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill, approved March 3, 1855.

Compensation of Navy agents.

That in lieu of two thousand dollars per annum, the maximum of compensation now allowed by law to Navy agents, there shall be allowed two per centum commission on the first hundred thousand dollars, or under, disbursed by them; and one per centum on every succeeding one hundred thousand dollars, or under, disbursed by them, until the compensation reaches the sum of three thousand dollars per annum, which amount shall be the maximum of compensation for said agent: *Provided*, That the compensation named herein shall be in lieu of all extra compensation of every nature and description rendered by Navy agents by order of the Navy Department, from and after the passage of this act: *And provided, further*, That nothing herein contained shall be construed to reduce the salary to which any Navy agent is entitled under existing laws. * * * * *

That the purser of the navy-yard at Washington, District of Columbia, shall, from and after the passage of this act, receive the same pay as is now allowed by law to the purser at the navy-yards at Boston, New York, Norfolk, and Pensacola: *Provided*, That when the pursers of the Navy shall be appointed inspectors of provisions, clothing, and small stores, they shall, while so acting, receive the same compensation as the pursers of the navy-yard to which they may be attached. * * * * *

Pay of warrant officers.

And be it further enacted, That the fifth section of the "act making appropriations for the naval service for the year ending thirtieth of June, eighteen hundred and fifty-five," approved August fifth, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, shall not be so construed as in any case to reduce the pay of the boatswains, carpenters, sailmakers, and gunners of the Navy, from the passage of said act.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill, approved August 16, 1856.

Pursers of sloops or smaller vessels to appoint clerks.

That each purser attached to a sloop-of-war, or other vessel smaller than a frigate, shall be authorized to appoint a clerk in lieu of the steward heretofore allowed, subject to the approval of the commanding officer of such vessel; and such clerk shall have the privileges allowed to the clerk of the commanding officer, and his yearly compensation shall be four hundred dollars and one ration per day.

AN ACT TO AMEND AN ACT ENTITLED "AN ACT TO PROMOTE THE EFFICIENCY OF THE NAVY."

Courts of inquiry on retired officers.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That, upon the written request, made within ninety days after the passage hereof, or within thirty days after the return of any officer absent from the United States at the time of the passage of this act,

provided he shall return within one year after the passage of this act, by any officer of the Navy who was dropped, furloughed, or retired by the operation of the act of the twenty-eighth of February, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, entitled "An act to promote the efficiency of the Navy," the Secretary of the Navy shall cause the physical, mental, professional, and moral fitness of such officer for the naval service to be investigated by a court of inquiry, which shall be governed by the laws and regulations which now govern courts of inquiry; and the said court shall, in their finding, report whether the said officer, if he has been dropped from the rolls of the Navy, ought to be restored, and, if restored, whether to the active or the reserved list, and if the latter, whether on leave of absence or furlough pay; and in case the officer making the written request, as aforesaid, shall have been placed on the reserved list, then the court, in their finding, shall report whether the said officer ought to be restored to the active list, or, if not restored, whether he ought to remain on the retired list on leave of absence or furlough pay; and the finding of the court shall, in all cases, be submitted to the President of the United States, and, if approved by him, in the case of a dropped officer, when restoration has been recommended, such officer may be nominated by the President to the Senate for restoration to the service, according to the finding of the court, as approved by him; and in the case of a retired officer, the finding of the court, when approved by the President, shall be conclusive; and such officer shall be restored to the active list, to occupy that position and rank in the Navy which he would have occupied had he not been retired under the action of the late naval board; or he shall remain upon the retired list on leave of absence or furlough pay, according to the finding of the court, as approved by the President: *Provided*, That the officers so restored or placed on the reserved list shall be appointed to their places, respectively, by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate.

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted*, That the operation of the present law limiting the number of officers of the Navy shall be suspended so far as to authorize the restoration, within one year from the passage of this act, by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, of officers reserved or dropped under the operation of the act of the twenty-eighth of February, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, entitled "An act to promote the efficiency of the Navy:" *Provided*, That there shall be no further promotions or appointments in any grade after said restoration shall have been made thereto, until such grade in the active service shall be reduced to the limit now prescribed by law. That when any such officer shall be restored to the Navy, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, the officer so restored shall occupy that position and rank in the Navy which he would have held had he not been retired, furloughed, or dropped, by the order of the President, on the report of the naval board: *Provided further*, That any dropped officer who may be, in the opinion of said court, entitled to be placed on the retired or furloughed list, may be thus placed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate.

Law limiting number of officers suspended.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted*, That officers who were dropped, as aforesaid, and who shall not be restored to the naval service within one year from the passage hereof, shall be entitled to receive one year's duty pay of their grades, respectively; and the President shall be, and he is hereby, authorized, with the advice and consent of the Senate, to transfer any officer from the furlough to the reserved pay list, and that so much of the act of February twenty-eighth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, entitled "An act to promote the efficiency of the Navy," as renders reserved officers ineligible to promotion, be, and the same is hereby, repealed.

Officers dropped and not restored to receive one year's pay.

Officers to be transferred from the furlough to the reserved list.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted*, That reserved officers may be promoted on the reserved list, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, but no such promotion shall entitle them to any pay beyond that to which they were entitled when so reserved; nor shall they, by such promotion, take any higher rank than they would have taken had they been retained in the active service of the Navy; and nothing in this act, or in the act to which this is an amendment, shall be so construed as to preclude officers on the reserved list from wearing the uniform of their grades, respectively.

Promotion of officers on reserved list.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted*, That captains in command of squadrons shall be denominated flag officers.

Commanders of squadrons to be designated flag officers.

SEC. 6. *And be it further enacted*, That all officers who may be restored to active service, under the provisions of this act, shall be entitled to draw the same pay they were drawing at the time they were retired or dropped, for and during the time of such retirement or suspension from the active service aforesaid.

Back pay of restored officers.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill, approved March 3, 1857.

Pay of warrant officers. *And be it further enacted,* That the acts making appropriations for the naval service of the fifth of August, eighteen hundred and fifty-four, and the third of March, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, shall be so construed as to allow to the boatswains, gunners, sailmakers, and carpenters of the Navy, when on shore duty, the same percentage for sea service as is allowed to them when on sea duty.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill, approved June 12, 1858.

Boys to be enlisted in the marine corps. **SEC. 3.** *And be it further enacted,* That it shall be lawful to enlist boys for service in the United States marine corps, with the consent of their parents or guardians, not being under eleven nor over seventeen years of age, to serve until they shall arrive at the age of twenty-one years; the boys so enlisted to receive the same pay, rations, clothing, and so forth, now received by boys enlisted in said corps, under the authority of the Secretary of the Navy.

Names of steamships. **SEC. 5.** *And be it further enacted,* That all the steamships of the Navy of the United States now building, or hereafter to be built, shall be named by the Secretary of the Navy, under the direction of the President of the United States, according to the following rule: All those of forty guns or more shall be considered of the first class, and shall be called after the States of the Union; those of twenty guns, and under forty, shall be considered as of the second class, and be called after the rivers and principal towns or cities; and all those of less than twenty guns shall be the third class, and named by the Secretary of the Navy, as the President may direct, care being taken that no two vessels in the Navy shall bear the same name.

NAVY EFFICIENCY BOARD.

From Act, approved March 3, 1859.

Pay of retired officers. **4.** The sixth section of the act of January 16, 1857, entitled "An act to amend an act to promote the efficiency of the Navy," shall be so construed as to include officers who, at the time they were dropped or placed on the reserved list, had been detached from duty or removed from command for supposed inefficiency or unfitness, but who have since been restored to the active list; and such officers shall receive the same pay they were receiving, respectively, when they were so detached or removed, up to the termination of the cruise when they were so detached, deducting any pay they may have otherwise received during the time aforesaid; and that this shall extend to any officer who has been transferred from the furlough list to the leave of absence list by the President, with the advice and consent of the Senate. That such officers of the Navy as were dropped from the service by the action of the late "naval retiring board," and who have been subsequently restored to the service and placed upon the "furlough" or "leave pay" list, shall be allowed furlough pay, if placed upon the furlough list, and leave pay, if placed upon the leave list, for and during the time they were so dropped, deducting any pay which they may otherwise have received during the time aforesaid.

Pay of furloughed officers. **5.** Such officers as were placed upon the "furlough list" by the action of the said naval retiring board, and who have been subsequently transferred to the "leave list," shall be allowed "leave pay" for and during the time they were on the furlough list, as aforesaid, deducting the furlough pay which they received during said time.

6. In case of the death of any officer after his restoration or transfer as aforesaid, his legal representatives shall be entitled to receive the amount which said officer would have received, under this act, up to the time of his death.

To increase and regulate the pay of the Navy of the United States.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That from and after the passage of this act the annual pay of the officers of the Navy, on the active list, hereinafter named, shall be as follows: Pay of the

Pay of chiefs of bureaus.
Superintendent of Naval Observatory to be classed with the chiefs of bur'ux.
Pay of officer in charge of gunnery exp'ts.

Sea service.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted,* That hereafter no service shall be regarded as sea-service but such as shall be performed at sea under the orders of a department, and in vessels employed by authority of law.

Power of Secretary to furlough officers.

SEC. 4. *And be it further enacted,* That nothing in this act contained shall be held to modify or affect the existing power of the Secretary of the Navy to furlough officers, or to affect the furlough pay.

Pay of masters not in line of promotion.

SEC. 5. *And be it further enacted,* That the increased pay hereinbefore provided for masters shall attach to masters not in the line of promotion, whether on the active or reserved list; and officers on the reserved list, when called into active service, shall receive the pay of their respective grades, as herein provided, during the term of such service: *Provided,* That nothing herein contained shall be construed to change or modify the present pay of officers on the reserved list, either on leave or furlough.

PURSERS TO BE STYLED PAYMASTERS. PAY OF PURSERS' CLERKS AT THE NAVY-YARDS AT CHARLESTOWN, NEW YORK, AND NORFOLK.

From the Naval Appropriation Bill, approved June 22, 1860.

Pursers to be styled paymasters.

SEC. 3. *And be it further enacted,* That pursers in the Navy of the United States shall hereafter be styled paymasters, and that all laws and regulations applying to them as pursers, and all responsibilities and obligations attaching to them as such shall remain in full force, and continue to apply to them under the title of paymasters; and that the payments heretofore made to the pursers' clerks at the navy-yards at Charlestown, New York, and Norfolk, under appropriations made by Congress at the rate of seven hundred and fifty dollars per annum, are hereby confirmed, and that the pay of the pursers' clerks at those navy-yards shall be continued at the rate of seven hundred and fifty dollars per annum.

CIRCULAR.

EMPLOYMENT OF MECHANICS TO REPAIR MERCHANT VESSELS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *July, 1840.*

Employment and compensation of mechanics to repair merchant vessels.

The practice of allowing the mechanics employed at the several navy-yards, and on board ships on foreign stations to repair vessels belonging to the merchant service of the United States, will in future be limited to cases where a refusal to do so would of necessity impose injurious delays or greatly increase the expenses upon the merchant vessel. In such cases the mechanics shall make no demand for any compensation, but receive only such as the owner, assignee, or master of such merchant vessel shall choose to give, and their commander is willing they should take. Officers of the Navy, in like cases, shall neither claim nor receive any compensation whatever.

Gratuitous assistance to be given.

In all cases of distress, gratuitous assistance is to be given as heretofore, to the fullest extent practicable.

REGULATION.

PUBLICATION IN NEWSPAPERS OF TRANSACTIONS OF A PRIVATE NATURE PROHIBITED.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *December 7, 1841.*

Publication of transactions of a private nature prohibited.

Officers of the Navy are strictly prohibited from publishing, or causing to be published in newspapers, pamphlets, handbills, or otherwise, any disrespectful or offensive matter relative to transactions of a private nature, between officers

or between officers and citizens; and any officer so offending shall be arrested and tried therefor; and one specification of the charge against him shall be the violation of this regulation.

PRESENTATIONS OF SWORDS, ETC., PROHIBITED.

The practice of presenting swords, plate, or other things of value from inferior officers to from crews, to their superior or commanding officer, in the way of compliment; and all votes or resolutions, whether of praise or censure, from inferiors to superiors, are injurious to discipline, and of evil tendency in other respects. They are therefore strictly forbidden.

NAVAL GENERAL ORDERS.

ARRESTS ON A FOREIGN STATION.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *December 15, 1841.*

Whenever an officer shall be arrested on a foreign station, it shall be the duty of the commander-in-chief of the station to order a court for his trial as soon as possible after he shall be notified of his arrest, and this he shall not refuse or delay, except for imperative reasons connected with the public service.

Arrests on a foreign station

If such imperative reasons shall exist, so that a court-martial cannot be detailed and actually sit for the trial of the accused, his arrest may continue for thirty days after the commander-in-chief of the station shall be notified thereof, and no longer, and the accused shall then be returned to duty, unless, for sufficient reasons, the commander-in-chief shall otherwise direct; but he shall be again arrested, and shall be tried as soon as the condition of the service will admit of it.

No officer arrested on a foreign station shall be confined to his room nor restrained from the proper use of any part of the ship in which, before his arrest, he had a right to be, except the quarter-deck, unless such restraint shall be necessary for the safety of the ship, or the preservation of good order and discipline, and even in that case he shall be no further restrained than shall be necessary.

NAVAL GENERAL ORDER.

APPLICATION FOR LEAVE OF ABSENCE ON ACCOUNT OF ILL HEALTH.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *February 11, 1842.*

Officers of the Navy applying for a leave of absence or an extension thereof, on the score of ill health, must forward at the same time to the department the certificate of a surgeon in the Navy, if there be one in their vicinity, or, if there be no naval surgeon, of some respectable surgeon or physician, of their inability to perform duty.

Surgeon's certificate when applying for leave on account of health.

Such certificates must state the nature of the disease, and the probable duration thereof, as far as can be judged.

RIGHTS AND POWERS OF COMMANDERS OF SQUADRONS AND CAPTAINS OF FLAG-SHIPS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *April 22, 1842.*Commanders
of squadrons
and captains of
flag-ships.

The frequent misunderstandings which have occurred between the commanders-in-chief of squadrons and the captains of their flag-ships, on the subject of their respective rights and powers; misunderstandings which result only from the fact that their true relation to each other has not yet been properly defined, have suggested to the department the propriety of expressing its own views upon the subject. The following general rule embraces these views:

The commander-in-chief of a squadron, having in command of his flag-ship an officer of equal grade with himself, holds the same relation to that ship as to every other ship of his squadron.

While it is impossible to specify all the powers of a commander-in-chief over the ship which bears his flag, or of the captain of a flag-ship in subordination to the powers of the commander-in-chief, a due observance of the spirit of the above rule will go far to prevent any conflict or collision between those officers.

The dignity of a commander-in-chief is lessened by his engaging in the details of duty of his particular ship, and the respect which ought to attach to the immediate captain of the ship is weakened by any interference with him in the rightful exercise of his authority.

The commander-in-chief of a squadron will find the best support to his own dignity and importance in maintaining the dignity and importance of the officers who are subordinate to him. While, therefore, his superiority must be always admitted, and his authority respected and obeyed, a due and prudent regard to the limitation above indicated, will tend strongly to preserve the discipline and harmony of the service.

COMMANDER AS EXECUTIVE OFFICER OF A FLAG-SHIP.

The regulation of the 30th April, 1842, which prescribes that "when a commander shall be attached to a ship-of-the-line or frigate bearing the broad pennant of a commander of a squadron or station, he shall be considered as the executive officer of the ship, and shall have an apartment and mess in the ward room," is hereby annulled; and in future no ship will be allowed a commander as executive officer, unless a captain will receive him in his cabin.

Whenever a navy agent shall be authorized to make advances of pay to officers bound on a cruise, it shall be the duty of the purser of the vessel to furnish to such agent, as his guide, a correct list, signed by himself and approved by the commanding officer, of all the officers entitled to an advance of pay; which list must exhibit their names, rank, and monthly pay.

The receiving ships at the several stations are not to be considered "vessels in commission for sea service," except, as may sometimes be the case, while going from one port to another.

REGULATION.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMMANDERS OF STEAM VESSELS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *February 26, 1845.*

Commanders of steam vessels will cause the following orders to be carried into effect in the vessels under their command, in addition to the general orders and regulations which apply to sailing vessels, or to the general service of the Navy.

The following rules to be carried into effect in steamers.

First. Steam engineers of the Navy, when embarked in vessels, are to conform to the orders of the commanding officer of the vessel, and of the officer of the watch for the time being; but they are not, except in cases of great emergency, to be ordered to perform other duties than those immediately connected with the preservation, repair, or management of the engines and their dependencies.

Engineers to conform to orders.

Second. When practicable, one engineer at least is always to be on duty in the engine room whenever the fires are lighted; and when more than one engineer is attached to the vessel one must be on board at all times ready for duty.

One engineer to be on duty in engine room.

Third. The engineers, firemen, and coal-heavers are to be arranged in watches, and when on watch are to be under the immediate direction of the engineer of the watch, and are not to be ordered on other duties than those connected with the engines, boilers, and their dependencies, except in cases of emergency.

Engineers, firemen, and coal-heavers, to be arranged in watches.

Fourth. The senior engineer is to prepare and submit, for the approval of the commander, bills showing the specific duties of the respective engineers, firemen, and coal-heavers in their watches, for attending to and for cleaning the different parts of the engines and their dependencies, and he will give particular attention that the prescribed duties are performed in a proper manner, and, in case of misconduct or neglect, report offenders to the officer of the watch, or to the commander of the vessel, as the case may require.

Senior engineer to prepare watch bills.

Fifth. When the engines are in operation, reports are to be made hourly to the officer of the deck, whether the engines and their dependencies are in good order, and immediate notice must be given him, at any time, if anything should occur to require a change in the orders under which the engineer is then acting, or special attention to any particular object, to insure safety or more efficiency.

Reports when engines are in operation.

Sixth. The firemen are to be instructed as far as may be practicable to qualify them for managing the engines and dependencies with safety, in case accident or other cause should prevent the attendance of an engineer.

Firemen to be instructed.

Seventh. The senior engineer on board must examine daily the engines and their dependencies, and all parts of the vessel which are occupied by them, or by stores for their use, and make immediate report should any defect or danger be discovered. He must give timely notice to the commander of the vessel of the probable wants of his department, and whenever articles are received for it, must carefully examine if they are of proper quality, and report any which, in his opinion, may be objectionable.

Senior engineer to make daily examinations.

Eighth. Upon the arrival of a steamer in port, an early inspection is to be made by the senior engineer, to ascertain if the engines, boilers, or their dependencies require repairs or cleaning, and will report forthwith to the commander of the vessel.

Inspection when steamer arrives in port.

Repairs or cleaning to be made by the engineers, &c. *Ninth.* When repairs or cleaning are required for the engines or boilers they are to be made, as far as practicable, by the engineers, firemen, and coal-heavers of the vessel, and they are to be employed on such duties in preference to coaling, if both should be necessary at the same time.

Force-pumps. *Tenth.* The force-pumps, hose, and all other means for extinguishing fires must be always kept in good order and ready for immediate use, and so reported at the end of each watch by the engineer on duty, and the utmost care must be taken at all times in the arrangement of stores, the use of lights and fires, and the adoption of other precautionary measures to prevent the danger from fire, to which steamers are so much exposed.

Steam-log. *Eleventh.* A steam-log is always to be kept when the vessel is moved by steam, which log is to be signed in the "column of remarks" by the engineers of the respective watches, at the expiration of their watch and at noon of each day by the senior engineer of the vessel.

Entries to be made in steam-log. *Twelfth.* The engineer of the watch will be careful to note hourly on the steam-log all the information which the columns in it require, and to place in the "column of remarks" full information of the state of the weather and sea, and any accidents to or defects in the engines or their dependencies, the quality of the coal, or other circumstances, which may be useful for determining the powers and qualities of the vessel, and the engines, under the various circumstances to which they may be exposed. He will carefully note in it the draught of water of the vessel and immersion of the bucket-boards, just before going to sea and on arriving in port, and frequently when receiving coal or other stores.

Steam-log to be handed to commander daily. *Thirteenth.* The steam log-book is to be handed to the commander of the vessel daily, by the senior engineer on board; and it shall be the duty of the said commander to examine the same, and when satisfied of its correctness to sign it at the end of every calendar month, or oftener should the vessel in the mean time arrive at or anchor in any port.

Steam-logs to be deposited at navy-yards for the use of steamers. *Fourteenth.* Steam log-books, calculated to contain the log for one quarter of a year, and hydrometers, will be deposited at the respective navy-yards, for the use of steamers, upon proper requisitions. The commander of the vessel must transmit to the Secretary of the Navy, by the first safe opportunity after the close of the months of March, June, September, and December, the steam log-book for the preceding quarter, and whenever a steamer is placed in ordinary, for the period which has not been previously transmitted.

OFFICERS TO KEEP THE DEPARTMENT INFORMED OF THEIR ADDRESS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *January 30, 1846.*

Officers to keep the department informed of their address, and acknowledge and report in obedience to orders. All officers of the Navy not on duty will keep the department, at all times, advised of their address.

All officers, on being detached from duty, will immediately inform the department of their intended place of residence, and notice must be given of any contemplated change before such change shall have been made.

All officers will promptly acknowledge the receipt of orders, and inform the department immediately on their having reported in obedience to them.

"Although it is usual for our ministers to be conveyed in ships-of-war, no allowance is made by the government for the expenses of their maintenance whilst on board. In every such case provision is to be made and the expense to be defrayed by the minister himself, just as it would be if he took passage in a private vessel."

GENERAL ORDER.

PROMOTION OF PASSED MIDSHIPMEN.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *August 14, 1846.*

Vacancies in the grade of masters may be filled by the oldest passed midshipmen who are worthy of advancement.

Promotion of passed midshipmen.

The fitness of the senior passed midshipmen for advancement may be established by an examination, or by the records of the department, or by the testimony of the officers under whom they have served, or in such other manner as may be deemed proper. Those who may be found not suited to be advanced may be placed on furlough, or dropped from the list.

Examination of passed midshipmen.

The masters thus appointed will receive regular warrants, and will also remain in the line of promotion.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *August 17, 1846.*

No person shall hereafter receive the appointment of naval constructor in the Navy of the United States unless he shall have been examined and approved by a board to be designated for that purpose by the Secretary of the Navy.

No person shall hereafter receive the appointment of boatswain, gunner, carpenter, or sailmaker, in the Navy of the United States, unless he shall have been examined and approved by a board to be designated for that purpose by the Secretary of the Navy.

Surgeons of the fleet, and surgeons of more than twelve years, will rank with commanders.

Passed assistant surgeons, next after lieutenants.

Assistant surgeons, not passed, next after masters.

Commanding and executive officers of whatever grade, when on duty, will take precedence over all medical officers.

ROGERS AND BLACK'S SEMAPHORIC DICTIONARY ADOPTED.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *February 16, 1847.*

Semaphoric

In order to facilitate and improve the mode of communication at sea by ships of war with each other, and with vessels of the revenue marine and the merchant service, Messrs. Rogers & Black's Semaphoric Dictionary has been adopted for the use of the Navy, copies of which, together with the necessary flags, will be distributed among the public vessels of the United States, as the Department may from time to time direct.

Officers of the Navy will embrace every convenient opportunity to familiarize the service with the use of these signals by communicating with other vessels which may possess them, and with semaphoric stations on shore.

RULES RESPECTING ALLOTMENTS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *April 16, 1847.*

Allotments

1. Any person belonging to the Navy or Marine Corps may allot a portion of his pay, (not to exceed one half thereof without the special permission of the department,) to such attorney as he may think proper, for the benefit of his family or other relatives, for such time as he may be absent from them on public duty.

2. The allotment, after having been signed, must have the approval of the department or of the commander of the station to which the person making it is attached; and will be registered by the purser of such vessel or station, or by the Fourth Auditor of the Treasury. It will be executed in duplicate; and, in the case of commissioned officers and midshipmen, one part will be transmitted by the purser to the Fourth Auditor's Office; and in the case of all other persons, both parts will be so transmitted. The purser will send, with allotments registered by him, a general abstract for the use of the Fourth Auditor's Office, and a particular abstract for each of the navy agents by whom they are payable.

3. No allotment will be made payable on any other than the last day of the month.

4. The previous regulations upon the subject of allotments are hereby rescinded.

Pursers of more than twelve years will rank with commanders.

Commanding and executive officers of whatever grades, when on duty, will take precedence of all pursers.

A master's mate is not included in the complement of any vessel, agreeably to the present table, and such an appointment, therefore, cannot be made by any commanding officer without the special sanction of the Secretary of the Navy.

REGULATIONS.

Respecting the enlistment of firemen and coal-heavers.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, August 1, 1847.

No firemen or coal-heavers shall be shipped, as such, until they have passed a satisfactory examination, by one or more medical officers of the Navy, in respect to their health and vigor; nor shall firemen be so shipped until they have passed a satisfactory examination by one or more engineering officers of the Navy, upon their ability to manage fires properly with different kinds of fuel, and to use skillfully smiths' tools in the repair and preservation of steam machinery and boilers.

The firemen of the Navy shall hereafter be divided into two classes; and, until further orders, the pay of the first class shall be at the rate of thirty dollars a month; the pay of the second class at the rate of twenty dollars; and the pay of coal-heavers shall be at the rate of fifteen dollars, with one ration a day to each.

Should any fireman or coal-heaver neglect his duties, or be unable to perform them, the commanding officer of the squadron, or, in his absence, the commanding officer of the vessel to which such fireman or coal-heaver belongs, may, if he deems it necessary, direct another person to perform them during the continuance of such neglect or disability, or until the place is supplied by a person of the proper rating; and the person so appointed shall receive the pay of the situation which he may thus fill. But the commanding officer shall, when it is practicable, direct second class firemen to succeed or supply the places of the first class; and the coal-heavers, if qualified, shall take the place of the second class firemen in the preference to other persons.

Firemen and coal-heavers, when unable to perform their duties, or when they neglect them, shall receive only a reduced pay—that is, firemen of the first class shall only receive the pay of firemen of the second; those of the second the pay of coal-heavers; and coal-heavers the pay of seamen so long as they neglect their duties, or are unable to perform them, or until duly discharged from the service.

*It is to be understood, as a part of the conditions on which firemen and coal-heavers enter the Navy, that, in case any right to a pension should occur before any action of Congress shall be had on the subject, the rate of pension to a first class fireman shall not exceed that to which a boatswain's mate would be entitled; that of a second class fireman, the same as for a quartermaster; and that of a coal-heaver, the same as for a seaman.

Firemen and coal-heavers should be shipped on articles which refer to these regulations, which shall, in all cases, be read to them before they sign the articles.

Promotion of Firemen of the first class shall be eligible to promotion to the rank of third firemen and assistant engineers; second class firemen, to the grade of first class; and coal-heavers. coal-heavers, to the grade of firemen.

OFFICERS ORDERED FOR DUTY, OR RETURNING FROM SEA.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *March 1, 1848.*

Officers ordered for duty, or returning from sea. All officers of the Navy, not on duty, whose names are borne on the books of a naval station for pay, will, on the receipt of orders for duty, inclose a copy of the same to the commandant of the station.

And all officers returning from sea, under orders or permission from their commanding officer, will, immediately on their arrival in the United States, report in writing to the department, inclosing a copy of the order or permission under which they return.

PURCHASE OF ARTICLES IN OPEN MARKET.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *April 17, 1849.*

Articles purchased in open market. Whenever it becomes necessary to purchase articles contracted for, in open market, in consequence of the failure of the contractor to furnish them, let the requisition state upon its face, "There is required to be purchased in open market, for immediate use, to supply deficiencies under the contract of (here state the contractor's name,) dated _____, the following articles, which must conform, in quality, as near to the contract as practicable."

The bills must be certified to by the Navy Agent thus: "The above named articles were purchased at the lowest market prices, in open market, for immediate use, to supply deficiencies under the contract of _____, dated _____."

The Naval Storekeeper should acknowledge the receipt of the above articles accordingly, and the Inspecting Officer certify the articles to be of good quality.

A record is to be kept by the Navy Agent and Naval Storekeeper, and the excess of cost (showing the aggregate amount) over the contract, returned to the respective bureaus quarterly.

CIRCULAR.

EXAMINATION OF A VESSEL ON HER ARRIVAL AT A STATION.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *May 23, 1849.*

Examination of a vessel and her crew on her return from a cruise. You are directed, on the arrival of any and every public ship at the station under your command, to cause a critical examination to be made previous to her being dismantled, and before the discharge of her crew, into her condition as an effective ship of war, and fitness for action with an enemy.

For this purpose you will examine the condition of her guns, gun-tackling and gun-carriages, cylinders, cartridges, wads and shot, powder, &c.

You will also muster the men and see them exercised at their quarters, and report the result of your examination to the department.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *July 23, 1849.*

Officers of the Navy, while attached to vessels of the Coast Survey in sea service, will be considered as on sea service and entitled to sea pay. Sea service of officers on the Coast Survey.

Vessels of the Coast Survey will be considered as in sea service only while actually employed as vessels of the Coast Survey.

BY ORDER OF PERMISSION.NAVY DEPARTMENT, *August 31, 1849.*

“An order or permission given by a commanding officer on a foreign station, to an officer to return to the United States and report to the Secretary of the Navy, is regarded as requiring no more than that he should report in writing from the place of his arrival. No allowance for travel to the seat of government will be allowed, unless specially authorized by the department.” Traveling allowances of an officer returning from a foreign station.

CIRCULAR TO PURSERS.

REQUISITIONS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *February 23, 1850.*

After the first day of March, 1850, all pursers on duty within the United States will make their requisitions for money direct upon the Navy Department and its bureaus, instead of upon the navy agents, as has heretofore been the practice in some cases. Pursers to make their requisitions on the Navy Department.

The approval of pursers' requisitions by commanding officers will be required as evidence in favor of the wants of the service, and no requisition will be answered unless it bears upon it the signature of the commanding officer.

GENERAL ORDER.

CERTIFICATES IN CASES OF DEATH OR DISABILITY.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *February 17, 1851.*

In all cases of death or disability in the naval service of the United States, whether from wounds, injuries, casualties, or disease, it shall be the duty of the senior medical officer of the ship, station, or hospital, to record such death or disability, the facts thereto relating, and whether not it originated in the line of his duty. Duty of medical officer in cases of death or disability.

In all cases of death, a certificate shall issue, in which a copy of the surgeon's record and a statement of service shall be given.

In all cases of disability of a permanent character, which shall have originated in the line of duty, a certificate for pension shall issue, in which, together with a copy of the surgeon's record and statement of service, the degree of disability shall be set forth.

In all cases of discharge from service by reason of unfitness for the performance of duty from temporary disability, a certificate of ordinary disability shall

issue, in which a copy of the surgeon's record and a statement of service shall appear.

Such certificates are to be signed by the senior surgeon, countersigned by the purser, and approved by the commanding officer of the ship, station, or hospital, where such death, disability, or discharge may occur, and must be forwarded in duplicate by the commanding officer of the Navy Department.

VESSELS SUSTAINING INJURY FROM HAVING BEEN ON SHORE, ETC.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *August 16, 1852.*

Vessel sustaining injury from having been on shore, facts to be reported.

Instances having occurred of vessels on their return from foreign service being found to have sustained injury from having been on shore, or having struck on rocks, without any report of such circumstance having been made either at the time of its occurrence or at the termination of the cruise, it is hereby ordered and directed that every commander of a vessel of the Navy shall report to the Chief of the Bureau of Construction, Equipment, and Repair, immediately on its occurrence, every instance of the vessel under his command touching on a shoal or rock, or sustaining any injury to the hull, lower masts, or bowsprit, with all the circumstances attending the accident, and his opinion as to the probable injury sustained; and at the termination of his cruise he will send duplicates of all such reports made during the cruise to the bureau.

BREVET RANK OF MARINE OFFICERS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *November 22, 1852.*

Brevet rank of marine officers not to be considered in determining their relative rank with Navy officers.

The President directs, until otherwise ordered, that, in determining the relative rank of the officers of the Navy and the officers of the Marine Corps, the brevet rank of the latter shall not be considered.

Every communication to the department from any officer of the Navy on duty, or on reporting for duty, must be forwarded by his superior officer. No communication will be considered or replied to unless so forwarded. An officer in command, on forwarding a communication, will indorse on it, over his official signature, the words "*forwarded by.*"

Whenever, in the opinion of the commander of a vessel of the Navy, any person of her crew is unfit for service, he shall report the same to the senior officer in command, whose duty it shall be to order a survey to be held upon such person by three medical officers, who shall examine and report upon his condition; and if they find him "unfit for service," shall state, as far as practicable, the general character of his disease or disability, its probable duration, as far as can be predicted, and, in all cases, whether "originating in the line of duty." The report of survey to be transmitted, in duplicate, to the Secretary of the Navy or to the commander-in-chief of the squadron, for decision, by whom a copy shall be forwarded to the Navy Department.

Rank and precedence of Executive officers. DISBURSEMENTS BY PURSERS.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *March 20, 1855.*

Disbursements by Pursers. The second section of the "Joint resolution for the relief of pursers, &c.," approved March 3, 1849, provides "that every disbursement of public moneys, or disposal of public stores, made by order of any commanding officer of the Navy, which shall be objected to by the accounting officers of the Treasury

in the settlement of the accounts of any disbursing officer, shall nevertheless be allowed to such disbursing officer; and the commanding officer by whose order such disbursement or disposal was made, shall be held accountable for the same."

This enactment does not authorize an advance of public money by the purser to the commanding officer, or to any other person, on his order. The disbursement presupposes an indebtedness, and whether the objects for which the indebtedness accrued were sanctioned or not by law or regulation, the purser would be entitled to a credit for payment therefor, when made by order of the commanding officer. But the disbursement must be for some service rendered or article furnished. For instance: if a clerk, not allowed by law, be employed, or if an excess of the regulation-complement of cabin furniture, or if unauthorized provisions or stores of any kind be purchased, by direction of the commander, and by his order the purser has paid for such unauthorized service or supplies, the purser will receive a credit for the payment, and the commander will be held accountable.

In regard to advances or loans, however, the laws of January 21, 1823, and August 26, 1842, are not repealed or modified by the joint resolution of 1849. The sixth section of the act of August 26, 1842, declares "that it shall not be lawful for a purser in the Navy to advance or loan any sum or sums of money, public or private, or any article or commodity whatever, or any credit, to any officer in the naval service, under any pretense whatever." To allow a purser to advance or loan to a commanding officer on his simple order the funds provided for the expenses of the ship and wages of the crew, would be dangerous to the service and unsafe for the Treasury, leaving an open door for collusion and fraud. No credits will be allowed to pursers for advances or loans hereafter made by orders of commanding officers, no matter how frequent or peremptory such orders may be.

GENERAL ORDER.

SUMMARY COURTS-MARTIAL.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *April 4, 1855.*

In conformity with the ninth section of the "Act to provide a more efficient discipline for the Navy," approved March 2, 1855, the following regulations have been submitted to, and approved by, the President of the United States, and will be observed by summary courts-martial convened under the authority of the said act:

Rules and forms of proceeding of summary courts-martial.

1. Summary courts-martial will adopt the same forms of proceeding and rules of evidence as naval general courts-martial, so far as they shall be applicable and not inconsistent with the conciseness and precision enjoined by the law, nor with the provisions of this General Order.

2. The form of convening a summary court-martial will be by a brief written order addressed by the commander of the vessel to the senior member of the court, stating the names and rank of the members of the court, and of the recorder, and of the time and place of meeting; and by written or verbal orders to the other members of the court and the recorder. The written order to the senior member will be appended to the record of the proceedings.

3. The record will state that the oath prescribed by the law was duly administered to each member and to the recorder, in the presence of the accused.

4. If objection is made by the accused to any member of the court, it will be so stated in the record of proceedings, and made known, if the court think fit, to the commander of the vessel, who will, at his discretion, order another member of the court, or continue the member objected to.

5. The accused shall be furnished, before trial, with a written specification of the offense or offenses for which he is to be tried. The specifications shall be as brief as practicable, without unnecessary repetition or circumlocution or accumulation of epithets, but explicit; and all offenses or misconduct committed at any one time by the same individual and intended to be charged against him, shall be comprised in the same specification, which shall be approved, before trial, by the officer ordering the court, and a duplicate of it to be annexed to the record.

6. The accused shall not be required to plead guilty or not guilty to the specification; but if a plea of guilty be made, the court may, at its discretion, admit testimony as to the character of the offender, or in extenuation of the offense. And, in any case, the court, may find the accused guilty of the whole or any part of the misconduct charged, according to the evidence, and adjudge punishment for so much as shall be found proved.

7. Witnesses shall be summoned by the recorder through the executive officer of the vessel, and the summons shall be obeyed, unless disapproved by the commanding officer for some reason to be stated in the record.

8. The court, if requested by the accused, may allow a commissioned, warrant, or petty officer to appear as counsel, and cross-examine witnesses in his behalf; but no written defense or argument, nor any protracted oral defense or argument shall be admitted. Nor shall any testimony not clearly relevant be admitted, nor any documentary evidence be read to the court or appended to the record.

9. If more than one case be tried by the same court, the record of each case shall be separate, the order for convening the court shall be appended to the record of the first case, and be referred to in each subsequent record, so as to show that the proceedings of the court are continuous. And in each case the prescribed oath shall be administered anew to the members and the recorder of the court.

AMERICAN CODE OF SIGNALS ADOPTED FOR THE USE OF THE NAVY.

In order to facilitate the mode of communication at sea between ships-of-war and the merchant service, the American Code of Signals, by Henry J. Rogers, has been adopted for the use of the Navy, copies of which will be distributed by the proper bureau, among vessels of the United States Navy, as the department may, from time to time, direct. The flags will be made at the yards or on board ship, as may be most convenient.

Commanding officers of the Navy will embrace every opportunity to familiarize the service with the use of these signals.

GENERAL ORDER.

HONORABLE DISCHARGES.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *April 7, 1855.*

Honorable
discharges.

Whenever any seaman, ordinary seaman, landsman, or boy, who shall have received the "honorable discharge" from the Navy, authorized by the "Act to provide a more efficient discipline for the Navy," approved March 2, 1855, (form of which has been prescribed by the department,) shall, within three months from the date thereof, present said "honorable discharge" at any naval rendezvous, if he shall answer the description of such discharge, and shall be physically qualified, he shall be reënlisted for three years, and, upon his transfer to a receiving ship, shall be entitled to receive three month's pay equal to that to "which he would have been entitled if he had been employed in actual service" in the rate specified in the "honorable discharge."

If the "honorable discharge" should have been lost, reference can be made to the files of the department for corroboration that the person presenting himself did receive an "honorable discharge," and for a descriptive list of his person.

The recruiting officer will write on the face of the "honorable discharge,"

over his official signature, the date of reënlistment. After the reception on board the receiving ship of the person reënlisted, the commanding officer, also, will write on the face of the "honorable discharge," over his official signature, that the three months' pay has been credited or paid to him, with the date of such credit or payment, and the amount thereof.

To those reënlisting under the "honorable discharge," the advance authorized by the General Order of the department, dated August 11, 1854, will also be made.

Should the person holding an "honorable discharge" prove physically disqualified, it will be so written by the recruiting officer on the face of the discharge, and such discharge shall not entitle the holder to be received under it.

In the reënlistment of men under honorable discharges, regard will be had to the provisions of the Circular of March 25, 1851, in relation to enlistments.

On the returns now required to be made to the department of enlisted men from rendezvous and receiving ships, special reference will be made to those men who have been reënlisted under an "honorable discharge," and from what vessel they received their discharge.

Commanding officers of vessels, upon returning from a cruise, when directed to discharge the whole or any part of the crew, will furnish to those who, in their judgment, are entitled to it under the law, an "honorable discharge," and separate returns will be made to the department of the names and description of those to whom they have been given.

Blanks for the honorable discharges and return will be furnished by the department, and great care should be taken that they are both accurately and fully filled out.

A yeoman, however, is not to be discharged until his accounts have been audited and approved of by the commandant of the yard, as required by the Ordnance Instructions and other general regulations or orders. If found correct, the commandant of the yard will then grant the "honorable discharge," if entitled to it in the opinion of the commanding officer of the vessel to which he belonged.

Yeoman not to receive his discharge until his accounts are settled.

When invalids are sent to the United States from a foreign station, the commanding officer of the vessel to which they belonged will transmit a list of their names to the department, stating the general character of each, and designating such as, in his opinion, are entitled, under the law, to the "honorable discharge," in order that the commandant of the station at which they may arrive in the United States may be directed to grant the said discharge to those deserving it. A duplicate of this list is to be sent also to the commandant of the station where they are to arrive.

When any seaman, ordinary seaman, landsman, or boy, shall be discharged at his own request, or for his own convenience, before the expiration of his term of enlistment, he shall not be entitled to the "honorable discharge."

COMMENCEMENT OF PAY OF OFFICERS.

Extract from a letter addressed to the Fourth Auditor of the Treasury by the Secretary of the Navy, dated October 23, 1855.

"I find on examination that the rules of this department in relation to the commencement of pay of officers promoted have varied. The prevailing practice seems to be to allow pay from the time to which the commission relates in giving rank. This has long been, and is now, the rule of the War Department, to which there is a determination to adhere. I think there should also, if possible, be uniformity in the rules of the two branches of the service.

"I am of opinion, therefore, that it is better for the present to allow the pay back to the period of rank.

"This need not interfere with the General Order of June 9, 1853, applicable to special cases."

ALLOTMENT OF PAY.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *January 2, 1856.*

Allotments.

SEC. 86. *And be it further enacted*, That on and after the 1st day of August,* 1862, there shall be levied, collected, and paid on all salaries of officers, or payments to persons in the civil, military, *naval*, or other employment or service of the United States, including senators and representatives and delegates in Congress, when exceeding the rate of six hundred dollars per annum, a duty of three per centum on the excess above the said six hundred dollars; and it shall be the duty of all *paymasters*, and all *disbursing* officers under the government of the United States, or in the employ thereof, when making any payments to officers and persons, as aforesaid, or upon settling and adjusting the accounts of such officers and persons, to deduct and withhold the aforesaid duty of three per centum, and shall, at the same time make a certificate, stating the name of the officer or person from whom such deduction was made, and the amount thereof, which shall be transmitted to the office of the commissioner of internal revenue, and entered as part of the internal duties; and the pay-roll, receipts, or account of officers or persons paying such duty, as aforesaid, shall be made to exhibit the fact of such payment.

From an "Act to suppress insurrection, punish treason and rebellion, to seize and confiscate the property of rebels, and for other purposes."—Approved July 17, 1862.

SEC. 9. *And be it further enacted*, That all slaves of persons who shall hereafter be engaged in rebellion against the government of the United States, or who shall in any way give aid or comfort thereto, escaping from such persons and taking refuge within the lines of the army; and all slaves captured from such persons, or deserted by them and coming under the control of the government of the United States; and all slaves of such persons found on [or] being within any place occupied by rebel forces and afterwards occupied by forces of the United States, shall be deemed captives of war, and shall be forever free of their servitude, and not again held as slaves.

SEC. 10. *And be it further enacted*, That no slave escaping into any State, Territory, or the District of Columbia, from any other State, shall be delivered up, or in any way impeded or hindered of his liberty, except for crime or some offence against the laws, unless the person claiming said fugitive shall first make oath that the person to whom the labor or service of such fugitive is alleged to be due is his lawful owner, and has not borne arms against the United States in the present rebellion, nor in any way given aid and comfort thereto; and no person engaged in the military or naval service of the United States shall, under any pretence whatever, assume to decide on the validity of the claim of any person to the service or labor of any other person, or surrender up any such person to the claimant, on pain of being dismissed from the service.

* Extended to September 1 by Secretary of the Treasury, as authorized.

An act to provide for the more prompt settlement of the accounts of disbursing officers.

That, from and after the passage of this act, any officer or agent of the United States who shall receive public money which he is not authorized to retain as salary, pay, or emolument, shall render his accounts monthly instead of quarterly as heretofore; and such accounts, with the vouchers necessary to the correct and prompt settlement thereof, shall be rendered direct to the proper accounting officer of the treasury, and be mailed or otherwise forwarded to its proper address within ten days after the expiration of each successive month. And in case of the non-receipt at the treasury of any accounts within a reasonable and proper time thereafter, the officer whose accounts are in default shall be required to furnish satisfactory evidence of having complied with the provisions of this act; and for any default on his part the delinquent officer shall be deemed a defaulter, and be subject to all the penalties prescribed by the sixteenth section of the act of August sixth, eighteen hundred and forty-six, "to provide for the better organization of the treasury, and for the collection, safe-keeping, transfer, and disbursement of the public revenue:" *Provided*, That the Secretary of the Treasury may, if in his opinion the circumstances of the case justify and require it, extend the time hereinbefore prescribed for the rendition of accounts: *And provided further*, That nothing herein contained shall be construed to restrain the heads of any of the departments from requiring such other returns or reports from the officer or agent subject to the control of such heads of departments as the public interest may require.

Approved July 17, 1862.

From "An act to define the pay and emoluments of certain officers of the army, and for other purposes"—Approved July 17, 1862.

SEC. 7. *And be it further enacted*, That * * * no officer of the army or navy of the United States shall be paid mileage except for travel actually performed at his own expense, and in obedience to orders.

SEC. 13. *And be it further enacted*, That all contracts made for, or orders given for, the purchase of goods or supplies by any department of the government shall be promptly reported to Congress by the proper head of such department, if Congress shall at the time be in session, and if not in session, said reports shall be made at the commencement of the next ensuing session.

SEC. 14. *And be it further enacted*, That no contract or order, or any interest therein, shall be transferred by the party or parties to whom such contract or order may be given to any other party or parties, and that any such transfer shall cause the annulment of the contract or order transferred, so far as the United States are concerned: *Provided*, That all rights of action are hereby reserved to the United States for any breach of such contract by the contracting party or parties.

SEC. 15. *And be it further enacted*, That every person who shall furnish supplies of any kind to the army or navy shall be required to mark and distinguish the same with the name or names of the contractors so furnishing said supplies, in such manner as the Secretary of War and the Secretary of the Navy may, respectively, direct, and no supplies of any kind shall be received unless so marked and distinguished.

SEC. 16. *And be it further enacted*, That whenever any contractor for subsistence, clothing, arms, ammunition, munitions of war, and for every description of supplies for the army or navy of the United States shall be found guilty by a court-martial of fraud or wilful neglect of duty, he shall be punished by fine, imprisonment, or such other punishment as the court-martial shall adjudge; and any person who shall contract to furnish supplies of any kind or description for the army or navy he shall be deemed and taken as a part of the land or naval forces of the United States for which he shall contract to furnish said supplies, and be subject to the rules and regulations for the government of the land and naval forces of the United States.

SEC. 17. *And be it further enacted*, That the President of the United States be, and hereby is, authorized and requested to dismiss and discharge from the military service, either in the army, navy, marine corps, or volunteer force in the United States service, any officer for any cause which, in his judgment, either renders such officer unsuitable for, or whose dismissal would promote, the public service.

An act in relation to the letters of sailors and marines in the service of the United States..

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the provisions of the act of July twenty-second, eighteen hundred and sixty-one, authorizing soldiers to send letters through the mails of the United States without pre-payment of postage, is hereby extended to the sailors and marines in the actual service of the United States, under such regulations as the Post Office Department shall provide, the postage thereon to be paid by the recipients.

Approved January 21, 1862.

[The following are the regulations of the Post Office Department governing the transmission of letters of sailors and marines.]

POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT,
Appointment Office, February 8, 1862.

Under the act of Congress, approved January 21, 1862, sailors and marines in the actual service of the United States have the same privilege with soldiers of sending letters without pre-payment of postage.

All postmasters are instructed to mail without pre-payment of postage all such letters when certified as follows: The envelope must bear the certificate "Naval Letter," signed by the commanding officer or lieutenant on board the vessel, with the name of the vessel. Thus:

This privilege does not extend to commissioned officers.

All such certified letters must be rated with postage at the mailing office, to be collected at the office of delivery. Letters addressed to such sailors and marines must be prepaid as before.
