TOWN WARRANT STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN OF LEE

To the citizens of the Town of Lee, County of Strafford (S.S.), State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Lee Town Hall on Tuesday the seventh day of March 1972, to act on the following subjects:

(Polls will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.)

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote the changes in the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Lee Planning Board.
- 3. "To take the sense of the qualified voters whether the amendment of the Constitution proposed by the 1971 session of the General Court shall be approved."

(Articles 4-22 will be taken up at the Mast Way School on Wednesday the eighth day of March at eight o'clock in the evening.)

- 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year as may be necessary for General Government, including Town officers salaries and expenses, election and registration, Town buildings; for Health, Vital Statistics, Public Library, Employees' Retirement and Social Security, Insurance, Planning and Zoning, town reports, Recreation, interest on temporary loans, cemeteries, County tax, dog damage, legal expenses, Building Inspectors expenses, Town poor, Conservation Commission, Police Department, Fire Department, Highway Department and Town Dump.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to be deposited with the Trustees of the Trust Funds as Capital Reserve for equipment for the Fire Department.
 - 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appro-

priate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) as Capital Reserve for meeting expenses attendant to the State Law banning open dump burning.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred eighteen dollars and forty two cents (\$618.42) for construction of Class V Highways under the provision of TRA so-called. The State will contribute the sum of four thousand one hundred twenty-two dollars and seventy-seven cents (\$4,122.77)
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eighteen thousand nine hundred dollars (\$18,-900.00) for purchase of a new H5OC Diesel Tractor Loader for the Highway Department. (This figure is based on the difference between the purchase price of \$24,365.00 and the allowance of \$5,465.00 for the presently owned machine.)
- 9. (On petition of John E. Randall and nine other registered voters of the Town) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000.00) for one full time man, for Hiring of Special Officers, Maintenance of equipment including new equipment. Federally Funded in part under the Emergency Employment Act of 1970.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to have the Town revalued and appropriate the sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000.00) to cover the cost of same.
- 11. (On petition of Gerald Ouellette and nine other registered voters of the Town) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) to help defray the expenses of operation of the Beech Hill Cooperative Recreation Area for the year 1972, on the condtion that said amount be deemed payable only if matched by an equal appropriaton from Madbury, and an appropriaton of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) from Durham.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight hundred dollars (\$800.00) for the Durham Ambulance Corps.

- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred twenty five dollars (\$725.00) for the Oyster River Home Health Association.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00 for the Seacoast Regional Development Association.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred fifty dollars (\$650.00) for the Strafford Guidance Center, Inc.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight hundred fifty dollars (\$850.00) for the Strafford Regional Planning Commission.
- 17. (On petition of Richard Weyrick and nine other registered voters of the Town) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00) to cover expenses of planting trees on five (5) acres and performing timber stand improvements of five (5) acres of Town forest lands, provided that cost-share funds will be made available through the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.
- 18. (On petition of Gail Sanborn and nine other registered voters of the Town) To see if the Town will vote to designate and maintain a Scenic Road, in conformance with the provision of S.B. 138 (RSA 253 Amended to include Cartland Road from the intersection with Mill Pond Road to the intersection with Fox Garrison Road, thence Demerritt Avenue to its intersection with Route 125, thence High Road to the Epping Line.
- 19. (On petition of Sally W. Barney and nine other registered voters of the Town.) Request that in accordance with RSA 253 Amended the Town vote to declare Cartland Road a Scenic Road.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired from tax sales.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

22. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE FIRE CHIEF

I am happy to submit this, my first annual report. The department responded to 37 calls for assistance in 1971. Most were stopped quickly or corrected so no fire resulted. Damage to buildings and contents was set at \$5,255.00. The breakdown is as follows:

The number of fire permits issued is down slightly this year from 225 in 1970 to 175 in 1971. I hope this doesn't mean you have been burning without permits. See the forestry report elsewhere for information. Due to recent air pollution laws we are not allowed to issue permits for wire insulation, car bodies, tires, rubbish in the open, building materials, etc., etc. Please do not ask for permits for these items. Haul everything possible to your town dump.

It is interesting to note that 12 of the miscellaneous calls were to assist the Durham Ambulance Corps with manpower and/or radio dispatching and to assist the Police at accidents. This is a big increase over past years. I believe both of these units need and deserve more volunteers from Lee. Probably these calls will continue to increase. If our Fire Department fails to expand to fill this need then Durham, Lee and Madbury will need a rescue squad, one that can respond quickly with specialized tools. At present the Fire Department has none of these tools and no training in this area.

Four of the structural calls were for gas stoves that malfunctioned. Let's all get those appliances serviced more regularly! The results of neglect could be devastating.

The needs of the department are many and I shall divide them into 1. Manpower; 2. Equipment, short range; and 3. Equipment, long range.

On manpower, I am pleased with the numbers and quality of men we have gained in the past few years. However,

the men all need more intensive training. I have tried unsuccessfully, save for one or two men, to get them to attend fire schools available to us twice each year. Our town as a whole lacks the insight and perspective to see how far we are behind fire departments in other parts of the country and even in our own Mutual Aid System. Perhaps our Fire Department has done too good a job at prevention in the past which yields this apathy. Our training program for this year calls for bringing N.H. Fire Service Instructors right into Lee to teach. We still lack men daytimes. This I fear will never be solved unless we get some industry to keep men at home daytimes. Lacking that, we would have to hire full time firemen to cover the station from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m.!

Our more immediate needs for equipment are: 1. a better alarm system; and 2. light rescue equipment. Our red network system works excellently, but in the fire service we should never get caught with all our eggs in one basket. If the telephone system failed we could not alert a single fireman! We plan to expand the red network immediately to alert a few men at their place of work. There are two other methods of alerting firemen which we should have. One is by tone activated monitor radio receivers placed in each fireman's home, car, or place of business. The other is by a louder alarm on top of the fire house. I hope to have definite recommendations for the town on these latter two next year.

At present we have no tools to perform light rescue and extrication of victims of accidents. However, many of these items can be homemade by handymen or donated or purchased for not very much money. Our training this year will emphasize light rescue and as we learn more we plan to add to these smaller items. If experience indicates, we will recommend to the town larger items, perhaps next year.

Long range needs for equipment are another new fire truck to replace our 1947 model by 1975. If this new truck is a class A pumper, then and only then can we hope to get our Fire Department recognized by the N.H. Board of Fire Underwriters. This step would lower the fire insurance premiums on many homes in Lee.

Also needed is a larger fire house. The present one is filled to capacity with shelves on every wall and equipment even hanging from the ceiling. We have no meeting room to hold training classes in. It is necessary to leave one or more trucks outside to hold a meeting. This is bad in the winter months.

I would like to get better acquainted with all of you townfolk. I would especially like to know the location and condition of all woods roads and old logging roads that lead into the back areas of your property. It is critical to know these when you are trying to get a fire truck into a woods fire.

There is a new item in the budget called "Labor." This is really only a token sum of \$3.00 per man to fulfill a legal requirement so that the men will be covered by the town's Workmen's Compansation policy.

Donations received by the department this year were \$1,015.00 cash and 250 feet of 1½" fire hose.

I have called the Directors of the Fire Department together many more times this year and we submitted a detailed report to the Selectmen, much of which is in this report. I also met several times with the Planning Board.

I wish to thank the town officers, firemen, red network ladies, and all of you who cooperated with the department and thus made may job easier.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

LEST WE FORGET — IT CAN HAPPEN HERE

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalant on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds but 25 years ago this fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of Northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellar-holes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947 nothing could stop the wind driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire, but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all timse can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

- Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.
- 2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.

- 3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them *dead out* when leaving.
- 4. Most Important instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year — 1971 was a favorable year for the control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some towns. We thank those who remembered and ask others to heed Smokey's message.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

I wish more of you would come to the Lee Library to see what your Library can do for you. The Library is affiliated with the New Hampshire State Library. This means we can borrow from them most books requested by you. We can also borrow them through Interlibrary Loan. If the library does not have the books needed by your children for school assignments, we can borrow them through these two sources. We can also borrow records and films. As you will see by the following figures, the Library was busier this past year, than the previous year.

The total circulaltion for 1971 was 5,358 books, an increase of 347; 77 magazines, 80 records and 5 films. No record was kept in 1970 of magazines or records borrowed and this is the first year we borrowed films. We had 980 adult borrowers, an increase of 193; and 613 children borrowers, a decrease of 162 due to only 1 Story Hour this year. We borrowed 6,170 books from the Bookmobile, an increase of 3,408 volumes, during their 4 visits this past year. 128 books were borrowed by mail from the N.H. State Library. 87 of these were for school assignments or home study.

We bought 196 books with Library and Memorial gift money and had 55 books donated to us. We purchased a complete set of Harvard Classics. We sponsored 8 film showings for children of Mast Way Scrool, had 1 Story Hour, and held the 2nd Annual Art Exhibit during National Library Week.

We honor the Statewide Library Card. We may give this card to any patron in good standing, that is; they must be an active borrower for at least three months.

We wish to thank all donors of gift books and monies, Mrs. Mary A. Booth for the light in the vestibule, and the Grand-children of Mrs. Booth for their monetary gift. The Florence Caldwell Memorial Fund was used for the shelving. The Florence Menter Memorial Fund and the Lee Women's Club monies were used to purchase books.

Because zoning ordinances cannot be drawn in sufficient detail to cover all possible contingencies, the law requires that there be a Board of Adjustment to hear appeals from strict enforcement of the zoning ordinance. The Board operates as a semi-judicial body, with its powers limited by law. It may grant "exceptions" only to the extent provided in the ordinance. It may grant "variances" from the strict letter of the ordinance but within the spirit of the ordinance. It may reverse a ruling by an administratative agency (building inspector, selectmen) if it finds the ruling unreasonable. The Board does not have authority to change the zoning ordinance. It does not have enforcement authority.

BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

Before reaching a decision, it must conduct a public hearing. It must reach its decision on the basis of evidence and

not on a vote of those attending a hearing. Its decisions may be appealed to the State Superior Court. The Lee zoning ordinance requires the Board to give considerable weight to the wishes of "adjacent" land owners. Black's *Law Dictionary* defines adjacent as: "Lying near or close to . . . neighboring . . . implies that the two objects are not widely separated, though they may not actually touch. A word of flexible meaning, depending upon context and subject matter."

To save the Town money, on September 28, 1971 the Board changed its by-laws to eliminate advertising hearings in a newspaper. Notices are posted at Wenant's Store, Circle Lee Market, and the Town Hall. Those known to be involved are notified by mail. Complete records of the Board's activities are kept by the clerk, Wallace Dennis.

During 1971 the Board acted on 10 appeals: 5 exceptions, 4 variances, and one appeal from a decision of the selectmen. The decisions were: January 25, Roland Levesque, for an exception to sell antiques in a barn on Route 155, granted with limitations; May 11, William Morrison, for reversal of a decision by the Selectmen requiring him to discontinue his snow mobile business on Bennett Road, denied; May 11. Lone Pine Camping Association, for an exception to allow a trailer camp on Route 152, denied; June 22, Leonard Wenant, for a variance to allow an addition to his store at Lee Hill, granted: July 6, Albert Harvey, Jr., for an exception to allow continuation of his auto junk vard on Lee Hook Road, denied; July 6, John Fenn, for a variance to allow substitution of a larger mobile home for one in use on Wheelwright Pond, granted; September 7, James Banks, for an exception to conduct an engineering consulting business at his home on Stepping Stone Road, granted with limitations; September 7, Roland Cathcart, for an exception to allow expansion of his mobile home park on Route 155, granted; October 12, Irene Renzi, for a variance to allow building a residence on Route 155 on a lot 36 feet short of the required 200 foot frontage but with more than the required 40,000 square foot area, granted; October 26, Louise Fitzgibbon, for a variance to allow substitution of a larger mobile home for one already in use on Camp Ground Road, granted.

REPORT OF THE LEE CONSERVATION COMMISSION FOR 1971

The Lee Conservation commission meets the first Tuesday of every month. Any interested townspeople are welcome to attend.

The first phase of the Nature Trail, located thru the woods behind the Mast Way School, has been completed. The members of the commission spent many afternoons during the spring and summer clearing brush, laying out the trail, setting marker posts and identifying plants. A preliminary guide was written up and given to the school last fall. We also arranged a session for instructing the teachers on the use of the trail. There is more to be done in the line of identification for wildlife and soil types and inter-relationships of plants and animals this coming year.

With the help of the selectmen and Boy Scout leader George Durepo, we arranged to have a small building set up at the dump as a paper recycling center. This has meant a savings to the town in lessened amounts of paper to be disposed of and results in a source of income for the Boy Scouts. We are hoping that by next year we will have outlets for recycling cans and bottles as well.

We gave a half scholarship once again to enable a Lee youngster to go to Conservation Camp. This scholarship will be available again this year. We also offered half expenses to a Conservation Commission member to attend the Teachers Conservation Camp.

In November the Lee Conservation Commission was host to the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commission. Over 120 people attended the meeting at the Mast Way School, visited the Lee Bog and the Nature Trail and enjoyed a fine roast beef dinner at the Lee Grange before a bus trip to the coastal salt marshes.

We also sponsored tree improvement work on the Town Forest.

REPORT OF THE LEE RECREATION COMMISSION FOR 1971

The Lee Recreation Commission this past year has worked towards the improvement of the Town Park and looked into other areas in town for further recreation purposes.

We meet on the first Thursday of each month and would welcome any interested townspeople to attend our meetings by contacting the chairman to learn the time and place of the meeting.

The Multi-purpose Recreation Facility is well underway. It's use as a skating rink is proving successful; and many of the townfolk, of all ages, are enjoying skating this winter. The summer use phase will be prepared as soon as the weather permits. A coat of finish asphalt will be layed on the existing base, and the lines and net will be installed, making the court ready for use by early June.

The Recreation Commission wishes to take this opportunity to extend their sincere thanks to all who have worked so hard to make the skating rink a success.

Beech Hill Cooperative Recreation Area, supported by Lee, Madbury, Durham and UNH, is the only known cooperative venture of its kind between towns in New Hampshire. The long-range plans for it include forms of recreation for all seasons.

In 1970-71, a ski-slope, with rope tow, was developed and opened for use by residents of the three towns and UNH community. In the summer of 1971 a building was donated by the University, was taken down, moved to the ski hill, and is in the process of being re-built on the site for use as a "warming lodge". Although nearly all of the work at the area has been volunteer, it is necessary to hire two operators when the tow is in use. The largest expense is the \$1,000.00 per year insurance bill, required by law to be carried.

Management of the area is handled by an Executive Committee formed by members of the Recreation Commissions in the three towns.

LEE HISTORICAL SOCIETY Annual Report 1971

The idea of starting an historical society was first discussed during Lee's bicentennial celebration in 1966. But is was not until October 1970 that any action was taken. At that time a public meeting was called at the Town Hall with 35 interested people attending. Miss Alice Dudley presided as chairman *pro tem*. and the following steering committee members were appointed to get the organization under way: Mrs. Lloyd Stevens, chairman; Mrs. George Nugent, Mrs. Melvin Jenkins, Mrs. Lawrence Hill, Harry Bradshaw, Elmer Fogg, Jr., and Mrs. Richard Ingersoll. After several meetings the steering committee called the first general meeting of the Lee Historical Society at Town Hall February 4, 1971. A nominating committee was appointed. It was decided to have just four meetings a year with the annual meeting being held the first Thursday of April.

The first official meeting of the Lee Historical Society was held April 1, 1971 and the following officers were elected: Mrs. Lloyd Stevens, president; Elmer Fogg, Jr., vice-president; Mrs. Richard Ingersoll, recording secretary; Mrs. Maurice Hatch, corresponding secretary; Mrs. William Shea, treasurer; George Bennett and Mrs. Derek Seeley, directors for one year; Winston Caldwell and Dr. Samuel Taylor, directors for two years; Mrs. Allen Storms, publicity; Mrs. Peter Dodge was appointed chairman of the Cemetery and Historic Sites Committee.

At the February meeting Gary Magnuson of Durham showed Indian artifacts he had dug up at Wadleigh's Falls Island and which he volunteered to donate to the Lee Historical Society Museum. In April William Jones, Professor of Hisitory at UNH, spoke on archaeology, and in June Mr. G. P. Bremer of Brentwood spoke on antiques.

During the spring, summer and autumn months Mrs. Dodge and her committee of junior members cleared overgrown family burial places and a total of 285 headstone inscriptions from 33 cemeteries have been so far recorded.

At the September meeting Edwin Dethlefsen, Professor of Anthropology at Franklin Pierce College, projected slides and analyzed the results of the summer's archaeological digging in Lee, one of the most important discoveries in colonial demography of New England.

As of now there are 70 charter members; ten of these have life memberships.

Any person interested in joining the Lee Historical Society is cordially invited to attend the annual meeting on April 6, 1972.

LEE FIRE DEPARTMENT AUXILIARY REPORT

The Lee Fire Department Auxiliary, now in its 18th year, is an organization dedicated to supporting the Lee Fire Department. All women residents of the town are encouraged to join the Auxiliary and to attend its meetings held the second Monday of each month.

Numerous projects in the interest of the community are undertaken each year. Some of those for 1971 were: In February, a coffee, held at the Mast Way School, where school board members and voters had a chance to discuss the merits of the proposed building sites.

The Community Booklet — a service listing town officials organizations and businesses of the town — free to the residents of Lee.

The Lee Swim School — held each summer at Wheel-wright Pond where over one hundred children receive instructions in a Red Cross accredited program. Including Junior and Senior Life Saving.

The updating of the fire map continues as does the work on numbering all the buildings in town. It is hoped that each building will have its own permanent number attached and corresponding number recorded on the map to facilitate more prompt action by the Fire Department.

The Auxiliairy's most time consuming, but enjoyable, project is its annual "Night of Music and Madness" Show presented at the Cow Palace each May. The enthusisatic response by townspeople to these shows has enabled the Auxiliary to provide the Fire Department with \$1,000.00 to equip the newly acquired fire truck.

The 1971 Lee Fire Department Auxiliary officers and members would like to publicly thank the many people who have generously donated their time and talents towards the successful completion of our projects. Thank you one and all.

STRAFFORD REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION What Has It Done?

The Strafford Regional Planning Commission was organize din April 1968. Less than a year later it received interim certification from the Department of Housing and Urban Development, making member communities eligible for HUD grants for water and sewer facilities, and for a special bonus of 10% above the normal grants from the Environmental Protection Agency.

Each of the three original members (Dover, Rollinsford and Somersworth) has received grants after review and approval of their applications by the Commission. Two of the newer members (Durham and Newmarket) have received grants or have pending applications for bonus grants or both.

The Environmental Protection Agency has announced that not later than July 1, 1973 its requirements will be fully coordinated with those of HUD, so certification will be required for initial grants from that agency also.

In the meantime, the Commission was designated November 3, 1971 by Governor Peterson as an A-95 Review Agency, which means that from that date on *all* local applications for federal funds have been and will be referred to SRPC for comment and recommendation, including priority in relation to other applications for limited funds.

Retaining the HUD certification has involved a variety of complications as new requirements went into effect, and twice the Commission has been "decertified" without even being notified. As of October 1, 1971 every planning com-

mission in New Hampshire and most of those throughout New England had certifications cancelled as more new requirements became effective.

The Strafford Commission had already, however, with the aid of consultants prepared a 70-page water and sewer planning program, 30-page "Overall Program Design" including tentative work programs for the ensuing five years, and a 25-page "Initial Housing Element." These documents constitute not only the major part of the requirements for continuing HUD certification, but guidelines for the Commission's further efforts to help the cities and towns in the Region to preserve and enhance desirable features in the total environment, and include plans for pollution abatement, better housing, solid waste disposal, land use and assistance to local communities in matters of zoning, transportation and others. With a modest amount of work, already completed or under way, to bring some of these up to date, it is expected that renewed certification will be received in the fairly near future. The Strafford Region appears to be farther along toward this goal than any other in the State. Unfortunately, however, repeated efforts to obtain a specific list of the things which need to be done have been unavailing, although it has been repeatedly promised.

What It Is Doing Now

Another HUD requirement was that SRPC should have a full-time executive director. Charles E. Noyes started in that capacity March 1, 1971, and his work, together with establishment of a regular office and additional funds for consultants, have enabled the Commission to greatly expand its activities.

Following conversations with local planning boards which revealed that solid waste disposal was of prime concern to almost all of them, the Commission made that its No. 1 project for the current year.

Last summer SRPC hired with its own funds a UNH graduate student as a summer intern. He completed a survey of all of the solid waste disposal sites now being used in the Region, and prepared an excellent detailed report show-

ing type of disposal (burning dump, covered dump, sanitary landfill or incinerator), approximate annual cost and cost per ton, nearness to streams or watersheds, equipment used, etc., for each city and town. Copies were sent to all mayors and chairmen of Boards of Selectmen. It showed that to comply with State laws and federal standards, every city and town which has a dump (including Durham which dumps incinerator residue) will have to make changes by July 1, 1975.

At the same time, about half of a \$13,000 planning grant promised by HUD through the Office of State Planning was allocated to engage a consulting firm to make further studies and recommendations for handling solid waste disposal on a regional basis. The contract — meant to cover the current fiscal year — was not finally approved until early October, and the consultants have only begun to show results. This contract requires specifically that by next spring they indicate possible sites throughout the Region, and develop a presentation which can be shown to local officials, giving potential costs, recommended disposal method, optimum number of sites, transfer points and transportation costs, and other pertinent information.

Most of the rest of the HUD planning funds are being used to pay a consulting firm for a report on Open Space. This again is not only a HUD requirement but should help to establish goals and policies for open space preservation before more of it is pre-empted for undesirable uses.

Along with these specific projects, SRPC is devoting continuous attention to such matters as water supply, industrial development, zoning and transportation including the projected East-West Highway.

To be sure that local opinions are taken into consideration, the Commission has established a Citizens Advisory Council of representative individuals who are not public officials. They are invited to all meetings, to comment on any matter which is or should be before the Commission, and will be specifically consulted about any project or recommendation affecting their individual communities.

SRPC will also, on specific request and to the extent of

its resources, assist local communities with any planning problem.

Plans for the Future

If the recommendations for a regional approach to solid waste disposal generate sufficient interest and support, SRPC will re-engage consultants next year to develop more specific plans and recommendations with respect to number and location of sites and transfer points, economic and political feasibility. This may include physical engineering work such as test borings.

Study of open space and land use is expected to continue, but with greater emphasis on services to local communities in matters of zoning and other projects which will protect and enhance the environmental quality of the Region as a whole. There will also be more emphasis on housing and industrial development.

In all of its activities, however, SRPC will continue to recognize that its function is to assist and help coordinate the efforts of city and town officials, never to present them with ready-made plans which must be adopted or rejected out of hand, and never to try to force them to accept something they don't want.

To put it briefly, the Commission believes that a plan which fails to win public support isn't worth the paper it's written on.

The Strafford Guidance Center is a community mental health agency with offices in Dover. It is accredited under the State Community Mental Health Centers Act, RSA 126:B, and is qualified to receive state and local funds from both public and private sources.

The services of the Strafford Guidance Center are available to all residents of Strafford County without regard to ability to pay. Last year members of the Guidance Center Staff treated a total of 752 patients, people of all ages, only a small percentage of whom were able to pay the Center the full value of services rendered. Attached is a chart indicating the extent of patient use in your community in the last year.

The Guidance Center exists to provide a needed public service. To provide that service it needs public support. The total operating budget last year was \$122,930.00. The Guidance Center Finance Committee anticipated operating costs of \$131,080.00 in the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1972. This figure reflects only the anticipated increase in salaries and operating expenses to maintain present programs. Of this amount \$31,250.00 must be raised locally from public and private sources in the County.

The Guidance Center Finance Committee is requesting all towns and cities in the Strafford County to share on a proportionate basis the burden of meeting operating costs at the Center during the next year. You will find attached a sheet showing the population in your community, the proportion it bears to other communities and the entire population in Strafford County. Shown also is the amount based on population in your community that the Guidance Center will need if it is to meet its operating expenses in the next year.

To meet anticipated operating costs in the coming year, the undersigned request that the following amount be included as an appropriation for the Strafford Guidance Center in the town budget for the present year: \$650.00.

The staff and members of the board of Directors of the Guidance Center will be pleased to meet with you at any time to provide you with whatever information you may require with regard to this request.
