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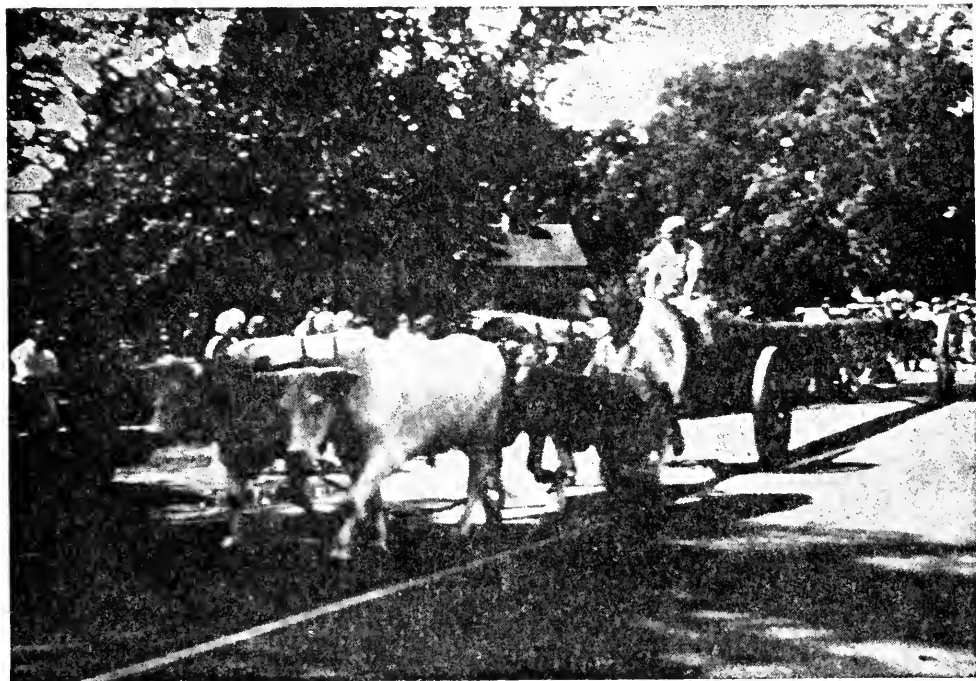

MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING

MARCH 4, 1975

At 10 A.M. Moderator Everett Sackett opened the meeting by reading the first three articles of the warrant. Mr. Wellington moved that the polls close at 7:00 P.M. seconded by Mr. Jenkins, the motion was carried. Mr. Sackett then declared the polls to be opened. Total Ballots cast, 382, the results were as follows:

Article 3. (Empowering the Planning Board under RSA 36:10a) Yes, 166, No, 173

Following the counting of ballots, the Moderator administered the oath of office to Harry C. Bradshaw, Selectman, William Boyd, Jr., Selectman, Alice E. Dudley, Treasurer and Ethel H. Hinds, Town Clerk. Mr. Burke moved that the meeting be recessed until 7:30 at the Mastway School, Wednesday evening. Seconded by Mr. Nugent, the motion was carried.

TOWN MEETING RECONVENED

MARCH 5, 1975

At 7:30 Moderator Everett Sackett reopened the meeting by announcing the results of Tuesday's balloting, and introducing all the elected officers who were present. Mrs. Bennett, retiring after 30 years of service to the Town as Tax Collector, was presented with 31 roses and received a standing ovation.

Article 4. Mr. Wellington moved that Article 11 and 12 be withdrawn at this time. Seconded by Mr. St. Jean. Mr.

Wellington explained the Legislature has passed Senate Bill #60, which removed penalties against Towns not using alternatives to open dump burning prior to July, 1975, and that the deadline has been extended to July 1, 1976. There are several other bills pending, one of which would exempt Towns of less than 2500 people, and it was recommended that small Towns delay acting until these decisions have been reached. Mr. Federer objected to delaying action of these two articles, as the smoke is a very real problem to those who live in the vicinity of the dump. The motion to withdraw Article 11, authorizing the Selectmen to negotiate, and/or contract for residential trash and garbage removal, and Article 12, to see what sum of money to raise and appropriate for removal of residential trash and garbage was carried.

Mr. Keniston asked that each item in this article be acted upon separately. Mr. Wellington read the Town Charges:

\$7,860.00 Town Officers' Salaries —

3,500.00 Town Officers' Expenses —

Mr. Keniston moved this amount be reduced to \$3,000.00. Seconded by Mr. Menter. Mr. Wellington explained some of the increases. Postage for mailing inventories, as required by the Tax Commission, computer costs for tax bills on 902 parcels of property, and in general, costs of all supplies increasing. The Chair was in doubt with the voice vote to reduce this item to \$3,000.00, and called for a standing vote. Yes, 50, No, 130, the motion was defeated.

2,100 Election and Registration Expenses

Mrs. St. Jean asked for clarification of costs of three dinners by the Grange. Miss Dudley explained the Grange serves dinner to 13-15 election officials and Town officers at a cost of \$40.00. Suppers were also served at the three 1974 elections. Mr. Keniston moved that these expenses be cut to \$1,000.00 where there are no fall elections this year. Seconded by Mr. Menter. Mr. Wellington explained it cost

\$1,507.00 for Town Reports this year. Move to cut this item to \$1,000.00 was defeated.

1,500.00 Legal Expenses

Mr. Wellington explained the increase in this item was due primarily to violations to Zoning and Building Ordinances, and the legal expenses incurred in enforcing them.

3,000.00 Town Hall and Other Town Buildings —

5,900.00 Employees Retirement and Social Security

Mr. Wellington explained the increase in this item. The Racetrack hires Town Police and Firemen. The Town pays their salary, but is reimbursed by the Racetrack, plus 10%. The track is no longer covered by NASCAR insurance, and they do not carry Workmen's Compensation. Our men are being protected under the Town of Lee, and the 10% extra covers this expense. Mr. St. Jean asked was this FICA in addition to the Police Budget of \$20,000.00. Miss Dudley explained the Town must match all FICA withheld from all salaries, (5.85%), and Retirement, (7%).

525.00 Building Inspector's Salary and Expenses

Mr. Keniston wondered when the Town voted to give the Building Inspector a salary. He gets half of the building permit fees. This information was not found. Mr. Keniston moved that this amount be reduced to \$100.00, plus half of the permit fees. Seconded by Mr. Stoakes. Mr. Wellington explained the duties and responsibilities of the Lee Building Inspector. Mr. Libby said he had to turn down more permits than he issues, and doesn't get paid for those. Move to reduce this amount was defeated.

20,000.00 Police Department —

Mrs. St. Jean was concerned about the Social Security, Retirement and Insurance being in addition to the \$20,000.00 budgeted. Miss Dudley and Mr. Keniston explained that Social Security is withheld from officers' salaries, and an equal amount must be paid by the Town.

Mr. Burke explained that a full time Police Officer must come under a Retirement system, deducted from salary, and is not eligible for Social Security. A Medical Insurance is paid by the Town for him. Mr. Cathcart moved to change the item so that \$5,000.00 would be taken from Revenue Sharing Funds and applied to the Police Budget, the balance of \$15,000.00 to be raised by taxes. There was discussion on the legality of this move, and the Selectmen said it was acceptable for Safety, Libraries, etc. However they proposed to apply the Revenue Sharing Funds under Article 15 to specific items of the Town Charges. Mr. Cathcart withdrew his motion.

\$9,702.00 Fire Department —

\$50.00 Conservation Commission —

Mr. Federer explained that most of this \$50.00 was used as a partial scholarship to send a teacher from the Mastway School to a Conservation Camp for one week during the summer, and part to maintain membership in the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissioners.

\$4,000.00 Insurance —

\$1,550.00 Planning and Zoning —

In explaining the increased cost of this item, the Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire say that the Planning Board may change the Subdivision Regulations by holding two public hearings and then publish their final decisions in a newspaper in general circulation of the area. Printed in their entirety would take one whole page of Fosters, at a cost of \$800.00. These regulation changes do not have to be voted upon by the Town.

\$650.00 Dog Care and Salary —

\$200.00 Health Officer

This includes salary and expenses.

\$30.00 Vital Statistics —

\$2,500.00 Town Dump Maintenance
\$18,000.00 Highways and Bridges
(Summer and Winter) —

Mrs. Curtis complimented Mr. Stevens on his work as Road Agent, and on the fine condition he keeps our roads. There was unanimous agreement.

\$3,000.00 General Highway Expenses —
\$3,000.00 Library —
**\$300.00 Town Poor —
**\$700.00 Old Age Assistance

Mr. Wellington moved that the sums of \$300.00 and \$700.00 be taken from unexpended balances of \$1,670.59, to carry items of Town Poor and Old Age Assistance. Seconded by Mr. Dennis, this motion was carried.

\$500.00 Recreation —

There was a short explanation of the work done. Painting tables, mowing, etc.

\$500.00 Cemeteries —

Mr. Walden explained they have discovered a number of graves that do not have perpetual care. These are now being tended, and mowing costs more.

\$2,000.00 Interest on Temporary Loans —
\$24,000.00 County Tax —

Mr. Wellington explained they have to more or less guess what this amount will be. In this instance he is afraid the figure is too low after attending their Budget hearing.

\$115,067.00
** 1,000.00 from unexpended balances

\$114,067.00

Mr. Keniston moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$114,067.00 for Town Charges and General Government. Seconded by Mr. Swift, this motion was carried.

Mr. Wellington asked that Article 15 be brought forward at this time.

Article 15. Mr. Wellington moved that the Town vote to distribute their Revenue Sharing funds to reduce specific Budget Items in Article 4 as follows: (\$9,236.96)

Seconded by Mr. Nugent, the motion was carried.

Article 5. Mr. Burke moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 for another full time police officer. Seconded by Mr. MacLean. This article was discussed in great detail. Mr. Burke was hired originally to work a 40 hour week, be on call six days of the week, and guard the school crossing. The seventh was covered by part time officers. The following year he asked for a budget increase to hire an officer for school crossing duty, and that he be permitted to work a 40 hour week and be on call five days. He ran into problems trying to cover the other two days in the week, and this explains the large number of special officers. Mr. Stetson has been training under the Public Employment Fund and working in the Lee Police Department since October 1st, 1974. Manpower has reimbursed the Town for his salary, but this runs out the first of April. The \$6,500.00 requested under this article would cover his salary from April 1 through December, 1975. Mr. Burke explained the need for another full time police officer, as

the town has grown rapidly these past few years, with a corresponding work load. He is unable to go back to the 40 hour week and being on call five days due to the Wage and Hour Act. Mr. Swanson addressed the meeting, explaining the Federal Labor Standards act, 1938; amended December 20, 1974. Any Town hiring five or more police officers must come under the Wage and Hour Act. There is no distinction between part time and full time. This applies to appointed Fire Officials also, but not to any elected officer. Under the modified plan, everything over 60 hours per week must be paid time and a half by law. However, this act is under a temporary restraining order. After another long discussion, Mr. Menter moved to table this article. Move to table was defeated. Mrs. St. Jean brought out that if the Lee Police force consisted of four or less men, the F.L.S.A. would not apply, and the Town could use the State Police more. Mr. Cathcart moved to amend that we eliminate the \$6,500.00 but to hire a second police officer out of the \$20,000.00 police budget. Seconded by Mr. Ouellette, move to amend was defeated. The original motion to raise \$6,500.00 for another full time police officer was voted upon. The Chair was in doubt with the voice vote, and called for a standing vote. Yes, 93, No, 91, the floor called for a ballot vote. Results of balloting: 215 ballots cast. Yes, 103, No, 112, this article was defeated.

Article 6. Mr. Saulnier moved that we do not purchase a new police cruiser this year. Seconded by Mr. St. Jean, and with very little discussion, this motion was carried.

Article 7. Mr. Main moved that the sum of \$39,386.00 be raised and appropriated for the construction of a new fire station. Seconded by Mr. Barney. Mr. Miner explained this would be a four bay building, constructed of cement blocks and wood, and to be located on land granted the Fire Department at the 1974 Town Meeting under Article 20A. During discussion it was brought out that the Fire Department would clear the land, and excavation would come out

of this sum. No sewer system has been provided for at present. Mr. Cathcart moved to amend that we make this a Bond Issue, \$10,000.00 per year over a four year period. Seconded by Mr. Walden. Mr. Chadbourn spoke of the FHA as having available funds at lower interest rates. Mr. Hatch explained that Lee now has a Recognized Fire Department, and residents living within a three road-mile radius of the fire station are entitled to a rebate on their fire insurance this year and a reduction in rates for next year. He spoke in favor of a new building. Bonding requires a 2/3 majority; borrowing by tax anticipation notes, serial notes or through the FHA requires a simple majority. On the motion to ~~amend~~, the Chair was in doubt with the voice vote and called for a standing vote. Yes, 47, No, 123, the motion to amend was lost. Mr. Bliss spoke of a (considered) second ambulance for the Durham Ambulance Corp being housed in the new fire station. The original motion to raise and appropriate the the sum of \$39,386.00 for construction of a new fire station was carried.

Article 8. Mr. Wellington moved that this article be withdrawn, Seconded by Mrs. St. Jean and with no discussion, motion to withdraw Article was carried. (This Article dealt with raising money for a Capital Reserve Fund for the new fire station.)

Article 9. Mr. Jenkins moved that the sum of \$5,000.00 be raised and deposited with the Trustees of Trust Funds as Capital Reserve for Fire Department equipment. Seconded by Mr. Stoakes. It was disclosed that all funds have been withdrawn, with the exception of \$34.00 in interest. There was discussion on the need of raising this money this year. That was explained as building up the Fund for future expenditures or replacements. The Chair was in doubt with the voice vote, and called for a standing vote. Yes, 71, No, 35, this motion was carried.

Article 10. Mr. Bradshaw moved that the Town raise

the sum of \$10,000.00 to be deposited with Trustees of Trust Funds as Capital Reserve for meeting expenses attendant with RSA 128:78-94, banning open dump burning. Seconded by Mr. St. Jean. Since we have a one year reprieve on the dump problem, some thought we should skip this year's appropriation, particularly where there is presently over \$38,000.00 in the Fund. Others thought we might be facing huge sums to solve problems perhaps next year, and a little put aside each year is prudent. Again, alternatives to our present system were explained; regional incinerator, private truckers ,etc. The motion was brought to a vote and carried.

Article 11. (Withdrawn under Article 4.)

Article 12. (Withdrawn under Article 4.)

Article 13. Mr. Bradshaw moved that the sum of \$622.38 be raised and appropriated for construction of Class V Highways under the provisions of TRA so-called. The State will contribute the sum of \$4,149.77. Seconded by Mr. Burke, and with no discussion, this motion was carried.

Article 14. Mrs. Jenkins moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Lee Historical Society. Seconded by Mr. Allan. Mrs. Jenkins explained this money will be used for the Bicentennial Celebration, and there are supposed to be up to \$1,000.00 in matching funds available. There are three divisions in the Celebration. Heritage (dealing with our past), Festival (Parades, etc.), and Horizons (our future). Under Horizons, the Lee Historical Society hopes to complete the old freight house as a Museum for the Town of Lec. Mr. Hunter spoke on the article. Motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Lee's Bicentennial Celebration was carried.

(Article 15 was taken after Article 4.)

Article 16. Mrs. St. Jean moved to amend Article 16. At this time Mr. Sackett stepped down and Mr. Nugent, pre-

viously sworn as Deputy Moderator, took over the Chair. There was a lively and lengthy discussion of the Municipal Budget Act and how it would affect the Town. Mr. Sackett spoke against this Budget Act as being too restraining. Mr. Bradshaw spoke of the present difficulty of closing the books, preparing the budget, posting the Warrant, getting the Town Reports to the printer in time, etc., where Town Meeting comes one week earlier than in previous years. It would be necessary for a Municipal Budget Committee to hold all their hearings within this limited time. Mrs. St. Jean moved her amendment as follows: To rescind present Article 16, and to set up a committee not empowered under the Municipal Budget Act. Said committee to be appointed by the Moderator; size and composition to be determined by the Moderator. Seconded by Mr. Sackett. Motion to amend was carried, and the amended motion was carried. Mr. Nugent then returned the Chair to Mr. Sackett.

Article 17. Mr. Federer moved that we pass over this Article. Seconded by several voices, motion to pass over was carried. (This Article dealt with adding some more Scenic Roads.)

Article 18. Mr. Jenkins moved that the Town vote to discontinue and make subject to gates and bars, the highways described as follows:

1. *High Road*. That portion beginning 150 feet beyond the footings of the present Francis Pond house to the Nottingham town line.
2. *Birch Hill Road*. That portion beginning 100 feet beyond the present Andrew house to the Epping town line.
3. *Sheep Road*. That portion beginning 50 feet beyond the footings of the old Edgar Hobby house to the junction of Steppingstone Road.
4. *Demerit Road*. That portion from the junction of 155

to the edge of the existing road (Demerritt Road) leading to John and Ida Randall.

5. *Cherry Lane*. That portion beginning at the driveway as it now exists to Raymond Miner house to the Madbury Town Line.
6. *Tibbetts Road*. That portion of the road from Route 4 (Concord Turnpike) to the Barrington town line and running behind the Hill Farm, so-called.

Seconded by Mr. Nugent. In discussing this motion Mr. Jenkins pointed out that if we close these three or four miles of road, the Town will lose an estimated \$1,500.00 in Subsidy money as Mr. Stevens sprays and tends them at least once every five years. The way it stands now, any owner or abutter may petition the Selectmen to open and maintain them. Last year the Planning Board was pressured by developers for some of these areas in the Town. If closed subject to gates and bars, they are still owned by the Town but no longer maintained. You may use them, but at your own risk. The Town retains the use of these roads, and if it so wishes in the future, can reopen them. Any owner or abutter if he so wishes, may apply to the Selectmen to have them reopened. The Selectmen may reopen them, providing the petitioner assumes responsibility of maintaining the road and gates and bars at their own expense. Mr. Hatch moved to amend that all reference to the Sheep Road be deleted from this motion. Mr. Van Osdoll seconded that, and motion to amend was carried. The amended motion, to close those portions of High Road, Birch Hill Road, Demerritt Road, Cherry Lane and the Tibbetts Road as spelled out in the original motion was carried.

Article 19. (To see what action the Town wishes to take regarding the publication of the Gross Valuation in the Town Report.) Mrs. St. Jean moved that no action be taken on this Article. Seconded by Mr. Nugent. Mrs. St. Jean stated she wished to be able to compare her assessed

valuation to others. Mr. Nugent stated that not only is the Inventory of Property Assessment open to view, but the Property Cards held in the Selectmen's office as well. Motion to take no action was carried.

Article 20. Mr. Wellington moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,100.00 for the Durham Ambulance Corp. Seconded by Mr. Stoakes, motion was carried.

Article 21. Mrs. Booth moved that the sum of \$750.00 be raised and appropriated for the Oyster River Home Health Association. Seconded by Mr. Boyd, motion was carried.

Article 22. Mr. Chadbourn moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the Seacoast Regional Development Association. Seconded by Miss Dudley. When asked, Mr. Chadbourn explained that this Association advertises for the region. Motion was defeated.

Article 23. Mr. Chadbourn moved that \$1,050.00 be raised and appropriated for the Strafford Regional Planning Commission. Seconded by Mr. Nugent. Mr. Chadbourn explained that this assessment came after the Warrant had been posted (asking for \$950). He spoke of the services offered by this commission. Help with tax maps, planning and zoning, development, etc. Mr. St. Jean wondered why this Association wasn't utilized more. When asked if this was worth \$1,050.00 to the Town Mr. Chadbourn explained the Federal Funding comes into the region thru their efforts. They get Federal Aid and Grants for Towns. Move to raise the sum of \$1,050.00 was carried.

Article 24. Mr. Hurley moved that the sum of \$900.00 be raised and appropriated for the Oyster River Youth Association. Seconded by Mr. Federer. Mr. Hurley spoke to the Article and said that Durham and Madbury vote a proportionate share. This money goes to reduce registration

fees for children who participate in their many activities. It is no longer known as the Durham Youth Association. This motion was carried.

Article 25. Mr. Bradshaw moved that the Town authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired from tax sales. Seconded by Mr. Boyd, this motion was carried.

Article 26. Mr. Wellington moved that the Town authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes. Seconded by several voices, this motion was carried.

Article 27. Mr. St. Jean moved that next year Town Meeting reconvene on the Saturday following the first Tuesday in March (Election of Officers) in the Mastway School at 10:00 in the morning. Seconded by Mrs. St. Jean, motion was carried.

Mr. Hurley took this opportunity to publicly thank Mr. Hatch for providing as much ice for the skating rink as Mother Nature would allow. There was unanimous agreement.

Mrs. St. Jean moved that the meeting be adjourned. Seconded by many voices, it was so declared.

PROCEDURE FOR LEE TOWN MEETINGS

1. Everyone should help to make the meeting business-like. Some voters stay away because of the long and pointless discussions.
2. Speakers should decide beforehand what they want to say, so that they can be brief and convincing.
3. Before talking, speakers are to give their names.
4. Roberts' Rules of Order will be observed to the extent applicable.
5. If a voter wants to make his support of a motion known, but has no new fact or argument to present, he should state his position and then sit down.
6. Speakers will be allowed to talk only once on each motion, unless there is a good reason to speak a second time.
7. No motion to table will be accepted until there has been a reasonable opportunity for discussion.
8. No motion to end debate (move the previous question) will be accepted until there has been reasonable opportunity for discussion.
9. Motions to reconsider are discouraged and will not be accepted if a number of those who voted on the article have left.
10. Questions should be addressed to the moderator, who will call on a suitable person for an answer.
11. Amendments offered must be written out and handed to the moderator.
12. Parliamentary rulings by the moderator can be overturned by a majority vote of those present.
13. Questions of law will be decided by the moderator in consultation with other officials. They are not subject to change by the voters at the meeting.

REPORT OF THE LEE POLICE DEPARTMENT

At Town Meeting 1975, the town voted not to hire a 2nd full-time man. Thus, Phillip Stetson was terminated under the Strafford-Rockingham Manpower Grant that the town had received. Also, on May 19, 1975, the Selectmen adopted the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act as amended December 1974. Due to these actions, the number of hours of active patrol in 1975 were somewhat reduced over those of 1974 and led to a reduction in activity, particularly motor vehicle and building checks.

Thus the Department, from January 1, 1975 to December 31, 1975 covered the following:

The figures for calls to Dispatch are not completed as yet. Therefore I will be unable to incorporate them in the report, although I will have them at Town Meeting.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those people who have assisted us during 1975.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Upon the recommendation of town selectmen and city councils, the Division of Forests and Lands appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town and city every three years. The town or city warden is responsible for maintaining a force of men and adequate equipment to suppress any wildfire that occurs in his town or city during his term of appointment. The fire warden must authorize all open burning when the ground is not covered with snow. No open fires can be authorized between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., unless it is raining, without the additional permission of the state district fire chief.

Any person wishing to kindle an open fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the forest fire warden. Camp and cooking fires also require the warden's permission.

The Division of Forests & Lands through its Forest Fire Service, assists all cities and towns in meeting these requirements by training the warden and deputy forces in wildlife suppression tactics, making hand tool suppression equipment available at fifty percent of cost, supplying pieces of Federal excess property for use as fire attack vehicles and sharing up to fifty percent of the cost of wildfire suppression costs.

Wildfire prevention is also a joint state, city or town program. Smokey Bear is available from the Forest Fire Service for local fire prevention programs. Posters and Junior Ranger kits are available for distribution by local fire departments upon request to the Forest Fire Service. Each

forest fire warden is expected to carry on a continuous wildfire prevention program within his town or city.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

The Trustees and I invite you to come in and visit your Library and learn what it can do for you. It may be small, but there are lot of services available. The Lee Library is affiliated with the New Hampshire State Library. This means I can borrow from them most books requested by you. If they do not have the book, they will borrow it from another library. I can also borrow through Interlibrary Loan. This includes fiction or non-fiction, for all ages, in all subjects. I can get your books for school assignments, through college. Records and films can also be borrowed.

The total circulation for 1975 was 6837 books, 58 magazines, 13 records, 45 jigsaw puzzles, and 40 or 50 films. We had 1209 adult borrowers and 861 children borrowing. The Bookmobile made four visits and left approximately 1500 books each visit. Approximately 150 books were borrowed by patron request from the New Hampshire State Library, Interlibrary Loan or special request from the Bookmobile.

We purchased 293 books this year and many others were donated. The Library has been subscribing to 12 magazines, but due to the fact that they are not being borrowed, some of these will not be renewed. Film showings were sponsored for the children of Mastway School. Only one Summer Story Hour was held as the children did not attend. We do not know why, but we will try again next year. The Little Red Wagon paid a visit that was well attended.

The fifth annual Art Exhibit was held during National Library Week. In conjunction with this, an Open House was held honoring the new room. With more space, we were able to host the Fall meeting of the District Area Council. The Historical Society and the Bicentennial Committee held their Fall meeting in the Library.

The Library honors the Statewide Library card. This card may be given to any patron in good standing. That is, they must be an active borrower for at least three months, with no books detained and no fines owing. This card allows patrons to borrow books from any library in New Hampshire honoring this card. I believe there are only three city libraries that do not.

We wish to thank all donors of gift books, magazines, and jigsaw puzzles. We appreciate the help of the Friends with all our programs, and the Thanksgiving and Christmas decorations by the Brownies.

ADVISORY BUDGET COMMITTEE

At the 1975 annual town meeting the citizens of Lee voted to establish an Advisory Budget Committee. Pursuant to this vote, town moderator Everett Sackett appointed six residents of the town to serve on the new Committee, which held its first meeting on July 21.

The primary function of the Budget Committee is to assist the Selectmen in the preparation of the annual town budget. To this end, the Committee requested all town department heads and officers—as well as outside agencies seeking town funds—to submit their 1976 budget estimates for review and evaluation in mid-December. In late January (1976) the Committee prepared a draft of the 1976 town budget, which was submitted to the Selectmen for final action prior to the holding of a public hearing and posting for the March town warrant.

Since the Lee Budget Committee was not created under the statutory provisions of the state Municipal Budget Law (RSA 32), it has no mandatory powers and is purely advisory in nature. Even so, the Committee has been active in this role and since July has held a total of ten meetings and one public hearing. All meetings are open to the public and complete minutes are kept and filed for public inspection in the Selectmen's Office in Town Hall.

The Committee believes that all budget requests should be carefully evaluated before they are submitted to the voters at town meeting. Lee's town budget has risen sharply in recent years and it is vital that a review process be developed to ensure that such increases are justified and essential. To accomplish this, the Committee is evolving policies and procedures which should result in the establishment of a sound budgetary process for the town.

From the beginning, the Selectmen have been most supportive of the Committee's work, and we wish especially to thank Harry Bradshaw, Robert Kenniston, Sr., and William Boyd for their help and cooperation.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT 1975

The Lee Planning Board held 26 meetings, with 12 public hearings involving zoning changes, subdivision regulations and subdivisions. Two work sessions were held and on June 11, the revised subdivision regulations were adopted. Nine field trips were taken by various members of the board to inspect test pits and site locations. Ten subdivisions were approved which created 14 new lots.

REPORT OF ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT 1975

The Board had a relatively quiet year with the holding of hearings on seven applications. During the year, we conducted the following business:

1. Frank Reinhold was granted a variance on frontage to give his grandson land on which to build a house.

2. Mr. and Mrs. Robert Emerson were granted temporary permission to live in a mobile home while they build a house.

3. Richard Saulnier was granted permission to construct and operate a repair garage and gas station on Route 125.

4. Andrea LeBlanc was granted permission to operate a veterinary hospital on Route 125.

5. Mr. and Mrs. Richman Walker were granted a variance on size of lot in Zone B on Wheelwright Pond.

6. Mr. and Mrs. John E. Randall were granted a variance to permit them to sell a house with odd-sized lot since the Town tax rolls had listed it that way for many years.

7. Herbert and Russell Richmond were granted permission to convert their unused poultry building to a store for the sale of stoves, craft items, etc.

The Board presently consists of Chairman Ralph D. Booth, Jr.; Wallace Dennis, Clerk; W. Scott Gibb; Everett Sackett; Sally Barney; and alternates George Goodridge and Lewis Jennison.

With the institution of an application fee, the Board showed a net income over expenses of \$35.80. Our only expenses are for postage and printing where necessary.

REPORT OF LEE CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1975

The Commission successfully completed purchase of the Little River Conservation Area, 7 acres of land between the Little River and Mill Pond Road, upstream from Cartland Road. Total expenses for the property were \$16,570. This was provided as follows: from Town appropriations to the Conservation Commission 1968-1970, \$3,978; Spalding-Potter Charitable Trust matching funds, \$2,000; U. S. Bureau of Outdoor Recreation matching funds, \$8,000; contribution by Walter W. Cheney, \$2,592. The area will be administered by the Conservation Commission for open space recreation such as walking, fishing, picnicking, and nature study.

A foot trail has been cut and marked in the Town Forest, starting at the right of the dump gate. At present it dead-ends after about a mile, but when completed will make a 1½ mile loop. We hope the townspeople will make use of this trail summer and winter.

On request of the Commission, Wheelwright Pond was sampled in May by the State Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission. It was found to be in good condition. A summary of the report was published in the *Town Crier*.

In December a joint meeting of the Conservation Commission, Planning Board, and Selectmen was held to initiate planning and coordination for open space protection in Lee. Consideration is being given to protecting the shores of the Lamprey River and other waterways either by conservation deeds or by zoning changes.

REPORT OF THE LEE RECREATION COMMISSION FOR 1975

Mr. Maurice Hatch reports that below zero temperatures have finally brought enough prevailing cold for the making of good ice at the town skating rink. Much appreciation is extended to Mr. Hatch for erecting the rink again this year, and hauling the water to flood it on the cold nights that most people are home sitting around the fire. The monies usually extended thru the winter from last year's appropriation were mistakenly put back into the general fund and the old rotten boards could not be replaced. Light bulbs and scrapers were purchased in anticipation of a new appropriation for 1976. New boards will have to be purchased before next year's skating season. Schedules were again set up for hockey and free skating.

Most successful, and used until the snow flies, is the tennis court. Many present enthusiasts are expressing thoughts of adding another court if land is available. At present, specific schedules have not been set up, as common courtesy in the use of the court seems prevailing. The present net which cost \$86.00 about five years ago has been stretched to its limit and should be replaced.

Several citizens, confused as to the function of the Recreation Commission and the town maintenance, have questioned the responsibility of cleaning up broken branches, garbage, etc., at the Town picnic area. In the past we have relied on 4-H members for the annual Town clean-up but perhaps more communication could be reached in this area. A large amount of unsightly garbage at Wheelwrights Pond was picked up by a Recreation member last fall.

As of this writing three vacancies are being filled. Mr. Charles Scott has ended his 3-year term and resignations

were handed in by George Nugent and Chairman, George Hurley.

REPORT OF STRAFFORD REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

Since its inception in 1968, the Strafford Regional Planning Commission (SRPC) has grown from three members to ten—nine of the fifteen towns and cities in the Region, plus Strafford County. These municipalities join together to (1) deal with concerns and plans for growth and development which transcend town boundaries; (2) share technical planning services for their municipal needs; (3) receive federal/state monies and other support for these services.

Some of the work of the Commission includes regional studies and planning, public information service on a variety of issues through programs and workshops, and assistance to town and city governments through technical services and studies.

SPRC has provided assistance to the Board of Selectmen in the preparation of a Flood Insurance application. The application has been approved and residents may now purchase the insurance. The Planning Board received assistance in the mapping of wetlands and the preparation of ordinances for wetlands control.

The foregoing is a brief presentation of SRPC and some of the services it provides. An in-depth report, which includes the current financial report of the Commission, is available in the Selectmen's Office for viewing by interested town citizens.

REPORT OF AMERICAN REVOLUTION BICENTENNIAL COMMISSION

Lee was the 18th town in the State of New Hampshire to be officially designated an American Revolution Bicentennial community. This early honor is due to the foresight of the Lee Historical Society, which in 1974 formed a Lee American Revolution Bicentennial Commission. The Reverend T. Willard Hunter was the first chairman and twenty-seven of the town's citizens, representing a broad cross section of interests, accepted membership.

A three-fold theme for Lee's Bicentennial recognition was drafted and approved by the State and National Commissions. These projects were adopted:

I. *Heritage '76* - "Lee Life in 1776" - sponsored by the Lee Historical Society.

II. *Festival USA* - "Impact of the Great Awakening on New Hampshire" - the rediscovery and re-affirmation of moral and spiritual values - sponsored by T. Willard Hunter.

III. *Horizons '76 & Century III* - restoration of Lee's Depot as a museum to house memorabilia as a lasting reminder of values and the quality of life - sponsored by the Lee Historical Society.

The Town Meeting, March 5, 1975, voted an appropriation of \$1,000 to help defray expenses of Lee's Bicentennial activities. This action enabled the local Commission to apply for matching funds from the National Commission. In January, 1976, a check for this additional \$1,000.00 arrived which will help to complete the new museum.

In the spring of 1975, Patricia S. Jenkins, President of the Lee Historical Society, succeeded Mr. Hunter as chairman.

Lee held its first public Bicentennial event, a Town Flag and Field Day, on June 14, 1975. The day began with a

Bicentennial Breakfast at the Lee Church attended by nearly 100 from throughout the town. UNH historian Charles E. Clark analyzed the Great Awakening of the mid-1700's and its impact on seacoast New Hampshire. At high noon townspeople crowded the Lee Church to pray for America at a special "Service of Petition for Divine Guidance" for the Nation. The mystery Indian who attended is still unbound.

Following the service, a ceremony was held in the Mast Way School at which Dr. J. Duane Squires, State Bicentennial chairman and National vice chairman presented the official certificate of recognition designating Lee a Bicentennial community. The official Bicentennial flag was presented to Lee's Selectmen by Mrs. Georgia Ireland, regional director from Boston.

The Jeremiah Smith Grange donated a new 40-foot steel flag pole in time for the new flag to be run up in the Town Park. The Grange also provided double-flag lapel pins for Commission members and participants.

Throughout the afternoon visitors and Town citizens enjoyed the craft exhibits and demonstration booths showing skills of another century, games, and contests. A barbecue, topped off by outdoor square dancing into the night concluded the day's activities.

Plans are afoot for the big Bicentennial celebration July 10, 1976, complete with parade, beard-growing contest, and Fourth of July oratory. Patricia S. Jenkins is again in charge and welcomes the ideas and the help of the entire town in making this event a meaningful one. The Commission hopes that Lee's celebration of America's Bicentennial does not only mean that we look backward in pride at the magnificent venture begun 200 years ago, but that our citizens also make some commitment to the quality of life that will make our Nation's Third Century the best yet.
