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REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD FOR LEE SCHOOL DISTRICT,

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Year Ending March 1, 1890.

It is with pleasure that we can say, that every teacher meriting it has received the hearty co-operation of the parents. Miss Nichols' services for the Lane school could be retained only two terms. That her future may be no less pleasant than her school life in Lee has been, is the wish of the Board. Miss De Meritte, as teacher for the third term, displayed the same thoroughness, that characterized her as a scholar, and which has made her so successful as a teacher. This was her twentieth term

We could not get the teacher that we expected for the first term, at Wednesday Hill, consequently had to do the best we could in the little time left. The one employed was not suitable for the place. Mr. Cate soon had the school in fine working order. He was most thoroughly supported by the parents. It is seldom that a teacher in so large a district school as the South Lee gives such universal satisfaction as did Mr. Frank J. Davis. With a school of fifty scholars we have yet to hear the first word of fault, and we can say the same by all the other teachers named, although this is saying a good deal. It was a pleasure to be present at the final examination of the South Lee school. Some of the classes in mathematics would do credit to any academy. Of the first class in spelling, all we can say is, you should have heard them. We doubt if there is a class in the state that can beat them for promptness and accuracy.

Text books on Physiology are now arranged for scholars in the fourth reader. One of the subjects treated on is the effect of alcoholic drinks on the human system. In no way can we better advance the cause of temperance, than by thoroughly inculcating into the youthful minds of the school children the injurious effects of intemperance. By so doing we have the question wholly outside of politics, and make it one of purely personal interest to the parents. For this reason alone we would most emphatically say, study Physiology.

Another study we wish to call attention to, is Grammar, as the study of language. The particular point we wish to call attention to, is the application of what they are studying to their future needs. To do this, give them some subject, and let them write it up the best they can. Next take them into the class, carefully study them, and make corrections, calling for the reason for the correction at the same time. Also teach them to express their thoughts in the best language possible. Be sure that every word is spelled correctly, and that the writing is not slighted. By so doing we really study grammar, spelling and writing at the same time. We do not mean to do this once a week, but to bring it into everyday work as much as possible. Also make corrections on conversation. Such a course followed up in school, and supplemented outside of the school room, must of necessity make correct linguists.
