


Extract from act of Congress of February 20, 1907, creating and defining the duties of the Immigration Commission.

That a commission is hereby created, consisting of three Senators, to be appointed by the President of the Senate, and three Members of the House of Representatives, to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and three persons to be appointed by the President of the United States. Said commission shall make full inquiry, examination, and investigation, by subcommittee or otherwise, into the subject of immigration. For the purpose of said inquiry, examination, and investigation said commission is authorized to send for persons and papers, make all necessary travel, either in the United States or any foreign country, and, through the chairman of the commission, or any member thereof, to administer oaths and to examine witnesses and papers respecting all matters pertaining to the subject, and to employ necessary clerical and other assistance. Said commission shall report to Congress the conclusions reached by it, and make such recommendations as in its judgment may seem proper. Such sums of money as may be necessary for the said inquiry, examination, and investigation are hereby appropriated and authorized to be paid out of the "immigrant fund" on the certificate of the chairman of said commission, including all expenses of the commissioners, and a reasonable compensation, to be fixed by the President of the United States, for those members of the commission who are not Members of Congress;





#### GENERAL EXPLANATION OF TABLES.

Persons of native birth have been divided into two general groups and further subdivided under each of the two, as follows:

1. Native-born of native father.

Persons under this group are classified as White, Negro, Indian, Chinese, Hindu, Japanese, and Korean.

2. Native-born of foreign father.
Persons under this group are further classified according to race of father in all tables where the data were secured for households and according to country of birth of father in all tables where the data were secured for employees. Where classification is by race of father, the classification used for several years by the United States Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization is followed.

Persons of foreign birth are classified according to race (or people). The classification of the United States Bureau of Immigration and

Naturalization is followed.

In the study of households information is presented—

1. By general nativity and race of the "individual" in all tables which show facts which are personal in their nature, such as English speaking, occupation, or conjugal condition.

2. By general nativity and race of "head of family" in tables con-

cerned with family matters; for example, family income.

3. By general nativity and race of "head of household" in all tables dealing with living conditions, among which are tables showing the composition of the household and the number of persons per room and per sleeping room. The distinction which has been made throughout this study between "family" and "household" is de-

pendent upon the use of the term "apartment."

· An "apartment" is a room or rooms within which all the usual daily processes of living—namely, cooking, eating, and sleeping—are carried on by the occupants. According to this definition an apartment may be, for example, a whole house, or it may be a single room of what was originally intended as an apartment, or it may be a corner of a wareroom or the back of a storeroom partitioned off and set aside for household uses. Two or more groups of occupants with distinctly separate money interests frequently rent a number of rooms jointly, occupying certain rooms separately but sharing one or more, usually the kitchen, or kitchen and living room. Under these conditions neither the rooms used by the one group of occupants nor those used by the other can be considered an apartment, since the room used in common must in such case be considered a room in each apartment, and thus be counted twice. Where these conditions have been encountered, the entire number of rooms has been considered one apartment.

The "household" includes all persons living within an apartment without regard to the relationships which exist among them. The without regard to the relationships which exist among them. The household may consist of one or more families with or without boarders or lodgers, or it may consist of a group of persons living together, no family included, or it may consist of various combinations of families, "groups," and boarders or lodgers.

The term "family," as used throughout these tables, refers in general to the immediate family composed of husband, wife, and children Creaters of property and property and the property and the property of the property and the property of the property and the property of the

dren. Groups of persons among whom none of these relations exist are not considered families. Households in which complicated relationships exist have been resolved into the component immediate families. Remnants of families maintaining a home are considered families when either husband or wife is present.

The general tables show results of two practically independent

studies, as follows:

#### STUDY OF HOUSEHOLDS.

All tables headed "Study of households" are based on information from the schedule which was filled out for certain selected households in each of the several communities. Names and addresses were secured of employees in a given industry who were heads of households; and for each such household a schedule was filled out by an agent of this commission, who visited the apartment and secured detailed information, so far as possible, for every occupant, as well as data in regard to family and household organization and status at the time of the visit.

#### STUDY OF EMPLOYEES.

The general tables headed "Study of employees" present data from the schedule relating only to the individual employee. This schedule was filled out by the employee himself or by some one detailed by the employer to the task, to whom the employee furnished data. The general tables of this series therefore concern only the history and present status of the employee, while the other carries as her been extend presents data not apply for certain of the series, as has been stated, presents data not only for certain of the employees but also for members of their households. All data included under the "Study of employees" are tabulated by sex and by the general nativity and race of the individual. For the native-born of foreign father the classification is by country of birth of father and not by race of father.

#### DESCRIPTION OF TABLES.

Total number of employees for whom information was secured, by sex and general nativity and race: Study of employees. Tables 1 to 28.—These tables enumerate the employees for whom data were secured for the "Study of employees." The enumeration is by general nativity and race of employee, and by sex in industries where both male and female employees report.

Number of foreign-born employees in the United States each specified number of years, by sex and race: Study of employees. Tables 29 to 56.—All foreign-born employees who report the number of years since their first arrival in the United States are here classified as in the United States under one year, one year, two years, three years, four years, five to nine years, ten to fourteen years, fifteen to nineteen years, or twenty years or over. In all industries where employees of both sexes report the tabulation is by sex.

Total number of households and persons studied, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 57, 94, 131, 168, 205, and 242.—These tables enumerate the households studied of each race, the aggregate of the members of the households of each race, and the persons, male and female, for whom detailed information was secured. All members of households appear in these tables under the general nativity and race of head of household.

Number of persons for whom detailed information was secured, by sex and general nativity and race of individuals: Study of households. Tables 58, 95, 132, 169, 206, and 243.—These tables are a second enumeration of the persons, male and female, who are included in the detailed study of members of households. In this enumeration each individual appears under his own general nativity and race.

Number of foreign-born persons in the United States each specified number of years, by sex and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 59, 96, 133, 170, 207, and 244.—These tables, which are concerned with members of households, are similar to Tables 29 to 56,

relating to employees.

Occupation before coming to the United States of foreign-born males who were 16 years of age or over at time of coming, by race of individual: Study of households. Tables 60, 97, 134, 171, 208, and 245.—Males who were 16 years of age or over at the time of their first arrival in the United States are here classified according to whether before coming to the United States they worked for profit, for wages, or without wages, and are further classified according to the kind of employment pursued. Payments in kind as well as in money are here considered wages. Persons who worked without wages were usually at work with fathers or other near relatives.

Occupation before coming to the United States of foreign-born females who were 16 years of age or over at time of coming, by race of individual: Study of households. Tables 61, 98, 135, 172, 209, and 246.—These tables are similar to Tables 60, 97, 134, 171, 208, and

245, relating to males.

Number of males 16 years of age or over in each specified industry, by general nativity and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 62, 99, 136, 173, 210, and 247.—These tables show the number of male members of households 16 years of age or over who are at home and at school, and classify those who have had employment within the year ending with the taking of the schedule according to the industry in which they have been employed. The main headings used in these tables follow the classification of the United States census with the following modifications: General labor is here separated from domestic and personal service; fishing, mining, and quarrying are separated from manufacturing and mechanical pur-

suits; trade and transportation are distinct from each other. The headings as here used are:

Agricultural pursuits.
 Domestic and personal service.
 Manufacturing and mechanical pursuits.

Mining (including quarrying).
 General labor.
 Professional service.
 Trade.
 Transportation.
 Fishing.

The term "Domestic and personal service" includes besides domestic servants certain classes of persons not professional who serve the general public, such as policemen, city firemen, and employees at places of amusement.

Number of females 16 years of age or over in each specified industry, by general nativity and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 63, 100, 137, 174, 211, and 248.—These tables are similar to Tables 62, 99, 136, 173, 210, and 247, relating to males.

Number of male heads of families earning each specified amount per year, by general nativity and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 64, 101, 138, 175, 212, and 249.—These tables form a part of the study of family incomes. The information relative to income was secured for the year ending at the time of the agent's visit.

In the "selection of families" for the compilation of data concerning family income, the following classes were omitted:

1. Families established less than one year.

2. Families living two or more per household under complicated financial arrangements, so that exact income from boarders or other sources within the household are uncertain.

3. Families with earnings or contributions representing entire earnings of members who are profit earners or whose net earnings are for any other reason uncertain. That part of the income in this study represented by earnings is net.

Practically all of the heads of families included in these tables are also heads of households. They are here classified according to the

amount of their earnings for the year.

Yearly earnings (approximate) of males 18 years of age or over, by general nativity and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 65, 102, 139, 176, 213, and 250.—Male wage-earners are here classified according to the amount of their earnings for the year ending at the time of the agent's visit. Persons who receive board and lodging in addition to a money wage and persons who receive tips or other perquisites over and above a stipulated wage are not included in these tables.

Yearly earnings (approximate) of females 18 years of age or over, by general nativity and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 66, 103, 140, 177, 214, and 251.—These tables are similar to Tables 65, 102, 139, 176, 213, and 250, which relate to earnings of males.

Amount of family income per year, by general nativity and race of head of family: Study of households. Tables 67, 104, 141, 178, 215, and 252.—The families included in these tables are the same as in

Tables 64, 101, 138, 175, 212, and 249. These families are here classified according to the amount of total income for the year from all sources. Tables 68, 105, 142, 179, 216, and 253 show the sources of this income. Income from "boarders or lodgers" and in some cases

from "other sources" is gross.

Number of families having an income within the year from husband, wife, children, boarders or lodgers, and other sources, by general nativity and race of head of family: Study of households. Tables 68, 105, 142, 179, 216, and 253.—The families included in these tables are the same as in Tables 64, 101, 138, 175, 212, and 249. The number of families with income from earnings of husband, the number with income from earnings of wife, etc., are shown here. The terms "husband" and "wife" include the widowed, divorced, and deserted. The principal items under "Other sources" are (1) receipts from investments, which, in the great majority of cases, are in the form of rentals, and (2) contributions of friends or relatives, who pay either more or less than the rates of boarders or lodgers. Attention is called to the fact that the family may have had income from some source, for example, from boarders or lodgers, within the year, but not at the time the schedule was taken.

Source of family income in detail, by general nativity and race of head of family: Study of households. Tables 69, 106, 143, 180, 217, and 254.—The families included in these tables are the same as in Tables 64, 101, 138, 175, 212, and 249. They are classified here according to the source or combination of sources upon which the family has been wholly dependent for income within the year ending with the taking of the schedule. The four items which make up all incomes except those entered in the last column of these tables are earnings of husband, earnings of wife, contributions of children, and payments of boarders or lodgers. It will be noted that all families deriving their entire income from husband, wife, and children have a net income, and that all incomes including the payments of boarders or lodgers are gross; also that all families having any part of their income from money invested appear in the last column of these tables.

Months worked during the past year by persons 16 years of age or over employed away from home, by sex and by general nativity and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 70, 107, 144, 181, 218, and 255.—Members of households of working age who have been employed outside of the home within the year ending with the taking of the schedule are here classified according to whether they have worked under three months, three and under four months, four and under five months, etc. For the purposes of these tables, all cases of part-time employment have been reduced to a full-time basis; for example, an employee who has worked seven months on half time is counted as having worked three and one-half months. The data are shown for males and females separately.

Number and class of households, by general nativity and race of head of houshold: Study of households. Tables 71, 108, 145, 182, 219, and 256.—All households are here divided into "Family households," or households where a family is present, and "Group households," or households composed of a group of persons, no family included. Family households are further classified as being with or without

boarders or lodgers. Family households with neither boarders nor lodgers are subdivided into those consisting of a single family and those consisting of two or more families living in the same apartment and sharing one or more rooms. Family households with boarders or lodgers are subdivided into those who keep boarders and those who keep only lodgers. Households keeping both boarders and lodgers are here entered as households with boarders. "Boarders" are persons to whom both food and lodging are furnished.

Number of households paying each specified rent per month per apartment, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 72, 109, 146, 183, 220, and 257.—In these tables appear only the renting households which report the rent paid for the unfurnished rooms which they use for living purposes. The

following classes are thus excluded from these tables:

1. Housholds which rent apartment furnished.

Households which pay an undivided sum for apartment and place of business.

Resident landlords who pay an undivided sum for the apartment they occupy and other partments which they sublet.

4. Households which pay "ground rent."

Number of households paying each specified rent per month per room, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 73, 110, 147, 184, 221, and 258.—The households included in these tables are the same as in Tables 72, 109, 146, 183, 220, and 257.

Number of households paying each specified rent per month per person, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 74, 111, 148, 185, 222, and 259.—The households included in these tables are the same as in Tables 72, 109, 146, 183,

220, and 257.

Number of households keeping boarders and lodgers and number of boarders and lodgers, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 75, 112, 149, 186, 223, and 260.—These tables show the number of households keeping boarders and the number keeping only lodgers; they also show the total number of boarders and of lodgers. "Boarders" both sleep and eat with the household. Households which keep lodgers in addition to boarders are classified with the households keeping boarders. Among certain races it is customary to include one of the following accommodations with the nominal price of lodging: (1) Coffee or soup is served once a day; (2) the lodger is allowed the privilege of cooking his food on the kitchen stove; (3) the housewife buys the lodger's food, having the price charged in his account book, and prepares the food for him. Persons with such financial arrangements consider themselves lodgers and have been classified as such in these tables.

Number of persons per household in apartments of each specified size, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 76, 113, 150, 187, 224, and 261.—Households are here classified according to the number of rooms which they occupy and are further classified according to the number of persons of which they are composed. Rooms used exclusively for business purposes, although connected with the apartment, are not counted in the num-

ber of rooms per apartment. As before stated, only such persons as sleep in the apartment are considered members of the household.

Number of households occupying apartments of each specified number of rooms, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 77, 114, 151, 188, 225, and 262.—These tables summarize a part of the data of Tables 76, 113, 150, 187, 224, and 261. Households are here classified according to the number of rooms they occupy.

Number of households of each specified number of persons, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 78, 115, 152, 189, 226, and 263.—These tables summarize a part of the data in Tables 76, 113, 150, 187, 224, and 261. Households are here classified according to the number of persons in the

household.

Number of households and number of persons in apartments of each specified number of rooms, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 79, 116, 153, 190, 227, and 264.—These tables summarize part of the data in Tables 76, 113, 150, 187, 224, and 261. They give the total number of households and the total number of persons in apartments of each specified size.

Persons per room, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 80, 117, 154, 191, 228, and 265.— These tables show the number of households which average less than one person per room, one and less than two persons per room, two and less than three persons per room, etc. These tables also show the average number of persons per household and per room for all households studied.

Persons per sleeping room, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 81, 118, 155, 192, 229, and 266.—These tables present the data relative to persons per sleeping room. Only rooms which are regularly used for sleeping purposes are here considered sleeping rooms. These tables are similar to

Tables 80, 117, 154, 191, 228, and 265.

Number of households regularly sleeping in all except each specified number of rooms, by general nativity and race of head of household: Study of households. Tables 82, 119, 156, 193, 230, and 267.— These tables classify households according to the number of rooms left for living purposes after the number of sleeping rooms has been deducted.

Literacy of persons 10 years of age or over, by sex and general nativity and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 83, 120, 157, 194, 231, and 268.—These tables, which are concerned with members of households, show the number of persons who read some language and the number who both read and write some language.

Literacy of foreign-born persons 10 years of age or over, by sex, years in the United States, and race of individual: Study of households. Tables 84, 121, 158, 195, 232, and 269.—These tables classify foreign-born persons, male and female, according to the number of years since their first arrival in the United States. The classes are: Under five years, five to nine years, and ten years or over. These tables show under each of the three groups the number of persons who can read some language and the number who can both read and write some language.

#### THE TEMPORARY DEMANDS FOR LABOR.

The construction of new steam and electric railways and the extension of old lines, the digging and enlarging of canals and waterways, the development of water-supply systems in towns and cities, the needs of the maintenance of way departments of the railroads, the lumbering season and the ice harvests in the North and Northwest, as well as other seasonal demands for labor in the canneries and the grain and berry fields, have created a large demand for floating, unskilled labor, which has been principally met by recent immigrants. As a matter of fact, the extensive demand brought into play by the forces mentioned above has rendered necessary a large body of laborers who are practically permanently employed, for the reason that they move from one kind of temporary employment to another or from one occupation to another, owing to seasonal variation in the demand. The present report has to do with the nature of this floating labor supply and the methods of its distribution.<sup>a</sup>

#### NATURE OF THE FLOATING LABOR SUPPLY.

The temporary labor supply, as already mentioned, is largely recruited from members of races of recent immigration originating in Southern and Eastern Europe. Even the South, which in former years depended almost entirely upon the negro for this class of work, owing to its extensive development during the past decade, has found it necessary to employ immigrant labor. The character of the labor supply for construction and other temporary work is well exhibited by the information received in the course of an original investigation conducted in the different parts of the country. A study of the employees in the maintenance of way department east of the Ohio River of one of the most important steam railroads showed, on the basis of the data received for 817 employees, the racial composition of the operating forces at the present time. From the table which immediately follows it is seen that the foreign-born

employees constituted 53.9 per cent of the total number studied, and that the principal races employed were Croatians and North and South Italians.

An analysis of the period of residence in the United States of these foreign-born employees also reveals the fact that 64.1 per cent had been in this country under five years and that very small proportions had a residence of ten years or longer. The table below sets forth in detail the proportions of this total number who had been in the United States each specified number of years.

#### THE PRESENT STUDY.

The present study is designed to set forth briefly a description of the agencies for distributing the unskilled labor supply so far as interior centers of distribution and redistribution are concerned. No detailed mention is made of the movement out of New York for the reason that the methods of handling the immigrant and other labor supply in that city has been fully discussed in other reports. In Part II of the present report detailed consideration is given to the working and living conditions of the temporary laborer on railroad and other construction work after he has reached the place of his employment.

#### CHAPTER II.

## AGENCIES OF DISTRIBUTION.

The padrone system—Contract—Labor agencies.

The principal methods by which the laborer secures emptoyment in seasonal and other temporary occupations are (1) by personal application, (2) by the padrone system, and (3) through labor agencies. The method first mentioned is seldom followed, the only cases where it is employed occurring when the construction or other work, because of its extent or by reason of the regular recurrence of demand, becomes a matter of common knowledge. As a rule, the demand for and supply of labor are adjusted through a system of regularly constituted agencies.

#### THE PADRONE SYSTEM.

The padrone system is the outgrowth of the inability to speak English and the lack of knowledge of American methods and customs which prevails among the immigrants who seek employment. Some form of the system is found among all non-English-speaking races. It is most highly developed, however, among and is most usually followed by the South Italians. In the majority of cases the padrone is a labor agent, who agrees to furnish and control a certain supply of labor for a specified work, in return for which he is to receive certain privileges, as, for example, the commissary and housing privileges in a construction or other camp. In other cases he acts merely as the representative of the laborers in negotiations with employers or other persons, and for this service each laborer pays him a specified amount. As representative of the system in its usual form, an agreement between an Italian pardone and a large construction company is submitted below:

#### CONTRACT.b

----, Оню.

This agreement, made and entered into this 15th of August, 1908, by and between \_\_\_\_\_, of New York City, known as the party of the first part, and \_\_\_\_\_, of \_\_\_\_\_, Pa., known as party of the second part:

Witnesseth, that whereas the parties of the first part are about to employ from four to five hundred unskilled laborers for the construction of a tolley line \* \* \* (in) West Virginia, \* \* \* a distance of 47 miles \* \* \*, the parties of the first part do hereby let to the party of the second part the full privilege of furnishing and maintaining all laborers necessary for said work \* \* \*.

It is further agreed that the party of the second part shall have the entire privilege of running and maintaining a commissary or store from which the aforesaid laborers

shall be furnished with provisions used by them, and it is further agreed that the parties of the first part shall retain from whatever moneys may be due the aforesaid laborers the board of (and) the store bill that each and every one of the aforesaid laborers may have and pay the same to the party of the second part on the regular pay day.

The party of the second part agrees to present such a store bill at least three days be-

fore the aforesaid pay day.

The parties of the first part agree to pay \$1.50 per day of ten hours' work to aforesaid laborers, and to make such payments not more than two weeks apart from the time of the beginning of the work.

(A section confirming the right of the employer to discharge men unsuitable for the

work, the same to be replaced by the party of the second part.)

The party of the second part agrees to supply all the men before mentioned and bring them to the aforesaid work on the order or the parties of the first part, within ten

days \* \* \* (of) receipt of such order.

(A section providing that not less than 150 men are to be called for in the first order.) The party of the first part agrees to build all the shanties or houses necessary for said laborers and give to the party of the second part the right \* \* \* \* to use said houses \* \* \* for the accommodation of such men employed \* \* \* and all the expenses for the erection (of the shanties) \* \* \* to be on the parties of the first

The party of the second part agrees to pay 5 per cent to the party of the first part, and (of) the entire amount of the said commissary owned by the party of the second part, and also agrees not to sublet or sell his right without \* \* \* consulting with the party of the first part \* \* \* and receiving their consent.

(A section providing that no other laborers are to be employed so long as the party of the second part is able to furnish the number called for in the contract.) (Signatures of the parties.)

#### LABOR AGENCIES.

The labor agencies of the different cities are the usual institutions through which individual laborers or small gangs of laborers secure employment. These agencies are located in the different cities of the country and cooperate one with another in adjusting the supply of labor to the distribution of the demand. They are either independent institutions or operated in conjunction with banks, steamship agencies, or other businesses. a The usual movement is from New York to the recognized industrial centers of the interior of the country where the larger number of immigrants seeking work find employment in regularly established industries. The demand for temporary or seasonal work is then largely supplied by the agencies of the interior by means of laborers secured from the immigrant colonies of industrial cities and towns. When one piece of work is completed the laborers usually return to the point from which they originally started and are again distributed by the agencies. In many cases, however, the newly arrived immigrant is sent directly from New York to railroad or other construction work in the interior. b As representative of the system in some of the principal interior distributing points, a general description of the temporary labor supply and the methods of handling it is set forth, according to cities, in the following pages:

Buffalo, N. Y.—This employment agency is conducted by a Polish

woman who has been in the business for a number of years. As far as could be ascertained no other business is run in connection with the agency, but prior to the time of establishing the employ-

ment agency the proprietress ran a saloon.

The method of securing labor is through newspaper advertisements and voluntary application. The proprietress stated that she had no contracts or agreements to supply any hotels or corporations, firms or individuals with labor. Those desiring servants make personal application. The agency is licensed by the city, and is subject to examination at least once a month by the city employment-bureau inspector. The informant stated that many so-called agencies were operating without a license. The nature of employment consists principally in domestic service, usually in private families of the city. The books show that girls are rarely sent to hotels and no instance was noted where they had been sent out of the city.

During the past seven months 199 girls and women have secured

employment through the agency.

Applicants for positions are charged from \$0.50 to \$1, depending upon the age, and collection is generally made upon registration.

Three weeks' service is guaranteed—that is, the applicant is given three weeks' trial; in that time she can try as many different places as she wishes. This holds good unless it becomes apparent that the applicant willfully changes without cause. If none of the places to which she is sent in that time prove satisfactory, the applicant must usually pay a second fee if she desires to continue the service. But under extenuating circumstances an extension of the service is sometimes granted.

Employers pay a fee of \$1 and a similar three weeks' trial is allowed in summer and four weeks in winter. Where the servant taken is without funds, the employer sometimes pays the fee, taking it out of her wages. Such positions as are furnished generally pay from \$0.50

to \$1 per week:

The proprietress claims never to have summed up her profits nor to keep any records from which they could be deducted. The gross receipts for the seven months of 1909 would be about \$400, according to her statements as to the fees charged.

The Galician girls were regarded as the hardest workers, best savers, and most generally satisfactory. The Polish girls were declared to be of little use as domestic servants, while those from the

Russian Province were inclined to be lazy.

The head of the agency says she has found that all female applicants pay up promptly as a rule. There is little chance for exploitation by them. But she claims to have had some very unfortunate experiences with male contract and railroad labor. A very decided disposition was shown on the part of the men to promise payment and never show up again after securing employment. On account of this trouble she stated that she had given up handling men four or

five years ago.

The proprietress stated that except to houses of unquestioned repute she very rarely furnished servants to hotels. She professed to exercise great care in this respect, owing to the fact that ignorant girls in such employment were likely to meet unhealthy moral conditions. The proprietors of houses of ill fame frequently apply to her, so she said, for two or three or more girls at a time. She could but believe that it was not as servants but for illegal purposes that they desired them. When such applications were made she made a pretense at filling them, taking the addresses, etc., but claimed that

she never filled the orders. Her knowledge of this part of the "underworld" enables her to protect her applicants. But when a mistake is made, as sometimes happens, she is generally apprised of the fact by the girls whom she has sent.

She stated that she had sometimes had men to apply for one or more girls at a time. Such applications she treated in the same

manner as noted above.

Syracuse, N. Y.—The proprietor of this agency, if such he may be termed, is himself a contractor, although practically retired on account of ill health. He occasionally furnishes men to other contractors, although he no longer derives any considerable revenue from that source. The state of his health prevents him from engaging actively in either of these lines. Perhaps his chief income at present arises from his rentals, real estate, and loan business. In connection with these he is a commissioner of deeds.

He does not operate a saloon, boarding house, or any other such business, frequently found in connection with labor agencies. In the strict sense of the term he does not now conduct such an agency, although he formerly handled many men. A considerable part of the information herein given concerns his experience of the past. He does not appear to advertise himself as a labor agent, has no other office than his home, does not register applicants, claimed that he

does not charge fees, and is not a licensed labor agent.

Laborers are furnished for railroad, canal, and other constructive work such as is generally carried on through contractors. The proprietor stated that he had no agreements or permanent contracts with any railroad, corporation, or contractor to furnish labor continuously. He said, however, that there were certain contractors on whom he could depend to give him orders and who relied on him to furnish them with men. The following will indicate the general methods of operation. Men do not apply for work, and consequently no register is kept. Whenever an order for laborers is received, the proprietor endeavors to fill it by offering the job, naming the terms, to such idle men, or men desiring other work, as he can find. Sometimes the local supply has been insufficient, in which case men are secured from Utica, Rochester, or New York City.

Occasionally contracts are signed with those for whom the laborers are secured. Generally speaking, these contracts specify the wages which the men are to receive, arrangements for boarding and lodging, etc., and provide that the agent shall keep the contractor supplied with the designated number of men for the time agreed upon. In any event the agent must see to it that the requisite number of men are always on hand. Otherwise he is in danger of losing his lucrative

commissary privileges.

The proprietor claims that he receives no fees from the men whom he sends out, principally because the average immigrant has learned that he does not have to pay a fee in order to secure a job. Reminiscent of the halcyon days when labor agents flourished on the ignorance of the immigrant, the informant said that fees of \$15 and more, in his own experience, had been anything but unusual. Not only that, but commissions were paid by the contractors as well, giving the agent a double profit. Even now labor agents in New York City who send out men are able to collect large fees from

recent arrivals. 'As a rule, however, the practice of charging fees has greatly lessened as the experience of the immigrant has increased. No commissions are now received from contractors. The proprietor claimed that his only profit accrued from boarding and lodging the men sent out.

Inasmuch as his only source of revenue from the transaction comes from boarding and lodging the men, this proprietor usually establishes a commissary at the camp to which he sends men. The ''shack'' for this purpose he may build himself or may ront from the contractor. Arrangements are made with the latter whereby all amounts due the agent for provisions, etc., are deducted from the wages of the men before payment is made. In this way he is assured of all sums due him on this account.

The scale of commissary prices depends entirely upon the agent in charge. In the language of the proprietor, "Some agents rob more than others," implicating himself in the general classification. He stated, further, that commissary prices are necessarily higher than others, due to the fact that the operator can not always secure such a limited stock at wholesale prices, must pay the freight, and is compelled to make back in a limited time the money invested in a store building.

Whether the laborers pay for their transportation outright or receive it from the contractor or the agent it is all the same, for, in the latter case, it is deducted from their wages. Where men are obtained from New York the general practice among agents is to bargain with the different railroads for cheap rates. But the men do not derive any advantage from the reduction obtained; they are charged full fare. The proprietor admitted that he followed the general practice.

In general, the proprietor stated, the labor agent's business is nothing like as lucrative as it once was. Quite frankly he admitted that several years ago there were large opportunities for theft and fraud. The immigrants of those days were absolutely unaccustomed to the ways of the New World. They did not know when they were being overcharged; they could not make formal complaint even if they did, for they could not speak the English language. But the older among them have learned better, the younger generation knows better, and the recent arrivals are soon taught how to look out for themselves.

Very little labor is furnished to local contractors, the constructive projects of the city being of a limited nature, and none who contract on a large scale are now located here. Most of the labor goes to Buffalo or New York contracting firms or to railroads.

The informant stated he no longer held the deposits of the men whom he sent out, although he had been accustomed to do so in the past.

The informant stated that in the past he had sent men to Canada, but that for the most part his operations had been confined to New York State.

It is not at all infrequent, stated the informant, that laborers secure transportation, ostensibly for the purpose of taking the job offered, but in reality to obtain a free ride to some other work. Quite often, too, they desert to other work than that for which their transportation has been paid. Particular mention of this kind of exploitation

among men sent out as hop pickers was made. The informant stated that only recently a desertion of this sort had come to his attention. The only recourse the agent has in such cases is to watch the men and prevent their desertions, by force if necessary.

The proprietor was not a licensed labor agent, and evidently his business is subject to no supervision or examination. He plead igno-

rance of the state law regulating labor agencies.

Utica, N. Y.—This employment agency handles Italians chiefly, but occasionally a few Spaniards, Poles, and Syrians are secured positions. The head of the agency is labor agent for a division of a large railroad company in New York and is under contract to furnish such laborers as may be desired for the division. The head of the agency stated that this railroad company was the only concern to whom he furnished labor at the present time. The proprietor operates a saloon, grocery, and bank, in conjunction with his labor agency. In fact, the principal patrons of the above-named business are laborers whom he has sent out to work.

The agent claims that he is paid no fee or commission by the railroad company for supplying labor, his profit arising from the commissary privileges extended. The laborers are usually housed in work cars furnished by the railroad, one being provided for the agent as a commissary. His contract with the company allows bills due him up to a total of \$10 per month to be paid out of the men's wages. stated that this sum easily covered the average expenses of the men. Should any one of them desire more, he is either credited or the amount charged against his deposit, in case he has any, with the banker. The agent is frequently commissioned to purchase clothing for them as well. He stated that he did not collect any fees from the men he sent out and that his commissary prices were no higher than those of his Utica store. The railroad company furnishes free transportation to all its laborers except where they are taken upon application from The cost of transportation is not deducted from their wages. Men usually apply for work or are obtained from the immediate locality. But it is sometimes necessary to secure them from New York, in which case they are generally hired through the employment offices of that city. The informant stated that instead of collecting a fee from the men he frequently had to pay a commission of \$1 for them at these New York agencies. He does not keep a register of laborers employed.

The informant further stated that the men were continually subjecting him and the railroad company to loss and annoyance by "jumping" their jobs or obtaining free rides to certain points. In the latter connection he mentioned a recent case of a squad of men who had been sent to the Adirondacks as fire fighters, and all of whom had deserted to other jobs upon arrival. He stated that he took no precautions to make sure of their staying on the job—that he had to

take his chances on that score.

The proprietor is not licensed as a labor agent at Utica, but stated that he was so licensed in New York City, to enable him to obtain men there. That is, as a licensed employment agent he can send men out of the city.

Chicago, Ill.—There are two kinds of employment agencies in Chicago which are worthy of attention. The first class includes agen-

cies—generally conducted by Americans—independent of banks or steamship offices; the second includes those conducted by immigrants

in connection with immigrant banks or steamship agencies.

The first class of agencies operate under a state license and carry on a business much the same as in other cities. They distributed during the twelve months ending June, 1909, approximately 40,000 men, by races, as follows:

In Chicago these agencies seem to charge such office fee as they think they can get. The State fixes the fee at \$2, but the interpreter at one of the agencies said that sometimes when work was scarce they charged as high as \$10 per man. At other times when labor is scarce and work plentiful they will take the man for 50 cents, and in some cases where they have a contract to fill they will take the man free, although this latter practice is the exception and not the rule. The question of transportation seems to vary likewise. In some cases the agencies charge a man 1 cent per mile and in other cases send him free. Labor agents in Chicago find the same fault with American and Scandinavian labor as do agents elsewhere, i. e., that it can not be depended upon. As a result they supply immigrant labor whenever they can. The agents in Chicago supply a great deal of labor to agencies in St. Paul and Minneapolis. When the labor agencies in St. Paul and Minneapolis call on Chicago to supply them with laborers the office fee is supposed to be equally divided between the two agencies. Labor agents in Chicago say that they have very little if any trouble with padrones, and that what the padrone gets by furnishing his gang to the labor agent is the place of foreman, and from 25 cents to 50 cents per day extra for such service.

The final destination of the men sent out from Chicago is about as follows: Most, if not all, of the Austrians go into construction work, as they are of large stature and do not seem to mind the heavy labor. The Italians, Greeks, and Servians, almost without exception, go into section work for some railroad. The Bulgarians also go into construction work, as they are quick to learn and are in demand as teamsters. A great many of the Poles go into the logging camps of Michigan, Wisconsin, and Minnesota. Most of the Americans and Scandinavians go into construction work in and around Chicago. These labor agencies keep no account of their men after they are once placed. There are two immigrant agencies of the second class in Chicago, one operated by an Italian banker and steamship agent and the other by a company of Greek bankers and steamship agents, that are worthy of mention. Each is conducted on exactly the same plan, and both have contracts to furnish labor to a large railroad company for its section work, extra gangs, etc. These agencies enjoy and merit the utmost confidence of their patrons. Their fee is \$2 to each and every person furnished with work for a period of thirty days. They keep an absolute account of every man passing through their agency, and can tell exactly where he is. A contract is drawn in duplicate, one copy being kept by the laborer and the other retained and filed by the labor agent. Any correspondence relative to the laborer is kept on file with his contract. Such letters as he may write to the labor agent are translated into English and attached to his contract. Entries in the books show that the company refunded \$2,700 last year to laborers who were laid off on account of the financial depression. These two companies supply all labor to one of the largest railroads in the West. During the past year they have furnished:

Under the system employed by these two agencies there is little or no chance for exploitation. They evidently enjoy the confidence of the people, as they handle most of the money saved and transmitted by the men whom they supply with work.

Neither of the above agencies will supply labor to anyone but the railroad mentioned, although they have numerous calls from other firms and corporations. Each is a model agency, conducted along business lines, yet having in mind the welfare of their countrymen. The books of these agencies are open for inspection at any time, and both expressed a willingness to help us in any way they could. Both say that the practice of exploitation of the ignorant immigrants is generally brought about by the aid of some of the unscrupulous members of their own race, in whom they place great confidence.

St. Paul and Minneapolis, Minn. St. Paul and Minneapolis are the gateway through which passes nearly all the floating labor going to the Northwest. During the twelve months ending June, 1909, labor agencies in these cities secured employment for approximately

61,000 people, with a division by races as follows:

The Italians and Greeks nearly all went into section and extra gang work in connection with the various railroads at a wage of 13 cents per hour. The Slovaks, Magyars, Bulgarians, and Servians for the most part were sent into construction work of various kinds at a wage of from 15 cents to 20 cents per hour. The Americans and Scandinavians went into all kinds of work. Of the 61,000 given employment it is estimated that 90 per cent of the Americans and Scandinavians returned to St. Paul and Minneapolis upon completion of the work to which they were assigned. The other 10 per cent went farther west. Of the Italians and Greeks, very few, if any, have returned, as they were given permanent employment as section men, etc., on the railroad. Within the past two years the Slovaks, Magyars, Bulgarians, and Servians have exhibited a strong tendency toward moving west as winter approaches and construction work ceases, only about 40 per cent of them ever returning to the city. Labor agents ascribe this drift to the fact that weather conditions on the Pacific coast are more favorable, and they can secure work the entire year instead of in the summer and fall, as is the case in Montana, the Dakotas, and Minnesota.

The fees charged in St. Paul and Minneapolis are from \$5 to \$7 for work at some distance from the city. For local jobs the fee is

from \$1 to \$3. These fees represent the net profit of the labor agent as in all cases the railroad fare is either paid by the laborer or by the company to whom the labor is supplied. The charge is made greater for jobs at a distance from the city in order to protect the agent in case the man refuses to go to work upon arrival at his destination. In this case the labor agent is liable for his railroad fare as the company pays the fare of the men reporting for duty only. As a rule, the labor agent is not obliged to resort to any other means of securing labor than that of placing a sign in front of his place of business, or an advertisement in the paper, as the supply generally exceeds the demand. However, every now and then it happens that there is a shortage in the labor supply of a city. a case of this kind the situation is handled in the following manner: Suppose A, in St. Paul, has a call from a railway company to supply 1,000 men at Fargo, N. Dak., for construction work and finds that the available laborers at hand number only 500. He immediately calls upon Chicago or St. Louis agents to supply the shortage. a case of that kind it is stated that the labor agent in St. Paul divides his office fee equally with the labor agent in St. Louis and that the

laborer is not charged an extra fee.

Each gang of immigrants is handled through a padrone, the labor agent contracting with the padrone instead of the men themselves. As a reward for supplying the labor agent with his gang he is given a position as foreman, or walking boss of his gang, and receives about 50 cents per day additional. In cases where the immigrants come nearly direct from their native country and are not versed in American ways it is thought that the padrone may extort an additional sum from them for getting them a position, but after they have been in this country for some time and become acquainted with our methods they can not be exploited in this manner. It is a noticeable fact that contractors in calling for labor specify Slovaks, Magyars, Bulgarians, and Servians for construction work in preference to Italians and Greeks. The main reason for the preference is that the races specified are far easier to handle, are larger and hardier, and will work in any kind of weather, rain or shine. The Bulgarian seems especially adapted to construction work as he is quick to learn, can manage horses, and can do several kinds of work, while the Slovak, Magyar, and Servian scarcely ever learn to do more than one thing. Labor agents state that within the past five years Greeks and Italians have displaced the Japanese as section men on all the railroads in the Northwest. They ascribe this change to the fact that they are easier to handle than the Japanese and are steadier workmen.

Labor agents say that in many instances they are compelled to supply immigrants for no other reason than that the American labor to be had is of a roving disposition and can not be depended to continue until the work is completed, so that in order to protect themselves they must fill their contracts with men who will stay, and these are immigrants. A few of the larger agencies have regular contracts with railroads, contractors, etc., to furnish them with laborers as required. Whether the labor agent pays some official of the railroad or company for the exclusive right to furnish this labor could not be definitely ascertained, but it was thought that

in some instances this was the case.

Duluth, Minn.—All of the employment agencies of Duluth, Minn., so far as could be ascertained are operated under the state license and are also further restricted by a special county license. None of them are conducted in connection with a steamship agency or bank. The fees allowed by the county are \$1 per man for a local job and \$2 per man for a job at some distance from the city. During the past year these agencies have handled, at a profit of \$1.50 per man, about 23,000 men by races, as follows:

The Austrians have gone principally into construction work and to the iron ore fields. The Finns have been furnished with about the same class of labor. The Greeks and Italians almost without exception have gone into section work for some railroad system. The Scandinavians and Americans have gone into almost every kind of work, but the largest percentage of them have gone into the logging camps in northern Minnesota. The Poles and Bulgarians, almost without exception, have gone into construction work of some kind.

A great many of the employment agencies have contracts with railroads and other corporations to furnish them with all the labor they need. In a case of this knid the laborer pays his office fee of \$2 and is given free transportation to the place where he is to begin work. Where the employment obtained is not in connection with a railroad the transportation is sometimes furnished and sometimes not, but in all cases the man gets a very much reduced rate, generally 1 cent per mile. If he has not the money necessary to pay this charge, it is advanced by the labor agent and deducted from his first month's pay. A great many vagrants in and around Duluth take advantage of this rate to secure cheap transportation to some other part of the country. The employment agency has absolutely no protection against this procedure, and hence it adopts the plan of supplying immigrants whenever possible as they are more likely to continue at work than the roving class of Americans and Scandinavians found in this country. Things are now in such condition that very few companies will send an American or Scandinavian West in the spring or summer for the reason that as soon as the wheat harvest begins he will leave his work to follow the harvesters, while the immigrant will work by the side of a thrashing or harvesting crew and never think of leaving his work to take service Such floating labor generally drifts back to Duluth to spend the winter or goes into the logging camps of northern Minnesota. The labor agents always inspects the work he is to furnish men for unless he knows the man or company he is dealing with, in which case he takes the employer's word about the work. The exploitation of immigrants seems to be carried on almost entirely by the padrones, or leaders of the various gangs. Labor agents say that when they advertise for men to go into certain work that the padrones tell the immigrants not to take the work. The padrone then comes to the labor agent and tells him that he will supply a certain number of men, but that they can only pay, say, \$1, instead of \$2, the regular The labor agent must have the men to fill his contract and

consequently accepts the terms.


St. Louis, Mo.—The labor agencies of St. Louis, Mo., operate under a state license of \$300 per year. During the past year (1908) they have handled a total of about 45,000 men, 40,000 of whom passed through one labor agency, which is the oldest and perhaps the best known labor agency in the United States. Most of the work furnished was construction work of some sort or work in connection with some railroad, and it seems as if the fees charged were the highest the labor agent could extort from the men. The custom as to furnishing transportation varies as in every other city. In some instances it was supplied and in some other instances it was not. It is safe to say that in the majority of cases transportation was not furnished.

All of the agencies, with the exception of one, are operated free from any bank or steamship agency, and so far as could be ascertained most of them were connected with some railroad or corporation. Only one agency—the one operated in connection with a bank and steamship agency—keeps any account of men after they are supplied except such as is necessary to collect the fee and railroad fare in case it had been charged against the individual. After it has been collected no account is ever kept of the man.

More evidences of exploitation were apparent in St. Louis than in any other city visited. All labor agents assert that the immigrant is exploited by the interpreter (padrone), but that it was impossible to secure immigrant labor without dealing with the padrone. They say that in some instances the padrone extorts as much as \$20 to \$25 from each of the members of his gang.

# CHAPTER I.

#### INTRODUCTION.

Explanation of study—Employees for whom information was secured—[Text Tables 3 and 4 and General Table 1].

#### EXPLANATION OF STUDY.

The statistical basis of Part II of the present report consists of the information secured from persons engaged in railroad and other construction work in different parts of the country. The descriptive matter relative to the same wage-earners has been incorporated in the study of conditions which prevail in the different sections of the country. These conditions are fully treated in Parts III–V, inclusive, dealing with the East, West, and South.

#### EMPLOYEES FOR WHOM INFORMATION WAS SECURED.

The extent of the information received for seasonal and temporary laborers is set forth in the following table, which shows the number and percentage of male employees of each race for whom information was secured:

### CHAPTER II.

#### RACIAL DISPLACEMENTS.

Period of residence in the United States of foreign-born employees—Racial classification of employees at the present time—[Text Tables 5 to 8 and General Table 2].

PERIOD OF RESIDENCE IN THE UNITED STATES OF FOREIGN-BORN EMPLOYEES.

The character of recent and past labor employed in railroad and other temporary construction work is exhibited by the following table, which shows, by race, the percentage of foreign-born male employees studied who had been in the United States each specified number of years. Length of residence in this country and period of employment in this class of work are of course not the same. As a rule, the immigrants employed in the construction of railroads and other temporary work return to the large industrial centers during the winter months, or they may be originally employed in connection with some basic industry, such as iron and steel manufacturing, and temporarily engage in railroad construction and similar work.

The racial composition of the temporary labor supply is further exhibited by the table and accompanying charts next presented, which show the number and percentage of each race of employees on railroad and other construction work for whom detailed informa-

tion was secured:





Of the 4,432 foreign-born males in this industry, concerning whom information was obtained, it will be noted that 73.7 per cent have been in the United States under five years, 17.8 per cent from five to nine years, while only very small proportions have been in the United States from ten to fourteen, fifteen to nineten, and twenty years or over. With the exception of the Irish, 83.8 per cent of whom have been in the United States five years or over, by far the largest proportion of each race have been in the United States less than five years. All of the Herzegovinians and Roumanians and 96.2 per cent of the Bulgarians have been in the United States under five years. proportion of Bulgarians, it will be noted, is only slightly in excess of the proportion of Greeks or Russians, considerably in excess of the Croatians, Poles, or South Italians, and largely in excess of the Magyars, North Italians, or Slovaks, in the order named, the Slovaks reporting 60.6 per cent. Of those who have been in the United States from five to nine years, the proportions of Greeks, Russians, and Bulgarians, as compared with the proportions of the other races with this length of residence are very low. None of the Bulgarians, Greeks, Herzegovinians, or Roumanians and less than 1 per cent of the Croatians and Poles have been in the United States from ten to fourteen years, while the proportion of Irish with this length of residence is in excess of the combined proportions of North Italians, South Italians, Magyars, and Russians. The Irish again show the largest proportion, or 10.3 per cent, who have been in the United States from fifteen to nineteen years. As regards those who have been in the United States twenty years or over, the proportion of Irish, or 41.2 per cent, is in striking contrast with the combined proportions of the other races, the combined proportions amounting to but 8.5 per cent.

In the above table 73.7 per cent of the employees have been less than five years in the United States, 8.6 per cent ten years or over, and a negligible proportion twenty years or over. The great majority of each of the three races specified report less than five years in the United States in all three territorial divisions, but it will be noted that the proportion of 62.2 per cent of the North Italians is much lower than the proportion of either the South Italians or Croatians, evidencing a somewhat earlier immigration. On the other hand, less than 3 per cent of any one of the three races have been here twenty years or over. Practically equivalent proportions are reported by the Croatians in the East and Middle West, and by the North Italians in the East and South, in all three year groups, leading to the inference that the immigration of each race into the specified localities began simultaneously. The South Italians, however, report their largest proportions in the South, the twenty years or over group excepted, and their smallest in the East, showing that immigration of this race first began in the East, afterwards spreading to the Middle West and South.

The preceding table shows that of 5,821 employees for whom information was secured 76.6 per cent are of foreign birth, 10.4 per cent are native whites born of native father, 9.4 per cent are negroes who are native-born of native father, and 3.6 per cent of the employees for whom information was secured are native-born of foreign father. Of employees who are native-born of foreign father, those whose fathers were born in Ireland show 2.3 per cent, while no employees whose father are of other specified races show over 1 per cent of the total number for whom information was secured. Of the foreign-born employees, the South Italians show 33.4 per cent, followed by the North Italians and the Croatians with 11.1 per cent and 9.6 per cent, respectively. None of the other foreign-born races show over 3.7 per cent of the total number for whom information was secured.

Irrespective of locality, it will be noted that of all male employees in this industry for whom information was obtained the foreign-born constitute 76.6 per cent, the native-born of foreign father 3.6 per cent, and the native whites and negroes born of native father 10.4 and 9.4 per cent, respectively. Among the foreign-born races constituting as much as 1 per cent of the total number of employees it will be noted that the South Italians, with 33.4 per cent, constitute a very much larger proportion than does any other race. The North Italians constitute the next largest proportion, or 11.1 per cent. This, it will be noted, is slightly in excess of the proportion shown by the Croatians. Following the Croatians are the Bulgarians, Poles, Irish, Greeks, Russians, Roumanians, Slovaks, Herzegovinians, and Magyars, who constitute from 3.7 to 1 per cent each of all employees for whom information was obtained. Of the native-born of foreign father, only one race, the Irish, with 2.3 per cent, constitutes a proportion in excess of

1 per cent.

A comparison of localities shows that in the Middle West all of the employees for whom information was obtained are foreign-born, while in the East and South the foreign-born constitute 78.5 and 48.7 per cent, respectively. The native-born of foreign father also constitute in the East a larger proportion of the employees than in the South. On the other hand, a much larger proportion of the employees in the South are made up of whites and negroes native-born of native father The South Italians, it will be noted, than is the case in the East. constitute a slightly larger proportion of the employees of the Middle West than in the South or East, while the Bulgarians, Greeks, and Roumanians constitute a very much larger proportion in the Middle West than in the South or East. This is also true of the Croatians, except that the proportion in the East is considerably in excess of that in the South. Of the remaining foreign-born races constituting as much as 1 per cent of the total number of employees studied, irrespective of locality, it will be noted that each race constitutes a larger proportion of the employees in the East than it does in either of the other localities. In the case of the Herzegovinians, Magyars, and Poles no information was obtained in the Middle West or South. will also be noted that no information was obtained for the Irish. Russians, or Slovaks in the Middle West, while in the South these races each constitute less than 1 per cent of the employees studied in the locality. That this last statement is equally true of the Irish native-born of foreign father is apparent from the foregoing table.

# CHAPTER III.

# ECONOMIC STATUS.

PRINCIPAL OCCUPATION OF IMMIGRANT EMPLOYEES BEFORE COMING TO THE UNITED STATES.

Before entering upon a discussion of the economic status in this country of employees engaged in railroad and other construction work the principal occupation while abroad of the foreign-born employees is set forth. In this connection the following table is submitted, showing the percentage of foreign-born male employees in each specified occupation before coming to the United States.

Of the 4,134 foreign-born male employees for whom information was obtained 57.4 per cent before coming to the United States were either engaged in farming or employed as farm laborers, 26.6 per cent were employed in general labor, 8.6 per cent in hand trades, 5.1 per cent in occupations other than specified, 1.4 per cent in trade, and 0.9 per cent in manufacturing. No Croatians, Poles, or Russians and only a very small proportion of each of the other races were employed in manufacturing. No Irish or Poles and only a very small proportion of each of the other races were in trade, while no Poles or Russians were employed in occupations other than specified, the proportions of the other races employed in occupations other than specified ranging from 9.6 per cent of the Irish to 1.1 per cent of the Croatians. regards the proportions of these races engaged in farming or employed as farm laborers, it will be noted that the Greeks, with 84.8 per cent, show a slightly larger proportion than the Poles or Croatians, a considerably larger proportion than the Bulgarians, Russians, or South

Italians, and a much larger proportion than the Irish or North Italians, the last-named reporting only 39.1 per cent. In this connection it will be noted that the North Italian is the only race reporting a smaller proportion engaged in farming or employed as farm laborers than is employed in general labor. The proportion of North Italians employed in general labor, 39.2 per cent, is slightly in excess of that shown by the Russians or South Italians, considerably in excess of that shown by the Irish, Croatians, or Poles, and very largely in excess of that shown by the Greeks or Bulgarians, who report 3.3 per cent only. As regards those employed in hand trades, it will be noted that with the exception of the Bulgarians, Irish, and North Italians each race shows a proportion below that shown in the total for all employees, the Croatians reporting the lowest proportion so employed, or 2.6 per cent.

#### DAILY EARNINGS.

In the table next presented the average amount and range in amount of daily earnings of the employees is set forth. The table shows the percentage of male employees 18 years of age or over earning each specified amount per day.

Information was obtained in this industry for 5,562 male employees, of which number 69.4 per cent earn \$1.50 or over per day, 22.3 per cent \$2 or over, and 14.2 per cent \$2.50 or over, while slightly less than 10, 5, and 3 per cent earn \$3 or over, \$3.50 or over, and \$4 or over, respectively. The foreign-born show a slightly smaller percentage earning each specified amount, while the whites, both native-born of foreign father and native-born of native father, show a much larger

proportion earning each specified amount than is shown in the total for all employees, the proportion of native-born of foreign father earning each specified amount being considerably in excess of that shown by the native whites born of native father. As compared with the foreign-born, the native negroes born of native father, with the exception of those earning \$3.50 or over and \$4 or over, show a larger proportion earning each of the other specified amounts. foreign-born the Irish show a slightly larger proportion earning \$1.50 or over and a considerably larger proportion earning each of the other specified amounts than is shown by any other race. Among those earning \$1.50 or over there is little difference in the proportions of the Irish, Greeks, and Bulgarians, each showing a considerably larger proportion earning this amount than do the Croatians and a very much larger proportion than either of the other races for whom information was obtained, the very large proportion of Russians earning under this amount being in striking contrast to the proportion of each of the other races. None of the Greeks and, with the exception of the Irish and North Italians, only a very small proportion of each of the other races earn \$2 or over per day. The Irish, with 52.3 per cent, earning that amount show a considerably larger proportion than do the North This is true of the Irish and North Italians earning each specified amount. No Russians earn over \$2.50, and no Bulgarians, Croatians, or Poles over \$3.50 per day. With the exception of the Irish and North Italians above mentioned each of the other races shows a small proportion earning each specified amount. A comparison of those whose fathers were born in Ireland with the foreign-born Irish shows that with the exception of those earning \$1.50 or over the former show a considerably larger proportion earning each specified amount than do the latter.

The following table shows, by locality and by general nativity and race, the percentage of male employees 18 years of age or over earning

\$2 or over per day.

Considering the male employees for whom information was obtained in the entire industry, it will be seen from the above table that 22.3 per cent earn \$2 or over per day, the foreign-born reporting 14.5 per cent earning this amount, as compared with 72.1 per cent of the nativeborn of foreign father and 59.7 per cent of the native whites born of native father. The proportion of negroes native-born of native father earning that amount, it will be noted, is slightly in excess of that shown by the total for all employees. As between the several localities, it will be noted that no employees in the Middle West earn \$2 or over per day, as compared with 11.9 per cent in the South and 29.4 per cent in the East. As regards both the foreign-born and native whites and negroes born of native father, it will be seen that the proportion earning \$2 or over per day in the East is in excess of the proportion earning that amount in the South, the difference being much more marked among the whites and negroes than among the total foreign-born. As regards the foreign-born races, it will be noted that neither the Croatians nor South Italians show a proportion in the Middle West earning \$2 or over per day. The South Italians, however, who show a proportion only slightly in excess of the Croatians in the East earning this amount, show a considerably larger proportion than do the South Italians in the South.

The next table submitted shows, by locality and by general nativity and race, the percentage of male employees 18 years of age or over

earning \$1.50 or over per day:

Irrespective of locality, it will be noted that of the male employees in this industry 69.4 per cent earn \$1.50 or over per day, the foreign-born reporting 65.2 per cent, as compared with 99 per cent of the native-born of foreign father, 88.6 per cent of the native white born of native father, and 71.8 per cent of the native negroes born of native father. Among the foreign-born it will be noted that the Croatians show a much larger proportion earning this amount than

do the South Italians. As between the several localities it will be noted that a much larger proportion in the Middle West than in the East and a very much larger proportion than in the South earn \$1.50 or over per day. Of the foreign-born it will be noted that a slightly smaller proportion in the East than in the South and a much smaller proportion in each of these localities than in the Middle West earn \$1.50 or over per day. Among the native-born of native father it will be noted that both the whites and negroes show a much larger proportion earning \$1.50 or over per day in the East than in the South.

Among the foreign-born the Croatians report only 66.4 per cent in the East, as compared with 100 per cent in the Middle West, earning \$1.50 or over per day, while of the South Italians earning this amount the proportion in the Middle West is considerably in excess of that in the East or South, the last-named reporting but 50.5 per cent.

From the above table it will be noted that exactly 50 per cent of the 154 male employees for whom information was obtained earn between \$1.50 and \$2 per day, 2.5 per cent earn \$2 or over, and less than 2 per cent earn under \$1. With the exception of a slightly smaller proportion of the total native-born earning \$1.25 or over and a much smaller proportion \$1.50 or over, and a slightly larger proportion of the foreign-born earning these specified amounts, the proportions of both the total native-born and foreign-born vary little from the proportions shown by the total for all male employees earning each specified rate per day. None of the South Italians earn \$2.50 or over per day and a slightly smaller proportion earn \$2 or over and \$1 or over, while a slightly larger proportion earn \$1.25 or over and \$1.50 or over than is shown by the total for all male employees.

# RELATION BETWEEN PERIOD OF RESIDENCE AND EARNING ABILITY.

The progress in industrial efficiency or earning ability made by foreign-born employees after designated periods of residence in this country is considered in the following table, which shows, by race and by length of residence in the United States, the per cent of foreign-born male employees 18 years of age or over earning each specified amount per day. By grouping the proportion in each period of residence under the several races it is possible to make a study of the progress in earning ability made by the foreign-born employees of each race.

That the length of residence in the United States tends, upon the whole, to materially increase the earning ability of the foreign-born male employees in this industry for whom information was obtained is apparent from the above table. With the exception of the Bulgarians, only a very small proportion of whom, regardless of the length of their residence in the United States, earn \$2 or over per day, and with the exception of the Croatians, 8 of whom have been in the United States ten years or over, none of whom earn \$3 or over per day, each race shows a large gain in the proportions earning each specified rate excepting the lowest as the length of residence in the United States increases. While this gain varies more or less as between the several specified rates and also as between the several races, it is, nevertheless, most substantial.

Among the several foreign-born races the representatives of which have been in the United States less than five years and who earn each specified rate per day, it will be noted that only 5.4 per cent of the Bulgarians earn under \$1.50 per day, as compared with 53.3 per cent of the Poles. Little difference exists between the proportions of North Italians, South Italians, or Poles earning under \$1.50 per day, while the proportion of Croatians earning under that amount is very much larger than that shown by the Bulgarians. None of the Bulgarians or Croatians earn \$3.50 or over, none of the North Italians or South Italians earn \$4 or over, and none of the Poles \$2.50 or over per day. Of those earning \$2 or over per day the Bulgarians show the smallest proportion, or 0.5 per cent, while the North Italians, with 17.1 per cent, report a very much larger proportion earning this amount than do any of the other races. As regards these same races the representatives of which have been in the United States from five to nine years, it will be noted that no Bulgarians earn \$2 or over and that no Croatians or Poles earn \$3.50 or over per day. Of those earning \$1.50 per day the Bulgarians, with 87.5 per cent, show a slightly larger proportion than the North Italians and a considerably larger proportion than the Croatians, Poles, or South Italians in the order named, while of those earning each specified rate, with the exception of \$4 or over, the proportion of North Italians is largely in excess of that of any other race. Considering those who have been in the United States ten years or over, it will be noted that none of the Croatians earn \$3 or over, and none of the Poles \$3.50 or over per day. With the exception of those earning \$1.50 or over it will be noted that a much larger proportion of North Italians than of any other race earn \$2 or over, \$3 or over, and \$3.50 or over, and that a slightly larger proportion of this than any other race earn \$2.50 or over or \$4 or over per day. As between the South Italians and Poles earning \$3 or over per day the proportion of the latter is only slightly below that of the former, while as between these same races earning each previous specified amount the proportion of the latter is considerably below that of the former; the Poles in each instance where a proportion earning each specified rate is reported show a smaller proportion than does either of the other races.

Upon information obtained for 5,583 male employees in this industry, it will be noted that 63.7 per cent can read and 62.4 per cent can both read and write. The proportion of foreign-born who can read and who can read and write is in each instance slightly below that shown by the total for all employees. On the other hand, all employees native-born of foreign father can read and both read and write,

while the native whites born of native father report 91.7 per cent who read and 91.4 per cent who read and write. As regards the native negroes born of native father, it will be noted that the proportion who read and who both read and write is in each instance slightly in excess of that shown for all employees. Among the foreign-born, it will be noted that the Norwegians alone report no illiteracy. Closely following the Norwegians, with 97.7 per cent who can read, are the Irish, who show a slightly larger proportion than the Herzegovinians and Magyars and a considerably larger proportion than that shown by any other race, the Croatians reporting the lowest proportion, or 44.6 per cent. As regards those who can both read and write, the Irish again report a proportion only slightly below that of the Norwegians, but which is slightly above that of the Magyars or Herzegovinians and considerably above that of any other race, the Croatians again reporting the lowest proportion, or 42.3 per cent, who can both read and write.

In the next table presented the percentage of male employees who read is shown according to locality and general nativity and race.

The above table shows that of the male employees for whom information was obtained in this industry, irrespective of locality, 63.7 per cent can read, the foreign-born reporting 57.4, as compared with 100 per cent of the native-born of foreign father, 91.7 per cent of the native whites born of native father, and 69.2 per cent of the native negroes born of native father. Among the foreign-born it will be noted that there is little difference in the proportion of Croatians or South Italians who read, each showing a much smaller proportion than is shown by the North Italians. It will be noted that 68 per cent of all males for whom information was obtained in the East read, as compared with 53.8 per cent of those in the Middle West and 54.8 per cent of those in the South. The foreign-born and native-born of native father, both whites and negroes, each show a

larger proportion in the East who read than in the South, the difference being much more marked among the whites and negroes nativeborn of native father than among the foreign-born, the proportion of the foreign-born in the Middle West who read being slightly in excess of the proportion in the South and slightly below the proportion shown in the East. As regards the native-born of foreign father, it will be seen that the entire number for whom information was obtained in the East read. Among the foreign-born it will be noted that the proportion of South Italians in the East who read is slightly in excess of that in the South or Middle West, while of the North Italians a slightly larger proportion in the South read than in the East. On the other hand, the Croatians show a considerably larger proportion who read in the Middle West than in the East.

#### CONJUGAL CONDITION.

The following table shows, by general nativity and race, the percentage of male employees 20 years of age or over in each conjugal condition.

From information obtained in this industry for 5,121 male employees it will be noted that 45.7 per cent are single, 52.7 per cent married, and 1.6 per cent widowed. The foreign-born, as well as the native-born of foreign father and the native whites born of native father, each show a proportion single, married, and widowed similar to the proportion shown by the total for all employees. The negroes native-born of native father, however, show a considerably larger proportion single and a considerably lower proportion married than

do the native whites born of native father. As regards the nativeborn of foreign father, those whose fathers were born in Ireland show a slightly smaller proportion both single and married, and a slightly larger proportion widowed than is shown for the total number of employees. Among the foreign-born, on the other hand, the proportions of the various races in each conjugal condition vary considerably. None of the Greeks, Herzegovinians, or Roumanians, and, with the exception of 7.9 per cent of the Irish, only a very small proportion of each of the other races is widowed, the proportion in no instance exceeding 1.8 per cent. As regards those who are single, the Herzegovinians, with 84.3 per cent, report by far the largest proportion, while the lowest proportion, or 27.5 per cent, is shown by the Bulgarians. Following the Herzegovinians are the Poles, 57.4 per cent of whom are single. This proportion, it will be noted, is slightly in excess of that shown by the Greeks, Irish, or Croatians, considerably in excess of that shown by the Russians, South Italians, or North Italians, and largely in excess of that shown by the Roumanians, Magyars, or Slovaks, the last-named reporting a proportion single slightly above that of the Bulgarians.

The next table presented divides the totals of the one immediately preceding and shows, by general nativity and race and by age groups, the percentage of male employees in each conjugal condition:

Upon information obtained for 5,121 male employees in this industry, it will be seen that the largest proportion, or 52.7 per cent, of those who were 20 years of age or over are married, 45.7 per cent single, and 1.6 per cent widowed. Of those from 20 to 29 years of age by far the largest proportion, or 70.2 per cent, are single, and 29.4 per cent married, while of those from 30 to 44 years of age, only 20 per cent are single and 78 per cent married. A still further decrease in the percentage single and an increase in the percentage married is noted among those 45 years of age or over from the proportions shown in the preceding age group. The foreign-born show proportions in each conjugal condition in each age group that vary little from the proportions shown in the total for all male employees. This is also true of the native whites born of foreign father and the native whites born of native father who are 20 years of age or over and who are from 20 to 29 years of age, and in so far as the native whites born of native father are concerned it is true of those who are 45 years of age or over. On the other hand, both the native-born of foreign father and native whites born of native father show a considerably larger proportion single and a considerably smaller proportion married than is shown in the total for all employees. As compared with the proportions shown in the total in each conjugal condition, the native-born of foreign father who are 45 years of age or over, while showing only a slightly larger proportion single, show a considerably larger proportion widowed and a considerably smaller proportion married. As regards the native negroes born of native father, it will be noted that of those 20 years of age or over the proportion single is considerably in excess, while the proportion married is considerably below that shown by the native whites born of native father. is equally true as between the males of these races from 30 to 44 years of age and 45 years of age or over, while as regards those from 20 to 29 years of age the proportion of negroes single is slightly in excess and the proportion married slightly below that shown by the native whites. Among the foreign-born, it will be noted that the largest proportion of each race from 20 to 29 years of age is single, the difference in the proportions single and married being much more marked among some races than among others. By way of illustration, the Bulgarians in this age group report 52.6 per cent single and 46.4 per cent married, while the Greeks report 88 per cent single and only 12 per cent married. The Bulgarians and South Italians alone show small proportions widowed in this age group. None of the Greeks, and only a very small proportion of each of the other races, the representatives of which are from 30 to 44 years of age, are widowed, while the largest proportion of each race is married, the Irish showing the smallest proportion married. The Bulgarians, on the other hand, show the largest proportion married, or 96.3 per As regards those 45 years of age or over, none of the Bulgarians and Croatians and only small proportions of the North Italians, South Italians, and Greeks, as compared with 32.3 per cent of the Irish, are single. All of the Bulgarians are married. the Bulgarians are the Croatians, who show a slightly larger proportion married than do the North Italians, South Italians, or Greeks, and a much larger proportion than the Irish. The Irish, on the other hand, show by far the largest proportion widowed, or 22.6 per cent, while none of the Bulgarians or Greeks and only a very small proportion of each of the other races in this period of residence group are in that conjugal condition. A comparison of the foreign-born Irish with those native-born of foreign father shows that the proportions in each conjugal condition who were from 20 to 29 years of age and from 30 to 44 years of age vary little one from the other, while of those 45 years of age or over the foreign-born show a considerably larger proportion single, a considerably smaller proportion married, and a slightly smaller proportion widowed than is shown by the native Irish born of foreign father.

Irrespective of locality, it will be noted that of the male employees for whom information was obtained 52.7 per cent are married, both the foreign-born and native-born of foreign father showing a proportion married slightly above, while the native whites born of native father show a proportion slightly below, that shown in the total for all male employees. The negroes native-born of native father, on the other hand, report a proportion married considerably below that shown by the native whites. It will be noted that the proportion of employees in the Middle West who are married is considerably in excess of the proportion in the East or South, in the order named. This is also true of the foreign-born, while both the whites and negroes native-born of native father show a larger proportion in the South than in the East who are married, the difference being less marked among the negroes than among the whites. foreign-born both the Croatians and South Italians show a considerably larger proportion married in the Middle West than in the East, the proportion of South Italians married in the East being slightly in excess of that shown in the South. As regards the North

Italians, however, it will be noted that a much larger proportion in

the East than in the South are married.

The most significant fact in connection with the conjugal condition of foreign-born employees is the location of the wives of the married males. Although a large proportion of the employees of foreign birth are married, a considerable proportion left their wives in their native countries when immigrating to the United States. In this connection the following table is submitted, which shows, by race of husband, the percentage of foreign-born husbands who report wife in the United States and the percentage who report wife abroad:

Information was obtained in this industry for 1,829 foreign-born busbands, of which number only 23.8 per cent report wife in the United States, while 76.2 per cent report wife abroad. None of the Bulgarians, Greeks, or Roumanians and only 6.9 per cent of the Croatians report wives in the United States. The Irish, on the other hand, report by far the largest proportion, or 97.7 per cent. Both the South Italians and Poles report proportions below, while the North Italians show a proportion above that shown in the total for all foreign-born husbands.

From the preceding table it will be seen that 76.2 per cent of the foreign-born husbands in all localities report wife abroad, the proportion of husbands in the Middle West reporting wife abroad being considerably in excess of the proportion in the South and largely in excess of the proportion shown in the East. As between the Croatians and South Italians in this industry, a considerably larger proportion of the former than the latter report wife abroad. As regards the Croatians, the proportion of husbands in the Middle West reporting wife abroad is slightly in excess of that shown in the East, while of the South Italians the proportion of husbands in the Middle West with wife abroad is considerably in excess of the proportion shown in the South and largely in excess of that shown in the East.

The extent to which married males of foreign birth who had left their wives abroad when immigrating to the United States sent for them after designated periods of residence in this country is considered in the following table, which shows, by race of husband and by years husband has been in the United States, the percentage of

With the exception of the Bulgarians, none of whom in any specified period of residence report wives in the United States, it will be noted that the proportion of husbands of each race reporting wives abroad decreases as the length of residence of the husbands increases, the greatest gain being noted as between the South Italian husbands who have been in the United States from five to nine years and ten years or over.

#### VISITS ABROAD.

The tendency manifested by foreign-born employees to return to their native lands for visits of varying duration after designated periods of residence in this country is set forth in the table following, which shows, by years in the United States and race, the visits abroad made by foreign-born employees.

Of the 3,561 foreign-born employees for whom information was obtained, 12.7 per cent of those who have been in the United States under five years, as compared with 42 per cent of those who have been in the United States from five to nine years and 38.2 per cent of those who have been in the United States ten years or over, have made one or more visits abroad. The proportion of Greeks with a residence of less than five years who have made one or more visits abroad is in striking contrast to the proportion of each of the other races, the South Italians reporting 16.7 per cent, the largest proportion, while the Greeks report only 1.6 per cent. None of the Bulgarians or Greeks, who have been in the United States from five to nine years and a considerably smaller proportion of Croatians than North Italians or South Italians report one or more visits abroad. As regards those who have been in the United States ten years or over, the proportion of Croatians who report one or more visits abroad is very low as compared with the proportion of either of the North or South Italians. That the tendency toward visiting their native land on the part of the North and South Italians is greater than on the part of any other race is apparent from the above table.

The preceding table shows that 20.2 per cent of the foreign-born male employees for whom information was obtained have made one or more visits abroad. Of those in the East, 22.8 per cent have made one or more visits abroad, as compared with 17.9 per cent in the Middle West and 11.3 per cent in the South. Both the Croatians and South Italians show a slightly larger proportion who have made one or more visits abroad in the Middle West than in the East. As regards the South Italians, it will be noted that the proportion in the South who have made one or more visits abroad is much below the proportion in the East and very much below that in the Middle West.

The preceding table shows that 26.6 per cent of the 5,788 male employees in this industry reporting are from 20 to 24 years of age, 21.1 per cent are from 25 to 29, 15.2 per cent are from 30 to 34, 19.1 per cent are from 35 to 44, and 6.5 per cent are from 45 to 54 years of age while very small proportions are 55 or over or under 14 years of age. were from 14 to 19 years of age closely followed by the native-born whites of native father and negroes who are native-born of native father, while native-born of foreign father show somewhat smaller proportions in this age group than do other nativity groups given above. Negroes show the highest percentage of male employees from 20 to 24 years of age, followed by foreign-born native whites born of native father, and native-born of foreign father, the latter showing comparatively small proportions. There is no considerable difference between the percentages of the different nativity groups in the following specified age groups, except that showing persons from 35 to 44 years of age, where native-born of foreign father show a high percentage when compared with the proportions shown by the other nativity groups. Of the foreign-born races the Herzegovinians show the highest percentage of males from 14 to 19 and from 20 to 24 years of age and the Irish the lowest percentage. last-named race shows the highest percentage from 45 to 54 and 55 years of age or over; Slovaks, Russians, Roumanians, Poles, Magvars, and Herzegovinians show no males who are 55 years of age or over.

The lack of interest in American citizenship on the part of the employees studied in this industry can be noted from the fact that of the 594 employees reporting complete data only 75, or 12.6 per cent, are fully naturalized and an additional 65, or 10.9 per cent, have first papers. But few races report in sufficient numbers to be represen-

tative. Of these the Irish, with 27, or 67.5 per cent, out of 40 employees are fully naturalized and an additional 6, or 15 per cent, have secured first papers. The employees of the other races who have manifested any interest in this regard are few, the 146 North Italians reporting 13, or 8.9 per cent, fully naturalized and 22, or 15.1 per cent, with first papers, as compared with a smaller proportion of the South Italians and a still smaller proportion of the Croatians.

The disposition of employees of foreign birth to acquire citizenship after designated periods of residence in this country is exhibited in the following table, which shows, by years in the United States and race, the present political condition of foreign-born male employees who were 21 years of age or over at time of coming to the United

Of those foreign-born male employees who have been in the United States from five to nine years, only 2.8 per cent are fully naturalized and an additional 9.4 per cent have first papers, while of those who have been in the United States ten years or over 39.6 per cent are fully naturalized and an additional 15.1 per cent have first papers. While the proportions of both North and South Italians who have been in the United States from five to nine years and have first papers only vary little from the proportion shown by the total for all employees, the proportion of each race fully naturalized is below that shown by the total. As regards the proportions of these same races fully naturalized and having first papers only, who have been in the United States ten years or over, it will be noted that the North Italians show a slightly larger proportion than the South Italians in each instance, each race, however, showing a considerably smaller proportion fully naturalized than is shown by the total for all foreign-born employees, while the reverse is true of those having first papers only.

Of the 4,127 foreign-born male employees in this industry for whom information was obtained, only 35.8 per cent speak English. A comparison of the various races discloses the fact that the Slovaks, with 73.8 per cent, show a considerably larger proportion with ability to speak English than do the North Italians, Croatians, or Magyars, and a very much larger proportion than do any of the other races. The Herzegovinians, with 6.6 per cent, and the Bulgarians, with 8 per cent, show the lowest proportions with ability to speak English. As between the South Italians and Greeks, it will be noted that the former, with 31.5 per cent who speak English, show a considerably larger proportion than the latter, who in turn show a slightly larger proportion than the Poles and a considerably larger proportion than the Roumanians or Russians.

The next table presented shows, by locality and by race, the percentage of foreign-born male employees who were able to speak English:

From the above table it will be noted that 35.8 per cent of the foreign-born male employees in all localities for whom information was obtained speak English. The North Italians and Croatians, with proportions very nearly the same, each show a much larger proportion who speak English than do the South Italians. In both the East and South the proportions who speak English are considerably above, while in the Middle West the proportions are very much below, that shown in the total for all localities. The Croatians show a very much larger proportion in the East than in the Middle West who speak English, while as regards both the North Italians and South Italians it will be noted that a much larger proportion of the former in the South than in the East and a considerably larger proportion of the latter in the South than in the East speak English. Of the latter it will be noted that a much larger proportion in both the South and East than in the Middle West speak English.

The following table makes possible a comparison of the relative proportion of younger and older immigrants able to speak English. It shows, by age at time of coming to the United States and race, the percentage of foreign-born male employees who were able to speak

As regards the ability of the foreign-born male employees who were under 14 or 14 years of age or over at time of coming to the United States to speak English, it will be noted that of those who were under 14 years of age at time of coming 88.7 per cent now speak English, as compared with 34.9 per cent of those who were 14 years of age or over at time of arrival. As between the North Italians and South Italians who were under 14 years of age at time of arrival, it will be noted that all of the former now speak English, as compared with 88.9 per cent of the latter. Considering those who were 14 years of age or over, it will be seen that as compared with the other races the proportion of Bulgarians who now speak English is extremely low, the proportion amounting to only 8 per cent. On the other hand, the Croatians and North Italians, who show the largest proportions, each show a proportion in excess of, while the South Italians, Greeks, and Poles each show a proportion below, that shown by the total for all foreign-born male employees.

That the ability of the foreign-born male employees in this industry to speak English increases with length of residence is apparent from the above table. By way of illustration, 25.1 per cent of those who have been in the United States under five years speak English, as compared with 63.7 per cent of those who have been in the United States from five to nine years and 87.9 per cent of those with a residence of ten years or over. As regards those who have been in the United States under five years, the Croatians and North Italians each show a proportion who speak English in excess of that shown for all foreignborn male employees, the former showing a considerably larger proportion than the latter. The proportion of Greeks varies slightly and that of the South Italians considerably from the proportion shown by the total. This is also true of the Poles and Bulgarians, except that the proportion of the former is considerably below and that of the latter very much below the proportion for all foreign-born male employees. None of the Bulgarians who have been in the United States from five to nine years speak English, while the largest proportion, or 77.6 per cent, is shown by the North Italians. The Bulgarians, it will be noted, present the only instance in which the ability to speak English is not increased by the length of residence in the United States. The proportion of Poles who speak English it will be seen is considerably below that of either the Croatians, South Italians, or Greeks, these last three races reporting very nearly the same proportions. Each shows a proportion who speak English considerably below that shown for all foreign-born employees. Among those with a residence of ten years or over in the United States, all Poles speak English, while the Croatians, North Italians, and South Italians follow the same general tendency as shown in the total.

# CHAPTER I.

# INTRODUCTION.

Explanation of study—Description of localities studied—Employees for whom information was secured—[Text Table 33 and General Table 14].

#### EXPLANATION OF STUDY.

The investigation of construction work in the East was made in the States of New York and New Jersey. The work covered was railway and other construction for the completion of which from two to eight years was required. Twenty-eight camps and two trains of camp cars were visited. This data, secured during the summer of 1909, is intended to show the nationality and general class of labor employed on construction work. Individual schedules were secured as far as possible from all the laborers in the camps and cars visited and descriptive notes made of the methods of employing and treatment of immigrants and of their manner of living. In ordinary railroad construction the bulk of the labor is performed by unskilled laborers. Although much of the work is done by machinery, large forces of men are also employed. Such occupations as dumping the dirt trains, moving the tracks, on which these trains run, picking the slopes of the cuts and digging out foundations require only the unskilled labor which are all classed under the general term of pickand-shovel laborers. In making this investigation more stress was laid on the importance of securing individual schedules than other The method followed in securing these cards was such kinds of data. as to carry the investigators into the camps rather than the office of the employers. The attempt was made at first to have the employers secure individual schedules and a visit was made to the office of each contractor or firm and schedules left, but on the return trip it was found that few of them had been secured, and the investigator in most cases either employed one of the office clerks to obtain them at night and at odd times, or went among the men on the work and in camp, thus securing them himself. The data obtained by means of these cards afford the statistical basis of the present report.

# DESCRIPTION OF LOCALITIES STUDIED.

The majority of the camps visited were engaged in work which was being done in a thickly settled dairy-farming district. The surrounding country was mountainous, but the construction camps and

work were in the rolling country or valleys. A network of railways, some crossing and some paralleling the line of the work, together with a good system of macadamized roads, furnished ample transportation facilities. Dairy farming and potato raising were the chief industries in the immediate section. There were small towns and villages within a few miles of each other throughout the district traversed by the railroad on which these construction camps were visited, but the construction work was the only attraction for the foreign-born laborers. The climate was not especially favorable to this kind of work, as some of the operations had to be discontinued during the three winter months. The bulk of it, however, was comparatively convenient to New York City, where the immigrant laborers returned when thrown out of work.

#### EMPLOYEES FOR WHOM INFORMATION WAS SECURED.

The extent of the data secured for individual employees in the East is exhibited by the following table, which shows the number and percentage of male employees of each race for whom information was secured.

The above table shows that of the foreign-born male employees for whom information was secured 68.9 per cent have been in the United States under five years, 19.8 per cent from five to nine years, and only a small proportion ten years or over. All of the Herzegovinians and a larger proportion of the Russians, Croatians, and Poles than of the individuals of any other race have been in this country under five years and a larger proportion of Magyars, North Italians, Slovaks, and South Italians than of the individuals of any other race have been here from five to nine years.

The preceding table shows that of the total number of employees for whom information was secured 78.5 per cent were foreign-born, 10.3 per cent were native-born whites of native father, 6.1 per cent were negroes who were native-born of native father, and 5.1 per cent were native-born of foreign father.

Of 2,861 males reporting in this industry by far the largest proportion, 55.1 per cent, were farmers or farm laborers before coming to the United States, 30 per cent were general laborers, and 8 per cent were in hand trades. The percentage engaged in manufacturing, in trade, and in other occupations before coming to the United States was very small. Croatians and Poles show the highest percentages who were farmers or farm laborers and North Italians the smallest proportion engaged in this occupation. All of the races except Poles, Croatians, and Irish report between 30 and 40 per cent of their number as having been general laborers, the two races first mentioned showing somewhat over 16 per cent. Irish show the highest percentage who were engaged in manufacturing, hand trades, and other occupations.

The preceding table shows that 67.7 per cent of males engaged in this industry and reporting complete data earn \$1.50 per day or over. 29.4 per cent earn \$2 per day or over, 18.4 per cent earn \$2.50 per day or over, and 12.4 per cent earn \$3 per day or over. The proportions earning \$3.50 or over and \$4.50 or over per day are very small. Native-born of foreign father shows the highest per cent earning \$1.50 per day or over, followed in the order named by native whites born of native father, negroes who are native-born of native father, and foreign-born, the latter showing very much smaller proportions. same order continues for each specified rate per day up to and including those who earn \$4 or over. Foreign-born in every instance shows a comparatively small proportion earning under each specified rate when compared with the other nativity groups given in the table. Of the foreign-born races Irish show the highest percentage earning each specified rate per day and Russians the lowest. No Croatians nor Poles earn \$3.50 or over per day and no Russians earn \$2.50 or over per day, the latter race showing a very high percentage earning under \$1.50.

# RELATION BETWEEN PERIOD OF RESIDENCE AND EARNING ABILITY.

The extent of progress in industrial efficiency or earning ability of foreign-born employees after designated periods of residence in this country is set forth in the table next presented. The table shows, by race and length of residence in the United States, the percentage of foreign-born male employees who were 18 years of age or over earning each specified amount per week, the proportions in each specified period of residence being grouped under the several races in order to make possible a study of the progress in earning ability of foreignborn male employees of each race.

The above table shows that in almost all instances the earnings of the individual increase according to length of residence in the United States. There are only two exceptions to this rule—Croatians who have been in this country under five years showing a slightly higher percentage earning \$1.50 a day or over than Croatians with a residence of from five to nine years, and Poles who have been in this country from five to nine years showing a higher percentage earning the above specified rate per day than those with a residence of ten years or over.

The following table embodies the same data as the one immediately preceding, but in a somewhat different form.

Of the male employees studied who have been in the United States under five years, none earn as much as \$3.50 a day, excepting the North Italians, of whom less than 1 per cent earn between \$3.50 and \$4 per day. Of the Croatians, 66.2 per cent earn \$1.50 or over a day, leaving 33.8 per cent who earn under that amount. Of the North Italians, 55.5 per cent earn less than \$1.50 per day, while for the South Italians and the Poles the proportions are almost the same. The North Italians show a higher rate of earnings than do any of the other races. Of those who have been in this country from five to nine years, only a very small proportion for each of two races earn as much as \$3.50 per day. In this period of residence also, the North Italians show the highest rate of earnings. The Croatians, of whom 34.6 per cent earn under \$1.50 a day, show the lowest rate of earnings. Among those who have been in the United States for ten or more years, the North Italians show the smallest proportion of persons earning less than \$1.50 per day. The Poles, of whom 40 per cent earn under that amount, show the lowest rate of earnings. None of the Croatians earn as much as \$3 per day and none of the Poles earn as much as \$3.50 per day.

# CHAPTER IV.

# WORKING CONDITIONS.

Methods of employment of immigrants—Regularity of employment—Hours worked per day and per week—Frequency and method of wage payments—Standard of living—Schools—Housing—Cost and manner of living—Savings—Law and order—Medical attention—Commissary stores—Detention practices—Employers' opinions—Liquor traffic—Amusements.

## METHODS OF EMPLOYMENT OF IMMIGRANTS.

The three methods of securing labor for the work in the East adopted by employers were, in the order of their importance, found to be as follows:

1. Padrone.

2. Labor agencies.

3. Personal application.

While the distribution of labor is effected largely through some employment agency, the majority of the labor engaged in construction work in this region was brought out from New York and Philadelphia by padrones. The Italian padrone system, according to the Bulletin of the Bureau of Labor for September, 1907, was developed in the United States after 1885. Its existence is due to the immigrant's ignorance of the American customs and to his willingness to trust his welfare to one of his own race who has been in this country long enough to have become familiar with such methods and customs.<sup>a</sup>

The methods followed by the padrones are very simple. They first contract with a contractor or railroad company to furnish labor, for which they are allowed the privilege of running the commissary. most cases where the employers are contractors, and not the railroad company itself, the padrones get only about 90 per cent of the commissary profits. After the padrone has established his commissions the contractor notifies him of the number of men needed, and he goes to New York or Philadelphia and secures them. In getting the men in these cities the padrones generally operate in conjunction with a banker or labor agency, or else makes a canvass of the section in which these immigrants live when out of work. A padrone having once established himself with a contractor usually remains with him, enlarging his business and increasing the number of his commissions as the contractor's business grows. The contractors employing a large number of men like the arrangement, as it insures them labor, does away with the necessity of keeping an interpreter, and gives them, through the padrone, a hold on the men that they would not otherwise have. This system prevailed in all except five of the camps studied in the East, these five being camps that had a large percentage

of other than Italian laborers. One case was noted where two padrones operated a bank and labor agency in Philadelphia and a string of commissary stores on the railroad work in New Jersey. padrone remained at the scene of the construction work, directing the commissaries, while his banking partner in Philadelphia gathered the men and sent them out. They also handled the savings of the laborers whom they employed. A large construction camp in the eastern part of New York State was the only camp securing its labor directly from labor agencies. The contractor at this camp and one of his two subcontractors with a smaller camp near by operated their own commissaries and secured their own labor. The main camp contained about 2,000 laborers. A few had come to the work of their own accord, having learned through their friends of its whereabouts, but the majority were secured through labor agencies. The contractor was accustomed to send an order for a certain number of men, usually stating nationality desired, to the agency in New York. This agency requested each laborer to sign an agreement printed on a small ticket to the effect that the transportation expenses and a fee, usually \$2.50 per man, for securing him work should be deducted from his first wages. The amount each man owed was charged against him when he was given the contractor's metal working check. In bringing the men to the work either the contractor's interpreter or one of the agencies' representatives escorted them.

Personal application as a means of securing work is more in evidence when work is scarce than at other times. One camp engaged in railroad work in New Jersey, containing over 300 laborers, was supplied entirely by this method. In that particular camp the Croatians were in the majority. The commissary store was conducted by the contractor, but there were several boarding houses managed by Croatians, to whose advantage it would be to have a large number of men in camp. These Croatians were in the habit of writing their friends and relatives to come. During the industrial depression of 1907-8 there were large numbers of men going about in districts where construction work was in progress looking for work, and from these wandering gangs many were employed. In more prosperous times, when labor becomes scarce, the contractors that have been relying upon this method for labor have to turn to the labor agencies. Since the padrone system is confined entirely to the Italian nationality, contractors not using this race do not employ the padrone system in securing their labor. Numbers of immigrants come from their native homes direct to the construction camps, having been notified through their friends and relatives of the chance for employment. As a rule the laborers who have been secured by personal application remain in the work longer, as nothing has been misrepresented to them regarding the work, as is often the case with those employed by the other methods. It is also much cheaper to the laborer, as he pays no fees to padrones or labor agencies for securing work.

## REGULARITY OF EMPLOYMENT.

Ordinarily the period of employment in construction work is from five months to two years. For no length of time is the number of men employed the same. At times a larger force than usual is employed for a short while to rush some particular point on the work,

which, having been finished, the men are set adrift. This lack of permanence is the chief objection to this kind of employment. To married men, who would have their families with them, the lack of accommodations for women in camp is another element of undesirability. The work is sought mainly by those immigrants who expect to return to their native land when a few hundred dollars have been saved. The possibility of living at low cost even when the men are exploited by padrones and employers is the one great advantage over other kinds of work. It is comparatively free from danger of accidents, which is also a point in its favor with the Italians.

# HOURS WORKED PER DAY AND PER WEEK.

The standard of working hours on the railroad work in New Jersey was ten hours a day and sixty a week. All construction work in the State of New York is affected by the eight-hour law. On one job three shifts were worked, but the laborers generally made only eight hours each a day. On this work there was much Sunday labor, making the number of hours in many cases fifty-six a week. Generally speaking, outside construction work is done by the single shift. The character of the duty is such that the amount of work done by the same gang is less at night than in the daytime, and for that reason contractors do not favor night work. It is resorted to only when the time limit for completing the work is nearly up.

# FREQUENCY AND METHOD OF WAGE PAYMENTS.

The frequency of wage payments varied from once a week to once a month, though payments once every two weeks were the custom. The largest camp visited paid its men weekly. In all cases the employers were one pay period behind as it would be impossible to keep the time and commissary accounts in such shape as to pay up to date on each pay day. The usual method of keeping time was to have a timekeeper go over the work twice a day and check up the time as turned in by the gang bosses to avoid possible errors. In some cases tickets for the amount of a day's wage were issued each night for the previous day's work. These tickets bore the amounts in figures from 1 to 25, placed around the margin. They also usually had the contractor's name, the laborer's name or number, and a statement that they would be void unless presented by the laborer to whom it had been issued. The amount of goods bought in the commissaries were punched from the marginal figures as the purchases were made and the remainder was turned in with other whole tickets for cash on pay day. This method of issuing tickets, besides doing away with keeping a daybook in the commissary, also lessened the chance of leaving a laborer's time out, as each man asked for his ticket if it was not given him by the timekeeper. In paying off cash is generally used, although one camp paid off by means of commissary checks.

# STANDARD OF LIVING.

The standard of living in construction camps is necessarily below that which surrounds industries offering more permanent employ-ment and facilities for women. Many of the immigrants employed in such work, having come direct from their homes in Europe to the construction camps, have to be taught by their friends already on the work how to cook. Wherever there is a woman in the house there is a marked difference in the appearance as to cleanliness. most of the construction camps there are practically no women. Such is usually the case on railroad construction. Occasionally a man and his wife will run a boarding group or else a foreign gang boss or baker may have their wives with them. Among the laborers generally, however, there are no women. In strong contrast with this condition on railroad work were the many foreign families living in the large camps in the New York aqueduct work, where the employment was to last longer than the ordinary railway construction job. Here the men nearly all board or have their meals cooked by a woman. Another most commendable feature of the New York camp not met with in any other construction work was the existence of a church and school. This church was of the Roman Catholic faith. The building was of fair quality, being a wooden structure costing about \$600. There are only two or three immigrant families that attend, however, and these were Italians. The attendance was made up of Americans, both native and from the camp of the Roman Catholic faith.

# SCHOOLS.

There are two schools in the district included in the New York camp. One of them is the original public school that was in existence before the work was started. After the camp was established this school was not large enough to accommodate all the scholars so the contractors erected another larger building of three rooms in the main camp and the contractor's chief engineer was made superintendent of schools in the district. Under his supervision all the negro and foreign scholars attend the new school, while the old building is used for white American children, both of the camp and of the original inhabitants of the district. The teachers in both schools, as in any other public schools, are paid by the State of New York. The Society for Italian Immigrants, founded in New York City in 1901 and maintained by voluntary contributions, also conducts a night school in the new school building in this camp. There are about 140 men on the roll with an average nightly attendance of 40, mostly Italians, although any race is allowed to attend, the only cost to the pupils being for books. They are taught English and American methods, laws and customs, so as to prepare them for citizenship and enable them to take better care of themselves. There is also a kindergarten during the day in this new building conducted by the same society. Both foreign and white American children attend this school, but no negroes. This church and school were the only ones encountered anywhere in connection with construction work.

## HOUSING.

As regards housing conditions, the usual custom in New Jersey and eastern New York is to have one-story bunk houses about 70 feet long and 22 feet wide. They may be divided by board partitions into a number of rooms about 18 by 22 feet, with one door each, opening out of doors, or else have no partitions but a row of double-decked bunks on either side. With this latter arrangement, which is most common, there is a door at each end of the narrow passage which runs the entire length of the house. About midway of the house a space is left for the stove, which serves for both cooking and heating. Another door at the side of the house opens into the space left for the Two or three windows, 18 inches square, are cut along the sides to afford ventilation. Another type of house is a two-story building, 28 by 14 feet, with a shed room 14 by 14 feet at one end. The whole of the upper floor is one room and used as a sleeping room, there being sometimes cots or bunks built against the wall, while sometimes the bedding is simply thrown on the floor. The lower room is used as a living and dining room. The men also wash their clothes in this room, while the cooking is done in the shed, which also has a bed in it. All the houses are of the roughest lumber, covered on the roof and sides with tar paper. As many as 40 men are often crowded into a single bunk house. In one camp vermin had become so annoying that the men, who were Italians, built themselves little huts of old boxes and other scraps of plank, and covered them either with sod or discarded pieces of tar paper. These huts, however, were unfit for use as quarters in winter, when the men were compelled to move back into the bunk houses. The different races do not live together in the same bunk houses. The living conditions of the different camps vary only slightly, and in all cases are as bad as the filthy habits of the men and negligence of their employers can make them. Occasionally a shanty with its floors swept and a narrow space cleaned on the ground around it is seen; but the greater number have all the refuse matter from the kitchen lying where it was thrown from the door. The floors are unswept and dirty. bedding is filthy, as the laborers never wash themselves or buy clean bedding when they can find a supply of any description left by the men who occupied the shanties before them. For toilet arrangements, some of the camps have dry pits dug at some distance from the camps, with rough shanties built over them, but most of the camps have no arrangements. There seems to be little difference between races in the lack of cleanliness, and employers pay no attention to sanitary conditions. In two of the camps investigated, old farm houses were used for housing purposes. They were two-story houses in poor repair and had about 6 rooms each. The rooms had no inside doors, plastering in nearly all the rooms was gone, and the flooring and weatherboarding was broken. As in the case of most railway construction camps, the ground around the houses was heaped with garbage. The camp cars furnished by the railway companies to their men in the East are ordinary box cars, with windows about 18 inches square, cut in either side near the ends to afford ventilation. They have double-deck berths or "bunks," with one stove in the center of each car. From 10 to 14 men occupy a car. One

dollar per month per man is charged for the rent of the cars and shanties. The railway company furnishes the cars and the man who conducts the commissary gets the rental from them, which, together with his commissary profits, constitutes his pay for securing labor. The houses in one particular camp in New York, engaged in building the aqueduct for the city water supply are by far the best encountered on construction work. The camp contained in all, including the cottages built for the American superintendents, about 200 houses, and was built on sloping ground, which greatly aided the drainage. The houses were built on regular streets, with space enough between each house for a small garden. The principal streets on which there was much hauling were regularly sprinkled. There was a small hose wagon kept in camp, to be used in case of fire. water used in camp is brought from a mountain spring to a reservoir tank above camp, so that the force of gravity forces the water to all The sewerage is as good as in many small towns, all the toilets being flush and the sewers draining into a large covered cesspool some distance from the camp. Along the line of the aqueduct the camps were not as good as this main camp. The toilet facilities were merely dry pits, where lime was thrown occasionally.

The water supply was gotten from a pump or near-by spring.

The races living in the camp were segregated, there being an Italian, negro, American, and "Austrian" section in the main camp. This "Austrian" section includes all the Poles, Croatians, Slovaks, Magyars, and Herzegovinians. In the case of a few of the bunk houses on the outskirts of the camp, negroes were found living in one end of the bunk house, while a group of Russians, Poles, and Magyars occupied the other. Also in a few of the boarding groups Croatians, Finns, Swedes, and Herzegovinians were found living together. This is due to the fact that they all had the same occupation and were thus thrown together in the work. No instances were found, however, where Italians were living with other races. No attempt is made to segregate the different races on the work, but they all work together and do several different kinds of work in one week. The same gang of men may work in the stone quarry one day, on the concrete work the next, or moving the track for the dirt trains the following day. The fact that the houses occupied by the immigrants on the work are far better than are other construction work is due to the New York City board of water supply. This board is also responsible for the exceptionally good sanitary conditions found on this work. Inspectors keep close watch on the camps and notify the contractors when conditions are becoming unsatisfac-The contractors in turn issue orders to the occupants of the house or shanty in question, and if they do not improve conditions immediately the work is done for them and an exorbitant price is charged for it. These sanitary rules are more closely observed in the camps at Brown's Station than in those along the line of the aqueduct. Even in these camps, however, some of the bunk houses, built on the plan of the ordinary bunk house, are extremely filthy. They are on the outskirts of the camp and do not seem to be as closely inspected as the other houses. The houses on this work are of several types. Unlike the ordinary construction shanty, where cheapness is the first point, they are all, with the exception of two or three shanties, singly built. The houses in the main camp that

are occupied by the laborers, both native and foreign, are built one-story high in form of a "T", having four or five rooms, 4 by 16 feet, in a row, and one additional room projecting in the rear to serve as kitchen. There are outer doors to both the center room and the kitchen, but each of the other rooms is reached by going through this center room, which is usually a dining room. Others have only two rooms and the projecting kitchen. These smaller houses are occupied by a man and his wife, while the larger five-room houses are used by families who take boarders. The bunk houses in the main camp are about 80 feet long by 14 feet wide, and high enough to allow a double deck of bunks, built of rough boards, along the side. Some of the shanties in the smaller camps are 16 by 16 feet, having one door in front and a window on either side. small stove is placed near the front door to serve for both heating and cooking. These small shanties hold eight or ten men. Others are great barn-shaped affairs, built the height of a two-story house but with only one floor. There is a door at each end and a double deck of scaffolds along either side, broad enough to hold the beds and cots on which the men sleep. Windows are cut along the sides of both the top and bottom scaffolds and there is a raised opening in the center of the roof to give ventilation. All the houses on this work are built of good lumber closely fitted. The ceiling and walls are boarded up inside and the roofs and sides are covered with a kind of roofing paper. The bunk houses have the same side and roof covering, but inside they have no lining wall or ceiling. The cost of the average house in the main camp is about \$600, and the shanties and bunk houses in all the camps cost about twice as much as those used for the same purpose in railroad construction camps. In the main camp all the houses have a kitchen and each of the shanties has stove for cooking, but in several other camps the usual small hut, made of poles and scraps of plank and covered with sod, is used as kitchen. The Italians build more of these huts than do the members of any other race. The condition in which the interior of the houses are kept on the New York aqueduct work is for the most part exceptionally good especially where there is a woman in the house. Nearly all of the families are in the main camp, there being only one or two in each of the other camps. the houses had clean matting on the floors, white counterpanes and clean linen on the beds, a sewing machine, and were tastefully fur-These conditions were met with most frequently among the North Italians. Around the houses are attractive flower beds and also gardens in which they raise quite a lot of vegetables, the wife doing all the garden work in addition to her household duties. These houses are as neat and as clean as any inhabited by immigrant families in the cities, the heads of which were steel, glass, or other industrial employees. There are also in these camps some families who live in the greatest filth without being removed by the inspector.

The New York City board of water supply has a rule that no

The New York City board of water supply has a rule that no refuse or slops in the camps shall be thrown from the doors on the ground, but pits filled with broken stone must be prepared by the contractors and all slops thrown into them. This arrangement is not used in the main camp as there is a better sewerage plan; but in several of the smaller camps, which are at the edge or in a piece of

timber, this rule was totally disregarded.

#### COST AND MANNER OF LIVING.

In most of the construction camps the shanty rent is \$1 per month per capita, although in some it was as high as \$1.59. Of this higher price, however, the houses were much better than the average shanty found in construction camps. This charge also covers the cost of fuel and light. Often the wood that is cleared from the right of way is given the men for fuel. In some camps coal is furnished. The cost of food is about \$8 per month per man for the Italian and \$12 for the Croatian and other nationalities. Many of the Italians who cook for themselves even live cheaper. On the railroad construction the men generally do their own cooking, each man for himself, though frequently groups of five or six make an arrangement by which one man takes one day each week from his work and cooks for the others. Among the Croatians there are boarding groups, in which the boarding boss buys all the food from the commissary and at the end of the month each man's proportion is deducted from his wages by the commissary clerk. In one camp studied in the east there were several boarding houses conducted on the American plan in which the boarders paid \$2.50 per week for board and lodging. This arrangement was found among all the races except Italians, who either had the boarding-boss system or cooked for themselves. The few cases where an Italian took a boarder on the American plan occurred where a married man had a kinsman living with him. There were several camps in which the Swedes boarded in the camps with Americans paying \$15 each month and eating the same kind of food. Members of no other foreign race were found boarding with Americans. The men who cook for themselves use either the stove, with which each shanty is furnished, by the contractors, or else small out-door ovens built by themselves, by placing three flat stones on the edges to form an inclosure with one side open. Across the top is placed a flat bar of iron or sheet of tin on which the stewpan, their sole cooking utensil, is placed. In summer when the weather is good, they do most of their cooking on these ovens. Their tables are rough affairs nailed to the wall of the shanties when indoors, or boards nailed to a stake driven in the ground when out of doors. Many of them do not use any tables at all but eat from the stewpans in which the food is cooked, while sitting on the stones or logs about the camp The reason the Italian laborers do not board but cook for themselves is undoubtedly their inclination to save. From the following bill of fare it will be seen that they consume cheaper food than other races:

Italian.—Breakfast: Coffee and dry bread. Dinner: In home; macaroni and soup, bread and coffee. Dinner: At work; bread, bologna sausage, and onions. Supper: Macaroni, and either rice and tomatoes, or rice and potatoes, or rice and beans.

On Tuesday and Sunday the Italians usually have a boiled meat for supper, but bread and macaroni and either potatoes or tomatoes

form their most usual diet.

In the case of the Croatians, Polish, Slovaks, and Russians the food consumed during the day is usually as follows:

Breakfast: Bread and coffee. Dinner: Meat, bread, and coffee. Supper: Soup, bread, coffee, and beer and kraut.

On Tuesday and Sunday meat is eaten at each meal of the day.

# SAVINGS.

The Italians save more than any other race. Their habit of living and clothing themselves cheaply leaves them a large percentage of their wages. The amount drawn at each pay day by the common laborer is about \$35. Deducting \$10 a month for the Italians and \$15 for the other races for living expenses, \$20 to \$25 is left, and this they save. There are a number of young Italians who have begun to resemble Americans in dress and customs. Some of these spend their entire earnings in clothes and in the pursuit of pleasure. Most of the money saved by the immigrants is, however, sent to foreign banks in New York and Philadelphia, and these banks in turn send it to the immigrants' families in their native homes. From a small village post-office adjacent to one of the railroad construction camps there were sent between July, 1908, and July, 1909, 15 money orders to Austria, amounting to \$983, and 8 to Italy, amounting to \$580. During the same period an office near the next camp not issuing international money orders sent 78 to Philadelphia, amounting to \$4,021, and 19 to New York, amounting to \$668. These offices were chosen at random and are probably a fair representation of conditions found in other localities.

## LAW AND ORDER.

On all the work connected with the New York City reservoir and aqueduct construction there were regular police furnished by the city. In one camp there were about 20 of the contractor's men vested with the authority of a sheriff, in addition to the city police. With this force of officers there was no trouble in keeping order. In some of the outlying camps the walking bosses maintain order, although the work is patrolled by the city police. On all railroad work it is the custom for the camp superintendent or walking bosses to maintain order. Where the padrones have charge of all the commissions, as is the case on nearly all of the work covered by this report, they are looked to by the contractors to keep order in the camp. When a disturbance in camp occurs the padrone or foreman holds the men he deems best arrested until the local authorities can be notified. The most usual cause for calling on these local authorities is found in connection with a strike.

## MEDICAL ATTENTION.

Although living in a most insanitary manner and crowded into poorly ventilated shacks, the immigrants are largely free from disease. Doubtless the fact that the work is in the open air has a great deal to do with their good health. Pneumonia, malaria, and an occasional case of typhoid fever are the main diseases noticed among them, and these sicknesses are due rather to their manner of living than to any racial peculiarities. Medical attention is

needed in case of accident more than for sickness. On one job the contractor insured his entire force against accident for 2 per cent of the pay roll each month. The insurance company took charge of any laborer injured and cared for him until he was able to work again. In the other railroad work visited no medical attention was furnished by the employers. If a physician was needed, the men secured one from the nearest town. On the waterworks construction the usual custom of charging each employee a medical fee and furnishing a physician to cover the work each day was in practice.

At most of the camps on this work there were also hospitals for the use of the employees. Each employee was charged 20 cents each week for the medical fund, and out of this fund the hospital was maintained and the physicians were paid. Two of these hospitals were visited. One of them was merely a farmhouse, used for a hospital and not fitted with much of the usual hospital equipment. Only one physician and one nurse were there, and the doctor was away part of the day visiting the camps. But the other hospital was built expressly for that purpose and had every facility found in the average hospital. The beds, operating room, and other accessories were as good as are found in many city hospitals. the patients were cared for and operations performed in this hospital, unless it was otherwise preferred by the patient or the trouble happened to be of a nature requiring the service of a specialist, when the patient was taken to some city. The physicians interviewed stated that the races of northern Europe were liable to nervous diseases, but other than that have noticed no diseases peculiar to immigrants. The laborers on the work seemed to be especially healthy and every precaution was taken by the board of water supply to keep them so. Each man had to get a certificate of vaccination from the hospital before he was allowed to begin work. Many of the Croatians, Poles, Slovaks, and Russians had smallpox marks, but they had the disease before coming to this country.

#### COMMISSARY STORES.

The commissary stores on the railroad work were, with only one or two exceptions, operated by the padrones who furnished the labor. In two camps on the railroad construction work and in several camps on other kinds of construction work the commissaries were owned and operated by the contractors. Although a source of large profit, the tendency among the larger railroad contractors and railroad companies doing their own construction work in this region is to let out their commissary privileges to padrones. The reason for which they sublet this privilege, as already mentioned, is the desire to secure plenty of labor. The contractor builds the camps and store buildings and holds all commissary accounts out of the laborers' wages, thereby protecting the padrone against loss from the dishonest workmen. The padrone usually pays the contractor 10 per cent of the commissary profits. The padrones are generally Italians and furnish chiefly Italian labor, although all other races are represented among the men brought to the work by them. The smaller contractors on the railroad work and several of the larger firms in the other kinds of construction work employ their labor through the agencies and operate their own stores, counting the profits therefrom more than the extra

trouble in securing labor. Some of the larger camp stores will compare favorably with any of the department stores in the small towns through this section. Everything that the foreigners use is kept. Prices in all the commissaries are much higher, 50 to 75 per cent, than in other stores. In the commissaries of the subcontractors and padrones they are highest. Those of some of the larger camps on other railroad work were only slightly in advance of neighboring stores. In foodstuffs having a standard price, the difference is not as great as in clothes, shoes, and other things of that nature. Bread, cheese, meat, and similar articles were generally 1 or 2 cents per pound higher, but shoes were often sold for twice what they would cost in a regular shoe store in a near-by town.

The Italians spend the least per man and the negro the most. Compulsory patronage was not openly acknowledged by the contractors, but each man was expected to do the bulk of his buying from the commissary on the work where he was employed. They are sometimes threatened with discharge for not buying. Some laborers asserted that they were charged from \$4 to \$10 a month at the commissary, whether they bought goods to that amount or not, and consequently all the men bought at least that value of goods at the store.

# DETENTION PRACTICES.

The only way in which the men were detained at the work was the use of some scheme that would put them to expense and would cause them hardships, should they leave. These practices were noted only on the railroad construction work. One method was to retain 10 per cent of the amount due the men at the time they leave work. Another way was through the use of the local authorities. When the men went out on strike, the leaders were arrested and usually imprisoned or fined heavily and the others were thus intimidated into going back to work.

# EMPLOYERS' OPINIONS OF RACES EMPLOYED.

The order in which the different races are preferred by the employers were: (1) Croatians; (2) all other races except South Italians; (3) South Italians.

The Croatians rank next to the Italians in numbers and this fact had a great deal to do with their high standing in the opinion of the employers. The Slovaks, Poles, and Herzegovinians were also good laborers but were not found in as large numbers or as frequently as the Croatians and consequently had not come under the observation of as many employers as the Croatians had. The principal characteristics in which these races excel the South Italians are industriousness, able-bodiedness, are more easily handled, and not so ready to move from one camp to another. The North Italian was classed along with the other races, coming between the Croatians and South Italians, but, like the other races, comparatively few of them were found on construction work. The subcontractors using a small force have a better opportunity to secure the better races, but the large firms who leave the employment of men to the padrones usually get the South Italians. They are usually found in large numbers wherever the padrones are used, while the other races are found in

small gangs of a few each, scattered here and there through the different camps. The Italians do not eat enough to give them strength, and consequently it takes a larger number of them to lift a rail or heavy timber than of the stronger men. This habit of starving themselves is due to their desire to save rather than to peculiarities of appetite. Bearing on this point is the following statement taken from the Bulletin of the United States Bureau of Labor for September, 1907:

The theory that the Italian laborers must have the food and cooking peculiar to Italy is disproved by the fact that in emergency cases, when a railroad company finds it necessary to assemble a body of Italians and other laborers quickly at some given point, accompanied by its own boarding cars, and supplied free meals of soups and roasted and boiled meats in the usual American style, the Italians are among the heartiest and most appreciative consumers.

Another complaint against the South Italians is that they leave the work in a body when one of their number suffers a real or fancied wrong. On one occasion in the State of New York the Italians, who were in the majority, went on strike for higher wages. The work happened to be so near completion that it could be carried on by the other laborers, most of whom were Croatians. But the Italians marched down the line, attacking the working gangs of Croatians with sticks and stones and would have caused the discontinuance of the work but for the interference of the walking boss and local authorities, who arrested the leaders. Another gang of South Italians was brought from New York City to one of the construction camps about 120 miles distant. They stayed about an hour and then went to the next camp and applied for work, the contractor who brought them out having had his trouble for nothing.

## LIQUOR TRAFFIC.

In all construction camps beer or a good substitute is kept. Foreigners will not stay in a camp where they can not get beer. The Croatians are the heaviest drinkers. Their chief pastime after work in the evenings is to sit about a table talking and drinking beer. The Italians drink most on Sundays and other holidays and feast days. They have as strong an appetite as the other races for drink, as is shown by the fact that they drink to excess. On feast days when they do drink their unsurpassed tendency to save keeps them from spending very much in drink. The most usual custom is to sell the beer through the commissary. All the boarding houses and boarding bosses have a supply on hand and they sell or lend it to each other just as they would any foodstuff. Often an Italian secures the privilege of operating a saloon adjacent to the camps. On the railroad work large quantities of beer are brought from the saloons in the neighboring towns and villages. In some cases brewery wagons visit the camps and deliver the beer to the boarding houses or bosses. There is a very cheap grade of beer that has come to be called "Italian" beer from the fact that it is used so extensively by men of that race. Very little whisky is used among the immigrants, what is used being consumed by races other than the Italians.

#### AMUSEMENTS.

In the railroad construction camps amusements are very few. Card playing is sometimes indulged in on rainy days or Sundays. Among the Italians music is often a source of amusement, and almost any night stringed instruments and singing can be heard in their huts. Both the Italians and Croatians play quoits, using discarded horseshoes for rings. The men usually spend the most of their spare time, however, washing and mending their clothes, mending their shoes, and fixing their little cook huts around the camp. In one of the large camps where they are more permanently settled and in one or two of the other smaller camps where the same men have remained for some time, the chief amusement is a game which they call "ball." The Croatians, Slovaks, and Poles play pool occasionally when the opportunity occurs, but do not engage in the other games above mentioned. Music also is a pastime among them.

# CHAPTER V.

# SALIENT CHARACTERISTICS.

## LITERACY.

The degree of literacy which prevails among employees in railroad and other construction work in the East is set forth in the following table, which shows, by general nativity and race, the percentage of male employees who were able to read and the percentage who were able to both read and write.

Of the male employees for whom information was secured 68 per cent are able to read and 66.5 per cent are able both to read and write. The proportion of employees who are able to read and to read and write is largest for the native-born of foreign father and the native whites born of native father, and much larger for the native negroes born of native father than for the foreign-born. Of the foreign-born, all the Norwegians can both read and read and

write. With this exception the Irish, Herzegovinians, and Magyars have the largest and the Croatians and South Italians the smallest proportion of individuals who are able both to read and to read and write. The difference between the proportion of persons who read and the proportion who both read and write is largest for the Herzegovinians.

#### CONJUGAL CONDITION.

The following table shows, by general nativity and race, the percentage of male employees 20 years of age or over in each conjugal condition:

The above table shows that of the male employees 20 years of age or over for whom information was secured, 51.8 per cent are married and only 1.6 per cent are widowed. The proportion of married employees is largest for the foreign-born, second largest for the native-born of foreign father, and considerably larger for the native whites born of native father than for the native negroes born of native father. Of the foreign-born, the Slovaks, Magyars, and North Italians have the largest and the Herzegovinians the smallest proportion of married employees, while the proportion of widows is much larger for the Irish than for the individuals of any other race.

The preceding table shows that of the total number of male employees reporting who are 20 years of age or over, 51.8 per cent are married and 1.6 per cent are widowed. Of those who are 20 to 29 years of age, 28.6 per cent are married, and of males from 30 to 44 years of age, 76.1 per cent are married. In the two groups just mentioned the proportions widowed are very small. Of those who are 45 years of age or over, 79.9 per cent are married and 7.7 per cent are widowed. In the nativity groups including persons from 20 to 29 years of age, foreign-born show the highest per cent married, followed in the order named by native-born of foreign father, native-born whites of native father, and native-born negroes of native father The same order continues in the group of males from 30 to 44 years of age, while in that showing persons 45 years of age or over foreignborn continue to show the highest per cent married, followed by native-born whites of native father, native-born of foreign father, and negroes who are native-born of native father. The total showing all persons 20 years of age or over show foreign-born having highest per cent married, closely followed by native-born of foreign father, while native-born whites of native father and negroes who are nativeborn of native father, in the order mentioned, show somewhat smaller proportions who are married. Irish show the lowest per cent of males who are married in each specified age group, and also with the totals showing all persons 20 years of age or over. This race also shows a considerably higher per cent widowed in the group from 30 to 44 years of age, 45 years of age or over, and for all males 20 years of age or over. In the group from 30 to 44 years of age South Italians show the highest per cent married, while North Italians show the highest per cent married of individuals from 20 to 29 years of age, of those 45 years of age or over, and of all males 20 years of age or over.

The most significant fact in connection with the conjugal condition of employees of foreign birth, especially those of recent emigration, is found in the location of the wives of the married males. Although a large proportion of foreign-born employees are married, a considerable proportion left their wives in their native lands when immigrating to the United States. In the following table the percentage of foreign-born husbands who report wife in the United States and percentage who report wife abroad is shown, according to race of husband:

Of 1,212 husbands reporting complete data, 33.5 per cent have wives in the United States and 66.5 per cent have wives abroad. Irish show the highest per cent of husbands having wives in the United States and Croatians the highest percentage having wives abroad. The preceding table shows that of the husbands who have been in the United States under five years, the Croatians have the highest percentage who report wives being abroad, followed in the order named by South and North Italians in much smaller proportions. The same order is preserved in the period of residence of from five to nine years and for the totals of the preceding table. Of husbands who have been in this country ten years or over, South Italians show a slightly higher percentage than North Italians having wives abroad.

## VISITS ABROAD.

The tendency manifested by employees of foreign birth to return to their native lands for visits of varying duration after designated periods of residence in this country is considered in the table next submitted. It shows, by years in the United States and race, the visits abroad made by foreign-born male employees.

The preceding table shows that of the 1,523 males from whom information was secured, 12.7 per cent who have been in the United States under five years report 1 or more visits abroad, 45.4 per cent who have been in this country from five to nine years and 39.3 per cent with a residence of ten years or over report having made visits to Europe. Of the total number of males reporting 22.8 per cent have visited Europe 1 or more times since their arrival in the United States. Each race shows a higher percentage of persons visiting Europe with a period of residence from five to nine years in the other residential periods given. North and South Italians show considerably larger proportions who have visited Europe than Croatians.

Of the male employees in this locality for whom information was secured 25.4 per cent are from 20 to 24 years of age, 22.3 per cent are from 25 to 29 years of age, 16.3 per cent are from 30 to 34 years of age, 20.4 per cent are from 35 to 44 years of age, and only a small proportion are under 20 or over 44. The proportion of employees from 20 to 24 years of age and from 25 to 29 years of age, respectively, is largest for the native negroes born of native father, second largest for the foreign-born, and larger for the native whites born of native father than for the native-born of foreign father; the proportion of employees from 30 to 34 years of age is largest for the native-born of native father, negro, second largest for the whites born of native father, and larger for the foreign-born than for the native-born of foreign father; and the proportion of employees from 35 to 44 years of age is largest for the native-born of foreign father, second largest for the native whites born of native father, and smallest for the native negroes born of native father. Of the foreign-born the Herzegovinians, Croatians, South Italians, and Slovaks have the largest proportion of employees from 20 to 24 years of age, the Magyars, Norwegians, Herzegovinians, and South Italians have the largest proportion of employees from 25 to 29 years of age, and the Poles, Norwegians, Russians, and Irish have the largest proportion of employees from 30 to 34 years of age. The proportion of employees from 35 to 44 years of age is largest for the Irish, Slovaks, and Magyars and smallest for the Herzegovinians.

# CITIZENSHIP.

The extent to which foreign-born employees have acquired or manifested an intention of acquiring citizenship is indicated by the following table. The foregoing table shows that 70, or 14.1 per cent, of the 495 employees reporting complete data are naturalized, while 61, or 12.3 per cent, have first papers only. Of the North and South Italians, the only races reporting in numbers large enough to be representative, the former shows a somewhat higher per cent than the latter who are naturalized and who have first papers.

The above table shows that 14.1 per cent of the 495 males reporting complete data are fully naturalized and 12.3 per cent have first papers only. Of males with a residence from five to nine years only 2.6 per cent are fully naturalized and 11.1 per cent have first papers only. Those with a residence in the United States of ten years or over show a very much higher percentage fully naturalized and having first papers only than is shown in the preceding group, 39.9 per cent being citizens and 15 per cent having first papers. In the group including males who have been in the United States from five to nine years, South Italians show a slightly higher percentage than North Italians of males fully naturalized and having first papers. In the period showing residence ten years or over North Italians show a considerably higher percentage fully naturalized and having first papers only than South Italians, the proportion of North Italians continuing greater than that of South Italians who are fully naturalized and have first papers for all males with a residence of five years or over.

The proportion of foreign-born employees who speak English is 93.6 per cent for those who came to the United States when under 14 years of age and only 39.9 per cent for those who came here when 14 years of age or over. Of the North Italians and South Italians, a

much larger proportion of the individuals who came to the United States when under 14 than those who came when 14 or over are able

to speak English.

The above table shows that 28.5 per cent of the foreign-born male employees who have been in the United States under five years speak English, as against 65.7 per cent of those who have been here from five to nine years, and 87.3 per cent of those who have been here ten years or over. In the case of every race the proportion of employees who speak English increases steadily with length of residence in the United States.





# PART IV.—DETAILED STUDY OF RAILROAD AND OTHER CONSTRUCTION WORK IN THE WEST.

# CHAPTER I.

# INTRODUCTION.

Territory studied—Description of localities—Employees for whom information was secured—[Text Table 52 and General Table 27].

# TERRITORY STUDIED.

The investigation of immigrant labor in railroad and other construction work in the West was made in North and South Dakota, Minnesota, and parts of Kansas and Missouri. This territory for the purposes of the present report is arbitrarily designated as the West. The nationalities and the method of employing them, together with a brief description of their treatment and the manner in which they live, is given. The character of the work, its advantages and disadvantages, compared with other employment in the same section, is also touched upon. Likewise a general description of the localities where construction camps were visited is given and the effect of the climate on the length and amount of employment is discussed.

## DESCRIPTION OF LOCALITIES.

The sections in which construction work was ttudied were for the most part rolling prairies where the work was comparatively light and of short duration. During the winter the construction work, generally throughout the Northwest, is discontinued. The country surrounding the work is sparsely settled. There are, however, many foreign laborers that work through this section each harvesting season. It was stated by one of the leading labor agents in the territory that annually 7,000 men seek employment in the wheat fields, working northward as the crops ripen, arriving in the Dakotas in time to reap the late crops there in August and September. Having finished the harvesting season, they stay near the larger cities in that region until winter brings work in the logging camps and at the ice harvests. In the spring they again return to the cities and await the harvest season. This demand for labor greatly affects the construction work, as the harvest fields pay higher wages, and, owing to the shortness of the time of employment in construction work in this section, is fully as attractive to the laborer in other respects. 419

More of the persons included in the above table have been in the United States under five years than in all of the other age periods combined. None have been in this country for twenty years or more, and less than 2 per cent have been here over ten years. All of the Roumanians have been in the United States under five years, and none of the Bulgarians or Greeks have been here over nine years. The South Italians show the largest proportion in the period of from ten to fourteen years, while the Croatians show the only proportion over fourteen years. Over 90 per cent each of the Bulgarians and Greeks are of less than five years' residence here.

Less than 1 per cent of the total number of persons for whom information was secured are North Italians. Over 5 per cent are Roumanians. The largest proportion is shown for the South Italian race, the percentage being 39.6. The Bulgarians also were studied in comparatively large numbers, the proportion for that race being slightly less than 25 per cent. The Croatians and Greeks studied each represent between 12 and 20 per cent of the total number.

The preceding table shows that by far the greatest proportion of males reporting were engaged in farming or were farm laborers before coming to the United States. The next greatest proportion were engaged in hand trades, a considerably smaller percentage were general laborers, while about the same proportion were in trades or engaged in other occupations, and a very small percentage were in manufacturing. Greeks show the highest percentage who were farm laborers before coming to the United States, Croatians the highest percentage who were general laborers, Bulgarians the greatest proportion in hand trades, South Italians the highest percentage in trade and other occupations, and Greeks the highest percentage who were in manufacturing.

Of all the persons reporting, 11.7 per cent earn under \$1.50 per day. Of the South Italians, 30.2 per cent earn under that amount. None of the Bulgarians, Croatians, or Greeks earn under \$1.50 per day. None of the persons included in the above table earn \$2 or over per day.

The South Italian is the only race included in the above table. Of the persons for whom information was secured, none earn \$2 or over per day. Of those who have been in the United States under five years, slightly less than 75 per cent earn \$1.50 to \$2 per day. Of those who are from five to nine years in this country, 54.9 per cent earn that amount, and all of those who have been here for ten or more years earn \$1.50 or over per day.

## CHAPTER IV.

## WORKING CONDITIONS.

Methods of securing immigrant labor—Sources of supply—Kind of work done—Housing—Segregation by races—Systems of living—Medical attention—Law and order—Exploitation.

# METHODS OF SECURING IMMIGRANT LABOR.

The chief methods of securing immigrants in the Middle West and Northwest involve the use of labor agencies. Especially is this true of races other than the Italian, who are secured through the padrone system. The agencies generally have contracts with the railroads and send out the labor in an intelligent, systematic way, but it often happens that a number of small agencies having no contract with the railroads or contractors will hear of work and all rush men to the place, with the result that many of the men are left on their own resources to get back to the cities, where they can again

apply to the agencies.

Early in the season the men present themselves to the agencies for registration, for which they are usually charged \$2, the maximum legal fee. In the order they have registered they are shipped off in gangs when the demands come in from the railroads. Before a month has passed some of the first gangs may begin returning and are then shoved through the machinery again. Sometimes they are not returned all the way to the city from which they originally started but are transported from where they were discharged, or gave up their places on account of various hardships or because the work ceased, to other points where they may be reemployed. circulation is encouraged, for at each shift the men pay the agencies. When the supply of men runs low, toward the end of the season, the agencies sometimes cooperate. One may have an order for a large gang which it can not fill on short notice. It solicits help from other agencies and the two divide the profits. Some do this continually. One agency that handles Bulgarians exclusively has not been able to get large contracts from the railroads. It must therefore divide its gains with some larger agency which has succeeded in getting con-On the other hand, there is every reason to believe that the large agency in its turn pays heavily for its contracts, so that the secondary agencies lose not so much as at first seems. already been indicated, there are two distinct movements during the year; in the spring the gangs move westward, especially northwestward, to points beginning in Chicago suburbs and extending up into Minnesota, the two Dakotas, Iowa, and Montana. In August and September a lull in the labor-agency business occurs. In October the men begin swarming back into Chicago, those who can afford it to winter in the colonies. The Bulgarians return to Granite City,

Ill., although there is also a colony of them in Chicago. Then the agencies are busy again, sending gangs southward into Kansas, Missouri, Mississippi, and Louisiana. One agency, as an instance, has a permanent contract with three different railroads. The Southwest movement is not so heavy, partly because many of the immigrants prefer wintering in the cities, because the constructional work in the South is not so seasonal in its nature, and also because there are large cities nearer than Chicago from which immigrant labor can also be drawn.

## SOURCES OF SUPPLY.

For the past two years, since the financial depression of 1907–8' the labor agencies have been able to get all the men they needed from within the city in which they are located. This year has seen a return to normal conditions. For two months the local supply was adequate. The registered men were shipped off; then the subagents in the foreign colonies, boarding bosses, saloon keepers, etc., recruited the gangs and marched them up to the agency doors on commission. In June the local supply gave out. At such times exploitation is at a minimum. Then the agencies have recourse to their outside connections.

There is one agency in Chicago that has been in existence only three years and has a complete system of such connections. They have subagents, permanent or temporary, in all the large immigrant centers in other cities. As a result they have done the largest business during the past season. From outside Chicago they recruited: Granite City, Ill., 600 Bulgarians; Cincinnati, Ohio, 250 Bulgarians; Canton, Ohio, 240 Bulgarians and Roumanians; St. Louis, Mo., 200 Greeks: Detroit, Mich., 125 Italians: New York, N. Y., 260 Italians.

Greeks; Detroit, Mich., 125 Italians; New York, N. Y., 260 Italians. From these and other cities they have drawn also many gangs of mixed races. They even resorted to the Bureau of Information of the Department of Commerce and Labor in New York, and through it obtained 50 men of various nationalities. All these immigrant laborers were the unemployed surplus of their respective colonies, most of them having been idle all winter. These same methods are followed by the other agencies, though apparently with not so much energy. The gangs are always shipped directly to those points where their labor is needed, without stop-over privileges. The reluctance of most of the agencies to recruit men in distant cities lies in the necessity of really having to advance their cost of transportation, and the greater the sums advanced and the distance traveled the greater are the chances of loss through defaulting men. All of them complained of this risk. The agents say they are allowed a rebate from the railroads on transportation for their gangs, but for defaulting men they must pay full fare.

At first only those men are taken who can advance their own fare, but invariably they must buy their tickets from the agents. Just what benefit the men get from the allowed rebates could not be ascertained, but one reliable agent admitted that there was some profit in this when not too many defaulted. Evidently the greatest profit is made when the transportation is over the same lines for which the men are to work, with whose officials the agents have a

close understanding.

## KIND OF WORK DONE.

The occupations filled by the immigrants in construction work are for the most part those of unskilled workmen. Much of the work herein referred to is repair and maintenance work on railroads, rather than the initial construction. The principal occupations are carrying cross-ties, shoveling ballast under the track, shifting the track with bars, digging ditches, and picking the sloping sides of the cuts. Most of the work in this region, especially in the Northwest, is seasonal, since the railroads do most of the track raising and general repair work between spring and fall. The term of employment is very short for each job, which keeps the men on the move. This feature debars women from accompanying their husbands, and for this reason it is little sought except by unmarried men or else those whose wives are abroad. Being in the open air this is much more healthful than most other work, and which strongly appeals to the Italian.

#### HOUSING.

Housing and living conditions vary little, or not at all, even among the various companies. Freight cars, fitted up inside with from eight to ten bunks, are used as sleeping quarters. Separate cars are used as kitchens and as dining rooms. The bunks in the sleeping cars have been roughly put together, four in either end of each car, leaving ample space in the middle even when two extra bunks are crowded in. There is usually a table in this clear space where the men play cards and sometimes eat instead of in the regular mess car. Even with ten men in one car, they could never be described as crowded. kitchen car is fitted with a range, tables, an ice chest, and numerous lockers in which the provisions are kept. The cook or cooks sleep here in one end of the car, and sometimes an interpreter is with them. The mess car is always next to the kitchen. Through its entire length, in the middle, runs a plain board table, a bench of equal length on either side, with lockers on the walls where the tableware is kept. Usually these cars were found to be neatly kept for this is the business of the cooks (about 1 to each 30 men) for they have no work other than this and their cooking. There was always drinking water in plenty, supplied in buckets by the water boys, iced when spring water was not available. The Greeks and Italians seemed the most unclean in their living arrangements. The Italians are fond of decorative effects, hanging out flags and gaily colored rags and sometimes the outsides of their cars are lined with growing plants in boxes. These camps are strung on sidings, ladders being raised to the open doorways. So long as the work is within several miles of the camp, the car is not moved, the men traveling to and fro on hand cars; but when necessary a switch engine appears and hauls the entire camp to the next siding, or switch, causing the men no other inconvenience than, in the case of those who bake their own bread, the building of a new bake oven—a small cave in an embankment or hillside.

#### SEGREGATION BY RACES.

Each gang is a racial unit, living in separate cars and usually in a separate camp. Sometimes Bulgarians and Croatians, Croatians and Roumanians and Italians were found in the same camp, but it seemed that Greeks could not live peaceably with any other race. Croatians and Bulgarians, speaking practically the same language, fraternize readily; but Bulgarians and Roumanians must be kept apart from Greeks, both of the former being secessionists from the Church of the Greek Patriarch.

## SYSTEMS OF LIVING.

Everywhere the men must pay their own living expenses. companies pay the wages of the cooks, equal to those of the laborers. Fuel, sometimes old ties, sometimes coal, sometimes both, is supplied The cooking ranges and the kitchen utensils are bought by the Theoretically, the men may buy their provisions from whom they please, and wherever they insist on this right no doubt they do. It is always the interpreter, the chief of the gang, who finances the living fund, made up from contributions from the men, collected by the interpreter on each pay day. In the beginning, the provisions are usually had on credit from some local store, guaranteed by the roadmaster or the boss, the interpreter settling the bills fortnightly after each pay day. Those gangs which were near enough to a city usually bought their bread in the city, but otherwise the bread was baked in the camps, holes being hollowed in an embankment, filled with burning embers, emptied when well heated, and then filled with the loaves, the entrance being sealed with stones and mud. The management of the oven is left to volunteers, the cook mixing and forming the dough only. It was only those staple articles of diet which must be cooked in common, such as bread, meat, potatoes, macaroni, that were bought in common; butter, eggs, fruit, etc., were bought separately, as each individual desired them. average amount put into the common living fund was from \$6 to \$10 a month. The Croatians seemed to live most generously; the Greeks and Bulgarians most plainly. But the reputation of the Croatians among the foremen for generous living may rest more on their propensities to use liquor; for only they, of all the races, are not sober, though their sprees are periodical rather than continuous. But even the Bulgarians, said to be the most sober, have acquired the universal habit of beer drinking. Ten men club together, each giving ten cents, and buy a keg of beer for one dollar. Variations of the general system of living were found to exist. In one camp the interpreter of a gang of Italians bought the flour and baked the bread himself, selling it at 10 cents per loaf with a considerable profit. In another, also an Italian gang, the foreman and interpreter had established a regular grocery store in the kitchen car, dividing the profits of the sales between them. This same system was apparent among a gang of Greeks in South Dakota. Excepting meat, the cost of provisions did not seem high. About Minneapolis, such meat as the men consumed averaged from 9 cents to 10 cents per pound. But in South Dakota, even in those districts where cattle are raised, the same grade of meat cost from 12 to 15 cents per pound.

## MEDICAL ATTENTION.

Hospitals were available to all the work places. In case of illness the men must pay such expenses themselves, and only where accidents are attributable to the companies do they pay the costs. One man was killed in Minnesota, by the falling in of the bottom of the gravel car, and he was buried at the company's expense. There is nowhere any regular medical inspection, but the outdoor life is so healthy that, as one of the men remarked, "it eliminates doctor's bills." He counted that as one of the advantages attached to that kind of work.

# LAW AND ORDER.

The maintenance of law and order is left much to the men themselves, unless outsiders are involved. Trouble is frequent. It was noted that most of the bosses were armed with automatic revolvers and that they were all large men.

#### EXPLOITATION.

The different phases of exploitation practiced in the West may be separated under the following heads:

I. Charging exorbitant fees and commissions.

II. Discharging the men from their work that they must pay for reinstatement, or that the labor agents may collect more fees for finding them other work, or being obliged to "square" themselves with foremen.

III. Sending men to places where jobs do not exist.

IV. Interpreters' dishonesty.

V. The furnishing of poor food at a high price by contracting supply companies.

VI. Transportation dishonesty; the charging of fares where men

are entitled to ride free.

There are state laws in the Middle West forbidding labor agents to charge more than \$2 registration fee; but it has no significance, for by giving it another name they may charge so much as they please, or so much as the laborers can pay, meaning that the right of private contract is unlimited. Registering is only done at the beginning of the season. The fees that are really charged are from \$2 to \$15, according to the statement of a reliable labor agent, and there have been cases where \$20 has been paid for places. Of 51 agencies which an investigator of the Chicago League for the Protection of Immigrants canvassed during the summer of 1908, 13 agencies charged from \$1 to \$2, 23 agencies charged from \$3 to \$5, 12 agencies charged from \$6 to \$10, and 3 agencies charged from \$11 to \$14.

When the men can not pay the entire fee in cash, the balance is deducted from their pay on the first pay day. The agents claim

that part of the large fees are for transportation.

Discharging men to obtain more fees from them is a common practice, according to complaints brought before the League for the Protection of Immigrants. A superintendent of a lodging house who houses many of the laborers during the winter, and who, besides, has investigated railroad work, estimated the average duration of a job at two weeks when men are plentiful. Men are sometimes

unintentionally sent to places where work does not exist, when agencies have no special contracts, as explained already in this report. In one city it was learned that a Bulgarian saloon keeper sent men to another near-by city with false addresses, charging them \$2 apiece. This story has been corroborated by Bulgarians living in the city where the instance occurred, though not by the victims. Exploitation by the commissary department is practiced by charging high board for poor food. This practice was the favorite topic of one of the commission's chief informants. He states that many left places on the railroad because of the poor food. He also finds that as the men become scarce toward the end of the season the food improves. a typical firm of food contractors, the men pay from \$3.75 to \$4 per week for board, which is deducted from their wages before they get Good board can be had in Chicago at this rate. The supply company pays nothing for the transportation of its supplies. honesty in transportation seems not to have attracted so much attention as other forms of exploitation, among persons interested in the welfare of the laborers, perhaps because it is apparently aimed at the stockholders of the railroad companies rather than at the laborers. But it cuts both ways and seems to be even harder upon the laborers than are the other forms of exploitation. It is true that men never pay more for their railroad tickets than the regular rates. But if the railroad companies recognize the theory that the labor they employ should be transported at their cost, and do transport it free of charge, and still the men pay their own transportation, the money extorted from the men under this pretext must be clear exploitation. Private individuals are taking money from them for service which the companies intend to give them free of charge.

The difficulty in defining the limits of this practice is in learning just how much free transportation the railroads allow. Sometimes the laborers, in going to their work, pass over roads not connected with the company for which they are to work. In that case fare may be charged, but at a rebate. What that rebate is nobody but the labor agent and certain railroad officials know. It must be more than the mere party rates, otherwise some of the labor agencies could not flourish as they do and still offer cut-rate tickets. The two railroad offices visited would tell nothing definite on this point, nor could it be ascertained whether the men must pay fare in passing over the road of a company consolidated with, but still distinct from, the company for which they were to work. When the engineer of maintenance of way, the official of a railroad who hires the construction gangs for that company, was called on, he flatly stated that they would give no information on that subject. In the office of the assistant manager of another railroad, officers were courteous but evasive, though they did make the definite statement that the laborers which the company employed passed over its roads free. indications of private dishonesty in granting contracts are strong.

As has been stated in the foregoing pages, many railroads, as well as contractors, have regular boarding and lodging trains. In constructing new lines of railroad, grading, bridging, tunneling, etc., the work is always in a more or less sparsely inhabited section, and in this case houses for the accommodation of the men have to be built. A prevalent custom in the Middle West and Northwest is to

have a fixed charge for board and lodging, rather than to have the men do their individual cooking. It has been found that all laborers of European nativity, except the Italian, will readily accept this form of accommodation. This is another reason why the Italians are not so much desired as the other races in this section.

Without reference to fraud, labor agents' fees in the West and Northwest are sometimes unreasonably high, varying with the relative proportion of supply and demand. The season (1909) in the Northwest has seen a scarcity of men, obvious from the rise in wages as the season advanced and the decrease of agents' fees in the same

time. The various gangs investigated had paid as follows:

Sixty-five Bulgarians in Hastings, Minn., paid \$3.50 each; 27 Roumanians in Red Wing, Minn., paid \$12 each; 73 Bulgarians in Red Wing, Minn., paid \$12 each; 27 Bulgarians in Frontenac, Minn., paid \$3 each; 50 Italians in Frontenac, Minn., paid \$4 each; 70 Bulgarians in Savage, Minn., paid \$15 each; 42 Bulgarians in St. Louis Park, Minn., paid \$3 each; 40 Italians in Roscoe, S. Dak., paid \$11 each; 53 Croatians in Bowdle, S. Dak., paid \$10 each; 40 Italians in Selby, S. Dak., paid \$3.50 each; 24 Greeks in Sitka, S. Dak., paid \$7 each; — Croatians in Pontus, S. Dak., paid \$9 each; — Italians in Pontus, S. Dak., paid \$4 each; 32 Bulgarians in Aberdeen, S. Dak., paid \$7 each; and 61 Italians in Aberdeen, S. Dak., paid \$10 each; and 61 Italians in Aberdeen, S. Dak., paid \$11 each.

Those paying the higher fees came early in the season, in March and April. In some cases, as will presently be explained, the fees were increased by falsification. Some of those most heavily charged came from Minneapolis, and some lightly charged from Chicago, so that transportation could not have been included. In fact, all had

traveled on their identification tags.



## CHAPTER IV.

# SALIENT CHARACTERISTICS.

#### LITERACY.

From the above table it will be seen that the proportion of male employees who read and write is slightly smaller than the proportion who read. In each case the proportion is between 50 and 55 per cent. The Greeks show the largest proportion of persons who read and likewise the largest proportion who read and write. The South Italians show the smallest proportion in each column. The Bulgarians are second, the Roumanians third, and the Croatians are fourth.

## CONJUGAL CONDITION.

Over 50 per cent of the total number of persons are married, the proportion of single persons is decidedly smaller, and less than 2 per cent are widowed. The Greeks show the largest proportion of single persons and the smallest proportion of married persons. None of the Croatians, Greeks, or Roumanians are widowed. The Bulgarians show the largest proportion who are married, followed closely by the South Italians. The Croatians and Roumanians show practically the same proportion of persons who are married.

Excepting the first age group in the foregoing table, each separate period shows a decidedly larger proportion of married than of single or widowed persons. Among all races, excepting the South Italian, the proportion of married persons is greater for those 45 years of age or over than in either of the other two groups. For the entire table

it is seen that the proportion of married persons is in excess of 50 per cent, while the proportion of widowed persons is very small. None of the Croatians are widowed. The Bulgarians show the largest proportion married, while the Croatians show the largest proportion single. The differences in proportions in the two groups over 29 years of age is not marked, but among those who are from 20 to 29 years of age the single males are decidedly in the majority.

The most significant fact in connection with the conjugal condition of foreign-born employees is the location of the wives of the married males. Although a larger proportion of the employees of foreign birth are married the majority of these left their wives in their native countries when immigrating to the United States. The following table shows, by race of husband, the percentage of foreign-born husbands who report wife in the United States and the percentage who report wife abroad:

None of the Bulgarians report wife in the United States, 100 per cent reporting wife abroad. Less than 5 per cent each of the Croatians and South Italians report wife in the United States and each race shows a proportion in excess of 95 per cent who report wife abroad. The total that results from the above shows that 98.6 per cent report wife abroad and only 1.4 per cent report wife in this country.

All of the Bulgarians who appear on the foregoing table report wife abroad. Of the South Italians who have been in this country under five years, 98.5 per cent report wife abroad and 97.4 per cent of those who have been here from five to nine years report wife abroad.

The table given above shows 826 males, of whom 17.9 per cent have made one or more visits abroad since their arrival in the United States. Of those who have been in the United States under five years 15.5 per cent have visited abroad, of those with a residence of from five to nine years 34.6 per cent have visited abroad, and of males with a residence of ten years or over 10 per cent have visited abroad. South Italians show a very much higher per cent in each period of residence given than the other races of males who have visited abroad since immigrating to the United States.

Twenty-five and seven-tenths per cent of the total number of male employees are from 20 to 24 years of age; 21.1 per cent are from 35 to 44. A smaller proportion is in every other age group, none being under 14. The South Italians have a considerably larger proportion from 14 to 19 years of age than any other race, but they have also relatively large proportions 35 to 44, 45 to 54, and 55 or over. Forty per cent of the Greek male employees are from 20 to 24 years of age.

Only 15.2 per cent of all the persons included in the above table speak English. The South Italians, of whom nearly 20 per cent speak English, show the largest proportion. The Roumanians and Bulgarians each show proportions in the neighborhood of 8 per cent. Of the Greeks 17.1 per cent and of the Croatians 15.8 per cent speak English.

More than 50 per cent of all males who were under 14 years of age at time of coming to this country now speak English. The proportion of those who were 14 or over at time of coming and who can now speak English is 14.4 per cent. Of the South Italians who were under 14 years of age, less than 75 per cent speak English. Of the males who were 14 years of age or over the South Italians and Greeks each show comparatively the same proportion of English-speaking persons. The Croatians follow, while the Bulgarians show the smallest proportion.



Of the foreign-born male employees shown in the above table, slightly more than 15 per cent speak English. Of those who have been in this country under five years the proportion is a little larger than 10 per cent, while of those whose residence here has been for ten or more years the proportion is 90 per cent. Of those who have lived in this country under five years the Greeks show the largest proportion of English-speaking persons, followed closely by the Croatians. The Bulgarians and South Italians each show less than 10 per cent. None of the Bulgarians who have lived here from five to nine years speak English, while the proportion for the Greeks is 50 per cent and for the South Italians 47.1 per cent. Of the South Italians who have been in the United States for ten or more years 100 per cent speak English.

#### EARNINGS AND SAVINGS.

The wages have increased during the season. Before the middle of April one representative railroad paid \$1.25 per day; then, until May 15, \$1.35, increasing it to \$1.50. In July wages were increased to \$1.65 per day. Considering only the time employed, the men save from their wages even at the low rates of the early spring. Information on this point was procured first hand from the Bulgarians and Macedonian-Roumanians only, but there is no reason to suppose that the same would not apply to all the races. They estimated their clear savings at \$1 per day. Most of them carried their money in leathern belts worn under their clothes. Some had deposited in American banks; but no Bulgarians were encountered who had deposited their money in foreign banks since the failure of a Bulgarian bank in this section. The married men sent money home only once or twice during the season, and then in only small sums. They explained that their families lived on farms, the women and children raising sufficient produce to support themselves, and that money was required only for clothing.

# PART V.—DETAILED STUDY OF RAILROAD AND OTHER CONSTRUCTION WORK IN THE SOUTH.

# CHAPTER I.

## INTRODUCTION.

Scope of investigation—Description of locality—Climatic conditions—Kind of work done—Methods followed and sources of information—Employees for whom information was secured—[Text Table 69 and General Table 40].

## SCOPE OF INVESTIGATION.

The investigation of construction work in the South in the summer of 1909 was directed to railway construction in West Virginia, Virginia, eastern Tennessee, and a section of work between Marion, N. C., and Spartanburg, S. C. During the past five years two trunk line railways have been built across this section from the West Virginia and Kentucky coal fields to the Atlantic seaboard. Besides this and the new work of building branch lines in the coal fields, the other railroads already operating in this territory have made extensive improvements. Although the larger part of the work had been completed prior to the time of the investigation, about 5,000 men were employed on the work covered. Of these some 2,000 were immigrants, 500 native whites, and the remaining 2,500 negroes. The majority of the foreigners were found in West Virginia and Virginia. The work in Tennessee and North and South Carolina employed nearly all negroes.

## DESCRIPTION OF LOCALITY.

The bulk of the work investigated was in rough, mountainous country, sparsely settled, and with no transportation facilities. In some instances, as in the case of spur lines, one extremity of the work was some point on an operated line, but the other extremity would be at a coal bank in the mountain fastness. Such is the Winding Gulf extension of the Virginia Railway, diverging from the main line at Mullens, Raleigh County, W. Va. The trip over this work was made on foot rather than horseback, so rough was the country. Other work in this region, while in the mountains, is along the lines operated, and consequently is more accessible. The work in eastern Tennessee was, for the most part, through rolling country and a very fertile and thickly settled farming district.

### CLIMATIC CONDITIONS.

The climate throughout this region is most favorable to the progress of this class of work. Very little time is lost. The long fall seasons and open winters, the coolness in summer, due to the altitude, are all

factors which go to make the climate almost ideal for this kind of work. During rainy seasons, however, all work except tunneling is stopped.

## KIND OF WORK DONE.

In railroad construction in the South, as elsewhere, the majority of the work required is unskilled. Carrying cross-ties, shifting the tracks for construction trains, picking and shoveling earth and rock, and handling stone around the concrete mixers are the main occupations of the men employed. All engine runners and most of the carpenters and mechanics are Americans. Among the blacksmiths, drill rows, and work-train brakemen many foreigners are found. They are also used frequently as cart boys, when they lead one mule, and sometimes as a "skinner" or wheel-scraper driver, but not a single case was found where a foreigner was a wagon driver. Negroes are used almost exclusively for this occupation.

## METHODS FOLLOWED AND SOURCES OF INFORMATION.

The methods of securing information for this work were through nationality cards filled out by the laborers, and interviews with the contractors, superintendents, and foremen and personal inspection of the camps and manner of living. In securing the nationality cards an attempt was made to have the contractors secure them through their clerks and timekeepers, but the clerical force of an ordinary contracting firm are generally overworked, and consequently few cards were secured in this manner. Of the 1,026 cards obtained in this region, about 900 were gotten by a personal canvass, the attempt being made to secure, as far as possible, cards for all men employed on the line of work being investigated, from foremen down.

# CHAPTER II.

# RACIAL DISPLACEMENTS.

It appears from the above table that the proportion of foreign-born male employees who have been in the United States from five to nine years and twenty years or over is, respectively, considerably larger for the North Italians than for the South Italians, while the proportion of such employees who have been here under five years is larger for the South Italians than for the North Italians. Of the South Italians, 0.9 per cent, as against none of the North Italians, have been in this country from fifteen to nineteen years, while 3.6 per cent of the North Italians and none of the South Italians have been here from ten to fourteen years.

## RACIAL CLASSIFICATION OF EMPLOYEES AT THE PRESENT TIME.

The preceding table shows that of 966 male employees for whom information was secured, 48.7 per cent are of foreign birth, 31.3 per cent are negroes who are native-born of native father, 19.6 per cent are native whites born of native father, and 0.5 per cent are native-born of foreign father. Of the employees who are native-born of foreign father, those whose fathers were born in Ireland show a slightly higher percentage than those whose fathers were born in England. Of the foreign-born employees, the South Italians show 32.9 per cent, followed by the North Italians with 5.8 per cent; no employees who are of other foreign-born races show over 3 per cent of the total number for whom information was secured.

The above table shows that of all the foreign-born male employees for whom information was secured 44.1 per cent were employed abroad in farming or farm labor, an exactly equal proportion were employed in general labor, 6.2 per cent were employed in hand trades, none were employed in manufacturing, and only a very small proportion were employed in trade or in occupations not specified. The proportion of South Italians in each occupation specified does not differ greatly from the proportion reported for all the foreign-born.

Of the male employees 18 years of age or over for whom information was secured, 59.6 per cent earn \$1.50 per day or over, 11.9 per cent earn \$2 or over, 9 per cent earn \$2.50 or over, and 8.1 per cent earn \$3 or over. The proportion of employees earning \$1.50 a day or over and \$2 a day or over, respectively, is larger for the native-born of native father white than for the foreign-born and larger for the latter than for the native negroes born of native father. A considerably smaller proportion of the South Italians than of all the foreign-born earn \$1.50 or over.

#### RELATION BETWEEN PERIOD OF RESIDENCE AND EARNING ABILITY.

The progress in industrial efficiency or earning ability made by employees of foreign birth after designated periods of residence in this country is exhibited in the table following, which shows, by race and length of residence in the United States, the percentage of foreign-born male employees 18 years of age or over earning each specified amount per week, the proportions in each specified period of residence being grouped under the several races in order to make possible a study of the progressive earning ability of foreign-born male employees of each race.

Because of the small number involved no computations have been made for the South Italians who have been in the United States ten years or over. It will be noted, however, that of those who have been in the United States from five to nine years the proportion earning each specified amount is very much larger than the proportion of those who have been in the United States under five years, indicating that as the length of residence in the United States increases so does the earning capacity.

As regards the South Italians who have been in the United States under five years, it will be noted that 46.5 per cent earn \$1.50 or over and that none earn \$4 or over per day, while the proportion earning any other specified amount in no case exceeds 2 per cent. As regards the representatives of this race who have been in the United States from five to nine years, 71.8 per cent earn \$1.50 or over per day, while the proportion earning \$2 or over amounts to only 17.9 per cent. This proportion, it will be noted, is slightly above the proportion earning \$2.50 or over and \$3 or over, which proportions in turn are slightly in excess of those earning \$3.50 or over and \$4 or over per day.

## CHAPTER IV.

# WORKING CONDITIONS.

Reasons for employment of immigrants—Methods of employing immigrants—Regularity of employment—Hours worked per day and per week—Medical attention—Standard of living—Cost and manner of living—Commissary stores—Requirements as to patronage—Detention practices—Employers' opinions of races employed—Law and order—Exploitation—Criminality—Liquor traffic.

## REASONS FOR EMPLOYMENT OF IMMIGRANTS.

The scarcity of labor is responsible for the employment of immigrant labor in the South. The negro is much preferred by Southern contractors and was universally used until the abnormally active period in construction work which began about 1902. From that time up to the fall of 1907 there was a steady stream of foreign labor to the Southern States. It was during this period that the two trunk line railways, from the construction camps of which data were taken for this study, were in the most active stage of construction. ing to the bulletin of the Bureau of Labor issued September, 1907, there were sent from New York City labor agencies to the South during the period from May 1, 1904, to July 21, 1906, 2,981 Italians, 2,688 Slavs and Hungarians, and 12,875 other nationalities. Of these, 1,536, or 51.53 per cent, of the Italians; 790, or 29.39 per cent, of the Hungarians and Slavs; and 10,181, or 79.07 per cent, of the other nationalities went into railroad construction and repairs. also stated in this bulletin that "the Italians as a rule refuse to accept railroad work in the South, owing partly to the long-distance charges for transportation to be deducted from their wages after going to work. Conditions as to wages and treatment also are not so satisfactory to them as in the Northern States." Bearing on this statement is the fact that the 1,536 Italians that went into railroad repairs and construction (although 51.53 per cent of all Italians sent south) were only 12.28 per cent of the total number of laborers sent to this kind of work during that period. To decrease the supply of negro labor available for construction, the rise in wages in all occupations during this period rendered it possible for the negro to remain at home, where he could maintain himself by working about half time at miscellaneous occupations. As employment becomes more scarce, the foreigners return to the larger cities, and negro labor becomes easier to obtain. Thus in normal times more negroes than foreigners are found in construction work in the South.

## METHODS OF EMPLOYING IMMIGRANTS.

The three methods by which immigrants were brought into the territory during the period between 1902 and 1907, when construction

work was abnormally active, were (1) through licensed employment

agencies, (2) padrones, and (3) labor agents:

(1) Labor agencies in New York and Philadelphia furnished most of the labor brought in directly by the contractor. Under this method the contractor wanting men would send a man to one of these cities to escort the men to the construction camps. Transportation and agency's fee, which was about \$2, was deducted from the first wages due the laborers. (2) Much of the labor was brought by Italians who had the commissary privileges. They furnished the labor free of expense to the contractor, but the contractor protected the padrone against loss of transportation by keeping the men on the work where possible until they had worked out their transportation. The padrone in most cases paid the contractor 3 per cent of the total commissary receipts. (3) The third method, labor agents, is different from the other two in that they have no regular offices, nor do they operate commissaries, but bring the men to the contractor at so much per head, usually \$1. They do a more thriving business when work is plentiful and labor is scarce. Much of the labor in this region was brought from Cincinnati by an American agent. After the construction activity began to lessen and gangs were thrown out of work, they began to rove about looking for work, or else a contractor would send a man to where another job was nearing completion, and in this way the men are working back and forth across this territory wherever new work is undertaken.

## REGULARITY OF EMPLOYMENT.

In connection with the discussion of conditions of employment it is interesting to compare the different phases of the work in the South with those of other industries. Bearing most directly on the economic status of the laborers is the fact that in no case is employment The length of time the work may last varies from a few months to three or four years and depends directly on the magnitude of the work, although other factors, such as discontinuance due to financial troubles, working single shift only and inclement weather, enter into the consideration. As work nears completion, gangs are sent adrift as they finish up the particular portion on which they are It often happens that the same contractor or firm has work in progress in several different places and is able to transfer men from one job to another, but there is no assurance of it. This phase of the work is undesirable to the better class of laborers who go into mines and coke ovens and into other industrial establishments where steady employment can be obtained under normal conditions.

## HOURS WORKED PER DAY AND PER WEEK.

The standard working time throughout the South is ten hours a day and six days a week. Sunday work is not engaged in except in cases of overhauling and repairing machinery and drilling when it is necessary for the continuance of the work the following day. Time is kept by days and hours. If work is discontinued during the day on account of the weather, the number of hours, counted to the nearest quarter, is usually given.

#### MEDICAL ATTENTION

On all the construction work of any importance in the South there was an arrangement providing a physician to ride over the line of the work, visiting all the camps either daily or on alternate days. Each employee was charged a fee, usually 50 cents a month, for this medical attention. All medicines were furnished by the contractor. some cases the contractor employed the physician at a monthly salary, himself getting the revenue from the medical fees. Others allowed the physician the entire amount of such fees collected. pitals were often established where the length of the employment and the number of men justified it. The hospital was maintained by a fee of 50 cents per month per man, in addition to the doctor's fee. Although the physician rides the line daily, in accordance with the agreement by which the medical fee is deducted from the laborer's wages, the laborers do not always receive the consideration due them. When a more serious case occurs the patient is usually sent to a hospital if at all practicable.

#### STANDARD OF LIVING.

The houses occupied by the laborers on construction work throughout the South are of cheap construction and built for only temporary use. The mild climate does not require houses as closely built as are used farther north, and tents are often used when the work is of short duration. The houses most frequently met with are shanties built of rough lumber and covered with tar paper. In building them cheapness is the governing point. A frame-work of scantling is set up on which boards are nailed vertically, forming the sides, which may or may not be covered with tar paper. Sometimes there are no floors and the foundations on which the shanty rests are a pile of flat stones or of ends of plank placed under each corner. They are about 8 feet high from the floor to the eaves, 14 feet wide, and from 14 to 60 feet long. They usually have a comb roof of about 4 feet pitch, which gives more air space than the flat tops that are more rarely found. Bunks built one above the other against the walls serve as beds, while a stove in the center furnishes both cooking and heating accommodations. All bedding is supplied by the men, and consists in most cases of a pile of straw, obtained from a near-by farm, sometimes in a filthy case, but often lying loose in the bunk. From 20 to 30 men occupy a bunk house 50 feet long. Cooking is done on the stoves in the houses in winter; in summer out of doors or in little huts built by the men themselves. These huts built by the immigrants are usually of sod, placed in a frame of poles and are either square with a flat top, or cone shaped like an Indian tepee. Others are built of odd ends of plank, scraps of tar paper or tin. Some of the Italians build very attractive buts of discarded powder cans. By cutting the cans down the side seam after the ends are knocked out, small rectangular blocks of tin are obtained, and by nailing these over a frame of boards the appearance of a corrugatediron house is given. Where the work is double tracking, box cars placed on a temporary track near the work and fitted up as camp cars are used. These cars have a stove in the center, a double deck

of berths at either end, and windows about 18 inches square cut in either side. In the few cases where a married man, usually a foreman, is among the immigrants, the house is of a better grade. Although built of the same material as the shanties they are more closely built and are usually lined with paper. The general plan followed is a three-room, one-story house, one room being used for cooking and dining, and the remaining two as living and sleeping rooms.

## COST AND MANNER OF LIVING.

The majority of the immigrants do their own cooking, each man for himself, or else they form groups of five to ten when the men take it by turns to leave work one day to cook for the others of the group. There are a few boarding places on the American plan, but these are rare and are always where there is a foreign foreman with his family on the work. An occasional boarding group is found where all the men buy their own provisions, each man for himself, having it cooked by the woman who conducts the house, and who charges the men \$2.50 for cooking and washing. This custom is found more widely among the Croatians. Of all the different methods, individual cooking is most prevalent. The cost of living is about \$10 per month per man for the Croatians and Slovaks and from \$5 to \$7 for the Italians. The Italians live mainly on bread and macaroni and bologna sausage, which accounts for the extremely low cost of their maintenance. their noon meal on the work a whole gang may be seen eating simply a loaf of bread and a pickle or a piece of bologna sausage. At night they cook a stew made of macaroni, tamales, and potatoes and a small scrap of meat. For breakfast they have bread and coffee and bologna sausage. When not working the majority of the Italians eat only two meals a day. The other foreign races eat meat for both supper and breakfast in addition to a good deal of canned food.

## COMMISSARY STORES.

The commissary on construction work in the South is an important part of the industry. In many cases the only profit is from this source. In former years, when the negro was practically the only laborer, it was not unusual for a contractor to take work at cost, or even less, depending on the commissary for his profits. As the foreign laborer has been substituted for the negro, this custom has become less and less prevalent, as its existence depends upon the expenditures of the laborers, and the negroes are more extravagant than any others. Many of the larger southern contracting firms have abandoned the commissary as a source of profit since employing foreigners and maintain it only as a convenience. This has given an opening for the padrones, who are becoming more and more numerous on southern construction work. A common custom with some of the firms is to allow a padrone to keep a commissary in payment for his action in securing labor, while the contractor keeps his own store, catering especially to the negro and native white labor, although the foreign laborers may deal with him to some extent The prices in all commissaries are higher than in other stores, the difference ranging from 20 to 80 per cent. The lower prices

prevail where other stores are convenient and the scarcity of labor prevents any compulsory patronage. In more isolated districts where there are few other stores the prices are about 80 per cent higher. On all work in the mountain districts, where the other stores do not sell goods used by the foreigners and where such stores are scarce, these high prices prevail. The order in which the laborers stand socially as to outlay is negro, Croatian, and all others except the South Italian. The negroes are by far the best customers in the commissary. They are generally unmarried men with no responsibilities, roaming from one place to another, spending their entire earnings in the commissary. They often cash their time at a discount and then spend the money before leaving the commissary. The Croatians are good livers compared with the other foreign races, and they do not stint themselves in food and drink. The negro spends his surplus above what is needed for food in gaudy clothes and patent leather shoes, but the Croatians spend theirs for beer or such substitute for that beverage as may be had in the commissary. Although extravagant, they do not, however, spend as much as the negroes, who loiter about the commissaries looking for something for which to spend their money. The Croatians know what they want and buy it freely, but if there is a surplus of their wages it is saved. The Italians, living as they do, very cheaply, buy little from the commissaries. They stint themselves in order to save, buying only the necessities of life, which in their case are bread, sausage, and canned goods.

## REQUIREMENTS AS TO PATRONAGE.

In a general way the laborers are required to patronize the commissaries. If a wholesale boycott of the commissaries by the laborers were to take place, there is no doubt that they would be replaced by others who would patronize the stores. In localities where other stores are convenient there is a good deal of buying at these other stores, especially when labor is more scarce than work, and the men feel more independent. The men, both negroes and foreigners, understand that they will be more likely to be employed on other work if they deal at the commissaries instead of other stores. isolated districts where no other stores are convenient, the men must necessarily patronize the commissaries although the prices are high. The chief method of securing the patronage of the laborers is that of "paying off." The men are paid only once a month. This of itself has a great deal of influence in the direction of extravagance. A man coming into camp on the first of the month will not be paid until about the 20th of the following month. He must have food and clothes, and is credited for only as much as is due him on the time books, unless he happens to be an old employee who has worked for the company before and can be trusted. If he should leave before pay day his time is cashed, with 10 per cent deducted, or he may take it in supplies at the commissary subject to no discount from what is due him. The prevailing custom throughout the region is to issue to each man each night a ticket good for the amount of wages earned by him the previous day. These tickets are good only at the commissaries and are received by them in exchange for goods.

At the end of each month each man turns in to the bookkeeper all the tickets he has left that were issued him during that month, for which he receives currency three weeks later. These tickets usually bear the company's name and a statement that they shall be void if presented by other than the person whose wage they represent. Often the contractor makes a special arrangement with a neighboring store-keeper by which the storekeeper takes the tickets in payment for goods, but when he in turn settles with the contractor the tickets are discounted 10 per cent.

#### DETENTION PRACTICES.

The detention of laborers in the camps is practiced to some extent wherever the contractor advances transportation for men brought on the work. While the practice is generally applied to the transportation men, it is sometimes indulged in also when men that are leaving are badly needed to continue the work. The chief methods are (1) through the local authorities and (2) by armed guards. The method of having the escaping men arrested on the charge of violating the boarding-house law is the safest to the contractors and most frequently used. Laborers are frequently brought to the work on free transportation, having made an agreement to work out their indebtedness. After getting to the neighborhood in which the work is being done, they leave the contractor that brought them in and work for another company where they do not have the cost of their transportation deducted from their wages. In order to protect themselves against this practice, the contractors have the men arrested, and confronted with a jail sentence when attempting to leave. are then willing to remain and work out their indebtedness. in the more isolated camps the men are closely watched by the foreman and other bosses, who carry arms, and are driven back and shut up in their shanties and held until they agree to return to work, or their baggage may be taken from them and held until they have worked themselves free of debt. These practices are more in evidence during the periods of special activity in construction work, as these men are more often offered transportation in advance, and after getting in the neighborhood are better able to find other work. the other hand, in dull times the men are glad to pay their own transportation and do not leave the work.

## EMPLOYERS' OPINIONS OF RACES EMPLOYED.

The order in which the labor is classed as to preference by the southern contractor is (1) negroes, (2) Croatians, and (3) all others except Italians. In point of numbers the Italians far exceed any other foreign race on construction work in this region, with the Croatians coming second. The other foreign races are so sparsely represented that the comparisons are made between only these three. Negroes are everywhere preferred to members of any other race. They are good teamsters and are used as wagon drivers and in all places requiring the control of more than a single mule. Although they do not work regularly, it is said that while working only four-fifths of the time they do more work than the foreigners working full time. A contractor employing negro labor keeps a full camp at all

times, thereby insuring a full force. After each pay day there is a considerable falling off of the negro labor for two or three days, during which time the workmen gamble, drink, and spend their money in the commissary. After having spent all their money they return to work and work regularly until the next pay day. Another respect in which negroes surpass the foreign labor is the ease with which they are handled on the work. They do not resent rough treatment as readily as the foreign laborers, nor do they unite to leave when one of their number is discharged. Still another, and probably the strongest reason for employing negro labor is, as has already been stated, the inclination to spend the entire earnings in the commissaries. This trait, together with the high prices in the commissaries, rendered it possible for the contractors to work at cost and make a good profit from the commissary. The Croatians or "Austrians," as they are called by the contractors, are preferred second to the negroes. One contractor stated that he preferred the Italians to any other foreign race, but he had employed them almost exclusively, and had not had much experience with the other races. His objection to the Austrians, although having employed only a few, was that they required more attention and were more particular about their houses and cooking arrangements. The reasons given by those preferring them to the other foreign races are their superiority as laborers, extravagance, and relative lack of disposition to leave because one of their countrymen has been mistreated. Being better livers and larger men they are more able to do heavy work. Whenever hard labor is to be performed, such as shoveling the muck from tunnels, mixing the concrete with shovels, and working around the stone crushers, the Croatians will be found to outnumber the other foreigners. They are also the most industrious of all foreign races encountered on this work. Next to the negroes they are the best customers in the commissaries, which of itself, from the point of view of the contractor, is a much desired quality in laborers. The Italians are regarded the least desirable of all foreigners for this work, as they are deficient in those qualities and traits which render the Croatians the best. The chief objection to them is laziness, which, coupled with the habit of stinting themselves in food, render them the poorest of labor. Their small stature and natural lack of strength, limited patronage of the commissaries, and unsurpassed clannishness, which causes a whole gang to leave when one is mistreated, are other undesirable traits. A common reply of a contractor when asked his preference of race is, "Any except the Italians."

### LAW AND ORDER.

The maintenance of law and order rests solely with the foreman or walking bosses, as the camp superintendents are called. authorities never interfere unless there is some infraction of the law affecting people outside of the camp. They are occasionally called in when the contractors wish to detain transportation men, but rarely or never to settle trouble in camp among the men. There is a characteristic feeling among these walking bosses that to ask for the assistance of the local authorities is to acknowledge their own inefficiency.

### EXPLOITATION.

Exploitation is confined principally to the commissary, and the custom of paying off only once a month, which compels the men to buy from the commissaries. When work is scarce and labor is plentiful, the men, especially the negroes, can be harder driven than in normal times.

### CRIMINALITY.

With the exception of petty thieving, immigrant labor in the South is exceptionally free from criminality. There have been many instances where they have attacked the gang foreman, but it is usually in resenting harsh treatment inflicted on them by the foreman. Considering the number of men employed, these misdemeanors are extremely few. Occasionally drunken brawls, which result in a general fight arise, especially among the Italians. Practically all the criminality met with on construction work is found among the negroes. After pay day gambling and drinking are indulged in, and fights often occur which result in a killing. In many of the camps where there is a large percentage of negro labor there are women who smuggle cocaine, and it is under the influence of this drug that most of the crimes are committed. The contractors are very active in trying to break up this cocaine trade wherever it is observed, as it renders the negroes unruly.

### LIQUOR TRAFFIC.

In all camps where immigrants are employed beer, or some substitute which is practically the same thing, has to be supplied in order to keep the men. It is handled principally by the padrone or contractor, who has it shipped to the camp in barrel lots, consigned to different men in the camp, so as to get around the prohibition laws. It is then sold in the commissaries at a profit. In many instances the men do actually order it for themselves by the keg or crate, and it is the existence of this practice that renders it possible for the commissaries to handle it without being molested by the authorities. When the sentiment of the neighboring native population is too strong against this practice, the contractor sells an imitation beer as a substitute. This is often a cheap grade of beer in bottles bearing the label of a malt extract. In all camps of any size there is at least one foreigner's shanty where beer can be bought. It is sold openly to any of the men in camp, but they are suspicious of strangers as there are frequent cases where the local authorities have arrested and fined them for illicit selling of liquor. The Croatians are the most intemperate of any of the races employed in this class of work. beer can be obtained they drink it for each meal and on Sundays, and other days when not working there is a large percentage of intoxicated men among them. Like the negroes, they have a tendency to spend their wages for drink. The Italians rank second among the foreign races in this respect, but do most of their drinking on feast days, Sundays, and other holidays. They are as fond of it as the Croatians, but their economical habits serve as a check on their intemperance.

### CHAPTER V.

# SALIENT CHARACTERISTICS.

Literacy—Conjugal condition—Visits abroad—Age classification of employees—[Text tables 76 to 82 and General Tables 45 to 49].

### LITERACY.

The degree of literacy which prevails among the employees engaged in railroad and other construction work in the South is set forth in the following table, which shows, by general nativity and race, the percentage of male employees who were able to read and the percentage who were able to both read and write.

Of the 942 male employees in this industry for whom information was obtained 54.8 per cent read and 54.2 per cent both read and write. The foreign-born, it will be noted, show a slightly smaller percentage who can read and both read and write than the negroes and a much smaller percentage with ability to read and both read and write than do the whites native-born of native father. A comparison of all races shown in the above table discloses the fact that the whites native-born of native father, 76.7 per cent of whom can read and 76.2 per cent of whom can both read and write, show a slightly higher percentage who can read and both read and write than do the North Italians, while the negroes native-born of native father, 50.3 per cent of whom can read and 50 per cent of whom can read and write, show a slightly larger

proportion who read and both read and write than do the South Italians. It will also be noted that each race, with the exception of the North Italian, shows a slightly smaller proportion who can both read and write than who can read only.

### CONJUGAL CONDITIONS.

The following table shows, by general nativity and race, the percentage of male employees 20 years of age or over in each conjugal condition.

The above table shows that of the employees in this locality for which information was secured 48.1 per cent are married and only 1.7 per cent are widowed. The proportion of married individuals is largest for the native whites born of native father, second in rank for the foreign-born, and smallest for the native negroes born of native father, and the proportion of widowed is largest for the native whites born of native father, second in rank for the native negroes born of native father, and smallest for the foreign-born. Of the foreign-born the South Italians have a much larger proportion of married individuals than the North Italians.

The table following divides the totals of the one immediately preceding and shows, by age groups and general nativity and race, the percentage of male employees in each conjugal condition.

As regards all males for whom information was obtained, it will be noted that 50.1 per cent are single, 48.1 per cent married, and 1.7 per cent widowed. Of those who were from 20 to 29 years of age, the proportion of single is largely in excess of the proportion married, while of those from 30 to 44 years of age the reverse is true. last is also true, but to a considerably larger extent, of those 45 years of age or over. Only a small proportion of those from 20 to 29 years of age are widowed. In the two following age groups, however, the percentage of widowed shows a material increase, although the largest proportion is less than 8 per cent. As between the foreignborn and native-born of native father white it will be noted that the former show a considerably larger proportion of those from 20 to 29 years of age single and a considerably lower proportion married than the latter, while of those from 30 to 44 years of age a slightly larger proportion of the former than the latter are married and a slightly lower proportion single. None of the native whites born of native father or of the foreign-born 45 years of age or over are single, while of those who are married the proportion of the former is below that of the latter. Of the negroes native-born of native father, the proportion of those from 20 to 29 years of age in each conjugal condition is similar to the proportion shown by the foreign-born. This is also true, but to a slightly lesser extent, of those who are 45 years of age or over, while of those from 30 to 44 years of age the negroes show a considerably larger proportion single, a slightly larger proportion widowed, and a considerably smaller proportion married than do the foreign-born. With the exception of those 45 years of age or over, all of whom are married, the proportion in each conjugal condition in the other age groups is similar to the proportion shown in the total for all foreign-born.

The most significant fact in connection with the conjugal condition of foreign-born employees is the location of the wives of the married males. This is indicated in the following table, which shows, by race of husband, the percentage of foreign-born husbands who report wife in the United States and the percentage who report wife abroad:

The proportion of foreign-born husbands of the South Italian race reporting wives abroad is larger in the case of husbands who have been in the United States under five years than in the case of husbands who have been here from five to nine years.

The proportion of all foreign-born male employees who have made visits abroad is largest in the case of employees who have been in the United States ten years or over, second in rank in the case of those who have been here from five to nine years, and smallest in the case of those who have been here under five years. Information was obtained in this locality for 966 male employees, of which number 51.9 per cent are from 20 to 29 years of age, a considerably larger proportion being from 20 to 24 than from 25 to 29 years of age, 16 per cent from 14 to 19, 12.5 per cent from 30 to 34, 12.3 per cent from 35 to 44, and 6.8 per cent 45 years of age or over. Both the foreign-born and the native-born of native father white show proportions in each specified age group that vary little from the proportions shown by the total for all persons, the former reporting a proportion slightly above and the latter a proportion slightly below 50 per cent of their respective numbers from 20 to 29 years of age. None of the North Italians or South Italians is under 14 years of age, and none of the former is 55 years of age or over. In the other specified age groups it will be seen that the proportions of both races are similar to those shown in the total for all persons with the exception of the North Italians 35 to 44 years of age. As regards the negroes native-born of native father, none of whom are under 14 years of age, it will be noted that the proportion from 14 to 19, 20 to 24, and 25 to 29 years of age, also 55 years of age or over, is slightly in excess of the proportion of native whites born of native father in these age groups, while in the other age groups the proportion of negroes is below that of the native whites born of native father.

# GENERAL PROGRESS AND ASSIMILATION.

Citizenship—Ability to speak English—[Text Tables 83 to 86 and General Tables 50 to 52].

### CITIZENSHIP.

The extent to which foreign-born employees engaged in railroad and other construction work in the South have acquired or manifested an interest in attaining citizenship is set forth in the following table, which shows, by race, the present political condition of foreign-born male employees who have been in the United States five years or over and who were 21 years of age or over at the time of arrival in this country:

The above table shows that of the 32 foreign-born individuals in this locality for whom information was secured but 4, or 12.5 per cent, are fully naturalized and but 3, or 9.4 per cent, have first papers only.

Information was obtained in this locality for 463 foreign-born male employees, 40.4 per cent of whom speak English. Of those who were under 14 years of age at time of coming, the entire number now speak English, as compared with only 38.9 per cent of those who were 14 years of age or over at time of coming. Of the South Italians, it will be noted that, of those who were under 14 years of age at time of arrival, the proportion who now speak English is identical with that shown for all male employees, while of those who were 14 years of age or over at time of coming the proportion who now speak English is slightly below the proportion shown by the total.

It shows, by years in the United States and race, the percentage of foreign-born male employees able to





As regards the ability to speak English, by years in the United States, it will be noted from the above table that 31.9 per cent of those who have been in the United States under five years speak English, as compared with 85 per cent of those with a residence of from five to nine years and 100 per cent with a residence of ten years or over in the United States. In the period of residence of under five and from five to nine years, in which the South Italians report a proportion who speak English, it will be noted that said proportions are but slightly below those shown by the total for all foreign-born male employees.

# GENERAL EXPLANATION OF TABLES.

Persons of native birth have been divided into two general groups and further subdivided under each of the two, as follows:

1. Native-born of native father.

Persons under this group are classified as White, Negro, Indian, Chinese, Hindu, Japanese, and Korean.

2. Native-born of foreign father.

Persons under this group are further classified according to race of father in all tables where the data were secured for households, and according to country of birth of father in all tables where the data were secured for employees. Where classification is by race of father the classification used for several years by the United States Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization is followed.

Persons of foreign birth are classified according to race (or people). The classification of the United States Bureau of Immigration and

Naturalization is followed.

In the study of households information is presented—

1. By general nativity and race of the "individual" in all tables which show facts which are personal in their nature, such as English-speaking, occupation, or conjugal condition.

2. By general nativity and race of "head of family" in tables con-

cerned with family matters; for example, family income.

3. By general nativity and race of "head of household" in all tables dealing with living conditions, among which are tables showing the composition of the household and the number of persons per room and per sleeping room. The distinction which has been made throughout this study between "family" and "household" is de-

pendent upon the use of the term "apartment."

An "apartment" is a room or rooms within which all the usual daily processes of living, namely, cooking, eating, and sleeping, are carried on by the occupants. According to this definition an apartment may be, for example, a whole house; or it may be a single room of what was originally intended as an apartment; or it may be a corner or a wareroom or the back of a storeroom partitioned off and set aside for household uses. Two or more groups of occupants with distinctly separate money interests frequently rent a number of rooms jointly, occupying certain rooms separately but sharing one or more, usually the kitchen, or kitchen and living room. Under these conditions neither the rooms used by the one group of occupants nor those used by the other can be considered an apartment, since the room used in common must in such case be considered a room in each apartment and thus be counted twice. Where these conditions have been encountered the entire number of rooms has been considered one apartment.

The "household" includes all persons living within an apartment without regard to the relationships which exist among them. The

household may consist of one or more families with or without boarders or lodgers; or it may consist of a group of persons living together, no family included; or it may consist of various combinations of families, "groups," and boarders or lodgers.

The term "family" as used throughout these tables refers in gen-

eral to the immediate family composed of husband, wife, and children. Groups of persons among whom none of these relations exist are not considered families. Households in which complicated relationships exist have been resolved into the component immediate families. Remnants of families maintaining a home are considered families when either husband or wife is present.

The general tables show results of two practically independent

studies, as follows:

### STUDY OF HOUSEHOLDS.

All tables headed "Study of households" are based on information from the schedule which was filled out for certain selected households in each of the several communities. Names and addresses were secured of employees in a given industry who were heads of households; and for each such household a schedule was filled out by an agent of this Commission who visited the apartment and secured detailed information, so far as possible, for every occupant, as well as data in regard to family and household organization and status at the time of the visit.

### STUDY OF EMPLOYEES.

The general tables headed "Study of employees" present data from the schedule relating only to the individual employee. This schedule was filled out by the employee himself or by some one detailed by the employer to the task to whom the employee furnished data. The general tables of this series therefore concern the history and present status of the employee, while the other series, as has been stated, presents data not only for certain of the employees, but also for members of their households. All data included under the "Study of employees" are tabulated by sex and by the general nativity and race of the individual. For the native-born of foreign father the classification is by country of birth of father and not by race of father.

### DESCRIPTION OF TABLES.

Total number of male employees for whom information was secured, by general nativity and race: Study of employees. Tables 1, 14, 27, and 40.—These tables enumerate the employees for whom data were secured for the "Study of employees." The enumeration

is by general nativity and race of employee.

Number of foreign-born male employees in the United States each specified number of years, by race: Study of employees. Tables 2, 15, 28, and 41.—All foreign-born employees who report the number of years since their first arrival in the United States are here classified as in the United States under one year, one year, two years, three years, four years, five to nine years, ten to fourteen years, fifteen to nineteen years, or twenty years or over.

Occupation of foreign-born male employees before coming to the United States, by race: Study of employees. Tables 3, 16, 29, and 42.—In these tables are shown the number of foreign-born employees who just prior to coming to the United States were in the same industry in which they were employed at the time of the investigation, in farming or farm labor, in general labor, etc. Persons who report their occupation as "none," "at home," or "at school" are excluded from these tables.

Number of male employees 18 years of age or over earning each specified amount per day, by general nativity and race: Study of employees. Tables 4, 17, 30, and 43.—Employees are here classified according to the amount of their earnings. In some industries earnings are reported by the week, and in others by the day. Where employment is on the time basis the data are for "rate of pay"; where employment is on the piece basis the data are for "earnings."

Number of male employees 14 and under 18 years of age earning each specified amount per day, by general nativity and race: Study of employees. Tables 5, 18, 31, and 44.—These tables are similar to Tables 4, 17, 30, and 43, relating to earnings of males 18 years of age or over. In practically all industries the number of employees under

14 was too small for tabulation.

Literacy of male employees, by general nativity and race: Study of employees. Tables 6, 19, 32, and 45.—These tables show the number of employees who read some language and the number who both

read and write some language.

Conjugal condition of male employees, by age groups, and general nativity and race: Study of employees. Tables 7, 20, 33, and 46.— For the purposes of these tables employees of each sex are divided into four age groups—16 to 19 years, 20 to 29 years, 30 to 44 years, and 45 years or over—and are further classified according to whether they are single, married, or widowed. With the widowed are included the relatively few persons who are divorced or deserted.

Location of wives of foreign-born employees, by race of husband: Study of employees. Tables 8, 21, 34, and 47.—These tables show the number of foreign-born married employees who report wife in the United States and the number who report wife abroad.

tabulation is by the race of the employee.

Visits abroad made by foreign-born male employees, by years in the United States, and race: Study of employees. Tables 9, 22, 35, and 48.—Employees are here classified according to the number of years since their first arrival in the United States. The classes are: Under 5 years, 5 to 9 years, and 10 years or over. Under each group employees are classified according to whether they have made no visit or one, two, or three or more visits abroad.

Number of male employees of each age or within each age group, by sex and general nativity and race: Study of employees. Tables 10, 23, 36, and 49.—Employees are here classified according to age, by years if between 14 and 19 years of age, and by year groups if 20 years

of age or over.

Present political condition of foreign-born male employees who have been in the United States five years or over and who were 21 years of age or over at time of coming, by race and length of resi-

dence: Study of employees. Tables 11, 24, 37, and 50.—These tables include only foreign-born employees who were 21 years of age or over at the time of their first arrival in the United States and who have been in the United States long enough to acquire citizenship. These persons are classified as in the United States 5 to 9 years and 10 years or over and are further classified under each year group as aliens, citizens, and persons with only their first papers.

Ability to speak English of foreign-born male employees, by age at time of coming to the United States and race: Study of employees. Tables 12, 25, 38, and 51.—These tables classify foreign-born employees of non-English-speaking races according to whether they were under 14 years of age or 14 years of age or over at the time of their first arrival in the United States, and show the number in each of the

two groups who are able to speak English.

Ability to speak English of foreign-born male employees, by years in the United States and race: Study of employees. Tables 13, 26, 39, and 52.—These tables classify foreign-born employees of non-English-speaking races according to the number of years since their first arrival in the United States. The classes are: Under 5 years, 5 to 9 years, and 10 years or over. Under each group the number able to speak English is shown.






