ACWORTH TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Acworth in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to bring in your votes for Town Officers to the Town Hall on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next between the hours of three of the clock in the afternoon until nine of the clock in the evening; and,

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Acworth on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at seven-thirty of the clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To see if the Town will enpower the Selectmen to serve as Pound Keepers, Measurers of Wood, and Fence Viewers.
- 2. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
 - 3. To see if the Town will direct the Selectmen to appoint the Road Agent.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to pay to the Crescent Lake Association, Inc. (a non-profit organization), the sum of \$250.00, in order to increase police protection for property within the Crescent Lake area, to which the Crescent Lake Association, Inc., will match, dollar for dollar, to hire the services of Mr. Edward Bruno for year-round protection of cottages and road patrol.
- 5. To see if the Town will appropriate a total capital outlay sum of \$8,000.00 for reconstruction and repairs to the Acworth Silsby Free Library building, to be commenced during 1978.
- 6. To see if the Town will appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$13,500.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith:

7. To see if the Town will accept the Budget as submitted and recommended by the Budget Committee.

- 8. To see if the Town will establish a Recreation Committee per R.S.A. 31:47, to consist of 5 persons whose duties it shall be to select and obtain the use of suitable areas for non-commercial recreational purposes. This committee to be appointed in 1978.
- 9. To see if the Town will enpower the Planning Board pursuant to RSA 36:19-a to review, and approve or disapprove site plans for the development of tracts for non-residential uses whether or not such development includes a subdivision or resubdivision of the site.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to consider supporting a County solid waste facility, if such a facility is found feasible to construct and operate. (See letters on pages 56-57.)
- 11. To see if the Town could consider joining a neighboring town in a solid waste transfer station operation, if this operation should prove more economical than individual town operated stations. (See letters on pages 56-57.)
- 12. To see if the Town will take a consensus vote of the qualified voters as to whether the Historical Society should further proceed with a **History of Acworth**, as outlined in the Society's Report. (See pages 54-55.) By Society Request.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to exempt itself from the requirement that the Town Clerk register applicants for the Voter Check List. Ref. (R.S.A. 55:9-C)
- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell, by means of public competitive bids, selected standing timber on Town Forest Land, in such amounts to benefit the remaining forest, and to use all revenue obtained from this article to accelerate repayment of principal of long term debt.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to change the classification of Grout Hill Road from A. Supplee's property included, to and including R. Wilson's property Lot II from Class VI to Class V. By Petition.
- 16. To see if the Town will empower and direct the Selectmen to Lay Out a Class V Highway, upon receipt of a petition to do so, from Ingoldsby's dwelling north to the Max Boy dwelling. By Petition.
- 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to Lay Out a Class V Highway of that portion of Road #92 (north end) from Acworth Town to Derry Hill, which presently is Class VI. By Petition.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to Lay Out a Class V Highway that section of the Old State Road (#102) from the Storms/Brown driveway westerly to the Colburn dwelling (formerly Hunt) westerly boundary presently classified as Class VI Highway. By Petition.

- 19. To see if the Town will vote to return to the unofficial ballot system for the election of town officers. (See Minutes of Article 4 of March 8, 1977 Town Meeting.)
 - 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before this Meeting.

MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING HELD MARCH 8, 1977

The Inhabitants of the Town of Acworth met at the Town Hall at 8:00 P.M. on March 8, 1977, according to the Warrant and acted on the articles thereon:

Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Kenneth Grant. He read the warrant and the Reverend Harold Craw offered a prayer.

The following Town Officers were elected:

ARTICLE 1: Voted to empower the Selectmen to serve as Pound Keepers, Measurers of Wood and Fence Viewers.

ARTICLE 2: Voted to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 3: Voted to direct the Selectmen to appoint the Road Agent.

ARTICLE 4: Tabled until March 1978.

ARTICLE 5: Voted to appropriate the total capital outlay sum of \$45,000.00 for reconstruction of Bridge #111/065 (The South Acworth Bridge) over Cold River.

ARTICLE 6: Voted to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw all principal and interest from Account #810053-3 and Account #7-1-0231-2 held by the Treasurer; these accounts being identified as South Acworth Bridge Reconstruction Capital Funds, for the purpose of offsetting the appropriated sum of \$45,000.00.

ARTICLE 7: Ballots Cast - 110. YES - 101 NO - 9 (3/4) 76). Voted to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow a maximum of \$12,000.00 the needed balance for reconstructing the South Acworth Bridge #111/065; and to make minimum annual principal payments in the amount of \$3,000.00 to repay this debt.

ARTICLE 8: Voted to rescind affirmative Action taken on Article #9 at the Town Meeting of 1970, and any other action that may have been taken at any other meeting regarding the reconstruction of the South Acworth Bridge.

ARTICLE 9: Voted to appropriate a total of \$18.00 to supplement the cost of heat and utilities for the benefit of The Children and Youth Program at the Charlestown Medical Building. By Petition.

ARTICLE 10: Ballots Cast - 92. YES - 84 NO - 8 ($\frac{1}{2}$ 62). Voted to appropriate a total sum of \$9,500.00 for the purchase price of the Galion Grader T-600 now in use; and to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow a maximum sum of \$4,500.00 to be used towards this purchase; and repay this dept by making minimum annual principal payment of \$2,250.00.

ARTICLE 11: Voted for Town to appropriate \$1,000.00 for the purchase of Town Hall office equipment.

ARTICLE 12: Voted to appropriate a total sum of \$6,500.00 for the purpose of commencing compilation and preparation of the Tax Map (R.S.A. 31:95a): and to direct the Selectmen to withdraw the Tax Map Capital Reserve Fund (\$5,500.00 plus interest) to offset the above appropriated amount and to cease further payments to this fund.

ARTICLE 13: Voted the Town to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$10,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith:

ARTICLE 14: Voted to accept the Budget as submitted and recommended by the Budget Committee.

MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING, Continued

ARTICLE 15: Voted to grant authorization to the Board of Selectmen to issue written permits to recognized snowmobile clubs for the purpose of creating, using, and maintaining trails over town-owned forest lands.

ARTICLE 16: Voted that the Town require that the Selectmen first obtain an affirmative two-thirds vote on a warrant article at a regular Town Meeting before being empowered to sell town-owned lots, and/or timber, gravel, and earth from any Town property in an amount exceeding \$100.00, based on unit prices prevailing during the calendar year of empowerments; and rescind any action taken on these subjects at prior Town Meetings.

ARTICLE 17: Voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell, by means of public competitive bids, selected standing timber on the Gove Lot, in such amounts as to benefit the remaining forest; selection and sale-management to be under the direction of the State Forester; and to use all revenue obtained under this Article to accelerate repayment of principal of long-term debts.

ARTICLE 18: Passed as amended to empower and direct the Selectmen to postpone the layout of any Class V and Class VI highway until a vote can be taken on the matter at a Town Meeting; regarding the need of such a layout for the general benefit of the residents and property owners of Acworth.

ARTICLE 19: Motion made and passed to Pursue the settlement agreement between the Town of Acworth and Davis & Symonds Lumber Co. matter by filing suit.

ARTICLE 20: Voted to accept \$300.00 per request of Stephen B. Bragdon, Administrator of the Estate of Albin Dressel, formerly of Acworth, who died June 26, 1974, for the perpetual care of Albin Dressel's cemetery lot.

ARTICLE 21: Voted to exclude from its Social Security plan services performed by election officials or election workers for each calendar quarter in which the renumeration paid for such services is less than \$50.00.

ARTICLE 22: Get town reports out early. Post to public the deadline for filing dates, what time the voting hours are and what time the meeting will be held.

Mrs. Ingraham gave a talk on how she and the State plan on fixing up 123-A Roads.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

REPORT OF ACTIVITIES FOR 1977

In January, the South Acworth Bridge reconstruction got underway with engineering research and design plans developed under the direction of the Selectmen. Unanimous affirmative action was obtained on four articles of the March 8, 1977 Town Meeting, in addition to full approval from four abuting property owners. We wish to thank them for their cooperation and use of land. Actual reconstruction commenced in mid March and the new 50 foot bridge was open to traffic by late May. Each of the four pre-stressed concrete beams weighs twenty tons and has a rated carrying capacity of H20-44; thereby assuring safe crossing for private and commercial operators. The Board of Selectmen were pleased with the work and cooperation of the engineering firm of Rayco Engineering and the bridge building firm of Burrington Survey and Construction Co., Inc.

Also during the first quarter of the year we saw the completion of the reconstruction and addition to the Town Hall. Town Meeting was held in a more comfortable and warm hall. Accoustics have also been improved, allowing people in all parts of the hall to hear speakers and the moderator. Dances have been held on a monthly basis and requests for use of the hall for private use have increased. The Town Clerk's office and the small conference room used bi-monthly by the Planning Board and Conservation Commission, have proven to be satisfactory, in addition to weekly meetings held by the Selectmen in their new office.

In the early summer, this Board invited the towns of Alstead, Lemster, and Unity to perambulate their respective mutual town lines. Alstead declined to answer the invitation. Unity was not able to make the meeting because of two unplanned resignations on its Board. Lemster met and the line was perambulated from our northeast corner. Boundry markers were identified, reconciled and re-established where necessary. During the past six years the Charlestown, Langdon, Marlow and Lemster town lines have been perambulated. The town lines of Alstead and Unity remain to be done.

Tax Map work progressed very well with the Crescent Lake area (140 parcels) and the Acworth Town area (60 parcels) now prepared for public presentation. These meetings are scheduled to be held during spring and early summer when more land owners can be present.

Highway maintenance and new construction continue to be a major activity of the Town. The use of 4000 yards of crushed bank run gravel improved the durability and riding quality on main arterial roads and steep troublesome sections of other roads. The use of this material has reduced loss of road surface from water and traffic erosion. Annual upgrading should be more successful without the prior necessity of adding new material each year. Where new construction was being prepared for a hard bituminous surface, the use of this crushed gravel was very successful such as on parts of the Forrest Road and the access to the South Acworth Bridge.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN, REPORT OF ACTIVITIES, Continued

Late May saw the completion of the third major new bridge crossing the Cold River, in as many years. This leaves one more bridge, also crossing the Cold River, to be repaired. The Grout Hill Bridge needs immediate attention to the replacement of the deck, posts, and railings. The carrying beams have been found to be sound by the State Bridge Division and our own engineer. This bridge has been closed since November 1977 and estimated costs for materials and labor total \$7,000.00.

Annual assessing of real estate with the necessary tabulation and frequent reconciliation involves a grea. Jeal of time in order to be done fairly. As taxes increase there will continue to be an increase of work by the Board of Selectmen/Assessors to defend the accuracy of records and the justification of their assessments. During 1978 there will be at least about 900 parcels of land with 360 buildings spread out over 37 square miles to record, tabulate, assess, and compute. On average there will be 100 transfers of title as the number of subdivisions and general land speculation activities increase, along with constantly changing values, that all must be recorded. Consideration may want to be given to the future use of a separate Board of Assessors in order to handle this requirement of town government. This branch of duty shows signs of rapidly increasing.

Financial activities of the Town have greatly increased during the past few years. An annual cash flow of dollars has increased in ten years from \$186,000.00 to a record amount in 1977 of \$462,000.00. This latter figure was handled by writing 555 checks, a record number. This alone imposes a substantial increase in accounting and service work done by the Selectmen and Treasurer. At the bi-monthly financial meetings the Selectmen and Treasurer discuss, audit, write and record about, on average, twenty-two checks totalling \$20,000.00. In addition to this the Board reports on nearly forty separate accounts and periodically must audit these for Town budget and State statutory requirements.

Selectmen's correspondence continues to increase in volume with about 125 answers in letter on such matters as assessments, taxes, building permits, zoning, various enforcement of ordinances, timber harvest violations, highway problems, animal damage from dogs, and general legal action taken on many subjects. As a policy all letters received are answered as quickly as possible.

REPORT OF TOWN COUNCIL

Summary of General Activities During 1977

- 1. A review of proposed Warrant for March 8, Town Meeting with particular attention to articles concerning Davis & Symonds Lumber Co., power to postpone lay out of Class V roads, and preliminary review of ways to protect Town from damage in connection with South Acworth Bridge.
- 2. Complete revision of proposed agreements/contracts and final drafting of new contracts and documents for March reconstruction of South Acworth Bridge.
- 3. Extensive research and drafting with several meetings with the Board of Selectmen and others concerning extent of obligations of Town for road maintenance on Class V and Class VI roads. Also procedures to change those obligations and negotiation of claims concerning road maintenance.
- 4. Preparation of the Warrant for Special Town Meeting on July 12 with review and drafting of requested articles concerning burial permits and private access agreements on unclassed roads or Class VI roads.
- 5. Attendance at two evening public hearings and meetings with Selectmen and others concerning proposed zoning ordinances with extensive legal drafting for Special Town Meeting.
- 6. Legal advice on the limitations concerning the authority of the Zoning Board of Adjustment in relation to the statutory powers of the Planning Board.
- 7. Work on the Town Master Plan and its legal requirements done in conjunction with County and State planning agencies.
- 8. Advice and following legal draft concerning requests to review "planned unit development" regulations for construction in the Town, to be presented at Special Town Meeting for new zoning proposals.
- 9. Requested information with advice, drafting, and follow up negotiations on behalf of the Conservation Commission's program to reserve conservation easements in certain wetlands.
- 10. Initiation of enforcement proceedings against Danis and Symonds Lumber Co. et al, (see minutes of Article 19, 1977 Town Meeting) and their successors in connection with the February 1975 settlement, in Sullivan County Superior Court docket #7702 involving Pierce Brook Estates, and especially the roads leading to and through that subdivision development. The case has been brought forward and enforcement proceedings against the defendants has begun, with a trial now tentatively scheduled by the Clerk of Court for late March 1978. Due to congestion on the Court calendar it is at least possible that trial will not be had until somewhat later in 1978.

In conclusion: there were no legal claims or law suits entered against the Town of Acworth or any of its officers during 1977, and as of February 20, 1978, to the knowledge of the undersigned council there are no significant pending legal claims against the Town or any of its officers.

REPORT OF THE ACWORTH PLANNING BOARD — 1977

Construction approval was granted in April to New Hampshire Electric Co-Op. for construction of new lines on Derry Hill. After many meetings with officials and residents, it was agreed that the new lines would remain in essentially the same location as the old instead of along the roadside as originally proposed.

Most of the year has been spent working on the zoning. Many hours were spent with Bob Ward of the U.V.L.S.C. and with the local Conservation Commission and the Zoning Board of Adjustment preparing the ordinance which was voted at the Special Town Meeting.

The first public hearing was held in the evening of May 31, and was attended by 29 people. Questions were answered and many suggestions offered were incorporated into the ordinance. This was presented at an afternoon hearing on June 20 to 8 people.

Sample copies of the ballot and the zoning ordinance were distributed, and a public meeting was held on July 5 to discuss the warrant.

Since the zoning was defeated by a large majority, we felt that a lot more work is needed to find something that is agreeable to the majority. Toward this goal, we decided to appoint an advisory committee to help us write another ordinance. It is expected that this will be presented during the coming year, and is anticipated in our budget request.

The other large expense is the printing of the Master Plan. This money was voted last year, and the printing has begun. However, after the zoning vote, it was decided that we should postpone adoption of the Master Plan, so this money was unspent. It is expected that this will also be completed this year.

The last meeting of each month remains open by appointment for meeting with the public on matters such as subdivision, annexations, or any other related matters. Of course, all meetings are open to the public at all times.

The Planning Board always has and continues to try to reflect the opinions of the whole town. Every person must let us know what his opinion is in order for this to be possible.

ROAD AGENT'S REPORT 1977

Culverts were put in on Lynn Hill, Grout Hill, Crescent Lake Road, Gates Mountain, Pelton's Road, Cyrus Hollow. Crushed gravel was put on the following roads: Crescent Lake, Lynn Hill, Grout Hill, Poly Hill, Pitkins Road, Gates Mountain, Turkey Shoot, A. Clarks, Black North, Quinns, Sirkins, Parsons, J. Ballas, School House, Ingoldsby, Cyrus Hollow, and Ken & Harvey Bascoms.

We sealed the East Acworth Roads and parts of Forrest Road. Also farmer mixed Forrest Road. We cut brush on Grout Hill, Charlestown Road, Turkey Shoot Road, Forrest Road, Phoenix Nest Road, Derry Hill and Campbells Road and the Henio Road.

Dead trees were cut along the Turkey Shoot, Crescent Lake, Sirkins and Harvey Bascom's Road.

All the roads were graded once and some were done twice. Bank run gravel was put on the Cross Road, Grout Hill, Gates Mountains, Henio Road, Turkey Shoot Road, Phoenix Nest Road, Black North and Quinns Road.

All snow-plow equipment was repaired and painted in conjunction with general preventive maintenance of the two International Trucks. Also during the early summer new planks and railings were installed on the Echo Valley Farm Bridge and a new ramp and road approach was constructed to the new bridge crossing the Cold River in South Acworth. The planks were removed from the old South Acworth Bridge and the site prepared for the bridge contractors.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS UPPER VALLEY LAKE SUNAPEE COUNCIL

1977 was a year of some reorganization for the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council. In contrast to previous years when the Board of Directors was divided into two bodies, one meeting in Newport, we are now a single unit meeting in varying member towns. Such a change has enabled representatives from all member towns to meet and discuss problems of mutual importance on a somewhat wider basis. Being able to see ourselves as a part of a larger region and its overall problems of growth and development is a necessary step toward maturity in any single community and we are grateful to have that opportunity expanded through our membership in the U.V.L.S.C.

Amoung the many items discussed this past year, at least two may be of some interest to area residents. The first is that we are pleased to report the unanamous adoption of a regional land use plan as required by the Federal Government. This plan was formulated through many meetings with interested area citizens and sets guidelines for development with the area to which all federally funded or approved projects must comply. The guidelines which were developed after much debate were of a nature that would preserve the present quality of rural N.H. and limit development to forms which would be compatable with it.

A minor item, yet of possible interest to some, which was recently discussed in Hanover was the possible future role of the U.V.L.S.C. in regard to recent federal legislation designed to protect and acquire land along the Appalachian Trail System.

During 1977 James Phinizy resigned from the Board of Directors and Maggie Hanson agreed to serve as an alternate Director.

REPORT OF THE FALL MOUNTAIN VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

TO THE TOWN OF ACWORTH

In 1977 the Fall Mountain Visiting Nurse Association provided a total of 3849 units of service (nursing, occupational therapy, home health aide care and clinic services) to the five-town area of Acworth, Alstead, Charlestown, Langdon and North Walpole. This was a 17% increase over services provided in 1976.

Acworth, which has 6.6% of the total population, received 247 units of service or 6.4% of the total provided.

The cost to the VNA for services in 1977 was up by 9%. This means an increase in the tax appropriation is necessary if services are not to be reduced in 1978. The Agency is requesting an increase of 5% from each town, which would raise Acworth's 1977 appropriation from \$1,182.50 to \$1,242.00. It is anticipated that the additional increase in expenses can be met through the completion of a two-part fund drive that was begun in November 1977.

It is likely that requests for VNA services will continue to increase in 1978. Medicare, Medicaid and other insurance reimbursers are looking for less expensive alternatives to hospitalization and nursing home care. The VNA often is able to provide the professional and homemaking services that otherwise would necessitate institutional care for a patient. Home care not only is less expensive, it means a better satisfied patient and frequently a more rapid convalescence and recovery.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT — 1977

The buildings around the common on the hill look great; the Town Hall with its new look, the church structurally renovated and painted and the school with its new entrance.

Our school is a very important part of the community and we are most fortunate to have two fine teachers, Janice McDonald and David Hinman, who are dedicated to preparing the children well in all phases of their development.

The Parent's Club is very active and supportive of the entire school program. Their play, which was very well done, and The Maple Festival, always a popular event, raised a considerable sum of money to purchase playground equipment. The playground is undergoing much needed renovation, and to date, approximately 150 yards of fill have been brought in. Plans are to complete the project in Spring and Summer.

A new furnace has been installed, one room redecorated, a section of the roof replaced, part of the exterior painted, with the remainder to be done during the coming year.

We are pleased and most fortunate to have Dr. Harry Westcott as our new superintendent. He and Mrs. Westcott are becoming acquainted in the district by attending many community events. With the new administrative plan, adopted by the board, Dr. Westcott is overall superintendent, directly responsible for curriculum and personnel, while John Menton, assistant superintendent, is in charge of all business aspects of the district, including building maintenance.

There are two concerns of prime importance, namely the necessity for a yearly appropriation of money to upgrade all building in the district and keep all properly maintained. The committee, created by the Alstead Town Meeting, is exploring the possibility of their separating from the district. This development must be carefully watched, since we are now sending grades 6, 7 and 8 to Alstead.

I personally feel that we have an excellent school system and under new dynamic leadership, things are happening. Our children rank with the best, and merit our continued support.

ACWORTH SILSBY LIBRARY REPORT 1977

The Library has been used, not only as a source of information, but has also been the focal point of some community activities. The 4H Club displayed hand made items during National 4H Week, October 2-8. The school children made murals and pictures throughout the year. Christmas books for youngsters were featured in a seasonal display. The older children visit the Library on Tuesday afternoon. Thursday the story hour for younger children has been continued during the school year as well as during summer vacation.

Community groups; the Woman's Club, the Community Aid, the Parents' Club and Female Charitable Society have given money generously for books. In February the Selectmen donated \$100 for books in appreciation for the use of the Library while the Town House was being remodeled. In July a successful sale of discarded and duplicate books was held.

Mrs. Newton and Mrs. Poltrack attended two book buying meetings. Mrs. Newton also went to two District Advisory Council meetings.

The floor in the stack room was striped and refinished and seven storm windows installed. Four chairs were recaned. These items were covered by funds from Revenue Sharing. Certain minor changes were made to reduce fire and accident risk.

It is essential that certain definite and specific repairs to the building be made to prevent further deterioration. A complete written break down of necessary work with accompanying figures was presented to the Budget Committee and to the Selectmen for their information and study.

If in future years expansion of the Library is deemed necessary, it has been suggested that the basement, which is in good condition and has a 9 foot ceiling, be converted into usable space. At the present date this could be done for approximately \$20,000.

It is interesting to note that according to the New Hampshire Library Statistics published last year Acworth has a circulation of 14.5 books per capita which is higher than any of the surrounding towns including those with a larger population.

Salaries must conform to the Federal Minimum Wage Law and therefore there is an increase in the budget for this item.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY REPORT

The Acworth Historical Society held monthly meetings during the year. An inventory was made of articles given to the Society. The places where they are was noted. This material is available for examination by any interested persons.

Several years ago it was concluded that the narrative part of the History as written by Mr. Newton F. Tolman in 1967-1978 was inadequate and unsatisfactory as a complete history. However, this year the Society mimeographed Mr. Tolman's work. Copies are available in the Library for reading and reference. Copies may also be purchased from the Library for \$2.00 each.

The original completion date for the History was 1967, the Acworth Bicentennial year. Little progress had been made on the Genealogy Section at that time.

The preparation of the Genealogy Section is not yet finished. Considerable more time and effort is needed to bring it to completion. The magnitude of this undertaking in the amount of time and work involved to prepare the records of 400 families was not correctly estimated originally. It is now believed that this number can be substantially reduced and still provide a satisfactory result more in keeping with recently published histories.

The Homestead Chapter will require revision in order to include more recent ownership changes. However, this is not a major problem.

Projections were made later that the History could possible be published in 1974 or early 1975. Later it was estimated to be published as an observance of the American Revolution Bicentennial in 1976.

Subsequent to many discussions this past year it is evident that the services of a competent professional historian is imperative in order to produce a creditable, satisfactory, accurate history.

This undertaking will require well-coordinated direction and the sustained interest and support of the community. The project would have to be underwritten by the Town. A preliminary investigation indicates the cost of publication would be approximately \$20,000.

Gentlemen:

Your solid waste disposal facilities were inspected on January 23, 1978. The mountainous pile of refuse that has accumulated on-site poses a potentially serious public health hazard. Uncompacted, uncovered refuse serves as a breeding ground for deleterious insect and rodent populations, and causes serious odor problems. In addition, a fracture line caused by differential settling of the refuse pile was observed at the head of the pile very close to where people were throwing their refuse. A person could be injured if he were standing on the refuse pile when it shifted. One person's weight may be sufficient to cause the pile to shift, slump or slide.

In view of the unsatisfactory conditions at your dump site, you are requested to investigate alternative methods to dispose of your solid waste. Included among these alternatives might be:

- a. a sanitary landfill within Town of Acworth boundaries;
- b. a regional site with one or more surrounding towns;
- incineration of waste and landfilling of ash either as an individual town or regional basis; and
- d. setting up a transfer station to deliver waste to a nearby incinerator or sanitary landfill.

Recycling and resource recovery should be included as part of any waste disposal alternative.

It is requested that you keep the Bureau of Solid Waste Management informed of your progress in finding a satisfactory solution to your solid waste problem. We would be happy to assist you in any feasible capacity. We look forward to hearing from you in the near future.

REPORT OF THE SULLIVAN COUNTY CONSERVATION DISTRICT

January 13, 1978

TO: The Board of Selectmen

RE: Sullivan County Solid Waste

Gentlemen:

In September, 1977 a letter was sent from this office concerning Solid Waste and basically recommending that the smaller communities withing the County consider establishing a transfer station. This concept would consist of a compacting unit and a container for non-separated waste with separate containers for glass, cans, newsprint and cardboard. It should be noted that all the above-noted separated materials can now be sold within the area along with scrap metal, i.e.: washers, dryers, stoves, etc.

As you may know, the Sullivan County Commissioners has authorized this office to investigate the feasibility of establishing a Countrywide facility and/or sub-County (smaller areas) facilities to accommodate solid waste. Present indications are along the lines of recycling and incineration with the sale of the separated materials and energy generated by the incineration. Only a few years ago, most of the recommendations for disposal of solid waste were for communities to develop a landfill site. It has since been proven that not only is valuable land being wasted but water pollution and the development of methane gas is becoming a problem in many areas.

In order to obtain an economical solution to the problem, it is obvious that a sizeable volume of solid waste will be required. This is the reason for this communication. We need your help in order to continue. We are, therefore, requesting your assistance answering the enclosed questionnaire and returning it in the enclosed stamped envelope. You may also wish to keep a copy of your reply in your records to indicate to the State your continued work and cooperation in solving the solid waste problem. Thank you for your assistance in this regard, and should there by any questions please feel free to contact us.
