1976 commencement speaker

Dr. James R. Schlesinger will be the speaker for Indiana University of Pennsylvania's commencement the Sunday afternoon of Senior/Alumni Weekend, May 16, at George P. Miller Stadium.

Secretary of Defense for more than two years, he has also served the federal government as Director of the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA), chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission and Acting Director of the Bureau of the Budget.

Accepting an honorary doctor of letters degree at

commencement will be Jean Daugherty '43, television performer and executive with WHEN-TV in Syracuse, New York. She is perhaps best known in that area for the "Magic Toy Shop," a series of children's programs on that station for some 20 years.

Sister of Duffy Daugherty, longtime head football coach at Michigan State University, she has gained numerous awards through the years, both for children's programming and for documentaries.

alumni citations

Dr. Harry Fair Jr. '58 and the team of Charles A. "Charlie" Davis '34 and Robert Ensley have been granted University Alumni Citations for Achievement and for Service respectively. They will formally accept the honors at this spring's Senior/Alumni Weekend Luncheon in May.

Selected by the Alumni Council, the three are the first to share in a new program of awarding a single citation each spring. Dr. Fair's honor recognizes his professional achievement, that to Davis and Ensley their contributions to the life of the University.

Dr. Fair, a mathematics and physics graduate of Indiana who studied under Daniel G. Reiber, has become an internationally recognized authority and consultant, both in working with explosives and in advancing the cause of the medical knowledge through his work with lasers.

He is affiliated with the U.S. Army's Picatinny Arsenal Feltman Research Laboratory in Dover, New Jersey, as chief of its solid state branch. For the 1974-75 year he was awarded the Secretary of the Army's Research and Study Fellowship to conduct a year of research in London and in Paris.

In 1971 Dr. Fair had been granted the Department of the Army Research and Development Award, representing the highest form of recognition by the Army for scientific contributions. He is listed in American Men of Science, and is credited with placing the Army in the forefront of his area of study.

Davis and Ensley, as music and drama director respectively, collaborated for 30 years on the famed campus Swing Out productions each spring. In addition, they directed many summer theater musicals and have taken their music and drama to area high schools and colleges.

Davis conducted the Glee Club and University Chorale and the Mellowmen dance band for many years prior to his retirement in 1973. He is now serving as an alumni delegate to the University Foundation Board of Directors and representative to the State Council of Alumni Associations.

Ensley originated the highly regarded summer theater and Drama Workshop programs at Indiana in 1947, and has directed 150 plays. He has also directed more than 50 major drama productions through the academic years.

Alumni Nights for IUP grads and friends are scheduled for August-one for the University's own Theater by the Grove and a second for the Pittsburgh Civic Light Opera at Heinz Hall, featuring "Godspell" and "George M.," respectively. Date and cost particulars will be mailed to all interested.

Summer theater at IUP begins June 30-July 3 with "The Contrast" by Tyler Moses, and continues on respective Wednesday through Saturday nights with "Tunnel of Love," "Secret Affairs of Mildred Wild," "Lloyd George Knew My Father," "Cat Among the Pigeons" and "Godspell."

For a good weeknd when many popular campus events are in full swing, think about coming back to Indiana April 30-May 2. Swing Out will be center stage at 8 p.m., both Friday and Saturday nights for the Broadway musical "Company," and there will be an outdoor concert at 5 p.m., Friday at Flagstone.

Fraternities, sororities and other campus organizations will take an active part in University Weekend festivities. Tickets for Swing Out may be reserved and reservations for lodging made through the Interest Blank.

giving program

As of press deadline for this edition, and prior to followup promotion, progress toward the 1975-76 Alumni Annual Giving program goal was on target, approaching \$15,000 of the \$40,000 aim. But it was clear that vigorous encouragement of spring giving would be required.

The individual response to the special "Margin of Excellence" leadership giving clubs, started during the Centennial year, was again encouraging. Members will be invited guests for dinner with President Robert C. Wilburn in May.

Thanks to alumni giving, the Breezedale Restoration project can now be furthered. A need of \$25,000 of Association funding has been projected by fall, so that this may be matched by Commonwealth funds, and the extensive, but largely unseen, engineering and mechanical work can be done.

Special appreciation is extended Mrs. Eunice McCloskey, a painter and writer of Ridgway, who has contributed a fine collection of primitive Pennsylvania paintings and a great deal of period furniture that will blend with the Victorian mansion. Her daughter, Eunice, graduated from IUP in '64.

Current annual giving revenue also means that Stabley Library can augment its resources in a manner appropriate to a University of Indiana's enrollment and standing, and the various other established accounts can prove of great help in their purposes.

Since graduating from their alma mater, Indiana's some 35,000 living alumni have ranged far afield from campus. They presently reside in each of the counties of Pennsylvania as well as in all of our 50 states, the District of Columbia, various United States territories and abroad.

While nearly 18,000 live reasonably close to Indiana, more than 11,000 have come to reside some distance from campus. The greatest number are in Southwestern Pennsylvania, while approximately 4500 alumni live out of state.

Beyond the particular counties listed, some 11,000 are in the general area of Harrisburg, York and Lancaster, more than 900 in the Philadelphia area, including Montgomery, Bucks and Chester Counties, and another 300 in neighboring Delaware, including particular areas on its borders.

Most popular areas further away from Indiana are New York City, Northern New Jersey and Connecticut (360), Washington, D. C., Northern Virginia and suburban Maryland (280), both the Gulf and Atlantic

Coasts of Florida, Baltimore and Northeastern Ohio.

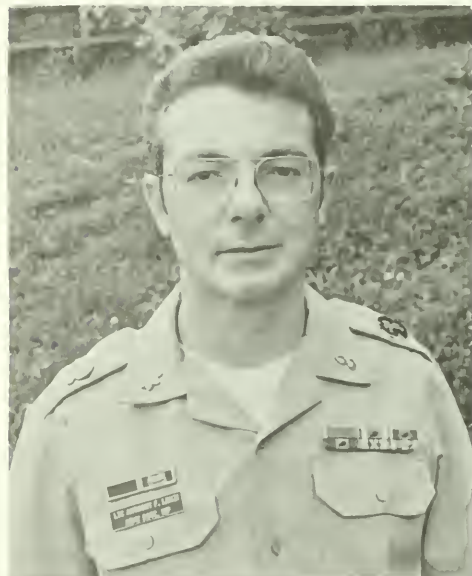

IUP Sports

BASKETBALL TEAM, WRESTLING AND SWIMMING PERFORMERS HAVE OUTSTANDING WINTER

For the eighth season in the last nine, IUP's basketball team qualified for the NAIA District 18 post-season playoffs. Coach Carl Davis's squad finished the regular season with a 19-4 record to rank second in the district and was scheduled to face Waynesburg in the first round of playoffs March 1.

A 6-5 transfer from St. Bonaventure, Bill Moore, from Altoona, has paced the Indians in scoring (16.8) and rebounding (11.1) and is second in assists (105).

Backing Moore offensively have been 6-2 guard Gary Kotsch, a junior from Harrisburg with a 14.2 scoring average, and the team's captain, 6-7 John Guyton in with a 13.1 average. The senior from Stoneboro is the eighth Indiana player in history to pass the 1000-point barrier. Prior to the playoffs, he had registered 1177 points to rank seventh in the all-time scoring parade.

While the basketball team was performing in its usual excellent fashion, the swimming and wrestling outfits produced sparkling showings.

In the Pennsylvania Conference Swimming Championships that were held in the IUP Natatorium, Ralph Johnson's swimmers and divers achieved the school's best finish ever - third.

Individually, Indiana's All-American Emilio Abreu, the native of Paraguay, captured three championships

(the 200-yard and 400-yard individual medleys and the 200-yard butterfly) and sophomore Bill Kane (Maple Glen, Pa.) won the 200-yard backstroke.

All four victories were swum in Conference record times.

Another IUP All-American, wrestler Larry McCoy, the defending national champion at 167 pounds, emerged as the tops in that weight in the Pennsylvania Conference as he took the 1976 crown at Bloomsburg. McCoy, a native of Indiana, will look for his second national championship in the NAIAs later in March.
