THE Judicious READER

Will perceive on the following pages much beside A Counterfeit Presentment of An Old Almanack. This little book revives for a later Generation the thoughts and habits of a simpler Age. It shows, better than many pages of written History, how greatly the life of New-England has changed during the nearly two Centuries which have intervened since its Original Appearance.

James Franklin was one of the Procession of Bostonians who have followed the trail blazed by Roger Williams, and whose removal to Rhode Island was agreeable to both Com-He was possessed of a Press and Type, and so far as known a respectable Reputation, in Boston, when in the Year 1720 a change in the Political Complexion of that Town gave to a rival Printer the work, previously enjoyed by Franklin, of getting out the Newspaper issued by the local Postmaster. A few months later appeared The New-England Courant, in which Franklin undertook to even accounts with those who were not his friends. He gathered a Group of congenial Spirits, who came to be known to some who did not approve of them as "The Hell-Fire Club." assistance, Franklin introduced Urllom-Journalism into Boston. The new paper soon had the whole Town talking about its exposures of official mismanagement and its portrayal of social short-comings. The following pages suggest that if James Franklin wished to be unkind, he may have used expressions which undoubtedly irritated those about whom he was writing.

It was the Age of Swift and Addison and Steele, of Spectators and Tatlers; and their New-England contemporaries possessed all the virility and audacity of the times. The Courant opposed whatever it thought that the ruling Hierarchy favoured. When Cotton Mather and the other

leading Ministers came out on behalf of the newest medical innovation, Innoculation against the *Small-Pox*, the *Courant* ardently championed the side of the regular Practitioners who opposed this unheard-of Trifling with the Image of *God*. In Politics it was against the Administration, which bided its time until the pestering sheet overstepped the bounds and laid itself open to Discipline.

The first attempt to suppress it failed, because the Authorities discovered that the Townspeople believed the Courant to be in the right when it accused the Officials, or some of their influential Supporters, of having too friendly an interest in a Pirate Craft which was operating off Boston Harbour. A few Weeks later, however, the Legislature took decisive Action, and Voted: "The Tendency of the said Paper is to "mock Religion, and bring it into Contempt, that the Holy "Scriptures are therein profanely abused, that the Reverend and faithful Ministers of the Gospel are injuriously reflected on, His Majesty's Government affronted, and the Peace and good Order of His Majesty's Subjects of this Province disturbed; "wherefore Franklin was forbidden to print anything more until he had received permission from the designated Official.

The next week's paper came out as usual, and Franklin was at once arrested. In the following issue, he announced that he had dropped the Undertaking, and that the Paper would be continued by a new Publisher, who was none other than his younger Brother, the more famous Benjamin, then an Apprentice in the Printing Shop. The Subterfuge served its purpose, and the Courant ran on until the summer of 1726.

Some months later, James Franklin removed his belongings to Newport and set up his Press on Tillinghast's Wharf. There, before the end of the Year 1727, he printed "John Hammett's Vindication and Relation . . . Of his withdrawing from the Baptist's Communion; Of his uniting to

them again; Of his separating himself wholly from the Baptists, and joining himself in Unity to the People called Quakers;" and the Almanack now reproduced. These were the First-Fruits of the first Rhode Island Press.

The only copy of this Almanack now known to be in existence belongs to the Library of Congress, which bought it at the sale of George Brinley's collection in 1878. It then lacked the last leaf. A few weeks ago Mr. Alfred B. Page, of the Massachusetts Historical Society Library, identified a stray leaf which had been found at the Boston Public Library as the missing portion of this identical copy of the 1728 Rhode Island Almanack. The Officials at the Boston Library at once took the necessary steps, and the lost Member is now once more united to the Body from which it had been so long separated.

The Author of the Almanack signs himself "Poor Robin." There can be little doubt that this was in reality the pen-name of the Printer-Publisher, James Franklin, who possessed a goodly share of the Intellectual Originality and Literary Facility which marked the Genius of his younger Brother. The occasional scraps of Philosophy and the sententious Phrases which are crowded into the vacant spaces of the Calendar bespeak a common Parentage with the more familiar Sayings of "Poor Richard." It is not a hazardous Suggestion that both Robin and Richard acquired their habits of keen Observation of Men and Affairs from a common source, a hard-headed Father and a shrewd Mother given to speaking her Mind.

Tho' I have not given you my proper Name, yel affure you I have had one the greatest part of half an hundred Years; and I know of no Necessity for parting with it at this Time, since I presume my Almanack will answer all the Ends design'd without that Expence. So, wishing you a happy
