INTRODUCTION.

In preparing this, the Thirtieth Edition, of a Descriptive Catalogue of Roses, I am reminded of the lapse of time and the great progress made in Rose culture, for in the Gardener's Magazine for August, 1833, Mr. Loudon, the gardener's best friend, takes occasion to say of the first, or nearly the first edition of my Catalogue of Roses, "This we consider to be the most useful catalogue of Roses in the English language." He then goes on to say, "To convey an idea of the completeness of the collection, we may mention that there are 16 sorts of Rosa indica odorata," (the Tea-scented Rose): what a contrast this offers to catalogues of the present day, in which from 60 to 80 varieties of this class are named and described! In looking over a catalogue of the above date, printed on a single folio sheet, I find not even one variety of our favourite class, the Hybrid Perpetual, named.

My old friend says much more about my catalogue than I ought to quote here. I can only say, that now as then, I have endeavoured to make it a guide to the purchaser.

THE FOLLOWING HINTS AS TO THE CULTURE OF ROSES MAY BE FOUND USEFUL:-

For protecting the Bourbon, Chinese, Tea-scented, and other Roses, on their own roots, nothing can be better than moss procured from shady banks or woods. It should be placed round each plant, one or two inches from the stem and branches, not closer, about nine inches or a foot thick. This prevents the ground from being frozen; and although the tops of the shoots may be killed, they grow vigorously from the root on the return of mild weather. Saw dust is also an excellent protection. It should be placed in a small heap, about nine inches in depth, round the stems, and removed in April. This covering may be applied early in December, and remain around the plants till the end of March, or even later if a cold backward spring.

Hybrid Perpetual and Bourbon Roses bloom much more abundantly in Autumn if they are removed annually in November, particularly in poor soils unfavourable to Roses. They may be replanted nearly or quite in the same places, giving to each plant a shovelful of rotten manure, which should be mixed with the soil in filling in. This annual removal is absolutely necessary for Roses on the Manetti stock in poor light soils; for unless they are removed they cease to bloom freely in Autumn.

All the Roses to which P is affixed make long and vigorous shoots; they form a fine column when their branches are tied to a stout stake; one of iron, about 10 feet in length, $1\frac{1}{2}$ feet of which must be inserted into the soil, will be found most cligible. These are called "Pillar Roses."

Plants of the Climbing and of all the Autumnal Roses are kept in pots, so as to remove with safety at any season. April and May are the most favourable months for planting out the Bourbon, China, Tea-scented, and Noisette Roses.

ROSES FOR EXPORTATION.

Roses and Fruit Trees can be sent to the most distant colonies without hazard. The following is an extract from a letter received from New Zealand:—"The trees reached me on July 1st, and were immediately planted; of the forty-four Apple trees only three were dead; several of them have fruit blossoms, and will bear next year; they have put forth most vigorous shoots." Roses and trees for New Zealand and Australia should be shipped in December.

SUMMER ROSES.



THERE are a few Summer Roses still worthy of the attention of the amateur, and among them most of the Moss and Provence Roses are desirable, owing to their perfume and beauty; for no rose can surpass the Old Moss Rose when in bud, and the Old Provence or Cabbage Rose when half open. A few of the Hybrid China and Bourbon Roses are also desirable, owing to their robust growth and hardy nature, as they soon form standards of large size and great beauty, well adapted for extensive lawns.

REMARKS.

Moss Roses, as a rule, do not form good standards, their growth is too straggling. Standards are however still cultivated of some few of the more robust kinds. Nos. 1, 5, 6, 9, 11, and 15, are grown on their own roots for pegging down in beds devoted to the different groups.

REMARKS.

The above varieties form large grand-looking standards. Nos. 1, 5, 6, and 10, are the cream of this class, and very beautiful both in foliage and flowers. They should not be closely pruned, but the long shoots shortened one-third, and the small spray-like shoots cut out when the heads of the trees become crowded. They should, in fact, be allowed to make large spreading trees.

REMARKS.

In cold, humid, backward climates, these fine old roses may still be planted with advantage, for in such districts they will bloom in August and continue a long time in flower: they will, in fact, grow and bloom in climates entirely unfit for the Autumnal Roses.

Damask Roses, and the varieties of Rosa Alba, are now things of past and pleasant times to the aged rose amateur, who can recall the pleasure he derived when the Painted Damask rose and Madams Hardy were first introduced; and such roses among the "Albas," as Félicité, Queen of Denmark, and Sophie de Marcilly, where the pride of his heart—their tints were so delicate, their form so perfect. These tints and perfection in shape are now more than rivalled by such Hybrid Perpetuals as Madame Vidot, Madame Rivers, and several of that race, so that our old summer favourites must give place to others more beautiful and more lasting.

YELLOW ROSES.

The only Summer Yellow Rose worthy of cultivation at psesent is the *Persian Yellow*, which will grow freely in any soil if the air be pure and free from smoke. Standards are 1s. 6d. each; Dwarfs, on their own roots, 1s. each. Miss Beaufort, in "Syrian Shrines," says "we noticed, near Beyrout, a splendid double sweet-scented moss rose, of a fine deep lemon colour, which would make glad the heart of an English gardener;" this news is, I fear, too good to be true.

REMARKS.

To ensure a fine autumnal bloom of these roses, the soil should be deep and rich: if not so, they should be annually or biennially lifted, and replanted with some rich fresh compost to their roots. There are many other varieties of this group, but none are equal to Nos. 3 and 4, the former for beautiful flowers, the latter for its buds only, which in September are most fragrant and grateful.

HYBRID PERPETUAL ROSES. LIST 1.(2)

Owing to the extraordinary number of new roses of this family annually introduced, rose catalogues have become burdened with an array of names tedious to read, and irksome to those who wish to select a few really good roses. To obviate in some measure this difficulty, I have inserted in this list those Roses only, whether new or old, that are distinct, good, and above all, free and healthy in their growth; the flowers are all of full size, fine shape, and perfect in colour; in short, any variety selected from it, even at random, will prove good and well worthy of cultivation.

DWARF ROSES ON THE MANETTI STOCK.—Roses on this stock, as I have found from experience, only flourish well when the stock is completely covered. The soil in which they are to be planted should be stirred two feet in depth, and the roses planted so that the earth is one inch above the junction of the bud with the stock; (this is very perceptible;) they are not then liable to put forth suckers, and will grow finely in the stiffest clay and the lightest sand. They are, however, more particularly to be recommended for light sandy or gravelly soils, unfavourable to roses on the Dog Rose stock. The few suckers from this stock require close attention; they do not put them forth from the root, but from the stem below the graft or bud; they steal up in a most insidious manner, and are often so like the shoots from the graft as scarcely to be distinguished from them.

⁽²⁾ Young and healthy plants of some kinds in this list can be supplied on their own roots; they are smaller than budded plants, and not so well calculated for immediate effect, but for light soils or old highly manured gardens they are well adapted, as they soon form nice compact bushes.

REMARKS.

In the gardening periodicals of the past rose season, there is a great abundance of rose news, so that most of the really good roses are pretty well known; still, as I wish this catalogue to be a tolerably faithful guide, a few words about especial favourites may not be amiss.

Among the roses with bright colours, so beautiful and yet inclined to be so much alike, No. 1 is more than usually brilliant, and No. 7 the most perfect, the largest, and finest of all; Nos. 13, 20, 31, 32, 39, 56, 57, and 60, are all most brilliant and beautiful, varying to a certain extent with the weather, so that sometimes when it is hot and sunny, they all seem alike; Nos. 65, 67, 70, and 71, are four really magnificent roses; 67 is remarkable for its dark rich colour, and 65, 70, and 71, for their brilliant colours, they have bloomed here in great perfection; 75 is quite dazzling with its large scarlet petals, but, like the majority of very brilliant coloured roses, it is not in full beauty except in cool, cloudy weather. We must not pass over our older friends, Nos. 28 and 69, for, with the exception of No. 7, No. 69 is one of the most perfect and brilliant of roses, and No. 28, with its rich deep crimson, may be placed in the same category.



NEW SELECTED HYBRID PERPETUAL ROSES, LIST 2.

These are varieties selected from those sent out by the French florists in the autumn of 1862, and by the English florists in the spring of 1863, their qualities are not yet fully developed; among them are doubtless some good kinds, but probably none equal to the fine roses of the preceding season.

REMARKS.

The above list of new roses contains, as may be seen, a large majority of roses of brilliant colours. We owe most of these bright crimson and scarlet roses, to that beautiful rose General Jacqueminot, which in the warm summers of 1857, '58, and '59, produced bushels of fine well ripened hips. From this abundant crop of seed, the French florists raised thousands of seedlings, among them such magnificent roses as Senateur Vaise, Charles Lefebvre, and François Lacharme, in short nearly all our popular brilliant roses, and to the same fertile source of good roses, Messrs. Paul and Mr. William Paul owe their new bright coloured roses, Lord Clyde, Lord Macaulay, Lord Herbert, and some others, all bright and beautiful; but at present no crimson rose, whether English or foreign, equals Charles Lefebvre.

This summer has been particularly favourable to the seed bearing roses, and not only Général Jacqueminot, but his numerous progeny, such as Senateur Vaise and others, promise to bear a most abundant crop of seed, so that we are likely to have a countless number of new bright coloured roses; it is only to be regretted that, although most beautiful, there is but little distinction in character, so that even an experienced eye is not able to know one from the other.

The present season promises to be fertile in new crimson roses, for already a Lyons Rose Grower announces Abbé Reynaud, Amiral La Psyrouse, Eugène Verdier, Marechal Souchet, and Paul de la Meilleray, all hybrid perpetuals, all crimson roses, and, I may add, all at twenty francs each. A Paris grower also announces Claude Million, George Paul, George Prince, H. Laurentius, John Nesmith (he perhaps means Nasmyth), Joseph Fiala, and Madame Victor Verdier, all hybrid perpetuals, all crimson roses of different shades, and all twenty-five francs each. Surely it is time to endeavour to put a stop to this silly creation of names of seedling roses without distinctive characters; by English florists refusing to buy all the new varieties offered annually by the French florists.

REMARKS.

The roses in this list are more remarkable for the brilliancy and singularity of their colours than for size, fullness of petals, or perfection in the shape of their flowers. They are, in fact, not quite perfect enough—in the sense of the word as used by florists-for List 1, and yet wondrously beautiful when "viewed aright," i. e., on "a rose tree in full bearing." They may be called picturesque roses, and should form a separate group in the rose garden. Those adapted for pillars should be freely dispersed over the pleasure grounds. No. 3 is an improved version of our old friend Gloire des Rosomenes, and is remarkable for the beauty of its foliage and flowers. 8 is of a colour not to be described, so rich are its shades of dark velvet maroon and crimson: to have this gem in perfection it should be made to form a pyramid, by placing five or seven buds in a stem of some vigorous sort, like Madame Pisaroni, worked on the Manetti Stock. 9 is another of these brilliant roses, the colour of which is difficult to describe; the word glowing is appropriate, for when the sun shines on a bloom just open, it glows so as to dazzle the eyes: if it had not pointed petals, and had the form and fullness of our Comtesse Cecile, it would be perfect. 11 is probably a seedling from that old beautiful semi-double rose, Standard of Marengo: this is also a glowing rose, its petals are like brilliant shells. 12 and 18 are roses to view at a distance, their growth is most vigorous, so that they will form large pillars, to be planted at the extremities of large lawns; in rose culture much is yet to be done; and fine columns, some ten feet in height of these roses, would have a grand effect. 16 and 19 are two most brilliant roses. I have not seen any rose with the peculiar vivid colour of the latter, reminding one of that of the Tom Thumb Geranium.

In this list are many roses, which, with some amateurs, may be popular; but for the most part they are surpassed by the varieties enumerated in List 1, which I have endeavoured to make perfect, so as to enable the purchaser to select fine varieties without the necessity of wading through a host of names. All the varieties in this List are charged at a uniform rate, 1s. 6d. each, for standards; 1s. each, for dwarfs and dwarf standards.

REMARKS.

Some twenty years since how we rose lovers welcomed new Bourbon Roses! they were then so fresh, so free in giving abundance of flowers all the autumn; the history of the original Bourbon Rose being also so interesting. It was some years before much variation in colour took place, and some of us can remember when Madame Desprez was the gem of the family. At last Monsieur Desprez "gained" the first crimson Bourbon Roses; among them the Crimson Globe and Splendens, since then we have had perhaps more than enough of crimson roses of this family burthening our catalogues with names. All the dark coloured Bourbon Roses are now totally eclipsed by the Hybrid Perpetuals, but there are a few of lighter colours very desirable. No. 1, is one that has never been equalled in its unique colour; 7, 16, and 19, are indeed models of shape and beauty; 17 is still, like 1, quite unapproached in colour, as is 23; and then 28, a grand magnificent rose is one to dream about, for singularly enough its raiser has never since given us a rose approaching to it in beauty. Bourbon Roses are quite hardy and bloom more freely in autumn than any other autumnal roses, even on the hills of Yorkshire. All those not described as to their habit are stout and robust growers, and form fine bushes or standards.

REMARKS.

These beautiful Roses and the Hybrid Perpetuals will ultimately be the roses of the amateur. Tea Scented Roses will not, however, do for general culture in the open air, but in orchard houses and rose houses; for why should not the wealthy lover of a garden have his rose house? A simple span-roofed house, 14 feet wide, with a fixed roof and side ventilation, a path down the centre, and each side-border planted with half or low standard Tea Scented Roses, would form a Rose Paradise in April, May, and June, and again in September and October.

Among these fine Roses there are some old varieties which seem to defy all competition, such are 2, 7, 9, 11, 30, and 39. The comparatively new rose 15, has been badly named, it is not a ball but a plate. 10, like 11, is remarkable for its extreme vigour of growth, making shoots in one season from 8 to 10 and 12 feet in length. Both are well adapted for pillar roses in warm climates; in cold situations such pillars might be protected by binding fern or branches of evergreens round them. The new varieties 6 and 40, are fine and well worthy of cultivation. 16, judged by its blooming here in pots under glass, is like but inferior to 9. The red Tea Rose 28 is like all of this race that incline to the dark colours of some of the China Roses—deficient in size and shape, it is however remarkably fragrant.

A temperate climate and warm and dry soil are essential for the out-door culture of these very beautiful and fragrant roses. In the extreme south-west and west of England they may be planted in beds, but in the midland counties and in the north, the greenhouse, or a southern aspect against a wall, are eligible situations for them. Planted in the borders of the Orchard House they succeed admirably; or what would be a preferable mode of culture, Standards should be potted into 13-inch pots, and placed among the fruit trees, they would bloom beautifully in May, after the fruit trees, and while the leaves and fruit of the trees are young, and not so interesting as at a later period of the summer.

REMARKS.

All the fine Yellow Roses of this group require being trained to a south wall; if grown as Standards, they should be lifted and placed in a warm shed during the winter, or what would be a better position, potted and placed in the orchard house till winter and spring frosts are over, and then be planted in their summer quarters.

No. 5, the most beautiful and magnificent Yellow Rose ever beheld is but rarely seen in full beauty, as it does not bloom freely. When planted against a wall its shoots should not be shortened but nailed in to their full length. Under glass, when planted in a rich border, it grows most luxuriantly, but seldom or never blooms. I beg to recommend its culture in orchard houses as a standard; its stem should not exceed 3 or $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet. A good standard of this height potted into a 13 inch pot would in a year or two form a fine blooming tree. Nos. 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 11, 13, 15, 16, and 17, are all more or less tender, and require shelter in winter, so that they should be planted against walls with a warm aspect or be placed under glass.
