





ROLLS OF CERTAIN INDIAN TRIBES IN OREGON AND WASHINGTON.

LETTER

FROM

THE SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR,

TRANSMITTING,

WITH A COPY OF A COMMUNICATION FROM THE ACTING COMMISSIONER OF INDIAN AFFAIRS, THE ROLLS OF CERTAIN INDIAN TRIBES IN OREGON AND WASHINGTON FOR USE IN REFERENCE TO A CERTAIN AGREEMENT OF AUGUST, 1851.

DECEMBER 6, 1906.—Referred to the Committee on Indian Affairs and ordered to be printed.

Department of the Interior, Washington, December 5, 1906.

SIR: I have the honor to state that in the Indian appropriation act for the fiscal year 1906 (33 Stat. L., 1073) the following legislation appears:

That the Secretary of the Interior be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to investigate the number of Clatsop Indians of Oregon and Washington, Tillamook Indians of Oregon, Lower band of Chinook Indians of Washington, and Kathlamet band of Chinook Indians of the State of Oregon, or their heirs, who can be identified as belonging to said tribes at the time of executing certain agreements dated August fifth, August seventh, and August ninth, in the year eighteen hundred and fifty-one, and report his findings to Congress at its next session.

In compliance with this law, Supervisor Charles E. McChesney was, on December 8, 1905, directed to proceed to the reservations in Oregon and Washington upon which some of the said Indians resided and elsewhere, as might be necessary, to make the investigation, and I have the honor to inclose herewith copy of a letter from the Acting Commissioner of Indian Affairs, dated the 1st instant, transmitting the supervisor's report, dated the 15th of November, 1906, submitting rolls of the Lower Chinook, Kathlamet, Tillamook, and Clatsep Indians, together with the evidence taken in support of the same.

Sir: Referring to Department letter of April 12, 1905, relative to the provision contained in the Indian appropriation act for the fiscal year 1906 (33 Stat. L., 1073), authorizing and directing the Secretary of the Interior to investigate the number of Clatsop, Kathlamet, Tillamook, and Lower Chinook Indians in Oregon and Washington, etc., and to Department letter of April 19, 1905, directing this Office to carry the same into effect, I have the honor to report that Supervisor Charles E. McChesney was, under date of December 8, 1905, directed to proceed to the reservations in Oregon and Washington upon which some of the said Indians resided, and elsewhere as might be necessary, in order to make the investigation and gather the data required.

The supervisor was instructed to confer freely with the Indian agents and superintendents in charge of reservations in order to locate all the Indians or their heirs, many of whom are scattered throughout the States of Oregon and Washington and do not belong to any agency. He was also directed to make the investigation as complete as possible, take testimony, examine the agency records and, in fact, exhaust every available source of information in his efforts to get at the facts with respect to those Indians and their heirs.

The Office is now in receipt of the supervisor's report under date of the 15th ultimo, submitting therewith rolls of the Lower Chinook, Kathlamet, Tillamook, and Clatsop Indians, together with evidence taken in support of the same, all of which is respectfully inclosed herewith for transmission to Congress in accordance with the provision of the act referred to.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR, UNITED STATES INDIAN SERVICE, Pawhuska, Okla., November 15, 1906.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith separate rolls of the Lower Chinook, Kathlamet, Clatsop, and Tillamook Indians who made treaties with the United States in August, 1851, now living, and the heirs of those who have died since 1851, four rolls.

Also the original copy of the testimony, being statements numbered from 1 to 115 inclusive, on which the rolls are based, and a typewritten copy of the same. Also names with post-office addresses of all the parties enrolled.

I also return herewith the copy of Senate Document No. 340, Fifty-seventh Congress, first session, and copies of Senate Executive Document (confidential) Nos. 39 to 58 inclusive, Thirty-second Congress, first session, being articles of agreement entered into with several Indian tribes.

The statements of the claimants contain all that could be ascertained in the various cases and in many instances the statements of claimants are confirmed

by the testimony of others.

My conclusions are that, unless otherwise stated in my notes attached to the individual statements, the testimony is reliable and should be accepted. Such notes are intended also as my report on the individual cases.

I have enrolled a number of heirs without being able to see the parties, but in all such cases I am satisfied from the testimony of others that such enrollment should be made and is correct. It may be that some heirs have been omitted, but I have used every endeavor and exhausted every possible source of information in my efforts to ascertain all the heirs. The claims of all whose names were given me at various places were carefully investigated, but evidence was taken only where it was necessary—in several such cases the parties concerned, when seen, told me frankly that I had been misinformed as to their Indian blood, and that they were not heirs of any of the tribes I was at work on. In such cases it was not considered necessary to take their testimony. Some of the statements taken (particularly of the younger heirs) are not as full and complete as could be desired, but it was the best they could do, and it is not to be wondered at, after the lapse of so many years, that they should not be able to give a clear account of their ancestry back to 1851, when one considers the class of people. In such cases I endeavored to supplement their testimony by that of others who had knowledge of the case. I was fortunate in finding two old people at Bay Center, Wash, who remember the Lower Chinook and some of the other tribes before 1851, and who still retain in their old age much of their mental vigor, and I found them of great assistance.

I also transmit herewith the evidence taken in six other cases, with my conclusions thereon, that the evidence presented and other reasons given in the notes do not justify the enrollment of the claimants, viz: Elizabeth Menard, Edward Teabo, Henry Wallace, Elizabeth Blacketer, Larose Quenal, and Mary

Klamath, and I have not enrolled them.

In the case of Mrs. Sophia Morris (see statement No. 31), who is a Lower Chinook claimant, I have to state that her Indian blood comes from the maternal side, and that her mother is living, and that consequently Mrs. Sophia Morris is not an heir.

In regard to the claim of Mrs. Nancy Garvais (see statement No. 38), who claims with the Clatsop Indians on her maternal side, I would respectfully invite attention to the pay roll of the Naalem band of Tillamook Indians, made in July, 1898, by Agent T. J. Euford. No. 2, in red ink, wherein Nancy Gervais appears as the daughter of Tulasaske, and receives pay on account of her said mother with the Naalem band of Tillamook Indians.

I also call attention to the statement of Mrs. Clara Oskalowis Pearson (Statement No. 39), who claims with the Tillamook Indians on account of her mother, who is alive. She has not, therefore, been enrolled with the Tilla-

mook Indians.

I also call attention to the claim of Mrs. Louisa Wyaleta (Statement No. 40), who claims with the Tillamook Indians on her maternal side. On pay roll of the Naalem Indians, before referred to, made by Agent Buford, Louisa Wyaleta appears as the daughter of No. 30, in red ink, being Teeachecano, wife of Wyaleta.

I also call attention to the case of Joseph Duncan and his sister Mary Duncan Angelo (see Statement No. 91), who claim with the Clatsop Indians on their maternal side. On pay roll of Naalem band of Tillamook Indians, before referred to, made by Agent Buford, Joseph Dunkle, or Duncan, No. 33, in black ink, appears as the son of Clequost, wife of Clecleste, or Dunkle, died 1880; consequently neither Joseph Duncan nor his sister have been en

rolled with the Clatsops.

I am indebted to Mr. Harrison Allen, of Astoria, Oreg., attorney for the Lower Chinook and Clatsop Indians, for much valuable assistance and courtesy shown me. Mr. Allen has done much work for these Indians before the Court of Claims and elsewhere, for which he has as yet received no compensation, and he asks that in case an appropriation is made to carry out the unratified treaties with these Indians, that some arrangement be made whereby he will receive proper compensation for his work.

My mother left surviving her as sole heirs myself and my brother, Alex. Pellard, about 37 years old, and he lives at Altoona, Wash., and my half brother, named Henry Pierce, of whom I have not heard for six or seven years, and whose whereabouts I do not know and do not know whether he is alive or dead.

My father's name was Klaloo, who was a Kathlamet Indian who died many years ago. I am a niece and one of the surviving heirs of Klowsum (deceased), who was a Kathlamet Indian chief, the other heirs being Samuel Mallet, of Bay Center, Wash., and a grandson named Jason Millet, of Bay Center, Wash.,

and who is the son and heir of James Millet, deceased, of Bay Center, Wash., and who was a brother of Klowsum, deceased. I am a half-sister of Kalup, deceased, who was a Kathlamet Indian, who had no children at the time of his death, and myself and half-brother, Samuel Mallet, of Bay Center, Wash., and Jason Millet, son of James Millet, deceased, his half-brother, are his sole surviving heirs.

STATE OF WASHINGTON, Pacific County, 88:

Samuel Mallet, of Bay Center, being duly sworn, deposes and says he is 76 years of age and born at Bay Center, and belongs to the Waukikum tribe of

Chinook Indians.

I knew Cumcumley, a Lower Chinook Indian and one of the signers of the 1851 treaty. He died nearly forty-two years ago. Cumcumley had 5 children, 4 of whom died before Cumcumley did. One daughter survived him, whose name I do not now remember and who died about two or three years after Cumcumley died, and without issue, aged about 15 years. Cumcumley lived at the mouth of the Columbia River, near where Fort Columbia now stands, on

the Washington side of the river.

I knew Kulchute, a Lower Chinook Indian and one of the signers of the 1851 treaty. He died of smallpox before Cumcumley's death. Kulchute had two wives and three children; both wives and two of the children died before Kulchute died. The daughter who survived Kulchute was named Tah-shuck, who is now dead, leaving as sole issue and heirs one son and one daughter, viz, Edward Smith, who now lives on the Chehalis Reserve, Oakville, Wash., and his sister, Maggie Smith, now Mrs. Joseph Pete, who lives same place. I knew Ahmoosamoose, a Lower Chinook Indian and one of the signers of the 1851 treaty, who is now deceased, leaving as sole heirs two sons and a daughter, as follows: Jack Ahmoosamoose, who is dead, unmarried and without issue; Joseph Ahmoosamoose, who has since died, leaving a daughter named Kate, who is now alive and married to a man named John Walkowsky, and lives near Oysterville, Wash. The daughter of Ahmoosamoose was named Looks, and she is dead, leaving as issue two sons named Joe and Frank Hyasman, both of whom live at Granville, Chehalis County, Wash.

I knew Quewish, a Lower Chinook Indian, and one of the signers of the 1851

I knew Quewish, a Lower Chinook Indian, and one of the signers of the 1851 treaty. He is dead, and did not leave any children surviving him, but left grandchildren. One grandchild, whose name I do not now remember, married and left surviving her a daughter named Sallie, who is now dead. She was married and left surviving her a son named Matthew John, who now lives at Georgetown, Wash., and a daughter named Caroline, who is now Mrs. George Charley, and lives at Georgetown, Pacific County, Wash. Another grandchild of Quewish is named Joseph Narcotta, whose whereabouts I do not now know. He went to Victoria, British Columbia, several years ago, and I do not know whether he ever married or is now alive. Another grandson named Jones is dead, leaving surviving him as issue and sole heir a son named Paul Jones, who is now living at Bay Center, Wash. I knew Selahwish, a Lower Chinook Indian, and one of the signers of the 1851 treaty, who is dead. He had children, but they are all dead and without issue or heirs. All the children died

in youth.

I knew Wahkuck, a Lower Chinook Indian, and one of the signers of the 1851 treaty, who died about thirty years ago without issue, but he left surviving him as sole heir a sister, whose name I can not now remember, who is also dead, leaving as sole issue and heir a son named James Julius, aged about 55 years, who now lives at Oakville, Chehalis County, Wash. I knew Chakinpon, a Lower Chinook Indian, one of the signers of the 1851 treaty. He is dead. He had children, who are also dead, and I know of no issue or heirs. I knew Huckswelt, a Lower Chinook Indian, one of the signers of the 1851 treaty. He is deceased, and left as sole heirs his wife, now named Catherine George, aged

about 60 years, living at Bay Center, Wash., and one daughter and two sons. The daughter's name is Josephine Hawk, now Married to Fred. Pope, at Granville, Chehalis County, Wash. One son is named Adam Hawk, and lives at Granville, Chehalis County, Wash., and the other son is named John Hawk,

and lives at Bay Center, Wash.

I did not know Kahluckmuck. I knew Schoo, a Lower Chinook Indian, one of the signers of the 1851 treaty. He is dead, without issue and without heirs, as far as I know. I knew Tychawin, a Lower Chinook Indian, and one of the assigners to the 1851 treaty. He is dead. He had children, but they are all dead. leaving no issue or heirs—all died of smallpox. I knew Narcotta, a Lower Chinook Indian, signer to the 1851 treaty. He was a grandson of Quewish, deceased. [See Quewish, above.] I knew Yahmants, a Lower Chinook Indian, and one of the signers of the 1851 treaty. He died fourteen or fifteen years ago. His wife and children are all dead, leaving no issue. The wife and all the children died before Yahmants did. Yahmants had a sister named Kahmuck, who was alive in 1851 and left surviving her at her death a daughter named Julia Lussier, who is now deceased, leaving as issue and heirs Alex. Lussier, of Bay Center, Wash.; Sterling Price, of Portland, Oreg.; Mrs. George Pryor, of Nema, Wash., and other children whose names I do not now remember.

I knew Kaase, who is dead. He was a Lower Chinook Indian and one of the signers to the 1851 treaty. He left no issue or heirs, to my knowledge. I knew Wahqueon, a Lower Chinook Indian and one of the signers to the 1851 treaty. He is dead and his wife is dead, and there is no issue. He had a sister who survived him, named Willegas, who is now dead, leaving as sole heir a son named Samuel Jackson, who now lives at Bay Center, Wash., about 21 years of age. I knew Seekumtyee, who is dead. He was a Lower Chinook Indian, one of the signers to the 1851 treaty. His wife is also dead and they left no issue. Seekumtyee had a sister, who is dead and left as issue and sole heir a son named John Cliff, who now lives at Humptulips, Chehalis County, Wash., and who is the only heir I know of Seekumtyee. I knew Kadock, a Lower Chinook Indian, and one of the signers to the 1851 agreement. He had children, but they all died before he did, and he has no issue or heirs now alive to my

knowledge.

I knew Yahwisk, who is dead. He signed the Lower Chinook treaty of 1851. His wife and children are all dead, but one of his sons, named Tyee John, who is dead, left two children, named John and Sampson. John John lives at Georgetown, Wash., and is about 40 years old. Sampson John lives at Oyhut, Chehalis County, Wash., and is over 40 years of age. I knew Elaspah, who is dead. He was a Lower Chinook Indian. He died unmarried and without issue. He had brothers, but they died without issue. He had no sisters, and there are no heirs to my knowledge. I knew Chacolitch, who is dead, and he left no issue or heirs. He was a Lower Chinook Indian. I knew Jack Wonio, a Lower Chinook Indian, who was alive when the treaty was made in 1851. He was a relative of Yahmants, deceased; and Jack Wonio died about ten years ago, leaving as issue and sole heir one son, named Henry Jack or Jáckson, who is about 30 years old and lives at Bay Center, Wash. I know Herbert Petit, of Ilwaco. He is a Lower Chinook Indian. His mother is a Lower Chinook, and his father was a white man. Herbert was alive when the 1851 treaty was made.

mother is a Lower Chinook, and his father was a white man. Herbert was alive when the 1851 treaty was made.

I know Julia Russel, who lives in Ilwaco, Wash. She is a Lower Chinook woman. I do not remember her mother's name. Julia was alive in 1851. Her mother was a daughter of a niece of Yosick. Julia Russel had a sister named Mary Ann Bouten, who lived at or near Ilwaco, and has other relatives alive there, I think. Catharine McCarthy, living at Ilwaco, Wash., is a descendant of the Clatsop Indians. Catharine was married to a man named Brown, who is dead, and Catharine's mother was related to Chenob's sister.

I knew Totillicum, who was a chief of the Kathlamet band, alive and one of the signers of the 1851 treaty. He died about thirty-five years ago. He had a number of children, but they died without issue. Totillicum had four brothers and two sisters, all of whom died before Totillicum did, except Klowsum, who has since died, leaving as sole heirs the following: Samuel Mallet, male son, living at Bay Center, Wash.; Elizabeth Klowsum Springer, daughter, living at Bay Center, Wash. James Mallet, deceased, son of Klowsum, deceased, who died about twenty years ago, leaving a son named Jason Millet, who lives at Tokeland, Wash. I did not know John, one of the Kathlamet treaty signers. I knew Kaisht, a Kathlamet Indian chief, who was alive in 1851. He is dead, without issue or heirs. I knew Sahoho, a Kathlamet Indian, who was alive

in 1851, but who has since died. He had children, but they are all dead, with-

out issue or heirs, to my knowledge,

I knew Moses, who was alive in 1851, but has since died. He was a Kathlamet Indian. He left no issue or heirs. I knew Kalup, who was Klowsum's son and my half brother, same father but different mother. He is dead, without issue, and the only relatives of his now alive are Samuel Mallet, half brother, Bay Center, Wash.; Elizabeth Klowsum Springer, half sister, Bay Center, Wash.; James Mallet, deceased, half brother, and who left as sole issue and heir a son, Jason Millet, Tokeland, Wash. I knew Wakotsuck, who is dead. He left no children or heirs. He was a Kathlamet Indian and one of the 1851 treaty signers. I knew Twilts, also Scotchlechie, who were both chiefs of the Clatsop Indians; both are dead, without issue or heirs, to my knowledge.

I had a brother named Jonas John, who died three years ago, aged 39 years, and left surviving him as issue and sole heirs three children, named Oscar John, about 7 years old, who lives with me; also Harriet John, 9 years old, who lives on Quinealt Reserve, and Alice John, aged 10 years, who also lives on Quinealt Reserve. Wash.

serve, and Alice John, aged 10 years, who also lives on Quinealt Reserve, Wash. I had another brother, named Toney John, who died about two years ago, aged 58 years, and who was alive in 1851, when the treaty was made. He left surviving him his widow and two children as sole issue and heirs, viz, Mrs. Toney John, who lives at Oyhut, and has the two children, Loi John, aged about 14 years, and Wilson John, aged about 10 years, living with her. I had a sister, named Nellie John, who died about sixteen years ago. She was married and left surviving her three children as sole issue and heirs, named Lena, Lizzie, and Sallie Pete. Lena is about 30 years old and married to Howard Cultee, of Bay Center, Wash. Lizzie is about 22 years old and

married to Hays, at Tokeland, Wash. Sallie is about 28 years old and married to Edward George, at Bay Center, Wash. There are no other heirs of Tyee John now alive.

Their names are Sallie (Pete) George, married and living at Bay Center, Wash., aged about 36 years, and Lizzie (Pete) Hays, married and living at Tokeland, Wash., aged about 25 years. We are all great-grandchildren of Chief Yosick, of the Lower Chinook Indians.

My father was named Heside, or Pete, and he was a Lower Chinook Indian, who died six years ago, aged about 43 years; and he was a son of Wetoolisk, a Lower Chinook Indian, who died many years ago, but was alive in 1851, when

the treaty of that year was made.

My maiden name was Catharine Was-se-quah. I have been married twice; first time to Tom Hawks, or Huckswelt, a Lower Chinook Indian chief, who was alive in 1851 and one of the signers of the treaty of that year. He died about twenty years ago, aged about 60 years, and left surviving him, myself, Catherine George, his widow, and our children, as follows: John Hawks, son, 50 years old, Bay Center, Wash.; Adam Hawks, son, 45 years old, Granville, Wash.; Josephine Hawks Pope, daughter, 33 years old, Granville, Wash., who are his sole heirs. I am now married to an Indian named Wynooche George.

I have no brothers or sisters. I have a half-sister, named Catherine Dawson, living at Bay Center, Wash. I knew Cumcumley, who died many years ago, and he was a chief of the Lower band of Chinooks. He had five children, all of whom are dead, and there are no issue or heirs of his now living. I knew Kulchute also, who died before Cumcumley died. There were two Kulchutes, both Lower Chinook Indians, and they were cousins. The elder Kulchute died without any issue or heirs surviving him. The younger Kulchute, who was also alive in 1851, left surviving him one daughter named Tahshuck, who is also dead, leaving as sole heirs one son and one daughter, viz, Edward Smith and Maggie Smith Pete, both of whom reside on the Chehalis Reservation, Oakville, Wash.

I knew Ahmoosamoose, a chief of the Lower band of Chinook Indians, alive in 1851, but who is now deceased. He left three children surviving him and who are his sole heirs, viz, Joseph Ahmoosamoose, son, who is dead and left surviving him a daughter named Kate, now Mrs. Kate Walkowsky, and she lives near Oysterville, Wash. Another son was named Jack, who is dead without issue. Ahmoosamoose also left a daughter named Looks, who is also dead, leaving as issue two sons, named Joe and Frank Hyasman, both of whom are now living at Granville, Chehalis County, Wash. I knew Quewish also, who is dead. He was a Lower Chinook Indian, alive in 1851. No children

survived him, but at the time of his death he had grandchildren, as follows: Wahpoaya, who is now dead, leaving as sole heirs Caroline, a daughter now living at Georgetown, Wash., and married to George Charley, and Matthew John, son, now living at same place. Narcotta, who is also dead, leaving as issue and sole heir Joseph Narcotta, whose whereabouts I do not now know. Jones, who is dead, leaving a son named Paul Jones, living at Bay Center, Wash., as

sole heir. I know of no other heirs of Quewish.

I knew Selahwish, who is dead. He had two children, but they never married. Selahwish had a sister named Cahlast, who is dead also, leaving a daughter named Ellen, who is dead also, leaving two children as sole issue and heirs, viz, Archie Pallard, who lives at Altoona, Wash, and Adelaine, now Mrs. James, living at Bay Center, Wash. I knew Wahkuck, a Lower Chinook signer of the 1851 treaty. He died without issue. He had two sisters who survived him as sole heirs. One of the sisters died without issue and the other left as sole issue and heir a son named James Julius, now living at Oakville, Chehalis County, Wash. I do not remember the name of James Julius's mother. I knew Chakinpon, who is dead. He had children who are also dead, and I know of no issue or heirs now alive. I do not remember Kahluckmuck. I knew Schoo, a Lower Chinook chief who signed the 1851 treaty. He is dead and all his children are dead, and there are no heirs.

I knew Tychawin, who is dead. He had children, but they are all dead and without issue. All died of smallpox. I knew Narcotta, who was a grandson of Quewish, deceased. [See Quewish, above.] Yahmauts died about fourteen years ago. He had a wife and children who died before he did and without issue. He had a sister named Kahmuck, who was alive in 1851 and left surviving her as sole heirs a daughter named Julia Lussier, one named Mary Pettie, and Isabel Betrand, all of whom are, or were recently, alive. Julia Lussier I am told died a few years since and she left as issue and heirs several children, as follows: Alex. Lussier, who lives at Bay Center, Wash.; Mary Ann Lussier, now married to Louie Duchene and lives as Skamokawa, Wakiakum County, Wash.; also Mary Lussier, who lives somewhere in Oregon; also Lulu Price, who is married to George Pryor and lives at Nema, Wash., and Sterling Price, who lives at Portland, Oreg. There are no other heirs of Yahmauts now alive.

I knew Kaase, who is deceased. He left no issue, and his wife died before he did and there are no heirs to my knowledge. I knew Wahqueon, a Lower Chinook chief also, and he is dead. His wife is dead, and there was no issue. A sister survived him, named Willegas, who is dead, leaving as heir a son named Samuel Jackson, who lives at Bay Center, Wash., aged about 21 years. I knew Seekumtyee, who is dead. He was also a Lower Chinook Indian and one of the signers of the 1851 treaty. His wife is dead and all his children are dead and there was only a sister who survived him and who was his sole heir, and her name was Ahkiack, who is now dead. She had a son named John Cliff, who lives at Humptulips, Wash., about 40 years of age, and who is the sole surviving heir of Ahkiack and Seekumtyee. I knew Kadock, who is dead. All his children died before he did, and there are no heirs living.

I knew Yahwisk, and he is dead and his wife is dead. He left surviving him as sole heir his son, Tyee John, who is also dead and who left surviving him as sole heirs his sons, Johnny John and Sampson John. Johnny lives at Georgetown, Wash., and Sampson lives at Oyhut, Wash. There are no other heirs of Yahwisk, deceased. I knew Elaspah, who is dead. He died unmarried and without issue. He had brothers, but they died without issue. He had no sisters, and there is no heir. I knew Chacolitch, who is dead. He was never

married and left no issue, and there are no heirs.

Note.—All the foregoing were signers to the Lower Chinook treaty of 1851. I knew Elaspah's father, who was a Lower Chinook Indian and was alive in 1851 when the treaty was signed. His name was See yak que kak, who left

1851 when the treaty was signed. His name was See yak que kak, who left surviving him besides Elaspah, his son, a brother named Whah sa quah, who is dead, leaving a daughter (being myself), Catherine George, and another daughter (my half-sister), Catherine Dawson, now living at Bay Center, Wash.,

as his sole heirs.

I knew Mooyahuts, who was a Lower Chinook woman, alive in 1851 when the treaty was made, who is now dead and left as her sole heir her son, Jack Pisk, who died about twenty years ago, leaving as issue and sole heir one son named Henry Pisk, who is about 30 years of age and lives at Bay Center, Wash. There is no other heir alive of Mooyahuts, deceased. I knew Totillicum, who was a chief of the Kalhtamets, who is dead. He had a number of children, but they are all dead. He had a brother named Klowsum, who sur-

vived him and was his only heir. Klowsum is also dead, and his heirs are Samuel Mallet, Elizabeth (Klowsum) Springer, and Jason Mallet, grandson, all of whom live at Bay Center, Wash. There are no other heirs of Totillicum, deceased. I did not know John. I knew Kaisht, who is dead. He was not married and died without issue—no heirs. I knew Lahoho, who is dead, and he has no issue or heirs now alive. I knew Moses, who is dead, and he has no issue or heirs now alive.

I knew Kalup, who was Klowsum's son. He is dead and had no children, and the only persons surviving him as relatives are his half-brother, Samuel Mallet, and half-sister, Elizabeth (Klowsum) Springer, and Jason Millet, son of his half-brother, James Mallet, deceased, all of whom live at Bay Center, Wash. I

knew Wakotsuck, who is dead and left no children or heirs—all are dead.

Clatsops.—I knew Tostow, who is dead, a Clatsop Indian chief, who was alive in 1851. He left surviving him as issue and sole heirs a son and a daughter. The daughter's name is Kate Tostow, who is now alive and lives at Skipanon, Oreg. I think she is married. The son is dead. His name was Baker and he died without issue, and Kate is the sole surviving heir of her father, Tostow, deceased.

I knew Colata, who is dead. He had seven children (five are dead, having died unmarried and without issue). Two daughters are now alive, one named Grace Swawa, living at Tillamook, Oreg., and the other named Filly Cotata, unmarried, and lives at Garibaldi, Tillamook County, Oreg., aged about 40 years. Filly is the older sister. I knew Twilts, a Clatsop chief, who is dead, and there is no issue or heir to my knowledge. I do not remember Tickahah. I knew Washington, who is dead, and his wife is dead. A son, named Joseph Lane, survived him as issue and sole heir. Joseph is dead, leaving as sole heirs his wife, Jennie, now Jennie Williams, living at Bay Center, Wash., and son, James Lane, of Tokeland, Wash., aged about 21 years, and also a daughter named Louisa Lane, who is dead, and left surviving her a daughter named Nina Bobb, married and living at Tokeland, Wash., also. I knew Skotchlechie, a Clatsop chief, who is dead, and his wife and children are all dead—no issue and no heirs alive.

I knew Dunkle, who is dead. He left two children, Joseph and Mary Dunkle, who live at Nehalem, Oreg. I knew Winawox, a Clatsop, who is dead, and his children are all dead—no issue or heirs alive. I do not remember Hulleh. I knew Waucakie, a Clatsop, who is dead. He had one daughter, who died without issue, and there are no heirs now alive. Bob Silackie is a Clatsop Indian, alive, at Georgetown, Wash., whose father and mother were both Clatsops, who died about fifty years ago, but were alive when the 1851 treaty was made. The father's name was Queanequah. I do not now recall the mother's name.

I know Joseph and Howard Cultee, of Bay Center, who are Clatsops. They are sons of Kularsen, who was alive when the 1851 treaty was made, and he was a Clatsop Indian. I do not know any of the Tillamook Indians. I knew Wahmaskie, who was a Lower Chinook woman, who died about thirty-five years ago, aged about 55 years. She left as issue a son named Dixie James, now living at Bay Center, Wash., and also her husband, James Huckquist,

now living at Bay Center, Wash., aged about 80 years.

father's, Jack Cotata's, mother is alive now at Garibaldi, Oreg.; also two sisters of his are living there. I am the sole surviving heir of my father, Jack Cotata.

Frank Sweeney, who now lives at Ilwaco and is about 46 years old; also Walter Sweeney, who lives at Ilwaco, but who is now absent at South Bend, Wash., aged about 27 years; also Lucy Langland (maiden name Lucy Sweeney), who lives at Chinook, Wash., aged about 25 years; also Wilbert Sweeney, who lives at Ilwaco, but is now absent and is about 22 years old. My other sister was named Mary Ann Pickernell, and she was married twice, first to V. W. Bouten, from whom she was separated, and her second husband is N. Nienberg, who is now alive. By her first husband she has two children, who survive her and are her sole heirs, named Vasco Bouten and Eugene Bouten, whose address is Ilwaco. She had no children by Mr. Nienberg. the whereabouts of any of them or whether alive now or not. Mary Driscoll was my mother's daughter by another husband, and she was not my father's (Tostow's) child.

Their names are: Agnes (Smith) Day, married, and 34 years of age, and she lives at Seaside, Oreg.; Laconia (Smith) Oman, married, and 29 years of age, and she lives near Warrenton, Oreg.; May (Smith) Wallingford, married, and 24 years of age, and she lives in Warrenton, Oreg. of age, unmarried and without issue.

I had three sisters, all of whom are now dead, named Josephine Smith, who was married to Frederick Ketchum, who is also dead. They had as issue eight children, two of whom are dead, unmarried, and without issue. The names of the six who are alive are Mary (Ketchum) Ford, aged 54 years, who lives in San Francisco, Cal; Frances Ketchum, married to a man named Castow, who also lives in San Francisco, Cal., and is aged 52 years; Clarence Ketchum, who is about 50 years of age, and lives part of the time in San Francisco, Cal.; Isabel Ketchum, who is married, but I do not know her husband's name, who lives in Arroyo Grande, Cal., who is about 47 years old; Louisa (Ketchum) Shedd, married to Fred Shedd, and who lives in San Francisco, Cal., aged about 45 years; Melsina Ketchum, who is married, but I do not know her married name, and she lives in Arroyo Grande, Cal. Josephine Ketchum's husband died, and she afterwards married Ernest Ketchum, who is now alive and in Arroyo Grande, Cal., and as issue they had five children, I think; I can not remember the names of all of them. Those I remember are named Dexter Ketchum, Solomon Ketchum, Robert Ketchum, and Elsie Ketchum. Elsie Ketchum lives in Portland, and is married to Fred Foot, East Portland, and the others live at Arroyo Grande, Cal.

I had six sisters who have died, named Lucy Sweeney, who died in infancy; one named Anna Sweeney Petit, who died about eighteen years and who has two children now alive—Georgia Winship (maiden name, Georgia Petit) and Hattie Reed (maiden name, Hattie Petit); and one sister named Ida Lindgenfelter (maiden name, Sweeney), who has two girls and a boy now alive, Everett, Josie, and Mary Lindgenfelter, who live in Walla Walla, and one sister, Phebe Sweeney, married to Pettit, and who left surviving her tree children named Eva, Ada, and Fred Pettit, who live in Aberdeen, Wash.

One sister was named Clara Becken, who left surviving her a son, Will. Becken, who lives at Ilwaco, Wash., aged about 16 years.

One sister was named Frances, and she died without issue.

father was Duncan, and he was a Clatsop Indian, alive in 1851 when the treaty of that year was made, and his mother was Innewak, a daughter of Shoo-shetacus, a Tillamook Indian.

I have no sisters now alive.

I had brothers, but they died in early age, unmarried and without issue.

I had one sister who died aged about 14 years, unmarried and without issue.

I have no brothers or sisters now alive. I had a brother named Joseph Esatim, who died about nine years ago, aged about 70 years, without issue, and his wife died before him. I had a sister whose name I do not remember, and she died in youth, unmarried and without issue.

I had two brothers who have died, one named David Gervais, who died in 1854 or 1855, aged about 40 years. He was maried, but his wife is dead. David left as issue and sole heir Maggie Gervais, who is now Maggie Gervais Loren, married, and lives at Brooks, Oreg. She is about 45 years of age. My other brother was named Xavier Gervais, and he died about thirty years ago aged about 38 or 40 years. He was married, but whether his wife is alive I do not know. One son was born of the marriage, but I do not know if he is alive or dead. I have not heard of them for years. I had two sisters, one named Julia Gervais, who married Ledger Laderoute, a white man, who is dead, leaving as issue two children who are now alive, living in Vancouver, Wash., the last I heard of them, named Isidore and Joseph Laderoute.

By my first husband, Charles Killess, I had two children. One of them lived to be a man and married, but never had any issue, and his wife is dead. The other child died in youth, unmarried and without issue. By my second husband Shawha I had two (2) children, a boy and a girl, both of whom are dead, having died in youth, unmarried and without issue. By my last husband, Oskalowis, I had one child, and she is now alive and named Clara (Oskalowis) Pearson, married, 33 years old, and lives in Seaside, Oreg.

I have no brothers or sisters now alive. I had one full brother, whose name was Solon G. Cook, who died a number of years ago, who died unmarried and

without issue. I had four sisters, as follows, two of whom died unmarried and without issue; one is now alive and is now Rosa (McMillan) Casey, and

she lives at Portland, Oreg.

The next sister was named Katie (Cook) Painter, and she lived in Astoria, Oreg., leaving a husband named W. B. Painter, who now lives in Astoria, and they have four children, all now alive, in Astoria, named Ida Painter, Ellen Painter, married and present name I do not remember; William Painter, and Annie Painter. The next sister was named Helen (Cook) Butler, and her husband is alive and named Robert Butler and I do not know his present address. I had a brother named John, who is also dead. He was married and his wife is also dead, and there was never any issue. He was younger than I am. I had other brothers, but they all died young, unmarried, and without issue. I had

two sisters, both of whom are dead. One named Helen (Lattie) Cloutrie married, who died about twenty-three years ago, her age I do not remember, but she was six or more years older than I am. Her husband's name was Antoine Cloutrie and he is dead, and they had as issue four children, three of whom are now alive and one is dead. The boy is alive, but the girl is dead. I do not remember their names. My sister, Lottie (Hallet) Stone, had three children, all alive. One is named Albert and one Charles, but I do not remember the name of the other child, but she is a daughter, who is about 5 years old, and they live in Baker City, Oreg. I knew Delia (Hallet) Rowland, deceased, and know she was a daughter of Chuluck.

I have no brothers alive nor any sisters. I had three brothers, who are dead. Two of them died unmarried and without issue. One was named James Scarborough and one named James Allen Scarborough; and Robert Scarborough was married and his wife is dead without issue. I had one sister, who is dead, named Mary, who was married to a white man named Hays (first name I do not remember), who is also dead, leaving as issue three children—one named Henry Hays, aged about 28 years, and he lives at Cathlamet, but is now absent; one named Fred Hays, aged about 30 years, and he lives in Seattle, Wash., and the third child was a daughter, whose name was Angeline, who is dead. I think her husband is alive about Seattle somewhere. They had a child, who, I think, is dead.

My sister Hatwi afterwards married an Indian named Tom Walley, who lives in Georgetown, Wash., and the issue of this marriage was one child, a daughter named Emma or Ella Walley, who is dead. She was married and left surviving her one child, named Daisy Ford, aged about 15 years, and she lives in Georgetown, Wash., with Tom Walley.

My sister died in 1899, aged about 50 years, and had as issue two children, Lena (Pete) Cultee, now married to Howard Cultee, of Bay Center, Wash., and the other named Sallie (Pete) George, who

lives at Bay Center, Wash., married to Edward George.

Lucy Sampson's mother, whose name I do not know, was, I think, an Alsea Indian woman. Her father was Sampson (first name unknown to me), who was a Tillamook Indian, alive in 1851, when the treaty of that year was made—in August. I do not know the year my wife's father died nor his age at the time of his death. My wife had two brothers, who have died. They died unmarried and without issue. My wife had two sisters, who are both dead, having died unmarried and without issue. One was named Sophie Sampson, who died about ten years ago, and the other named Mary Sampson, who died about

three years ago.

My wife had an aunt named Julia Jack, who died about three years ago, aged about 75 years, and she was a Tillamook Indian woman. She was married twice, first to John Baxter, who is dead, and there were no children born of this marriage. Julia Baxter then married Calipooyas Jack, who is also dead, having died before Julia did. No children were born of this marriage, and at the time of her death my wife Lucy was the sole surviving heir of Julia Jack, deceased, who had no brothers or sisters. He was married to Hannah, a Tillamook Indian woman, now alive on Siletz Reservation, and one daughter, named Agnes Bobb, was born of this marriage. Agnes Bobb is now alive and married to Henry Curl, and lives on Siletz Reservation. Hannah and her daughter Agnes (Bobb) Curl are the sole surviving heirs of Dick Bobb, deceased. One brother was named Charles Bobb, who died about forty years ago, aged about 35 years, who was married. His wife died after Charles Bobb did. She died about forty years ago. She was married to David Lano, who is alive on Grand Ronde Reserve, a mixed blood. As the issue of this marriage four children were born, two of whom died when young, unmarried and without issue. The two children now alive are Cecelia, aged about 39 years, and Jane, aged about 33 years, both of whom live on the Grand Ronde Reserve, Oreg.

I had one sister, named Mrs. Pratt, who died about thirty years ago. Her husband is alive, named John Pratt, and he lives on this reserve. No children were born of the marriage.

My father's name was Franklin Teabo, a white man, who died when I was 3 years old. My mother's name was Mary Teabo, who died about eight years ago, aged about 50 years. She was a Chinook woman, and lived in Kathlamet. I have a brother, named Joseph Teabo, who lives at Chemawa. Oreg. I had a brother, named William Teabo, who died when 17 years of age, unmarried and without issue. I had one sister, named Agnes Teabo, who died about fourteen years ago, aged 17 years, about, at the time of her death. She was married to Frank Burtrell, who lives at Bay Center, Pacific County, Wash. He is an Indian. No children were born of the marriage.

Elizabeth Menard, of the Grande Ronde Reservation, Oreg., being duly sworn, deposes and says she is about 57 years of age. My maiden name was Elizabeth Sangaratta, and I am a Lower Chinook descendant.

My mother's name was Nancy Sangaratta, who was a Lower Chinook descendant, who died about eight years ago, aged 70 years, and who was a daughter of Pisk's first wife, a Lower Chinook Indian woman, who died years ago. My father was a mixed blood Indian, named Joseph Sangaratta, who died about seven years ago, aged nearly 90 years, who was a Marysville Indian. I have no brothers alive—never had any brothers. I had two sisters who died in infancy. I have one sister now alive, named Mary Mitchell (formerly Mary Sangaratta), living on Grande Ronde Reservation, Oreg.

STATE OF WASHINGTON, Pacific County, ss:

Samuel Mallet, Catherine George, and Catherine Dawson, of Bay Center, Wash., being each duly sworn, were examined by Supervisor Chas. E. Mc-Chesney, U. S. Indian Service.

Q. Did either of you know Louis Tole, father of Elizabeth Blacketer, of Siletz Reserve, Oreg., and was he a member of the Lower Chinook or Clatsop tribes of Indians?—A. Samuel Mallet: Never knew him. Catherine George and Catherine Dawson: He was with the Salmon River Indians. No Chinook.

Q. Did either of you know Louis Napassent or his daughter Larose, now Mrs. Quenal of the Grand Ronde Reserve?—A. Samuel Mallet: Did not know Louis Napassent. Catherine George: Did not know Louis Napassent. Catherine Dawson: Louis Napassent was a French half-breed, Larose Quenal is a Clacatack Indian. She is not a Lower Chinook.

Q. Do either of you know whether Henry Wallace, of Grand Ronde Reserve, Oreg., is of Lower Chinook blood?—A. Samuel Mallet, Catherine George, and Catherine Dawson: Father and mother were both Upper Chinook Indians.

Q. Did either of you know Edward Teabo's mother, and the tribe she belonged to?—A. Samuel Mallet, Catherine George, and Catherine Dawson: She

was an Upper Chinook or Chehalis Indian.

Q. Did either of you know Nancy Sangaratta and the tribe of Indians she belonged to?—A. Samuel Mallet, Catherine George, and Catherine Dawson: She was an Upper Chinook or Chehalis Indian. She was not a Lower Chinook.

Peter Beautheu, now living at Grand Ronde Reservation.

That my father was alive at the time of the making of the treaty in 1851.


