About 7:30 Bob Heyer will start his demo... an 18"x 27" transparent watercolor, very similar to this "cameo" of it. The importance of value sketches will be shared, highlighting the use of shapes to build a strong composition. Each step of the painting process will be explained from initial wash to the final details. Questions are welcome.



Bob has developed a national reputation as a painter, teacher, and literary contributor to art magazines. His many awards (editor's note: I mean many!) in juried shows include The President's Award from the American Artists Professional League, the Dagmar Tribble Memorial Award from the Garden State Watercolor Society, and Best in Show from the New Jersey Water Color Society show.

His paintings and articles have been featured in such publications as Watercolor Magazine, The Best of Watercolors, International Artist Magazine, and American Artist Magazine. So come on out and enjoy a great evening with your fellow artists and friends!

It is with very great sadness that we note the passing of our wonderful ex-President Alka Dalal. She did so much for the Raritan Valley Arts Association, from leading the meetings, to getting us exhibits, and to having us in her home for sociable get-togethers. Her paintings were varied, in several mediums, and wonderful. A really good person, she is missed. Your editor will quote from the email she received from Alka's daughter.

"Our mother, Alka Dalal, passed away peacefully last night (October 3) after a two year battle with ALS. Prayers will be held on Saturday, October 8th at 1:30 PM at the Jain Center of NJ (11 Cedar Grove Ln, Somerset NJ). All are invited.

Born in Mumbai in the optimism just after independence, Alka and her two siblings were raised by her mother, aunt, and grandfather with a love for education and her Jain faith.

Her father, whom she adored, was jailed along with Gandhi during the struggle for Independence - and died when she was 9. Her grandfather was a Jain monk who had forsaken the material world, but would share his reflections and learnings with his precocious granddaughter. Her mother and aunt, strong women in a time of men, would impart their lessons from teaching thousands of students - and pour so much of their hopes and dreams into her.

An exuberant dancer and college slow biking champion, she was called the "tough nut" of her family for her dedication - and her obstinacy. Like so many others, she came to America for a better life, and landed in Queens, where she met my father, Sid Dalal. Their first date, at the Manhattan Monk's Inn, was rocky: he thought she talked too much about her brother and she thought he was an unkempt professor. Luckily, there was a second date that led to a loving and adventurous 38-year partnership and two children.

She led several lives, from a nutritionist at Jamaica Hospital in Queens to a manager at AT&T to a twice published author. A lifelong learner, she took extra classes on programming, painting and statistics even after earning two Masters and a Bachelors degree from NYU. Art always inspired her - and in the last 30 years, she painted hundreds of oil, acrylic and mixed media pieces, while imparting her lessons on countless students. Her artwork has been exhibited in innumerable art shows and has been sold across the world.

She believed in philanthropy, a love for mankind, and giving back - and expressed it in so many actions: from advocating for the construction of a local Jain temple, to painting for trauma-ridden American troops, to making substantial contributions to a number of charities. Our father and she established the Dalal Family Foundation to continue her legacy. One of her last words to her family was "be charitable," a philosophy she lived each day."
