Blair's cat was sick and Mr. Blair gave it castor oil. Naturally she spit in his face. For a day or two the resulting sore throat looked like tonsillitis. Two rather tired men - Moffett & Phillips had to consult the invalid (not the cat) about something and they are now enjoying a rest also. No one has been very sick but these bugs are able to do so much harm, the community must be protected. We have no

isolation hospital at the foreign hospital.

Dear Jamie,

I have neglected you for a long time - for  
 various reasons - one was I was in quarantine for a month  
 on account of suspected diphtheria - tonsillitis at any rate  
 this kept us all at home - the children doing their studies  
 there. We got out of quarantine on Valentine's day the  
 14th and had a right weather. I came to Seoul - to sign  
 some papers before the Council General - I to have some  
 dental work done - and to see some Gov. officials about  
 school matters. Weather went back to Gyeongju after just one  
 day here - shall stay here until tomorrow Monday night.  
 It has been good to get a number of letters from  
 you and to know a little more of your movements and  
 activities. Harold has sent a number of your  
 letters and you know how much I love your Princeton trip. An-  
 other thing I shall want to know more of your family events in  
 the States. We have had one great family event in  
 the States. My mother's very much of you and it always has  
 been a great gathering. I have heard a little of you through  
 Paige one of your friends has a daughter Janet somebody  
 who has a letter from Dr. Whiting who met you.  
 My Hamilton sister wrote for me to say to you that we  
 are all well and hope you are the same.

She said you were elected Freshman Class representative on the "Senate" - but as you did not return to Providence if she was mistaken. Keep me posted on such matters.
