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INTRODUCTION

Having published, several years ago, a genealogy of his father's family, the author began the collection of material for a similar work on his mother's line, descendants of Thomas Sayre, one of the founders of Southampton, Long Island. He met with some difficulties he had not experienced in his former task. All the persons he heard of bearing the name of Banta were descendants (or wives of such descendants) of Epke Jacobse, the Frisian immigrant of 1659; whereas the name of Sayre, in its various spellings, has been common in England for at least seven centuries, and other persons of that name besides our Thomas were among the early settlers of New England and the South, and have been found among the immigrants, not only from England, but from Ireland and Germany, to the present time. It will readily be seen, therefore, that large numbers of those in this country who bear the name of Sayre, Sayres, Sayer, Sayers, etc., would not be included within the scope of this work.

Again, while the Bantas, for nearly a century and a half at least, were generally connected with the Dutch churches of New Netherland and vicinity, the records of whose marriages and baptisms have been, with rare exceptions, preserved, so that it was possible to get quite complete data as to families from the beginning, the Sayres were mostly in Congregational or Presbyterian churches in Suffolk and Orange counties, N. Y., and Essex, Salem, Cumberland and Cape May counties, N. J., where scarcely any marriage or baptismal registers are extant prior to the nineteenth century. Curiously enough, too, very few family Bibles have been discovered containing records so much sought after. This will explain, therefore, why, in the earlier generations mentioned in this book, the maiden names of wives, and dates of marriage, birth and death, are so frequently missing. From wills and deeds the first names of wives have sometimes been gleaned.

THE SPELLING OF THE NAME.

As is well known, in early times there was no uniformity in the spelling of many ordinary words, and it was to be expected that in the spelling of proper names great diversities would be found. The name of the family forming the subject of this book has had only the ordinary experience of other cognomens in this regard. In the first official document we have discovered referring to this family, being a tax-list for Poddington, Bedfordshire, England, the ancient

home of the family, under date of 1332 occur the names of William, John and Galfro Seyer. In Harvey's History, referred to on page 2, the form of Sayer appears in 1327, Sayr in 1430, and Seyre in 1545. In the will of the first positively identified ancestor, William, dated 1562, the name appears as Sayer, Seyer and Seyre. A grandson of this William Sayre, who, we learn, had been educated, drew up and witnessed his cousin's will, as stated on page 5; and in this his signature appears in a "very good hand," William Sayre. It may not be generally known that the word "cousin" at that period included other degrees of relationship, such as nephews and grandnephews, and in the particular instance cited on page 5, William Sayre was a nephew or grandnephew of Edmund Squire, who called him his cousin.

The families who remained on Long Island and those who went to New Jersey have usually retained the spelling Sayre, while those who removed to Orange County, N. Y., about the middle of the eighteenth century, commonly adopted Sayer. One family removed from Southampton to Middletown, Conn., many descendants of whom spell their name Sears. Other forms have been adopted, such as Sayr, Sayres, Sayres, etc., and apparently for no assignable reason. Two brothers sometimes have spelled their names differently. For example, Anthony, on page 215, spelled his name Sayre, as did his father. His brother Matthias, page 212, signed himself as Sayres. Curiously enough, the latter left two sons, the descendants of one of whom use the form Sayres, and of the other, Sayre. In another case a father, whose signature is Sayr, has children who add the final "e."

Assistance Rendered.

The "History of Southampton," by Mr. George R. Howell, a Sayre descendant (page 160), contains a dozen pages or more of genealogies of the Sayre family, and these have been of very great value in laying the foundation for this work. Mr. Samuel P. May, of Newton, Mass., published in 1890 a genealogy of the Sears family; and in the collection of matter therefor he accumulated considerable material relating to the Sayres, which he generously placed at the disposal of the present writer. In addition, he has been unstinted in his services in the way of suggestion and information, and the compiler of these records gratefully acknowledges his indebtedness to the uniform courtesy and invaluable assistance of Mr. May.

Of course, in a work of this character the great bulk of the material, other than that derived from public or official documents, must be contributed by the various members of the families who may be interested in it, and the labor of the author has largely been that of a compiler. He would express his warm appreciation of the services of the many who have helped him, sometimes by the expenditure of much labor and trouble, in collecting and contributing records of their own families.

There are others who have not only furnished information as to their own immediate families, but have been unsparing in their efforts to collect material

from a wider circle; and to these he would express especial thanks. Among these he feels it due to mention Mrs. Laura Jones, of Newark, N. J., who has thoroughly gleaned the field of Essex County, N. J.; Miss Elizabeth Burt, of Warwick, N. Y., who has been very efficient in collecting information from the Orange County, N. Y., families; and Mr. Edward A. Sayre, of St. Mary's, West Virginia, who has aided materially in enrolling in their proper places many of the mighty army of Sayres in that State and in Ohio.

Howell's "History of Southampton" publishes the following in regard to the coat of arms of Thomas Sayre. Traditions as to family arms are not usually of much value as authority.



- "The arms of the Sayre family are, as handed down by family tradition:
- "Gules, a chevron ermine between three sea-gulls argent.
- "Crest: A cubit arm erect proper holding a dragon's head erased argent.
- "Motto: Saie and doe."

SAYRE SOLDIERS.

The Sayres have borne their part in all the wars in which the country has been engaged. A list is here given of all whom we have been able to identify. It is doubtless by no means complete, especially in regard to the Civil War, as the main source of information relating thereto has been from correspondents, and the questions bearing on the subject may not always have been noted and answered. The war with Spain and that in the Philippine Islands have been too recent to permit of obtaining any account of participants therein, except in two or three cases.

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

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Following is a statement on file at the Pension Bureau, Washington, showing the Revolutionary War services of Pierson Sayre, which should have appeared on page 117.

COURT OF COMMON PLEAS.

JULY TERM, 1832.

THE STATE OF OHIO SS. BUTLER COUNTY

On this 4th day of August in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two personally appeared before the Honorable the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas in and for the County of Butler of the State of Ohio, PIERSON SAYRE, aged about seventy years, a resident of the town of Hamilton in the County of Butler aforesaid, who, being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th, 1832.

That in October, 1777, he was called out to serve in the militia of New Jersey for one month. He was engaged in guarding the line at Elizabethtown under the command of Lt. Squires. Deponent states that the militia companies of New Jersey were divided into classes who served alternately on monthly tours. From the time deponent was first called out he served monthly tours every other month for two years, after which until the close of the war he served on different tours, sometimes two months, never less than one month on a tour. Deponent states

that he served in all during the whole war between two and three years.

About the first of June, 1778, (as deponent believes) he was called out to serve in Capt. Lane's company in the Regt. commanded by Col. Jaquish. On this tour he was called out six weeks during which time he was in two engagements with the British, one at Connecticut Farms, then in two weeks afterwards at Springfield, New Jersey. In the latter engagement Gen. Knyphausen, a British officer, was killed. Deponent mounted guard at different times at Elizabethtown which was the headquarters of the militia. He also mounted guard at Trimbley's Point, Old Point, New Point, Newark and Hackensack. At some of these places he mounted guard two months and at none less than one month. At the time the British lay on Staten Island deponent went in a command with some regulars under General Sterling to the Island and drove the British from their fort. The Americans soon left it.

Deponent knew Generals Wines and Hurd, to whose Brigade he belonged; he knew Cols. Jaquish, Ludlow, Crane, and Smith, Captains Lane, Wood, Winans,

Craig, and Major Crane, under all of whom deponent served. He was frequently engaged in skirmishes with the British and Tories. He cannot state the dates of the different tours he served, having never kept any regular or written account.

Deponent was born in Essex County, N. J., Sept. 12, 1761; he has a written record of his age. He knows of no living witnesses by whom, from their own knowledge, he can prove his services. He is well known to John Sutherland, James Boal, James McBride, and others, by whom he can prove that he sustains a good character for truth and veracity; that he is reputed and believed in the town and county where he resides to have been a soldier of the Revolution.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency

of any State.

He has lived in Butler County, Ohio, twenty-three years.

ERRATA AND ADDENDA.

On pages 584, 585, and 586 appear the families of James Sayre (1404i), Rachel Sayre (1404j), and Hannah Evans Sayre (1404k) under the heading, "Line of William, Thomas, David, David, David, David, This is an error. It should be "Line of James, James, David, David, David, David, as will be noted by reference to page 253.

The wife of James ⁵ Sayre (119) on page 97 was probably Elizabeth or Rebecca Moore, daughter of Richard Moore.

On page 93 it is stated that Stephen Sayre lived in New York in 1784. The Chamber of Commerce was reincorporated April 3, 1784. His name appears as one of the forty petitioners for the incorporation and as one of the original thirty-six members of the chamber.



CHAPTER I.

ENGLISH ANCESTRY.

As will be seen later on, in the account of the founding of Southampton, Long Island, Job Sayre, in his examination by the Dutch magistrates at New Amsterdam in 1640, stated that he was born at "Bretfordshire," and was twenty-eight years of age. This gave us a clue as to the locality where our Sayre ancestry was to be sought, directing us to Bedfordshire and to a Job Sayre born about 1612, with a brother Thomas. As a result of extended researches conducted by several experienced English genealogists, we have been enabled to trace the direct line of Thomas Sayre, our Emigrant Ancestor, for three previous generations in England, and to show that "the old yeoman family of Sayre" were in Bedfordshire at least seven or eight hundred years ago. It is commonly supposed to be of Norman origin.

The earliest mention of the family from which our Thomas Sayre sprang is in a Subsidy Roll or Royal Grant of the time of Edward II. From an official document we quote this explanation of what the "Subsidy Rolls" consist of:

Information from Subsidy Rolls.

Subsidy Rolls. As many of these rolls contain the names of the persons assessed towards the payment of each subsidy, they are extremely valuable in the compilation of pedigrees, showing at once the precise hundred and township in which the family lived at the time of the assessment, and also to a certain extent their rank and position, which may be deduced from the amount paid. The most valuable assessments for materials of this nature are the Grants of 23 Edward I, and of the 1st and 6th years of Edward III, and the Poll Taxes of 51 Edward III, and the 2d and 4th years of Richard II. From the latter date to 14 Henry VIII, the rolls, with few exceptions, supply no names, but from 14 Henry VIII to the reign of Charles II, the lists of names are numerous and complete, especially in the Hearth Tax Rolls of the latter reign.

The first of these rolls in which Poddington (the earliest known residence of our Sayres) is mentioned is that of 3 Edward II (8 July, 1309-7 July, 1310). It contains twenty-three names, and among them is "Willō Seyer, 2s tax," the total amount for the whole list being £10 13s 10½d.

The next is dated 6 Edward III (25 Jan., $133\frac{1}{2}$, to 24 Jan., $133\frac{2}{3}$), and is a grant

to the King of "a fifteenth and a tenth." Poddington was but a small place, and yet forty-eight of the inhabitants were named, among whom were three Sayres. These names, with amount of tax, were:

Harvey's "History and Antiquities of the Hundred of Willey, in the County of Bedford, England" (4to, London, 1872–8), is a scarce work. The extracts here given were made by a correspondent in England from the copy in the British Museum, and verified from a copy in the possession of Rufus King, Esq., of Yonkers—the only one we have found in this country.

Page 382. Refers to "the old yeoman family of Sayer."

Page 389. Refers in the text to "Sir Percie's lande" mentioned in the will of Thomas Sayre of Poddington, yeoman (30th May, 1581), which gives rise to Note 1, as follows:

The name (Sayre, Sayer, etc.) occurs as far back as 1316, when William Sayer was a landholder in Hinwick. In the ancient account of land in Hinwick from the pen of John Orlebas Esq., we also meet with the names of the following members of this family:

Roger Sayer, 1327.

In 1430, Joan Parker or Packer of Sharnbrook grants to John Sayr of Poddington the elder and William Hennet, clerk, rector of Newynton, tenements in Hinwick called Dehuus.

In 1431, John Sayr, the elder, of Podington, to John Sayr, the younger, his son, of the same place, reversion of a tenement and sixty acres of land in Hinwick, and tenement lying between the land of the prioress of Harewold [Harrold] on the one side and the King's highway on the other. Witnesses, John Tymest, vic. of Podington, Nicholas Dikon, Adam Gausye, of Hinwick, and others.

1477, Simon Sayer, son of John Sayer, late of Hinwick, deceased (and others), to Agnes, his wife, daughter of John Pyrt of Lavendon. His father's lands.

Witnesses, John Sayer, John Payn, and others.

1545. John Faldd [Faldo], of Sutton, Beds, yeoman, to William Seyre, of Hinwick, with warrant of attorney to Daniel Payne and Edmund Squyre, of Podington, to deliver seisin.

1553. 6 July, Peter Grey, of Chilington, Beds, to William Sare, of Hinwick, yeoman, two closes and two acres in Hinwick, then in the tenure of the said William, and formerly belonging to the priory of Harewold, lately dissolved, with

warrant of attorney to David Payne, gent.

1562. Aug. 1, William Seyre, the elder, of Hinwick, to Edmund Squyre and William Abbot, of the same place, husbandmen, all his lands, &c., late of John Faldo, of Sutton, and of the dissolved priory of Harewold, to reconvey the same to the use of the said William Seyre and Alice his wife for their lives; remainder to William Seyre, their son and heir apparent, remainder to Thomas, another son of the said William and Alice; remainder to the right heirs of William and Alice.

[A. D. 1616.] 18th and 20th June, 14 James I, William Sayer, of Hinwick, and William Olyver, of Thenford, Northants, yeoman, executed, on the days named respectively, deeds of gift. (Intended marriage of Anthony, son and heir of the said William Sayer, with Elizabeth Olyver, daughter and coheir of William Olyver. Sayer made over a moiety of his goods and chattels to his son, and Olyver one third of his possessions to his daughter. Richard Childe was a witness.)

In 1621, depositions of William Sayer, of Hinwick, yeoman, and many others, were taken at Bedford. A copy of their statements is in the muniment chest at

Hinwick House.

Page 398. View (wood-engraving) of Poddington Church.

Page 403. Inscriptions in the nave of Poddington Church: "Here lyeth ye body of M! W." Sayer who departed this life Nov. ye 16th, 1747, aged 82.

"Here lye ye remains of Sarah, the wife of M. W. Sayer. She departed this life Dec. 27, 1732, aged 73.

"A constant comer to ye house of God, Lived and dy'd a good Christian."

Page 408. There are many entries (the first 1663) of the Sayers or Sayres family. (This refers to entries in the parish register of Poddington, which are extant only from 1662.)

The earliest will we have found of any Sayre of Bedfordshire is that of William Sayre, of Sharnbrook, dated 22^d Dec., 1519. We have no evidence that he was an ancestor of our Thomas Sayre, of Southampton, N. Y., but it is possible that he was an uncle of William Sayre "the elder," with whom our known English ancestry of Thomas Sayre begins. As this will of 1519 was executed before the Reformation, and is quite curious, it is given in full, with all the curiosities of spelling.

The wills of William Abbot, the elder, dated 1582, and of Edmond Squire, dated 1593, the witnesses named above, were written by as well as witnessed by William Sayre, styled the cousin of the latter, and the signature appears, in a "very good hand," William Sayre, which we assume settles the correct spelling of the family name.

WILL OF ALICE SAYRE.

WILL OF THOMAS SAYRE (GREAT-UNCLE OF THE EMIGRANT THOMAS).

In the name of the father and of the sonne and of the holy ghoste, so be it. Be it knowne unto all men by theise presentes that I Thomas Sayre of Hynwicke in the parishe of Podington in the countie of Bedf, yeoman the 30th of Maye in the yeare of our lorde god 1581 and in the 23th yeare of the raigne of our soveraigne ladie Queene Elizabeth &c beinge sicke in bodie butt whole of minde, and of perfecte memory ordaine and make this my laste will and testament in manner and fourme followinge that is to saie firste I bequeathe my soule into the handes and tuicion of god allmightie my onely savour and redeemer throughe Jesus Christe and stedfastly believe freely to be justified and saved through faithe in the bloude of Jesus Christe whoe died for me and by his deathe and pretious bloude shedding hathe delivered me from the thralldome & bondage of sathan sinne deathe and hell and hathe purchased for me an everlastinge inheritance in his kingdome of glory weh throughe true faith I stedfastly beleeve my soule shall enter into and possesse with full love presently after it is dissolved out of this life and I committ my bodie to the earth whence it was made being to be interred in the churche or churche yarde of Podington aforesaid and att the laste and general daie of Judgement I beleeve that my bodie shall rise againe and be ioyned to my soule and so beinge glorified shall live with Christe for ever in his kingdome of glory ffirste I give and bequeathe to the poore of the parishe of Podington aforesaide to be indifferently devided by the discretions of my executrix minister and church wardens there where most neede is vII's Item I give and bequeathe to the poore of Wemington to be likewise distributed in manner & forme aforesaid where moste neede is 1115. Item I give and bequeathe to the poore of Odell to be distributed in manner & fourme aforesaid where moste neede is vs. Item I give and bequeathe to Willyam Makernes the younger in full payment of a lagacie of one hoggerell or younge sheepe to him given by the laste will of my late deare mother Alice Sayre deceassed xis. Ite I give and bequeath to Elizabeth Sayre late wife of my late brother Willyam Sayre late deceassed all such goodes & cattells weh late was delivered to me by Inventory or else the price

of the same goodes thearein expressed to the vse of the said Elizabeth and to the vse of the chilldren of the saide Willyam Sayre the tyme for the inioying of the farme & occupyinge whearein my beloved wife Margery Sayre and Elizabeth Savre her sister now inhabite as allsoe the tyme for deliveringe over of the same parcelles of goodes & cattalls abovesaide to be sett downe by the deliberate advise of such overseers as heare after shall be named by this my will went thinge if they cannot in full wise decide then I will that they shall choose & electe suche wise and indifferent men as they shall thinke meete to determine the same cause this beinge allewaies my will that my wife my sister Elizabeth Sayre and my well beloved nephew Willyam Sayre to give their consents in the same arbitrements to be made that nothinge be donne any wayes either by overseers or others by their appointment in any cawses concerninge this my will without the consent of my saide wife her sister Elizabeth Sayre and Willyam Sayre that theareby as well my wife her sister Willyam Sayre & the reste of the poore children of my brother may have every waye that is due unto them & my selfe theareby to be discharged of the dutie in consciens weh I my selfe am bounde to for them all deducting unto my saide executrix forthe ofthe p'cells aforesaide aswell the some of xxx paide unto Richard Wagstaffe & Elizabeth now wife to Robert Laudes as allso suche somes as I have laide forthe divers & sundry tymes about the placinge out my saide nephew Willyam Saire as otherwise in extraordinary chardges weh I have beene att by the schoolinge of the children of my saide brother. Item I give and bequeathe to Robert Sayre my nephewe vs wheareof I hadd by three bullockes to me solde by the overseers of my brother his laste will by the praisers [appraisers] of the goodes to me delivered LVI^{s.} VIII^{d.} Item I give and bequeathe to Thomas Sayre my nephewe IIII[£] x^{s.} Item I give and bequeathe to ffrauncis Sayer my nephewe xx^s, and to Alice Sayer my neece xx^s all the saide legacies to be paide & delivered vnto the chilldren abovesaide when they shall come to the age of XIX yeares. Item I give and bequeathe to everyone of my godchilldren vI^{d.} Item I give and bequeathe to Margery Sayer my wife all those my leeses as of one tenem^t in Hinwicke called Sir Percies lande with their appurtennes & allso the reuersion of the same landes weh I bought of Edmond Aprece gent and allso of my cloose in-Wemington called Rushe bushe cloose and allso all that my lease of one yarde [year?] lande wth the appurtentics lyinge in the towne parishe and feildes of Woolaston in the Countie of North: and allso all my righte of one cloase lyinge in Chillington nighe the river side and all my righte title interest terme and termes of yeares weh I have in the premisses above saide. Item I give and bequeathe to Willyam Sayre my nephew 30s. Item I will that my saide wife shal further the saide Willyam to have the vse of any of my saide [sic] bookes and that she give vnto him any of the saide bookes that shall be best for his purpose. Item I give and bequeathe to John Coxe my man one quarter of malte Item I give and bequeathe to John Hull one quarter of Malte. Item I give and bequeathe to John West vi: strike of malte Item I give and bequeathe to Thomas Greene twoe strikes of malte Item I give and bequeathe to Willyam Masters three strike' of malte. Item I give and bequeathe to Anne Lambert my maide serv'nt three strike' of malte Item I give and bequeathe to Alice Weste my sister one royall of goulde I will that all my legacies laste recited shall be paide & delivered to them to whome they are given within the space of a yeare and a quarter after the daie of my deathe; the residue of my goodes nott bequeathed my debtes paide & funerall expences dischardged I give and bequeathe vnto my deare and lovinge. Wife Margery Sayre whome I make executrix of this my laste will and testament desiringe and chardginge her before the lorde to performe & fullfill this my will willinge & desiringe the saide Margery & Elizabeth her sister as allsoe all my brothers chilldren & the others weh I have hadd the chardge of for theire

bringinge vpp quiettly and dutifully every of them to behave themselves as well towardes theire mother and aunte as allsoe to all other theire ellders wheareby godes glory may shine and be sett forthe by them: Item I constitute and make my deare freindes in the lorde Robert Hattley Esq' John Harveye Esq' Robert Smithe & George Hilles overseers of my laste will and testamente desiringe them most humbly in the lord to see the same performed and to be good vnto my saide deare wife and Elizabeth Sayre my poor afflicted sister and to my brothers chill-dren & to doe for them in good cawses what they maye willinge and chardginge them and every of them that in all cawses what soever may arise in any cawse concerninge my will to dispose and order the same in such wise as before in this my will is expressed for the benefitt & best profitt for the saide Margery Elizabeth and the reste of the chilldren: all other willes I revoake & call in & make this my last will to stande in force: In wittnes wheareof I have subscribed the same with my owne hande the daie & yeare above written in the presence of Steven Hodges, John Barnes, Edmonde Squier and Willyam Abbott the ellder.

From a passage in the last-cited will it would appear that Thomas's brother William had made a will. Unfortunately, it has not yet been brought to light, though diligent search has been made in every office where it was deemed probable it had been probated.

Podington, the residence of William Sayre, as stated in his will, is thus described in Lysons's "Magna Britannia," Vol. I, p. 125:

Pudington, or Podington, in the hundred of Willey and deanery of Clopham and diocese of Lincoln, lies on the borders of Northamptonshire, thirteen miles northwest of Bedford, about five miles from Higham Ferrers, and about sixty-three miles from London. King Henry III in 1227 granted the manor of Pudington to Isolda de Dover, till such time as he should think fit to restore it to the house of Reginald Damastin, Earl of Boloigne, whose property it had formerly been; in which case he promised to grant her an equivalent. The manor was afterwards successively in the Grays of Ruthin and in the Bromfletes. In the reign of King Henry VIII, being vested in the crown, it was annexed to the honor of Ampthill. In 1557 it was granted to George Bredyman. In King James' reign it was in the family of Payne, from whom it passed by an heir female to that of Child. The seat of the ancient manor house, which appears to have been a castellated mansion, is occupied by a farm.


Before the Conquest it was held by Levenot, a thane of King Edward, and in

Domesday by Hugh Flandrensis.

In 1782, Rev. Oliver St. John Cooper, then vicar of Podington, compiled a short account of the place, which forms a part of No. VIII of the "Bibliotheca Topographica Britannica," published in 1783, a copy of which was found in the Public Library of Boston, Mass., and from which we quote:

The modern name is Puddington; on some of the communion plate it is Poudington; 17 Edward II, 12 Richard II, Podington, and often so spelt at this day [1782]. In Domesday it is called Podintone. Haneuwich = Hinwich is also mentioned in Domesday. It is a hamlet half a mile from Puddington, and is mentioned in the Will of William Sayre as the place of his residence. Sharnbrook the residence of William Sayre (will 1519), is $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. W. of Puddington, and Harold, hereafter mentioned as the residence of a Sayre, is 4 miles from Puddington.

In 1778 there were 21 houses in Hinwich, with a population of 116. There

were only eight freeholders then in the hamlet.

In Puddington at that date there were 51 houses with 305 inhabitants. Labourers were paid one shilling a day, including one mess of milk in the morning, and as much beer and as often during the day as they pleased. Land was worth twelve shillings an acre and Cottages rented for thirty shillings.

The Vicar of Puddington was hanged at Woburn by Henry VIII, together with the Abbot of the Convent, for "withstanding the measures of the King."

The number of "dissenters" in 1782 did not exceed six or eight, and they had no meeting house.

The following extract is from a work ("The Ecclesiastical and Architectural Topography of England," published under the sanction of the Central Committee of the Archæological Institute of Great Britain and Ireland.—Bedfordshire. Oxford and London: John Henry Parker, 1848, 8vo.) which, though published only fifty years ago, is quite rare. No copy was found in the British Museum.

Podington, or Puddington, St. Mary. This church consists of a nave and aisle, a chancel, and a west tower, and is chiefly Early English. In the chancel is a good moulded Early English piscina, and the chancel-arch springs from chamfered corbels. In the north wall are four sepulchral arches now blocked up with mural monuments to the memory of the Childs and Paynes. The naveaisles are on round piers of Transition-Norman character, moulded with zigzag lines, those on the north differing from those on the south. The font is circular Norman, covered with a zigzag moulding, and is engraved in Lysons; there is an Decorated western tower, with modern buttresses and a good crocketed octagonal spire. A view of the church is engraved by Lysons; and another in the Collections towards a History of Bedfordshire, containing an account of the parish and of Luton and Dunstable. 4to, 1782.—H. A. and H. K. B. [in the "Introduction"]. The monumental brasses [of the county] are numerous. Poddington possesses specimens, nearly all of interest.

Our line of known direct ancestry therefore begins with William Sayre, of Hinwich, parish of Podington, in the hundred of Willey and in the county of Bedford. His wife was Alice Squyre. He died in 1564, his will being dated 1562 and proved 1564. The will of his widow was dated April 20, 1567, and proved June 2d of the same year.

The marriage of Francis Sayre and Elizabeth Atkins is recorded in the parish register of Leighton Buzzard, November 15, 1591. The records of this place begin in 1562, and continue till 1615, when there is a break until 1640. A careful search of these records was made for the birth of Francis Sayre and of his wife, Elizabeth Atkins, but neither was found recorded. Francis was probably born at Podington, the records of which do not begin until 1602.

Leighton Buzzard.

From Lysons's "Magna Britannia," Vol. I, p. 103, we take the following description of Leighton Buzzard, the birthplace of Thomas Sayre, the Emigrant Ancestor:

Leighton Buzzard, in the hundred of Manshead and deanery of Dunstaple, is a market town on the river Ouse on the borders of Buckinghamshire, forty-one miles from London [and about thirty miles south of Hinwich, the old-time home of the Sayres]. It is supposed to have been the Lygianburgh of the Saxon Chronicles, which was taken from the Britons by Cushwulph in 571. It has been conjectured that the addition of Bussard or Buzzard is a corruption of Beaudesert, which name indeed occurs in some old papers, but in the most ancient records the name of the town is written Leighton-Bosard, and sometimes Busard or Buzzard. The family of Bosard or Bossard, from which it seems to have derived its additional name, were of consequence in the county, and knights of the shire in the reign of Edward II and Edward III. The market, which is on Tuesdays, is one of the most ancient in the county; the tolls were valued at seven pounds per annum at the time of the Norman Survey (Domesday). In the market-place is a beautiful Gothic cross of a Perpendicular form, with figures of kings, etc. The number of houses in Leighton parish (exclusive of the hamlets), according to the returns made to parliament in 1801, was 376; that of inhabitants, 1963.

King Henry II granted a manor in Leighton to the abbess and Cistercian nuns of Font-Everard in Normandy, who established a cell of foreign monks in this parish at a place called Grovesbury, the prior of which was procurator-general for the concerns of the abbey of Font-Everard in England. In 1316 this manor was held under the abbess by Mary, the king's sister, who was a nun of

Ambresbury.

In 1411 the abbess of Font-Everard had the king's license to alienate the manor of Grovesbury to John Worship. In 1413 it was purchased by Sir John Phelip, who settled it upon his wife Alice, a granddaughter of the poet Chaucer, and their joint heirs. It seems to have been seized by the crown on the death of her third husband, William Duke of Suffolk, for in 1472 it was granted for life to the duchess as a compensation in part for a debt due to her by the crown.

At the entrance of the town is an almshouse for eight poor widows, founded by Matthew Wilkes in 1630. Their allowance is three shillings a week each, besides firing and clothes. The Hon. Mrs. Leigh, about the year 1790, built a house for the Sunday schools, to which she subscribed twenty pounds per annum.

In the centre of the market-place is a pentagonal cross, which has long at-

tracted the attention of archæologists.

The market-cross is a well-known and elegant structure in the Perpendicular style, with flat four-centred arches below, and figures under ogee canopies, and terminates by a crocketed spire. Rickman describes it as "Perpendicular of good composition, but its details and execution are not equal to the design." There are engravings of the cross in "The Beauties of England and Wales," Vol. I; Britton's "Architectural Antiquities," Vol. I, p. 80.

In the "Gentleman's Magazine" for 1801, Vol. LXXI, p. 321, reference is made to the cross as follows:

Whether the conformity of its grotesque ornaments with those in the parish church is any proof that the two structures are coeval must be left to better judges.

In the same magazine for October, 1851, p. 418, is an account of a joint meeting at Leighton Buzzard of the Architectural and Archæological Societies of Bedfordshire and Buckinghamshire, at which it was proposed to repair "the ancient cross of Leighton Buzzard — with figures of kings, &c.," as represented in Farrington's illustrations to Lysons's "Britannia." A picture of this cross appears in the present book.

In "Church Bells" for August 19, 1892, is a description of the church in which our Thomas Sayre's parents were married and in which he was baptized, which we transcribe. It was accompanied by a full-page illustration, but we have had prepared another view, taken from an original photograph.

ALL SAINTS' CHURCH, LEIGHTON BUZZARD, BEDFORDSHIRE.

This fine cruciform church is a familiar object to travellers on the London and North-Western Railway. The tower is of the Early English period, and the massive spire, 193 feet high, is probably of only a little later date; both were originally built upon severe designs, but have been modified by subsequent alterations and insertions. The tower is built of a cretaceous limestone, and the spire, the condition of which is surprisingly unimpaired, probably of an oolitic limestone. The chancel is also in great part of Early English date; the transepts (fourteenth century) have Perpendicular windows. The nave is surmounted by a remarkably fine Perpendicular clerestory, the large and beautiful three-light windows of which are arranged in couplets. In the interior, the elaborately carved Perpendicular roof of the nave, of unusually high pitch for the style, is very fine. The ancient carving and the series of stalls, with miserere seats, in the chancel are remarkable.

The most superficial observer could scarcely take a circuit of this fine old church without being struck by the iron scroll-work which decorates the west door. It consists of two hinges, eight feet by four feet ten inches, covering the door. The handle is in the shape of a skeleton hand, and is alluded to by Parker, in his book on *Gothic Architecture*, as a good specimen of the iron-work of the

period.

The font consists of a massive bowl, supported upon a bold central and four plain smaller columns, the capitals of which run up to the level of the top of the bowl; the water-holding mouldings of the bases of these columns indicate unmistakably that the font is of Early English date. The metal plug bears the date of 1630. An ancient wooden lectern, the base of which is of the thirteenth century date, in the form of an eagle with wings spread, well carved, is popularly supposed to represent a buzzard, in allusion to the name of the town; but the unusually pronounced aquiline beak confutes this view, to say nothing of the probability that the word 'Buzzard' (formerly spelt 'Bussard') is simply a cor-

ruption of 'Beau Desert.'

The church is said to have been built by St. Hugh, Bishop of Lincoln, who founded a prebendal stall, or rectory, the first incumbent being Nicholas Hyam. The church was finished in 1288, and in that year was consecrated by Oliver Sutton, then Bishop of Lincoln, and a legend in connexion with the carved eagle and the consecration is that, while the ceremony was proceeding, 'the Bishop was much annoyed by an arch-enemy in the form of a large bird hovering about him; he cursed it, and it fell down, a broken, battered thing.' A red cedar pulpit, beautifully constructed after the fashion of the time, and presented, nearly 230 years ago, by the founder of the Wilkes' Almshouses, has up to the present time stood in the chancel, but is now placed in the nave. The figures of one panel at the back represent the Sacrament of Baptism — the putting off of the old, and the assumption of the new, life.

The church was judiciously restored by Messrs. Bodley & Garner in 1886, the old galleries and pews were removed, and the church made free and open. During the progress of the work several very interesting discoveries were made. In the transepts were found the remains of two altars of the Perpendicular period, and a stone string-course of the Decorated period running round the walls of both transepts. The remains of the coloured battlemented reredos have been carefully restored, and an oak altar table added, which is now used for week-day Celebrations. Six stained-glass windows, including the west window, have been inserted.

They are from the studio of Mr. Kempe.

The Rev. J. W. Richards has been vicar of the parish since April, 1862, during which time over 12,000% has been spent in Church work.

Francis Sayre was a mercer, or "silkman," as he is denominated in the tax-roll of 1609–10. The following names are taken from the "Lay Subsidy Rolls" for the years and localities mentioned, and include Francis Sayre, some of his sons, and others who were doubtless near kin. The William Sayre, called "an Assessor" at Podington, was probably the William Sayre (brother of Francis) who drew up and witnessed the will of Edmund Squire at Podington in 1592, and whose signature thereto, "in a fair hand," would apparently fix the correct spelling of the name at that date. In the will of Edmund Squire, William Sayre is called his "cousin," a word used at that period to describe a nephew or other kinsman, and not restricted as at present.



We know nothing further concerning Francis Sayre except that he continued to reside at Leighton Buzzard and died intestate in 1645, his widow Elizabeth being appointed administratrix of his estate in April of that year, as appears from the record in the Prerogative Court of Canterbury, Administration Act Book A. D. 1645, folio 39:

Mense Aprilis Anno Dñi 1645.

The expression "finitis & \bar{c} " shows that the intestate possessed personal estate to the value of ± 5 or upwards in more than one ecclesiastical jurisdiction, so as to let in that of the Prerogative Court of Canterbury.

The baptismal records of Leighton Buzzard give the names of children of Francis Sayre and Elizabeth Atkins as they appear in the following list. The record is in Latin, as were all church records of the time. There is a break in the records from 1615 to 1640; one other child was born, at least, Mary, who married in London, June 8, 1639, Edward Tynge, merchant, who was a man of note later in Boston and Dunstable, Mass.

It will be observed from the above that in the register the child baptized on January 13, $16\frac{10}{11}$, is called Johannes. The law at that period required a transcript of all marriage and baptismal records to be made and sent to the archdeacon at Bedford. In this transcript the name is very plainly Job, showing that an error exists in the Leighton Buzzard record. A copy of a baptismal item from this transcript is here given:

Job Seare filius francisci Seare de laighton . . . [slightly imperfect through damp] tercio die Januarij Anno d $\bar{n}i$ 1610 [$16\frac{10}{11}$].

Minister ibm Antoinus Slater Gard. ecclie ibm ["Gard." = gardiani, i. e. churchwardens].

Bernardus Backwell.

(Translation: Job Seare, son of Francis Seare, of Leighton . . . 3 January, 1610.)

Our English investigator writes on this point as follows:

The present register at Leighton is not the original. The handwriting is so entirely uniform during a long series of years that it is not possible the entries can have been made at the time. And the hand is not that of any incumbent, but of a scribe, as is patent on its face. It is evident that the copyist misread in the document before him "Job" for "Joh," the common abbreviation for Johannes, and wrote the latter name.

The transcript had to be sent in yearly, and was made from the original, so that we are fully justified in relying upon it rather than upon the copy which exists in the parish.

The incumbent and churchwardens were required to sign the transcript, which, produced from the proper custody, is legal evidence in Her Majesty's courts of law.

The importance of the discovery of the error in the register in the name of the child baptized January 13, $16\frac{10}{11}$, will be seen later on in the examination of Job Sayre before the Dutch magistrate in New Amsterdam in 1640, for it was through the record of this baptism that we were enabled to identify positively the Southampton, Long Island, Sayres with their English ancestors.

CHAPTER II.

THE SOUTHAMPTON FOUNDER.

One of the traditions current among some of the Sayres was that Thomas Sayre, our first Emigrant Ancestor, had been employed in the mint before sailing for America. To verify this, if possible, an examination was made, as will appear from the following report, showing undoubtedly that there was no foundation for the tradition.

It probably was based upon the supposed origin of the name from "assayer."

REPORT AS TO THE RESEARCHES AMONGST THE RECORDS OF THE MINT.

It is probable that, in matters genealogical, recourse is not often had to the records of the Mint. It appears desirable, therefore, to enter somewhat into detail as to the work done in this respect.

The practice of declaring accounts before the Lord High Treasurer of England, or before the Chancellor of the Exchequer, and two or more of the other Commissioners of the Treasury, appears to have been introduced about the reign of

Henry VIII, and to have been fully established in that of Elizabeth.

Two copies of each account were prepared in the Audit Office, to which, after

various formalities, one copy was returned.

An abstract of every account was entered on the Memoranda Rolls, under the heading "States and Views of Public Accounts."

An exhaustive Inventory of the Declared Accounts of the Audit Office has quite recently been prepared and arranged under suitable headings, such as Alienation Office; Army, Navy and Ordnance; Butlerage (Pincerna Regis); Customs' (Collectors); Custos Sigilli; and so forth, one being "Mint."

The Declared Accounts of the Mint were the records first examined, as being

the most likely to furnish what was desired.

The result of the examination of them and of other records is appended, the official reference being noted in each case.

In not one of all these various records was the name Sayer found.

Thomas Sayre, son of Francis and Elizabeth Atkins Sayre, our first Emigrant Ancestor, was born in Leighton Buzzard in 1597, baptized July 20, 1597, and probably continued to reside there until he was nearly forty years of age. Presumably he married there, and his children, some or all, were doubtless born there. Owing to loss of the parish registers, however, we have no information which might have been gathered therefrom. The first record we have of him after that of his birth is at Lynn, Mass., in 1638, but how long he had been a resident there, or whether he came directly thither from England, we have no means of determining.

Lynn was settled in 1629. In 1638 the committee appointed to divide the lands completed their work, and a book was provided in which were recorded the names of the proprietors with the number of acres allotted to each. This book is lost, but the first three pages have been preserved, and on the first page appear

the names of Thomas Sayre, sixty acres, and Job Sayre, sixty acres.

From Lynn six colonies had been sent out prior to 1640 to make settlements elsewhere. In the preceding year another colony undertook to make a settlement on Long Island. They invited Mr. Abraham Pierson of Boston, to become their minister, who, with seven of the emigrants, entered into a church covenant before they left Lynn. The eight "undertakers," as they were called, purchased a sloop for the transportation of their families and goods for £80, Thomas and Job Sayre each contributing £5 as his share. Before sailing the proprietors disposed of their interest in the vessel to David Howe in consideration of his making three trips annually for two years for the transportation of their goods from Lynn to the place of their settlement. Articles of agreement dated March 10, $16\frac{3.9}{4.0}$, were drawn up and signed. A copy will be found in Howell's "History of Southampton."

Following is a transcript of the deed to the colonists for the land on the east end of Long Island, which has been found and sent us from England. A curious circumstance about this is that while it is dated 12th June, 1639, it refers to the colonists "being drove off by the Dutch from the Place where they were by me Planted," which appears to have been done in May, 1640. In Howell's "History of Southampton" these deeds are given, taken from the town records and from records at Albany, and attention is called to the "manifest error" in the date.

Know all men whom this p'sent writinge may concerne that I James Farrel of Long Island Gent Deputy to the Rt honble the Earle of Starling Secretery for the Kingdome of Scotland doe by these p'sents in the name and behalfe of the said Earle of Starling & in my owne name as doth or may concerne my selfe give up all Rights Titles Claimes & Demands of and from all Pattent Right of all those Lands lying and being bounded betweene Peaconeke and the Easter most point of Long Island with the whole Breadth of the said Island from Sea to Sea with

STERLINE

In the p'sence of JAMES RAMSEY JOHN JOHNSON vera Copia.

(State Papers - Colonial; Vol. IX, No. 34.)

The following account is largely taken from Howell's "History of Southampton, N. Y.," and is based on the records published in N. Y. Col. Doc. II, pp. 144-150.

The next we hear of the Lynn "undertakers" was on the 10th of May, 1640, at Manhasset at the head of Cow Bay, (or Schout's Bay, as the Dutch called it). Here they found the arms of the Prince of Orange erected upon a tree, and Lieut. Howe, the leader of the expedition, pulled them down. But the Sachem Pewhawitz, who had just before ceded all his rights to the Dutch, promptly informed Gov. Kieft that "some foreign strollers" had arrived at Schout's Bay, where they were felling trees and building houses, and had "even hewn down the arms of their High Mightinesses."

Commissary Van Curler (Corlaer) was sent to ascertain the facts, and the

Sachem's story was found to be true.

The arms of the State had been torn down, and in their place "had been drawn an unhandsome face, all which appears strange to us, being a criminal offence against his Majesty, and tending to the disparagement of their High Mightinesses."

May 13. The Council of New Amsterdam ordered Cornelius Van Tienhoven to arrest and bring before them the "strollers and vagabonds" of Schout's Bay,

who had so insulted their Dutch dignities.

On the next day, with two officers and twenty men, he started on his mission of ejectment, and arrived at the clearing May 15, finding one small house built and another unfinished.

"They were first asked what they were doing there, and by what power or whose authority they presumed to settle on our purchased soil, and told them

they must show their commission."

Eight men, one woman and a little child made answer that they intended to plant there, and were authorized thereto by a Scotchman who had gone with their commission to Red Hill.

Secondly, they were asked "for what reason did they throw down their High Mightinesses arms, and set up a fool's face in the stead?" to which some answered, "the escutcheon was cut down by a person who is not present;" another answered, "such was done in their presence by a Scotchman, James Farrett, and he and Lieut. Howe were then at Red Hill."

Hereupon six men, namely, John Farrington, William Harcher, Philip Kertland, Nathaniel Kertland, Job Sayre and George Wells, were brought to Fort Amsterdam, leaving two men and a woman and a child on the ground to take

care of their guns. They arrived on the 15th of May.

At the subsequent examination the following facts appeared: they went to Long Island to settle, from Lynn, Mass., and others were to follow. They came under authority of James Farrett, with consent of Gov. Winthrop of Massachusetts Bay Colony. It was intended to bring twenty families, and many more would come if the land was good.

They should have lived free, under their own laws, and would have been

obedient to whomsoever was lord of their land.

Job Sayre, on examination, said he was "born in Bretfordshire!" [Bedfordshire: he was examined through a Dutch interpreter]; was "twenty-eight years old"; and "had resided in Lynn, Mass."

As the name of Thomas Sayre does not appear as one of the six arrested, he was perhaps one of the two men left at Schout's Bay to look after the woman and

child and care for the property.

On May 19 those arrested were discharged "on condition that they promise to deport forthwith from our territory, and never to return without the Directors'

express consent."

Accordingly, the little colony sailed through Long Island Sound, and around the eastern point of the Island, to Peconic Bay, landing at what is now called North Sea, a little hamlet about three miles from the village of Southampton, whence they took up their march through the woods to find a place for their new homes.

The first attempt at a settlement here was in a place now called the "Old Town," about three quarters of a mile from the main street of the present village.

Here they remained about eight years.

In 1648 Thomas Sayre built the house on the town lot apportioned him in that year; which is undoubtedly the oldest English house on Long Island, or in the

state of New York.

It is still habitable, and has never passed out of the hands or occupancy of the family, until in 1892, upon the death of Mrs. Sarah (Sayre) Larry, it fell to her heirs, and was sold to settle her estate. It now belongs to her son, Capt. Larry. It stands on the west side of the main street, north of the academy, cornerwise to the road, a rod or so back from the fence, surrounded by rose bushes and fragrant shrubbery, and shaded by tall trees which are young in comparison to the age of the house. The great chimney, the narrow windows, the massive frame, are all as they were; and the endurance of the old mansion is not yet half tested. The original roof, no doubt, was thatched, as were those of the church, parsonage and jail, built about the same time. And a village ordinance required that a permanent ladder reach from the chimney to the ground, as a precaution against fire.

At first all houses were built facing exactly southward, and so tenaciously was this custom adhered to, that in one case, it is said, a dwelling was placed rear end

to the street, in order that its front door should face the equator.

¹ As there was a possibility that this might have been Hertfordshire in the original and an error made in copying, advantage was taken by the author, during a visit to The Hague, to examine the original document in the royal archives, through the courtesy of our American minister, and the name was found to be as above stated.

Job's Lane, or the Academy Lane, was originally a portion of Thomas Sayre's

homestead, and was given to the town as a thoroughfare by his son Job.

Since this description was written several small houses have been put up on Main Street in front of the "old Sayre house," and a fine Public Library has been erected on Job's Lane so that the house is not now visible from the streets. venerable relic is now neglected and efforts should be made to purchase it by the town and preserve it as an historical monument.

Thomas Sayre was a prominent man among the founders, as appears from the following extract from the town records:

October 10, 1649: at a General Court he was one of three men chosen "to agitate town business, and they are to have the same authority that the five men had the last year." This is the first record extant of the choice of town rulers, and he may have held office earlier.

October 6, 1651, he was one of the five men chosen "for governing of town affairs"-"to act and order all town affairs whatsoever excepting matters of admitting of inhabitants or giving of lands."

October 6, 1654, he was chosen one of three "Townsmen."

March 6, 1657, he was chosen at a town meeting as one of six men "to act and conclude concerning a difference concerning land which east Hampton men make within our bounds."

At a court, May 2, 1657, he was one of seven men chosen "to have the managing of the present affair of the town concerning the safety thereof and get all men to lay down themselves in respect of their persons and estates to be disposed of by the said seven men in a way of righteousness."

At a court, June 19, 1657, he was one of five men "chosen to lay out roads and view fences."

December 9, 1658, at a town meeting, he was chosen to be "overseer formending the bridge."

October, 1648, he "was allowed for his basedrum the sum of thirteen shillings, and his year begins the said day." There being no church bells, a drummer was employed to go round the town and summon people to church and town meetings.

The meaning of the two following items is not quite clear:

At the general court, October 23, 1650, "it was ordered that Thomas Sayre shall duly train with the company of town soldiers at their days appointed, excepting his personal pursuing of the Indians in a hostile way, or to go forth against the common enemy."

October 6, 1653, "It is concluded that Thomas Sayre shall have paid unto him by the town ten shillings as an allowance unto him for some pitts that he emparted to the highway, for which he was to have allowance by order made formerly when Mr. Wells and Mr. Gibbons were here."

He was probably of a quick temper, and not slow to express his opinions even about those in authority, as is evidenced by the following:

November 18, 1644, "Thomas Sayre was censured for some contemptuous carriage to Mr. Gosmer, being Magistrate, to pay ten shillings and to make public acknowledgment of his offense, which if he shall refuse, then to be liable to pay forty shillings."

March, 1653, "Thomas Sayre and Joshua Barnes for speaking unseemly and unsavory words in the Court or concerning the Court were fined to pay ten shillings each. Note—ye fines remitted upon their acknowledgment March 6, 1654."

He was doubtless liberal of heart. The town records publish only one occasion where contributions were made for those in distress, and on that occasion it relates: "At a town meeting, February 4, 1656, a contribution was made for Goodman Gouldsmith, because of his loss by fire" (house burned by Indians); of the contributors (of wheat) one only gave more than Thomas Sayre.

His name appears as a juror nine times in the period from September, 1653, to September, 1658.

At the original settlement of the town each settler was allowed a "home lot" and certain other lands, and subsequently other lands were divided among the original settlers or those to whom they had disposed of their rights; each lot was designated as a 150-pound lot, and there were forty-one allotments made at the several divisions.

February 2, 1653, there was a "division of lands called Sagaponack," and he drew lot No. 4, 150, and 50 of lot 13.

February, 1654, at the "Seaponack Division," he drew lot No. 2 and 50 of lot 25.

1657, at the "Eastward allotment of meadows at the Beach," he drew lot 47 and part of 15.

March 5, 1651, the "little plains" allotment was made, and Thomas Sayre drew No. 25, and "is to have 50 out of No. 29."

A second "division of the little plains" took place shortly afterwards, and he drew as in the foregoing allotment.

He signed the call for the town meeting to arrange for the reception of Governor Lovelace in 1668.

He was a farmer and a tanner. In 1667 he gave five acres to each of his four sons.

He died in 1670.

His original will, with autograph signature, is preserved in the office of the Surrogate, New York, and is recorded there in Liber I, folio 63. It reads as follows:

In ye name of God, Amen. I, Thomas Sayre of South Hampton on Long Island in the Com. Nov: Yorke, being in perfect strength of mind, blessed be ye Lord for it, but weake of Bodye, not knowing ye day of my appointed change doe make this last Will and Testament, in manner following:

Imprimis. I give and freely bequeath my Soule unto God that gave it and

my Body unto earth from whence it was first taken.

2d. I give unto my sonne ffrancis Sayre 2 acres of land lyeing next unto his own in Copt Neck in ye Great Playnes and 2 acres more of land lyeing in ye Eight acres Lotts in ye said Great Playnes, a pewter fflaggon, a Pewter Bowl, and great Pewter Platter.

3d. I give unto my sonne Daniell Sayre, 2 acres of land lyeing next unto ye above said two acres in ye said Eight acre Lotts, and three acres more of Land

lyeing in the Ten acre Lotts, and one great Pewter Platter.

4th. I give unto my sonne Joseph Sayre, ffourty pounds Sterling to be paid him by my Executor Ten pounds per annum to beginne wth in five years next after my decease, to be paid in good Merchant's Shoos or other pay that will procure Hides towards his setting up as a Tanner.

5th. I give unto my daughter Damaris Atwater ffourty Shillings. 6th. I give unto my daughter Mary Price ffourty Shillings.

7th. I give unto my daughter Hannah Sayre Twenty pounds to be paid at her day of marriage or when she shall be eighteen years of age which shall first happen and that my Executor doe keep her Cow and Calfe and their increase for her untill she shall be either married or in some other capable way to maintain them.

8th. I give my household goods to be equally divided between my sons Job and Joseph and Hannah, and that when they be divided, Hannah have her first

choice of ye partes.

9th. Lastly. I by this last Will and Testament have made my son Job Sayre my sole Executor to receive all my Worldly estate, both of Housing, Lands, goods and Cattle and Debts due to me from any person or persons, and to pay all debts due from me and all Legacyes specified.

In witness whereof I have hereunto sett my hand and seale this 16th day of

September, 1669.

Job Sayre admitted executor of his father's estate.

Whereas Job Sayre of ye Towne of Southton in ye East Riding of Yorkshire upon Long Island did at ye last Court of Sessions held in that Towne for ye Rideing afores' make proofe of the Last Will and Testament of Thomas Sayre, his father, deceased, wherein the said Job is left Sole Executor of all his Estate, Goods and Chattels, and ye said Executor having given in Security to ye Court for performing the particulars in ye said Will expressed, according to ye Law in such cases provided, the original Will and Testament remaining in ye office of Records, These are to certify all whom it may concerne that ye said Job Sayre is admitted to all Intents and purposes executor of the Last Will and Testament of him ye sd Thomas Sayre, his Father deceased: Hee haveing hereby full power and lawful authority to Doe and execute all things whatsoever in the said Will and Testament is required, of which he is to return an accot wthin one yeare and a Day after ye Date hereof, and thereupon take out a Quietus as in ye Law is sett forth.

Sealed with ye Seale of the Office and Dated at New Yorke this first day of April in ye 23d yeare of his Ma^{ties} Reigne, Anno D. M. 1671.

The children of Thomas Sayre, in the order of names as they appear in the will, possibly not in order of birth: in the distribution of the "household goods" the name of Job precedes that of Joseph, and there are reasons for conjecturing that the former was the older:

 - "Father-in-law" was, however, sometimes used for "stepfather"; and it is possible that Sayre had married Eleanor, the widow of Edward Howell, the father of Edmund.

Job Sayre.

Of Job Sayre, the brother of Thomas, but little is known. He was born in Bedfordshire, England; baptized at Leighton Buzzard, January 13, 1611; had sixty acres of land allotted to him in Lynn, Mass., in 1638, which he sold to Adam Otley, who conveyed it to Richard Glover of London, by deed dated 16th October, 1644; the said sixty acres of land being described as lying in Rumney Marsh (now the City of Chelsea).

The name of Job Sayre appears in the list of proprietors of Southampton, 1640; member of the First Ward Whaling Squadron in 1644, of Freemen 1648-9, and of Inhabitants in 1649.

His name is not found in the Division of Plains lands in 1651, and as no allotment was made to any representative, he had evidently sold out his interest and removed, or had deceased without children surviving. That he probably

removed would appear from the fact that a Job Sayre witnessed an affidavit of John Treworgy at Pascataway (now Dover), N. H., Oct. 25, 1650.

This was probably the same Job, but whether he was at Pascataway temporarily, or whether he had settled there, we have so far been unable to learn.

In Savage's "Genealogical Dictionary" he is called son of Thomas Sayre; but this is an error. Howell, in his "History of Southampton," follows Savage's lead. In the first edition he states that Thomas Sayre was born in 1593, which in the second edition he changes to "about 1590."

CHAPTER III.

THE PIONEERS.

2 FRANCIS² SAYRE was born probably in Bedfordshire. He lived at the North End in Southampton, L. I.; married Sarah (probably Wheeler). She was doubtless the daughter of Thomas Wheeler and Alice, his wife, of New Haven, Conn. The latter, after the death of her first husband, married Josiah Stanborough, of East Hampton, L. I., and died about December, 1673, as appears from the following from Suffolk Co., N. Y., Records, Sessions Book No. 1, page 288:

The estate of Widow Alice Stanborough was inventoried Dec. 22, 1673.

After the inventory is the following:

"We John Wheeler Francis Sayre and Joshua Horton have divided the goods belonging to her estate to our satisfaction. John Wheeler is to pay all debts, and to have all outstanding dues. No will is found and yet there may be a will. But if any will is found it shall not affect the above agreement." It is signed by John Wheeler, Francis Sayre and Joshua Horton and witnessed by Samuel Mulford and Enoch Fithian.

The court finds that the above are the persons to whom of right the estate

belongs and ratifies the agreement.

John Wheeler having a double portion is to pay half the court charges. Francis Sayre is to pay the other half and to recover half of such sum from Joshua Horton.

They call themselves brothers and speak of Alice Stanborough as "our mother."

The date of above agreement was January 9, 1673.

Francis Sayre's name appears in list of inhabitants in 1657, and in Whaling Squadron, Fifth Ward, in 1657 and 1667; he signed the call for a meeting on reception of Gov. Lovelace in 1668. In tax levy for 1683, he was assessed on 2 polls and £178.

He was chosen Overseer April 1, 1681, and Trustee of Southampton April 4, 1693.

Mr. William S. Pelletreau copied from an old fragment of town papers, torn and almost illegible, the following: "Monday, Jan. 13, 1667—laid out to Francis Sayre, next to his own in ye rear division, 40 poles East and West, and 18 poles North and South, for 5 acres."

A deed from Francis Sayre to Job Sayre dated February 5, 1694, recorded Liber A of deeds, page 76 (Riverhead), conveys:

Three acres of land lying and being in ye great plains in a necke commonly called by ye name of Captain's Necke, being bounded as followeth: on ye north side with ye land of Job Sayre aforesd and on ye south side with my own land and on ye east & west end with highways, with all ye fencing.

A deed from Francis Sayre to Job Sayre, dated March 22, 1696, recorded Liber A of deeds, page 76 (at Riverhead, N. Y.), conveys:

All ve housing, land, meadows and commonage as followeth viz: ve house and home lot No. 4, was my father's as aforesd and eight acres in Captus Necke, bounded on ye south with ye land of me, ye sd Francis Sayre and north with ye land of Thomas Lupton & east & west with highway, & twelve acres more of land in ye great plains & ox pasture as it lies in several divisions & parcells & thirty acres of land fronting to long spring path bounded north with ye land of John Post & south with ye land belonging to yee children of John Moppam, deceased & west with a highway or common land & ten acres more of land adjoining to ye north side of John Post's home lot bounded north & west with highways & east with ve land of Daniel Sayre & two third of a twenty acre lot of land lying at a place commonly known by ye name of Sagabonnack bounded on ye south end with ye beach and with ye land of sd Pierson on ye west & with ye land of John Jeffery on ye east, my own third being included a highway on ye north end of both party of the whole lot & a hundred of meadow & upland in Potunk & a hundred of meadow and upland in fourth necks as they fell by lot in these divisions & a hundred of meadow in ye division at Acquaboug, and hundred of meadow and upland in a twenty acres division in hogg necks & a hundred pound alotm't of commonage and all other mesuage of land & priviledges.

He died January 20, 1698.

His will reads as follows:

In the Name of God Amen & in ye 10th year of the reign of our soverigne of England, Scotland, France & Ireland, King, Defender of ye faith &c., I, Francis Sayre of ye towne of S. hampton in ye County of Suffolke & Province of N yorke being by ye blessing of Almighty God in health of body & of sound memory & conceiding ye fraile state of all mortalls, Doe make, ordain this to be my last Will & testament in manner & form following (viz) I do hereby revoke, make void & null all former wills of mine of wt nature or kind soever. And bequeath my soul to God that ge it me & my body to be decently buried and after funeral charges and all my just debts are paid I dispose of my worldly estate as followeth, viz:

I give & bequeath unto my eldest son, John Sayre, all that my certain tract of land with his dwelling house thereon standing at flying point only according to an agreement formerly with him made to pay unto his brother Caleb Sayre thirty pound & his mother to have ye use of half sd house during her life.

Secondly. I give unto my son Thomas Sayre & his wife Patience during their naturall lives all that my certain piece of about — acres be the same more or be it less as it is now fenced and lies adjoining to ye north side of my long springs close of land and a rood of ground as it now fenced be it more or less with his now dwelling house thereon standing and two acres of land in ye first necke in ye great plaines in ye first necke and if my sd son Thomas shall have any heir or heirs of his body then I give the sd land unto ye sd heir or heirs forever.

Thirdly. I give and bequeath unto my seven children, namely John, Thomas, Francis, Jonathan, Ichabod & Caleb Sayre and my daughter Damaris Howell two third parts of all my movable estate, my cart & plow tackling only excepted to be equally amonst them my above named seven children divided only my sd daughter Damaris to have liberty to chose what she will have for equall seventh

part in of sd two third parts of my movable estate aforesd.

Fourthly. I give and bequeath unto my well beloved wife Sarah Sayre all that my one half of ye land above named & given to John & one third part of my land

& houseing hereinafter given & bequeathed to my son Ichabod for her subsistance during her natural life and one third part of all my moveable estate to be divided unto her by my executor. And she my said wife to have her choice of what roomes, she sees fit of my dwelling house soe that it makes not above one third

of my said dwelling house.

Fifthly. I give & bequeath unto my son Ichabod Sayre & to his heirs & assigns forever all ye rest of my land & meadowes of what kind, nature or quality soever that I have, doe or may possess in ye Court of sd town of Southampton and not before in this my will demised & given with my dwelling house & barn only reserving to my wife what is above mentioned, viz: one third part of same during her life and then I say it is my will that he my said son Ichabod shall enjoy all my land and meadows to him & his heirs forever That I have not mentioned to be given to my son John or Thomas Sayre. I also give unto him my said son Ichabod Sayre my cart & plow with all tackling & utentialls thereunto belonging or appertaining. And I doe hereby make & ordain him my s^d son Ichabod Sayre, Executor of this my last Will & Testament willing him to pay unto his youngest brother Caleb Sayre ye full sum of forty pounds currant money of this Province when he sd Caleb shall attain ye full age of twenty one years and that he doe in every part & article see & perform this my last will & testament according to the true intent & meaning hereof. That ye whole estate of my movables (funeral charges, just debts, carte & plow, tackling onely excepted) be by him my sd son Ichabod Sayre duely & truly paid to my sd wife & children in such manner and proportion as above mentioned & expressed and that he doe pay ye sd sum of forty pounds to his brother Caleb out of his owne estate. And I doe also given unto him my sd son Ichabod and his heirs forever a fifty pound alotm' of commonage and all increase of land thereon arising. And for ye full confirmation of this my last will & testament I have hereunto set my hand & seal. in Shampton afores^d this 14th day of January Anno Dom. 1697.

By the tenour of these presents know y^e that on y^e 20th day of Sept. 1698 at y^e manor of St. George in y^e County of Suffolk before Coll William Smith, Judge of the Prorogative Court in y^e County above s^d was proved & approved the last will & testament of Francis Sayre late of Shampton in y^e s^d County, deceased, on y^e 20th day of January Anno Dom. 1698 who by his said Will & Testament did nominate & appoint his son Ichabod his Executor to whom was granted the administration of all & singular the goods chattels & credits of y^e s^d Deceased.

13 FRANCIS,3 b. June 17, 1669, at Southampton, L. I. Died probably in Elizabeth, N. J., whither he had removed before 1696-7, at which date he subscribed 3s towards the support of Rev. John Harriman, Presbyterian minister at Elizabeth. His wife Sarah administered on his estate Nov. 6, 1708. Her maiden name was Whitehead. Married 1st Ogden, then Brown, then Francis Sayre.

In the settlement of Joseph Ogden's estate, Nov. 20, 1705, Francis Sayre was exect. Isaac Ogden called the latter "his father-in-law." "Father-in-'law" here probably means "stepfather," Francis Sayre having married the widow of Joseph Ogden, who died prior to Feb. 28, 1690. The widow of Francis Sayre, Sarah, afterward married Azariah Crane.

3 DANIEL² SAYRE, was born probably in Bedfordshire. He is named in a list of inhabitants of Southampton in 1657. Was in the Whaling Squadron in 1657-1667, and was assessed in 1683 on three polls and £207 3s. 4d. He lived at Bridgehampton and was a weaver. He married, first, Hannah Foster, daughter of Christopher and Frances Foster; and, second, Sarah —.

On the fragment of the town record referred to on page 26 is the following: "Monday, Jan. 13, 1667, laid out for Daniel Sayre, on the north side of Francis, 46 poles east and west, and north and south 52 poles for 15 acres."

He died in 1708, having outlived all his brothers. His will, dated Aug. 21, 1707; probated Apr. 13, 1708; recorded in N. Y., Liber 7, folio 480, reads as follows:

In the name of God Amen. The 21st day of August 1707 I Dan' Sayre of Southampton in the County of Suffolk and province of New York husbandman

being aged and crased in body but of perfect mind and memory thanks be given unto God therefor, calling unto mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to dye, do make and ordain this my last will and testament, that is to say Principally and first of all I give and recommend to the earth my body to be buried in decent Christian Buriall at the discretion of my executor and as touching such worldly estate Whearwith it hath pleased God to bless me in this life. I give Demise and dispose of the same in the following manner & forme vist 1sth Imprimis I give & ffreely bequeath unto Joseph Savre Daniell Savre Hannah Topping the wife of M^r Josiah Topping and my son Samuel Though deced yet his children come in for his equall part with his Brethren with my son David Sayre to these I give my Tow negro Slaves called by the names of Gordg and Moll. These to be sold by my son-in-law Josiah Toppin and my son Daniel Sayre and the money that they fetch is to be equally devided amongst my children before named and Samuells children are to divid his fift part equally between them. 2! I give to my son Ephrem [Ephraim] Sayre ffive shillings in curr money of New York as an addision to what he hath already Received 314 I give and frely Bequeath unto my son Nathan Sayre and to his heires & assigns for Ever my dwelling house Barn & Buildings, Lands, meadows comonages & all my estate movable & immovable personally & Reall that I am possessed of at the time of my Departure out of this life By the sd Nathan Sayre his heires & assigns to be possessed & inioyed and do constitute make & ordaine the sd Nathan Sayre my sole Ext of this my last Will & Testament to have & receive all my estate Whatsoever & to pay out these Legases Before mentioned according to the true intent & meaning hearof and I do hereby utterly Disallow, Revoak and Disannull all & every other former Testaments, Wills Leaggecies and Bequeasts & Ex¹⁵ By me in any ways before named Willed & Bequeathed Ratifying & Constituting this & no other to be my last will & Testament In Witness wearof I have hereunto sett My hand and seale the day and year above written.

4 JOSEPH ² SAYRE, born probably in Bedfordshire, married Martha ——. On the fragment of town records mentioned on page 26 is the following:

"Monday Jan. 13, 1667, laid out for Job and Joseph Sayre on the north side of Lieut. Post's, by Francis Sayre. on ye South side 51 poles; on the north side 48 poles; on ye East side 30 poles, on the west side 32 poles, for 10 acres."

He removed from Southampton in 1665 to Elizabeth, N. J., and was named as one of the proprietors in Elizabeth in a deed from Richard Nicholls, Governor. He signed a petition to the Governor in December, 1667; was a witness there October 4, 1671, and took the oath of allegiance to the Dutch September 11, 1673.

He was a tanner as well as a farmer, and received £40 in merchandise by his father's will towards setting him up as a tanner. He also received one third of his father's household effects, from which possibly it might be inferred that at that date he was not yet married, or had just begun housekeeping.

April 11, 1676, a warrant for the survey of 180 acres of land at Elizabeth was issued to him.

Hatfield's "History of Elizabeth" (pp. 167-183) gives the following list of lots, at Elizabeth, belonging to Joseph Sayre:

His house-lot of 5 acres was bounded on the North by Robert Bond; West, by the Mill Creek; East, by the Highway, and South by Benjamin Homan.

He had also 9 acres of upland in the plaine, adjoining Daniel De Hart; also 12 acres of upland adjoining Rev. Jeremiah Peck and Stephen Osborne; also 22 acres of upland on the small neck adjoining Rev. Jeremiah Peck and Joseph Meeker; also 9 acres of upland on the Mill Brook adjoining Robert Bond and Robert Vauquellen; also 36 acres of upland near a swamp and adjoining George Pack; also 35 acres of upland adjoining Hurr Thompson; also 10 acres of meadow at Woodruff's Creek; and 4 acres on Elizabethtown Creek. In all 142 acres.

This list cannot be complete, as it does not include the 180 acres mentioned above nor the land referred to in this item:

"In 1699-1700 John Megie drew a 100-acre lot between Joseph Sayre and Benjamin Lyon and the foot of the mountain."

In 1694 he subscribed \mathcal{L}_{I} towards the support of the Presbyterian minister, Rev. John Harriman.

He died in 1695. His will, dated December 4, 1695, was apparently proved the same day, and reads as follows:

In the name of God, Amen, I, Joseph Sayre of Elizabeth Town in ye county of Essex and province of East New Jersey, Yeoman, Being weak and sick in body but of perfect understanding and memmory as at any other times, Doo Make, Ordain, and appoynt this my last Will and Testament, hereby nulling and Makeing voyd and of none effect any and all manner of will or wills, Testament or Testaments whatsoever by me made at any time here before Either by word of mouth or in writing, by these Psants Establishing and Confirming this to be and Remain my last Will and Testament In which first I bequeath my Soul to God who Gave it and my body to ye Dust out of we'l it was taken to Reicive a Decent Christian buriall, and for that worldly Estate we'l God hath endowed me with I Dispose of

as followeth viz: Imprimis. I give and Bequeath unto my wel beloved wife Martha and to her heirs and assigns for Ever the One third part of all my moveable Estate; (one Ox, one Cow, one Steer Come Two year old and one heipher Come three year old only excepted w^{ch} at y^c making hereof Doo properly belong to my son Thomas Sayre,) and further I Give and bequeath unto my s^d Wife the one third part of all my Houseing and Lands During her widowhood.

Item. I Give and bequeath unto my wel beloved Son Thomas Sayre all my now Dwelling houses and Barn and home lot to y^e s^d Thomas, paying to my Sonne Ephraim Sayre y^e summe of five pounds Currt money when he comes to

ye age of one and twenty years and to his heirs and assigns forever.

Item. I Give and bequeath unto my s^d Sonne Thomas Sayre and to his heirs and assigns forever my bay lot of Meadow with all y^e priveleges and apurtenances

to ye same belonging.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my Sonne Daniell Sayre all that my lot of land lying and being in Elizabeth town aforesaid Joyning to ye land of benjamin Trotter and to his heirs and assigns forever, and all my Right in ye new field and ye one half of all that my lot of Meadow lying and being by Mr. Woodruff's Creek, ye whole lot being by Estimacon Ten acres of Meadow be ye same more or be it less.

Item. I Give and bequeath unto my Sonne Ephraim Sayre and to his heirs and assigns forever all that my lot or Piece of land lying and being In ye Great Neck of sd Elizabethtowne Joyning to ye land of Joseph Meaker being by Estimacon twenty two acres of land be it more or less and all my share of land in partnership with Benjamin Meaker, Joseph Meaker and Jhon Thompson, Deceased; and ye one half of what my lot of Meadow by Mr. Woodruff's Creek above named and all other Rights and priviledges in Elizabethtowne aforesd to me belonging not disposed of in ye above Donations (namely of lands and heridatements) I Equally Devide between my three sonnes above named.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my sd Sonne Ephraim Sayre one Good Cowe

and one of ye biggest of my Pewter platters.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my four children, namely, Thomas, Daniel, Ephraim and Sarah all ye Remainder of my moveable Estate to be Equally De-

vidid among them.

Item. 5 JOB 2 SAYRE may have been born in Lynn or at Southampton. At the latter place he married, October 27, 1670, Sarah ——, who died October 29, 1684; and second, June 18, 1685, Hannah Raynor, widow of Arthur Howell.

January 13, 1667, there were laid out for him five acres, as mentioned on page 26. He was chosen Constable of Southampton, April 1, 1682; Commissioner, April 1, 1686; and Trustee, April 4, 1693.

In 1683 he was taxed on two polls and £,164 10s. od.

He was Recorder of Southampton for years; he gave the town the land for the highway known as Job's Lane and Academy Lane.

The following item from the N. Y. Colonial MSS. at Albany, Vol. XXXII, p. 120, is quite obscure and its meaning is not clear:

SUFFOLK, SS.

To ye Honble Judgs and Woppfull his Majestyes Justice of ye Peace in Court of Oyer & Terminer, Novembr ye 12th 1685. The most humble Petition of J. Laughton Most humbly sheweth, That whereas yo' Poore Petitioner was through his Ignorance Led into A Snare in ye Pleading of A Case for Job Sayre hee therefore humbly Confesseth his fault and Prayes yo' Hon's Mercy and favore therein that his ffine thereby may bee Remited According to yo' Wonted Clemency In the Like Maner and your Petitioner for yo' hon's health & happins shall as in Duty hee is Bound Ever Pray.

I give Bequeathe Grant Devise and Dispose of the same (both personal and Reale) in manner and form following (That is to say)

(All my Just Debts & above bequeathed Legacies first thereout Paid and Discharged) all the Residue and Remainder of my said movable Estate I give and bequeath unto my three nephews, namely Ezekiel Sayre, Benjamin Sayre and James Sayre (sons of Job Sayre of Southampton in the County of Suffolk and Province of New York my Brother) to be equally Divided to and amongst all three of them my said nephews part and part

equal and alike.

Item. I give grant Devise and bequeath unto my well-beloved nephew Benjamin Sayre herein above named and to his heirs and assigns for Ever all that my now dwelling House and home lott Scituate lying and being in Elizabeth Town afores^d with all the appendages and appurtenances thereto belonging and appertaining to be possessed thereof at the time of the Decease of my said Wife if she remain Intirely my Widow untill her Death or otherwise if she happen after my Decease to be married to another man then at the time of such her Remarriage and from thence forth To Have and to hold the said Dwelling House and home Lott with Liberties priviledges and appurtenances to the same belonging and appertaining unto him the said Benjamin Sayre his heirs and assigns forever—and Also all other my Lands in said Elizabeth Town—I give grant Devise and bequeath unto my said Nephew the said Benjamin Sayre his Heirs and Assigns forever to be possessed thereof Immediately after my Decease.

Item. I order and appoint my said Brother Job Sayre above named to Receive and take the care of all such Legacys above herein given and bequeathed to those who are under age till they arrive to full age. And to acquit and Discharge my Executrix and Executor thereof upon his receipt of the same

I make appoint and ordain my said Wife Sarah and my said Trusty ffriend said Benjamin Price Jun' the Executrix & Executor of this my last Will and Testament Praying them in the name of God to se the same Executed acording to the true Intent and meaning thereof. And I do utterly Revoke and make void all former Wills and Testaments by me at any time heretofore in any wise made and Declared and do hereby Rattify and Confirm this to be my only last Will and Testament. Joseph Walters, of Newark, about 1688, gave his estate to "cousin Jonathan Sayre."

On May 1, 1697, the Proprietors of East Jersey deeded to Jonathan Sayre, of Newark, certain real estate.

In the Colonial MSS. at Albany (Vol. LV, p. 6), May 3, 1711, Jonathan Sayre is referred to as "Master of the good sloop Unity bound for New York."

Vol. LV, p. 116, July 11, 1711, records a receipt from "Jonathan Sayer," dated at New Haven, for 11 bbls. of pork and beef to be delivered to his Excellency Col. Hunter, in New York, "on my arrival there."

Newark, N. J., records:

In 1716 Jonathan Sayre had 70 links of fencing on the common line — the fence beginning at Bound Creek and running north to Main River.

In 1721 he was surveyor of highways in Newark, N. J.

Early copies of the "New York Post Boy" mention Captain Jonathan Sayre's vessel as sailing from Boston to East Jersey.

He died at Newark, N. J., in 1732, aged fifty years, as stated on his gravestone. Probably an error in age, and more likely sixty years. His wife, ———, died before December 14, 1727, the date of his will, which was probated June 23, 1732 (1733?).

His daughter, Hannah Ogden, was executrix. The witnesses were Caleb Sayre, Benjamin Coe, and Abigail Coe.

Ichabod Sayre is mentioned in a list of inhabitants of Southampton, L. I., in 1698.

He was part owner of a whaler, April 18, 1711. (Vol. LIV, p. 188, of Colonial MSS., Albany, N. Y.)

At a meeting at Southampton, April 7, 1712, to settle rights in common, Ichabod and Thomas Sayre each received one quarter by Samuel Cooper.

Ichabod was elected Clerk and Constable at Southampton, April 6, 1725, and Trustee in April, 1730, '33, '37, '41.

18 JOSEPH ³ SAYRE married Priscilla —. Oct. 1, 1686, he bought at Southampton lot No. 18. On July 15, 1690, he sold a lot he had of his grandfather Christopher Foster. He was chosen Trustee of Southampton, April 3, 1694.

He moved to Fairfield, Cohansey, Salem Co., N. J., in 1697, being one of the company of original purchasers (from Connecticut and Long Island) who settled that place in that year. The terms of settlement are set forth in "Agreement between ye purchasers of Fairfield," recorded in Salem Deed Book, No. 6, p. 169, &c. This "Agreement" assigns to Joseph Sayre two hundred acres as his portion of land. The land records show several conveyances to and from him. Fairfield is now in Cumberland County, which was set off from Salem County in 1748. He was named as a Justice of the first Court of Records, Salem, N. J., June 2, 1705, Sept. 17, 1706.

His will, recorded at Trenton, Liber I, folio 265, was dated April 10, 1710, and probated April 19, 1710. The inventory of estate was £337 15s. od. The will reads as follows:

19 DANIEL³ SAYRE, of Sagg. L. I., born 1666 at Southampton, L. I., married Sarah ——, who was born 1667, and died May 15, 1733.

On Sept. 13, 1706, Nathaniel Bishop conveyed land in East Hampton to Daniel Sayre, Weaver, of Southampton.

In 1712-13, land at Montauk was sold to Daniel Sayre, yeoman, which he sold in 1717.

He was chosen Collector of Southampton in 1712.

In 1730-31, Daniel Sayre, of Southampton, "Gentleman," is mentioned in a deed.

Vol. LIII, p. 103, of Colonial MSS. at Albany, under date of June 23, 1709, reads:

The Council have agreed that Daniel Sayer and Mordecai Holman shall be Lieutenants to the company of Col. Schuyler, and desire you will fill up their commissions accordingly, to the end they may not be detained longer in Towne.

RIP VAN DAM, THO. WENHAM, JOHN BARBERIE, A. D. PHILIPSE.

This was indorsed: "Order to fill up Commissions for Capt. Lt. & Captain of Coll. Schuylers Company, Suffolk."

Daniel Sayre was called also Captain Daniel Sayre.

Vol. LIV, p. 188, dated April 18, 1711, in a letter from Daniel Sayre, gives names of whalers, and mentions that Ichabod Sayre was part owner of a whaler.

Vol. LIV, p. 181, March 30, 1711, states that Daniel Sayre submitted to the Governor a report of the number of whales killed near Long Island Coast.

He was Sheriff of Suffolk Co., N. Y., 1711-12.

He was Justice at Southampton, 1718 to 1733.

At a town meeting to draw lots in Cedar Swamp, April, 1727:

Daniel Sayre, Jr., 1) 150

East Hampton Records, II, 293, March 4, 1713, read: Nathaniel Hand conveys to Daniel Sayre, yeoman, land at Wainscott in East Hampton, bounded North by highway, South by John Hopp, East by town land, west by Thomas Osborn and Daniel Sayre aforesaid. 12 acres, house and orchard.

Page 373, Daniel Sayre, yeoman, conveys 26 acres at Wainscott, June 25, 1717. Page 427, in list for 1727, to put cattle in at Montauk, "Captain Sayre £,16 6s 8d."

A deed from Daniel Sayre to Nathan Cooper, dated January 7, 1724, recorded June 21, 1724, Liber "B," page 131, conveys:

One certain tract or parcel of land situate, lying and being in the bounds of the town of Southampton, in ye county & collony abovesaid, being bounded on the East by the common land belonging to ye sd town, on the West by the Long Pond, on the North by the lane of Eliphalet Clarke, on the South by the land of Nathaniel Woodhull, Containing by estimation twenty-four acres be it more or less.

Vol. III, Southampton, p. 20, March 20, 1731, Daniel Sayre conveys "to Jonah Pierson half of my North lot I had of my son, bounded West by Morehouse's land, South by land I sold Job Pierson, East by Hedge's land, North by highway."

He died May 11, 1748, and was buried at Mecox, L. I.

His will, dated May 22, 1747, probated June 16, 1748, recorded New York, Vol. XVI, p. 331, reads as follows:

In the name of God, Amen. The 22nd day of May in ye year Anoque Domini 1747 I Daniel Sayre of Southampton in the County of Suffolk & in the Colony of New York Esqr being in age and weak in body but of perfect mind and memory thanks be unto God therefore Calling to mind the Mortality of my Body and Knowing it is appointed for all men once to dye do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament. That is to say principally and first of all I give and Recommend my soul into the hands of God that gave it and my body I recommend to the Earth to Buried in Decent Christian Burial at the Discretion of My Executors nothing doubting but at the general resurrection I shall receve ye same again by the Mighty power of God and as touching ye or such worldly Estate wherewith it has please God to bless me in this life I give Demise and dispose of ye same in ye following manner and form. Imprimis I order that all my lands and Meadows and Buildings within the Bounds of Southampton shall be sold by way of Publick vendue at the Discretion of my Executors. Item I give to my son Daniel Sayre 20 Pounds and my Pistil and one silver spoon Item 2nd I give to my daughter Hannah Smith 50 pounds in a Bond payable the first day of April next ensuing by John Conckling. Item 3 I give to my daughter Mary Ludlam 20 pound and to her three daughters Mary Sarah and Pheby Ludlam ten pound each if they live to age of 18 y^{rs} Item 4 I give to my daughter Ann More 50 pounds and one silver spoon. Item 5 I give to my grandson Daniel Sayre Son of Ethan Sayre deceast 30 pounds. Item 6th I give to my grandson Silas Sayre, son of Silas Sayre deceased if he live to the age of 21 thirty pounds Item 7 I give all the rests of my Estate Equally among the 12 children that are grandchildren to me. 6 of my son Ethan Sayre deceast Sarah Elizabeth, Abigail John Nathaniel and Noah. If they live the males to the age of 21 and the daughters to the age of 18 and six of my son Silas Sayre deceased Sarah Ezekiel Elizabeth Abigail Hannah David if they live the males to the age of 21 & the daughters to the age of 18. I make and ordain John Sayres and my grandson Thomas Cooper to be my executors of this my last will and Testament & I do hereby utterly disannull Revoke and disallow every other former Will or Testament and Executors by

me in any ways before named Wiled and Bequeathed Ratifying and Confirming this and no other to be my last Will and Testament In Witness Whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal day and year above written.

20 SAMUEL³ SAYRE removed to Elizabeth, N. J., where, in 1696-7, he subscribed 6s. towards the support of Rev. John Harriman. He died before August 21, 1707, on which date his father mentions in his will "the children of my deceased son Samuel." There was a Samuel "Sayer" who served as juror in 1682 in court at Salem, Mass., and who afterward signed, with others, the "humble and solemn declaration of regret for the part they had borne in the witch trials." (From "Salem Witchcraft," by Chas. W. Upham, Vol. II, p. 475.) The names of the children are not positively known, but probably were as follows:

21 DAVID³ SAYRE, of Cohansey, N. J., married —. In 1709 he was Overseer of the Poor, and in 1718 Surveyor of Highways. In 1714 the inhabitants of Cohansey refused to pay taxes because assessed by a Roman Catholic; among them was David Sayre. In June, 1715, all these persons, yeomen of Cohansey, were indicted for resisting the constable and refusing to pay taxes. What the result was is not known.

His will is recorded at Trenton, N. J., in Liber V, folio 95; dated February 16, 1741; probated December 8, 1744, and March 29, 1745.

26 DANIEL³ SAYRE married Elizabeth He was a farmer in Elizabethtown, New Jersey. The New Jersey archives state that on September 12, 1700, Daniel Sayre and other inhabitants of Elizabethtown went to Newark and took from the Sheriff the keys of the prison, and liberated Joseph Parmenter, then in custody. We have no further explanation of the matter. At a town meeting of the inhabitants of Elizabethtown held August 2, 1720, he was appointed one of a committee of seven freeholders, or trustees, for the disposal of the common lands, and to defend the title of the people to their inheritance. He died in

His will, dated February 26, 1722, probated June 3, 1723, is recorded in Trenton, New Jersey, in Liber A, folio 246, and reads as follows:

In the Name of God Amen the Twenty Six Day of February in the ninth year of the Reign of our now Sovereign Lord George of Great Brittain France and Ireland King Defender of the Faith & in the Year of our Lord Christ One Thousand Seaven hundred & Twenty two; I Daniel Sayres of Elizabeth Town in the Province of New Jersey in America Yeoman calling to Remembrance the Uncertainty of humane Life & being in Sound & disposing memory, Praised be God Therefore,

And in case my son Nehemiah does not pay to my son James the above said £20 in the time above said Then I do give to my son James and to his heirs and assigns forever all my 10 acre lott I have given to my son Nehemiah 6th I give and bequeath to my daughter Susannah the sum of 10s. also I do give to my son in law Mr. Timothy Johns the sum of 10s. being in lieu of what I had given to my daughter Elizabeth in my former will in her life time. Also I give to my daughter Abigail the sum of 10s. 7th and lastly I constitute and apoint and ordain and make my 2 sons namely Nehemiah Sayre and Benjamin Sayre my only sole and joynt executors of this my last will & testament and I do hereby disallow revoke and disanull all and every other former Testament Will and legacy request and executor by me in any wise before this time named willed and bequeathed ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last will and testament. His will, dated July 6, 1740, probated September 17, 1753, reads as follows:

The 6th of July, in the year of our Lord 1740, I, Ezekiel Sayre of the town of Southampton County of Suffolk & Colony of New York Blacksmith being in perfect health of body & mind thanks be unto God for it but calling to mind the mortallity of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to dye, Do make and ordain this my last will & Testament That is to say Princably & first of all I give and recommend my soul into the hands of God that gave it hoping through the merits, death & passion of my Saviour Jesus Christ to have full & free pardon & forgiveness of all my sins & to inherit everlasting life & my body I commit to the earth, to be decently buried at the discretion of my executors hereafter named nothing doubting but at the general resurrection I shall receive the same again by the mighty power of God & as touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me in this life I give demise and dispose of the same in the following manner & form that is to say first, I Ezekiel Sayre blacksmith do give and bequeath unto my beloved brother Joseph Sayre cordwainer of the town of Southampton and County of Suffolk and province aforesaid 200 Acres of land lying scituate & being in the County of Orrange to him and his heirs forever it being a tract of land purchased of Edward Blagg of New York, joyning to Hezekiah Howell & Co. and do likewise give to Joseph Sayre the half of my moveable estate and the other half of moveable estate I give to my honored Mother Susannah Sayre, wife of Job Sayre. I constitute & ordain James Herrick joyner of the town of Southampton County of Suffolk

& province of New York to be my sole executor of my estate and I do hereby utterly disallow revoke and disanul all and every other former testaments wills & legacies, bequests and executors by me in any ways before this time named, willed and bequeathed Rattifying & confirming this & no other to be my last will & testiment.

37 THOMAS & SAYRE, born at Southampton, July 1, 1696; married Rachel Abbott. He removed to Cohansey, N. J., about 1716, and, according to Shourd's "History of Fenwick Colony," settled on land bought of William Hall, near Maskell's mills. He subscribed £5 towards building the Presbyterian church there in 1735. The children named below are those given in Shourd's We think it an error, and that Thomas (37) was the Thomas Sayre whose will is recorded at Trenton, dated October 10, 1758, and probated March 11, 1761, in which he is described as a cordwainer of Hopewell. He made his wife Mary sole executrix, and divided his plantation where he lived equally between his wife and his son David, and made other bequests to his son Benjamin (probably the elder son), his daughter Hannah, and his granddaughters Philathia, and Rhoda Sayre. A deed recorded in Liber W, folio 83, at Trenton, dated December 24, 1757, shows that Thomas Sayre, cordwainer of Hopewell, had bought land in Hopewell, February 18, 1722, and had conveyed part of it to his son Benjamin by deed dated November 5, 1753. We have not been able to further trace these children named. Thomas (118) and James (119), mentioned below, may be children of David (64), but as we cannot demonstrate that theory we conclude to follow Shourd.

He removed after 1762 to Cape May County, N. J., where he died about July, 1779. In his will he is described as "Jonathan Sayre, Senior," a cordwainer. His will, recorded in Trenton, dated January 4, 1777, was probated July 12, 1779. Amount of inventory, £853 16s. 8d. His wife Sarah and son Jeremiah were made executors. To the former he left for her lifetime all his cleared land and the woodland "for firing," and the house and movable estate. The timber in the Cedar Swamp was to be sold to pay debts. To son Christopher he left fifty acres of woodland on the north side of tract bought of Spicer, and to son Jonathan, fifty acres of woodland on the south side of said tract. To son John, half of the home plantation after the death of his wife, half of the Sedge Island, half of the Cedar Swamp, and half of the remainder of the tract bought from Spicer. To son Aaron, the other half of the several properties given to John. To daughter Sarah and son Jeremiah, £10 each, to be paid by John and Aaron. John and Aaron were minors, and if they died before reaching the age of twenty-one years, their portion was to go to son

He bequeathed to his son Ichabod land bought of Lemuel Wick, and other land to be equally divided between Ichabod and Stephen. He married first, Mary Gibbons, daughter of Richard Gibbons, and second, Patience Reed, daughter of Thomas Reed, of Hopewell, Cumberland County, N. J. He had a farm near Roadstown (originally known as Sayre's Crossroads), in Hopewell and Stowe Creek townships, near Greenwich, Cumberland County, N. J. He subscribed £4, in 1735, towards building the Presbyterian church there.

In 1731 he was Constable, in 1747, 1748, and 1749, first Sheriff of the newly organized county of Cumberland; August 9, 1748, he received a commission appointing him Lieutenant of a militia company, of which Jonathan Holmes was Captain; in 1752–53 he was Clerk of the Board of Chosen Freeholders; and in 1754 and 1757, Sheriff. In 1776 he was a Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, and for many years Justice of the Peace.

His will, dated November 26, 1785, probated May 24, 1786 (Liber XXVIII, folio 168, Trenton, N. J.), mentions the following:

Wife, Patience; grandsons, Eli Elmer and Leonard Sayre; three grand-daughters, Theodosia Remington, wife of Moses, Mary Wood and Charlotte Wood.

She died in 1730, aged thirty-seven. He was a Constable of Cohansey in 1714–15. His will, dated December 27, 1715, and probated January 24, 1716, reads as follows:

In the Name of God Amen I Joseph Sayre of ye Lower Precinct of Cohansee in ye County of Salem & Western Division of ye Province of New Jersey being sick in Body but of a sound & perfect memory through God's Goodness Do make & constitute this my last will & Testament in manner & form following, yt is to say, I give & bequeath my soul unto ye Hands of Almighty God my Maker & Redeemer & my body to be bury'd in Christian Burial according to the Discretion of my Executor: And as for such Temporal Estate or Worldly Goods as it hath Pleased Almighty God to bestow upon me I do hereby dispose thereof as here followeth, namely, Imprimis I give & bequeath unto my Loving Uncle Ephraim Sayres the Sum of thirty pounds lawfull lawfull currency: Item I give & bequeath to my Dear Sister Tamison Vaunce the sum of five Pounds of ye same lawfull Currency. Item, in case my wife should proove with child at ye Time of my Disease, I give & bequeath unto that Posthumous Child in case he or she shod live to ye Age of eighteen years the sum of Forty Pounds lawfull currency. Item, all Debts Legacyes & Funeral charges being payd I give & bequeath unto my beloved wife Margarett Sayre two third Parts of all ye rest & residue of my Goods & chattell & personal Estate whatsoever. Item I give & bequeath ye value of the other third Part of my said Goods chattels & Personal Estate whatsoever to my Dear children Joseph & Richard Sayre to be equally divided between or ye issue of their Bodyes then Living by my undernamed Executor when they come to ye Age of twenty years or to ye Survivor of them in case ye one shod happen to die afore ye age of twenty years not leaving issue or in case both my said children shd. happen to die without issue afore they arrive at ye Age of twenty, then ye said Third Part of my personal Estate or value to be equally divided by my undernamed Executor between my Surviving Brethren or their Heirs. Item I give bequeath & devise unto my beloved Wife Margarett Sayre for & during the Term & time of her natural Life the one third Part of all my Lands, Tenements & real Estate whatsoever & after her Decease to my said children Joseph & Richard Sayre in case they be then arrived at ye Age of Twenty years Else to my undernamed Executor till they arrive at such an Age. Item I give bequeath & devise to my son Joseph Sayre all the Lands, Tenements, Hereditaments & their Appurtenances whatsoever wch I had from my deceased Father Joseph Sayre scituate bounded & butted as expressed in ye Will of my said deceased Father & six Acres of marsh or Meadow Ground wch I bought of Frederick Garison situate bounded & butted as expressed in yo Deed of Sale with I had from yo said Frederick together with ye one moyty or one half of all ye Proprietaory rights wch I had from my said deceased father, not yet disposed of, taken up or to be taken up, to be occupy'd & enjoy'd by my said son Joseph Sayre when he comes to ye Age of twenty years in case my foresaid wife be then deceased Else to thirds

then & the other third part at ye time of ye Disease of my foresaid Wife Margarett Sayre Item I give bequeath & devise unto my son Richard Sayre one Tenement of Lands with its Appurtenances wch I bought of my Uncle Ephraim Sayre bounded & butted as by ye Deed of Sale wch I had from my said Uncle as doth & may appear together with ye other moyty or other half of all the proprietory Rights aforesaid to be occupy'd & enjoy'd by him ye said Richard Sayre when he arrives at ye age of twenty years, for himself his Heires & Assignees for-ever or in case my wife Margarett Sayres be Alive at his ye said Richard Sayres my sons coming to ye Age of twenty years then two third Parts then, & ye other third part at ye decease of my said wife. Item in case one of my said children Joseph Sayre or Richard Sayre shd happen to die afore he arrives at the Age of twenty years as aforesaid not Leaving Issue of his body then living when he shd have arrived at such an Age then I give & bequeath all ye foremeentioned Lands tenements & Proprietory Rights above bequeathed to ye child so dying, to his surviving Brother or ye Issue of his body then Living wn he shd have arriv'd at ye Age of twenty years as aforesaid. Item in Case both my said Sons Joseph & Richard shd happen to die afore they arrive at the Age of twenty years not leaving issue of their bodies then living, Then I give bequeath & devise ye forementioned Lands, Tenements & Proprietory Rights to be equally divided between my then surviving Brethren or their Heires they or their Heires at ye time of their having thereof paying ye sum of thirty pounds Lawfull Currency to my sister Tamson Vaunce if then Living or to her children if any be then living: Item I give & bequeath my foresaid Children during their Minery to my beloved wife Margarett Sayre to be maintained, brought up & educated in a Christian Way suitable to their place & station, but in Case my undernamed Trustees or overseers & Executor shall think my said children or any of them, not to be maintained brought up & educated as aforesaid I do hereby authorise & empower them to take my said children & to dispose of them as they see cause in order to their being so brought up during their minority. Item I name, constitute & appoint Jonathan Fythian & Ephraim Geily to be Trustees or Overseers & my Loving Uncle Ephraim Sayres to be ye sole Executor of this my Last Will & Testament. Hereby revoking & disannulling all former Wills & Testaments by me made or Declared. In Witness whereof I have made this my last Will & Testament to be read & published & do hereunto put my hand & seal this twenty seaventh day of December in ye year of our Lord God 1715.

His will, dated September 12, 1736, probated August 1, 1738, mentions that he is preparing a voyage to England, and gives to his sister Mary Pledger, wife of John Pledger, Jr., £10, and an iron pot which was given to his brother Joseph by his mother. To his sister Ann Johnson, £10, and an iron pot and brass cettle (sic). To his loving brother Robert Johnson, £10, when of age. (These were half-sisters and -brothers.) 55 DANIEL ⁴ SAYRE, born at Southampton, L. I., was called "Daniel Tertius" in a list of inhabitants of Southampton in 1698. He married Phebe, daughter of Isaac Rayner. He moved to Elizabeth, N. J., about 1730, and bought a farm at Connecticut Farms, about half a mile west of the church, on the road to Scotch Plains, extending to the Rahway River. He died in 1763.

His will is recorded at Trenton in Liber H, folio 256, dated January 29, 1763, probated May 30, 1763, and reads as follows:

In the name of God amen the twenty-ninth day of January In the second year of his majstys Reighn George the third by the grace of god King Defender of the faith &c. and in the year of our Lord Christ seventeen hundred sixty & three, I, Daniel Sayer of the Boro of Elizabeth & Countey of Essex & province of East New Jersey yeoman being varey sick and weake of body & of Perfict Mind and memory Thanks be given to Allmighty god thairfor. Calling to mind the mortality of my bodey and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do thairfor make this my last will and Testament In maner and form following that is to say Principally and first of all I Surender and Commit my Sole in the hands of god that gave it and as touching my bodey I Recomend it to the Earth to be buried in a Christean like decent maner at the discretion of my executors hereafter named nothing doubting but at the generall Resurrection, I Shall Reseve the saim again by the mighty power of god and as for such Worldly Estate Wharewith it hath Pleased god of his goodness to bless me in this life, I give devis and Bequeath as followeth first my will is that all my just & lawfull debts be payed out of my moveable Estate.

Imprimis I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Phebe & to her heirs & asighns my Negrow woman Ruth and the one third of my moveable Estate after my Debts be payed and I give unto my s^d wife the free use and possession of the one Equal third part of my farm & buildings during har natroal Life Excepting

that part which I gave to my son Daniel.

Item I give and bequeath unto my loving Son Daniel & to his hairs and asighns all that small plantation which I purchesed of my Son John Sayer Bounded East by the land of John Seving North by the land of Samuell Higans west & South by highways by Estemation containing thirtey five acors on Condition that my s^d Son Daniel shall pay the sum of fiftey pounds Courant Money at 8 pr. ct. which shall be aded to Encreas my moveabel estate & pay my debts

and legeseys.

Item I give and bequeath unto my two loving Sons John and Abraham Sayer all the remaining part of my homsted farm to be Equily divided between them part & part with the Condition that they shall provid for & mentain & keep my Dafter Phebe Comfortabely during her natural life and as nither of my s^d sons is mareyed if thay or Either of them Shuld so continu til death thin his or thair part of my farm so gave shall be equally Divided amongs all my surviveing Childring but if Either or both of my S^d sons shuld marey & have a Child that then and in that cais his or thair part shall be free and clear to him or them & thair hairs and asighns. Item I give and bequeath to my five Dafters which air mareyed vz. Hannah Smith, Sarah Terrel, Abegeal Brokfeald, Marey Higans & Elizabeth Smith to Each of them the Sum of ten pounds Curant money at 8 prct. together with what thay have allreadey Reseved.

Hem I give & Bequeath unto my two loving granddafters vz. Jemima & Marey Higans the sum of ten pounds Each of them to be Raised out of my moveabel estate & put out to Intrest by my Executors until thay severally arive to age of Eighteen & then to be payed by my Executors & if either of my sd granddafters shuld die befor that age than her part shall be payed to the

Surviveor of them.

Item Whairas I have a small plantation setuate & leying on the mountain which I purchesed of Joshua Morehous my will is that my Executors shall maike Sail of the said plantation at thair Discretion & the money arising thairby shall

be aded to Encreas my moveabel Estate.

Item, I give and bequeath all the Remainding part of my moveable Estate to be Equaly Divided amongs all my Dafters, and I doe hereby make & Constitute My Loving & trusty sons Daniel Sayer and Jacob Brockfeald and my Loveing and trustey friend John Stits all of the Boro & Countey aforesaid Executors of this my Last will and Testament Revoking & disanuling all former or other wills Testaments & legaseys heretofor by me maid or dun Ratfying allowing & holding this and no other to be my last will and Testament.

154 ABRAHAM⁵ was not married at date of his father's will, and, doubtless, never married.

Following is a copy of an advertisement that appeared in the "New Jersey Journal," of Elizabeth. The application referred to has been diligently sought for in the record offices in Trenton and Newark, but in vain. As far as can be ascertained from the scanty records, Daniel ⁶ Sayre (472), called "Daniel Sayre 4th," must have previously purchased from Abraham Sayre, who is believed to have died unmarried in Newark about the year 1800, his half of the farm referred to in the advertisement, and subsequently purchased the other half from the heirs of his uncle John. Rev. Menzo Rayner, of Elizabeth, N. J., and several Rayners of Hempstead, L. I., in 1798 conveyed to Daniel Sayre 4th their interest as heirs of one ninth part of John Sayre's estate, but their kinship has not been discovered.

Wednesday, December 14, 1796. Notice is hereby given, that upon application to me by Daniel Sayre of Elizabethtown, Essex Co., N. J., who claims an undivided ½ part of all that tract of land, which formerly belonged to Daniel Sayre, the elder, deceased, which was given and bequeathed by the last will and testiment of the said Daniel Sayre the elder, unto his 2 sons John and Abraham Sayre, to be equally divided between them, subject to the creditors and limitations, in the said will mentioned, and expressed, which said tract of land, so given undivided, is situated, lying and being in Elizabeth Town aforesaid, bounded easterly by the land possessed by John Allen; southwardly, partly by land possessed by Henry Jefferies, and partly land formerly of John Stites, Esq., deceased; westwardly by Rahway River, and northwardly by the road, or highway leading from Conn. Farms to the Scotch Plains. I have nominated Jonas Wade, Esq., David Crane, Esq., and Joshna Winans, commissioners to divide the said tract of land into 2 equal shares or parts; and unless proper objections are stated to me, at the house of Mr. Ferd Cotter, innkeeper in Elizabeth Town aforesaid, on the fourteenth day of February next, the said Jonas Wade, David Crane and Joshna Winans will then be appointed commissioners to make partition of the said land, pursuant to an act entitled "An Act for the more easy partition of lands held by copartners, joint tenants and tenants in common." Passed the 11th day of November 1789.

56 ISAAC⁴ SAYRE, of Bridgehampton, N. Y., married Elizabeth, daughter of John and Sarah (White) Smith. She was born November 26, 1699, at Haddam, Conn. Her mother was a daughter of Captain Nathaniel White, and granddaughter of Elder John White, of Haddam.

Isaac Sayre on December 22, 1721, "declares ear mark" at Southampton.

In the Southampton town book, Vol. II, p. 187, is an account of the proceedings of the Commissioners of Highways, in 1726, in rectifying the highway between Hezekiah Topping's and Isaac Sayre's corner; and also "between East Hampton line and Isaac Sayre's land, we have laid out a highway to the beach."

He died in 1726.

His will, New York surrogate's office, Liber X, folio 413, reads as follows:

In the Name of God Amen the 14th day of this instant December in the 12th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lord George and in the year of our Lord God 1725 I, Isaac Sayre of Southampton in the County of Suffolk in the colony of New York Husbanman being very sick and weak in body but of sound and perfect mind and memory and calling to mind the mortallity of my body knowing that it is appointed for man once to die do make and ordain this to be my last will and testament, and 1st I give my soul to God that gave it and my body to be commited to the earth to be decently buried at ye discretions of my executors hereafter named, And touching such worldly estate as it hath pleased Almighty God to bless me with I give and bequeth as followeth And first I will that all my just debts be paid in convenient time after my decease 1st I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Elizabeth Sayre the use and improvement of all my lands houseings and moveable Estate until my son Isaac Sayre shall arrive to the age of 21 years, provided she remains my widow but and if she shall marry sooner then the use of my aforesaid lands and houseing to be for the use of my child or children and one half of my moveable estate after my debts are paid to be and remain hers forever and the other half to be my child or children's but if my wife remains my widow after my son arrives to the age aforesaid then she shall still hold and injoy the $\frac{1}{3}$ part of my houseing and $\frac{1}{3}$ of all my lands dureing her widowhood. But if my child or children die before he or they arrive to the aforesaid age then my will is that my wife shall have all my moveable estate and twenty pounds forever the said £20 to be paid her by my executor.

2 I give and bequeath to my son Isaac Sayre to him his heirs and assigns forever all my houseing and lands provided he shall live to the age of 21 yrs or shall

have a child or children lawfully begotten of his body.

But if my wife be now with child and have a son and it lives, and it lives to the age of 21 yrs or to have issue lawfully begotten of his body that then I give and bequeath to him his heirs and assigns forever my Lot called Johneses Lot bounded on the S. part by Josiah Peirsons Land and on the W. by the land of John Stanbrough deceased and part by the land of Robert Norris. But if she shall have a daughter then my will is that my son Isaac Sayre shall give it at the age of 18 years a good bed and furniture and 2 new suits of apparel and £40 currant money of the collony of N. Y. My will is further that if my child or children die before he or they arive and live as above said then I give and bequeath to my brother Silas Sayre to him his heirs and assigns forever all my aforesaid housing and lands provided he shall have lawfull issue in case he will pay to my Sister Ann Sayre £6 in N. Y. money. But and if my brother Silas Sayre die and leave no issue lawfully begotten of his body then my aforesaid housing and lands I give and bequeath to brother Ethan Sayre to him his heirs and assigns forever. And I do ordain make constitute and appoint my beloved wife executrix and my brother Silas Sayre executor to this my last will and Testament And if he shall be taken away by death before this my last will and testament be proved and approved that then my brother Ethan Sayre shall be executor to this my last Will and testament with my wife.

My will is further that if my wife die remaining a widow what I have given her in this my last will and testament be given to my child or children if there be two and I do hereby disanul revoke and disallow all former wills testaments and

bequests by me made heretofore.

Ratifying and confirming this and this alone to be my last will and testament whereunto I have set my hand and fixed my seal the 14th day of this instant December in ye 12th yr of his majesties Reign Anno Domini 1725.

Probated March 21, 1726. Executors sworn Aug. 30, 1726.

After the death of Isaac Sayre, Elizabeth, his widow, married Jeremiah Ludlow, who was born in Southampton, L. I., and removed to Elizabethtown, N. J., and to the vicinity of New Providence, N. J., about 1737. He died Aug. 1, 1764, aged sixty-seven years. His widow died March 13, 1790, aged ninety-one years. In the family Bible of Isaac Sayre, Jr., the record of the death of his mother, Elizabeth Ludlow, appears: born in 1699, died March 13, 1790.

They had two sons, Jeremiah and Colonel Cornelius Ludlow. The latter was the father of General Benjamin Ludlow, the grandfather of George Harris Ludlow, once Sheriff of Morris County, and the great-grandfather of George Ludlow, Governor of New Jersey in 1881.

57 HANNAH ⁴ SAYRE, born 1690, married first, Captain John Cooper, who was born in Southampton, 1685, and died there December 14, 1715. His will is recorded in New York surrogate's office, Liber VIII.

Hannah married second, on March 3, 1718, Major William Henry Smith, who was born March 13, 1689, and was the tenth child of Colonel William Smith, known as "Tangier Smith" (having been Governor of Tangier), and Martha Tunstall, his wife.

The following record of William Henry Smith is found in the handwriting of Colonel Smith, his father:

Brookhaven, y^e 13th March, $16\frac{88}{89}$ This 13th day of March, 1689, was borne my fifth sonne, William Henry Smith, on a Wednesday, at four o'clock in the afternoon, and was christened by Mr. Ennis. His godfathers, his father and brother Harie; his godmother, his sister Patty.

He settled on a part of his father's purchase at Mastic or Sabonack (St. George's Manor), upon the south side of the island.

He married first, Miss Merrit, of Boston, by whom he had one son, Merrit Smith, who married and died in Connecticut.

He died January 27, 1743. Hannah, his second wife, died April 22, 1763. They were interred at St. George's Manor, with his parents and family.

Y., dated March 3, 1759, from John Nicholl, of New Windsor, in Ulster County, and Frances Nicholl, widow and relict of John Nicholl, deceased, father of John, to Joseph Sayers, a mason, of Goshen, for a £150 lot, No. 32, being one of the south eastern division lands in Goshen, in line of Colvin Bradner, being 172 acres.

His will, recorded in the surrogate's office, New York, in Liber XXVI, folio 64, was dated April 11, 1767, and probated October 31, 1767, and describes him as of Goshen. It mentions his wife, Sarah ——.

He bequeathed 5^s to each of his three eldest sons, they having each "received a child's portion." To his son Daniel he gave £190; to his son Stephen, £220; to his daughter Martha, £100; and £100 to be equally divided among Yost Doree, Garret Doree, Sarah Doree, and Hannah Doree, children of his second wife. To his youngest son, Jonathan, who was not yet of age, he gave his farm. His sons James and John were appointed executors.

The will of his widow, Sarah, of Hamptonburgh, was recorded in Liber A, page 105, at Goshen, dated August 26, 1784, and probated February 12, 1790; and gave all her estate to her daughter Sarah Duryee, excepting small legacies to Peter Nelly Wood, Lenah Duryee, daughter of Garret Duryee, four grandsons (three only named), Yost, Garret, and Joseph.

In the Census of Slaves in 1755 he is set down as owning one slave.

He removed to the southern part of the county, having bought land in Warwick township, where he had a mill, as appears from the following records:

In Liber C, folio 441, of Conveyances at Goshen is a deed, dated July 30, 1766, from David McCamly to Thomas Sayre, for land on "the west side of the highway that leads to David McCamly's mill, and on the road to Captain De Kay's house."

Part of this land he conveyed to his son, Thomas, Jr., April 29, 1777. See Mortgages, Liber A, folio 253, Goshen, "land near Sayre's mill." Also Liber D, folio 4, February 13, 1779.

Will of Wm. Bull, 1755, Liber XX, folio 42, refers as follows:

Son Isaac 200 acres where he lives bounded S. E. by line of my land. S. W. by line called new North West line of Capt. John Evans' Patent. N. E. by land of Stephen Harlow and Thomas Sayres, and to extend so far north as to contain 200 acres . . . To Son Richard . . . bounded S. W. & N. W. by land devised to son John. On page 103 of Elizabeth town book No. 2 the following appears, under date September 28, 1744:

Jacob Brookfield and Ephraim Sayre make application for survey of their lands, the original town book showing the surveys being lost. Ephraim Sayre says his land begins at the N. W. corner of land conveyed to his honored father Daniel Sayre, dec^d, runs thence East 23 chains to the line of Jacob Brookfield, &c.—about 35 acres—bounded S. by West Brook and Daniel Sayre dec^d; E. by East Brook and a road; N. W. and N. E. by Jacob Brookfield; S. W. by John Pike and Daniel Meeker.

An Ephraim Sayre, carpenter, of Elizabeth, died intestate, and his widow, Elizabeth, by a letter dated May 16, 1746, renounced her right to administer upon his estate, and requested that Ebenezer Sayre, brother, and Lewis Mulford, chief creditor, be appointed, which was done. The appraisal of the property was ± 330 , and among the witnesses was Jonathan Sayre. Elizabeth Sayre executed a power of attorney to Lewis Mulford to collect debts due her late husband, which is recorded in the register's office in New York, and she appeared before the mayor of that city in 1754 and duly acknowledged it.

Ephraim Sayre married, in the Dutch Church, N. Y., June 1, 1737, Elizabeth Lynesson, daughter of Gideon and Jane Herres Lynesson, who was baptized in the Dutch Church, N. Y., October 26, 1718. John Sayre (90) was living in New York in 1737, in Broad Street, and his next-door neighbor was Joost Lynesson; and it has therefore been conjectured that it was his brother Ephraim who married Elizabeth Lynesson. As, however, Ebenezer's (91) brother Ephraim was apparently the one who died in 1746, and the husband of Elizabeth Lynesson is assumed to have been living as late as 1782, it is possible that the latter was not a son of Daniel, but a son or grandson of Ephraim, son of Joseph, 2 of whose descendants we have no trace. The name of Lynesson appears later among the descendants of the Ephraim who is mentioned in Littell's "Early Settlers of Passaic Valley" as owning and living on Lot No. 51 of addition to Elizabeth town lots. This was on the west side of the Passaic River, in Morris County, on Long Hill. An unrecorded lease, dated May 7, 1762, is in possession of D. Hobart Sayre, Esq., of Union, from Ephraim Sayre, of Essex County, tailor, to John Bebout, of Morris County, weaver, for one hundred acres of land then in possession of Ephraim, being Lot No. 51 bounded south by Hilley's, east by Lewis Woodruff, west by John Sayre, north by Peter Bebout; also for the meadow in Willow Swamp.

The following advertisement appeared in the "New Jersey Journal" of May 29, 1782, published at Chatham, N. J.:

All persons indebted to the estate of Daniel Sayre, late of Elizabeth, deceased, must pay by 27th June, or they will be proceeded against.

EPHRAIM SAVRE, Administrator.

All persons indebted to the Subscriber on his own account must N. B. pay &c.

I do give and Devise unto my beloved Wife Rachel the one equal half of my Estate both real and personal which I shall be possessed at the time of my Death over and above the above Legacy of Twenty pounds, to her & her Heirs

and assigns forever.

I do give and Devise unto Elias Sayre, the Son of my Brother Daniel Sayre, the other equal half of my Estate both real and personal of which I shall die possessed to him and his Heirs and Assigns forever. But it is nevertheless my intention and Will that my wife Rachel shall be and remain in possession of my whole Estate untill the aforesaid Elias Sayre shall arrive at the age of Twenty one years, upon this condition that she shall take care of and properly bring up the said Elias Sayre in a decent and proper manner having due respect to the Advice, Direction & Desire of his Father in his education.

I do give and Devise unto my beloved Wife Rachel the Choice of the Horses of which I shall Die possessed for a riding Horse for herself with a good saddle over and above the half of my Estate Devised as above.

And Lastly I do hereby Constitute and appoint my beloved wife Rachel and my Brother Daniel Sayre Executors of this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all other Wills and declaring and ordaining this my last Will and Testament. In Witness whereof I have hereunto Set my hand & Seal, this Nineteenth Day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred and seventy six.

Signed, Sealed, published & declared as and for his last Will and Testament by the said David Sayre, in whose presence and at whose request we hereunto set our names as witnesses hereof-

William Sayre, the surviving Witness, Garret Noel being dead and the other being moved away he the said William Sayre being duly Sworn on the Holy Evangelists of Almighty God did depose and say that he saw David Sayre sign and Seal the same and heard him publish pronounce and declare the within Instrument in writing to be his last Will and Testament, and that at the doing thereof he the said Testator was of sound and disposing mind and memory and that the other two subscribing Evidences were present at the same time and signed their names as witnesses to the within will with this deponent and altogether in the presence of the said Testator.

His mother-in-law, Elizabeth Stilwell, of Jamaica, L. I., widow, in her will, dated September 11, 1735, appointed him executor, and left six silver spoons to his daughter Elizabeth. This will was probated November 1, 1753, at which time Sayre was living in Philadelphia, and is described as "a shopkeeper."

He was an extensive real-estate owner in Philadelphia, and was also in the distillery business.

"The New York Post Boy," January 13, 1752, published the following advertisement:

Ebenezer Sayre offers 60 acres for sale at Public Vendue on Tuesday 11th March next. A plantation in the borough of Elizabethtown, County of Essex, upwards of 60 acres, 10 of which is good mowing ground, commodious to the East side of Rahway river within less than ½ mile of Hubbell's mill and on the road to Raritan. Good dwelling house, &c.

Also has 13 acres near it for sale.

He removed to Morris County, N. J., where he bought much real estate.

At Perth Amboy there is recorded a survey for John Harriman and Ebenezer Sayre, dated February 1, 1764, for land bought of David Ogden in Pequannock and Hanover townships, Morris County, for eighty-five acres in four tracts.

He built a house at what was afterwards known as Columbia, near the Passaic River.

He died intestate in 1765, his widow being appointed administratrix.

She subsequently married —— Frost, of Morris County.

The eldest son, Ebenezer, received the real estate by the law of primogeniture then in force.

He was elected, April 3, 1753, Overseer of the Poor at Southampton.

In the drawing of lots at Awcauboge Division of Quogue Purchase in 1763, he drew lot No. 21, ½, and his brother Joseph, ½. Also of Lot No. 1, ¾, 50. Also of "Little Plains Division," drew Lot No. 22, ¾.

February 25, 1764, page 242, Southampton records, Nehemiah Sayre and Joseph Sayre (99), having a 50 in Lot 49, Great South Division, divided it. This is now woodland of the heirs of Julius Sayre, Seponack.

Page 294, Division of Topping Purchase, 1782, Lot No. 31, Nehemiah Sayre, 34. Lot No. 12, heirs of Joseph Sayre.

He "signed Association," 1775.

He lived in 1776 west of Watermill.

In census of 1776 his household consisted of one male over fifty, one between sixteen and fifty, and three females over sixteen.

He died August 4, 1784.

His will, in the surrogate's office, Riverhead, L. I., Liber A, folio 119, dated June 20, 1784, and probated July 1, 1789, reads as follows:

In the Name of God, Amen. I, Nehemiah Sayre of the town of Southampton, in the County of Suffolk and State of New York being weak in body but of perfect mind and memory thanks be given to God therfor, but calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do make this my last will and testament, that is to say, principally and first of all I give and recommend my soul to God that gave it and my body I recommend to the earth to be buried in decent Christian burial at the discretion of my executors and as touching such worldly estate as it hath pleased God to bless me with in this life I give and dispose of the same in the following manner and form (first) I will that all my just debts be well and truly paid in convenient time after my deceas by my executor, hereafter mentioned.

(21). I give to my loving wife Bethiah one bed and furniture with all the household goods she brought with her and also one cow and thirty fore pounds in cash to be paid by my executor also I give her the use and improvement of one third part of all my lands also the use and improvement of one roome in my now dwelling house during her natural life all which I give her in lieu of her

dower.

(3/y.) I give to my three daughters namely Elizabeth, Hannah and Jane twenty nine pounds to each one of them.

(4/y.) I give to my son John Sayre a feather bed and suitable covering and

five pounds in cash for clothing.

(5b). I give to my son James Sayre two hundred pounds in cash also I give him the one equal half of all my land or interest that I have at Susquehanah to

be to him his heirs and assigns forever.

(6ly.) I give to my son Abraham Sayre all my lands and buildings that I have within the township of Southampton to be to him his heirs and assigns forever for which he my son Abraham shall provide for my son John a suitable support and maintenance for him during his natural life he being entitled to my son John's labour. And if any of my children should attempt to recover any legacy by virtue of their grandfathers will that then my will is that he she or they so doing shall be cut off of any legacy in this my last will excepting ten shillings to each of them.

Lastly, I do make and ordain my son Abraham Sayre to be my sole executor of this my last will and testament and I do order and my will is that he my said son Abraham shall pay all my debts & legacies as above mentioned and in case my movable estate should fail or come short of paying that then my will is y' he my executor shall sell land to discharge the debts and legacies. And I do hereby revoke disanul and make void all and every former and other will or wills by me made and confirm this and no other to be my last will and testament.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set to my hand and fixed my seal this

twentieth day of July in the year of our Lord 1784.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my son Benjamin Sayre the house and land with all the buildings thereon which I formerly bought of William Topping the land containing about ten acres be it more or less likewise twenty acres more or less lying at the little pond formerly bought of John Reeve and three acres formerly bought of Silas Howell and five acres of woodland lying between Josiah Hand's land and Daniel Hedges land and ten acres of woodland lying in the bounds of East Hampton between the lands of Ezekiel Howell and Noah Barns to be to him and to his heirs and assigns forever.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my son James Sayre my lot on the North side of the Road containing about eleven acres be it more or less with all the buildings thereon likewise twenty acres of land on the South side of the road be it more or less which land I formerly bought of Joshua Howell to be to him and to his heirs and assigns forever.

Item. I give to my sons David Sayre and James Sayre all my woodlands at Noyack and about seventeen acres of woodland in the bounds of Easthampton in the hollow lot adjoining John Novin's land also about seventeen acres of woodland which I bought of Abraham Cook called Cook's land adjoining Stephen Edwards land also about four acres of woodland lying near Moses Howell's orchard all which several pieces of woodland I give equally to my sons David and James to be to them their heirs and assigns forever.

Item. I give to my sons David Benjamin and James Sayre one quarter of a fifty of Commonage and one acre of orchard at brooked pond to be equal between them and to their heirs and assigns forever.

Item. I give to my son Zephaniah Sayre all my movable estate to him and to his heirs and assigns forever.

Item. I give to my four daughters Susannah, Elizabeth, Phebe and Abigail

the sum of five shillings each current money of New York.

Item. I constitute and appoint my two sons David Sayre and James Sayre my only executors of this my last will and testament and order my executors to pay my just debts and legacies out of the moveable estate left to my son Zephaniah Sayre and I hereby revoke and disannull all other will or wills by me before made ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last will and testament in confirmation whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this

fourteenth day of November in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety one and in the sixteenth year of American Independence.

I hereby promise, covenant and agree, this twenty seventh day of Nov. 1790, previous to my marriage with Mrs. Eliza Dorone that all the property she now has, or may have hereafter by gift, Will or other ways from her Brother Stephen Dorone of the Island of Jamaica, or from James Boswell, Esq., her brother in law, shall be still her own, for her own proper use holding it separately and independently of me, or any of my creditors, in trust. It being agreed that Mr. Jacob Parayra a party to this declaration and agreement shall be the Trustee for the said Eliza Dorone.

It is also agreed and understood that the said Eliza Dorone shall be at liberty to act for herself in all matters regarding her property if by removal out of this country, by death or otherwise it should become inconvenient to consult Mr. Parayra and all such transactions shall be deemed good, valid and conclusive.

dren by my son Samuel William Savre and then to divide the said interest or income in so many equal parts and portions as there may be children living of my said son Samuel and his present wife Virginia and to pay one of the said parts or portions to each of the children — Provided always, and it is my further will and direction, that as the said children, if male, shall respectively arrive at the age of twenty one years, and if female, shall respectively arrive at the age of eighteen years, such child shall receive an equal part or portion of the principal money placed in the stock, the whole to be divided into as many parts or portions as there shall be children living at the death or second marriage of the said Virginia Sayre and provided always and it is my further will and particular desire should my grand daughter Mary Grymes Sayre survive all the children of my son Samuel by his present wife Virginia before they arrive at the age herein mentioned that my Trustee or Executor herein named or his heirs shall pay immediately unto my grand daughter, Mary Grymes Sayre all the original money with the interest that may be due of five thousand dollars in the six per cent stock of the United States, which my friend Dr. Thomas Redman now holds in trust for me. I also give and bequeath unto my said grand daughter a topaz brooch set with diamonds, a gold tooth pick case, S. F. engraved on the lid, also a miniature picture set in gold of my much lamented sister, Mrs. Boswell, with a mourning brooch and ring of her hair, also mourning ring with the hair of my beloved sister Mrs. Courtauld,1 but should my said grand daughter Mary Grymes Sayre die before she arrives at the age of twenty one years I give and bequeath the said trinkets to my daughter in law Mrs. Virginia Sayre.

I give and bequeath unto my son Samuel Wm. Sayre my gold repeater with the chain and seals, also three hundred dollars to be paid to my said son immediately for his family mourning. And I do appoint my said friend Dr. Thomas

Redman Executor of this my last will and testament.

In witness hereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 27th day of October in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventeen.

ELIZABETH SAYRE.

Signed, sealed, declared and published by me the said Elizabeth Sayre to be my last will and testament in the presence of us.

Having omitted to bequeath an annuity in this my last will and testament, I beg this may be considered a codicil thereto. I give and bequeath to my respectable friend and trustee Dr. Thomas Redman a certain annuity of one hundred pounds sterling per annum held by me on the life of the Baroness de Poellnitz and payable at the house of Mess. Thomas Coutts & Co. Bankers London in trust, nevertheless that the said Thomas Redman shall and will pay this said annuity or as much thereof as he shall receive unto my husband Stephen Sayre during his life and from and after his death should the said annuity continue unto my son Samuel William Sayre and his heirs. It is my will and particular desire that my grand daughter Mary Grymes Sayre shall be paid or receive from my trustee Dr. Thomas Redman or his heirs an equal part and portion as there shall be children living at the death or second marriage of my daughter-in-law Virginia Sayre by my son Samuel Wm. Sayre. I mean that my grand

daughter Mary Grymes Sayre shall receive an equal portion or part of the principal money placed in the stock as the children then living of my son Samuel Wm. by his present wife Virginia.

(Signed) ELIZABETH SAYRE.

Stephen Sayre was educated at Princeton College, and was graduated therefrom in 1757, receiving the degree of A. M. in 1760, and a like honor from Harvard in the same year. He was commissioned as Captain of the Suffolk County Company in the French war in 1759. He removed to London, where he became a banker. He was conspicuous for personal elegance and accomplishments, and was said to be the handsomest man in England. He moved in the best society of the kingdom, and was in the confidence of Chatham and other Liberal statesmen of England. He was chosen High Sheriff of London in 1773, and delivered an able speech before the Livery of London on the occasion, from which we quote (Thompson's "History of Long Island," I, 360):

Gentlemen of the Livery: It is impossible for me to express the feelings of gratitude which predominate in my breast upon the present occasion. The honor you have done me calls for a return which a life entirely devoted to your services only can make. I deem myself more highly favored because I am well convinced that nothing under heaven could have induced you to elect me into the office of Sheriff but an opinion of my independence and sincere attachment to the public cause.

I am independent: I will continue so. Upon public grounds only I presumed

to solicit your favor: upon public grounds only I will study to deserve it.

It shall be the labor of my life to convince you that in vesting me with your gracious choice I will strain every nerve in combating our common foe; I will labor assiduously to stop the progress of despotism; at least I will, by a vigorous exertion of those powers with which you have entrusted me, prevent its making any inroads into this great, this opulent, this free and independent city.

But his advocacy of the American cause and consequent opposition to the arbitrary measures of the Administration drew upon him the displeasure of the Government. In 1774 a petition of native Americans residing in London was presented to George II. There were thirty signers in all, and the first name on the list was Stephen Sayre. ("N. E. General Register," XXX, 134.)

In 1775, in a gay and unguarded moment, he let fall some expressions which were seized upon by an officer of the Guards, a native American also, Richardson by name, who charged him with having asserted that he and others intended to seize the King on his way to Parliament, take possession of the city, and overthrow the Government.

He was thereupon arrested and committed to the Tower upon a charge of high treason. He remained a prisoner five days, but being brought before Lord Mansfield, the Chief Justice saw the inconsistency of the charge, and admitted him to bail in £500, with two sureties of £250 each. No prosecution was attempted, and the bail was thereupon discharged.

Mr. Sayre then sued Lord Rochford (who had committed him), the Under Secretaries of State, and the King's Messengers for illegal imprisonment, and recovered £1000 damages, subject to decision of the Court on certain points of law relative to the evidence. This decision was handed down on November 25, 1776, adversely to Sayre, and Sayre suffered heavily in costs. His bankinghouse, Stephen Sayre and Barth-Coote-Purdon, Oxford Street, failed, and he lost everything.

The following is from the London "Public Ledger" of October 25, 1775:

Between the hours of nine and ten on Monday morning Mr. Slavely, of Half Moon Street, Piccadilly, and Mr. Mann, of Queen Anne Street, Westminster, (King's Messengers), attended by a constable, repaired to the house of Stephen

Sayre, Esquire, in Oxford Street.

As an excuse to obtain an interview with him they pretended a forged draft for $\pounds 200$ had been issued by the bank of which Mr. Sayre is a proprietor. He no sooner appeared than they acquainted him that they had an order, signed by Lord Rochford, one of the Secretaries of State, to take him into custody on a charge of high treason, and to search for, take, and carry with them such of his papers as they might deem effectual for their purposes.

Mr. Sayre heard the summons with composure, and obeyed its dictates with manly dignity; conscious of his innocence, he smiled at the malignity of the charge, and in perfect reliance upon his own integrity permitted the officers to

search his tables and rifle his bureau.

They conducted him to Lord Rochford, where they also found Sir John

Fielding.

The charge in the information was that Mr. Sayre had expressed an intention of seizing the King's person as he went to the Parliament house, and of taking possession of the Tower, etc.

The advice of Mr. Sayre's counsel was that he should not answer any interrogations which Lord Rochford or Sir John Fielding might put, nor sign any paper

whatever.

Mr. Sayre was then ordered into an adjoining apartment, and afterwards committed a close prisoner to the Tower.

He was released October 28th on bail.

On the 13th of December, 1775, he appeared at the Old Bailey, and his counsel, Mr. Arthur Lee, moved to discharge the recognizance entered into on the 28th of October last, on Mr. Sayre's being brought before Lord Mansfield upon a writ of habeas corpus.

Mr. Baron Burland, who, with the Lord Mayor, presided at the court, accordingly discharged the recognizance, and Mr. Sayre immediately gave orders to commence actions against Lord Rochford, the Under Secretaries of State, and the King's Messengers.

In Gorden's "History" it is also stated that "in 1775 many suspicions were entertained of combinations in favor of America, and upon certain hints thrown out, Mr. Sayre, an American and a banker in London, was secured; and being examined before the Secretary of State, Lord Rochford, and confronted by his accuser, was committed to the Tower for high treason, on the ridiculous charge of designing to seize His Majesty at noonday in his passage to the House of

Peers, of conveying him a prisoner to the Tower, and afterwards out of the kingdom, and of overturning the whole form of government by bribing a few sergeants of the Guards."

Mr. Sayre, it is said, subsequently served as private secretary to Franklin, though no proof can be found, and was employed in various matters by Arthur Lee, and went in his suite to Berlin at the time of the first suggestion of the project of armed neutrality.

He owned property in New York City, and lived there in 1784; for in the New York register's office, Liber III of mortgages, folio 383, we find the following:

Stephen Sayre, Esq., of N. Y. Mortgages for £1000 to Peter Stuyvesant, May 27, 1784, land bounded South-west by Wall St., South-east by Lot 6, formerly occupied by Lewis Pentard, North-east by James Nevens, and Northwest by Lot 8, formerly owned by Nicholas Bayard, being 25x122, being land granted to Nicholas W. Stuyvesant by John Cruger et al. in 1762 and 1773.

Subsequently he preferred claims for his services in Europe during the war, and for his expenses incurred; but though these claims were investigated by committees of several successive Congresses and were approved by officers of the Government, no appropriation was ever made to reimburse him.

In the possession of one of his descendants is an invitation addressed to him at Alexandria, Va., requesting him to dine with General Washington.

From the "Richmond Enquirer," dated February 25, 1806, we quote the following:

We are informed that Stephen Sayre, Esq., is now in our city and lodges at the Bell [tavern]; he has been on a visit to his son Capt. Sayre.

We hope he may be induced to reside here, as his only son has now a consid-

erable property in the State.

It is well known that Mr. Sayre was Sheriff of London at the commencement of our Revolutionary War; and being too zealous in our cause, he was committed to the Tower, under a pretence of treason against the Government; that he quitted England, was employed by our Commissioners in Paris in 1777 to go to Berlin, that he first prevailed on the King of Prussia to enter into the Armed Neutrality; he then proceeded to Denmark and Sweden, united those two powers in the object, which was finally carried into effect in 1780 by the Empress of Russia, who fitted out 20 ships of the line to support it.

We have made the above remarks because, since his arrival, Mr. Sayre has made some communications to a friend here that must, when publicly known, not

merely excite curiosity, but the wonder of every Citizen of America.

We are informed of a project by the Northern papers to be conducted by General ——, but we had no idea before that his plan was the most extensive, and, above all things, most likely to change the state of affairs through the universe.

He bought an estate upon the Delaware River, near Bordentown, N. J., which he called Point Breeze. This beautiful estate, some years later, was sold to Joseph Bonaparte, ex-king of Spain, who expended large sums in its further embellishment.

The Massachusetts "Spy," or Worcester "Gazette," of September 25, 1816, contains this paragraph relative to Joseph Bonaparte, which it had copied from "The Baltimore American":

This man, it is known, has fixed his residence on a moderate property at Bordentown, N. J., worth sixteen or eighteen thousand dollars. He seems determined to conform to the manners and customs of our country. I saw old Mr. Sayre, of whom he purchased the farm. He said when Mr. Buonaparte came to take possession of that place he was called out from dinner, and found him busily engaged, with his own hands, unloading the furniture he had brought. Something was said about sending for other hands, but he said no—everybody worked in this country.

The city of Bordentown afterwards bought the estate for a public park, known now as the Bonaparte Park.

From the "Richmond Enquirer" of December 10, 1818, we quote:

Died.—At the residence of his son in Brandon, Virginia, on the 27th of September last, Stephen Sayre, Esq., a native of Long Island, in the 85th year of his age; and on the next day his wife also died.

118 THOMAS ⁵ SAYRE. The account given below is based upon Shourd's "History of Fenwick Colony." There is some reason for believing that this pedigree is erroneous, and that Thomas, the father of the children whose names follow, was Thomas ⁵ (207) of the line of David, David, Daniel. But as this cannot be demonstrated, we have followed Shourd. Thomas Sayre married Rachel Dennis. He resided in Lower Alloway Creek, Salem County, N. J. He was a farmer and Justice of the Peace for many years.

His will is recorded in Trenton in Liber XXXV, folio 97. It is dated August 25, 1791, and probated January 8, 1794. His son Dennis was made executor. Abbott Sayre was a witness.

HILDREN.

363 ABBOTT,6 b. 1743; m. Elizabeth Bacon (License) Oct. 16, 1780. During the Revolution he was in Capt. Sheppard's company and was wounded at Hancock's Bridge, March 21, 1778. As he is not mentioned in his father's will he and his daughter are supposed to have died prior to August, 1791.

364 REUBEN, 6 b. Nov. 5, 1746; m. Hannah Stretch, daughter of Bradway Stretch. He was killed at Hancock's Bridge, N. J., March 17, 1778. His widow subsequently married James 6 Sayre (374). It is said that the British searched

his body, and finding no watch, swore he must be a poor Yankee Captain who could not carry a watch! His body was carried away by friends, and his watch found in his boot. His brother Reuel received and carried it till his death, leaving it by will to his son! Reuben, with the request that it should be handed down to a Reuben Sayre, as long as there should be one in the family. It is now held by Reuben Sayre, of Millfield, Athens Co., O.

Johnson's "History of Salem" states that Reuben Sayre was killed by Jonathan Ballinger. Some years after Sayre's son fell into the Delaware River, and was rescued by a person on the wharf. When he recovered he recognized his rescuer as a son of Ballinger, and immediately jumped overboard again, saying he would not owe his life to such a rascal! and was again rescued with difficulty. As Reuben left no children this story is evidently apocryphal.

Reuben left an estate appraised at £1345 8s. 9d., over which a contest arose between his widow and other heirs, which was settled by arbitration Feb. 4, 1779, the widow receiving one third.

365 HANNAH,6 m. Aug. 18, 1768 (date of license), Wade Barker. It is a curious coincidence that on Feb. 23, 1779, a license of marriage was issued to Wade Barker and Hannah Sayre, the widow of Reuben Sayre (364).

366 DAVID,6 b. Nov. 13, 1751; m. Oct. 18, 1774 (date of license), Prudence Keasby, daughter of Edward Keasby and Sarah Quinton, of Salem Co. By a codicil to her father's will, probated Dec. 6, 1779, she received the sum of £2000. His will, dated Nov. 18, 1783, describes him as of Philadelphia, in which city it is recorded in Liber S, folio 439. It gives to his "only son" Edward all his land, and to each of his three daughters £100 on her marriage, or on attaining eighteen years of age.

368 JOSEPH, 6 b. Nov., 1756. He was a soldier of the Revolution. After the War he removed to western Pennsylvania, and thence to Clark County, Ohio, where he died in 1835. He received a pension based upon the following application on file in Washington, D. C.:

STATE OF OHIO SS.

On this fifth day of October 1832 personally appeared in open Court before the Court of Common Pleas, now sitting, within and for said county, JOSEPH SAYRE, a resident of Mad River township in the County of Clark aforesaid, and State aforesaid, aged seventy-six years (within one month) who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath, make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7, 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named

officers and served as herein stated:

The Col. was John Holmes, the Lt. Col. was Benjamin Holmes and the name of the Major was Henry Sparks. This applicant was drafted. His Captain's name was Charlton Shepard, his Lieutenant's name was Benjamin Holmes, son of the Col. and nephew of the Lt. Col. aforesaid. Applicant was

drafted in the month of September, 1775 or 1776, for one month, but served six weeks under the officers aforesaid. At the time applicant was drafted he lived in the County of Salem and State of New Jersey. Applicant after the aforesaid tour was ended, and in the same autumn, volunteered in the militia or "Flying Camp." His Capt. was the aforesaid Shepard and his Lt. was applicant's brother, Ruel Sayre. Applicant was first marched to Trenton where Col. Griffin of Philadelphia took the command for a season and kept it until the troops arrived in Bordentown when Gen. Washington took command. In the meantime applicant was present at an engagement at Mount Holly when the said Griffin commanded the American Troops. The British in that action were victorious. Applicant was at the cannonade of Trenton very early in the year 1777. The day after that cannonade the battle of Princeton was fought and this applicant participated in it from beginning to end. The day after the battle of Princeton he was taken sick and remained so for several weeks. In this tour of service he was employed nearly two months.

In the next autumn applicant was drafted for one month and was joined to a company of which Ruel Sayre, applicant's brother, was Captain, and Benjamin Curlap was Lieutenant, the Ensign he does not recollect. David Potter was commandant of the regiment. The regiment was marched to Philadelphia where they remained about two weeks when they were driven forth by the British troops. Potter was taken prisoner on the retreat from Frankfort. Applicant was, in the same month, in a skirmish at Dr. Otto's (or Auter). He then was marched to Woodbury where he remained until his term of service ended. In the same autumn he was drafted for another month and served it out at Cooper's Ferry, where the body of troops to which

applicant was attached was stationed.

In the month of March following applicant volunteered to prevent the British troops from crossing Alloway's Creek. His Captain was the aforesaid Charlton Shepard, and his Lieutenant, as applicant believes, was Benjamin Curlap, before named. At Hancock's Bridge, the party to which applicant belonged was encountered by a party of the British ten fold more numerous, and all of this applicant's companions were bayonetted — massacred — with the exception of a French boy, who, with this applicant were all that escaped. Applicant was then taken prisoner (on the 21st day of March), and remained in captivity (the principal part of the time), in the "Sugar House" in New York until he was exchanged in the month of October following.

The following are applicant's answers to the interrogatories of the War Department:

He was born in Salem County, N. J., in the year 1755. He has the record of his age in his family Bible.

He lived in Salem aforesaid when called into service. He has since lived in Pennsylvania and Ohio.

He was twice drafted, and once a volunteer. Washington, DeCleave, Newcomb, Potter.

He had no written discharge.

John A. Alexander, Maj. Gen. Samuel Craig, Esq., Elias Baker, and Samuel Shellabarger, Samuel Robinson, Thomas P. Moore, and many others.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the Agency of any State. (Signed) JOSEPH SAYRE.

119 JAMES ⁵ SAYRE was born in Cohansey, N. J.; married ——. Perhaps it is erroneus to place him in this line, and he may have been James ⁵ (208) of the line of David, ⁴ who received mill property by his father's will (see page 69). He was probably the James Sayre who was one of the founders of the Presbyterian church at Logtown in Lower Alloways Creek in 1750. The account of his descendants given below is from Shourd's "History of Fenwick Colony," and is evidently not accurate nor complete. Possibly a fuller account may be received before publication, and, if so, it will be inserted on a subsequent page.

FANNIE BEAUMONT,7 m. Dec. 23, 1875, Dr. Harrison Withrow, who was born Nov. 2, 1841. He enlisted July 20, 1861, in the 11th Missouri Infantry; was promoted to 2d Lieutenant, and was honorably discharged in 1864. He studied dentistry, and is practising (1876) in Petersburg, Ill.

He was a merchant in Newark December 7, 1774. The citizens of Newark chose a "Committee of Observation" for the township, and among them was Jonathan Sayre. Wickes' "History of Orange" states that Grove Street in that village was formerly called Whiskey Lane from the following incident. During the Revolutionary War Jonathan Sayre had stored in a barn on the lane a considerable quantity of whiskey, which was covered with salt hay. A band of Hessians discovered it while they were camped in the vicinity and got drunk on it. It came to be considered common property and everybody filled his jug from it, and the lane became known as "Whiskey Lane."

He died May 31, 1815, and was buried in Trinity Churchyard, Newark. His will, dated April 4, 1815, was probated July 29, 1815, and is recorded in Newark (Liber C, folio 56). It divides his estate into twelve parts, apportioned among his children and grandchildren. If son Caleb desired to keep up hatter's shop which he occupied he was to be allowed to do so.

Whereupon the Court discharged him from his indentures. Thomas Eagles and Martha Eagles [his mother] petitioned the Court in his behalf as above.

He served during the War of the Revolution, from Essex County, and was put on the pension roll August 10, 1833. He died at Newark, N. J., January 26, 1834, aged eighty-six years. After his death the pension was continued to his widow.

The application for pension reads as follows:

STATE OF NEW JERSEY COUNTY OF ESSEX

On this 19th day of September in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Thirty-two, personally appeared in open Court before the Judges of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas holden at Newark in and for the County of Essex, UZAL SAYRES, of the town of Newark, County of Essex aforesaid, aged eighty-five years, who, being first duly sworn according to law, on his oath doth make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th, 1832:

That he was born on the 16th day of September, 1747, and that he has a family record of his age, that he lived at Newark aforesaid at the commencement of the Revolution, that he was then enrolled in an uniformed company of militia commanded by Capt. James Wheeler. The militia companies in the sections of the country where he resided were divided into classes and especially the company to which he belonged, into classes in such manner as that his tour of duty

returned every third month.

In the year 1776, the month he does not now recollect, he marched under command of the said Capt. James Wheeler to Long Island previous to the landing of the British there, and was encamped on the Island for one month at least and did duty as a soldier there until relieved by troops called three months men when he returned home and there, being on the line, was frequently called on occasions of alarms and other occasions, and in this manner did military duty until his next tour.

In April 1777, he served one month tour of duty in Newark under the command of Capt. Joseph Hays, after which he did repeated service in times of alarm in standing sentry, guarding prisoners and property, under the command of Capt. James Wheeler and other Captains whose names are not now recollected, until again ordered out on another month's tour, which next tour took place in the month of July, 1777, and under the command of Capt. Thomas Williams, which service was also performed in the town of Newark, after which he performed duty as before stated in alarms, as a guard, and as a sentinel, whenever called on and which was frequently, until December, 1777, when he served one month under the command of Capt. Elijah Squire, also in the town of Newark, and from the

expiration of that term of service he took his regular tour of duty of one month every third month under different Captains, to wit., Capt. Caleb Wheeler, — Reeves, Samuel Huntington, Elijah Squire, Thomas Williams, Josiah Pierson, Robert Nichols and Matthias Lyon, until the latter part of the year 1782, and between the different months of tours was at all times in readiness and obeyed every call upon him as a soldier and in fact insomuch that he was in actual service as a military man under the command of different officers nearly all the American Revolutionary war. That besides the Captains above named he was acquainted with and often under the command of Col. Van Courtlandt and Major Samuel Hays. James Hedden was Adjutant of the Battalion to which he belonged.

That he was at the battles of Connecticut Farms and Springfield under Capt. Huntington, and followed the enemy each time to Elizabethtown, harassing them. That when the enemy came up from Elizabethtown, passed through Newark, Second River and to Hackensack, he was out doing duty with the regiment and was in the engagement at Second River with their regiment under Gen. Wines, with the enemy who had halted there during the night; that he followed them on to Hackensack and then returned with the regiment to Newark. That he was in repeated skirmishes with the enemy at the ferry near Newark and in particular recollects at least five skirmishes at that place. Recollects recapturing at the ferry a number of cattle that the enemy had stolen and while endeavoring to cross the Passaic River, stuck fast in the mud on the opposite side and were got out by the militia of whom this applicant was one, after driving off the enemy, who retreated to Bergen.

That he did during the war at least eight months active duty under Capt. Caleb Wheeler, brother of James Wheeler, above mentioned, that he did at least two months duty under Capt. Isaac Reeves, that he did at least four months under Capt. Huntington, at least two months under Capt. Thomas Williams, at least two months under Capt. Elijah Squire, at least four months under Capt. Pierson, at least three months under Capt. Robert Nichols, and at least two months under Capt. Lyon, whose names he has before mentioned, besides the duty under the Captains first above mentioned, and that he expressly charges the truth to be that he did at least three years active duty during said war.

He has no documentary evidence and he knows of no person now living whom he can conveniently procure to testify to his services excepting Col. James Hedden, who was adjutant of the regiment to which he belonged, and whose

affidavit is hereto annexed.

He hereby relinquishes every claim to a pension or annuity excepting the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State.

Personally appeared before me the undersigned, a Justice of the Peace in and for the County of Essex aforesaid, UZAL SAYRES, who, being duly sworn according to law, on his oath saith that he is the same Uzal Sayres mentioned in the declaration hereunto annexed made before the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas of

the County of Essex on the 19th of September, 1832, and to the interrogatories prescribed by the War Department he makes the following answers, viz:

1. He was born on the 16th day of September, A. D., 1747, in the town of

Newark, Essex County, N. J.

2. He has at this time a record of his age in his possession in the family Bible.

3. He was living in the town of Newark when called into service on the same spot where he lived at the close of the Revolutionary war where he has lived

ever since and where he now lives.

4. He entered the service by joining an uniform militia company in the town of Newark, commanded by Capt. James Wheeler, and was enrolled therein in 1776; that in that year he did one month of active duty in said company as a private on Long Island; that in April, 1777, he did one month active duty under Capt. Joseph Hays, in the town of Newark as a private; that in July, 1777, he did one month active duty under Capt. Thomas Williams as a private; that in December, 1777, he served one month of active duty under Capt. Elijah Squire as a private and that he did the service hereinafter mentioned during said war up to the latter part of 1782 under the Captains hereinafter mentioned, being out every third month, to wit.; for eight months under Capt. Caleb Wheeler, for two months under Capt. Isaac Reeves, for four months under Captain Samuel Huntington, for two months under Captain Thomas Williams, for two months under Capt. Elijah Squire, for four months under Capt. Josiah Pierson, for three months under Capt. Robert Nichols, for two months under Capt. Matthias Lyon, all as a private, making with the services first above mentioned, two years and seven months service actually, truly, and faithfully performed during said war, and during which service he was not engaged in any civil pursuit, and for such service he claims a pension.

5. He belonged to the Battalion commanded by Maj. Samuel Hays and to the regiment commanded by Col. Philip Van Courtland; that he recollects seeing during the war, Gen. Sterling, Lee, Maxwell and Greene, and for the general circumstance of his services he refers to his declaration aforesaid wherein he has mentioned the same as fully as he now can by reason of his old age, infirmities,

and consequent loss of memory.

6. He never received any written discharge during the war only by word of mouth from his commanding officer, it not then being customary to give dis-

charges to militia men.

7. He refers to Rev. William T. Hamilton, Rev. Philip C. Hay, Rev. Baxter Dickinson, David D. Crane, Esq., Hon. Silas Condit, Hon. Theodore Freelinghuysen, Josiah C. Hornblower, Esq., John I. Plume, Esq., Col. James Hedden, Elias Van Arsdale, Esq., William Pennington, Esq., all of Newark, and to all and any of the respectable citizens of the said town to whom he is generally known.

I Joshua Sayre of the town of Southampton, in the County of Suffolk and State of New York Husbandman being weak in body but of sound mind and memory thanks be to God therefor, but calling to mind the mortality of my body do make this my last will and testament, and principally and first I recommend my soul to God who gave it and my body I recommend to the Earth to be buried in decent Christian burial, and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me I dispose of it the manner following — Imprimis, I will that all my just debts and the legacies be paid in the manner hereafter mentioned.

Secondly. I give to my sons Joshua, Caleb, Silas, and Enoch twelve dollars and fifty cents to each of them. I give to my son Thomas twenty five dollars

and to my grandson James Sayre twenty five dollars.

Thirdly. I give to my son Rufus Sayre and to his heirs and assigns forever the one equal half of my Ocabogue meadow, also give to him twelve acres of land to be taken off the North east corner of wood close adjoining the lane and so to extend so far southward as to make a straight line with the ditch which runs east and west also give to him the one equal half of that woodland which I bought of George Herrick dec'd lying near seven ponds.

Fourthly. I will that my movable estate be sold together with that piece of land called the manor and that lot of land known by the name of Cowpasture lying adjoining John Bishop with my mill that the same be sold by my executors and the money arising from the said sales to go towards paying my just debts and

the legacies above mentioned.

Fifthly. The residue and remainder of all my buildings lands woodlands meadows and commonage (not above demised) I give to my grandson Rufus Sayre to him his heirs and assigns forever but in case of his decease before he come of age then my will is that it go to his brother Rogers or in case of his decease then to his brother James their heirs and assigns forever. Provided however and it is my will that my daughter in law Huldah live in my house and have a home there so long as she remain my sons wife or widow as the case may be.

Lastly I nominate constitute and appoint my son Rufus Sayre and my friend William Herrick joint executors to this my last will and testament and I do hereby invest them with full power to sell the lands above mentioned and ordered to be sold and conveyance of the same to make, and I do hereby utterly disannul and revoke all and every other will or wills testament or testaments by me before made and do ratify and confirm this and none other to be my last will and testament.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF I have hereunto set my hand and seal this nineteenth day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and six and the thirtieth of our Independence.

149 ABRAHAM⁵ SAYRE, born in Cumberland County, N. J., in 1750; married first, January 15, 1779, Rachel Meeker, who died January 13, 1815, aged fifty-one years; and second, Phebe ——.

He was in Capt. James Ewing's Company of Deerfield Militia in the Revolution.

In 1805 he was a member of the Senate of New Jersey, the body at that time' being known as the "Legislative Council."

He lived at the north end of the town of Bridgeton. Elmer's "History of Cumberland County," page 42, states that "Goose Hill got its name from a story that the owner of the farm opposite accused his neighbor, Abraham Sayre, of plucking feathers from his geese; and afterwards, when some of his pigs went astray, he put up a poster, offering a reward, and hoping that Squire Sayre had n't mistaken them for geese, and pulled off the hair."

A libel suit followed, which was afterwards settled by arbitration. This was in 1810.

In 1814 he sold part of his farm on the east side of the main stream in Cohansey to parties who erected a dam for water-power.

This land was subsequently reconveyed to Mr. Sayre, who built a flour-mill upon it. He died October 24, 1819.

He, however, apportioned the land among his brothers, "in accordance with the wishes of his revered father," as stated in the deeds executed by him to his several brothers.

161 ISAAC ⁵ SAYRE, born in Southampton, L. I., 1722. He married Jane Swaine, daughter of Matthias and Catharine Swaine.

His father died when he was an infant, and his mother married Jeremiah Ludlow, and they removed from Southampton to Elizabethtown, N. J., subsequently settling in what is now New Providence Township, Union County, N. J., living between the mountains southwest of Springfield near Summit.

He kept a tavern near Summit during the Revolution, in which it is stated General Washington was on more than one occasion entertained.

"During the battle of Springfield, just below the first mountain, in 1780, many of the Continental soldiers made their quarters in this valley [Summit Township].

Here they could have a good view of the approach of the enemy under the command of General Howe, with his six thousand regulars; and Colonel Dayton's detachment lay near Westfield; while scouts lined the summit, bringing messages from General Washington, encamped with the American army near Morristown, some eight miles west.

"Isaac Sayre's house was the resort of many of these foot-sore scouts, and there they found a welcome.

"His wife, it is said, could not do too much for them. To her last day she recounted the fact that she had entertained General George Washington, and encouraged his men as they came to her mountain home, never turning them empty away.

"The old homestead was, until recently, still standing on the road corner where the old red school-house stood."

On August 21, 1804, the trustees of the M. E. Church of New Providence deeded to him and his son Anthony a tract of land of sixteen acres in that town, on the road from New Providence to Chatham (see Liber I, page 812, of deeds, Newark), sold by widow of Isaac, and Anthony, November 23, 1808.

Isaac died April 25, 1805.

161a EZEKIEL ⁵ SAYRE, born in Southampton, 1726. Littell's "Early Settlers of Passaic Valley" mentions that an Ezekiel Sayre lived in 1788 on Stony Hill, near New Providence, N. J. Some of the descendants of Isaac (161) claim that he was a brother of Isaac. He may have been the Ezekiel who was Lieutenant of the Monmouth County, N. J., Militia during the Revolution. 205 DAVID ⁵ SAYRE. The most ancient graveyard in Fairfield, Cumberland County, N. J., is on the south side of Cohansey Creek, about half a mile from the "Old Stone Church" of New England Town. It has long been disused, and is overgrown with large trees. The tombstones are in a remarkably

good state of preservation, and the inscriptions very distinct. One of these stones is marked, "David Sayre, Esq., died April 11, 1767, in the 47th year of his age." Between the head and foot stones has grown a tree about a foot in diameter. This stone is doubtless in memory of David of the line here indicated. The title "Esq." probably indicates that he was a Justice of the Peace. In the "Annual Report of the State Historian of New York" (Vol. I, p. 524) is a list of troops from Cohansey in 1715, under command of Lieutenant Thomas Maskell, and among them appear the names of David Sayre, and David Sayre, Jr., the grandfather and father of this David.

Volume X, "Colonial Records of Pennsylvania," p. 756, under head of "Minutes of the Council of Safety" held at Philadelphia, October 16, 1776, a resolution was passed that the following officers be appointed in the Twelfth Battalion of Foot to be raised in this State for Continental service, commanded by Colonel William Cooke, viz.:

First Lieutenants,

William Sayre.

"Pennsylvania Archives," Volume X, second series, pp. 757, 758: "12th Penn. Reg. Congress authorized this regiment to be raised in the counties of Northampton and Northumberland." The latter county at that time (1776) embraced a very large territory, reaching as far west as Beaver County, south to Allegheny County, and north to Lake Erie.

The greater portion of the regiment was recruited on the west branch of the Susquehanna, and on December 18 it left Sunbury for the battle-fields of New Jersey. It was with Brigadier-General Thomas Conway, brigade headquarters, at Five Cross Roads at Metuchen, between Quibbletown and Amboy. Engaged at Bonnel Brook April 12, 1777, and Piscataway May 10, where Joseph Lorentz and twenty-one others were made prisoners by the British. . . . In the battle of Brandywine the Twelfth was engaged; also at Germantown. April 12, 1778, the Twelfth was incorporated with the Third Regiment. On p. 760, under "Roster of field and staff officers," appears:

"He lived in a stone house, built by Samuel Decker, which stood upon what is now the Loomis farm." At his death he left what was considered in those days a fortune to his children. They applied to the courts for a partition of his real estate among them. The court appointed commissioners, who filed their report February 16, 1814, making division among the children.

He was a farmer in Florida, Orange County, N. Y. After the Revolutionary War he removed to Monongalia County, Va., where he owned a farm. During the War of 1812 he enlisted in Captain Moore's company, the Twelfth U. S. Infantry, and served until his death on or about January 3, 1815.

Under date of April 26, 1819, an application for a pension was made on behalf of his children, Mary Shuttleworth, John, Nicklin, and Seely Sayre, which is now on file in the department at Washington.

Rachel Meeker died a widow, February 19, 1800, in the eighty-third year of her age, and was buried in the Presbyterian churchyard at Madison, N. J.

Ephraim Sayre was a farmer and tanner, and was an esteemed deacon in the Presbyterian church at Bottle Hill (now Madison, N. J.). He is said to have

been a minute-man in the Revolution, and to have participated in the battles at Connecticut Farms, at Springfield and at Monmouth.

His house at Bottle Hill, of which a view is given, is still standing, and has been in continuous possession of his descendants. A Morristown journal, September 29, 1890, contained the following:

"One of the most noted landmarks of the Borough of Madison is the old Sayre Mansion on Ridgedale Avenue. It was built about the year 1745 by Daniel Sayre, who had removed to Bottle Hill from Elizabethtown. During the Revolution it was owned and occupied by his son, Deacon Ephraim Sayre, who was a

man of the noblest character, both as a Christian and a patriot.

"Deacon Sayre was always ready not only to yield to the constant demands upon him made necessary by the presence of the army, but to throw open his house to the men whenever their comfort required. Some of the wounded of the battle of Springfield were here cared for, the kitchen being used as a hospital; and at times the hospitality of the proprietor's table was freely enjoyed by both officers and soldiers.

"The house was the headquarters of General Anthony Wayne for a considerable part of the time that the army was in this neighborhood (the winter of 1780-81). The room occupied by the General was the front room in the north end, and in it many conferences took place between 'Mad Anthony' and the other illustrious commanders.

"General Washington and his staff were frequently in the house, as they were then located at Morristown; and the chair in which the General sat is still preserved, and many other pieces of antique furniture are cherished in this

house.

"Rev. James Caldwell, of patriotic memory and Revolutionary fame, whose wife's mother was a Sayre, was a warm personal friend of Deacon Sayre. He preached in Bottle Hill as often as his other duties permitted, the announcement that he would do so being always sufficient to attract a large number of hearers; and on these occasions the Sayre mansion was frequently used for the services. The south front room is the one in which the 'Fighting Domine' of Springfield preached, and the very spot where he then stood, in the southwest corner of the room, is pointed out. And in this room, for some years, the regular weekly prayer-meetings of the church were held.

"This devoted man, it will be remembered, was shot by a sentinel at Elizabethtown Point, it being popularly supposed at the time to be at the instigation of the

enemy or their sympathizers.

"When the news of the murder of Parson Caldwell (his wife having previously been killed at Connecticut Farms) reached Deacon Sayre, he got up his team, went to Elizabethtown and took Mr. Caldwell's six orphan children to his own house, where he took care of them until they were permanently provided for elsewhere. They were under his roof at least three months, and learned during that time to greatly love and reverence their benefactor.


"Here Baxter Sayre, the famous abolitionist, spent his early years; and to this home of his childhood the philanthropist David A. Sayre, of Lexington, Ky.,

used to return at intervals with great delight.

"So memories of old-time patriotism, hospitality, religious zeal, and self-sacrifice


cluster around this old homestead and make it holy ground.

"The present owner (1900), Mr. Joseph M. Sayre, is the great-grandson of the good old Deacon, and cherishes the old mansion and its associations with a true patriotic reverence."

Headquarters of General Anthony Wayne in the Revolution.



The following article was written for the "St. Louis Presbyterian," and published by request. It is a copy from the newspaper clipping now (February, 1895) in possession of D. F. Sayre, Esq., Fulton, Wisconsin. Evidence shows it to have been undoubtedly written by Rev. J. G. Bergen, pastor of the Madison, N. J., Presbyterian church.

The reverse side of the clipping shows that it was published in 1856 (during the Frémont and Dayton campaign), in a Morristown, N. J., newspaper:

I found the church of Madison to consist of about two hundred members, two hundred families, and over twelve hundred souls. It had a strong and able bench of Elders, on whom I could lean for prayer, counsel and aid; and an active Board of Trustees, who relieved me from the burden of worldly concerns.

Ephraim Sayre, a man of about seventy years, strongly marked with what in that part of the country was technically called "mother wit," stood at the head of the eldership, and from his laconic remarks I learned more of practical pastoral wisdom than from any other man. He was a frank-speaking man—out with his first thoughts—which, in him, as in most men of his temperament, were ordinarily his best thoughts. Sometimes he was too dogmatical with his brother elders, on which occasions he would close with his last argument, "at any rate, I am the oldest and ought to know best"; this he often would deliver with so

much seriousness as to make it gravely amusing.

He was a man whose piety and hospitality were strongly marked. His house had long been called "the minister's tavern." It was the first I had entered in that congregation. He was the deacon through whom Dr. Finley had introduced me to the people; and on account of his plainness of manners I had greatly misjudged him on first sight. It was at his house I spent two weeks solus, in my first winter among that people, my young companion being at her father's house in Monmouth; doubtless, as the day approached when I expected to go for her. my pleasurable anticipations were strongly expressed; and as I took my seat in the gig the old gentleman said: "If you should lose your wife, you would n't miss her so much as I would if I were to lose mine." I took the reins, saying to myself, "Strange, strange. How can a man that was once young make such a remark?" But the longer my companion was spared to me the more I subscribed to the sentiment of the elder; and now that, after forty years' companionship it has pleased God to call me to the trial, I acknowledge the truth and wisdom of the remark, while I endeavor to bow in submission.

He was a warm-hearted Christian, sure to be at the prayer-meeting, and when there, in the spirit of prayer, with deep and humble confession of sin, thankful acknowledgment of God's mercies, and fervent supplication for the young, often accompanied with overflowing tears which would induce him on some occasions to say, "My friends, pardon me; I know it is a weakness; I know

there is no religion in tears, yet I thank God I can weep."

In revivals of religion he used to say to young converts who were in the employ of others: "Remember your time belongs to your employers; don't give them occasion to say you neglect your duty or business to them by your constant going to meetings or late staying. Rise earlier, work more diligently; one duty must not crowd out another; don't give occasion to the wicked to reproach your religion."

In his latter days he became very deaf, so that he could scarcely hear anything in the sanctuary; and yet, as long as he was able, he filled his place, and said he would go if he could not hear a word, for it was God's house, God's

ordinance, and he liked to be there.

In his last long confinement he used to say: "Bless God for my eyes"—the Bible was his constant companion, but his memory was almost gone with his

hearing, and he would say: "At any rate, I feed as I go along."

When I stood by the bedside of that dying, good man, and when to a mourning church I preached his funeral sermon 'midst a vast concourse of people from the surrounding country, I felt, in some measure, as the sons of the prophet did as they exclaimed when Elijah was removed from their sight: "My father! my father! the chariot of Israel, and the horsemen thereof!"

OLD MAN OF THE PRAIRIE.

267a EPHRAIM 5 SAYRE, born 1738; married Mary Meeker, daughter of James Meeker, according to Littell's "Early Settlers." The Westfield church records say that Ephraim Sayre married Mary Davis, June 30, 1762. Probably Mary Davis was a widow and her maiden name was Meeker. She died August 7, 1797, in her fifty-eighth year. He married again, Jane ——, who died December 19, 1823, in her seventy-ninth year. Littell, in mentioning the sons of Ephraim (89), omits this son. His identity as a brother of David (268) and William (271) is demonstrated by a comparison of the signatures of the latter as they appear on the records at Trenton, where William witnesses his brother David's will in 1776, acts as executor of his brother Ephraim's will in 1804, and signs his own will in 1823, the three signatures being evidently by the same hand.

Ephraim was a farmer in Elizabeth, N. J., on the road to Crane's Mill (Cranford), and member of the church there. Two Ephraims appear as subscribers towards the support of the church at the time of the Revolution. He died July 22, 1804. His will mentions his wife Jane, his son Ephraim, his daughter Mary, granddaughters Hannah and Susan Miller, and Elizabeth, daughter of David Williams. His brother William was named as executor.

Letters from descendants of Thomas, the oldest son, say that he remembered his mother sitting in the dooryard and crying as the guns of the battle of Monmouth were heard, because her husband was in the battle.

He was a farmer, and removed at the close of the Revolution to the vicinity of Redstone, now Fayette County, Pa., but which section was at that time claimed by Virginia.

274 JOHN⁵ SAYRE, born June 4, 1738, at 58 Broad Street, New York City; married, in Philadelphia, September 28, 1758, Mary Bowes, daughter of Francis Bowes and Rachel Chevalier, who was born in Trenton, N. J., March 5, 1739. She was his stepsister, his father having married her mother April 8, 1751; her first husband died in Philadelphia, December 3, 1749.

He was educated at King's (now Columbia) College, N. Y., and became a clergyman of the Episcopal Church.

Rev. Rufus Emery, of Newburgh, N. Y., in an address delivered January 13, 1892, in Christ Church, Warwick, N. Y., thus speaks of Mr. Sayre:

Two years after the death of Mr. Watkins — that is, in 1767 — the Rev. John Sayer was appointed by the society to the Newburgh Mission and parts adjacent. Mr. Sayer did not live in Newburgh, but back in the country, at a place called Bellomont, preaching alternately at Newburgh, Otterkill, and Wallkill. He obtained charters for three parishes, St. George's in the county of Ulster, St. Andrew's in the precinct of Wallkill, and St. David's in the county of Orange. The charter of St. George's is now in the possession of that Parish, that of St. Andrew's is entered on the Parish Record. both bearing date July 30, 1770, and that of St. David's is recorded in the office of Secretary of State at Albany, in the Book of Patents, dated July 31, 1770. Mr. Sayer did not confine his labors to his three stations, for he says in a letter to the Society in 1773 that he "officiates at Warwick, a place 20 miles from his residence, once a month on week-days, and once in three months on Sundays, though it be no part of his mission, and that

he reads prayers and preaches on week-days in many distant parts of the mission, for the sake of the aged and infirm, and for the purpose of capturing the children

of the poor."

Mr. Sayer was a physician as well as a priest, a popular preacher, and a devoted churchman. In 1773 Mr. Sayer suddenly left his mission, leaving everything in disorder and confusion. The cause of his leaving is now unknown, unless his subsequent action may suggest an explanation. He was an ardent loyalist, and probably had no sympathy with the ideas and feelings which were prominent around him. He was transferred from this mission to Fairfield, Conn., where he served till the invasion of General Tryon in 1779, when he reported to the Society that he had retired within the king's lines. He went to New York and afterwards to Nova Scotia, where he died. The Rev. Philo Sheldon, in a manuscript history of Trinity Church, Fairfield, Conn., says of the Rev. John Sayer, that he was a man of superior ability, a great preacher, rather inclined to Calvinistic principles, but a high Tory. . . .

In this imperfect outline of the early missions and missionaries of our arch-

In this imperfect outline of the early missions and missionaries of our arch-deaconry, three persons stand eminent: the laborious Watkins,¹ the active and brilliant Sayer, and the zealous and self-sacrificing Brown. One laid the foundations, the other built on them strongly and well, the last restored the waste places and repaired the desolations of former years. They are worthy of our respect and honor. They were faithful servants of the church, worthy followers of her great Head and Master. Though dead, yet now they speak, resting from their labors.

and their works do follow them.

When the British, under Tryon, burned the town of Fairfield, Conn., Rev. John Sayre was rector of Trinity Episcopal church in the town. From "An Historical Discourse" delivered in Trinity Church by its rector, August 10, 1851, we take this extract:

One week after Tryon burned Fairfield, July 8, 1779, the pastor of the Congregational church in that town wrote to a friend that "Mr. Sayre, the Church of England missionary, begged the General to spare the town, but was denied. He then begged that some few houses might be spared as a shelter for those who could provide habitations nowhere else; this was denied also." The whole town was burned, and with it the parsonage, the dwelling of Mr. Sayre, and he found himself in a moment with his wife and eight small children entirely destitute of everything except the garments in which they were clad. Under such circumstances he sought a shelter for his family on board the British fleet, but without any pledge of protection, or any promise of help or assistance from the commander of the expedition, and went to New York, then in possession of the British army. There he remained several months, recruiting his health and strength, which had been seriously impaired. Afterwards he frequently assisted his brethren who had charge of the parishes of Jamaica, Newtown, Flushing and Huntington on Long Island.

After the Revolution Mr. John Sayre was one of fifty-five petitioners for a grant of land in Nova Scotia. In October, 1783, he went to St. John, New Brunswick, and obtained a grant, receiving what was known as No. 56 Dock Street.

He was appointed by Lord Dorchester one of the agents of the government to locate land grants. He afterwards moved to Maugerville, on the St.

John's River, where he died August 5, 1784. His widow and other heirs sold the property in St. John to her son James, as appears from the following:

Copy of record in the Registry Office of St. John, New Brunswick. 22d July, 1785. Mary Sayre and others to James Sayre: Know all men that &c. we Mary Sayre, widow of the Rev. John Sayre, deceased, and John Sayre, Francis B. Sayre, Cadwallader Sayre, Rachel Cunningham, wife of Lieut. Thomas Cunningham, Esther Robinson, Mary Sayre, Junior, and Henrietta Sayre; all of the Province of New Brunswick for £5, release to James Sayre their interest in Lot of Land in City of St. John, New Brunswick, in Dock Street.

Witnessed 17 June, 1785. Registered 22 July, 1785.

Mary & John Sayre, Francis Sayre, C. Robinson & Esther Robinson.

His widow returned to the United States and died January 11, 1789, at Bloomsbury, near Trenton, N. J. One of her sisters had married the distinguished John Cox, one of whose daughters had married John Stevens, of New Jersey, and another Horace Binney of Philadelphia; and she was also kin to General Joseph Reid and Bowes Reid.

There is a memorial tablet to Rev. John Sayre in the church at Maugerville, N. B., where he officiated.

The inscription on the tombstone at Maugerville reads as follows:

. " Here lies the body of Rev. John Sayre,

formerly Rector of Trinity Church, Fairfield, Ct., and one of the Society's Missionaries to that place. From thence a Refugee with his family within His Majesty's lines in New York, and from New York, upon the Evacuation of it by the British Troops, to this place.

"Who departed this life at Burton, on Saint John's River, upon the Fifth of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-four, in the forty-seventh year of his age."

275 ESTHER ⁵ SAYRE married, August 31, 1763, William Augustus Atlee, eldest son of William and Jane Atlee, who was born July 1, 1735, in Philadelphia, and baptized July 26, 1735.

He studied law in Judge Shippen's office, and was admitted to the Lancaster County Bar, August 30, 1758. He became an eminent counselor at law, and was appointed, on August 16, 1777, First Associate Justice of the Supreme Court. He was associated with Chief Justice McKean during the War of the Revolution; he was Chairman of the Committee of Safety, and Commissary and Superintendent of the Arsenal, Barracks and British prisoners then at Lancaster.

On August 17, 1791, he was appointed Presiding Judge of the First District Court of Pennsylvania on the circuit embracing Chester, Lancaster, York and Dauphin counties.

He died September 9, 1793. See Atlee Genealogy for descendants.

277 JAMES 5 SAYRE, born 1745 in New York; married in 1775 Sarah Forgue, daughter of Dr. Forgue, who was born in 1757, and died December 15, 1797. He was educated in the University of Pennsylvania; was in the class of 1765. He was admitted to the Bar in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, in 1765, and in

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Orange County, N. Y., in 1770; but subsequently became a clergyman of the

Episcopal Church.

He received the degree of A.M. from King's College (now Columbia), N. Y., in 1774. The following is a copy of a letter written by him to his sister, Mrs. Esther Atlee (275), of Lancaster, which is of interest. It is somewhat mutilated by age.

Philada. Dec. 14th 1774.

My dear Hetty:

I am glad of this early oppty. of informing you that by the Divine Mercy & Protection I am safely returned hither, everything having succeeded for my

design in crossing the Water.

You must easily imagine that the joy natural to my Return was damped by the account of the loss of our dear Mother. But our grief in such cases ought ever to be checked with the Consideration of the gain of the (for a time) loss to us. I hope that in this, as in every other situation, we... behave with a be-

coming Resign . . . infinitely wise & good Dis . . .

I need not tell you, irksome as it is to my private & natural Feelings, to go away, before I visit you & yours. But, unless I arrive at my place of Destination before Christmas, I cannot get there, with some necessary things, before Spring, as the Boat cannot ply on the North River when the Season is further advanced, & I cannot answer neglecting my Charge for so long a Time. You know that I am not my own. I could wish to tell you several things, but perhaps I should not be able to tell you anything new, except some very valuable new Friends which were raised up for me in that (to me) strange Land . . . whom I cannot forbear . . . just mention . . . amiable Lady Juliana . . . Penn. And I request you to acknowledge for me my obligation to Mr. Barton, for his Interduction of me to a Person, who exceeded the opinion (pretty much raised, too) which I had preconceived of her. I must defer more till it shall please our Master to permit us to meet; which (with his Permission) I shall endeavor to procure as soon as possible. I am extremely hurried indeed—arrived the Day before yesterday after nine weeks from London & stormy, uneasy Passage, for my prefer . . . thro which, I beg you to add your T . . . to mine where due — to set out next . . . I have (perhaps) to prepare a Sermon . . . day, & above two thirds of my Friends here . . . to visit. Adieu for this Time . . . & kiss my little Son & the rest for me. Your affect. Bro.

(Signed) JAS. SAYRE.

He organized the Episcopal church in Newburgh. He was chaplain of one of De Lancey's battalions, but, "impelled by distress, severity of treatment, and by duty," he resigned in 1777. From 1777 to 1783 he was rector in Brooklyn, N. Y. From the annals of Trinity Church, Newport, R. I., we extract the following:

On Aug. 27, 1786, at a meeting of the congregation after divine service, it was voted that the Rev. James Sayre, who hath performed the services of the church this day, be accepted and settled as our minister, and that he be paid as a salary £100 sterling money per annum, to commence upon his arrival at Newport. . . . Oct. 1, 1786, Rev. Mr. Sayre hath, this day, arrived.

His signature appears on page 184 of the annals. He retired during the winter of 1788-89.

He was a royalist during the Revolution, and, with his brother John, went to New Brunswick at the close of the war. He drew lot No. 4 at St. John, N. B. He subsequently returned to the United States, and was at Newport, R. I., from 1786 till 1788. He then became rector of the church at Fairfield, Conn., where he died December 18, 1798.

J.; that he was in the battle of Monmouth, New Jersey, and that he is in very reduced circumstances and stands in need of the assistance of his country for support.

Y., when the Revolution broke out, and received a commission as lieutenant, as appears by the official document given below, which is on file in the Pension Office in Washington, D. C. His name appears on the Assessment Roll of Warwick, N. Y., September, 1775. He lived ten or twelve years in Elizabethtown after the war, and subsequently in Hector, Tompkins County, N. Y., about twenty years.

He died June 16, 1841, in the ninety-fourth year of his age.

STATE OF NEW YORK, SENECA COUNTY.

NATHAN SAYRE, an applicant for a pension under the act of Congress of June 7th, 1832, being duly sworn according to law, maketh oath and saith in addition to what he has set forth in his declaration which is on file in the Office of the Secretary of War, that his commission as Lt. in Capt. Wisner's company was granted by authority of the Provincial Congress of New York, but by whom

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it was signed he cannot now recollect. But he well recollects that his commission was burned.

That in December, 1776, while the British army was in New Jersey, and about the time Gen. Lee was taken, declarant, having a brother in New Jersey, went from Orange County in New York into New Jersey to see what had become of his said brother, and finally found him at the house of his father-in-law, about two miles from Elizabethtown in New Jersey.

The British army, or a part thereof, was then lying at Elizabethtown. Declarant had his commission as Lt. in his pocket, and in anticipation of being taken prisoner by the British and recognized as an American officer he was advised to, and did, burn his said commission at the house of Effingham Townley,

father-in-law of his said brother.

At the time declarant first entered the service in the fall of 1775, as mentioned in his declaration now on file in the Office of the Secretary of War, he lived in Warwick, in the County of Orange, New York, and orders came (but from what source he does not recollect) to raise a company of minute men for four months; that declarant with others volunteered, and after the company was filled they proceeded to elect their officers. John Wisner was elected Capt., George Luckey, Lt., David Armstrong, Ensign, Joseph Beckwith, Orderly Sergt., and declarant, 2nd Sergt. Declarant supposes that those who were designated as commissioned officers received commissions, but this fact he does not certainly know. That in a few days after said company was raised they had orders to march to New Windsor, and marched there and was billeted out upon the inhabitants of New Windsor and Newburg a month or two - does not now recollect precisely how long. They were then ordered to Ft. Constitution, on the Hudson River opposite West Point, where they remained in service the residue of their term of service of four months, according to declarant's best recollection and belief. He is not now certain that he served the whole of the residue of his term of four months at Fort Constitution, but he knows that he served the whole of his term of four months out, was discharged at the end of this term of four months and returned home. Col. Isaac Nichols commanded at Fort Constitution while declarant was there.

In the month of April, 1776, another company of minute men was raised in Warwick aforesaid, in manner aforesaid, and declarant again volunteered and was elected and commissioned Lieutenant in said Company, John Wisner, Captain, and Asa Wisner, Ensign. Soon after said company was raised they marched to Fort Constitution aforesaid and remained there in service until their term of four months was out. In this service declarant was out and served as Lieutenant four months as stated in his declaration now on file in the Office of the Secretary of War. At the end of the four months he was discharged and went home. Col. Nichols still commanded at Fort Constitution. While declarant was at Fort Constitution during this service he was engaged the most of the time with others in collecting materials and fixing the Fort. Declarant well recollects that he was out in this service and at Fort Constitution at the time American independence was declared.

Late in December, 1776, or early in January, 1777, declarant still living in Warwick aforesaid, there was an alarm and Col. Hathorn's regiment of militia, to which declarant belonged, was ordered out, and declarant marched with said regiment and was out in this service three weeks or more. In this service declarant served as Lieutenant, although this was after his commission was burned. When the regiment was mustered they marched to Closter (in New Jersey, as declarant thinks); the object in marching to Closter was as declarant then understood to watch the movements of the British then lying at Hackensack. They

stayed at Closter until the British left Hackensack and were discharged and returned home.

When declarant made his declaration, which is now on file in the office of the Secretary of War, he was called on by Judge Halsey, through the instrumentality of one of his kind neighbors, unexpectedly, and being old, infirm, and forgetful, he omitted to state some services which he was in. Sometime in the Summer of 1777, Col. Hathorn's regiment was ordered out on an alarm and declarant turned out with said regiment and was out in the service this time at least two weeks; in this tour he served as Lieutenant. They marched from Warwick to Fort Montgomery on the Hudson River. While lying at Fort Montgomery news came that the British were at Haverstraw committing depredations, and Capt. Thomas Moffit beat for volunteers to go with him to Haverstraw, and declarant, with a number of others turned out and went to Haverstraw under the said Capt. Moffit; staid there a short time, returned to Fort Montgomery and were discharged with the rest of the regiment and returned home. Declarant cannot now recollect the precise time this service was rendered, but perfectly well recollects rendering this service and thinks it was in the summer of 1777.

Soon after the alarm last mentioned Col. Hathorn's Regt. was again ordered out on an alarm and declarant turned out with said regiment and was out this time as much as two weeks, and also served as Lieut. They marched from Warwick to Ramapo in Rockland County; declarant thinks they staid at Ramapo until they were discharged and returned home. Declarant cannot recollect the exact time of this alarm but perfectly well recollects being out on this occasion

and thinks it was at the time mentioned.

In the early part of October, 1777, Col. Hathorn's regiment was again called out and declarant turned out with said regiment and was out on this tour more than two weeks, and served as Lt. They marched from Warwick intending to go to the relief of Ft. Montgomery, but before they reached that Fortress they received information that the Fort was taken by the British. On receiving this information they altered their course and marched to Little Britain, in Orange County; staid there a short time and was then and there ordered to guard about forty, he thinks forty-two, wagons loaded with arms for the American Army, from that place to Easton in Penns. After performing this service they returned home to Warwick and were then discharged.

In Sept., 1778 (according to declarant's best recollection), Col. Hathorn's regiment was again ordered out on an alarm and declarant marched with said regiment to Peramus in the capacity of Lt., remained there two weeks and was

dismissed and returned home.

In July, 1779, when Stony Point was taken, Col. Hathorn's regiment was again called out to take charge of the prisoners taken at that Fortress and march them into New Jersey. Declarant turned out with said regiment and marched as a guard for said prisoners into New Jersey. On this occasion he served as

Lt. and was out in this service one week.

In January, 1780, declarant left Warwick and went to Elizabethtown in New Jersey, and remained there until some years after the close of the Revolutionary war. Soon after he arrived at Elizabethtown a company of cavalry was raised and organized for the express purpose of preventing the British and refugees from coming over on the ice from Staten Island and plundering the inhabitants of property and in some instances taking off the inhabitants themselves. By whose orders or by what authority this company was raised he cannot tell, but he then understood and believed that it was raised by order of the Continental officer who had the command of the Continental troops then at Elizabethtown, but he does not recollect who this officer was.

Capt. Wm. Crane had the command of this company, and declarant enlisted and served in it as a private one month, and found his own horse, equipage and rations. This company was composed principally of men living in and near Elizabethtown for the particular reason as declarant understood and believed that the duty to be performed by them was to prevent the enemy from crossing on the ice from Staten Island in the night and plundering the inhabitants and taking off property and persons and to give the alarm in case they should cross; such men being better acquainted with the crossing places, passes, roads, etc., than others who did not live in that region of the country. One half of this company rode one night and the other the next; declarant serving every other night and in this way alternating through the month. At the expiration of this month it was found that the depredations of the enemy were so completely suppressed by this means, and the ice still continuing to be crossable, it was ordered that a light company should be raised for another month for the like service under the same Capt. Crane, and declarant supposed, and still supposes, by the same authority as the Declarant enlisted into this company for one month and in like manner found his own horse, equipage, and rations, and served this month out in the same manner as the first.

One reason declarant had, and still has, for believing that Capt. Crane's company was raised and served directly or indirectly by order of the Continental officer then in command of Elizabethtown, is that he well recollects that every other night through the whole of both months' service, when declarant was on duty, they went from Elizabethtown Point and other places where they were riding the most of the night, about the middle of the night, to the quarters of the Continental officer who had the command of the Continental troops then on duty as guard at Elizabethtown, for the purpose of reporting to him anything which might have happened to any of them and what discoveries, if any, they may have made respecting the enemy, and to warm them, the weather being extremely cold. After making a report and warming themselves a short time again returned and remained on duty until daylight in the morning and then made a like report to the same officer. Another reason declarant had and still has for believing that this company was raised and served by order of the officer then in command of that station, or some Continental officer, is, that declarant was paid for his services, rations, &c. wholly in Continental money by the said Capt. Crane, and then understood and believed and still believes that Capt, Crane received the same money from some of the Continental officers then at Elizabethtown.

Declarant was acquainted with Capt. Crane before the Revolutionary war and after declarant returned to Elizabethtown in Jan., 1780, he was intimately acquainted with him until near his death, now not far from twenty years ago. Capt. Crane and many other persons have frequently told declarant and he verily believes it to be true, that Capt. Crane was in the expedition to Canada under Gen. Montgomery, and he thinks Crane acted as Lt. in that expedition but is not certain. Crane was wounded in the leg in that expedition as declarant always understood and believed and now believes, declarant having frequently seen the wound which Crane said he received in that expedition. Capt. Crane, previous to his death, was obliged to have this leg taken off. Declarant once saw him after he had his leg taken off. Capt. Crane, some time after Jan., 1780, was

appointed a Col. of militia.

About the seventh of June, 1780, at the time the British burned Connecticut Farms and Springfield, declarant then living at Elizabethtown, there was an alarm and declarant turned out and served as private under Capt. Obadiah Meeker in his company of cavalry, and was out on this service two weeks or more. In this service they were marched to Springfield and continued at and

near Springfield watching the movements of the enemy until after it was burned,

and was then discharged and went home to Elizabethtown.

Some time in the month of August, 1780, declarant performed a tour of service as a private under the same Capt. Meeker at Elizabethtown. At this time the British were still on Staten Island, and the militia in and about Elizabethtown were called on to keep guard at Elizabethtown and declarant was called on and turned out and was in this service half a month.

In stating his second tour of service under Col. Hathorn, when Ft. Montgomery was taken, declarant stated in his declaration now on file in the Office of the Secretary of War that he was out in this service three weeks, but after having more time for reflection on the subject and recollecting some facts that took place about that time, he is convinced he was out only sixteen days, and has accord-

ingly stated it in this supplementary declaration to be at least two weeks.

Declarant now lives at Hector, in the County of Tompkins and State of New York, about ten miles from Judge DeMott's, a Judge of the Court of Common Pleas in and for the County of Seneca, and from where declarant lives to the nearest judge (now at home) in the said County of Tompkins, is about twenty-two miles, and declarant being old and infirm it is a great convenience for him to make this supplemental declaration before the said Judge DeMott instead of making it before a Judge of Tompkins County, and this is the reason of declarant making it before a Judge residing out of the County in which he resides.1

303 ABRAHAM ⁵ SAYRE was born at Southampton, L. I., February 5, 1745, and married Mehitable Howell, daughter of Abner and Eunice Fithian Howell, who was born May 24, 1751, and died January 21, 1820.

He belonged to the First Regiment of Minute-men of Suffolk County during the Revolution. He was usually styled "Captain."

He was chosen Trustee of Southampton in 1786, 1787, 1788, 1790, 1791, 1793, 1796, 1797; elected as Assessor in 1790; as Commissioner of Highways, second district, in 1793, 1799; and as Fence Viewer in 1798, 1800.

He died at Southampton April 16, 1810. His will, at Riverhead (Liber C, folio 101), dated February 14, 1810, probated December 6, 1810, reads as follows:

In the Name of God, Amen. I Abraham Sayre of the town of Southampton in the County of Suffolk and State of New York yeoman being weak in body but of sound mind and memory thanks be to God therefor but calling to mind the mortality of my body do make this my last will and testament and principally and first I recommend my soul to God who gave it and my body I recommend to the earth to be buried in decent Christian burial at the discretion of my executors hereafter mentioned and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me I dispose of it in the following manner.

First I give to my beloved wife two milch cows two good feather beds and bedding together with all my household furniture (tankard excepted) and sixty two dollars in cash and fifty cents (that is twenty-five pounds), with the use and

improvement of half my house during her widowhood.

Secondly. I give to my three daughters, Eunice, Ruth, and Phebe two dollars and fifty cents, to each of them, to my daughter Beulah I give five dollars, to my daughter Susannah I give one hundred and thirty five dollars in cash together with the privilege of a home in the west room while she remains single.

Fourthly. I give to my son Merit one hundred dollars in cash, to my son William I give two hundred and fifty dollars in cash, To my son Jared I give one hundred and twenty five dollars in cash, and to my son Lewis I give one hundred

and twenty five dollars in cash.

Fifthly. I give to my son Nehemiah Sayre eight acres of woodland lying at potunck adjoining Matthew Jessup to him his heirs and assigns forever and as I have given him the one half of my Potunk land and meadow (lying down neck) in a deed my will is that the same remain to him as therein specified only half the whole below and no more.

Sixthly. I give to my son Stephen my silver tankard together with all the residue and remainder of all my moveable estate of whatever nature or quality the same may be and I also give to my said son Stephen to him his heirs and assigns forever my mill together with all my buildings and all the residue and remainder of my lands woodlands meadows and commonage of which I may die seized provided however and it is my will that my sons Nehemiah & William have each of them one bed & bedding (out of the house) on the following conditions

however the said bequest is made to my son Stephen, Viz. that he maintain my brother John during his natural life and also that he pay all my just debts and the legacies above mentioned and in case he refuse to comply with these conditions then my will is that so much of the lands intended for him be sold as will be sufficient to pay them.

Lastly I nominate and appoint my son Stephen sole executor to this my last will and testament and I do hereby utterly revoke every other will or wills by me before made, and do ratify and confirm this and none other to be my last will and

testament.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF I the said Abraham Sayre have hereunto set my hand and seal this fourteenth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ten.

He engaged in ministerial work in western New York for about two years. In 1865, on the recommenda-tion of Dr. Macauley, secretary of one of the Presbyterian boards at Philadelphia, Mr. Howell was offered a professorship of Latin or Greek, at his option, in a college in Iowa. His engagements forbade his accepting the offer. A short time after his declination of the professorship, the presidency of the college was offered him, but this, too, he declined. In 1872, at the suggestion of Dr. S. B. Woolworth, he was induced to accept an office in the State library as librarian. In this office Mr. Howell rendered the State valuable service. His early study of many languages stood him in good stead in the classification, cataloguing, and arranging of the many volumes in the general library. His suggestions with regard to the purchase of suitable and desirable volumes have been very useful in the development of the resources of the library. For several years Mr. Howell was the secretary of the Albany Institute, in the welfare of which he took a deep interest. He read several valuable papers on scientific subjects before the institution, some of which have been published in the "Transactions of the Albany Institute," including "Linguistic Discussions,"
> "The Open Polar Sea," and "Heraldry in America." He
> wrote a "History of Southampton, L. I.," containing the genealogies of nearly all the old families there [which has been

of invaluable service in the compilation of the present volume]. In addition to his works on scientific and literary subjects, Mr. Howell wrote an amusing book entitled "Noah's Log Book," that gamed for him much favorable criticism. He was employed in the library for twenty-seven years, until his death. He leaves a widow, Mrs. Mary Seymour Howell, a popular lecturer, and one sister, Mrs. E. H. Harrington (now living on Ivy street, this city), who has resided in Bridgeport for many years.

He signed as bondsman for the marriage license of his brother at Southampton, N. Y., September 29, 1777.

There were several James Sayres who lived near each other in Orange County about the time of the Revolution, and it has been quite difficult to identify positively each as he appears in various records.

The following permit, which is copied from pages 512-513 of the "Public Papers of George Clinton," published as Vol. III of the "Report of the State Historian, New York," date not given, but probably about 1777, appears to show without question that this James who married Elizabeth Howell was the person referred to in the permit, and that he left Long Island after it had fallen into possession of the British, and became a resident of Orange County:

"Mr. James Sayre, a Refugee from Long Island, having left at his former place of abode household furniture and other property which he is desirous of bringing off, is hereby permitted to pass to Long Island and return, for the above purpose.

"This permission is not to be considered as a license to bring off from the Island any articles for the purpose of traffic; and, as he must necessarily pass through the State of Connecticut, it is recommended to him to apply to his Excellency, Governor Trumbull, for his approbation of the measure."

A James Sayre was First Lieutenant of Captain Woodhull's Company of Light Horse, Orange County, N. Y., from July, 1776, to January, 1777.

The following items on the records at Goshen doubtless refer to this James:

Deed dated Nov. 5, 1782, James Sayre of Blooming Grove buys of John Alsop 515 acres of land at Blooming Grove for 2500 Spanish milled dollars. June 3, 1783, James Sayre and his wife Elizabeth convey part of the above tract to Barnabas Horton. April 2, 1787, James Sayre and his wife Elizabeth convey part of above tract. Dec. 17, 1790, James Sayre, of New Cornwall, gave a mortgage to Martha Herrick, of Southampton, N. Y., which was satisfied Mar. 31, 1813.

He died September 21, 1807. His will, recorded in Goshen (Liber D, folio 64), dated February 10, 1807, was probated December 1, 1807.

He had probably given portions to several of his sons before death, as his will divided his estate into four parts only: one quarter to each of the three sons Jedediah Howell, Gabriel and Israel, and one quarter to his unmarried daughters, Clarissa Howell Sayre and Elizabeth Sayre. His sons Horace G., Oliver C. and Jedediah Howell were named as executors, and his son John Alsop signed as witness.

308 JAMES⁵ SAYRE, born in Goshen, N. Y., March 2, 1750; married Mercy Seely, daughter of Jonas Seely, who was born August 6, 1754, and died August 10, 1805.

He was a farmer residing at Sugar Loaf, near Goshen, Orange County, N. Y. He was a soldier of the Revolution in the First Regiment of the Line from Orange County. With his widowed mother, brothers Ebenezer and John, and sister Julianna, he removed to Chemung County in 1792, living in the village of Newtown, six miles south of Elmira, on the Chemung River, for a year; and then bought a farm of several hundred acres at Horseheads, six miles north of Elmira.

Ausburn Towner's "History of the Valley and County of Chemung," p. 45, says:

Two brothers by the name of Seely became contractors for the government to furnish supplies to the army in the war of 1776. Through the depreciation of Continental money they lost all their property, together with the sureties which belonged to their brothers-in-law, James, Ebenezer and John Sayre. The Seely brothers again began working at their home in Orange County and when they had sufficient money to pay three shillings per acre for land they purchased about 800 acres in Chemung County where the village of Horseheads now stands. This land was given to the Sayre brothers as part payment in compensation for the loss they had sustained in 1792. The Sayre brothers, in company with their brother-in-law, Jonathan Conkling, and their aged mother, came to the Chemung valley and took possession of this property. James, the father of James, Jonas and Matthew, settled where the Hon. Jonas Van Duzer now resides. . . . James and Ebenezer had been soldiers in the Revolutionary war.

James Sayre was a man of considerable wealth for those early days, having large farms and dairies. He kept three shepherds to tend his flock.

The spinning women came and spent the winter spinning all the flax and wool used by the large family.

He had sawmills and grist-mills. He died June 4, 1826. He left a large estate to his sons, and gave his daughters each \$300.

He was Trustee of the Presbyterian Church of Blooming Grove at its organ-

ization, April 19, 1806.

He owned a farm about two miles north of Oxford, Orange County, N. Y.

He was Assessor, Overseer of Highways, and Overseer of the Poor in Blooming Grove from 1796 to 1816; and was Third Supervisor of same place, holding that office from 1805 to 1810.

His will, dated July 11, 1840, is recorded at Goshen, December 6, 1845, in

Liber N, folio 374.

Under the Act of Congress passed June 7, 1832, for pensioning Revolutionary soldiers, he received a pension which continued until his death, November 18, 1845.

The following is a copy of the application for pension, on file in the Pension

Office in Washington, D. C.

STATE OF NEW YORK COUNTY OF ORANGE

On this 27th day of May, in the year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Thirty-three, personally appeared in open Court before the Court of Common Pleas, now sitting, (being a Court of Record), JOB SAYRE, a resident of the town of Blooming Grove, County of Orange and State of New York, aforesaid, aged seventy-five years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7th, 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named

officers and served as herein stated:

That in 1775 he volunteered under Capt. Thomas Moffat of Blooming Grove aforesaid; that he did not volunteer for any stated period of time. He marched from Blooming Grove through the aforesaid County of Orange to New Windsor, on the Hudson River, remained there one month under the aforesaid Capt. and at the expiration of one month the company of Capt. John Wisner, from the Town of Warwick, County aforesaid, came to New Windsor and deponent's company was discharged. The company of Capt. Wisner was not full—he wanted three men and deponent was one of those who volunteered to make out the required number. Deponent marched from New Windsor down the river (then frozen) to Fort Constitution nearly opposite West Point on the east side of the river and in the County of Putnam; remained at Fort Constitution one month; was then and there verbally discharged. Col. Nichols was in command of the Fort. There were other troops than those of deponent's company. His said first enlistment or entry in service was in the month of October in the said year, 1775.

That in the year 1776 he enlisted for life under Capt. Daniel Denton of the town of Blooming Grove, aforesaid, and Lieut. Strong and Samuel Miller. Marched from Blooming Grove to New York through Monroe, Ramapo, Hackensack, etc., to Hoboken. Washington was then in command in person in New York; General Putnam was there; Gen. McDougal commanded his brigade, Wisenfeldt was his Lieut. Col., Denton his Captain. The standing army was

stationed in and about the city. When the city was taken by the British army he went with the other troops to Harlem, Kings Bridge, and stopped at White Plains. They were pursued by the British army to White Plains where there was an engagement of the hostile forces; that deponent was in that engagement, was one of five ordered to the management of a field piece and was taken from the lines for such purpose. Gen. McDougal was in command at White Plains. The force of the British army was much superior and Gen. McDougal thought it most advisable to retreat. The British took possession of the battle ground but did not pursue the American troops further in their retreat. There were many killed and wounded in that action on both sides; thinks there were two hundred of the Americans killed and mortally wounded. The enemy after remaining some time at the battle ground returned again to the city of New York. Deponent marched with the other troops to Peekskill in the County of Westchester, from Peekskill to Haverstraw, and from thence to Suffern where they were discharged from the service and returned. This deponent had enlisted for life but it having been represented to the State Congress that such was the case they directed such enlistment to be destroyed and issued commissions to enlist for three years or during the This deponent having enlisted for life was accordingly discharged. He enlisted in February and was discharged and returned home in December following, having served a period of nine months, the whole as a Corporal.

That in the Spring of 1777 he again entered the service in a company of Light Horse commanded by Capt. Ebenezer Woodhull, of Blooming Grove, aforesaid, who had received a commission to enlist a company of Horse, from Gov. George Clinton, to be ready at all times for the performance of duty when their services

should be required.

In the Fall of 1777, after the British had taken Fort Montgomery and when on the route up the river to Kingston, which they burned, he was ordered out by the Captain of his company, Capt. Woodhull, to New Windsor on the Hudson. There were several companies of militia there. Col. DuBoise of the standing troops was there. Remained there a short time, then marched to Kingston. After remaining there a short time he was discharged from duty and returned home having been out on duty at least two weeks.

That in 1778 he was ordered out in service as one of Capt. Woodhull's company to go to Morristown in the State of New Jersey to guard some clothing that had been taken from the British — no other troops at Morristown but deponent's company. He was out on this duty four days. In the same year he was again ordered to Morristown for the purpose of guarding clothing as stated before. Three were required to guard such clothing to Philadelphia of which number deponent was one. He went to Philadelphia and from thence returned home having served on that tour at least ten days.

That in 1779 he was ordered out by his Capt. Woodhull and marched to Fish-kill in the County of Dutchess. Does not recollect the names of any other officers than his Captain, and Lieut. McCambly. He remained at Fishkill one

month, was then discharged and returned home.

He was born February 28, 1758, in the town of Blooming Grove, aforesaid.
 There was a record of his age in his father's Bible, which is now lost.

- 3. Lived in the town of Blooming Grove when called into the service and has ever since resided there.
 - 4. He was called into service as hereinbefore stated.

5. He never received a written discharge.

6. He is known to Chas. Howell, Nathan H. White, Selah Strong and Hezekiah Howell, of his neighborhood, who can testify as to his veracity and their belief of his service.

He hereby relinquishes every claim to a pension or annuity, except the present, and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State.

311 JOHN⁵ SAYRE was born in Blooming Grove, Orange County, N. Y., July 24, 1767. He married Sally Brewster, who was born in Orange County, September 11, 1771, and died November 15, 1854. She was one of the earliest members of the Baptist Church in Romulus, N. Y., which was organized in 1795.

He removed with his widowed mother and his brothers James and Ebenezer to Chemung, and subsequently, in 1794, to Romulus, in what was afterwards Seneca County.

He was Town Clerk for four years - from 1797.

At a special town meeting held November 26, 1799, he was elected a Delegate to a Convention in the newly erected County of Cayuga. September 2, 1800, he was chosen Supervisor of Romulus, and was reëlected every year to and including 1808. He was elected to the same office in 1830, 1831 and 1832.

He was elected the first Member of Assembly from Seneca County in 1804, reëlected in 1807, and for a third time in 1830.

He was Surrogate of the County from February, 1811, to April, 1813, and County Treasurer from October, 1817, to October, 1821.

He was appointed Justice of the Peace, January 22, 1802, and in 1804, when Seneca County was erected, was appointed a Magistrate, and served as Associate Judge of Seneca County for many years; also as Loan Commissioner for the county.

He was the first Postmaster at Romulus when the office was established, October 16, 1802.

One of the earliest schools in Romulus was taught at the house of Judge Sayre, who at the time kept a hotel at which town meetings were sometimes held.

He died March 4, 1848.

In 1788 John Halsey sold to his nephew Isaac Sayre thirty acres at "the head of the creek," and five acres at Halsey's Neck. Isaac sold the first-mentioned plot to his son Jehiel in 1813.

In 1791 he was a farmer in Southampton, and probably a whaling captain.

In Liber M, folio 297 of Conveyances, Orange County, N. Y., a deed is recorded, in 1791, for one hundred acres of land in Blagg's Clove, New Cornwall, conveyed to Hezekiah Howell, Jr., by Job Sayre and Isaac Sayre, Yeomen of Southampton, being land which their father had received from his brother Ezekiel.

He died July 27, 1850, and was buried in Northend Cemetery, Southampton.

He was a soldier of the Revolution, as appears from the following copy of application for pension on file in the Pension Bureau at Washington:

STATE OF NEW YORK COUNTY OF SUFFOLK \$ ss.:

On this 6th day of February, 1838, personally appeared before me Hugh Halsey of Southampton in said County, First Judge of the Court of Common Pleas in and for said County, JAMES SAYRE, of said Town of Southampton, County and State aforesaid, who being by me first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7th, 1832.

That he was born at Southampton, aforesaid, on the 20th day of August, 1753, and was eighty-four years of age on the 20th day of August last, as he has always been informed and believes; that he has seen a record of his age in his father's

family Bible, but is unable to state where that record now is.

That he enlisted in the service of the United States on the 28th day of June, 1775, in the town of Southampton and County of Suffolk, State of New York, in the company commanded by Capt. John Hulbert, John Davis 1st Lt., and Wm. Haven 2d Lt., belonging to the third regiment of New York forces under the command of Col. James Clinton; that he enlisted as a Corporal into said company; that he enlisted for the term of six months to commence on the 1st day of July and end on the 31st day of December then next. A few days after his enlistment the company was mustered at the residence of Capt. Hulbert in said town of Southampton, and he with said company marched to Montauk, being the extreme East part of Long Island, and were stationed there as a guard to protect and defend the cattle feeding upon the extreme plains, or common, from the depredations of the British then lying in Gardner's Bay; that two other companies were there a part of the time, one from Southold in Suffolk Co., commanded by Capt. Griffin, the other from Huntington in said County, commanded by Capt. Grinnell; that he continued at Montauk in the service until the latter part of August of that year, at which time Gen. Wooster came to Montauk with orders for the three companies then stationed there to march to Ticonderoga in the northern part of the State of New York; that he with said company left Montauk and embarked on the first of September on board a sloop at Sag Harbor and arrived at New York in a few days; that he with said company staid in New York a few days and then again embarked on board the same sloop for Albany where they arrived in a few days; staid there a few days and then marched through Half Moon and Saratoga on the west side of the Hudson river to Lake George where they embarked on board of boats and went to the head of the lake where they landed and marched to Ticonderoga a distance of about three miles; that he arrived there sometime in the month of September and continued in the Fort at Ticonderoga until the first of November. In the month of November Fort Chambly on Lake Champlain was taken by General Montgomery, Gen. Arnold, and Ethan Allen, and one hundred and seventyfive prisoners, as it was said, were taken, being men, women and children. The prisoners were sent down to Ticonderoga the last of October and put under the care of Capt. Hulbert's Co. They left Ticonderoga with the prisoners the first day of November and crossed Lake George and thence marched down to Albany; that on arriving at Albany Capt. Hulbert with a part of the company started for Trenton with the officers and musicians and that he with a part of the company under Lieut. Havens, guarded the other prisoners to Old Canaan, in the State of Connecticut, delivered the prisoners, staid there a few days, and then marched to Fort Constitution on the Hudson river where Capt. Hulbert and the rest of the company joined them; that he staid at Fort Constitution with said company in the service until about the 27th of December; that on that day, or two or three days before, his term of service expired he was sent to New York with despatches to one Capt. Johnson; that Benjamin Sanford and George Ludlow were sent with him; that he arrived in New York on the first day of January, 1776, and delivered the despatches to Capt. Johnson. When he left Ft. Constitution Capt. Hulbert told him not to return, but to go on home from New York, as his term of service would expire on the 31st of December; that he staid in New York one day and embarked on board of a sloop for Setauket, on Long Island, where he landed and went through Riverhead to his home in the Town of Southampton, where he arrived about the fourth or fifth of January, 1776, having served his full term of enlistment of six months.

He knows of no person whose testimony he can procure who can testify to his service except Abraham Sherril of the town of East Hampton in said county of Suffolk, who was with him as a private in said company. He now lives in the said town of Southampton and has lived there ever since the Revolutionary War. He is acquainted with Rev. Amri Francis and Gurden Cowithe, residing in his neighborhood, who can testify as to his character for veracity and their belief of his services as a soldier of the Revolution. He had a written discharge from Capt. John Hulbert but has since lost it and is now unable to say where it is.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the Agency

of any State.

Your petitioner therefore prays that he (there being no widow) may be appointed Administrator of the Goods, Chattels and Credits of the said deceased, and will ever pray, &c.

In the Name of God, Amen. I David Sayre of the town of Southampton in the County of Suffolk and State of New York Farmer being of sound mind

and memory thanks be to God therefor but calling to mind the mortality of my body do make this my last will and testament and principally I recommend my soul to God who gave it and my body I recommend to the earth to be buried in decent Christian burial and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me I dispose of it in the manner following.

Firstly. I give to my beloved wife all the personal estate which remains of

what she brought me.

Secondly. I give to my three daughters Pamelia, Polly and Joyce five dollars in cash to each of them and my will is that they shall have a home in the house as long as they remain single.

Thirdly. I give to my son Hervey Sayre to him his heirs and assigns forever about Four acres of Brushland which is bounded Northerly and Southerly by

Matthew Sayre.

Fourthly. I give to my son Oliver Sayre to him his heirs and assigns forever all my buildings together with all the residue of my lands woodlands & meadows. Also give to Oliver all my moveable estate of whatever nature or quality the same may be except what is above disposed of on condition that he pay all my just debts and the legacies and in all things comply with my will as it respects more particularly his three sisters above named, and I make my son Oliver Sayre sole executor to this my last will and testament and I do hereby revoke every other will or wills by me before made and do ratify and confirm this and none other to be my last will and testament.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF I have hereunto set my hand and seal this eleventh day of January in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and nineteen.

His application for pension, on file in the Pension Bureau in Washington, reads as follows:

STATE OF OHIO, PERRY COUNTY.

COURT OF COMMON PLEAS, NOVEMBER TERM, 1832.

On this 9th day of November, 1832, personally appeared in open Court, now sitting, Reuel Sayre, a resident of said County of Perry and State of Ohio, aged within a few months of seventy-nine years, who, being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress of the 7th of June, 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated. That he volunteered in the Salem County, N. J., Militia and went out under Captain Wood, on the third day of August, 1776, as he thinks, in the regiment of Col. Holmes, served more than one month

as a private volunteer. "On my return I was chosen a lieutenant in Captain Shepard's Co., of N. J. Militia, in Col. Holmes' regiment, and went out in December following - cannot tell the exact time - in 1776. I held a Commission as Lieutenant which I have taken no care of and lost or destroyed, supposing it to be of no service. I served five months as a Lieut. and was then chosen Captain. I did not actually serve as Captain. I am perfectly satisfied that I served in all as Lieutenant and private, as aforesaid, six months. I was out in service as Lieut. when the British took possession of Salem, N. J. The Captain was then severely wounded and being afterwards unfit for duty I was chosen Captain. I was in two or three skirmishes, first at a place called Petticoat Bridge, in the upper part of Jersey, when the British over-run the Jerseys. Next I was under Washington when he was attacked at Trenton; the next at a place called Hancock's Bridge. When the British were in Salem, Salem County, N. J., they came upon us by surprise, the guard was taken, and every man killed but myself. We were stationed at the Bridge, we had guards up and down the Creek, they came through the marsh on the back of us at night; I got off by mingling among the British in the dark. All were killed, left for dead, or taken prisoners, but myself. This was the time our Captain was wounded and left for dead. I had one brother killed and one taken prisoner in this night affair."

He cannot name any officers more particularly that he knew. "There is no man living as I know of whose testimony I can procure. I am so very deaf that it is almost impossible to understand fully what is to be done to obtain my

pension."

QUESTIONS BY THE COURT.

When and in what year were you born?

Ans. I was born in the year 1754, in July, in Salem County, N. J.

Have you any record of your age, and if so where is it?

Ans. I have, but not knowing that it was necessary I have not brought it with me and I understand the Court is about to adjourn. I can send it into town.

Where were you living when you entered the service; where have you lived since? Ans. I lived at Salem County, N. J. Since I lived in N. J. till 1795. I lived in Pennsylvania about twenty years and I have lived in this State until to-day seventeen or eighteen years.

How were you called into service?

Ans. I always turned out as a volunteer. I was a young man and always stepped out.

State the names of some of the regular officers, where you served, the Continental and Militia Regiments, and the general circumstances of your service.

Ans. I cannot further than I have done.

Did you ever receive a discharge or commission, if so, what has become of it, and by whom was it signed?

Ans. I did not receive a discharge. I cannot remember who signed my com-

mission. It is gone. I wish I had it now.

State the names of persons to whom you are known in your neighborhood and who can testify to your character for truth and veracity.

Ans. Judge Wilson, Judge King, and the Rev. Thomas Moore.

I hereby relinquish all claim whatever to a pension except the present and declare that my name is not on the pension roll of the Agency of any State.

470 NATHANIEL 6 SAYRE was born November, 1754.

His father had died during the war, intestate, leaving a large farm of several hundred acres at Connecticut Farms, N. J., which, according to the law of the State at that time, fell to Nathaniel, as the eldest son. He, however, divided the land among his brothers, "according to the wishes of his revered father," as is stated in the deeds; he removed to Mendham, Morris County, N. J., and subsequently to Dover, N. J., where he died about 1838, unmarried.

He served in the War of the Revolution, as appears by the following official statement, on file in the Pension Office at Washington, D. C. The pension was received by him until his death.

STATE OF NEW JERSEV, COUNTY OF MORRIS,

On this 7th day of August 1832, personally appeared in open Court before the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas now sitting, NATHANIEL SAYRE, a resident of Randolph township in the county of Morris and State of New Jersey, aged seventy-seven years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of

Congress passed June 7th 1832.

That he enlisted in the Continental army or State troops, he is uncertain which of the two it was, in August, 1775, as he thinks for the term of six months in a company commanded by Capt. David Palmer, William Crane being 1st Lt., the name of the Col. he has forgotten. With his company he marched to New York and from thence to Albany, to Ft. George and Ticonderoga, thence to St. Johns where the enemy fired upon them and they often had skirmishes with them. From St. Johns he was removed with his company to Montreal where they kept garrison until January. They returned to Albany and at the expiration of the time for which he was enlisted he was discharged and returned home, but has since lost his discharge. The company to which he was attached was raised for the purpose of aiding Gen. Montgomery in his attempt on Quebec but never reached further than Montreal.

The next summer, viz. 1776, he was ordered by his officers on a tour of militia duty for the period of one month at Elizabethtown to keep guard and to prevent the enemy from plundering etc. He served at this time under Capt. Potter, Col. Thomas being as he thinks in command of the regiment. He staid until the company was dismissed. After being at home for about one month he was again called out and did duty under the same officers at the same place and upon the same service as before for the period of one month and was again dismissed and went home.

Sometime in the Fall of the same year he did another month's tour of duty at Chatham, Springfield, Connecticut Farms, Elizabethtown, and helping guard along the shore again under Capt. Potter; was verbally discharged.

In the latter part of this year he was out for another month's tour at Ash Swamp, in the vicinity of Woodbridge, N. J., under the same officers. He be-

lieves that in the course of this year he was out four months.

In the year 1777, he was out at least three months under different officers, Col. Jacques commanding the whole of the troops while at Newark; he was employed during this time at Newark, and Elizabethtown, guarding the several points along the shore — chiefly at Elizabethtown.

In the course of the year 1778, he was very often called out and did duty for three months or more under Capt. Potter, often having none but company offi-

cers, as but few men were in service at the time.

Again in the year 1779, he was out as much as three months upon the same duty and in the same places as before. And through each year until the close of the war he performed as much as three months' tours of militia duty under different officers whose names he does not remember. He knows that Major Hays was an officer in his first year of militia duty, commonly called "Old Bark Knife."

From feebleness of memory he is altogether unable to state minutely his services during any part of the time in which he was engaged, and he is unable to give either the names of his officers or the months and years when the several

services were rendered.

This deponent was born in Elizabeth township, Essex County, N. J., where he lived when he entered the service. For more than forty years past he has resided in Randolph, Morris County, N. J., where he now resides. He will be seventy-eight years of age in November next but has no record of his age. He never received any other than a verbal discharge, or dismission from his officers for militia service after his service expired. He refers to Col. Joseph Cutter and Jonathan Nixon in proof of his character and the general belief that he served in the war of the Revolution. He verily believes he served twenty-two months, including his first enlistment of six months in the regular army.

He hereby relinquishes every claim to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY, Ss.:

Personally appeared before me, Samuel B. Miller, one of the Judges of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas and Justice of the Peace in and for said County of Essex, ANTHONY SAYRE, of the township of Springfield, County of Essex and State of New Jersey, who being duly sworn deposes and saith that he is the same Anthony Sayre who heretofore made a declaration for pension dated the 16th day of August in the year of our Lord eighteen hundred and thirty-two, and that by reason of old age, the great length of time and the consequent loss of memory, he cannot swear positively as to the precise length or period of the war when he served, but according to the best of his recollection at this time he served as a volunteer and drafted soldier in the Revolutionary War at the time, and not less than the period mentioned below:

That he first entered the service of the United States as a volunteer in the township of Springfield in the County of Essex and State of New Jersey, in the Revolutionary War, in the month of August, 1776, in a company of militia commanded by Capt. Jacob Brookfield, and did six months duty under the command of Major Hays in Col. Thomas' regiment, stationed first on Staten Island and then at Elizabethtown point, and helped build the fort or breastworks at said

point.

In the year seventeen hundred and seventy-seven, in the month of May, he was drafted in a company of militia commanded by the said Jacob Brookfield, and was in actual service that year as a private soldier under the command of the said Capt. Brookfield and Capt. Joseph Horton eight months, stationed at Elizabethtown point and Hackensack. He was that year part of the time under the command of Col. Jaquish and part of the time under Col. Thomas, and when at Hackensack under the command of Col. Bott (?).

In the spring of 1778 he was again drafted as a private soldier in a company of militia commanded by Capt. Joseph Horton (Capt. Brookfield having resigned)

and was in active service that year six months. The same year volunteered and went to Monmouth and was in the Monmouth battle, and was under the command of Col Jaquish, stationed the most of the time between New Brunswick and Hackensack.

In the spring of the year 1779 he was again drafted in said Capt. Horton's company of militia as a private soldier and was out in his company in active service five months that year, stationed the most of the time at Elizabethtown point under the command of Cols. Jaquish and Thomas.

In the year 1780 he was again drafted in the said Capt. Horton's company as a private soldier and did four months duty that year, and was in the battle of Springfield and pursued the British to Crown Point, in Capt. Squires' Company

stationed at Springfield and Connecticut Farms under Col. Jaquish.

In the spring of 1781 he was out on duty in the said Capt. Horton's company of militia as a private soldier four months, stationed at Springfield and along the enemy's lines between New Brunswick and Hackensack under the command of said Col. Jaquish — making his whole service as a volunteer and drafted private soldier in the Revolutionary war, in the militia, two years and nine months; and for such service he claims a pension. And this deponent further saith that the service stated in this and his original declaration to have been performed by him in the war of the Revolution as a private soldier was bona fide and actually rendered. That he was duly called out with his company and actually stationed at the different places mentioned in this and his said original declaration doing military duty all that time. And for the time during which the said service was performed he was not engaged in any civil pursuit.

As to the interrogatories prescribed by the War Department, to the first

he answers:

1. He was born in the township of Springfield, Essex County, N. J., October 10, 1754.

2. He has a record of his age now in his possession.

3. Was living in the said township of Springfield when first called into service, and has resided there ever since.

4. He first volunteered and then was drafted.

5. Knew General Washington, Gen. Wayne, Gen. Dickerson, Col. Wynes, Col. Ogden, and many others.

6. Never received any written discharge and has no documentary evidence.
7. William Stiles Ely, Matthias Denman, Caleb Woodruff Ely, John Wade, Abner Wade, Jacob Wyllys, Jacob Broadwell, and many others he might name can certify as to character.

In 1799 he was elected a Representative in Congress, and was continued for four years, from which station he was appointed by the Legislature of the State of New York a Senator in the Congress of the United States.

In 1814 he was made Marshal of the Southern District of New York, which office he held till his death, June 25, 1816.

On this 22d day of May, 1850, before me, a Justice of the Peace in and for said County and State, personally came SILAS SAYRE, and, being duly sworn, says that he is the identical Silas Sayre who was Captain of Company 1st in the 9th regiment of Infantry of the militia of the State of New York, commanded by Col. Joiner.

That on or about the 6th day of September, 1814, while in the service of the United States at a place called Plattsburg, in the State of New York, under the immediate command of Gen. McComb, he received the following injury to wit:

On the 6th of said September, 1814, while engaged with the enemy and on the retreat, Gen. Wright ordered a heavy rail fence thrown down, which impeded the course of his horse; many of the soldiers in the excitement of the moment immediately seized the rails and threw them almost every way, the end of one of which struck the applicant on the lower part of the abdomen causing a breach which he exhibited to his Lieutenant at the time, and consequently by his advice gave up the command on the eleventh to said Lt.; that the Surgeon of said regiment (since deceased) advised the applicant to abstain from all laborious employment which he has since done.

That the reasons of his not making earlier application are the delicate nature of the injury and his ability (except at intervals) to superintend his business so as to be able to gain a comfortable support. Recently the said injury has reduced

him to a state of total disability and complete dependence.

That he with others was discharged by general orders on or about the 15th day of September, 1814; that his Ensign is dead, and the affidavit of his Lieutenant is herewith sent; that he does not recollect the paymaster by whom he was paid.

They seem to have disappeared out of this community. I know of no person of that name."

Charles E. Hart died Saturday evening at 7 o'clock at his residence, 123 Plymouth avenue. He was born September 13, 1827, on a farm on Clover Street, in the town of Brighton. His father was Romanta Hart and his mother Ruth Coles Hart. At the age of 20 Mr. Hart went to California by way of the Isthmus of Panama, being a passenger on the Oregon during the second trip made by a steamer up the Pacific coast. The Golden Gate was entered on the first of April in the memorial year 1849, and the young pioneer, showing his usual energy, engaged in several business enterprises. He held shares in mines, leased a farm and managed a store. One especially interesting accomplishment is remembered: he introduced eastern fruit trees into California and secured seedlings and nursery stock in Rochester. After nine years on the Pacific coast Mr. Hart returned to Rochester.

Another residence in the West, during which Mr. Hart's efforts were chiefly devoted to mining, followed. In California he had studied carefully the washing process and soon gained equal familiarity with crushing and drilling. Business interests took him to Colorado, Idaho and New Mexico. His life up to this time had been unusually active, and the strain of overwork began to tell so severely upon his health, that ten years ago he returned to this city, and he had since then lived in comparative quiet.

He was the Democratic candidate for State Senator in the 44th Senatorial District of New York in the campaign of 1895, but was defeated in a strongly Republican district.

566a The account given on page 53 of Thomas Sayre (37), based upon statements made in Shourd's "History of Fenwick Colony," has been found to be incorrect. Said Thomas (37) was the Thomas referred to on pages 53 and 54, who had sons Benjamin and David; and Thomas (118) on page 94, and James (119) on page 97, were, without doubt, sons of David (64), who were numbered respectively 207 and 208 on pages 69 and 125. Thomas (207) and his wife Rachel were constituent members of the Baptist Church of Salem, N. J., which was organized May 17, 1755, at Mill Hollow, near Salem. In March, 1785, a movement was made to erect a new meeting-house, and Thomas Sayre was appointed one of the committee "to fix the size and mode of the house." The next month it was decided to build the new house in Salem, and Thomas Sayre was appointed one of the trustees. May 23, 1790, his son Reuel and wife Rachel were baptized, and September 25, 1790, Reuel was chosen as one of the collectors for the church, and September 15, 1792, he was chosen deacon. Thomas Sayre was a farmer and justice of the peace. He died about January, 1794, his will being probated January 8, 1794, as mentioned on page 94. In order that later generations may appear in their proper line of descent, we have concluded to make corrections in this manner. Of the sons of Thomas (118, which should be 207), the families of Reuel (367), Dennis (369), Thomas (371), and William (373), are found on pages 184 to 187. The descendants of these sons will be recorded under numbers other than stated on those pages so as to bring them under the correct pedigree. That is:

566b Referring to remarks on page 252, under 566a, concerning Thomas Sayre (118), we add that up to the time the account of his brother James (119, which should be 208) was printed, we had not been able to get replies from any of his descendants, and therefore could give only the meager information on page 97. The will of his father David (641 included the following item: "I give and bequeath to my beloved Son James Sayre my half part of ye Saw Mill with all ye land and meadow thereunto belonging when he shall arrive at the age of twenty years." The location of this saw-mill has not been identified, but it was probably in the vicinity of Jericho, Cumberland County.

On page 97 we affixed asterisks to the names of two of the sons of James, expecting to receive further information concerning them for mention in the proper place. This, however, has as yet come to hand only partially, and we add to the account stated on page 97 the following:

570 THOMAS SAYERS, born in Salem County, N. J., December 26, 1770; married April 23, 1795, Frances Dye, who was born January 7, 1777, and died February 27, 1853. A letter from him to his brother Ephraim in Pennsylvania is in possession of a descendant of the latter, who caused it to be published in a Pennsylvania newspaper, and it is here given as an illustration of some of the trials to which the early pioneers of our Western States were subjected early in the century. He died July 15, 1844.

MIAMI COUNTY, OHIO STATE, the 9th of February, 1812.

DEAR BROTHER: I once more am permitted by the leave of Divine Providence, with time and opportunity, to write to you, and am happy to inform you that my family is as well as common, thank God for his mercy. I received vours of the 29th of December, and also that you sent to Zanesville, and am glad to hear that you are all well. On the 20th of last month, a day or two after I received your last letter, I started to Ft. Wayne with a sled in company with five others, with whisky and flour for that garrison; it lies about a hundred miles from where I live in a northwest direction on what is called the Mamee, or Miami of the Lake. About 60 miles of the way is through the Indian lands and uninhabited. We had to encamp out five nights, the snow about 14 inches deep and the weather very cold. Some got their feet frostbit, tho' I did not; yet I am very unwell since I returned. I saw a good many indians at the fort, some of a strange tribe called the Kickepoos from the Illinois River, but did not learn their business there. There is great talk of a British and Indian war. If there should be war with England it is probable that there will be an Indian war also: if so it will be well with you and others who are out of danger. I lately saw a letter from one of our legislators, who says that they are about to raise a company of rangers to spy on our frontiers, who probably will be a help to our safety.

The most strange and awful news I have to relate to you is the shaking of the earth through all this country; the first shock of earthquake felt here was, I think, about the 16th of December; the last was on Friday last, first about 4 o'clock in the morning, the other about 9 o'clock in the evening. The first of the two last mentioned was very hard and the earth continued in motion for the space of two minutes, and some say more. I suppose it was not felt in Waynes-

burg or you would have mentioned it in your letter.

There is a copy of a letter published in a newspaper from a gentleman passing down the Mississippi, who was anchored near the Little Prairie, a little below the Chickasaw Bluffs. He stated that the earthquake, which was on the 16th of December, was very hard there, and that many of the islands sank in part and were split to pieces and the banks in places fell in in acres together, and all the logs, &c., imbedded in the bottom of the river, rose up and greatly obstructed the passage down the river, and that the inhabitants of that part were moving off from the river. Other reports are going that a volcanic eruption has taken place up the Missouri River in one of the mountains, and that it bursts forth with fire and that it has destroyed a vast many Indians near it. The truth of those reports I am not able to ascertain, but true it is that it is the awful power of God to

shake terribly the earth. I now come to tell you something about the land as you requested me. Mr. Smith has broke up and gone off down the river, tho' it is said full handed, and has left his lands in the hands of W. Lowery, his former agent, who is now his son-in-law, who sells to any who will purchase, tho' he does not sell much, as there has been but one fourth paid and the certificate taken out, so the back interest makes it come high to the purchaser. Another thing in his favor was that Congress allowed them a year of grace, the same as is allowed on other public lands not excepted to the rights of preemption, which prolongs the time of forfeiture till the first day of next January. I advise you, if you have a mind for land here to come down next fall, and if you like, deposit your money with a receiver or some other person, to enter, when forfeited, in your name. This is the best instruction I am able to give you and am but a poor adviser at any time.

I have a house and lot in Staunton; I wish you would send some one to buy it. It is a frame, with a stone chimney, two fire places, a good well of water in the yard, and the lot is inclosed with a post and rail fence. I ask only \$140 for it, and the forty I would take in shoemaking, if you can send a shoemaker to purchase. I think this is very low, and a shoemaker is very much wanted, and would meet with good encouragement, there being two tanyards near and no shoemaker. I shall be glad to see you or Reuben down here. I do not ever expect to come and see you again, as I am embarrassed with a large and expensive family, which requires my care and attention at home. We now have 12 children, four sons and eight daughters. The youngest was born on the 15th of November.

I shall omit writing again until John Dye goes up in the spring, and then I

will again if I am spared, and you can do the same when he returns.

No more at present; my pen is getting very bad, and I have now encroached on the hours allotted me for sleep, and must conclude, with remembering my love to my mother, brothers and all inquiring friends. Fannie remembers her love to Polly, and so do I also. Requesting you to show this letter to my mother, I am and remain your friend and brother,

She shared her portion liberally with those less fortunate than herself, and took a deep interest in the charities of the Woman's Auxiliary Society of the

Y. M C. A.

In the discourses at the funeral, tributes of respect were paid to the worth of her character, especially in its faithfulness and unselfish ministering to others.

The History of Orange County gives an extended account of Mrs. Lydia Sayer Hasbrouck and her husband, John Whitbeck Hasbrouck, accompanied by portraits; an epitome of which follows:

She was noted from childhood for her fearless spirit and independence of character. She inherited her father's temperament and features in a marked degree. She had the reputation in her school days of being the smartest girl of her classes, but terribly independent and self-reliant. When a reform dress for women, the "Bloomer Costume" was first brought into notice in 1849, she early espoused and adopted it. She was refused admission to the Seward Seminary at Florida, Orange Co., N. Y., because she insisted upon wearing the dress.

She was graduated as a physician at Hygeia Therapeutic College in New York, and began the practice of medicine, first in Washington, D. C., where also she began to write for the press. In September, 1853, she was a delegate to the World's Temperance Convention, held in Metropolitan Hall, New York, where so much excitement and disturbance were aroused by women taking part in the proceedings and speaking from the platform.

She spent several years in lecturing through the country, and in writing for

the press.

July 27, 1856, she married John Whitbeck Hasbrouck, who was born in Ulster Co., N. Y., Nov. 20, 1821, and who has been connected with various papers as publisher and as editor; among others "The Sybil," at Middletown, N. Y.

In 1880 the Legislature passed a law allowing women to vote for and hold school offices. At the first election, in Middletown, Mrs. Hasbrouck was elected a member of the school board by the "Equal Rights" element, uniting with the Temperance and Democratic vote against the Republican party.

Mrs. Hasbrouck has been successful, not only in her profession as a physician and in literary matters, but in the business world as well. She has been energetic and has shown remarkable abilities. She has become interested in real estate operations, and has erected some of the finest blocks in Middletown.

Park Commissioner William A. Stiles died early yesterday morning, at 241 Tonnele Avenue, Jersey City Heights, the residence of his sister,

Mrs. E. H. Davey.

Mr. Stiles was born March 9, 1837, near Deckertown, Sussex Co., N. J., where his father conducted the then famous school at Mount Retirement. The school accommodated sixty boys and girls, and was locally renowned as a preparatory college for many years. The Alumni Association still holds annual meetings. The house and grounds occupied by the school, which was given up at his father's death, have been for some years a farm operated for Mr. Stiles by his brother-in-law, E. N. Millen.

Graduating from his father's care, he went to Yale, where he was Graduating from his father's care, he went to Yale, where he was soon known as a promising mathematician and student. He was graduated in 1859. William C. Whitney and the late William Walter Phelps were among his associates there. A rather good story is told of one of his first experiences in the university. He was always gaunt and country-looking, and he never cared how his clothes fitted him or how shabby they were as long as they were clean. His fellow-students regarded him at first as very "green" and awkward. One day he was called upon to demonstrate a problem in geometry. He did it well and the professor nodded approvingly and the professor nodded approving his well, and the professor nodded approvingly, and then, pointing his finger, asked: "But why does A equal B?"

"Because two and two make four!" answered the new student.

The class laughed. The professor looked up sharply. He saw that no impertinence was intended, but that the geometrical fact was in the lad's mind as clear as the sum in addition. After that the class knew Stiles, and soon the whole college knew him. He was as a lad what he was as a man, of rugged honesty and ability, and he made friends easily and kept them for life. His manner of speech, his caustic humor and his kindliness of heart, added to the simplicity of his tastes, frequently tempted his friends to compare him with Abraham Lincoln. He was a celebrated after-dinner speaker, and one of the most popular members of the University Dining Club.

Mr. Stiles was a natural mathematician, and mathematical bent led him, when he left Yale and found his eyesight poor, to California to engage in Pacific slope surveying. His health failed, and he returned to Deckertown to take a professorship at Mount Retirement and assist his father as County Superintendent of Schools. During a long period of idleness forced upon him by the condition of his eyes he took up the study of botany. His sisters read aloud to him all the books to be obtained on the subject, and then questioned him as to

what they had read.

This eventually led to what has been his main interest in life, although only in recent years has he given all his attention to it. Forestry entranced him, and with its study naturally came a grasp of landscape gardening. He used to show how he came to take up landscape gardening from mathematics by this form of reasoning:

"Mathematics is logic, system, form. Art is form in its highest de-

velopment. Botany is the study of nature's growths, and from examination of nature's methods one learns the natural arrangement of plants and trees and of the paths through the collection of lawn, bush, and forest, and thus nature and art again commingle and again are proved

identical."

The appointment of Mr. Stiles by Mayor Strong to a Park Commissionership in 1895 was felicitous in the extreme. Not only was his knowledge of forestry of inestimable value to the city's park system, but his determination to permit of no desecration that he could help of the public parks led him frequently to voice public sentiment in his opposition to the less technically expert opinions of his brother Com-

missioners

When Mr. Stiles's eves became strong enough to permit him to pursue his ordinary vocations, he took up the study of animate things with the same earnestness that had characterized his study of the inanimate. He interested himself in politics, and was soon recognized as an authority on political affairs in New Jersey. He was an ardent and consistent Republican, and was for three years Secretary of the New Jersey Senate. He once contested a seat in the Senate in a strongly Democratic district, and was defeated only by a narrow majority. He served frequently as President of State conventions, and was a delegate to the Chicago Convention that nominated Garfield. He held a place in the New York Custom House for two years, but resigned because he found the work uncongenial.

In 1888 he became editor of "Garden and Forest."

Mr. Stiles was for years editor of the agricultural department of the "Philadelphia Press," and wrote all the New Jersey political matter for the "New York Tribune." He was later an editorial writer for the "Tribune," where his knowledge of English and his crisp, clean-cut form of expression made him a powerful adherent of whatever policy he was supporting. His versatility and thorough knowledge of the subjects in which he was interested made him a valued contributor to the local press and to the different magazines and reviews. Besides his hobbies - mathematics and botany and horticulture - he was well posted in the chemistry of agriculture, general literature, and music.

Mr. Stiles was never married. He was the only son of his parents. He had four sisters, three of whom - Mrs. E. H. Davey, Mrs. E. N. Millen, and Mrs. James Bennett — survive him. Dr. Joseph Hartwell, who attended him in his last sickness, and who was a famous athlete at Yale, is one of his nephews, and another is William Stiles Bennett,

a lawyer in the American Tract Society Building.

Mr. Stiles had an office in this city. His residence was given to inquirers as the Astor House, but the greater part of his leisure was passed either with Mrs. Davey or at the farm, near Deckertown. He was a member of the City Club, Yale Alumni Association, University Dining Club, Century Club, and Press Club.

The following account, with additions, appeared in the "Newark Advertiser" of May 13, 1833:

Samuel Sayre, Esq., formerly of this place, was murdered at ten o'clock on Saturday night last, together with his wife and colored servant girl, by a French laborer, Louis LeBlanc, who had been in his service for a fortnight. About an hour after daylight a person, passing the house of Mr. Sayre, picked up a bundle of clothing which was recognized as belonging to Mr. Sayre. He went to the house. Finding it locked up and failing to arouse the inmates, assistance was called, and the door broken open. A horrible discovery was made. The servant girl was found with her head cut open with a hatchet, and in the stable were found the bodies of Mr. Sayre and his wife, evidently killed with the same instrument. Le-Blanc stole a horse from the stable, and with a bag filled with plunder started for New York. He left the horse near Newark, and continued the journey on foot. Sheriff Ludlow in the meantime had been aroused and started in pursuit, taking with him a boy (afterwards the distinguished surgeon Dr. Lewis A. Sayre) who had seen LeBlanc at his kinsman's house the preceding day. The murderer was caught at a tavern on the salt meadows between Newark and Jersey City, was taken back to Morristown, and put in jail. The murder created the greatest excitement. The trial resulted in the conviction of LeBlanc, and he was duly executed. Mr. Sayre left two daughters, one of whom was away completing her education at the seminary at New Haven and the other was visiting friends in town, and thus their lives were saved! LeBlanc confessed that he waited several days for the return of this daughter, as he knew she had a gold watch he desired to get.

The Kitchell genealogy says of Baxter Sayre: "Deacon (he was a member of the Presbyterian Church) Baxter Sayre was a man of great force and fervor of character, a zealous Christian, and a bold champion of the Temperance and Anti-Slavery reforms in that early stage of conflict and obloquy that needed and produced heroes. Even before the great debate began, his tender conscience led him to emancipate his slaves in New Jersey, and when the conflict came, he was in it with clean hands and a whole heart. He was a friend of the Tappans, and associated with them rather than with Mr. Garrison.

"From 1828, he resided for ten years in New York, and was one of the foremost in building up the Chatham Street Chapel, and sustaining Rev. C. G. Finney in his labors there.

"On his return to New Jersey, in 1838, his dauntless advocacy of temperance and anti-slavery, amidst bitter opposition, entitled him to be ranked as the Apostle of these reforms in Northern New Jersey. He cast the first vote for the Liberty Party in Morris County, saying to the politicians: 'It is only one, gentlemen, but it will hatch.' His life was a warfare with evil, doing battle with wrong for the Lord, his King, at whatever odds. He died before victory came, but when Lincoln's Proclamation was announced, many remembered the toils and prayers of Baxter Sayre, and were glad that he too had joy over it in heaven.

"Betsey Kitchell was his fit wife and helper in such a strenuous and unselfish life. She inherited from her father his intellectual vigor, his keen wit, his constant industry and his piercing black eyes, flashing with fun and humor. She was slight and graceful, of retentive memory, abounding in anecdotes and reminiscences of the Revolution, and of the scenes and characters of the forming period of our government. Her girlhood fell in the times just after the War, when parties ran high, and chaos was coming into shape under the lead of Jeffersonian Republicanism. She took great interest in public affairs, and her intimacy with her father during much of his life in Washington, brought her into close acquaintance with the stirring events of the time. Her rare gift of humor and repartee, tempered with sense and judgment, made her the life of her household."

Baxter Sayre was a farmer, shoemaker, tanner and currier. He died September 17, 1857.

The following biographical sketch is mainly by Dr. John Stanford Sayre, who also defrayed the expense of the accompanying portrait.

The early education of David Austin Sayre was limited. He was apprenticed to learn the art of silver-plating. His employer removed from Elizabeth, N. J., to Lexington, Ky., in 1811, and his apprentice followed him, with a pack upon his back, through the wilds of Pennsylvania to Pittsburgh, where he took a boat down the Ohio to Maysville, whence he walked barefoot all the way to Lexington, arriving with only a half-dollar in his pocket. His employer had no legal right to take his apprentice out of the jurisdiction of one state into another, but he voluntarily followed, to work out a three years' apprenticeship, and to fulfill what he believed to be a moral obligation.

The silver plating business was continued in Lexington. He served out his apprenticeship to the end, and then kept on as journeyman. Toiling early and late, even to eighteen hours a day, he bought out the establishment of his late master who had failed. The new proprietor was workman, as well as salesman, in his small factory. The wares were reliable and of the right standard. His imprint can now be found on the heirlooms of many a home in that region. He continued silver-plating till 1823, when he connected a broker's office with his business. Intuitively the embryo banker found his place—the career for which he was so well qualified.

In 1829, he bought the credits and accounts of the old Commonwealth Bank of Kentucky, and his business became exclusively that of a banker, on the northeast corner of Short and Mill Streets, Lexington, Ky. This continued to be his office till his death. It was there he amassed his large fortune, and there he distributed his public and private bounties. The banking house of David A. Sayre & Co., founded in 1823, has never suspended in its history of more than three-

quarters of a century.

In the panic of 1857, he saved the Commercial Bank of Kentucky from ruin, by promptly paying both gold and his personal notes, which were considered as good as gold, for the notes of that bank. As soon as this was known, the run on the bank was stopped. The bank was saved as well as scores of private fortunes.

As a business man, Mr. Sayre was possessed of a subtle and keen intellect. He was wonderfully energetic; prompt in decision and leaped to conclusions, clear and reliable, which he was sure were right. A man of independent thought and opinion; and though impulsive, like his father, Deacon Ephraim, his advice was considered wise and prudent.

Nothing showed better the superior natural ability and character of the man, than the friends he made. Penniless and without a liberal education, he came to Lexington, "the Athens of Kentucky," its University and commercial center, the residence of its most distinguished and exclusive southern families, and his office became the resort of the ablest and best men of that region. His daily associates

him with their endearing expressions.

were Clay, President Holley, Crittenden, Breckinridge, Wickliffe, Bell, Johnson and others. With like disadvantages his rise in social position and in the respect of the people of Kentucky was perhaps only equaled by the late James B. Beck of Lexington, who was an overseer of negroes in a hemp factory on his arrival, and was afterwards elected to the Senate of the United States. When in London, the philanthropist, George Peabody, gave Mr. Sayre a dinner, showed him marked attention, and presented him with a portrait of himself. He was remarkably cheerful, jovial and affectionate in his disposition, so that he was known as "Uncle Davy" by young and old. Hospitality he dispensed with his father's liberality, and it is said, tears would moisten his eyes as the crowds of little children hailed

It was the spending of his wealth so largely for the good of the public and his fellowmen that made him so much respected and loved. One writer says he gave away over half a million dollars for charitable purposes during the last forty years of his life-time. As no one knew better than himself, this sum invested at no more than ordinary compound interest, would have accumulated to an enormous fortune; but he believed in being largely his own executor, and that what was given for benevolent purposes under his own immediate supervision, given promptly and judiciously, would be best given. Childless himself, he was an ambitious father to his brothers' children; giving educations or established positions, not only to them, but to others who had no claim of blood upon him. Among others whom he educated was his nephew, the distinguished surgeon, the late Dr. Lewis A. Sayre of New York. The last will of David A. Sayre bequeathed legacies by name to fifty-six of his relatives and connections, confirmed conveyances made to them during his lifetime and released all debts against any of them. Besides his will contained an original provision, the direction to establish a large Sayre Fund, "to give such assistance to my blood relations" as his "Executor thinks proper." This fund has been wisely managed for the past thirty years by the Executor, his nephew, E. D. Sayre, Esq., who succeeded his uncle, and still continues in the same office, the business of David A. Sayre & Co., Bankers.

He was a public-spirited citizen, ever ready to contribute to any enterprise by which the city or State of his adoption could be benefited. Making money to do good with, according to his conscience, he gave to the Orphan Society of Lexington, the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions, and to the Church, its schools and colleges, almost without stint, even authorizing persons in whom he confided to draw upon him within any limit their judgment sanctioned. He largely built the McChord Church, in Lexington, Ky.

His liberality erected the handsome library building of Center College,

Danville, Ky.

But the "Sayre Female Institute" of Lexington, Ky., was the greatest monument of this philanthropist. The buildings and grounds cost him almost one hundred thousand dollars; and to this Mr. Sayre added largely during his lifetime, endowing it with apparatus, furniture, etc. It was donated to the trustees in perpetuity, and is one of the most complete and best furnished female institutions south of the Ohio. The Alumnæ of "Sayre," now numbered by hundreds, are scattered all over the country. It was incorporated "with collegiate powers" in 1854, or seven years before Vassar College, which is older than Wells, Smith, Wellesley or Bryn Mawr. It was incorporated "when," according to President Raymond of Vassar, "not a single endowed college for young women existed in all Christendom." Section 6 of the Charter, says that "the Corporation shall have the power of conferring diplomas, and doing all the acts of incorporated colleges." Its Constitution states that "in accordance with the design of

the generous founder, the object of this institution is to afford female education of the widest range and highest order." David A. Savre was therefore entitled to the great honor of being the pioneer in the Southwest, and one of the leaders in the United States, of the higher education of women, the "novelty, benignity and grandeur of which idea," says Matthew Vassar, "arrested my attention."

David A. Sayre died on the 11th of September, 1870, when, says a biographer, "the city of Lexington was mourning a death felt in every household." The trustees of Sayre Female Institute passed resolutions to keep alive a respect for his memory, and his birthday was set apart as a holiday in the Institute, to be known as "Founder's Day." The Northern Bank of Kentucky resolved that in his death it had lost a trusted adviser, and a member of its Board. At a called meeting of the citizens of Lexington, Ky., it was requested that Judge G. B. Kinkead prepare for publication his excellent Memorial, and after a similar resolution, the Mayor issued a proclamation, asking that business be suspended during the funeral, and it was resolved that "the death of D. A. Sayre, benevolent, venerable in age, and abounding in charities, is a public loss."



ST. JOHN, NEW BRUNS'K, 5th July 1816.

MY HONORED AUNT: I had the very great satisfaction of receiving by the hands of Mr. Crookshank, Assistant Commissary General on the 29th ultimo, your most interesting and affectionate letter of the 17th April (probably ought to be May) to my Father. I with pleasure observe what you say respecting yourself, my dear Annt, and your children, my dear Cousins, all of whom I have never had the happiness to know personally.

I am greatly rejoiced to find that yourself, Mr. Bernan my Uncle and all

the family were in good health and so well established.

I am happy to hear from my other dear relations in the States, and sincerely trust that my dear Aunt Cox (724) has perfectly recovered from her

late distressing illness.

It is a long time since we have heard from you. The only letter we have received these several years was from my Cousin John (1807), your son, to my dear Father, in 1815, by Mr. Joseph Clarke, who had seen you some time

I with pleasure learn that he has gone to England to complete his studies, and to endeavor to be called to the English Bar, in which I hope he may effect-

ually succeed.

My Cousin Peter (1805 page 348) is, I am happy to see, elected a member of your House of Assembly for York. I hope he may give his constituents reason to approve their choice, and fill his station with satisfaction to himself and honor to his country. As you request your affectionate brother, my honored Father, to give you a full and circumstantial acc't of our family, I will do that for him for the present till he receives your letter and Cousin Peter's letter—although I shall not at this time express myself so fully on that head as

I intend to do in a future Letter.

My Father [James 6 Sayre (715)] married a daughter of Doctor Smith of this town, by whom he has a large family, viz:

Mary Elizabeth aged about 26 years, married and settled at Dorchester in this Province; Jane Ross married and settled in this town, aged about 24; William Pagan aged 22 years the 30th of June last; John aged 19 or 20 years; James aged about 16 or 17; Fanny Howard, Peter Otho Robinson, Thomas Smith, Theodocia and Emily, 10 in number, a very numerous family. My Father has never lost a child, but all are living.

My Father has not been so very fortunate in encreasing his worldly estate, as he could have wished, various heavy losses and disappointments in his mer-cantile line, put him considerably aback for a time, but thanks be to the Omnipotent Ruler of Heaven and Earth, he is getting well out of all embarassments, and he now possesses a tolerable good real estate. He lives at Dor-

chester in the County of Westmoreland in this Province, which is about 130 miles distant from this, a Vessel can run it in 12 hours, and it takes 3 days to travel by land. It is a pleasant country and fast improving; he formerly (about 13 years ago) lived at Maugerville, in this Province, where I believe, my affectionate Aunt, you have been. That is the place where my much honored Grandfather finished his mortal career, and I believe, my Grandmother also. Of these times you can be better acquainted with them than I am.

I have frequently heard Papa mention their revered names with yours, Mr. Robinson and all his other relatives with great affection. May they, under

Robinson and all his other relatives with great affection. May they, under the Almighty's protection rest in peace is my prayer.

My Uncle John (717) your Brother, now lives at Baltimore, U. S. is married to an English Lady, and had last year seven children. Mr. John Thomson, his wife's brother, was here last year, and gave me a particular account of them; he is doing pretty well, indeed very much so.

My Uncle Cadwallader we heard of last year, that he was in the Island of

St. Helena some years ago; the acc't did not come in a direct way, and cannot say if it was correct, but most probable it was. May he be blessed wherever

he is, poor fellow.

I am afflicted at the death of my dear Aunt Cunningham whom I have often heard of, but never had the blessing of seeing her; such is the way we all must go sooner or later; may we all put our trust in God Almighty.

Pray, my dear Aunt, let me know what names my fair cousins, your two

daughters have chosen to take in lieu of their original one; tell them to write me.

I beg you, Mr. B. and all the rest will favour me with their correspondence, and altho I have not the pleasure to be personally known to you, yet we may enjoy our mutual correspondence, which is even a great happiness.

I will indulge myself with the hope of one day seeing you all - may it not be far hence is my sincere wish. Oh! what would I not give to see this hope

realized.

I shall write my cousin Peter (1805) by this same mail which will leave this — in the Steam Boat to go by way of Fredericton and Quebec, etc. please write me by mail: direct "W. P. S. St. John, N. B."

I now live with my Godfather Mr. Wm. Pagan, one of the most respectable merchants of this city, whom you may recollect. He has nieces living in

Quebec.

I close this letter with the intention of soon writing again. I beg my sincere love to yourself, Mr. Bernan, cousins Peter and William and the young ladies my cousins, wishing you all the enjoyment of every blessing is the earnest prayer of your affectionate Nephew,

716 ESTHER ⁶ SAYRE, born February 17, 1763, in New York; married first, in New Brunswick, in 1784, Christopher Robinson, the son of William Robinson, who was born in Virginia in 1709, and nephew of Colonel Beverley Robinson, who raised a British regiment of "Loyal Americans" in New York, and who had married Susannah Phillipse, daughter of Frederick Phillipse, of Westchester County, N. Y., and at whose house, opposite West Point, N. Y., Arnold made his headquarters while he was conducting his treasonable plans.

Christopher Robinson was born in Westmoreland County, Va., in 1760, and was educated at William and Mary College, Va.; and early in the war, in 1777, when seventeen years of age, ran away from college and received a commission in the English army from his uncle, Colonel Beverley Robinson, in the latter's regiment, the "Queen's Rangers."

He served during the war, and was wounded; and after peace was declared went to Nova Scotia, where he received a grant of land at Wilmot. He subsequently, in 1792, moved to Upper Canada; was appointed Inspector of the Reserves of the Crown, and eventually settled at York, now Toronto.

In 1796 he was a member of the Assembly from Lennox and Addington Counties.

He died at York in 1798.

Esther married second Mr. Bernan, and died at Newmarket, near York, in 1827.

He was for eighteen years a member of the Legislature, serving in both the Upper and Lower Chambers.

During the War of 1812 he was one of the volunteers in the York Militia under Gen. Brock in the expedition which captured Detroit; and was also in the Battle of Queenstown Heights. In Nov., 1850, he was made a Companion of the Order of the Bath, and was created a baronet on Sept. 21, 1854.

He was Chancellor of Trinity College, Toronto, and was the author of several works on Canada. He resided at Beverley House, Toronto. He died Jan. 30, 1863.

and was one of the best after-dinner speakers in Canada.

He was president of the City Council of Toronto, was elected Mayor in 1857, and in the same year was elected to represent Toronto in the Canadian Parliament from 1857 to 1861, and West Toronto from 1861 to 1863. Was elected for Algoma to the Dominion Parliament in 1872, and served till 1874. Was a member of the Executive Council of Canada, and President from March 27 till May 21, 1862. Was re-elected at intervals for different constituencies until 1880, when he was appointed Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, which position he occupied for seven years.

He fell dead just as he was stepping on the platform at Sir Charles Tupper's great Conservative meeting, which he was to have addressed, held in Massey Music Hall, Toronto, June 19, 1896.

718 FRANCIS BOWES SAYRE, born in Lancaster, Pa., September 9, 1766; married April 9, 1792, Ann Heysham, who was born in Philadelphia, January 25, 1765.

The family Bible of William H. Sayre gives the following record of his mother's family—brought down to 1867.

She was the daughter of Capt. William Heysham who died in Philadelphia Sept. 26, 1797, in the 77th year of his age, and Mary, his wife, who died March 24, 1791, aged 68 years. He was a member of the Society of the Sons of St. George, elected April 23, 1793. His sword is in possession of his grand nephew, William H. Sayre, of South Bethlehem. They were buried in Christ Church burying ground, Philadelphia, as were many of their descendants. Their three other children were 1st, William P. Heysham, who was lost about 1800 in the wreck of the Charleston packet in the Delaware river; 2nd, Mary Heysham, who married

John Hannum Gibbons, M. D., and died at Holmesburg, Pa., Jan. 29, 1824, leaving one son, John Heysham Gibbons, who married Catharine Lardner, of Holmesburg, Pa. They now live in Charlotte, Va., with their daughters Anna and Virginia and son Nicholas. Another son, Lardner Gibbons, is married and lives on a farm in Greenville, S. C. Another son, John Heysham Gibbons, is a Brevet Major General in the U. S. Army, stationed with his family at Fort Saunders, Dakota Territory. Two daughters, Mary and Catharine Gibbons, are unmarried, living at Holmesburg, and another, Margaret, married John Moore.

Robert, second son of William and Mary Heysham, was in the battle of Trenton, when only sixteen years of age, and continued through the Jersey campaign. He acted as adjutant under Gen. William McPherson, during the insurrection in Western Pennsylvania. He was Deputy Naval Officer of the port of Philadelphia under McPherson's appointment. He died in Philadelphia, Nov. 14, 1822, in the 63d year of his age and was buried in Christ Church burying ground. Of his children, Margarita died Oct., 1824; Alexander Hamilton died July 24, 1830, in the 26th year of his age, both in Philadelphia; John Gibbons died in Matansas, July 4, 1831; Mary died in Philadelphia, June 8, 1840; and in the same city, William Sayre died May 7, 1849—all of the above were unmarried. Of the children of Robert Heysham, there yet survive, residing in Philadelphia, his son Edward, married, and daughter Frances.

Francis Bowes Sayre studied medicine in the University of Pennsylvania, and received the degree of M. D. in 1790. May 6, 1788, he became a charter member of the New Jersey Medical Society, the first medical society incorporated in the country. He first practiced medicine at Cresswick, N. J. He bought, April 6, 1792, a plantation there of sixty acres on the south side of Cresswick Creek, as appears from a deed recorded at Mount Holly, in Deed Book 6, folio 209, which he sold May 10, 1798. He died in Philadelphia, September 2, 1798, of yellow fever. Dr. Rush of that city, in his account of the Yellow Fever in 1797–98, mentions that Dr. Sayre was one of the most reliable practitioners of the time.

The *True American and Commercial Advertiser* of Philadelphia, September 3, 1798, gives the following notice: "His services in the cause of humanity (to which he has gloriously fallen a martyr) will ever be indelibly impressed on the numbers of his indigent fellow citizens, who by his persevering assiduity in his profession, have been rescued from the grave. How laborious and distressing his duty must have been, may be easily conceived, when it is known that previous to the attack, he had above one hundred patients under his care. The loss of Dr. Sayre, whose talents, industry and medical knowledge rendered him an invaluable member of society, is particularly distressing at this time."

Dr. James Milnor, in his "Memoirs," speaks of "my ever-to-be-lamented friend, Dr. Francis Bowes Sayre, who fell a glorious martyr to his philanthropy." He was buried in Christ Churchyard, corner Fifth and Arch Streets, Philadelphia, where his monument stands adjoining those of Francis Bowes and Andrew Reed.

Elias S. Ward, one of the most prominent business men of Newark, and well known throughout the State, died late yesterday afternoon at his home, 13 South Ninth Street, this city.

Early in the present century his grandfather, Jacob Ward, Jr., moved from Bloomfield to Afton, and here, at the old homestead,

where his aged mother still lives, Elias was born.

When about twenty-one years old he left his home on the farm and came to Newark to engage in business. He entered the leather trade and made himself a master of the details of leather manufacturing. For a number of years he was associated with others in the business, but about 1880 he organized the firm of E. S. Ward & Co., whose plant, one of the largest in the city, is on Norfolk Street. Mr. Ward prospered in business and accumulated a large fortune. He early became interested in electricity as a means of propulsion for street cars, and was the pioneer in introducing electric street railways in Newark. He was one of the projectors of the Rapid Transit Railroad Company, which built and operated what are some the West Viscol. Company, which built and operated what are now the West Kinney Street and Central Avenue lines of the Consolidated Traction Company. Later he, with others, bought the Newark and South Orange Street Railway, and he became its president, holding that position at the time of his death. He was also largely interested in electric railroads at Plainfield, this State, and in Bridgeport, Conn.
Soon after the organization of the Prudential Insurance Company,

Mr. Ward became a heavy stockholder, and for many years was prominent in its Board of Directors and as chairman of the Executive Committee. In all the enterprises with which he was connected, Mr. Ward displayed a broad public spirit, a generous liberality and a warm regard for the welfare and comfort of his employees.

He was always an ardent Republican, and from early life took an active interest in politics. He was not an office-seeker, however, and the only public position he ever held was in the Board of Chosen Freeholders, of which he was a member for several years.

In 1895, at the solicitation of many friends, he became a candidate for the Republican nomination for Governor, and at the nominating convention at Trenton received the solid support of Essex County, besides a number of votes from other counties, until it became evident

that John W. Griggs was the choice of the convention.

Mr. Ward was a man of great public spirit, and devoted much time and thought to the improvement of the city and the advancement of its commercial and manufacturing interests. He was an active member of the Board of Trade, and of many other organizations of a semipublic character, all having the betterment of the community as their object. In private life he was noted for his genial disposition, his unostentatious charity and his never-failing generosity. Few men in the State had a wider circle of personal friends.

He was a mason and builder and dealer in masons' materials for many years in New York City, and subsequently in Newark, N. J. He was Alderman from the old North Ward in Newark when there were only four wards in the city. He died October 7, 1892, at the age of ninety-nine years and five months.

His widow made this statement concerning him:

Although he was eighty-four when we were married, he was in no sense, but in his number of years, an old man. Both in regard to mental and physical vigor, he might have been twenty years younger. He was a man of cheerful, genial disposition, never giving way to despondency.

He became a Christian early in life, uniting with the Second Presbyterian Church of Newark, of which he was an honored member at the time of his death. He was by trade a mason, and spent his early life in Elizabeth and Newark. During the War of 1812 he was employed by the government to work on the forts at Staten Island. From there he went to New York to work at his trade.

In 1831 he removed to Newark, and engaged in business as a dealer in masons' materials and supplies, by which he made a comfortable competence, and retired from business about 1846.

He died in the same home where he had lived for over sixty years, No. 225 Orange St.

His judgment was excellent, and he retained it to a remarkable degree, attending to his own business matters until the last week of his life, with the outside assistance of his son James, and the writing by some member of his family, as he lost his eyesight a year or two before his death. He still signed his own signature as long as he lived.

If you care for the signature of a man in his one hundredth year, who could only indistinctly see a piece of white paper against a black background, I inclose you one, cut from an old check dated August 15, 1892.

784 GILBERT HUNT⁶ SAYRES was born in Westfield, N. J., December 13, 1787; married May 30, 1810, Eliza Maria Brown, who was born January 14, 1788, and died June 13, 1874. (He spelled his name with a final "s.")

He was educated at Columbia College, N. Y., from which he was graduated in 1808, and received the degree of Doctor of Divinity.

In 1863 Columbia honored him with the degree of S. T. D. While in college he left the Society of Friends, and, joining the Episcopal Church, began his preparation for the ministry. He was made deacon by Bishop Moore, October 6, 1809, and ordained priest by Bishop Hobart February 27, 1812. In 1810 he took the charge of Grace Church, Jamaica, L. I., becoming rector after ordination to the priesthood, and so continued until ill health compelled his resignation in 1830. This was his only parochial charge. His disabilities becoming chronic, he was able to render only occasional ministerial services. He continued his residence in Jamaica until his death, April 27, 1867.

One who knew him well wrote at his death, "Dr. Sayres has passed an eventful and useful life. His general intelligence, his piety, his urbanity of manners, his charity and Christian liberality, are all too well known to require particular mention. He was one of the founders of the American Bible Society, and gave a helping hand to every good cause. His memory will long be cherished by the humble and oft-neglected poor, whom he was ever ready to assist with religious consolation and advice."

Y., and was admitted to the bar in 1850. As a lawyer he excelled in those resources which come from profound study coupled with a high degree of legal acumen. He had a passion for legal scholarship and recondite reasoning. He was twice elected to Congress (1870 and 1872). The office and honor of judgeship came to him (1859) by appointment, at the very beginning of his legal career, and two months later the wisdom of the appointment was confirmed by vote of the people of Chemung. The closing years of his life were honored by a unanimous selection (1883), by the people of this district, to a seat upon the supreme bench of the State of New York, and though compelled by ill health to resign the position, he had the satisfaction, granted to but few men, of seeing his own son made his successor, first by the selection of a political opponent, Gov. Hill, and then by the unanimous choice of the people.

"It was while he held a seat in Congress that the famous 'back pay' measure came up, and Congressman Smith was one of the minority who voted against the measure, and, when it was finally passed, refused to accept the increased compensation, but presented it to the Orphans' Home of Elmira. He introduced the first resolution in Congress directing the President to make efforts to settle differences between nations.

"He looked well after the interests of old soldiers during his term,

introducing many private pension bills for their relief.

"Judge Smith was a man of deep religious convictions. He was greatly interested in his church, the First Presbyterian. He was also a lover of literature, and was especially fond of poetry and works of a philosophical character. In the height of his physical powers there was no better public speaker than he in this part of the State. His addresses were polished and strong. They exhibited the culture of a well-stored mind, abounded in the keenest wit, and never failed to create an impression. One of his most notable speeches was on the occasion of Washington's birthday, Feb. 22, 1862, when the war excitement was at its height. It was regarded as one of the most remarkable speeches ever made in Elmira."

At the breaking out of the War of 1812, being then only seventeen years old, he enlisted in a Greene County Regiment, and served till the close of the war.

After farming a little while, he shipped on a whaler from Sag Harbor, and subsequently became a captain. Many missionaries were passengers with him to the Sandwich Islands, and he was very popular with them.

The Sandwich Islanders were at that time in a state of semi-barbarism. On one occasion a chief, with several of his men, boarded Captain Sayre's ship, it is supposed with the intention of murdering him and his crew, but were so kindly entertained that the chief took from his neck a large shell which he wore, and presented it to Captain Sayre, which was considered the highest honor he could confer.

One of the Sandwich Islands was named for Captain Sayre.

At an advanced age he retired from the sea, and made his home at Cairo, N. Y. In 1850 he was appointed superintendent of the Sailors' Home in New York, and held the position three years, with the highest appreciation of the Board for his admirable management. The Home had for many years been burdened with debt, and a final contribution from Captain Sayre in 1864 canceled it, as is shown by an article in the "Sailors' Magazine" of May, 1864:

"We are most happy to make the announcement that the last shot which settled the sinking iron-clad pirate that has for twenty-two years been threatening the Sailors' Home, was the five-hundred-pounder from the locker of the old blind sailor."

He died October 1, 1875. His monument, in the village cemetery of Cairo, is a block of white marble, on the top of which rests a book representing a closed log-book, indicating that his life work was done. On one corner is carved a compass with the four cardinal points.

On the front face of the block are the words "My Husband."

Was president of the Chicago Wholesale Grocers' Exchange; first president of the Merchants' Exchange; treasurer of a railroad company, and in 1891–92 was president of the "old" Tippecanoe Club of Chicago, with a roster of more than five hundred men who had voted for General William Henry Harrison in 1840. "He was educated at the Hudson Academy, and left home when nineteen years of age, for Maysville, Mason County., Ky., a stranger in a strange land, with only his clothes, a few books and a dollar and a half in his pocket, half of which sum he gave to a fellow-traveler who was sick and without money. While waiting at the hotel, considering what was best to do, an old gentleman, Jesse Holton, came in. They soon became engaged in conversation, and each learned the wants of the other. Mr. Sayre wanted a school; Mr. Holton wanted a teacher. They rode around and made up a school, and he continued teaching in that neighborhood for two years, when he married one of his pupils, Sallie Holton, a niece of his first employer. Ill health sent him to Boone County, Ky., where he cleared a space in the timbered land and built a rude cabin, and for three years cultivated the land. But the rude life and hardships sent him back to Mason County, where for several years he resumed his teaching. He took up the study of Latin, without a teacher, and became so proficient that he could teach it in his school. Subsequently he removed to Warsaw, Gallatin County, Ky., and taught for three years, when, through ill health, he gave up teaching, and took a farm four miles from Warsaw, where with his wife and eight children he spent his remaining years. When nearly seventy-five years of age he took up the study of French, and in less than a year could translate and read understandingly to himself, and in two years could translate and read aloud as well as in English. He subscribed for a French paper for many years, and those hearing him read would not believe it was printed in French. This also he did without a teacher.

"He was a Whig, a slave-owner and Southern sympathizer, though he took no part in the Civil War. He had his second eyesight at eighty years of age, and could read by lamplight without glasses." He died in Warsaw, July 19, 1885.

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

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

"That we deeply regret the action of our beloved Superintendent, Mr. Theo. M. Banta, in tendering his resignation as Superintendent of our Sunday-school. "That we hold him in the highest estimation for the twenty-five years of con-

The following sketch appeared in the "Atlanta [Ga.] Journal":

William Wirt Allen entered the service of the Confederate States in 1861 as rist lieutenant, and was for a time stationed at Pensacola, under command of Colonel, afterward Lieutenant-General Braxton Bragg. In 1862 he became colonel of First regiment Alabama cavalry, and was distinguished for gallantry during Bragg's Kentucky campaign, including the engagements of Bear Wallow Horse Cave, and on the Mumfordville turnpike, at Green river. In the latter engagement Colonel Allen led the brilliant charge in which his lieutenant-colonel, T. B. Brown, was killed. This charge elicited the praise of even the Federal general against whose troops it was directed. In a charge at the battle of Perryville Colonel Allen was again wounded, and General Wheeler, in his official report, says: "This charge, one of the most brilliant of the campaign, was made in column by detachments of the First and Third Alabama, the gallant Colonels W. W. Allen and James Hagan being in advance."

In the Murfreesboro campaign Colonel Allen led his regiment in the almost continuous cavalry fighting of December, '62, and January, '63; participated in Wheeler's famous rides around Rosecrans' army during the battle of Murfreesboro, and the destruction of the Federal wagon-trains which so crippled

Rosecrans that he was unable to advance for several months.

At a critical stage of this battle one of the most brilliant charges of the war was made by Wheeler's First brigade, and conspicuous at the head of his regiment was the handsome and intrepid Allen, his sabre flashing high in the air. Suddenly his right hand was shattered and at the same moment his horse was killed. Mounting behind his bugler, he refused to be taken from the field until he was carried to the head of his column, and, holding his bloody hand aloft, several of his fingers dangling, he called upon his boys "to avenge this."

In General Wheeler's official report of this campaign Colonel Allen was particularly commended for gallantry, and while disabled he was promoted to


rank of brigadier-general.

During the retreat from Dalton to Atlanta, what was known as the "Confederate Brigade," composed of the Third, Eighth (under Colonel J. S. Prather of Atlanta), Tenth and Twelfth Confederate regiments of cavalry, was commanded by General Allen, and frequent mention is made in official reports of the important service rendered by this command in protecting the rear and flanks of General Johnston's army. In the engagements at Cassville, Pickett's Mill and Decatur General Allen and his brigade bore a conspicuous part.

Judged by its results and considering the disparity of the forces engaged, probably the greatest cavalry exploit of the war was the destruction by Wheeler's cavalry, numbering less than 5,000 men, of the gigantic raids sent out by General Sherman during the battles around Atlanta; these numbered over 9,000 picked men under Federal Generals Garrard, Stoneman and McCook. Garrard's division of 3,800 was driven back to his main army by General Kelly with less than half the enemy's numbers; McCook was overtaken near Newnan, and of the 3,600 comprising his division less than a third got out; Stoneman was captured near Macon by Generals Iverson, Allen and Crews. Stoneman claims that he was surrounded, but, as he had 2,300 men and was captured by 1,300, it reminds one of Pat's explanation of how he captured three of the enemy: "Bedad, I surrounded 'em!"

In the latter part of August, 1864, and during Wheeler's raid into middle Tennessee, in which the gallant Kelly was killed, General Allen was given command of Martin's division and commanded a division fighting Sherman through Georgia and the Carolinas, and in February, 1865, he was promoted to major-general and confirmed by the Confederate Senate.

At Waynesboro, Ga., November 28, 1864, General Allen had two horses shot under him and was painfully wounded, but continued on duty. At Aiken, S. C., Allen's division was largely instrumental in saving the town from the ravages of the enemy, which service was gratefully acknowledged by Governor McGrath, of South Carolina, and rewarded by the presentation of a beautiful

silk flag from the ladies of Aiken.

In the attack on Kilpatrick's camp, near Fayetteville, N. C., in March, 1865, the author of "Hampton and His Cavalry," in speaking of the charge made by Butler's division of Hampton's command, quotes from General Kilpatrick's official report, in which that officer says: "I found my men flying before the most formidable cavalry charge I had ever witnessed." Kilpatrick's report does contain the language quoted, but it says the charge was made by Allen's, Hume's, and Butler's divisions.

The same author also refers to a peculiar piebald stallion and a magnificent black horse captured by Butler's division from General Kilpatrick. I have General Wheeler's word for it that his Texans captured the stallion and gave it to him, while there is a gentleman living in Atlanta who saddled the black

horse for General Allen to ride after the latter's horse had been killed.

From the foregoing it will be seen that General Allen was in no sense a parlor knight, but was in the front of battle from Kentucky to the Carolinas. As brave as a Paladdin, he was as modest as he was brave. He shrank from making himself conspicuous, was only prominent when a battle was on, and then was always to be found in the thickest of it. While few officers in our army had as brilliant a career, few are less widely known. But his memory lives in the hearts of hundreds of the veterans who followed him in the days which tried men's souls.

The beautiful flag presented by the ladies of Aiken is preserved by his fam-

ily, and his old battle-flag and bullet-riddled coat are deposited in the corner-

stone of the Confederate monument at Montgomery.

After the war General Allen was content to be a loyal and quiet citizen, and followed planting for a time. Later he became connected with a railroad, with headquarters in New Orleans, was a member of the city government of Montgomery, and was adjutant-general of Alabama under President Cleveland. He was one of the organizers and the first president of the Confederate Survivors' Association of Montgomery. In 1893 he moved to Sheffield, Ala., where he died, November 21, 1893, and his battle-scarred body was laid to rest in Florence, on the banks of the beautiful river, over which he had so often led his troopers to battle.

1185 DANIEL 7 SAYRE, born in Warren, Franklin County, O., January 13, 1808; married November 26, 1835, Musidora Morgan, a sister of United States Senator Morgan, who was born in Huntsville, Ala., March 28, 1818.

The "Montgomery Daily Advertiser" of April 8, 1888, contains the following:

"Daniel Sayre came to Montgomery in 1820, when a boy of twelve years. He became the editor of the 'Talladega Watchtower' in 1844. He afterwards moved to Tuskegee, where he edited and published the 'Tuskegee Republican,' the Whig organ of the staunch old Whig County of Macon. He occupied this position till 1854, when he was elected Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Masons of Alabama, when he removed to Montgomery, where he lived till his death. He held this Secretaryship consecutively for nearly thirty-four years. He was also for many years Grand Secretary of the Grand Chapter, and Grand Recorder of the Grand Council and the Grand Commandery of the State."

He was widely known and greatly loved for his kindness of heart, his benevolence and his good, sound judgment. He was a man of strict integrity, and was a tower of strength to the Masonic fraternity. He died at Montgomery, Ala., April 7, 1888.

1187 CALEB SMITH ⁷ SAYRES, born near Elizabeth, N. J., in 1768; married Susan Richards, daughter of Jacob and Susanna Wills Richards, who removed to Philadelphia after her husband's death, and married second, John Galvin, of United States Navy. Dr. Sayres united with the Presbyterian Church at Westfield, N. J., July 31, 1785. He served as surgeon in the 8th Battalion Pennsylvania Militia, Lieutenant-Colonel Vernon commanding; and practised medicine at Marcus Hook, Chester, and in other parts of Delaware County, Pa. His residence at Marcus Hook, facing the river, is still standing. He was a Justice of the Peace for the county, and a liberal subscriber to the funds of St. Martin's Church at the Hook.

He died at Marcus Hook, Pa., December 3, 1799, and was buried under the floor of St. Martin's Church, as it is now extended.

In early life he went to Brazil as supercargo of his own vessel, the Clio; was afterwards a merchant in Philadelphia; was appointed Vice-Consul of Brazil, Dec. 3, 1841; Vice-Consul of Portugal, March 13, 1850; Vice-Consul of Sweden and Norway, July 10, 1854; and Vice-Consul of Denmark, May 1, 1862, resident at Philadelphia.

"Was appointed by the Princess Regent of Brazil Honorary Consul of that Empire, with the rank of Captain in the Brazilian Navy, Feb. 2, 1872, for long and faithful service to the Empire; and was at the time of his death Dean of the Consular Corps at Philadelphia, and probably the oldest foreign Consul in point of service in the United States.

"Mr. Sayres was a gentleman of the olden school, courteous and dignified. At over seventy years of age he was erect and his step as springy as a man of fifty. He was a great reader, had a fine memory and was a good linguist, and was the owner of a fine library. He died in Philadelphia, Pa., March 29, 1877, and was buried in Laurel Hill Cemetery."

A newspaper of Newark gave the following account of Mr. Sayre:

> In the death of Voziferi Sayre, who was buried yesterday, Springfield loses its most noted character. "Uncle Zip," as he was familiarly called, was known to every man, woman and child of Springfield, and to many beyond the boundaries of the little village. Every sportsman who has hunted on the Spring-field mountain during the past half century knew him, for he was a fine shot, and many times the sportsmen have been entertained by his quaint talk and

stories and partaken of his hard cider.

"Uncle Zip" was born on the mountain sixty-five years ago, within a mile of the house where he died. His father's farm was on the top of the mountain, near the road that leads from the county road, near Springfield, to Summit. The house set back in the woods a mile from the road. His father, Anthony Sayre, was unusually strict with his children, even for those days, and never allowed them to have companions, or to leave the farm unless he was with them. They were never allowed to attend school, and even when he took any of them to the village, which was very rare, he would not permit them to

speak to any one, even though they were spoken to.

There were three boys and a girl in the family, "Uncle Zip" being the eldest. Thrown upon their own resources for companionship and amusement, the children grew up very "odd," as the neighbors called them. They were absolutely without any knowledge of the ways of the world outside of the boundary fence of the mountain farm. Even their speech had an odd drawl, and their words were accented so peculiarly that it was difficult to understand them. This peculiarity of speech clung to "Uncle Zip" all his life.

When he was about eighteen years old he ran away from home, and went

to work for a farmer near Springfield. He was very thrifty, and had saved enough from his earnings when he was married, a few years later, to buy a small mountain farm near his father's.

A thorough hunter was "Uncle Zip," and it was perhaps through this that he came to be so widely known. He knew every path and thicket on the mountains between Springfield and Bound Brook. He could go out and come back with a well-filled bag when other hunters would return emptyhanded. All the choice grounds for rabbit, partridge, quail, coon and 'possum he knew, and that sportsman who was fortunate enough to be allowed to accompany "Uncle Zip" was happy. It was a favor not lightly bestowed, and when given was appreciated.

Next to his love of hunting "Uncle Zip" loved to "swap." It made but little difference what was traded—horses, cows, wagons or farming implements—he was ever ready for a trade, and that he was not slow in driving a bargain many who have tried to take advantage of his supposed innocence and ignorance can testify. He was Overseer of the Roads in one of the Springfield districts for many years, and was frequently a member of the petit jury, and his colleagues on the jury always respected his straightforward honesty and hard common sense.

The universal esteem in which "Uncle Zip" was held was plainly attested by the large number of people who attended his funeral. A widow and two

sons survive him, and he leaves an estate estimated at \$15,000.



"Mrs. Annie Roush has died at Letart, a few miles from Parkersburg, W. Va., aged nearly one hundred and five years. It is thought, says the "Washington Star," that she was the head of the largest family in the world and the only woman in this country who lived to see her sixth generation. Mrs. Roush was born at Morgantown, Pa., June 4, 1787, when Washington, Hamilton and Jefferson were planning the Constitution. Her father was David Sayre. In 1801 Mr. Sayre started west and settled above Pomeroy, on the Virginia side. Here he resided

several years, finally moving up the river and crossing to where Letart now stands. In 1802 Annie married Henry Roush, and was the mother of thirteen children. The first child, Sarah, married Thomas Coleman and became the mother of twelve children. The next, Elizabeth, married Henry Wolf and had sixteen children. The third, Lydia, married a Mr. McClain, and after his death married John Wagoner. It is through her children that Mrs. Roush could trace her descent to the sixth generation. The fourth child, Annie, had an even dozen of children. The next four children were girls, and their progeny numbered fortyeight. The ninth died when he was young. The next two were girls and had twenty-one children. The last two children were boys and have seventeen children around their boards. The second daughter of Lydia Wagoner, who was Mrs. Roush's third child, married a Mr. Hazlett. Their eldest son, David, is the father of six children, and his eldest daughter's (Mary's) child, Nannie, aged about five years, has the unique distinction of living at the same time as her greatgreat-great-grandmother. Mrs. Roush's grandchildren numbered 135, and the total number of her great-grandchildren is not less than 500. The number of her descendants is over 2000, although the exact number cannot be ascertained."

He was a merchant of Utica, and one of its pioneer business men. In a volume published by Dr. Bagg, entitled "The Pioneers of Utica," there appears the following reference to Mr. Sayre:

"In this connection let us mention also one still a resident, who has been most of his life engaged mainly in the hardware trade, James Sayre, a native of Milton, Saratoga County, N. Y., where he was born in 1799, came to Utica in 1818, and entered the store of John H. Handy. With him he soon became a partner, and on the death of Mr. Handy assumed the sole management, completing also the erection of the National Hotel, which the latter had begun. His first subsequent partner was Philip Thurber, and this connection was followed, about 1835, by one with Alanson House, which lasted until 1849. In 1837 he entered into an arrangement for dealing in New York also. The firm known by the title of Townsend, Sayre & Clark, and in which Mr. House was likewise interested, lasted until 1852. Since that time Mr. Sayre has carried on business in company with his sons Charles and Theodore, though bodily infirmities have recently withdrawn him from active duty. At first his place of business was next below the canal on the east side of Genesee, but when this channel was widened, and his store encroached upon, he sought the land whereon stands his present store, put up a wooden building and subsequently the fine brick one he now occupies. He has always been closely attentive to business, and has reaped the reward due to such devotion by the possession of a handsome fortune, and, what is more, the full confidence of the community for his integrity and business capacity. Except that he was alderman in 1830, he has held no municipal office, but has served considerably as a bank director, at first in the United States branch, then for a short time in the Ontario branch, and later for many years in the Oneida National, of which he is president. For many years he has been a trustee of the First Presbyterian Church, and for no little period its treasurer. He has also been president of the Utica Cemetery Association. In 1824 he was married to Miss Van Ranst, of New York. They are the parents of three sons and two daughters, viz.: Charles, Anna (Mrs. Byxbe), James, Caroline and Theodore, the last being the present senator from this district."



A Utica paper published the following obituary of Mrs. Byxbe:

After an illness of four months, Mrs. Anna C. Byxbe entered into rest last evening at the home of her brother, Hon. Theodore S. Sayre, 310 Genesee St. Quiet, uneventful, but beautiful was the life that was ended, and tender is the chord touched in the breasts of hundreds who have listened for words of hope and cheer from the sick-room as the days and weeks of her illness have gone by. As gentle as is the dawn of a new day, so was the passing of her

spirit into the land of perfect peace.

Anna C. Sayre was born in this city June 10, 1828, the daughter of James and Amelia M. Sayre. Her education was begun at the Ladies' Seminary in this city, and completed at Mr. Abbott's School in New York. She married George E. Byxbe of New York, and resided in that city until 1880. Mr. Byxbe died in 1869. During the past twenty years of her residence in Utica the beauty of Mrs. Byxbe's life has left its impress upon the community. She was a member of the First Presbyterian Church and the Women's Missionary Society. Her relations with both were earnest and active. She was also one of the managers of the Utica Orphan Asylum and the Young Women's Christian Association. The greatest pleasures that life afforded her consisted of doing good unto others. Possessing abundant means, she was enabled to relieve distress and contribute to the wants of the poor. Although interested in and connected with organized charities, yet it was through the quieter and less ostentatious channels of private giving that she was able to accomplish the most good and found the greatest satisfaction and pleasure. The beauty of her character, the gentleness of her nature, the depth of her consideration for the wants and the well-being of others inspired the love of all whose fortune it was to know her. Association with her was a refining, ennobling influence. Young women upon whom fortune had not smiled were the especial objects of her attention, and many are there to-day who will rise up and call her blessed. Her life was an inspiration for good, and the community may well sincerely mourn the deep loss which her death has brought. Mrs. Byxbe is survived by her brother, Hon. Theodore S. Sayre, and by a number of nieces and nephews.

Although his business life in Utica was alike honorable and successful, it is in public life that he has been most prominently before the community.

He was elected Alderman in 1863, and held the office eight years. In 1874 he was elected Mayor, and declined a renomination the following year. While serving as Mayor he was successful in establishing the Board of Police and Fire Commissioners. In 1875 he was elected State Senator from the 19th District. In 1886 he was appointed a member of the Board of Police and Fire Commissioners; he also held the position of Civil Service Commissioner. He has always taken a deep interest in the moral welfare and advancement of the city, and has fulfilled with honor and fidelity the many public trusts bestowed upon him. He is a Director of the Utica Savings Bank, also of the City Water Works; and was a Director of the Utica and Black River R. R. Co. until the lease of that road to the Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg R. R. Co. He is one of the Advisory Board of the Orphan Asylum, of the Home for Aged Men, and of the Women's Christian Association; is President of the Bible Society; and is a member of the Oneida Historical Society and the Fort Schuyler Club. He was formerly identified with the First Presbyterian Church but now with the Sayre Memorial Church, which beautiful edifice was erected by him in memory of his parents, and dedicated Jan. 25, 1884, the anniversary of his father's birth. This is one of the most notable individual benefactions given to the city of Utica. He has been an Elder, and a faithful teacher in the Sunday-school almost from its origin.

He learned the trade of printer in the "Republican" office under Col. Joseph Cooke. After completing his trade he entered Waynesburg College. In July, 1862, he enlisted in Company F, 85th Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry, and served until the close of the Civil War. 

1723 LEWIS ALBERT 7 SAYRE, born February 29, 1820; married January 25, 1849, Eliza Ann Hall, who was born January 19, 1822, and died January 6, 1894. The following, with some changes, is from a sketch published a few years ago.

Lewis Albert Sayre was born at Bottle Hill (now Madison), Morris County, N. J. He received his primary education at the local academy, and was subsequently placed under the tuition of a cousin, Edward A. Stiles, a graduate of Yale and at a later period Superintendent of Public Education for New Jersey, who at that time presided over Wantage Seminary at Deckertown, N. J. He spent two years at that institution, and then went to live with an uncle, David A. Sayre, a banker, in Lexington, Ky. He attended Transylvania University, and after passing through the full course of study was graduated in 1839.

His uncle had hoped that he would devote his life to the ministry, but the gifts of nature and a set purpose drew him in another direction. Medicine was his ambition, and, going East again, he began its study under Dr. David Green of New York. He then entered the College of Physicians and Surgeons, and in 1842 received the degree of Doctor of Medicine, presenting, at graduation, a thesis on "Spinal Irritation" that was recognized as an evidence of unusual ability, and was published in the "Western Journal of Medicine and Surgery."

Dr. Sayre immediately received the appointment of prosector of surgery, under Professor Willard Parker, in the institution from which he had just graduated, and in 1852, being compelled to resign because of his extensive practice, he was appointed emeritus prosector. In 1853 he was appointed surgeon to Bellevue Hospital, and in 1859 surgeon to the Charity Hospital on Blackwell's Island, and of this institution he became consulting surgeon in 1873. He was one of the prime movers in the organization of the Bellevue Hospital Medical College in 1861, and upon the formation of its faculty was made professor of orthopædic surgery and fractures and luxations, and afterward of clinical surgery, which chairs he filled till the time of his death.

He was also one of the founders of the New York Pathological Society, and active in the formation of the New York Academy of Medicine and the American Medical Association, and was elected vice-president of the latter in 1866, and president in 1880. The address delivered by Dr. Sayre at the thirty-first annual session held at New York in June of that year, and published in the transactions of the association, is a model of its kind, in its terseness and clearness of expression and as illustrative of his views upon important questions.

In 1866 he was appointed resident physician of the city of New York, and made great efforts for the improvement of the hygienic conditions of the city. His reports to the Board of Health upon cholera, compulsory vaccination, drainage, sewerage, and other questions of vital import, show a careful consideration of the best interests of the community and a thorough knowledge of the subject of hygiene.

In 1854, he performed the operation for "Morbus Coxarius," or hip-joint disease, being the first American surgeon who had performed the operation with successful results. This was reported in the "New York Journal of Medicine" for

January, 1855. In 1876 he was appointed by the American Medical Association a delegate to the International Medical Congress held at Philadelphia during the Centennial. Before that body he read a paper on "Morbus Coxarius," and performed the operation before the Congress, at the conclusion of which Professor Lister remarked: "I feel that this demonstration would of itself have been a sufficient reward for my voyage across the Atlantic." Dr. Sayre has successfully performed the operation for this disease more than one hundred times.

In 1871 Dr. Sayre made a visit to Europe, and widened and extended his professional fame on that side of the sea. By special invitation he lectured upon hip-joint disease and its remedy before several medical societies, who extended a

warm welcome and greeted his demonstrations with marked enthusiasm.

In 1877 he was appointed by the American Medical Association a delegate to the British Medical Association held at Manchester, England, in the same year. The fame of his wonderful success in the healing of spinal affections had preceded him, and, as upon former occasions, he was invited to lecture before the leading medical societies and at the principal hospitals. In London he gave lectures upon, and demonstrations of, his mode of treatment at the University College Hospital, Guy's, St. Bartholomew's, St. Thomas's, and the Royal Orthopædic. He subsequently accepted invitations from Liverpool, Manchester, Birmingham, and Cork, at each of which places he lectured and gave demonstrations, being afforded abundant opportunities for public tests of the value of his mode of treatment and appliances, and being greeted with great cordiality by his professional brethren. At one of his lectures before the British Medical Association he received the most flattering acknowledgments of that body in an editorial comment by the "British Medical Journal" of August 18, 1877, as follows: "Resolutions were carried by acclamation warmly thanking him for the generous and devoted course which he pursued in spending so large an amount of time and trouble in bringing under the notice of the profession in this country the methods and details of proceedings by which he carried out his treatment of angular and lateral curvature of the spine, which constitutes a new era in that department of surgery, and of which the already proved success entitles us to say that this method of treatment will prove an inestimable boon to thousands of persons now and hereafter."

The "Lancet" of July 4, 1877, in concluding a most complimentary notice of his demonstrations and lectures at the University College Hospital of London, said: "We are not blind to the fact that much of the success obtained is due to Dr. Sayre's own rare physiological and mechanical skill, but his principles are as sound physically as their application is mechanically expert, and we thank him most heartily for the trouble he has taken in England to illustrate and enforce them."

A correspondent of the "Medical Record," September 5, 1877, speaking of Dr. Sayre's demonstration at Manchester, says: "He spoke an hour and a half, in a manner which delighted these men amazingly. They expressed their gratification in the most complimentary terms which could be employed."

While abroad upon this occasion Dr. Sayre prepared "An Illustrated Treatise on Spinal Disease and Lateral Curvature," which he dedicated to the medical profession of Great Britain, in grateful acknowledgment of their generous and

cordial reception.

As a lecturer, Dr. Sayre's style is very vigorous and clear, terseness and simplicity adding to its impressiveness, while his ready logic and power of illustration, with his rich fund of humor and fancy, stamp him as one peculiarly endowed for imparting instruction. His many professional writings are marked by the same characteristics, and seldom fail to convey the full meaning of the author.

Dr. Savre has also published "A Practical Manual of the Treatment of Clubfoot," which is highly esteemed and has already passed through several editions and "Lectures on Orthopædic Surgery and Diseases of the Joints," a large volume of some five hundred pages, illustrated by nearly three hundred woodcuts, which is regarded as the leading authority in that department of surgery, and which has not only reached its second edition, but has been translated into French and German, and is now being translated into Spanish. Some years ago the "British Medical Journal" (which is probably the highest authority recognized by the medical world), in speaking of a recent German translation of this work, said: "Dr. Sayre's methods have now such universally recognized currency and value throughout English-speaking countries, and are so well known and largely practised throughout Europe, that it is surprising these valuable lectures have not before been translated into German. Time, which tries all things, has set its seal of emphatic and general approval both on the principles and methods which Dr. Sayre has ingeniously devised, ably illustrated and successfully carried into practice. He has removed a great mass of painful, tedious and almost incurable complaints into the region of curable and easily managed affections. He has substituted a simple and practical method, within the reach of every practitioner, for costly, complicated and heavy mechanical devices which were accessible only to the few, and which only imperfectly and occasionally fulfilled their objects. Few men have in their generation accomplished so much for the relief of humanity, and his name will go down to posterity, with that of Marion Sims, as among the most distinguished benefactors whom the American medical profession has produced for the glory of medicine and the good of mankind during this century."

Dr. Sayre's wonderful success is not only recognized abroad, but tributes of a high character are paid him continually here at home, in these latter days. Out of the many that might be chosen, we select one from the presidential address delivered by Dr. E. H. Bradford before the Orthopædic Association, and published in the "Boston Medical Journal" of September 26, 1889. After giving a history of orthopædic surgery from the beginning, he said: "It is scarcely necessary to mention the name of Dr. Sayre in connection with the subject of orthopædic surgery. His fame in this regard is world-wide; one achievement alone would be sufficient for his renown - the well-known plaster corset; but it is not for this, or for his able advocacy of excision, for which alone are due our special thanks, so much as for the one great fact of the influence he has exerted. It is to him we owe the wide-spread interest which brings help to us from all over the country. Orthopædic surgery is no longer - thanks to the energy of Dr. Sayre, his brilliancy as a writer and a teacher — a neglected branch of surgery. The surgeon no longer looks upon the treatment of orthopædic cases as a forlorn hope of despairing surgical duty, or as a matter to be relegated to the commercial instincts of the maker of trusses. . . . Dr. Sayre has not only promoted the cause of the treatment of deformities: he has broadened the field of

general surgery."

He is also the inventor of several instruments which have proved efficient aids to the surgeon, among which is the uvulatome, club-foot shoe, scrotal clamp. flexible probe, improved tracheotomy tube, and various splints and appliances for use in orthopædic surgery, which have proved of the highest value to the profes-

sion and of remarkable utility in the treatment of deformities.

During Dr. Sayre's first visit to Europe, in 1871-72, he was created a Knight of the Order of Wasa by Charles IV of Sweden, in recognition of his valuable services to science, the king being personally cognizant of the accuracy of his method of diagnosis and the success of his modes of treatment through the skill displayed by him in the case of a member of the royal family whom he was called

upon to attend. The Medical Society of Norway concurred in this action of the

Swedish monarch by electing Dr. Sayre an honorary member.

Dr. Sayre was engaged in the various labors of his profession, almost to his eightieth year, with a skill that had been heightened by experience and with a vigor strengthened by the success that had followed his labors in the past. In addition to the positions already enumerated, he was consulting surgeon to St. Elizabeth's Hospital and to the Northwestern Dispensary, a member of the American Medical Association, the New York Academy of Medicine, the County Medical Society, New York County Medical Association, New York State Medical Association, the New York Pathological Society, of which he had been president, an honorary member of the New Brunswick Society, and also an honorary member of those great European bodies, the British Medical Association, the Medico-Chirurgical Society of Edinburgh, and the Medical Society of St. Petersburg, Russia. He had been too busy in his profession to accept any positions of a civic or political character, except a service from 1845 to 1861 as Surgeon-General of the First Division of the New York Militia.

Dr. Sayre's great success in his profession, as has already been said, was due primarily to a natural gift made effective in hard work; while the special features of that success were an accuracy of observation, clearness and decision in making his diagnosis, promptness in execution when necessity required, and the courage to do what he thought ought to be done, and to abide by the consequences. conversationalist of the highest order, social in his intercourse with his fellows, he was recognized as one of the leaders in the great world of medicine and surgery. The position to which he attained can be described in no better words, and certainly from no greater authority, than to quote the conclusion of the remarks made by the eminent Dr. S. D. Gross of Philadelphia, before the class of Bellevue Hospital Medical College, on January 10, 1880. Dr. Gross said: "Dr. Sayre has done wonders in the field of surgery. He has not only made a fame for himself throughout the civilized world, but has also made a fame for the nation. I shall probably not be here when he shall pass away, to write his biography—as I am a number of years older than he — to tell the world of his wonderful achievements; but we will need none, for the world is already his biographer. It has erected to him a monument more durable than marble or brass!"

He resided at the northeast corner of Fifth avenue and Thirtieth Street, New York, where he died Friday, September 21, 1900.



1739 EMILIUS KITCHELL? SAYRE, born in Madison, N. J., March 20, 1810; married June 30, 1844, Elizabeth Stanford Pierson, who was born April 14, 1823, in the city of New York. Her father was Elijah Pierson, a wholesale silk merchant, who became prominent in missionary and philanthropic work. He was a Trustee of Brown University. She was a lineal descendant of Rev. Abraham Pierson, the first president of Yale College, and of John Alden, of *Mayflower* memory. She received the principal part of her education at the celebrated Brace Female School at Hartford, Conn. She left this school when sixteen years of age to live with relatives in New York City, and later in Madison, N. J., where she was married by Rev. Clifford S. Arms, in the Presbyterian Church.

They made their new home in Lexington, Ky., where Emilius K. Sayre was esteemed and successful as a lawyer and as the adviser of his uncle David A. Sayre, long known as a banker. Here she lived, admired and loved by a wide circle of friends and acquaintances, fitted to shine in society, yet devoted to her family and home. She was domestic to a degree considered remarkable even in that country of homes. Her best energies and affections were concentrated in her home, and she gave herself entirely to her family. The dignity of her life was equaled only by the dignity of her death, which took place on June 14, 1896, at her home near Monticello, Mo.

Emilius Kitchell Sayre, A. M., LL. B., at his death was the oldest graduate of Amherst College, having graduated there in 1828. On leaving college he was appointed professor of mathematics at the old Washington Institute, New York City.

He studied law at Transylvania University, Lexington, Ky., 1831-33; was admitted to the Kentucky Bar in 1833; practised in several Circuit Courts in Central Kentucky, and in the Court of Appeals and Federal Courts 1833-53.

In 1853 he retired from practice and settled on a four-thousand acre estate in Missouri, where he lived until the time of his death. He was a delegate to the

Missouri State Constitutional Convention in 1861, and though he owned slaves he voted against secession and opposed all unconstitutional measures. He died at his home in Monticello, Mo., January 13, 1899, in his 90th year.



After a preparatory course in the public school and in the academy at Goshen, N. Y., he entered the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor in 1856, but was compelled to leave in his second year by reason of an affection of his eyes. He studied law and was admitted to practice in 1860 in Brooklyn, N. Y. The same year he removed from Goshen, N. Y., to Atchison, Kan. In April, 1861, he was elected city attorney of Atchison upon the Republican ticket, and in the following September was appointed District Judge of the second judicial district of the State by Gov. Charles Robinson, a position to which he was twice elected without opposition, and which he resigned to resume the practice of his profession. From 1861 to 1864 he was one of the editors of the "Weekly Champion," a newspaper published at Atchison. In 1868 he was a Republican presidential elector. In May of the following year President Grant appointed him United States Attorney for Kansas. In November, 1872, he was elected a member of the House of Representatives of Kansas from Atchison, and in November, 1876, State senator from Atchison County, which position he resigned January 1, 1877, to accept an appointment by Gov. Osborn to the position of chief justice of the Supreme Court of Kansas. The same year he was elected chief justice to serve an unexpired term; in 1878 he was reëlected for the full term of six years, and was renominated and reëlected in 1884 and 1890. He was long president

of the Alumni Association of Michigan University for the Southwest. On April 30, 1895, he resigned his position as chief justice to resume the practice of his profession at Topeka, Kan., as a member of the law firm of Waggener, Horton & Orr.

OTHER SAYRES.

While the material used in the foregoing pages was being collected a large amount of matter accumulated pertaining to Sayre families which could not be connected with the line of Thomas of Leighton Buzzard, which alone is the subject of this volume. The name of Sayre, in its various renderings, has been common in England for several hundred years, and, as was to be expected, persons bearing the name have been found among the emigrants to America from the earliest times to the present.

As a curious coincidence it may be mentioned that among the replies received in answer to the circular sent out requesting information was one from Thomas Sayer living at Rigby, Idaho, who was born in Poddington, Bedfordshire, England, the original home of our Thomas Sayre from at least the thirteenth century. He is a descendant of at least three generations of William Sayers, of Hynwich, a name and place with which the present genealogy begins.

Among other emigrants of the name from England during the seventeenth century we have found the following,—most of the items in the first section being taken from the volumes of the New England Historical and Genealogical Register:

EMIGRANTS TO NEW ENGLAND.

Widow Jane Sayer received in 1640 a home lot in Providence, R. I., and "signed the compact."

The History of Wells, Maine, contains an extended account of the Sayer family there. William Sayer, of Wells, married in 1675, Mrs. Sarah Wells.

January 25, 1692. Mary Richworth, wife of William Sayer (or of Joseph Sayer), was taken prisoner by the Indians of Acadia, with two of her daughters, and carried captive to Canada. One of the children, Mary Genevieve Sayer, was born April 4, 1681. Her sister Mary Joseph was born March 9, 1685. They were baptized in Montreal by the French, December 8, 1693. The elder child became a "sister des Anges," Congregation of Notre Dame, Montreal, and died there March 28, 1717. There is a gravestone at Wells in memory of Sarah, relict of William Sayer, who died January, 1734, in her eighty-fifth year.

August 10, 1703, Joseph Sayer, his wife and several children were killed by the Indians at Wells. and another was taken captive to Canada.

A letter from Quebec, written by Ebenezer Hill to friends in Wells, under date March, $170\frac{1}{5}$, mentions: "Mary Sayer, brother Joseph's daughter, . . . and our other friends and neighbors here are well."

June 22, 1710. Jacob Sayer and Martha Loomis were married in Lyme, Conn., and had children born there.

February 2, 1707. A child of Josiah and Martha Sayer was born at Tiver-

ton, R. I. The Sayers are numerous in the "Vital Statistics" of Rhode Island from the beginning of the eighteenth century.

February 2, 1634. James Sayer, of Northbourne, Kent, tailor, passenger in Ship *Hercules*, from Sandwich to New England.

1655. John Sayer, of Falmouth, sold Long Island in Casco Bay, Maine.

1638. Elizabeth and Mary Sayers, from Hingham, Norfolk, England, by Ship *Diligent*, of Ipswich, and settled in Hingham, Mass.

1658. Thomas Sayer was at Hingham, Mass.

November 26, 1673. Thomas Sayer married at Hingham, Mass., Sarah, daughter of John and Margaret Prince. Was a selectman and held other offices. February 10, 170\frac{8}{9}, Thomas and Sarah Sayer were among the signers of a certificate in favor of Widow Mehitable Warren, charged with witchcraft. He was born 1645, and died December 3, 1732. The author has an account of some of their descendants.

January 2, 1634. William Sayre, age 58 years, on Ship *Bonaventura*, to Va. February 17, 1634. William Seere, age 22, by Ship *Hopewell*, for Barbadoes. July 24, 1635. Thomas Syer, age 14, by Ship *Assurance*, for Va.

SAYRES IN VIRGINIA, MARYLAND, ETC.

November 22, 1633. William Saire was one of the gentlemen adventurers who came with the first colony to Maryland in the *Ark and Dove* from Cowes and arrived at St. Clements, now Blackstone, Island, March 25, 1634. (McSherry's "Maryland.")

1670. Peter Sayer was clerk of Old Kent, Md.

1725. Peter Sayer, of Talbot County, Md., 200 acres called Branfield, formerly taken up by Peter Sayer.

1672. William Sears made deed, and in 1675 a deed was made to William Sare. (Talbot Co., Md., Records.)

1708. William Sayers, or Seyers, mentioned in will of Nathaniel T. Teagle, of Talbot County, Md., as his son-in-law. This William Sayers was a pilot in York River, Va. (Va. Hist. Mag., I, 4. 1894.)

FROM VIRGINIA LAND PATENTS, ETC.

Major Francis Sayer, 610 acres in Lower Norfolk County, of which 550 acres lying between the south and east branches of Elizabeth River, derived as follows: 150 acres formerly granted to William Ranshaw, September 24, 1636, and by him sold to Thomas Sayre, deceased, and by him given to his son Trustram Sayer by will, and after his death recovered by the said Francis Sayer by order of Assembly, and 300 acres granted to Thomas Nellres, May 17, 1637, and by him sold to the said Francis Sayer, and the remainder of said land is now first granted, October 21, 1684.

Major Francis Sayer, 1000 acres in Lower Norfolk County, October 20, 1684. Major Francis Sayer, of the County of Norfolk, 147 acres in Norfolk County. April 24, 1692.

Major Francis Sayer, subsequent to January $169\frac{4}{5}$, and prior to 1699, married Frances Mason Newton, widow of George Newton, and daughter of Col. L. Mason, of Lower Norfolk. He died prior to March 15, $170\frac{7}{8}$. There are references to him in the New England Genealogical Register for 1893, pages 70 and 202.

The name Sayer in Norfolk County has usually been pronounced Sawyer, and the two following items undoubtedly refer to the person named above:

Thomas Sawyer, 300 acres in the Upper County of New Norfolk, on the east branch of Elizabeth River, May 22, 1637. He was a "head right," or one of the persons in right of whose settlement in Virginia the land was granted.

Thomas Sawyer, 250 acres in the Lower County of New Norfolk, about two miles from the lower branch of Elizabeth River, May 10, 1638.

There were two families of Sayers in what is now Wythe County, formerly part of Augusta County, in the southwestern section of Virginia. The earliest Augusta County Sayers will we have found is that of Robert Sayers, "late from the province of Pennsylvania," dated June 26, 1746, and probated at a court held for Augusta County, August 20, 1746. It was witnessed by John Buchanan, William Adair, Francis McCoun and Thomas Beard. It named his wife Catharine—she was a Buchanan—his two sons, William and Alexander, and three minor daughters, Margaret, Anne, and Elizabeth. Alexander, the younger son, bought June 20, 1753, 536 acres on a branch of Reedy Creek, Augusta County, and was drowned, unmarried, in New River, Va.

There is a deed to William Sayers — doubtless this son of Robert — on record in Augusta County, dated October 1, 1747, for 290 acres of land on the west side of the Blue Ridge, near Buffalo Creek. He married first a Miss Buchanan, perhaps daughter or sister of John Buchanan who was a witness to the will of Robert Sayers, and second Elizabeth Drake, and died about 1777. Another account states he married a widow, Esther Thompson Crockett, daughter of Rev. John Thompson, of the Presbyterian Church. The tradition among some of his descendants is that he was born in Scotland. He left two sons, Col. Robert Sayers of the Revolution, who never married, and Major John Thompson Sayers,

who was wounded at the battle of Cowpens. He married Susan Crockett and left many descendants. One of his daughters, Esther, married Abner Sayers, of the other Sayers family of Wythe County, and they were the grandparents of Hon. Joseph Draper Sayers, ex-Governor of Texas.

There is another will on record in Augusta County, Va., of a Robert Sayers, dated September 3, 1756, and probated in the following November. It refers to his brother David, of whom he had bought land for twenty-five pounds, "taking my father's word for ten pounds and there is yet due fifteen pounds." He bequeathed the land to his son Robert, who was to take care of his other son David, who was non compos mentis. Both sons were yet minors. The relict of Robert Sayers was Hannah.

The brother of Robert Sayers, senior, mentioned in the above will, was doubtless David Sayers who married Mary, daughter of John Beattie. Beattie was born in Ireland, and on coming to America lived first in Maryland, and afterwards in Rockbridge and Washington counties, Va. His children were born in Maryland and in Virginia. David Sayers is variously stated to have gone to Virginia from South Carolina and from Maryland. There is a deed recorded in Augusta County, dated October 13, 1751, from William Sayers, "of the Province of South Carolina," and it appears probable that he was the father of David Sayers. The latter had twelve sons and four daughters. Among his sons was Abner Sayers, who married Esther Sayers, and was the grandfather of Hon. Joseph D. Sayers, as above stated. Quite a long list of descendants of these two Wythe County Sayers families is in possession of the author.

June 2, 1739. Charles Sayer bought land in Princess Anne County, Va. October 31, 1764. Thomas Sayers bought 380 acres on Cedar Creek, Halifax County, Va.

August 27, 1770. James Sayers bought 115 acres on Middle River, Augusta County, Va.

1734. George Sayres signed a petition to the Pennsylvania Legislature, which stated that the petitioners were from Germany and desired naturalization. One of the replies sent in answer to the circular requesting information for this work was from a Sayer who stated his father was born in Germany.



INDEX.

In preparing this index, it has been deemed expedient to include all the descendants of Thomas Sayre, of Southampton, under the one name of Sayre, regardless of the particular spelling adopted by some families. The féw other Sayres mentioned will be found in the same list.

Where numerous similar names appear of sons who became heads of families, the fathers' names are usually

appended to facilitate the search. Sayre daughters, when married, have their husbands' names affixed.

The names of Sayres and, occasionally, of other persons who married and had children, are usually on two different pages; the first where they appear in the account of their parents' families, and again as the head of a new family. The paging refers to this second mention, and the other will readily be found by reference to the number prefixed to the names, which are consecutive. For example: Stephen Sayre, on page 89, is numbered 117; this number will also be found on page 53, showing his father's line.

The names to which an asterisk is appended are those found on the chart inset opposite page 498, showing the

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
