A Few Remarks about Ordering.

E enclose with this catalogue an envelope and order sheet, which will be convenient in making out a list of the plants and seeds wanted. We will supply additional order sheets when requested, but orders can also be written on plain paper. Please write only one variety on a line. Please be very sure, before mailing your order, that you have written your NAME, POST OFFICE, COUNTY and STATE plainly, so there can be no mistake. Ladies are requested to put Miss or Mrs. before their names, so that we can address the packages properly.

If you want Flower Seeds immediately, and are not yet ready to receive plants and bulbs, you can include all in one order, and we will be very careful to send the plants at the time requested, mailing the seeds at once. If you send a general order, without special instructions, we will understand that you want the entire order filled immediately upon receipt.

PLEASE FORWARD MONEY with the order, and at our risk, if sent by registered letter, post-office order, bank draft, cash by express, or express money-order. Stamps are convenient for making change, and while we prefer money, we WILL RECEIVE CLEAN POSTAGE STAMPS AT PAR VALUE, the same as cash. Please add up your order carefully, and forward the exact amount, after deducting the discounts offered below.

It is very selbom that an order is lost or stolen, but, in case of such an accident, it is well to keep a copy of your order. Then, if you do not hear from us within a reasonable time, write us, stating date of order, amount, how sent, and enclose a duplicate. We hold ourselves responsible for the safe arrival, in good condition, of all plants, bulbs and seeds we send out, and will immediately replace any plants that may have died or been lost from delay in the mails.

PLANTS, SEEDS AND BULBS FREE BY MAIL. We send all varieties of Plants, Bulbs and Seeds, securely packed, POSTPAID, BY MAIL, without extra charge. In Roses, "the second size" are grown especially for mailing,—all our mail plants are strong and vigorous, and are really superior to plants usually sent by mail. The MAIL BUSINESS is a specialty with us, as thereby we can introduce our grand novelties and specialties into even the most distant homes, where the express charges would be too excessive.

PLANTS BY EXPRESS. Our "first size" Roses are grown especially for sending by express, and are generally too large to send by mail. We also give larger plants of other flowers, wherever possible, when ordered sent by express. We recommend having plants sent by express, when the order is large and the distance not too great. The purchaser pays express charges upon the receipt of the box, but we always put in some fine extra plants, which are generally sufficient in value to cover the cost of expressage. We also frequently give choice "extras" on mail orders.

DISCOUNTS. We offer the following discounts on Plants and Bulbs to those who plant largely, or who will get up a club. This applies to both mail and express orders.

New Ever-Blooming Roses.



Comtesse Anna Thun.

Our illustration gives the size and form of this new French Rose, but it does not show the coloring, which is its chief attraction. The color is citron yellow, shaded with coppery rose, changing to peach at the center. Flowers are medium to large size, with cup-shaped buds. One of the finest Roses in our French importation. 35 cts. each.

Edward Pailleron.

Growth vigorous, flowers large and full; color deep rose changing to light rose—reverse of petals bronze. 25 cts. each.

Madame Philemon Cochet.

A moderate-growing variety, with medium sized cupshaped flowers. Color clear rose, shaded with light salmon, resembling Madame Bosanquet. 25 cts. each.

Madame Hoste.

New Mammoth Double Geranium-Centaure.

Many new Geraniums are being annually introduced; a few of these are decided improvements on existing types, but it is only at rare intervals that a variety is sent out that has so many good points as the New Centaure, offered by us for the first time this year. Two years ago, in France, our attention was called to this mammoth variety, but only a few plants could be obtained. We have propagated continually, and now have, without doubt, the largest stock in America, and can offer it to our customers at a moderate cost. We can recommend it as the best large-flowering double pink Geranium in cultivation. Two years ago, we introduced the White Swan as the best double white Geranium, and so well pleased were our customers with it that we have sold over 36,000 plants of this variety alone. We predict for THE CENTAURE even greater popularity, for every one seeing a good specimen truss cannot fail to become enthusiastic over it, pronouncing it the largest and finest Geranium in cultivation. The NEW CENTAURE is remarkable for its stout, robust growth and for its immense trusses of bloom. The foliage is very large and of a light green color, with a band of darker green encircling each leaf. The flowers are borne on bold trusses of enormous size, almost spherical, and as many as 62 florets have been counted by us upon a single truss. The color is the richest deep pin', shading near the base of the petals to light pink—the base of the upper petals creamy white. In most large flowering Germiums, when in fill flower, the center of the truss is faded, while new florets are coming into bloom around the circumference; but in THE CENTAURE, most of the florets bloom at once, and when in full bloom the truss is an almost spherical ball of rich, glowing pink. This variety is suitable either for bedding or pot culture. In bedding, although it does not throw as many trusses as the White Swan, it is continually in bloom, and the trusses are more than double the size. Last Spring we sent a few plants, for trial, to the Eminent Divine and Amateur Horticulturist, REV. J. S. MACINTOSH, D. D., and he reports as follows:-

"This grand Geranium is the only worthy companion to White Swan that has yet come before me; and, as you know I am always on the lookout for anything good in the Geranium class. A solid bed of Centaures for the center, with White Swan round in broad belt, was a sight that made even the boys stop and stare. A tub with Centaure filling up the middle and dark mulberry Colei at the edge was a charm every hour. I tested this Geranium in the severest possible ways, single plants and lines set right in the very teeth of the strong northeast Atlantic winds, and they grew defiantly and made thick, short jointed, sappy shoots that were loaded down with their immense trusses. Another great point in favor of Centaure is, that this wet summer the blooms did not rot as I found nearly all the double Geraniums of the finest shades doing. Any one who wants cut flowers to put up according to the new and better style of loose grouping will, as my wife did, delight in this plant with its massive blooms and strong, bold stems. For specimen plants in pots, trained out after the English mode, this Geranium is a very decided advance on any of the doubles I have tried. You are at liberty to use this parson-lore for what

it is worth."

PRIMULA OBCORICA.

S will be seen from our illustration of a two-year old plant, Primula Obconica is a profuse flowering Primrose, and is as near an ever-blooming plant as it is possible to obtain. There are only a few pot-plants that will bloom successfully in the house, and we know of none that, with ordinary care, will give more pleasure and satisfaction than this. It is beyond doubt one of the finest plants for pot culture ever introduced, and cannot fail to become a favorite with those desiring plants that will grow easily. The flowers are pure white, shading to lilac, and have the true Primrose fragrance. The plants produce, on long stems, spikes containing from 10 to 15 flowers each; upon two plants picked at random we counted respectively 45 and 52 flower-spikes, and they had been profusely and steadily blooming for one year. If desired, the plants can be kept out of doors during the summer, in a partially shaded place; when necessary, shifted into larger-sized pots, and in the fall can be removed to the house—soil and treatment the same as an ordinary Primrose. It has already been several times recorded in The English Garden that this plant has been known to flower for over twelve months without a break.



Most Polyanthas produce their flowers in clusters, but the flowers of George Pernet are produced singly and in pairs, and therefore can be cut with stems. The color is bright rose, changing in center to pale rose, with base of petals shaded with yellow. The flowers are medium to small in size; the petals have a beautiful rayed form and are reflexed, the full flower resembling a miniature reflexed Chrys: anthemum. 35 cts. each.










































