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## COINS AND TOKENS OF SCOTLAND

*Compiled by P. FRANK PURVEY*

This, the third volume in our trilogy of catalogues of coins of the British Isles, has been awaited since Scottish coins were last included in the 1960 edition of our Standard Catalogue. Frank Purvey has catalogued the coinage taking into account the results of numismatic research carried out in this series in recent years, and has illustrated over 350 specimens to aid the classification of different issues. Over 100 counter-marked "dollars" and other pieces are listed, making a total of 1544 coins and tokens catalogued. Historical notes on the Scottish monarchs and on the major developments in the coinage and token issues, together with an index of Latin inscriptions and a bibliography will make this a useful handbook for collectors and students. ## A STUDY OF THE RARITY OF COINS ISSUED BY THE DUCHY OF BRUNSWICK-LÜNEBURG, LATER THE KINGDOM OF HANOVER BETWEEN THE YEARS 1662-1866

During the course of nearly two hundred years the rulers of Brunswick-Lüneburg progressed from mere dukes to become successively Electors, (Ernest Augustus was the first Elector), Kings of Great Britain (George Ludwig, the second Elector, became George I of Great Britain) and eventually Kings of Hanover held initially as a monarchy in affiliation with Britain (George III, George IV and William IV) and finally, as an independent Kingdom (Ernest Augustus, Duke of Cumberland and George V of Hanover) until its absorption by Prussia (1866). In addition to the above progression the Duchy also formed part of the puppet kingdom of Westphalia during the Napoleonic Wars and those coins issued by Jerome (Hieronymus) Napoleon in his capacity as Westphalian King are included in the interests of completeness. Needless to say in parallel with such far reaching political changes the coinage underwent a striking metamorphosis during this period changing rapidly from the rather sparse currency issued by a petty duke into an extensive series produced in a multiplicity of types and denominations by a continental ruler of consequence.

Even after many years meticulous study of any particular coinage it is notoriously difficult to acquire more than a purely subjective opinion of what is either common or rare unless proper records are kept. Since any individual's experience is bound to be relatively limited such records may not be entirely accurate. If, however, the contents of a number of records are combined and analysed the errors inherent in the examination of a small survey are, while not eliminated entirely, greatly minimised.

Presented below are the results of such an analysis of sales lists, etc., collected over a period of 20 years. Not every list available during this period has been examined since a possibility existed that the same coin might be recorded a number of times if it was not sold. However a suitable random sample was selected in order to obviate this particular source of error. Symbols denoting degrees of rarity etc. have not been ascribed to coins of various monarchs, types, etc., since many of the finer points in

the presented information might be obscured. In any case an entirely satisfactory system does not exist and moreover none of the systems in use at the moment take account of the condition of any particular piece—a most important variable in the assessment of rarity. Thus the numbers of various coins recorded in the survey are expressed directly as percentages of the total so that their inter-relationships may be immediately apparent.

## GOLD COINAGE

As gold coins comprised only 12% of the total numbers recorded they are rarer than silver pieces in the proportion of approximately 7:1. However, although the main currency of the Duchy was based on silver, the 18th century silver famine is reflected in the relatively high proportion of gold coins of George II and III occurring in the survey. In contrast, no gold coins of the Elector Ernest Augustus occurred and those of George I before and after his British accession are rare. Rather surprisingly gold coins (mainly those struck on the French standard) of Jerome Napoleon were quite well represented. Analysis by denomination shows that the 5 taler and 2 taler (=gulden or ducat) pieces are the most commonly encountered.

With regard to the grade of preservation more than half of the coins recorded were found to be in EF condition or better, viz:

Consequently, from the above it can be seen that although George III ducats would be relatively easily obtained. Specimens of the gold coinages of George Ludwig and William IV are very rare (Table I).

In each reign the denomination and type most commonly encountered is listed below:

No attempt has been made to present an analysis of every single denomination and type since the number in the survey was too small to permit an accurate analysis. However broad indications of what is either common or rare are discernible if the material in Table III is interpreted in the light of Tables I and II. To give an example, the gold coinage of George Ludwig is rare (only 1% of all gold coins) but the most common denomination is the ducat (type; bust on the obverse and a shield on the reverse) which is likely to be in VF condition or better.

## SILVER COINAGE

A simple analysis of the figures shows a different pattern from that of the gold coinage (see Table I). Coins of the first Elector (Ernest Augustus) are well represented and if the pieces issued by George I both before (George Ludwig) and after his



British accession are taken together they are more common than those of any other reign (25%) and comprise one quarter of the total. Both George II and III enjoyed long reigns and therefore if the number of years during which they were issued is considered their coins are quite scarce. Considering his short (and infamous) reign, Jerome's coinage is justifiably rare (2% of the total).

Analysis by denomination shows that talers and gulden ( $\frac{2}{3}$  taler) are the most common coins in the sample (72% of the total), i.e.

When the material is analysed by both reign and denomination their inter-relationships in each reign can be clearly seen.

Thus talers of George I are the most common while those of George IV are the rarest. Conversely  $\frac{1}{2}$  talers of George IV comprise nearly half of the total number of that denomination seen in the survey. Incidentally, the column showing  $\frac{2}{3}$  talers illustrates the fact that a copious issue of a denomination in one reign is usually followed by a scarcity of that denomination in the next reign, since there was relatively little need for it to be struck.

As in the examination of the gold coinage, the denominations and types most commonly occurring are listed.

When the silver coins were analysed with regard to condition, most of the pieces were "very fine" or better, viz:

As with the section dealing with the gold coinage, information regarding the common silver pieces can be obtained by interpreting Table VII in the light of Tables IV, V and VI. Where, as with Ernest Augustus (Elector), two types of taler are listed it is intended to show that both are equally common; similarly for  $\frac{2}{3}$  talers of George III.

Considering that so few were in fine condition either of two explanations can apply; either all the poorer coins may have been melted down and only the better ones have survived or alternatively there are plenty of poor specimens available and

only the better pieces are commercially saleable. In general, experience with this particular series prompts one to favour the former explanation since although this coinage is rare the few specimens one sees in both gold and silver are generally in good condition.

## THE NUMISMATIC IMPORTANCE OF THE CALIPHS

The earliest Arabic coins are well struck and written in a very clear form of Kufic script. As shown in the article "Kufic script on early Islamic coins" on pages 200-203 of the *Bulletin* of June 1970, mint and date are clearly written on the margin of the obverse. However, by the 900's and 1000's A.D. the coins are not nearly so legible, and any extra help towards dating the coin may be very welcome indeed.

In the earliest period, in the full zest of religious enthusiasm, the coins are anonymous—after all it was Allah who ruled, and mere men hardly counted! But as time went on names began to appear below the Kalima in the area of the coin. Officials and governors began to inscribe their own names; but, most important, from early in the ninth century A.D. it became the custom to write in the name of the reigning Caliph, a custom which was continued on the coinage of orthodox dynasties until the sack of Baghdad by the Monguls.

What helps is that these Caliphal names are easy to pick out, not only because they come either just below the *Mohammed rasul Allah* or the *la sherik lahu* of reverse or obverse, but also because after Mamun they all have a similar type of ending—الله

*Allah*, or *Allah* combined with a preposition بالله *bi-'llah* or لله *li-'llah*.

The names of the Caliphs are really "laqabs," that is titles of honour, and they all have religious meanings. For instance, the Caliph we call Mu'tasim is really *el-mu'tasim bi-'llah* "the one who holds fast to Allah." These laqabs are evidently carefully chosen so that, although whole groups of letters are indistinguishable in the Kufic script, each name is distinctly different. Actually they look very similar in English; Mustansir, Must'asim, Mustazhir, and so on; but in Kufic script they are unmistakable.

Here is a list, giving the names in full in modern Arabic and in Kufic.

who reigned until the fall of Baghdad in 1258 A.D., 656 A.H. After this there was a "shadow" Caliphate in Egypt until 1516 A.D., but this is much less important numismatically speaking.

These Caliphal names appear on coins with the rounded script too, when one must be prepared for considerable abbreviation of the smaller looking letters—e.g.

Mustansir may be written as *المص*

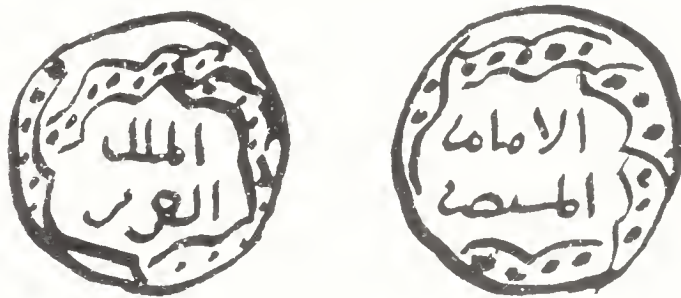
Most usually where a Caliph is given a title it is *امير المؤمنين* *amir el-muminin* "commander of the faithful"; but in the West it is the tendency to call him

*الامام* *el-imam*. Saladin gives the Caliph his personal name—Mustazi is "el-imam Hasan," and Nasir is "el-imam Ahmed."

To show how helpful I have found the Caliphs I give just two examples.



1 This coin had me puzzled: the obverse has the plain *la ilah illa Allah wahidahu la sherik lahu* of all such coins, and the margins are illegible. Below the *Mohammed rasul Allah*, though, is the name of the Caliph Razi, which dates it to 934-940 A.D. I looked through all my lists to find which dynasties could be possible for this date, and finding that the Samanid ruler of the time was a Nasir, who was a son of Ahmed, I found I could read *Nasr bin Ahmed* on the bottom line of the coin.



2 Again, on this copper coin of the Ayyubids, it is easy to read *el-melek el-'Aziz* on the obverse. At first I thought this must be el-'Aziz 'Uthman, Saladin's son who reigned from 1193 to 1198 A.D. But on examination the reverse reads *el-imam el-Mustansir*, the Caliph of 1226 to 1242 A.D. This meant that the el-'Aziz must be el-'Aziz Mohammed, 1216-1236 A.D.

One final caution. There is the slight possibility of confusing an orthodox Caliph, with, for instance, one of the Shi'ite Fatimid rulers, who also called themselves Caliph. There is a Fatimid Qa'im, a Zahir, and a Mustansir. In practice, though, it is not too difficult to pick out Fatimid and other Western coins.

## BUILDINGS AND MACHINERY

*Notes*

The records in this Class are arranged under the following main headings:

Buildings and Site (Tower of London)

and

and their dates fall within the period 1653 to 1947. They mostly relate to the Mint's present premises on Little Tower Hill which it has occupied since 1810. The other records concerning the Mint buildings, machinery and security arrangements during that period down to the year 1910 are entered in the Record Books in Class Mint 1.

The precise date of the Mint's removal from the City of London to the Tower is not known, but the Mint was certainly within the precincts of the Tower in 1299 and continued to remain there until early in the nineteenth century. One of the apparent reasons for the removal to Little Tower Hill in 1810 was the decision taken in 1804 to introduce steam plant for coinage, which involved the possible endangering of the Tower fortress by the boiler fires. Another reason was the need for the expansion of the Military in the Tower during the war with Napoleon, which necessitated the taking over of the Mint's premises in the Tower for the accommodation of troops.

The site on Little Tower Hill had formerly been occupied by Government tobacco warehouses; and to accommodate the Mint buildings, the area of that site was enlarged by the purchase of Swedeland Court and Bailey Place. The new buildings were completed by the end of 1809, and the removal of the Mint from the Tower to the new premises began in 1810 and was completed in 1812.

In the new premises, provision was made for twenty-four rent free residences for the use of the Mint officials and key workmen, those residences consisting of both houses and flats. By 1851, that number of official residences had become larger than required owing to the departure from the Mint of the Company of Moneyers, whose contract had been terminated in that year. In the years which followed, that number of residences became further in excess of requirements owing to the reductions made from time to time in the number of the Mint's principal officers. By 1900, only ten of the residences were still in occupation, and those were being withdrawn from the staff as opportunities occurred; succeeding officers and key workmen being left to make their own housing arrangements, since it had then become no longer customary for them to live over their work. Also at that time, it was proposed that some of the fourteen empty residences should be pulled down and the land on which they stood be disposed of; and this had been done by 1906, the land in question being included in a new street connecting the Tower Bridge with Royal Mint Street. About the same time, some more of the empty residences were disposed of by the transfer of the North Block to the Board of Trade for use by the Registry of Shipping and Seamen. Upon the Superintendent's apartments being turned into offices in 1922, the only residences then remaining were those provided for the Office Keeper and the Electrician. By that time, a further disposal of vacated residences had also been made by the transfer of the South Block to the Customs and Excise Department.

Alterations and additions were also made from time to time to the main buildings and workshops.

A Gold Refinery was set up in 1813, and this was enlarged in 1829. Gold refining continued in the Mint until 1851, when it was decided to rely for refining on the Market. Thereupon the Refinery was separated from the rest of the Mint and leased in 1852 to a member of the firm of Messrs. Rothschild and Sons. The rent was

collected by the Mint and paid into the Exchequer until 1901, when a new arrangement was made by which the Office of Works would fix and receive the rent in future. A new lease of the Refinery for 21 years from June 1901 was granted by the Office of Works under that arrangement.

In 1816, the Mint Gas Works came into being by the erection in the south-east corner of the Mint of a plant for distilling gas from coal, with all the ramifications required to illuminate workshops and to allow night labour. The system was extended in 1817, the gas replacing oil and candles for external and workshop lighting; and extended again in 1834, when gas was supplied to the official residences. By 1852, however, it had become cheaper to buy gas from the Ratcliff Gas Company than to make it in the Mint; and thereupon the domestic production was stopped and the gas works discontinued.

## PAPER CURRENCY

To meet the increasing interest we are experiencing in banknote collecting we have now established a banknote department. It is our intention to publish bi-monthly lists in our *Coin and Medal Bulletin*, either incorporated in the *Bulletin* or as a separate insert.

Whilst certain coin collectors have allied banknotes to their collections for a number of years, it is only in the last few years that the collecting of world paper currency has become a firmly established hobby. The increasing number of reference works on paper currency published during the last year or two has certainly been instrumental in popularising this hobby.

Although our lists will cover the entire range of world currency we will undoubtedly tend to specialize in the early British Private Banks and British Colonial and Commonwealth issues. We will also bring the collector the colourful modern issues as this type of material will be ideal for a collector on a limited budget.

Collectors will find that degrees of preservations, types and varieties will be as important as they are to coin collecting. We will adhere to the following terms and definitions.

*unc.* — clean and crisp. As issued.

EF — clean but perhaps trace of folds, almost as issued.

VF — minor folds or creases. A note exhibiting a little wear.

F — a note which is very creased and worn, but still perfectly clear.

*fair* — extensively creased and worn. A note that has seen much circulation.

We will also endeavour to bring the collector the latest reference books and suitable accessories.

We have been fortunate in the past three months in acquiring two large collections, but have become quickly aware of the difficulties we will have of maintaining a large and varied stock. For this reason we will always be keen buyers of single items and large collections.

## MEDAL COLLECTORS' SECTION

Growing concern has been expressed amongst collectors and dealers at what seems to be an increase in the number of doubtful medals in circulation. There also seems to be an improvement in the expertise shown in the production of these medals.

This state of affairs makes life difficult for all, but is particularly tough on the beginner. As it is, many medals were originally issued unnamed, and all sorts of subsequent naming is possible. Errors were made and corrected whilst medals were being officially named. Recipients occasionally erased and changed their rank on promotion, or corrected mis-spelt names or initials. "Official" rolls are not infallible or do not exist at all. Men were loaned or attached from one regiment or unit to another. Bars become loose or are added. Some awarded themselves medals which they felt they had earned, but for which they had not officially qualified. Human frailty, pride and avarice are all exemplified by doubtful medals, and deliberate deception by the outright fakes.

The proper defence is to arm yourself with experience, knowledge, good books and good friends. The first two may take many years to acquire, but you have only to join a medal society to find yourself surrounded by helpful fellow collectors. Membership of the Orders and Medals Research Society, for instance, is invaluable. Books can be more difficult to find, but there are three which can really repay their cost "at a stroke". The recent edition of Gordon's *Battles and Medals*, revised by E. C. Joslin, tells you which units or regiments are entitled to which medals and bars. *British Gallantry Awards*, by P. E. Abbott and J. M. A. Tamplin, describes every gallantry award with the conditions of entitlement, and notes on fakes and copies. Finally there is the book by A. A. Purves, *Collecting Medals and Decorations*, which gives detailed information on styles of naming, and examples of many spurious bars.

Amongst the good friends should, of course, be numbered the reputable dealers. They cannot guarantee that every medal purchased from them is faultless. Dealers too are human, and must often commit themselves to buying without having the time for the detailed research which is available to customers who can buy on approval. Naturally they check later, but not all medals that check out on rolls are genuine, and not all genuine medals can be checked out. In the very large number of medals which they handle, those which are sold and subsequently faulted are relatively very few, and the buyer can be sure that his money will be refunded in full and, most helpful of all, that the medal will be put out of circulation for ever.

The expertise of the specialist collector can be formidable, and we would be the first to acknowledge that, as a customer, he, and his medals, are usually right. Our New Year resolution is to try and ensure that we, and our medals, are always right. Meanwhile, Happy Christmas to all medal collectors (and Dealers).

### BOOK REVIEW

O'TOOLE, Wing Commdr. E. H. **Decorations and Medals of the Republic of Ireland.** London, 1972. 42 pp. (incl. 2 colour plates of ribbons), illustrations in the text.  $8\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{3}{4}$  in. Price £1.50 UK.

Although this is a small book, with only 42 pages, it will be warmly welcomed by medal collectors, as it fills a long felt want. Irish medals have been neglected by many medal writers, apart from a few notes by Taprell Dorling, in his *Ribbons and Medals*, and these are by no means comprehensive.

Eamonn O'Toole is to be congratulated on compiling a clear, concise guide (despite a very few errors—the sort which seem to creep into every textbook), with virtually all the data relevant to each item, from the 1916 Medal, for the Easter Rising, to the present day. In addition to the description of each medal, the author gives the circumstances leading to its institution, the necessary qualifications, and additional information, such as details of the designers and manufacturers, and, in many cases, the numbers issued.

The book opens with two pages of ribbons in full colour. It is perhaps a pity that these, like the illustrations of the insignia, are not shown at full size, but since the text quotes the widths, both of the ribbons and their stripes, the collector can accurately determine their make-up. We note that the ribbons shown for the second and third classes of the Distinguished Service Medal do not agree with the written description, and apparently the illustrations have become transposed. The description of the blue of the ribbons of the Merchant Marine Medal, the Service Medal, and the Reserve Defence Forces Service Medal, as "St. Patrick's blue" seems strange to British collectors, to whom the description means a very pale, slightly greenish blue, but perhaps the Irish attribute a rich dark blue to their patron saint.

All the medals described are illustrated, but in a few cases the size is not stated, but this can be calculated from the given data, i.e. the width of the ribbon. For example, the illustration of the 1916 Medal shows the ribbon as approximately 25.5 mm., and the medal as 30 mm. diameter. Since the ribbon is quoted at 34 mm., the medal must be 40 mm. in diameter, or thereabouts. But not all the illustrations are exactly three-quarters full size, and other examples will have to be calculated mathematically by simple proportion.

For many years collectors have had difficulty in identifying the eleven varieties of the Emergency Service Medals, 1939-46, and the information supplied on this series is very welcome. We would, however, mention that the *rev.* inscription on No. 11 is NA CAOMNOIRI AITIULA. Incidentally, non-Gaelic speaking readers may be puzzled by some of the inscrip-tional data; for example, what appears to be SEIRBIS on the insignia is recorded in the text as SEIRBHIS, but this is explained by a dot above the B, which makes it BH, pronounced as v.

Since many Irish troops have served with United Nations peace-keeping forces, the UNO medals are included, while the final chapter, gives a full description and photographs of the very rare unofficial medal, struck in 1931 by the Irish-Americans, to commemorate the voyage of the *Aud*, in 1916, in connection with Sir Roger Casement's activities.

To sum up: a very useful book, which can be confidently recommended to the collector.—*A.A.P.*

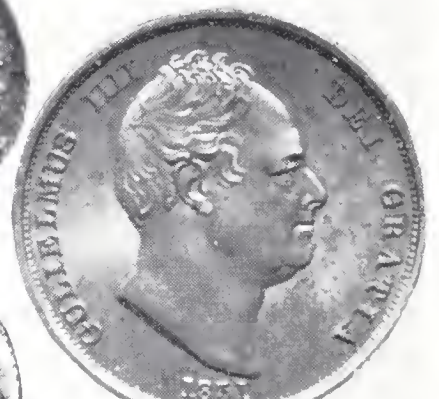

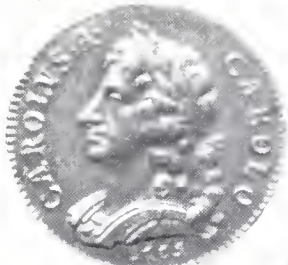

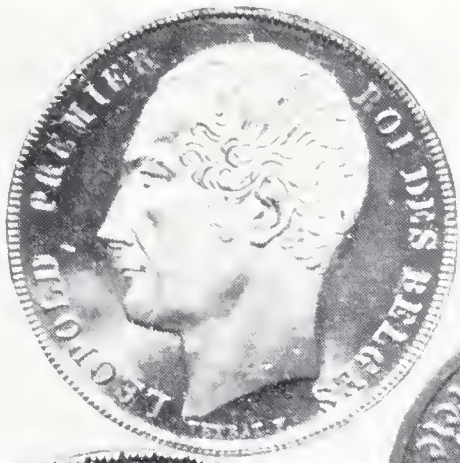
