

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
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DEDICATION



T.K. Retires

An interesting series of events took place in December of 1972 surrounding the retirement of Mr. Franklin from regular participation in the affairs of Albert College. He served as Teacher, Business Administrator of the College and Secretary of the Board of Govenors, during his long and distinguished career.

The students will be well aware that his service to Albert was not confined to the demands of the actual position which he held. His kindness, his wealth of experience and his untiring energy were always at the service of both teachers and students. It is understandable that his colleagues and the students should wish to give tangible expression of this love and appreciation when T.K. decided to take things a bit more easily.

The members of the Board of Govenors began the festivities with a testimonial dinner at the Four Seasons Hotel in Belleville, at which Mr. Franklin acquitted himself very well in the acceptance of a Polaroid Camera and a Scholarship in his name.

A surprise party was arranged for him and Mrs. Franklin at which as many of his former secretaries as could be contacted were invited to attend. The event proved to be very interesting and enjoyable and he had the opportunity to pick out some lawn furniture for his beautiful summer cottage, after his return from Florida.

The Faculty of the College held their party for Mr. Franklin at the Headmaster's residence on the campus, where it was decided to keep T.K.'s image and example before future generations of students by having an oil painting of him done, which will hang in the Library.

The maintenance staff gave him an ample supply of film for his camera, and afterward Jo-anne Willment made a presentation of a gold watch, suitably inscribed, to Mr. Franklin on behalf of the boys and girls in attendance at the school this year. This was done at the Christmas Banquet and Chapel Service.

These festivities were fun yet tinged with regret at the withdrawal of one so active in the affairs of the College. T.K. will maintain his position as Secretary and has also agreed to perform a valuable service in working with the Alumni Association by assisting them in matters of records and general secretarial work.

The yearbook staff would like to dedicate this year's edition of the Alibi, with pride, to Mr. Franklin. We hope that it will serve as a testimonial of the love and best wishes that go with him in his retirement.

Tour To Greece

On Sunday, March 18, a group of Albert College students and friends with Mr. MacKay in charge embarked on what is planned as an annual event - a visit overseas - this year to Greece, Yugoslavia and London.

After a delay of 24 hours in Toronto because of adverse weather conditions, "the Company of Adventurers" as Mr. Franklin dubbed them, arrived at Heathrow Airport just in time to transfer to the airport at Luton and the flight to Split in Yugoslavia. The view of the Alps was the first of many breathtaking sights that defy description. At Split we transtransferred to our "mobile home" the Greek liner the "Delos" where we found ourselves on "C" deck with students from Ottawa, North Bay, London, Toronto and some "tourists" from England.

The Adriatic was calm and serene as we made our way South. Life on board was never found dull with happenings, and lectures and bingo in the Delos Lounge, and dancing in the Corfu Lounge and of course rock in the Discotheque... down on "D" deck. The morning of March 22 saw the Delos drop anchor at Itea at the west side of the Strait of Corinth. We transferred to shore by barge where busses took us up the torturous trail to Delphi, the site of the ancient temple of Apollo, the Theatre of Delphi, the Sanctuary of Athena and of course the ancient Oracle. Miraculously, three thousand years of history came into focus as we sat and looked down on the temple, the Stadium and the Sanctuary. It was an emotional experience that one does not put into words readily.

After dark. In the morning we found ourselves docked at Pireaus, the port of Athens, one of the world's cleanest ports. After breakfast, March 23, we were taken on a bus tour of Athens, a tour which culminated at the Acropolis. Visits to the Parthenon, the Aereopagus and "Mars Hill" where Paul made his well-known oration to "ye men of Athens". After lunch it was the scenic ride to Cape Sunion and the remains of the Temple to Perseus. Back to Athens in time to spend money that was burning holes in our pockets.

March 24th meant an early departure for Patras and again through the Corinth Canal in the dark. One cannot forget the ride from Patras to Olympia, through the countryside with small farms, and small gardens. A rather dull and rainy day meant little opportunity for picture taking but we never ceased to marvel as we roamed the remains of the Temple of Hera, the first Olympic Stadium, the Gymnasium, the Temple of Zeus and the numerous other remains that have remained for us to savour. Time to consider the poverty of the people in this part of Greece made us very mindful of our own affluence and our privilege. We returned to the Delos in time for dinner and weighing anchor for the journey to Corfu.

March 25 at Corfu was another memorable day - an island paradise - a jewel set in the Adriatic. We wended our way by bus to the Casino. The statuary and the frescoes, beautifully preserved, left us agape at the beauty of the hill.

It takes one back over 1000 years as one looks through the historical and cultural monuments and the beautiful countryside. Dinner to-night was a special event - the captain's dinner party and the farewell party in the Delos Lounge as we sailed for Split.



Was it all real? Was it just a dream? How much do we remember? How much will we remember? These are the questions we asked ourselves. Each of us has his or her own answers. It was indeed a memorable experience. It was indeed an education and it was fun.

Next year, God willing, it could be Russia, or Scandinavia or Spain and more exposure to a shrinking world.

YOU DID IT WITH LOVE ALL KINDS OF LOVE

What I am going to say today concerns a subject that many people have spoken about; one that perhaps some of you may think is being abused. I don't agree - because there are infinitely many types of it that can be revealed in equally endless ways, some of which I'll talk about today.

The subject is love; and I think there is no more beautiful emotion, either to give or receive, in the world. I realize I'm not an authority on it, but I had an experience that gave me a glimpse of a fraction of the different types of love that people can express. The experience occurred about five or six weeks ago, and it proved to be both a wonderful and a horrible one. The place? A camp called Grippen Lake. The wonderful experience? Meeting many new people who loved to be there,



showed love to each other in friendly ways, loved what they did. The horrible experience? I needn't mention it, because it's no longer important. What is important, and more, almost unfathomable because of the extent of the feeling
produced, is the various types of love that were revealed through the experience. There was perhaps most of all, the
love born of concern for fellow student and companion; a deep one, and one that in some cases bred deep sorrow. For
being the cause of this sorrow, I apologize; at the same time, I thank those who felt it for caring so deeply.

The next type of love was deeper yet - it was one that, I am told, wrenched hearts, as it was born of worry. It was followed by a love born of thanks - thanks that things would be all right again, thanks that there was no need for worry anymore. From this evolved a love for each other, one that brought about mutual concern and aid; for instance, consoling each other, offering shoulders and soothing words, helping each other to pack, and later trying to cheer each other up. This kind of love is a particularly beautiful one, because it is spontaneous and totally unselfish.

Later came to me in hospital material expressions of love, the first knowledge I had of the effect the incident had on you all. Cards, flowers, letters, general get well wishes - they came pouring in from everywhere, and many from people I did not expect. Visitors came in every day - my wonderful family, of course; but there were staff members as well, who took time out to come. The effect this had on my wealth was wonderfully positive - so much love has a great effect on the body's healing powers. Frankly, I was so overwhelmed, I cried many a time. To be the recipient of such deep and abundant feeling was the greatest thing that has ever happened to me. Little did I know it was only the beginning.

Wednesday of that week I was visited by a friend who had just found out what had happened that afternoon, and had driven out to see me. Love again - and a great love. Then, on Saturday, I received a group of students who had requested to visit me. They brought with them so much love, concern, good spirits, I didn't know what to do. To have people come to see you from distances just because they love you and wish you well is an experience that is emotional for you as well as for them.

Still there was more love to come, in different ways. Monday following there was a love expressed born of happiness and, I think, relief at seeing someone about whom people were concerned return. Enroute home I stopped in at the school just to say hello, and was envoloped in this kind of love. It was there in the smiling faces, the affectionate gestures - you who were there know what it was like. All this would have been enough in itself to last anyone for the rest of their lives, but again a week later there was more - and of a different kind. It was a combination of the loves born of happiness, reunion, and concern. There was a love I'll call the "kid glove love" for want of a more adequate expression. It was a gentle love, one where I was treated like a delicate instrument, and there was liberal tenderness in it. And you know what? I still feel this love very much.

All these types of love, given so freely, are proof that man can give of himself without second thoughts or regrets. It is a marvelous thing.

What does it feel like to receive all these kinds of love? At the risk of being repetitious, it is overwhelming. One asks, "How can I cope with this? What can I do to thank such fantastic people?" Well, a good beginning is to thank all of them outright - and I have so much and so many people to be thankful for. I thank the beople who saw me fall, and cared enough to reach me as quickly as possible, even at the risk of injuring themselves; I owe those individuals a lot. Miss Brintnell I thank you with all my heart for the loving care you showed me, though it was a great strain on you, I know. It is because of you that the line on my head is a thin one; that I did not lose as much blood as I could have; that I was alive when the ambulance arrived. I thank Mr. Jodoin for the comforting words and loving care he showed me enroute to the hospital - I am told he has never talked so long uninterrupted. Mr. Schindel, you were responsible for a lot of prayers being said for me - another expression of another love. Thank you for that. All the staff members who tried to help the students who needed you, I thank you. Miss Delvin, your visit did me a lot of good. I thank Miss McIntyre for her gesture of love, her taxi service on that Saturday, and most recently and especially, her expressions of "kid glove love", even though they spring from her potential heart failures. And, of course, I must thank Mr. MacKay for all he has done for me, particularly taking time out from his own busy schedule to take me back to Grippen and gain some understanding of what happened. Mr. MacKay - thank you.

Lastly, I must thank a group of people who, from the point of view of friend and peer love, are the people closest to my heart. Each moment of the day you have made me feel more needed, wanted, and truly loved than ever before in my life. Your expressions of love, your concern, your confidence in me have given me a whole new outlook on life.

It is a truly awesome thing how people in time of crisis will, for the sake of love, forget themselves completely and turn their attentions wholly to mending whatever has occurred. You people - all of you - are a perfect example of this unselfishness in love. If there were more people like you, the world's attitude would turn from apathy to empathy - and it would be a world worth living in. This is what you have done to me. Having received so much love, I want so much to give it as well. It is you that have made me love life, wish to live, wish to love people. It was not an effort you made, it was not a goal you consciously had, yet you did it. This is unique and total kind of love.

It would be a gratifying thing if, in some way, I could repay this love. If ever anything happened to you, I would help you in any and every way, believe me. It's hard to express in words how I would like to repay you all; but if I could, I would. There is a song that expresses this idea.

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
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From the Editor
