ATHLLETICS of the Cniversity are under the control of the Athetic Association of which every student is a nember and persons of the Faculty may become members on the payment of the regular anmual fee of two dollars.
The organization is qoverned by a Board of Directors, one from the Fabulty and three from the student boty. The student members are elected yearly, there being two collegiate members and one preparatory.

The Assoceation recognizes teans in four branches of athleties-football, baseball, track and baskelball: the members of whieh are awarded the Varsity "M."

The Tniversity is a member of the Northwest Interaollegiate Athletie Association, the other members of which are: Lniversity of Washington, University of Waho, Cniversity of Orerob, Montama Agricultural College, Oregon Agrientural College and Whitman College.

## Annual Meet of Montana High Schools

$\tau$IIE Inter-Seholastic: Mect has proven to be the most interesting and suecessful event adopted by the liniversity to arouse and sthutate the Iligh schnols of the state. The meet was plantmed in the winter of 1903? when the invitation to the High Sehools was formally extended at the State 'Temehers' Association at Anaconda.

Acoording fo the plan as proposed the C'niversity agreed to pay the entipe expenses of three eontestants from ench High Schood on the aceredited list. It was also agreed that contestants from sehocols not on the aceredited liat wond he recerived on the same conditions as others, except that railromal fare wonld not be paid. Shools were urged to send as many contestants as possible, and all who came ans contestants were eared for while in the city. Nearly every school delegation was necompanied by one of the thathers ats chaperon.

The plan of paying the entire expense of so many comtestams, from stah remote phaces, wats a doubtinl undertaking, as the expense would be barge, atel there was no way of telling low well it wond he patronized. The eitizens of Missuala promptly sutheribed several humbed dollars to be used in case of deflivit.

Students, facnly and citizels entered bartily into tha selpeme. The High Fchool tearhers and [mpils it the rity gave somerous and logal sapport. The result was that the first year's meat, on which so much depernded, was a success in every way, and the permanemey of the muth as an annal event wik aswured.

During the first two gens the meet paid all expenses. With favorable Weather it will eontime to dorso, as interest in the event is prowing. High Sehool pupils, University students and faculty, and citizens generally, look forward with much antimpation to the time of the meet. The old men become boys again when they see the enthasiasn of the contestants. The High sehoml prople rally to the support of the contextants from the school and make unity of spirit among the body of represontatives. Students and faculty from
the I'niversity take pheasure in entert nining the visitors, and in assisting them in varions wiys.

The meet has done wemders for the High sehowls in developing an interest in deelamation. Athletie interest has been vostly greater since the first meet. The teachers and pupils of the sehowh have become acquainted with each other, and the Iligh Sohool prople see the linversity and become nequmintel with the stidelits and falulty. As merns of making comparisoms of work, beemming aequminted with each other, und stimulating seloobs to effort, nothing like the meet has ex or heen undertuken in the state.

The Iniversity stachents tuke no part in the ment. Naturally, the harger seloouls are expected to carry off the honors. The results of the past two rears have shown that the smaller schools are going to keep the larger s-hools on the maxions sent as regards wiming.
