





Great Commission Hall includes thirteen furnished apartments, a conference room to accommodate one hundred persons, a full hospitality kitchen and other common areas for study and fellowship. Felix Drury of New Haven was the architect. Babbidge Facilities Construction Co. managed the construction. Great Commission Hall is OMSC's third building, joining the historic Farrel House at 490 Prospect Street, which serves as administration and guest facility, and Doane Hall, which provides eleven residential apartments.

Great Commission Hall was designed to provide a variety of places for formal and informal fellowship. These range from the ample social room with its adjacent terrace to the sunken entrance court designed to provide seating on the retaining wall, to the window seat in the main stairwell. Each apartment has a comparatively large living room for entertaining and relaxation as well as for computer-based study and research.

The building's exterior is distinguished by the horizontal banding of the two brick colors with the small glazed accent blocks, the continuous horizontal precast sill bands, the uniformly-sized windows and the standing seam metal roof. This horizontal character is counterbalanced by the slender upward thrust of the nearly three-story main entrance projection with its narrow vertical trim boards, clustered windows and arched porch with traditional columns. Throughout, the architect has maintained a balance between the site and the building to create a place of interaction and reflection, while recognizing the needs for facilities to support OMSC's programs. He has created a structure that would harmonize with the administrative building and *Doane Hall*, but would also be handsome and distinctive in its own right.

Dinner Speaker James T. Laney



James T. Laney received his B.A., M.Div., and Ph.D. degrees from Yale University – its College, Divinity School, and Graduate School, respectively. A United Methodist minister, he was Associate Professor at Yonsei University in Seoul, Korea from 1954 to 1964. After receiving his Ph.D. in 1966, he taught at Vanderbilt Divinity School. In 1969, he became Dean and Professor of Ethics at the Candler School of Theology at Emory University. Named President of Emory in 1977, he guided Emory through a period of expansion and civil activism until he was named Ambassador to South Korea by President Clinton in 1993. Now returned from that post, he has remained active in the life of the University, in the city of Atlanta, and on the national and international scenes as President Emeritus.

A distinguished writer on theology, ethics, and the role of the academy in the professional world, Dr. Laney has been a leader in contexts like the Atlanta Project, spearheaded by former President Jimmy Carter, the Board of Ethics of the Atlanta Committee on the Olympic Games, and a range of other cultural, educational and social initiatives. His time as Ambassador to South Korea brought the challenge of a particularly dangerous flare-up in relations between North and South Korea. As his counsel is frequently sought by his alma mater Yale, he is a frequent visitor to New Haven, often with his wife, Berta.

Dedication Speaker Samuel H. Moffett

Samuel H. Moffett was born in Korea, the son of American missionary parents, and was himself a missionary to China (1947-51) and to Korea (1955-81). He is an ordained Presbyterian minister. Educated at Wheaton College, Princeton Theological Seminary, and Yale University's Graduate School, where he received his Ph.D. in 1945, he was appointed the Henry W. Luce Professor of Ecumenics and Missions at Princeton Theological Seminary in 1981. Both Dr. Moffett and his wife, Eileen, had taught at the Presbyterian Theological Seminary in Seoul, the largest Protestant theological school in Asia, where he also served successively as Dean of the Graduate School and Associate President of the Seminary.

The author of several widely-read and influential books, including Where'er the Sun (1953), The Christians of Korea (1962), and The Biblical Background of Evangelism (1968), Dr. Moffett retired from Princeton in 1986. Since then, he has been working on a two-volume work entitled A History of Christianity in Asia. The first volume of this magisterial survey, covering the "Beginnings to 1500," was published in 1992, while the second, in part funded by The Pew Charitable Trusts' Research Enablement Program, is in preparation. Dr. Moffett served on the Board of Trustees of the Overseas Ministries Study Center from 1986 to 1992.

The Overseas Ministries Study Center

The Overseas Ministries Study Center, located since 1987 in New Haven, Connecticut, was founded in 1922 in Ventnor, New Jersey, as a housing and renewal center for missionaries on furlough. The founders were Marguerite T. Doane and Ida F. Doane, daughters of William Howard Doane, the Gospel hymn writer (died 1915). Doane wrote hundreds of hymns, many, such as "To God Be the Glory," with the blind poet Fanny Crosby. His ministry as a YMCA musician evangelist was admired by Ira Sankey, colleague of evangelist D.L. Moody, and it was said that American missionaries of the late nineteenth century were sure to include Doane hymns in their equipment for overseas ministry.

In 1967 the Board of Trustees inaugurated an informal program of continuing education for the missionary residents of OMSC in Ventnor. Under directors R. Pierce Beaver (1974-1976) and Gerald H. Anderson (1976-), the OMSC Study Program became nationally known. The annual series of weekly seminars and workshops, beginning each fall and continuing through the academic year, draws missionaries of many nations and Christian traditions. Each year more than 400 persons, non-residents as well as residents, enroll in the programs.

An important consideration in the 1987 relocation to New Haven was proximity to the research libraries of Yale University, especially the Day Missions Library of Yale Divinity School. Since 1977 OMSC has published the *International Bulletin of Missionary Research*. In its seventy-seven years of service to the world church, the Center has provided furlough apartment accommodations for more than 10,000 adults and 5,000 children.

From the Director



As an institution devoted primarily to serving the parts of the church "overseas," where Christianity is flourishing at unprecedented levels, OMSC is challenged to keep pace with the emerging needs of the

ever-growing number of the church's servants. The decision of our Board of Trustees to expand our physical plant (see the article at right) and their mandate to initiate new international programs are causes for confidence in the Center's continued importance for the mission of the twenty-first century church. The growth of the "Friends of OMSC" from just over thirty contributors two years ago to almost 140 during 1996-97 is a further cause for optimism. With such support and such a strong commitment to the advancement of our mission, surely we can produce good fruit in the years to come.

As I write this, we are preparing to send the Rev. Dr. James M. Phillips, our former Associate Director, on a trip to northeastern Asia—Japan, China and Korea—to discover new ways for OMSC to serve the very different churches of those three nations and to encourage church leaders there to make use of OMSC's unique educational resources. Our ties have been close over the years, but much of the news of the Center's work has been word of mouth. We hope to open up broader lines of communication.

At the same time, our current Associate Director, the Rev. Dr. Jonathan J. Bonk, is putting final touches to plans for increasing our involvement with the churches of Africa. Flowing naturally from his work with the ongoing Dictionary of African Christian Biography, planned as a non-proprietary resource for those churches, Dr. Bonk's "Project Luke" would assist the dictionary project by providing training and educational resources to the writers of the latter-day (continued on page 2)

OMSC to Build "Great Commission Hall"

At their December 3rd, 1997 meeting, OMSC's Board of Trustees approved a plan to build "Great Commission Hall" on that part of the Center's property facing Mansfield Street (the area behind the Doane Hall residences). The building will combine thirteen apartments, for use by both long- and short-term residents, with a number of common areas, including a social room twice the size of the present conference room, a kitchen facility, and a study area for English as a Second Language. Commenting on this decision, the Board's President, the Rev. Dr. J. Martin Bailey, said that "a thorough analysis of projected needs, together with a review of our long-range plan, led the Board to its unanimous decision. I am convinced that this new building will provide OMSC with the basis for its global outreach well into the next century."

Groundbreaking for Great Commission Hall is scheduled for June 3rd, with completion anticipated in time to receive residents in the summer of 1999. New Haven—area architect, Felix Drury, who oversaw the work on our current buildings back in 1987, has designed a three-level building that takes advantage of a steep downgrade towards Mansfield Street. The new social room and other pub

"Acts of the African Evangelists and Apostles." Now being shared with foundations and individuals with a view to receiving their support for an initial three-year program, this project will likely be a central part of OMSC's work in the years ahead.

Finally, I am pleased to be able to announce the publication by Macmillan Library Reference USA of the Biographical Dictionary of Christian Missions last November, just after the previous issue of *The* Hearth went to press. At a surprise luncheon festivity in December, scholars and North American mission executives joined close friends of OMSC in presenting plaques to myself, as editor, and to other key members of the editorial staff. (Regrettably, one of these, the Rev. Dr. William Smalley, former missionary to Thailand and a long-time friend of the Center, died soon after.) Last month, Assistant Editor Robert T. Coote and I had the opportunity to present copies of the BDCM to a number of European Christian leaders, including Pope John Paul II, then just returned from Cuba. This, and the letters of thanks and congratulations from scholars and church leaders across the denominational spectrum we have received from many parts of the world, confirm my sense that OMSC continues to be a place where the great hymn's vision is realized: "In Him shall true hearts everywhere/their high communion find."

lic areas, along with a handicapped-accessible apartment, will be situated on the ground level. The two upper levels will contain twelve apartments—two with two bedrooms, nine with one bedroom, and one efficiency/studio. The second floor will have a major entry way from the east—from Doane Hall and from the administration building—which will in turn lead into a stairway to the ground floor common areas.

OMSC's director, Dr. Gerald H. Anderson, emphasized that "flexibility is the key" to the expansion of our facilities and, consequently, of our ministry. Noting that "in the past several years, I have had to turn down dozens of applications for residency because we were booked a year or more in advance," Anderson welcomes the possibility of serving a greater percentage of eligible applicants. Additional space for residents also allows greater diversity within the resident community. This wide representation of church traditions and national origins has been frequently noted as an advantage by both the residents themselves and those who participate in our seminars for a week or two.

It is intended that a few of the new apartments will be reserved for the short-term stays for which we receive so many requests and through which we are able to accommodate many distinguished and interesting guests. Provision of common areas useful for advanced communications and for additional instruction in English for some of the overseas residents allows the Center to keep up with the needs of those it serves. A second, larger all-purpose room allows us to use whichever space best fits the size and needs of any given seminar and opens the possibility of simultaneous events.

A combination of gifts from individuals, mission agencies, and other institutions and money from OMSC's own portfolio is expected to fund the approximately \$1.4 million cost of Great Commission Hall. Development Director Dr. Robert Ford hopes that "those agencies and churches regularly served by OMSC will want to play a role in expanding the Center's ability to serve their missionaries." Individuals have already made gifts as a way to honor or memorialize loved ones. Opportunities for naming various parts of the new facility are available.

Little, who has been at the same time rector of the Episcopal Church of St. James in Fair Haven, itself an exemplar of intercultural ministry, with its combined Anglo and Hispanic congregation, is now the director of the new Church Mission Society, USA, which he helped to organize. This is a sister organization to CMS, Britain. (Look for him, along with OMSC friend, Canon Graham Kings of the Henry Martyn Center, Cambridge, on the June 22-27 "Camel Walk" fundraiser honoring the 200th Anniversary of CMS and benefiting an endowment of church primary schools in Northern Kenya. OMSC is one of Geoff's supporters for the walk from Oxford to Cambridge!) "All of us involved with REP," says Little, "take great pride in the doors we have opened for mission scholars and mission scholarship around the world" and, he might have added, perhaps among "unreached people groups" within North American academia as well! While wrapping up this program has elements of sadness, the sense of great accomplishment is widely felt among those who guided and participated in REP's work.

Thieme Bible Ministries, the independent Preston City Congregational Church, and the American Baptist Church in Voluntown. If was after all not so very far away that Roger Williams established his Rhode Island colony. And into this milieu of independence and the frequent reawakening of the evangelical Protestant spirit was born OMSC's grandsire, William Howard Doane. We rejoice in these links between past and present!

The Doane Heritage in Eastern Connecticut The 1999 "Founders' Day" Commemoration

Residents, staff, and friends of OMSC celebrated the anniversary of the founding of OMSC by Marguerite and Ida Doane (through articles of incorporation dated March 14, 1923) by visiting the birth site of their father, Gospel hymn writer, William Howard Doane. Born in the small town of Preston City, Connecticut, on February 23, 1832, Doane grew up in the same environment of religious zeal that produced Adoniram Judson and many of the other first American overseas missionaries. Doane's religious background was mixed: his father, Joseph, held Presbyterian or Congregationalist views, while his mother, Frances Treat Doane, was firm in her Baptist tenets. In fact, the Treats had been among the founders and builders of the Preston City Baptist (now "Bible") Church, situated on an opposing corner from their home. Joseph and Frances purchased the house and shop on another of the four corners, which had formerly been an inn, and it was here that William Howard was born. Unfortunately, this building was torn down in the 1930s for the purpose of straightening out the nearby highway, but a small park commemorating the site, with an appropriate plaque, has been created.

Our tour on Saturday, March 13th, began with an orientation to the town and its ecclesiastical history (in New England, church history usually *is* the town's history!) by members of the Preston City Historical Society. We gathered in the lovely, one-room Victorian structure that had served until recently as the town's library, and were offered the kindest hospitality. Walking by the Treat Home (the house of William Howard's Baptist maternal grandparents), and detouring briefly to see the Town Pound (paddock for livestock) and Poor House, we returned to Preston City's four corners to see the plaque commemorating Doane's birthplace. Situated on a main artery leading to one of Eastern Connecticut's booming Indian Casinos, road crossing here is more of an adventure than it was in Doane's day!

The present structure of the Preston City Bible (then "Baptist") Church was built by the Treats and their neighbors in the 1820s—though the building was literally turned on its axis to face the street at a later date. Again warmly welcomed, we not only saw the site of some of William Howard Doane's earliest religious and musical experiences, a lovely and well-preserved building, and the portable "cabinet organ" he gave to the church later in his life, but also had the opportunity to raise our voices in song: "To God be the Glory!" Driving just a bit up the hill, we visited the Preston City Congregational Church, in whose school rooms Doane had been educated, and in which he was equally at home, given his father's predelictions. Rebuilt in the 1880s after a fire destroyed the building Doane would have known, the church received at that time a gift of hymnals from the town's best known musical son.

After lunch, we traveled toward the Rhode Island border to the section of Voluntown known until recently as "Doaneville," after the textile mills there that were owned by William Howard's father, uncle, and progenitors. In the early 1850s, Doane worked for his father at the mill and lived near-

by. At this time, he was the choir leader at the Voluntown **Baptist** Church, which had originally been built as the "Doane Meeting House" for the nearby factory. Very closely related in its architecture to the Preston City Church, the building had been greatly altered in the past, but is being considered for restoration. In the meantime, one former gallery in which much of the inner structure is currently visi-

ble was available for inspection—an impressive opportunity to appreciate the skill of early nineteenth-century church builders. It was this "Yankee ingenuity" that brought wealth to Doane in later years!

At each of the three churches we visited, as at the Historical Society, we met with warmth and interest. Nor did we fail to draw some conclusions from the paths the three churches we visited have followed, the Preston City Baptist Church now a Bible Church in the tradition of the R.B.

He came to us in a time of wrenching transition when not a few wondered whether this so gentle and mild mannered man could ever take the place of the Center's forceful founder. But almost imperceptibly, in ways that escaped the public eye but were no less effective, Dan Hardy restored the Center's vision for the future, and turned doubt into confidence. He set a course which both internally and externally raised the level of cross-discipline academic dialogue, especially between theology and science, to new levels of excellence.

He has won for the Center an ever widening measure of international respect, and for himself the affection and gratitude of the whole, rotating CTI community, the annual "twelve disciples", as different and stimulating a mix every year as one could ever find. Who of us will forget the way he presided over the "presentations"? He has been a master both at guiding and stimulating open discussion, never dominating it, but now and then in his low-key way intervening to ask for a missing definition, or raise a critical question, or simply to ask for more clarity whether from the presenter or the questioner.

Dan Hardy was a theologian when the scientists among us needed one, a philosopher when we were caged in our own presuppositions, a pietist in the proper sense of that word when we were too aridly academic, and a questioning scientist when our theology got too turgidly theological.

We shall miss you very much, Dan.

Project Title: A History of Christianity in Asia: Vol. II, 1500 to the Present



Western church histories too often disregard the fact that Christianity spread east across Asia as early as it moved west into Europe. This is an issue Dr. Moffett seeks to redress in his two-volume work A History of Christianity in Asia. The first volume, Beginnings to 1500 was published in 1992. In his proposed second volume he takes up the story of the coming of Western missionaries to Asia and the dramatic revival of Asian Christianity beginning in 1500. Particular attention is paid to the development of national leaders and churches. The two volumes will be the first single-author treatment of this subject. Dr. Moffett's REP grant has funded necessary archival study and field research.

Born in Korea, the son of American missionary parents, he was a missionary to China (1947-1951) and to Korea (1955-1981). He received a Th.B. (1942) from Princeton Theological Seminary, U.S.A., and Ph.D. (1945) from Yale University. Dr. Moffett retired from teaching at Princeton Seminary in 1986. His publications include *The Christians of Korea* (1962) and *The Biblical Background of Evangelism* (1968).

Project Title:

A Historical and Social Study of the Mission Work and Role of the Sudan Interior Mission (SIM) in the Founding of Christianity and the Indigenous Church in Northern Nigeria, 1893-1976



Dr. Turaki, a Nigerian, provides a historical and sociological case study of the missionary legacy of SIM in his homeland. His research demonstrates how SIM missionaries operated in a complex socio-political environment which included the presence of traditional African spiritism, Islamic religion, and Western colonialism. The publication of this work is intended to contribute to the celebration of the centennial anniversary of the founding of SIM in 1893. Dr. Turaki's REP grant has been used to conduct extensive archival research in the United States and Nigeria.

Dr. Turaki has been General Secretary of the Evangelical Churches of West Africa since 1987. He received an M.T.S. (1978) from Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary, U.S.A., and a Ph.D. (1982) from Boston University. Much of his published work, including *The Christian and Politics in Modern Nigeria* (1988), is concerned with society and ethics in Western Africa.

Project Title: Indigenous Religions and Christianity in Brazil: A Study of Comparative Religion and Ethnology



In this project Dr. Wright seeks to understand the dynamics of the religious life of indigenous peoples in relation to the forms of Christianity introduced among them by Christian missionaries and sects. More specifically, through a comparative study of five ethnographic regions in Brazil, he investigates how native peoples have utilized, transformed, or rejected Christian symbols and theologies. Dr. Wright's REP grant has been used to conduct field research in Brazil.

Dr. Wright is a United States citizen with permanent residence in Brazil. He has taught in the Department of Anthropology at the State University of Campinas since 1986. He received an M.A. (1974) and Ph.D. (1981) from Stanford University, U.S.A. He has published widely on the indigenous history and anthropology of peoples in the Amazon region of Latin America.

A History of Christianity in Asia, 2 Volumes.

Let me start straight out with the confession that I know very well that I have bitten off more than I can chew. But I want you to know that I am still chewing, thanks to, among others, the OMSC and the Pew Charitable Trusts.

But I have only 12 minutes. 2000 years of Christianity in the largest continent in the world in 12 minutes! So I will tailor my report to the four points suggested in the Memorandum: 1. Description. 2. Methodology. 3. Outcome, and 4. the Importance of my project.

I. <u>Description</u>. My project is a one-author, two-volume history of Christianity in Asia. <u>A</u> History, not <u>The</u> History, for a one-author survey should never pretend to be definitive.

The two volumes divide the history at the year 1500 which marks the beginning of the age of western discovery, the second and most successful entry of the west into Asian history after the time of Christ, the first being the Crusades.

Volume I covers the first 1500 years—a millennium and a half which can be described, perhaps, as "the rise and decline of Christianity in Asia". In it I set out to correct the neglect by most Western historians of the almost forgotten story of Christianity's dramatic spread east across Asia to the east. We need reminding that in the 13th century, the Patriarch of the Church of the East, which we call Nestorian, exercised ecclesiastical authority over more of the surface of the globe than the Pope in Rome. There are too many of us who are surprised to learn that in that same century the Pope permitted a Mongolian Christian, technically a heretic, the bishop—ambassador of Kublai Khan—whose mother incidentally was a Christian—to Edward I of England and Philip the Fair of France—to celebrate a Nestorian mass in his presence in the Vatican. However, unfortunately, the first volume ends not in ecumenical Christian

triumph but in disaster with the virtual extinction of Nestorianism in Asia.

If Volume I ends with an all-time low for Christianity in Asia, Volume II (1500 to the present) has to guard against portraying the next 500 years as Asia's all-time high. It cannot escape the fact that at the moment when Asian history records the near end of Christianity east of the Euphrates, the so-called Christian West rediscovers Asia--but not all Asians regard that as an all-time high. Nevertheless, is true that it was the West which revitalized Christianity on the continent, but also reshaped it. Most of the next 200 years are all Catholic, in fact most of the next 300 years are Catholic. Then there is 60 years of Catholic decline (the 1770s to the 1830s and 40s). But in the next 100 years, the 19th century, Protestant missions become dominant, and by the middle of the century Catholic missions revive. Those four hundred years from 1500 to 1900 alter the whole course of Asia's history, Christian and non-Christian, continent-wide.

But only in the last century, the 20th, does Asian Christianity reach what might arguably be called its all-time high for this has been the century of the rise of Asia's own Asian churches, the century of transition from mission to Asia, to Asian missions to the world. As for the future, who can tell?

- II. Now a word about <u>Methodology</u>. I will make seven observations.
- 1. I must begin with the acknowledgment that I write from an admittedly <u>Christian viewpoint</u>. No apologies. All historians have presuppositions; some admit them more readily than others. One aspect of a Christian viewpoint on history is a respect for tradition, and I would argue that that is not unreasonable, given that traditions, like culture, <u>shape</u> history. If western historians can resect a tradition of Peter in Rome, why can't we be equally respectful of a tradition of Thomas in India. I also, however, write with the purposeful intent to observe professional norms of scholarship and objectivity. I do not confuse tradition

with history.

- 2. Arbitrary limits. Space and time have forced me to limit the geographic scope of the project as much as I reasonably can. I adapted, therefore, the United Nations division of Asia into two sub-continents, East Asia and South Asia, excluding the Russian north as a separate continent. For the first volume I also chose to omit as much as possible of the Christianity of the Mediterranean coast, since by Greco-Roman conquest coastal West Asia was effectively drawn out of the east into western church history. In effect then, the Asia I describe is oriental Asia east of the Euphrates and south of Asia Minor and Russia. That inevitably and unfairly slights Eastern Orthodoxy and Armenian Christianity, but history is rarely just.
- 3. One author. For the sake of focus, clarity and unity, I chose a one-author approach. That has its problems. Asia is a linguistic jungle in which a single author cannot hope to do justice to all the limitless languages of the original sources. So I must acknowledge my great debt to a host of specialists, Western and Asiatic, to whose monographs, articles, translations and histories my footnotes can only partially bear witness.

I notice one great difference in this respect between Asian history before and after 1500. Primary sources before 1500 were scarcer but because they were fewer could be tracked down. The problem for a one-author project is that after 1500 primary, to say nothing of secondary sources begin to multiply exponentially. There have been times when I regretted that printing was ever invented.

- 5. <u>Periodization</u>. History is too rough and unruly to be boxed into neat chronological periods. Asian church history, moreover, roams over so wide a range of different ecclesiastical, regional, and national histories, that no one scheme of chronological classification fits them all. The edges I put on the boxes blur by decades, not by single years.
- 6. Narrative flow. The problem of preserving a balance between historical detail, issue analysis, and narrative flow is

also difficult. Macauley stretched his definition of history a bit too far when he declared, "History is the sum of innumerable biographies", but if one boils the biographical, anecdotal fat out of history, one is left with an inedible, unreadable bag of bones. Rightly or wrongly, therefore, I aimed for the general reader, and particularly for those with an interest in global Christian mission, but with one eye kept open for the needs of specialists—regional and national historians, social historians, historians of theology, and any readers whose intellectual curiosity is broad enough to reach out beyond the limits of their own specialties. I was encouraged by an enthusiastic reaction to Vol. I from the principal research physicist at the plasma lab where Princeton University is working toward a breakthrough out of fission into fusion nuclear physics.

7. Statistics. As I approach the present in Vol. II, and look back at the last 500 years, statistics will become more and more important. One hypothesis suggested by the research so far, is that Christianity in Asia has taken firm root and grown only in rough proportion to its success in achieving a sufficient mass following to make a significant observed effect on national cultures. Church statistics are notoriously soft, but David Barrett, editor of the Oxford World Christian Encyclopedia has generously offered his professional assistance in collecting and analyzing statistics by centuries, perhaps including extrapolation to the year 2000.

Outcome. Any way, the first outcome was Vol. I, published by Harper/Collins in December 1992. It has already been translated into Korea. As for Volume II, I won't know much about outcome until it comes out. I am presently on Chapter 15, and into 19th century southeast Asia, in first draft.

IV. So the fourth point: <u>Importance</u>. <u>Importance for world mission and for non-western Christianity</u>. Well, the word "Asia" itself in the title makes it important. Asia covers a third of the world's land surface. It includes two-thirds of all the

world's population. It is home to all six of world's major organized religions (Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism, Confucianism and Judaism). Christianity is now the world's largest and most universal religion, yet despite amazing growth in the 20th century, Christianity in Asia (excepting Judaism) is the smallest of the six religions. The important question is, Why?

But let me conclude on a more personal note. Let me try to explain the importance of the project by telling you how I got into it. It goes back almost fifty years. I was preparing to return to my roots in Asia. I had discovered from my church history courses in the west that had it not been for Prof. Latourette at Yale, Asian church history (in fact, any kind of 3rd world Christian history) would have remained a blank.

That didn't greatly surprise me, but what did surprise and frighten me was that when I got back to Asia and was asked to teach church history, I found myself repeating the same flawed pattern. What was wanted, and what I began to give them, was standard western church history. Asia needed and still needs a readable, available focus on Asia. Yet when in the next thirty years my students went to America for further study, what they came back with was still more Western church history. They knew nothing about their own church history. So in desperation, I turned over western church history to the Koreans (who by then, after more recent research than mine in Western libraries, knew more about it than I did), while I volunteered to teach the history of Christianity in Asia. We ended up with Korean professors teaching Western church history, and the Western professor on the faculty teaching Asian church history.

My conclusion? My conclusion is that what the west needs is to <u>read</u> more third world church history; and what the third world needs is to <u>write</u> more third world church history. But it can't write more third world church history without better resources. Christian institutions in Asia not only need more and better libraries, they need more attention to the securing and

protection of archival source materials. Thank God they are recognizing this, as the national churches in country after country organize their own church history societies. But lest the third world churches descend into what Stephen Neill calls "the snake pit of ecclesiastical nationalism", their regional surveys must rise above nationalism. The sin of over-nationalizing is the mirror image of the previously more common sin of over-westernizing Asian church history.

My project, I hope, will be one small step toward adding a continental, supranational perspective to the history of Christianity in Asia.

But enough of reporting. I must keep chewing away at the writing. My wife says, "Sam, you'd better get moving or you'll never get up to the land of the living."

Dr. Samuel Hugh Moffett, a former missionary to China and Korea who teaches at Princeton Theological Seminary in New Jersey, will speak March 1 and March 2 at First Presbyterian Church's three-day missions conference.
