

THE PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Even though we are celebrating in 1963 the 150th Anniversary of Emanuel Church, its history actually goes back nearly 200 years. For it was from 1745-1775 that the German Reformed and Lutheran people settled in Piedmont North Carolina. The first place of worship, where Emanuel Church now stands, was a brush arbor. Later a log building was constructed which was called, "Bower's Meeting House." Probably the reason people were so slow to organize a church here was due to the shortage of Ordained Reformed and Lutheran Ministers. It was in the year 1813 that the faithful Reformed and Lutheran Christians in this area organized a church and named it, Emanuel. And the log building was replaced with a frame structure.

As I write this 150th Anniversary Message, a verse of scripture from I Corinthians 3:6 seems so appropriate. Paul wrote, "I have planted, Appollos watered, but God gave the increase." Here the Apostle compares a church to a garden. Someone must plant the seed, and someone must water and care for the plants. But it is God who actually gives the growth and the increase.

Our forefathers planted the seeds of a church here. And scores of faithful souls have watered and cared for it these 150 or more years. Yea, even as they watered they continued to plant new seed. To them, beginning with original ones who dared leave the homeland of Germany and brave these shores and this wilderness, we are deeply grateful. But most of all, we are grateful to God who has given and continues to give the growth and increase.

Not only do we observe this 150th Anniversary with grateful hearts, but we also rededicate ourselves in the same faith which brought them to this land, and pledge anew our allegiance to the Lord whose foundations Emanuel Church was built. And we pray and trust that God will keep us faithful to plant and water so that this church might continue to grow and flourish to the end that through the years hungry souls might have the "Bread of Life" broken to them.

HISTORICAL SKETCH

EMANUEL UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST

1813-1963

"The proper name of the Church has always been Emanuel."* The oldest records now extant, dating from the ministry of the Rev. P. Allison Long, and written by Elder Absolom L. Grimes, name the church Emanuel. There are three forms for this name: Emmanuel (Matthew 1:23, King James Version) the Greek form Immanuel (Isaiah 7:14 and Matthew 1:23, American Revised Version) the Hebrew form; and Emanuel as in the Church records. It means "God with us." That is what a church should be, a place of meeting where the Almighty overshadows and the people are aware of the presence of God. Immanual was the name God gave His Son, the living God clothed in human flesh. Emanuel Church has been a witness to the living God through all the years. Emanuel is a Christian church. "Christ Jesus himself is the chief cornerstone."

THE BOWER'S MEETING HOUSE

Prior to the Emanuel Church a log house stood on the grounds. It was used for religious services when a Pastor or a Missionary sent by the Synod could visit the community. It was also used for a school when a teacher could be found. It was the day when all the education was under the control and entirely supported by the church. This log house was commonly known as "Bower's Meeting House." It was build on land owned by Jacob Bowers, a member of the Reformed faith. Later his daughter deeded a parcel of land to the church.

THE DEED FOR THE LAND


"The deed to the church lands bears the date of February 20, 1813. It was made to Philip Kanoy, Jacob Myers, Sr., and John Bowers by John Myers and his wife Elizabeth. The original tract contained three acres and the consideration was five dollars."* Elizabeth Myers was the daughter of Jacob Bowers, and the sister of John Bowers. It is evident that the burial ground was laid out many years before the deed was given. "The oldest tombstone bearing a date has upon it the year 1808, though some graves in those early years are not marked." *There is a large section north of the church that is unmarked. Unhewn stones indicate very old graves. Many of these have already crumbled.

A UNION CHURCH

The three men named in the deed are "called, Elders of the Presbyterian and Lutherian German Churches."* These pioneers were of German ancestry. They began coming into this section of North Carolina about 1745. They came out of their fatherland because of the oppression of war and the intolerance of religion. Many were from the Palatinate. They were of the Reformed and Lutheran faith. Some came here through the

port of Charleston, S. C. Most of them came through the port at Philadephia and from Pennsylvania. William Penn had offered land to these poor Germans who were seeking a home in the new world where they would have religious and civil liberty. When they came into North Carolina they took up land along the rivers and creeks. They built their homes in the lowlands where springs of flowing water were found.

Many of the churches in North Carolina are older than Emanuel. Brick Church in Guilford, Pilgrim in Davidson, Grace in Rowan, St. Paul's in Catawba, and Daniel's in Lincoln, and others were well established congregations long before Bower's Meeting House was hewn out of the trees of the forest. These German pioneers brought with them their Bibles, Catechisms, and hymn books. They came to build homes and a new civilization in the western world. If they were slow in building churches, we should remember that they were poor.




THE HOUSE OF WORSHIP

"The second house of worship was commenced in the year 1813 and finished in 1814." *This was a frame building, two stories in height. There was a gallery on three sides. On the north was the high pulpit in which the minister stood up to preach the Word. In those days churches were built for the preaching of the Gospel. There were no Sunday Schools. Pastors often conducted catechetical school for the instruction of members in the faith, particularly the doctrinal system of the church. This style of church was typical of the Union Lutheran and Reformed Churches of that age. No picture of the church was preserved. (This skectch was drawn by C. H. Shuler) Its style is preserved in old St. Paul's in Catawba County, a frame church erected about the same time, and in Grace (Lowerstone) in Rowan County, a stone building erected in the year 1795. On Sunday afternoon, January 12, 1902, this House of Worship was destroyed by fire. There are many still living who experienced the sadness of that afternoon when the old church perished forever from their sight.

"But on the site of the burned church another more handsome was erected the following year, surmounted by a graceful tower in which hangs a bell to summons worshippers to the House of God." *Both Luthern and Reformed joined hands and hearts in the building of the new church. The pastor at that time was the Rev. Clarence Clapp. He was a son of the Rev. Jacob C. Clapp, D. D., whose long ministry was a benediction to the whole church in North Carolina. The church has no record of the cost or of the dedication. It was finished and used for worship before the end of the 1902.





THE REFORMED BUY THE LUTHERAN INTEREST

In the year 1925, after one hundred and eleven years of united worship and work, the Lutheran Church decided to disband. They sold their share in the property to the Reformed for the sum of \$400. The members in the Lutheran Church reserved the right for burial in the church cemetery. At that time the cemetery was free burying ground and the church was opened to all funerals. In the year 1926 the church was enlarged by the building of seven rooms, two of them opening up as "transept

rooms" to the sanctuary. A front portico was build. All the members worked. The new church, enlarged, reroofed and painted outside and inside, was ready for dedication August 29, 1926. More than \$2,600 has been expended. The Rev. J. C. Leonard, D. D., preached the dedication sermon. In February 1938 new hardwood pews, modern in design, were installed in the nave of the church and the two transept rooms at a cost of \$1,000, and a new carpet and other furnishings were added at a cost of \$200. In the summer of 1939 the church was reroofed at a cost of \$400. This church, as it sat on an elevation, was beautiful to behold.

THE FIRST PASTORAL CHARGE

The first pastoral charge in which Emanuel was placed was the Davidson charge, composed of Pilgrim, Beck's, Bethany, Beulah, and Emanuel Pastors of the Davidson charge from 1812-1827, as recorded in the Historic Sketch of the Reformed Church of North Carolina, are as follows: "Revs. G. Boger, J. R. Riley, Wm. Weinel, H. Diffenbach, J. Scholl, J. S. Ebaugh, G. Leidy and J. Ruby."* It is evident that some of these were missionaries sent by the Synod, as the Rev. J. Ross Riley. Rev. Wm. Hauck was pastor from 1828 to 1832. He was elected the president of the first Classis at Brick Church in 1831. Rev. W. C. Bennet was pastor 1833 to 1837 and he became a member of the Classis in 1833 when he was reported as pastor of congregations in South Carolina. He was dismissed in 1837 to Zion's Classis. Rev. David Crooks became pastor in 1838 and served eight years The oldest record of members is a list as recorded in 1845 near the end of his ministry. It is so valuable that the names are given:

From 1846 to 1848 Rev. Jones, an itinerant minister, Rev. David Cooks and Rev. F. Plassman served the church. Rev. Thornton Butler was pastor two times, 1848-51 and 1856-57 There is a roll of members of 1849 which listed only 28 names, six less than in 1845. But there are six additional

names of "Colored Members" enrolled. Four of these are by the name Grimes and two named Myers. It was the time of Slavery. These members of the church who owned slaves offered them the means of grace of their own church, admitted them to their membership and communion, and taught them Christian faith. The Rev. William Sorber was pastor 1853 to 1856. The membership roll of 1853 contains 53 names, a great increase.

THE LOWER DAVIDSON CHARGE

The Rev. P. Allison Long became pastor in 1858 and served until 1866 or later. It was during his pastorate that the Davidson charge was divided. He kept the Lower Davidson as his field of labor. We have the first record of baptism of children during his ministry. October 12, 1861, Mary Catharine and Martha Jane, children of Wilson L. and Susan B. Myers, were baptized. On August 10, 1862, Bethlehem Black, son of George Black, was baptized. The roll of members in 1856 listed 108 members and three "colored members." The large increase in membership tells us of the spiritual prosperity in the church. The war took some of the members. Spiritual death came in the wake of the war, the "political matters," and senility, and lowered morals—all these brought Emanuel very low for almost one full generation.

THE CONSISTORY

The first minutes of the Consistory date from 1866. The members were: John A. Long, David Myers, W. L. Myers, Andrew Sechrist, Solomon Lore, and A. L. Grimes. The Consistory records deal with the spirtual state of the members. Some were considered as "unworthy of membership in the church," others were charged with "drunkenness." It is significant that "accused pleaded quilty, manifested great penitence, and promised to amend." Some were suspended for a season and then restored to full membership.

The records show the Lord's Supper was administered. "The Consistory met after preaching." It was the "Preparatory Service" on Saturday August 11, 1866. "It was suggested that we inquire whether there were any belonging to the Church not worthy to come around the Table for the reception of the Lord's Supper." The records state that some were "cited to attend trial" and others were "restored to full membership." "They promised to live better lives." Also some were charged as unworthy of belonging to the church because they did not attend and had their membership rescinded. The records also tell us of the revivals or "protracted meetings" that have proven very fruitful in the Emanuel Church. These annual meetings are a part of the life and ministry of the church to this day. In those dark days following the war, the church, the pastor, and the consistory were mindful of the spiritual needs of the people. How long Emanuel was without a minister following 1866 is not known. The records state that Rev. Jesse W. Cecil was pastor for about a year, probably

1871-72. He served again a second time 1892-93. Rev. Michael L. Hedrick was pastor from 1873 to 1887. The Rev. Allen R. Holshouser was pastor 1889 to 1892. During his pastorate Emanuel grew to 141 members. During this time Emanuel aided in building a parsonage for the Lower Davidson Charge on a parcel of ground near Hedrick's Grove. Rev. William H. McNairy became pastor in 1894 and served two years.

THE THOMASVILLE CHARGE

In 1896 there was another division of charges. Calvary had been organized in 1891 and Heidelberg in Thomasville in 1893. Emanuel was placed with Calvary and Heidelberg constituting the Thomasville Charge Rev. Clarence Clapp was called to the pastorate. Other pastors who served the Thomasville Charge were: Rev. Walter W. Rowe, 1902-1903; Rev. Jacob N. Faust, 1903-1904; Rev. Frederick Cromer, 1904-1905; Rev. Lucian W. Showers, 1905-1906; Rev. Irvin S. Ditzler, 1907-1908; and Rev. Clarence Woods, 1910-1913. Emanuel helped build the parsonage in Thomasville.

THE EMANUEL CHARGE

Emanuel, Calvary and Zion were constituted a charge at the Classis in May 1913. This charge erected a new parsonage in Thomasville on Lexington Avenue in the year 1916. Pastors who served the Emanuel Charge were Rev. John B. Swartz, 1914-1915; Rev. Dugan C. Cox, 1916-1925; Rev. Sterling W. Whitener stated supply, 1927-1928; Rev. Sidney C. Safrit, 1929-1933; Rev. Kendall B. Shoffner, 1934-1938, and Rev. William C. Lyerly, 1938-1946.

In 1934 the Reformed Church and the Evangelical Church united to form the Evangelical and Reformed Church of the United States.

THT 125th ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

On the fifth Sunday in October 1939, Emanuel celebrated the 125th Anniversary of the first church. It was a great day. Rev. James D. Andrew, D. D. spoke on the subject of temperance at the Sunday Church School hour. Rev. Jacob C. Leonard, D. D., the Stated Clerk of the Classis for almost a half century, delivered the Anniversary Address. The Holy Communion was celebrated. A fellowship dinner followed the morning service. In the afternoon brief addresses were delivered by Revs. J. A. Palmer, B. J. Peller, C. C. Wagoner, J. C. Leonard and Joshua L. Bowers. Rev. Walter W. Rowe, D. D. could not attend because of illness.

During the pastorate of Rev. W. C. Lyerly action was begun to constitute Emanuel a separate charge. On May 2, 1946 this became effective, with other churches, Calvary and Zion, forming the Calvary-Zion Charge. On May 15, 1946 Rev. Lyerly resigned as pastor and Rev. J. A. Palmer was named supply.

In search of a new pastor the consistory met with Rev. J. L. Levens, President of Southern Synod, and requested him to contact Captain Lawrence A. Leonard, who at that time was serving as Chaplain in the United States Army in Korea, to ask him if he would consider a call to Emanuel Church.

Realizing that we would have to build a parsonage, plans were made accordingly. Charles F. Myers deeded the church land on Holly Grove

Road for a parsonage. In September 1946 a committee of men and women was named to decide on a definite plan for a house to be build on this lot.

On Novemeber 15, 1946 Rev. L. A. Leonard accepted the call to be pastor of Emanuel. Installation services were conducted on December 8, with Rev. A. Odell Leonard and Rev. J. A. Palmer officiating.

Some had doubted the ability of Emanuel to support a pastor and go forward with the building program already visualized. But with the full time service of Rev. Leonard many changes were made. A Workers' Conference was organized and met regularly to plan the work of the Sunday Church School. The Children's Department was made a separate unit with its own superintendent.

In the summer of 1947 the building of the parsonage started. Months earlier the men of the church, along with the pastor, had worked to cut trees, stack lumber, and prepare the lot for building. Many hours of labor were donated by the men of the church under the leadership of the pastor, making it possible for Rev. Leonard and his wife, Mary and son Daniel, to move into the beautiful colonial eight room brick structure home on December 26, 1947. The parsonage was free of debt.

Again the new Emanuel was before the people. This issue was debated pro and con until March 14, 1949, when the consistory set the date of March 20 as the day for appointing committees to study and present the essential needs of the church. Every member of the church was given the opportunity to express his opinion. It was the unanimous opinion that a new Christian Education Building and a larger sanctuary were needed, and that these building projects be separate. First the Christian Education Building, which was so desperately needed, was built then the sanctuary was completed.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION BUILDING AND OLD CHURCH

Rev. L. A. Leonard and Rev. A. Odell Leonard spent many hours studying plans and considering the needs as presented by the various committees and individuals. On February 21, 1950 the Consistory met and approved a sketched floor plan; and on November 5 the ground breaking service was held. The contract was let to Craver and Essex of Lexington, N. C. On the last Sunday in September 1951 the children went into



the new Christian Education Building, and the adults followed on the following Sunday. For the first time in the history of Emanuel the Sunday Church School was completely departmentalized. On Sunday, November 18, 1951, the beautiful Christian Education Building was dedicated, free of debt.

Early in 1952 plans of the new sanctuary and additional classrooms were drawn and presented to the consistory. They were approved and the contract for building was let to Craver and Essex of Lexington, N. C. On April 20, 1952 ground breaking service were held and the final phase of the building program was under way. On May 31, 1953 at 3:30 P. M. the new sanctuary and Sunday Church School rooms were dedicated to God with the Rev. A. Odell Leonard, D. D., Rev. Henry J. Meier, Rev. A. W. Hedrick, and the pastor Rev. Lawrence A. Leonard officiated in the service.

These six years and six months (November 15, 1946 to May 31, 1953) mark the growth not only in the material but also in the spiritual welfare



of Emanuel. Many accepted Jesus for the first time and many others rededicated their lives to Him. Many learned the joy of giving through the example set by the pastor, whose motto was: "Give until it hurts and then keep on giving until it quits hurting." Rev. Leonard preached, talked, and lived stewardship and direct giving from the very beginning of his ministry. The progress through these years reflects the faith shown and still challenges men to even greater things for the Master. Men, women, and the youth of Emanuel served on committees and boards of the Synod.

With a feeling of accomplishment at Emanuel and having received call to mission work at Asheboro, Rev. L. A. Leonard resigned effective March 31, 1954. Again Dr. A. Odell Leonard became the spiritual leader of the people.



During the pastorate of Rev. C. Keith Sink, 1955-1959 the stewordship of the people was made manifest in their consecrated effort to remove indebtednes from the church. On May 17, 1959 the service of mortgage burning brought great joy to the congregation and hosts of friends

Additional lands were donated to church property by Messrs A. Lee Black, W. L. Myers, Everette Kepley and Miss

Leola Black, Extensive improvements were made to the cemetery and lawns. Playgrounds were prepared and equipment was installed.

The year 1957 was most historic for the Evangelical and Reformed Church. This was the year that the United Church of Christ became a reality when the Evangelical and Reformed Churches merged with the Congregational Christian Churches.

The Rev. Mr. Sink resigned October 24, 1959 to return to the U. S. Army as a Chaplain and the Rev. Richard
A. Cheek became the supply pastor.

On June 15, 1960 the Rev. J. Wayne Fouts accepted the call to become pastor. With the church physical plant odequate and no indebtedness, the interior of the sanctuary was made more worshipful with the panelling of the chancel and the addition of a reredos. Evangelism and visitation programs were prayerfully planned and carried out.

Members of Emanuel were a part of the continuing mission of the United Church of Christ as it became organized in the nation.



AUXILIARY ORGANIZATIONS

The women of the church were first organized as The Ladies Home Workers in 1923. In 1939 they became charter members of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Evangelical and Reformed Church. Then in 1942 they became a part of the Women's Guild of the church at large, and are presently affiliated with the Council for Lay Life and Work.

The men of the church were first organized as The Men's League in 1930. In 1946 they became charter members of the Church men's Brother-hood of the church at large and are presently affiliated with the Churchman's Fellowship and The Council for Lay Life and Work.

The youth of the church were first organized as The Christian Endeavor in 1930. Then in 1947 the organizational name became Youth Fellowship. They are presently affiliated with the youth Fellowship of the church at large.

Boy Scout Troop No. 114 was organized in 1957 and Girl Scout Troop No. 3 was organized in 1960. Cub Scouts were organized in 1963. These organizations are presently active in their fields of endeavor.

The Young Adults were organized in 1947 and this was a very active organization until 1953.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

The oldest record that can be located is dated 1871. There was probably some teaching earlier.

The first entry reads as follows:

A few years later another entry:

The Sabbath School was organized at Emanuel on April 8, 1883 with the following officers:

A. E. Sechrest, Superintendent T. W. S. Grimes, Assistant Superintendent J. W. Bowers, Secretary

The School was small in these days. The Lowest attendance recorded was 11 on April 15, 1883. However, in 1886 a record of 51 was listed.

There was no mention of offerings, although they had a treasurer.

The literature used was the Bible and The Blue Back Speller.

The present enrollment is 273, with an average attendance of more than 200.

ACKNOWLDGMENTS

The sources from which this record is given comes largely from A CENTURY AND A QUARTER IN A RURAL CHURCH by the Rev. W. C. Lyerly in 1940, which reads in part as follows: "The sources from which this record is made are very largely the record books of the church . . . many of them being incomplete . . . The minutes of Classis, 1889-1939, have been consulted. Quotations marked (*) are from THE CENTENNIAL HISTORY OF DAVIDSON COUNTY by the Rev. J. C. Leonard, D. D. and are used by permission. Some of the older members of the church gave valuable information."

The record from 1940-1963 was submitted by Mr. Fred Bodenheimer and Mr. R. M. Grimes.

MINISTERS FROM EMANUEL CONGREGATION

Four sons of the congregation have accepted the call to the ministry of the church.



The Rev. Harvey Wilson Black, D. D., Greensburg, Pa., was born and reared In Thomasville Township, Davidson County, N. C. He is the youngest son of the late Joshua F. and Tryphena L. Black. He was baptized and confirmed a member of Emanuel Reformed Church where his parents were members.

He received his public education in the Byerly School and the Thomasville High School. He attended Catawba College, from which institution he graduated with the A. B. degree in 1922. Three years later, he graduated from the Central Theological Seminary of the Reformed Church in the U. S., now Eden Theological Seminary, Webster Groves, Mo., with the B. D. degree. During the next two years, he took graduate work in the field of Christian education in

Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill., from which institution he received the M. A. degree with additional credits in June, 1927. Catawba College conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Divinity in 1954.

Following his gradaution from the seminary, he was licensed to the gospel ministry by the Classis of North Carolina on July 20, 1925. At the conclusion of his graduate work in Northwestern University, he became Director of Religious Education in Second Reformed Church, Greensburg, Pa. He transferred his membership to the Classis of Westmoreland and the Pittsburg Synod in Pennsylvania on May 16, 1927. He was ordained to the Christian ministry by the Classis of Westmoreland in St. Paul's Reformed Church, Derry, Pa., on March 18, 1928, where he was pastor for three years. Following his pastorate in Derry, he was pastor of Christ Evangelical and Reformed Church, Latrobe, Pa., for 21 years and 8 months. He was elected full-time president of the Pittsburgh Synod on September 8, 1952, and took office on November 1. After 10 years, he resigned his office to retire from the presidency of the synod, effective January 1, 1963, when the Pittsburgh Synod was constituted a part of the Penn West Conference of the United Church of Christ.

During his active career as a minister, Dr. Black served the Church at large in various capacities. He was one time president of the Classis of Westmoreland. He served on numerous committees and boards of the Classis and of the Pittsburgh Synod. He was for 12 years a member of the Board of Directors of the St. Paul Homes for Children and the Aged, Greenville, Pa. He was for many years chairman of the Committee on Christian Education and a member of the Committee on Church and Ministry of the Synod. He served on the Board of Directors of the Dunkirk Conference Grounds, Dunkirk, N. Y., for more than 10 years. He represented the Synod on the Board of Directors of the Pennsylvania Council of Churches during his tenure in office as president. He edited and managed the publication of the PITTSBURGH SYNOD NEWS while president of the Synod.

Dr. Black has been a frequent delegate to the General Synod of the Church: one time to the General Synod of the Reformed Church in the U. S.; six times to the General Synod of the Evangelical and Reformed Church; and three times to the General Synod of the United Church of Christ. He had an active part in the reorganization of the Synod, Conference, and Associations of the United Church of Christ in Pennsylvania.

Following his gradaution from the seminary, Dr. Black was married to Glenna Dale Lentz, Gold Hill, N. C. Like her husband, she was reared in the Reformed Church tradition. She is also a gradaute of Catawba College where she taught for a time in the Catawba Academy and served as secretary to the college president. They have one daughter living, Martha Lentz, who is married to the Rev. Charles W. Sigler, pastor of St. Paul's United Church of Christ, Johnstown, Pa. Another daughter, Sara Elizabeth, died at the age of 17 years in 1949.



The Rev. Van Dolan Grimes, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. McCoy Grimes of Thomasville, N. C., was born May 19, 1925.

Mr. Grimes graduated from Pilot High School in 1942. He served in the U. S. Navy from October 1943 to May 1946. Upon his discharge from the Navy he resumed his work as an electrician with the Thomasville Chair Company. He entered Catawba College in the fall of 1954, at which time he was received under the care of the Southern Synod.

Mr. Grimes entered the Theological Seminary, Lancaster, Pennsylvania, in the fall of 1955. During his Junior year he did field work in the St. Mark's Evangelical and Reformed Church, Reading, Pennsylvania, with a membership of

1900. He served as student assistant at Grand View Heights Community Methodist Church in Lancaster, Pennsylvania during his middler year, and was Director of Youth Work in the same church during his Senior year.

On April 30, 1958 he was licensed to the Christian Ministry, pending his graduation, by Southern Synod. 


