No DEDUCTIONS will be made, except in cases of protracted sickness, or of students entering after the close of the third week of the term, who will be charged from the time of entrance.

LOCATION.

The Illinois Wesleyan University is located in the city of Bloomington, McLean county, Illinois, in a healthful and delightful region of country, near the geographical center of the state, and at the intersection of the two great leading thoroughfares of travel; viz., the “Illinois Central” and the “St. Louis, Alton & Chicago” railroads: It is thus rendered easy

of access at all times from all parts of our extended commonwealth. Our inland position, the enterprise and intelligence of our community, the high tone of Christian morals among us, and the remarkable healthfulness of our city and its vicinity, offer peculiar inducements to such as seek the advantages of such an Institution.

PATRONAGE.

The University is under the joint patronage of the Illinois and Central Illinois Annual Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, which annually appoint Visiting Committees to supervise the examinations and general management of the Institution, in conjunction with the Board of Trustees, thus offering to the public strong guaranties of the high moral tone of the instruction imparted within its halls.

LIBRARY.

The nucleus of a valuable Miscellaneous and Scientific Library has been secured, which is open to the use of Students, on the payment of a small annual fee.

APPARATUS.

Large and very valuable additions (costing some \$800), have recently been made to the Chemical, Philosophical and Astronomical Apparatus, including a fine Achromatic Telescope, five inch aperture, and six and a half feet focal distance; and arrangements are now being made looking to the fitting up of a fine Chemical Laboratory.

MUSEUM.

The Museum of Natural History, has been increased very largely since our last annual announcement. It now comprises over Four Thousand specimens in Geology and Paleontology; One Thousand One Hundred salt water, and One Thousand fresh water and land Shells. A Botanical collection representing nearly the entire Flora of the state; Two Hundred specimens in Ornithology; besides various reptiles and animals; a very extensive and valuable Entomological

collection, and a fine collection of minerals from the Smithsonian Institute at Washington. It now affords unusual facilities for the practical study of Natural History in its various Departments. Our Classes also have unrestricted access to the large and rapidly increasing Museum of the Illinois State Natural History Society, located in this city.

RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

While all sectarianism will be rigidly excluded, the faculty will, on all fitting occasions, strive to inculcate the principles not only of a pure morality, but of an evangelical Christianity. Students will be required to attend some place of public worship on the Sabbath, such as their own preferences may dictate or their parents or guardians designate; they will also be required to attend the regular daily worship in the College Chapel.

LECTURES.

Regular Courses of Lectures will be delivered in connection with the recitations in the departments of Natural Science and of Mental and Moral Philosophy.

QUARTERLY REPORTS.

Daily Records of the proficiency and deportment of every Student will be kept, and will, if desired, be furnished quarterly to his parents or guardians.

EXAMINATIONS.



There will be a regular Public Examination of all the Classes at the close of each Term; and Students will be advanced only after such examination.

TEXT BOOKS.

All the Text Books used in the University can be obtained at reasonable rates in this city.

COURSES OF STUDY.

These have been arranged with much care, after a close comparison of the standards of the best institutions of our country, and are designed to meet the varied wants of the youth of our rapidly developing commonwealth.

 The curriculum in the Scientific department has been re-arranged with special reference to the wants of the large class of young men whose time, means, or other circumstances do not admit of their pursuing the regular Collegiate Course.  It is designed to discipline the mind and prepare young men for teaching and for the ordinary pursuits of life. It embraces all the studies of the Classical Course, except the ancient languages, together with many special studies deemed desirable. It can be completed in four years, and will entitle the successful candidate to the degree of Bachelor of Science.

The Classical Course, it* will be observed, is full and complete, comparing favorably with that of our older Universities. It includes a course of four years, in addition to the usual Preparatory studies, and entitles the Student to the degree of Bachelor of Arts. We cannot too earnestly recommend Students, when it is practicable, to avail themselves of its advantages.

VOCAL MUSIC.

At the earnest and repeated solicitations of many of the Friends and Students of the University, a Department of Vocal Music has been organized, and will, henceforth, constitute a regular Department of the University. Special inducements are held out to those who may desire a thorough course of instruction in vocal and instrumental music by the Northwestern Academy of Music located here.

COMPOSITION AND DECLAMATION.

All the Students will be exercised regularly in these important branches of a liberal education. And the Junior and Senior Classes will be required to engage also in forensic disputations.

PREPARATORY DEPARTMENT.

This will be under the immediate supervision of the Faculty, assisted by such Tutors as may be necessary to accomplish the work. It is preferred that Students preparing for the Collegiate Classes should make their preparation here rather than prepare elsewhere for an advanced standing. If we must be responsible for the final credentials of the scholar, we would prefer laying the foundation for his scholarship.

LITERARY SOCIETIES.

The Belles Lettres Literary Society has completed and furnished in handsome style its fine hall, and is now successfully prosecuting its labors in its own appropriate sphere of action.

A second association—the Munsellian—has also been organized by a number of spirited young men, and has entered the field of Literary effort with much promise for the future. We cannot speak too strongly of the advantages of such Societies as an integral element of a thorough education.

BOARDING.

Good Boarding can be obtained in respectable private families in the city, at prices ranging from \$3.00 to \$3.50 per week; with fuel, lights, and rooms furnished.

SELF BOARDING,

A new building has been erected on the College Campus for the special accommodation of Students who may desire to board themselves. Many young men by availing themselves of its advantages, have been able to reduce their expenses during the current year to less than \$1.25 per week.

COLLEGE EDIFICE.

This is new, spacious and convenient, beautifully located in a pleasant grove in the northern part of the city. It affords the necessary accommodations in the way of Chapel, Recitation Rooms, &c., for two hundred and fifty students.

GOVERNMENT.

The laws of this Institution are few and simple, but are sufficient to secure quiet and order. The object of instruction will be to form correct mental and moral habits, and to cultivate a taste for intellectual pursuits.

Punctuality in attendance at all College exercises, and careful observance of study hours, and gentlemanly deportment, are required of every Student. Visits of pleasure, gathering in groups, taking amusements on the Sabbath-day—absences from rooms at improper hours, or unpermitted absence from town—writing upon or defacing the furniture or rooms of the College or other public buildings—wearing fire-arms or other weapons—drinking intoxicating liquors, or keeping them, except by the prescription of a physician—contracting debts without the knowledge or consent of parents or guardians—using obscene or profane language—refusing compliance with any requirement of the Faculty—and all other breaches of morals or good order, or violations of gentlemanly demeanor, are strictly and totally forbidden.

No Student who occasions trouble in any of these particulars shall be suffered to remain to exert on others his corrupting influence.
