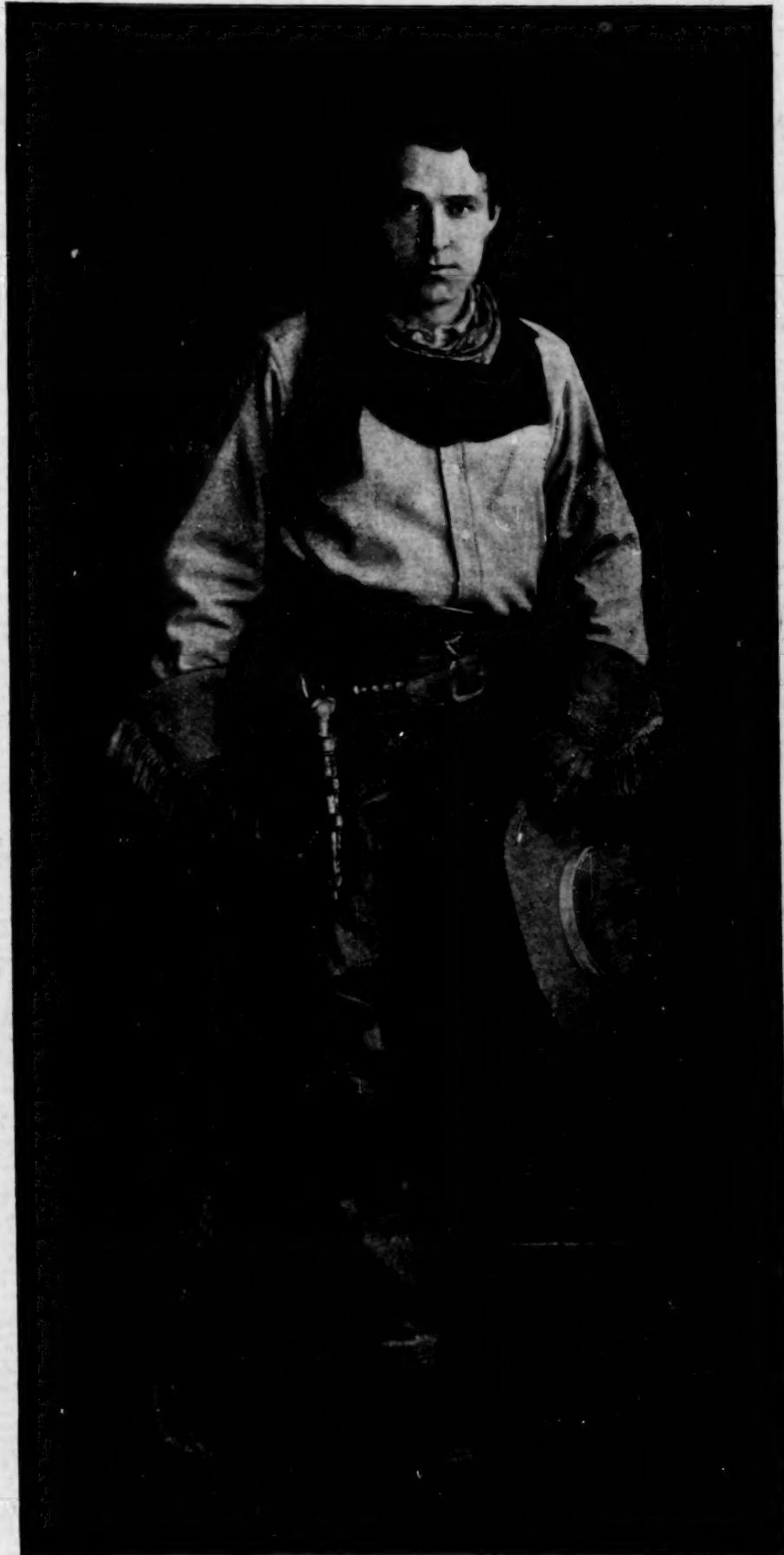

PLAYHOUSES.

Low Field's new theatre in New York will open after the national election.

The opera house at Charleston, W. Va., will be improved before next season.

Work has begun on the new opera house at Elvira, Ohio.

C. C. Foor has leased the Grand Theatre at Anderson, Ind.

The Grand Opera House at Toledo, Ohio, has been leased for two years by Detroit capitalists. It will be run as a vaudeville house.

The Shuberts decided to abandon their season of summer drama at the Hyperion Theatre, New Haven, Conn., after two weeks' trial.

Ex-Mayor William D. Brown has leased the opera house at Onawa, Iowa, and took possession June 1.

To open or not to open is the question that is much discussed in Chicago with regard to the Iroquois Theatre.

The Danville, Ky. Opera House closed its season June 10, after a presentation of 63 of the best shows on the road.

The new opera house at Minden City, Mich., has been provided with a new lighting apparatus.

The management of the Iroquois Theatre won its fight against the city and a building permit for the remodeling of the house has been issued.

The famous Madison Square Theatre in New York, is to be renovated and opened for next season. No manager has as yet secured the house.

The opera house at Charlestown, Mo., has been converted into a commercial building and a new house will be erected at that place before next season.

Work on the New Girard Avenue Theatre, Philadelphia, is progressing rapidly and the chances are that the house will be open early in September.

The Manhattan Theatre at New York City will be improved this summer and it is reported that this house will be occupied by Mrs. Fiske all next season.

The New Bijou Theatre at Detroit, Mich., opened its doors to the public June 1, presenting light, continuous vaudeville. The house is said to be neat, clean and attractive.

The Jefferson Theatre Company, of Birmingham, Ala., was recently incorporated with a capital stock of \$5,000. J. E. Smith, Jr., W. J. Smith and Hugh Norvan were the incorporators.

The site has been cleared for the erection of the new opera house at Orange, Tex., and work on the building will commence immediately. Manager Dickensheets, of the Orange Theatre Company, is now booking attractions.

There is every indication that the new opera house project in Stillwater, Minn., will be a go, the committee having in charge the sale of stock reporting that nearly \$20,000 worth of it has been taken by residents of the city.

The theatre at Lynchburg, Va., was converted into a business block last fall and that city is now without a theatre. It is understood that a company has been organized to build a new house.

James J. Grace, in behalf of the Columbia Theatre Company, of Boston, Mass., recently instituted suit against the elevated railroad company for \$500,000, claiming that the defendant's trains made the playhouse a failure. A judgment for \$61,000.50 was obtained.

Richard G. Holliman, president of the Eden Musee Company in New York City, sailed for Europe last week on his annual vacation.

The Majestic Theatre in New York is closed for the first time since it opened over a year and a half ago.

The new fire proof theatre being erected at Jefferson City, Mo., will be opened in November. It is a modern, up-to-date theatre and will be managed by Will J. Edwards who is well known to the profession.

The equipment of the Masonic Theatre to be erected at Tipton, Ind., this season will include a theatre constructed on latter-day principles and will cost \$50,000. The manager of the new house has not been selected.

The St. Nicholas Skating Rink in West Sixty-sixth Street, New York City, will be converted into a theatre for Hartig and Seaman. About

\$30,000 worth of improvements will be put on the building.

The executive staff of the new Empire Theatre at Minneapolis, Minn., consists of Henry Leitner, prop. and mgr.; Merrill de Sota, stage director; Will H. Gross, stage manager; H. Leitner, musical director and Daryl McGloam, stage carpenter.

The roster of the Park Theatre at Canton, Ohio, which opened June 5, is as follows: F. K. Albaugh, manager; Barney Rosenthal, treasurer and personal representative; Sam Young, press agent and Chas. Hardwick, stage manager.

Work in the remodeling of Capital Theatre at Frankfort, Ky., has been commenced and the seating capacity will be increased to 1,250, the stage enlarged, four new boxes put in and new upholstered chairs will replace the old ones in the parquet and dress circle. The seating capacity of the parquet and dress circle is 700.

Manager Wm. T. Roehl announces that before next season opens he will renovate and refresco the Grand Opera House at Dubuque, Iowa. A new asbestos drop, new dressing rooms, carpets, etc., will be some of the many improvements. Mr. Roehl will personally conduct the house again next season. This house closed June 11.

The opera house at Tekamah, Neb., was wrecked by a tornado, June 2. At the time the storm struck the building, the students of the high school were decorating the interior for the commencement exercises and were placing the motto, "Lanched, but Whittier Bound." Several students were injured in the wreck.

The tenants of the old Winter Circus Building at Broad and Cherry Streets, Philadelphia, have been given notice to move and work will be started on the demolition of the building at once, and as soon as this is finished work will be started on the new Lyric Theatre which is to be erected and managed by Charles B. Dillingham. Contracts for the erection of the theatre will be let in a few days.

The Opera House, Shea's Empire, Lyceum Theatre, Cleveland Theatre and Star Theatre, of Cleveland, Ohio, have all closed for this season to open up again after considerable changes next August. The Garden Theatre on Wilson Ave., opened up last week for a summer run, and the New Garden Theatre on Euclid Ave.

opened this week for the summer, playing vaudeville.

Fire in the Electric Theatre at Prairie du Chien, Wis., June 8, destroyed 10,000 feet of celluloid films in a moving-picture machine and seriously burned the manager, John Miller, one of the family of acrobatic fame. Rollo Montgomery, who worked the machine, was overcome by the heat.

Gilmore and Yale is the new firm that will run the Auditorium Theatre, Philadelphia. The house will not be a combination house, but will be devoted to productions of a novel kind.

Mr. Wise is now acting as manager of Yale's Scenic Studio, Philadelphia. Mr. Wise has been business manager for The Devil's Auction for a number of years.

George Middleton, president of the Bijou-Academy Company, of Chicago, Ill., has purchased the Academy of Music property, 83 South Halsted Street, and will spend \$50,000 in re-fitting the building and theatre. It will be reopened about September 1. The theatre has been closed since the Iroquois fire. The consideration paid was \$25,075.

Cole and Johnson, the writers of several successes, have signed contracts with Klaw and Erlinger, whereby the latter firm will produce as the productions of these song writers.

Frank Lounie, a comedian of wide repute, is now playing the part of General Booter in Woodland at Boston, Mass. Woodland will be played through the time scheduled for it in Boston, and will not be seen again on the road until the regular opening of the fall and winter season.

Mr. Lee Shubert, of Shubert Bros., sailed last week for London. He will stay two months during which time he will witness several new productions with a view of determining the advisability of their presentation on this side.

The Mardi Gras and Spring Festival to be held at Seattle, Wash., promises much in the way of results. The city has subscribed several thousand dollars toward the event and Arnold and Hutchin promises to do their portion of the work in furnishing up-to-date attractions.

Notes from the Mundy Carnival Company: Creation is still making top money. The festival at Chattanooga, Tenn., was a great success in every way. We did over \$16,000 worth of business and gave entire satisfaction. Joe J. Conly attended the funeral of Col. F. W. Gaskill at Alliance, Ohio. We play Sioux City, Iowa, on the streets, in August. Next week we play Aurora, Ill. It will be the first carnival there in three years.

Notes from the Parker Amusement Company: To say that this stupendous amusement undertaking stands without a peer in size, strength, cleanliness, magnitude, and beauty, would be but voicing the statements of every person to whom its features have been presented this season. It is true that the stringent rules laid down by the Parker management, regarding the conduct of its employees, are perhaps entirely out-of-common around shows, but considering the impression which ladies and gentlemen always leave with the public the results so far have been entirely satisfactory, and only serve to place the aggregation on a solid footing with the better class of amusement-seekers everywhere.

At Wichita, Kansas, where we returned after a very successful six days last year, large crowds were always in order throughout the entire week, and the attractions all did a phenomenal business. Independence, Kansas, opened with a rush and patrons acquired the habit of attending clean shows very early in the week, and soon forgot that a dancing girl or disgusting form of entertainment was necessary to a midway. Mr. Parker carries an expert moving picture photographer, whose duties are to take important local scenes, develop the films in a car fitted up for the purpose, and then have them reproduced in the Electric theatre. On Saturday night of each week these films are cut into small pieces and given to patrons as souvenirs. On the morning of May 27, Mr. Parker notified his staff and a few of their friends that preparations were made to "shoot" an oil and gas well in the center of the gas and oil belt and that a moving picture would be made of each scene. It is needless to add that everyone responded to the invitation, as we were all anxious to see what Mr. Parker's wells were going to yield, and as he had invested quite a sum in bringing his five acres of oil and gas land to a point

where financial results might be obtained, everyone was eager to see him win. A drive of six miles was made in carriages and we reached the oil fields at ten o'clock. The Kansas Torpedo Co. was already on the scene with 50 quarts of nitro glycerine, and when our motion picture camera was placed in readiness a large tube containing the explosive was dropped into the well, the time fuse attached to a dynamite torpedo was lighted and also lowered down to the nitro glycerine. We were all crowded around the well, and immediately in front of the camera, so interested in the work of the torpedo men that we never thought of keeping our distance and did not realize our dangerous position until the ground beneath our feet began to tremble from the force of the explosion, 1800 feet below us, and then we took to our heels. Mr. Parker dropped his coat which he carried over his arm, Harry Edwards fell headlong over Mr. Kennedy, the manager, and everyone became excited in his eagerness to elude the falling oil, which spouted high in the air and sprinkled everything for 100 feet around. The sight was one well worth seeing, and there is no doubt but that the film exposed, when reproduced will prove quite a novelty in moving pictures. A trip was then made to a Government test, a 20,000,000 ft. gas well and another exposure made with the camera; showing the force of the gas as it hurled heavy pieces of iron in the air, which placed over the opening of the pipe, which measured 20 square inches, with the force of the gas being 470 pounds pressure to the square inch, so one can imagine what a producer this well will be. The Santa Fe Ry. Co.'s, fast train, the California Limited, was also photographed.

The Michigan Billposters met in annual convention at Saginaw on Tuesday, June 7, in the Academy of Music, a very cozy theatre of which John Davidson is manager as well as being the owner and operator of the billposting plant.

Some of the visiting members after an early breakfast at the Bancroft House took a ride on the Interurban car line to Bay City, about 15 miles North, viewing on the trip immense sugar beet factories and salt works; an inspection of the Bay City Billposting Company's plant was also a feature of the trip.

The convention was called to order at 11:30 a. m., by President Geo. M. Leonard, who announced the business session for two o'clock sharp, then adjourned for lunch. The business of the convention was transacted between two and six p. m., and was one of those harmonious, systematic and sensibly conducted meetings which the Michigan Association members seem to have the record for holding.

The plan of the Bay City Billposting Company was reported by President Leonard as not up to the requirements of the Association either in capacity or condition of the boards; 90 days were given as a limit in which the member must rebuild, repair and increase the capacity of the plant; failure to do so, to result in revocation of membership.

A discussion by the members of their existence so far this season in dealing with circus agents showed that very satisfactory results were developing from the Circus Agreement, and it was the sense of the meeting that the welfare of the Association at large had been carefully looked into by the Board of Directors when the agreement was formed and that it was deserving of the Michigan Association's most hearty approval.

"Resolved, further, that we unanimously endorse President Barney Link and Secretary Chas. Rosencrans, of the Associated Billposters and Distributors and herewith pledge them the votes of our members and delegates and our full support for re-election at the St. Louis Annual National Convention."

NEW JERSEY BILLPOSTERS MEET.

The annual meeting of the New Jersey Billposters and Distributors' Association, was held at the office of President O'Mealla, 104 Greene Street, Jersey City, N. J., Monday, June 6.

The meeting was called to order with President O'Mealla in the chair. The attendance was the largest in the history of the Association. The routine of business was transacted by the order provided in the by-laws. The principal issue of the meeting was Assembly Bill No. 183, introduced by Mr. Colby and fixing a tax of \$5 per square foot on all bill and advertising boards, and the decisions of the Atlantic City and Passaic cases.

The Association has taken in eight new members the past year and one new one this year, making a total membership of seventy-three members in good standing.

One very important topic taken up was a motion by Mr. Snydam, of New Brunswick, that this Association have a committee of three to be known as the Law Committee. Carried.

The election of officers resulted as follows: President, Mr. J. F. O'Mealla, Jersey City, N. J.; vice president, Mr. E. M. Slocumb, Newark, N. J.; secretary and treasurer, Mr. Chas. Rosencrans, Long Branch, N. J.; Law Committee, J. F. O'Mealla, S. Pratt and C. Rosencrans. Delegates to St. Louis Convention: E. M. Slocumb, Newark, and C. Rosencrans, Long Branch.

"Resolved, that this Association heartily approves the re-election of Barney Link as president of the National Association."

"Resolved, that this Association extends a vote of thanks to the Board of Directors which regulated the circus middle at the Chicago session, that makes circus work and commercial work agree."

Those present were S. H. Robinson, S. Pratt, E. M. Slocumb, J. F. O'Mealla, B. W. Snydam, A. H. Sommonds, Harry O'Mealla, Irving Rosencrans, A. Balloon, Chas. O'Mealla, Chas. Ros-

encrans and Mr. J. D. McManus, editor of "The Billposter."

The meeting adjourned to meet Thursday, January 5 at Trenton.

IMPORTANT LEGAL DECISION.

The legal right of a property owner to build or let the privilege of building billboards, bulletin boards or any other safe structure on his property, has been again clearly set forth in a decision in the Appellate Court in Chicago.

The decision is the most positive and important in its bearing on billboard rights ever rendered.

The case was that of the City of Chicago versus The Gunning System, in which the city's billboard ordinance was proved invalid.

The court sustained an injunction of the Circuit Court forbidding the city's arrest of Gunning System employees and all other means of enforcing the objectionable law.

In its appeal to the courts to prevent the city's action against its interest the Gunning System declared it had 400 billboards in Chicago, built on vacant property, giving it a gross annual income of \$120,000. Enforcement of the ordinance, the court declares, would mean the payment to the city of \$210,000 a year for license fees.

The court says: "Lot owners have the right to erect on their property any structures they please, providing they do not imperil others. The Council has no power to remove such safe structures."

"It is generally admitted that America is a long way behind us in the matter of billposting. We have not been to the states to see for ourselves, but we have read and heard sufficient from trustworthy sources to convince us that the opinion is well founded. Buffalo Bill's advertising manager has stated that the British billposter is the best in the world. We do not suppose that many Americans will admit it, but that does not alter the stubborn fact. If we have learned lessons from American Press advertising, and we have undoubtedly, the American may learn something from our high standard of billposting, the fairness of its methods, the soundness of its trade, its splendid organization, the unique stations—unique in size and position—the neatness of our bills, and the way they are shown for public enlightenment. Matters of interest to the organization were introduced and discussed rapidly, but with due consideration. E. Rice, of Rusk, S. L.; Raff, of Abilene and Charles Fielding, of Arlington, were presented for membership and unanimously elected to seats in the convention. At 12:30 the meeting was adjourned to meet again at two p. m.

The afternoon session was devoted mainly to the election of officers for the ensuing year. The election resulted in a manner very complimentary to the officers for last year, for the entire ticket was re-elected for another year. Those receiving honor were President L. C. Revare, of Corsicana; Vice-president J. O. Bell, of Denton; Secretary Will P. Shirley, of Weatherford; Treasurer J. E. Howard, of Galveston.

Austin was selected as the next meeting place. Alf. A. Edwards, of Edwards and Company, of Waco, and J. E. Howard, of Galveston, were selected delegates to the National Convention which meets in St. Louis, Mo., next month. The meeting adjourned sine die at 4:30 p. m. and the delegates were conducted to the beach where an elaborate fish fry was awaiting them.

Making due allowance for varying characteristics, it is a fact that billposting in America has not been brought to the pitch of excellence attained in this country. In America there is little cohesion among billposters, prices vary to a bewildering extent, there is little business development. In the art of poster printing, too, America has made big strides, but her posters are no better than our own, and certainly her methods of putting them up are vastly inferior. This fact will doubtless stick in the throats of those who dislike to see Britain succeed at anything, and who show their dislike for its ways by adopting the ways of other countries. But when it comes to billposting, we can give America a start and a good beating."
