Bill Indefinitely Postponed: Senate indefinitely postponed action on S. 2815, to provide that current withholding tax tables remain in effect until March 15, 1976.

Measures Passed:

Committee funds: Senate took from the calendar and agreed to S. Res. 330, authorizing an additional \$12,000 for Judiciary Subcommittee on Internal Security for inquiries and investigations.

Lincoln statue: Senate took from the calendar and passed H.J. Res. 406, authorizing presentation by the United States to Israel of a statue of Abraham Lincoln to be donated by Leon and Ruth Gildesgame, of Mount Kisco, N.Y.

Federal-aid highways: Senate passed H.R. 8235, to authorize appropriations for the construction of certain highways, after substituting language of S. 2711 (as passed on Dec. 12, 1975) for titles I and II. Senate insisted on its amendments, requested conference with the House and appointed as conferees Senators Bentsen, Randolph, Gravel, Muskie, Burdick, Culver, Stafford, Baker, Buckley, Domenici, and McClure.

The previous passage of S. 2711 was vitiated and the bill was then indefinitely postponed.

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Resolutions Agreed To:

Notification of President: S. Res. 344, appointing Senators Mansfield and Scott of Pennsylvania as a committee to inform the President of the United States that a quorum of the Senate is present and ready to receive any communication that he may wish to submit. The committee subsequently reported that the President proposed to report to the Congress on the State of the Union this evening.

Notification of the House: S. Res. 345, informing the House of Representatives that a quorum of the Senate is assembled and that the Senate is ready to proceed to business.

Hour of Meeting: S. Res. 346, setting 12 o'clock meridian as the hour of daily meeting of the Senate unless otherwise ordered.

Joint Session: Senate agreed to H. Con. Res. 524, providing for a joint session of the House and Senate for the purpose of receiving the President's message on the state of the Union.

Fisheries Protection: Senate resumed consideration of S. 961, to establish on an interim basis a 200-mile fishery management zone off the coasts of the United States, and to establish a national marine fisheries management program, agreeing to technical amendments proposed thereto as follows:

(1) Modified Stevens amendment No. 1158; (2) modified Stevens amendment No. 1159; (3) Stevens amendment No. 1186; and (4) modified Stevens amendment No. 1188.

Agreed to the committee amendment in the nature of a substitute as amended by an amendment that permits the States to be reimbursed only for the actual and added basic costs incurred due to the presence of refugee children in the school district (agreed to by a recorded vote of 235 ayes to 143 noes with I voting "present".)

Subsequently, this passage was vacated and S. 2145, a similar Senate-passed bill, was passed in lieu after being amended to contain the language of the House bill as passed. Agreed to amend the title of the Senate bill.

ing commercially significant amounts of coal;
An amendment that adds language to protect certain national recreation areas from any future coal mining (agreed to by a recorded vote of 370 ayes to 32 noes with 2 voting "present"); and

An amendment that requires notification of the Governor of a State in which strip mining is proposed to be conducted on national forest lands so that he may notify the Secretary of the Interior of his reasons for opposing such a proposal (agreed to by a division vote of 39 ayes to 25 noes).

Rejected:

An amendment that sought to make all information acquired by the Secretary accessible under the provisions of the Freedom of Information Act with the exception of certain proprietary information obtained from a company or an individual;

An amendment that sought to prohibit strip mining on any leased tracts of land until strip mining legislation has been enacted by Congress;

An amendment that sought to reduce the number of public hearings required on a proposed coal lease from 4 to 2, with one hearing to be held on the proposed land use plan and one on the lease itself (rejected by a division vote of 14 ayes to 17 noes. Previously, a point of order against the amendment was overruled);

An amendment that sought to strike the 25,000-acre limitation on logical mining units (rejected by a recorded vote of 97 ayes to 301 noes with 1 voting "present");

An amendment that sought to reduce the minimum royalty from 12.5 to 5 percent;

A substitute to the previous amendment that sought to reduce the minimum royalty to 8 percent;

An amendment that sought to prohibit the issuance of a lease to any person or entity engaged in the production of crude oil or natural gas (rejected by a division vote of 26 ayes to 51 nocs);

An amendment that sought to provide for a reduction in the Federal share of lease revenues from 50 to 37½ percent and to allow the States to spend their revenues from programs of their own choice (rejected by a division vote of 18 ayes to 45 nocs);

An amendment that sought to strike the provisions requiring that proposed regulations governing the issuance or renewal of coal leases be in conformity with Federal antitrust laws; and

An amendment that sought to strike the section providing for a comprehensive exploratory program.

Subsequently, this passage was vacated and S. 391, a similar Senate-passed bill, was passed in lieu after being amended to contain the language of the House bill as passed.

H. Res. 965, the rule under which the bill was considered, was agreed to earlier by a yea-and-nay vote of 386 yeas to 12 nays with 2 voting "present."

Rejected:

An amendment that sought to redefine "new natural gas" to be gas produced from a well the drilling of which began on or after January 1, 1976;

An amendment that sought to make it the purpose of the bill to minimize the detrimental effects of a natural gas shortage on the public interest (rejected by a division vote of 26 ayes to 74 noes);

An amendment that sought to authorize the FPC to establish and modify national ceilings for rates and charges for the sale or transfer of offshore gas produced after January 1, 1976 (rejected by a recorded vote of 182 ayes to 236 noes); and

A preferential motion that the Committee rise and report the bill back to the House with the enacting clause stricken.

Rejected an amendment that sought to redefine "new natural gas" as that new gas produced by independent producers who do not directly or indirectly control, nor are controlled by the transportation component of the industry (rejected by a division vote of 33 ayes to 35 nays).

Animal Welfare Act Amendments: By a yea-and-nay vote of 335 yeas to 34 nays, the House passed H.R. 5808, Animal Welfare Act Amendments of 1976.

On a demand for a separate vote in the House, agreed to the third committee amendment (seeking to include live birds within the definition of animal fighting ventures) by a yea-and-nay vote of 289 yeas to 76 nays. Previously, this amendment was agreed to in the Committee of the Whole by a division vote of 26 ayes to 16 noes.

Rejected a motion to recommit the bill to the Committee on Agriculture.

Took the following action in the Committee of the Whole:

Agreed to:

The first committee amendment as amended;

An amendment to the first committee amendment that clarifies that any prosecution under this act shall be with the consent of the Attorney General;

The second committee amendment;

The third committee amendment (agreed to by a division vote of 26 ayes to 16 noes);

The fourth committee amendment:

An amendment that excludes activities, the primary purpose of which is hunting, from the definition of "animal fighting venture";

An amendment that limits the appropriations for the enforcement of the section prohibiting animal fighting to not to exceed \$400,000;

An amendment that requires Federal agencies to comply with humane standards with respect to laboratory animals;

An amendment that excludes the use of the mail service of the U.S. Postal Service for the purpose of promoting an animal fighting venture outside the limits of the United States; and

An amendment as amended that authorizes the appropriation of \$600,000 for other than the section prohibiting animal fighting.

Rejected:

An amendment to the first committee amendment that sought to strike language authorizing the Secretary of Agriculture to designate additional kinds and classes of animals within the purview of the act (rejected by a division vote of 5 ayes to 16 nocs);

An amendment to the first appropriations authorization amendment that sought to authorize an additional \$400,000 for the sections other than the section prohibiting animal fighting (rejected by a division vote of 12 ayes to 16 nocs); and

An amendment that sought to strike the entire section making animal fighting ventures a federal crime (rejected by a recorded vote of 56 ayes to 312 noes).

Subsequently, this passage was vacated and S. 1941, a similar Senate-passed bill, was passed in lieu after being amended to contain the language of the House bill as passed. Agreed to amend the title of the Senate bill

H. Res. 1024, the rule under which the bill was considered, was agreed to earlier by a yea-and-nay vote of 352 yeas to 5 nays.

An amendment that prohibits the rereading of X-rays and provides that the Secretary shall accept the opinion of the claimant's physician concerning the presence of pneumoconiosis (black lung disease) (agreed to by a division vote of 30 ayes to 10 noes); and

An amendment that inserts a new section to conduct a study of white lung disease by the Committee on Education and Labor.

Rejected:

An amendment that sought to remove the differentiation for entitlement between anthracite and bituminous coal miners after 25 years of service in a coal mine (rejected by a division vote of 22 ayes to 27 noes);

A substitute amendment to the previous amendment that sought to remove the differentiation for entitlement after 30 years of service in a coal mine;

An amendment that sought to eliminate the July 1, 1971, cutoff date for accumulating the number of years required for benefit entitlement;

An amendment that sought to extend the period for determining the applicability of entitlement for benefits to the effective date of the enactment of this act;

An amendment that sought to insert a new subsection to expand the definition of miner to include individuals employed in above-ground mining operations (rejected by a division vote of 9 ayes to 29 noes); An amendment that sought to strike the section providing black lung benefits to widows of miners killed in underground coal mines after 17 years of employment in such mines (rejected by a recorded vote of 141 ayes to 253 noes with 1 voting "present"); and

A substitute amendment to the committee amendment in the nature of a substitute that sought to provide that any miner employed for 25 years or more in underground coal mines, and who died prior to the effective date of the act would be presumed to have died due to pneumoconiosis or that at the time of his death was totally disabled by that disease (rejected by a division vote of 43 ayes to 86 noes).

The Clerk was authorized to correct section and subsection designations and punctuation in the engrossment of the bill.

H. Res. 1056, the rule under which the bill was considered, was agreed to earlier by a yea-and-nay vote of 275 yeas to 118 nays with 1 voting "present."

An amendment that sought to prohibit any military or security supporting assistance to Chile (rejected by a recorded vote of 139 ayes to 266 noes);

An amendment that sought to strike the section providing for trade with Vietnam (rejected by a recorded vote of 185 ayes to 223 noes);

An amendment that sought to prohibit any funds to be used for the purpose of planning or carrying out any assassination or to finance any foreign political activity; An amendment to the previous amendment that sought only to prohibit the use of funds to finance any assassination;

An amendment that sought to strike the section relating the sense of the Congress regarding control of military forces in the Indian Ocean (rejected by a division vote of 24 ayes to 103 noes).

A point of order was sustained against an amendment that sought to add a new section to authorize \$1 million to the safeguard program of the International Atomic

Energy Agency.

An amendment was offered but subsequently withdrawn that sought to allow funds to be authorized for the purpose of assassination and financing of foreign political activity. Previously, a point of order was overruled against the amendment.

Subsequently, S. 2662, a similar Senate-passed bill was passed in lieu after being amended to contain the language of the House bill as passed. Agreed to amend the

title of the Senate bill.

The Clerk was authorized to correct section numbers and punctuation in the engrossment of the Senate bill.

H. Res. 1068, the rule under which the bill was considered, was agreed to earlier by a voice vote.

Rejected an amendment to the previous amendment that would insure that matching funds are distributed on a pro rata basis (rejected by a division vote of 74 ayes to 87 noes). Earlier, a point of order was overruled against the amendment;

An amendment that sought to reduce the food stamp program by \$1 billion (rejected by a recorded vote of 147 ayes to 229 noes);

An amendment that sought to increase outlays by \$700 million and budget authority by \$200 million to remove the cap on medicaid and medicare reimbursements:

An amendment in the nature of a substitute that would reduce revenues by \$10.9 billion, outlays by \$13.7 billion, and budget authority by \$23.5 billion (rejected by a recorded vote of 145 ayes to 230 noes);

Agreed to an amendment to the previous amendment that added \$900 million for veterans benefits and services; and

Rejected an amendment in the nature of a substitute that would balance budget outlays with anticipated revenues and hold the increase in the public debt to \$15.1 billion (rejected by a recorded vote of 105 ayes to 272 noes).

Subsequently, this passage was vacated, and S. Con. Res. 109, a similar Scnate-passed measure was passed in licu after being amended to contain the language of the House-passed measure.

Presidential Message—Sickle Cell Anemia: Received and read a message from the President wherein he transmits the third annual report on the Administration of the National Sickle Cell Anemia Control Act—referred to the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce.

Land and Water Conservation Fund: By a yea-and-nay vote of 392 yeas to 3 nays, the House passed H.R. 12234, to amend the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act of 1965, as amended, and to amend the Act of October 15, 1966, to establish a program for the

preservation of additional historic properties throughout the Nation, as amended.

By a yea-and-nay vote of 248 yeas to 147 nays, on a demand for a separate vote in the House, agreed to an amendment that prohibits the use of Federal funds to enclose or shelter facilities used for outdoor recreation activities. Previously, this amendment was agreed to in the Committee of the Whole by a division vote of 36 ayes to 24 noes.

An amendment that sought to strike language providing for a new 20–75–5 State distribution formula when appropriations available to the States from the Fund exceed \$240 million;

An amendment that sought to lower the threshold for the implementation of the 20-75-5 ratio from \$240 to \$180 million (rejected by a recorded vote of 177 ayes to 221 noes);

An amendment that sought to allow the Secretary of the Interior to waive the 50–50 Federal-State matching grant formula with a 70–30 ratio for areas with heavy outdoor recreational needs; as amended by an amendment that would require the Secretary to consider the State's ability to fund projects before waiving the 50–50 ratio; and

An amendment that sought to require States to identify those areas having the highest unmet needs, and the Secretary to consider those needs in allocating annual appropriations.

An amendment was offered but subsequently withdrawn that sought to add a new section providing free entry to handicapped and reduced entry to elderly persons at recreational areas designated by the Secretary.

Subsequently, this passage was vacated and S. 327, a similar Senate-passed bill was passed in lieu after being amended to contain the language of the House bill as passed. Agreed to amend the title of the Senate bill.

An amendment that provides that the Veterans' Cost-of-Instruction Program be administered by an identifiable unit in the Office of Education;

An amendment that prohibits higher educational institutions from using Federal assistance to undertake studies, projects, or contracts containing discriminatory provisions;

An amendment that provides an extension of authorizations for title X, grants for State planning for community colleges;

An amendment that requires that administrative hearings in connection with alleged violations of the Act be held within the boundaries of the jurisdiction where the alleged violation occurred;

A technical amendment:

An amendment that permits funds to be used for research projects not federally initiated;

An amendment that provides that funds granted for international studies be used to stimulate locally designed programs upon the request of the locality, and not for the development of new curriculums:

An amendment that sought to make it unlawful for any Federal agency to require the imposition of quotas, goals, or any other numerical requirements on the student admission practices of institutions of higher education receiving Federal funds (agreed to by a division vote of 44 ayes to 23 noes). Earlier, a point of order against the amendment was overruled; and a point of order was sustained against a similar amendment:

An amendment that prohibits funds authorized under the Foreign Studies and Language Development section of NDEA to be used for activities involving any aspect of the religion of secular humanism (agreed to by a recorded vote of 222 ayes to 174 noes). Earlier a point of order was sustained against a similar amendment; and

An amendment that exempts from title IX any scholarship or financial assistance awarded to an individual in a pageant, contest, or other competition based on personal appearance, talent, and poise.

Rejected:

An amendment that sought to strike the requirement that the Veterans' Cost-of-Instruction Program be administered by an administrative unit in the Office of the Commissioner of Education (rejected by a division vote of 24 ayes to 24 noes);

An amendment that sought to establish a National Student Financial Assistance Data Bank in the Office of Education:

An amendment that sought to strike out language providing when appropriations for student aid exceed \$2.5 billion, an amount equal to the excess would also have to be appropriated for programs to improve the physical and institutional base of higher education (rejected by a recorded vote of 146 ayes to 255 nocs, after being agreed to earlier by a division vote of 35 ayes to 27 nocs); and

An amendment that sought to exempt fraternities and sororities from title IX jurisdiction (rejected by a recorded vote of 121 ayes to 272 noes).

Subsequently, this passage was vacated and S. 3295, a similar Senate-passed bill, was passed in lieu after being amended to contain the language of the House bill as passed. Agreed to amend the title of the Senate bill.

noes, earlier, a point of order against the amendment was overruled):

An amendment that sought to extend Davis-Bacon prevailing wage provisions to all construction projects using any revenue sharing funds (rejected by a recorded vote of 174 ayes to 218 noes);

An amendment that sought to strike \$15.1 million for the procurement of Belgian made machineguns (rejected by a division vote of 25 ayes to 38 noes);

An amendment that sought to cut \$350 million for long leadtime procurement of a *Nimitz*-class attack carrier (rejected by a recorded vote of 179 ayes to 213 noes):

An amendment that sought to defer until February 1, 1977, \$948 million for the production of 3 B-1 bombers (rejected by a recorded vote of 186 ayes to 207 noes, with 1 voting "present");

An amendment that sought to cut \$297 million for the procurement of Minuteman III missiles and \$20 million for the initiation of MK-12A reentry vehicles (rejected by a division vote of 27 ayes to 54 noes);

An amendment that sought to reduce the overall defense appropriation by 3 percent; and

An amendment to the previous amendment that sought to reduce the overall defense appropriation by 5 percent for new obligational authority and not to exceed 10 percent for non-obligated authority.

A point of order was sustained against a section prohibiting the expenditure of appropriations for certain foods or textile products unless the Secretary approves such expenditure; as legislating in an appropriation bill.

The Clerk was authorized to correct section numbers in the engrossment of the bill.

H. Res. 1292, the rule waiving certain points of order against the bill was agreed to earlier by a yea-and-nay vote of 375 yeas to 2 nays.

Rejected a substitute to the previous amendment that sought to add \$6 million for the National Sea Grant Program (earlier, a point of order was sustained against a similar amendment that sought to earmark \$29,239,000 for the National Sea Grant Program);

Agreed to a series of perfecting amendments; and Agreed to an amendment that adds \$300,000 for the Commission on Security and Cooperation in Europe. Rejected:

An amendment that sought to reduce the United States contribution to the United Nations from its present 25 percent level to the level that would be required under a proportional population formula—5.6 percent;

An amendment that sought to strike out \$38.1 million for two new penal institutions (earlier, a point of order was sustained against a similar amendment);

An amendment that sought to forbid funds to pay persons for furnishing information to the Justice Department relating to violations of Federal law unless such payment is authorized by law;

An amendment that sought to add \$29.5 million for economic development assistance programs (earlier, a point of order was sustained against a similar amendment that sought to earmark \$77 million to areas that suffer severe unemployment); and

An amendment that sought to halt any funds for any pay increase for any justice or judge of the United States or any referee in bankruptcy (rejected by a division vote of 17 ayes to 39 noes).

A point of order was sustained against language that forbids funds for Federal Trade Commission employees who make public any line-of-business data; and

A point of order was overruled against language that forbids Federal loans for college rioters.

An amendment that increases the funding levels for mental health research by \$10 million and for new community mental health centers by \$14 million (agreed to by a recorded vote of 248 ayes to 136 noes);

An amendment that increases the appropriation for multipurpose senior citizen centers by \$10 million (agreed to by a recorded vote of 318 ayes to 67 noes);

An amendment that insures that Federal/State joint leasing does not delay the development of offshore lands if the Governor of the State declines the offer to engage in such joint leasing;

An amendment clarifying the responsibility of the Secretary in the size and location of outer continental

shelf lands leasing;

An amendment that gives the Secretary 18 months after the date of the enactment of this bill to submit a leasing program;

An amendment that gives affected States an earlier opportunity to respond to the proposed leasing program of the Secretary;

An amendment that requires that the Secretary insure that public hearings be conducted in the location of those areas affected; An amendment that deletes language requiring the Secretary to consider allegations of safety violations within 30 days of such allegations and submitting findings within 90 days;

An amendment that adds a new section that excludes suits filed under the provisions of the National Environmental Policy Act from the restrictions in the bill;

An amendment that clarifies that the cancellation of leases due to violations of safety regulations will not en-

title lessees to any compensation;

An amendment that makes the provisions of the section on oil and gas development and production retroactive to frontier areas including those in Southern California;

An amendment that requires the preparation of at least one environmental impact statement in every region where there has been no previous development;

An amendment that adds a new section providing that development and production plans will be available to the Federal Power Commission for coordina-

tion purposes;

An amendment that prohibits the employment of any employee of the Department of the Interior, at or above the grade of GS-16, involved in the regulatory provisions of this bill, by any company governed by this bill for a period of two years after such employee leaves the Department;

Two amendments en bloc that clarify the jurisdiction of coastal zones for the management of oil spills;

An amendment that strikes the title making amendments to the Coastal Zone Management Act of 1972;

An amendment that adds a new section providing for rule and regulation review by the Congress (agreed to by a division vote of 59 ayes to 14 noes); and

An amendment that adds a new section prohibiting discrimination in any activity conducted pursuant to the provisions in the bill.

An amendment that sought to delete language mandating geological exploration in frontier areas prior to their leasing (rejected by a division vote of 17 ayes to 23 noes);

An amendment that sought to provide that the Secretary must consider, in lieu of accepting, recommendations of a Regional Advisory Board or Governor of an affected State, concerning any proposed lease sale;

An amendment that sought to transfer the responsibility of baseline and monitoring studies from the Secretary of Commerce to the Secretary of the Interior (rejected by a division vote of 5 ayes to 20 noes);

An amendment that sought to leave the authority for issuing safety regulations applying to the construction and operation of offshore oil rigs to the Coast Guard (rejected by a recorded vote of 193 ayes to 193 noes);

An amendment that sought to strike language allowing citizens to commence a civil action against any person, including the United States, who violate any provision in the bill;

An amendment that sought to substitute language rewriting the reasons for which the Secretary may disapprove plans submitted by prospective lessees;

An amendment that sought to reduce the time the Secretary would have to approve or disapprove a plan, after considering comments and recommendations of public officials, from 120 to 60 days;

An amendment that sought to add a new section which would exclude from OCS oil drilling and production, any oil rig, vessel, or structure not wholly owned, manufactured, or operated by United States citizens (rejected by a division vote of 5 ayes to 47 noes). Earlier, a point of order against the amendment was overruled;

An amendment that sought to restrict unlimited liability for oil discharge damages to the owner or operator responsible; and

An amendment that sought to extend exceptions of defenses for damages to the costs of cleaning up oil spills (rejected by a division vote of 17 ayes to 39 noes).

to 50 per cent;

A clarifying amendment to section 211 transferring from subsection (a) to subsection (e) the language regarding the two year notification requirement of the cancellation of a grazing permit or lease;

An amendment which allows BLM officials to enforce public land laws whether or not the local officials accept contracts for enforcement;

An amendment that freezes present auto emission standards through 1979, reduces the levels during 1980-81 to the current California standards, and requires the full 90 percent reduction for carbon monoxide and hydrocarbons beginning in 1982, with nitrogen oxide standards to be established by EPA (agreed to by a recorded vote of 224 ayes to 169 noes with 1 voting "present").

Rejected an amendment in the nature of a substitute to the previous amendment that sought to require the full 90 percent reduction of the three major pollutants in 1981 and require, in the interim, the nationwide implementation of the 1976 and 1977 California standards (rejected by a recorded vote of 75 ayes to 313 noes).

Agreed To:

An amendment that requires the Administrator of EPA to establish acceptable carbon monoxide levels for the interior of school buses and other sustained use vehicles and requires DOT to insure compliance. Previ-

ously, a point of order was overruled against this amendment:

An amendment that limits EPA's authority to use the Clean Air Act to deny sewage treatment grants made under the Water Pollution Control Act;

An amendment that delays for 2 years the implementation of Stage II vapor recovery regulations for independent gasoline marketers until the FTC can make an economic analysis of their impact;

An amendment that allows dealers in high altitude areas to adjust emission controls for some emissions to provide for more effective emission controls;

An amendment that requires the Task Force on Environmental Cancer and Heart and Lung Disease to include in its research program the consideration of the impact of personal health habits, including tobacco smoking. Previously, a point of order was overruled against this amendment;

An amendment as amended by an amendment in the nature of a substitute (substitute agreed to by a recorded vote of 231 aves to 156 nocs) that allows EPA to represent itself in civil actions in courts of original jurisdiction, but reserves Justice Department control of appellate litigation;

An amendment that permits Congress to disapprove in whole or in part any rule or regulation change made pursuant to the Clean Air Act; and

An amendment that improves accounting by the EPA of actions taken to protect the public health and safety during periods of high pollution to enable the oversight committees of Congress to examine how efficiently EPA exercises its authority.

Rejected:

A motion to strike the enacting clause;

An amendment that sought to strike language requiring annual inspections to test the efficiency of pollution control devices of light-duty vehicles in 29 air quality control regions; and

An amendment that sought to require new regulations to limit the pollutants emitted by supersonic aircraft.

An amendment was offered but subsequently withdrawn that sought to prohibit the use of tolls on bridges located entirely within New York City as part of an applicable implementation plan.

Objection was heard to a request to consider a similar Senate bill, S. 3219, and pass said bill in lieu of H.R. 10498, after being amended to contain the language of the House bill as passed. Pages 30464-30511

An amendment that exempts from reporting requirements the making of loans to federal officers and employees at terms which are no more favorable than those

available to the general public;

An amendment providing that the Comptroller General refer to the Committee on Standards of Official Conduct incidents of the giving of gifts that exceed \$100 in value to determine if acceptance is in violation of the Rules of the House;

An amendment requiring that all contributions to registered lobbying organizations in excess of \$2,500 be reported (agreed to by a recorded vote of 290 ayes to

53 noes);

An amendment requiring that organizations report on their areas of primary concern rather than 25 issues upon which the organization concentrated its efforts; and

An amendment including any records maintained by the Comptroller General under the provisions of the bill within the scope of existing public information laws.

An amendment that sought to strike the language of the \$1,250 expenditure threshold for retaining a person to lobby and provide instead a threshold of at least 20 percent of that person's time as devoted to lobbying; An amendment that sought to include within the registration requirements the identifying of anyone who has contributed or expects to contribute \$2,500 to an organization and who spends or will spend 20 percent of his time or more lobbying during any filing quarter;

An amendment that sought to increase the reporting requirements for contributions from \$2,500 to \$5,000;

A motion that the Committee rise (rejected by a recorded vote of 129 ayes to 207 noes);

An amendment that sought to provide that tax exempt organizations and state colleges and universities would not have to report quarterly on their lobbying activities and instead would submit annual reports; and

An amendment that would have included within the reporting requirements the names of Federal officials or employees contacted by lobbying organizations.

Earlier, rejected an amendment in the nature of a substitute to the committee amendment that sought to use the number of contacts within a reporting period, rather than a percentage of time, as a threshold for defining a lobbyist organization (rejected by a recorded vote of 74 ayes to 291 noes).

Agreed to the following amendments to the amend-

ment in the nature of a substitute:

An amendment which strikes from the reporting requirements a description of exactly 25 issues of concern to an organization;

An amendment that exempts from the reporting requirements the making of loans to Federal officers and employees at terms which are no more favorable than those available to the general public;

An amendment that adds language clarifying the definition of solicitation as not including oral or written communications by one registered organization to

another registered organization; and

An amendment that requires the Comptroller General to refer the giving of gifts that exceed \$100 in value to the Committee on Standards of Official Conduct to determine if acceptance is in violation of the Rules of the House (agreed to by a recorded vote of 294 ayes to 61 nocs).

Rejected the following amendments to the amendment in the nature of a substitute:

An amendment that sought to strike the language including preparing or drafting of communications as lobbying activities (rejected by a recorded vote of 143 ayes to 236 noes). Previously, this amendment was agreed to by a division vote of 29 ayes to 12 noes;

An amendment that sought to delete from the reporting requirements any communication between an organization and its own Congressional representative as long as the principal place of business is within the same State:

An amendment that sought to reduce from 5 to 2 years the amount of time organizations must retain records pursuant to the bill; An amendment that sought to exempt from the reporting requirements on dinners those connected with an international exhibit or an event sponsored by substantial numbers of companies belonging to a trade or industry association;

An amendment that sought to add language that would include as a minimum threshold the making of 12 oral lobbying communications with a Federal officer or employee (rejected by a recorded vote of 68 ayes to 298 noes);

An amendment that sought to include certain employees of State and local governments within the definition of lobbying organizations (rejected by a recorded vote of 150 ayes to 215 noes). Previously, this amendment was agreed to by a division vote of 37 ayes to 25 noes;

An amendment that sought to require lobbyists to wear identification name tags if their lobbying activities are within 50 feet of any entrance to either Chamber of the Congress while such Body is in session (rejected by a recorded vote of 84 ayes to 271 noes);

An amendment that sought to exempt the influencing of the award of a government contract as an activity which constitutes lobbying under the bill (rejected by a recorded vote of 89 ayes to 268 noes):

An amendment that sought to include within the registration requirements the identifying of anyone who has contributed or expects to contribute \$2,500 to an organization and who spends or will spend 20 percent or more of his time in any filing quarter engaged in activities for the organization (rejected by a recorded vote of 159 ayes to 195 noes);

An amendment that sought to require the reporting of any and all individuals lobbying within 50 feet of either Chamber of Congress, including their hours and purpose of their activity (rejected by a recorded vote of 137 ayes to 223 noes); and

Rejected a motion to strike out the enacting clause (rejected by a division vote of 52 ayes to 120 noes).

Points of order were sustained against an amendment that sought to require all lobbying to be 100 feet or more from the Chamber of either Body of Congress when it is in session;

An amendment that sought to restrict to \$100 per year the amount of gifts that an organization can give to a Federal officer or employee; and

An amendment that sought to include ex-Members, former Parliamentarians, former elected officers and elected minority employees of the House as being subject to civil penalty when appearing on the House floor or in adjacent rooms as a representative of an organization required to register under the bill.

Objection was heard to a request to consider a similar Senate bill, S. 2477, and poss said bill in lieu of H.R. 15, after being amended to contain the language of the House bill as passed.
