


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

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### SKETCHES OF THE HISTORY

OF THE

### UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA.

It might be claimed that the Centennial year of American Independence was likewise the Centennial year of the University of North Carolina, although the charter was not granted until 1789.

In December, 1776, a Convention, then called Congress, of enlightened men met at Halifax to form a Constitution for the new free State of North Carolina, under whose protection the people could maintain the Independence they had declared a few months before.

Without an army or navy, they had entered on a war for existence with a nation powerful, populous and wealthy, having the tradition of invincibility, which had, under Marlborough, within the century, broken the power of the Great Louis of France—had, with heavy hand, crushed the fortunes of the Pretender at Culloden—had sent Wolfe to storm the Heights of Quebec; had swept the seas with her fleets. The Revolution, if it failed, was Rebellion. The penalty of defeat was the doom of traitors. The State had barely two hundred thousand inhabitants, widely scattered and badly armed, and divided in sentiment. But notwithstanding these odds, this Congress, with wisdom unparalleled and faith approaching sublimity, provided for the interests of unborn children. They knew that those children would not be capable of freedom without education. They knew there could be no education without

teachers. They knew that teachers could not be procured without colleges, and they made the requirement of the University a part of the fundamental law. In the month of December, 1776, in the Constitution of the new State, then first adopted, are found these golden words, written amid storms and thunderings, to be made good when the sun shone on a free and united people: "ALL USEFUL LEARNING SHALL BE DULY ENCOURAGED AND PROMOTED IN ONE OR MORE UNIVERSITIES."

It was an act of sagacity and courage and far-seeing statesmanship, prompted by the bold men of Mecklenburg, who, smarting under the repeal of the charter of Queen's College, instructed their delegates, John Phifer, Robert Irwin, Zaccheus Wilson, Hezekiah Alexander, and lastly, but most prominent, Waightstill Avery, when cannon were booming and banners were flying and soldiers marshalling for the great death-struggle, to use all their endeavors for the establishment of a University and its endowment and maintenance.

The Revolutionary Fathers went to their honored graves. Generation after generation grew up and passed away. The old Constitution, after conferring the blessing of good government for many decades, was amended to suit the wants of a growing West. A great civil war desolated our land and destroyed institutions woven into the fabric of society. A race of slaves was suddenly made a part of the governing voting element of the State. Constitution, superseding the old Constitution of 1776, was adopted to carry into effect this great change, and by a singular coincidence, exactly one hundred years after the adoption of the old Constitution, the people of the State amended the new, giving it a shape which will probably remain essentially unchanged to a distant period. But in all these vicissitudes and changes, showing the settled determination of the people of North Carolina, which no anxieties or disasters could banish from their minds, is still the substance of those golden words of 1776; or rather the execution of the mandate of the old Constitution, in part, is assumed, and the General Assembly is directed to go on and provide for rearing up, to the full magnitude of its usefulness, the University of the State.

While the Revolution was progressing, as might be anticipated,

the mandate of the Constitution lay dormant. Inter arma silent leges. When Caswell was beating McDonald at Moore's Creek Bridge, and Campbell, Shelby, Cleveland, Sevier, Williams and McDowell were capturing Ferguson's forces at King's Mountain, and Cornwallis and Greene were wrestling for the victory at Guilford, and Fanning was carrying as prisoner from Hillsboro the Governor of our State, and the momentous question whether our ancestors were patriots or traitors was still undecided, there was no time for erecting universities. And after the war, industry must have time for restoring plenty to wasted lands and statesmanship to form a settled government in the place of a nerveless confederacy. In the month of November, 1789, our State, after first a stern refusal and then a cov hesitation of a year, entered the American Union. In the next month of December, as if forming part of a comprehensive plan, the charter of the University, under the powerful advocacy of Davie, was granted by the General Assembly. The Trustees under the charter comprised the great men of the State, the good men of the State, the trusted leaders of the people.

The first named and chairman was Samuel Johnston, who, in legislative, executive and judicial station, in war and peace, left the impress of his wise conservatism on the State. There were James Iredell, one of the earliest Judges of the Supreme Court of the United States, and Alfred Moore, his successor in this high office. . There were the first Federal District Judge, Colonel John Stokes, and John Sitgreaves, his successor. There was Hugh Williamson, the historian, and signer of the Constitution of the United States, a delegate to the Convention of 1787, and a long array of men who were to become Governors: Samuel Ashe and William Richardson Davie and Richard Dobbs Spaight, Benjamin Williams and Benjamin Smith. There were military men, who had been conspicuous fighters in the Revolution: General Joseph Graham, scarred with wounds in the defence of Charlotte under Davie, the father of the revered statesman, William A. Graham, the last exertions of whose honored life were spent for the revival of the University; General Thomas Person, whose hatred of injustice began with the disastrous struggles of the Regulation. There were Colonels William Lenoir and Joseph McDowell, who aided in thwarting the plans of Cornwallis by the capture of Ferguson at King's

Mountain. Of the State Judiciary we find the three Judges under the Court law of 1777—Samuel Spencer, John Williams, and Samuel Ashe, already mentioned, whose name is worthily represented by his descendants, Thomas Samuel Ashe, of Anson, and Samuel A. Ashe, of Raleigh; and of others distinguished in the history of the State—Archibald McLaine and Willie Jones, bold and active patriots, Stephen Cabarrus, long Speaker of the House of Commons, and John Haywood, the popular State Treasurer. Of the national House of Representatives, were Charles Johnson, grandfather of the late distinguished physician, Charles E. Johnson, of Raleigh, Joseph Dixon, James Holland and Alexander Mebane.

At the same session the General Assembly granted to the University all escheats and certain debts due by tax collectors during the Revolutionary war, called arrearages. All sheriffs realize that claims nearly ten years old of the nature of these arrearages were likely to remain in a state of suspension for many years and so indeed they have, even to this day.

The grant of escheats under the act of 1789 was of real value, and by the energy and good management of the Trustees, after a long period was the source of the endowment of the University. Many denizens of foreign birth left no heirs, citizens of North Carolina, and under the law as it stood until 1871, their lands escheated to the State; and in like manner obscure soldiers, to whom land warrants were granted for their services in the war, died leaving no heirs to inherit their claims. Of course the revenue from this source naturally diminished as the years rolled away from the Revolution, and it was still further diminished by acts of the Legislature giving the lands to a remoter heir, being a citizen, when the next heir is an alien, and giving the widow all the estate if her husband should die without an heir. At this day the chances of an escheat are worth but little, as an alien stands on the same footing with a citizen in regard to the possession of real estate.

It was not from parsimony but hard necessity that the long services of our patriot-soldiers, in hunger, and thirst, and cold, and nakedness, were paid for in a paper currency, like that of which the conquered Confederates have had such bitter experience. To this meagre dole was added for faithful service warrants for land

to be located in a country of great fertility, but the home of bears and panthers and not friendly Indians, the western region of Tennessee, then a part of the domain of North Carolina. To a private was given 640 acres, to a Lieutenant 2,560, to a Captain 3,840, to a Major 4,800, to a Colonel, or Lieutenant-Colonel Commanding, 7,200, to a Brigadier-General 12,000 acres. To the great General Greene, who had by his genius retrieved the fortunes of the war after Gates' disastrous failure, they gave 25,000 acres.

The gift of the unclaimed land warrants was to the University like the cool waters near the parched lips of Tantalus. North Carolina, in 1789, ceded all its territory of Tennessee to the United States. The new State, after its admission into the Union in 1796, claimed all the rights of sovereignty, and refused to give effect to the grants made by North Carolina.

The State of North Carolina would never have secured an acre of these lands. No argument but that they were to be used for education, had any weight with the legislators of Tennessee. The Trustees sent to plead their cause one of the most enlightened members and most skilled in the arts of managing men, Judge Archibald Murphy. Even he, with all his eloquence and address, was forced to a hard compromise. Two-thirds of the warrants were given to the College of East Tennessee and the College of Cumberland, and one-third to the University of North Carolina. It was not until 1835, after suffering untold privations, staggering under a debt of nearly \$40,000 to the banks, that funds were gathered from this source and the donations of Smith, Gerrard and others, to lift its head above the waters.

It is pleasant to note that by the providence of our ancestors the enemies of our country's freedom contributed, albeit unwillingly, to the enlightenment of our people. But it is of pathetic interest to know that the ignorant soldiers of America, who, after countless sufferings, filled uncoffined graves, were not only gaining liberty for their country but, unintentional benefactors, were building a great institution of learning. They did glorious work, those "unnamed demigods of history," as Kossuth calls them, blindly suffering martyrdom for a cause they dimly understood, but that cause triumphant and leading to never ending blessings of free institutions and liberal education.

With the exception of \$10,000 loaned by the State for erecting buildings (afterwards converted into a gift), all the benefactions of the General Assembly were only of such interests as could be of little, if any, advantage to the State. This is expressed in the preamble of one of the acts: "Whereas, The State possesses certain funds from which no profit is yielded, but which by the zeal, activity and united exertions of the Trustees of the University, might be rendered productive," &c. The abortive gift of uncollected taxes has been mentioned.

The gift of confiscated property was likewise of this nature, though at one time great revenues were expected from it. The Trustees had collected a handsome sum from debts due Henry Eustice McCulloch, the agent of Lord Granville, for lands sold by him prior to the Revolution, when behold, our Conference Court, then the Supreme tribunal, decided in accordance with the Treaty of Peace of 1783, that these debts could not be taken from McCulloch, and the University was forced by the Legislature to disgorge—a rare instance of a corporation performing an act so disagreeable and "contrary to nature."

The Trustees met for organization on the 18th of December, 1789, Charles Johnson being chairman. The journal kept by one of the earliest Treasurers, Walter Alves, written with wonderful neatness and accuracy, gives the names of the subscribers. The largest donations were by William Cain of the Orange District, and Alfred Moore of the Cape Fear, great-grandfather of a distinguished son of the University, Alfred Moore Waddell. The charter was accepted and steps were taken to solicit subscriptions. Davie cheered the hearts of the Trustees by announcing the gift by Benjamin Smith of warrants for 20,000 acres of land.

The second meeting was likewise in Fayetteville, November 15th, 1790.

Col. William Lenoir, a hero of King's Mountain, the Speaker of the Senate, on the nomination of the Speaker of the House, Stephen Cabarrus, was made President of the Board. James Taylor, of Rockingham, was elected Secretary, while to the position of Treasurer, the State Comptroller, John Craven, was appointed. Death had invaded their ranks. The old heroes were dropping off. The venerable Robert Dixon was succeeded by

James Kenan, grandfather of our Attorney General, and battlescarred Judge Winston by Alex. Martin, who, like our Vance, had been Governor in times of war, and after a long interval in times of peace, occupied the executive chair. James Hogg proceeded to the welcome duty of presenting to the Board patents for the 20,000 acres of land, donated at the preceding meeting by Governor Smith. On the resignation, by Col. Lenoir, of the chairmanship, Governor Alexander Martin was chosen as his successor. It was agreed that the places of future meetings should be selected by ballot. Hillsborough was the choice of the Board for the next meeting, and also for that of August, 1792. It was at this meeting that steps were taken for the purpose of locating the institution. The attendance of members proved the interest taken in the question. There were present 25 trustees out of 40, the largest proportion ever known. The largest number in these days of easy railroad travelling, is 39 out of 80, in 1885, when six professors were elected. Such patriotic sacrifice of comfort in the heated dog-days deserves to be recorded. Those who answered to the roll-call were:

Alex. Martin, Governor, of Guilford; Hugh Williamson, the historian, of Chowan; Benjamin Williams, afterwards Governor, of Moore; John Sitgreaves, Judge United States District Court, of Craven; Fred. Hargett, State Senator, of Jones; Richard Dobbs Spaight, the elder, elected Governor that year, of Craven, who was afterwards killed in a duel by John Stanly; Wm. H. Hill, member of the Legislature and of Congress, of New Hanover; James Hogg, merchant, of Cumberland; Samuel Ashe, then Judge, afterwards Governor, New Hanover; John Hay, lawyer, Cumberland; Wm. Barry Grove, member of Congress, Cumberland; Col. Wm. Polk, member of the Legislature, then of Mecklenburg; Judge John Williams, Granville; Alexander Mebane, afterwards member of Congress, Orange; Joel Lane, member of Senate, Wake: Alfred Moore, then member of the Legislature, afterwards Judge Supreme Court, Brunswick; Willie Jones, Halifax; Benjamin Hawkins, Senator in Congress, Warren; John Haywood, State Treasurer, then of Edgecombe; Rev. Dr. Samuel E. Mc-Corkle, a distinguished preacher and teacher, Rowan; Wm. Richardson Davie, afterwards Governor, Halifax; Joseph Dixon, State

Senator, afterwards member of Congress, Lincoln; Joseph Mc-Dowell, Jr., member of the Legislature, Burke; Wm. Porter, member of the Legislature, Rutherford; Adlai Osborne, Clerk of the Superior Court of his county, a well-read and influential man, Rowan.

According to localities, counting New Hanover as an Eastern county, and Cumberland, Warren and Guilford as Middle counties, there were ten Eastern, nine Middle, and six Western Trustees.

Willie Jones submitted a motion, which was adopted, that the Board would not select any particular spot, but would choose by ballot a place with liberty of locating within fifteen miles thereof. This was all the more proper because the charter provided that the site should not be within five miles of the permanent seat of government or any court house—an incidental proof of the drunkenness and rowdyism of the country during court week, horrible specimens of which may be witnessed to this day.

The places in nomination were as follows: Raleigh, in Wake county; Williamsboro, in Granville county; Hillsboro, in Orange county; Pittsboro, in Chatham county; Cyprett's Bridge, over New Hope, in Chatham; Smithfield, in Johnston county; Goshen, in Granville county.

The Board proceeded to ballot, and Cyprett's, or Cipritz, Bridge, now Prince's Bridge, on the great road from Newbern by Raleigh to Pittsboro, was chosen. The choice was a natural one. The fifteen miles radius allowed a range over wide areas of Chatham, Wake and Orange, from the highlands of New Hope to the hills of Buckhorn, from the Hickory Mountain to the eminences overlooking our beautiful capital on the west. The same influences which secured that the capital should be located within ten miles of Isaac Hunter's plantation, in Wake county, that is, as near the centre of the State as possible, carried this vote.

On the 4th of August, 1792, the Board adopted an ordinance to carry into effect the selection of the University site within the circle described. One commissioner from each Congressional District was appointed by ballot. There were from the Morganton District, Wm. Porter, of Rutherford; the Salisbury District, John Hamilton, of Guilford; the Hillsboro District, Alex. Mebane, of Orange; the Halifax District, Willie Jones, of Halifax; the Edenton District,

David Stone, of Bertie; the Newbern District, Frederick Hargett, of Jones; the Wilmington District, Wm. H. Hill, of New Hanover; the Fayetteville District, James Hogg, of Cumberland. They were to meet in Pittsboro on November 1st, 1792, prepared to visit in person all places deemed eligible.

At the appointed time a majority convened in Pittsboro, viz:-Hargett, Mebane, Hogg, Hill, Stone and Jones. It was an excellent committee. Senator Hargett had already assisted as Commissioner in locating and laying out the city of Raleigh. ander Mebane had been a member of the Convention which framed the State Constitution and a useful officer of the Revolutionary army. He long served the county of Orange in the State Legislature and the year after this was elected to the Congress of the United States. He was father of James Mebane, first President of the Dialectic Society, who attained the honor of the Speakership of the House of Commons, and grandfather of another alumnus of the University, the respected Giles Mebane, once Speaker of the Senate. James Hogg was an influential merchant, afterwards of Hillsborough, among whose descendants are the Binghams, Norwoods and Webbs of Orange, and Dr. Wm. Hooper, an eminent professor of the University. Wm. H. Hill, a descendant of Governor Yeamans, was an able lawyer of Wilmington, afterwards State Senator and member of Congress. David Stone, then a member of the House of Commons from Bertie, afterwards Governor and Senator of the United States, was a well educated and accomplished young man. Willie Jones was one of the most active and influential men of the Revolutionary and post-revolutionary periods, as chairman of the Committee of Safety, wielding executive authority in 1776, a member of the Continental Congress.

We have the journal of the proceedings of these Commissioners as, in the beginning of November, ninety-seven years ago, they started from Pittsboro to view the various points offered for their choice. Great efforts were made for the location at Haywood, in the forks of Haw and Deep rivers, likewise a competitor with Raleigh for the seat of government. An offer was made of six hundred and forty acres of land to secure the selection of the Cross Roads in Wake, near Cary, where then lived Nathanael Jones, called of White Plains, to distinguish him from Nathanael


Jones of Crabtree. Ten other places were tendered, mainly in the county of Chatham, but in far-sighted liberality, the men of Chapel Hill and its vicinity exceeded all others. I give their names, because they should be had in especial remembrance by the lovers of the University:

Colonel John Hogan, two hundred acres; Benjamin Yergan, fifty-one; Matthew McCauley, one hundred and fifty; Alexander Piper, twenty-six; James Craig, five; Christopher Barbee, two hundred and twenty-one; Edward Jones, two hundred; Mark Morgan, one hundred and seven; John Daniel, one hundred and seven; Hardy Morgan, one hundred and twenty. Total, one thousand one hundred and eighty acres, of which eight hundred and forty were in one body.

Let me describe the spot more particularly, as it appeared to the eyes of the Commissioners.

The construction of railroads has made a wonderful change in the relative importance of our public highways. In the old days those who made tobacco rolled it away to Petersburg, the hogsheads being at once the wagon and the wheels for carriage. Those who made corn, generally converted it into hogs and drove them on foot to Philadelphia or Charleston. Wheat was ground into flour and sent by wagon to distant markets—to Fayetteville, Wilmington, Newbern and Petersburg. The corn and rye not fed to swine was changed to whisky and the fruit into brandy, and that which escaped the capacious throats of the neighborhood drinkers, was peddled along the road side to the rural drinkers or sold in bulk to the village shops. In violation of all rules of political economy, a man was at the same time an agriculturist, a manufacturer, a transporter, a wholesale merchant, a retailer, and a voracious consumer.

The returning wagons carried home supplies of molasses and sugar, iron and salt, shot and powder and flints, not forgetting the ribbons and combs and such paraphernalia, that ladies in all ages will obtain to gild the refined gold of their personal charms. They were the vehicles also of the news of the day, there being no post-office nearer than Tarboro. The wondering neighbors heard from these drivers what was going on in the big world—that Washington had consented to accept a second term of the Presidency, that





the heads of the King and Queen of France had rolled into the guillotine basket, that the allied armies had been driven back from the Rhine; and then what has proved to be of more importance than all the victories of armies or the crownings of kings, that a Yankee schoolmaster, named Whitney, had invented a machine for picking seed out of cotton, and every old lady paused in the musical whirr of her spinning wheel to listen to the astounding intelligence, not more than three months old, that in the old country a man named Arkwright was spinning yarn by water power, and more incredible still, a preacher named Cartwright was weaving cloth by wood and iron instead of human muscles.

From these causes the roads of those days, though over them rolled no modern carriages or effeminate buggies, or bicycles, picturesque but unsociable, frequently resounded with the heavy wheels of the covered wagons, and the Cross Roads were places of importance, where wagoners and the neighbors met for business and social enjoyments, listened to political speeches, and more rarely to homely but heart-stirring sermons.

The great roads from Petersburg to Pittsboro and the country beyond, and from Newbern toward Greensboro and Salisbury, crossed on this eminence. At the north-east corner of the cross was a chapel of the Church of England, a sad relic of the futile efforts to establish a church in North Carolina. It was called New Hope Chapel and the eminence was called New Hope Chapel Hill, or the Hill of New Hope Chapel. The eminence is a promontory of granite, belonging to the Laurentian system, and extends into the sandstone formation to the east, which was once the bed of a long sheet of water stretching from near New York to the centre of Georgia. We have in our Museum pieces of rock formed from the mud and sand at the bottom of this old bay on which are ripple marks of the waves and prints of the plants and animals which grew in its shallows. It was on this plateau, elevated 250 feet above the country on the east, then as now celebrated for its magnificent forests of oak and hickory, its springs of cool and purest water, its pleasant, mudless, dustless soil, its genial, healthful climate, on whose hillsides the mountain flora blossom, that the home of the University was fixed.

The report of the Commissioners was submitted by their chair-

man, Hargett, to the Board, and was referred to a committee consisting of Gov. Davie, Rev. Dr. McCorkle, Willie Jones, Judge Ashe and Judge Sitgreaves. Jones reported an ordinance ratifying their action, which was unanimously adopted. Davie offered an ordinance for appointing commissioners to erect buildings and lay off a town. The building was to accommodate fifty students, not to cost over \$5,000.

The corner stone of this building, the "Old East," was laid on the 12th of October, 1793.

We have fortunately an account of the proceedings of this day so memorable, written by Davie himself, the chief actor. I will endeavor to take the veil off this picture of long ago, and wipe off the dust which obscures it.

The Chapel Hill of 96 years ago was vastly different from the Chapel Hill of to-day. It was covered with a primeval growth of forest trees, with only one or two settlements, and a few acres of clearing. Even the trees on the East and West Avenue, named Cameron by the Faculty in recognition of the wise and skilful superintendence, by Mr. P. C. Cameron, of the extensive repairs of our buildings prior to the re-opening in 1875, were still erect. The sweet-gums and dogwoods and maples were relieving in the autumnal sun, with their russet and golden hues, the general green of the forest. A long procession of people for the first time are marching along the narrow road, afterwards to be widened into a noble avenue. Many of them are clad in the striking, typical insignia of the Masonic Fraternity, their Grand Master arrayed in the full decorations of his rank. They march with military tread, because most of them have seen service, many scarred with wounds of horrid war. Their faces are serious, for they feel that they are engaged in a great work. They are proceeding to lay the foundations of an institution which for weal or woe is to shape the minds of thousands of unborn children; whose influence will be felt more and more, ever widening and deepening as the years roll on. as one of the great forces of civilization.

Let us transport ourselves in imagination and look on this strange procession and see if we can recognize any of them as they step firmly in the pleasant sunshine of the autumnal sun.

The tall commanding figure most conspicuous, in the Grand

Master's regalia, is that of William Richardson Davie. He is no common man. He had been a gallant cavalry officer in the Revolution. He had been a strong staff on which Greene had leaned. He had been conspicuous in civil pursuits; an able lawyer, an orator of vast influence. With Washington and Franklin, and other great men, he had assisted in evolving the grandest government of all ages, the American Union, out of an ill-governed and disintegrating confederacy. He was beyond his times in the advocacy of a broad, generous education. His portrait has been drawn by a masterly hand, Judge Archibald Murphy, one of the most progressive and scholarly men our State has known. In his speech before the two Societies at Chapel Hill he says: "Davie was a tall, elegant man in his person, graceful and commanding in his manners. His voice was mellow, and adapted to the expression of every passion; his mind comprehensive yet slow in its operations, when compared with his great rival; his style was magnificent and flowing; he had a greatness of manner in public speaking which suited his style, and gave to his speeches an imposing effect. He was a laborious student, arranged his discourses with care, and where the subject merited his genius, poured forth a torrent of eloquence that astonished and enraptured his audience."

Judge Murphy says: "I was present in the House of Commons when Davie addressed that body upon the bill granting a loan of money to the Trustees for erecting the buildings of the University, and although more than thirty years have since elapsed, I have the most vivid recollection of the greatness of his manner and the powers of his eloquence on that occasion." General Davie was afterwards Governor of the State and Envoy of the United States to the Court of France. I find him styled in the Journal of the University in 1810, "the Father of the University," and he well deserved the title.

Who is that distinguished looking man, "small in stature, neat in his dress, elegant in his manner," next to Davie? It is Davie's great rival, Alfred Moore. Judge Murphy gives us a vivid picture of him also: "His voice was clear and sonorous, his perception quick, and judgment almost intuitive. His style was chaste and manner of speaking animated. Having adopted Swift for his model, his language was always plain. The clearness and energy

of his mind enabled him almost without an effort to disentangle the most intricate subject and expose it in all its parts to the simplest understanding. He spoke with ease and with force, enlivened his discourse with flashes of wit, and where the subject required it, with all the bitterness of sarcasm. His speeches were short and impressive. When he sat down every one thought he had said everything he ought to have said." His learning and acquirements secured for him a seat on the bench of one of most august tribunals in the world, the Supreme Court of the United States.

In that procession appeared too one who had highest reputation among his contemporaries as an enlightened lawyer, William H. Hill, heretofore described, father of the brilliant young man whose death filled the whole State with grief, Joseph A. Hill.

We next see one who was for many years the most popular man in North Carolina, John Haywood. For forty years—1787 to 1827—he was Treasurer of the State. His hospitality was unbounded. He made it a rule to invite specially to an entertainment at his house, at each session of the General Assembly, which then met annually, every member. His kindness and charity were absolutely inexhaustible. In reading over the University records, I find that for over thirty years he scarcely missed a meeting of the Board, whether held at Chapel Hill or at Raleigh. His name is perpetuated not only by distinguished sons now living, but by one of our loveliest mountain counties and by a neighboring town, which once aspired to be the capital of the State, and site of the University.

Marching with Haywood was Gen. Alexander Mebane, of the old Scotch-Irish stock, who settled the Haw Fields in Alamance, something of whose history has been given.

In that procession was also John Williams, founder of Williamsboro in Granville county, whose strong, sturdy sense enabled him to step with short interval from the bench of the carpenter to the bench of the Judge of the first court under the Constitution of 1776. He was likewise a member of the Congress of the Confederacy.

Thomas Blount, member from Edgecombe, soon to enter Congress and to become an attached colleague of Nathaniel Macon, was likewise present.

Prominent in the procession was the venerable Hargett, Senator from Jones, plain, solid, but eminently trustworthy. His name, as well as Blount's, is commemorated by principal streets of Raleigh.

After these came other Trustees. Who they were, with the exception of McCorkle, we have no record.

The orator of the day, Dr. Samuel E. McCorkle, was one of the most noted educators of that period. He was one of the sturdy Scotch-Irish, who made the North of Ireland famous throughout all lands for triumphs of intelligent industry and thrift, whose glorious defence of Londonderry stands unrivalled in the annals of human valor and endurance; who gave to North Carolina many of its leaders in war and in peace—Grahams and Jacksons, Brevards, Alexanders, Mebanes and hosts of others, but above all most of its faithful and zealous instructors of youth, such as Dr. Caldwell of Guilford, and Dr. Caldwell of the University, Dr. Ker and Harris, its first Professors, and that noble progenitor of a long line of able and cultured teachers, and founder of a school eminent for nearly a century for its wide-spread and multiform usefulness, William Bingham, the first.

Dr. McCorkle was among the foremost of these. He was beyond his generation as a teacher. His school at Thyatira, six miles west of Salisbury, spread abroad not only classical learning but sound religious training. He attached to it a department specially for teachers, the first Normal School, I feel sure, in America. The first class which graduated at our University consisted of seven members; six of them had been pupils of Dr. McCorkle. And it is gratifying that one of the first graduates of the revived University was a relative of his, George McCorkle of Catawba, the Chief Marshal of 1876.

The name, Zion-Parnassus, which he gave to his school at Thyatira, shows how he combined the culture of the Bible and the culture of the muses. The first Board of Trustees of the University was composed of the greatest men of the State, and among them—Senators, Governors, Judges of the Supreme Court of the United States and of the State—was Dr. McCorkle, the solitary preacher and solitary teacher. He was one of the best friends the University had; worked for it, begged for it, preached for it.

The Trustees, in December, 1795, tendered him the chair of Moral and Political Philosophy with the chairmanship of the Faculty, which was not accepted. It was most fitting that he should deliver the first address at the University, to be followed by a long line of eminent men.

After the Trustees march State officers, not Trustees; among them Judge Spruce McKoy of Salisbury, and doubtless John Taylor, the clerk of the Superior Court of Orange, ancestor of one of our professors; and then followed the gentlemen of the vicinity, the McCauleys and Barbees and Hogans and Daniels and Pipers and Craigs and Yeargins and Morgans, and among them Patterson of Chatham, the contractor for the building. Since that day we have had processions, year by year, on our commencement days, and in their columns, Presidents and Governors and Senators and great divines, men learned and distinguished in all the pursuits of life, but never has there been a procession more imposing than that which laid the corner-stone of the Old East, on the 12th of October, 1793.

We have a report of the address made by Dr. McCorkle under the blue sky of that autumn day. It is replete with wisdom and noble thoughts, and fully proves that the estimation placed on him by the men of that day was fully earned. An extract is given:

"It is our duty to acknowledge that sacred Scriptural truth, 'Except the Lord do build the house their labor is but in vain that build it.' The happiness of a nation depends on national wealth and national glory and cannot be gained without them. They in like manner depend on liberty and good laws. Liberty and laws call for general knowledge in the people. . . . . How can glory or wealth be procured or preserved without liberty and laws? They must check luxury, encourage industry and protect wealth. They must secure me the glory of my actions and save me from a bowstring or a bastile, and how are those objects to be gained without general knowledge? Knowledge is wealth, it is glory; whether among philosophers, ministers of state or religion, or among the great mass of the people."

We thank thee for thy golden words, thou venerable father of education in North Carolina. On this foundation the University desires to rest. The enlightenment of the people, their instruction

not alone in secular learning but in religious truth, leading up to and sustaining liberty by demanding and shaping beneficent laws, under which wealth may be accumulated and individual happiness and national glory secured, all sanctified by the blessing of God; these are the objects, these the methods, these are the good rewards of the University.

But the beginnings of the University were in troublous times. Its struggles were not only with want and penury, but with ignorance and prejudice and a wild spirit of lawlessness.

All the world was in a ferment. The passions of the era flamed across the ocean and enkindled sympathetic passions in our midst. Furious efforts were made to force the United States into alliance with the French Republic. The vision of the sister democracies of the Old World and the New, marching shoulder to shoulder to plant in every capital the standard of Universal Freedom, and conquering together a Universal Peace, aroused every sentiment of romantic philanthropy and quixotic gratitude.

The rage of parties was strong in North Carolina as elsewhere. It stood in the way of all measures for the advancement of the public good. It stimulated bad passions, prevented coöperation, divided the people into hostile camps. In the general excitement the cause of education was little regarded, and but for the wisdom of such men as Davie, and Moore, and Mebane, and Haywood, and Hill, the new-born University would have been strangled in its infancy.

The population of the State was only about 400,000, of whom about 100,000 were slaves. The permanent seat of government had just been chosen. The city of Raleigh was located in 1792, the State-house was not finished until 1794. The inhabitants of the State lived remote from one another, and mutual intercourse was prevented not only by long distances but by the execrable roads and the almost entire absence of spring vehicles. The two-wheeled sulky and stick-back gig were possessed by the better class, while only a few of the wealthiest could boast of the ancient lumbering coach. Most traveling was on horseback, it being quite the fashion for the lady to sit behind the gentleman, and steady herself by an arm around his waist.

The diffusion of intelligence through most of the regions of the

State was by the chance traveler or the wagoner. In 1790 there were only 75 post-offices in all the Union, there are now 50,000. There were only 1,875 miles of post roads in all the Union, now there are over 300,000. Then there was only one letter to 17 people, now there are over 20 letters to each person. Then there were only 265,500 letters carried in a year, now there are over 1,000,000,000 letters. Then the postage was from 7 to 33 cents according to distance, now for 2 cents a letter will go with great certainty to the shores of the Pacific, even to distant Alaska among the frozen latitudes. In his message to the Legislature of 1790, Goy. Alexander Martin complains that there is only one mail route in the State and that runs only through the seaboard towns, that only a few inhabitants derive advantage from that establishment in comparison to the general bulk of the people of the interior country. Five years afterwards Prof. Harris, when a weekly mail had been established, writes, "our news at this place (Chapel Hill) has given us more trouble and disappointment than information. I joined Mr. Ker, acting President, in getting Browne's daily paper, but it has not arrived by the two last posts, and if it does not come more regularly we must discontinue it." The old records show that it was a common practice to send a special messenger, called an "express," when important communication became necessary between the University authorities and the Trustees.

The state of education was at a low ebb. There were no public schools and few private schools. I am fortunately able to give information on this subject from Judge Archibald Murphy, an early student of the University; after his graduation, one of its professors. He says: "Before this University came into operation in 1795, there were not more than three schools in the State in which the rudiments of a classical education could be acquired. The most prominent and useful of these schools was kept by Mr. David Caldwell, of Guilford county. He initiated it shortly after the close of the war, and continued it more than thirty years. The usefulness of Dr. Caldwell to the literature of the State will never be sufficiently appreciated, but the opportunities of instruction in the school were very limited. There was no library attached to it. His students were supplied with a few of the Greek and Latin

Classics, Euclid's Elements of Mathematics, and Martin's Natural Philosophy. Moral Philosophy was taught from a syllabus of lectures by Dr. Witherspoon in Princeton College. The students had no books on history or miscellaneous literature. There were very few indeed in the State, except in the libraries of lawyers who lived in the commercial towns. I well remember that after completing my course of studies under Dr. Caldwell, I spent nearly two years without finding any books to read except some old works on theological subjects. At length I accidentally met with Voltaire's History of Charles XII of Sweden, and an odd volume of Smollett's Roderick Random and an abridgement of Don Quixote. These books gave me a taste for reading which I had no opportunity of gratifying until I became a student of the University in 1796. Few of Dr. Caldwell's students had better opportunies of getting books than myself, and with those slender opportunities of instruction, it is not at all surprising that so few have become eminent in the liberal professions. At this day (1827) when libraries are established in all our towns, when every professional man and every respectable gentleman has a collection of books, it is difficult to conceive the inconvenience under which young men labored thirty or forty years ago." And yet there were men who, like Judge Murphy, conquered all these difficulties and rose, conspicuous for learning and science.

The North American Review, in 1821, said that, "in an ardent and increasing zeal for the establishment of schools and academies for several years past, we do not believe North Carolina has been outdone by a single State. The Academy at Raleigh was founded in 1804, previously to which there were only two institutions of the kind in the State. The number at present is nearly fifty, and is rapidly increasing. Great pains are taken to procure the best instructors from different parts of the country, and we have the best authority for our opinion, that in no part of the Union are the interests of education better understood and under better regulation than in the middle counties of North Carolina. The schools for females are particularly celebrated and are much resorted to from Georgia, South Carolina and Virginia. In the year 1816, the number of students at academies within the compass of forty miles amounted to more than one thousand. This space comprised

the counties of Warren, Granville, Orange, Wake, Franklin, and two or three others adjoining."

In those days the University was the only institution of higher learning in North Carolina, and when we contrast the general darkness in 1795 with the rapid improvement, as shown by the extract from the North American Review, in twenty-five years, cannot the University say with triumph: These schools were my children? I am their Alma Mater—their creative and fostering author, they are the fruit of my labors.

#### THE BUILDINGS.

It is convenient now to give a connected history of the various buildings of the University, commencing with the "Old East," of whose beginning we have spoken.


The bricks of this, as of all the other buildings, except those in Memorial Hall, which were obtained from the Penitentiary, were burnt on University land. The lime used in the mortar of the early structures was obtained from shells brought from Wilmington by boat, thence by wagon. There is recorded a donation of fifty bushels of such shells by Mr. Richard Bennehan, grandfather, as the royal charters say, of "our well-beloved cousin and trusted counsellor," Paul C. Cameron.

The Old East continued in its primitive condition until 1824, when its roof was adorned by a third story nearer to the skies. At the same time the Old West was built of a corresponding size. In 1848 the length of both was extended towards the north so as to admit new Society Halls and Libraries.

The first President of the Dialectic Society, James Mebane, already mentioned as son of one of the Trustees who selected the site, was present at the ceremonies attending the removal into the new Halls, and he, with President Battle, then a Senior and President of the Society, jointly presided over the body.

The lots of the village of Chapel Hill were sold on the same 12th of October, 1793, the price for all, about \$3,000, being considered highly satisfactory. It was pressingly necessary to provide a residence for the President, or presiding Professor, and also a Steward's Hall, wherein the students of the period might obtain





their subsistence. The President's Mansion is the house on the avenue west of the New West building, which is now in the occupancy of our Professor of Physics. In that house were sheltered David Ker and Joseph Caldwell and Dr. Chapman, then it passed into the possession of Dr. Elisha Mitchell. President Caldwell, after his marriage to Mrs. Wm. Hooper in 1809, removed to the lot owned by her and bought by the University after his death. The dwelling house, which had the honor of sheltering three Presidents of the United States, as well as Presidents Caldwell and Swain, was accidently burned on Christmas Day, 1886. The old President's house contained, in the small room at the head of the stairs, the library of the institution.

The Steward's Hall was situate nearly opposite the east end of the New East building in the centre of Cameron avenue. It was there that most of the students for many years boarded at Commons, paying for the first year \$30, or \$3 per month; for the next four years \$40 per year, or \$4 per month; in 1800 rising to \$57 per year; in 1805 to \$60; in 1814, under the inflated war prices, to \$66.50; in 1818 to \$95, or \$9.50 per month; in 1839 to \$76, when the system was abandoned. It was in this building that the "balls" of the old days were given, at which tradition hath it, venerable Trustees and Faculty, even the great President himself, together with their pupils, with hair powdered and plaited into "pigtails," and legs encased in tight stockings and knees resplendent with buckles, mingled in the dance with the beauteous damsels of the day.

At the Commencement of 1881 we had a most eloquent and instructive address to the students by a classmate of President Polk, an excellent specimen of the old school, an octogenarian, Gen. E. J. Mallett, of New York, lately called to his final home. He was introduced as having received his diploma sixty-three years before that day, and it was stated that for seventy years he had never taken a glass of ardent spirits, and, therefore, that he had still the inestimable blessing of mens sana in corpore sano, and that other still greater blessing, mens sibi conscia recti. In his autobiography, printed only for his relatives—a copy being donated to our Historical Society, we find an account of the ball given in compliment to his class, when graduating. The following description of his dress is interesting.

"The style of costume," said Gen. Mallett, "and even the manners of the present generation are not, in my opinion, an improvement on a half century ago. The managers would not then admit a gentleman into a ball-room with boots, or even a frock coat; and to dance without gloves was simply vulgar. At Commencement ball (when I graduated, 1818), my coat was broadcloth of sea-green color, high velvet collar to match, swallow-tail, pockets outside with lapels, and large silver-plated buttons; white satin damask vest, showing the edge of a blue undervest; a wide opening for bosom ruffles, and no shirt collar. The neck was dressed with a layer of four or five three-cornered cravats, artistically laid, and surmounted with a cambric stock, pleated and buckled behind. My pantaloons were white canton crape, lined with pink muslin, and showed a peach-blossom tint. They were rather short, in order to display flesh-colored silk stockings, and this exposure was increased by very low cut pumps with shiny My hair was very black, very long and queued. should be taken for a lunatic or a harlequin in such costume now."

### PERSON HALL—THE OLD CHAPEL.

Having provided dormitories for sheltering the students and food for their bodily sustenance, and halls for their mental instruction, the Trustees next addressed themselves to provision for their religious and moral training. The old ante-Revolutionary Chapel of the Church of England, from which the place took its name, had gone to decay. A building under the control of the Trustees must be erected. When it was barely above the ground the treasury ran low.

An old bachelor, one of that class, which, having no immediate claims on its bounty, sometimes redeems by beneficence to public objects their failures in social duty, came to their relief. His name was Thomas Person. He had been an ardent lover of liberty, had sympathized with the Regulators in their abortive effort to shake off colonial oppressors, and had suffered from the ravages of Tryon's army. He was prominent in resisting the exactions of the British Government, which led to the war of Independence. He appeared at Newbern as a Delegate from Granville to the first Assembly held

in defiance of the royal authority in August, 1774, of which that noble patriot, John Harvey, was moderator. He was one of the thirteen Council of Safety which was the supreme Provisional Government, after the end of the Royal authority. He assisted in 1776, as a member of the Congress at Halifax, in forming our State constitution, in which was the provision requiring the establishment of the University. He was the first Brigadier-General of the District of Hillsborough. He was among the band of forty of the greatest men the State had in 1789—the first Board of Trustees of the University. As Senator from Granville he gave his vote for the new institution. He did more. He gave a sum in money very liberal for that day for the completion of the Chapel. grateful memory of his services to the State the General Assembly gave his name to a county carved out of old Orange. In gratitude for his generous gift the Trustees called the new Chapel after him, Person Hall, or as it appeared until lately on the diplomas, Aula Personica.

In this hall Faculty, students and villagers worshipped for nearly forty years. It was likewise used on commencement occasions. In it Judge Murphy delivered the first address before the two Societies in 1827, and, among other eloquent orators, Judge Gaston made his memorable speech in 1833, which has gone through three editions, notwithstanding that it contained a hope for the abolition of slavery.

Although this building is named Person Hall, yet, because of its use as a church on Sundays and for morning and evening prayers, it gained the name of "the Chapel," and when Gerrard Hall was built, the former was called, and is so known to this day by old students, "the Old Chapel."

About 1840 it was divided by partitions into four recitation rooms. It was restored to a single room in 1877 for the use of the Professor of Chemistry; the wood-work was accidentally destroyed by fire in the same year and immediately rebuilt. In 1885 chemical laboratories were added on its western side.

# GERRARD HALL

was begun in 1822. It was called after another Revolutionary hero, Major Charles Gerrard,—not a bachelor, but childless. He

was a native of Carteret, but long a resident of Edgecombe. He served in the war of the Revolution from the beginning to the end. As a soldier he was "brave, active and persevering." His character as a citizen, husband, friend and neighbor was justly admired. His rank in the army (Lieutenant) entitled him to a grant of 2,560 acres, which he located at the junction of Yellow Creek with Cumberland river, not far below the city of Nashville.

This tract, the fruit of his toil and suffering and blood, he regarded with peculiar affection, and when he bequeathed this, with some 10,000 acres additional, which he had purchased, he requested in his will that it should perpetually remain the property of the University. For thirty-five years the Trustees regarded this wish as sacred. But after losses from the neglect and perfidy of agents and the onerous charges of taxes, while the black cloud of debt hung over the institution, they concluded with sorrow to authorize its sale. Two of their ablest lawyers, William Gaston and George E. Badger, after examination reported the following resolution:

"Whereas, The Trustees of the University of North Carolina have been compelled to direct a sale of a valuable tract of land, bequeathed by Major Charles Gerrard, with the request that the same might be perpetually retained by the University; and

"Whereas, They are solicitous not only to manifest their own sense of the liberality of the donor, but as far as may be practi-


cable to perpetuate its remembrance;

"Resolved, Therefore that \$2,000, part of the purchase money of said land shall be applied to the finishing of the new Hall at the University, and that the same shall be called by the name of 'Gerrard Hall.'"

Five years afterwards this resolution was carried into effect. The spelling given is according to the original will of Major Gerrard. Judges Gaston and Badger, in reporting the foregoing resolutions, adopt the same. Afterwards the name was wrongly confounded with that of the founder of Girard College.

When this Hall was built it was intended to have a broad avenue running along the southern wall, east and west. Hence the porch on the south side of the building. The merchants of the village claimed that this would injure their trade by diverting travel from Franklin Street, and the plan was abandoned.





#### THE SOUTH BUILDING.

We will now turn to what we call the South, but what was known for many years as the "Main" Building. The European plan of a quadrangle—in old times a veritable prison in which the students were locked at night, was adopted, probably at the suggestion of Dr. Caldwell and Prof. Harris, who were educated at Princeton. Its corner-stone was laid in 1798. Its walls reached the height of a story and a half, and then remained roofless for years. Dr. Wm. Hooper, in his "Fifty Years Since," a most interesting and amusing production, tells how the students of that day packed in the East Building four in a room, built cabins in the corner of the South in order to secure greater privacy for devotion to their books, and how, "as soon as spring brought back the swallows and the leaves, they emerged from their den and chose some shady retirement, where they made a path and a promenade," like the Peripatetics of ancient Greece. He states moreover, what sounds strange to us, that holidays were sometimes given for the curious reason that the inclemency of the weather prevented study.

To finish this building was the great problem of the young University. The Trustees in despair did not hesitate to practise what was common in old times, even for building churches and denominational schools, but which the sounder morals of our day make a criminal offence, the raising of money by lotteries. Their circular of 1802 announces with sanctimonious gravity that "the interests of the University of North Carolina and of learning and science generally, are concerned in the immediate sale of these tickets." The highest prize was \$1,500, and was drawn by Gen. Lawrence Baker, of Gates. The lucky number, 1138, was announced as an important item by the metropolitan journal, the Raleigh Register.

Still the building was unfinished, and still the intellectual squatters of the University sat *sub divo*, as the Professor of Latin would say. President Caldwell mounted with heroic energy his stick-back gig and painfully traveled over the State in 1809, and again in 1811, soliciting subscriptions.

It would be interesting to contrast his journeys with those of the present day, when one can dine in Goldsboro and breakfast next morning in Asheville. The battle of New Orleans occurred on the 8th of January, 1815. The news did not reach Raleigh until the 17th of February. Prof. Charles W. Harris writes in 1795 to Dr. Caldwell, at Princeton, that his best way of reaching Chapel Hill is to buy a horse and sulky and thus travel in his own conveyance, selling the same at Chapel Hill. He is confident that the trip can be made in thirty days. His baggage was sent by water to Petersburg and thence hauled by a passing wagon. The President of the present day can, without losing a night's rest, journey luxuriously from New York to Chapel Hill in less than one day. It was doubtless the achings and weariness of the flesh of these journeys which caused Dr. Caldwell, twenty years after, to astonish the State by his eloquent and practical Carlton letters, advocating the N. C. Railroad from the Tennessee line to Beaufort. His labors for the University were successful. He secured about \$12,000, and while our people were going crazy over the naval victories of 1814, the rejoicing students moved into the completed "South Building." The corner-stone was laid the year when the great Napoleon gained the victory of the Pyramids, the year before he usurped the power of First Consul; it was finished the year when he laid down the imperial title for a petty throne in Elba, the year before his final ruin at Waterloo.

It was one of the grandest buildings in North Carolina in those days. It furnished for a third of a century halls and libraries for the two societies, which, before its erection, were forced to meet by turns in Person Hall. It should have been called in honor of the Father of the University, Gen. Davie. The omission thus to recognize his great services has been rectified by the happy thought of a gifted lady, on whom the Muses of History and Poesy have benignly breathed, Mrs. C. P. Spencer. She has named the historic tree which sheltered the venerable Commissioners, when, under its shade, they located the site of the University, and which, in spite of a century's storms and the fierce assault of the thunderbolt, still rears its majestic head above the neighboring oaks, the Davie Poplar.

#### SMITH HALL.

In 1852 the Trustees did tardy honor to the first benefactor of the University. As has been stated Governor Benjamin Smith, of Brunswick, made the first donation for the cause of higher education in North Carolina, namely, warrants for 20,000 acres of land in Tennessee. It is true they were not immediately available. They were afterwards surrendered to the Chickasaws and subsequently repurchased by the Government. It was forty years before they were made available. They were ultimately sold for \$14,000, after being broken up by the severest earthquake which has afflicted America since its discovery, into lakes and hills. The proceeds went into the endowment and were swallowed up by the great civil war, which, with more terrible voracity than a hundred earthquakes, engulfed so much of the wealth and population of the Southern country.

Beniamin Smith was a man of mark. He was in youth an aide-de-camp of Washington in the disastrous defeat of Long Island. He was conspicuous for his gallantry under Moultrie. By his fiery eloquence the militia of Brunswick volunteered to serve under him in the threatened war against France. He was fifteen times Senator from Brunswick. He was chosen Governor in 1810. His county called its capital, Smithville, in his honor. His name survives too in the bleak and stormy island at the mouth of the Cape Fear. The land he gave us, as was also the land of Gerrard, was won by valor and blood in the war for freedom. Their sacrifices were not useless. Their monuments are far more enduring than brass or marble. Centuries will come and go. Families will grow great and be extinguished. Fortunes will be made and lost. Offices will be struggled for and ambitious hopes realized, but the names of the victors will vanish as if written on the sands of the sea-shore. Reputations blazing in pulpit, or forum, and senate chamber will fade as rapidly as the meteor's path. But the blessings of the gifts of Person, Gerrard and Smith will never cease. For nearly a century they have planted learning and sound principle in the minds of men over all our Southern land. In all the ages to come their work will go on. The thousand young men, who will have their mental panoply supplied from the University armory to engage in life's varied conflicts, will hold their names in honor. As long as the University lasts they will never be forgotten, and the University will last forever!

### NEW EAST-NEW WEST.

Prior to 1850 the highest number of students was 170. After the discovery of the California gold mines, and consequent increase in the supply of the circulating medium, there ensued wonderfully prosperous times for all the world, and especially for our Southern States. The old North Carolina families who had carried their lares and penates into the fertile regions of the southwest sent back their sons to their native State for education. Students swarmed into the University. They overflowed the old buildings and were camped in little cottages all over the town from Couchtown to Craig's. In 1858 there were as many as 461, of whom 178 were from other States than North Carolina. The New East and New West were built for their accommodation, finished in 1859. The two societies aided in a considerable degree in the construction and adorument of their beautiful halls and library rooms. Probably no societies in America have superior accommodations in these respects, and I am bound to say that in my opinion no societies by intelligent and honest devotion to the purposes of their creation better deserve them. Long may they flourish.

The Gymnasium is the property of a corporation, whose stock-holders are friends and alumni of the University. It was ready for use in June, 1885.

# THE MEMORIAL HALL

was erected to the memory of David L. Swain, for thirty years President, and of all the departed good and great—Trustees, Professors, Alumni—who have aided and honored the University. It is a Memorial too of those gallant Alumni who, at the call of our State, gave up their lives in the great civil war. Though God gave them not the victory, and though we will not question the wisdom of the decision of the All-Wise, yet we must always honor

the courage, the devotion to duty, the high resolve and the willing sacrifice of our Confederate Dead.

The tablets on the walls not only show the widespread usefulness of the University, but call to mind every important epoch in our State history, from the Provisional Government of 1775 to the threshold of the present day, as appears from the following statement:

The Provisional Government of 1775–776 is illustrated by the name of Samuel Johnston, who was the President of the Provincial Council, and therefore the first acting Governor of the State; also by Archibald MacLaine, member of the Committee of Safety for Wilmington, and by Waightstill Avery, signer of the Mecklenburg Declaration of May, 1775.

The Constitution of 1776 and the War of the Revolution are called to mind by the three above named, of whom Avery was the first Attorney-General of the State and, with MacLaine, was on the committee which reported the Constitution to the body which adopted it. Besides these are Benjamin Hawkins, aide-de-camp to Washington, Wm. Richardson Davie, Wm. Lenoir, Joseph Winston and Joseph Graham, all gallant fighters for freedom, and Richard Dobbs Spaight, Sr., likewise a soldier, but more famous as a member of the Continental Congress.

The adoption of the Constitution of the United States is illustrated by Spaight and Davie, members of the Convention which adopted it; by Samuel Johnston and Benjamin Hawkins, the first two Federal Senators from North Carolina, and by Wm. Lenoir, a member of the Conventions of our State, of 1788 and 1789, one of which refused, and the other agreed to adopt it.

The threatened French war is called to mind by Davie, who was appointed a General in the army, proposed for waging it, and was one of the Commissioners to France, who succeeded in averting it.

The war of 1812 is well commemorated by Wm. Hawkins, Governor, and Duncan Cameron, one of his aids; by Joseph Graham, a General in the expedition against the Creeks; by David Stone, United States Senator from North Carolina; and Wm. Gaston, a prominent member of the House of Representatives.

The acquisition of Florida is called to mind by Wm. D. Mosely, Governor of the Territory.

The first inauguration of Internal Improvements is especially noted by Archibald D. Murphy and Rev. Dr. Joseph Caldwell, the first and most earnest advocates of canal and railroad building.

The great Eastern and Western agitation, leading to the Convention of 1835, is brought to mind by the names of Wm. Gaston, David L. Swain, John Owen, Bartlett Yancey, Duncan Cameron, Willie P. Mangum, Calvin Graves, James W. Bryan, James Mebane, Wm. B. Shepard.

The hot controversies of *Jackson's time* are peculiarly commemorated by James K. Polk, Bedford Brown, Willie P. Mangum, John Owen, Wm. B. Shepard and others.

The important period of the acquisition of Texas and the Mexican war is revived by the tablets of James K. Polk, President, Wm. A. Graham, Governor, Michael Hoke, George E. Badger, Willie P. Mangum, Bedford Brown, Daniel M. Barringer, John M. Morehead, Burton Craige, Romulus M. Saunders and the three brothers, Wm. B., Charles B. and James B. Shepard.

The internal improvement era of 1848 is called up by the names of John M. Morehead, Calvin Graves, Haywood W. Guion, William A. Graham, Waightstill Avery, Jr., Romulus M. Saunders, Jonathan Worth, John D. Hawkins, Dr. Joseph W. Hawkins.

The compromise of 1850 and the period preceding the Civil War are called to mind by Graham, Badger, Morehead, W. Avery, Jr., R. M. Saunders, Jacob Thompson, Lewis Thompson, Patrick H. Winston.

Secession and the Civil War are largely represented on the walls of the Hall by civilians as well as soldiers, prominent in council or field. Among the civilians are Thomas Ruffin, Graham, Worth, W. Avery, Jr., Gov. Henry T. Clark, Walter F. Leak, Burton Craige, Jacob Thompson.

Of the military are Gen. Bryan Grimes, Gen. James Johnston Pettigrew, Gen. George B. Anderson, Col. W. Avery, Col. Clark M. Avery, Col. Isaac E. Avery, Major Joseph A. Engelhard, Major Joseph H. Saunders, Col. John L. Bridgers, Lieut. Wm. Preston Mangum. The period of reconstruction is commemorated by Gov. Worth, Gov. Tod R. Caldwell, Lewis Thompson, Patrick H. Winston, Matthias E. Manly.

The Judicial history can be almost read from the tablets. It begins with Samuel Johnston, a Judge before the organization of the Supreme Court under the Act of 1818.

Of the Supreme Court, there are tablets to Chief Justices Leonard Henderson, Thomas Ruffin, Frederick Nash and Richmond M. Pearson, and to Associate Justices Wm. Gaston, Wm. H. Battle, Matthias E. Manly.

Of the Superior Court Judges are Archibald D. Murphy, John R. Donnell, Willie P. Mangum, Duncan Cameron, George E. Badger, David L. Swain, John M. Dick, R. M. Pearson, W. H. Battle, M. E. Manly, David F. Caldwell, James W. Osborne, Jesse G. Shepherd.

Of the Federal Courts is Judge John A. Cameron of the District Court of Florida.

There is a long list of Governors represented, beginning with Samuel Johnston, Chairman of the Provincial Council in 1775, and Governor in 1787; Richard Dobbs Spaight, Sr., 1792–'95; Wm. Richardson Davie, 1798–'99; David Stone, 1808; Wm. Hawkins, 1812; John Owen, 1828; David L. Swain, 1833–'35; Richard Dobbs Spaight, Jr., 1835; John M. Morehead, 1840–'44; Wm. A. Graham, 1844–'48; Henry T. Clark, 1861–'63; Jonathan Worth, 1866–'68; Tod R. Caldwell, 1870–'74.

The National Congress, before the adoption of the Constitution, has Richard Dobbs Spaight, Sr., Samuel Johnston, Benjamin Hawkins, Wm. R. Davie.

Senators of the United States are Samuel Johnston, Benjamin Hawkins, David Stone, Willie P. Mangum, Wm. A. Graham, George E. Badger, and M. E. Manly, the latter elected but not allowed to take his seat.

Representatives in Congress are Joseph Winston, Richard Dobbs Spaight, Sr., Alexander Mebane, David Stone, Wm. Gaston, James S. Smith, John H. Bryan, John Owen, Bartlett Yancey, R. D. Spaight, Jr., Wm. B. Shepard, Charles B. Shepard, Ebenezer Pettigrew, James K. Polk, D. M. Barringer, R. M. Saunders, Richard S. Donnell, Jacob Thompson.

Ministers to Foreign Nations are Wm. R. Davie, D. M. Barringer, R. M. Saunders.

Attorney-Generals of North Carolina are Waightstill Avery, Sr., R. M. Saunders, Bartholomew F. Moore, and Wm. A. Jenkins.

The Financial History of the State is illustrated by Thomas Ruffin and Duncan Cameron, Presidents of the leading early banks, and by Samuel Johnston, John Haywood, Jonathan Worth, State Treasurers.

The Teachers are largely represented. There are Presidents Joseph Caldwell and David L. Swain, Professors A. D. Murphy, Wm. Bingham, Wm. Hooper, Elisha Mitchell, James Phillips, J. DeB. Hooper, Ralph H. Graves, the elder, Carey D. Grandy, Wm. M. Green. Of these Wm. Hooper was afterwards President of Wake Forest College, and Bishop Green, Chancellor of the University of the South.

The great schools of the State are represented by Wm. Bingham, Wm. J. Bingham, his son, and Col. Wm. Bingham, his grandson, Alexander Wilson, Ralph H. Graves, the elder, J. DeB. Hooper, James B. Slade, the pioneer of higher female education in Georgia.

The Clergy has most able representatives: Charles Pettigrew, elected in 1795 first Bishop of the Episcopal church in North Carolina, Wm. Hooper, Wm. M. Green, Elisha Mitchell, Alexander Wilson, James Phillips, James Morrison, Francis L. Hawks, Joseph H. Saunders, the elder, Wm. Barringer.

The Medical Profession is abundantly honored by Simmons J. Baker, John B. Baker, James H. Dickson, James S. Smith, Joseph W. Hawkins, Frederick D. Lente, of New York.

The Legal Profession. It is unnecessary to repeat the names of those illustrating the legal profession. Of course the Judges and Attorney-Generals belong thereto, and most of those named as having held official stations. It may be well to name some who devoted themselves mainly to the bar. For example, B. F. Moore, Francis L. Dancy, James W. Bryan, H. W. Guion, Robert Strange, P. H. Winston, of Bertie, R. S. Donnell, Wm. F. Dancy.

Authors and Scientists are slimly, though ably represented. Lewis von Schweinitz, the great Botanist, Francis L. Hawks, Joseph Caldwell, Elisha Mitchell, David L. Swain, Wm. A. Graham, Haywood W. Guion.

Enlightened and successful men of business, but little engaged in public life, are here commemorated, viz.:

Richard Bennehan, Thomas D. Bennehan, James C. Johnston, Bryan Grimes, the elder, Richard Henry Lewis, James S. Battle, Edward J. Mallett, Wm. Peace, John D. Hawkins, Joseph H. Saunders, the younger.

There is a tablet to the *Donors of Land, embracing the site of the University*, and recently a tablet has been inserted to the memory of Miss Mary R. Smith, who donated a valuable tract of land in Chatham county for the education of students at the University.

The Hall was designed by Samuel Sloan, architect, and is one of the handsomest college buildings in the Union, its roof supported by semi-circular arches, from basement wall to basement wall, 128 feet in diameter, with not a column to break the view. Its seating capacity is 2,450, while, by making the aisles available, 4,000 people can be accommodated.

This noble building was dedicated on the 3rd of June, 1885. Rev. A. W. Mangum, D. D., Professor of Moral Philosophy, read the dedication Ode, adapted by himself. Rev. Charles Phillips, D. D., Professor Emeritus of Mathematics, offered up a most appropriate prayer, and Mr. Paul C. Cameron, Chairman of the Building Committee, in behalf of himself and associates on the committee, at the request of the Faculty, delivered an address on the University, very able and instructive. It is noticeable that Mr. Cameron had been an alumnus of the institution for sixty years. The Trustees unanimously passed a resolution of thanks to him for his personal supervision of the work, and for a timely loan of \$8,000 needed for its completion. Resolutions of thanks to Governor Thos. J. Jarvis were also unanimously adopted for his valuable services while Governor in behalf of the University, in many directions, particularly in aiding the erection of this building.

# Donations and Appropriations.

The donations of Smith, Gerrard and Person have been mentioned, as also the contributions raised by President Caldwell for completing the South Building. Prior to 1797 sundry persons subscribed the sum of \$7,648 for the purpose of erecting buildings.

In 1802 the ladies of Raleigh and Newbern contributed a pair of globes, a compass and a quadrant. The escheated land warrants granted by the State in 1789 realized to the University in 1836 about \$150,000, which was lost during the civil war by reason of the insolvency of the bank, in the stock of which the endowment was invested. Other smaller amounts were received from time to time from escheats in North Carolina, balances unclaimed in hands of executors, etc., arrearages confiscated, etc., amounting to \$134,000. This was used for current expenses, including building.

In 1875, at the solicitation of President Battle, then Secretary and Treasurer, a number of persons, principally alumni, contributed about \$18,000 for the purpose of repairing the buildings, and subsequently a like amount was contributed for building the Memorial Hall. Soon afterwards the ladies of Raleigh and of Hillsborough contributed about \$500 towards the purchase of apparatus.

## THE LAND GRANT.

In 1866 the General Assembly granted to the University 270,000 acres of land scrip with the obligation to establish at least two professorships, in which the leading object should be, as stated in the Act of Congress of July 2, 1862, without excluding other scientific and classical studies and including military tactics, to teach such branches of learning as are related to Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, in such manner as the General Assembly may prescribe, in order to promote the liberal and practical education of the industrial classes in the several pursuits and professions in life. It was further provided that the county court of each county should have the privilege to select one student, a native of the State and resident in such county, of good moral character and capacity for usefulness, and without means of his own, free of all charges for tuition and room-rent; and further that students should be admitted to this department without any requirements of previous education sufficient to enter the regular college course.

The scrip was sold in 1867 at the then market price of fifty cents per acre. Ten thousand dollars of the proceeds were used on account of the real estate of the University. The residue

was invested in North Carolina bonds, partly special tax. In 1875, as the State had, in accepting the Land Grant, bound itself to keep the fund intact, the General Assembly gave its certificate for the original principal (\$125,000), and directed the public Treasurer to pay the interest, \$7,500 a year, regularly. This act enabled the institution to be reopened in 1875. The Trustees proceeded to carry into effect the above recited clause of the Act devoting the scrip, by paying special attention to Industrial and Agricultural Chemistry, Botany, Physiology, Zoölogy, Physics, Mechanics, Surveying, etc., pains being taken to make the instruction in these branches as practical as possible, while "other scientific and classical studies" were also taught. In the place of one laboratory the University had now five, viz: Chemical (quantitative as well as qualitative), Physical, Biological, Botanical, and Mineralogical. While classes were exercised in the field for purposes of instruction in those departments and also in surveying and engineering, the small amount, \$7,500 per annum, which was not supplemented by grants from the State or other source, did not suffice for carrying on agricultural or mechanical works, or performing experiments for the benefit of the public.

In 1887 the General Assembly concluded to establish a separate Agricultural and Mechanical College at Raleigh, and ordered the \$125,000 to be delivered to that institution as soon as it should be prepared to begin the work of instruction.

In 1867 the General Assembly granted the University \$7,000 for the purpose of paying arrears due the Faculty.

In 1881 the Assembly made an appropriation of \$5,000 per annum, and in 1885 of \$15,000 per annum, for the support of the institution.

Hon. B. F. Moore, LL.D., of Raleigh, N. C., in 1878 bequeathed \$5,000 in United States five per cent. bonds, the interest of which is to be applied to paying the tuition of students, to be appointed by his heirs, or, failing such appointment, by the Trustees of the University.

In 1880 Rev. Chas. F. Deems, D.D., LL.D., established a fund to be loaned, on security, to indigent students for defraying their expenses at the University of North Carolina. Mr. W. H. Vanderbilt added to it in 1881, and the amount of the principal is now

\$13,300. The fund is of very great benefit to the poor young men of the State. Already 130 students have been assisted by it in obtaining higher education.


In 1885 Miss Mary Ruffin Smith, living near Chapel Hill, died, leaving to the University a valuable plantation in Chatham county, called Jones' Grove, the rent of which, or the interest of the proceeds if sold, is to be used in the education of such students as the Faculty may nominate. The fund is to be called the Francis Jones Smith Fund, after her brother from whom she inherited the land. The property is worth about \$14,000 or \$15,000.

The earliest donations of books to the Library were made by Judge John Williams, James Reid, of Wilmington, Gov. Wm. R. Davie, Prof. David Ker, Richard Bennehan, Abram Hodge, the Centre Benevolent Society, Francis N. W. Burton, Wm. H. Hill, Edward Jones, Joseph Gautier, Joseph B. Hill, Calvin Jones. The most considerable donation in recent years was by Mrs. Cornelia P. Spencer, about one thousand volumes from the library of her father, Rev. Dr. James Phillips.

### PLAN OF INSTRUCTION.

As soon as the corner-stone was laid, the Trustees took steps for organizing a plan of instruction in the University. The committee appointed for the purpose on the 4th of December, 1792, was an able one. The chairman was the Rev. Dr. Samuel McCorkle. Associated with him were David Stone, Alfred Moore, Samuel Ashe, Hugh Williamson and John Hay, an eminent lawyer of Fayetteville, whose name survives in Haymount. Of these McCorkle and Stone were graduates of Princeton; Williamson, a graduate and ex-professor of the University of Pennsylvania. Moore's education at Boston was interrupted by the Revolutionary War, but he was a well read and accomplished man. Hay was distinguished for his literary acquirements.

The committee reported through Dr. McCorkle on the 5th of December, 1792, that "taking into consideration the financial condition of the University, the pursuits of literature and science should be confined to the following objects: . . . The study of languages, particularly the English; the acquirement of historical knowledge,

ancient and modern; the study of the Belles-Lettres, Mathematics and Natural Philosophy; the improvement of the intellectual powers, including a rational system of Logic and Moral Philosophy; information on Botany, to which should be added a competent knowledge of the theory and practice of agriculture best suited to the climate and soil of this State; the principles of architecture."

They further recommended the purchase of apparatus for experimental Philosophy and Astronomy. In this they would include a set of globes, barometer, thermometer, microscope, telescope, quadrant, prismatic glass, electrical machine and an airpump. The committee recommended the purchase of a library, the selection of the books to be left to the Faculty.

The report is remarkable for the great prominence of scientific studies, and those of a practical nature. The scheme is almost identical with that adopted by Congress for the colleges to be formed under what is known as the Agricultural and Mechanical College Land Grant Act of 1862. Not many years elapsed, however, before classical studies were given the prominence usual in the colleges of the day.

On the 21st of December, 1793, the committee made an additional report, recommending the election of a "presiding professor," and if the receipts from tuition should justify it, one assistant. The style of the presiding officer was "Professor of Humanity." This term expressive of the widely ramifying duties of the new professor, signified "mental cultivation befitting man"—such intellectual panoply as the perfect man should possess; and as from medieval traditions still dominant in the higher institutions of learning, modern science was little known and less regarded, this mental panoply was held mainly to include languages, and grammar, and rhetoric, and poetry, and especially the study of the ancient classics.

It was carefully provided in the strongest terms that neither the professor nor his assistant should have any claim, right or preference to the Presidency of the University.

The doors of the Institution were ordered to be opened on the 15th of January, 1795, and the session was to continue for eleven months, with only one week's vacation in summer, beginning with the 10th of July.

The tuition was graded according to the studies taken. For Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, and Book-keeping, \$8 per year; for the Latin, Greek, and French Languages, English Grammar, Geography, History, and Belles-Lettres, for any or all, \$12.50; for Geometry, with its practical branches, Astronomy, Natural and Moral Philosophy, Chemistry and the principles of Agriculture, for all or any of them, \$15.

The salary of the Professor of Humanity was \$300 per annum and two-thirds of the tuition fees. If an assistant should be found necessary, he was to be paid \$200 and the other one-third of the fees.

The Professor of Humanity was elected by ballot. As showing to some extent who were prominent in educational circles in that day, the names of those nominated are given. They were Rev. Dr. Samuel McCorkle, Dr. David Ker, the Rev. George Micklejohn, Rev. Robert Archibald, Mr. John Brown, Rev. James Tate, and Andrew Martin.

The friends of Dr. McCorkle expected his election, as in their opinion he was eminently suitable by reason of his learning, experience, and enthusiasm for the new institution. But I find that General Davie was opposed to him, probably on account of his deficiency in business qualifications, and Davie's influence was potent.

Rev. David Ker was a graduate of Trinity College, Dublin. He was pastor of the Presbyterian Church in Fayetteville, and was principal of a school as well. He was a man of ability and learning, but held his office for only one year. After leaving the University he studied law, and was appointed by Jefferson at the instance of David Stone, then Senator, Judge of the Mississippi Territory, in which position he died in 1810, leaving the reputation of an able and faithful officer. He is said to have exchanged his calvinistic tenets for a mild form of infidelity.

Professor Charles W. Harris, who was soon afterwards chosen at a salary of \$200 per annum and one-third of the fees, was a native of Cabarrus, one of that excellent family which for about a century has been among the best and most intelligent in the country. He was a graduate of Princeton, and was evidently a superior man. After the resignation of Dr. Ker he was placed in charge of the

University, though not styled President. He was a young man, evidently fond of politics—was reading law while at the University. He, too, was for awhile tinctured with the prevailing Voltaireism of the day, but soon, it is said, he returned to the true faith. He seems to have enjoyed the entire confidence of the Trustees. He would doubtless have won a high position in our State if he had not been cut off by early death from pulmonary consumption. It was his sagacity which caused the election of Joseph Caldwell, his college-mate at Princeton, as his successor in the chair of mathematics, an election which gave the University what it needed—an able, energetic and wise leader.

The North Carolina Journal, of February 23rd, 1795, gives a spirited account of the opening day of the new institution, on which Providence did not smile. The Governor of the State, Richard Dobbs Spaight, accompanied by several members of the General Assembly and by the Trustees of the University, rode in state over the muddy mid-winter road. The clouds gathered and wept cold tears over the melancholy scene. The editor's imagination warms at the idea of the number who would have been present on the "much desired occasion" but for "the unfavorable state of the weather." The Governor and his cortege found for their inspection under the gloomy sky and among the giant trees, waving their leafless branches in the icy wind, an unfinished two-story building of new brick, splashed with mortar; the red hole in the ground which marked the site of the future Chapel; an unpainted President's house and steward's hall of wood; a village without houses, and with its streets overgrown with forest trees; a solitary professor and not a single student.

The coming of students was delayed by the inclement winter, and the impassible state of the roads, bridges being seldom found over streams ordinarily fordable. It was the 12th of February when the first student arrived. He was from Wilmington—his name, Hinton James. The Faculty records show that he was faithful and successful. For several years students were required to read original compositions on Saturdays, and those deemed especially meritorious were posted in an honor book. The name of Hinton James occurs often on this roll. His subjects show that he had a bias towards science, such as "The Uses of the Sun," the "Com-

merce of Britain," "The Motions of the Earth." He became afterwards a civil engineer, an assistant of Fulton in his work on our rivers. Some results of their labors may be still seen on the Cape Fear. He served his county for several terms as Senator in the General Assembly.

The next students who arrived were Alfred and Maurice Moore, sons of Judge Moore, both of whom served in the General Assembly afterwards, the former attaining the dignity of Speaker of the House; John Taylor, who became Clerk of the Superior Court of Orange; Hutchings G. Burton, who became Governor of this State; and Robert Burton, his brother, afterwards a Judge of the Superior Court. In four months there were forty-one students in attendance, and by the end of the year about one hundred, many of whom were in the preparatory department.

Mr. James mentions that no uniform dress was used in his day. In 1827 the Trustees prescribed a uniform of dark gray in summer and blue in winter, but six months afterwards changed the winter color to dark gray, so that it is probable that our boys were the first in our State to wear the dress which is so intimately associated in Southern minds with the tenderness and pathos and heroism of the Lost Cause. A solemn ordinance was adopted at the same time, which sounds strange in our ears, "The wearing of boots by the students is positively prohibited." This law was passed doubtless on account of the financial panic of 1825, but, like all sumptuary laws, was regularly circumvented. We have it on the authority of the late Judge Battle, who graduated in 1820, that the College servant, known as "Brad," owned a pair of these objectionable articles, which he rented to students for a handsome sum whenever they particularly desired to shine in the eyes of the ladies. The Seniors, during the commencement in which they graduated, were exempt from the prohibitory boot law by special exception to the ordinance, and it was not long before ambitious Juniors, Sophomores and Freshmen obtained the distinguished privilege.

### THE STEWARD.

The number of inhabitants of the village of Chapel Hill was so small that at the beginning and for many subsequent years a



steward was appointed, who gave bond and security for furnishing the students their table board. It is interesting to inspect the bill of fare of 1795, provided at \$3 per month.

For breakfast: milk or coffee and tea, or chocolate and tea, one warm roll, or loaf of bread, or corn bread and butter.

For dinner: that noble Anglo-Saxon dish, which has built more railroads, dug more canals, fought more battles, and felled more forests than any other ration in history, namely: bacon and greens. For this might be substituted beef and turnips. With these must be furnished fresh meat and fowl, for which the steward could substitute puddings and tarts.

For supper, the ration was either coffee, or tea, or milk, and bread or biscuit—not any butter.

In addition to the above, potatoes and other vegetable food usual in North Carolina were prescribed. It was expressly understood that when milk was furnished, neither coffee, nor tea, nor chocolate was required, "unless for boys who eat no milk." By an amendment to the agreement the supplying with milk was delayed until the 1st day of May, and wheat bread and biscuit until the 1st of August. For the months of January, February and March thereafter, the wheat bread was allowed to be cold, but well risen. The ration of butter was limited to one ounce, and in place of butter meat might be substituted by permission of the Faculty. For supper, milk was required from May 15th to September 15th, coffee, or tea, or chocolate afterwards. These amendments were in favor of the steward, but a great concession was won by the students, which must have tended to increase their respect for the Sabbath, namely, that during January, February and March, puddings and tarts on Sundays were obligatory.

It is noticeable that the hours for meals were at 8 o'clock a. m., 1 o'clock p. m., and supper "before or after candlelight, as the Faculty may prescribe."

If the steward had faithfully complied with the terms of this contract in spirit and letter, it is clear that all things needful for the body were supplied, but the records show that there was interminable wrangling both about the quantity and quality of the food furnished. Some of the wealthier students preferred to walk from one and a half to two miles to houses in the country for their meals,

and it was the rule for the others to supplement their rations at commons by night suppers, sometimes fairly paid for, sometimes captured in nocturnal hunts for persimmon-loving opossums, sometimes obtained by illicit raids on gardens and poultry yards. The tradition of this latter practice led a juvenile Juvenal, who was a student nearly fifty years ago—now one of the most distinguished lawyers of all our alumni—in a satirical description of Chapel Hill, to write of it as a place

"Where demand and supply, Your all-conquering law, Robs barrels and hen-roosts From Pinhook to Haw."

Old students will remember that Pinhook was a cross-roads not far from the town of Durham.

The plan of "living at commons," though necessary in the early days on account of the want of boarding houses, was finally abandoned about 1840. Long before this large numbers of the students refused to patronize the official table, and paid higher prices elsewhere. About six years afterward Steward's Hall was sold and removed from the campus.

#### THE CURRICULUM.

The experience of the first year demonstrated that a number of the students, owing to the paucity of good schools in the State, were not prepared for collegiate instruction. In December, 1796, there was established a Preparatory department, which arrangement continued for a number of years.

At the same time a curriculum, or course of studies for the University proper, was adopted. The plan called for five professorships, namely: 1. Rhetoric, and Belles-Lettres; 2. Moral and Political Philosophy, and History; 3. Natural Philosophy; 4. Mathematics; 5. Languages.

The ancient classics were made optional, the degree of Bachelor of Arts (A. B.) being obtainable without the study of either. In 1800, doubtless through the influence of Professor Caldwell, who was a strong advocate of the classics, Latin was made a required

study, and the year afterwards either French or Greek was also made essential. In 1804 Greek was made obligatory, thus inaugurating the course which dominated the University exclusively until 1875, over seventy years.

It is true a "School for the application of Science to the Arts" was inaugurated in 1854, two professorships being added, namely, that of Civil Engineering and that of applied Chemistry, in which the degree of Bachelor of Science was obtainable, but as the science students could obtain their Bachelor of Arts degree one year before that of Bachelor of Science, the course leading to the latter was in effect post-graduate, and the number pursuing it was small.

In 1875 the University was reorganized on the basis of largely increased liberty of election and much greater proportion of scientific and linguistic studies. Three courses lead to degrees: one to that of Bachelor of Arts (A. B.), including both Latin and Greek; another to that of Bachelor of Philosophy (Ph. B.), with Latin or Greek replaced by French or German; and the third replacing both the classics with French, German, and scientific studies. Besides these, students are allowed to take an optional course, leading to no degree, but in number of hours employed equivalent to the regular courses. Teachers' certificates are given to those completing a course of two years specially prescribed. The classical course is "the old curriculum," but with a larger proportion of scientific studies. The degrees of Doctor of Philosophy (Ph. D.), Master of Arts (A. M.), and Master of Science (M. S.), are conferred upon students who have completed postgraduate studies prescribed by the Faculty. The first (Ph. D.) requires the equivalent of two years' study in two departments, and the others, the equivalent of one year's study in three departments. Special certificates are given for proficiency in any department.

The classical course, corresponding to that inaugurated in 1804, has still its hold on those seeking higher education, the number of graduates for the last ten years being 110, while those who took one ancient language number 64, and those who took neither of them number 20. There is, however, even in the classical course, much greater attention paid to scientific studies and those included under the general name of English studies than formerly.


#### EARLY STRUGGLES.

The University had in its early days severe struggles for success. Its income was exceedingly small. The people of the State had little money on account of the difficulty of getting crops to market over the long and rough roads. It was almost impossible to obtain competent professors on the meagre salaries offered, and when obtained, they soon resigned their places for better compensation elsewhere. Acting President Ker left the institution after only one year's teaching; Prof. Samuel A. Holmes, after two years; Prof. W. E. Webb, one year; Prof. Charles W. Harris served one year; Judge Murphy, one year; Prof. Wm. Bingham, four years; Prof. Gillespie, two years. Dr. Joseph Caldwell was the only early professor who determined to burn his ships and make the care of the University his life work. His indomitable perseverance and dauntless pluck often saved the tottering fabric from ruin.

Not only was there a paucity of numbers, but the violence and unruliness of spirit among the few students in attendance show that there was little scholarly spirit in the land. Fights, often with knives and pistols, shown if not used, were common. Drunkenness and riots were frequent. Infidelity was the fashion of the day and invaded the Faculty as well as the student body.

Another great obstacle to success was the defective mode of government. The Trustees, although meeting seldom and engrossed in other pursuits, deemed it their duty to claim a large share in regulating the discipline, often as an appellate tribunal reversing the sentences of the Faculty. There was no one of them who could give that continuous supervision, so absolutely necessary to secure good results. Davie did a great work in inaugurating the institution, but his home was in Halifax, several days' journey from Chapel Hill. He was much engaged in an extensive law practice, and in gubernatorial and legislative duties. In 1799 he was long absent from the country on his peace mission to France, and in 1805, after a heated canvass for Congress, in which he was overwhelmed by the rising tide of Republicanism, he transferred his home to South Carolina. It was not until after many years' proof of fitness for the task that the Trustees gave to Dr. Caldwell and





his Faculty that power and responsibility which must be possessed by those in authority in every business in order to secure its proper conduct.

The catalogue of students proves clearly how slowly the institution progressed on its upward path. The first class of graduates, in 1798, contained seven; the second, nine; the third, three. In each of the years 1800, 1802, 1803 and 1805 there were only three. The sky brightened in 1808 when there were thirteen. But two years afterward an unfortunate effort was made to force students habitually to inform on one another, which caused the reduction of the senior class to one in 1811.

After this there was a constant though irregular progress; for the ten years prior to 1830 averaging about thirty, then declining until 1840. From 1840 to 1850 there was an average of over thirty. From 1850 to 1860 was the period of greatest prosperity, the number of graduates reaching ninety-six in 1858, and the highest number of matriculates being 461 in that year.

The prosperity of the University has, of course, always been dependent on the financial condition of the country. In the good times of 1821 to 1825 the attendance was nearly equal to that in Governor Swain's time of 1837 to 1850.

## DOCTOR CALDWELL.

President Caldwell was an extraordinary man. The pen portraits drawn of him by such able observers as Paul C. Cameron, Walker Anderson and others, show us a character, brave and strong, full of energy and courage; a scholar, yet a man of action; genial and kindly, yet stern in discipline; a true Christian; a courteous, high-toned gentleman. His benevolence extended beyond the sphere of his daily duties. His labors for popular education and for the building of a railroad from the Tennessee line to the Atlantic, show broad and enlightened views.

For thirty years he was the Atlas on whose shoulders our University world rested. The Trustees and Faculty learned to confide not only in his sincerity of purpose, which all admitted, but in his skill as a teacher, and wisdom as an executive officer. The students, although often smarting under the severity of his censures, carried

into their maturer life a profound respect for him—in most cases veneration and love. Among them were many leaders of the people in all the States south of the Potomac, comprising a President and Vice-President of the United States, members of the cabinet and foreign ministers, National and State Senators and Representatives, judges of the highest courts, Governors, professors in colleges and eminent teachers, great divines—in fact, men eminent in all the pursuits of life.

President Caldwell's prosperity culminated in 1824, when the financial condition of the University was so good as to allow the Trustees to send him to Europe for the purchase of scientific apparatus and books, appropriating \$6,000 for the purpose. Mr. Cameron gives a glowing account of the illumination of the buildings in honor of his return. It was only two years after this when the effects of the financial crisis of 1825 were felt in the diminution of students and of income. in such cases, the Trustees, hoping for a favorable change, postponed the reduction of the Faculty, borrowing money to meet deficiencies, incurring a debt of nearly \$40,000. It was then, and long afterwards, generally thought that all of the property of the institution was liable to be sold for its debts and the doors could be closed. This direful evil was threatened, and while the good President's heart was torn by anxiety on this account, he was attacked by a most painful and lingering disease. His sun went down in the deepest gloom, after nine years of bodily and mental suffering, on the 27th of January, 1835, at the age of sixty. A cast was taken of his head after death, and the bust in the Philanthropic Hall, executed by this means, preserves faithfully his features. He is buried at the old monument, near the Dialectic Hall, with his second wife and his stepson, Dr. William Hooper, sleeping by his side. When President Polk visited Chapel Hill at the commencement of 1847, the project for erecting a more handsome monument of marble was inaugurated. He has a nobler monument still in the county named in his honor by a grateful and admiring Legislature.

Dr. Caldwell's specialty was Mathematics. He was the author of a book on Geometry, in which, as an appendix, is a treatise on Trigonometry. He was particularly partial to Astronomy. Prof.

James L. Love has shown in a well-written monograph that he is entitled to the credit of having built the first Astronomical Observatory in America, connected with a college. It was on a knoll a few hundred yards southeast of the campus. In it were a meridian transit instrument, a zenith telescope, a refracting telescope, an astronomical clock, a sextant, a reflecting circle, and a Hadley's quadrant. Observations were made for several years, in 1832 and afterwards, by him and Professors Mitchell and Phillips. The instruments were removed after his death on account of leakage in the roof, and the abandoned building was soon destroyed by fire.

Dr. Caldwell was Professor of Mathematics and Chairman of the Faculty from 1798 to 1804, then President until 1812, teaching Mathematics at the same time; then at his earnest request he was relieved of the Presidency. His successor was Rev. Robert Hett Chapman, D. D., a good and learned man, but not successful as an executive officer. The records show that his difficulties chiefly came from the intensity of political feeling in those war times. He was a Federalist and nearly all the students were Republicans. Their hostility to him culminated in contemptuous injury to his property. Dr. Caldwell obtained a warrant against the perpetrators and forced the students to divulge the names of the guilty parties under process of law. Dr. Chapman resigned after a troublous incumbency of four years, and Dr. Caldwell was forced reluctantly to resume the headship, only to lay it down with his life.

## TENNESSEE LANDS SOLD.

The echoes of Dr. Caldwell's funeral bell had hardly died away when the dark clouds passed from the sky of the University. The escheated lands of the Revolutionary soldiers, who had died without heirs, located in West Tennessee, belonging to the University, were bringing little profit to the institution. The Secretary, Charles Manly, was sent by the Trustees, in conjunction with their agent, Samuel Dickens, to sell the whole, including the 20,000 acres donated by Governor Smith in 1790. Speculation in western lands was buoyant, purchasers were readily found, and an endowment, after paying all debts, of about \$150,000 was received. \$100,000 of this was invested in bank stocks, drawing eight per

cent. dividends, and a total income of about \$12,000 yearly, in addition to tuition receipts, was received. An assured salary could be offered to a new President, and additional professors employed.

### GOVERNOR SWAIN.

The choice of the Trustees for the Presidency fell on David L. Swain, who, at the age of thirty-four, had filled with honor the offices of Solicitor, Judge and Governor, besides being a member of the General Assembly and Convention. In his busy life he had not been able to read many books, but he had great knowledge of men, a large brain, a powerful memory, a genial temper, and kindly heart, ready wit and unfailing tact. While his person was ungainly, his manner was imposing, and he was a most effective speaker. His administrative powers were of a high order. He had the prestige of success. He had large acquaintance with North Carolina, and has left valuable monographs on various portions of its history.

The procurement of an endowment and the election of a popular ex-Governor as President, caused an immediate accession of matriculates. The number rose from 89 in 1836 to 142 in 1837, and 169 in 1838. For the first twelve years of Swain's administration the attendance averaged somewhat larger than during the best years of Caldwell's. The increase was not, however, in proportion to the increase of population, nor to the better facilities for travelling. This was the result of the extreme low prices of agricultural products during this period. Cotton was as low as five cents per pound in 1844 and 1845. After 1850, owing to rapid increase of prosperity in the South by extension of the cotton culture, combined with the increase of slaves, and to the completion of railroads, making travelling more easy, the number rapidly grew. In 1853-'54 there were 281, of whom 220 were from North Carolina; in 1857-'58 and 1858-'59 the maximum was reached; 461 in the former year, of whom 168 were from other states, and in the latter 456, of whom 178 were from beyond our borders. Then the effects of the panic of 1857, and the apprehensions of the coming war began to be felt. In 1859-'60 there were 430; in 1860-'61 only 376.

Being a Southern Institution, the sons of the University rushed

into the war with all the *élan* of Southern character. Trustees, alumni, professors, tutors, students, ceased reading of the old wars of Greece and Rome, ceased disputing about the conflicts of chemical atoms, ceased pondering over the solution of mathematical problems, threw aside their books and their studies, gave up fair hopes and scholarly leisure and life itself, without grudging the magnitude of the sacrifice. Into that great vortex were plunged the largest portion of our wealth and much of the best youth of our country; but none who died left a wider remembrance or more sincere mourners than the sons of the University, the victims of the great civil war.

The University was one of the few Southern institutions which kept its light burning throughout that dark and bitter period. The perseverance of President Swain and the elders of his coadjutors (his younger associates had gone to the war), kept that light in steady radiance until Kilpatrick's cavalry tramped through the streets of Chapel Hill.

The terrible blow to higher education by the disastrous struggle may be gathered from the simple facts that out of the 95 Freshmen who matriculated in 1857–'58 only 10, out of the 80 Freshmen of 1858–'59 only 1, and out of the 68 Freshmen of 1859–'60 only 5, remained to receive their diplomas at graduation. Taking the three classes together, 227 out of 243 lost their opportunity of higher education; nearly all of them enlisting in the army. The tablets in Memorial Hall contain 260 names of our alumni who lost their lives in the Confederate cause, beginning with Lieutenant-General, Bishop Polk, who matriculated in 1821, and ending with John R. Haughton and Frederick Nash, matriculates of 1862, James J. Phillips, of 1863, and Wm. H. C. Webb, of 1864. The researches of Dr. Stephen B. Weeks have added at least ten to the mournful list.

As the personal and official prosperity of Dr. Caldwell culminated in 1824, so that of Governor Swain culminated in 1859. He had been recently honored with the degree of LL. D., by Yale University. The commencement of that year was a most brilliant occasion. President Buchanan was present, with Secretary Thompson, and many of the most distinguished citizens of the State. The University was in a most prosperous condition. Its income

largely exceeded its expenditures. The General Assembly, as a favor, had granted it the right to subscribe for \$200,000 in the new Bank of North Carolina. Half of the stock was paid for, and it had money owing it by individuals sufficient, with a few years' savings, to pay for the other half. Thus would be secured \$16,000 a year, which, added to tuition receipts, would make a total annuity of over \$35,000.

From that year the troubles of the worthy President began—troubles, personal and official. His sense of hearing became more and more dull. The numbers of the University began to fall off as the mutterings of the coming storm were heard.

War began, and for four years the institution he loved so well was the object of the most painful solicitude. While he had private means sufficient for his own support, his professors found it difficult to live on their salaries, paid in depreciated currency. But for the liberty given them by the Trustees, to cut fuel from the University lands, they would have been compelled to resort to other pursuits in order to procure the necessities of life. At the end of 1862 a professor's salary was worth 60 barrels of flour; at the end of 1863, 20 barrels; at the end of 1864, 9 barrels; and in the spring of 1865, about 4 barrels. The number of students dwindled to 60, with a Junior class of two. By the destruction of the value of the Confederate and State treasury notes and bonds, the close of the war found the bank stock of the University worthless. The endowment was gone, but the debts remained about \$100,000, the major part incurred for the worthless stock. The salaries of the professors could not be paid out of the meagre tuition receipts of only 76 students in 1865, 107 in 1866, and 86 in 1867. The General Assembly granted \$7,000 for one year, but the relief was partial only. By the exertions of President Swain, the Agricultural College land scrip was issued to the State, and transferred to the University, but, except for a small amount, the proceeds could be made available only after long delay. A thorough reorganization was deemed advisable, and to that end the members of the Faculty placed their resignations in the hands of the Trustees. A scheme of reorganization, more in accordance with modern ideas, very much like that now prevailing, reported by a committee of Trustees, Messrs. K. P. Battle, William A.



Graham, and S. F. Phillips, through Mr. Battle, the chairman, was adopted to go into operation in the fall of 1868. At the Commencement of that year, it was apparent that the Trustees would soon lose their places in pursuance of the changes in the mode of appointing Trustees, ordained by the constitution adopted under the Reconstruction Acts of Congress. They therefore refused to accept the resignations of the Faculty, and directed the exercises to be resumed, as was accustomed after the usual vacation.

As was expected the old Trustees were removed in July, 1868, and others appointed in their stead. These at once vacated the chairs of all the members of the Faculty. President Swain claimed that, as by the new Constitution the President of the University was made ex-officio a Trustee of the same, his office was placed beyond the authority of the Board. This claim was not allowed, and he did not appeal to the courts. Soon afterwards he was so severely wounded by being thrown from his carriage by a runaway horse, that he died on the 27th of August, his last thoughts, like Caldwell's, being on the apparent ruin of an institution he loved better than his life.

### NOTES ABOUT THE PROFESSORS.

Among the coadjutors of Caldwell and Swain, the following are specially mentioned on account of the length and faithfulness of service, or because of their attaining distinction in other fields.

Professors Ker, Harris and Archibald D. Murphy, of the early professors, have already been described. Rev. Wm. Bingham, a learned and most faithful professor, founder of the Bingham School, which has been continued with eminent ability by his son, William J., and his grandsons, Col. William and Major Robert Bingham, was an emigrant from North Ireland, in the latter part of the last century.

Ethan A. Andrews, LL. D., and Denison Olmsted, LL. D., were called back to Yale College, and were the authors of valuable text-books in their respective departments of Latin and Natural Philosophy. While in North Carolina Prof. Olmsted made a report on the Geology of the State, said to be the first in point of time in the Union.

Rev. Elisha Mitchell, D. D., LL. D., a native of Connecticut, was an indefatigable and successful worker in the development of the Botany, Geology and Mineralogy of North Carolina. He was the author of many monographs on these subjects of great value, including text-books in Chemistry and Geology. After the death of Dr. Caldwell, he was Chairman of the Faculty until the arrival of Governor Swain, and frequently acted in that capacity in the absence of the latter from Chapel Hill. He had a very great brain, and if he had confined himself to a specialty, would have won world-wide distinction. He began his service for the University as Professor of Mathematics. After eight years in this department he was transferred to the chair of Chemistry, Geology and Mineralogy, but he extended his reading into all departments, including theology, and even law. The stone walls around the campus and other University lands are monuments to his memory at Chapel Hill, while he sleeps on the summit of the highest peak of the Black, named in his honor, in exploring which he lost his life on June 16th, 1858. He and Olmsted and Andrews were graduates of Yale University.

Rev. James Phillips, D. D., was a native of England. He died at the post of duty, suddenly, on the Chapel rostrum, as he was about to conduct morning prayers one day in 1867, after having faithfully served the institution for forty-one years. He was a preacher of great force and fervor, and was a profound scholar, especially in pure and applied mathematics and in theology. He was succeeded by his son, Rev. Charles Phillips, D. D., LL. D., who gained great reputation in the South, both as an instructor and preacher. After being superseded as heretofore mentioned in 1868, he served as Professor of Mathematics in Davidson College until 1875, when he was invited to resume his chair at the University, serving during that year as Chairman of the Faculty. Three years later he was forced by ill health to tender his resignation of his professorship, but consented, at the request of the Trustees, to allow his name to continue in the list of the Faculty as Professor Emeritus. He has recently removed to Birmingham, Ala.

Professor Walker Anderson embraced the profession of the law and became Chief Justice of Florida. Wm. M. Green, D. D. LL. D., was the Protestant Episcopal Bishop of Mississippi, and Chancellor of the University of the South. He was one of the last survivors of the class of President Polk (1818), dying in 1887, leaving Rev. Dr. Robert Hall Morrison the sole survivor and oldest living graduate.

Rev. Wm. Hooper, D. D., was a grandson of Wm. Hooper, a signer of the Declaration of Independence. He was at one time President of Wake Forest College, at another, Professor in the University of South Carolina. He was an elegant writer, as his published sermons and addresses show. He was engaged in the instruction of youth, male or female, for sixty-six years.

His cousin and son-in-law, John DeBerniere Hooper, was a teacher for forty-one years. He was an accurate and well-read scholar and was possessed of an elegant style as a writer.

Rev. Charles F. Deems, D. D. LL. D., born in Maryland, is Pastor of the Church of the Strangers, New York, and is the author of several able and popular religious works, viz.: "Who Was Jesus," "The Home Altar," "Weights and Wings," etc. He is a preacher of great power, and in that capacity, and as President of the American Institute of Christian Philosophy, and editor of Christian Thought, exercises a wide influence.

Wm. H. Battle, LL. D., was Judge of the Superior Court of North Carolina from 1840 to 1852 and of the Supreme Court from 1852 to 1868. He was at one time Reporter of the decisions of the Supreme Court, and reprinted with annotations volumes of old reports, which had become out of print. He was also one of the authorized compilers of the Revised Statutes, and sole compiler of Battle's Revisal.

His associate in the School of Law, Samuel Field Phillips, son of Rev. Dr. James Phillips, held under this State the positions of Reporter, of Auditor, and of Speaker of the House of Commons; and under the United States, the office of Solicitor General.

Rev. Albert M. Shipp, D. D., LL. D., after leaving the University, was President of Wofford College, and Dean of the Theological department of Vanderbilt University. He was a very able preacher.

Manuel Fetter, a native of New York, was Professor of Greek for thirty years, and then a teacher of boys for twenty years longer, making fifty years spent in teaching. He had a peculiar hold on the affections of those who studied under him at the University.

Rev. Fordyce M. Hubbard, D. D., born in Massachusetts, was master of an elegant style, and was author of various historical and literary essays of great merit. He was very learned in classical and English literature.

Nicholas M. Hentz was distinguished for his learning as an entomologist, and published an exhaustive monograph on spiders. He was the husband of the authoress, Mrs. Caroline Lee Hentz.

Rev. John Thomas Wheat, D. D., was widely known as a minister of the gospel for about sixty years. His work lay chiefly in Tennessee, Virginia, and this State.

Rev. Andrew D. Hepburn, D. D., LL. D., a native of Pennsylvania, after leaving the University became President of Davidson College, and a professor in Miami College, in Ohio. He has published an excellent text-book on Rhetoric. He is a learned and accurate scholar, especially in mental and moral philosophy.

Prof. William J. Martin, LL. D., a native of Virginia, was a meritorious officer (Colonel), of the Confederate war. He has been about twenty years Professor of Chemistry at Davidson College, and has acted as President with great acceptability.

Prof. Benjamin S. Hedrick, after leaving North Carolina, was for many years chemical expert in the Patent Office at Washington, D. C.

Of the Tutors, John M. Morehead and Wm. D. Mosely became Governors, the former of North Carolina, the latter of Florida; M. E. Manly became Judge of the Superior and Supreme Courts of the State; Anderson Mitchell and James Martin, Judges of the Superior Courts; Giles Mebane, Speaker of the Senate; Jacob Thompson attained Cabinet positions in the United States, and then the Confederate States; Gavin Hogg was a leader of the bar of the State; Lewis Williams was for years member of the House of Representatives; H. C. Jones, Reporter of the Supreme Court of the State; Edward D. Sims, Professor of the University of Georgia; James H. Otey, Protestant Episcopal Bishop of Tennessee; R. H. Graves, Principal of prominent schools for males.

### THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

The Board of Trustees, under the Constitution of 1868, was composed of one from each county, appointed by the Board of Education, with the members of the latter ex-officio Trustees of the University. The Board thus constituted elected new professors, with Rev. Solomon Pool, D. D., President. The doors of the institution were opened, and in 1869–'70 a catalogue was published, showing a list of 35 students. As the attendance was not satisfactory, and there was no endowment for the support of the Faculty, the Trustees in 1872 ordered the exercises to be indefinitely suspended.

In 1873 a Constitutional Amendment was adopted by a vote of the people, giving the management of the University to the General Assembly. That body in 1874 provided for the election of 64 Trustees by joint ballot of the Senators and Representatives, to serve for eight years, but so classified that one-fourth go out of office every two years. In 1877 the number was increased to 72, and in 1884 to 80. Ten constitute a quorum. In order still further to remedy the difficulties resulting from the government being vested in so numerous a body of men, scattered over the State, an Executive Committee of seven is annually appointed by the Board, who have all powers not prohibited. Thus are secured such promptness and continuity of management as are necessary to success in all matters of business.

The new Trustees lost no time in meeting for the purpose of reopening the institution. Governor Tod R. Caldwell was requested to preside, but he refused to do so, alleging that the Board had not been appointed in accordance with the Constitution. Dr. Pool, who had charge of the University buildings, likewise declined to surrender possession of the same.

Hon. Alexander McIver, Superintendent of Public Education, with whom had been deposited for safe keeping the University seal and record books of the University, consented to become defendant in a friendly suit for the purpose of deciding the question. The Supreme Court gave their decision in favor of the new Board, and on May 4th, 1875, they met at the Executive office, Governor Curtis H. Brogden presiding, and Kemp P. Battle,

being appointed Secretary. A committee, consisting of Messrs. Kemp P. Battle, John Manning, James A. Graham, J. J. Davis and Rev. C. B. Hassell, on motion of Mr. P. C. Cameron was appointed to report a scheme of reorganization at an adjourned meeting next day. The committee accordingly submitted a scheme embracing six colleges or departments. The plan was adopted, and at an adjourned meeting on the 16th of June ensuing an amendment was adopted, providing for an adjunct professorship of Latin and German. The following Professors were chosen: Rev. Charles Phillips, D. D., LL. D., Professor of Mathematics; J. DeBerniere Hooper, A. M., Professor of Greek and French; Rev. Adolphus W. Mangum, A. M., Professor of Moral Philosophy and English Literature; Alexander Fletcher Redd, Professor of Physics and Chemistry; Ralph H. Graves, B. Sc., C. & M. E., Professor of Engineering; John Kimberly, A. M., Professor of Agriculture; George Tayloe Winston, Adjunct Professor of Latin and German. Of these Dr. Phillips and Professors Hooper and Kimberly had been members of the Faculty in former times; Messrs. Graves and Winston had been students of the University, but had completed their education elsewhere, the latter at the United States Naval Academy and Cornell University, the former at the University of Virginia; Prof. Mangum was a graduate of Randolph-Macon College, and Prof. Redd was an alumnus of the Virginia Military Institute. Dr. Phillips was, by authority of the Board of Trustees, elected by the Faculty Chairman.

As has already been stated, money was contributed, mainly by alumni, for repairs which were most judiciously made under the personal supervision of Mr. P. C. Cameron. By aid of these contributions and the interest on the Land Grant, which the General Assembly at the request of the Trustees ordered to be paid, the doors were opened on the 6th of September, 1875, the attendance in the first year reaching 69; in the second, 112; and in the third, 160. In the following week, on the 15th, were had the formal ceremonies of the reopening. A procession of students, citizens of the village, visitors, Alumni, Faculty, and Trustees of the University, and the chaplain and orators of the day marched from the South Building into Gerrard Hall. Addresses were delivered by Governor Curtis H. Brogden, President ex-officio of the

Board of Trustees, and by Hon. William H. Battle, a graduate of 1820, at the request of the Faculty. A hymn composed by Mrs. C. P. Spencer for the occasion was sung. A most feeling prayer was offered by Rev. Dr. Wm. Hooper, who had graduated sixty-eight years before.

### IMPROVEMENTS SINCE THE REOPENING.

The improvements in the University, since the reopening in 1875, have been marked, as the following statement will show. When we consider the poverty of the State, and the frequent failures in crops, they have been very gratifying.

The numbers have for the last six years averaged 207, nearly all being from North Carolina. This is more than was had from the opening in 1795 to the year 1852. In 1853–'54 the number from this State was only 220, and in 1854–'55, only 230. There was then however a considerable attendance from other states, especially those south of us, on account of their unparalleled prosperity, and their having been settled by North Carolina families. In addition to the impoverishment and sundering of old ties caused by the long war, and the closing of this University for so many years, these states have well endowed and well manned institutions which are all free, except in the case of the University of South Carolina, which was once free, but now charges \$40 per annum for tuition.

The prosperity of our University has stimulated the other colleges of our State, so that the departure from our borders of young men for higher education, other than those pursuing specialties, has almost ceased. Up to the reopening in 1875, not a dollar of annual appropriation had ever been secured from the State. The \$7,500 interest on the Land Grant fund cannot properly be considered an appropriation, as it is merely interest paid on an honest obligation, and this has been ordered to be transferred to the Agricultural and Mechanical College at Raleigh. Independently of this, the University has by the Act of 1881 \$5,000, and by the Act of 1885 \$15,000, making a regular income of \$20,000 from the State. This amount with the receipts from tuition and interest on endowments, enables the University to employ a teaching force

substantially equal to that had in its palmiest days. In 1860, counting the President, there were eleven professors and five assistants; in 1888, eleven professors and three assistants.

The University has kept step with the general educational tendency of the age in the direction of more practical and scientific studies, while holding high its classical and mathematical standard. A full professorship is given to the English language and literature. Quantitative and qualitative analysis in chemistry are provided for in ample laboratories, built as an extension to Person Hall, instead of the ill-ventilated and darkened basement under Smith Hall. A separate laboratory is assigned for work in mineralogy and another large one for work in botany, and dissection and study of animals. Graduates in Chemistry of this University, since 1875, are at the head of the State Experiment and Fertilizer Control Station, and of various other enterprises requiring such scientific knowledge. Funds have been provided for the purchase of large additions to the apparatus and appliances for teaching in the departments of Physics, Chemistry and Natural History, including such instruments and models as are needed to illustrate the most recent discoveries in electricity, &c. A large collection has been made of mineralogical specimens, as well as woods and medicinal plants, and the specimens, previously owned by the University, have been relabelled in accordance with modern scientific nomenclature and properly displayed. A nearly complete collection of the skins of birds of the State and a very large collection of insects and other animals have been made.

In the department of Physics and Engineering, there is a great progress in the acquisition of apparatus, &c., needed for instruction. Besides purchases made from time to time the Trustees have recently appropriated \$1,500 for this department alone, and the physical laboratory will soon be supplied with a dynamo and other instruments, requisite for showing experimentally the most recent discoveries. Much practical work is required in the use of surveying and engineering instruments, and in projection drawing.

In Pure Mathematics constant drilling is had in the lower classes, and the higher, being elective, and only entered by the best students, are carried much further than was possible in miscellaneous classes.

The other departments are not behind the scientific in the best methods and appliances of teaching. In that of Political Economy and Constitutional Law much attention is given to the history of the great questions involved, and an elective course in the Constitutional History of England has been added. In Mental and Moral Philosophy there is increased study of Christian Evidences, and an elective course in the History of Philosophy and Natural Theology is given.

In the Classics it is aimed to make the students able to read at sight the standard authors, and to appreciate the beauties of thought and language. They are constantly practised in Greek and Latin Composition, and made to study the Histories of Greece and Rome. A course in Comparative Philology is given in these departments.

In the department of English much attention is paid to the History of English Literature, to the criticism of the best authors at various epochs, to the beauties of style and language, and to the formation of good style. Historical Grammar is carefully studied. Much parallel reading is required. There is an elective class in Anglo-Saxon, in addition to the regular work of the department.

French and German are taught by a full professor, a native of a neighboring State, who has spent years in both France and Germany, and has the proper pronunciation of those languages and thorough acquaintance with their idioms. Attention is paid to the history and development of the literature of those countries.

In all these departments, post-graduate courses are provided, as has been stated, giving the students advanced instruction of a high order. This is done in addition to the regular work of the professors, and there is no charge for tuition.

Besides the above, the President and professors offer for three months in each year during the session, special instruction in their departments, suitable to the teachers of the State. For this no tuition is charged. Among the studies thus offered is the Science and Art of Teaching, thereby giving the advantages of the Summer Normal Schools, which have been abolished.

Shorter courses of study, requiring only two years for their completion, are offered to those who have not time nor money nor

the previous preparation to enable them to complete one of the full four-year courses. One of these courses is arranged for the education of teachers, another for physicians and pharmacists, a third for the training of business men, merchants, farmers, manufacturers, mechanics, &c. And provision is made for those wishing to pursue special studies in Chemistry, Natural History, &c.

The Law School has been placed on a much more satisfactory basis, the professor in charge devoting nearly all his time to instruction.

Arrangements have been made for the addition to the University, beginning at the opening of the next fall term, of a well equipped and well manned Medical and Pharmaceutical department, in which students can get thorough preliminary training in all studies pertaining to those professions.

The literary and scientific activity of the students is quickened by various societies, conducted jointly by Faculty and students.

The Elisha Mitchell Society is for the promotion of scientific research. Other scientific workers in the State are members. A Journal is published, which is exchanged for the publications of more than two hundred similar learned bodies. Thus a valuable scientific library is being collected.

Another society is the Shakspere Club, for the critical study of Shakspere and other dramatists. Carefully prepared papers are read, and addresses made. The nucleus of a Shakspere library is formed.

The North Carolina Historical Society is engaged in the study of our State history, and the collection of documents and materials for its illustration. Public meetings are sometimes held for this, as well as the other societies, and papers read.

The Seminary of Literature and Philology has for its object promotion of research along special lines of literary work. The professors, besides guiding and assisting in the regular work, present, from time to time the results of their own labors. The character of the topics may be gathered from the following list of subjects on the programme: 1. Lyric Poetry; 2. The Historians; 3. Sacred Literature; 4. Words; 5. The Drama; 6. The Supernatural in Literature; 7. The Alphabet; 8. Epic Poetry.

The spirit and intelligence shown by the students in these socie-

ties are very encouraging, and the professors are stimulated to increased ardor in their respective specialties.

The University is entitled to the distinction of having inaugurated the plan of Summer Normal Schools. The first was held in the University buildings in June and July, 1877, and was wonderfully successful in arousing enthusiasm and introducing the best methods of teaching into the State. The President and several of the professors gave a large portion of their vacations to the work without pecuniary compensation. This Normal School was the parent of those held in various parts of North Carolina, and was imitated in Virginia, South Carolina, and nearly every Southern State. Although now discontinued in North Carolina, their influence will be felt in the Teachers' Institutes recently inaugurated by Act of Assembly, under the management of two of our recent graduates.

The erection of the addition to Person Hall, the Gymnasium and the Memorial Hall, has been since the re-opening in 1875. These cost nearly \$50,000, while repairs and changes in the old buildings have been made, costing nearly \$20,000 more. The greater portion of this money (about \$70,000) has been contributed by the alumni and friends of the institution.

The branch railroad to Chapel Hill was secured chiefly by the exertions of Governor Jarvis, Col. A. B. Andrews, Gen. R. H. Hoke, and the officers of the University.

In addition to the amount above stated, as donated for buildings and repairs, Rev. Dr. C. F. Deems has provided a fund, to which the late Mr. W. H. Vanderbilt made a handsome addition, for aiding students by loans, amounting to over \$13,000; the late B. F. Moore, \$5,000; and the late Mary R. Smith, a plantation worth about \$15,000, for paying the tuition of needy students; and Mrs. Cornelia P. Spencer made an addition to the library of about 1,000 volumes,—in all nearly \$50,000. It may be safely estimated that over \$75,000 have been donated to the University since its re-opening in 1875, besides the procurement of the annual appropriation of \$20,000. When we consider the exceedingly distressed financial condition of our people, this statement shows that the friends of the institution have not been sleeping.

The improvement in the religious condition of the student body


is shown by the great interest taken in the work of the Young Men's Christian Association. Its meetings are regularly attended and conducted with true devotional spirit and fervor. The members have recently fitted up, with neatness and taste, their Hall on the first floor of the South Building, and the room adjoining it on the west, the latter as a reading-room. The Association has a great and increasing influence for good among the students.

#### LIBRARIES.

There are three libraries, one belonging to the University, and one to each of the Literary Societies, each containing about 8,000 volumes. These by recent action have been combined, and thus a most valuable collection of over 20,000 volumes is accessible to the students every day in the week except Sundays, in the spacious, well lighted, and well ventilated room, called Smith Hall. Adjoining the library is a well equipped reading-room.

#### LITERARY SOCIETIES.

There are only two Literary Societies of the students in the University, the Dialectic and Philanthropic. Both were established in 1795, the former having a brief priority in time. The latter was for a few months called the Concord Society. The motto of the former is "Love of Virtue and Science," and its color is blue, the emblem of truth. The motto of the latter is "Virtue, Liberty, and Science," and its color is white, the emblem of purity. As has been said. James Mebane was the first President of the Dialectic Society. Richard Eagles, whose name survives in Eagles' Island, opposite Wilmington, was the first President of the Philanthropic Society. The students, until a few years ago, selected one or the other from social or other personal motives. Lately there has grown up the custom, not founded on any law, that those from the western counties shall join the Dialectic, and those from the eastern counties, the Philanthropic Society. The dividing line is not fixed, but well enough understood to prevent disputes. Some of the central counties are considered debatable territory but etiquette forbids active effort to influence the decisions of those coming from this territory.





Occasionally, too, for special reasons, the rule is broken and occasions no permanent ill-feeling. The relative numbers vary from year to year, as the larger wave of students happens to flow from the East or the West.


The exercises of the Societies consist in debating, declamation, and English composition. The meetings are secret. They are conducted, as a rule, with great decorum, and the members perform their duties with much diligence and spirit. Many alumni, who have achieved great success in life, have borne testimony to the advantages they derived from practice in speaking and writing, and in the conduct of deliberative assemblies.

The Societies, alternately, select a distinguished man to deliver an oration before the University on the day preceding the annual Commencement day. This usage has existed since 1826. It is suspended for the present year, owing to the Centennial Celebration, the orators being chosen by a committee of the Alumni Association and by the Faculty.

Three Representatives, chosen after competition by judges appointed by the Faculty, deliver original speeches during Commencement week. The Marshals must likewise be members of the Societies.

No other societies are allowed except with the permission of the Trustees. Such permission has been granted to a number of "Greek letter fraternities."

The Dialectic and Philanthropic Societies have each very handsome halls. They each have about twenty oil portraits of their eminent members, life size. These are the best collections in the State, perhaps not excelled in the South. Some of these are donations, the majority have been painted at the expense of the Societies.

#### NOTE.

For the following Catalogue the University is chiefly indebted to Mrs. Cornelia P. Spencer, of Chapel Hill, who has been employed upon it for several years, giving much time and pains to the work. The difficulties have been such as only compilers of similar catalogues can appreciate.

It contains the names of all matriculates, so far as known, from 1795 to 1889 inclusive. Being the first of its kind to be issued by this University, it must contain many errors, and is now published in order that one more perfect may be made possible. It is earnestly requested that corrections and additions of any kind be sent to President Battle, at Chapel Hill. Valuable material has already been furnished by Dr. S. B. Weeks.

The plan of the Catalogue explains itself. Immediately after each name is placed the town or county from which the student came to the University; then his degree, with the year of graduation, or, in the case of non-graduates, the years of entrance and departure; following this, the occupation, etc.; then the latest known address, if different from that first given. Where no State is named, North Carolina is understood, except in such cases as plainly imply what State is meant.


