The details contained in the attached communication have been checked and are correct. Enquiries made in competent local circles reveal nothing of a detrimental nature to Mr. REDLINGER'S character. Nothing is known by this office to his detriment.

He can be regarded as a trustworthy person, anti-Nazi in his outlook on life, whose sole desire at the moment is to proceed to Burma where he will be able to earn enough to keep him in daily bread. He is at present unemployed.

The company now wish to employ Mr. Redlinger in Rangoon and the Burma Government have authorised me to issue the necessary visa, provided I am absolutely certain as to his trustworthiness and bona flues.

Can you assist me please in establishing Mr. Realinger's trustworthiness and bona fixes? I have seen him several times and have formed a favourable opinion.
