Brady Bill 2

"SLAM" Marshall may have had it right after all. In the fight for our gun rights only one in four "soldiers" shoots back, the rest take cover and hope the danger will pass.

Unfortunately, it's becoming clear that the danger will not pass and those who don't join the fight

will end up prisoners of a repressive regime that bears little resemblance to the United States of America we hold dear.

Case in point: Brady 2, Handgun Control Inc.'s (HCI) new bill designed to further tighten the vise of

oppression on gun owners. Here's what the Brady Bunch have in store for us:

Anyone owning 20 or more firearms or more than 1,000 rounds of ammunition or primers would be required to get an "arsenal" license. This would involve being fingerprinted and obtaining permission of local zoning authorities, plus a \$300 tax every three years. It would also subject any arsenal holder to unannounced, warrantless home "inspections" up to three times a year.

"Firearm," by HCI's definition, includes magazines and "any part of the action," (even pins, springs and screws) so nearly every firearms owner would possess an "arsenal" under their definition. Even if you dodge the arsenal provision, owners of even one handgun would be required to obtain a state handgun license. This would require passing a state-controlled safety course, the

fee for which has no cap and can be set by state legislators.

Brady 2 would raise the current 11% tax on firearms and ammunition to 30% on handguns and 50% on ammunition, and divert the revenues to help pick up the tab for Clinton's socialized medicine.

It would become a federal crime to buy more than one handgun a month.

A permanent seven-day waiting period would be imposed on all handgun transfers, renouncing the compromise made to enact Brady 1.

More persons

would be banned from owning any gun. If you're under 21 you could not own *any* handgun or handgun ammunition. If you're under 16 you could not own a firearm of any type.

All magazines of greater than six round capacity would be outlawed.

So-called "Saturday Night Specials," as defined by HCI, would also be outlawed.

"To me, the only reason for guns in civilian hands is for sporting purposes," according to Sarah Brady herself. Her vision is shared by 216 members of the House of Representatives and 56 senators who voted to start the ball rolling by passing the "assault" weapon ban.

It's past time for those gun owners who have been derelict in their duties to stop cowering and start fighting for the common cause. Marshall has been proven wrong on the battlefield; let's make sure he's also wrong in the fight for our rights. **

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H.R. 3128 to abolish the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice. DoD's general counsel responded to a guery by Rep. Ron Dellums with a note that "The Department of Defense does not object to this legislation..." Maloney (rhymes with ...) then issued a letter to her congressional colleagues headlined: DoD Urges Termination Of Civilian Marksmanship Program. The semantic leap from "does not object to" to "urges" will serve to illustrate the ethical level of those trying to end the DCM program. Maloney's accomplices? She rounded up the usual suspects: Handgun Control Inc., National Coalition to Stop Gun Violence. The New York Times and The Washington Post, plus the National Taxpayers Union and Citizens Against Government

Waste. This bill will be coming up: Contact your representative.

HOT LOADS

Don't try this at home: Researchers at Sandia Labs in Albuquerque, New Mexico, have driven a one-gram projectile at some 52,800 feet per second, believed to be a world record for any projectile larger than a speck of dust. This hyper velocity was achieved using a unique tandem-barrel gun: In the first barrel, with a bore of 3.5 inches, a powder charge drives a heavy synthetic piston, compressing hydrogen gas ahead of it.

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bore, where it drives a second synthetic piston. called a "pillow," through a section of the bore under vacuum to impact with a titanium plate, driving the plate forward at nearly the impact velocity. The "pillow" gives enough to compress slightly, so when it rebounds, that eneray is also added to the titanium projectile. It'll probably take a while for the slow-and-heavy vs. fastand-light aficionados and the wound ballistics wonks to sort out the implications of this development.

PYONGYANG-WACO

A story in the Bangkok Post would lead us to believe that some of the entrenched tyrants of the Orient take lessons from the would-be tyrants of the West: North Korea burned more than a dozen army officers to death in a public "ceremony" that

was attended by some 1,000 onlookers, including the families of the soon-to-be-deceased. Accused of plotting to overthrow Kim II-Sung and his son Jong-II, the men were doused with gasoline and then torched, while the crowd threw rocks and chanted "traitors." Well, they probably deserved it. After all, plotting to overthrow your local dictator does rank right up there with suspicion of failure to pay the \$200 tax on Title II weapons.

NORTH KOREAN TUNNEL RATS


The Army may use sophisticated sound technology to locate, map, analyze and ultimately seal off a suspected network of 23 tunnels North Korea has burrowed under the DMZ. Four tun-

nels have been discovered since 1974, complete with reinforced concrete construction, electric power, weapons storage, sleeping areas and a narrow-gauge railway with carts. The fourth tunnel was discovered by U.S. and South Korean forces in 1990 in the eastern sector of the DMZ, evidence that North Korea has dug invasion tunnels all along the front line.

Robert Rich of the U.S.-Korea Economic Institute was quoted in *Defense News* as saying U.S. forces used seismic technology shortly after the Korean War to monitor tunneling efforts by the North. Typical North Korean tunnels, he said, are dug wide enough for a jeep or small armored personnel carrier, or a four-abreast column of troops.

If undertaken, current acoustic technology would hopefully determine whether missiles, artillery, vehicles or other ordnance is stockpiled inside. The Army could then use helicopter-delivered ground penetrators to burrow into targeted tunnels and release chemicals or other access-denial agents.

TITAN'S KNIFE

In addition to SOG Specialty's new SEAL knife, Mission Knives of San Juan Capistrano, California recently announced the Navy has let a contract for them to supply a state-of-the art "beta titanium" bladed diver's knife — designated the MPK (multi-purpose knife). This titanium blade is treated to 44-46 on the Rockwell C scale, to provide a very lightweight, high tensile strength, non-magnetic, corrosion-resistant,

multi-function cutting tool.

The blade (see photo) is 7.125 inches long and .25-inch thick, with a non-reflective black finish. It features two inches of rope-cutting serrations at the base of the edge. The one-piece, injection molded 4.75-inch handle is made of textured, grooved Kevlar fiber in a black Hytrel base, to provide a fire-resistant, dielectric gripping surface.


The knife comes with an ambidextrous Kevlar/ Hytrel sheath suitable for field, scuba and jump operations. Field sharpening is accomplished with an Eze-Lap Model M diamond hone. Testing by SEAL units indicates the MPK is equal or superior to many of the conventional ferrous knives currently in use.

The Navy has purchased knives for issue to SEAL Teams 1, 3 and 5, Seal Delivery Vehicle Team Unit 1 and Naval Special Warfare Group 1. Representatives of Mission Knives state the titanium MPK will be offered for commercial sale once Navy contracts are completed. For information contact Mission Knives Inc., Dept. 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

Fighting The Crime Bill

ith passage of the Brady Bill, the Feinstein Amendment to the Crime Bill (at this writing, the Crime Bill has yet to be reconciled by the House-Senate conference committee) and a full-court press by anti-gunners to strip Americans of their Amendment Second rights, gun owners are beginning to wonder where to turn.

This is normal: We gun owners are historically a self-sufficient lot — not a group of whiners dependent on Big Brother to protect us and show us how to live. Therefore, forming a coalition against a common foe is somewhat alien to us.

But the strategy for an effective fight against antigun forces *is* to band together, so the whole becomes greater than the sum of our parts. This banding together is necessary on both the local and national level.

At the national level, join the NRA. You may have some burr under your saddle about the NRA for some action in the past. Maybe some snot-nosed NRA lobbyist rubbed you the wrong way when he did not accept your "solution" to a problem, and did not take the time to explain that the idea had been unsuccessfully tried before. Whatever. In any case, the NRA is the "Big Guy" and the only really effective gun on Capitol Hill.

Pick up the phone and call 800-672-3888. You will get a voice mailbox. Follow the instructions and you can join with a credit card. On 1 July 1994 the dues were raised from \$25 to \$35 per year. Before you grumble about "someone raising prices," you should know that this was proposed to all NRA members via their magazines The American Hunter and The American Rifleman. Members were asked to give the Washington office feedback, voting 96.1% in favor of raising their dues.

NRA membership is critically important to anyone interested in preserving their Second Amendment rights. The more members the NRA has, the more money it has - and we all know Washington lobbying is expensive. The more people the NRA has writing and calling members of Congress, the better chance they have of defending our rights. And don't just send in your dues, but drop a few bucks in every time they ask for more contributions. None of us like to get requests for money, but if everyone sent in the price of a box of cartridges each time, we would be in tall cotton.

Buy your gun stuff from suppliers who participate in the "NRA Round-Up" where invoices are rounded up to the next full dollar, and the change sent to the NRA Institute for Legislative Action (ILA). It may sound like chicken feed, but Midway (5875 D W. Van Horn Tavern Road, Columbia, MO 65203; phone: 800-243-3220) collected and sent to the NRA ILA more than \$150,000 in both 1992 and in 1993 through this program. If your favorite supplier or gun shop does not participate, ask them to. Mike Dillon,

we appear to be split in our opinions, legislators will not listen to us and the antis will publicly showcase this as our ineffectiveness. God knows that a strong-willed group like gun owners can be argumentative, but keep these discussions in the "family," not in public. NRA/ILA has a grassroots group, the Second Amendment Foundation



among many others, (Dillon Precision Products, 7442 E. Butherus Drive, Scottsdale, AZ 85260-2415; phone: 800-223-4570) also does this.

Next, join or organize a grassroots effort. There are plenty of groups that sit around talking to each other about how our rights are being eroded. Join or form a group committed to acting to preserve our rights.

The most effective strategy the antis have is divide and conquer. When

Effective Aggressiveness

by Col. David Hackworth

he following monograph was extracted from the Vietnam Primer, co-authored at the height of the war by then Lt. Col. David H. Hackworth.

The record of U.S. Army operations in South Vietnam demonstrates one hard fact: A companysize attack upon an enemy fortified base camp or semi-fortified village, held in equal strength by NVA or VC Main Force with a determination to defend, and not subjected to intense artillery and/or air strikes beforehand. meant payment of a high price by the attacker. The result of such an attempt was either the ultimate withdrawal by the attacking force - too often after excessive loss - or a belated reinforcement and a more prolonged involvement than anticipated or was judicious.

Yet this tactic seemed to have had fatal allure for the average young U.S. rifle company commander. It was tried many times and just as often failed. The enemy deliberately tried to make his position look weak, and hence attractive. One ruse was to leave frontal bunkers unmanned, though the approach of the attacker was known. Initial resistance would be offered by a squad minus, while within the complex a company plus was preparing to maneuver. The effort was subtly directed toward getting the

attack snarled in a maze of fortifications not visible to the eye, whence extrication grew ever more difficult and advance became extremely costly.


The direct consequence for the rifle company that impulsively engaged a position well beyond its strength, was, at least 50% of the time: (1) its battle order, or fighting formation, was weakened through immediate losses in its frontal element; (2) it had to concentrate on extracting its casualties under fire: (3) its direct pressure against the enemy was diminished and disorganized. In short, impulsiveness ran counter to effective aggressiveness.

Upon contacting any such fortified position, where direct enemy fire by automatic weapons supplied proof of the intention to defend, the rifle platoon or company should immediately dispose to keep its strength and numbers (weapon power and men) latent and undercover to the full limit permitted by the environment. It should perhaps even simulate a withdrawal, continue desultory fire from its forward weapons, or seek the enemy rear when favored by terrain, weather, and light. The full-length assault is to be avoided until the heavy fires of supporting arms can be brought in. The careful, fire-covered probe is the called-for expedient.

The headlong rush, like the attempt at envelopment before any attempt has been made to feel out resistance, should absolutely be avoided.

Where environment and weather permit such intervention, artillery fires should concentrate on the rear, while tactical air targets the enemy camp. Otherwise the effect of bombardment is likely to result in the premature aborting of the position. Following bombardment, the direct frontal assault by the single rifle company should not be pressed unless reinforcement is already on its way, within 20-30 minutes of closing, in strength suffivantage of natural cover and concealment, and avenues of approach. Gradual advance is the one safeguard against full exposure and undue loss, as in the taking of a city. Holding at least one platoon in reserve is insurance against enemy attack on the flank or rear.

When casualties occur in the initial encounter with the enemy in fixed positions, the extraction of WIAs by forward skirmishers should not be more than the distance required to give them the nearest protection from enemy fire. This position should include a relatively secure approach for the aid man. Extraction of the dead is

CLINTON DEATH CLOCK

Last month we reported that the former wife of Arkansas State Trooper Danny Ferguson was found dead of "self inflicted" gunshot wounds (the most recent reports are that it was with a .380 round to the temple. not a shotgun as originally reported). —Danny Casalero, an investigative reporter who was also working on the Arkansas drug and gunrunning operations, was found murdered in a bathtub in Washington, D.C.

—Stanley Heard and Steve Dickson, both advisers on health care reform, died in a plane crash at Washington's Dulles Airport 10 September 1993.

—Ed Wiley, fund raiser for the Clinton campaign, was found dead of apparent suicide in November 1993, in Virginia.


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
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




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-Victor Riser, finance co-chairman of the Clinton for President campaign. was killed in a plane crash in July 1992.

- Paul Tully, political director of the Democratic National Committee, died from unknown causes in his Little Rock hotel room in September 1992.

-David Hale, who plead guilty to defrauding the government in a \$300,000 SBA loan to James McDougal's wife (of Whitewater fame) and who

said he was pressured into it by Clinton, still lives. Perhaps that's because he's now in a witness protection program.

The tragic Ranger raid in Somalia surged back into public view with hearings by the Senate Armed Committee. Services

During the White House ceremony to present the posthumous Medals of Honor to families of the slain heroes of Mogadishu, our fearless CinC was reproached by one of the fathers, a veteran himself, who told Clinton, "My son died for nothing. And you, sir, are not fit to be commander in chief." president visibly reeled, then resumed smiling and talking to other guests. The incident was not widely reported in the U.S. press. 🕱

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
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
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
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WE THE SHEEPLE



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

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I WAS THERE

Golan Fights

fter leaving the Army I travelled to Israel and worked on a banana farm while planning a kayak trip down the Nile River. On 6 October 1973 I had gone through two barbed wire obstacles and a minefield to go fishing on the Yarmuk River - the border between Israel and Jordan below the Golan Heights — when Israel was attacked on two fronts.

After I returned from fishing, a reserve officer came to see me. He asked if I would be willing to help out. "Most of our young men are gone. Can you tell other foreigners what our situation is?" he asked.

"OK. What is our situation?"

"The Arabs attacked last night in the Golan and Sinai but it looks like it will be another short war. We need someone here to take care of bomb shelters and maybe set up trenches. It would help if you can do that with our men."

The first day I inspected bomb shelters and worked connecting outposts and machine gun emplacements with slit trenches. By evening we could hear the war. At night the entire Jordan valley was blacked out and we could see flashes of the battles and hear the roar of guns.

The next day a woman asked if I'd show her the difference between

Arab aircraft and ours. I smoothed a place in the dust and drew the boxey looking MiGs the Syrians were flying and silhouettes of Phantoms and Mirages. "So, those would be MiGs up there then?" she asked.

"No, they couldn't be. Whoa, they sure are!" Seconds later an air raid siren went off and people ran for the bomb shelters I'd inspected and repaired earlier. Before they were out of sight, two MiGs turned east with a squadron of Israeli fighters after them. One was destroyed fairly close to us.

That afternoon the highest ranking district officer asked to see me. He told me things weren't going to be settled as quickly as they were in '67. "You were in the American Army?" I told him I was. "Will you help us? We need drivers and men who can use weapons and maps. We will soon be receiving weapons from America and will also need help in training our men."

"Of course I'll help."

"I want you to know that since you're not Jewish you cannot be a member of the Israeli Defense Forces. If you get captured you will be treated as a mercenary." He sat forward during the entire conversation looking more like a Danish businessman than an Israeli officer asking a man to risk his life.

It was soon apparent from radio broadcasts and the number of wounded that things were not going well in the Golan. Near the end of the first week of fighting I was up in the Heights and saw wrecks of fighters which had run into Soviet-built SAMs. Debris from some planes was scattered over a quarter mile, while other planes dug deep furrows

before exploding. Even behind the lines there would be fighters screaming overhead with missiles chasing them.

could take a strong hit. We pulled our van next to one of the walls, loaded our weapons and waited. Soon the village was full of smoke, dust and burning vehicles. Centurion tanks started backing out to the main road crushing buildings that hadn't been demolished in the fighting. We decided to get out of there before we were either crushed, blown up



became graves when dug in Soviet-style. Thanks to Israeli competence, they didn't fare much better when they moved.

Exploding planes were often a greater danger than Arab tanks and artillery.


Running supplies to one village, we came under heavy tank and artillery fire. Thankfully, the older buildings were made from native stone and

or captured.

Later I was back in Golan en route to Mount Hermon. There was light sniper fire from Syrian positions but most of the enemy was out of ammunition, food and water. I walked between two APCs to find a place out of the

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wind to urinate. An Israeli sergeant called to me, "Piss over here, piss over here," and guided me to a more open, windy area.

"I don't want to get my boots wet," I said.

"It drives the Arabs crazy! They have no water," he explained. "None of them have pissed for days!" I did my part for Israeli PsyOps and got my boots wet.

On the way back to the Jordan Valley we stopped at a checkpoint where a skinny, Hasidic sergeant told me I looked like I needed a rest and asked what unit I was with. Since I wasn't with a unit I just said, "It's a hard life," then closed my eyes. Nobody questioned the U.S. Army patch on my field jacket. He flagged us through.

We had to detour around a blown bridge and went through Druse territory. Druse villages had been completely demolished, first by Syrians on their way through and then by Israelis pushing them out. The survivors watched us like Kansas farmers watching a swarm of locusts.

Later, when we started getting American arms and supplies I was asked to show troops how to use them. There were some casualties from the back blast of the LAWs, but word got around fast on how to use them. The forward assist on M16s made no sense to them. "If there is a problem with jamming why not fix the problem?" Why not indeed? They never did adopt a barrel-up position for carrying the M16, but preferred to loop a sling around the front sight mount and carry it like an UZI. Before I left, a weapon being held like this went off at a bus stop, severely injuring several people.

I heard about the end of the war while sitting in a radio bunker on night shift. There was no screaming or shouting to celebrate, just Old Testament thanks for keeping the country intact once again.

In December the officer who asked me if I would help out offered to send me to Bethlehem for Christmas. I thanked him but turned it down; the opportunity to serve was its own reward. X

UNITED STATES

After winning contract to provide 900,000 government employees with charge cards, American Express identifies employees of super-secret Defense Intelligence Agency in home mailings and credit checks.

At Clinton's request, Lockheed study estimates it would cost \$79.8 million and take three months to reactivate three SR-71 Blackbird surveillance aircraft for use over North Korea.

Congress plans to halt production of TOW missiles in '95, leaving an inventory barely large enough to provide current launchers with one basic load — no reloads. The 106,000 in stock are combination of new and old warheads, many of which must be expended in training prior to expiration. 

Is America Becoming A Police State?

In the wake of monolithic

communism's shuddering collapse after decades of brinkmanship, detente and fear of global holocaust, it is ironic that the Cold War is being remembered as the proverbial good old days. The former Soviet Union was an Evil Empire, but at least we had a good idea who held the launch keys. At least then the threats to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness were more easily identifiable because they came from a direction we were watching.

In those days, the U.S. Constitution wasn't just

a fading artifact under armed guard and bulletproof glass, but a sacred parchment whose supreme legal authority guaranteed an inviolate boundary between institutionalized tyranny and government by consent. Its first 10 amendments, the once-revered Bill of Rights, weren't just quaint legal theory, but a living reality that high school civics teachers could explain in good conscience.

Now the constitutional cornerstone on which government and society were built has been — and continues to be — chipped away from within by certain of our "public servants." They serve mainly themselves, primarily at the public trough. Their hidden agendas are carried out by their handmaidens in Congress who daily betray the interests of the very people whose constitutional liberties they are sworn to protect.

These bureaucrats and constitutional corruptors — not the drug dealer, not the terrorist, not the street

gangster — are Public Enemy No. 1. In classic Orwellian Doublespeak, many of these enemies of liberty go under the guise of "liberal," a misnomer that implies they are forwardlooking, magnanimous and interested in the betterment of all. But in their hard and hypocritical hearts, they hate individual liberty, except under the governmental cloak of their own pious privilege. They love Big Brother and advance the development of a federal police state. Yes, they are liberal, like a drunken sailor on payday; liberal most of all with our hard-won liberty and our hard-earned money.

Orwell In The USA

One lesson I learned in civics class, and in subsequent courses in history and political science, is the fundamental difference between the free-enterprise republic that our Founding Fathers intended and the totalitarian socialism that rose during the last century to challenge our national heritage of individual liberty. Under the latter, all property and jobs, virtually every aspect of life, are controlled by an "all-wise" central government. In socialist theory, all citizens are equal. But in practice, government leaders, along with the bureaucrats and secret police forces required to keep them in power under threats to the people of imprisonment or death, are "more equal" than the common citizen. In other words, the people serve the state and those who control it - the government does not serve the people.

In contrast to that socialist concept, under our constitutional form of government, the principles of individual liberty, private property and free enterprise are esteemed as capable of bringing the most good to the most people. Or so we were taught in the good old days.

Imagine a society in which mere suspicion and hearsay, perhaps fabricated by an angry neighbor, an unscrupulous police agent or a criminal lying to save his own neck, suffices for the government to seize your car, your firearms, your computer, your business, all your personal records, your bank and savings accounts and even your home and farm, whether or not you are ever charged with a crime. And what if this were done without even a hearing in front of a judge?

What would it be like to live in a nation where police seized your pri-

vate property first and asked questions later, where you're assumed guilty unless you can prove yourself innocent, and innocence is of marginal relevance anyway? And if you couldn't afford legal counsel, tough luck? And if you are poor or uneducated, the situation would be just that much more hopeless?

Sound like life in the shadow of the gulag? No. Welcome to life in these United States of the 1990s.

If it sounds hard to imagine, it may be harder still to believe that this is reality, but it is, the Bill of Rights notwithstanding. The first 10 amendments may sound emphatic. Its writers may have intended them to be inviolate safeguards. But thanks to Congress, which is more interested

in scratching the backs of bureaucrats than serving the taxpayers who finance their lush lifestyles, the intended protections of the Constitution have become less and less of a benchmark to the so-called laws of the land.

For instance, Article IV of the U.S. Constitution states that: "the right of

the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated ..." Article V supposedly guarantees that: "no person shall be ... deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation."

But most of what we learned in high school civics about basic constitutional protections and basic legal rights "is no longer true," wrote Jarrett B. Wollstein, a director of the International Society for Individual Liberty. "A combination of rising crime, the growing power of government, and increasing concern about drugs has done tremendous damage to the

Bill of Rights...


"Few Americans realize how grave and how ominous that damage has been," Wollstein warned in the July 1993 issue of *The Freeman*, an essay periodical devoted to expanding ideas about personal liberty. "Today the government has the power legally to seize your bank account, your house, or your business, without trial, hearing, or indictment. Everything you have worked for and accumulated over a lifetime can now be taken away from you at the whim of authorities. Black or white, rich or poor, we are all potential victims."

Donald Scott of Malibu, California, was one of the rich victims. Heir to a European fortune, the 61-year-old millionaire owned a 200-acre

oceanfront ranch in the Santa Monica Mountains, where he had lived for 25 years. Valued at about \$5 million, his Trail's End Ranch surrounded on three sides by the National Park Service, which had repeatedly pressured Scott to sell out. He adamantly refused.

At 0830 hours on 2

October 1992, 32 heavily armed men and women from the U.S. Park Service, the U.S. Forest Service, the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration, the California Bureau of Narcotics Enforcement and the National Guard were led on a raid against Scott, organized by the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department. Also along were two scientists from NASA's nearby Jet Propulsion Laboratory, assigned to collect specks of marijuana pollen.



Criminals In Uniform

Deputy Sheriff Gary Spencer, who has a reputation of being as big a hot dog with his gun and badge as he is with his surfboard, claims he had a confidential informant — which can

often be a criminal willing to lie to avoid prosecution — who alleged that Scott had 2,000 marijuana plants on his property. After a 10 September 1992 foot patrol by Spencer failed to turn up evidence against Scott, who had no criminal record, Spencer formed a task force and called in DEA Agent Charles Stowell for aerial surveillance.

Using National Guard aircraft, Stowell made four overflights. On the final flight, from 1,000 feet up and

without the aid of binoculars, Stowell ported to Spencer that he "might" have seen about 50 plants being grown on platforms in trees. On 24 Septemfour ber, heavily armed U.S. Border Patrol agents, wearing camouflaged clothing and with night vision equipment and climbing gear, hiked to the wooded area of the alleged growing platforms. They

found no sign of marijuana cultivation.

On 30 September, Spencer told Stowell that the informant had changed his story to indicate only 50 plants were being grown — coincidentally the same number the DEA agent said he "might" have seen. So Stowell gave Spencer permission to use his report from the final overflight as evidence to request a search warrant. When Deputy Spencer applied for the warrant the next day, he inflated the number to indicate Stowell had definitely seen between 50 and 100 pot plants. On this fraudulent basis the warrant was approved.

Suspect Killed — Mission Accomplished

Although Scott was a somewhat eccentric recluse, the paramilitary raiding party that Spencer organized

would make it appear the old man was a heavily armed and well-guarded narcotics baron. The swift-strike tactics used were also unnecessary: It's doubtful Scott could have dashed out into the woods when the cops knocked at his door, lowered the fictional platforms from the trees, uprooted the nonexistent plants and flushed them down a toilet before being nabbed.

Other suspicious aspects about the raid also surfaced. One state narc and

a U.S. Forest Service Ranger assigned to the raid noted later that Spencer's pre-raid briefing specifically noted the possibility of seizing Scott's valuable property. Members were specifically told to look for any other contraband that might justify a seizure. As it turned out, not even the NASA scientists with their fancy equipment could locate a single speck

of any illegal drug.

Spencer apparently intended to deprive Scott of his property. The deputy had a real estate appraisal of the Scott ranch prepared before the raid — indeed, one day before DEA Agent Stowell first said he "might" have seen 50 marijuana plants. Even more damning, Stowell wrote in the margin of that document the comparable \$800,000 value of a nearby 80-acre parcel.

Deputy Sheriff Spencer no doubt also intended to deprive Scott of his liberty. But before he could do that, he deprived an innocent old man of something no court of law could give back: Spencer shot Scott to death in Scott's own living room.

As it turned out, the only "plant" the cops located was Scott's girlfriend, Frances Plante. She said they both were asleep when she was awakened by the sound of someone pounding the kitchen door. "It sounded like an earthquake," she said. Pulling on clothes, she ran to the kitchen, where she saw faces peering through the window. A voice said, "Let me go first," she recalled, immediately followed by another voice that said, "Yeah, let Gary go first."

Followed by another deputy, the surfboarding super sleuth Gary Spencer burst in with gun drawn. Plante said she screamed not to shoot and backed into the living room, at which time Scott ran out of the bedroom, pointing a .38-caliber revolver at the ceiling. Plante said someone yelled for Scott to put the gun down, and as he began to do so, Spencer shot him three times, killing him instantly.

Another "Unfortunate Victim"

In a report delving into the suspicious circumstances and events that led to Scott's death, "District Attorney Michael Bradbury... concludes that the real motive behind the raid was not a search for drugs, but the raiders' desire to seize Mr. Scott's property under federal forfeiture laws," wrote Gideon Kanner, an emeritus law professor at Loyola Law School in Los Angeles, in The Wall Street Journal."The case, which is still unresolved, raises important questions about the interrelationship between personal liberties and property rights protected by the Constitution."

In that report, Bradbury noted that he could "find no reason why law enforcement officers who were investigating suspected narcotics violations would have any interest in the value of the ranch or the value of the property sold in the same area... But the crux of this issue is those deputy sheriffs shouldn't have been there in the first place... Donald Scott did not have to die, and he should not have died. He was an unfortunate victim of the war on drugs."

Bradbury's report recommended further action by a grand jury, but the case remains unresolved. The DA assured the public, however, of his belief that "only" Scott's property rights were violated, probably of little comfort to Scott. Of course, Spencer and his buddies claim they knocked loud and long, announcing their identity several times before bursting in. Not surprisingly, law enforcement authorities took the position that Spencer's

conduct was not criminal because he fired in "self-defense," conveniently avoiding the issue of Scott's right to self-defense in his own home.

Still, "there was virtually no way that [DEA Agent] Stowell could have seen through that canopy of trees," Bradbury's report acknowledged. "I think [Stowell] was under tremendous pressure from... Deputy Spencer." Further, Spencer's informant, while confirming his initial allegation of thousands of plants being grown, denied ever reducing the estimate to 50 plants, "raising the possibility that Spencer fabricated this information in order to induce Stowell to agree to use his name in the search warrant affidavit," the DA's report concedes.

Bill Of Rights: Exclusionary Clauses?

"What we have here is a grim reminder that the liberties protected by the Bill of Rights are not neatly divisible into 'property rights' and 'personal liberties,' "Kanner wrote. "Even where the invasion is 'only' of one's property rights, it often implicates violation of other rights as well, even the right to life itself. Here is an object lesson that where one category of fundamental constitutional rights is not

secure from governmental overreaching, neither are the others."

The death of Donald Scott is only one of the most outrageous among hundreds of thousands of such cases. Property forfeiture laws were ostensibly written to seize ill-gotten gains from drug kingpins, to take away the profit motive. But most

often, the targets are poor or middleincome people, or casual drug users and racial minorities and those who speak little English. And like the crackdown on law-abiding federal firearms licensees to supposedly stem the flow of black-market guns, there is little or no practical effect on the alleged problem by forfeiture laws. Indeed, major drug kingpins transfer their millions to offshore bank accounts untouchable by forfeiture, and then hire the

best lawyers to fend off the feds.

More than 80% of the people whose property is seized are never charged with any criminal offense, according to a 10-month investigation into civil property forfeiture by The Pittsburgh Press. By 1990, the U.S. Marshal Service — only one of several federal law enforcement agencies that directly benefit from forfeited assets - had an inventory of more than \$1.4 billion in property that included more than 30,000 homes, businesses, vehicles and boats. Between 1985 and 1991, the value of annual total federal asset forfeitures jumped from \$27 million to \$644 million, an increase of nearly 2,400%. Annual federal seizures topped the \$1 billion mark in 1992. Federal seizures now total more than \$4 billion, a figure that does not include auctioned property and billions more seized under scores of various state seizure laws.

To The Victor Go ...

The history of legal forfeiture in this country goes back to the American Revolution, when those colonists who opposed independence had their homes and farms seized by victorious patriots who claimed domain under

the ancient belief in the adage, "To the victors go the spoils." This questionable credo was passed into law during Reconstruction to punish particularly recalcitrant Southern rebels, and was also used to seize property from rum-runners and bootleggers during Prohibition. It began to gain wide popularity again

with the advent of

"We've adopted this demonology," said U.S. District Judge Robert Sweet of New York, an outspoken critic of federal drug policy. "Drugs and drug users are made scapegoats" at the expense of constitutional protections that no longer protect the average citizen.

The modern forfeiture crusade began in 1970, with passage of the Racketeering Influenced and Corrupt Organization law, or RICO Act. RICO

was expanded in 1984, and now extends federal jurisdiction to almost every property offense by anyone anywhere in the country. It empowers agents to freeze or seize all of any individual's real property or assets based merely upon suspicion that a crime might have occurred. It makes the investigating agencies direct beneficiaries of such seizures, which in times of budget cutbacks increases the potential for abuse. It was merely the first of many laws passed since then that allow the feds to summarily take property without indictment, trial or conviction.

Seizure laws are based on a legal fiction that the property itself, not the individual, is "guilty" of a crime and can be "arrested." Unlike individuals, property and other inanimate assets do not have constitutional rights, thus enabling police agents and prosecutors to circumvent normal due process and legal safeguards. The concept enables the government to impose a greater procedural burden on property owners and make the individual's personal guilt irrelevant to the proceedings.


"Legal" Robbery


The Supreme Court has taken small steps to remedy this growing legal and constitutional travesty. In 1990, for instance, North Dakota resident Richard Austin sold two grams of cocaine, worth about \$180-\$200, to an undercover agent. Not only was he arrested, but the cops seized his mobile home and his auto body shop. Austin's lawyer challenged the seizure, arguing that the punishment did not fit the crime, and thus violated the Eighth Amendment's prohibition against excessive fines. The Supreme Court upheld the defense attorney's argument in June 1993, and ordered the house and business returned to Austin.

The decision, The New York Times reported, "demonstrated the Justices' concern with the increasingly aggressive use of forfeiture laws.'

States increasingly rely on forfeiture laws, and California, one of the nation's most supposedly liberal states, is one of the most abusive, according to an investigative series by the San Jose Mercury News. Many of the seizures "have been legal street robberies," former Los Angeles drug

They blanket Albania from the beaches to the mountains. Through the blur of a car window they look like bizarre idols erected to some deity of concrete. Closer inspection shows them to be domed bunkers of various sizes, huddled together to serve soldiers and civilians as fighting positions and shelters in the event of enemy attack.

You cannot avoid them. They hug the roadsides of Albania's tattered national road system; they blemish the gorgeous Adriatic coastline like gian warts; they dot the hills and mountains near cities and on borders—they even squar in front of apartment houses and schools as mute evidence of unfettered socialist stupidity run amok.

To Western eyes, the bunkers are the defining man-made phenomena of Albania, the one thing, except mountains, that never leaves your sight wherever you travel in that country.

These bunkers were a central element in an elaborate national defense system Albania concocted as a bulwark against the "imperialism and revisionism" of Western and Warsaw Pact powers, as defined by the demented communist dictator Enver Hoxha. Hoxha concluded that the United States, NATO, Italy, Greece and Yugoslavia, either separately or in tandem, would come to plunder this tiny country the size of Maryland.

Even though Albania has a per capita income roughly 5% of America's, and an industrial base more akin to Africa than to Europe, so firmly entrenched was Hoxha's cuft of personality that he was able to convince Albanians they enjoyed the highest standard of living in the world; so advanced over other nations, in fact, myriad aggressors had Albania marked for conquest and pillage. Cut off from the rest of the world, Albanians, at least for a time, actually believed him.

Many countries have reminders of grandiose folly, but tarely are they as inescapable as Albania's bunkers. In a country where 70% of the landscape is scenic mountains, every vista is marred by empty, purposeless concrete domes now defaced and decaying in the elements.

In discussing the bunkers, Albanians rely on anecdotal information and few people know the details of their origin. Albanians point not only to the bunkers but also to such things as concrete fence posts festooned with steel spikes to impale invading paratroopers. But there seems to be no official history of the fortifications. Information presented to visitors during the communist regime makes no mention of

them, as if tourists would politely not notice.

Obvious Secret

In March 1992, Albania became the last Eastern European country to declare itself a democracy, and the country is currently struggling with massive economic, social and political transformation. Free to speak for the first time, Albanians now openly discuss their time under a particularly cruel form of communism, arguably more harsh and Orwellian than any other form practiced in Eastern Europe.

From 1949 to 1983, some 176,000(!) bunkers were built. The anachronous and ubiquitous fortifications remain as mysterious as Albania itself. They exist in such incredible numbers as a result of military advice and aid from Maoist China, Albania's sponsor in the 1970s. And they exist at all because if anybody did dare to ask why all that concrete had to be poured to protect Albania, Hoxha shipped them off to prison or exile.

If the numbers bandied about by Albanians are accurate, the country spent an estimated \$185 million annually on bunkers during the early 1970s. An average bunker cost as much as a three-bedroom apartment to construct, a rotten shame in a country where even today more than 50,000 people have no home and hundreds of thousands live two to three families per apartment.

Planning and construction of the bunkers was handled by a special staff under the Ministry of Defense. Roughly 110 employees oversaw construction and distributed the bunkers throughout 24 military districts.

The bunkers are of similar design and constructed in varying dimensions at four concrete plants, with most being cast at "The Steel of the Party" plant in Tiranë. Bunkers on international borders often had an exterior steel plate covering half the dome, but most were simply precast, reinforced concrete. Smaller models had steel pad-eyes to facilitate transport and placement.

The majority of bunkers comfortably fit one person, with an 18-by-40-inch gun port facing the assumed direction of enemy attack. Larger bunkers next to highways and on beaches could hold four or five people, with ample room for large caliber ordnance.

Although Albanians deride the bun-

kers, they now wax creative in making at least some of them serve a useful purpose as stables, temporary apartments, outhouses and, for young adults on the make, trysting spots away from their close-knit families. The bunkers are an eyesore, a constant reminder of the extreme isolationism and paranoia that plagued Albania's last four and a half decades of communist rule. They also represent a pathetically outmoded form of military strategy, a modern equivalent of the failed French Maginot Line.

Pinpricks Of Resistance

Within the limits of available materials (which do not compare favor-

ably to Western standards) the bunkers are structurally sound. They appear to be well-designed and would be able to withstand some level of direct fire and offer a degree of protection for the occupant. If you were an advancing force they might be a nuisance, a deterrent to some degree.

But the placement strategy behind the bunkers is without discernible plan. While those located on beaches and on the periphery of cities imply some sort of defensive strategy, others can be found placed at random between apartment buildings and neighborhood schools. Steve Bucci, a U.S. Army Special Forces officer serving as adviser in Albania, said military officials told him that at times local military commanders would receive six to 12 bunkers to position at their own discretion.

Except for providing hard points from which to harass an invader, the bunkers would have been scant defense against an armored sweep, precise aerial bombardment or even a guerrilla with a satchel charge. An attack from the blind sides or rear of the bunkers would have disabled them. Bucci noted that, "You can't shoot anything with a backblast in most of them ..."

Their greatest effect would have been from their sheer numbers — 176,000 potential pinpricks of resistance for an invader to deal with.

Ultimate Bunker Mentality

Albanian paranoia about foreign invasion has at least some basis in light of the country's fascinating, littleknown and tragic history. From its earliest days, despite its protective shield of mountains, Albania was a land to be plundered, overrun and governed by others. Albania first gained formal independence in 1912, only to be overrun again by foreign armies in World War I. During World War II, Italy annexed Albania; later the Germans occupied it and fought a bloody battle with Hoxha's partisan army that left 28,000 Albanians dead, but liberated the country.

Hoxha placed his prime minister, Memhet Shehu, in charge of expediting production and placement of the bunkers in the late 1960s, after the Prague Spring had fueled his paranoia concerning foreign invasion. Nicholas Pano, a professor at Western Illinois State University and a student of Albania for 30 years, said the Chinese advised Albania to plan for a "people's war," a guerrilla war where if the government fell to invading armies the people could carry on the struggle in the mountains and outside cities by fighting from the bunkers.

At the height of bunker-building in 1973 and 1974, Hoxha also began a Chinese-style "cultural revolution" that came down especially hard on artists and intellectuals. Under Chinese influence — or to keep the succor flowing — Hoxha also published the works of Mao and abolished military ranks. Having been underwritten by the Chinese, the grand bunker program halted abruptly in 1983, when China cut ties and financial support.

In an effort to prove that Albania was in the vanguard of military thinking, the leadership always liked to point out that other well-developed nations such as Switzerland employed similar civil-defense training, according to Oltin Prifti, a history instructor at Tiranë University. But by any measure, Albania's leaders were floundering in a twilight zone of military strategy.

More Bunkers Than Brains

Most Albanians still remember their teenage years when nearly all of them attended 15- and 30-day annual sessions for national defense training that included bunker strategy. Always willing to coerce young people into working for free while calling them "volunteers," the government had teenagers dig ditches to connect bunkers, employing the same sort of youth

camps that constructed the national railroad. The military training mixed pain and pleasure: Prifti said some participants who attended winter sessions ended up dead from exhaustion or exposure.

With a key aspect of Albania's strategy under Chinese tutelage being that civilians would play an important role in the defense system, one of many ironies is that too much concrete was poured to serve too few commandos. The combined troop strength of Albania's military divisions was only 30,000 and national mobilization would add another 200,000. With 176,000 bunkers, that's 1.3 "trained" fighters per bunker, which means if the bunkers were fully manned there would be little army in the field: The entire military force, would, in effect,

be sitting in conspicuous, indefensible bunkers waiting to be mopped up by an invading force.

And their myopic devotion to such fortifications left the Albanian military with little money for upgrading troop training or improving their aging hardware — but that was part of Hoxha's overall plan. To avoid conflict or the potential for a coup, Hoxha kept the military "marginalized," according to Bucci. "If you were young and unreliable you went to the military high school. And he spread the military out so different units had no way to communicate."

Albania's military still uses longobsolete 1950s equipment, ranging from T-34 tanks to MiG-15s and -17s that ingenious technicians have somehow managed to keep flying despite a lack of spares. Military officials, now under the command of an Albanian

> civilian secretary, have asked for U.S. support in upgrading their clothing, personnel management, military law and other practical considerations.

> What to do with the bunkers is not exactly a priority national issue, but it is a concern for Albanians, especially those who want to exploit the country's undeveloped tourist potential. Aesthetically, bathers and bunkers on beaches are an unlikely mix. Concrete has rarely been less sexy, but creative attempts to spruce them up have been made. On one spectacular highway along the Adriatic between Vlorë

and Sarandë, a few bunkers were painted pink and other bright colors by Italian tourists.

Home-Domes & Low-Tech Disco

In a western village near Korcē, one bunker is used as a disco. Some families have moved into the larger bunkers built for 76mm or 100mm guns — one family managed to squeeze in a double bed, stove and TV, leaving the bathroom outside. And an entrepreneur in Gjirokaster opened a cafe in one of the larger bunkers.

The military plans to maintain at least some bunkers near border crossings, where they can be put to good conventional use, according to Bucci. A few Albanians, perhaps nostalgic for the old days, figure having them

around is a good idea after seeing what has happened in Bosnia, where such bunkers might have protected civilians from Serb mortar shelling.

Most, however, have fallen into disuse and are covered with dirt, grass, excrement and other refuse. Somehow peasants have managed to topple a few here and there, imploding the bunkers by burning car tires inside them to calcine the concrete, and then crushing the rubble by hand and using it for building materials. Whatever works ...

The government has no money for much of anything and has no plans to remove the bunkers unless they are in the way of development. Bunkers near beaches south of Durres, a potential resort area, are being slowly removed from the sandy soil. Most Albanians would like to see them all removed, for they are a painful symbol of the repressive paranoia and isolationism from which they have only begun to emerge. They remind visitors and Albanians alike of the perverted regime that led this tiny country counter-current to the 20th century, only to leave it foundering a generation behind its neighbors.

They are Albania's cross to bear, her albatross. "To me, they look very ugly and they always remind me of the past," said Arben Kallamata, assistant director of Radio Tiranë. "As difficult as it is to remove these things from the ground, it is [more] difficult to remove the past from this country. When



Delta Snipers Earn America's Highest Award In Somalia's Fiercest Fight

On the wall of the Special Forces Memorial Court at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, are etched the words of the Prophet Isaiah:


"I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send and who will go for us.'"

Answering that call in Somalia on 3 October 1993, Master Sergeant Gary I. Gordon and Sergeant First Class Randall D. Shughart became the first American soldiers since the Vietnam War to receive the Medal of Honor. This distinction cost them their lives.

Gordon and Shughart were Delta Force snipers assigned to Task Force Ranger in Somalia (although Army Special Forces Command still does not officially acknowledge that Delta was in the African nation).

The two Army SF troopers had provided covering fire in six previous "snatch" missions where followers loyal to fugitive warlord Mohamed Farrah Aidid were rounded up and interrogated in an attempt to locate Aidid himself — believed to have masterminded the massacre of Pakistani peacekeepers.

The task force's seventh mission on the afternoon of 3 October was similar to earlier ones. Once again, Gordon and Shughart were flying in an MH-60 Blackhawk providing covering fire. "While Gordon and Shughart were labeled as snipers, they

were not the sniper we have come to know," said a high-ranking SF officer who asked not to be identified. "They were in an overwatch mode."

SpecOps commanders would like to have their snipers occupy the top floor of a building across the street from where an operation is going down, but in a fast-moving situation such as developed on 3 October in downtown Mogadishu, you "had to dance with the people you brought." Helicopters became the multi-story building from which to fire. Though

BRASS STUMBLES, SOLDIERS FALL

When Marines hit the beaches of Somalia in December 1992, it was a humanitarian mission to restore order and distribute aid. Before it was over, it cost us 44 dead, 175 wounded and almost \$2 billion.

Marine General Robert Johnston's Marines had the warring clans awed enough to stand down while U.N. aid was distributed to the starving throngs, but on 5 June 1993, two dozen Pakistani troops were killed in an ambush. Aidid was blamed. Clinton's new team in Somalia wanted Aidid hunted down and tried: The U.S. mission changed from feeding to fighting.

Starting 11 June, USAF AC-130 Spectre gunships began pounding Aidid's HQ, preceding a ground operation. Clinton announced, "We're striking a blow against lawlessness and killing," but the muscle needed to back this up, including armor, had been largely withdrawn and wasn't coming back. Aidid struck back with hit-and-run attacks on U.S. forces.

Rangers were sent on fruitless raids based on faulty intelligence, while Aidid watched. On 3 October a CIA operative fixed two Aidid aides, and the task force was launched on their seventh helibome raid.

But unknown to Army intelligence, Aidid had evolved a plan: Shoot down a chopper, surround it, wait for U.S. reinforcements and hit them from ambush. Like the VC he copied, Aidid carefully chose ground where he had all the advantages, and waited. Mogadishu's inner-city buildings and narrow, maze-like streets lent themselves to close-quarter fighting, which would decrease the Rangers' firepower advantage.

Our 3 October raid netted 24 prisoners, plus two top Aidid aides, and was in the ground withdrawal phase when Aidid's men shot down a chopper with massed RPG fire. Rangers, returning to base with their POWs, moved to the rescue. But there was no cover, and Somalis were firing down from rooftops and windows: Every intersection was a bloody gauntlet. Ranger Sergeant John Burns said, "It was like being a target in a shooting gallery."

The raid had the same effect nationally as the Tet Offensive of 1968, when a communist surprise attack jolted South Vietnam and killed 2,200 U.S. soldiers. Americans asked, "Just what the hell are we doing in Vietnam?" The same question was asked in Somalia. People wondered why we were in a clan-driven civil war with no impact on our national security. Like the 1983 bombing in Beirut that killed 244 men, 3 October was the death-knell of another badly thought-out mission. Clinton ultimately issued the order to withdraw all U.S. troops by 31 March 1994.

Though this action will go on record as one of the most courageous examples of small-unit daring — brave men executing a flawed plan — the generals

failed to ask whether the risk of the operation was worth the gain.

Had generals Montgomery, Hoar or Powell stood tall and demanded of their civilian chiefs — none of whom had ever smelled enemy gunfire — that a 14 September request for armor be honored, U.S. casualties would have been limited to chopper crews and a handful of Rangers. Ironically, USMC tanks were on ships just four days away.

If armor, instead of trucks, were with Ranger commander Lieutenant Colonel Danny McKnight's ground column — whose mission was to extract the POWs and Ranger force — they could have busted through to the first downed chopper within minutes and pulled out the dead pilot. Instead, while following the contemporary Ranger code never to leave a dead comrade, the pilot's body became an anchor. More casualties were taken trying to extract it, and the unit became too shot-up to move. Dying for the dead never made sense to this old Ranger.

The spin-doctors of history are already at work on this sad experience. Clinton kicked off the campaign when he blamed his wrong-headed war-fighting phase on the United Nations. During a 14 October news conference he said, "We cannot let a charge we got under a U.N. resolution to do some police work ... turn into a military mission." Then-Secretary of Defense Les Aspin quickly followed suit. He said the tank request "was never put in terms of protecting troops. It was put in terms of the mission of delivering humanitarian aid."

This has been followed by a chorus of U.S. Army generals who said that tanks, "would not have significantly altered the outcome of the events on October 3." That line may work with an unknowing public, but don't try it on the Somalia Ranger Task Force. This damage control won't wash, especially when, right after the fight, a Montgomery aide reported the general felt "that this could have been prevented if he had his armor."

Then there's the videotape from choppers flying over the fight, classified on Pentagon orders. It details our forces being ambushed, choppers crashing, rescue efforts and Somalis attacking. "It shows how magnificently our men fought," said a captain at West Point. The film also shows how USAF gunships would have turned the tide, and begs the question why the Spectres were in Italy and not overhead protecting our troops. Soldiers who have seen the film want it shown, but a friendly U.S. Army press officer observed, "The film's too hot for public consumption. It would bring the disaster back and present more questions than answers."

not an entirely new role for Delta Force, it was the first time this type of "overwatch mode" was tested under fire. The other six missions had been a walk in the park. This one would be a walk on the wild side during which Gordon and Shughart would be credited with keeping more than 300 hostiles at bay while the main assault force rounded up 24 of Aidid's lieutenants inside a building near the

Olympic Hotel.

The operations plan included contingencies to rescue the crews of downed aircraft, but no one had foreseen that Task Force Ranger would lose *four* Blackhawk helicopters to RPGs, two of which would crash in Indian country. For this reason only one USAF Combat Search and Research (CSAR) Team was in the air that day.

When the first helicopter crashed in a narrow alley five blocks northeast of its objective, a 16-man CSAR team fast-roped into the crash site (see "Fast Rope Into Hell," SOF July '94). Gordon and Shughart provided protective fire from the air, allowing USAF pararescue (PJs) men Master Sergeant Scott Fales and Technical Sergeant Tim Wilkinson and 14 other CSAR team members to secure the

area around the downed helicopter and administer emergency aid to the two of four crewmen still alive.

As these PJs left their Blackhawk, it was hit in the rotor by an RPG round. The pilots fought to keep the 19-ton aircraft hovering so Fales and Wilkinson could fast-rope to the ground, before limping back to the airport to crash-land. Minutes after

Gordon and Shughart instinctively understood that if the downed crew were to survive, help would have to be on the ground. They immediately volunteered to go, but were denied by the ground-force commander who said, "It's too dangerous." Precious time was lost, enabling more Somalis to rush to the crash site, while Gordon and Shughart pleaded three more times

Fales and Wilkinson fought their way to the crash site, Somali RPGs nailed another Blackhawk. This third helicopter to get hit crashed into a densely populated part of the city as it was attempting to fly south to the U.N. compound. In its wreckage lay four critically injured crewmen.

With the CSAR team already committed at the first crash site, attempts to get a relief force from the Olympic Hotel to the second crash were foiled by Somali ambushes. That left only Gordon and Shughart to keep the Somalis off the downed crew.

Reaching the second crash site, Gordon, Shughart and a third member of his sniper team, Sgt. 1st Class Brad Holling could see movement inside the downed Blackhawk as they turned a tight 360 overhead and came under withering fire from Somali militia racing toward the crash site in trucks.

The door gunner was hit and seriously wounded by ground fire that ripped through the Blackhawk. Holling was also hit, but was able to pull the wounded gunner from his station and take over the gun.

to be put on the ground to help their downed comrades. Three times they were denied permission.

Finally the ground force commander reluctantly gave them the green light for insertion, but by then the die was cast.

"They had to know they'd bought a one-way ticket," Fales said, "because these guys watched the whole thing unfold from the air." "They knew it was a desperate situation down there and that's why they repeatedly asked to be inserted," Wilkinson said, "But Gordon and Shughart felt if they didn't get in there and try to effect a change, the downed crew would be killed."

Once on the ground, the Green Berets must have realized this was it. But those who knew them, including Fales and Wilkinson, say they believed passionately in the creed that says, I will not fail those with whom I serve. The Delta snipers jumped into a ferocious firefight from their hovering Blackhawk 100 meters south of the crash site.

The pilot, Chief Warrant Officer Michael Goffena, said, "Anyone in their right mind would never have gone in." As he pulled power and began to lift off, Goffena noticed the two snipers were a bit unsure of which way to go, because of dirt and debris blown in their faces by the Blackhawk's rotor wash. Leaning out his port window, Goffena pointed them in the direction of the crash.

As Goffena's craft turned to leave, an RPG round slammed into the starboard side, knocking his co-pilot unconscious and sheering off Holling's

leg. Goffena was able to nurse his badly wounded bird and bloody crew back to the New Port of Mogadishu where the Blackhawk crash-landed.

Equipped only with scoped M16A2 rifles and Beretta pistols, Gordon and Shughart fought their way through a dense maze of shanties and shacks to reach the critically injured crew: They

then immediately pulled the two pilots and two gunners from the mangled wreckage and established a perimeter around the downed aircraft.

With the crew relatively safe for the moment, Gordon and Shughart constantly moved around the perimeter of the crash site, trying to keep

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KKK Recon, RT Georgia And Charlie Run Out of Luck In Laos





On 16 November 1968 four choppers signaled reveille at Mai Loc, Forward Observation Base (FOB) 1. As usual, they were Vietnamese air force CH-34 Choctaws — codenamed Kingbees —

making their final approach about 25 feet over the wire. On board were Sergeant Bader, First Lieutenant Stacks and Major Toomey from MACV-SOG Headquarters, as well as a platoon of KKK, *Khmer Kampuchea Kron*, an underground Cambodian political faction.

As the aircraft landed, I watched the KKK. They were all jokes and smiles, wearing black scarfs with "KKK Recon" around their necks. Something was about to go down and a bad feeling settled over Mai Loc.

That afternoon we were issued an operations order: Conduct an area recon of the Prairie Fire (PF) AO inside Laos, insert, snoop around, engage any enemy and disrupt their activities. We were assigned fast-movers — jet aircraft and A-1E Skyraiders — and would pick up our gunships on the other side of the fence.

Somebody decided to let Toomey and the KKK strap-hang. The CO told me to keep an eye on the major, "Don't let anything happen to him, and keep it quiet." That was a direct order.

I was the team leader (one-zero), Bader the assistant team leader (one-one) and Toomey's job was to get some ground time. To keep them out of our way, Stacks and the KKK would provide LZ security. Our normal complement of six Bru, a tribal group similar to the Montagnards, made up the rest of Recon Team (RT) Georgia.

The night was spent getting the KKK ready. We had to walk them through all our last minute checks: call signs, maps, radio checks, clean your CAR-15, jump up and down to check for equipment making too much noise, PRC-25, URC-10, clean your CAR-15 again, check and recheck everything. Our equipment was our only life-line.

The next day was filled with bad omens. RT Georgia was ready to go



but the Kingbees showed up late and shut down. Then the KKK wouldn't fly with the Vietnamese, something about the pilots' heads being higher than the Cambodian's, very bad medicine. That took an hour to remedy.

Finally a low whine filled the air and the rotors started turning. Lots of

thumbs up and grins from us, but the KKK looked as though they had shit their pants. They were not a happy group of campers.

Un-real Estate

Our ship led off and gained altitude as we crossed over the border and entered that piece of un-real estate known as the Prairie Fire AO. We were constantly on the lookout for signs of 37mm antiaircraft fire.

Thirty minutes later the door gunner "gave us the finger," pointing toward the LZ. It looked big and empty from

where we were sitting, too easy. Our Vietnamese door gunner mumbled his usual broken English, "Kingbee go down now."

The LZ was at least as big as a football field and covered with ant hills. In the center was a group of hills for Stacks and his KKK to rally around. By the time the other ships dropped off the rest of the RT, the KKK had formed a loose perimeter. There was no fire, a cold LZ.

I got the go ahead to move out from "Covey," our forward air controller circling overhead in an OV-10. We went over a fence to our south and turned east, stopping for a moment to look back toward the LZ. There was little cover, trees every eight to 10 feet with minimum foliage. Visibility was good and we spotted smoke from several long houses only 200 yards away.

Our point man moved out and halted the RT at an assault position about 50 yards from the long houses. There was just enough gun ship activity in the area that we had to raise our voices. We made our final preparations for an attack and tried a quick commo check with the KKK—no reply.

The NVA, with weapons at port

arms, were running around, yelling at each other and stumbling over pigs and chickens. Clothes, helmets, uniforms and web gear hung from lines strung tree to tree. We stood there and looked at each other. How could we have inserted this close and marched this far without being spotted?

Seven of us deployed on line and two of the Bru broke off heading toward the rear of the huts to cut off anyone trying to escape. Once they were in position, we trotted toward the long houses and began to fire. The NVA fled as they fired a few rounds in our direction. They were in such a panic not a single bullet was aimed our way.

We rolled through the empty huts and met up with the two Bru who closed in from the north. Any surviving NVA disappeared south. We looked at each other

and almost laughed at how easy this was. The Bru formed a loose perimeter and the team snooped around camp. Both long houses were

filled with equipment: weapons, uniforms, rice and commo gear.



Toomey and I headed south to follow up any escaping NVA and make sure they didn't surprise us later. We stopped at a canyon and peered over the edge. Eight feet down was a ledge littered with hammocks, equipment and cooking fires. Toomey jumped down and got a

quick burst from someone hiding inside a cave. As fast as he jumped down, he jumped back up. I started laughing, it looked as if he had landed on a trampoline. Major Toomey was white, and shaking and all he could say was, "Fuck this shit man."

I jumped down on the ledge and moved cautiously toward the cave. Two NVA would stick out their rifle barrels, pop off a few rounds and scramble back inside. Toomey stayed on top of the ledge and moved directly over the cave. Stacks and a few KKK came running over to our location.

Toomey pulled the pin on a grenade and threw it in. Seconds later it rolled back out, dropped over the ledge and exploded. Bader peered over the rim, "Toomey, check this out man, give me a couple of rocks." He tossed two rocks to me and I inched closer to the cave, threw them in and waited. Sure enough, both rocks rolled back out. Bader pitched in a smoke grenade. It was kicked out and fell over the ledge.

I signaled to Bader and Toomey. On the count of three, we would all throw in frags. One, two, three ... one grenade rolled back out, then another followed by two wild-eyed NVA. Bader and Toomey were leaning over the ledge waiting for our guests. As the two came out they were met with three CAR-15s on full auto. To their rear, for their added enjoyment, the third frag exploded and launched our two friends into the air.

I'll never forget the expressions on their faces. They looked like those trick divers going off a high dive. The first one, staring at me with all these little holes in him, turned his head 180 degrees to look me square in the face. I swear to God he told me in

perfect English, "Fuck off."

From across the draw we started receiving a few rounds of small arms fire. It wasn't enough to worry about and we moved back to the long houses. After taking a quick inventory of the captured equipment, our mission began to make sense. We would use the KKK to hump all this out. I got on the horn to Covey, "You want all this shit, right?"

"Negative, burn it." I looked at Toomey. Thinking he could use his rank to convince Covey to grant permission to take all this gear back to Vietnam, I handed him the radio. Another negative from Covey. "You're to burn everything and get back to the LZ." If that was the case, why did we bother to come here?

Stacks headed back to the LZ with the KKK while Bader and I tried to call in a Skyraider to take care of the fire from across the canyon. Covey came in low and marked it with white

right on target. Whoever had fired on us was no longer worrying about mama-san.

Our team then set everything on fire with WP grenades and I managed to get a few tokens from our worthy enemy. Once that job was done and the long houses were ablaze, we headed back to the LZ.

While the KKK manned our perimeter, Stacks called for an extraction, Covey approved it and the ships were on the way. I knew the NVA would soon be back to salvage anything we left.

Everything was quiet until the first Kingbees and slicks came in for their approach. NVA opened up west of the LZ, but just like before, their fire seemed weak.

Covey saw what was going on and called for gun ships to roll in on the west side of the LZ. The Bru and the RT were up and firing. The KKK just lay there. No one on the perimeter was returning fire. We had the NVA outnumbered at least three to one, but still the KKK wouldn't fire. A B-40 exploded just west of our RT's position hitting one of the Bru in the thigh.

Lieutenant Stacks crawled over to see what was wrong with the KKK. When he returned, he motioned to Bader and I, "Two KKK over there just killed themselves." Bader and I couldn't believe it. "Two fuckin' KKK just sucked the ends of their M-16s and committed suicide." We looked at each other in disbelief.

Stacks told me to check the rest of the KKK on perimeter. I found them spread eagle on the ground as low as they could get. Their weapons were laying in front of them and they had these little religious amulets in their mouths, chanting away like there was no tomorrow.

I pleaded with these guys to return fire but all they could tell me was they all were going to die. "Shoot, just shoot, ti-ti NVA, no sweat, sat cong, kill the fuckers!" No luck, the KKK were frozen.

Back at the center of the LZ, the Bru were returning fire while Bader

and Toomey directed what little outgoing we had. The NVA fire wasn't serious, but because of the KKK, it was slowly getting out of hand. Three more Bru were wounded.

The first ship rolled in and we loaded our wounded. A second ship landed and the KKK scrambled to get aboard in total chaos. Toomey tried to restore order, but the KKK were out of control. Another Kingbee came in, took fire and split. Off to

the east, a ship went down and another slick had to divert to pick up that crew. A fifth slick powered through and picked up another load of hysterical KKK.

Alone On The LZ

The Bru kept firing until all the KKK were off the LZ, then they loaded up. Bader, a Bru and myself stayed on the LZ taking cover, return-

ing fire and praying for the last ship to make it in. A Kingbee radioed he was on the way, but as he flared to land, fire from the west increased. The Kingbee took off. He tried one more time, but the fire was too hot.

Another slick darted in and tried to land just a few feet from us. We laid down suppressive fire and threw our gear on the aircraft at the

same time. Bader and the Bru jumped on while I continued firing. I turned to throw on my equipment only to see the slick taking off, leaving me alone on the LZ. Off to the north I could see another aircraft waiting to come in.

There were two other gun ships making firing runs over the NVA to our west. As my slick rolled in and hovered to get me out, I noticed the crew chief standing on the skids looked as though he was ready to jump in and fight. While laying down covering fire, he flipped up his visor. I caught a glimpse of an ear-to-ear grin and realized I knew this guy: It was Private First Class Rusty Armstrong from Harlingen, Texas. He was blow-

ing everything away and yelled at me to get on board. I complied and we were out of there, leaving the dead KKK on the LZ.

As we landed back at Mai Loc, the KKK were standing around talking big, "No sweat, no sweat, kill VC, kill VC, KKK numbah one." Even the Bru had a good laugh at this group of human waste.

The CO grabbed us as we headed for a debriefing. The first thing Stacks mentioned was how the KKK nearly got everyone killed. No one blinked an eye. Our debrief turned into a charade, everyone just nodded their heads. We ended this little act and headed outside.

The CO followed me out and told me to get my team together, re-supply and be ready to go back into the same LZ next morning. RT Georgia would conduct some kind of an assessment of the area.

Déjà Vu All Over Again

Next morning we went through the same drill, only without the KKK. Not only were we in the same AO, we were on the same LZ. We sat there for

an hour waiting for permission to move out. It never came. Kingbees pulled us out almost as quickly as we landed. What was the point?

When RT Georgia got back to Mai Loc, I looked for the CO. He had been waiting for me with another operations order. We were going into the LZ again. Why the hell would we get pulled back to 'Nam

only to have to reinsert back into the same PF AO?

I flipped. "No fucking way am I going in, Negative!" I stood there and argued. "Same AO, same flight path, I guess? Same everything." I wasn't going anywhere near that mission.

The CO caved in and gave me a target with a different RT in the Nickel Silver AO (North Vietnam). Without any further briefings, I grabbed my assets, loaded and flew north. Had anyone properly planned the operation, they would have gotten a weather report. Nickel Silver was fogged in, mission scrubbed.




Scarf worn by recalcitrant "heroes" of Prairie Fire AO. When NVA proved unable to inflict losses on KKK, they took matters into their own hands.

Khmer Rouge Back On The Move — Pailin First To Fall

Return To The



KILLING FIELDS

Cursing dirt roads in general, and this one in particular, I bounced about in a rented Land Cruiser on a deeply rutted and potholed Highway 10 from Battambang to Pailin, Cambodia. The latest government offensive against the Khmer Rouge (KR) had commenced four

days earlier and I wanted to see how it was going. The offensive, directed at guerrilla strongholds in Pailin and the surrounding countryside, had the potential to inflict severe and permanent damage on guerrilla forces.

If successful, government sovereignty would be reestablished over a large area of Cambodia, insurgents would be deprived of more than a million dollars a month from smuggling gem stones and timber into neighboring Thailand, and a political settlement with a weakened KR might finally be achieved. If government forces were repulsed, or failed to hold

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Pailin, not only would there be enormous political embarrassment, but army morale, already low after a recent defeat at Anlong Veng, could crumble beyond salvage. These were high stakes indeed.

The cliche "war torn" fits Cambodia better perhaps than any other country. Since Prince Sihanouk's government fell in 1970, Cambodia has been ravaged first by the KR and then by Vietnamese who occupied the country from 1979 until 1989. Since then there has been continuing guerrilla activity, widespread banditry and a legacy of some 10 million mines planted by various combatants.

After the Vietnamese were forced out the United Nations moved in. Under their dubious guidance, Cambodia lurched toward elections in May of 1993. In an outpouring of popular support for peace and democracy, despite intimidation by the KR, 90% of eligible Cambodians went to the polls and elected a new government. Four months later Sihanouk returned from China as a constitutional monarch with few real powers.

Ailing and elderly, Sihanouk presides over a fragile coalition govemment. While his National United Front for an Independent, Neutral, Peaceful and Cooperative Cambodia (FUNCINPEC — one of the world's more necessary acronyms) won a plurality, it has to share power with the Cambodian People's Party (CPP), a renamed communist party which holds 51 seats in the assembly, controls security forces and many provincial administrations.

Cambodia is also burdened with

two Prime Ministers — Prince Norodom Ranariddh, Sihanouk's son and head of FUNCINPEC, and Hun Sen, who leads the CPP. Sihanouk, suffering from cancer, spends a good deal of time in Beijing undergoing treatment.

Illegitimate Khmers

Initially part of the peace process, KR guerrillas boycotted the elections presumably having decided an electorate would not willingly give power to the same people who so horribly misused it earlier. Since Cambodia's constitution stipulates that all government posts be filled from those represented in elections, the Khmer Rouge have no legitimate claim to government office. Instead, they have chosen to conduct a low-intensity guerrilla war in northwest Cambodia.

Pailin, one of their main headquarters, has been occupied since 1989. Its rugged terrain and isolation make it ideal for a guerrilla stronghold. Its proximity to Thailand allows them to conduct lucrative smuggling activities with impunity. Valuable timber and gem stones are as abundant in Pailin as corrupt Thai businessmen and arms dealers just across the border. According to a 1992 classified Thai intelligence report, the KR have banked \$1 billion in future profits from concessions already granted to Thai logging companies.

Nevertheless, government authority and legitimacy has been tenuously growing, and the number of KR guerrillas has significantly decreased. Estimated at nearly 35,000 in 1991, their ranks have dwindled to only about 9,000 today. Since elections in May, around 2,000 have defected to the government and many more have just drifted off into the bush.

Khmer Rouge guerrillas, however, fight on. In February government troops captured the guerrilla stronghold of Anlong Veng in northwest Cambodia, only to lose it three weeks later. The KR, allegedly with Thai assistance, cut the only road into Anlong Veng and starved government soldiers out. Low on water and ammunition, badly equipped and fed, the army troops fled, abandoning tons of materiel.

Khmer Rouge target Pailin, Anlong Veng and other strongholds close to Thai border, providing quick access to safe havens and lucrative markets for timber and gems.





A handful of T-55s, rocket launchers and these BTR-60s and BRDM-2s comprised the bulk of motorized assets of the 5,000-man army poised to capture Pailin from the Khmer Rouge.

Khmer Rouge connections with Thailand present a difficult practical and diplomatic problem for any new Cambodian government. Lucrative timber contracts are cited as motivation for Thailand — as soon as Anlong Veng was back under guerrilla control, logging trucks started to roll toward the border. There are reports that "combatants" make deals to leave certain roads mine-free so logs can continue to move.

Pailin presents many similar logistical problems as Anlong Veng. Both cities are connected to the rest of Cambodia by only one long dirt road winding through jungle. Roads are easy to interdict. At the end of May the rainy season begins and Highway 10 to Pailin may become impassable due to guerrilla ambushes, mines and plain old mud.

Surrogate Killers

A few wounded soldiers straggled down the road as we drove "to the sound of the guns." There weren't really many guns sounding, though, as Cambodian war-fighting methods avoid taking or inflicting casualties on a scale achieved by more civilized countries. Perhaps because they are predominantly Buddhist and don't want to lose karma by actually killing someone, they prefer to let surrogate killers, mines and malaria, do that for them. Clearly that does not always hold true, but many military operations are notable for the relatively low numbers of casualties.

Three hours out of Battambang we reached the end of the road, 20km east of Pailin. A couple of tents,

T-55s, BTR-60s, BRDM-2s and rocket launchers scattered around suggested we had found General Pol Saroeun's, Deputy Chief of Staff of the Royal Cambodian Army, headquarters. There were not many other indications that we had just driven in to the operational HQ for the entire Pailin offensive.

There were no sentries and people

hung about in haphazardly slung hammocks or wandered around barefoot in the oppressive heat. Few troops seemed to be anywhere near their weapons. There were no fortifications or defensive positions, although Saroeun did have a log bunker near his tent. Camp location seemed to have been determined solely by the fact that the road ended there. Bulldozers and trucks stood by, ready to push the road as far as Pailin. Maybe I missed something, but I don't think so.

Saroeun met us outside his tent and gave us a briefing complete with map and overlays. A middle-aged ex-guerrilla fighter, he at least had blue lines on his map for friendly forces, and red for enemy, but there was no evidence of staff training in his briefing or his camp.

The Cambodian army had advanced very slowly toward Pailin on three axes, strengthening their flanks as they

went. A sad lesson of Anlong Veng was the hazard of being attacked from the rear while advancing so supplies were being stockpiled to guard against disaster if the road was cut off. Government forces were deliberately (slowly) making their way through jungle and hills to the city.

More of a nonevent than a battle, the capture of Pailin saw relatively little fighting of any kind. Five thousand troops, 10 tanks and some artillery encountered sporadic resistance, but only about 100 KR and 25 of Saroeun's men were killed. Four days into the operation there was still some doubt as to whether government troops had actually reached Pailin, although government press releases announced its capture as early as 18 March.

"Don't Break The Lock"

One problem with this leisurely advance was that only about 100 KR remained in Pailin. Given days of warning, 2,900 guerrillas, along with nearly 20,000 civilians, had drifted across the Thai border accompanied by two or three KR tanks. The town was virtually empty, and many civilians had fastened signs on their doors saying, "Please be careful with my house" and "Please don't break the lock."

Probably the most serious problem with the operation was a shortage of water. While no one had actually produced a poisoned water sample, rumors were rife that guerrillas had poisoned local streams and other supplies. True or not, government troops were unwilling to drink local water and were dropping by scores with heat exhaustion.

As proof of the superiority of government arms, Saroeun described a tank engagement between five government T-55s and one KR Type-59, a Chinese version of the same tank. According to the general, government tanks prevailed but the Type-59 was still able to disengage and flee across the border into Thailand. One would

YOU STILL CAN'T BEAT A COMPASS

Long accustomed to navigating with a map and compass, I viewed the small green computerlike device in my hand with curiosity and misgiving. We had been walking for seven hours over

flat terrain under a canopy of trees solid enough that I had not been able to see a single terrain feature. Based purely on time-distance and directional calculations, I had a reasonable idea where we were in eastern Cambodia. but I hoped that the Magellan GPS Trailblazer would tell me our exact location.

Never having used a GPS before. I had taken particular care in

initializing the device before leaving Phnom Penh. Turning it on in the jungle, I waited hopefully for a grid reference to appear on the display screen. I waited, and waited, and waited. Moving around a bit, as suggested by the instruction manual, I waited again. Finally, I turned it off. Thirty minutes of watching it say, "searching, searching," was enough. Maybe every satellite over Cambodia was down that day, but I was not impressed.

Over 10 days or so, I tried to get position fixes in a variety of environments with varying results. When used in the open, it quickly produced a grid reference agreeing with my map-and-compass work.

Lightweight and compact, the Trailblazer was easy to carry, and its clear and simple programming and operating

instructions make it infantry-friendly. It runs for hours — up to six according to the book - on three AA batteries. A thoughtful addition from the manufacturer is a waterproof instruction manual that conveniently fits into a carrying

Although the Magellan Trailblazer has major limitations, when it did work it made a useful addition to land navigation. Don't throw away your compass just yet, though.

have thought with five opponents, the Type-59 would have been reduced to its component parts, but Saroeun called it a victory, so it must have been. While the government is declaring victory, it may be a little premature. Khmer Rouge strategy could well be, as Mao advised, "run away to fight another day." Since the government is heavily supplying Pailin to avoid their mistake at Anlong Veng, the Khmer Rouge may wait until the rainy season closes the road and attack, capturing all those supplies.

The Cambodian government does not possess enough air assets to maintain a garrison of any strength, even in good weather. Stockpiling enough stores to last through the rains might work, but would present enormous temptation for an enemy short of provisions.

Government sources counter that they will hold the town or blow up 100 tons of munitions captured from the KR. Such destruction would be a significant loss for guerrilla forces. In addition, each day that the government holds Pailin, gem mines and the logging routes into Thailand costs KR coffers a considerable amount of smuggling revenue.

Blight At The End Of The Tunnel

No matter who eventually controls Pailin, northwest Cambodia will continue to be a problem for some time. The Thai connection frustrates government efforts to consolidate control over its own territory. Some estimates claim that the KR retains control of one-fifth of the countryside and, as long as they remain wealthy, they are unlikely to relinquish their power.

Khmer Rouge leaders continue to be treated as dignitaries by Thailand, and are offered military escorts and free use of Bangkok international airport. The Thais even built a lavish compound for genocidal Pol Pot, offering him sanctuary in spite of Cambodia's attempts to repatriate him and make him stand trial for his war crimes and crimes against humanity.

United Nations peacekeepers doubt that a mutually beneficial relationship between certain influential Thais and KR can be disentangled. Guerrillas derive logistical, military and technological support, while enriching their accomplices on the spoils of Cambodia.

On top of military difficulties, the area around Pailin is becoming an environmental catastrophe as well. The countryside has been raped by strip mining and clear cutting. State land, once covered with forests, has been pillaged and thousands of cubic meters of timber and plywood lie along main roads ready for shipment into Thailand. Gem mining has been made easy by sophisticated, imported Thai machinery, but no thought has been given to environmental damage.

Cambodia is also battling against internal corruption. Finance Minister Sam Rainsy is a heartening voice with his call for reform and an end to old business cabals. Under attack from both political parties, Rainsy was supported by Sihanouk himself, and so retains a delicate hold on his office. Even Prince Ranariddh, Sihanouk's son, issued a veiled warning to Rainsy to back off in his fight for honest government and business practices.

Despite Rainsy's best efforts, corruption remains rampant. A Japanese company, recognizing the profit potential of construction projects, allocated \$2 million dollars for one venture, three-quarters of which was spent on bribes. Similar stories abound across the country, and "informed conjecture" has opposing sides in military actions agreeing on a division of spoils before opening fire. Growth potential is good if excesses of business and governmental corruption can be eliminated.

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Slickest Compact Nine Ever?

LIW's CP1 — Human Engineering At Its Zenith

hen dropped into true pocket pistol envelope, the 9mm Parabellum cartridge reaches the highest level of its usefulness. In my opinion, full-size service sidearms should be chambered for more effective rounds, such as the tough-to-beat .45 ACP or the .40 S&W (an excellent, but unnecessary compromise between the 9mm and .45).

The problem has become sepa-

rating the wheat from the chaff, as socalled "compact nines" are as common as cockroaches in a sewer pipe. Many are unreliable junk — most of the Spanish-made pistols so highly touted by the popular gun press are an example — and a large number of the others are not really very compact, e.g., the SIGARMS series.

Many armed professionals have a legitimate requirement for a hideaway handgun. Small semiautomatic pistols are thinner than any revolver, even the S&W "J" frame series with their five-shot cylinders, and thus easier to conceal.

Unfortunately, in the past, pocket pistols were limited to little more than the .380 ACP (9mm Kurz) cartridge. To date, the most effective ammunition in this caliber is the Hornady 90-grain XTP Jacketed Hollow Point

(JHP). With a muzzle velocity of about 1,000 fps, this bullet will penetrate about 10.5 inches of soft tissue while expanding from .42 to .45 caliber.

The most effective 9mm Parabellum ammunition (147-grain JHPs like the Federal Hydra-Shok, Winchester Black Talon and CCI Gold Dot) will penetrate from 12.5 to 18 inches of soft tissue while expanding anywhere from .54 to .69 caliber.

Remember, we want a minimum penetration of about 12 inches. Once we achieve that goal, the bullet that makes the biggest hole does the most damage. Thus, a really compact, reliable pistol chambered for the 9mm Parabellum round is to be preferred over any similar-sized envelope containing the .32 ACP, .380 ACP or 9mm Makarov rounds.

Selecting a compact nine is not an

easy task. Gun magazines are of no help as their survey articles on generic topics do no more than puff every product mentioned. A good place to start is with a manufacturer whose products have demonstrated superiority, both in the past and currently.

South Africa's Lyttelton Ingenieurswerke (Afrikaans for Engineering Works) — or "LIW" as it is now referred to — has a proven track record in the defense industry. They produce the Z88 and SP1 9mm Parabellum pistols, the new SP2 .40 S&W pistol, the R4 rifles series, the SS-77 caliber 7.62x51mm GPMG, a new 5.56x45mm Squad Automatic based upon the SS-77, several different 20mm automatic cannons, the G5 towed and G6 self-propelled 155mm artillery, a 35mm computerized antiaircraft cannon system, the Rooikat

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Armored Fighting Vehicle, mortars of all types and numerous other defense products.

This highly regarded company has just introduced what I personally feel is the slickest-looking compact nine ever designed. Called the CP1 (Compact Pistol 1), its attractive and unique frame and slide configuration is the result of a complex design process between LIW and Pentagraph, an internationally respected and wellknown industrial design firm. These graphic, product and environmental design consultants, together with input from consumers, were commissioned to create the pistol's exterior envelope. The final result is not only eye-catching, but exhibits human engineering at its small-arms zenith. Thoroughly unconventional in appearance, here's a pistol that literally fits your hand like a glove and almost instinctively comes right up on target every time it's presented.

The CP1 has a polymer frame and a black stainless steel slide. The slide is an investment casting with a nitrite finish called "QPQ" — both highly scratch and corrosion resistant. Resistance to oxidation is an important criterion for deep-concealment weaponry.

Both the front and back strap areas of the frame have a pebble-grain textured surface that provides just enough gripping adhesion without inhibiting the shooter from shifting his grip, if required.

The CP1 operates by means of gasretarded blowback in a manner similar to the Heckler & Koch P7 series pistols. This operating principle was first employed in the World War II-era German Volksturmgewehr (People's Assault Rifle — VG1-5)

> and in an experimental Swiss pistol developed by Eidgenossiche Waffenfabrik, Bern. Much later, it was also used to operate the now almostforgotten Stevr-Daimler-Puch 9mm Parabellum GB pistol.

> Most often, gas pressure is used to unlock and open a

firearm's action. Reversing this principle, the LIW project engineers have used a gas-actuated piston to hold the breech closed until chamber pressures drop to a safe level. After the cartridge is fired, gases are diverted into a cylinder below the barrel. Acting upon a hinged piston attached to the front of the slide, the propellant gases retard rearward movement of the slide. This system eliminates the requirement for a locking mechanism, permitting a lightweight slide, less

powerful recoil spring and fixed barrel (pinned to the gas block).

Because the CP1 is much lighter than the H&K P7, a larger gas port is required. The CP1's gas port measures 2mm diameter, while that of the P7 is only 0.9mm. The gas piston is nickel plated, a process more chip-resis-

tant than hard chrome, and is pinned to the slide.

Overall length of the CP1 is 6.9 inches (176mm). Height with the standard magazine is 5.5 inches (139mm) and with the compact magazine only 5 inches (128mm). Width at the thick-

est point (the grip area of the frame) is 1.1 inches (28mm). The weight, empty, with the standard magazine is 24.7 ounces (700 grams) and 24.3 ounces (690 grams) with the compact magazine.

The polygonal-rifled barrel is 3.9 inches (99mm) in length and is fabricated from stainless steel. Polygonal rifling seals propellant gases behind the bullet and increases barrel life. CP1 barrels have four-groove rifling with a right-hand twist of one turn in 9.85 inches (254mm). This is the rate of twist most commonly found on 9mm Parabellum barrels. However, this is of academic interest only. Because of the short ranges at which handguns are employed (which doesn't allow proper stabilization of the bullet pistol bullets being closer to round balls than to boat-tail rifle projectiles), the launching platform's extremely short sight radius and the inherent shakiness of the operator's hands, the rifling's rate of twist becomes an insignificant factor in the pistol accuracy equation.

This single-action pistol has an internal hammer with a torsion spring and a half-cock notch in the event the weapon is dropped. The spring-loaded hammer is cocked when the slide moves rearward. When the trigger is pulled, the trigger bar moves backward to trip the sear (which projects

out of the right side of the hammer housing) and release the hammer. Consisting of only seven parts, the modular hammer assembly is compact and simple. It can be removed by driving out its retaining pin in the frame. The fixed ejector is attached to the hammer assembly.

The barrel and gas block assembly, held in place by grooves on the polymer frame, can also be removed. The magazine hold-open device is attached to the left side of the gas block. Activated by a step in the magazine follower, the hold-open mechanism is spring-loaded. In the pocket pistol style, the hold-open has no external slide-stop lever on the frame. Once caught rearward, the slide can travel forward again only after the empty magazine has been removed and/or a loaded magazine has been inserted and the slide has been manually retracted slightly to the rear before permitting it to fly forward.

More unconventional for a small pistol of this type is the manual safety, which is located in the front portion of the trigger guard and blocks a safety plate connected to the trigger. Color coded red, as is the trigger safety, the safety is pushed forward with the front of the trigger finger to enable the pistol to fire. Placing the pistol in a holster will push the safety back into the safe position.

Pressing the red trigger safety (cosmetically reminiscent of the Glock's) in the center of the trigger draws a spring-loaded pin on the left side of the trigger inward to permit the trigger's rearward travel.

The CP1 trigger bar is spring-loaded. When the slide is open, the trigger bar is forced down by an integral cam on its upper surface and is thus disconnected from the sear. Furthermore, the hammer cannot go forward unless the slide is in battery, as it will otherwise impinge on the feed bar (an integral part of the breech block). Premature ignition is impossible with this system.

The manual safety is also employed to disassemble the CP1. After removing the magazine and clearing the chamber, press inward on the safety (spring-loaded when pressed past the safe position) while retracting the slide fully rearward and then upward to separate it from the frame. Withdrawing the recoil spring from around the barrel is the only other disassembly step required. Remove carbon fouling from the piston and the gas cylinder (which is directly under the barrel). After cleaning and lubricating the other components in the normal manner, reassemble in the reverse order.

There are two different magazines

for the CP1. The standard magazine holds 13 rounds and the compact variant has a 12-round capacity. The bodies are fabricated from stamped sheetmetal pressings. Both the followers and floor plates are made of polymer. The magazine floor plates are curved to match the contour of the frame. These magazines are incredibly simple to disassemble (something John Moses Browning forgot about when he designed the M1911 magazine). Simply press inward on the floor plate's integral polymer projections that protrude through a slot on each side of the magazine body and withdraw the floor plate.

Located on the left side of the frame to the bottom rear of the trigger guard, the magazine catch/release is almost flush-mounted, yet easy to depress. It

The extractor, retained by a conventional spring and plunger, is located at the rear of the ejection port on the right side of the slide.

During test firing sequences, the CP1 exhibited somewhat less muzzle iump than would be expected from a 24-ounce pistol chambered for the 9mm

Accuracy was at the level required for the anticipated use. This is not a target or hunting pistol. The vast majority of gunfights involving handguns occur at distances less than 7 meters. The target is bobbing and weaving and the shooter is under intense stress. Firing for maxi-

Those addicted to placing the index finger of the support hand on the front of the trigger guard will not be able to apply this nonsense to CP1 because of the location of its manual safety. This useless technique only serves to weaken the support arm's isometric pull inward when firing from the Weaver stance.

Another brilliant and innovative design from a company whose string of successes appears to be unending, the CP1 is issued with a plastic storage box and one of each of the two types of magazines.

LIW has now provided law enforcement agencies and military organizations throughout the world with a superior replacement for their less effective PPKs and Makarovs and a more concealable pistol than the majority of handguns chambered for the 9mm Parabellum cartridge.

has a spring rod in the manner of the Glock, with the added advantage that it can be used with the catch/release button moved to the right side of the frame. When released, empty magazines fall freely out of the magazine well.

There is a feed ramp on both the gas block and integral barrel collar. The CP1 has been designed to reliably feed all modern JHP ammunition and Soldier of Fortune's test and evaluation indicated this to be so.

The fixed, open square-notch rear sight is an integral part of the slide casting. A blade-type front sight has been attached by means of a dovetail in the slide. It can be adjusted for windage zero by loosening the grab screw that locks it onto the slide. Sight radius is 5.4 inches (136mm).

mum theoretical accuracy from a Ransom Rest does not approach a realistic simulation of this scenario.

Because human engineering was a salient feature of the envelope's design, target acquisition times during drawstroke sequences were noticeably lower when compared to pistols of more conventional configuration, such as LIW's Z88 SP1/2 series.

Muslim Fanatics Slaughtered By The Thousands In Southern Sudan

We Kill Them Like Sheep"

It's only 97 klicks from the runway in Juba, the Khartoum government's Antonov bomber base, to the village of Pageri. Weeks earlier the government attacked this civilian target by rolling 50kg bombs off the back ramps of their aircraft. I was surveying the damage with two combat photojournalists fresh from Somalia, Gilluame Bonn and Marc Dominic Cunningham-Reid II.

"They hit this place pretty good. Why can't they hit any SPLA (Sudanese People's Liberation Army) positions?" Dominic asked. I was reminded of the terror bombing of another civilian target a few weeks earlier, the Catholic mission at Chukudum (see "Land Without Mercy — War Without End," SOF Aug. '94).


The three of us were heading north from Nimule toward Juba to witness the ongoing National Islamic Front (NIF) offensive. We passed through a country-side devastated by decades of conflict and neglect. Scattered about was the detritus of war and famine: expended cartridge cases, empty vials of injectable meds, spilled sorghum and empty grain sacks — from which troops make sandbags, field packs and web gear. A few SPLA guerrillas dressed in rags wandered about listlessly, many looking like AIDS victims, one sniffle away from a casket.

We were riding with an SPLA unit to meet up with Commander Oyay Deng Ajak, Sendru Hills AO commander. A 10-year combat veteran and one of the ablest and most successful SPLA commanders, Ajak is sent to whichever section of the front is hot.

We linked up with Ajak and continued north toward the front. I was impressed with his intellectual bent; he's extremely well read on socio-political and military affairs. When asked how the war was going he seemed unconcerned about the NIF offensive and commented on SPLA strategy, "We'll take Kapoeta, Torit and Juba this year. We're not concerned with losing small towns. We know we'll take this territory. There is no solution, no end to this war except to take our territory and rule ourselves."

As I'd noticed in the Didinga Hills, the SPLA is well equipped. They are either the rag-tag conventional army of New Sudan, or a well organized, well equipped guerrilla force. According to Ajak, "In 1991-92 our major problem was a lack of munitions." Now the SPLA has sufficient stocks of captured ordnance and receives supplies from friendly African nations. Ajak continued, "Our major problem now is supplying our outlying outposts. We need transport.

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
We also need heavy weapons and especially SAMs, which we were getting from Mengistu [former president of Ethiopia]. In other areas we can continue our light infantry guerrilla tactics, because of the terrain."

Human Waves

When we arrived at the Sendru Hills AO, Ajak showed us hundreds of SPLA dug in among towering outcrops of boulders, defending a blocking position 20km south of Juba across the only road from Nimule into the city. This high-speed avenue of approach, a rutted and poorly maintained single dirt track, is guarded by Ajak's light infantry with old RPD light machine guns, a few RPG-7s, a venerable old 82mm recoilless rifle, and Ajak's only armor, two captured T-55 tanks. The recoilless has knocked out one NIF T-55 and disabled two others.

The troops keep watch for the next human wave attack. I've seen the grim vestiges of these fruitless assaults, resembling over-the-top charges. The sun-bleached bones of Khartoum dead

litter the killing ground — stark reminders of the fatal sum of a combat equation containing poorly trained, charging fanatical religious conscripts on one side, and the muzzles of dugin automatic weapons on the other. Sun-blackened corpses lie on the open ground where they were cut down, providing food for vultures and carrion dogs.

Ajak, disgusted with slaughtering such cannon fodder, said, "When they

hit us with rocket and mortar fire we just lay down and wait for their advance. We're facing mostly these students conscripted from high schools and universities, civilians in uniform with only two or three weeks of training. They're issued a rifle, a Koran and a 'key to paradise'

ribbon."

NIF officers are likewise poorly trained and lack experience. Khartoum purged its best officers and tactical commanders, and most professionals have defected to the SPLA. In Ajak's opinion a soldier should receive six to nine months of training.

Ajak let me tour the front line. Sitting in the shelter of the rocks I could hear the starter grind on a nearby NIF T-55. I grabbed my borrowed Kalashnikov and moved forward with two guerrillas for a look-see. We had fun peering from behind a boulder and looking into enemy positions only 200 to 300 meters away, well within small arms range. I could hear NIF soldiers talking above the idling tank.

Although we were within spitting distance, it was actually safer up on the line, dug into the rocks and caves, than back at Sendru base 4km to the rear. There, bivouacked in thatch huts and threatened daily by Antonov and MiG attacks, and incoming rocket fire, you have to sprint to the dugouts, slit trenches and bunkers. At least up on the line you can hear the "cough" of the incoming mortars.

I found 7.62x51mm NATO rounds with Arabic headstamps lying in piles by some older remains, left after pockets were emptied and equipment and uniforms stripped from the bodies. Most SPLA wear "captured" uniforms—well laundered and bullet holes patched. The rounds hadn't been scavenged by the guerrillas who apparently have ample supplies of 7.62x51mm for their few captured H&K G-3s.

Taking Tea At The Front

The next day while at the front positions I was standing to the left of a 12.7mm DShK heavy machine gun when, Ka-Bam! There was a loud report from the enemy opposite us and an incoming round from a 12.7mm streaked over my head. Fortunately, the gun must have jammed because only a solitary round came my way. I jumped down behind our machine gun and we all had a nervous laugh.

Further along the ridgeline we received more automatic weapons fire.

BATTLING TO GET TO THE BATTLE

The only way to link up with SPLA forces facing the NIF offensive south of Juba from the Didinga Hills was to leave Sudan all together. I flew from Kenya to Uganda, landing at Entebbe and experiencing a bit of a thrill stepping onto the tarmac with my Israeli Para's mapcase. It took two days travel via Nissan bus to Gulu, last stop south of the Sudan.

The situation "upcountry" in northern Uganda is intense. President Yoweri Museveni issued a surrender ultimatum to Joseph Kony and the bush rebels: One week or we come and get you. The ultimatum to Kony's Lord's Resistance Army (LRA) ran out the day I entered the AO. Great timing.

The LRA AO is the heavily forested Acholi tribal area from Gulu, north to the Ugandan border. Rasta-haired, dirty and dressed in rags the rebels hijack and rob civilian vehicles for clothes, money and food. Even relief organization and NGO vehicles are frequently stopped and robbed. Teenage boys are pressed into the rebel ranks and sent to bush guerrilla camps for training and indoctrination.

The local troops I saw enroute to Gulu wore a hodgepodge of uniforms. One soldier carried a poorly maintained AKM with its barrel plugged with dried mud. Slings were often made of rags, and the sole magazine dented, the bottom caked with mud. The mud on the bottom of the magazines indicates that the soldiers are shoving them into the ground and then using the top of their AKM receiver as chairs — a fairly common practice among poorly trained conscripts in the Third World.

By contrast, three troopies I jokedn-smoked with outside the Acholi Inn in Gulu were well equipped with woodland pattern camouflage uniforms, decent looking leather boots and serviceable web gear. The

NCOIC, armed with an FN 5.56mm Minimi light machine gun, had a belt of 5.56mm crisscrossing his chest, Frito bandito style. He gasped in disbelief when I told him that privates in the U.S. Army carried the SAW. In Uganda only junior NCOs are competent and literate enough to use anything more technologically complex than a Kalashnikov, the universal peasant rifle.

These guys were recently transferred from Kampala. "Professional" units had been shipped in during the past week in preparation of the ultimatum. The troop reinforcement was also convenient should the Sudanese government offensive succeed in pushing the SPLA back to the Ugandan border.

They snapped to attention as a civilian in a blue cotton safari-leisure suit appeared, some type of government official. After he passed, as with most troopies worldwide, the conversation returned to weapons, whiskey and women.

The next day I caught a ride north with the relief convoy. Rebels had recently stopped a Catholic Relief Services (CRS) vehicle and robbed the Kenyans of their clothes. They left the field representative, Todd Cornett of Eugene, Oregon, his clothes, but took his money. He was thrown face down on the road and a Kalashnikov muzzle jammed against his skull.

I found out later that two civilian vehicles 20 minutes behind us were ambushed by rebels. Eight were killed and several wounded, a typical scenario in the bush. The next week, while I was in the Sudan, a government official's Land Cruiser and military escort were blown away by an RPG. I hope it wasn't my buddies and the guy in the blue leisure suit.

Ajak and his staff continued on, leaving me beside another 12.7mm gunner.

The 1st Brigade "Commando" CO, Assistant Commander Deng Kuat Nyang ran over and gave the order to open fire. I frantically jammed in my ear plugs and snapped my pistol belt. The 12.7mm really gave them hell. Dust was flying and the air was thick with cordite fumes. My eyes burned and I blinked back tears and stifled a cough as I helped feed links.

We'd given any dozing jellaba (recruits) their morning wake-up call. The reply was intense: 12.7mm and 14.5mm machine gun fire, and the distinctive ripping from a dozen or so RPDs, an obsolete belt-fed Soviet 7.62x39mm light machine gun. Rounds impacted around our position and smacked against the granite behind me. I suddenly realized how exposed this position was. My gunner fired back burst after burst, his face locked into a leering grimace.

The incoming was getting too thick not to be in a hole somewhere. Nyang yelled at me to follow him. There wasn't enough room on the hilltop for all of us and we were the odd guys out in a dangerous game of musical foxholes.

As we started down the backside of the hilltop we heard the first unmistakable toy freight train rattle-rattle of incoming rockets. Everyone flashed each other that "oh shit" look and double-timed up the forward slope of the next hill where Ajak and his staff were beginning to orchestrate the battle. As I rounded the bend of a large boulder, flinging myself down into the safety of a rocky crevice, Dom looked at me and yelled, "Rob, what the hell did you start back there?"

BM-21 rockets began impacting 100 to 200 meters to our front. The fire let up a moment and suddenly Ajak's orderly appeared with a tray of steaming tea mugs. This was the first time I ever sat in the open, sipped tea and watched rockets smack into my own lines. The secret is to sit the tea down as you hear the rocket come in and then flinch. Fifteen minutes into the exchange — though it seemed like an hour - Ajak called for 120mm mortar support. He spotted the rounds himself and sent them in on the jellaba headquarters. Then he worked over a poorly camouflaged T-55 tank - the same one that was idling the day before. After the mortars hit, the jellaba knocked off the firing for a while to rinse out their underwear.

They Die In Thousands

This brief but heavy exchange was just a taste of what was to come. Dom and Guillaume were about to get blooded as combat photographers when 45 minutes later an even more intense rocket bombardment began, sending us scuttling for cover. We were pinned down for two hours.

Over the rattle of small arms fire and the whoosh of incoming, Ajak

said, "It's not tactics ... it's a bullfight ... trying to push through ... just, go, go, go!" He discussed previous ground troop assaults, "We kept repulsing their attacks and they kept coming back. These 'mujahideen' they come in thousands and they die in thousands. They're stupid. We kill them like sheep."

I asked Ajak if he took any prison-

ers in the previous week's fighting. "No," he replied, "the mujahideen, they don't surrender. We haven't been able to capture any. We do have many prisoners, but that's from before a POW we had was killed in Pageri during the bombing." How convenient for the SPLA, who aren't disposed toward taking POWs and

then having to feed them.

"Using this route it's impossible for them, unless we withdraw." Oyay smiled slightly as he said this. The meaning was clear - Withdraw? Not bloody likely.


Despite the fact his command faces a fanatical force of light infantry supported by seven 120mm mortars, seven 107mm MRLS, two BM-21

MRLS, several 82mm mortars, and three or four T-55 tanks, his position is practically impregnable. The valley and road, nearly devoid of cover and concealment, are now heavily mined. Attacking across open ground, the NIF are enfiladed from the surrounding hilltops and rocky crags. The hills offer commanding fields of fire over the AO. The NIF attack here has stalled, so they've begun to concentrate on another front in the direction of Kit. The guerrilla soldiers manning this section of the line occasionally flinched and ducked for cover. Junior officers, full of bravado, stood partially exposed, exchanging grins at each near miss - the Sudanese version of playing chicken with the family car. These guys were motivated, enjoying every minute of the exchange, confident they were inflicting damage or at least further demoralizing the poorly trained conscripts "sent from the north to die in the south."

As enemy rockets continued to slam into the nearby hillside 150 meters away, Ajak began calling in counter-battery fire. Perched behind a flat-sided neck-high boulder, he used binoculars to spot targets for his artillery, shouting commands over his shoulder for the radio operators safely ensconced in a crevice.

Drop Five Zero, Fire For Effect

After the first six rounds of rocket fire the enemy got serious. A smoke round exploded. When I mentioned this, an SPLA officer said, "No, it's a dud." Unfortunately, I'd watched the rocket strike, heard the BANG, and watched a sizable plume of white smoke appear: spotter round. I said to Dom, "We're about to really catch shit now."

I was hoping the enemy FOs wouldn't walk the rounds in on top of us. The next round was HE, on target

No Time For Heroes

Vietnamese Pilot Shot Down By State Dept. Red Tape

f South Vietnamese air force Major Quy Nguyen An had been as ponderous and persnickety as the U.S. State Department, four more American names would be chiseled into The Wall. And we'd have one less hero to cherish in a world that needs all the heroes it can find.

Even a blind hog can find an acorn once in a while, but the State Department's striped-pants set isn't always as astute. While tripping over each other in the headlong rush to reestablish diplomatic relations with Vietnam's communist government, they vacillate in deciding whether An

ciation and the Vietnamese Air Force Veterans Association of Colorado. His appearance is part of a nationwide campaign, spearheaded by retired U.S. Air Force Colonel Noboru Masuoka of Sunnyvale, California, to generate enough public pressure to compel the State Department to do the right thing. You be the judge.

Major An's moments of glory were many during the Vietnam War - as were his rescues of U.S. military personnel — but the most momentous took place on 17 January 1969. Then a captain, An was flight leader and aircraft commander in a combined

> operation to insert U.S. Special Forces teams into a target-rich environment near the Ho Chi Minh trail in Laos.

> As one of the outstanding pilots in an elite Kingbee Squad-(219th ron Squadron, 41st Wing, Vietnamese air force), An's mission was to insert a Green Beret team into a bomb-crater LZ. Hovering above, An saw a UH-1H "Ghostrider" Huey hit by sev-

eral 37mm anti-aircraft rounds soon after dropping off its Green Beret passengers.

"We were hit several times," recalls retired U.S. Army Col. Robert A. Stratiff, then a captain. The Huey was hit "once in the fuel cell, setting us afire, with another [round] severing our hydraulic lines. We were in a very bad way, searching for a suitable clearing in the [enemy-held] jungle to set down in before we exploded."

An "entered a high-speed dive," Stratiff said. "In what seemed like a split-second, Kingbee Leader took up a position beside us."

Guided by An's H-34 Choctaw, Captain John Liner, the Ghostrider pilot, steered desperately for a clearing. But An saw danger — sharpened tree trunks hidden in 15-foot elephant grass, waiting to impale the ship of any unwary pilot who might set down.

An quickly "maneuvered his ship across our flight path, causing us to veer away from the clearing," Stratiff said. "He vectored us a little farther on" to another clearing. An set his ship down close to the disabled Huey and ordered his crew chief out with a machete, to clear a path through the elephant grass to the burning aircraft. Almost immediately, the makeshift LZ began to draw fire from a nearby enemy held tree line.

Liner's emergency LZ was "a very short distance from the Ho Chi Minh trail," Stratiff recalled. "It was crawl-

ing with NVA."

Guided by An's crew chief, Stratiff, Liner and the other two crewmen from the downed American aircraft, Staff Sergeant Ronald King and Private First Class Terry Whitehurst, ran for the safety of An's H-34, its spinning rotors faning the black smoke of their burning chopper over tossing waves of elephant grass.

"There was never a more welcome sight than to see Major An calmly smoking a cigarette and asking us if we were all right as we climbed aboard his ship," said Stratiff, now a northern Virginia resident. "Amid heavy enemy fire, he lifted us from that jungle

is worthy of the special consideration necessary to prevent his forced return to Ho Chi Minh City — and a probable prison term.

Major An received a hero's welcome in Colorado recently, his appearance sponsored by the Colorado National Guard, the Air Force Asso-

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clearing to the safety of the staging area near Dak To," where more than a dozen fresh bullet holes were counted in An's helicopter.

"Major An clearly saved four American lives by displaying extraordinary courage, skill and daring in making this rescue in the middle of a hostile enemy camp," said retired Army Col. Robert Morrison, who recommended An for a Silver Star. (He was ultimately awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross.)

"Our relationship with Major An's Kingbee unit was truly unique," Morrison recalled. "Our missions were always at great peril... We all share in the proud profession of soldiering... Few ever exceeded those expectations as did Major An... He has my hand for all my born days."

On learning that An was alive, Liner, now living in Lafayette, Louisiana, said he "always thought he'd been killed" in a later crash.

There was good reason for Liner to think An was probably dead. An was shot down four times in four-and-a-half years. The final time, on 17 September 1970, the fuel cell caught fire and exploded. An's arms were severely burned and had to be amputated below the elbows. He still smokes cigarettes, though, and can eat, write letters and ride a bicycle, with or without his artificial limbs.

South Vietnam ultimately fell and An, as a South Vietnamese air force major and war hero, was arrested by the new communist government and sent to a "re-education camp." An was deemed a "useless" candidate for "re-education" because he lacked arms for forced labor. After nine weeks of captivity, he was turned penniless onto the streets of Saigon.

An eked out a subsistence living by teaching English and mathematics, and growing orchids. But he and his family wanted desperately to leave, to somehow get to the country of so many of his old comrades-in-arms, the United States. His wife and step-daughter fled with many others in a boat. They were never heard from again. An was caught three times trying to escape, which drew a two-year prison sentence.

An and his daughter applied for the Orderly Deportation Program, set up by the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) to bring South Vietnamese veterans to the United





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States as political refugees.

There's one major piece of red tape for An, though: The INS program requires at least three years in a re-education camp.

Thanks to an intense lobbying effort in the San Francisco Bay area led by Masuoka, and key assistance by U.S. Air Force General Charles Horner, An was granted a humanitarian visa. But unless the State Department relents, the 51-year-old An and his 21-year-old daughter must return to Vietnam - and probable imprisonment - by January 1995.

It's not that President Clinton hasn't recognized An's heroism: He sent An a letter of greeting, acknowledging that "over 25 years ago... [sic: Clinton's grasp of Vietnam history is admittedly hazy you risked your life to save four American pilots. Your bravery and selfless devotion to your fellow man serve as an example for us all..."

Having made that noble pronouncement, Clinton went off to do other noble deeds. In the meantime, while the fate of An and his daughter twist in the winds of bureaucratic indifference, the State Department granted political refugee status to approximately 4,000 enemy soldiers who surrendered in Iraq. If that makes sense, you must be getting your drinking water out of the Potomac River.

"An came to the United States... to claim... freedom," said Chanh Duong of Golden, Colorado, a former pilot in the 112th Observation Squadron and later chief intelligence officer for South Vietnam's Third Air Division at Bien Hoa. "But the U.S. government denied his request... He dreamed of a future in the United States... a land of freedom, of opportunity, of prosperity. The denial of residency will destroy his future... Was it worth the risk of his own life to save the lives of four American airmen?"

Let's hope so. In the meantime, U.S. Rep. Norman Y. Mineta of California and Sen. J. Bennett Johnston of Louisiana are studying sponsorship of a private bill that would save An and his daughter from deportation. less these rules are followed during engagement, unit action stalls around the attempt to extricate casualties, thereby yielding fireand-movement initiative to the enemy. This effect was observed in approximately one-third of company actions researched.

The database clearly indicates the most effective way to deal with the enemy fighting out of a fortified camp or village is to zap him with the heaviest artillery and tactical air ordnance, not to maneuver against him with infantry only. The "finding" infantry must also carry on as the "fixing" force, leaving the "finishing" to the heavy weapons that can both kill men and batter down protective works.

If overextension is to be avoided, the sealing-in of the position cannot be assigned to the unit that has initiated the action. higher sealing-in is The command's problem. Additional maneuver elements should be dropped to the rear of the position, and if need be the flanks, to block likely escape routes, strike the withdrawing columns, and continue the mop-up once the enemy realizing the assaulting infantry will not fall victim to his subtle trap wearies of the punishment. How far these reaction deployments are spread depends on the topography, availability of natural cover, and all else connected with the enemy's ability to vanish into the landscape and our chance of cornering him before he does so. X

the KR are changing. Several members of the old guard power elite have fallen out of grace and been replaced by younger faces. In November 1992 the KR announced formation of the Great National Union Party (GNUP), headed by 10 intellectuals. These leaders are known as

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
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technocrats, not hard-liners. Dismissed by many as a front organization, GNUP has been steadily gaining power and influence and may be the KR's first attempt to transform itself from a guerrilla army into a legitimate political party.

On the tooth-rattling trip back from Pailin to Battambang I began to hope that General Saroeun and his troops would hold Pailin through the rainy season. If they do, they would administer a blow to Khmer Rouge prestige and power, moving them closer to the negotiating table. In a climate of peace and reduced military expenditures, rebuilding Cambodia could proceed at more than its current snail's pace. The Cambodian government has offered amnesty to all KR who will lay down their arms, and many have even been given government and military jobs. Cambodia needs peace. And, as I reflected on the eight-and-a-half hour spine-shattering ride from Battambang back to Phnom Penh, Cambodia could also use a good asphalt and paving company.

Shortly after SOF left Cambodia, the army announced its next objective would be Phnom Malai, 80km north of Pailin and reportedly the last guerrilla stronghold. However, in early April, the government's hold on Pailin became tenuous as the Khmer Rouge began blocking resupply efforts and stepped up attacks on remote villages along the Thai border. Under heavy pressure, government forces withdrew from Pailin on 19 April in the face of a major KR offensive. Pailin is in KR hands as of this writing but government proclaimed in mid-June that it could retake the town whenever it wanted.

Government hopes for peace talks with a defeated and weakened opponent have dissolved. Guerrillas claimed to have captured village after village while government forces scrambled to regroup and keep open major highways.

with the marker round about 100 to 150 meters from us. I saw the flash of the third round's impact. Frags bounced off the tree in front of me. The fourth round popped my ears. The bastards dropped another 50 and we took a lot of shrapnel from the next salvo. More frags hit the tree and I was showered with wood chips, branches, leaves and caught a lungful of dust. I coughed up gritty, gray phlegm all day long.

Dom shot a video which (though the Sony HandyCam blinked out a couple of times from the near misses) captured the action, interspersed with my coughing and good old American obscenities. Some of the tape appeared on CNN — minus my soundtrack. As long as we ducked low behind our rock wall and didn't take any ricocheting frags we were OK. We crouched behind the stone, our foreheads pressed against the cool granite in supplication to the god of near misses. Ajak joined us in the hole. We chain-smoked Sportsman cigarettes and ducked every time we heard the telltale rattle of another incoming rocket until the bombardment subsided. Miraculously, no one was injured. The only casualties from the firefight and rocket and mortar exchange were chipped stocks on a few Kalashnikovs and dirty underwear.

Once the arty leveled off we took the opportunity to return to the guerrilla base, where we were sporadically bombed by Antonovs and MiGs for the next two days before departing. During this time I found out that the guerrillas conduct hit-and-run raids on NIF outposts, forcing them to guard their lines of communication to Juba with fortifications every few kilometers. Despite my pleading, Ajak wouldn't let me participate in any raids or ambushes on these outposts. The NIF would get a lot of propaganda if they killed an American and captured his body. "I don't want you to get killed," he said.

"Good," I said. "I don't want me to get killed either." In the Sendru Hills, getting killed is a real possibility.


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

As we headed back to FOB 1 we took fire from a mountain near the PF AO. Our request to engage was disapproved. My confidence in SOG's sanity was sorely lacking by then.

When we landed back at Mai Loc, FOB 1 was all but empty. There was no one to meet us at the pad as we walked back to the mess hall. Something had happened.

A Kingbee had gone back into the Prairie Fire AO for a third time to lay down booby traps. On the way back out the ship was hit with 37mm antiaircraft fire and blown out of the sky. From 3,000 feet you don't walk away. Both crew and passengers were killed: Bader, Stacks, Toomey and several others. According to the State Department, they were all listed as missing until five years ago, when a recovery team "positively identified" a few teeth and bone fragments.

We all knew something was very wrong with what had happened. Who decided to leave all that equipment behind on the first mission? Why did we take all the strap hangers? Why go into the same LZ, same flight plan two more times? Why wasn't a Bright Light Team sent in to recover bodies? Whose fault was it? Who's to blame?

We all knew the odds. Everyone who died that day knew what could happen. Trying to figure it out today, after all these years, leads me to only one conclusion: It doesn't matter.

their position from being overrun by the ever-growing, angry crowd of Somalis. While patrolling their tight perimeter they killed an undetermined number of Somalis probing their position.

Chief Warrant Officer Michael Durant, the lone survivor of the crash,

remembers sitting in the cockpit of his Blackhawk "in some kind of daze," after the crash. Although stunned and a bit confused, Durant was able to talk to his co-pilot, CWO Ray Frank, who had hurt his back and was starting to get out. Durant remembers undoing his shoulder harness and trying to climb out the right side of the cockpit, but a broken right leg prevented him from getting very far.

Durant did not know the condition of the other two crewmen, but remembers seeing one of them face down in the dirt about 10 feet away from him. "He was hurt pretty bad," Durant said, "talking, but not making any sense."

When Gordon and Shughart reached the wreckage, Durant explained that he had broken his right leg and injured his back. "I don't remember hurting, so obviously they were concerned for my well-being when they lifted me up." One of the Delta operators reached inside the cockpit and retrieved Durant's weapon and several ammo magazines.

Durant said he could then hear Gordon and Shughart firing from the left side of the aircraft while he started shooting on the right side. Durant survived the ensuing firefight because of the position the Delta operators put him in.

"It was perfect the way they put me," he said. "There were only two ways anyone could have come in and I had a perfect view of both. I controlled the right side of the aircraft." Unfortunately, Durant soon ran out of ammo. "I heard Randy get shot. He had a unique voice, a distinctive voice."

When Gordon returned to Durant after the skirmish, he brought with him an M16A2 carbine. Since Shughart was the only one who carried such a weapon, it meant that the Delta sniper was badly hurt, or dead.

After his friend and fellow sniper fell, Gordon returned to the wreckage one more time, recovering an M16 rifle and five more rounds of ammunition, which he gave to Durant. Before leaving Durant to defend the right side of the aircraft, Gordon used a survival radio to call for additional aircraft. Durant said Gordon was told a ground reaction force was en route.

"Good luck," whispered Gordon as he once again went out to secure the perimeter, now armed only with his 9mm Beretta.



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Once Gordon got hit and went down, the shooting stopped and a mob overran the crash site, beating Durant and stripping him of his flight gear, before parading their prisoner through the streets of Mogadishu.

"Before those guys came in ... they had to know it was a losing battle. There was nobody else left to back them up. They were two guys in the middle of the city in the daytime. You've got a very slim chance of success," Durant said, "but if they had not come in, I would not have survived. I was sitting in the cockpit unable to get out." A day doesn't pass where Durant doesn't remember the sacrifice Gary Gordon and Randall Shughart made on his behalf: "I'm 100% convinced I would have been killed by gunfire if those guys had not been there," Durant said. "Without a doubt, I owe my life to these two men and their bravery."

Precious Delays

"Had it not taken so long for Gordon and Shughart to receive permission from the ground-force commander to be inserted, and had the task force had another CSAR team in the air," Fales said, "I believe Gordon and Shughart might have gotten Durant and his crew out of there." But the planners who put the mission together did not expect to lose four choppers that day.

Fales, who fought for 15 hours to stay alive at the first crash site before help arrived the next day, said, "What got them was the amount of time they had to stay on the ground."

When Rangers finally reached the crash site, the bodies of the four crewmembers and the two Delta operators were gone. Only the smoldering wreckage of the Blackhawk remained—that and several hundred small arms casings. "I'm sure they made every round count," observed Fales, "because you don't hear automatic weapons fire from SpecOps personnel."

After-action accounts indicate Gordon and Shughart expended all their ammo. While that may sound like they went into a situation unprepared, SF sources say Gordon and Shughart were not there to fight a protracted battle. "They were in there to do a job and get the hell out," according to one Special Forces officer.

Soldiers like Gary Gordon, a fa-

ther who filled notebooks with stories for his two young children, and Randall Shughart, who loved the outdoors and planned to build a log cabin in Montana when he retired, were selected from the ranks of Special Forces to become Delta operators because of their high degree of proven self-reliance. They were not easily rattled and they more than proved it.

So what motivates men to go into situations like the one in Somalia knowing that their chances of survival are extremely bleak? "We do it for each other," noted a veteran SF officer, "We sure don't do it for mom and apple pie."

Why Heroes Died

After the ill-fated raid of 3 October, the Clinton administration was accused of failing to provide adequate support for U.S. troops in Somalia. Flak from key members of Congress caused the president to eventually withdraw all U.S. forces.

"If there are any debates still to be had about our mission in Somalia, let people have those debates where they belong — with the president and policy makers," Clinton said as

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
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SOF '94 Convention, P.O. Box 693, Boulder, CO 80306. Gordon's wife, Carmen, handed the mahogany box containing her husband's Medal of Honor to their six-year-old son Ian. "But let there be no debate about the professionalism and the valor of those who served there, and the valor of those who died there. We are proud of what they did. We honor them. We thank them. Their actions were clearly above and bevond the call of duty."

The somber scene that unfolded in the East Room on 23 May 1994 was eerily reminiscent of Medal of Honor presentations in that same room by the late Presidents Lyndon Johnson and Richard Nixon during the Vietnam War. A total of 238 Medals of Honor were awarded during that war — 150 posthumously. The last Medal of Honor was awarded to the Unknown Soldier of the Vietnam War by President Ronald Reagan on Memorial Day, 1984. No American has been awarded a CMH for action since the Vietnam War.

The SpecOps men I talked to don't have a problem with paying the ultimate price in the national interest. Observed one decorated veteran, "We are cut a lot of slack, because at some point we're going to be asked to give a lot." But this veteran and others in the SpecOps community do have a problem with the administration's "cut and run" policy. "There's too much of this liberal crap of not wanting anybody getting hurt," he observed. "In the real world, people do get hurt, some get killed. That's why it's an honor to serve with men like Gary Gordon and Randall Shughart, who are willing to pay the ultimate price."

the Year - recently told a federal corruption jury in Los Angeles that members of their task force routinely lied under oath, falsified police reports, invented informants, planted drugs and beat suspects to get money and valuables from them," the Mercury News reported. "If police officers believe you are a drug dealer, they can take nearly anything you own. No crime is required; no arrests are necessary."

The fact that the seizing agency gets to keep three-fourths of the value of the property is problematic at best, the newspaper reported, especially when such funds are used to heavily supplement salary and equipment budgets. "Much like a drug addict becomes addicted to drugs, law enforcement agencies have become dependent on asset forfeitures," California Deputy Attorney General Gary Schons said.

The only hope for relief lies with the courts, a prospect that could take decades and cost innocent citizens millions and possibly billions of dollars. Unfortunately, the only immediate hope is with the same myopic group of people who passed the laws that got the nation into this mess: Congress. Two senators, Bob Dole, the minority leader and a Kansas Republican, and Howell Heflin. an Alabama Democrat, have sponsored a bill that would provide limited relief. Other proposals are in the works.

Still, the crisis should have and could have been avoided if Congress did not willingly fan the flames of public hysteria over crime in general and drugs in particular. At least one state judge more than a century ago, ruling on a civil forfeiture case against a former Confederate Army officer, foresaw the massive abuse implied in such supposedly legal circumvention of the Constitution:

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
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
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PARTING SHOT

... Shoveling Shit In Louisiana

olonel David Hackworth sent along these excerpts from General George S. Patton's speech given in England 29 May 1944 to U.S. troops preparing for the D-Day invasion. Can you imagine any of our so-called leaders, military or civilian, giving a similar speech in the politically correct '90s? We couldn't either.

Men, this stuff we hear about Americans wanting to stay out of this war, not wanting to fight, is a lot of bullshit: Americans love to fight — traditionally. All real Americans love the sting and clash of battle. When you were kids you all admired the champion marble player, the fastest runner, the big league ball players, the toughest boxer. Americans love a winner, and will not tolerate a loser. Americans despise cowards. Americans play to win — all the time. I wouldn't give a hoot in hell for a man who lost and laughed. That's why Americans have never lost, nor ever will lose a war, for the very thought of losing is hateful to Americans.

You are not all going to die. Only two percent of you here, in a major battle, would die. Death must not be feared. Every man is frightened at first in battle. If he says he isn't, he's a goddamn liar. Some men are cowards, yes, but they fight just the same, or get the hell shamed out of them, watching men who

do fight who are just as scared. The real hero is the man who fights even though he is scared. Some get over their fright in a few minutes under fire, some take hours. For some it takes days. But the real man never lets his fear of death overpower his honor, his sense of duty to his country, and his innate manhood.

All through your army career you men have bitched about what you call, "this chicken shit drilling." That is all for a purpose. Drilling and discipline must be maintained in an army, if only for one reason: instant obedience to orders and to create constant alertness. I don't give a damn for a man who is not always on his toes. You men are veterans or you wouldn't be here. You are ready. A man, to continue breathing, must be alert at all times. If not, sometime a German son-of-abitch will sneak up behind him and beat him to death with a sock full of shit.

There are 400 neatly marked graves somewhere in Sicily, all because one man went to sleep on his job. But they are German graves, for we caught the bastards asleep before they did ...

My men don't surrender. I don't want to hear of a soldier under my command being captured unless he is hit. Even if you are hit, you can still fight. That's not just bullshit either. The kind of man I

want is like a lieutenant in Libya, who, with a Luger against his chest, jerked off his helmet, swept the gun aside with the other hand, and busted hell out of the enemy with his helmet. Then he jumped on the gun and went out and killed another German. By this time this man had a bullet through his lung. That's a man for you.

All the real heroes are not storybook combat fighters either. Every man in the army plays a vital part. Every little job is essential to the whole scheme. What if every truck driver suddenly decided that he didn't like the whine of those shells and turned vellow and jumped headlong into the ditch? He could say to himself, "They won't miss me -- just one guy in thousands." What if every man said that? Where in the hell would we be now?

No, thank God, Americans don't say that. Every man does his job. Every man serves the whole. Every department, every unit, is very important in the vast scheme of things. The ordnance men are needed to supply the guns, the quartermaster to bring up the food and clothes for us - for where we're going there isn't a hell of a lot to steal. Every damn last man in the mess hall, even the one who heats the water to keep us from getting diarrhea, has a job to do. Even the chaplain is important, for if we get killed, and he was not there to bury us, we'd all go to hell.

Each man must not only think of himself, but think of his buddy fighting beside him. We don't want vellow cowards in this army. They should be killed off like flies. If not they will go back home after the war and breed more cowards. We've got to save the fucking for the fighting men. The brave men will breed more brave men. Kill off the goddamn cowards and we'll have a nation of brave men.

One of the bravest men I saw in the African campaign was one of the fellows I saw on top of a telegraph pole in the midst of a furious fire while we were plowing toward Tunis. I stopped and asked him what the hell he was doing up there at that time. He answered, "fixing the wire, sir."

"Isn't it a little unhealthy right now?" I asked.

"Yes, sir, but this goddamn wire has to be fixed." There was a real soldier. There was a man who devoted his all to his duty, no matter how great the odds, no matter how seemingly insignificant his duty may have seemed at that time ...

Thank God that at least 30 years from now when you are sitting around the fireside with your grandson on your knee, and he asks you what you did in the great World War II, you won't have to say, "I shoveled shit in Louisiana."

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
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
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
