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

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74 MILLION ROUND MISTAKE

In the wake of the galloping paranoia generated by the Oklahoma City bombing, it appears U.S. Customs dusted off a two-year-old (and incorrect) tip from a confidential informant that Eagle-Exim of Santa Clara, California, was smuggling illegal am-

munition. Without even bothering to check, federal agents got a warrant and showed up at Eagle's old address with a raiding party, busting in on a precision metalworking company who now occupied the space Eagle had left months before. When the feds finally got their addresses and warrants straight, they seized some 74 million rounds of 7.62x39 ammo, claiming it was illegally imported Chinese manufacture.

"They were wrong," said company president Don St. Pierre. "Dead



wrong." Former chief federal prosecutor for the Bay area Joseph Russonielio noted, "Clearly, the service got caught up in the heat of the moment." Robert Weisberg, a teacher of law procedure at Stanford Law School observed, "This kind of thing shouldn't happen."

The soft-nose ammo, of course, was neither Chinese nor illegal. After some face-saving attempts, the feds had to give it back. Eagle-Exim promised not to sue the government for damages, although they are out some \$250,000 in lost sales and legal fees. Well, at least the feds didn't come in shooting this time — might have been em-

barrassing when they had the wrong address.

TRUTH HURTS SPOTLIGHT

The conspiracy mongers who churn out *The Spotlight* fishwrapper each week were not at all amused when confronted with the truth in our article "All The News That's Fit to Invent" (Aug. '95).

WHO'S THE MILITIA?

Into the current militia debate, we'd like to interject, hot off the press, what Title 10 United States Code — Armed Forces, (As Amended Through December 31, 1994) says about who is the militia. Quoting from "Chapter 13 — The Militia, Section 311. Militia: composition and classes":

(a) The militia of the United States consists of all able-bodied males at least 17 years of age and, except as provided in section 313 of Title 32, under 45 years of age who are, or who have made a declaration of intention to become, citizens of the United States and of female citizens of the United States who are members of the National Guard.

(b) The classes of the militia are — (1) the organized militia, which consists of the National Guard and the Naval Militia; and (2) the unorganized militia, which consists of the members of the militia who are not members of the National Guard or the Naval Militia.

We're not lawyers, but taking this at face value it would seem "Acting Adiutant General of the Unorganized Militia of the United States" Linda Thompson doesn't qualify because she's a gal. Aside from being rather poorly worded, it appears this law is rife with sexist, ageist implications. We rather prefer George Mason's definition given at the Virginia Constitution ratification convention in 1788: "...I ask, Who are the militia? They consist now of the whole people, except for a few public officers." 🕱

HERE COME DA JUDGE

Daniel S. Pearson, a retired Florida appellate judge and former federal prosecutor, has been named to investigate the finances of Commerce Secretary Ron Brown. Now in private practice, Pearson, 64, was selected by a three-judge court empowered to pick such investigators.

Attorney General Janet Reno asked the court in May to select a counsel to determine if Brown improperly accepted nearly \$500,000 from a business partner, and whether he deliberately filed inaccurate financial statements and a misleading mortgage statement. Pearson has been commissioned by the court to determine if Brown committed any federal felonies; his specific mission is to investigate Brown's acceptance of money from former partner Nolanda Hill or her firm First International Inc., Brown's financial disclosure reports, and his application for a mortgage in 1993.

D'AMATO PROMISES VIGOROUSNESS

Promising that the investigation would be impartial and thorough, Sen. Alfonse D'Amato, R-N.Y., has announced hearings on the Whitewater affair involving President and Hillary Rodham Clinton. D'Amato said the hearings would begin with the issue of whether improper conduct occurred in the handling of documents in the office of White House

Deputy Counsel Vincent Foster after his gunshot death two years ago. "The Whitewater committee plans a vigorous schedule of hearings and depositions," D'Amato stated. "We expect to conduct further rounds of hearings over the remainder of this year and perhaps into next year, if necessary, to complete the committee's work."

According to sources close to the Whitewater investigation, one of several conflicts in the White House account of what happened after the death of Vince Foster will be testimony from Secret Service uniformed officer Henry O'Neill, who has told prosecutors that he saw Hillary Clinton's chief of staff, Margaret Williams. remove papers from Vince Foster's White House office suite the night of his death. Ms. Williams disputes the guard's statement, and at her instigation took, and passed, a lie detector test last fall.

BILL'S BUDDY GETS HARD TIME

Webster Hubbell, the longtime friend of President Clinton appointed to the No. 3 post at the Justice Department, has been sentenced to nearly two years in prison for bilking legal clients at the Arkansas law firm where he and Hillary Rodham Clinton were partners. Hubbell is the first former Clinton staff official sentenced to prison in the 18month-long Whitewater investigation. Whitewater

prosecutor Kenneth Starr spoke glowingly Hubbell's contributions to his community and country, but did not mention Hubbell's cooperation with the Whitewater investigation — or that many of Hubbell's charitable acts were paid for with stolen money. Hubbell was also ordered to repay \$135,000 of the \$482,410 he stole, and to spend three years on probation.

FIRED FOB PAID \$3,000 A MONTH

President Clinton's Arkansas pal. Dave Watkins. was his head of administration during the 1992 campaign, and followed Clinton to Washington to serve the same function at the White House, But last vear when Watkins took a \$14,000 ride in a presidential helicopter to go golfing in Maryland and it came to light — he was dunned for the \$14,000 ride. Watkins said he was checking out the course for Clinton, and according to the New York Daily News he tried to get other staffers to pony up. too. Watkins was ultimately sacked over the affair ... but hardly sent away hungry. Business Week now reports that since his firing last July, Watkins, now vice-president of a California golfmanufacturing club company, has been receiving a \$3,000 a month stipend. Fortunately, fellow taxpayers, this retainer did not come from the federal coffers, but from the Clinton campaign. Why? Because his knowledge of campaign finances was supposedly needed to answer audit questions from the Federal Election Commission. Of course. If Joe Doakes knew anything, he would get a subpoena: FOBs get a retainer just in case they know something.

"ASSAULT WEAPONS" ADS: DEM STRATEGISTS UNHAPPY

According to columnist Deborah Orin, a lot of **Democratic** strategists think President Clinton has shot himself in the foot with his \$2.5 million ads bad-mouthing "assault weapons" and touting his uncharacteristically faithful stand against them. Democratic critics regard it as a waste of money, being run some 18 months before the election, and resent the loss of the \$2.5 million, which counts against the amount Clinton is allowed to spend in his re-election bid. "It's money right down the toilet," said one skeptical Democrat. Further, airing campaign ads so early and having aides boast about the political dividends - makes Clinton look political and undercuts his attempts to build an above-the-fray "presidential" image. Noted Republican national chairman Haley Barbour, "Clinton claims that he is not starting the campaign — but the American people are getting used to Bill Clinton saving one thing and doing another." 🕱

SOF Fabricates Quote?

hen other media express differing viewpoints from SOF, we usually think that is a healthy sign of the marketplace of ideas we both work, and it's fine with us.

Consequently, SOF seldom wallows in editorial imbroglios with other members of the press. But we do make exceptions, such as when a particular publication's bizarre twisting or outright fabrication of fact are so demonstrably wrong that this in itself is news (see "All The News That's Fit To Invent," SOF July '95). Another exception would be when a credible writer accuses SOF of printing "what appears to be a wholly fabricated quotation."

Our long established editorial policy is to correct any error that creeps onto our pages, and we are therefore grateful if an error is questioned, as this serves to help us address it. But in the instance at hand we have to perceive the question as an accusation of editorial irresponsibility — not an error — and we must admit to being slightly less than grateful.

The issue at hand is whether Janet Reno, while a prosecutor in South Florida, attended a B'nai B'rith meeting in 1984 where she told the assembly that, "The most effective means of fighting crime in the United States is to outlaw the possession of any type of

firearm by the civilian populace." This statement was referenced in the April 1995 SOF article "... Necessary To The Security Of A Free State" which dealt with citizen militias. The story was subsequently syndicated by The New York Times, and drew printed response from the major media, including the above "what-appears-tobe-a-wholly-fabricatedquotation" judgment from St. Petersburg (Florida)

SOF's source for this Janet Reno quote is Fred Diamond, a retired investment banker and resident of Dade County, Florida, who was present at the referenced meeting. His

in response to his recent query, Janet Reno told him that "...she could not remember ever suggesting that all guns should be banned. 'I can't say I never said anything like that,' she added. 'I might have made a statement that guns are killing, but I don't recall that statement.'

Although Ms. Reno "does not recall," a credible witness issued a sworn affidavit regarding what he does recall. In deciding where the truth may lie, Dyckman tells his readers to "consider the source" [i.e. Soldier Of Fortune]. By association Dyckman also impinges the credibility of several other publications, including the National Review, which used the same quote in its 29 May 1995 issue.

Apparently in Mr. Dyckman's world you can only trust the St. Petersburg Times. In the real world. however, you should be leery of any "journalist" who's grown so comfortable with the public officials he's supposed to be watching to write: "Having known Janet Reno for nearly 25 years, I can say with confidence that she does not say dumb things." That was the lead to Dyckman's attack on SOF, and we suppose if one operates under that assumption, there's little point to actually listening to what Ms. Reno says.

SOF stands by the article, and the statement attributed to Janet Reno.

In a light vein we sometimes preface a startling. semi-humorous factoid in a column with "We're not making this up." But even when we do not use this preface, the reader may rest assured we do not -ever — make things up. In our 20-year effort to go where it's happening and get the truth independently, SOF has had more reporters shot out from under their cameras than we now have editorial staff. As we write this, our Publisher/ Editor Bob Brown is in Sarajevo trying to get a sworn affidavit, dated 17 June 1993, reads, in part: "Although the focus of her presentation was to discuss what her office was doing to control crime in Dade County, Janet Reno responded to questioning concerning her position on gun control.

"Janet Reno told the members of our group assembled that waiting periods were only a step, that registration was only a step, and further that prohibition of the private ownership of firearms was the only ultimate solution to controlling crime."

I am dismayed to see what appears to be an attempt to defame antibig-government people in general and *The Spotlight* in particular. These people


may be somewhat over the edge, but you can hardly blame them. We have been lied to and messed with by "our" government for several decades.

Removing The Crimp From Your Style

hose who shoot fast guns must either locate inexpensive surplus ammunition or reload, or — most commonly - both, as machine guns consume considerably larger quantities of fuel than rifles or pistols. If you intend to reload using Boxer-primed military cases, you have a problem. Military cases, no matter the country of origin, almost always have primers which are staked or ring-crimped in place. And that includes such popular cartridges as .45 ACP, 5.56x45mm NATO (.223 Remington), 7.62x51mm NATO (.308 Winchester) and .30-06.

Staking is usually at three points around the primer. Frankford Arsenal used to stake-crimp .50 caliber Browning machine gun ammunition. The more common ring crimp is formed by means of a knife-rim concave die, only slightly larger than the diameter of the primer. This punch contacts the case head and curls brass over the entire circumference of the outer edge of the primer.

Very little has been written about why military small arms ammunition has crimped or staked primers. Frank Hackley (the former commanding officer of Lake City and Frankford Arsenals) of the Woodin Laboratory, a world renowned foundation devoted to the re-

search of military and police small arms cartridges under 35mm, informed me that there were several reasons for crimping or staking primers. First of all, this helps to secure the primer in the event of an oversize pocket or undersize cup, both entirely possible when massproduced, high-speed priming and case drawing (the multiple-step process

by which a small block of brass or steel is stamped into a cartridge case) is subjected to the haste and consequent drop in quality control usually associated with wartime production.

Secondly, this procedure reduces the possibility of blown primers caused by overpressure as a result of adverse storage conditions, propellant deterioration associated with aging, or excessive head-

space (encountered more frequently in Browning machine guns which feature operator-adjusted headspace). I would personally add that machinegun barrels and receivers are designed to serve as heat sinks during sustained fire in order to dissipate heat and prevent

premature ignition — "cook off." However, when temperatures rise above 200 degrees Celsius, cook offs can occur and pressures will increase to dangerous levels. Because of the volume of fire required on the battlefield, it is difficult to design weapons that preclude the possibility of overheating. Blown primers can induce serious stoppages in auto-

Regardless of what some gun writers have said, removing a spent primer that has been staked or crimped in place is usually not difficult. The ordeal commences with the attempt to seat a new primer into a pocket that has a ring crimp surrounding it. I learned this the hard way about 30 years ago when I tried to seat primers into a substantial

matic weapons. In addition, crimping strengthens the head of the case, especially around the primer pocket, as the compression involved in the process helps to maintain a uniform hardness gradient in the brass. Finally, crimping assists in waterproofing the primer pocket.

batch of military .45 ACP cases without first removing the crimp. In those days, we had to painstakingly ream out the ring crimp case by case with a hand tool. With the advent of Mike Dillon's superb RL 1000 progressive

reloader, this became unnecessary as the machine provided automatic primer pocket swaging. While no longer in the Dillon Precision Products Inc. (Dept. SOF, 8009 E. Dillon's Way, Scottsdale, AZ 85260; phone: 800-762-3845) catalog, the RL 1000 remains a legendary piece of equipment, still in use throughout the country (I have serial No. 037). Of Dillon's current line of progressive loaders, only the RL 1050 features automatic primer pocket swaging. However, Dillon does not recommend reloading either 7.62x51mm NATO or .30-06 with the RL 1050. Thus, those reloading .308 Winchester or .30-06 and all those using either the Square Deal "B," RL 550B or XL 650 are well-advised to obtain the Dillon Super Swage 600 if they intend to employ military surplus cartridge cases.

Priced at just under \$70, the Dillon Super Swage 600 uses no shell holders (unlike the failed primer pocket swagers of several other manufacturers). When swaging primer pockets, support should come from inside the case. Primer pocket swagers that try to use a standard shell holder for case support invariably leave a horseshoe-shaped distortion on the case head.

Dillon's Super Swage 600 utilizes a case locator rod that the empty case slips over to provide maximum support for the case and prevent damage to the case's rim. Two rods and a bushing are supplied. The unit comes with the 5.56x45mm rod installed. The larger rod is for .30 rifle caliber cases and both .38 Special and 9mm Parabellum pistol cases. A bushing that fits over the larger rod will accommodate .45 ACP cases. It takes only a few minutes to change the case locator rods and involves only removing the retaining nut in back of the swager lever, unscrewing the threaded case locator rod and installing the new one in the reverse manner. Set a case over the rod and adjust the case locator rod in or out so that the case goes freely down

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

I WAS THERE

A Company Job

here are certain dates in one's life that stay etched in your memory. I can vividly remember my wedding day, where I was the day JFK was assassinated and 18 March 1972.

I was a CH-34D helicopter pilot for Air America Inc. on what started as a routine flight from Udorn, Thailand, to Pakse, Laos, where I was scheduled to remain for six days. My passengers were flight crews "dead-heading" up country for crew rotation.

I was about 10 minutes from refueling in Savannakhet, Laos, when the Air Force airborne controller (known as "King") for search and rescue (SAR) missions in Laos broadcasted a message searching for any Air America helicopter in the AO that might be available to help rescue a downed pilot.

Normally the military took care of their own SARs, but Air America made many rescues simply because we were in the area, available and fast. The Air Force was often its own worst enemy — by the time their birds were scrambled and briefed, cover provided and authentication of the downed pilot made (as if the enemy would stage a fake crash), he'd probably be captured.

I responded that I was available. After refueling, I was put in touch with "Sandy One," the onscene commander directing the rescue operation. The downed aircraft was an OV-10 forward air controller out of Vietnam. He had been shot down over the Ho Chi Minh Trail about 40 miles east of Savannakhet. The crew was hiding on the east side of the road. A quick pickup could avert certain capture by the NVA.

I contacted Sandy One shortly after takeoff and was advised to head east to Route 23 and take up Force] are on the way and will be making the pickup."

That was just fine with me and my crew. We didn't relish the idea of flying through all the AAA reported in the area. I heard the Jollies call Sandy with an ETA of 15 minutes.

Sandy descended toward the target to get a visual on the downed pilot. A few seconds later his wing man reported ground fire in Sandy's AO. As he was making the pass Sandy Two came up again, "You're receiving fire."

Sandy One answered, "I've been hit and I'm on fire!"

I interjected at that point to turn to heading 270 before bailing out. I wanted him to head toward us and bail out on the west side of Route 23. "Negative, I'm heading south and ejecting right now!"

We didn't have a visual on him because of the smoke. As he was making his last transmission I turned on the UHF homing switch to locate his position, nosed over and descended to treetop level before crossing Route 23. The pilot we came to pick up would have to wait; we had to rescue the rescuers.

My two crew members, Captain B.J. Ruck, co-pilot, and flight mechanic Jim Nakamoto both agreed to go on with the rescue. There was no doubt this could turn into a shit sandwich in a great big hurry.

Another Air America CH-34 arrived as backup and remained in orbit west of the trail. I went in for the pickup. We were low, pulling lots of power and maintaining max air speed. The wheels were inches from the treetops. When we crossed Route 23 we were exposed much longer than I anticipated. It looked like a four-lane

an orbit, but not to — under any circumstances — cross the road. As I flew closer to the area I could hear Sandy One talking to the downed pilot over the radio. He was OK but NVA soldiers were starting to look for him.

Arriving at Route 23, I began to orbit and called Sandy with my position. I requested the coordinates of the downed airman but Sandy refused. "Besides," he said, "the Jollies [Air

The next radio transmission was from one of the Jollies reporting (in a nervous sounding voice) he had to RTB (return to base) due to a fluctuating gauge (probably his blood pressure). Number Two came back with, "I'm right behind you." He sounded relieved too.

I called Sandy again and requested the coordinates. He wanted to make another pass over the area and get back to me.

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

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

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COMBAT WEAPONCRAFT

Personal Patrol Pack

he model 1957 butt-pack should be familiar to grunts of the last four decades.

When combined with GI suspenders, pistol belt, magazine pouches and canteens, it allows for mobility yet carries a basic load of supplies. It can carry enough spare clothing and food to keep a prudent operator going for several days in decent field and weather conditions. A logical addition allowing extended field use is a backpack carrying "first to use" items as well as comfort items. Items carried in the backpack can be used to resupply the butt-pack.

I have combined the 1957 butt-pack system with a small commercial ALICE-style pack, and this works very well. Given water, this gear has the capacity to keep you operating for about 14 days.

You will note the ammo pouches are for the M1A or M14 rifle — in my opinion the "better" rifle for an unsupported operator to have.

If you come under attack with this system on, you can jettison the backpack and continue to operate for several days from the butt-pack supplies. Here is how the system is put together:

The backpack is a mini-ALICE pack imported by Brigade Quartermasters that sells for \$39. It is a few inches shorter than the small-size GI issue ALICE pack. I stand 5 feet 11 inches and cannot use the GI small ALICE pack and still fit the butt-pack system, but one who stands about 6 feet 3 inches could.

Our mini-ALICE pack is configured to hold two exterior canteens, ammo pouches (80 rounds) and a twoquart bladder canteen stored in a separate pocket inside the pack. The pack also holds three pairs of socks, a wool sweater, underwear, first aid kit, one shirt, pants, and six MREs. The three outside pockets each have an MRE and toilet paper, nylon 550 cord

and other small items to top them off. Additionally, I pack a 14-inch machete (serving as a knife or shovel), four small smoke canisters, flashlight, and 35-gallon garbage bags for multiple uses. The two small attached extra pockets can carry lighter items.

On the GI pistol belt are four ammo pouches holding 160 rounds, three canteens, and the butt-pack. Attached to the butt-pack are two more pouches giving another 80 rounds of ammo. Inside are 50 feet of 550 cord, three pairs of socks,

ground cover, pocketknife, four MREs, first aid kit, camo netting, gloves, camo long-sleeve T-shirt, watch cap, eye protection, can opener, binoculars and ear plugs. Attached to the outside is a GI poncho.

The pistol belt is designed with the suspenders to be worn quite high on the body, but few troops do. However, when worn in the high position the grenade straps of the ammo pouches may be snapped into the steel rings on the suspenders, creating a tight and strong unit.

I like this system but I, too, prefer wearing the pistol belt lower, which helps make room for the ALICE pack. To take advantage of the ammo pack straps I make a loop by tying a length of 550 cord through the steel suspender rings, and clip the pouch straps to this cord loop, eliminating most pouch-wobble and acting as a backup should the metal suspender-strap fitting break.

I also run extra 550 cord from the butt-pack to the suspenders to assist in keeping things attached should the snaps

or suspenders break. This reinforcement insures I can operate without having to do field repairs should a suspension part of the system fail.

I leave suspenders clean: About the only thing I consider hanging on suspenders is the individual first aid pouch. Knives and flashlights are "sexy" but the latter can send reflection from the lens, and if I need a large knife that fast I'm probably dead. Suspenders are certainly no place to hang smoke or gas grenades unless you like the idea of a lucky hit re-

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leasing toxic chemicals under your chin.

I utilize the "old" style H-pattern suspenders. The H-pattern is superior to the current military "Y" style because they do not twist around, are more stable, and allow for finer tuning of the load. These suspenders and butt-packs are available in cotton or nylon.

Using the system is simple: Expend supplies in the mini-ALICE pack first. Only then should you proceed to the items of the buttpack and pistol belt. Obviously, items in the ALICE pack are to be used to refill the belt pack kit if and as those supplies are expended first. You want the belt gear to be constantly topped off because the ALICE pack may have to be dumped for mobility: That is the salient feature of this modular, dual-pack system.

Dividing weights and supplies for mobility is the better way to go. Weight of a pistol belt and buttpack assembly set up and loaded as described is 33 pounds.

The mini-ALICE pack weighs in at 33 to 35 pounds, loaded. The average infantryman would not typically go into combat with nearly 300 rounds of 7.62mm ammo, since soldiers have strong resupply lines. However, unsupported operators may have to operate from their personal gear for weeks.

Contact will determine how quickly ammo is expended, but if you don't shoot you can't eliminate the enemy. Water is absolutely essential: You can do without food, and even a gun, but you will weaken quickly without water. In extreme cold or heat you can reconfigure for extra clothing or water, which will impact the amount of ammo and food you carry.

A complete pack system like this (belt, suspenders, butt-pack, mini-ALICE) will set you back \$50-\$75 depending on source and condition. Potential combat for the unsupported operator dictates light, fast and efficient movement in order to survive, shoot, move and communicate effectively. This unit works well toward that end.

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
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WORLD SITREP

UNITED STATES

Captain Scott O'Grady may have flown into a trap set by Bosnian Serbs in retaliation for air strikes on Pale ammunition dumps. SA-6 launchers were moved 40 km from their base at Banja Luka to an area with no targets to protect, but one that was overflown several times each day by NATO planes. The missile which downed the American jet may have been fired blind — without radar guidance — but once the missile broke through the clouds, its backup infrared guidance system may have locked on to O'Grady's aircraft without giving him time to take evasive action. U.S. intelligence learned of the missile launcher move before the flight, but word did not reach the pilots.

President Clinton authorizes the transfer of \$15 million from Pentagon operations, training and maintenance funding to start support for the Quick Reaction Force in Bosnia. This method of funding does not require congressional approval.

GREAT BRITAIN

High Court rules that a military ban on homosexuality is legal, but predicts Parliament will change the law in the near future.

TURKEY

Iranian officials approve Turkish plan for joint military actions against PKK rebels along their border, but reject proposals that would allow Turkish troops to pursue rebels into Iran. Turkish commanders in Tunceli admit Kurdish civilian support for PKK rebels is a major problem.

SOMALIA

Delegations from both Aidid and Ali Mahdi arrive in Addis Ababa trying to claim Somalia's seat at the OAU summit. Aidid seeks to cement the support of as many groups as possible, appointing 34 cabinet ministers, including a tourism minister (there have been no tourists in 10 years) and a telecommunications minister (the entire telephone system was dismantled by looters years ago and sold for scrap).

RUSSIA

Russian-built, laser-guided, cannon-launched missiles in 105mm and 120mm calibers are available for export. For use in Westernbuilt tanks only, the missiles have an 80% hit probability at 5 km.

Prime Minister Chernomyrdin takes personal charge of Chechen peace talks. Dudayev agrees to resign as president of Chechnya if Moscow recognizes the republic as an independent state.

ARGENTINA


Government offers \$800,000 per family to Falklanders in an attempt to convince them to accept Argentine sovereignty. The 2,000 people living on the island express little interest in the arrangement.

SRI LANKA

Rebels launch a 500man amphibious raid on army supply base on Mandaithivu Island, killing 99 soldiers and 50 rebels. The rebels capture a huge stockpile of weapons and munitions.

SIERRA LEONE

New South African advisers report the military will be reorganized to carry the battle to the rebels. Military dictator Valentine Strasser orders the retirement of current army commander and appoints Brigadier Joy Turay. Government troops launch airmobile assaults supported by Ukranian-piloted gunships and destroy rebel bases near the Kole River, Jahi Koya and Kenema.





Second Amendment

What Gun Grabbers Don't Want You

Throughout our history, SOF has never wavered in its defense of Americans' Second Amendment right to keep and bear arms.

As far back as issue No. 4 we addressed "The Future of Gun Ownership in the U.S." and predicted much of what is happening today - not because we're prescient, but because the roots of today's gun grabbing were sown decades ago. We saw it coming, we still see it coming and we continue to fight it, month after month.

This article isn't normal SOF fare, but in our anniversary month we thought we'd detail some of the reasons we so dogmatically stand up for the amendment that insures all the others.

Anti-gun politicians claim the right to arms applies only to the National Guard or, contradicting themselves, only to sporting arms that it does not guarantee the right to self-defense, to carry a concealed weapon or to own a militia rifle so you can defend your freedom. Like Sen. Dianne Feinstein lecturing Justice Stephen Breyer at his Supreme Court confirmation hearings, they claim the framers of the Constitution left little guidance as to the meaning of the Second Amendment.

They lie.

The founders of our country were prolific writers and public speakers. They passionately wanted their great experiment — a more democratic government than any the world had seen - to succeed. They left us plenty whereby we might fathom their intent. In particular they felt that an armed citizenry was the cornerstone of freedom.

And their writings on the subject are clear, unequivocal and unanimous. "Firearms stand next in importance to the Constitution itself. They are the American people's liberty teeth and the keystone under independence," according to George Washington.

We face three choices: allow our most basic human right, the one which enables us to defend all other rights, to be nibbled away; work ceaselessly to counter the gunophobes' lies no matter how weary we grow of the struggle; or take up arms and purge these usurpers from our body politic. The third choice is as repugnant as the first is unthinkable. Sadly, we may yet be forced to it. But humanity obligates us to avoid such bloodshed if

To counter the lies of the gunophobes with truth, we must know the history of the Second Amendment.

I urge you to spend a few evenings in a law school library studying the right to arms. If you lack time, or a university nearby, here is ammunition for your struggle. Because they are important to the argument, I will include comments by later observers and Supreme Courts that have touched upon the Second Amendment, as well as the words of those who gave us our democracy.

The First Law Of Nature

Sir William Blackstone's Commentaries on the Laws of England, 1769, was one of the primary legal references used by our Founding Fathers. Blackstone said that the right to selfdefense is a God-given, absolute, inalienable right of every human being, "... justly called the primary law of nature, so it is not, neither can it be in fact, taken away by the laws of society." Our Founding Fathers often referred to the right of self-defense, including the right to defend our freedom against a corrupt government, as "the first law of nature," a right every human being has owned since before we were human.

As British General Thomas Gage was landing four regiments in Boston in 1769, the New York Journal noted the right to arms "is a natural right which the people have reserved to themselves, confirmed by the [English] Bill of Rights, to keep arms for their own defense," and, as Mr. Blackstone observed, "it is to be made use of when the sanctions of society and law are found insufficient to restrain the violence of oppression."

Feeling as they did that self-defense was the primal human right and wellspring of all human freedom, the Founding Fathers could not imagine we would allow a small elite to destroy that right. Nonetheless, John Adams clarified their intent regarding self-defense: "Arms in the hands of citi-

zens [may] be used at individual discretion ... in private self-defense..."

Thomas Paine, political philosopher and author of Common Sense, continued: "... arms like laws discourage and keep the invader and the plunderer in awe, and presume order in the world... The same balance would be preserved were all the world destitute of arms ... but since some will not, others dare not lay them aside... Horrid mischief would ensue were one half the world deprived of the use of them ... "

The American theory of democracy insists that government does not grant rights to the people, but that all rights are inherently owned by the people, individually and collectively. We lend certain rights to government only in the interest of peaceful coexistence. Those rights are subject to recall if government abuses them.

We also set certain rights off-limits to government. The Constitution is a fence within which government

remains. The Bill of Rights is a palisade behind which we guard rights that belonged to our ancestors before the dawn of history, telling government "Beyond this line you shall not cross." If government tries to infringe on those rights, we have every right to abolish it and start again.

The Supreme Court recognized this premise in U.S. vs. Cruikshank: "... The right of the people to peaceably assemble [for]... lawful purposes existed long before the adoption of the Constitution of the United States... It has always been one of the attributes of citizenship under a free government... It was not, therefore, a right granted to the people by the Constitution. The government of the United States when established found it in existence ... the right of bearing arms for a lawful purpose ... is not a right granted by the Constitution. Neither is it in any way dependent upon that instrument for its existence..."

Cruikshank is a twisty piece of litigation, yet it's plain the justices believed the right to arms predated the Constitution and that the legislature has no right to deprive any of arms.

Albert Gallatin, secretary of the Treasury under Thomas Jefferson, explained: "The whole of the Bill [of Rights] is a declaration of the rights of the people at large or as individuals... It establishes some rights

of the individual as inalienable and which consequently, no majority has a right to deprive them of."

Paramount of those rights is the right to keep and bear arms. Samuel Adams, American statesman and the force behind the Boston Tea Party, agreed: "The Constitution shall never be construed [to authorize Congress] to prevent the people of the United States, who are peaceable citizens,

from keeping their own arms..."

Thomas Jefferson continued: "No free man shall ever

be debarred the use of arms."

And William Rawle, whose commentaries on the Constitution became a standard text on the subject: "... the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed. The prohibition is general. No clause in the Constitution could by any rule of construction be conceived to give the Congress a power to disarm the people."

And Justice William O. Douglas: "When a legislature undertakes to proscribe the exercise of a citizen's constitutional rights it acts lawlessly, and the citizen can take matters into his own hands and proceed on the basis that such a law is no law at all."

Proper, Natural State

Madison did not pen the Bill of Rights in a vacuum. The states, which withheld ratification of the Constitution until they were promised it would include a bill of rights, sent their own proposals for Madison to study, sum-

marize and include. Several states had passed their own bills of rights; Madison considered those too. Their proposals for protecting the right to arms help us understand their intent.

New Hampshire: "Congress shall never disarm any citizen, unless such as are or have been in actual rebellion."

New York: "That the people have a right to keep and bear arms; that a

well-regulated militia, including the body of the people capable of bearing arms, is the proper, natural, and safe defense of a free state."

Pennsylvania: "That the people have a right to bear arms for the defense of themselves and their own state, or the United States, or for the purpose of killing game; and no law shall be passed for disarming the people or any of them, unless for crimes committed, or real danger of public harm from individuals; and as standing armies in the time of peace are dangerous to liberty, they ought not to be kept up; and that the military shall be kept under strict subordination to and be governed by the civil power."

This proposal contains the only mention of hunting I have found in the words of the Founding Fathers, except for a letter in which Jefferson advised his nephew to eschew ball sports "which stamp no character on the mind." He felt hunting built character and taught skills needed by a militiaman. Hunting arms are protected by the Second Amendment, largely because they are also useful militia weapons — your scoped deer rifle would make a fine sniper rifle. But they are not its primary intent. A constitutional amendment to protect a right to sporting goods is ludicrous and unnecessary.

Samuel Adams' proposal for the Bill of Rights stated: "... and that the said Constitution be never construed to infringe the just liberty of the press or the rights of conscience; or to prevent the people of the United States who are peaceable citizens from keeping their own arms; or to raise standing armies, unless when necessary for the defense of the United States or of some one or more of them; or to prevent the people from

petitioning, in a peaceful and orderly manner, the federal legislature for a redress of grievances; or to subject the people to unreasonable searches or seizures of their persons, papers, or possessions."

The Pennsylvania Constitution of 1790 and the Kentucky Constitution of 1792, drafted with detailed advice from James Madison, upheld: "That

the right of citizens to bear arms, in defense of themselves and the state, shall not be questioned.²⁹

The inalienable right of self-defense applies to all attackers: private and government sponsored. The Founding Fa-

their saw kings across Europe use their armies to tyrannize their subjects. These same armies were often able to turn into despots themselves.

Remember Ruby Ridge, Waco and our government's use of its own citizens as unwitting lab rats to test effects of radioactivity. In light of these atrocities, what purpose does the government have in disarming the citizenry while agencies like the BATF keep their guns? George Mason, a colonial leader influential in drafting the Bill of Rights, knew as early as 1788 when he spoke at the Virginia Constitution ratification convention: "To disarm the people [is] the best and most effectual way to enslave them..."

Armed Citizens Are The Militia

Just as the inalienable right of selfdefense applies to individuals, the framers of the Constitution insisted it applied collectively to society. The best model available was Switzerland, which at that time had already enjoyed two centuries of peace and freedom because all Swiss males were trained in arms, kept arms in their homes and were ready to fight on an hour's notice.

While the Swiss were well-armed, well-trained and well-disciplined — the 1790's meaning of "well-regulated" — they were a general militia composed of all capable citizens. A select militia — citizens first, soldiers second, but still an elite force that can be forced by government to bear arms against its people exactly

like our National Guard — was also seen as a danger to liberty. An armed society was the solution to government-sponsored oppression.

Elbridge Gerry, vice president under James Madison, understood the problem in 1789: "What, sir, is the use of a militia? It is to prevent the establishment of a standing army, the bane of liberty... Whenever govern-

ments mean to invade the rights and liberties of the people, they always attempt to destroy the militia..."

Saint George Tucker, preeminent jurist of the post-Revolution years wrote: "A well-regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed. This may be regarded as the true palladium of liberty. The right of self defense is the first law of nature; in most governments it has been the study of rulers to confine this right within the narrowest limits possible. Wherever standing armies are kept

military forces which shall be occasionally raised to defend our country, might pervert their power to the injury of their fellow citizens, the people are confirmed by the next article in their right to keep and bear their private arms," Tench Coxe, Pennsylvania delegate to the Continental Congress, wrote in the *Philadelphia Federal Gazette*.

Justice Joseph Story described the militia as "... the natural defense of a free country against sudden foreign invasions, domestic insurrections, and domestic usurpations of power by rulers... The right of the citizens to keep and bear arms has justly been considered as the palladium of the liberties of a republic; since it offers a strong moral check against the usurpation and arbitrary power of rulers; and will generally, even if these are successful in the first instance, enable the people to resist and triumph over them."

While the founders reluctantly decided they needed a small professional army to man garrisons on the frontier, they nonetheless believed the people should remain capable of defeating their own army. Noah Webster argued that: "Before a standing army can rule, the people must be disarmed... The supreme power in America cannot enforce unjust laws by the sword; because the whole body of the people are armed, and consti-

tute a force superior to any band of regular troops..."

The question of whether the militia is the National Guard or not was answered by George Mason: "I ask you, sir, who are the Militia? They consist now of the whole people..."

Richard Henry Lee, delegate to the first Continental Congress and senator from Virginia,

also seemed to understand that an armed citizenship and the militia were one and the same: "... to preserve liberty, it is essential that the whole body of the people always possess arms and be taught alike, especially

up, and the right of the people to keep and bear arms is, under any color or pretext whatsoever, prohibited, liberty, if not already annihilated, is on, the bank of destruction."

"As civil rulers, not having their duty to the people duly before them, may attempt to tyrannize, and as the

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Anarchy In Afghanistan

Chaos Continues With No End In Sight





Throughout the 1980s no one covered Afghanistan like SOF. Bob Brown humped the high deserts of the Hindu Kush on several occasions; Peter Kokalis rummaged through more muj arms bazaars than he can remember, seeking, and often finding, elusive pieces of Soviet weaponry never before seen in the West; Foreign Corre-



spondent Lance Motley was the first and only Westerner to make it to Herat (near Iran and the last place in the world anyone with ties to The Great Satan would want to be caught); the list goes on.

Why did we make such a commitment to a virtually unknown war in a strategically unimportant area? Because it epitomized what SOF is about: fighting the good fight against tyranny. The fact that the tyrants in this case were communist Russians and the gutsy Afghans welcomed our help in shooting the shit out of them was just icing on the cake.

Many of the muj we came to know had nerves of steel, a democratic outlook and a hatred for the commies shared only by those of us who tangled with them in Vietnam. This was our kind of fight and one we won. Well, sort of. Regretfully the

war in Afghanistan didn't end when the Russians were kicked out and factional fighting rages on uncontrolled to this day.

t was a day of great military victory, but the fight wasn't over. Inside the bluedomed mausoleum of ancient Afghan King Nadir Shah, a squad of Pushtuns hammered away at the fleeing enemy with an RPK machine gun. Well, at least two of them were — another couple were nearly comatose from smoking hashish. Another squatted amid the ruins over a small fire, warming a large lump of cannabis resin for the next joint.

Just outside the mausoleum a Russian-made T-62 was also firing at the opposition. The tank contributed a touch of light comedy to the battlefield drama; every time it fired the concussion caused great lumps of plaster to fall from the mausoleum ceiling onto the heads of the machine gunners. They were too stoned to differentiate between falling plaster and incoming fire and blazed away with greater fury whenever they felt the "incoming" raining on their heads.

Troops loyal to Afghan President Burhanuddin Rabbani successfully breached the defenses of rival factions on the eastern Kabul front lines in the summer of last year. This was the first major breakthrough in nearly six months of continuous but inconclusive factional fighting in the capital since Rabbani's rivals launched a failed coup.

Lined up against Rabbani's forces were the mostly Pushtun mujahideen of his old rival, *Hezb-i-Islami* faction leader Gulbuddin Hekmatyar. An unlikely but convenient coalition existed between Hekmatyar's forces and the ex-communist militia of Uzbek General Abdul Rashid Dostam.

Rabbani's forces were made up of his own Jamiat-i-Islami Tajik faction under ex-Defense Minister Ahmad Shah Massoud (the famous jihad guerrilla commander from the Panjshir Valley), with Pushtun backing from the Itihad-i-Islami faction of Rasool Sayaf. To further

complicate the issue, Massoud also had an independent unit of Uzbeks and the backing of mixed Kabul garrison troops under General Baba Jan, another ex-communist.

The victory actually began the day before on Saturday, in different military operations carried out by two different factions. First, in a predawn operation, a pro-Rabbani Shi'ite religious faction called Harakat-i-Islami attacked Hekmatyar's south Kabul base, a castle called Darulaman Palace built in the 1920s intended as a future seat of Afghan government. The closest it ever came was the short tenure of Hekmatyar as prime minister.

For the previous week Harakat had Hezb under siege in Darulaman, with artillery backing from pro-Rabbani rocket batteries. They had the palace surrounded on three sides and strafed it with 23mm cannon fire, which rather hampered civilian traffic.

I was escorted by Harakat to Darulaman — they were keen to prove a victory over Hezb. We traveled by military jeep, speeding past their original front line, and were met by scores of displaced civilians fleeing the area with bundles of portable belongings.

Inside the battle-scarred palace I met the Harakat commander who led the 0300 attack. His exhausted men were sprawled on the floor surrounded by heaps of spent ammunition cases and stacks of live rounds for the two key infantry artillery weapons in Afghanistan: RPG-7s and recoilless rifles. Outside in the dust lay a dead Hezb fighter. Bloody trails where wounded were dragged from the palace were still fresh on the ground.

Among the 32 prisoners Harakat claimed to have captured that morning were five Arabs and six Pakistanis. Hezb recruited many young Pakistanis to fight in Afghanistan with a bogus offer of military training so they could then fight for what Muslim fundamental-

ists call the "liberation" of Indian-held Kashmir.

I interviewed one of the Arab POWs, who admitted he was from North Yemen; he too claimed to have come to Afghanistan for military training. This prisoner, who had been shot three times in the battle, said he was one of a

group of nine Arabs defending the palace. He was lucky
— he said his more seriously wounded Arab mate was
shot dead in front of him.


The second battle took place late afternoon when the fighting in Kabul shifted to the eastern front. In concert with a massive BM-21 rocket barrage, pro-Rabbani Sukhoi Su-22 jets pounded Maranjan Hill and its adjacent anti-Rabbani stronghold, the ancient fortress Bala Hissar, guardian of the eastern approaches to Kabul.

Massoud's infantry pushed forward through the old Kabul bazaar and stormed the ramparts of this 1,000-year-old citadel, clearing Dostam's Uzbeks and a handful of Hekmatyar's men, including more Arabs. When I arrived, two dead Hezb fighters were still lying at the gates of Bala Hissar. I watched a Massoud muj appraising one of the bloodied faces alive with feasting flies. "An Arab," he spat. Then searching the Chinese-made webbing, his ex-

pression changed to a smile as he extracted a Russian F-1 hand grenade as booty.

Battle For Maranjan Hill

These Rabbani victories were key. The fighting began Sunday morning when pro-Rabbani troops, under cover of heavy bombardment from a battery of Russian-made artillery, mostly 82mm and 120mm mortars, 122mm D-30 howitzers and BM-21 rocket launchers, stormed out of their bun-

kers to assault Maranjan Hill.

Maranjan is a strategic low-lying hill in the eastern Kabul suburbs which dominates the Kabul River front line. A stronghold of the anti-Rabbani alliance, its tanks and much favored truck-mounted ZU-23-2 cannon were a formidable defense. These gunners could shoot across the river into downtown Kabul, targeting the defense ministry and presidential palace, and rake residential districts inhabited by Afghan locals, journalists and foreign relief workers from the Red Cross and other aid organizations. They also provided cover for their allies based below in the former Soviet-built apartment housing complex known as the Microrayan.

But this morning they buckled.







There was a time, particularly after Vietnam, when the press held the American fighting man in low esteem. If the military got any ink, it was generally to lay blame for something.

SOF has always taken a different approach. We know what the guys on the business end of military ops have gone through and the dedication and expertise they bring to their jobs. Many at SOF have walked in their shoes.

That doesn't mean we look the other way when the military screws up,

but it does mean we print the triumphs and not just the tragedies. We're glad that in our anniversary month we can bring you one such triumph, written by one of our regular contributors who makes it a point to go where the troops go, even if it's to hell holes like Haiti and Somalia.

Captain Thomas Hanford's aircraft still had fuel so he remained on his combat patrol over Bosnia and tried to reach Zulu on the old fre-

quency. Hanford heard some suspect clicks when suddenly Zulu came up voice, "This is Basher 52."

"Say again, understand this is Basher 52?"

"This is Basher 52. I'm alive."

"Say again, Basher 52, you are weak and unreadable, this is Basher 11."

"This is Basher 52!!!"

"Copy that, you're alive! Basher 52, sit tight ..."

Captain Scott O'Grady's survival had been in doubt until 0208 8 June when he made contact with his

wingman and set in motion a sensational chain of events. Approval for his rescue was made with lightning speed up the chain of command to Admiral Leighton Smith in London and back down to the 24th Marine Expeditionary Unit in the Adriatic and Colonel Marty Berndt at 0230.

Soon it was show time for a platoon-size element of 41 Marines known as a TRAP Team (Tactical Recovery of Aircraft and Personnel). Lieutenant Colonel Chris Gunther, mission commander, and First Lieutenant Martin Wetterauer, ground security OIC, discussed what they might encounter on the ground. "We talked about two possible scenarios," Gunther said. "but we envisioned everything from having a pilot down in the trees and [having] to hoist him out, to a situation where he was literally running for his life, being chased by Serb soldiers."

There was also the unanswered question of just how close the team could get to O'Grady. "My greatest fear was that we wouldn't be able to find Captain O'Grady, that he would have either gotten run off, or scared off, and couldn't get to a place where we could pick him up," Berndt admitted.

Thanks to America's myriad intelligence gathering sources, however, Berndt had a pretty good handle on major enemy weapons systems that might pose a problem. Once the mission was established and the intel evaluated, the TRAP Team was augmented for their specific mission.

Two AH-1W SuperCobras, and four AV-8B Harrier IIs would ride shotgun with Dash-1 and Dash-2, the Super Stallions carrying the TRAP Team. Above the Marines would be 40 additional aircraft; a mix of F/A-

18D Hornet attack fighters, Air Force A-10 Warthog tank killers from Aviano Air Base. Italy, and Navy EA-6B Prowler electronic jamaircraft ming from the aircraft carrier, USS Roosevelt. Electronic jamming EF-111s were also airborne to assist. A backup team of U.S. Army Special Forces was en route by helicopter to the area from a base in Brindisi, Italy.

In addition to the vast armada of heavily armed aircraft vectoring holding into positions over Bosnia by a NATO AWACS, there were also additional Marines standing by on deck of the USS Kearsarge (LHD3) in case the TRAP Team got trapped and

had to battle its way out of Bosnia. "I had a Sparrow Hawk package, or reinforced rifle platoon, on deck with their weapons and ammo ready to launch if the TRAP Team got into trouble," Berndt said, "and right behind them there was a reinforced rifle company that had the capability to do the same thing."

Berndt decided to go along to coordinate the search and rescue mission himself. Why would the CO of a MEU and brigadier general-select risk his life on a mission like this when there were junior officers available? "Why not? I think is the better question," Berndt responded. He thinks of himself as the cheerleader and

spokesman for an outfit that does this kind of thing for a living. "And my take was that I had to be with them. It was that simple," Berndt added. He is an officer who's been shot at before and felt his men needed a steady hand at the tiller, and as calming effect, one who wouldn't lose it under fire. Those who serve with Berndt say he's a hands-on kind of CO. He wants to be where the action is.

Berndt went into Bosnia loaded for bear. "It's difficult to get a handle on the soldier who moves with a very small unit, or perhaps is a soldier/farmer," Berndt explained. That's why the TRAP Team was backed up by helicopter gunships, attack fighters and tank-killing A-10s. But Berndt wasn't worried, he had assessed the risk and felt he had sufficient force to deal with it. Gunther said the TRAP Team could have stayed on the ground in Bosnia for two hours and fought a major engagement if necessary.

TRAP Teams prefer to operate at night. This is the standard at which they train, but Berndt couldn't make that happen. The support package customized for this mission could have been on the ground before dawn, but would have to sacrifice a lot of the backup capability. And without the

backup, Berndt felt the risk was too great to manage. That's why the primary rescue package lifted off at 0500 and orbited over the *Kearsarge* for 45 minutes until backup units could fly in from Italy. No one was willing to wait another 12 hours for darkness, so the mission went forward during daylight.

The rescue force covered the 87 miles to the last known location of the flyer quickly. About 5 miles from where O'Grady was hunkered down, the two Super Stallions orbited over a good-sized town in a deep valley while two SuperCobras carefully crept through dense fog up a mountainside. "The fog was a two-edged sword. While it masked our noisy approach to the pickup point, and probably prevented us from waking up townspeople in the valley below, it also made it difficult to see where we were going," Gunther said.

Basher 52, Got You In Sight

By 0612 O'Grady was talking to his rescuers but the heavy fog below them reduced visibility to a few

hundred feet. Gunther worried the fog might cause them to abort the rescue mission. When Dash-1 and Dash-2 arrived over the LZ they had to auger in through a tiny hole in the cloud cover. The site was all but socked-in.

"The LZ was tight," Capt. Paul Fortunato said, the pilot of Dash-2. Fortunato estimated the diameter was

no more than 100 feet, barely enough room to do some pedal-turns as he gently set his helicopter down. Visibility was so poor the Super Stallion set down inadvertently on a big boulder and barbed wire fence that prevented the crew chief from lowering the rear ramp so a 20-man security team could deploy. Fortunato had to lift slightly and reposition the aircraft. Dash-1, the other Super Stallion, landed across the barbed wire fence in another mini-LZ without incident.

"I have to give credit to the pilots of the Super Stallions. They did some incredible flying. When we were going in, it didn't look like there was going to be enough room to land, but they somehow squeezed the aircraft through the trees anyway," Christopher White, a security team leader, said.

Lieutenant Wetterauer and his 20-man security team scrambled down the rear ramp of Dash-1, established immediate security and headed in the direction of yellow smoke the pilot of a SuperCobra helicopter gunship dropped to mark the spot where O'Grady had fired a pencil flare to identify himself and his position. As Wetterauer and his men pushed through a thicket they found a smoking canister.

Suddenly, out of the thicket like a rabbit chased by hounds, O'Grady made a beeline for Dash-1. "Seeing him running through the brush covered in sweat with a six-day beard on his face and his pistol in his hand is a scene I'll never forget," Gunther recalled. "I said to myself, he looks good and moves pretty good for someone who's been on the ground for six days."

When Sergeant Major Angel Castro Jr. saw the man he came to save heading his way, Castro ordered everyone on board his helicopter to stay put. But Sergeant Scott Pheister had already safed his gun, climbed out of the crew chief door on the right side of the aircraft and was running to meet O'Grady.

"I remember him coming across the LZ wearing an orange survival cap, waving his Beretta and babbling," said Pheister, who was forced to physically disarm O'Grady. "I hated to hit an officer," Pheister said, "but I hit his right wrist, and knocked the weapon out of his hand." Pheister then hustled the weakened aviator to the waiting chopper and shoved him into a seat.

"I was so anxious to get him in the bird, I just picked him up and slung him into the cargo area," Pheister said, who laughed when reminded he been charged for the weapon if we had left it on the LZ," Pheister said.

As soon as the rescued pilot was inside the aircraft, Sgt. Maj. Angel Gomez strapped him into his seat, put a cranial (crash helmet) on his head and prepared for liftoff. "When I sat him down, he said, 'thank you,' and just kept saying, 'thank you,

could have broken O'Grady's neck. "Wow," Pheister said, "I didn't even think of that. What a terrible thing to have done to a guy who had survived six days in enemy territory."

Before climbing aboard the helicopter himself, Pheister ran back to where he disarmed O'Grady and retrieved the weapon. "He'd probably thank you,' over and over again," Gomez remembered.

O'Grady was cold, severely dehydrated and soaking wet. Hypothermia had set in and he was shaking violently. Gomez grabbed a Gore-Tex jacket from Berndt and put it on O'Grady. Once airborne, Gomez gave the flyer a canteen of water. O'Grady

took a long swig, nearly draining the canteen in one swallow.

Asked if he was hungry, he nodded again and was given an MRE. "But he could only eat five or six spoonfuls of the chicken stew," Gomez said. O'Grady's stomach had shrunk after six days of eating only grass and insects.

The flyer was still shivering and a space blanket was passed forward. Gomez also gave him a pair of gloves and ordered two young Marines to flank him to keep him as warm as possible. The temperature was about 45 degrees as winds whipped through the helicopter's two machine-gun portals.

"When he first got on the helo, he was sobbing and weeping," Lance Corporal Paul Bruce said. "It was more than just a tear or two. His chest was heaving. He was so happy to be alive. So grateful. So glad to be rescued."

SAMs In The Air!

While the flight into Bosnia was clean the trip home was not. When the primary rescue package cleared

the fog-shrouded mountains and moved into a flat, level plain stretching to the coast, the aircraft became visible and vulnerable. About twothirds of the way home they began taking AAA and small arms fire.

"I saw a Russian-made SA-7 fired at us," co-pilot Capt. Jim Wright said. "It came corkscrewing up at us from the left side of the aircraft." Fortunato and Berndt also saw the SAM fly by. At least one other SAM was fired at the pair of Super Stallions.

The Cobra pilots who were flying at five and seven o'clock positions be-

hind the Super Stallions had a ringside seat for the fireworks. They spotted another smoke trail corkscrewing toward the formation, but didn't engage the Serb missilemen. Their mission was to escort O'Grady safely back to the ship. Everyone in the primary rescue package could accomplish that mission

best with speed and maneuverability.

Fortunato and Major William Tarbutton, who was flying the other Super Stallion, popped flares and took some violent evasive action to avoid the surface-to-air missiles and ground fire. "We flew into Bosnia at about 200 feet over pine forest," Fortunato said, "But we flew [much] ... lower

on the way home."

Fortunato and Tarbutton also flew faster. On the way into Bosnia they flew at about 120 mph, but on the way back to the *Kearsarge*, they skimmed across the treetops at 175 mph hoping to avoid Serbian gunners.

"We were zigzagging around, banking hard all over the place," Bruce said, later admitting it was a terrifying ride. "The roughest helicopter ride I've ever been on." Ammo boxes were banging around and a couple of grunts barfed their brains out as Fortunato and Tarbutton twisted and turned to avoid being bracketed by AAA.

Both aircraft took a few hits from small arms fire. One of the rounds hit the leading edge of Tarbutton's blades. Another one struck Fortunato's tail rotor. And at least one more round pierced the rear ramp and ricocheted around the cargo area hitting Sgt. Maj. Gomez's canteen.

"As Captain Fortunato rocked the aircraft back and forth, I felt something slap me in the back," Gomez said, who didn't give it

another thought until Cpl.

Arthur Parham handed him a spent slug. Without batting an eye, Gomez handed the bullet back to the young grunt. "Keep it as a souvenir," he bellowed, "No big deal."

Inside the choppers, Marines swayed back and forth in their seats as Fortunato and Tarbutton popped up to clear power lines and dropped back down again to hug Mother Earth in case anyone else on the ground wanted to take a shot at them.

Pheister on starboard gun received permission from Fortunato to engage two AAA sites. Pheister, who didn't fire a shot during Operation Desert Storm, ripped off a five- to 10-shot burst of caliber .50 as he passed almost level with the gun positions. "I could see tracers coming at us, but we were going so fast, they [Serbs] couldn't bring their big stuff to bear on us."

Pheister said he could see clusters of hand-held automatic weapons winking at him as he roared by. "I don't think I hit anything, but I'll bet I kept their heads down long enough for us to escape the kill zone."

"We escaped serious damage because of outstanding crew coordination," Wright said. "There was a constant flow of info from the gunners to Tuna [Fortunato's call sign] and me up front. We knew where the stuff was coming from and were able to avoid most of it."

O'Grady clenched his teeth as they made a beeline for the boat. The two Marines sitting on either side of him to keep him warm just looked at him and told him he was with Marines and that everything was going to be alright.

When Berndt turned in the jump seat between the pilot and co-pilot to check on his soon-to-be famous passenger, O'Grady looked at the MEU commander, grinned and gave him a thumbs-up.

"I knew then," Berndt said, "that he was OK." Mission accomplished.

Trapped At Altitude

When Scott O'Grady lifted his F-16C Fighting Falcon off the runway at Aviano Air Base in Italy where the 29-year-old Air Force captain was assigned to the 555th Fighter Squadron, he had no idea he was flying into a maelstrom. Climbing into the sky on the wing of his flight lead, O'Grady followed Captain Bob Wright to northern Bosnia to enforce a United Nation's mandated no-fly zone. This mission looked like the other 60,000 sorties over Bosnia, but that was about to change.

Soon there was a blinding explosion. Nobody needed to tell O'Grady what had happened — his fighter plane had been hit in the belly by a SAM. The surface-to-air-missile was probably a mobile-launched SA-6 that came up directly under the F-16 in a blind spot and blew the aircraft in two.

"The first thing I saw was the cockpit disintegrating in front of me. It's just unbelievable that I didn't die." O'Grady said after being rescued.

Miraculously, as his F-16 disintegrated, O'Grady reached for the ejection lanyard between his legs and punched out of his flaming cockpit as it tumbled through the air. "God let me see that ejection handle, that beautiful golden handle," he recalled after his rescue.

The F-16 ejection seat is designed to deploy automatically but O'Grady, whose neck and face were singed by the flames, didn't want to wait until that happened. He feared the seat had been damaged by the explosion so he manually deployed.

Wright was helpless. He watched his wingman's aircraft explode in a gigantic fireball and suppressed his shock as he marked O'Grady's position near Mrkonjic Grad, about 25 miles south of Banja Luka in an area controlled by Serb rebels. The flaming wreckage fell so quickly into the clouds, Wright was unable to see if his wingman ejected.

"I was in the parachute for an extremely long amount of time. Everybody on the ground could see me. They were standing there watching me the whole time. There was a military truck there waiting for me," O'Grady remarked about breaking through the clouds over a major city in full view of everyone.

When O'Grady hit the ground he shed his parachute and dashed toward a small clump of bushes. Crawling into the middle, he dug his face into the dirt and covered his ears with his green Nomex flight gloves so no bare skin would be visible.

Within two or three minutes Serbs were swarming all over the hillside searching for him. Some of the soldiers came within a few feet but didn't see the pilot. For the next six days, O'Grady lay motionless during the day and moved with agonizing slowness each night in search of better cover.

O'Grady says he knows how a rabbit feels as hunters beat the bushes trying to flush it into the open. At one time Serb soldiers opened fire. "They weren't shooting at bunny rabbits. Maybe they thought they saw something that was me and were trying to kill me," O'Grady said. His nerves were really tested when he was awakened a couple of days later by an artillery piece going off a few feet from where he was hiding.

The day after O'Grady was shot down, Serb military leaders, perhaps to throw cold water on NATO's search, told Western officials they were holding the pilot. And two days later, General Ronald Fogelman, Air Force chief of staff, committed a serious breach of security when he mentioned to reporters at a Pentagon reception that intermittent signals had been received from what could be the airman's emergency locator beacon.

White House officials were angered by a disclosure they considered premature and possibly dangerous to the missing pilot. Nothing more was said about signals and the world waited to hear whether Scott O'Grady was dead or alive.

In the early morning hours of 8 June, six days after he was shot down, O'Grady made radio contact with Capt. Thomas Hanford, an F-16 pilot from his squadron. "I'm alive. Help!" O'Grady radioed. To make sure the voice was that of O'Grady, Hanford asked him to identify the squadron in which he served in Korea; a question designed to ensure the

H&K Will Arm America's Elite

No other consumer magazine can hold a candle to SOF when it comes to no-B.S.. detailed technical weapons articles; or coverage of military and paramilitary small arms in general; or the inside line on the arcane, esoteric underworld of firearms rarely explored by the mainstream gun rags.


For more than 20 years SOF has racked up countweapons coups, from being the first Westerners invited to China to test their new small arms, to being allowed to dig through the Salvadoran army's captured weapons room. Add in the exclusives we've gotten in South Africa, Russia, Bosnia and other places, and you can see why we're proud of our achievements in this area.

And though we spend a good deal of time out of country, we don't ignore developments in our own backyard. When not on the battlefield we keep our eye on the American consumer and surplus

gun markets, reporting only on the more interesting items. The following piece is an update on the SpecOps pistol first detailed in our June '93 issue. Amid diminishing defense dollars, the U.S. Special Operations Command (USSOCOM — the umbrella organization for the Navy

SEALs, Army Ranger Battalions and Special Forces, Air Force Special Operations and several other unspecified clandestine operations groups) still has enough leverage to generally obtain the often exotic equipment they need to perform the high risk missions assigned to them.

On 28 August 1991, USSOCOM awarded both Colt and Heckler & Koch with Phase I development contracts (see "Hot Rod Hybrid Handguns," June '93) for what was then called the Special Operations Forces (SOF) Offensive Handgun Weapon

System (OHWS). Promoted primarily by the SEALs, the contracts came out of the Naval Surface Warfare Center in Crane, Indiana.

In general, the OHWS consisted of a caliber .45 ACP semiautomatic pistol with some very special attributes, a detachable flash-and-sound suppressor and a Laser Aiming Module (LAM). During Phase II of the project, minimum sound-level reduction of the suppressor was specified at 28 dB (decibels) with the unit dry and 35 dB with the unit filled with no more than 5 cc of water, coupled with a 75% reduction in the flash signature.

After extensive, winnertake-all testing, a \$1.4 million Phase II Engineering and Manufacturing Development contract was awarded January 1994 to Heckler & Koch Inc. (Dept. SOF, 21480 Pacific Blvd., Sterling, VA 22170-8903; phone: 703-450-1900) for the pistol and suppressor, which are now referred to as the SOF Offensive Handgun and Suppressor Caliber .45 ACP. Heckler & Koch then selected Knight's Armament Co. of Vero Beach, Florida, as subcontractor for the suppressor. The suppressor submitted for Phase II testing was designed by Doug Olson of Knight's Armament Co. and differs significantly from the "can" Olson designed

for the Phase I Colt OHWS entry. Final development and production of the LAM will be a separate contract in Phase III.

Heckler & Koch's SOF Offensive Handgun is to a large extent based upon their USP (Universal Self-Loading Pistol). It operates by means of short-recoil with breech locking, based on a linkless modified Browning system (ejection port barrel-locking block). Weight of the pistol, with an empty magazine, is 2.66 pounds (1.21 kg). The pistol with a full magazine of 12 rounds of .45 ACP ball ammunition, together with the sound suppressor, weighs 4.22 pounds (1.91 kg). The length of the pistol is 9.65 inches (245 mm). The Knight suppressor is almost an inch longer than the Phase I H&K suppressor. With the suppressor attached, the overall length of the system is now 16.56 inches (421 mm). Height is 5.9 inches (150 mm), and at its widest point this pistol measures 1.53 inches (38.8 mm).

Both single- and double-action modes are provided; the ambidextrous manual safety lever permits carrying in "condition one" (a round in the chamber, hammer cocked and safety on). Trigger pull weight in single-action is 4.85 pounds (2.2 kg). This increases to 12.13 pounds (5.5 kg) in double-action. A separate decocking lever has been provided to silently lower the cocked hammer. Both the

magazine catch/release, which is ambidextrous, and the slide release lever are located in conventional positions that permit manipulation without adjustment of the firing grip. There are three safety features: 1) the safety lever, 2) a firing pin block, and 3) the disconnector.

The fixed partridge type sights are adjustable for elevation and windage zero. They employ a three-dot system with self-luminous tritium inserts.

The H&K Offensive Handgun was designed to fire a minimum of 30,000 rounds of +P ammunition (5,000 with the suppressor in place), without any major parts failure or replacement. The slide and frame were designed

for a minimum of 60,000 rounds. These are project requirements.

Heckler Koch's Phase II Offensive Handgun differs from their original Phase I entry in the following important areas. First of all, the slide lock was removed. This feature was originally stipulated for two reasons: to eliminate the noise associated with the reciprocating slide and to prevent a shell casing from ejecting to the

ground and being left behind. However, with the suppressor in place the sound pressure level generated is still 132 dB and this effectively masks the slide noise. Furthermore, the very real possibility that the operator will require an immediate second shot overrides the importance of a tidy operational area.

It was originally required that the barrel, 5.87 inches (149 mm) in length, have lands-and-grooves-type rifling with a right-hand twist (by coincidence, of course, the direction of twist of Colt handguns). This has been changed to Heckler & Koch's well-known polygonal rifling with a left-hand twist. Polygonal rifling provides a better gas seal, more consistent velocities, superior accuracy,

ease of maintenance and increased service life.

To further enhance the accuracy potential, Heckler & Koch brought the locking block to tighter tolerances with the slide, without compromising the pistol's reliability. In addition, an O-ring now interfaces between the slide and barrel. This Oring has withstood 30,000 rounds without failure. All of this has resulted in 5-round groups as tight as 0.45-inch (i.e., a single hole) and a group average of 1.3 inches of extreme spread at 25 meters from a test fixture designed by Heckler & Koch.

The safety lever has been made 0.15-inch wider to permit the opera-

Heckler & Koch's Phase II Offensive Handgun differs from their original Phase I entry. The slide lock has been removed and the safety lever is 0.15-inch wider to permit the operator to obtain a better purchase with gloves. The hammer has been changed to a hollow spur, which will deform if impacted upon during a drop test and thus prevent a primer indent.

tor to obtain a better purchase with gloves. It is at this location that the pistol has its greatest width.

H&K's Phase I Offensive Handgun had a lanyard loop molded into the polymer frame. This has been modified to a separate grip extension insert with lanyard loop which holds the hammer strut and spring in place.

The hammer on the original H&K Phase I pistol had a problem passing the drop test. This has been changed to a hollow spur, which will deform if impacted upon during a drop test and thus prevent a primer indent. The spur itself is dovetailed into the hammer and is therefore replaceable. H&K is currently testing another alternative with a hard rubber spur molded

onto a metal projection on the hammer.

A flared trigger guard of the type found on the H&K USP has been added. It protects the magazine catch/release when the pistol is holstered. The magazine has also been improved to enhance reliability.

The mechanical recoil-reduction system, also found on the USP, that buffers unlocking of the barrel and consists of a heavy, captive coil spring around the guide rod, remains as before. It reduces measured recoil forces by as much as 30% and significantly diminishes perceived recoil. Also unchanged is the hooked locking block at the end of the guide rod that stops

the barrel's rearward travel during the latter part of the recoil stroke. Newly added is another feature from the USP: a captured recoil spring held to the guide rod with a C-clip. It makes the pistol easier to disassemble and reassemble.

A new black, corrosion-resistant maritime coating, called "KTL" replaces the original salt-spray resistant finish on the one-piece machine steel slide and other compo-

nents. Used by the German navy, "KTL" has passed through the stringent Phase II salt fog tests with flying colors.

The barrel threads on the H&K Offensive Handgun have been moved outward toward the muzzle by about 1 mm to obtain a second bearing surface in back of the threads for the Knight sound suppressor. This second bearing surface and an O-ring in the suppressor prevent the suppressor from rotating during firing sequences, but still permit it to be detached within the stipulated 15 seconds without special tools. H&K's original coupler piston system was modified to ac-

Today many American troops are afflicted with Gulf War syndrome, and we still don't know whether protective measures were inadequate to protect our soldiers or whether some of the protective measures were actually harmful.

Twenty years ago SOF was the first magazine to give grunts a forum to write their combat experiences as they experienced them.

No reporter to "inter-

pret" the truth, no censorship from REMFs higher up the chain of command, just hard-hitting, first-person accounts that have often proven there's more to the story than the mass media and government want us to know. This was true in Vietnam,

Grenada, Panama and particularly the Gulf War.

Our writers often aren't academics, professional authors or investigative reporters, they're people who participated in the event they're writing about. Twenty years ago this was a foreign concept to journalists, and even today the mainstream media generally prefer to get their stories by looking at the war from the rooftop of the local Hilton rather than riding shotgun in the lead vehicle heading for the FEBA.

Bob Newman's Marine combat experience in Kuwait is a good example of our type of journalism: To know the truth about chemical and biological agents in the theater you had to be there in a combat role. Newman was, and he shares his little bit of the war with us. The fact that the word from the ground doesn't jibe with the official government line shouldn't surprise SOF readers.

Our Marine infantry company trudged through the northern Saudi Arabian desert, festooned with massive ALICE packs and "782" gear, carrying assorted weapons of war. Our squad automatic weapons,

M16A2 rifles, M60E3 machine guns, 9mm pistols, shoulder-fired multipurpose assault weapons and 60mm mortars were silhouetted against the distant horizon as the winter sun struggled to illuminate the barren landscape of the ancient desert. A light mist fell from the pale gray clouds overhead, and I shrugged to adjust my pack.

We had moved all night by vehicle to this location near the "elbow" of Kuwait, the crook in the Kuwait-Saudi border that runs approximately from Umm Hujul up to a point west of Al Abdaliyah. We were now humping to our defensive position just below the border. I noticed that the usually flat desert floor ahead was overlaid with sand "moguls," and I casually wondered why. In a few minutes I would find out.

Our route of march took us directly through these mounds of sand, which was in fact a huge animal graveyard. The carcasses of camels, sheep, goats and dogs by the hundreds were being exposed by the constantly blowing, shifting desert sands that had until recently hidden this ghastly scene. In the predawn light of the overcast desert we were halfway through the graveyard before we realized what we were walking through. I wondered what had killed all these animals and how they had come to be buried here. It momentarily bore on my mind that intelligence said the Iraqis were planning

to use chemical and biological warfare against us in the coming days, and I wondered if what we were walking through was somehow connected. We trudged on.

Later that day we were told to stay clear of the animal graveyard because intelligence suspected that it might be the result of biological weapons, anthrax in particular. Medical personnel could be seen from our position in MOPP 4 (mission-oriented protective posture), which means full chemical/biological protective gear, stringing bright yellow tape between engineer stakes that were forming the border of the graveyard. In our case, the warning was a little too late.

So concerned with Saddam's chemical and biological warfare abilities and intentions were the brass that we began to be issued assorted pills and were given various inoculations to help stave off the effects of nerve gas such as sarin, known to be one of Saddam's favorites. Little did we know that these pills and shots had not been fully tested, and after we took them, the word eventually came down to not take any more pills because there may be a "problem" with them. Again, a little too late.

Burned By Mustard Gas

Two weeks later I sat atop an amphibious assault vehicle or "Amtrac" a few miles below the border, watching as the towering flames from the remains of the Al Wafrah oil field lit up the night. The following morning my company would assault through the minefields and obstacle belts, while the inky black smoke from hundreds of mutilated, burning oil wells

coated our skin, uniforms and gear with a fine, slick sheen. Just as we were crossing through the berm - that massive wall of sand along the border the radio crackled with excited orders to quickly go to MOPP: An Amtrac near us had struck a mustard gas mine and two of the crewmen were wounded. blisters from the mustard gas appearing on their exposed arms almost instantly. This is in direct contradiction to the official government line that no chemical weapons were

encountered (though this incident is part of the official Marine Corps history).

The Iraqis were shelling the charging Marine assault forces with arty and mortars, and crater analysis performed by some Marines with chemical detection equipment showed that blister agents and nerve agents were present. The German-made Fuchs (Fox) chemical detection vehicles were detecting both types of agents as well — and this is not a detection system known to make mistakes. Later that morning anthrax was positively identified in an Army lab from a sample taken from a dead sheep.

Shortly after noon on our first day in the attack the smoke was so thick that we could barely see the vehicles beside us, and as the wind

shifted back and forth to reveal Iraqi positions ahead, the air was rent with the fiery red signature of the Amtrac's .50 caliber machine guns raking trenches, bunkers and various armored vehicles holding Iraqis bent on martyrdom. Combined antiarmor teams (CAATs) would join the fray, ripping vehicles (Soviet-made T-55s and T-62s, BMPs, BTRs French-made and Panhard scout cars) to shreds. Secondary explosions within Iraqi armored vehicles, caused by their own

ammunition cooking off, turned them into wheeled and tracked pressure cookers. A TOW missile launched to my right front, and I could trace its flight as it jinked and maneuvered toward a distant Iraqi T-62 MBT that I couldn't see from my position. Soon a flash up ahead told me the tank had been hit, and I watched the turret pop up into the air and disappear again as it fell to earth. This was the first time I had ever seen a tank struck with a TOW missile and I was amazed at its power. We rolled through the remains of an Iraqi artillery position that had just been pulverized by an effective mix of Marine arty and air power, and I could see hundreds of shells littering the sand, strewn about the wreckage of the howitzers. Again, I wondered if any of those shells contained chemical agents.

Shortly after darkness my unit, 2nd Battalion, 4th Marines, attached to the 8th Marines and assaulted the "ice-cube tray," a large building complex covering many acres of desert. Securing the objective, the battalion settled in for the night in a defensive perimeter that put 1st Battalion. 8th Marines and one tank company along our border at a road intersection. All was fairly quiet until 0230 when

1/8 and the tank company on our flank were counterattacked by an Iraqi force consisting of numerous tanks, armored personnel carriers and infantry fighting vehicles, as well as dismounted infantry attempting a double envelopment from the northwest and northeast. A horrendous firefight ensued, and Iraqi artillery that hadn't been accurate at all up to this point suddenly became effective, wounding five Marines. The 10th Marines opened up with counterbattery fire and destroyed the Iraqi artillery as Marine tanks and CAATs maneuvered to engage the armored assault, sometimes firing them up at ranges less than 100 meters.

A couple of hours before dawn the Iraqis suddenly fell silent, but a crafty Marine captain suspected they

were simply reorganizing and falling back, prompting him to repeat three of the artillery missions he had just fired, which caught the Iraqis completely unprepared and vulnerable. The results were impressive and broke the Iraqis' fighting spirit; those surviving surrendered in the morning. All of the prisoners who we took that night and those taken by 1/8 the next morning had with them chemical protective gear.

The next day we were again in the attack: This time the

regiment's objective was to pass through Phase Line Bear, which was the highway leading out of Kuwait City, and take division objective 4, an Iraqi barracks and compound. The Army's Tiger Brigade, a tank unit equipped with state-of-the-art M1A1 Abrams tanks, was to seize division objective 2, the high ground known as Mutlaa Ridge that overlooked the six-lane highway the fleeing Iraqis were using to escape back to Iraq. This area was already being attacked by Marine air, which had been hitting Iraqi vehicles all morning and had rendered the road impossibly blocked with destroyed vehicles. Shortly after this occurred the Tiger Brigade showed up on the Iraqis' flank and engaged them, literally wiping out hundreds of vehicles caught in the murderous crossfire and killing countless enemy. This road would become variously known as the Highway of Death, Carnage Valley, and the Highway to Hell.

As the 8th Marines moved closer and closer to their objective, 2/4 maneuvered around another minefield and began taking increased fire from tanks and other armored vehicles, which they quickly blew to bits. They were then ordered to seize the United Agricultural Research Facility near Al Jahrah, which they did by forcing a brigade from Iraq's 3rd Armored Division to retreat. The 3rd Battalion, 23rd Marines was also involved in securing this large complex, and a tank platoon was called in to help engage Iraqi armor. As one Marine tank moved past a burning Iraqi tank, a secondary explosion within the burning tank killed one of the Marine tankers. The 3/23 then closed with 1/8 and began taking rounds from a dairy farm in the form of sniper fire and rockets. The Marines quickly engaged them, killing several Iraqis and destroying an ammunition truck.

As dawn broke, Fox Company 2/4 began a detailed inspection of the complex it had captured and quickly realized that it was sitting on a powder keg. The warren of bunkers it had taken was filled with all manner of ordnance, ranging from Sagger missiles, grenades, and small arms ammunition to SA-7 Grail surface-to-air missiles, rocket-propelled grenade rounds and artillery shells. A multi-

Gulf War Syndrome

Although the U.S. government, specifically the Pentagon, continues to deny that Iraq used any chemical or biological weapons during the Gulf War, documents from various units in that war tell a very different story. Nerve and blister agents were repeatedly detected by high-tech German-made Fuchs chemical detection vehicles, and Marines performing chemical detection duties with other dependable gear also detected chemical agents on the battlefield. Marines were wounded in the minefields as a result of Iraqi mustard gas mines. Army nuclear-biological-chemical (NBC) specialists made positive identification on at least one anthrax-ridden sheep carcass. Other Coalition forces reported positive detection of chemical agents, as well.

The pills and shots received to supposedly help defend against chemical attack were given to Marines and later recalled, but by then the Marines had already swallowed the pills.

Some units, such as 2nd Battalion, 4th Marines, were constantly submerged in dense oil smoke from late February through April 1991, sometimes being inundated for days on end until the wind shifted. Numerous toxins were present in the smoke, which at times was so thick you couldn't see your hand in front of your face at high noon. Orders were sent down to stop all unnecessary physical activity during these times, and a special medical team was sent out to our unit (and others) to determine any ill effects. I never heard the results.

Gulf War syndrome's exact cause is still unknown and may be a result of a variety of things, such as the combination of the oil smoke, residual blister, nerve and biological agents, insecticides applied to our skin and uniforms, and interaction between the pills and inoculations received. The symptoms include aches and pains in joints and muscles, short-term memory loss, rashes and other problems. Even some families of Gulf War vets have become sick, indicating that it may somehow be contagious. It took the military almost four years to get a handle on my illness, and I am currently still in remission.

Despite the government's insistence that no chemical or biological weapons were used, Washington does have a system in place to recognize, deal with and track Gulf War syndrome, which the government obviously doesn't want to go the way of the Agent Orange debacle. Why the government continues to deny responsibility is clear: It doesn't want to get stuck with the medical bills of sick and possibly dying Gulf War vets. In light of this, the Texas-based law firm of Spagnoletti & Associates is suing more than 30 manufacturers of chemical and biological warfare material on behalf of the vets. The latest Department of Defense and CIA intel reports say that Saddam is rapidly rebuilding his chemical and biological warfare capabilities, including the development of sarin, mustard, chlorine and anthrax, among other nasties. It appears to only be a matter of time before U.S. forces again find themselves over there.

Soldier Of Fortune Editor Fires Up Terrs In SOF's First War




Isolated by politics and geography, Rhodesia lay surrounded by hostile governments supportive of communist insurgents and terrorists; controlling foreign-trained and armed insurgents infiltrating from Mozambique fell largely to the Rhodesian Light Infantry.

Rhodesia will always be closely linked with SOF. It was, after all, our first on-the-ground war and the first place we could practice our brand of journalism. SOF Vol. 1 No. 1 even contained an article on how to become a mercenary in Rhodesia and featured a memorable photo of an African Rhodesian whose head had been blown away by terrorists when he failed to cooperate with his "lib-

erators." The liberal press was unhappy about the photo and article, since they'd painted the Rhodesian war as a struggle by a racist white minority government to hold onto power against the will of the benevolent black majority.

The fact that Rhodesia actively recruited foreigners did not earn it any PR points in the eyes of the world, but did serve to attract professional



fighting men. And though these professional soldiers helped make the Rhodesian army one of the most effective counterguerrilla forces ever fielded, the press focused on the mercenary angle and printed stories of alleged atrocities that resulted in an "election" the Rhodesian government couldn't hope to win.

Bob Brown was in the AO numerous times and SOF published the other side of the story, but in the end truth took a back seat to propaganda. One good thing came out of it though; we became acquainted with many Americans fighting for Rhodesia—soldier/authors whose names would become well known to regular SOF readers: Robert MacKenzie, Mike Williams, Ken Gaudet and former SOF Managing Editor John Coleman (who penned the following piece), among others.

The "Lovers" of Three Commando, 1st Battalion, Rhodesian Light Infantry, had enjoyed good success during their six-week bush trip, racking up 60 terrorist kills and numerous captures by the third week, without injuries except some massive hangovers.

I was acting as the commando sergeant major, commanding the parachutist contingent of our fire force, and life was going well for me. All our para jumps had resulted in successful contacts with the terrs, and we'd yet to spend a night away from our secure base at Grand Reef airfield. Neither had we missed an opportunity to sample the evening delights found in Umtali, only a few miles down the road.

I had become friendly with quite a few local Rhodesians, managed to establish a line of credit at the more popular watering holes, and even found a never-ending poker game which didn't include "cheat the foreign army chap" in its rules.

Being a foreigner in the Rhodesian army wasn't half bad. If you kept your mouth shut, played by their rules, and didn't intimate you were from the CIA — which some Yanks had a penchant for doing — then you generally got along just fine.

Unfortunately, too many foreigners came down to Rhodesia acting the hero, and this left a bad taste in everyone's mouth. When newly arrived Americans were posted to Three Commando, my first words of advice were to forget they ever heard of Vietnam, don't talk politics, and never preface a sentence with "this is how we did it in the U.S. Army." The Rhodesians didn't want to hear about it, and had a good handle on just how to fight their own brand of war.

Op At The Kraal

Our commando was up before first light one morning and grabbed a quick cup of tea before flying out to where a Selous Scout OP had spotted approximately 12 to 15 terrs moving into an African kraal at last light the night before. We hoped they'd still be in place by the time our fire force hit the area at daybreak.

The scout reported much noise from the kraal for most of the night, and his guess was the gooks were enjoying a little R&R with local girls before moving on the next day: a reasonably common occurrence, and woe the village that didn't supply the women, willingly or not.

Inserted by helicopter, our fourman "stops" covered any avenues of escape the terrorists might take once the fire force arrived. Should an unlucky gook find one of our stops while fleeing the area, he got no farther. If the terrs decided to hold their ground, they faced the onslaught of our paraborne sweepline plus devastating cannon fire from the overhead K-Car's (command aircraft) 20 mike mike. Their only other alternative was surrender, but because of the massive propagandizing they received before entering Rhodesia, few terrorists took that option. Most took their chances in a shoot-out, rather than surrender

to us "foreign butchers."

We rumbled down the airstrip in our jump-rigged C-47 Dakota that morning and I listened over the spare headphones as choppers closed on the village where the terrs were holding up. The scout had noticed no unusual activity. I heard the OC announce the K-Car was pulling over the target area for a look, and for the troop-carrying G-Cars (French-made Alouette choppers) to go into their standard circular orbit around the suspected terrorist position.

Now the crunch: If there were gooks in the village, nine times out

of 10 they'd break and run when our choppers popped up out of nowhere. For that one other instance, however, the K-Car could expect long bursts of fire from the communist weapons the terrs carried.

This time nothing happened. There was no response whatsoever. Normally there'd be a mad dash by the African nannies to hunt down stray children or grab frantic chickens, or at least you'd see a couple of Kaffir dogs running like hell from the loud whop-whop of the choppers.

The scout OP couldn't provide any further information about the village. The last time he heard anything from the kraal was around 0300, when it was definitely occupied by merry-making terrorists and their captives.

Our OC, Major Snelgar, opted for a closer look and had the G-Cars set their stop groups down. If all remained quiet, the stops would sweep through the African huts to determine just what was going on. Either the terrs were holding the locals as hostages, or the gooks had slipped out during the night taking the entire village with them to act as porters, guides or new ZANLA "recruits." It had happened before, and in some cases the entire group would be moved across the border into Mozambique for political indoctrination.

There was, however, a scout watching the village, and they just didn't let 50-odd Africans with their chickens, goats and dogs slip by unnoticed. Something was up.

Terrs Break Cover

Since it was no longer necessary to keep the element of surprise, our ParaDak (Dakota) moved in closer so we'd be ready to jump. I could see the K-Car circling the kraal and the other troop carriers dipping into the tree line to drop off their four troopers.

Suddenly, puffs of black smoke shot from the K-Car, followed by bright flashes of 20mm HE shells impacting around the village.


"They're breaking ... they're running now!" Snelgar's voice burst over my headphones. "There's about 15 of them

bombshelling like crazy. Get the paras on the ground ASAP!"

Suddenly the dispatcher (jump-master) was shouting "GO, GO, GO!" while literally shoving the first man out the door. In a blur of action I watched the entire port side vanish out the open jump door, then I too was hurtling into empty space. When my fire force equipment was safely dangling on its nylon cord 20 feet below me, I took a quick look at the terrain we would be fighting through.

Easy ground, I thought, surveying the flat, thinly bushed veldt. There were a few dry streambeds running near the kraal — obvious choices for stop-group positions. Beyond were only sparse klompies of thorn and scrub brush, and these

would provide no sanctuary for fleeing terrorists. It was nearly ideal fire force country, and held none of the terrors of thickly overgrown rivers, mountainous rock piles, or dark

and forbidding caves we'd battled through before.

The OC immediately formed us into an extended-line formation facing west, toward the village. We would sweep the village first, clearing the huts of locals or terrs, then proceed with clearing operations until we linked up with the stop groups located on the far side of the kraal.

While the troops adjusted their kit, I briefed them on what the OC advised of the situation. Snelgar and the K-Car crew had seen no activity in the village until the first two G-Cars set their stop groups down. It appeared the terrs hoped we'd just go away, but when our intentions became clear, they probably realized that staying in the isolated huts was not smart.

Fifteen terrorists had burst from the huts and started running toward the north and west, the only directions offering cover and concealment. The K-Car crew-chief let rip with a long burst of 20mm fire at the scattering gooks, taking two down. These two were no longer visible from the air. Snelgar felt they were wounded and lying under cover.

Stop Two, to the northwest of the kraal along a dry streambed, bagged

two terrs running past their position. The rest of the gooks apparently went to ground under the thick klompies of bush. We were to move the sweepline on a general northwest

heading, and adjustments in direction would be made from the K-Car circling overhead.

Every eye was fixed on the village; any suspicious movement would be met with a hail of fire from our FNs and MAGs. The rule for combat survival was to shoot first and ask questions later.

The sweep moved to within 50 feet of the kraal with nothing to report. There was radio silence from the K-Car circling overhead, the four stop groups on the other side, and the remaining G-Car maintaining its wide orbit. The other three Gs had been sent back to Grand Reef for refueling and would remain there until called. There still had to be locals hiding and we wanted them moved out before we began clearing. Contrary to the

international press propaganda effort, we on fire force did our best to leave civilians alone whenever possible. I learned in Vietnam that lo-

cals generally did their best to avoid war and would usually only get involved when coerced by one side or the other. There were of course hard-core politiconverts who actively aided and abetted the terrorist cause, but our mission on fire force was to close with and destroy armed terrorist bands infiltrating Rhodesian territory from

Mozambique. The sweep was halted in a small depression offering some protection from potential gunfire from the village. I called for Trooper Hardesty in Banana Three. Hardesty could speak most Rhodesian African dialects without fault.

Sorting Out The Civvies

"Micky, I want you to tell everyone in that kraal they have all of two
minutes to clear their asses out of
there before we burn the place down.
I want 'em to come out of there with
their hands up and gather in the center of the kraal where we can see
everybody. Make sure they know that
anyone, and I mean anyone, left inside the huts is liable to be killed."

His 18-year-old face grinned back at me from under the black camouflage cream we always wore in the bush. "Sure, Colour. Anything you want me to tell those wounded gooks in there?" he asked.

I grinned back. "Yeah. Tell 'em that Josh Nkomo sent us." These were Robert Mugabe's ZANLA troops we had bottled up, and there was no love lost between the Mugabe and Nkomo factions.

Hardesty shouted my message toward the village, waited a moment, then repeated it again. "Give it to them again, Mick," I said. "This time tell them they've got 30 seconds before we open up." There was no way I was going to walk my troops into an unsecured village without at least

doing a little recce by fire. I only hoped the civilians were long gone and hiding in the veldt, waiting for both us and the terrs to take the war somewhere else.



The fire force AO varied from arid plains to mountainous terrain, but the main consideration was that Rhodesia was largely surrounded by a porous, hostile border.

Hardesty was halfway through my second message when a flurry of African nannies, children, old men and dogs stumbled out of the huts. Sixteen fire force guns covered them and they were scared shitless. Without doubt they figured we were going to gun them down en masse, a legacy from their terrorist "guests" the night before.

A long burst of AK fire sent us diving for cover. I heard screams

Fire force operations were often conducted against targets painstakingly identified by Selous Scouts, often along the border with Mozambique.

from the civilians to our front, and saw two of them keel over while the rest scattered off toward our

"Hold your fire!" I yelled to the sweepline while the panic-stricken natives ran through our positions and out toward our DZ. One of the Africans hit by the AK fire lay moaning, and the other was unnaturally still. I had no idea why that gook had chosen to open up on the locals, but it worked to our advantage. We now knew there was at least one armed terrorist somewhere in the village.

I had 15 troopers stranded in the open at least 50 feet from cover. Facing us was at least one armed terr, probably more, in or around the kraal. He could see us, and I had no intention of exposing my men to his AK fire.

I quickly worked out a threepronged effort involving the K-Car's 20mm cannon, Banana Three and Four's firepower as a fire support group, and my stick with Banana Two to act as the maneuver element. On my signal, the 20mm would send a long burst of fire into the village complex, the HE rounds throwing the terrorists off balance. Simultaneously, the two MAGs and six FNs from Bananas Three and Four would open up onto likely enemy positions, and would maintain a high rate of fire until my two sticks were able to dash forward and take up firing positions on the

> southern side of the kraal. If we made it that far, I would evaluate the situation and make new plans.

The kraal became a frenzy of flying dust and shrapnel, highlighted by the bright flashes of cannon shells impacting on the sun-baked earth. The guns from the support group increased the din as they systematically sprayed areas where the terrs might be hiding, their deadly 7.62mm rounds slamming into the

huts and cutting holes in the surrounding bush.

As the last cannon shell from the 12-round burst exploded near a grain bin in the center of the village, I took off running toward the left side of the huts, followed closely by my seven men. I dove behind the second hut with my machine gunner, George McDermott, right behind me.

"Look out, John!" he screamed, and immediately cut loose with a volley of 7.62mm machine-gun fire toward our rear. I pushed off and rolled to my left, and the area I vacated was stitched with AK fire. Up ahead by the next hut, two troopies from Banana Two were shooting it out with another terr at close range, and there was now machine-gun fire coming from the north. I'd walked us into a regular hornet's nest filled with terrorists, and the only way out was to literally shoot our way through.

George was still firing bursts into the bushes behind us while I yanked In M962 frag grenade out of my jacket webbing and sent the armed grenade flying toward the gook's position. We were danger-close to the exploding fragments and both George and I knew it, but there was no alternative except to take another AK burst.

There was a sharp bang-crump of the grenade detonating, and suddenly a terrorist in blue denim stood straight up. The frag had gone off behind him and had torn up his backside: Nerve impulses caused him to jump up, and McDermott laid him back down with a burst from his MAG.

I took a quick glance at the holes in the mud hut made by the terrorist's gunfire, and then at George who had just finished reloading a new belt into his gun. He looked up with a weary smile and said, "John, just what the fuck are we doing out here? These buggers are getting too bloody serious about all this, you know?" His Scot's burr got thicker when he was tense, and he now sounded like he was only a day out of Glasgow. I took a deep breath and shook my head. I had been seriously wounded by rifle fire earlier in the war, yet here I was doing the same thing all over again. Some people never learn, I guess.

"Hey, Meescham," I called to the

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trooper closest to me. "What've you got going up there? Where's Prinsloo?"

The Assault

Lance Corporal Devin Prinsloo, a national serviceman pulling his last few days of obligatory call up, stuck his head around the curved side of the mud-walled hut. His 19-year-old face was streaked with sweat and camo cream, and he looked tired. "We've got it sorted out, Colour," he said. "Ran into one of those wounded buggers the K-Car nailed earlier on. He tried to chuck a stick grenade at us, but the blokes revved him before

protection from any small arms fire, so I decided to hold our position and establish a fire support group.

When we opened up, I wanted Banana Three and Four to assault up from their location in the open field and try to clear the area of the terr gunner. Prior to their move, however, I'd have all of my riflemen throw hand grenades toward the gook's position to put him off balance and cover the assault team's rush.

Six nearly simultaneous but distinct explosions from our grenades were our signal to open fire into the brush cover across the way, and eight guns raked the opposite side of the have to walk right into him before you knew exactly where he was. It was a nerve-wracking business, and it accounted for two-thirds of our heavy booze-ups back in camp.

The mini sweepline to our front suddenly froze in place, then slowly dropped down into a kneeling position. It was uncanny how they all moved in unison as though attached to a common string. After a couple of bush trips together, this kind of reaction became instinctive: to act as one man and therefore come out alive as a team.

I watched Trevor and his gunner slowly inch forward, weapons ready.

he yanked the string. "Can't see anything else right now, but we took a little fire from some kind of machine gun across the village. It's hard to say whether the gook's in a hut or lurking in the bushes," the stick commander finished.

I nodded and had a look at our positions. My other two troopers were behind the first hut closest to our para drop zone, George and I behind the second, and Prinsloo and his stick were under cover of the third. The thickly walled huts gave us decent

kraal with a withering barrage of 7.62mm fire.

Banana Three and Four, under command of Corporal Trevor Norris, had now slowed down to normal fire force sweeping pace: slow and cautious. The bush around the village was fairly tall and thick, and could easily conceal two or three armed terrs. This was one of the worst phases of fire force, knowing there was an armed man hiding somewhere up front waiting to kill you, and also knowing you were probably going to

The MAG gunner cut loose with a burst from his gun, followed immediately by Norris with his FN: They had come across a dead terr armed with a PPSh 41 submachine gun, but were taking no chances. They saw a patch of blue cloth in the green scrub, and that was enough to warrant a few bursts of gunfire.

The village was again quiet except for the occasional metallic click of a trooper checking his rifle. Norris

On a smaller scale, but much closer to home, is the recent media hatchet job performed on G. Gordon RKB: Gordon, let's start by discussing the allegations and general attitude of the media toward you and the remarks they've made about your alleged "one shot to the groin, two to the head" comment. I haven't seen many people defending you. Has the media distorted or taken out of context your remarks about how to deal with the BATF?

GL: Well, yes, but that's nothing new. I mean, that's sort of a standard tactic of the mainstream media. What

> actually happened was back in 1994 I saw an editorial in Modern Gun by Jim Shults. He was making his readership aware of the fact that there were some people, veterans of the Phoenix Program and others, who were so incensed at the abuses of the general public by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms that they were actually advocating people going out and hunting down BATF agents and killing them as if they were Viet Cong.

RKB: This was in Shults' editorial back in 1994?


GL: Yes, and of course he was concerned about this and warned that things were getting out of said on the air this is how bad things were getting and it's unwarranted to go out and pro-actively hunt people down to kill them.

But, I said, I can foresee circumstances when these totally out-of-control BATF people come in the middle of the night, smash your door down without any notice whatsoever and come in shooting. Then, you have a choice. You can either let yourself get killed or you can defend yourself and shoot back. I said, of course if you're going to shoot back and whack these sons of bitches, remember that they're wearing flak jackets, head shots, etc. And that was August 1994. And then along came...

RKB: Let me interrupt. At that point did you hear any criticism?

GL: No. None at all. But we are aware of the fact that the White House monitors the program. In the wake of the Oklahoma bombing, when President Clinton was seeking to exploit it politically by smearing all of his opponents with an implied association with the bombers, the White House went on the attack.

They also dug up the fact that when I came back from the Fourth of July holiday in 1994, I had been shooting with friends and family. We ran out of targets and I had drawn some stick figures, the kind you use to identify for illiterates the men's and the ladies' room, and labeled one "Bill" and one "Hillary" and I shot at those. But as one who back in Watergate days remembers seeing professionally prepared targets superimposed on my face, it seemed to me that the big sissy really was squealing when he

shouldn't have been.

RKB: I know you came under attack from a multitude of media, but can you give me examples of who specifically attacked you?

GL: As best as we can determine, the White House had these remarks from the previous year and put them out to their media friends in sort of a forcement officer, any law enforcement officer, tells you to move your car, stand on this side of the sidewalk, or don't go in there, there is a presumption of regularity. He doesn't have to explain why to each individual. You're supposed to move. And if you object later on, you can get an explanation from the department.

The only thing one can criticize is the charge that the BATF were a bunch of jackbooted thugs. Jackboots come above the knee; they are combat-booted thugs. That's what they are.

RKB: The NRA came under tremendous criticism over this ad. It's interesting when it first came out no-

simultaneous assault. The upshot of it was that, as they typically do, they went too far. The White House was angry with all talk radio simply because they have politically opposed the president for a substantial period of time. But they made the mistake, if you will, of attacking only me by name. That is why I was given the Freedom of Speech Award by my peers, the National Association of Talk Radio Hosts, simply because I was the only one who was named.

RKB: In other words, you're saying the White House attacked you, personally?

GL: Well, no, President Clinton did. Mine was the only name he used. He didn't mention Rush or anybody else, he mentioned me. And so my peers gave me an award because I was the only one specifically named by President Clinton.

RKB: I see. Gordon, can you point to anybody in the media that accommodated the president?

GL: Just the usual suspects, you know: all three major networks, The New York Times, The Washington Post, Los Angeles Times, and their editorial cartoonists. But, you have to remember, Bob, that they've been yelling at me like that for almost 25 years now. I'm used to it. Doesn't bother me.

RKB: Has anybody attempted to put things in context and take your side?

GL: Yes. The Washington Times newspaper and Samuel Francis, a columnist, has. But, again, it's just something that I expect. At any event, I have pointed out that if a law en-

Similarly when a law enforcement officer from any jurisdiction knocks on the door and behaves as he is supposed to and says, "We are the police, we have a warrant for the search of the house," you're supposed to open the door, stand aside and let them search. We're not talking about that We're talking about the BATF, which has been notorious for this kind of conduct for years, for decades. My view is the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms should be disarmed. It will not do to transfer them into other agencies because when you pour dirty water into clean water, you get dirty water. And that's what I've been talking about.

RKB: I think it's interesting to note that about the same time you were under attack, the NRA came under a lot of fire for their controversial ad that ran...

GL: But, see, it was accurate in my view. In the first place, what they did was repeat what a very liberal, democratic, powerful committee chairman had said and he was right. body paid any attention to it either. It was only after the tragedy in Oklahoma City...

GL: Which had nothing to do with the NRA. And by the way, had nothing to do, so far as anybody has been able to determine, with militias or anything else. It looks as if it were probably fewer people than you can number on one hand who did this.

Now, it's true enough that a couple of them apparently tried to join a militia and were rejected. But it has nothing to do with the militias, it's got nothing to do with the NRA, it's got nothing to do with me, it's got nothing to do with you or the people who buy Soldier Of Fortune magazine. The White House and the mainstream media would like people to believe it does.

The militia movement has done absolutely nothing to warrant hearings into their activities. And I would point out, that the first individual militia we heard about in the history of our country was the Minutemen. They fired on the British at Concord. And what were the British trying to do? They were trying to seize firearms. This is a battle that's been going on ever since.

RKB: Well, I have speculated that this media blitz against you and others has been an opportunity for the left to exact retribution against gun owners and talk show hosts for defeating the Democrats in the election.

GL: Right. Bill Clinton himself attributed to the actions of the NRA and gun owners of this country, the loss of at least 20 congressmen in the 1994 elections. They also thought

those of us in talk radio had something to do with that. So if it is possible to smear us with the Oklahoma bombing, they would do so. The press avidly cooperated in that smear attempt. But they're going to end up with egg on their faces when they find out who actually did the bombing, that it had nothing to do with the militia movement, nothing to do with the NRA and nothing to do with talk radio. As I have said, I will be happy to wait for the trial and if any of the persons who are convicted say, "We did it because we thought Gordon Liddy told us to on his radio show," then I'll apologize. But I don't think we're going to find that that was their

RKB: Aren't they saying this is going to extend the mandate of the armed forces to cooperate with law enforcement in crimes that include chemical and biological...

GL: Chemical, biological and nuclear warfare and what have you. The problem is that there are plenty of experts on that who are not in the military. The whole Manhattan program was run by civilians. You already have the abuse of the one exception they've made to date—the drug war—because the president signed a paper that said drug abuse is a national security problem. That is very damaging to the military. The military justly enjoys the

mind-set, completely different training. I've been a military officer and I've been an FBI agent and I know the difference.

RKB: The expansion of the military's role isn't the only frightening aspect of the bill. Elaborate on the wire-tapping provisions.

GL: Well, right now, if they think Bob Brown is involved in a conspiracy to impersonate a human being, they have to go to a magistrate and persuade him there is probable cause to believe that this is going on and that if one listens in on a wire tap, one will learn of the fruits of a crime and so on and so forth. Then, armed with that, you put on this tap. As soon as


someone calls and they are not talking about that subject, you're supposed to hang up. Well, you know that doesn't happen. It gets abused. Now, what they want to do is to be able to tap any phone they think you might be using. It's very, very dangerous. It's extraordinarily intrusive.

RKB: Stop right there. Just how can this be abused, Gordon?

GL: Oh, boy! You should ask me how it cannot be abused. You're talking to somebody who knows something about wire tapping. Let's say they think that Joe Smith is a subscriber to SOF magazine, well, you might be calling him.

They want to be able to tap his phone in hopes of getting you. It's a bad business.

RKB: One reason abuses occur is that there is no oversight system for many federal agencies. A friend of mine I've known for many years, who is still an active FBI agent, feels one of the major problems is that there is no mechanism set up to deal with high level FBI administrators who step out of line. This is far more widespread than just the FBI or ATF. There's a multitude of examples out there, some of which we've covered

motivation.

RKB: Part of the fallout of the bombing has been added push for the anti-terrorism bill. What are your concerns about this legislation?

GL: Very dangerous. This happens every time a prominent person is assassinated or what have you. The leftists and the press lay it at the feet of those who own firearms and use it as an excuse for draconian legislation. Now they want to get into something that I think is particularly dangerous: having the armed forces involved with law enforcement.

very high regard of the American people. To jeopardize that so they can be put into the same basket with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, which is roundly hated by the American people, will be a disaster for the military. They're not trained to be law enforcement officers and if you train them to get into the habit of saying "Halt, federal officer" before they shoot somebody, they're going to be out in the trenches in the middle of a war someplace yelling, "Halt, federal officer." It's a very dangerous business. It's completely different

in SOF, where they just cover each other's ass and nothing's ever done. This leads to the abuses we've seen.

GL: Yeah. The only way you can deal with that, I think, is to have a very, very strong leader. J. Edgar Hoover had everybody under him accountable. But of course how do you keep J. Edgar Hoover in line? That can only be done through an oversight committee. Congress has got to use its oversight powers correctly not just lip service, but really look into things. In the past they were remiss a lot of times because they feared J. Edgar Hoover. Today they are remiss because we have a very political FBI director, Louis Freeh. And he gets away with things because he is willing to go up and testify in favor of this law or that. That used to be absolutely unheard of. I mean that was considered a political question and the bureau would never enter into it: never think of it. But, he does and that's not good.

RKB: I guess that is where congressional hearings come in — our last resort. Just having hearings is fine, but they need to have an objective and a purpose over and above simply exposing wrongdoings. Others have suggested that what the Waco hearings need to result in is the appointment of a permanent special prosecutor to deal with federal law enforcement abuse.

GL: Yeah, well, that would be an excellent idea. But I think with respect to BATF, we're going to have to go further. I think hearings should be directed as to whether or not it should be dissolved and its functions spread out among other federal law enforcement agencies which are not afflicted with the terminal corruption that afflicts the BATF.

RKB: What do you think specifically needs to be addressed in the Waco hearings?

GL: Oh, boy! There's a whole bunch of things. First of all, we need to subpoena the records of the cellular telephone calls from the site of that atrocity back to Washington. They fired two BATF people. Those agents brought a lawsuit that wasn't going anywhere until they subpoenaed the cellular phone records. Then rather than yield to that subpoena, the BATF put both of those people right back to work with back pay and the whole nine yards. And, what one hears in

this town, I don't know whether it's true or not, is that those telephone calls went right back to Ron Noble, the undersecretary of the Treasury for law enforcement.

RKB: A man who could not even 10 years ago get a job with immigra-

GL: What I think should happen is the focus must be on the tactics and actions of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms and on the FBI's hostage rescue team. And it must not be limited to the incidents at Waco and Ruby Ridge. They should

tion services.

GL: That's right. We need to look into why Delta Force was down there. My understanding is that the BATF lied to the military by asserting falsely that David Koresh was running a methamphetamine laboratory in that place. We need to look into and subpoena the application for the search warrant in the first place because at the trial there was evidence adduced that it was bogus - based on false information. The whole case was built, apparently, on false evidence. We are aware at Ruby Ridge, the federal judge himself denounced the FBI for falsification of evidence.

RKB: What else needs to be addressed?

subpoena all the recent victims of the BATF: the woman who was slammed against the wall and lost her baby. The Lamplughs, where they went in, they took their money, took their property, trashed the man's cancer medicine and on the way out, stomped to death the cat! These people had done nothing wrong.

HICH Altitude, Low Opening, No Chance

SOG Freefalls Into Laos & Cambodia

vets a voice, a place where their heroics were written about, where people spoke their language, a publication that covered the topics near and dear to them: firearms, expanding communism, U.S. military operations, the job market for combat veterans, etc.

Things have changed drastically in 20 years: Vietnam service is now chic—other publications routinely publish Vietnam war stories and the existence of hundreds of competing media means that when anything happens, someone's there to cover it. Still, SOF manages to be unique. Two decades of contacts, a reputation for truth, and reporters who know the topics they're writing about have enabled us to continue to bring you articles you won't see anywhere else.

The following piece, for example, researched and written by Kenneth Conboy and former Senior Editor Dale Andradé, demonstrates that there are still many facets of the Vietnam War that have yet to come to light.

A reconnaissance team from the top secret Studies and Observations Group (SOG) helicoptered into a North Vietnamese staging area in Cambodia. Waiting enemy gunners shot them off both their LZs. The next day the same team walked into Laos, only to run into another enemy force and was extracted under heavy fire. Another recon team in the same area bumped into an enemy force and two U.S. team members were killed during a running firefight. Running cross-border operations was always dangerous, but by early 1970, the beginning of the U.S. military's twilight in Vietnam, they were getting worse. Nowhere was this more true than along the Ho Chi Minh Trail, where Command and Control North (CCN) — the Da Nang-based SOG reconnaissance and exploitation force responsible for southern Laos — faced thick North Vietnamese patrols and unprecedented anti-aircraft fire. Several grid squares were rendered all but impossible for helicopter insertions.

SOG groped for new methods of running the North Vietnamese gauntlet. Sergeant Major Billy Waugh — a SOG operative known for daring and unorthodox schemes — raised the possibility of parachuting into the hottest real estate the Ho Chi Minh Trail had to offer using a high-altitude, low-opening (HALO) freefall jump.

Waugh found an ally in Special Forces Colonel Dan

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Shungel. In February 1970, Shungel took command of SOG Ground Studies Group, known as Op 35, which was responsible for reconnaissance into Laos and Cambodia. Shungel had become a freefall enthusiast at Fort Bragg, and he quickly bought into Waugh's scheme.

That summer Shungel employed a trio of skydivers to quietly flesh out Waugh's concept. The first, Ray Henson, was an experienced HALO jumper. The second, Tony Appleton, had amassed a considerable number of freefalls. The only one with a previous SOG tour, Melvin Hill, was Shungel's HALO instructor.

Shungel's three parachutists were shunted off to temporary assignments until Op 35 was granted formal approval to begin the HALO program. For Hill and Henson that meant desk slots. Appleton went to Ban Me Thuot to join Waugh, and was assigned to Recon Team (RT) Plane, arguably the best team in Command and Control South (CCS).

About a month later, Shungel and Waugh were given the green light to create their HALO team. Appleton, Henson and Hill transferred to the Op 35 training compound inside Camp Long Thanh, east of Saigon. Then the search began for indigenous HALO volunteers. Appleton brought four, stripping RT Plane of its best Rhade Montagnards. They were joined, at the insistence of the Liaison Service, by three ethnic Vietnamese volunteers.

Finally, Sergeants First Class Cliff Newman and Sam Hernandez were added. Newman, team leader of CCN's RT Virginia, was widely rated as one of the best recon team leaders in Da Nang. Hernandez, RT Virginia's assistant team leader, had considerable hours running missions shot himself in the foot and was sent packing. All but one of the Vietnamese dropped out. Most tragic of all was Tony Appleton, who took his own life over family problems. RT Florida returned to Long Thanh and practiced ground operations and night HALO jumps. CCN made final preparations for RT Florida's freefall. The team was reduced to six: Hill, Newman, Hernandez, two Rhade and a Vietnamese warrant officer named Thao. From these six, Hill was chosen by his peers as the team leader.

Scroungers To The Rescue

Florida's premier jump would be the first combat HALO in the history of the U.S. Army, so SOG wanted the best equipment possible. Unfortunately, there was not much in inventory. Master Sergeant Frank Norberry, one of the most respected freefall instructors at Fort Bragg, was dispatched to lend his expertise. Together with freefall specialist, Harry Denny, he created the Norden light — an illumination device rigged from a light wand and fixed to the back of the main parachute pack tray. This was to be used by Newman, so his teammates could focus on the light and remain in tight formation. A second Norden light was attached to the top of Newman's canopy.

More improvisation followed. The parachutes themselves were standard T-10 canopies modified with gores cut into the sides to improve maneuverability. For timing devices — which automatically deploy the main chute at a designated altitude — SOG used Czech-made KAP IIIs, far more reliable than the U.S.-issue alternative. Also procured was Tierra Spray, a green fluorescent mixture that, when coated on a freefall team, would allow them to

see each other in the darkness. Finally, the CIA loaned a homing beacon to Newman; each team member would carry a special radio receiver, allowing them to converge on Newman on the ground.

By the third week in November, RT Florida was ready. But intelligence sources began to suspect the mission was already compromised. A radio intercept revealed the North Vietnamese not only knew of the mission and drop zone coordinates, but also the names of everyone in RT Florida.

Op 35 was forced to change drop zones. The new target was 40 kilometers south of Khe Sanh, 15 kilometers inside Laos, sparsely

populated and well-known for dense anti-aircraft fire. And if there were any doubts about North Vietnamese vigilance, they were dispelled when Hill made a visual reconnaissance of the area in an OV-10, only to have the windshield shot out of the plane.

At 0200 on 28 November, six Florida members boarded a C-130E. Norberry, recovering from malaria, came out of bed to act as jumpmaster. Heading north, the aircraft rose to 17,000 feet and crossed into Laos. Five minutes from drop time the team did its equipment check and found the light on Hill's altimeter had burned out — he would not know when to pull his chute. Improvising, Hill tried dousing the front of his body with Tierra Spray, but could not

with Project Delta — a strategic reconnaissance operation in the northern half of South Vietnam.

With selection complete, training was set to begin. Because SOG did not have a HALO school of its own and wanted to keep its training secret, SOG requested that instruction take place on Okinawa under the auspices of the 1st Special Forces Group. Approval came immediately, and on 16 October the SOG parachutists were ready to begin. Shungel dubbed the team RT Florida after his home state.

On Okinawa, training took a toll on the freefallers. The Montagnard point man landed in the water on his first jump and promptly quit. The Montagnard team leader get enough illumination to read his altimeter.

Unwilling to abort the mission, the team moved to the edge of the tail ramp. Employing Combat Skyspot — a navigational system using ground-based radars — the C-130 crew came up on the drop zone. With a hand signal from Norberry, RT Florida stepped into the night.

As he had practiced so many times before, Newman

pressed a hand-held switch to activate the Norden light on his pack tray. However, the team hit rain clouds and lost sight of each other. Hill, who could not see his altimeter, knew that the first of two cloud layers ended at 4,000 feet, at which time he began counting before pulling the ripcord. But he opened his chute too soon and drifted from the rest of the team. On the ground, problems mounted. The drop zone was buried under 6 inches of water. and when Newman set up his homing device it shorted out. Worse, the Combat Skyspot navigational system, supposedly highly accurate, put the team a dozen kilometers off target.

Separated on the ground in enemy territory with poor weather closing in and without maps, Florida's members focused

on staying alive. Climbing an adjacent hill, Newman ran into Tiak, one of the Rhade Montagnards on the team, and the two tried to raise a Covey forward air controller (FAC). The other Rhade, No Nie, managed to link up with the Vietnamese warrant officer. Hill and Hernandez were both alone.

A search was immediately launched for the missing team. Since they did not know the team landed off-target, it took three days before a Covey made visual contact with Newman. The team members were glad to see the friendly aircraft, but it alerted the North Vietnamese to their presence. Enemy patrols approached, forcing RT Florida to call in repeated air strikes.

Two days of poor weather kept rescue

aircraft on the ground. Finally a pair of CH-53 helicopters attempted exfiltration. While retrieving Hill on a jungle penetrator, he was hit in the right shin with a spent round, but the other lifts were completed without incident.

Although RT Florida had accomplished nothing, SOG concluded that "as a method of entry this technique was considered proven as a means of entering [Laos] undetected since an active enemy search was not made to locate the team." Better yet, no one was killed, so Shungel and

Waugh continued to expand their pet project. By the beginning of 1971, Norberry, Denny, Newman, Hill and a handful of other HALO specialists established a freefall course at Long Thanh.

After a dozen more students were trained in late spring, the decision was made to form a second HALO team of just four Americans. Because of previous problems trying

to assemble on the ground, each member would be equipped with two radios so he could continue the mission independently. Chosen as team leader was Captain Larry Manes, a freefall instructor at Long Thanh who headed CCN's recon company. Two others, Specialist Noel Gast and Sergeant John "Spider" Trantanella, were from HALO-

qualified RT Idaho. A fourth, Robert Castillo, was from RT New Jersey.

"Half-Assed Gast"

During the predawn hours of 7 May, Manes' team boarded a C-130E. By this time, restrictions leveled against

SOG prevented Americans from entering Laos, so their target was a new North Vietnamese supply trail just inside the South Vietnamese border midway between A Shau and Khe Sanh.

At 20,000 feet the team jumped in pairs. Manes and Gast, each with a Norden light and covered in Tierra Spray, exited first. Murphy's Law quickly intervened. Castillo's parachute tangled. By the time he unwound the lines, he had drifted far from the rest of the team. More serious, one of the M14 anti-personnel mines in Gast's rucksack armed itself. Landing hard on his back, the toe-popper detonated and blew off part of his buttocks (earning himself the nickname "Half-Assed Gast"). Trantanella, too, injured himself on landing.

Nearby, Manes settled in a streambed. After hearing choppers fly overhead at first light, he waited two more hours before breaking radio silence to contact a Covey. Told that Gast and Trantanella had been extracted, Manes was asked if he needed directions to link up with Castillo. Not wanting to attract more attention with orbiting aircraft, he opted to continue the mission on his own. With the enemy apparently unaware of their presence, Manes and Castillo stayed put and watched the road for four

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more days before being exfiltrated without incident.

Once again SOG considered the HALO mission a partial success and began planning a third freefall. This time, however, some important lessons had been learned. First, jumps should occur no more than two hours before daybreak - shortening the time injured parachutists would have to wait for rescue. Second, having team members operate alone was far more realistic than attempting to assemble on the ground.

Third Time's A Charm?

As selection commenced for the third team, Andre

Smith and Jesse Campbell — both running recon in CCN — were quick to grab the slots. Sergeant Madison Strohlein - who had operated in CCS — also landed a berth. Heading them would be Billy Waugh, now sergeant major for CCN's recon company.

Assembled at Long Thanh, the four parachutists continued night practice jumps. On one of their final jumps, the team landed hard. Strohlein bruised his heel but elected to remain on the team. Smith seriously injured his back and was forced to drop out. Replacing him was Sgt. 1st Class James Bath, an experienced HALO instructor who had served multiple SOG tours.

Declared mission-ready, the team was given its target: westernmost Quang Nam Province, 6 kilometers from the Laotian border. The Air Force had produced photographs of the vicinity that showed campfires. SOG, told to investigate, had choppered in a recon team - only to exfiltrate them 45 minutes later under fierce enemy resistance.

In the hope that a HALO team would have a better chance of infiltrating undetected, Waugh's men planned to stage from Da Nang aboard a C-130 that flew a supply shuttle every night. However, after two false starts, the team stood down for a week and a half.

During the predawn hours of 22 June the team tried again. As the C-130 neared the border at 19,500 feet they

got the final green light and Bath, the assemblyman, stepped into the void. Once clear of the slip-stream he turned on the Norden light fixed to his pack tray. The other three jumpers fell into a tight formation as they passed through a layer of rain clouds.

Approaching the altitude to deploy his chute, Bath

blinked his Norden light to signal the rest of the team. But when he pulled the ripcord, the shock of his body weight and heavy gear ripped out a panel and pulled out the wire leading to the Norden light.

Looking up through the hole formed by the missing panel, Bath could see the other jumpers drifting apart as they searched for him. Bath could do nothing; his damaged chute would not respond when he pulled the steering toggles. Falling fast, he debated whether he should deploy his reserve. Bath elected to stay with his main canopy and slammed into a tree. Wearing only jungle fatigues and a soft horse-skin helmet (special tree-jumping uniforms were

no longer in the SOG inventory), he severely injured his left leg and suffered cuts across his face.

In his words: "I took out a metascope [night-vision device] and looked around; all I could see were green leaves, so I figured I was safe for the time. I then took out a small emergency radio and tried to raise the other team members. There was no answer from Waugh or Campbell, but Strohlein answered right away."

Separated from Bath by a small karst formation, Strohlein radioed that he too was hung up in a tree and had suffered a broken left arm. He was unable to remove himself from his harness or slide to the ground.

By daybreak, FAC planes were overhead trying to find

the two injured team members. Bath was able to give them a precise fix and a Huey darted in and snatched him from danger. But Strohlein, confused by the multitude of small planes in the vicinity, had trouble relaying his exact location. He remained on the air until 1100 hours, then reported North Vietnamese moving in. After that, transmissions ceased. The remaining two members each called in air strikes before they were picked up.

The following day a Bright Light rescue mission was inserted for Strohlein. Locating the tree where Strohlein had been suspended, they found his map and metascope. They also found his rifle with a bullet scar

gouged in the stock. Bullet holes riddled the tree and the parachute had been removed. No blood was found. Strohlein's fate has never been determined.

CCN had its fill of freefall operations, but others in

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SOF EXPOS TF's WARBIRDS bureau offices may be targeted for

SOLDIER OF It's not just in recent years that ATF has IVERSARY been overzealously pursuing law-abiding gun owners. SOF has been covering their

abuses almost as long as we've been around, with our first piece, titled "America's Gestapo In Action," running in November of 1978. That article detailed a raid on a San Jose, California, gun and coin show where ATF blocked the exits to the convention center and individually interrogated each exhibitor.

Seventeen years after that article appeared the American public is starting to take seriously the indignities and abuses ATF regularly dishes out to the citizens it supposedly serves. Their botched operations at Waco and Ruby Ridge have finally brought the renegade agency into the public and congressional eye, something we've been pushing for years.

In light of their egregious failures resulting in the deaths of dozens of Americans, SOF was alarmed to learn that ATF acquired counterinsurgency aircraft. As reported in last month's "ATF Watch" column, the ATF purchased 22 OV-10 Broncos from the Marine Corps; that worries us. Equally worrisome is the fact that ATF is dabbling in phony companies and bizarre transfer schemes à la the CIA. However, their attempts at playing spy appear as inept as their attempts at playing storm trooper.

Operational security has become a top priority for the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, Director John Magaw testified during recent congressional oversight hearings on the Waco massacre. Opsec, as it is called by security professionals, became a matter of particular concern because of the leaks to the news media that were ultimately blamed by ATF management for the deaths of four agents in the 28 February 1993 raid.

"I am absolutely convinced that the reason four people died is that there was no security," U.S. Rep. Louise Slaughter, a New York Democrat who participated in the House of Representatives hearings on Waco, said on 28 July.

Sensitivity about security failures at Waco led the ATF to cancel at the last second a sweeping raid on a District of Columbia housing project on 21 March 1995. Scores of ATF and other federal agents, pulled out of

offices from Baltimore, Maryland, to Richmond, Virginia, were staging for a large-scale early morning sweep of the project for gun/drug dealers, when one of the agents heard

news broadcast about their long-planned raid as he was driving in, and the mission had to be aborted.

The increased anxiety over security is caused in no small part by extreme outrage among many citizens over the ATF's reckless conduct in the Waco raid. Among the ATF's most nagging fears is that agents or acts of violent retribution.

Indeed, newspapers reported the arrest of militia members in Michigan who were caught by police with the names, addresses and license plate numbers of ATF agents, indicating the T-men were being followed. And federal prosecutors allege that accused Oklahoma City bomber Timothy McVeigh was motivated by his outrage over Waco, and chose his target, in part, because the destroyed federal building housed a large ATF office.

More recently, ATF headquarters received a telefax declaring war on the bureau and offering a \$10,000 reward for each dead agent. "This war is for all tax-paying patriots against you spineless, yellow-bellied, police state Nazi Gestapo," the fax said, according to The Washington Post. "...We will hunt you down and kill you with devious one by one." pleasure

So when the ATF decided to acquire its own fledgling squadron of military aircraft, 22 OV-10D Broncos, headquarters decided to register the airplanes under the name of a phony corporation, reminiscent of one of the CIA's covert corporate covers, the "Air America" operation of Vietnam War mystique.

ATF spokesman John C. Killorin confirmed to Soldier Of Fortune on 24 July what the magazine had already reported, that "American Warbirds Inc." is an operational cover for the OV-10Ds being refurbished for an ATF

air force (see "ATF Watch: ATF's Shadow Air Force," Sept. '95).

Opsec Concerns

Citing increased sensitivity about operational security, Killorin described the American Warbirds ruse as "a blind that tends to explain that airplane. If a criminal, or anyone else, became suspicious and wrote a letter to the address listed for American Warbirds, they would get nice letter back" advising that the company restores and demonstrates military combat aircraft in a manner Killorin compared to the Confederate Air Force. "Of course, we'll be changing the [cover] name in the near future," he said, citing SOF's exposure of the operation. The Federal Aviation Administration lists American Warbirds as a corporation headquartered at 5-1 Metropolitan Court, in a business and light industrial park located on a culde-sac in Gaithersburg, Maryland, a suburb of Washington, D.C. Despite this attempt to conceal the ATF's ownership of the counterinsurgency attack aircraft, though, bureau managers failed to take basic steps to allay suspicions of the curious, and thus ensure the success of the cover.

For instance, American Warbirds is not listed by the local phone company. Nor is it listed with local tax

assessors, or registered to do business in Maryland, a legal requirement that is easily verified by telephone. It is the only occupied address in that business park for which no name is listed on the park directory. Worst of all, though, this thinly veiled corporate "cover" would lead anyone — including potential terrorists and other criminals — directly into the middle of one of the ATF's most sensitive facilities.

The address for American Warbirds is actually that of ATF's radio branch, a part of the bureau's Special Operations Division, an office that handles the acquisition, record-keeping, main-

tenance, repair, modification and distribution of all ATF cellular telephones, radios, classified secure communications and covert surveillance gear.

Thus, ATF's effort to provide greater operational security for one operation, its fledgling force, drew unwanted attention to a more vital and sensitive operation, its communications and covert electronics shop. Such amateur-hour ruses raise questions about the real necessity for ATF to have so many

combat-capable airplanes, and whether the bumbling agency might abuse its air assets. Moreover, the effort to conceal them raises questions about the bureau's real intent, especially in light of the unsolved embezzlement of \$1.5 million from the ATF air force budget.

Terrorist Treasures In The Trash

Most important, though, is that during the routine pursuit of this story, SOF uncovered negligent or sloppy security procedures that could jeopardize ATF covert operations nationwide, putting the lives of ATF

agents and their families in potential danger.

Assisted by a security consultant, SOF undertook a surveillance operation on the Gaithersburg facility, to determine if it was connected to American Warbirds Inc. or the OV-10Ds purchases by the ATF. SOF's surveillance also uncovered major security lapses that not only confirmed (through aviation office phone bills) ATF's ownership of the air operation, but revealed sensitive information about the make, manufacture, wiring diagrams and frequencies of ATF's covert radio and surveillance electronics equipment nationwide.

The most obvious security breach detected was the improper disposal of records, all classified "Secret" or "Top Secret," pertaining to Secure Telephone Units, or STU-III phones, used for discussing classified information. Each unit costs about \$30,000, a military source said, excluding installation and maintenance. The classified documents pulled from the Gaithersburg dumpster include the serial numbers of individual units, the

names and locations of agents to which the units are assigned; code names and PINs (personal identity numbers), as well as the dial numbers for each unit. A number of technical manuals, including wiring diagrams for various devices, were also found. Some discarded corre-

spondence indicated the office employed not only a phony company name, but a fake address as well. Some aviation-related mail was addressed to 501 Metropolitan Grove, a nearby street which has no such number.

These and hundreds of other documents were voluntarily turned back over to the feds. They included scores of intelligence phone messages, ATF phone bills, shipping receipts, purchase orders and radio frequency zone maps for various ATF operations around the country. Also recovered from the trash were travel orders for agents and family members, overtime pay forms and copies of applications for leave time.

Risking The Rank And File

SOF magazine recovered personal mail, checking account carbons, social security numbers for agents and other employees, lists of home addresses and phone numbers of past and present personnel — with spouses names noted in parentheses. There were profile sheets with the names of agents' children, undercover radio call signs and operative code names. With no more than this, any terrorist or gangster would be able to assemble highly detailed dossiers on key agents and offices.

For example, personal phone messages with information about a female employee's marriage to Bernard, where the flowers were sent, the date and location of the wedding, as well as the names of the bride's and groom's parents, were retrieved. One agent discarded a cut-up credit card that was valid for another year. One note made reference to an internal affairs investigation. A 29 June 1995 memo announced a vacancy for "Criminal Investigator (Pilot) GS-1811-13," apparently soliciting applicants to fly the newly acquired OV-10s.

Finally, three copies of a detailed floor plan of the communications and electronics surveillance facility in Gaithersburg were obtained. The plans included the locations of secure storage areas and repair benches, and the names of each agent and clerk, written in his or her work space. Such information would be invaluable to a terrorist, or to a gangster planning a black bag job on the facility.

In case a letter of introduction were needed to penetrate an ATF operation, Gaithersburg personnel also helpfully tossed blank ATF stationery and a stack of postage-paid official envelopes in the trash, too.

"The thing that really upsets me is that [this] so clearly demonstrates the careless disregard for the welfare of the rank and file agents by management," said Richard L. Sherrow, a

former investigator for ATF's bomb and explosives branch and an SOF contributor.

Security Hemorrhage

"This is the type of sloppiness and incompetence that puts the lives of innocent, hard-working undercover street agents in serious danger," said Sherrow after reviewing some of the internal ATF documents, shaking his head at the carelessness, and at one point remarking on the apparent promotion of a former colleague on the West Coast whose name and other personal information was contained in one document discarded at the Gaithersburg office. "Not just the agents' lives, but the lives of their wives and children. It is the type of security lapse that should be a firing offense. It demonstrates gross negligence," Sherrow concluded.

Robert E. Sanders, a retired deputy director for enforcement at ATF and Washington-based attorney who regularly handles cases involving the Classified Information Procedures Act, agreed. "Security breaches on this scale demonstrate not so much a security leak as a security hemorrhage," Sanders told SOF. "The first concern of managers entrusted with responsi-

bility for criminal investigations should be the safety of the special agent and his or her family. One must never forget the special agent deals directly with criminals, from the investigation to the arrest to the search of the home or office, to testifying against them at trial.

"It is axiomatic that the criminal doesn't blame himself for being in jail, but blames his antagonist; the special agent," Sanders said. "Many of these criminals are vicious animals for whom taking a human life is not a major decision. Many of these criminals eventually get out of jail - often sooner than later - and they may seek revenge. It would be horrible if any revenge plot was aided by the careless disclosure of sensitive information about agents, their spouses, where the kids go to school, where the family grocery shops or takes the dry cleaning."

In analyzing the latest apparent security failure by the ATF, Sanders offered two possible explanations "both of which point to major management deficiencies. The most likely reason is that this is yet another symptom of poor management. Management is responsible to ensure that all employnal statutes, even for mere negligence. Section 793(f) of Title 18 makes it unlawful for a person who is entrusted with a document of any kind relating to national security and allows, through gross negligence the loss, destruction or unauthorized disclosure of its information. It is a crime to merely know that such an event has occurred and not report it. The penalty can be up to 10 years in prison."



its security procedures and its use of covert operations. More certain, according to The Washington Times, is a probe into why . ATF needs a combat-capable aircraft, one used in Vietnam to deliver automatic cannon, heavy machine gun,

rocket and missile attacks in close support of ground troops. It is designed primarily as a counter-insurgency attack aircraft, and is also used for aerial surveillance and tracking.

"Warbirds" For War?

"It's an excellent surveillance aircraft," Killorin noted. He said only seven would be operational — five less than the figure quoted by confi-

dential SOF sources.

ATF spokeswoman Susan Mc-Carron told The Washington Times that the bureau's OV-10s had been stripped of their combat armament, which includes 20mm cannons. Military configurations also include forward-looking infrared radar (FLIR), ground-tracking radar, laser range finders and target designators. Sources who have inspected three of the ATF's OV-10s report that the firearms bureau's planes have retained almost all the military extras except actual ordnance. Killorin disputed that. He noted, for instance, that the ejecting seats have been removed. Next thing you know, ATF will make its pilots buy their own parachutes.

Under the ATF's attempt to hide ownership of the aircraft, they were transferred from the Department of Defense to the General Services Administration. At least some of the ATF OV-10s were transferred by GSA to a phony New Jersey corporation called Mid-Air Salvage Inc., which lists the address of a new townhouse in Franklin Park, New Jersey. Mid-Air Salvage transferred title to American Warbirds on the same day in October 1994. One FAA title document noted that the aircraft was "sold by Mid-Air Salvage with an illegible signature showing title of 'owner.' F.A.A. should have requested a bill of sale from Mid-Air Salvage, signed by someone with a corporate or managerial title."

Several calls to GSA for verification and further information on the

ees with security clearances are cognizant of and strictly adhere to national defense procedures... It is also the management's responsibility to ... ensure compliance.

"The other explanation for such a security lapse, provided that management has scrupulously discharged its responsibilities, is misconduct or criminal negligence by the agent or employee," he said. "This particular instance may be in violation of crimi-

AIR PIRATES RAII

American Mercs Fire-Bomb Papa Doc's Palace

Strange and Byzantine plots have found a home at SOF since the beginning. On close examination most turn out to be someone's pipe dream, but a few of these schemes actually come off, and always with unpredictable results.

There was the time we had to "bail out" a handful of American mercs locked up in a Brazilian jail after they'd botched an attempted invasion of Ghana. Then there was the time our staffers rigged a propane bomb to drop on Desi Bouterse in Suriname. Once we even hired hundreds of Laotian resistance fighters to aid in our hunt for American POW/MIAs in Southeast Asia. And the list goes on.

The great thing about this is that SOF readers get a monthly ringside seat to many of these bizarre undertakings, usually from a first-person perspective. While we usually have to wait until these events are no longer news (prevailing lawsuits and criminal trials, etc.), they still make for great reading. This article proves the point; though this never-beforepublished story about former SOF staffer Ralph Edens' tour as a

"bombadier" on a one-plane mission to nail Papa Doc's palace is more than 25 years old, it's classic SOF.

Perhaps in the near future we'll even get to find out why Robert K. Brown owns several Kevlar-hulled attack boats and a gold mine in New Guinea.

Much of 1968 COLDIER OF and early 1969 witnessed a flurry of activity in the Haitian communities of Miami, New York and Montreal, as funds were raised for the

purchase of arms and equipment to overthrow the cruel and despotic Duvalier regime in Port-au-Prince. Although originally popularly elected, Duvalier had quickly become "president for life" and a madman who was universally acknowledged as a rat of the worst order. His abuse of the people he ruled was only equalled later by Idi Amin.

Enlisting Haitians willing to mount an insurrection against "Papa Doc" was not difficult, as his base of sup-Tonton Macoutes, the praehe used to keep people cowed. finding pro

bono cadre willing to assist solely for the benefit of mankind was not difficult. We'd even managed to set up an extensive Haitian training camp in a remote section of the Florida Everglades.

However, the accidental shooting death of recruit Gerald Baker during live-fire exercises at this facility created untoward official interest in current Haitian exile activities and we were forced to scatter and lay low.

Still, the movers and shakers of our particular part of the budding Haitian rebellion could not sit idly by while we had the resources to do something, and volunteers and cadre to do it with. Our training up to this point had been oriented toward seaborne infantry invasions and possibly airborne invasions backed up by air-lifted infantry.

After the stand-down following the death at the training site, a series of meetings in the Miami area discussed and reevaluated possible scenarios. Time, of course, can be helpful or harmful; in this case I had the feeling that events were rushing us into a situation where we would have to use or lose whatever advantage that exact point in time held. My concerns

part of the plan that I was to be responsible for - the seizure of the airfield at Cap-Haïtien — was losing its focus in a headlong rush to seize whatever the moment offered. The additional troops that were to jump with me were no longer being mentioned and the necessary means to get us there were also not being discussed. The plan had been to jump on the field, neutralize the garrison there and prepare to receive reinforcements. Once our forces were consolidated, we would drive on the palace in Port-au-Prince.

Bombing the palace at some point was also mentioned. How can you have a revolution, if you don't bomb the palace? The presidential palace and the military barracks immediately adjacent to the palace grounds were the targets of choice. Any collateral damage to the surrounding slums could be viewed as urban renewal.

Bug Out For Bahamas

The official interest aroused by Baker's death necessitated the movement of our equipment and some of our personnel to South Caicos Island, a British possession at the extreme southeastern end of the Bahama chain. It had been chosen for its adequate airstrip, its small population and its proximity to Haiti. From here we would launch the efforts that would force Duvalier out and lay the groundwork necessary for a free Haiti.

Timing of our arrival was indeed fortunate, with absolutely no authorities on duty at the airport. The whole thing could have ended there had anyone been on hand to greet and inspect us, as we were carrying almost all of our arms and equipment. We took advantage of the momentary and opportune isolation to unload and cache our equipment in the bushes

aircraft was identified as Jim Carlin. Along with the flight engineer, the flight mechanic and Col. Leon, our motley crew had grown to a total of 10 men.

New "Plans"

I listened aghast as Col. Leon outlined the new twists in the campaign against Duvalier. After hearing his sitrep I did not see the possibility of going forth with the previously planned airborne scenario. Also, relations with the local authority in South Caicos was quickly making our current situation untenable, with the locals moving to get us off the island as soon as possible.

Upon learning this we made plans for immediate departure and on arrival at the airport I became fully aware the chief of police and probably everyone on the island knew we were not *really* there to charter for skindiving adventures (our cover

off the runway, then proceeded to the only "town" and checked into the Admiral's Arms Hotel to await further developments.

For several days we waited with no information forthcoming, haunted by the feeling that we were being watched. One of the police chief's men even mentioned there was talk of getting us off the island.

One day upon returning from Grand Turk — the closest place that afforded a phone link to Miami or New York — Marty Casey and I ob-

served a huge plane at the airport, a Lockheed Super Constellation. Marty and I exchanged glances, but did not think that this aircraft might have anything to

do with our operation against Haiti. Boy, were we wrong.

Arriving back at the hotel, we met co-pilot Howard Davis and three men I did not know. After a short briefing and introductions, the captain of the



story). Some of the locals actually helped gather and load the Super Connie with our equipment that had been cached earlier. It was late evening when our loading was completed and we departed. We had not been briefed on what the latest plan was. Our quick departure had not, at least in my mind, even made it obvious what our current options, if any, were.

I knew we were flying north, but little more. After some time we landed at Great Exuma in the Bahamas, and took on fuel. Here there was a desperate consultation between Col. Leon, Jim Carlin, Howard Davis, Marty Casey and myself. Checking equipment were Canadian Bill Dempsey, Ed Kolby and Haitian exile Charlie Smith; the two remaining crew members were in the cockpit area. Marty and I, having been on South Caicos for some time, were not aware of what had happened to put us in this situation. And it was an odd situation; we were now sitting on a runway on a British-controlled island with 10 individuals, 50 33-gallon drums of JP-4 plus arms and equipment that would, if found, create quite a flap among Her Majesty's military and police forces.

Our hurried consultation conjured no particularly viable option: Returning to the United States with that cargo on board was out of the question, dumping/caching it on Exuma was also not practical. During this

exchange asked, rhetorically, where the parachutes were. Davis said they had been left in Miami, and fur-


ther that additional personnel were not forthcoming and our expected addition of air-landed infantry would not be available as well.

"Let's Bomb The Palace"

Colonel Leon then asked, "What do we do?" Because of the limited or singular options available to us, I said almost off-handedly, "We have the drums, let's bomb the palace." There was a pause and we all looked at each other. It may not have been an inspired idea strategically, tactically or practically, but no one objected. And there were no other plans.

We took off from Exuma with no difficulty; the flashing blue and red lights of the local gendarmes appeared at the end of the runway as we taxied away, which meant we probably left the police pondering many unanswered questions as our

altitude and began a slow turn to the south.

It was late in the evening — or early in the morning, depending on one's own assessment of the hour -but by any accounting it was the latter hours of what had been a long day and we were tired. But we had many details to attend to before reaching our rendezvous with history. To transform the 33-gallon drums of JP-4 into giant Molotov cocktails, we had available in our equipment inventory a number of 30-second mini-flares. We attached two to a barrel directly across from each other on the top rim of the drum, secured them, then tied the two igniters with a common nylon string so that pulling in the middle would ignite both mini-flares, and impact with the ground would create a spectacular fire bomb.

When we finished the job on the Molotovs, each of us checked our individual equipment for any lastminute additions, adjustments or changes, and took a minute for the individual introspection that everyone going into a hostile situation experiences.

Captain Carlin gave us ample warning of our ETA, and we started to maneuver some of the giant Molotov cocktails closer to the freight rollers on board. We also fashioned lifelines to secure ourselves when pushing the drums out the rear-door "bomb bay."

I remember the morning (approximately 1000 hours local time) 4 June 1969 as being beautiful and clear. On our initial approach, with the bay to our immediate right and the hills and mountains on our left, our descent was gradual, and we continued on southward, past the main portion of

downtown Port-au-Prince and our target. We continued south until we flew over radio towers beyond the city. We then turned right and right again and were flying back northward. We continued our descent until, according to Carlin, we were at approximately 400 feet. As we flew over the southern end of the palace grounds, Casey and Smith began pushing the giant cocktails out. After a few went out, I noticed that on at least two of the drums Smith had not pulled the nylon cord that would ignite the mini-flares. I went to the door and told Smith to go back and help Dempsey and Kolby load the drums onto the rollers and push them to the door.

Molotov Cocktail Hour

I wrapped the lifeline around myself as we made the turn toward the mountains and back south again before turning north for our second bombing run, descending to approximately 300 feet for this pass. We could see the fires that the previous pass had caused — and the ominous sight of almost everyone on the ground firing at us. It was then that we took some heavy hits from one of the machine-gun emplacements around the palace. The sound was like someone hitting the aluminum skin of the aircraft with a large hammer. I instinctively went horizontal, but later thought how foolish that was. The best position was vertical, as it presented a smaller target profile to fire coming from below.

On board we also had a glass fivegallon water bottle, filled with flammable liquid, that Marty and I had rigged with a vial of yellow phosphorus into a "junior" giant Molotov cocktail. The phosphorus was the remainder of a lot that Casey and I had experimented with in attempting to fashion anti-personnel grenades for use by the Haitians.

On this second pass we put the five-gallon Molotov cocktail out near

fire. Davis (the co-pilot) was standing in the cockpit door yelling "no, no, no!" Marty and I thought he was saying "go, go, go!" and we redoubled our efforts to push our deadly cargo out the door. It was also on this second pass that most of the damage was done to civilian areas, because as we were

turning we continued to bomb.

As we made our last turn north for our third bomb run we

were somewhat unsure of the situation, but we could see gunners leaving the 20mm and other positions and high-kneeing it to some other part of Haiti. We learned from sources later that sporadic AAA fire continued into the air an hour after we were gone.

Why three runs? The decision was obviously made by Carlin after weighing the relative ineffectiveness of the ground fire, and of course considering that with the damage that had already been inflicted on the aircraft, what was to lose?

We were at approximately 200 feet for this final run: I don't know how large we looked to those on the ground, but I can assure you it felt like every gun firing at us was firing at me personally. We finished the run and our over-the-shoulder target assessment indicated that we had put 28 of the 33-gallon Molotov cocktails and the five-gallon "junior" version over the palace, barracks and areas that were in close proximity to the palace grounds. Information obtained later indicated that two of the Molotov cocktails actually impacted on the palace, one on the extreme southern end and one on the front portico with negligible damage. Most damage occurred in the shanty areas

the end of the run, and I watched transfixed as the deadly device zigzagged its way to impact on the northern end of the boundary of the presidential palace grounds. This second pass was the one in which we took the hardest pounding, and it was toward the end, before turning to position ourselves for the third and final run, that a 20mm round went through the pilot's side of the cockpit and hit a fire extinguisher. It exploded and temporarily knocked the flight engineer unconscious, releasing a large cloud of white smoke.

From our view at the back of the aircraft, we thought the plane was on

Hundreds of military books are published each year and most leave us yawning, mainly because the majority offer little that's new or half as exciting as what you find every month in SOF.

There are notable exceptions, however. Every so often we run across a particularly worthwhile manuscript and we endeavor to give it wider exposure. In the late 1970s, SOF was the first place you could read about classics like Bradley Earl Ayers' The War That Never Was, Jim Morris' War Story, and many others frowned on at the time by the politically correct. More recently we've hyped up particularly worthwhile works like Gen. Harold Moore and Joe Galloway's We Were Soldiers Once ... And Young and Kregg Jorgenson's Acceptable Loss. This month we're printing a chapter from a dynamite new book covering the highlights of 26year. specops veteran Mike Walsh's life. It's simply titled SEAL! If you like hard-hitting action with just the right dose of offbeat humor you gotta check it out.

Three-quarters of the way through my tour at My Tho I took some R&R and visited with X-Ray platoon at Ben Tre. I had a few friends there and visits with other platoons were rare enough as it was. Like us, they were located beside a main river, and since it was only a 30-minute flight by helo from Dong Tam, I decided to drop in and pay my respects. When visiting other SEAL platoons in Vietnam it was understood you

Tre would become a major turning point in my professional life. It was here I made the decisions that formed my career path for the remainder of my time in the Navy.

Mike Collins was the platoon commander, and Ed Jones was the chief warrant officer. They'd done a tour together at Can Tho with Phoenix. Their activities there were regional in nature, and whenever those of us assigned to the program gathered in

brought along your combat gear. More than likely you'd find yourself on a combat operation before any socializing took place, kind of a weird way of welcoming you aboard. It also allowed your peers to see what you were made of and what level of operator you were.

The SEAL community, like all other special operations forces, is a small one. Word got around, both good and bad. If offered a chance to run with a squad from X-Ray platoon I'd jump on it. To beg off would have indicated a serious problem in my attitude, and I had no such problem when it came to war fighting. Ben

the city for business, Mike and Ed had their hands full. All Phoenix matters were handled before lunch, and we spent the rest of the day and night terrorizing the town as only SEALs could terrorize a town.

I recall one such meeting where six or seven of us were trying to check into the hotel in town. The young Vietnamese desk clerk was nasty, which just provoked us even more to give her a hard time. When she'd confirmed we were with the PRU she'd said, "No more rooms for you PRU guys" as if we'd accept this and go away. Bill (not his real name) took his briefcase and smashed it hard into

the desk's polished surface. The young woman appeared to go into shock at the violence of the act, and stood there beginning to tremble. We understood her reaction, as we'd each seen it a hundred times or more when the "men with green faces" appeared from nowhere to capture and kill their enemies. Bill began undressing in the lobby. No one said anything, our faces deadpan as he slipped his clothes off. Finally he was nude and both Vietnamese and American guests were fleeing the lobby in a panic. Highranking U.S. officers strolled past us, ignoring Bill as they tried to go about their business. Our teammate then opened his briefcase, took out a change of clothes, and began dressing. The desk clerk got the message,

and rooms suddenly became available. I guess you just have to know how to talk to people.

That same evening the hotel was raided by both Vietnamese and U.S. military police. We heard later that "someone" had been spotted on the establishment's roof test-firing a silenced Smith & Wesson M-76 submachine gun at the stray cats living in Ben Sum Ouy alley, next to the hotel. Apparently a few stray rounds had found their way through the windows of a whorehouse across the street and the residents and guests were complaining. We felt the atmosphere created by too many cops in one place was not at all restful so we "checked out" on the run. Naturally the MPs figured we'd come down the

elevator and leave by the front door, so they posted all their manpower in the lobby to await our arrival. Wrong! As was always our practice we did the unexpected and left by the rear stairwell, knowing how predictable the cops could be. By the way, the M-76 was a great little weapon.

150% Casualties

I thought the world of Mike and Ed, especially Ed. We'd attended training together in the Cuyamaca Mountains where the instructors, for some reason, had given my teammate a bad time. I never knew why, as he wasn't a troublemaker, although he was somewhat outspoken. Ed was black, and a good man in every respect. It became my habit to confide in him, and I could count on him to shoot straight with me in return. Jones would tell you the things you didn't want — but needed — to hear about yourself. He was a sea daddy, the kind of man every young sailor needs to show him the ropes. I've tried to pass along much of what Ed Jones taught me since those early days of training, as a tribute to one truly remarkable SEAL.

X-Ray platoon suffered more than 150% casualties during their tour at Ben Tre. This meant more than half the men were wounded at least twice, and some were killed. No one in X-Ray platoon went unscathed during that tour. When I was operating at Soc Trang the X-Ray platoon was

ambushed while inserting. Frank Bomar and a man named Ritter were killed by direct AK fire moments after stepping ashore. The VC had correctly predicted the most likely insertion point for a SEAL operation, and they had planted a submerged 500-pound command-detonated mine in the river meant to blow any small craft to bits. As the SEAL squad prepared to come ashore the mine was fired but failed to detonate. Despite this, the VC opened up with everything they had and Ritter took four AK rounds across the chest. He was

dead before he hit the ground. Bomar was hit by a single round in the right femoral artery. The bullet severed the artery and 60 seconds later he bled to

death. Not a good day for the good guys.

I was in Can Tho reenlisting for another four years of Navy life when the bodies were brought in, and it was a sobering reminder we were not invincible. Either X-Ray platoon was really hurting the gooks, or they'd become too predictable in their operations. It turned out the latter was the case and the VC were hitting back ... hard. It cost us two good men, but the men in the platoon learned their lesson.

Now I was in Ben Tre, seeing good friends and getting the chance to see how they operated. My first concern was how they were gathering and evaluating their intelligence.

Ed and I disagreed over their modus operandi, but this didn't affect our friendship in the least. On my first evening in town we launched an operation using an MSSC, or Medium SEAL Support Craft, to patrol the main river. I noted almost right away

that the map being used to navigate was inaccurate, but no one in the platoon seemed to give this much thought. Their tactics were flawed, and by the time we reached the infiltration point I knew we'd been compromised long ago. Regardless, the platoon boss gave the order to go in and so we did. The objective was a dry hole ... although I wasn't at all surprised.

It was obvious why they were having problems. Sometimes it's more difficult to recognize one's shortcomings when you're so close to the subject and perhaps personally involved. This might have been the case with X-Ray platoon. Doc Barnes, my radio man and near constant companion, was along for

the ride to Ben Tre and was picking up the same vibes. We decided to concentrate on the platoon's intelligence guys in an effort to upgrade their capability. The next operation was going to be a rough one, and we decided to go along and see it through.



While working as a Provincial Reconnaissance Unit adviser in Phoenix — and on all tours — Walsh opted for VC uniform, often right down to the sandals and AK-47. In battle, Walsh's short stature and VC dress gave him the edge more than once. History Repeats Itself

X-Ray had found themselves a *Chieu Hoi* who claimed he knew a VC demolition factory located some distance

from Ben Tre. The target was said to be situated on the upper reaches of a secondary river. The VC informer said he was unable to find the factory at night because he couldn't navigate. "Yeah, right," I told myself. Barnes and I, with our combat senses, could smell this one beginning to stink immediately. A VC who couldn't travel through the jungle at night? I'd never met one, nor had any other SEAL I knew. I was invited to interrogate the Chieu Hoi, as the intelligence guys had been students of mine during their training at SBI just months earlier. It was a psychological advantage I exploited to the max. This was one Chieu Hoi I didn't trust one iota, but in the end, my feelings made no difference.

Mike Collins listened to what I had to say, then listened to his own men, then ordered us to insert the next afternoon. "Here we go again," I told Barnes. I hoped history would not repeat itself where X-Ray's luck was concerned.

We could not have asked for a prettier day in which to operate. The sun was bright, winds were low, and the water was calm. Clint Majors, a recent graduate of both BUD/S and SBI, was running point. I thought a lot of him and still do. Our selected insertion point was a mystery to me. It offered no distinguishing feature whatsoever. Normally, this is a good thing; it means the bad guys probably won't set up on it waiting for Navy SEALs. But this time around I was getting that little feeling that told me this was going to be a bad day. We were going in over a riverbank roughly 10 feet high, and its 45-degree slope would have been a real nightmare under the best of conditions.

The take-charge attitude I'd been slowly fostering as a SEAL took over. "Clint," I yelled, "get over that hump as soon as you can! I'll send an automatic weapon to back you up!"

Ed Jones flashed me an angry look. "Who's running this operation?" he asked as we neared the riverbank.

"You are, Ed," I responded, "but an automatic weapon makes sense, doesn't it?"

Jones motioned for the automaticweapon man to move forward so he could scamper up behind Clint once

we touched shore. Ed knew I'd been working with Majors as a point man, so he didn't give me too much smoke for offering the advice. I think Clint was secretly happy with the suggestion, as it would have been pretty lonely on the other side of the massive mud wall with just a rifle as backup.

The patrol scrambled onto the bank

quickly as our boat nestled up to it as firmly as was possible. No contact meant we could get on the trail immediately, and within a short time we'd located the objective: a small cluster of hootches, all of which appeared to be deserted. I asked Ed to set out security while Clint and I moved forward to check the huts. "Watch out for booby traps," I warned Majors. Our Chieu Hoi was wandering around, and I motioned him to get down beside

Jones. He didn't move — at least not right away. With a fierce shove I sent him headfirst into the ground, his face sliding across the coarse earth until he stopped just inches from where Ed was positioned.

Looks Like The Alamo

Clint and I entered the empty compound. We found strong evidence the place had once been used as a demolition factory by the VC. Vast amounts of various explosives and their components were still present. We moved everyone into place once we were certain there were no enemy troops about, and we began gathering up what we could. I told the Chieu Hoi I was on the verge of cutting him up like a Texas steer. Ed restrained me, but the agent was convinced he would die at any second. Fear of me would keep him honest, I hoped.

Once our rucks were full, we burned and destroyed everything else. We recalled the boat, and the driver told us he'd just passed a squad-sized bunker on his way in. "Looks like the Alamo," he offered. After a quick conference we decided to locate the bunker and blow it in place using some of the captured demolitions. Might as well make a clean sweep of it so the operation wouldn't be a total loss.

We reinserted from the river near the bunker's position. After checking it for booby traps and snakes, we entered. I was always concerned about snakes, as the enemy often wired them up as living booby traps. If you missed one and he bit you, well, it was a bad way to die. More than once I used a small stick to swat at entrances just to see what might swat back. The hand of God was upon me, as never was I hit by

one of these foul creatures.

The bunker was huge inside. There were firing ports, cooking areas, and sleeping quarters. Oh, for another claymore pillow trick! But the idea was to blow the entire complex, so that was what we did, using a time fuse and as much explosive as possible. The whole thing went up like a textbook problem. They'd built it well, but we blew it better. Time to go home and have a few beers over this one.

SOMEBODY'S LYING

Articles on Waco have been a nearly constant part **UERSARY** of these pages since the attack on the Branch Davidian

compound on 28 February 1993. Since the June '93 issue, and in almost every subsequent magazine after the disastrous raid and following inferno, we've reported on the depths of deception the involved agencies have sunk to cover up their mistakes: from ATF to Treasury to the FBI to the U.S. Army.

We believe Waco was one of the defining moments of

our time and have therefore fanatically attempted to get behind the veil of lies put up by the government. The bombing of the Murrah building in Oklahoma City and a congressional inquiry support our stand that this issue goes far deeper than a botched law enforcement operation.

We will continue to research and publish new information on Waco until a satisfactory accounting has been made.

"The days of a couple of agents ... walking up to somebody's front door and knocking ... in threepiece suits to execute a warrant ... is [sic] over."

Thus did Vic Oboyski, a federal marshal for almost 25 years, condemn Sergeant Joe Friday's calm, deadpan civility to the trash heap of history. The kinder, gentler days of Dragnet are no more, according to Oboyski's might-makes-right vision of Future Cop, a chilling declaration

that bodes ill for the health of civil liberties in America. There will be considerably less liberty, and damned little civility, if Oboyski's law enforcement philosophy becomes the standard.

Maybe it already has. After all, federal lawmen rolled more armor against innocent women and children at Waco than the Clinton administration would allow to avert the slaughter of 18 U.S. servicemen in Somalia by blood-thirsty hoodlums who dragged the naked, battered bodies of their victims through Mogadishu's filthy streets. The FBI gassed the huddled masses of the Branch Davidian religious retreat with a toxic chemical forbidden for military use against enemy troops in war.

More than any of about 100

the executive branch painted a picture of a concerted cover-up effort by Treasury and Justice officials, including the destruction of primary records and specific orders, to stonewall any investigation that might benefit attorneys defending the 11 Branch Davidians who were ultimately tried for their role in the botched Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms raid of 28 February 1993. An Incident The hearings also produced an amusing round of finger-pointing by present and former ATF and Department of Treasury officials, who ac-

Although critics repeatedly criticized the Waco hearings for suppos-

edly turning up no new information,

some newly revealed documents from

cused each other of lying - in addition to allegations of perjury and obstruction of justice, and

evidence that the final armor-and-gas attack of 19 April had received final approval by President

Bill Clinton.

Neither Oboyski nor any of the other witnesses who defended the federal government's conduct at Waco referred to the 51-day event there as a tragedy, much less a massacre or a disaster. It was simply minimized as the Waco "incident," as if the unnecessary and hideous deaths of more than 90 people — including four Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms agents - were "incidental," defined by

Webster's as "happening as a result of or in connection with something more important; casual."

Oboyski was also typical among defenders of the federal faith when he assigned total blame to someone conveniently unavailable for comment; someone, indeed, no longer eligible for interview by the Bureau of Census - one David Koresh, the allegedly pedophilic pied piper and gun-loving guitarist of Waco infamy,

> witnesses called to give sworn testimony in July's joint subcommittee hearing about the Waco tragedy in the U.S. House of Representatives, Oboyski succinctly summed up the government's justification of its actions. His was not just the opinion of one federal agent. Oboyski is the president of the Federal Law Enforcement Officers Association, a group of more than 10,000 federal cops from 51 separate agencies.

still revered by Branch Davidians as a messiah figure, reviled by government worshipers as a demon incarnate. Oboyski would not even afford Koresh the dignity of using the dead man's legal name.

"Responsibility for the horrific end of the stand-off rests with Vernon Howell [Koresh], not the FBI or the attorney general," Oboyski opined. "Vernon Howell was a criminal, a child abuser, a cop killer and a coward... It may never be known if the apocalyptic end that Vernon Howell preached about so often could have been prevented, but to blame anyone other than Howell for the eventual outcome is wrong..."

Then Oboyski, himself a member of a cult of badge flippers, preached his own prophecy of social Atmageddon: "I do not believe that the Branch Davidian episode was a mere aberration," Oboyski said. "I believe it was a harbinger of things to come... Waco. The L.A. riots. The World Trade Center bombing and the killing of CIA employees in Virginia are the sounds of warning bells going off."

So ask not for whom the bell tolls... Et tu, Oboyski? Indeed, he was a ringer, part of the well-orchestrated political posturing and damage diversion conducted by U.S. Rep. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., congressional choir leader of the liberal left and President Clinton's point man in the Democratic Party's parade to promote socialism and pooh-pooh personal liberty. One must give the maestro his devil's due, however. Schumer's masterful subversion of the Waco hearings kept the Republican majority off balance and fuzzied the focus of inquiry, blurring boundaries in the blame game.

A Maestro Grabs The Baton

So successfully did Schumer set the tone, at least in the first half of 10 days of testimony, that many marveled at why the Republicans did not assert their new, hard-won majority status. Democrats put Republicans on the defensive by accusing GOP members of being anti-law enforcement. Did the joint subcommittee co-chairmen, Bill Zeliff of New Hampshire and Bill McCollum of Florida, know what that gavel was for? Schumer's clowning constantly upstaged the Republican role of ringmaster in what, at times, seemed like a three-ring version of The Twilight Zone.

First there were the Republican panel members, who spent half of their time allotted for questioning witnesses making rambling, touchy-feely apologies about why all this was necessary, while the remainder tossed powder-puff questions to executive branch officials who, unlike the GOP panel members, were obviously well prepared. "The congressmen didn't really get interested in the hearings until three days before they started," one staffer said.

boro, denounced the Waco hearings as "a massive waste of taxpayer money, designed for a political objective."

That objective, according to Schumer and his minions, was the repeal of the Brady Law and the assault weapons ban, and the abolition of the ATF. The villain, they claimed, was the National Rifle Association, which conducted its own sifting of evidence and ultimately retained Failure Analysis Associates of Menlo

With Noble, former ATF Director Steve Higgins and former Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen on one end of the witness table, and Chojnacki, Sarabyn and Hartnett on the other, each side accused the other of lying. Somebody obviously was. No one was charged with perjury.

Then there were the Democrats: It was eerie. Although the Dems are historically political foes of the military and police establishments, and the erstwhile champions of civil liberties and almost any religious of sexual fringe group one can name, they sat solidly in favor of Mom, apple pie, the missionary position and a Bradley tank in every police department motor pool. Strangest of all; Schumer's most able lieutenant, U.S. Rep. Tom Lantos, D-Calif., a Hungarian Jew who survived the Nazi death camp at Buchenwald, suggested a greater involvement of the military in civilian law enforcement that was too much even for Major General John M. Pickler, former commander of Joint Task Force Six.,

Citing Jonestown, the World Trade Center bombing and the gas attacks on Japanese subways, Lantos asked Pickler, "Don't you think your [the military's] involvement in civilian law enforcement needs to be broadened?"

"I believe our current politics ... are appropriate;" an apparently puzzled Pickler answered.

Wants More Of The Same?

Endorsing Lantos' suggestion that a-paramilitary police state might not be a-bad idea, U.S. Rep. Melvin Watt, a dyed-in-the-wool liberal Democrat from North Carolina's gerrymandered black district that snakes along Interstate 85 from Charlotte to GreensPark, California, to analyze the effects of the FBI's armor and CS gas attack. Failure Analysis is the highly respected engineering research firm that solved the explosion of the space shuttle Challenger, and debunked the staged NBC Dateline reports on exploding, side-mounted gasoline tanks on General Motors pickup trucks.

Schumer attacked the NRA as an "extremist" group of "patanoid" members whose involvement "tainted" the hearings. The Washington Post jumped into the NRA-bashing fray, publishing stories that paint the firearms bureau as being unfairly victimized by a ruthless, unscrupulous gun lobby. One can safely assume, then, that Schumer has never used "research" paid for and provided by Handgun Control Inc., or any other anti-gun lobbying group to bolster his efforts at passage of increasingly restrictive gun control legislation.

The NRA was not the only whipping boy for the Democrats. Soldier Of Fortune's story about the illegal training provided by Green Berets to the ATF just prior to its disastrous raid (see "No Peace Without Justice," May '95) was attacked as being inaccurate after Major Mark Petree and others denied the magazine's allegations. Holding aloft a copy of the SOF article like it was a decomposing rat that died of the plague, Schumer said that "This type of magazine ... is not known for its veracity."

Interesting, then, that three of the

hearings witnesses — former ATFers Robert E. Sanders, Richard L. Sherrow and Dick J. Reavis, author of *The Ashes of Waco: An Investigation* — have all published articles in SOF. Reavis called for the release of all government records pertaining to the Waco raid. Reavis pointed out that of the 80 or so statements by ATF agents taken by Texas Ranger investigators, only 20 have been released and the rest remain secret. He called coverage of the Waco story "a major failure of the press in this country."

Representative Henry Hyde, the Illinois Republican who chairs the Judiciary Committee, declared that "The Soldier Of Fortune article contains a lot of nonsense. All any of us want is the truth. And we're getting it."

Good Soldiers Don't Ask Questions

Especially from the Army, right?

"None of us had any reason to doubt the existence of a methamphetamine lab" at Mount Carmel, Maj. Gen. Pickler said, referring to an unsubstantiated allegation by ATF that Koresh was running a meth lab. "We do not question civilian intelligence... We do not routinely question the veracity" of drug allegations by civilians law enforcement agencies — a case nexus required by law to obtain JTF-6 training.

Two of the four Green Beret trainers whom SOF alleges were present at the ATF raid in Waco - Sergeant First Class Chris Dunn and Staff Sergeant Robert Moreland - were at the hearings and denied under oath that they participated in the raid. SOF rechecked with its confidential sources, two of whom were members of the training team and another who witnessed a conversation in which Dunn and Moreland allegedly acknowledged their presence at Mount Carmel by expressing the fear that they had been filmed afterward by a television cameraman. The magazine stands by its allegations that they were there.

The attack on the NRA by Democrats continued throughout the hearings. White House spokesman Michael McCurry said the objectivity of the House subcommittee investigation had been "subverted when a very extreme organization, like the National Rifle Association, comes in and basically hijacks these hearings by paying for investigators, placing them in the center of the fact-finding process."

The hearing co-chairmen, Zeliff and McCollum, denied that the NRA had exerted any undue influence and complained that the Clinton administration had undertaken its own "damage control campaign on Waco."

"It has become apparent after three days of hearings that a massive damage control plan has been put into action by members of the White House staff and senior officials at both the departments of Treasury and Justice," the co-chairmen wrote in a letter to Clinton. "According to The Washington Post, the White House staff has assembled a damage control team and retained the services of Mr. John Podesta, a public relations specialist and former White House official who has represented Handgun Control Inc..."

Prior to the start of the Waco hearings, Treasury Secretary Robert E. Rubin sent a letter to the news media in which he expressed the "fear [that] some may try to use these hearings to serve another agenda: to erode support for federal firearms laws ... by undermining public confidence in the men and women who enforce those laws... This issue is about law and order, and standing with our police and our federal law enforcement officials against those who would take away our right to live in safety."

Damage Control: Some Worked, Some Didn't

Rubin's letter was not the only Clinton administration effort to portray critics of ATF and FBI conduct at Waco in a bad light. U.S. Rep. Bill Brewster, an Oklahoma Democrat, said he "was called by a very high-up official in the administration [who] started asking me not to ask any questions that would make the administration look bad. I couldn't believe it... I told him I would ask my questions as I saw fit." Brewster, who said he was offended by the call, later identified the caller as Treasury Secretary Rubin.

Several newly disclosed documents indicate that the effort to cover up the truth of what happened at Waco began early on. A memo from Under Secretary of Treasury Ron Noble, dated 9 April 1993, advised that "Justice [Department] wants ... to be sure that the Treasury does not interfere... Justice's worry is that any official

government statement which criticizes ATF will be used by the defense in charging that fault lies with the government and not Koresh.

"At this morning's meeting with Justice, we heard that Web Hubbell, Associate Attorney General (designate) [since fired and recently convicted of defrauding clients when in private practice] is so concerned about the potential impact of our review on the criminal case that he planned to raise it directly with the president," Noble's memo said.

In his testimony, Hubbell denied that Clinton was in any way involved in approving the FBI's final solution, the armor and CS gas attack of 19 April. However, telephone logs and confidential sources indicate that Clinton — and First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton — were intimately involved in the decision-making process leading up to approval of the final FBI raid.

Robert M. McNamara, an assistant counsel with the Treasury Department, reiterated these Justice Department concerns in a memo of the same date. "Justice prosecutors in Washington and in Waco said that any words which could be interpreted as being critical of ATF must be avoided, since it would play into the defense attorneys' hands and aid ... the defense attorneys in making ATF the issue."

Three Monkeys: Jencks, Brady, Giglio

In another memo dated 14 April 1993, McNamara again cautioned Treasury officials that their investigation into ATF conduct at the Waco raid should be limited. "DOJ does not want Treasury to conduct any interviews or have discussions with any participants who may be potential witnesses [emphasis included]; the prosecutors do not want us to generate additional Jencks, Brady or Giglio material or oral statements which could be used for impeachment" of government witnesses.

The Jencks reference applies to written statements made or written prior to the Branch Davidian trial of January-February 1994. For instance, ATF special agents Eric Evers, Roland Ballesteros and three others told Texas Rangers in initial statements that ATF agents fired the first shots that pre-

shot rocket launcher truck had been destroyed just outside the complex as well. Throughout the complex, Iraqi gas masks were scattered helter-skelter.

It was clear that Fox Company couldn't stay long in this extremely dangerous area, and it relocated to a safer region several hundred meters deeper into the compound. Soon, EOD units showed up to clear the bunkers. Whether they held chemical munitions is unknown.

This action brought to a successful close the Marines' combat engagement in Kuwait, but the casualties of these battles continue. As we go to press, Iraq has finally disclosed to U.N. inspectors that large quantities of the offensive germ warfare agents clostridium botulinium and bacillus anthracis were produced at its al-Hakam site in 1989 and 1990.

By the time I arrived at the front lines the usual Afghan anarchy was evident. No one had a clear idea of what was going on or who was in charge. Heavy weapons and smallarms fire was thick and fighters were dashing in all directions. Tanks and BMPs clattered across bridges over the Kabul River. Shrapnel whizzed overhead as a salvo of incoming mortar rounds exploded in the maidan (parade ground). RPG rockets detonated 'everywhere.

My taxi driver understandably refused to drive across the Kabul River, and my interpreter, Ismael, and I had to get down to the bunker by the bridge where pro-Rabbani troops were dug-in with a Russian-made 73mm SPG-9 recoilless rifle. At that moment there was a great commotion a couple of klicks north where we saw Baba Jan's tanks cross another bridge and enter Microrayan, followed by heavily armed infantry units of Massoud's zarbati or "shock troops."

In front of us, groups of Sayaf's

Itihad Pushtuns were racing out from their front-line positions in a mosque to our right. Ismael and I dashed forward to join them. "Maranjan has fallen, by the grace of God!" they yelled excitedly.


This lot was a sight. Most wore only leather sandals and some had no footwear at all. Others weren't even armed. All had beards and long locks springing out from under their turbans. Like a gang of pirates out for plunder, they shot forward down the road between the derelict Olympic Stadium and the maidan yelling "Allahu akbar!" --- God is most great.

"Who occupies Maranian now?" I demanded. No one actually knew.

"Can you establish radio contact with Maranjan?" I wondered. They laughed in reply.

It wasn't clear if Maranjan had fallen at all. But our blood was up when we reached a fork in the road. One path led up to Maranjan and the other into the back of Microrayan housing estate. The Itihad lads couldn't make up their minds what to do.

We could see a furious battle in Microrayan. In house-to-house fighting Dostam troops were pushed back,



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
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On the double we took off up the hill. I noticed on top of the archway at the main guardhouse was a large portrait of Dostam. Still intact, it was an indication that we were not far behind the first wave of pro-Rabbani attackers. An hour or so later when we came off Maranjan, this portrait was shot to ribbons, symbolic of the defeat Rabbani's coalition rivals had suffered in east Kabul.

But Maranjan was still under mortar and rocket fire. For cover and the view over the far eastern suburbs still held by Hezb and Dostam forces, Ismael and I made for Nadir Shah's mausoleum. We could see the fighters running through the narrow streets as the hashish-smoking Itihad RPK gunners fired down at them.

We made our way past the "Martyrs Graveyard" for communists who had died in the jihad. Incoming fire blasted some of the graves open, exposing skulls and various bones but there were no fresh bodies to be seen from the battle. That surprised me, but you couldn't ignore the evidence of the struggle.

The bunker complex had been savaged by incoming artillery fire and one Dostam BMP-1 had its turret blown off. An intact T-62 had been captured, as had 60 prisoners and massive stocks of ammunition. Scattered about and ground under by tank treads was all manner of live ammunition that nobody bothered to clean up.

From the top of Maranjan we could actually look down on the Microrayan housing estate and watch the ongoing mopping up operations. Soon after, Baba Jan himself appeared on the hill. He was clean-shaven, wellgroomed, and his boots were polished - a stark contrast to the mujahideen. He asked me incredulously: "What are you doing here?" Other journalists didn't show until much later.

Bloody Retaliation

Baba Jan confidently remarked that the next target for the pro-Rabbani forces would be Hekmatyar's

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
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Charasyab headquarters, some 20 kilometers to the south. This was overly optimistic, for as the euphoria of this victory waned over succeeding days, it was discovered that Hezb had not been pushed completely off Maranjan Hill — the northern tip and a fair slice of the eastern face were still under Hekmatyar's control. A noman's land existed in-between. Hezbi-Islami was particularly incensed at news reports describing the total capture of Maranjan; indeed they continued a stiff resistance and the remainder did not fall for another eight months.

Yet the significance of this Sunday's operation was to break the six-month-long stalemate on the eastern front line, and to break Hekmatyar's deadly grip on Kabul. In the overall two-day operation in which Darulaman Palace, Bala Hissar and Maranjan Hill fell, the victorious forces loyal to President Rabbani claimed to have captured 700 POWs and 20 tanks, as well as inflicting a heavy blow to the morale of their rivals.

Monday morning as I was finishing breakfast, an Su-22 from one of Dostam's northern Afghanistan

airbases unloaded perhaps six bombs on a residential neighborhood, including a direct hit on a crowded pharmacy, killing and wounding 40. It was a charnel-house. Some dismembered corpses carried away in ammunition crates were barely recognizable as human remains.

In the afternoon I was scouting around Bala Hissar rather warily as there was a heavy trade in artillery bombardment. Out of the blue screamed a Dostam jet and in its wake the deadly swish of an opening 250-kilogram cluster bomb. The bomblets carpeted the perimeter defense of Bala Hissar and I beat a hasty retreat.

Counting myself lucky, I returned to the car where I found my driver in mild shock. An incoming 122mm rocket had blasted shrapnel through the car door on the driver's side while he was sheltered nearby in a bunker.

The fight for Kabul was not over.

message was not a Serb trick.

O'Grady answered correctly and Hanford notified his superiors he had made contact with the missing pilot. The information was relayed to an AWACS high above and then to Admiral Leighton Smith in London, who in turn notified Colonel Martin Berndt, commanding officer of the 24th Marine Expeditionary Unit in the Adriatic. When Leighton asked Berndt what he thought, the reply was: "I think we can get him."

Since his rescue, O'Grady has been reluctant to describe the moments leading up to the SAM hit. How high were you flying? "Shouldn't say." Did you see the missile that hit you? "No comment."

But through the eyes of senior Air Force officers at the Pentagon and a battle-tested F-16 squadron commander who not only dodged SAMs in Vietnam, but also SA-6s in Iraq, we have been able to piece together what probably happened on that fateful mission over Bosnia. The officers who provided this likely scenario asked not to be identified.

Wright and O'Grady were most likely cruising along at about 300

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knots when the SAM site acquired them. Deny Flight missions over Bosnia are about two hours in duration. Flying at 300 knots enables aircrews to complete their missions without having to refuel over enemy

But there's a danger of flying that slow. If a SAM is launched against an aircraft, it takes at least 400 knots airspeed to execute a rolling 9-G turn required to defeat the missile. At 300 knots a pilot will only be able to pull three to four Gs, not enough to give an incoming SAM an angle or problem it can't solve.

SA-6s like the one that blew O'Grady out of the sky are difficult to defeat - especially when a pilot is trapped at altitude and has little or no maneuvering room. Both pilots have publicly said they were flying at a "medium altitude" which translates to 10,000 to 25,000 feet.

There was a heavy overcast that made it impossible for them to see the SAM launch. But a veteran F-16 pilot says unclassified information on the shootdown indicates Wright and O'Grady knew the SAM site was looking at them. One of the sources reports O'Grady had an indication of a launch. Even if they couldn't detect the SAM visually, both pilots should have heard a high-pitched squeal in

their headsets warning them to check their RWRs (radar warning receivers) to see from which quadrant the missile was coming.

Sources say one of the mistakes young pilots make is hugging cloud cover during CAP (combat air patrol) missions so they can duck into the clouds and hide if necessary. That is fine if you are dealing with enemy fighters. But flying close to the clouds in missile country makes you easy prey for a SAM. You have no altitude in which to maneuver when the missile comes roaring through the cloud cover. A senior F-16 pilot says the Serbs may have lulled the Americans to sleep by "spoofing them," turning their SAM sites on and off.

Legislative critics want to know why the F-16s went in unescorted by planes that could take out surface-toair missile sites. After O'Grady was shot down, future F-16 flights were escorted into the no-fly zones over Bosnia.

Rep. Jim Saxton, R-N.J., released a report shortly after the shootdown indicating the U.S. military knew as early as 1993 that the region where O'Grady's aircraft was shot down was well-defended by Bosnian-Serb missile batteries. Saxton's report speculates the Serb military placed their main

concentration of air defenses around the Banja Luka air base.

General John Shalikashvili, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said after the 2 June shootdown that the military had no knowledge or suspicion of SAMs in the area. Yet Pentagon spokesman Kenneth Bacon said the military was well aware of the Banja Luka facility where the Serbs service surface-to-air missile systems. However, he said, "The F-16 that Captain O'Grady was flying on June 2 was shot down outside the known threat envelope of the Banja Luka SAMs.'

While the debate continues over whether or not we knew SAMs were in the area, the fact remains that a surface-to-air missile is an awesome weapon. "Pilots get used to AAA. They figure they're invincible," a veteran of the air war against Vietnam and Iraq said. "And you love to see a MiG because you can shoot it down. But there's something about a SAM. It's blood curdling - a machine that's after your life."

We'll probably never know if Scott O'Grady saw the SAM that hit his F-16, or for that matter whether he tried to defeat it. But on the ground he did everything right and survived. And survival is the name of the game. —D.B.C. 突

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

had just started to spread his troops out in order to sweep through the final few meters of bush when a denim-clad figure jumped up to his front and started running like hell away from the line of troopers. It caught us all by surprise, and the terr was probably 25 feet away before the first trooper reacted with a double tap from his FN. He missed.

The rest of Norris' sweepline opened up with two MAGs and the five other FNs, and Prinsloo's stick on my left also cut loose. It was amazing, but the galloping terr was rapidly increasing his distance, apparently untouched by the hail of bullets following him. When he was about 50 meters away, the twin Brownings from the overhead chopper also joined in, creating geysers of dust that obscured our vision.

"Stop One, this is K-Car. You've got a gook running right toward your position. He's in blue and gapping like hell so stand by for him!" shouted the OC over the radio.

Norris had moved his seven men up to the edge of the heavy bush near the kraal, and they stood staring toward the direction in which the gook had run. Still mindful of the uncleared mud huts in the village, I stood and walked over to join their group while George McDermott covered my rear with his gun.

"Nice going, guys," I said to the disgruntled looking bunch of camouflaged bush troops. "They teach you how to shoot like that in Training Troop?" It was one of those things which happened on occasion, when fate smiled on the terrorists. At any rate, the odds were that Stop One, located to the north and directly in line with the gook's escape route, would bag him in short order.

Weapons Cache

We took it slow and easy as there were only eight living quarters to clear and three storage bins that could possibly hide a person. During his search of the second hut, Corporal Norris sent word over for me to join him.

"Hey, Colour," he said, standing inside the dim, smoke-filled hut. "Have a look at this." He pointed to

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an area covered by a large grass mat and I lifted a corner with the toe of my boot. Two dozen Chinese stick grenades lay in neat rows in a sixinch depression. A more detailed search revealed about a thousand 7.62x39mm rounds hidden in the thatched roof and in various containers scattered around the hootch. The troopies searching through the storage bins also began to turn up communist ammunition in bandoleers.

This is what I called actively aiding the terrs. The Selous Scout OP had only been in the area for a few days and hadn't seen any other terrorist movement, but their intelligence had indicated this area was indeed a link in the terrorist supply chain from Mozambique. My thoughts turned to the gook who had sprinted away from the sweepline and I hoped Stop One had been able to take him as a prisoner. He could explain a lot about what was happening in this particular kraal.

"Stop One, this is Banana One. How do you read?" I radioed to Cpl. Hugh McCall, the stick commander. "I know why you're calling, Colour," he answered back. "Wherever that gook went it sure wasn't by us... How the hell did you guys miss with all that racket you were making?"

Trevor Norris, now standing next to me, picked up the conversation. "Hey, McCall," he radioed back. "We were giving you a chance to get in the war and you blew it. Stay awake out there next time, OK?" Trevor's wide grin belied the seriousness of his voice, and I knew McCall would be sending him a long-distance flip off.

Norris and Prinsloo quickly sorted out the area, ensuring that all the bodies were well away from the kraal line before we torched the buildings. When the area had been cleared and our troops moved well away, Norris and I began lighting the thatched roofs with our cigarette lighters. As I torched the first hut, I was overcome with a damned unpleasant sense of deja vu. I had done this sort of thing in Vietnam; didn't like it then, and enjoyed it even less now. Maybe I was getting soft in my old age, or perhaps I was just starting to see things in a different perspective.

With the African kraal burning fiercely behind us, I spread the 16man sweepline out into an extended

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line formation facing northwest and toward the area where the terrs had fled. There were still a probable 10 terrs located somewhere between my sweepline and the four stop groups positioned about 500 meters to our front

As we cautiously approached the first green mass of tangled foliage, I instructed Hardesty, my interpreter, to call for the terrs to surrender. The gooks hadn't a chance in hell of getting away, and intelligence from a live terr captive was much more productive than another dead body. It certainly made our job on fire force much less nerve wracking when they gave up without a fight.

There was no response, verbal or otherwise, to Hardesty's command, and it now became a matter of clearing by fire. I had the four MAG gunners in the sweepline lay down a few bursts of converging fire into the thick bush to our front. Again, there was no indication of a terrorist presence, and no movement at all except for the settling dust and falling leaves churned up by the machine gun fire.

The sweep slowly moved forward,

every man tense and ready to cut loose. The morning Rhodesian sun was already starting to cook us in our camouflaged jump suits and black face cream, but the sweat dripping from our bodies wasn't caused only by heat: We knew there might be a gook with suicidal tendencies waiting 15 feet away, ready to take a few of us with him before the rest of the sweepline fired him up.


Booby Traps And Body Count

Trooper McClellan on the extreme left of the sweep was the first to see a booted foot sticking out from behind the bush, and he immediately let fly a quick four rounds from his FN. The rest of us joined in, and the blast from 16 weapons was deafening even in the open veldt. The echoes of gunfire died and we continued our slow walk up to the terr's position. Whether the initial bursts of MAG fire had killed him prior to our last deluge wasn't certain, but the terr was certainly dead. Dressed in olive green pants with a Portuguese camouflage jacket, he was riddled with at least 15 bullet holes. Overkill or not, the gook never had a chance to fire his SKS.

Unless you actually saw a terrorist fall when you shot him, searching the remains became quite a risky business. Norris slowly unraveled the long parachute cord he had attached to the terrorist's body, and was working his way up to join us. The rest of his stick was now under cover, having taken the gook's weapon and other visible equipment along with them, and in a moment Trevor was ready to pull the body over. Cautiously taking up the slack, he and his gunner increased their pull as the body began to move. Grunting with exertion against the weight of the body, the two had the terr half turned over when the loud POP of a grenade detonating cap sent us digging into the dirt for cover.

Shouts of "Grenade!" from along the line were instantly drowned out by the ripping explosion from under the terr's already lifeless body. The gook's half turned position shielded us from the brunt of the blast. There was no need for a further look at the inert form lying 20 feet away, any kit or equipment he might have had on him would now be useless.

I passed the word to take a quick



smoke break. Gratefully, the sweepline slumped to the ground and unhooked their webbing, and I noticed with satisfaction that every third man turned to face the direction we had approached from; a precaution in case we had missed a hidden terr along the way.

It had been a busy day so far. We had killed a total of five terrs - two by Stop Two early in the contact and three from our sweepline - and had recovered or destroyed a fair amount of their kit. That left another possible 10 terrs still lurking, including the galloping gook who had evaded not only our sweep but Stop One also. But, this group would no doubt go on the terrorist inactive role for some time after their encounter with our fire force.

The Selous Scout observation post would remain in the area to monitor the situation, though by now the terrs were probably halfway back to Mozambique and still running.

As we were leaving I noticed the boat was so heavily loaded now that we were having problems getting under way. Just as we seemed to be picking up some speed Doc Barnes saw a man stand upon the shore and fire a B-40 rocket right at us. Doc was just yelling a warning when the round struck us in the flank. We came to an immediate stop, dead in the water, a sitting duck for the second rocket, which was already on its way. I watched it strike the river's surface, ricocheting off the water and heading into the jungle rather than our crippled vessel. When it exploded, the shrapnel came back at us, zipping and cutting through the air with deadly intent.

I was at the bow, watching the port side as security when all this took place. The first blast lifted me off the deck, blowing my weapon clean away. There went my precious Stoner into the river. I was heading that way myself, but a radio cable wrapped itself around my throat as I flew past it, keeping me out of the

water but not doing anything for my attitude. Shock was setting in from the unexpected attack, the fury of the blast that had nearly killed me, and from nearly strangling to death while flopping around the deck like a hooked fish. Clawing my way to a more secure position on the boat I looked at the horror the B-40 attack had brought us.

Thick, acrid, clinging smoke filled the boat's guts. The driver was peppered with bits of B-40 steel, his torso and crotch bleeding profusely. Bodies were strewn all over the back deck, so many packed so tightly together you'd step on someone no matter how careful you tried to be. Then I saw McCarthy. His entire right cheek had been blown off his butt, and what was left was actually cooking! He was conscious, and that blew me away as I looked into his pain-filled eyes. Ed Jones managed to grab the big .50 and began emptying its lethal load into the VC position. They actually ran! It was their worst mistake, because we would have been history had they stayed and kept up their fire. The ambush had been a good one; they just didn't follow through

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as a well-trained force would have.

As the coxswain got the vessel moving again I yelled over at McCarthy, trying to beat the growing sound of the straining engines as they picked up speed. "Mac, can you hear me?" I asked the wounded SEAL.

"Yeah," he slurred back groggily, "what happened?"

"All your grenades exploded, and you don't have an ass anymore," I explained to him as I crawled over to where he lay. "Hold still," I begged him. "Let me get the rest of your equipment off."

"OK, Mike," he whispered back. "Just don't throw what's left of my butt away!"

Mac's grenades had been detonated in low order, meaning an incomplete detonation took place due to the B-40 rocket, which sympathetically set off the man's explosives when it struck and exploded near him. All the smoke grenades had gone off, filling the boat with their colored vapors. As we raced downriver toward safety, the smoke cleared and I could see the extent of the damage. Missing legs greeted me. Our Vietnamese interpreter had lost his legs, and I began looking for the Chieu Hoi. The rocket had struck the boat precisely where he'd been standing. Its shrapnel had gone through him and into the back of my head and neck. He'd taken the brunt of the explosion, lucky for me.

Death To Traitors

I found him lying against the inside wall of the boat. I picked him up, looking directly into his face. As he lay there dying, his eyes opened and he gave me a smile. He'd known about the ambush, and he'd led us into it with the knowledge he might have to be sacrificed. Pulling my Gerber fighting knife from its sheath, I buried it deep in the hollow between his throat and his shoulder. He'd die, all right, by my hand, for what had just occurred. Dropping the dead traitor back to the bloodstained deck I began tending to Mac. The boat was roaring along at full speed, and I was slipping into secondary shock. It was also my job to act as a backup corpsman but my world was swimming so badly that when I tried to inject morphine into Mac, I hit myself in the hand before realizing it. Ed Jones worked his way over to me and took care of Mac's pain with a quick shot even as I passed out next to my two teammates.

The coxswain radioed our condition and situation to our sister squad, which was waiting for us on the pier. I awoke before we landed, and still remember vividly the looks on their faces. Mac was first off, then everyone who was missing a limb. Walking wounded like me came last. I wanted a cup of coffee, for some odd reason. The platoon's leading petty officer was Lou DiCroce. Lou found me some coffee and then began doing what he could for the others. Army medics began tagging us, and it took two helos to get us all to the hospital. DiCroce came up to see me off, dinging me with the usual SEAL humor about getting wounded and having to leave the party. I remember pointing at him and jokingly saying, "You're next, Lou." Four days later the boat he and Mike Collins were riding in was hit with rifle and grenade fire. Collins was killed, and Lou hit seriously in the head. He survived and is disabled today, but he's still got that sense of humor about him.

These two events brought an end to X-Ray platoon, perhaps the most hard-luck platoon to have served in the war.

On the flight to the hospital I began looking at the wounded men around me. Even though I was hurting, I'd been lucky. In my mind I began turning over the events that had brought us here. Were I one of the seriously wounded or maimed, my career would be over now. What skills did I have to survive back in the world? Sure, I had some photography background, but what good would that really do me? I took another look around. These guys were missing legs and other parts of their bodies. They were staring off into space, pondering — as was I — their fate. No one was talking; no one wanted to.

The future became more focused for me. The operation had been badly considered and flawed in its execution. During its entire duration up until we were ambushed, I'd been chomping at the bit to correct all the little things I noticed being done wrong. Good men, yes. Good leaders, sure. But this didn't translate as a good operation if everyone wasn't working together as a team. I decided

then and there I wanted more control over my fate and the fate of my men. Yes, my men. No more victims, no more being a victim myself. Even as my head was throbbing and the back of my neck was driving me nuts, even with the now-dried blood of both Mac and the dead Chieu Hoi encrusted on my hands, I knew what had to be done.

I was going to become a commissioned officer, no matter what it took.

SOG hadn't. Intelligence sources identified a suspected North Vietnamese headquarters and prison camp near the communist-held Cambodian border town of Kratie. Colonel Roger Pezzelle, who now commanded Op 35, wanted to launch a reconnaissance mission but lacked suitable longrange helicopters, and tight restrictions prohibited American troops from entering Cambodia. Launching a HALO mission solved the first problem, and forming a team consisting of one South Vietnamese and three Montagnards solved the second.

After midnight on 9 October, the four indigenous commandos boarded a C-130E. As during the previous freefall mission, the crew mimicked the flight path and schedule of a routine supply shuttle. With Pezzelle aboard as an observer, the team jumped from 10,000 feet.

Maintaining a tight assembly, the parachutists steered toward their drop

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(1-900-288-8729) Beacon Telesystems 914-423-7515 zone. Seconds before landing, however, a figure entered the clearing to relieve himself. Startled by the silent jumpers falling from the sky, the man shouted for help. Enemy soldiers immediately converged on the site and the team darted for the darkened brush. Though separated into three groups and on the run for a day, all four commandos were successfully extracted.

Not to be outdone, SOG's Command and Control Central (CCC) was preparing a HALO of its own. Far more ambitious than any of the previous missions, CCC planned a jump of 10 men: five Americans and five South Vietnamese. Forming the core was RT Washington, a mixed Montagnard team re-formed after being annihilated in December 1970. From Washington came Staff Sergeants Robert McNier and Howard Sugar, plus three Sedang Montagnards, one Bnar and one Jarai. Joining them were three more Americans from the CCC recon company: Richard Gross, Charles Behler and Mark Gentry.

Taken to Long Thanh for two weeks of training, the augmented

team began parachuting from helicopters and fixed-wing aircraft. Two dozen practice jumps later, they were able to exit a C-130 at 25,000 feet with 110 pounds of equipment and land within 50 meters of each other.

With the team mission-ready by early October 1971, CCC had to generate a target. Given the hazards CCN had encountered jumping into jungle canopy, CCC dictated its drop zone would be flat and open. Looking at the map for enemy-infested areas that fit the description, planners decided on the Ia Drang Valley. The mission itself, apart from further testing the HALO concept, was a general area reconnaissance.

After two weather aborts, the team boarded a C-130E on 11 October. As the aircraft lowered its tail ramp at 13,500 feet, the 10 men continued to breathe off oxygen consoles until one minute before jump time. At the command of the jumpmaster, they shuffled to the end of the ramp and stepped into space. All members wore a Norden light to aid in midair assembly. But Murphy's Law still intervened: As Mark Gentry left the plane his rucksack ripped loose, causing him to spin away from the rest of the team.

By the time the 10 jumpers touched ground, they were divided into three groups. The largest, consisting of McNier, Behler and three Montagnards, assembled in an open area. Sugar, Gross and two Montagnards gathered in a second field.

Alone, Gentry managed to land in a tree. His survival radio was preprogrammed to the frequency of beacons carried by Behler and Gross, but neither appeared to be working. He had better luck raising an orbiting FAC, but the plane was not carrying a night-vision device and could not identify Gentry's position. Worse, Gentry could hear Vietnamese voices from the jungle around him. Holding up in the bush until morning, he managed to again contact the FAC.

"The Covey finally got a fix on me and told me to move northeast to link up with Behler and McNier," Gentry recalled. "I came across their chutes and gear along the way. Continuing northeast I arrived at a river and could hear voices. I thought it might be some of the [Montagnards]

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from our team, but it turned out they were local communist troops. They saw me and started yelling."

As Gentry took to the jungle, the enemy followed close behind. Seeking refuge near a stream, they traded shots while Gentry tried to raise the FAC. When one finally answered, he called for tactical air strikes — only to be told that the coordinates were too close to Sugar and Gross.

Gentry again took to the bush. Coming to an open meadow, he dashed to the shelter of a bomb crater and relayed an emergency extraction request. Four enemy soldiers approached but, unable to cross the exposed terrain, settled for taking potshots. Gentry fired off the last of his ammunition and was picked up at 1000 hours without further incident. The same chopper also retrieved Sugar, Gross and two of the Montagnards; the rest of the team was recovered that afternoon.

The CCC operation came to a close and with it SOG's flirtation with HALOs. Concluding that "as an alternative method of insertion, parachute insertions have created a new threat that enemy [lines of communication] security forces must be prepared to counter," SOG headquarters shifted emphasis toward static line jumps from low altitudes. Further airborne operations all but ceased when SOG was deactivated on 31 March 1972. Left with a fraction of the logistical support once available to SOG, South Vietnam's Liaison Service had few means to carry on the more exotic infiltration techniques developed by its U.S. counterparts.



that woman lay for days, dead, while the FBI called in saying, "We had pancakes for breakfast, Mrs. Weaver, what did you have?" These people need to be subpoenaed in the full light of publicity, on C-Span, and tell their story to the American people. The American people are going to be horrified at what is being done by the BATF. There's all kinds of stuff like that that's got to come to the attention of the American people. And I think the disgust and the revulsion of the American people for these people will see to it that they are never involved in law enforcement again.

RKB: Those are just the recent cases.

GL: I can remember when I first joined the Treasury as an official in 1969, one of the first things we had to deal with was an atrocity by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, involving a man named Kenyon Ballew. That chap was a black powder firearms enthusiast. That's all he had, all he was interested in. BATF went spying on him and looked inside his house through a window or something and saw he had some old World War II hand-grenade casings. These were being sold widely throughout the country as paperweights at the time.

They said to themselves, "Well, we




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
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know he's a black powder enthusiast. he must have black powder in there." They theorized he could pour black powder in these casings and reactivate the hand grenades. These would then become destructive devices.

And so they got a search warrant and raided Kenyon Ballew's house. Well, he had several doorways on the ground floor. One of them he didn't use and had furniture up against it. The BATF didn't know that.

When they raided the house. Ballew was upstairs in his bathtub. They came smashing with a ram downstairs through that wrong door. Of course, they couldn't get through it right away and I guess they thought he was putting up resistance. At any rate, he hears all this ruckus, doesn't know what it is, gets out of the tub buck-ass naked, and grabs the only weapon he has: a black powder revolver.

By this time they're in the house. He runs downstairs to see what's going on, has the revolver in his hand with the muzzle pointed at the floor. and they shoot him down! This has been going on, as I say, for decades.

RKB: Gordon, some people have suggested that we may not get what we want out of the Waco hearings. There is a burden of truth in a trial that would not apply to a hearing. What concerns me is the method of interrogation. Having watched the POW/MIA hearings, we know that the questions are prepared by the staff. They may be good questions but then because the senator in this particular case does not have the frame of reference the staffers have, we simply don't get the proper follow up questions.

GL: Bob, one of the ways we're going to know whether we're getting real hearings or whether we're just getting lip service is whether we have top flight staff lawyers doing most of the questioning.

RKB: Is this going to be a problem? You have a better feel for this here in Washington than I do.

GL: There's almost a consensus here that what we're going to see is something designed to satisfy the uninitiated — we've had hearings and all is fine. You know, we'll make a few changes here and there and everything will be hunky dory again. That's what we're all worried about.

RKB: What we are hoping, Gor-

don, is that these hearings will be the first step in holding these people accountable.

GL: Well, I would be delighted if that were true. I hope that you're right.

RKB: Gordon, that pretty much wraps it up. Any closing remarks?

GL: No, just don't worry about the fact that the president, the lefties and the press are yelling at Gordon Liddy. They've been yelling at Gordon Liddy for almost a quarter of a century now. Gordon Liddy's doing fine and let me put it this way: Right after election day in 1996, I will still be a radio talk show host and I predict Bill Clinton will be one other unemployed Arkansas politician — if he's lucky! Because if he's unlucky. he's going to jail.


when young, how to use them."

The 1939 Supreme Court case *U.S.* vs. Miller echoed our Founding Fathers' intent: "The signification attributed to the term militia appears from the debates in the convention. the history and legislation of colonies and states, and the writings of approved commentators. These show plainly enough that the militia comprised all males physically capable of acting in concert for the common defense... And further, that ordinarily when called for service these men were expected to appear bearing arms supplied by themselves and of the kind in common use at the time."

And so, the militia rifles banned by Clinton's Crime bill, as well as short-barreled shotguns so useful in trench warfare and home defense banned by the National Firearms Act of 1934, are the arms most protected by the Second Amendment. Study the Uniform Militia Act of 1792. It is a mandate that citizens keep the best military-type weapons they can afford, ready to defend freedom on short notice.

Another Supreme Court case, Presser vs. Illinois, recognized the





arms-bearing population as the militia: "... all citizens capable of bearing arms constitute the reserve militia... The States cannot, even laying [the Second Amendment] out of view, prohibit the people from keeping and bearing arms, so as to deprive the United States of their rightful resource for maintaining the public security..."

The Right To Revolution

Put bluntly, the right to defend against tyranny is the right to revolution. Cowards will cringe at that thought, as do the quislings trying to destroy that right. Revolution is always a miserable prospect; it was just as difficult for the patriots to leave their jobs and families as it would be for us to leave ours.

But their sacrifice brought a new dawn of freedom to their families. If we are men, we too must be prepared to make that sacrifice. Being prepared for revolution is the best deterrent against it. Allowing ourselves to be disarmed is the surest way to make revolution unavoidable.

Patrick Henry agreed: "Guard with jealous attention the public liberty. Suspect everyone who approaches that jewel. Unfortunately, nothing will preserve it but downright force. Whenever you give up that force, you are ruined... The great object is that every man be armed... Everyone who is able may have a gun."

"They that can give up essential liberty to gain a little temporary safety deserve neither liberty nor safety," Benjamin Franklin replied.

Two other patriots concurred. Alexander Hamilton: "If the representatives of the people betray their constituents, there is then no recourse left but in the exertion of that original right of self-defense which is paramount to all positive forms of government..."

And Thomas Jefferson: "what country can preserve its liberties, if its rulers are not warned ... that this people preserve the spirit of resistance? Let them take arms... The tree of Liberty must be refreshed from time to time, with the blood of patriots and tyrants."

This is just a sampling of the ammunition you might use to understand and defend the Second Amendment. Next time you hear Bill Clinton say it doesn't harm the Constitution to



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ban assault rifles because they're useless for hunting, you'll not only know what he's full of, you'll be able to prove it.

cept the Knight suppressor. This suppressor weighs only 1 pound, a one-third reduction in weight over the 1.5-pound Phase I H&K sound suppressor. Made from stainless steel, the suppressor is 7.56 inches (192 mm) in overall length with an outside diameter of 1.38 inches (35 mm).

An interesting feature of this sound suppressor is its ability to be loosened and then indexed to 10 different positions. This permits the operator to move the shot group obtained with the suppressor in

place to within 2 inches of the unsuppressed shot group.

If all of the above is approved for production, the Phase III contract is to be awarded sometime in 1995. Max potential value for production quantities of 7,500 pistols and 1,950 sound suppressors is estimated at \$15.8 million.

Personally, I feel certain that Heckler & Koch will be granted the Phase III contract. Both their pistol and Knight's suppressor are outstanding designs.

As we go to press, Heckler & Koch anounced it was awarded the \$4.5 million Phase III contract for an initial production order of 1,950 .45 caliber pistols and 10,140 magazines. The pistol has been officially classified as the MK23 MOD 0, USSOCOM Pistol, Semi-Automatic. Cal .45. Under the terms of the Phase III order, first production pistols and magazines are to be delivered to the Navy on 1 May 1996. A maximum of 7,500 pistols, 52,500 magazines and 1,950 suppressors may be procured, with a full potential contract value of \$12.1 million. 🟋

that surround the palace. There were numerous fires that altered the landscape, and some 24 deaths were attributed to the fire-bombing, according to our internal Haitian sources.

Dresses For Puerto Rico

Continuing on a northerly direction after completion of the last bombing run, we still had 22 of the giant Molotov cocktails on board, so we continued to pull the flares and push them out on targets of opportunity that we passed on the way to take a look-see at Cap-Haïtien. Well before our expected arrival in the Cap-Haïtien area we had expended our load of destruction, so we continued on a more northwesterly heading and could see in the distance that trucks and other obstacles had been placed on the runway at Cap-Haïtien to thwart a possible air mobile landing.

Everyone on the aircraft was coming down from an adrenaline high and no one was aware of how the

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
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aircraft was holding up. Later we found that we had been hit approximately 32 times including a round that hit and exploded in the battery well of the port inboard engine, creating a ragged hole almost 10 inches across. Some of the hits had destroyed portions of our radio-navigation equipment and Carlin was flying mostly by dead-reckoning.

Soon we were flying through a large rain squall and saw no possible places to put the plane down. We were informed from the cockpit to prepare for a sea landing, which we did. We were very low when we finally broke through the squall line, and there before our eyes was this big, beautiful runway. All the while an insistent voice called and informed us that we could not land there unless we were declaring an emergency. Even if that had been our intention, we could not radio an emergency because our bullet-riddled radio was receiving but not transmitting.

We made a smooth landing and taxied up to an apron area and stopped engines. Almost immediately we were met by a U.S. Air Force major, and several other USAF personnel.

We deplaned and were standing under and around the aircraft checking the battle damage we had sustained.

Carlin and Davis were in conversation with the major and after a few minutes, Carlin came over and told us straight-faced that he had told the major we were delivering a load of dresses to Puerto Rico and had gotten lost. He said the major did not comment on this assertion, but apparently he was not blind to the clearly visible battle damage. Unbeknownst to us, there had been an alert in the Bahamas area that a civilian aircraft thought to be a "Super Connie" with red identification lettering had bombed Port-au-Prince earlier that morning.


Where we had landed was the USAF installation at Freeport, Bahamas, and the good major did not want us on his base. He even offered to drain the fuel from some small piston-engine aircraft to get us enough fuel to take off and get away from his base. But alas that was not to be. We only had enough fuel on board for five minutes flying and the additional fuel would not have gotten us much farther.

We started walking into the local town but didn't get far before being met by some of the island police. They welcomed us and invited us to share their hospitality but informed us that we could not stray from the immediate confines of the police area. Our situation was obviously the subject of official discussion, as within a day or so we were escorted to the airport and put on an Eastern Airlines flight non-stop to Miami. Arriving in Miami we were met by members of the U.S. Customs Service, who informed us individually and collectively that we were being held on suspicion of violation of U.S. neutrality laws.

During questioning by Customs, I took the opportunity to palm a little Minolta camera and expose the film I had taken of the bombing runs. When the agent saw what happened, he grabbed the camera and said, "That wasn't very smart." I suppose it depends from what perspective you view the events.

After our days in court and the ensuing appeals process, we reported to the minimum security slam at Elgin Air Force Base around the middle of

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1971. Bill Dempsey was deported to Canada, which has no neutrality laws, so he was literally home free. The rest of us were cut loose after time served and 75 days. I still have no idea who or what was responsible for the sentence reduction.

And Papa Doc? He eventually died of terminal meanness. And in Haiti, the more things "change," the more they stay the same.

highway and took about 15 seconds to cross. The pucker factor was red-lined, but we never heard a shot. Once we were back over the trees we breathed a bit easier.

Looking ahead through the smoke and haze we could see the fire bellowing from Sandy's wreckage. I turned a few degrees left, figuring the plane probably flew on for a few seconds after the pilot ejected.

About that time Sandy called on his survival radio that he could hear us and we were headed straight for him. I spotted his orange parachute and noted with some dismay that he was hanging about 50 feet up in a tree.

I settled into a low hover for a hoist pickup using the jungle penetrator. Jim operated the hoist, B.J. had his UZI on his lap watching out the left side and I maintained the hover. That UZI was our entire arsenal and wouldn't do much good against a squad of pissed off NVA.


The pilot looked up at us with a big grin as Jim worked the hoist to lower the penetrator. It was a bit early for celebration — our hoist had only one speed: slow. We expected the bad guys to come running out of the jungle with guns blazing at any time.

Jim came up on the intercom and advised me that our grinning pilot couldn't reach the penetrator. Jim was trying to swing it to him but because of the dense foliage it just wasn't happening. About that time we heard the first round explode above us. I'm not sure if Charlie was shooting at us or our cover, but it was all the incentive we needed. We retrieved the hoist and the pilot rappelled to the ground, unhooked his survival pack and moved to an open area.

We moved over him again and lowered the penetrator. He hooked up and we began extraction just as a second explosion went off overhead. To add to our concerns, our 30-minute low fuel light had been on for approximately 20 minutes. We finally got the pilot into the aircraft and figured that we'd been hovering there for 34 minutes. Luck was with us: We hadn't ran out of fuel and the bad guys hadn't hit us.

It was time to head out. King advised us not to recross that area but we were too low on fuel to play it safe. If we were going to run out of gas, the west side of the road was our best option.

I radioed for a drum of fuel ASAP and crossed Route 23 without incident to rendezvous with

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the other chopper. We hand-pumped 55 gallons of gas into what must have been an empty tank.

While refueling we all felt pretty good about saving at least one downed pilot and still being alive. Being the nice guy I am, I decided to have a little fun with him. There was a rumor going around the Air Force that Air America crews received a \$10,000 bonus whenever they recovered a downed airman. Of course, it was just a rumor.

I told the pilot we wouldn't be taking him directly back to his base but would be going on to Pakse. At that point anything I said would have been fine with him. I explained that he was worth \$10,000 to me and my crew so we wanted to make sure we turned him over to the right person to get credit for the bonus. He bought it all, hook, line and sinker.

The OV-10 crew was successfully picked up a day or two later. After landing, the author was summoned to the briefing room. In next month's issue see how Van Etten spent the afternoon of 18 March 1972. 🔀

transfer of ATF aircraft between dummy corporations went in an ultimate circle, with several officials denying any knowledge of the transactions.

At least two of the ATF's OV-10 Broncos were painted in July at Business Jet Designs Inc., in Shawnee, Oklahoma. According to various sources, including two pilots who photographed the aircraft and inspected them inside and out, the airplanes are being painted dark blue with red and white trim. The Times quoted Michael Pruitt, a company foreman, as confirming that the OV-10s, each registered to American Warbirds Inc., belong to ATF. Pruitt reportedly said one more Bronco "was on the way." The company expected to paint at least 12 of the OV-10s, the newspaper reported, at a cost of about \$20,000 each.

Which raises a question. If ATF is paying \$240,000 for new Bronco paint jobs, how is it going to change




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the registration without paying for yet another round of paint jobs. Many of the current wing numbers are known— a few of them published in last month's SOF, others published in recent books on the OV-10. Will the ATF pay for more paint jobs? Or better yet, why not just leave them as they are, save the money and register them to the ATF?

Spokesman Killorin did not have any answers. Nor will ATF discuss the still unsolved embezzlement of \$1.5 million from its aviation operation — more than a third the aviation division's budget for a five-year period. A suspect in the alleged embezzlement — former ATF Special Agent William Marshall Reece — was publicly identified more than a year ago. He had retired with full pay and benefits only a few months earlier, in October 1993.

"Reece is the subject of a criminal investigation into one of the largest internal thefts in ATF history," *The Washington Post* reported in its edition of 9 July 1994. The case "highlights a weak system of accounting controls that the agency has been attempting to overhaul."

Reece, who is suspect in the falsification of expense vouchers for aviation services that allegedly were never performed, has vigorously avoided interviews. He reportedly owns and operates a charter fishing business near Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, and spends leisure time at the secluded home of a female friend near Calabash, North Carolina. When a local television reporter from Washington, D.C., surprised Reece with a camera crew at the woman's home, he bolted for a pickup truck and roared off in a cloud of dust.

A Treasury Department audit sent to ATF Director Magaw "found no evidence of fraud," but acknowledged that accounting procedures are "susceptible to fraud, waste and abuse." Magaw has declined to discuss the case, except to say that unspecified corrective measures in accounting procedures have been implemented. The problem arose when the chief and deputy chief of ATF's special operations division, which also oversees the Gaithersburg operation, allowed Reece full control of his departmental budget, without any oversight.

Treasury investigators who asked

for flight logs and aviation reports were delayed by Reece while he reportedly "had to re-create documents or obtain them from other ATF offices," the audit report states. In addition, the report documents the payments of thousands of dollars for services, although the hours charged on invoices were "not verified to any supporting documents."

The ATF's failure to resolve the case or punish anyone for the alleged theft, plus its apparent eagerness to hide the activities of its aviation program, raises serious questions about the bureau's lack of accountability for personal misconduct and financial mismanagement. It is an overall lack of accountability that dogs the bureau's reputation on many fronts. The ATF's inability to maintain rudimentary security for basic day-to-day operations, or to ensure the safety of its own street agents, may be due in part to management's preoccupation with the secrecy, behind which are cloaked the ongoing crimes and incompetency inside America's most troubled and out-of-control law enforcement agency.

cipitated a gun fight at Mount Carmel. All agents subsequently retracted those statements, but defense attorneys were able to obtain copies of the Ranger statements under the Jencks ruling. The Brady rule requires that prosecutors turn over to defense attorneys any and all evidence that suggests innocence on the part of a defendant, is of an exculpatory nature, or impeaches government conduct. The Giglio rule requires the disclosure of plea bargains and other pre-trial deals.

"DOJ does not want us to make any findings or draw any conclusions from what we review; the prosecutors are concerned that anything, even preliminary, could be grist for the defense mill," McNamara's 14 April memo to Noble states. "DOJ does not want us to generate gratuitous expert witness' materials; the pros-

ecutors are concerned that these people ... could play into defense hands (e.g. Weaver)." The last is a reference to the Randy Weaver trial, in which the FBI and Justice Department were fined \$10,000 for concealing evidence and staging photographs.

Noble denied in sworn testimony that he had any contact with ATF agents in Waco on the day of the raid. In his own testimony, former Assistant ATF Director Dan Hartnett accused Noble of obstructing justice by inserting after the fact the issue of the element of surprise. Hartnett's testimony attacked the veracity of the Treasury Department report on Waco, claiming that he and ATF special agents Phil Chojnacki and Chuck Sarabyn were scapegoated.

This issue attained prominence when Chojnacki and Sarabyn, who had been fired from ATF, were rehired in a secret deal that included back pay and their attorneys' fees.

"That report was filled with distortions, omissions, and in some cases things that were simply untrue," Hartnett said. "I believe it was for political reasons. The politics of the situation became more important than

the people involved."

With Noble, former ATF Director Steve Higgins and former Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen on one end of the witness table, and Chojnacki, Sarabyn and Hartnett on the other, each side accused the other of lying. Somebody obviously was. No one was charged with perjury.

Chojnacki, in an interview with Treasury investigators on 17 November 1993, "was asked about any calls that he made to headquarters after it was decided to proceed with the raid. Chojnacki stated that he made no such call. When shown the log indicating that he had made a call to headquarters, Chojnacki stated that if the log indicated that he made a call, he must have, but he does not remember," Robert L. Cockrell noted in a Treasury Department investigative memo.


Rumors indicate that Chojnacki and Sarabyn got their jobs back only by agreeing to keep quiet about the complicity of superiors in ATF and Treasury in approving the raid, even after it was known that the element of surprise had been lost.

Finally, in a memo to Bentsen four days before the final raid and deadly

fire, former Assistant Treasury Secretary Robert Altman [who resigned under pressure a year ago, accused of misleading Congress during testimony about the Whitewater affair] advised that "Ron Noble informed me that the attorney general is weighing a request from the FBI to use an advanced form of tear gas on the compound in Waco... The FBI apparently has concluded that the outlook for a negotiated end to the stand-off is poor. They don't believe it is worth waiting. If the attorney general approves the request, the gas would be used and, hopefully, the Davidians would be forced to leave the compound. The gas would not be followed by an assault.

"My rough guess," Altman's memo concludes, "is that she won't approve the FBI's request. The risks of a tragedy are there. And, if the FBI waits indefinitely, Mr. Koresh eventually will concede."
