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

Trigger-Happy PR

OF operatives in the nation's capital report one of the most appalling political blunders seen in recent history. And your gun rights are in the middle of it.

One Richard Feldman — a former state and local lobbyist for the National Rifle Association, who now purports to "represent the firearms industry" through a group called the American Shooting Sports Council —

floundered frenetically around Washington during the week of 6 Oct. His frenzy culminated in his illadvised appearance at the White House on 9 Oct.

Reliable Hill sources have confirmed that Feldman first attempted to persuade Republican leadership to celebrate his announcement, despite his

having been part of a group lobbying against the Clinton trigger-lock mandate.

He pitched them hard with the promise of a big media event. He was looking to get "good PR" for a handful of companies that had decided to force their consumers to accept — and pay for — "child safety locking devices" with every new handgun. Most gun owners will remember these devices as trigger locks, which is what everyone called them before they were exalted on the White House altar of spin.

Feldman regurgitated a load of PR 101 nonsense that his clueless consultants had provided. He told the Republicans he was trying to "pre-empt" another Clinton announcement on the topic.

In fact, these well-placed sources now suspect Feldman was coordinating with the White House the whole time. They tell of countless other outright deceptions committed by Feldman during the episode, so coordination seems likely.

There is no question he ran to the enemy. The only question is when? Republican leaders and gun-rights groups were aghast to see Feldman appear at the White House podium in a hastily arranged Rose Garden ceremony at 1030 hours on 9 Oct. The standard backdrop of "bleacher cops" was arranged, and Clinton patted Feldman on the back for voluntarily accepting the very mandate he couldn't get through congress.

This maneuver has wrought disastrous

consequences in Republican circles, whose leaders rightly feel double-crossed for working hard to derail the Clinton mandate and then having it shoved down their political throats by Feldman and the White House. But Slick Willie was more than happy to take credit for another "victory for the children."

And now, the most recent developments on the gun issue have seen the White House handing out favors and special treatment to a few of the companies that participated, even while they continue their relentless quest to strangle the rest of the industry.

As for our gun rights, it remains to be seen just how far the Feldman maneuver has set back the cause. By surrendering their own credibility on firearm safety to the Nanny-in-Chief, these companies have given an enormous boost to the same social-engineering activists who believe guns are the root of a "public health epidemic."

The various justifications he's put forth are so nonsensical that veteran observers agree he must have another agenda in play. Gun owners should ask Feldman and the American Shooting Sports Council *exactly* what they hoped to accomplish through this hare-brained blunder.



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

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A DAY FOR THE BILL OF RIGHTS

Pop quiz: On what day was the Bill of Rights to the United States Constitution ratified? Answer: 15 December 1791.

The Bill of Rights defines what it means to be a U.S. citizen, setting our nation apart in its protection of the rights of individuals. Were it not for the Bill of Rights, the U.S. Constitution most likely would never have been ratified, because several states refused to join in a federal union without specifics to limit federal power and protect individual rights.

So why don't we celebrate this ultimate guarantor of Liberty? A national committee has formed to promote the idea that 15 December should be officially celebrated as Bill of Rights Day. Led by Aaron Zelman, executive director of Jews for the Preservation of Firearms Ownership, the steering committee, including SOF National Affairs Editor James L. Pate, is working to cultivate a grass-roots movement, town by town, county by county, to pass resolutions of official observance.

That's where you, the reader, can get involved. Volunteers are needed to solicit the support of local governing bodies, to buy and distribute literature and to talk up the Bill of Rights. The emphasis is less on celebration than on education. Basic rights are at grave risk if citizens

remain uninformed.

of the respondents in the same survey did not know there are three branches of government — much less what they do — and only a third knew that the first 10 amendments to the U.S. Constitution are called the Bill of Rights.

The theme of the effort to declare 15 December as an official day of observance is, "ALL of the Bill of Rights for ALL Citizens."

If a day of official observance is not set aside, Zelman said, "the Bill of Rights might otherwise be forgotten. Many Americans do not know their Bill of Rights. A special day would encourage even the government's schools to teach about it for at least one day per year. It would declare America's commitment to fundamental human rights to the whole world.

"It would also help force today's politicians to take a stand for or against fundamental rights, and remind policemen, prosecutors and judges that the government exists to serve, not to rule, the people," he added. "A Bill of Rights Day would annually remind America of how its history and philosophy have produced rights which oppressed people everywhere still long for. It would also honor the personal sacrifices and deaths of countless millions of people who struggled for basic rights for the last thousand years."

The idea is that if small towns, the cities and counties, pass resolutions of official observance, then all states will follow and, eventually, congress would be compelled to pass a resolution. After all, why would any freedom-loving citizen oppose the concept of preserving all of the Bill of Rights for all citizens?

Two cities — Rainier, Washington, and Monroe, Michigan — have already passed such resolutions. Georgia State Rep. Mitchell Kaye is sponsoring an essay contest on the Bill of Rights in conjunction with the crusade. It's time to get on the soapbox. Letters to the editor must be written. Informational packets must be handed out. Pitches to local governments must be made.

U.N.: GLOBAL DATABASE OF GUN LICENSES

The United Nations Panel of Governmental Experts on Small Arms, a 16-nation panel, has recommended that the U.N. convene a global conference on what is being called "arms traffick-

ing." The hope of reducing what the panel called "excessive accumulations of guns" in the world, their report recommended that the U.N.: a) support the destruction of small arms left over once conflicts are settled, b) study the feasibility of high-tech "marking" of firearms from the time of manufacture for the purpose of tracing, and c) study the possibility of restricting the production and trade of small arms to manufacturers and dealers and establish a global database of licenses. Although the U.N. alone cannot dictate American

licenses. Although the U.N. alone cannot dictate American laws and policy without such a treaty being passed by a two-thirds vote of the American congress, this straw in the wind is a good indication of where the intentions of the globalcrats' thinking is headed. (See "Downhearted Downunder" in FLAK, this issue.)



ECHOES FROM RUBY RIDGE

An Idaho magistrate has dismissed all charges against Kevin Harris, the man accused by the Boundary County, Idaho prosecutor of murdering Deputy U.S. Marshall William Degan during the 1992 siege at Ruby Ridge. Boundary County District Court Magistrate Quentin Harden ruled that Harris, already acquitted on federal charges of the same offense, could not be subjected to double jeopardy. Meanwhile, a Federal Appeals Court in San Francisco has cleared the way for Harris, who was wounded by the federal sniper who killed Vicki Weaver, to file a \$10 million suit against the federal government, ruling that the Bureau's "shoot to kill" rule of engagement was "a gross deviation from constitutional principles and a wholly unwarranted return to a lawless and arbitrary Wild-West school of law enforcement."

THE FABULOUS TOPPERWEINS

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Plinky Topperwein may well have been the world's greatest-ever husband and wife exhibition shooting team. Active until the 1940s, the Topperweins shot on tour for Winchester, making the fairground circuit for a generation. Many of their feats have never been equalled. You may have been jealous of your dad for his having been able to witness such feats as Ad's 10-day marathon of hitting 72,500 wooden blocks thrown into the air (well, he missed 9), but fret no longer: After many years of searching, Rex Applegate, one of SOF's favorite pistoleros and shooting archivists, has located enough original color and sound 16mm film footage for a video release showing this famous shooting team at work. The original film had been professionally made by Winchester-Western more than 50 years ago. Why it was never made available is a mystery, but now it is and you should get a copy so you can tell your kids about it. Think you're handy with a rifle or handgun? Get this film and get humble! FEINSTEIN PRESSURES ISRAEL OVER GUN EXPORTS

Sen. Dianne Feinstein (D-Ca.) announced she has sent a letter to Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, requesting him to block exports of "military style assault weapons" although the new iterations of Galils and UZIs produced by Israeli Industries Ltd. have been tailored and re-engineered to comply with new laws, including the "Feinstein Amendment." IIL, owned by the Israeli government, hoped to sell about 10,000 or more of these revised firearms on the U.S. market.

SOV SCIENTIST: KGB MADE TERRORIST NUKES

According to a Reuters story, former adviser to President Boris Yeltsin and respected scientist Alexi Yablokov confirmed that the KGB secretly made portable "suitcase" nukes. The flap arose when former Russian National Security Adviser Alexandr Lebed stated that up to 100 portable nukes, made up to look like suitcases, were unaccounted for since the 1991 implosion of the former USSR.

According to Lebed, who had agreed to testify before a U.S. Congressional committee later in October, the devices have an explosive capacity of one kiloton, can be activated by a single person — and could kill as many as 100,000 people. Yablokov said he has spoken to the scientists who worked on the weapons and was certain of their existence, acknowledging however that the former Soviet Defense Ministry might have never been aware of them, as they were an "atomic demolition munition" developed for the KGB as part of a secret program.

According to Yablokov, the weapons were "designed only for terrorist purposes" and were to be used by specially trained units to destroy key installations such as power plants during wartime.

FBI Director Louis Freeh told a separate congressional committee early in October that "we have not seen any hard evidence of suitcase-sized nuclear devices unaccounted for or falling into the hands of terrorists or rogue states," but Rep. Curt Weldon (R-Pa.) said the threat was serious and needed to be given higher priority by the Clinton Administration. "No one in the West, and few in Russia, know for sure whether dozens of small nuclear weapons, ideal for terrorist use, are unaccounted for and perhaps in the wrong hands."

Noted Senator Richard Lugar, "The Russian inventory system is so antiquated and inefficient that the Russians do not have an accurate count of nuclear weapons or materials," adding that Russian nuclear records were mostly handwritten and scattered around the country.

FBI AGENT GOES TO PRISON FOR RUBY RIDGE ROLE


Retired FBI agent E. Michael Kahoe, former head of the FBI's violent crimes section, has been handed 18 months in jail, a \$4,000 fine and two years' probation for destroying an executive summary report of FBI actions at Ruby Ridge, Idaho, which was critical of the FBI's role in the affair. Federal prosecutors claimed that Kahoe destroyed the documents to prevent the U.S. Attorney's office from turning them over to lawyers representing Randy Weaver, whose 14-year-old son Sammy was shot in the back, and whose wife Vicki was killed by FBI sniper Lon Horiuchi as she stood in the doorway of their cabin holding their baby.

Federal District Judge Ricardo Urbina handed down the sentence on the charge of obstructing justice, to which Kahoe had plead guilty. Weaver and his guest Kevin Harris were acquitted on charges they illegally killed a federal marshal during the 11-day siege by federal agents, and Weaver has subsequently won a multi-million dollar wrongful-death suit against the government. Harris was also recently acquitted of local murder charges, under a double-jeopardy ruling.

"CHINA CONNECTION" DELAYED

"The China Connection," Part II, of the SOF series on the Army Research Laboratory at Aberdeen Proving Ground, has been unavoidably delayed because its author, SOF National Affairs Editor Jim Pate was injured in a freak target-shooting accident on 11 October, and is recovering from emergency eye surgery performed at Johns Hopkins University Hospital. Although expected to regain most of his vision, Pate is unable to read or write during a recovery period of several weeks. In the interim, Pate strongly encourages everyone to wear shooting glasses, even in informal shooting sessions.

Cost of spies: CIA ends 50-year secrecy, revealing annual intelligence spending of \$26.6 billion in 1997. · International fighter: Pentagon officials want more overseas militaries to join Joint Strike Fighter program, which will develop next-generation worldwide strike fighter system. U.K. is only full partner with U.S., to date, pledging \$250 million. Pentagon officials hope more partners will shield program from budget cuts. . Landmine treaty: Clinton refuses to sign new landmine treaty, citing need to protect U.S. troops. Several U.S. generals supported treaty; many more rejected it with concern for smart mines and Korean demilitarized zone. Treaty backers vow to keep pushing for U.S. participation. . New Tomahawk: Navy will deploy new Tomahawk cruise missiles by 2002. New tactical missiles can circle over a battlefield for hours and be sent to a target that had not been seen at launch time. • Cyberwars: Turf battle escalates between Pentagon and intelligence community over who controls attacks on enemy computer systems. Pentagon programmers forbidden from hacking enemy computers without CIA and NSA approval. Chernomyrdin said technology will be used only for power plant, not weapons. • Mob with nukes? Chaired by former CIA Director William Webster, study concluded "it must be close to virtual certainty that (Russian Organized crime) would have little trouble finding willing military personnel who would provide, for example, a man-portable nuclear mine, fissile materials, or chemical and biological weapons for a 'consideration.' INDIA

Army to acquire five combat helicopters, upgrade 100 T-72M tanks, and award contract for 155mm self-propelled guns this year. Production underway on first of Army's new light combat helicopters. • Belarus President Alyaksandr Lukashenka announces his country will offer technological and maintenance support for Soviet-built weapons in the Indian inventory.

NORTHERN IRELAND

Homemade bomb: 1,000-pound homemade bomb destroyed by British troops near the Lisbellaw holiday complex in August. First bomb since ceasefire. IRA breakaway faction suspected. Irish police found bomb-making materials near Caven on 16 Aug.

KOREA

South Korea spends \$.32 billion for four airborne early warning planes. U.S. defense experts say move reflects South Korea's intent to maintain a hedge against potential future threats from Japan, China or other regional powers, as well as long-time adversary North Korea. • Chemicals: In recent computerized war game, United States finds North Korean chemical stockpile enough to jeopardize American victory in future conflict.

SIERRA LEONE

Junta asks Togolese President Eyadema to mediate conflict with Economic Community of West African States. Former President Kabbah begs ECOWAS to oust junta by force. Summit rejects use of force. Nigeria warns that junta planned to launch attacks on peacekeeping troops (mostly from Nigeria). Junta and rebel troops defeat attack by Kamajors militia near Zimmi. Nigerian guns fire shells into Freetown, during artillery duel, killing 12. Nigeria flies more troops into Sierra Leone.

CHINA Spies arrested: China arrests Xiao Tongszhi on suspicion he spied for Taiwan. Arrest comes after Xiao was jailed from 1950 to 1982 for spying. Taiwanese professor Lin Cheng-cheng arrested by China on charges of aerospace espionage during a visit to Beijing in July. • Army downsizing: Ruling elite announces plan to sell most state-owned companies and rebuild Army as smaller, more technical force. Army to be cut by 500,000 over next three years; Three top generals forced to retire. Ruling elite rejected all moves toward democracy.

SPAIN

Conservative Popular Party government will end compulsory military service by 1 Jan. 2003. ● Combined Spanish-Italian Amphibious Force (SIAF) should be in operation in 1998, following signing of formal agreement by Italian Prime Minister Romano Prodi and Spanish counterpart Jose Maria Aznar.

Nuclear warheads? Leaked U.S. CIA and Pentagon reports suggest Iran has been developing long-range missiles, possibly to carry nuclear warheads, in cooperation with Russia and China. State Department claims Russia has given repeated assurances it's not helping Iran but that there were "discrepancies between these assurances and reports of Russian firms cooperating with Iran." • Army Chief of Staff, Major General Ali Shahbazi, claims country has designed and built its first jet-strike fighter.

Government to cut military personnel by 30 percent over five years. Savings will pay for modernization and upgrades of equipment. Marthinus van Schalkwyk elected head of National Party; ANC denounced him as former apartheid proponent.

U.N. desertions: U.N. resolution sanctions UNITA for violating 1994 Lusaka Protocol. Joint commission supervising peace accords accused UNITA of "forced recruiting" of civilians. About 30,000 former UNITA soldiers said to have deserted U.N. camps.

CONGO

U.N. grows more impatient with Kabila, suspending refugee operations in response to Congo's forced repatriation of Rwandan refugees. Ethnic fighting continues in North and South Kivu Provinces as local groups ally with Rwandan and Burundian Hutus against Tutsi domination. • Prime Minister Kolelas: President Lissouba appoints Brazzaville Mayor Bernard Kolelas prime minister. Nguesso refuses to recognize appointment, claiming it brings neutral Kolelas into Lissouba's faction. Lissouba's four gunships attack Nguesso's positions in Brazzaville. Francophone summit in Gabon fails to resolve conflict; Democratic Congo closes mutual border.

So as I go down to my local gun shop in the States to buy a new AR-15 and a Colt .45 I can't help but think that another nation has gone over to the dark side. I can't help

but think our turn is next, and you can bet that the anti people are watching, listening and learning from what Australia is doing, and if they have their way these changes will be here sooner than later.

I would be happy to put my name to this letter but for the safety of my mates down under I will not — remember that paper trail. I will say this: I am a distinguished rifleman and a believer in the Constitution and very happy in the way it was writ-

ten. We had better lock and load now or we may live to regret it. One visit to a death chamber in a lifetime is enough.

An extra bit of information; The Australian government is putting together a 1,500-man strong "anti-terrorism" regiment which consists of 900 trigger pullers and 600 support personnel. But why would they need this unit? Because after September 30th, all will be good, the birds will be singing, the sky will be bluer and the beer will taste better.

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
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






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

Counting On A Long Shot

he average law-enforcement sniper shot is somewhat over 70 yards, so I realize the need for first-round hits at 600 yards may seem limited. Actually there are occasions when it is useful. One of the earliest and most prominent examples is the Charles Whitman case in Texas.

On a Texas college campus in 1966, Whitman randomly shot students and bystanders at ranges exceeding 450 yards with his hunting rifle. He was able to continue his spree largely because lawenforcement had no capability to respond to his long-range threat.

Rural officers can also envision circumstances where such long-range capability would be welcome. This includes service of felony warrants at remote locations in terrain that does not allow coneasily cealed approach. A long-range security team can add immeasurably to the comfort level of the service team crossing open ground to execute the warrant.

For a law-enforcement sniper to develop long-range capability, he needs to acquire the correct equipment, set it up correctly and know how to use it. The most obvious piece of long range equipment is the rifle. It must be

capable of a minimum of minute of angle (MOA) accuracy (1 inch at 100 yards). A rifle that will shoot 1/2 MOA is more suitable. The acceptable rifle is often a heavy barreled bolt-action, with a synthetic or laminated stock. Minimum caliber should be .308.

The second piece of essential equipment is a scope of sufficient power and clarity. A wise man once said there are two pieces of equipment on which you should spend more than you can afford: one is boots and the other is optics. He was correct. A quality scope is essential. A fixed-power scope of around 10X power or a high-quality variable that goes to the same level is recommended. The scope must have repeatable, reliable adjustments. I recommend scopes of the quality of the Leupold VariX III with turret target knobs.

Many times it will be discovered that because of manufacturing variances, the scope, after mounting, will not have enough upward adjustment to allow shooting past 400 yards. This is particularly true if the mounting holes on the receiver are not perfectly true to the bore. As a result, after adjustment the scope's reticle pattern will be off center. When the reticle is adjusted to the extreme for windage to correct for poor scope/bore alignment, the effect is a

lessened range of elevation adjustment.

This is because scopes actually are composed of two tubes: an inner and an outer. The inner tube is moved within the outer as the reticle is adjusted. If the inner scope tube is adjusted to the extreme inside edge of the outer tube, it cannot be adjusted to the same degree in the vertical plane compared to when it is centered.

To correct or avoid this problem there are two solutions: One is to use the windage adjustable base from Leupold. You may then make the major windage adjustments to sight the rifle with the bases

rather than scope, thus keeping the windage adjustments in the center of their range and allowing full vertical adjustment potential. The same effect can be had by using Burris posalign rings which can use offset synthetic spacers between the scope and the rings. The offset spacers can be positioned to prealign the scope with the bore. This same system allows you to mount the scope with a vertical offset that can and should be used to increase your potential "sight-in" range by raising the rear of the scope, thus saving your scopes elevation adjustments for long

range adjustment. This

system is very durable

and highly recommended.

Once you have a quality rifle/scope combination together with the appropriate mounts you need knowledge and skill. With regard to the former, you specifically need to know, to a very high degree of accuracy, the distance to the target, and how much drift you will experience from any wind present. Then, you must compensate for trajectory and drift.

There are numerous non-mechanical means for estimating range that we will not go into here. They are less accurate and take a greater degree of experience to use properly than my recommendation — laser rangefinders. Laser rangfinders are now becoming affordable for any sniper serious about his job. At the lower end of cost is a unit from Bushnell that ranges to 400 yards or a bit more for around \$300.00. A newly released unit goes to 800 yards for a few hundred dollars more. These are accurate, portable, and affordable units

Do not try to get by with lesser equipment. There are more expensive units such as the Leica which is incorporated into a superb set of 7x42mm binoculars. These are made with typical teu-

tonic craftsmanship, but are for the serious long-range shooter or agency, with a starting price of \$3,000 ranging upward to \$15,000 with GPS input, vertical angle of fire indicator, horizontal distance to target read out, and compass.

Once you have the complete rifle and laser rangefinder you need range time to build a range card for various ranges. Access to a ballistic computer program is helpful in order to give you the calculated drops, but the calculated drop per a computer is no substitute for actual range time, spent shooting groups at *known* ranges with your actual rifle and load. Once you have shot at known long-distance ranges and recorded your necessary scope adjustments, you are at a point to really start having fun and building confidence.

The easy part is over. It has been said that the long-range amateur is concerned with trajectory. The professional is more concerned with wind effect. Trajectory is predictable. Wind, however, varies with range plus velocity and direction. Your problem is to determine the wind velocity and then calculate its effect on your shot. To determine wind velocity there are various rules of thumb. Learn them and practice them. For the purposes of this article I simply recommend that you spend \$150 and purchase one of the now available electronic pocket wind meters. Keep in mind that they only tell you the wind speed at your position, not down range.

Now that you know the distance, your trajectory adjustment and the wind velocity (at least at your position), you need to come up with your wind correction. The primary method uses a formula as follows:

(Distance to target x wind speed) \div 15 = MOA of correction

This looks complicated but with use is fast and easy to use. This formula will give you the minutes of angle of correction necessary. It is based on a full-value wind (one which crosses at a 90-degree angle to your bullet path). The range is expressed as a single digit number in terms of 100s of yards. Example: You are faced with a 300-yard shot in a 10 mph full-value wind. Your formula is: (3 x 10) / 15 = 2 MOA correction. Fifteen is a constant denominator for .308 168-grain match, out to 600

Peddling Paranoia For Profit

Profiteering from paranoia in America has truly become a growth industry. Fear of the unknown and the misunderstood sells and sells big. But as to the rest, if these folks themselves didn't say or do something incredibly stupid, the SPLC and others on the Liberal Left could just make it up and no one would question it.


The scary thing is, the SPLC, Anti-Defamation League, and other "experts" have an open line to Bill Clinton, Janet Reno and the Justice Department, Congress, the national news media (with their urban-Democrat/elitist bias), and law-enforcement agencies across the nation. Inconvenient reality: Of these 858, better than 10% are listed as "unknown group" or "unspecified location." (Excuse me? They either are or they aren't.) Among some of the more laughable entries: The John Birch Society (in some states, but not all); The American Taxpayers Party; the Fully Informed Jury Association; the Black Panthers (give me a break); and — are you ready for this — an organization calling itself the "Texas Rangers." (Chuck Norris, watch out ...)

• In July 1996, during uproar surrounding the arrests of Arizona's infamous "Viper militia," the SPLC obligingly provided the (mostly gullible) news media with a list of 26 Arizona militia groups "known to be active from 1994 to 1996."

IR: Out of the 26 listed "militias," 22 either are not militias or don't even exist. That includes seven "name unknown" or "location unspecified."

• In its winter 1997 issue of *Intelligence* [sic] *Report*, Klanwatch writers blame "suspected right-wing terrorists" for "the 1995 explosion that derailed an Amtrak train in Arizona." Elsewhere appeared a photo of the train wreck accompanied by the caption, "The 1995 bombing of a section of track that caused the derailment of an Amtrak train may reflect tactical changes in the anti-government movement."

IR: Not only was there no "explosion" or "bombing" — the train was derailed after someone had manually removed 29 spikes from the track — but in October 1996 Bruce Gebhard, special agent in charge of the FBI office in Phoenix, acknowledged that there was little likelihood that the crash was the work of militia or patriot types.

Further, in September 1997 (it would seem, in plenty of time for Klanwatch's winter report) an FBI Behavioral Science Unit profile of the derailment suspect described him as a "liberal" and a "loner" — hardly a "right-wing" militia member.

By no means is the Southern *Profitable* Law Center alone in peddling paranoia. For example, there's Kenneth S. Stern, the American Jewish Committee's "expert" on hate groups.

By his own admission, prior to 1994 Stern had never even heard of militias. Yet, according to his 1996 book, A Force Upon the Plain, he is now considered "America's leading expert on the militia movement." Pretty heady laurels for someone who can't seem to get his facts straight.

As only one small example, while discussing Timothy McVeigh and the OKC bombing in his book, Stern wrote, "Some remember McVeigh at a 1993 Soldier Of Fortune Convention in Phoenix." Oh really? It may come as a shock to Mr. Stern, but as any long-time SOF conventioneer can attest, there never was an SOF Convention in Phoenix in 1993, or any other year for that matter. (There has been only one in Arizona: in Scottsdale in 1981 — another inconvenient reality.)

When confronted on national television by SOF National Affairs Editor James L. Pate on this and other factual errors in his book, Stern resorted to the intellectual liberal's immediate-action drill of rolling his eyes skyward, shaking his head, and clucking.

In other words, Stern had no defense for his sloppy research. The dangerous thing about such people and groups is not that they go after real criminals and hate-mongers, which is truly laudable, but that they sweep with such a broad brush that it tars anyone who doesn't march in lockstep with their ideals and agendas. (Kind of like the tactics of the Nazi party in Germany in the '30s.) And anyone who questions their propaganda or agenda is quickly branded as a purveyor of anti-Semitic, racist, etc., etc., hate speech.

It is a tactic, unfortunately, that President Clinton himself embraces. $\boldsymbol{\mathcal{R}}$

September 1964, I sat in a small gasthof in the town of Erlangen, West Germany, looking at an ad in a Frankfurt newspaper,

"WANTED: FIT YOUNG MEN. Interesting outdoor work, prior military service preferred." A Johannesburg, South Africa, telephone number was added.

I phoned and a hoarse voice with an Afrikaner accent answered. He questioned me about age, prior military experience and foreign languages, if any.

When I asked him specific questions about what types of operations were ongoing, he said that based on what I'd told him he felt sure they could use me.

My wife, at the time, was visiting her eldest son stationed at a local U.S. Army post. While hardly delighted about my dashing off to Johannesburg, she agreed to chauffeur me to the Frankfurt airport for my flight to Rome — to Entebbe — then touching down, finally, in Salisbury, Rhodesia.

After a two-day rest, I departed Salisbury for Johannesburg. Jan Smuts Airport was all but deserted.

I approached Customs and Immigration where a short, barrel-chested Afrikaner, sporting a bushy, handlebar mustache, checked my passport and shook his head. "Ach, man ... you're in a spot of trouble."

His partner, a larger clone, walked over, glanced at me, then at my passport.

By their looks, I could almost hear the cell door clang shut and the wholly unwelcome *cracks* of whips across my bare back.

"What's the problem, Sir?" I asked, striking a half-assed version of standing to attention.

(Saying "Sir" to anyone in uniform in a foreign country is always a splendid idea in that it will indicate that you are a boot-licking, ass-kissing, harmless, American idiot.)

The pitying looks I got from the immigration officers bolstered my theory.

"Ach, man, you don't have a visa for South Africa."

Telling him that no one in Salisbury had briefed me on that little matter seemed pointless.

"Why did you come to South Africa?"

I cleared my throat and blurted, "to join the mercenaries and fight for your country."

Abruptly, clouds cleared, bands played, the sun shone and birds sang, smiles broke out, and handlebars waggled.

"Right, then. If you're staying more than 48 hours you'll have to call me. My name ees Van der Merwe."

He handed me my passport and waved to a tall, skinny black African standing outside the exit doors next to a taxi. When the porter trotted in, officer Van der Merwe spoke to him in a torrent of gibberish, ending in the words "Dawson Hotel."

In the morning, I dialed the Jo'burg number and the same voice I'd heard in Erlangen answered and instructed me to meet him in the hotel coffee shop.

Mr. Ian Schmidt (given the situation in South Africa now, I'll use that name) waited 'til I nodded, then walked over to the table and sat down.

After shaking hands and checking my ID, he said that we had an appointment near the Dawson. His small sedan was parked near the corner. Ten minutes later we walked into a small, musty office.

Sitting behind the desk was a partially bald fiftyish man with a heavily tanned weathered face.

Ian introduced me to Mr. "Van der Merwe."

I opened my briefcase, pulled out my

license, log book, and airline ID and handed them over. Ian's eyes bugged.

"Ach, man! You said nothing about being a pilot!"

I tap-danced around, spilling nothing about my previous assignments with the 10th and 77th Special Forces Groups. Until I knew what was going on, I opted to use my flight time as a cover.

"Where did you get the Harvard time?" he asked. I was confused for a minute then realized he was using the British designation for our North American AT-6 advanced trainer.

"Sir, I owned a Harvard and used it to commute to work times.'

Van der Merwe studied the rest of the pages and jotted down the total times in various types of equipment. Then he asked, "Do you speak, read and write French?"

I said yes.

He looked over at Ian and said, "Start Captain Williams tomorrow at the administrative office."

With that I was hired. I found out the next day that job was to translate from French to English the six-month contracts issued by the Congolese government to mercenary volunteers.

There were any number of bizarre things about the Congolese exercise, not the least of which was the fact that Moishe Tshombe, the President of the Congolese Republic, secretly flew into Jo'burg for a series of private talks with the the President of South Africa, Dr. Vorwoerd, asking for help from the South African government to save the Congo from a communist takeover.

Those talks resulted in the call for volunteers to go to the Congo and help Tshombe in his fight for survival.

Foremost among the volunteer groups was 5 Commando, under the command of Col. Mike Hoare.

Such is the mystery of Africa, where a black government asks the head of an apartheid government for help.

After two weeks, aiding in the recruiting process, translating contracts from French to English, and answering questions about the Congo (about which I knew absolutely nothing) I was told of my transfer to Kamina Base, Katanga Province, Belgian Congo.

On final approach into Kamina, I noticed another C-54 parked on the hardstand with an ant-like line of people rushing toward it.

After deplaning, I asked one of the airport guards who those people were. He grinned and said, "Many want to go home. Some have disease from village girls, how do you call it? Syphilis?"

I congratulated him on his English.

In a barracks, which served as an officers' billet, I had just thrown my kit bag on a bunk when several people entered: Two of them unhappy returnees from the Stanleyville raid.

A major sat down on the opposite bunk and informed me that there had been a prob-

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
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


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
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
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
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PRUs To The Rescue

Editor's note: The December 1997 issue of SOF contained Good to Go: 7th Platoon at My Tho, the story of how Seventh Platoon, SEAL Team Two, withstood assault after assault of Viet Cong regular forces during the Tet 1968 offensive in the Mekong Delta town of My Tho. While that account is certainly an epic example of how SEALs give battle while on the defensive, it does not depict the effectiveness of their offensive operations. The exploits of Bob "Eagle" Gallagher, Harry Constance, Roy Dean Matthews, Fred Keener, Bob Peterson, and many others are largely unknown outside the small community that was SEAL Team Two during that heroic era. This series of articles is designed to bring some of those exploits to light.

eventh Platoon, SEAL Team Two (ST-2), was in 1968 as formidable a combat force as ever trod the terrain of South Vietnam. Unfortunately for the Communists, several other SEAL units, just as lethal, fought throughout the country. While Can Tho and My Tho (in the Mekong Delta), Nha Be (just south of Saigon), and Da Nang (in the north of the country) were the best known SEAL "home bases" during the Vietnam War, several smaller operations went on throughout the country at all times.

Among the deadliest was a Provincial Reconnaissance Unit (PRU) led by Senior Chief Petty Officer Bob "Eagle" Gallagher and Petty Officer Second Class Harry

Constance — the same two SEAL operators who figured so prominently in the defense of the Navy compound in My Tho during Tet '68. As the only Americans in this

particular PRU — based in Soc Trang, another small Mekong Delta town — Eagle and Harry performed the functions of commander, operations officer, paymaster, intelligence officer, quartermaster, and all the other command-and-headquarters personnel normally found in a battalion.

PRUs, basically, were company-sized units comprised of "chieu-hoied" (defected)

Gallagher was awarded a Silver Star for the feat; Constance got a free beer. Viet Cong, young men seeking legal draft exemptions, adventure-seekers, criminals, and draft-dodgers. According to Constance, his PRU was about 50% chieu hois (pronounced "choo-hoys"), with the rest a mix of the others. Gallagher disputes that, guessing about 80 percent were chieu hois.

Forging SEALs

Harry had been deployed to RVN with a new platoon. Upon his arrival in-country, however, Gallagher drafted Harry to be his "number two." During the early days of the 1969 Gallagher/Constance regime, Harry was told to select 12 likely candidates, from among the 120 or so PRU troopers, to train as SEALs (or something close as possible) within two weeks. As recounted by Harry in Good to Go, his wartime autobiography, Gallagher was specific in his instructions. "At the end of those two weeks, I want them to be able to sneak through the woods, and do everything we are able to do." Judging from the PRU's extraordinary accomplishments, Harry succeeded.

Harry described to me the difficulty he and Gallagher had in organizing and equipping the PRUs for combat against the Viet Cong. First, the two Americans had to overcome the reputations of previous advisors who lined their pockets with bonuses, and other funds, that were rightfully due the PRUs. Next, they had to retrain them in their own image — as professional military men capable of penetrating deep into enemy territory and wreaking havoc. Finally, they had to gain

trust — proving themselves as leaders who could take their men into harm's way and get them out again.

Capturing A Colonel

While scores of stories resulted from Eagle and Harry's tour with the PRU, among my favorites is the capture of a North Vietnamese Army colonel. Based on intelligence reports, this individual (let's call him Col. Dinh) was trained in the Soviet Union, was a member of North Vietnam's Lao Dong (Communist) Party, and was in South Vietnam to develop Viet Cong training procedures. His political level was comparable to that of province chief in the RVN government, and he was part of the policy-making elite of the communist forces.

Col. Dinh's capture involved every element of military planning and execution. Ironically, no RVN or U.S. forces would have even known of his presence in the South except for an egregious breach in Viet Cong operational security. Dinh, luck had it, made the mistake of marrying a local lass in something of an elaborate ceremony. Unfortunately for him, Gallagher's PRU intelligence network got wind of the wedding and the groom's identity, which set in motion a chain of events that resulted in Dinh's capture within days of his marriage.

After many days of careful planning and preparation, Gallagher and Constance led a picked party of Harry's specially trained PRU "SEALs" on a two-day approach march across the Delta countryside. While

the trek alone was a formidable consideration, it was complicated by known Viet Cong concentrations along the route, which caused the group to negotiate a dog-leg line of march in order to avoid them. Constance said Gallagher spent many hours poring over maps to develop a route least likely to result in enemy contact. The prospects for success — even survival — were "iffy," to say the least.

"Anybody going on that operation would have had to be out of their mind," Constance told me recently.

Maybe so, but the results were a sane victory.

Crashing The Honeymoon

Arriving in the wee hours of the morning at Col. Dinh's honeymoon hootch, after their 48-hour walk through the countryside, the patrol carefully reconnoitered the area. They posted security before executing the capture plan, which called for Harry to pin the sleeping colonel before he had a chance to wake up. When

ging, scratching, and rolling on the ground, Gallagher managed to draw his pistol and shoot the colonel in the thigh, thus ending the fight. The group then exited the area, bringing with them the highest-ranking officer ever captured up to that time. Harry claims, of course, that Gallagher forced him to shoulder-carry the captive on the I 1/2day return trek to Soc Trang. Gallagher says that's half true - that he alternated with Harry in humping the incapacitated prisoner through paddy and tree line. At any rate, they arrived back in Soc Trang and turned the colonel over to "higher authority," which forbade them from discussing the capture and reading any of the treasure trove of documents found in the hootch.

Official Secrecy

The North Vietnamese soldier was considered such a precious commodity, in fact, that "authorities" told Gallagher and Constance he had died. What really happened, Gallagher surmises, was that he remained very much alive and the "authorities" simply didn't want the enemy to know one its senior officers was in American custody.

Despite their secrecy, the powers-thatwere were so delighted with the result of the operation they awarded the Silver Star to Gallagher. Harry, in turn, says he got a free beer from Gallagher as just reward.

During the many hours spent with Harry Constance in recent months, I've made it a point to glean from him as much information as possible about his hero, Eagle Gallagher. Ever since I first met Gallagher in '64, I've wondered what made the man

Entering the house just behind the stunned Constance, Gallagher immediately encountered his target — a fully aroused soldier of large stature — and had no weapons for defense. Eagle's intent was to take the officer alive, and he went immediately into a hand-to-hand mode. Recently, Gallagher told me his quarry was one tough son of a gun, and the outcome of the fist fight was more than once in doubt.

"That guy could punch like a mule," he recalled. "And I didn't know if I was going to subdue him or not."

Strong stuff, coming from a guy well-known for his ability to prevail in any such "social" situation, from barroom brawl to mano-a-mano confrontation.

After what seemed a lifetime of slug-

tick. I still don't know the answer to that, but the accounts others have given me of his actions in combat compel me to state unequivocally that he was the most formidable warrior the U.S. military ever deployed to Vietnam.

No SEAL who ever operated with Gallagher will dispute that assertion, as each has his own tale of "what Gallagher did when ..." I recall a legendary instance of his unique ability to handle difficult social situations.

Gallagher, The Gunny, And His Wife

It occurred at the Chief Petty Officers' Club at the Amphibious Base in Little Creek, Va., back in the mid '60s. Seems Gallagher was minding his own business at the bar when a Marine gunnery sergeant attempted to provoke a fight with him. While Gallagher tried to avoid physical violence (really!), Gunny persisted in his efforts, which were rewarded when Gallagher exploded all over him. Result: one prostrate and unconscious Marine on the deck of the Chiefs' Club.

Upon seeing the animal Gallagher vanquishing her beloved with such brutality, Gunny's wife accosted our hero, cursing him and beating his chest with her clenched fists. When repeated warnings failed to dissuade her from beating a tattoo on his pectoral region, Gallagher had no choice - he nailed her on the jaw with a right that put her down for the count beside her husband. An eyewitness told me he never saw anything as funny as that devoted (if unconscious) couple laid out alongside each other on the barroom floor, with Gallagher sipping his beer just above them as though nothing had happened. (This was not, by the way, among the incidents that resulted in Gallagher being banned from the Chiefs' Club.)

Other accounts of Gallagher's pugilistic endeavors are nearly countless. This article, however, is supposed to be about military combat. So we'll return to Vietnam. There, Gallagher was viewed with awe by those closest to him, officers and enlisted alike.

Sometimes, however, those who didn't know him had to be awestruck in a forceful way, like when an overbearing Marine colonel tried to intimidate Gallagher during his PRU days. It seemed (and I heard basically the same version of this tale from both Eagle and Harry) the good colonel, a muckamuck in the highest levels of the PRU organization in Saigon, arranged to visit Gallagher in Soc Trang, where he lived and operated in the so-called "Embassy House." Upon his arrival, Gallagher took the colonel to his room for a private conversation, leaving behind a SEAL lieutenant from Can Tho, who was accompanying the colonel.

Raising Gallagher's Ire

It soon became obvious the Marine was intent on imposing his own stamp of military discipline on the local PRU. There was some question in his mind about Gallagher's status. He knew Gallagher was military, but wasn't sure of his rank status — confusion Gallagher did nothing to clear up. In a series of pointed questions, the colonel made it clear he would impose con-

ventional military constraints on Gallagher's unconventional organization. A question of whether Gallagher and Constance carried U.S. identification cards sent Gallagher over the edge.

Says Gallagher: "I made a couple of strong statements to the colonel, and the colonel left shortly thereafter." I was unable to coax Gallagher to go beyond that, except to say that a few days later he received a conciliatory note from the colonel, along with a copy of *Rogers' Rangers 21 Rules* (the most important of which, in my mind, is "Take care of your men").

Constance recalls things slightly differently. He insists there was a USMC sergeant major accompanying the colonel, who thought it the better part of valor to depart the premises when it became clear a major confrontation was brewing between Gallagher and the colonel. Harry says, "I have a photographic collection of Eagle standing up behind the table he was sitting at and shaking his finger in the colonel's face. After the sergeant major and I went outside and closed the door, we could still

hear loud talk going on. I didn't know what to do, nor did the sergeant major. Anyway, a few minutes later the colonel came out while telling Eagle what a fine operation he was running." The PRU continued to function as before.

Softer Side Of A SEAL

As "bad" as Gallagher was in dealing with the curious, the bureaucratic, and the

incompetent, he was nothing short of goodness and light in dealing with those who depended on his courage, leadership, and instincts for their own survival.

As previously mentioned, he was heroworshipped by his PRU troops, who frequently had been short-changed in their salaries and denied their bonuses by unscrupulous U.S. civilian "advisers." In *Good to Go*, Constance relates how he over-

heard conversations between two of those advisers in which they discussed inflating figures on weapons captures and how they sent thousands of dollars in cash back home. Gallagher, on the other hand, saw to it his men were paid fairly, treated courteously, and led from the front. And when a soldier was killed, he saw to it the family received all death benefits due them, and more.

The aggressive and focused leadership provided by Gallagher and Constance resulted in scores of dead, injured, and captured Viet Cong (not to mention hundreds of weapons) during their six-month tenure at the Soc Trang Provincial Reconnaissance Unit. Although no records were kept of their body-count effectiveness, I have it on highest authority that Gallagher's personal count was in the dozens.

In future issues, Larry Bailey will give more true accounts of how SEALs (and Bob Gallagher and Harry Constance, in particular) fought the Vietnam War. In the next article, learn how Gallagher won the Navy Cross and established himself as a SEAL Team Two legend. Future articles in this series about SEALs at war will provide detailed accounts of "Eagle" Gallagher's courage under fire, his leadership under pressure, and his unique ability to summon what Bailey calls "warrior instinct" to harm the enemy, but keep his own men unscathed.

a group, the Vietnam SEALs, who numbered some 500 at the war's peak, have no right to complain about the frequency and level of the awards they received. In terms of men involved, it's been said, SEALs were the most decorated combat force in the entire Vietnam conflict. Three Medals of Honor, nine Navy Crosses and a multitude of Silver Stars and Bronze Stars were bestowed on the members of SEAL Teams One and Two in Coronado, Calif., and Little Creek, Va., respectively.

believing that SEALs were properly held to a higher standard. In that context, Gallagher told me in a recent conversation that he has always believed that the entire framework of awards for valor should be re-examined. After listening to his rationale, I'm inclined to agree with him.

Basically, he maintains that too many high awards are given to men who — although comporting themselves dramatically, if not heroically — are acting out of necessity. He uses as an example

Consciously Tempting Fate

Had the SEAL leadership been as attentive to the award medals for valor early in the war as they became toward its end, there would doubtless have been significantly more ribbons worn on the community's uniforms. The experience of Seventh Platoon, SEAL Team Two, is instructive in that regard. As far as I've been able to determine, the siege of My Tho during Tet '68 by that band of determined sailors resulted in absolutely no awards to any of the dozen or so participants in that action (see "Good to Go," Dec. '97).

Considering the nature of its combat operations, neither did Seventh Platoon receive a significant number of awards prior to the '68 Tet Offensive. Yes, Bob "Eagle" Gallagher received the Navy Cross (next in seniority to the Medal of Honor) for the heroic actions he took in coordinating the rescue of LT Bob Peterson's squad during an epic encounter with a Viet Cong regular force battalion in late '67, but few, if any, of the other participants received so much as a Bronze Star.

This was typical of the early days of the SEAL Team Two commitment to the war. Nobody paid any attention to the lack of awards,

the action described above in which 7th Platoon fended off the VC battalion. While he acknowledges that he and others acted commendably, he points out that neither he nor the other squad leader, LT Peterson, planned to encounter an enemy force of such size. He seems to believe that it was expediency, not courage, that led him and others to perform so admirably.

What he is saying here is that greatest consideration should be given to those acts resulting from a conscious decision to expose oneself to the likelihood of serious harm or death, as opposed to that given those acts performed out of desperation. In truth, "no-choice heroism," — having to perform in dramatic fashion in order to save one's life — while commendable from a practical perspective, should not be the stuff of which higher awards are made.

Gallagher is right. Those military men and women who consciously go into harm's way knowing that injury or death is likely, as opposed to possible, should be recognized on a higher level than those who simply respond to the circumstances in which they find themselves, however hazardous those circumstances.

rom 30,000 feet the vast Sahara Desert takes on the appearance of a surreal Martian landscape. For the past few hours there had been nothing under the wings of the Air Afrique Boeing 747 but the reddishbrown hue of the world's largest desert. There was plenty of time to reflect on the assignment ahead and to wonder why the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms was undertaking an op in Africa.

My part in this adventure began on a mild September night in Washington, D.C., in 1986, when the special agent in charge (SAC) of the Explosives Technology Branch (ETB) at ATF headquarters phoned me at home.

"Is your passport up to date?" he asked. "Are you up to date on foreign ordnance, especially Russian?"

After I answered both questions in the affirmative, I was instructed to report to the Department of State the following morning for a visa, shots, and a plane ticket.

"There's been an attempted coup in Africa and the State Department wants someone to examine and evaluate the guns and explosives and stuff," the SAC said. "You're going to Togo."

After hanging up the phone I thought, "I'm going where?"

Sitrep: Togo

The following day, a crisp new visa for the *Republique Togolaise* in my pocket and a throbbing load of gamma globulin serum in my butt, I and Ed Owen, chief of the ATF's Firearms Technology Branch, were briefed on the situation.


The West African country of Togo had just thwarted an attempted coup d'etat and wanted U.S. observers to view firsthand the captured bounty from its victory over a communist incursion. A group of expatriate Togolese were said to have staged the failed

years later, French Togoland gained its independence and became simply Togo. Borders and names may change but tribal

> lands and animosities remain. What is now the southern region of Togo,

including Lomé, was initially founded by the Ewe tribe, which remained dominant until the colonial and post-colonial periods. Although the Ewe outnumber the Kabye in Togo by nearly 2 to 1, this was not reflected in the army, where 90% of the officers and 70% of the troops were Kabye. It is no surprise that President General Gnassingbe Eyadema was also Kabye.

On the other side of the border, Ghana's Marxist President Rawlings, an Ewe, had long sought to rout Eyadema and the Kabye from Togo. Making no bones about its leftist leanings, Ghana had openly courted Soviet military and economic assistance — all the

coup from the neighboring country of Ghana. Their plan was to slip across the border into the capital, Lomé, seize the radio and TV stations, and broadcast word that an overthrow had taken place. The rebels would then request military assistance from Ghana, whose president, Flight Lieutenant Jerry John Rawlings, would release his troops (standing by on the border) to enter Togo and back up the "new" government.

As with most of Africa, ongoing friction between Togo and Ghana dated back to precolonial tribal conflicts.

In 1919, with the dissolution of the German protectorate, Ewe tribal land was split into British and French Togoland. In 1956, British Togoland and the Gold Coast merged to form what is now Ghana. Four





while suckering a gullible U.S. government out of millions of dollars in foreign aid.


Armed And Touchy

Since the situation in Togo was still "not quite stable" and the airport in Lomé remained closed, our plan was to fly into the neighboring (Marxist) country of Benin, spend the night, then drive cross country to the Togolese capital.

Stepping off the plane in the port city of



Cotonou, Benin, the first thing that hit us was the humid tropical air. A quick glance toward the bottom of the aircraft stairs was rewarded by icy eye contact with a pair of AK-47-toting soldiers. This sight — coupled with the fact that the day before, two European tourists had been blown out of their Birkenstocks for photographing the president's residence — suggested to me that Benin hadn't changed much since a 1977 coup that served as the inspiration for

Frederick Forsyth's mercenary novel, *The Dogs of War*.

After a short night's sleep, we headed along the coastal highway toward Togo. At the border it seemed that half of the Togolese troops simply wanted to shoot these white devils and get back to sleep. The other half stayed asleep. After an hour or so of bribes, threats, and BS, we were safely across and headed to the capital.

Arriving in Lomé, the first order of business was to head north to the U.S. Embassy to pick up equipment and to get a current sitrep: Things had calmed down somewhat, but the military was still more than a trifle touchy.

We loaded our gear into an embassy Jeep and headed for the beach and the Hotel Sarakawa. Pulling up in front of the five-star hotel, we were greeted by the cold stares of two soldiers posted at the main entrance. When one of the State Department staffers pulled his backpack from the back of the Jeep and slung it over his shoulder, out popped the antenna of a portable radio. Up came two evil-looking submachine guns, bolts back and pointed right at us.

To say that the next few seconds were tense would be an understatement. The only sound — besides that of sphincters slamming shut — was Owen giving us a technical rundown on the subguns: "They're French MAT 49s: 9-millimeter submachine guns. They fire 600 rounds per minute from an open bolt and have a *shitty* grip safety." This didn't make me feel any better. Fortunately, a quickly spoken mixture of French and Kabye defused the situation; the weapons were lowered *most* of the way toward the ground.

The next morning we were off to the palace for a meeting with President General Gnassingbe Eyadema.

Foreign Muscle


Although Togo has been considered a pro-U.S. "island" in a sea of Marxist neighbors, it was no secret that it had kept its options open. Togo's ties to North Korea were obvious. Driving down the Rue du Colonel de Roux, past the Independence Square, you couldn't help but notice the larger-than-life bronze statue of President Eyadema, a gift of the North Koreans. In addition to maintaining an embassy in Lomé, the Pyongyang regime provides Eyadema's personal bodyguards.

A real eye-opener awaited us at the presidential palace: a ZU-23-4 Soviet-bloc

23mm anti-aircraft gun perched on the wellmanicured front lawn. Then, with brownsuited soldiers keeping an eye on us, we were escorted into the palace for our meeting with the president. Walking down the tiled halls to the presidential suite we were well aware of the North Korean bodyguards, tucked away in the shadowy corridors, eyeing our every move.

As we entered his office, Eyadema rose from his desk, smiling, and waved us over to a table. "Please," he said, "join me in coffee."

With fine china cups brimming with toostrong coffee and the obligatory small talk soon out of the way, we were treated to Eyadema's heroic account of how he personally led his troops in victorious battle against the godless communist invaders. It wasn't exactly how some of the U.S. Marine embassy guards described it but, what the hell — it was his story and his palace.



Talk soon turned to why we were here: to examine the captured hardware. President Eyadema assured us of the fullest cooperation of the government, and that we were free to begin at any time.

Oh, by the way, some of the rebels survived the firefight. Did we wish to interrogate the prisoners, the president asked. No, thank you very much, we don't even want to see the prisoners.

Ordnance Smorgasbord

Arriving at Togolese army headquarters we found, lined up side by side on the dirt parade field, a dozen or so bullet-riddled cars, trucks, buses, and taxis the invaders were driving when they rolled into the army's ambush.

Our next stop was a thatched-roof, opensided mess hall-turned-exhibition hall, where we found a smorgasbord of ordnance, field gear, explosive charges, and small arms and ammo, all laid out on a 15x30-foot rectangle of tables. Piles of blood soaked fatigues, improvised bandages, and cammies lay next to bulletpocked helmets and civilian-style walkietalkies. Alongside a boom box and cassette tapes of African chants was a motley assortment of voodoo fetish bags, sunglasses, and AKM bayonets. There were East German ammo pouches filled with scores of fully loaded AK-47 and AKM rifle magazines, and banded wooden cases of Soviet-made 7.62x39mm ammo.

As we made our initial walk-around, Owen asked an army officer if all of the weapons had been cleared. No sooner had he received an affirmative answer than Owen casually picked up an AKM, jacked back the bolt, and caught the ejected live round in midair.

Not content with merely making a liar out of the man, Owen immediately added insult to injury by angrily throwing the round across the table and into the chest of the open-mouthed officer. In short order a very pissed army colonel, bearing the tribal facial scars of a Hausa, made it abundantly clear that we were persona non grata.

Back to the embassy to sit on our thumbs.

The Lockerbie Connection

Without a doubt, the most intriguing and important of the materials recovered by U.S. agencies after the 1986 Togo coup attempt were two Swiss-made, compact electronic timing devices. Measuring just 3x3 inches, these state-of-the-art integrated circuit (IC) demolition timers were capable of 100% accurate delays of 1 to 99 minutes or 1 to 99 hours.

With no small amount of effort, one of these devices was brought back to the United States. After thorough examination and testing by the ATF, a briefing was given at CIA headquarters and the timer was turned over to the agency for evaluation.

Two years later, on 26 October 1988, the West German Bundeskriminalamt (BKA)

raided a suspected PLO terrorist safehouse in Neuss. Found in an automobile belonging to Hafez Kassem Dalkamoni, a senior lieutenant in the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine-General Command (PFLP-GC), was an improvised explosive device (IED) concealed in a black Toshiba radio-cassette player. The device was professionally constructed, probably by Ahmed Jabril, a former Syrian army officer and chief bomb-maker for the PFLP-GC.

At the heart of the IED seized in Neuss were 312 grams (10 ounces) of Semtex-H plastic explosive, a barometric (altitude) switch — and an exact copy of the IC timer recovered in 1986 after the Togolese coup attempt.

Then, just two months later, Pan Am flight 103 was blown out of the sky by a terrorist bomb over Lockerbie, Scotland, killing all 259 onboard and 11 people on the ground. As investigators painstakingly sifted through the wreckage, they discovered the remains of a black Toshiba radio-cassette player and a clone of the now-infamous "Togo timer."

Not Quite Ready

The following day, after tempers had cooled and rank was pulled, we were back on site. It didn't take long for us to figure out that the attempted coup had not been a fully developed military threat. For one thing, most of the hand grenades had *not* been armed.

In addition to a number of French model-1935 fragmentation grenades, there were two cases of Russian F-1 frags. Unlike U.S. hand grenades, Soviet F-Is are issued without the fuzes installed. Packed 20 to a crate, F-1s come with a Bakelite-type plug in the fuze well, with the UZRGM fuzes packed 10 each in their own sealed metal cans.

To put these grenades into action you first must open the fuze cans using a supplied can opener (which resembles an extralarge "P-38" GI tool). Next, you remove the individually wrapped fuzes from their containers, unwrap them, remove the grenade shipping plug, and thread the UZRGM fuze into the fuze well — pretty time-consuming if you're under fire in the middle of a coup. (Interestingly, the markings on the grenades' shipping crates were in English, while the fuze cans were marked in Russian and French.)

A persistent myth about UZRGM grenade fuzes refuses to die. That is, that the numerical markings on the fuze's detonator tube indicate the *delay time* of the fuze. Not true. In fact, these are merely factory markings and have no bearing on delay times. (To re-verify this, I conducted Togo field tests of several differently marked fuzes: The average delay time was 3.72 seconds, which was within the Soviet-accepted standard delay.)

Spread out next to the grenades were

several shiny, new RPG-7 rocket launchers along with piles of Russian PG-7 and Bulgarian PG-7M rockets. As with the F-1 grenades, the rockets, launch motors, and launchers were factory-fresh in their stiff, canvas carrying bags and still sealed in protective plastic wrap. However, there was some dried blood staining the ordnance, and two of the launch motors had bullets imbedded in them. As with the Soviet grenades, the PG-7 rockets and launch motors were labeled with English instructions.

The captured bullet-belchers came in two categories: assault rifles and pistols. The rifles were a collection of woodenand folding-stock AK-47s and AKMs of various Soviet-bloc manufacture. The handguns ranged from Makarovs and Browning Hi-Powers to French 9mm MABs — even a newer model Walther P.38. As it turned out, the only gun that was traceable was the P.38, whose last-known address was Tripoli, Libya.

International Cast

The explosives fell into two categories: military and commercial. While most had the unmistakable print of Ivan's hands on them, other material may have been added to "salt" the stash.

Among the military explosives was a case of French 250-gram (8.8 oz.) TNT blocks which, although reported to have been buried in the jungle for several months, didn't have a speck of dirt on them. Czech and Russian military detonators (blasting caps) were found along with French and Canadian commercial ones. Of particular interest were several commercial electric dets that were very similar to a shipment of 5,000 factory rejects that federal law-enforcement sources maintained had been sold by a "Canadian explosives firm" to a "Middle Eastern client" a year earlier.





Along with the TNT was a score of waximpregnated, string-tied burlap bundles. Unmistakable products of KGB terroristtraining schools, they ranged in size from 3 to 5 kilos (and were carbon copies of improvised explosive devices I have encountered in Central America and Puerto Rico). These packages are designed to be long shelf-life, ready-to-use bombs.

leave the dying and the problem of insurgency to those in the trenches, those who are the main target for insurgent violence, especially threats and assassinations. Small wonder that the desire for rescue grows stronger.

For the moment, the leading candidate for "man on horseback" is former military chief of staff, army Lieutenant General Harold Bedoya. Summarily relieved by Samper in August 1997, he apparently had told the president one too many times what he thought of his

they have so few other options. Predictably, the insurgents, needing money to conduct their campaign, also become involved.

What has changed is that no longer are the insurgents content to take a cut of the action: They have gone into vertical integration in a big way, controlling an everincreasing portion of the action from top to bottom, from growing to distribution.

In comes Washington with its demands that the Colombians solve America's drug problems, that a cambusiness about such matters, we "decertified" them in February 1997, the practical consequence being to put on-hold much of our aid to Colombia (aid directly connected with anti-drug work continued). What irony: Corrupt Clinton government cuts off aid to corrupt Samper government.

"Growing Intensity Conflict"

Who are the foot soldiers? In the front lines, of what one Colombian general has called a "growing intensity conflict," are

"counterinsurgency" approach — which seemed to be little more than caving to rebel demands the military evacuate large areas of the country in exchange for unspecified concessions (which rarely, if ever, materialized). Now the general has emerged as leading contender in the presidential election to be held next year.

If he is elected, Bedoya would almost certainly bring a more focused approach to the struggle. He has stated so forcefully, simultaneously pointing out that there is no need for a relatively wealthy country such as Colombia (its GDP is U.S. \$172 billion) to be a narco-state, the source of 80% of the world's cocaine and 60% of the heroin seized in the U.S. Untouched by even a hint of drug corruption, he would certainly be more palatable to Washington than Samper.

For the moment, Washington remains both Colombia's greatest friend and enemy. As to the former, it is U.S. training (particularly at School of the Americas) and equipment (especially the Black Hawk helicopter) which has allowed the country to stay in the game militarily. Economically, we are Colombia's largest trade partner.

However, Washington's sole focus is upon Colombia's role in the drug trade. The poor peasants — the manpower — become involved in narcotics because

paign of eradication, principally from the air, be conducted to choke off the narco Ho Chi Minh Trail. Little else matters in this battle save acres of plants neutralized — a plant body count.

To the peasants, for whom the plants are a living, that means war. Their ready and willing protectors, naturally, are the insurgents.

This dynamic should be familiar to us: It is that we have witnessed in the other Andean countries, particularly in Peru. We place the insurgents in a winwin situation.

Further, whenever the conflict gets too intense, they trot out the predictable charges of human rights violations. And, like clockwork, the U.S. hammers the Colombians on that score, as well. Pity Bogota: Damned if they do; damned if they don't.

To show the Colombians we mean

178,726 military personnel and 108,300 policemen. They don't function under a unified counterinsurgency plan or command. Consequently, the war is left to local arrangements struck between elected regional and local officials (voters elect the governors of the country's 32 departments and the 1,072 municipalities, or counties, which comprise the departments), and the military.

It is the army that takes the lead—and in combat with the insurgents, though the police are taking a reported 80% of the casualties. Though fairly large by South American standards, the army is small when considered within the context of the war in which it is engaged. Further, the constitution "hollows out" the force, prohibiting the use of draftees in counterinsurgency. This is a legacy of the negotiations that brought the insurgent group M-19 into the legal political

fold and produced the 1991 Constitution. Hence only a fraction of the manpower on the books can actually be deployed.

Structurally, the army has five divisions, organized in standard triangular form (three brigades, three battalions). Additionally, there is an Aviation Brigade, a Special Forces Brigade, and two Mobile Brigades, the closest thing to a strategic reserve that exists.

In fact, there are actually two armies in Colombia. The bulk of the forces, some 75%, are draftees, or conscriptos. They enter between ages 16-18 and serve 18 months if non-high school grads, which most are; or 12 months if possessing a high school diploma. The first category is termed "regulars," a label that is generally applied to all conscriptos.

This can lead to misunderstandings, since the quarter of the army that is not draftees is termed "professionals;" a term which in English is generally synonymous with "regulars." The distinction in Colombia, however, is crucial, for professionals are regulars (conscriptos) who have decided to stay on when their time of compulsory service is over.

The difference between professionals and regulars is more than simply the pay: Constitutionally, it is the professionals who are to do the fighting.

The results are obvious: It's a very small army that is actually fighting the war. A typical brigade might have, for instance, as did the one with which I was deployed, three regular battalions in various states of service (newcomers will frequently be taken in by entire formation (e.g. a platoon), two counterinsurgency battalions (comprised of professionals), two military police battalions (for urban ops; these may or may not be professionals); a cavalry squadron (i.e. a battalion composed of regulars); and an aviation unit (professionals).

In our area of operations (AO), the regular battalions of all types were engaging in area domination. This at times involved shooting, but it was the professionals of the counterinsurgency battalions who were doing the bush pounding. It was the latter who also bore the brunt of casualties.

For the professionals, the bleeding is constant. Contacts are daily and frequently very close-in and intense, because night operations are the maneuver of choice for government patrols (indeed, virtually all patrols at the government's equivalent of Ranger School, Lancero, are conducted in the absence of daylight). Both sides are well-armed with modern firearms.

Four rifle squads will comprise a platoon, four platoons a company. There is no weapons platoon as in the U.S. force structure. Instead, each squad may carry a 60mm mortar, making for a total of as many as 16 tubes per company. Supplementing these are four 81mm mortars at battalion level (each battalion


is three rifle companies).

Troops themselves are separated into just three ranks: soldier, corporal, sergeant, with the corporals performing squad leadership functions. Officer ranks, in contrast, mirror their U.S. counterparts. Pay has recently been increased quite substantially, with how much an officer actually makes dependent upon his particular allowances.

What one finds on the ground is a military of surprising sophistication conducting the normal operations of counterinsurgency. These span the gamut from extensive psychological warfare to airmobile assaults with

accompanying gunships blazing.

The problems of the counterinsurgency campaign do not lie with the military, rather with the lack of an overall concept, of a plan. So vast are the distances involved, so harsh the conditions, ranging from urban sprawl to thick jungle, that the counterinsurgency battalions are performing yeoman duty, forced to be all things to all elements of the population. Prohibited by the constitution from fielding militias, their numbers are inadequate to the domination of an area of operations so extensive. And the police are frequently poorly armed, badly trained, and insufficiently motivated. The results are predictable —

the troops are spread very thin.

That such manpower has been able to prove itself in the difficult circumstances of the past decade stems in large part from a strong officer corps. Though small unit engagements are the essence of the counterinsurgency, officers have demonstrated the ability to deploy and maneuver division-size forces consisting of multiple arms (to include air).

Close With And Destroy

Anyone who has been on the ground with the Colombian forces knows that the problem of the counterinsurgency lies not with the military's approach, rather with that of the government. The army, as the lead agency in actual operations, wages a multifaceted campaign that places far more emphasis upon aspects of the combat spectrum such as psyops and intelligence, than it does actual fighting. Still, it does go after the Gs. It's not about to let them take over territory and terrorize the people.

Prior to the present decade, militia played a significant role in Colombian counterinsurgency. Naturally, some of them, in a world awash with drug money, became involved with the narcos. This placed them in opposition to the state, but their key enemies remained the insurgents.

When insurgents were brought into the political arena, one of the prices they demanded was for militia to be outlawed. It was a solution only a leftist could love, for it was based on typical communist logic: if the people rise up on our side, they're the good guys; if they rise up to defend the system, to take the government side, they're criminals. Forcing the military to divorce itself from popular mobilization guaranteed only that such would go on without any oversight.

This is just what has happened. For such is the approach of the insurgents, based as it is not upon popular mobilization but intimidation through terror, that desperation has long since given way to the proliferation of popular militia. Some, as in the Philippines, have committed abuses. These are the individuals who invariably make the news and are held up by human rights organizations to represent the whole. This is not the truth of the matter.

The criminals are the insurgents. At varying times, there have been many insurgent bodies active in Colombia. Today, there are two main groups: the Fuerzas Armadas Revolucionarias de Colombia (FARC), or Armed Revolutionary Forces of Colombia, the largest body; and the Ejercito Popular de Liberacion Nacional (ELN), or National Liberation Army. Still active but a distant third is the Ejercito Popular de Liberacion (EPL), or People's Liberation Army. These three loosely coordinate through an umbrella body, Coordinadora Nacional Guerrillera (CGN). It has no command authority.

The insurgents operate as "fronts" of up to 200 men. FARC and ELN further

divide fronts (their "battalions") into columns (a government "company") and then into companies (equivalent to a "platoon"). Companies are made up of cells. Above fronts are blocks, which answer to the national leadership.

There are apparently some 66 FARC fronts (7,500 men), 35 ELN fronts (3,000 men), and 13 EPL fronts (715 men). Both FARC and ELN assign their fronts to five blocks. Precise strength figures are, of course, lacking. What is important is that the groups, though they do not generally act in concert, do not normally compete with each other.

In such a vacuum, it is terror that is the essence of the insurgent approach. I was in Colombia in August 1997, because insurgents were trying vigorously to scuttle municipal elections scheduled for the end of October. By attacks and killings, they had forced some 1,000 candidates to withdraw completely, exactly the approach used by Sendero.

In a typical action, ELN, as the summer had begun, had moved into La Union, a prosperous farming community some three hours drive from Medellin, capital of Antioquia department. These were not the dispossessed rising up to throw off their shackles. They were outsiders come to wreak havoc.

An area unlike our image of Latin America, La Union, the town, has just 4,000 people; La Union, the municipality, has another 17,000. Responsible for law and order in this world of 21,000 people, electricity, good roads, and fertile soil (not to mention some impressive country homes of the well-to-do) were just 10 policemen.

The insurgent approach was standard: armed propaganda. When the peo-

ple resisted, the homes of the 11 families most central to popular resistance were attacked with explosives. Deaths numbered only a few, but terror did its job. The families fled, leaving the remainder of the populace leaderless. So spread out were the targets that the police could not have pre-empted even had they had perfect foreknowledge.


Two weeks before I arrived, a troop (company) of the 4th Mechanized Group (Juan de Corral), a cavalry squadron under command of the 4th Brigade in Medellin, had moved in. With its four platoons, it had not been difficult for the troop to dominate the area. Using a combination of foot and vehicular patrols, it restored security and confidence.

This was logical, because La Union, according to intelligence information, fell under the ELN's 12th Front (cuadrilla), Regional Luis Fernando Giraldo, of just 50 men.

Fifty men! Thus is the dynamic of terror revealed. Fifty men striking at times and places of their choosing could hold hostage a population of 21,000.

Most of the 12th Front's attacks continued to occur along the main transportation arteries. Much like vandals randomly throwing rocks at cars on California freeway, the insurgents would descend from the hills just long enough to destroy several vehicles, block the road, inflict casualties. Rarely did they remain in so much as an effort to ambush the inevitable government reac-

tion. For main roads allow the employment, among other things, of armored cars and the like — too much for the insurgents, regardless of their armament. But for an isolated police station or a defenseless populace, the insurgents had more than enough firepower.

Obviously, force multiplication is necessary in such a situation, force multiplication which can come only through the use of militia, which the constitution forbids.

There are ways around such a prohibition, but the Colombians seemed unaware of the manner in which, for instance, the Filipinos solved their similar problem by bringing militia within the force structure. They paid them, used regular personnel to officer them, and subjected them to military law during their time on duty. Thus they were "a part of" the military, not an external body.

Colombia will come to this solution, as well, for there is no other. Meantime,




not content to wait while they are brutalized, local and departmental authorities have already taken the initiative, recruiting their own militias. Some have provided them only with radios to summon help. In zones of serious contention, though, the militia are armed and engage in all-out slugging matches with the insurgents.

As indicated earlier, there is no reliable casualty count. Nevertheless, every day, in every AO, there is action at some level. La Union is a fairly central, settled, well-off area. Yet it has come to suffer the level of attack I have just indicated. The more remote an area, the less government presence, the more it falls

29 December 1996, Guatemala's government and leftist National Sevolutionary guerrilla coalition (URNG), signed peace accords officially ending 36 years of war. But that hasn't doused hostilities in Central America's most populated country (some 10.5 million inhabitants, about half of whom are Indian).

Riots, mob justice and an uncontrollable frenzy of murder, which reportedly claimed over 3,500 lives in 1996 alone (*double* New York City's total) have overwhelmed police.

If this violence weren't enough, there have been recent reports of camouflage-clad gunmen, believed to be recalcitrant remnants of the URNG, opening fire on soldiers and security forces in the northwest highlands. No casualties have yet been reported

and the URNG rejects the notion that these gunmen have ever belonged to its ranks.

Mayhem has gotten so bad that President Alvaro Arzu has ordered the army to patrol the streets as trime-busters, not a first tour for the military in this arena.

Crime Busters

But now the army has some potent backup: a new homegrown armored personnel carrier, the *Danto*. This twin machine-gunned APC will be added to the fleet of some 30 Guatemalan-manufactured Armadillos (see sidebar), 10 U.S.-made M-113s and seven V-100s.

A prototype designed by the Guatemalan army's War Material Service in 1994, the Danto is an example of ingenuity on a shoestring that has recently been approved for active-duty operational use. During several May visits to the War Material Service base in Guatemala City, *SOF* received an exclusive up-close look at the Danto. "We are at your service," said a proud Colonel Adan Arana, the base's XO, who introduced Captain Ricardo Valdez whom, along with his men, were happy to provide information on its armor-skinned ally.

Costing less, perhaps, than the estimated

\$75,000 per unit price tag of its predecessor, the Armadillo (a near look-alike of the American V-100), the Danto packs a lot of bang for the quetzal. This 6X6 APC sports a 290 hp Cummings engine and transmission, and can be outfitted with a Swiss-made Oerlikon 20mm automatic cannon housed in a manually operated *Hispano-Suiza* turret. It can reach a peak velocity of about 80 kilometers per hour, and, with a capacity to carry 108 gallons of diesel, has approximately 1,300 kilometers of road range.

A 10-wheeler, the Danto's M-54A2 5-ton chassis provides a sturdy base to carry a heavy load without sacrificing performance, which would be greatly reduced using a lighter chassis.

It has *three* live axles, as opposed to the Armadillo's two. Fifteen millimeters of

steel armor plating shield the floor against landmines; 8 inches of armor protect the hull. Nine, 2-inch thick polycarbonate windows (two forward, three on each lateral side, and one aft) also provide a significant measure of protection against small-arms fire.

Compartmentalized Design

Divided into distinct front, middle and rear compartments designed to minimize damage and casualties if penetrated by explo-

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Armadillo Combat

"We were almost always ambushed," said Guatemalan Lieutenant Selvyn Morales. It was no wonder. There was but a single dirt road leading to the Las Palmas army detachment, about 5 kilometers from the Mexican border, in northwest Guatemala.

Leftist guerrillas had plenty of strategic spots along the some 70 kilometers of tortuous road to hit army convoys. One of their favorites was a bend known as El Titulin where on a cool spring evening in 1991 the guerrillas packed the road with a terrifying surprise — 10 handmade landmines.

A life-or-death test was in store for Lt. Morales and his comrades, as their army convoy chugged in from Las Palmas in the silky moonlight. It would also be a test for Guatemala's War Material Service armory, and its new joy "toy", the Armadillo—a Guatemalan-manufactured armored personnel carrier similar to the American V-100.

One Armadillo led the column of troop trucks, another brought up the rear with two others interspersed within the convoy. It was fortuitous for the soldiers.

At 2100 hours, according to Morales, two powerful, simultaneous explosions rocked the darkness, thundering over the monotonous grumble of the convoy. Two mines had been electrically detonated, one squarely beneath the lead Armadillo, blowing it a foot in the air and into the crater left by the other blast.

Watching from the second Armadillo, Lt. Morales had no doubt the blasts would have destroyed a truck. He estimated they were produced by up to 10 pounds of explosives each. But the

Armadillo's 15-inch steel armored underbelly held, and none of the crew or other troops suffered serious wounds, the stocky 28year-old officer recalled. Morales's dark eyes flash as he recounts his story, thrusting his square jaw at each dramatic moment.

As the trucks sped ahead and out of the killing zone, the Armadillos slowed, then hunkered down, eager to get it on with the Gs. Pairs of electrically detonated mines exploded all around them, while a torrent of RPG projectiles whooshed at them.

KaaBoom ... KaaBoom! KaaBoom! One RPG nailed a truck, wounding a young troopie. The Armadillos went into their quick-reaction mode, their gunners manning roof-mounted .50-cal. heavy machine guns and 7.62 x 51mm FN MAG 58 machine guns, laying down return fire as guerrilla small-arms rounds skimmed off the 8mm hull armor.

Officers and EMs, crouching halfway exposed through front roof hatchways, provided support by popping loose with M-79 grenade launchers and Galil automatic rifles.

An RPG round cratered in just in front of Morales' vehicle's left front tire — but only jarring the formidable Armadillo.

After 30 minutes of sporadic fighting, the discouraged guerrillas fled, leaving behind blood trails and detonating wires hitched to car batteries. Friendly casualties? One WIA.

"The Armadillo is really good," exclaimed Morales, and is very useful for our rough terrain. It has power, The soldiers feel secure in the Armadillo; it gives them courage."

ost gunfights take place in subdued light or in the dark. Most defensive firearms training takes place in the daylight. Thunder Ranch, recognizing this dangerous disparity, each year schedules a

Low Light Level 2 handgun course which I and *SOF* staff photographer, Chris Mayer, recently completed. This was my third class at Thunder Ranch and, as usual, it was a high-speed, low-drag experience from start to finish.

Thunder Ranch's highly respected honcho, Clint Smith, is a Marine Corps veteran with two infantry tours in Vietnam. His experience includes seven years in law enforcement, during which time he served as head of his department's FTU (Firearms Training Unit), as well as the senior countersniper on the SWAT unit. He was Operations Officer for Jeff Cooper's API, started and served as director of Heckler & Koch's training services division and with his wife, Deborah, founded International Training Consultants, Inc., a highly regarded mobile training program.

Thunder Ranch has a guest staff of 28 instructors. The three who taught our Low Light course were representative of the impressive quality of Thunder Ranch's adjunct personnel. Bill McLennan retired from the San Antonio Police Department after more than 30 years of service, the last six and a half of which were spent as OIC of firearms training. McLennan's unflappable demeanor, dry wit and encyclopedic knowledge of gunfighting tactics were tremendous assets to the course. Bill Black, a 16year veteran of the Littleton, Colo., Police Department is a patrol supervisor and tactical team leader for his agency. His background complements that of McLennan and together they provided us with enough tactical information to fill several field manuals. They were more than ably assisted by Lori Hauserman, a police officer with 15 years' service with the Glendale, Ariz., Police Department. Lori is an armorer and firearms instructor responsible for training 275 law-enforcement personnel.

Thunder Ranch classes never contain more than 20 students, as that is the number of firing positions on each range. As a consequence, students get more than their money's worth, since there is none of the usual down time associated with firearms classes that must be run in relays. You can expect to fire about 2,000 rounds in one of Thunder Ranch's handgun courses.

Ultimate Fighting Handgun

The students in this class represented the usual cross-section of individuals that attend courses to hone their gunfighting skills. Eight of the 20 were law-enforcement personnel, two from as far away as Australia. The rest were men and women who realize that purchasing a firearm is only the smallest part of the self-defense equation.

Their mix of weapons provided revealing

Shooting In The Shadows At Thunder Ranch

information. There was one SIGARMS P226, six Glocks and 13 M1911-type pistols. Three of the Glocks were either G17 or G19 9mm Parabellums and two were chambered for the .40 S&W round, Most unusual was a police officer from the Clay County, Fla., Sheriff's Department who was armed with a Glock Model 20 caliber 10mm Auto pistol. His department is one of only a handful who issue Glocks in that caliber. However, there can be no doubt that the pistol Jeff Cooper popularized as the ultimate fighting handgun still reigns supreme. For all of its crankiness and the often extensive custom gunsmithing many variants require, the caliber .45 ACP M1911 is still perceived by most armed professionals in this country to be the handgun most likely to win the fight when drawn from leather by an experienced pistolero.

No small part of that perception is based upon confidence in the .45 ACP cartridge. Penetration is, without doubt, the single most important parameter in evaluating the wound ballistics performance of handgun ammunition. The bullet must penetrate deeply enough to crush, cut and break through the human body's vital structures and organs. However, once we've obtained the required penetration, the bullet that makes the biggest hole will do the most damage. It is largely because of this that the .45 ACP round remains the cartridge of choice among a substantial majority of armed professionals after more than eight decades.

I went through the course with a Kimber Custom Classic .45 ACP — without doubt the best production series M1911-type pistol ever assembled. I used a holster and magazine pouches made by the Hanson Leather Co. (Dept. SOF, 2724 N.W. Keel Ave., Lincoln City, OR 97367; phone: 541-994-8295). Ernie Hanson has 18 years' service with the Lincoln City, Oregon, Police Department and knows what is required of gear designed for slapping leather on the mean streets. He is also a guest instructor at Thunder Ranch.

Ernie made his first holster in 1978. For a period of time in the 1980s the famous George Lawrence Company of Portland, Ore., and then of Lillicut, N.C., made his holsters. As he packs a piece for a living, a great deal of personal experience goes into the Hanson designs. All of Hanson's holsters are individually made to order by hand out of Herman Oak leather, which is of exceptional quality. Stitching is done with harness needles using the two-needle back-and-forth method. After stitching, a handgun of the proper model is placed in the holster and it is once again wet-molded by hand for a perfect fit. Ernie applies Fiebings oil dyes and lacquer finishes to his completed holsters and pouches.

The holster I used was his H-1011, an off-duty vertical holster that can be used crossdraw or strongside and costs \$61. This holster features an internal steel tension lining at the bottom that maximizes the holster's retention qualities. Oil, black or brown finishes are available. Hanson also

makes single and double vertical magazine pouches, a horizontal magazine pouch, off-duty cuff cases and badge holders, an ankle rig with a magazine pouch, inside-the-waistband holster, cowboy holsters and belts. This is superb leatherwork, handcrafted in the most painstaking and fastidious manner. While as yet relatively unknown, Ernie Hanson must rank among the very top of the true custom holster makers.

Playing In The Dark

The morning of the first day of this fiveday class was spent in the classroom being exposed to the important concepts we were to apply during the next four and a half days on the square ranges and in the Terminator

and Tower. That afternoon found us on the Red Range, starting first with dry-fire practice and then with live-fire on the only stationary targets we would see for the rest of the week on that range.

At Thunder Ranch shooting a "Plan A" means firing at the torso, or the body's energy source, the number of shots determined by the threat. Firing a "Plan B" indicates a shot to the head — the body's computer, while a "Plan C" signifies the first two zones

plus shooting at the pelvis, which should affect your opponent's mobility. Clint Smith says, "Shoot what is available as long as it is available and until something else is available." At Thunder Ranch you shoot until you win or the threat stops. When moving targets stop, you cease fire, as they have either gone down or you have achieved compliance.

Obtaining verbal compliance is an important aspect of training at Thunder Ranch and is stressed continually. This is, without doubt, a consequence of the law-enforcement background of most of the staff. As my background is entirely from the military, where this concept is a non sequitur, I have a great deal of trouble verbally communicating with targets. Bill Black informed us on several occasions that expressions such as, "Oh God, don't make me kill again!" were not acceptable examples of verbal compliance.

The important difference between cover, which stops or deflects direct and indirect enemy fire, and concealment, which only prevents you from being observed is also heavily emphasized at Thunder Ranch. This is because Clint Smith strongly advocates fighting your way out of the so-called "hole" — a distance of about two arm lengths or approximately 6 feet — back to cover. Throughout the week we fired most often at the Red Range while moving back to barricade cover. At Thunder Ranch, the barricades on the ranges are used to simulate cover and not as a brace for firing a handgun.

The third element in Thunder Ranch's fighting triad is an assertion of the impor-

tance of team tactics. For example, magazine changes are preferably executed in conjunction with your partner, whose responsibility becomes covering your target as well as his. Most often, the shooter's commands will be something like, "cover" and then "clear" after he has changed magazines and is back in the fight, but any verbal sequence would work, providing it was agreed upon beforehand.

Three types of magazine changes are taught at Thunder Ranch. The first, and most important, is the so-called "empty magazine change" which is unique to this facility, but in my opinion presents the most realistic scenario. Traditionally, those in my loop are supposedly programmed to keep track of our shots and perform a tactical reload before the slide locks rearward after the last shot in the magazine sails downrange. It never happens this way in the real world. I have never been in a fire fight where anyone knew how many rounds he had fired. When the M16's bolt locks to the rear or the AK's trigger is pressed and nothing happens, you reload. There are too many insane things happening in a gunfight to count the bullets going downrange. So when the slide locks rearward, you dump the empty magazine, slam in the new one and press down on the slide lock lever with the thumb of the firing hand.

Still, if possible, it's better to load when you can — during a lull in the action — and not when you have to. This so-called "tactical load" is performed by first reaching with the weak hand for the new magazine. Move it up to the magazine-well between the index and middle fingers. Use the thumb and index finger to remove the hold magazine on the down stroke and insert the new magazine on the up stroke. The depleted magazine goes in your pocket, *not* to the ground.

The "expedited" or "speed" load is based upon a four count. First, the opposite hand goes to new magazine just before releasing the magazine in the pistol's magazine-well. Second, the flat back of the new magazine goes to the flat back of the magazine-well. Third, seat the new magazine half way into the well. And finally, seat the magazine completely with one sharp stroke, reinforce the firing grip, then "front sight and press," if required.

Most commonly, when practicing these drills, beginning students will release the magazine in the pistol *before* they have the new magazine firmly in hand. This is a potentially fatal error.

On Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of the Low Light course, the class commences at 1500 and ends at 2300. Tuesday afternoon we began work on the Red Range with malfunction drills.

How important are they? What are the chances you will have a stoppage during a gunfight? I don't know. Statistics on this topic have never been tabulated, except in an anecdotal fashion. I have experienced several "bolt-over-base" stoppages in M16 rifles at inappropriate times in El Salvador. Modern handguns, even Glocks and highly tuned 1911-types, can go down at any time and that's why so many who walk in harm's way carry backups.

Murphy's Malfunctions

The most common stoppage and easiest to clear is a failure to fire. This can be a result of either an empty chamber due to an improperly seated magazine or a defective or hard-cupped primer. One prominent gun writer has advised his faithful myrmidons to pull the trigger again if they have a double-action pistol. This is typical of the bad advice that so often fills the pages of the popular gun press. If the primer is defective, pulling the trigger again will only provide your opponent with more time to send missiles downrange at you.

The correct response is the so-called "tap, rack, bang" sequence. This simply involves slapping the bottom of the magazine to certify that it is properly seated, racking the slide and pulling the trigger. All of this should be accomplished with your eyes and the pistol on the target.

A "stovepipe" stoppage can be caused by problems with ammunition, extractors, ejectors or recoil springs, or even "limpwristing." Clearing this kind of malfunction is almost identical to the procedure used to overcome a failure to fire. After the magazine has been tapped to assure its proper seating, a horse-shoe-shaped swipe to the rear is used to wipe the empty case away while racking the slide. Then, fire if required.

The most severe stoppage you can encounter with a semiautomatic pistol is one variation or another of the so-called "double feed." In my experience, the most common stoppage of this type is not actually a double feed, but a round which stubs on the feed ramp, driving the bullet back into the case with a consequent failure to chamber the round. If at all possible, I would transition to a backup handgun if this occurred, as this malfunction takes the longest time to clear. After first observing what has gone wrong, you must lock the






slide rearward, remove the magazine, rack the slide at least, insert the magazine and then tap, rack, bang. Even a J-frame in an ankle holster is faster to access than performing a double feed drill.

Firing from the "retention" position is also covered in Level 2 handgun courses at Thunder Ranch. Used only at contact ranges, the handgun is held in line with the pectoral, with the wrist locked and the firing hand held tightly against the body. Special emphasis was placed on holding the support arm upright and tucked tightly into the body to plug the gap in your body armor under the arm pit and to present the "hard" or bony part of the support arm to your opponent's blows or an edged weapon. The fingers of the support arm should be kept open and spread apart so your view is not obstructed. As always, after firing from this position you must get out of hole quickly while continuing to throw lead into your opponent.

By nightfall, we were ready to begin working with our flashlights. Every student in the class was equipped with a SURE-FIRE unit manufactured by Laser Products (Dept.

Light Up The Night

The switch used on the hand-held SURE-FIRE 6P series is quite simple. Push on the neoprene diaphragm in the middle of the tail cap, and the light comes on. Stop pushing and the light goes off. Rotate the tail cap until it's tight, and the light stays on. Unscrew it a bit and the light goes off. These flashlights are most often employed with the so-called "Harries Flashlight Technique." This technique requires the support hand to control the light without providing the customary isometric pull associated with the standard Weaver position. A variation of the Harries method is the "Chapman" technique, which was developed for flashlights with a button switch near the head. Using this technique, the light is held on the opposite side of the handgun from that used with the Harries method. Another technique that was demonstrated is the "FBI" method which involves holding the light above your head and forward of the body. It can be used for looking over fences or other obstacles or glimpsing into vehicles.

However most of us had the now prevalent SURE-FIRE Model 6Z COMBAT-LIGHT. It has a smaller diameter body just in back of the head and two neoprene rings around the rear of this portion of the body that in conjunction with the neoprene diaphragm in the tail cap permit the unit to be used like a "syringe" that puts the support hand back in more or less the standard Weaver position.

Each technique was practiced by shooting at wobbler targets. At first we turned on the light, fired, turned the light off and then moved: right, left or out of the hole. But, we also fired sequences with the light kept on to illuminate the target during movement. We also fired without use of the flashlight to demonstrate that muzzle flash will not totally blind you. However, Bill Black informed us at this time that firing a pistol with a muzzle compensator while dressed in a polyester leisure suit would probably turn you into a 6-foot road flare.

Several of the students had pistols fitted with self-luminous tritium night sights. They can be useful, but they have their limitations. Self-luminous tritium sights do not assist target discrimination in total darkness. Furthermore, when a flashlight is used, light reflecting off the target downrange is sufficient to back light the weapon's sights and permit proper sight alignment. However, when goblins are shooting at you in almost total darkness their muzzle flash identifies them and self-luminous night sights can be used in lieu of a flashlight with great effect.

I prefer the tritium night sights manufac-

THUNDER RANCH: A World-Class Facility

The Thunder Ranch Training Facility (Dept. SOF, HCR 1, Box 53, Mountain Home, TX 78058; phone: 210-640-3138; fax: 210-640-3183), which opened in 1993, is located 96 miles west of San Antonio, and 46 miles to the east of Kerrville in the rolling-hills karst topography of southern Texas on 2,400 acres. This region, once known principally for Texas Longhorn cattle, is now a center for exotic game ranches.

Thunder Ranch's physical plant is world-class throughout. There are four ranges. Both the Red Range and Orange Range are 50x50-yard square ranges. Red Range is the base range for all handgun-related classes. This 20-position range has turning, stationary, wobbler and interface target potential with "cover" structures when required. While the Orange Range also has stationary and wobbler target potential, its most prominent facets include a unique "charger" system that represents threats closing quickly on the student. In addition, it also has a two- or four-target setup for high-speed lateral running targets with an 80-foot range of operation. The Yellow Range measures 50x100 yards and has IPSC body-style armored and disc-type resetting targets. The target options include steel, paper, hostage, stationary, wobbler and movers. This 20-position range is the base range for preliminary work in shotgun and some pistol courses. Also holding 20 positions, the 50x100-yard White Range has stationary, wobbler and high-speed turning targets available. Its numerous barricades represent protective cover and/or concealment. The twosection Black Range has a 20-position conventional rifle range in 100-yard increments out to 300 yards. The other portion is a field range for target engagements from 400 to 1,200 yards for both known and unknown distance applications.

The most visually impressive facilities at Thunder Ranch are the Tower, Thunderville and the infamous Terminator. The Tower is a monolithic four-story structure with its own tactical simulator that permits live fire in all rooms and stairwells. Problems of both internal and external entry can be addressed. The stairwells vary in dimensions and geometry. All of the window ports can be plugged. Students in the Countersniper classes fire from the Tower. Thunderville is an elaborate, day or night, in-depth facade over 200-feet in length representing a two-sided street setting. It's used in all of the rifle programs that present dynamic scenarios. With over 60 target options, as well as movers, hostages, runners and wobblers, Thunderville features computer-controlled lighting, doors, movement, timing and hit documentation. This simulator has been designed to test decision-making and target identification under maximum stress. The Terminator, used in handgun, shotgun and rifle courses, can simulate home, motel or office environments with over 400 floor plan options and targets that emphasize identification and selection prior to engagement. This building is covered by a free-span roof for training under all lighting or weather conditions.

Friday, 5 January 1996, the telephone rang at 0830 and Osama Hamed picked up. The caller was his uncle, Kamel, and he asked his nephew why the cellular phone he had given him, number 050-507497, was off. He went on to say that he had given the

number to a very important client and that he wanted the line kept open in case the client called. Osama promised his uncle that he would activate the phone immediately and make certain that it remained operational.

A few minutes later, when Osama tried to phone out on his regular phone, the line was dead, a routine occurrence in Beit Lahiya. Around 0900, the cellular phone rang, but it was not the uncle's client. Instead, the call was for Osama's tenant, Yehiya Ayyash, the second-floor fugitive.

Osama took the phone to Ayyash and told him that his father, Abed allateef Ayyash, phoning from Rafat, on the West Bank, was ringing him.

According to Osama, "I gave Yehiya the phone and heard him asking his father about his health. I left the room to leave him alone. Five minutes later I returned, believing that he had finished his call. I saw Yehiya lying on the floor covered in blood. He had no head."

What had happened while Osama was out of the room is that the line went dead. Ayyash apparently kept the phone to his ear, thinking it was just a temporary disruption. There was a flash and a muffled boom. A portion of Ayyash's head was vaporized in a bloody cloud of gore.

The Israelis had placed 50 grams of the Czech plastic explosive, *Semtex*, inside the phone. The device was activated by an electronic signal transmitted from a silent drone aircraft flying

Hunting human beings is tough business, especially when your prey is smart, elusive, and paranoid. Few times in their history have the Israelis confronted a more difficult challenge than to kill Yehiya Ayyash, known as "the Engineer," the master bomb-builder of the Islamic terrorist group Hamas.

2,000 feet overhead.

Ever paranoid about his own security, Ayyash had taken apart the cellular phone on a number of occasions, fearing exactly the kind of attack that ultimately cost him his life. Whenever he heard a plane or a helicopter flying overhead he turned off

his cellular phone and disconnected his regular phone.

This was not the first time that one of Israel's enemies had succumbed courtesy of a lethal cell phone. In 1973, Dr. Mahmoud Hamshari, Black September's number-two man in France, picked up the phone in his flat. The caller asked if he was speaking with Dr. Hamshari. When assured by Hamshari that it was he, the caller activated a high-pitched tone that set off a powerful shrapnel-filled bomb secreted beneath Hamshari's phone stand. Hamshari breathed his last a few days later in a Paris hospital.

Shin Bet refused to confirm or deny that it had any role in Ayyash's death, however, a high-ranking official of the agency told the authors that, "'The Engineer' encountered an even better engineer, who works for us. He lived by the bomb and died by the bomb."

Aftermath

Following the assassination, the Palestinian National Authority issued special restrictions limiting the use of cellular phones, which are very popular among those who can afford them because of the often-sporadic regular phone service. According to the new regulations, no cellular phones are permitted in the immediate vicinity of the PNA's president, Yasir Arafat. A cellular phone owner who wants to visit Arafat at his home or headquarters must now check his phone, along with any weapons, with the guards. The guards store the phones in steel boxes until they are reclaimed by their owners.

Mossad Gives Terrorist Mastermind An Ear Full Of Ordnance

His father, Abed Alateef Ayyash, on his cell phone days after his son's demise, perhaps firming arrangements for his son's "star" on Hamas' "walk of shame."

According to Sacri Iyd, the chief executive officer of the company that provides cellular phone service in the Gaza Strip, he was interrogated by the Palestinian police for many hours after "the Engineer's" death. "They asked many questions," recalls Iyd, "regarding how the system works and how easy would it be to hide explosives inside a phone." Interestingly, few people canceled their phone service after the attack. As a footnote, a cellular phone owner was stopped by a Palestinian policeman as he attempted to enter the local court house in Gaza a few days later. He dutifully handed his phone to the policeman, but when the officer realized what it was he threw it away and dived for cover.

The Legacy Of Dread

Hamas is an Arabic acronym for Islamic Resistance Movement, an organization that came into being in 1988, as an alternative to the PLO. By contrast to Yasir Arafat's relatively secular world outlook, Hamas seeks to supplant Israel with an Islamic state. In this connection, it is part of the larger radical Islamic revolution sweeping the Muslim world, which looks to Iran as its source of inspiration and support. Iran and Saudi Arabia are believed to be the two largest financial backers of the organization, and Hamas also receives training, weapons, and explosives from Iran.

Ironically, Israel bears some of the blame for the rise of Hamas, since Jerusalem gave support to the organization in its infancy as a counterweight to the PLO, a way of putting pressure on Arafat. By 1994, however, Hamas had become a Frankenstein's monster, and had eclipsed the PLO as Israelis chief internal enemy.

Israel also can be faulted for its past support of Iran, Hamas's chief protector and patron. Israel, for example, provided secret assistance to Iran during the protracted Iran-Iraq War in the 1980s, on the theory that the longer the war went on the more it weakened and distracted two of the Jewish nation's most implacable enemies. Indeed, thousands of Iranians charged Iraqi positions during the war carrying, in their pockets, small plastic "keys to Paradise" - made in Israel.

The Israeli pullout from the main Palestinian-dominated cities, and the complete removal of Israeli symbols of authority, shocked Hamas, which had argued that it would never happen. The subsequent Palestinian elections also were a major setback for Hamas, since 85% of those eligible to cast ballots did so, in defiance of a Hamas boycott. Arafat and his allied candidates received nearly all of the vote.

As Arafat gained in legitimacy, Hamas was increasingly marginalized which led to a major schism within the organization. Hamas leaders in Gaza favored cooperation

with the Palestinian National Authority, but this was opposed by those on the West Bank and in other countries who hoped that they could bomb the Labor Party out of office and bring hardliner Benjamin Netanyahu and his Likud party to power. Netanyahu, it was felt, would subvert the peace process with his support of Israeli settlers on the West Bank and his advocacy of security requirements that ran counter to Palestinian aspirations for an independent state.

No About Face

Beginning in 1989, Hamas launched a series of major attacks on Israeli targets. On 6 July, a Hamas supporter grabbed the wheel of an Israeli bus and steered it into a deep ravine killing 16 passengers and injuring 26. Two women were killed in a Hamas attack on a commuter bus on 1 July 1 1993, and on 6 April 1994, a Hamas suicide bomber killed eight people in the town of Afula. A week

unarmed civilians is hardly a noble deed.

later, five more Israelis were killed in the town of Hadera by a suicide bomber. A bomb aboard a bus shattered Tel Aviv's central business district, killing 20 people in October 1994. In the weeks leading up to Israel's last election, nearly 70 people died and a hundred were injured in four separate Hamas bombings in both Jerusalem and Tel Aviv. The bombings undermined the credibility of the government of Prime Minister Shimon Peres and ultimately contributed to Natanyahu's victory at the polls.

The Quarry

The terrorist mastermind behind the attacks was Yehiya Ayash, the architect and builder of bombs and overseer of the recruitment of the suicide drivers who wheeled explosive-ladened vehicles to their targets.

Yehiya Abed al-Latif Satti Ayyash was born in 1966 to Abed allateef and his wife, Lysha, in Rafat, a small and peaceful village, university shut down by order of the Israeli military governor.

When Ayyash was enrolled at Bir Zeit, Hamas and Islamic Jihad had replaced the older, more established Palestinian organizations as the chief magnets for campus radicals. Hamas representatives described how they had driven the Israelis out of Lebanon with their car bombs and other acts of terror, and announced that they would attack Israelis and "torch the ground beneath their feet."

It didn't take long before Ayyash entered the ranks of Hamas and busied himself preparing bombs aimed at the hated Israeli enemy.

As his involvement intensified, Ayyash became more and more secretive and paranoid. He withdrew from almost all social contact, and trusted few people but his wife and father. He never met any of the individuals who ferried his bombs to suicide missions, but used a series of cutouts to ensure that he was several steps removed from

each action. He rarely ever set up a meeting in advance, and never accepted a meeting site or time chosen by anyone else.

Unpredictability became his watchword. When he wanted to speak with someone, he always sought out the person on his own terms. If one of his associates was arrested, he changed every aspect of his plans and operations, down to the last detail.

He utilized Israeli identity cards, and generally dressed as an ordinary Israeli. He drove a van plastered with Likud and other political stickers typical of West Bank settlers. He carried a loaded pistol, which he, himself, had stolen.

As time went by, the mysterious and elusive "Engineer" became a Palestinian folk hero, who seemed able to run rings around the Shin Bet and always stay one step ahead of his pursuers. But the months on the run gradually took their toll and he opted to relocate his base of operations to the densely settled Gaza Strip, a rabbit warren of unmarked houses and unnamed streets where he felt it would be far more difficult for the Israelis to come after him.

This proved, however, to be his undoing. He underestimated his adversaries; it was a mistake the Israelis would not make.

Profile of a Suicide Bomber

Potential Hamas suicide bombers used in Ayyash's operations against Israel were generally recruited, or at least identified, by the Imam at his mosque. The average bomber was a young male, single, between the ages of 17 and 26. Most hailed from poor families in small villages or squalid refugee camps. Usually they were at some time pupils at religious schools or universities.

Then, as today, many suicide bombers had experienced traumatic encounters with Israeli soldiers or other authority figures. Iman Radi, for example, who blew himself up on 25 December 1994, was haunted by



which clings to the barren slopes of Samaria, that has seen considerable growth over the past two decades. Even during the Intifada, few residents participated in the uprising or even paid much attention to it. Most of the inhabitants of Rafat are small farmers, content to eke out a living tilling the soil.

The Ayyash family was the most prominent in the village, and Yehiya had two younger brothers, Mareen and Yunes. He is remembered as an outstanding student at the village school, ambitious and full of energy. When he completed high school in 1988, he entered Bir Zeit University to study chemistry.

Bir Zeit, the oldest Palestinian university on the West Bank, was, during the 1960s and 1970s, a volatile hotbed of radical politics and rabid support for the PLO and the PFLP. Because of the politicization of the faculty and students, and the constant demonstrations that seemed almost a part of the curriculum, Bir Zeit was frequently closed down by the Israeli authorities whom, for *years* during the '70s, kept the

myself crushed in the back seat of a special-police cruiser stalking a target: a known Chechen car thief. There was no *NYPD Blue*-like excitement to this operation, just the slow passage of time marked by overstuffed ashtrays and foul-tasting lukewarm tea. Stakeouts, I discovered, can be mind-numbing. My left leg went to sleep for the second time in as many hours.

Then the radio came to life with rapid-fire Russian cop talk. The target was making his move.

Quicker than you could say Ivan Strashniy ("Ivan the Terrible"), our

Lada squad car screeched forward in the direction of a mini-van that was turning a corner not 50 meters in front of us. In a blur of motion, another car containing the second team slid in front of the van, halting it.

Doors opened and officers in military-style cammies and helmets dashed to the van. Semiauto pistols and bulletproof shields stabbed at the van's front and side doors — both of which were nearly torn off their hinges. Then the suspect came tumbling out and was hurled at the pavement. Then came his companion, similarly treated.

There were no niceties, no Miranda warning, just the sound of handcuffs being ratcheted tightly. The suspect, a young man wearing a tank-top shirt and jogging pants, spat a few obscenities at the *OMON* troops just before he was unceremoniously pushed into the back of a third patrol car and sent downtown for processing.

"That's how we deal with our crooks here," explained Deputy Commander Vitaliy Borisovitch Kiyko. "Not like your FBI." He had heard and read things about law enforcement in the United States.

"Why did they let those blacks destroy Los Angeles?" Kiyko continued, bluntly, about some widely publicized riots following a controversial trial verdict. "And look at what happened with that [Feb. '97] bank robbery: The police had to borrow guns. That wouldn't happen here."

Kiyko might be right. With a population of approximately 8 million, Moscow is well policed and still enjoys — excepting Russian "Mafia"-related violence — a relatively low crime rate. Law enforcement here

is not hog-tied by laws protecting criminals and citizens alike, nor does the average officer fear having to go before a review board to explain his or her excessive behavior.

The various law-enforcement agencies in Moscow altogether have nearly 100,000 men and women in uniform. Two thousand of them are of OMON, the *Otryad Militsii Osobovo Naznacheniya*: "Police Special Assignment Group."

OMON troops, like their American SWAT counterparts, act as the police department's muscle. When a bank robbery or hostage situation erupts, it's OMON that is entrusted with the task of ending things safely. The troops are hand-picked, highly trained, and are outfitted with the latest equipment and Russian weaponry. Unlike many of their counterparts in today's Russian armed forces, OMON troops don't lack in esprit de corps.

Bad Boys, Bad Boys ...

Back at OMON barracks, a crew from Russia's Cops-style TV show joined us in

Kiyko's office. Over the requisite shots of vodka and humorous toasts calling for "Death to Yankee imperialism," Kiyko and the crew hashed out plans for a series of complicated training exercises the following morning at OMON's "terror town" facility.

The highly animated, 44-year-old Kiyko comes across as a cop's cop.

A 10-year veteran, Kiyko's hard-biting Russian wit and love for anything to do with law enforcement quickly earned him the respect of his men and the coveted job of OMON's deputy commander. "I started out as an immigration officer with the KGB," Kiyko said. "I then went on to the juvenile-crimes division before joining up with OMON."

During a 12-month stint in Chechnya, however, Kiyko, then commanding a Ministry of Interior military-police company, got his wings clipped and found himself branded a troublemaker and media hog.

"I was too much for those old men," Kiyko said, referring to his higher-ups. "They couldn't stand that a lower-ranking officer like me could be on TV and in the news. I got too big for my shoes, they said."

Once back in Moscow, Kiyko worked overtime to shed some of his bad-boy image. Through the *fraternity* of Ukrainian officers serving in the Russian uniformed services, he channeled his way up the ladder and soon was offered the position of deputy commander.

"I don't like to sit behind a desk all day," Kiyko said. "I like to get out with my men and work with them. They respect that."

"Look, later this afternoon, some of my men will be providing security at a *Spartak* [Moscow soccer club] football match," said Kiyko. "You and Tamara [*SOF*'s translator] should meet them at the entrance at 1630."

Soccer Hooligans

Unlike American-football games, football matches in Europe can attract a decidedly lower class of fans, many with extreme political views and a propensity towards violence. Whether in Britain or Russia, if you're a cop on this beat, it can be tough work. And for this correspondent, this Moscow match could be an ideal opportunity to get up-close and personal with a bunch of riot-baton wielding OMON troops thumping on Russian skinheads.

I wasn't disappointed. Not five minutes after placing myself safely behind the cordon of cops and OMON frisking every single fan entering the stadium, a scuffle broke out between a plainclothes Moscow police officer and three "neo-Nazis" who claimed their meter-long pine logs were not weapons but *canes* needed to aid their injured legs.

"Ivankovich and Ageyeva — get over

there and give him a hand," yelled Lieutenant Boris Avremenko, OMON's senior officer on site. "Use gas if you have to!"

Both OMON men waded into the growing melee. With the aid of three patrolmen, they dragged the three thugs to a police bus for a quick beating and a formal arrest.

Soon the bus was filled with another 15 or 20 other troublemakers or *khooligany*, as the OMON called them. All had been busted trying to sneak past security with some sort of weapon, or were on a list of known troublemakers.

On the other side of the stadium, though, more serious trouble had broken out: An OMON officer and a gang of fans got into a full-blown tug-of-war over a Nazi flag and a nail-studded club. The fans were arrested, but from what we could learn the OMON man suffered serious leg injuries and was taken to the hospital.

"We take all kinds of abuse for little money," said Avremenko. "The average OMON officer only gets about [the equivalent of] \$250 a month. That's not much if you get hurt like that officer. Many of us have to work two jobs. I do a little plumbing on the side. My wife holds two jobs, too."

From Bust To Bang

Moscow was celebrating its 850th anniversary. The city never looked better. The streets had been scrubbed clean of prostitutes, drug pushers, and the homeless.

Two British friends of mine were using the occasion to throw a monster party at their \$3,000-a-month apartment overlooking the Moscow River. I needed the break. The weekend before our visit to OMON, I had tried to squeeze a story out of the Moscow air show. It had been a bust.

Every major military-aircraft manufacturer in the world had descended on the Russian capital for a week-long marketing fest. But after two days of pounding the tarmac, I had come up empty. Our contacts at the Sukhoi Design Bureau Aviation Scientific-Industrial Complex, manufacturers of the front-line Su-27, Su-33 and Su-37 warplanes, turned out to be of no help. While dozens of 10-year-old kids sat in cockpits playing with the latest in Russian-made heads-up technology, the SOF (American edition) correspondent had to settle for excuses and a pounding headache. Thankfully, Tamara the translator's persistence and powers of persuasion

got us connected with OMON, and that story was a "go."

On our second day with the special police troops, we arrived as scheduled at the barracks housing Deputy Commander Kiyko's office. There he sat, wearing a crisp uniform, under two spot lights, answering a series of softball questions from the correspondent from the TV show. Outside, about 15 OMON troops were smoking cigarettes and preparing themselves and their equipment for a series of rappelling and entry exercises.

"Gee, where are the blank rounds?" I asked one of the team leaders,

"Sorry, we don't use blanks," he nonchalantly replied. "We always practice with live ammunition."

"Chambered?" I asked.

"It depends," he said. "If we're practicing an entry with 'bandits' and targets then yes — we chamber a round. It has to be as realistic as possible."

I watched the OMON team members load their magazines with round after live round. Maybe the TV crew would get more action than they bargained for.

Getting It On Film

The OMON "terror town" wasn't what I

der holster. Two identical, beige Lada squad cars pulled up. Kiyko got into the front seat of the second car, while six other OMON troops divided themselves up between the two cars.

On Kiyko's order, the OMON spilled out of the cars in well-practiced motion. One trooper dropped to a knee and aimed a Kalashnikov rifle to give covering fire while everyone else ran toward the fictive target. It probably looked very good on film.

Snapping gum and smirking over his ability to still keep up with OMON half his age, Kiyko walked back to the camera crew and pointed at the top of a garage behind us. "See, while you were shooting us, I had my best shot shooting you,' Kiyko said. He pointed at an OMON sniper behind an air vent. The barrel of a 7.62mmx54R SVD sniper rifle was barely visible, and pointed at us. The Russian sense of humor just kills me.

"When I think back to some of the more interesting operations we've mounted," Kiyko mused later that afternoon over vodka, "I'd have to say the most satisfying was the [Russian] White House siege." That event occurred early in President Yeltsin's administration.

"We really felt like we were fighting for something real," Kiyko continued. "Not like Chechnya. Crushing the coup [attempted in 1993] was for Russia."

"I'm not a lover of guns and blood," Kiyko concluded. "I take my job seriously. I am entrusted to keep peace, but criminals shouldn't come to Moscow and think they'll have an easy time with me."

had imagined. It instead turned out to be the rear of an actual dormitory and the adjacent abandoned buildings. One TV camera crew had set up in the "target" room and another was walking back and forth filming the OMON men prepping themselves.

An OMON team, in full "dynamic entry" gear, was now rappelling down the face of the building toward the target room. Window by window they descended, then safely positioned themselves outside the target window. On command, they swung in one after another and opened fire.

"Cut," yelled the TV producer in Russian. "Could we please do that again? This time I'd like the officer with the assault rifle to wait a second longer before shooting the target. It'll give our cameraman an extra few seconds of footage."

Time and time again, the OMON went through the paces for the cameras. Finally, after getting that right, a second team of OMON assaulted the room from the ground using a pole and ladder to gain entry.

'Someone has got to be a star," Kiyko chimed in from behind me. "I'm going to show everyone how we grab a suspect from

a speeding car."

Kiyko then asked one of his guys for his service pistol. He let the magazine slide out, checked it, pushed it back in, checked the safety, and put the pistol into his shoul-

SOF Tracks Hezbollah In Beirut

was a chilling display, and they played it time and again on Syrian television. The opening gambit showed a Hezbollah guerrilla group on operations somewhere in southern Lebanon in the Israel-declared Security Zone. The group of four or five hirsute soldiers, clutching M16s and wearing Hezbollah's distinctive black uniform, had taken a position on a small knoll. Below, standing alone and unescorted - which was unusual, for this was a war zone that had been tested often enough by opposing forces in recent months - was an American-built M113 armored personnel carrier. It had no markings, though its light-gray color indicated its origins: Israeli Defense Force (IDF).

The cameraman, a little unsteady at times, moved to the left of another man preparing a device. Suddenly there was a blast. In a blink of an eye, a round ball of fire hurtled toward the APC in a slight clockwise rotation. The gunner, peering through sights, carefully worked a control stick, directing the antitank missile via wire guidance. Seconds later, the armored vehicle exploded in a sheet of flame.

I eventually was able to establish that four or five Israeli soldiers had died. A Hezbollah man I spoke to later wasn't sure. "We never really know. The Zionist enemy always lies about these," he said and spat into the dust at his feet.

On several earlier visits to this Levantine theater of operations, I had observed Hezbollah's preference for a weapon that had long been obsolete.

Time and again U.N. and other opera-

tional reports spoke of "Sagger" missiles being fired at Israeli or South Lebanon Army (SLA) positions or patrols. There seemed to be no end to the availability of the weapon. Hezbollah appeared to have thousands of them: a Soviet-designed high-explosive, manually commanded, antitank missile that delivers 6 pounds of explosive to a target at almost 400 feet per second and with penetration of about 18 inches of steel. The range is 1,600 to 2,000 meters. The Sagger has the charming nickname of *Malyutka*, Russian for "little one."

I discovered during my visit to Beirut in September this year that the Sagger missiles deployed by Hezbollah cadres against the Israelis and their surrogates are *not* the weapon left over from the Soviet Union. It is an Iranian derivative, manufactured in Tehran by the Shahid Shah Abady Industrial Group.

The Iranian "Sagger" is essentially the same as the Soviet missile down to the waterproof case that floats and forms the base for the launcher. As with the original version, a well-trained crew can launch two missiles a minute through an eight-power sight and guidance system.

During an earlier visit to an Israeli border position ("Road Killers," April '97 SOF), the youthful IDF lieutenant who escorted me about the base admitted that twice he had come under Sagger fire. He didn't know whether they were the Soviet Malyutkas or those made in Iran.

"It didn't matter. It was mind-blowing: When you see this ball of fire coming at

you, you're transfixed. It's almost like being under a spell. You just know that someone's going to die. But on both occasions, it just wasn't my turn," he said quietly, with an American accent. His family had done their Aliya to the Promised Land from Michigan when he was still in junior high school.

Not In Our Interests ...

Recent events in the Middle East had prompted me to return to Lebanon in early August. The Israeli border had again become porous to *Katyusha* rockets and, for a while it looked as if we were to see a repeat of last year's Operation Grapes of Wrath, the Israeli military's retaliation against guerrilla activity in southern Lebanon. Even now, that scenario cannot be ruled out.

Customarily, I enter Lebanon through Israeli lines, either at Rosh Haniqra at the coast or at Metulla, on Israel's northern border in an rugged area locals refer to as the "highlands" of Upper Galilee. Accordingly, I made a formal approach to the Israeli Embassy in Washington to do so. When officials there asked why, I told them that I hoped to meet up with the "Party of God" (Hezbollah).

"No way," said Major General Yoran Yair, the (then) Israeli military attaché. "You are intending to visit with Hezbollah. It is neither in our interests or yours to bring you through our defenses. What do you think Hezbollah would do to you if they discovered you had come to Beirut directly from Jerusalem and with the help of the IDF?"

The general had a point. So I came to Lebanon by air from Cyprus.

I took the usual step of notifying the British Embassy that I was in Beirut. When I asked Larry Bond, one of the senior diplomats there, about the guerrilla group, he suggested that I try elsewhere. He couldn't — or wouldn't — heIp me. "We have no contact with those people and for very good reason — which I don't need to explain to you," he said.

I seemed to be drawing a lot of blanks.

Not For Tourists

Media contact with Hezbollah is always tenuous. In my case it was an adventure: I could hardly tell Tehran-backed fundamentalist organization that I was representing the American Soldier Of Fortune magazine. I said, honestly, that I was a correspondent with the European International Defense Review (IDR).

Though Hezbollah is unofficially head-quartered in Beirut, the movement has no fixed address. It is not listed in any directory. On inquiry, those asking are usually directed towards what is termed the organization's Central Information Office in Beirut's southern Harek Horeik suburb. But even this address (in the street of the Martyr Ragheb Harb, who had been killed in an Israeli rocket attack) is reached only after following numerous false leads. Hezbollah, someone else said, uses this time and confusion to find out exactly who is this person: a legitimate journalist, or spy for Israel's Mossad or the CIA?

At one stage, my driver, having been wrongly directed by a group of women (all of them wearing the *routay* scarf, as is the custom in many of the poorer Moslem societies) ended up in the approaches to what obviously was one of Hezbollah's complexes. We were challenged by black-clad guerrillas with Ml6s. After questions, they directed us to a building at the other end of the block. We got nowhere.

It was interesting that while we were there, a black seven-series BMW, accompanied by more black-uniformed guards, roared out into the road past us. We had almost entered the lion's den.

I had noted the changes getting there from built-up central Beirut. They were subtle at first, but became more marked the farther we traveled south. The middle-class areas that we passed through gradually yielded to a bleak zone of rutted streets and overcrowded poverty. The tank tops and shorts of the women that are everywhere along the Corniche in the summer heat soon were supplanted by garments that covered every part of the female body except the hands and face.

The stares that we got became sullen and suspicious. This was not a part of Lebanon usually frequented by tourists. I quickly realized that it also was a part of town that, for several years, had played host to a variety of Western hostages, many of them journalists. I had been told only the night before in the Wild Geese Pub (in the former

Christian sector) that one of the U.N. Irish Battalion men had been kidnapped by a group of fundamentalists. He had been released after a day, though. His problems, apparently, were of his own making: You don't mess around here with Lebanese women, boy.

It had not been easy getting this far. Everywhere I went, I seemed to be met by

strong and fit men with neatly trimmed beards, the hallmark of Hezbollah's converts.

Hezbollah's Spin Doctor

As the days passed there seemed to be more and more of them. Some appeared to be just lounging about whatever route I took. When I thought I was surrounded by them on my evening walks along the Corniche, that beautiful stretch of built-up waterfront in West Beirut which is still the hub of Lebanon's Islamic society, I then realized I was being paranoid: They just like dark clothes and beards in the Eastern Mediterranean.

Eventually, through a contact within the Lebanese Army, I was able to speak with Ibrahim Moussawi, spokesman for Hezbollah and a national media figure in Lebanon who often appears on television, including Hezbollah's own El Manaar station. A charming, amiable individual who

spoke good English, he belied the stereotype of a zealot. (See interview, page 63.)

He told me he had been following my reports from the other — Israeli — side of the conflict in *IDR*. It was my job, I said. He didn't argue. Later he said that he was aware that I had recently been with the Israeli army as well as with SLA units. He also commented on my interest in matters relating to nuclear developments in the Third World. It was all a little ominous.

Once in his office, Moussawi, 30-something and dressed in the customary Iranianstyle dark suit — sans shirt collar and tie — listened patiently, making notes while I spelled out my journalistic needs. I asked to go on a full military operation in the south. He then questioned me closely about the nature and intent of my visit. The last 15 minutes of our meeting were devoted to the reasoning behind why an Israeli pullout from South Lebanon was

inevitable and why I felt it would take place in the near future.

While not every question posed in my interview with the Hezbollah spokesman was answered, it did provide graphic insight to a guerrilla movement that has been unusually successful on the battlefield in the past two years.

Israeli and SLA casualties have never been higher. Hezbollah appears to have achieved the objective of being able to move about the security zone and strike, if not at will, then far more resolutely than before. With the Israelis more directly involved in the war, the IDF consequently is taking more knocks.

The situation in southern Lebanon is best summed up in the words of a columnist writing for the Israeli newspaper *Yediot Ahronot*: "We seem to have unleashed a monster in the occupied zone ... our own Vietnamese debacle. ..."

Mounting Losses For Israel

Moussawi and I did not talk about one of the issues about which there has been much comment of late in Israel, America, and Lebanon itself: the (perceived) factional split within Hezbollah. Word had it that there have been sharp differences between Hezbollah General Secretary Sayyed Hassan Nasrallah and the more extreme, less-eloquent, Beka'a Valley-

based Sheik Subbhi Tufeili. Tufeili was the first general secretary, and remains a Hezbollah leader who is thought to be closer to the Iranian mullahs than Nasrallah — if that were possible.

I raised this issue during a subsequent meeting with the head of the Lebanese armed forces, General Emile Lahoud, at his headquarters at Yarze on the outskirts of Beirut.

There was no split within Hezbollah, he

said. The report was an attempt by Israel at "disinformation." Nasrallah, Gen. Lahoud told me, was in overall command of the organization; where applicable, Tufeili took his orders from the Hezbollah *shoura* or council.

"No matter what you read or hear," Lahoud told me, "I can assure you that the movement [Party of God] is intact and thriving. And believe me, I should know."

Q&A With Hezbollah

The following is from a September '97 interview of Ibrahim Moussawi, the Hezbollah spokesman in Beirut.

Al J. Venter: To what do you ascribe Hezbollah's battlefield successes in the past year?

Moussawi: There are several reasons. For a start, we believe implicitly in our cause.

There is consequently a high level of motivation and a strong sense of belonging to the region, in which the conflict is taking place, among our Holy Fighters. Couple this to the demand for absolute obedience to the leaders and you have a good combination among the fighters.

Also, we rely heavily on past experience and evaluate the ongoing situation constantly. The organization benefits greatly from the mistakes of the enemy. As always, a well-prepared ambush, even if we have to lie in wait for two or three days, can provide us with good results. Our tactics, broadly speaking, are as follows:

We do our best to prevent the enemy in their efforts to keep their [southern Lebanon security-zone] outposts supplied, hitting them as often as possible. For this we can use mortars, antitank missiles, or an ambush at close quarters. We try to use different options at different times.

We like to confuse our adversary, at the same time create crises of confidence between the Israelis and their surrogate allies, the SLA. In doing so we attempt to extract from the enemy the maximum cost in terms of human lives, weapons, and equipment. Like us, for every weapon or soldier wounded or killed, more have to be brought in, providing fresh opportunities.

The Hezbollah Command tends to concentrate its attacks on military buildings and headquarters.

We give as much support as possible to the people living in the occupied zone, making them aware that the eventual outcome of the war is also about their freedom. Obviously, this has certain serious psychological implications for those trying to counter our efforts. We have been more successful in achieving this objective than the enemy in recent times.

What weapons we have, we try to use to the best effect. We also attempt to improve our training in the use of this material.

AJV: Have you used examples from other conflicts: Vietnam, the PLO, or Cuba possibly?

Moussawi: We regard the war in south Lebanon as a school in itself. We have our own methods and teaching systems which, as you know, have proved to be successful, like the suicide bombers who follow the orders of their leaders without question. The objective, basically, is to kill the biggest number of the enemy. In any war an ambush is an ambush. The same with a mortar attack. You look for casualties to be inflicted.

AJV: In your operations against the Israelis, what normally constitutes a strike force and for how long, on average, can an operation last?

Moussawi: It might be anything from two days to a month to get through enemy lines, depending on the nature of the operation. Obviously, there are often many obstacles to get to a specific target. Some of the considerations might be enemy positions and those of their allies; laying mines or booby traps or ambushes for their first line of defense, and doing the same for their second line of defense; closely monitoring their positions ahead of and behind these lines; the ability of the enemy to use night-vision equipment; their [Israeli] use of advanced radar systems that can detect our presence, often at ranges of several thousand meters; the round-the-clock use by the Israelis of unmanned aerial vehicles [UAVs]; traitors in the occupied land.

AJV: How do you manage to counter the presence of UAVs?

Moussawi: The best way to avoid these devices is to mislead the enemy. We also have to carefully select the times and places where these attacks take place to avoid being targeted, especially by the IAF [Israeli Air Force]. With time we are getting better at it.

AJV: Hezbollah forces have achieved some striking successes in land-mine warfare; much more so than in the past. This is obviously new technology for your organization. Who provided it?

Moussawi: This kind of technology is progressing constantly. We benefit from it as the enemy does and we try to use it to our advantage

AJV: The U.N. in Lebanon (UNIFIL) puts your regular operational strength at "less than a thousand" with many thousands as parttime volunteers. Is this correct?

Moussawi: No comment. We keep this to ourselves.

AJV: I have noticed that some of your men are armed with M16s; others seem to prefer the AK-47. Any reason?

Moussawi: While the M16 is more comfortable for the average soldier because of its light weight, it is sometimes subject to breakage or stoppages. The AK-47, in contrast, is much more reliable.

AJV: Does Hezbollah still have training camps in South Africa?

Moussawi: We never had any training or activity in South Africa and we challenge anyone to prove it.

AJV: Is the Party of God going to continue to use suicide attacks against the Israelis?

Moussawi: Of course. We have lost units in South Lebanon fighting the enemy.

(Note: When the question of five active Hezbollah training camps in South Africa was raised in Parliament earlier this year, a spokesman for the ANC government of President Nelson Mandela initially denied that any such camps existed. Only after their location had been pinpointed and numbers cited by opposition politicians did the government concede and give assurances they would be closed. There is also evidence that former members of South African special forces have been involved with this guerrilla movement and that mine and counter-mine warfare were among subjects taught. This could be one of the reasons for Hezbollah's recent land-mine successes against the IDF.)

tured by Innovative Weaponry, Inc. (IWI, Dept. SOF, 2513 E. Loop 820 N., Forth Worth, TX 76118; phone: 800-334-3573). IWI's optional multicolor night-sight system focuses attention on the front sight and speeds target acquisition by a considerable margin. Most tritium self-luminous sights glow green, simply because this color is the highest on the night visibility spectrum. However, operator alignment of three green dots in subdued light can be confusing. This detracts from emphasis on the front sight

and retards target acquisition.

The largest self-luminous dot is installed in the front sight and it is green. The two smaller dots in the rear sight are either yellow or amber. In use, I have found that the eyes instinctively focus on the green front dot with a strong 3-dimensional triangulation effect that helps to funnel the shooter's vision directly onto the target. I can personally recommend IWI's multicolor system highly and without reservations of any kind.

By the third day, shirts had been placed on the wobbler targets to more accurately simulate reality. And, we began work in the Terminator. The application of the tactical techniques required to survive a gun fight are an essential ingredient of all training at

Thunder Ranch. Moving through the unending labyrinth of rooms in the Terminator or working up the stairwells in the Tower will test your tactical skills to a level just below an actual confrontation with an armed opponent. Each step you take brings you into another potential threat area. Manmade funnels, such as doors, halls, corners and windows constrict movement and represent maximum hazard areas. They are bullet magnets and to survive you must stay on the outside of corners and visually "slice the pie" as you move forward. Shoot an innocent bystander in one of the simulators and the instructors will gleefully inform you that "you're going to share a cell with Bubba in the big house." There is a large sign in front of the Terminator which states, "Remember, you have the rest of your life to solve the problem. How long your life lasts depends on how well you do it."

During our night runs through the Terminator we learned not to set patterns of search with either movement or the flashlight. You should move away from the weapon's flash signature after firing. Crouching lower can help to back light the threat. In addition, you must stay away from windows or anything that would silhouette you.

Interspersed with our runs through the Terminator and Tower were a seemingly endless variety of drills on the Red and Orange Ranges. Most important to me were a series of stoppage drills, set up by each student's partner with both your pistol and his, that you had to clear in complete darkness from behind the barricade. Each of us was forced to clear about 80 malfunctions and then fire from cover.

During the daylight hours, we practiced both the drawstroke, shooting and reloading with one hand, first the normal firing hand and then the weak hand. Laying on our backs, first facing the target and then away from it, with the pistol on the ground, we fired laying on our backs, then sitting up and finally standing and firing while moving back to cover. Sound preposterous? Just picture yourself laying on the ground in a parking lot after being knocked down. No handgun course at Thunder Ranch would be complete without a run with the "chargers" on the Orange Range. This is especially challenging shooting, as the target advances almost faster that you can fire and get out of the hole.

All you need is money to acquire a pistol. Far more is required to insure that your opponent, and not you, goes down like "an asphalt snow angel" should you be forced into a deadly confrontation. You will need more than just a little true grit to attend a course at Thunder Ranch. Your physical endurance and emotional fortitude will be tested to their absolute limits. Personally, I wouldn't have it any other way. Only those who are really serious about survival end up on the firing line at Thunder Ranch. Their courses are booked far in advance with long waiting lists. Those looking beyond dry firing in their hallway mirror should contact them now many of the classes in Thunder Ranch's 1998 schedule are already filled. 🕱



Made by wrapping any available high explosives in paper and burlap, tying it with string, and dipping it in hot wax, would-be bombers simply have to insert a detonator and fuze or a timer and it's ready to go. Samples of the explosives from these particular bundles proved to be high nitroglycerin-content commercial dynamite.

Perhaps the most enigmatic of the explosives examined were contained in several clear plastic bags. Weighing approximately two kilos, each contained a putty-like material that ranged in color from dirty yellow to off-white. Laboratory tests later revealed the material to be U.S.-manufactured C-4 plastic explosive. The color discrepancies in the C-4 were traceable to various contaminants, probably introduced when the C-4 was reprocessed.

So, how would U.S. C-4 wind up in Ghana or Togo? A good bet was that it was part of the several tons shipped into Libya during the infamous Wilson-Terpil affair in the late '70s. It was during that time that renegade CIA operatives Edwin Wilson and Frank Terpil hatched a deal with Libyan strongman Muammar Khadaffi to provide the instructors and explosives Khadaffi needed for his terrorist-training camps. While not a smoking gun, this evidence, coupled with other materials that are known to have originated in Libya, certainly made for a warm barrel.

Attack of the Alphas

For the next few days we measured, tested, and photographed the piles of weapons and explosives. Now it was time for a little fun.

As mentioned, some of the PG-7 rocket motors had taken small-arms fire and, even though the Togolese soldiers were perfectly willing to fire them, I finally convinced them that it would be hazardous to their health and that the motors should be blown up. So, off we went to the Togo motocross track and firing range.

Since explosive-ordnance disposal (EOD) troops were nonexistent in this particular AO, I inherited the task. Besides, it would be a good excuse to test the UZRGM grenade fuzes and play with some of the other "toys." In the process, it was a chance to give the Marine embassy guards some hands-on training with Soviet weapons and ordnance.

While I prepared the demolition charge, Ed Owen took the Marines to the firing line to fire the AK-47s and AKMs. Since the only explosives available were from the captured stockpile, I had to improvise. The French TNT was out, as the army representatives made it clear that wasn't going anywhere. I ended up using the high-nitro-content dynamite.

After test-burning some fuse, I tripleprimed the charge with non-electric caps and yelled, "Fire in the hole!" After a quick safety check, I lit the fuses and we headed

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
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
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
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for the safety position.

Six minutes later a thick column of dirt climbed skyward, followed by a resounding Craaack! Success. One last trip back downrange to check out the crater and it would be "Miller time."

Halfway to the crater, we heard the roar. Heads snapped skyward.

Four Togolese Air Force Alpha jets were streaking down at us. Oh shit. There was really nothing left to do but swing my camera up at the jets. Then, as quickly as they were on us, they were winging away over the palm trees and out of sight. As it turned out, word of our EOD ops wasn't passed on to all levels. The jumpy jet pilots were taking no chances.

The job done and our butts still intact, we headed for the Marine House for some cool brews and a good BS session. Later, on the flight home, I realized I had a new appreciation for the film title, Out of Africa.

He also said the Lebanese military has an excellent working relationship Hezbollah, politically and militarily.

This subsequently became clear when those two groups, purportedly acting on a tip-off, jointly repulsed a fairly concerted Israeli raid on the Lebanese coast, just north of Sidon, in early September. Not since February's collision of two helicopters flying a special assault force to Lebanon, killing 73 troops, had Israel suffered such a jolting loss.

The mission on the night of 4 September was to have been a classic commando raid with a quick entrance from the sea by an undisclosed number of troops of Israel's "Flotilla 13," a SEAL clone. The naval commandos were to move quickly across a wellreconnoitered route to their target. But things went terribly wrong: A guide - possibly a double agent - led the Israelis into a minefield. Hezbollah and Lebanese army troops were dug in nearby, heavily armed with rifles, machine guns, even Sagger missiles.

The battle lasted several hours as Israeli helicopter gunships and patrol boats intervened to save the commandos. Even so, 11 commandos were killed, one was missing (and presumed dead), and more than 20 were wounded, some critically.

Lebanese television later carried film of Israeli weapons, gear, and body parts - all laid out for the news media by jubilant Lebanese and Hezbollah troops. The TV report likely played well in Syria, too.

sive projectiles, the Danto can ferry up to 20 troops including its three-man crew — four more than the Armadillo. Entry and exit are easily accomplished through the two side doors, a rear door and a roof port, where the turret is mounted.

Being a prototype, the Danto is undergoing continual scrutiny for adjustments and improvements. Captain Valdez mentioned the possibility of reducing its silhouette. With a length of 6.25 meters, a height of 3.45 meters (including the turret), and a width of 2.35 meters, the Danto is a *big* tar-

get — something, indeed, to consider when matched against antitank rockets.

During Guatemala's 36-year guerrilla war, at least a dozen APCs were knocked out of action — mostly by RPGs —according to Sergeant Pedro Antonio Garcia, a 16-year armor veteran. A guerrilla RPG attack, in November 1992, in which a soldier lost an arm and an eye when one of the open double doors of his hatch was blown shut against his arm as he manned an Armadillo's roof-mounted .50-caliber machine gun, gave impetus for the army to field a new weapons system to upgrade protection of its APC machine gunners.

Last year, improvement in cover and firepower were realized. Twin FN MAG 58 machine guns operated on a hydraulic mounting were introduced. Capable of being adapted to all APCs in Guatemala's inventory, this new configuration obviates the exposure of machine gunners. With 360-degree operation, the weapons systems are aimed and fired electronically by a gunner inside the vehicle, who locates his target via a video camera that feeds black and white images onto a TV screen.


"We do what we can with what we have." is the slogan of the Guatemalan army.

Its War Material Service has shown what major strides can be taken, with *very* limited resources.

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

an incident that occurred during the Intifada when Israeli troops broke into his family home. His mother was smashed in the face with a rifle butt, and Radi had to carry her to the hospital.

Suicide bombers often have problems at home and a most have very low self-esteem. To make up for these deprivations they become "born again Muslims," surrendering themselves wholeheartedly to the movement. Their world view is black and white and they embrace military solutions to all of their problems, in contradiction to the real spirit of the Koran. Indeed, they misinterpret many elements of their religion, or are often provided misleading religious interpretations by their Imams.

Most bombers have few prospects for a better life and willingly opt for deliverance for their worldly woes and a quick trip to Paradise, where they will be provided young virgins and live a life of ease.

Once a suicide bomber has been recruited and agrees to participate in an attack, he receives training aimed at steeling him to his fate. They are buried alive in coffins to give them a sense of what their future holds. Two days before the actual attack, the bomber begins fasting, to purify his body. Like any devout Muslim, he prays five times a day, and between prayers receives political and religious indoctrination, often from his Imam, who continuously reminds him of the joys of Paradise.

Nearly all of Ayyash's suicide bombers were dressed in IDF [Israel Defense Forces] uniforms, with IDF insignia and documentation. They carried their explosives in kitbags provided to IDF soldiers. In the wake of the terror campaign, Israeli soldiers in uniform, but without weapons and battle gear, were subjected to random security checks to verify their identities.

The Operation

Ayyash acquired his nickname, "the Engineer," from none other than former Israeli prime minister Yitzak Rabin, who took a deep personal interest in efforts to bring an end to his terrorist activities. By 1994, Ayyash's operations had become so successful that Rabin and his top advisors decided that the Palestinian would have to be killed. "It was not a matter of revenge," explained a former Shin Bet official. "It was a matter of security. Ayyash established a school for bomb-making in the Gaza Strip. We could not let it go on. We had to take him, dead or alive. Dead was more preferable, and this is what happened."

A retired Deputy Chief of Shin Bet, Gidon Ezra, who led the pursuit of Ayyash, said that, "We assembled the best people and best teams for the chase. There were no limits on the amount of money we could spend, but two critical elements — time and opportunity — were against us."

On two occasions, Ayyash's pursuers were certain that they had cornered him, but twice he eluded their grasp. The first was in 1994 when they raided a house in Nablus belonging to Ali Assi, a Hamas operator, only to discover that they had missed Ayyash by mere seconds. His bed, in fact, was still warm.

In February 1995, a house in Sheik Raduwan in the Gaza Strip exploded. A near-miss: In the ruins, authorities uncovered the body of Kamel Kachil, Ayyash's deputy.

The Israelis, however, vowed they would not falter again. To ensure that they finally snared their man, they hatched an elaborate plan that encompassed a combination of technology, deception and, above all, betrayal.

Ayyash had taken up residence in the home of an old friend, 27-year old Osama Hamed, located at 2 Shahid al-Khaluti Street in the small town of Beit Lahiya, in the Gaza Strip.

According to what Hamed told a gathering at a mosque in Gaza on 7 January 1996, "I'd known Yehiya Ayyash for a very long time. We studied together at Bir Zeit University and we remained in touch.

I knew that he had arrived in the Gaza Strip after he escaped from the West Bank. Last July, he established contact with me and asked if he could live with me at Bet Lahiya. I told him that I could not guarantee his safety as I live close to the Erez [main] border crossing into Israel.

"He insisted, though, and moved in with me and lived on the second floor of my house. At the time I worked for my uncle, Kamel, who is a developer. I told Ayyash that I was working on my uncle's building projects. I told him that I wasn't sure whether my uncle was 'clean.'

At the time of the operation, Kamel Hamed was residing in a luxurious house near the beach in Gaza. He drove a Mercedes Benz and appeared to be living the good life; married for the third time, he had 14 children.

Osama Hamed continues: "My uncle Kamel gave me a *Pelephone* [the Israeli nickname for Motorola's cellular phone] so that he would be able to find me whenever he needed me. Last Thursday [4 January 1997] Kamel arrived and asked for the cellular phone. He took it and returned it later. I did not suspect anything. It appears to me now that during this time somebody changed something in the telephones. My uncle told me that he was leaving for Israel and that he would call me on Friday morning."

Upon discovering Ayyash's body, Osama Hamed "called the Hamas people and told them. They arrived immediately and took the body."

How the Israelis managed to compromise Kamel Hamed remains a secret, but what is known is that he hasn't been seen since the day of the assassination. According to some sources he is now living under another identity in the United States.

If there is a lesson to be learned from the Israeli hits on Ayyash and Hamshari, per-

lem with one of the aircraft as a result of sabotage. It had crashed the week before, killing the entire crew.

I produced one of two bottles of scotch I carried along and, after a couple of belts, the major invited me on a tour of the camp. At our initial stop, on the dayroom's ping pong table, lay a young trooper wrapped in filthy, blood-soaked bandages, his wounds inflicted by a spear to the face and a panga in the side.

The following morning, I sauntered over to Base Operations and ran into a Belgian officer laboring hard to convey a weather report, in French, to a Cuban who spoke no French, but did speak some English. I spent 20 minutes interpreting French to Spanish, Spanish to French, with English tossed in. When I asked the Cuban where he hailed from, naturally he said, "Miami." He and several of his amigos were flying aircraft on interdiction missions against the communist Simbas.

Later, I meandered out on the flight line and inspected some very tired AT-6D aircraft.

Before I could energize the starter on one, a Congolese, in a witch-doctor get-up, began screaming and waving his arms, and then began pulling handfulls of white powder from the bag and sprinkling it on the wings of my plane. No airplane would fly unless the medicine man sprinkled dawa (magic powder) on its wings.

I began to wonder if this trip was a well-intentioned mistake, or God's idea of a bad joke.

Things, though, seemed to change the following evening. A U.S. Air Force C-130 landed and I and several other pilots were told we were going to Leopoldville, 700 miles from Kamina. We were met by Lt. Col. Jerry Puren, a South African officer and an aide to President Tshombe.

He took us to a hotel, then we were transferred two days later to a rancid Congolese flophouse anointed the Hotel Continentale (a better moniker: The "Alpha and Amoeba.")

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

yards. Your correction is 2 MOA. You can dial this in your scope adjustment or hold off the correct amount. If you choose to hold off, you need to translate 2 MOA into inches of hold-off at 300 yards, 2 MOA equals 6 inches.

I have developed another formula which I feel is easier to use and somewhat more accurate. Try both methods and use the one you prefer. My formula bases all initial calculations on a 10 mph, full-value wind. Once the basic calculation is made you must modify the result to take into account wind direction (no-value, half-value, or fullvalue). For winds other than 10 mph round to the nearest 5 mph increment (5, 10, 15, 20 mph) and modify your wind correction accordingly. Wind affects your bullet's path in a direct ratio to wind velocity. A 20 mph wind will have twice the effect of a 10 mph wind. The basic formula is $r^2 - (r - 1)$ where r equals the range in yards divided by 100. Using our same example of a 10 mph, fullvalue wind with a range of 300 yards, this formula would work as follows:


 $3^2 - (3 - 1) = 9 - 2 = 7$ inches wind correction.

Now suppose the wind is actually 20 mph. Double your calculation 7 inches x 2 = 14 inches wind correction. After calculating your wind effect be sure to adjust if it is not a full-value wind. A half-value wind requires only half the wind correction. This formula is accurate from 200 yards to 600 yards. For closer or longer distances than that simply drop the subtraction, part of the equation. For a 10-mph wind at 100 yards the formula is r² which equals 1 inch correction. If the wind is 20 mph the correction is 2 inches (your original calculation, doubled). Please note that this formula gives the wind correction in inches, rather than minutes of angle.

I have included a chart of actual wind drift for a .308 168 grain match bullet at 2650 fps with winds of 5-, 10-, 15- and 20-mph so that you can practice calculations and compare your results with the two methods to actual wind drift.

Study the traditional wind and range estimation techniques. Technology is nice when its available but you still have to function when the goodies such as laser range-finders and digital wind-meters aren't in hand. Remember, also, that even though you can hit your target at long range, the surest way to shoot well is to get closer. Military snipers typically will not shoot at *under* 300 yards, but any hit is often acceptable for them, and a miss is occasionally expected. In law enforcement, your shot must be surgically precise for most instances and misses are *never* acceptable.

under insurgent sway. And the more intense is contact when it comes.

Even Medellin itself is a battleground. In the early hours of one morning, I accompanied a raid targeting a slum area where the ELN has been active. Techniques were standard: blocking forces, assault forces, search forces.

Our timing was perfect, but two figures

who bolted into the maze could not be engaged - rules of engagement. In a house identified by intelligence personnel, though, we nabbed an ELN operative and a half-dozen homemade pistols. In another house, several targeted individuals were nabbed with a cache of propaganda.

The operation worked to perfection, but the commander was disappointed because no high-powered firearms were captured. Nonetheless, the cell was captured, the neighborhood freed.

Again, the effectiveness of terror is obvious. A handful of individuals with rudimentary weapons can dominate a neighborhood of law-abiding citizens. Our sweep involved at least a hundred men - to catch several.

Intelligence nets provided a picture that allowed a perfect raid (save for those who bolted and escaped), but they can only do so much. Only the force multiplication of a population "armed and numerous" can provide the ultimate neighborhood watch.

Clueless in Washington

This raises a point: It is decidedly not American policy to encourage militias, despite that they have been used in every insurgent conflict and are a necessary ingredient for victory: The mobilization of the people was the turning point in Thailand, the Philippines, and Peru. So thin is insurgent strength that militia will have a similar effect in Colombia.

This is an eventuality the insurgents will go to virtually any lengths to prevent, as they know what the results will be.

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
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nents with charges of human rights violations. Such charges are willingly picked up by the intact networks of Western wannabes who have never found a left wing cause they could not love.

They are particularly effective in the United States, where the level of understanding concerning Colombia is abysmal. Consequently, rarely has a country so important to America's interests been so poorly treated, not by design but from sheer arrogance and ignorance on Washington's part.

It is not that Washington's strategic myopia has left it totally off-base. Not being able to focus upon anything save drugs doesn't mean that drugs are not worth focusing upon. It's just that they're only part of the picture.

"The U.S. insists upon seeing the guerrillas as our internal political problem and narcotics as an international problem," analyzes a Colombian lieutenant colonel. Like many of his compatriots, he is bilingual, with an advanced degree from an American university. He is as intimately familiar with us as we are ignorant of him.

"The U.S. insists upon seeing them as separate problems," he continues. "They're not. They're all one big problem."

He has hit the nail on the head. We have long had the data which details, chapter and verse, the extent to which the insurgents have financed themselves through the drug trade. Further, we know in excruciating detail the extent to which they have moved to integrate the trade vertically, becoming cartels in their own right, FARC specializing in cocaine, ELN in heroin. Still we tell the Colombians to get with the anti-narcotics effort but refuse to help them, except on the margins, where "internal security" is concerned.

It would be a bad joke if men's lives weren't being lost. Ironically, it is a bad joke on both sides of the American political spectrum. Washington won't help Bogota, because it is not doing enough to go after the narcos (and takes their money). Yet the American left, which peddles the insurgents' Robin-Hood image, seems completely unaware that it is the needs of the drug trade which dictate insurgent policies and actions, not concern for change. Who suffers, therefore? The people, of course.

What is it the insurgents are after? FARC was formally founded in 1966, though it is an outgrowth of earlier peasant guerrilla movements. ELN was formed two years before FARC; EPL became active in 1967. All have hard-line communist leaderships which want "liberation." But do they want to seize power? And, if so how?

In this, I found Colombian intelligence lacking, even as they had quite a clear operational and tactical picture of what was occurring. The reason there is question as to what the insurgents want is because they don't seem to actually do anything that would fulfill a strategic —

or even operational — plan. They simply do what they do, which is to terrorize and work the drug trade.

That, however, leads to a second issue: Where's the money? If there is one thing that stands out on the ground, it is the relative paucity of armaments possessed by the insurgents. They're as well armed as any other insurgent group knocking about these days, but they do not even seem to use anything as heavy as an RPG-7, much less an SA-7. No grenade launchers proliferate; no mortars. Why?

The amounts of money are considerable. Figures published are usually in the hundreds of millions of U.S. dollars! It makes no sense that a movement with access to nearly half a billion dollars per year would be manufacturing homemade weapons in slums — not in today's environment, where anything can be picked up if the cash is there for the purchase.

In addressing this reality, Colombian security personnel invariably theorize that the insurgent leadership is either investing the money so as to generate income in a future world when the drug trade is shut down, or simply skimming the money for individual accounts someplace. These are plausible explanations, but in the absence of data, they remain only speculation.

Even the lowest estimates come up with income in the tens of millions (say, \$20-\$40 million). That's advanced purchasing power for any group.

If there's that kind of money backing up a reasonable number of insurgents, whether we're talking \$40 million or \$400 million, what's the goal? Liberation, in other words, isn't, on the face of it, being very vigorously pursued. Pushing drugs is.

That reality won't change until the security environment is set straight. That's unlikely to happen soon. If we've got Colombia wrong, so, too, as I've said above, does the Colombian government. Opines the lieutenant colonel, "At the heart of our problem is a very bad government. It is a government without historical perspective."

That perspective would tell Bogota that communist insurgent movements can be brought into the political fold through only one route — to be pummeled and then offered redemption. This is what has worked in the past for Colombia itself, where the insurgents have been a particularly cheerless, bloodthirsty lot.

Perhaps of greatest importance strategically, perspective should dictate that Colombia's leadership realize there is at issue a national problem: integration, if you like; counterinsurgency, if you're more militarily oriented. Either way, the nation must respond to the terror of the insurgents, rather than leaving the chore to the men on the front line.

In this battle, the U.S. can play a far more constructive role than it has thus far.

REMFRACKET

ars are a racket. That's why they won't go away! But now even peace-keeping is a racket. Which explains why we have American peacekeepers spread as thick as peanut butter from Angola to Zambia.

Peacekeeping makes it easy for the top brass to justify their force/level/budgets/existence and the parasite civilian contractors — such as former Defense Secretary Richard Cheney and his gang — who milk them bigtime.

Take that \$2 billion-plus a year running sore going on in the former Republic of Yugoslavia. Cheney and Company alone sucked in over \$250 million last year doing what engineers and mess sergeants used to do.

Our uniformed men and women deployed there call themselves "Prisoners of Peace," POP for short, which is an apt description. They're locked up like maximum-security prisoners in little forts right in the middle of a country that's become a huge insane asylum filled with serial killers and armed drunks.


Every peacekeeper there deservedly draws hazardous-duty pay and gets a tax break. Let's face it, you cannot pay enough extra money to anyone to stand down range in a shooting gallery manned by crazies. Our POPs deserve every extra nickel we can give them.

But not the cheats and scammers who, according to a Bosnianbased sergeant, "have been flooding into former Yugoslavia for the sole purpose of fraudulently collecting the lucrative tax-break and fire-pay benefits."

Another irritated sergeant says, "I have seen people come in on a C-130 (transport aircraft) for a 20-minute 'fact finding' visit while the plane undergoes an engine-running off-load of cargo and passengers, only to re-board the plane for a speedy departure and a guarantee for the thieves that next month's pay check will be a lot bigger."

An airman says "I have had officers tell me they frequently put troops from locations such as Hungary and Italy onto aircraft that are entering FRY (former Yugoslavia) airspace for the sole purpose of gaining benefits they don't deserve."

These "tax free" vacations happen every day. A captain sent me a bootlegged copy of the SFOR (Stabilization Forces in Bosnia) distinguished visitors sign-in log. It's 3" thick, heavy

with the names of too many general officers who visit FRY for a few days once a month.

Of course, they're out there to make sure our troops health and welfare are being well-looked after and that Cheney's boys are earning their fat profits. These brief monthly visits sure don't have a thing to do with qualifying for extra dough.

Another sergeant in NATO Headquarters reports that "It takes the Joint Visitors Bureau (officer) about ten minutes to give his weekly visitor briefing" to the four star [FOR commander. He says, "The number of 'distinguished' visitors is absolutely unbelievable."

An Airman says, "It's not only the generals who pour in here. We get stacks of colonels and others right down to the lowest rankers. It's wild! A colonel, for example, who just visits for a day gets \$650 extra."

Sure, some of these visits are necessary. But there's a lot of stealing going on that's taking money away from mission-essential activities and blasting the morale of those who do deserve the extra money.


This problem is easy to fix. Only award extra pay to the POP folks hunkered down in former Yugoslavia doing "mission impossible" and don't give the visitors zilch.
