Utica

UTICA, the "Forest City," dates back to old Fort Schuyler of Revolutionary days. It was incorporated as a city in 1832, with a population of 9,000. Today it numbers 60,000 inhabitants. Because of Utica's central location in New York State, it is sometimes called the "Hub." Its altitude is 410 feet above sea level, and this fact, together with its excellent water supply, renders Utica a most healthful community. The city has a first class street car service, good schools, and fine churches.

Utica ranks high as a manufacturing city, and has unusual shipping facilities, boasting six railroads running in all directions.

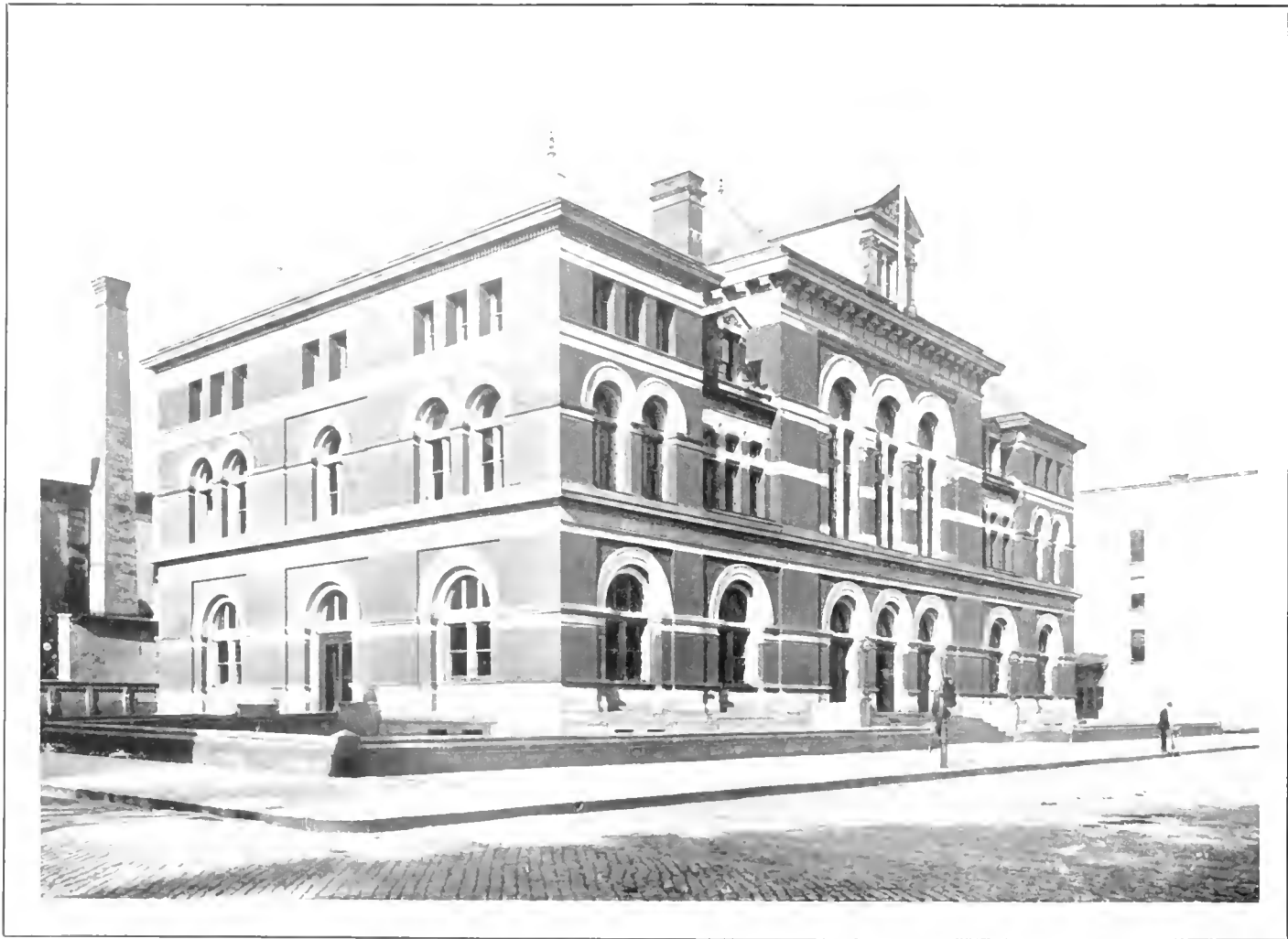

Contains the Post office, Custom House, Circuit and District Courts, and the U. S. Marshal's Office



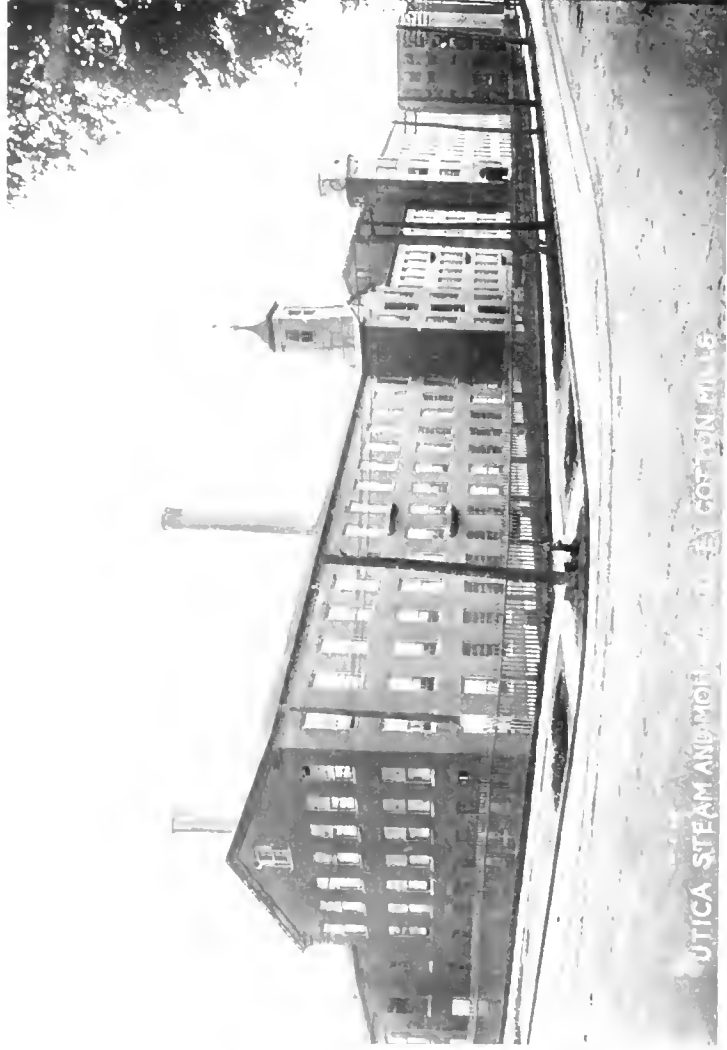

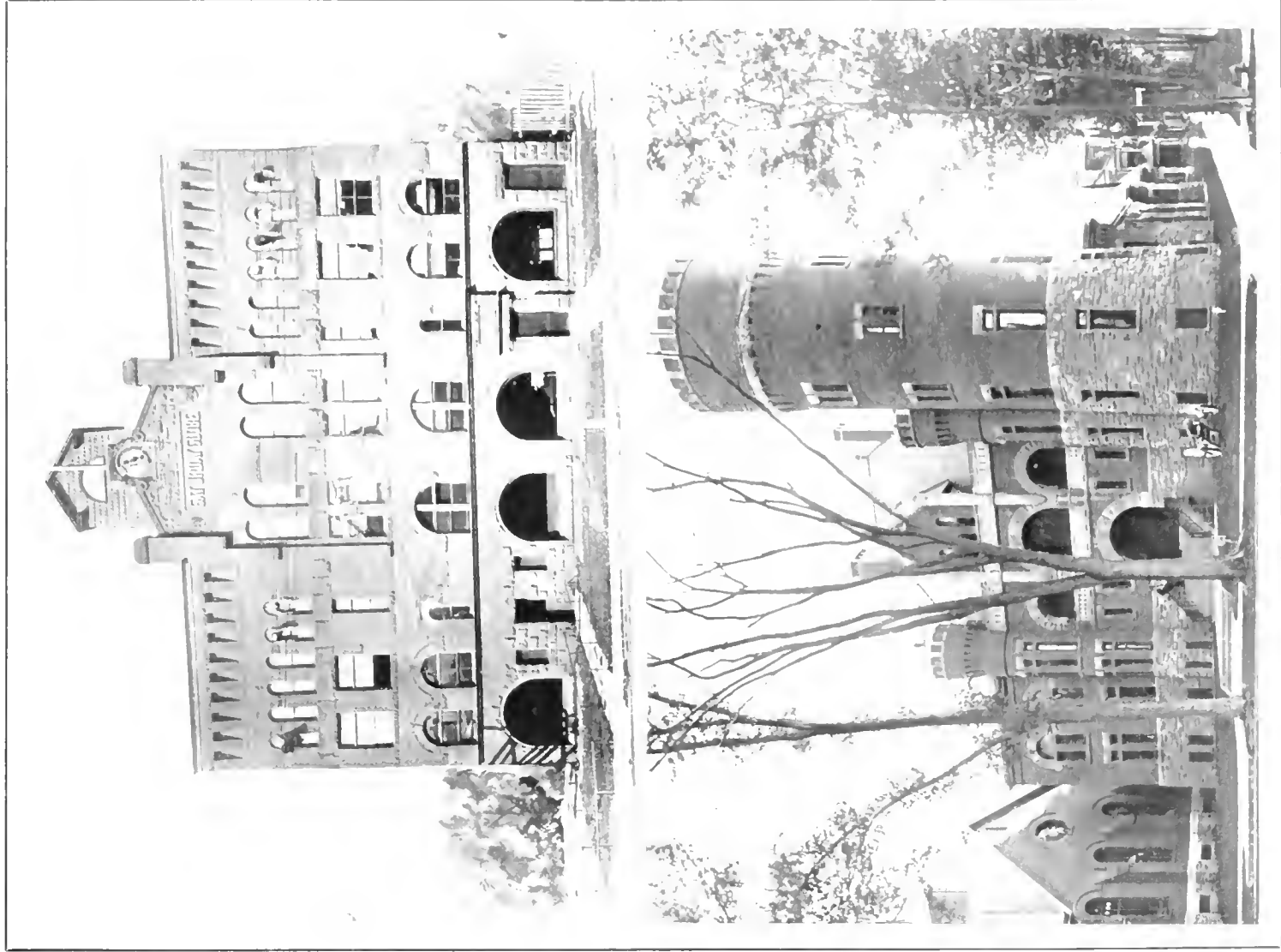

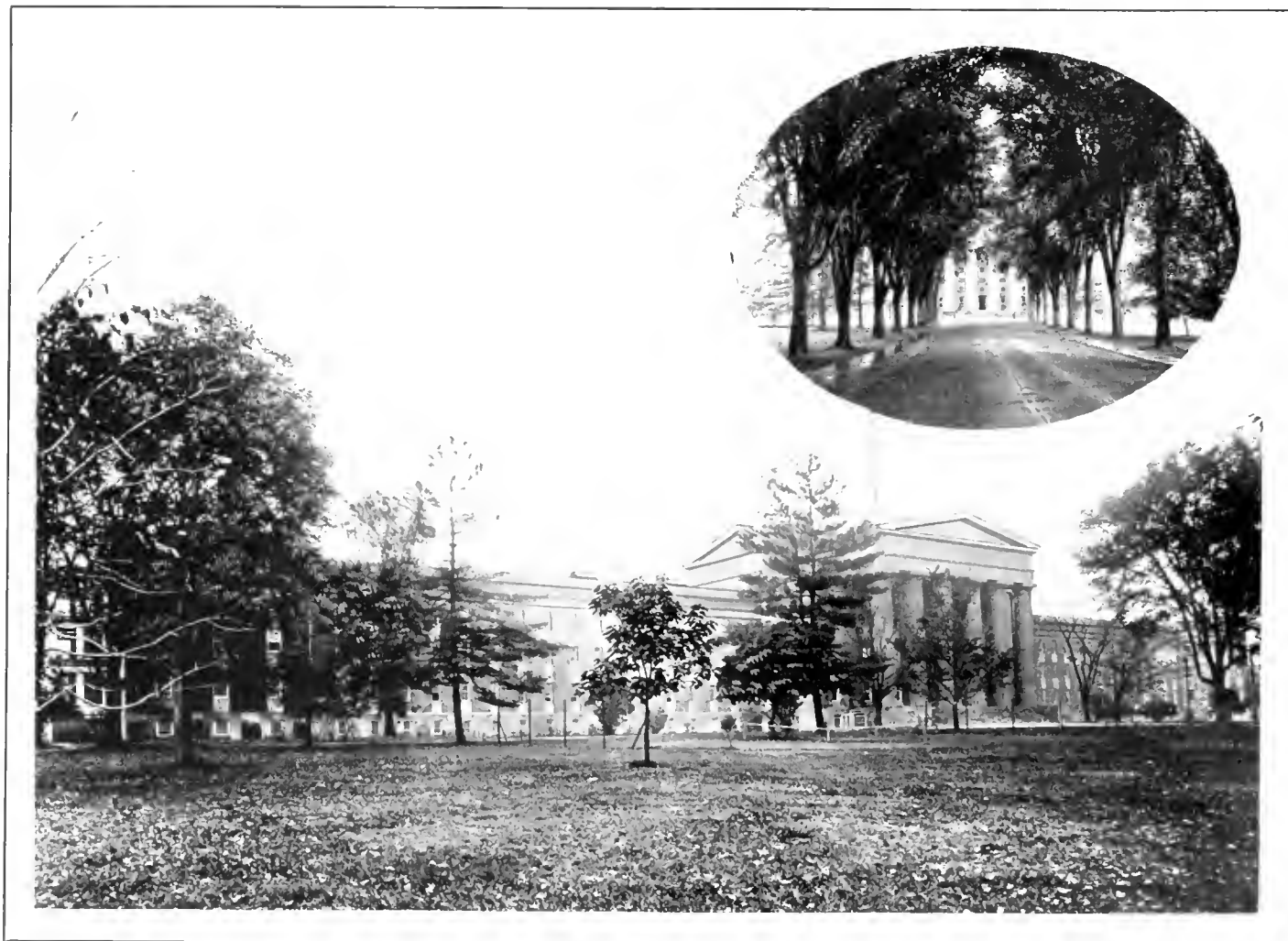

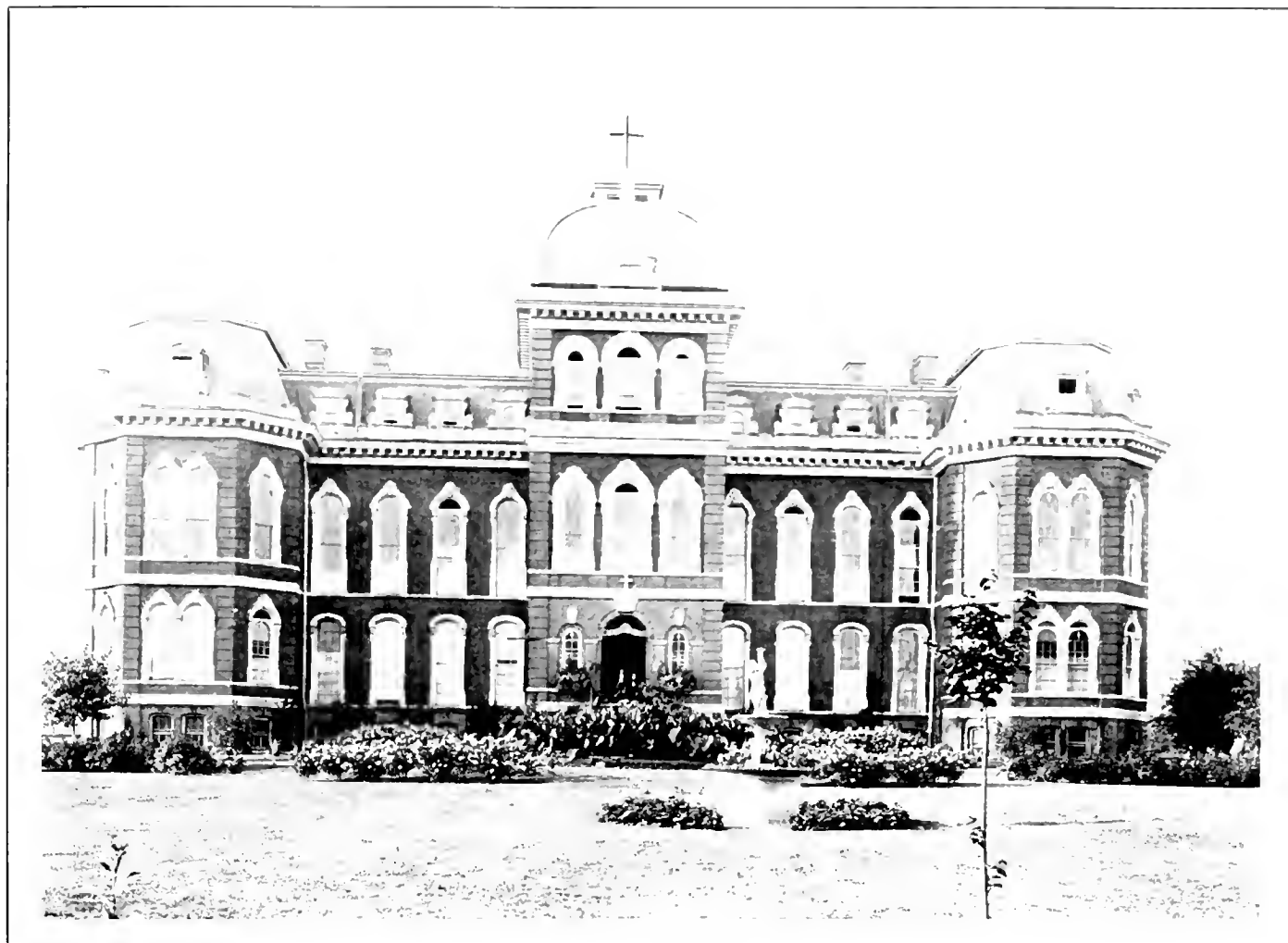

in New York State for the care of the insane

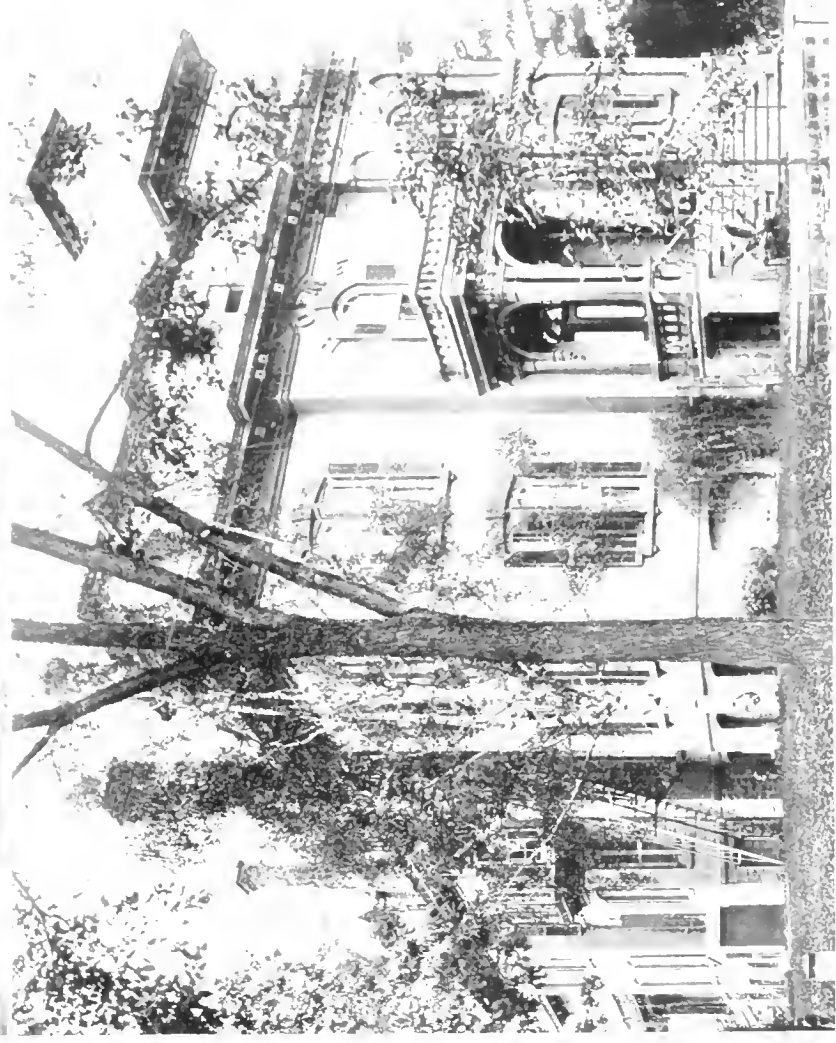


ST. VINCENT INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL, — RUTGER STREET
For destitute and truant children of Oneida and adjacent counties



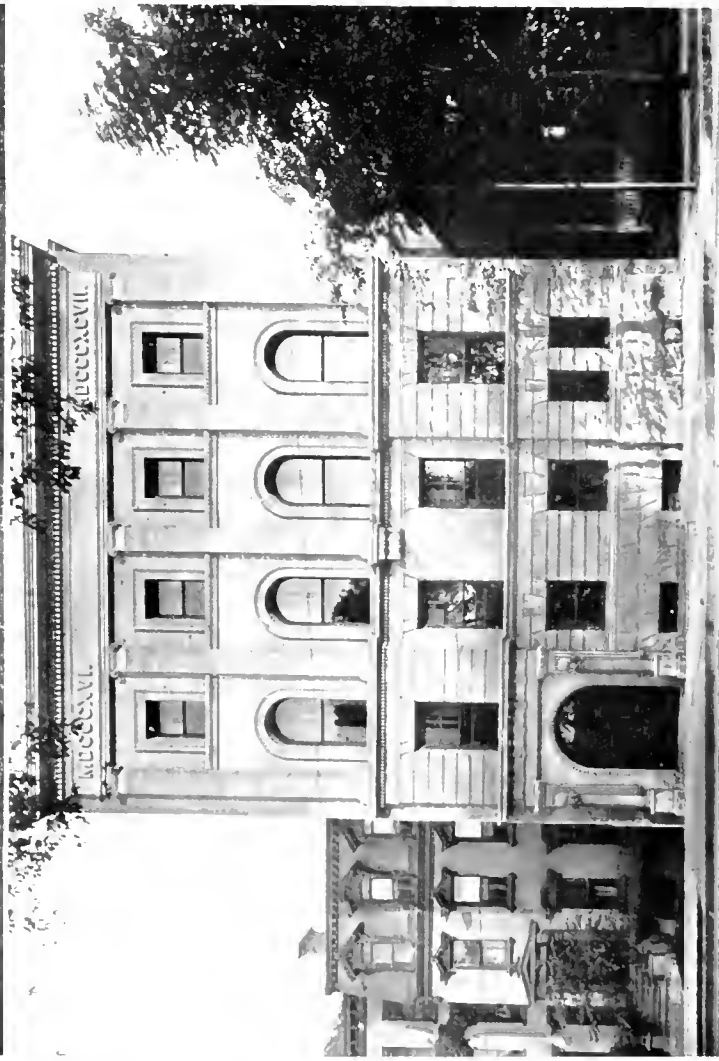
FAXON HOSPITAL — SUNSET AVENUE

Now known as "General Hospital" — Was erected in 1856 by the city for the care of indigent sick



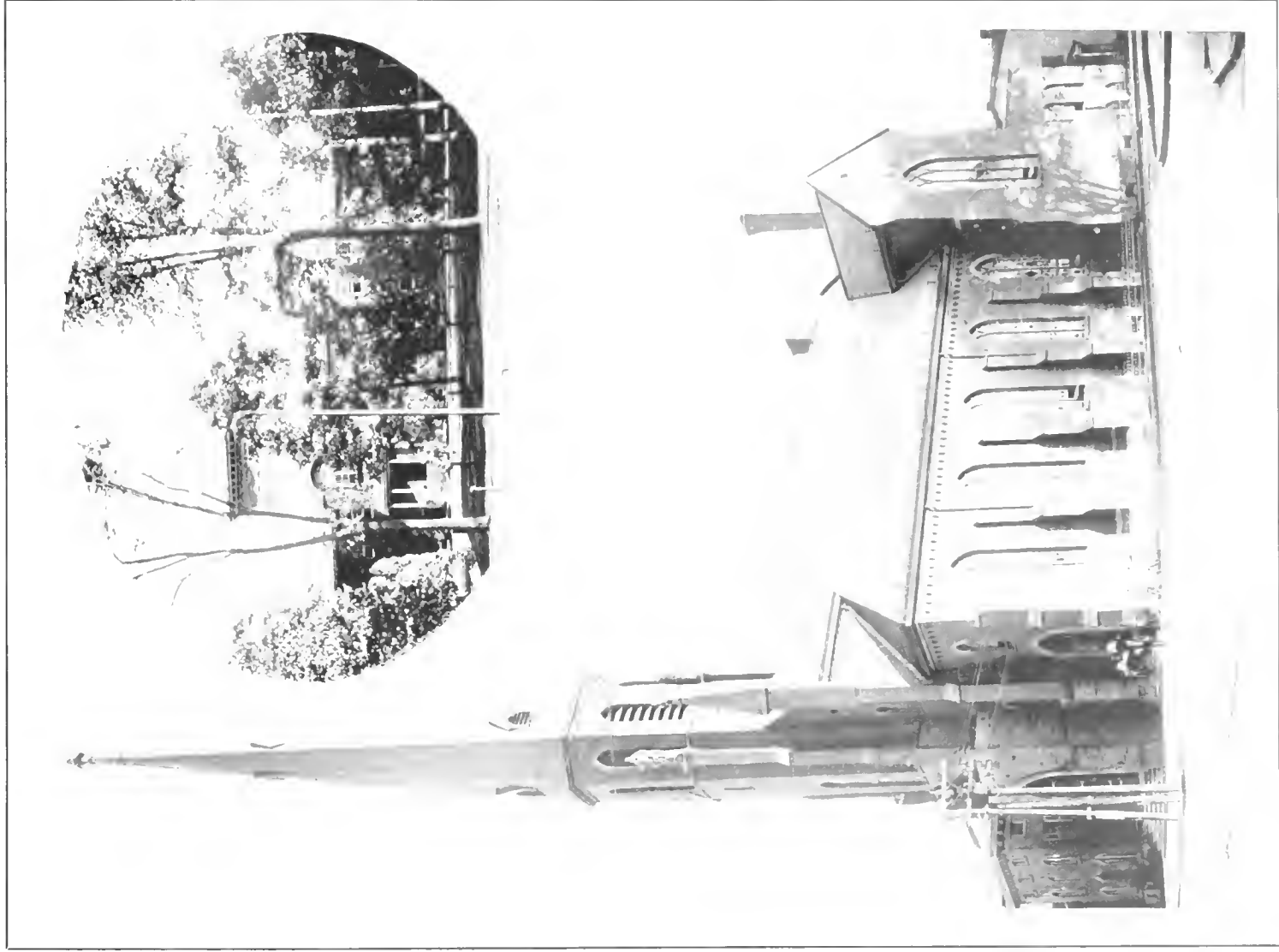
HOME FOR THE HOMELESS IN THE CITY OF CHICAGO

How it of the home is to shelter respectable men and couples, over sixty-five years of age, who are unable to support themselves, or their families, in the city of Chicago.

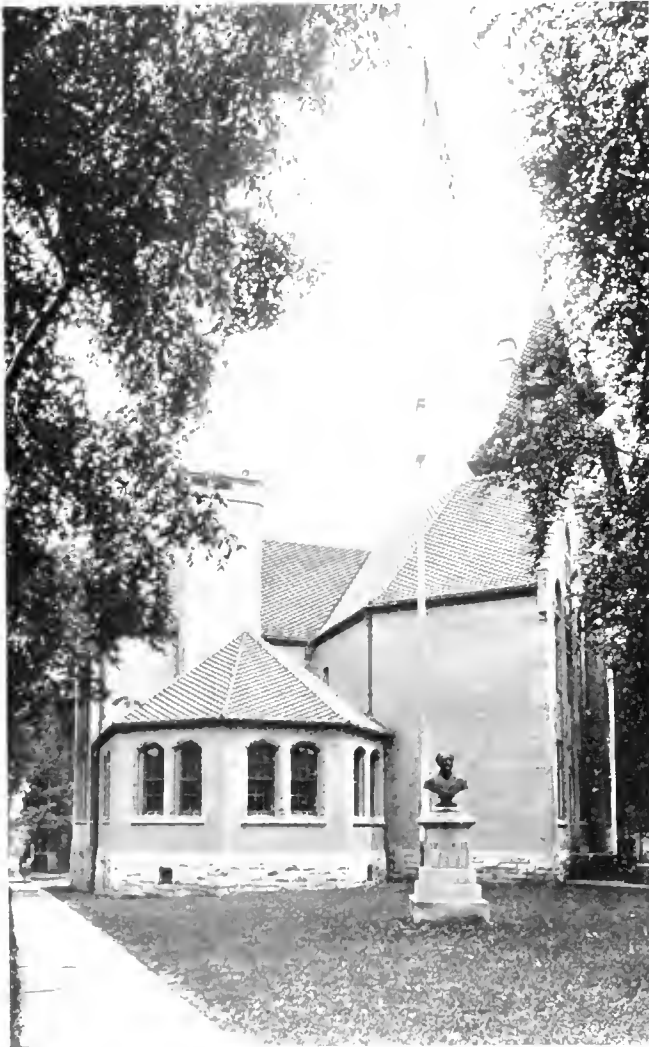


Cornerstone laid in the spring of 1891 by the Grand Lodge of the State of New York for needy Masons, their wives and children, widows and orphans

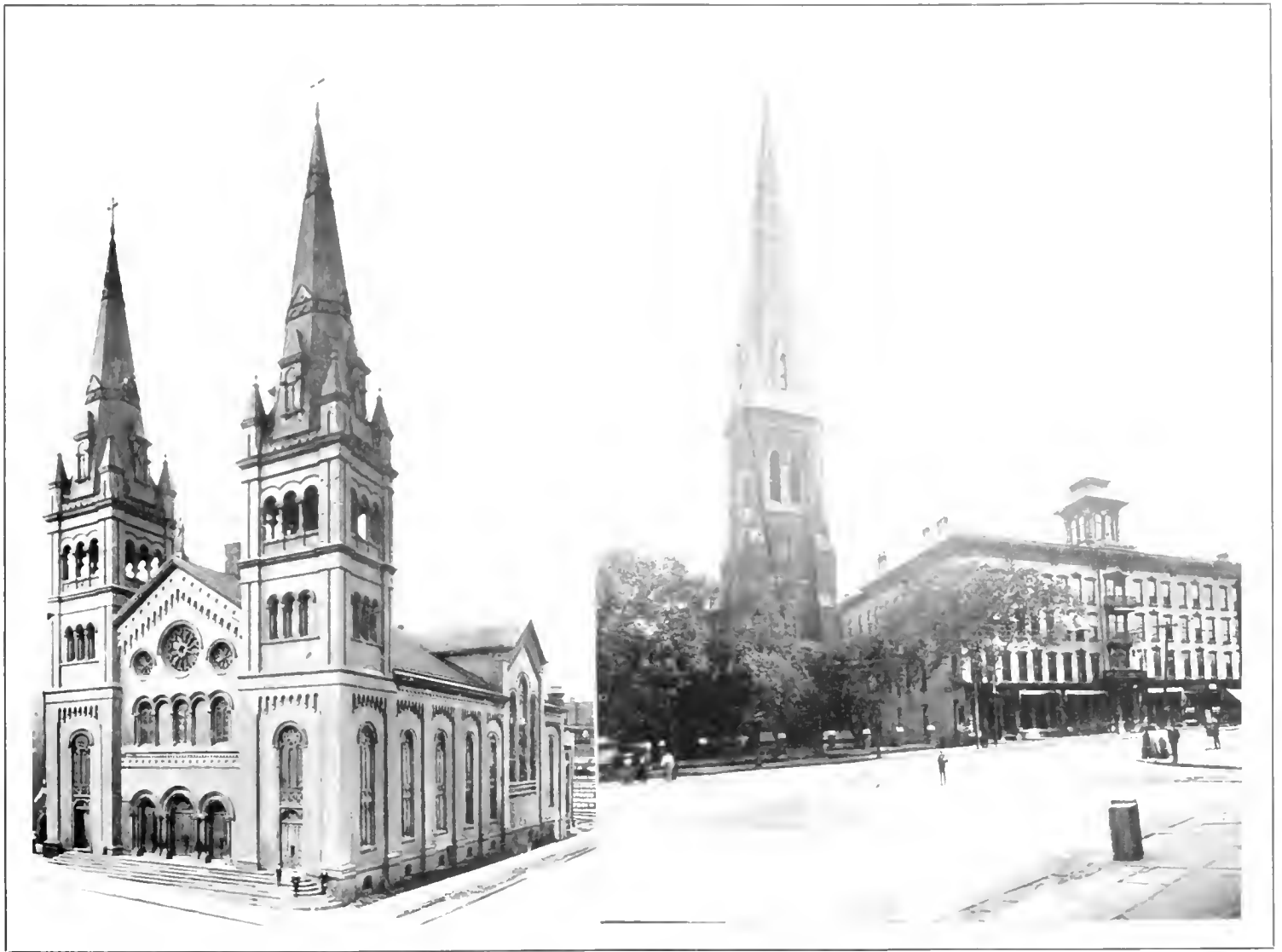
MASON-WILLIAMS MEMORIAL - SIDE VIEW

Grace Episcopal Church organized in 1837.



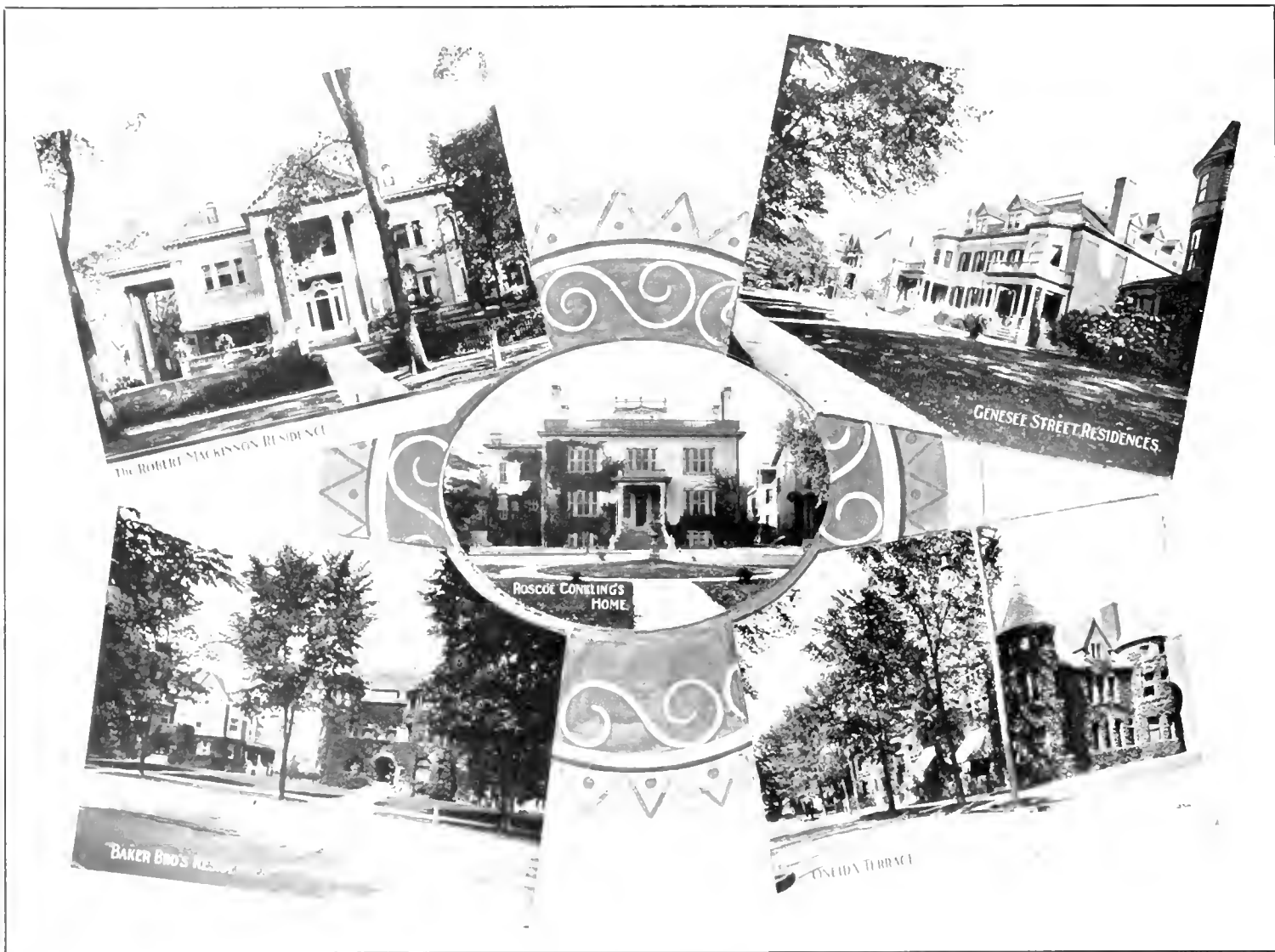
ULICA FREE ACADEMY — KEMBLE STREET

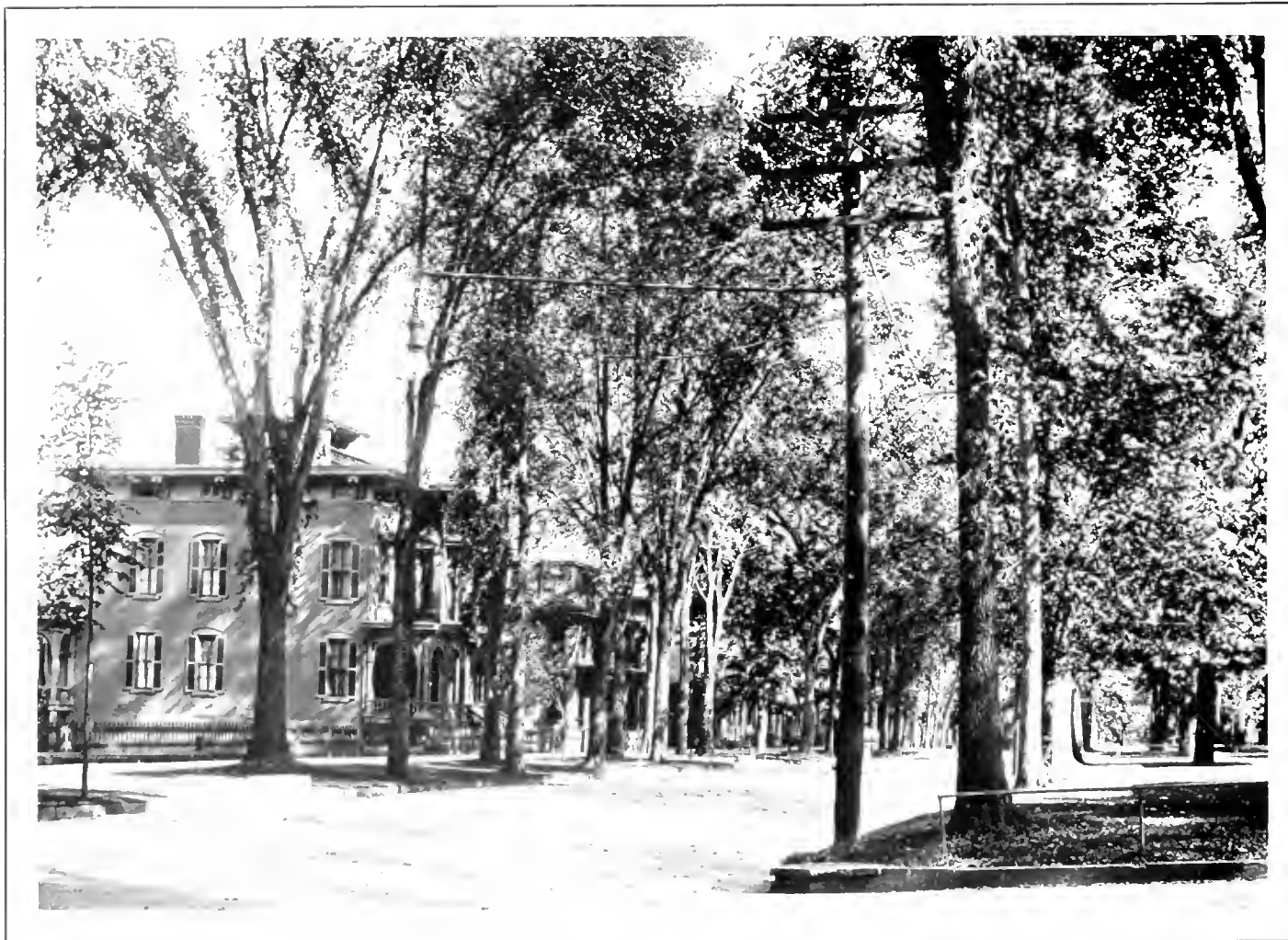

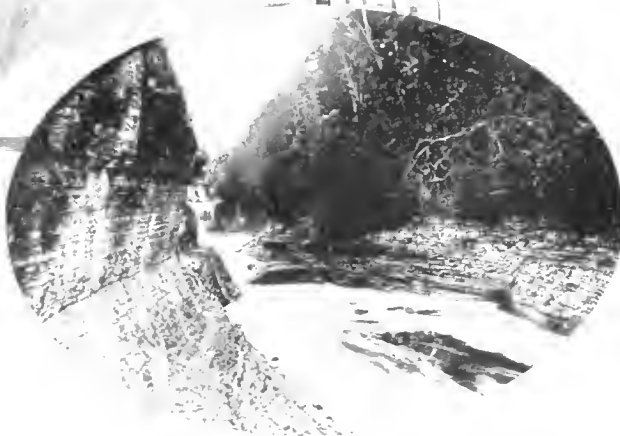
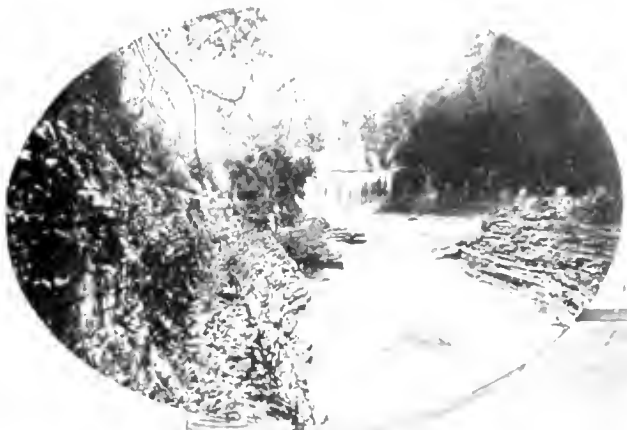


CHANCELLOR SQUARE PARK - BELLEFLEUR STREET

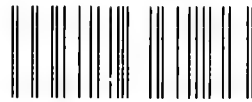

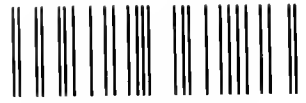
