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#### NOTE.

Hundreds are very ancient subdivisions of the county, and the origin of the name is still matter of speculation. Each hundred has a constable or bailiff, and in case of any damage being done feloniously by rioters to the property of any owner in the hundred, the remedy is to sue the hundred for damages. In the northern counties the name wapentake is generally used instead of hundred. The term lathe is now used only in Kent as the name of a division comprising several hundreds.

The Court of Quarter Sessions is composed of Justices of the Peace, and meets once a quarter for the transaction of judicial and other business connected with the county or division of a county to which it belongs. The judicial business is confined to criminal jurisdiction, and extends to all except the highest class of criminal cases.

The Petty Sessional Divisions are those in which two or more Justices of the Peace hold courts to exercise summary jurisdiction in the case of petty offences, or to transact certain special business (special sessions), such as granting licenses, etc.

The Registration Districts are subdivisions of the Registration County, which is the division adopted in all matters relating to the census and to registration, and does not coincide with the county proper of the same name, so that the total area and population given under the heading "Registration Districts" would be found to differ more or less from those given under Petty Sessional Divisions. The "w" which follows the area in the case of many of the Registration Districts indicates that the corresponding area either includes water or relates to parishes to which a portion of the Tidal Water or Foreshore of contiguous rivers or creeks has been allotted, though not included within the boundaries thereof by the Ordnance Survey Department.

The Union Counties coincide with the Registration Counties, and the Unions, or divisions adopted for the administration of the Poor Laws, are for the most part identical with the Registration Districts.

The  $\it Lieutenancy \it Subdivisions$  are those adopted in connection with the levying of the Militia.

The Highway Districts are subdivisions of the county made in accordance with the Highway Act of 1835 (5 and 6 Will. IV. c. 50), amended by the subsequent Acts of 1862 and 1864.

The term Corn Crops under the heading "Agriculture" includes wheat, barley, or bere, oats, rye, beans, and peas; Green Crops, potatoes, turnips, and swedes, mangold, carrots, cabbage, kohl-rabi, and rape, vetches, and other green crops, except clover and grass. The Grasses included under the heading "Clover, Sain-

foin, and Grasses" are only those grown under rotation; and under the heading "Bare Fallow" is also included *Uncropped Arable Land*.

In the statement furnished under each county of the parishes making up the county constituencies under the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, which are mainly based on the Petty Sessional Divisions, the last parliamentary return of the Petty Sessional Divisions (1878) has for the most part been followed; but as the Act refers to these divisions as they existed on the 1st of January 1885, it may be found that in a few instances changes made in the composition of the Petty Sessional Divisions since the date of the return mentioned have affected the accuracy of the statement. In some cases, however, the compiler of this portion of the text has been able to take such changes into account, and he begs to take this opportunity of thanking those clerks to magistrates and others who kindly supplied him with the necessary information in reply to private inquiries.

- Map 16.—The Distribution of Population is illustrated by a map which, with black dots for towns of more than 50,000 inhabitants, and of black circles for towns of more than 10,000 inhabitants, marks the heavy urban localities; whilst by means of graduated tints of colour the varying density of the general population is forcibly shown. The proportion of population to acreage is given to the nearest tenth, in figures, in each of the counties or division of counties, in accordance with the Census Returns of 1881.
- Map. 17.—The Occupations of the People are shown on a map which is based on the tables in the Census Returns, vol. iii., 1881. The proportion of each class in each county is shown by bands of colour, and the principal or most characteristic industries (including the fisheries around our coasts) by red lettering.
- Map 18.—The Agricultural map gives the extent and character of the cultivation of the soil by bands of colour—marking in each county the proportion under corn crops, green crops, clover and grasses under rotation, permanent pasture, arable land, woods and plantations, and waste.
- Map 19.—The Coalfields are shown upon a separate map, copied from those in Professor Hull's monograph on the "Coalfields of Great Britain," which gives the presently worked or visible coalfield, the at present unworked or concealed coalfield, lying at a depth of less than 4,000 feet, and the area originally covered by coal measures.

The visible coalfields are:—1. South Wales; 2. Bristol and Somersetshire; 3. Forest of Dean; 4. Forest of Wyre; 5. Shrewsbury; 6. Coalbrook Dale; 7. Denbighshire; 8. Flintshire; 9. Anglesey; 10. South Staffordshire; 11. North Staffordshire; 12. Lancashire (including Burnley Basin); 13. Ingleton; 14. Cumberland; 15. Warwickshire; 16. Leicestershire; 17. Derbyshire and Yorkshire; 18. Northern (Durham and Northumberland).

The concealed coalbasins are:—1. Somersetshire; 2. The Midland Basin, of which the Denbighshire, Shrewsbury, South Staffordshire, Warwickshire, Leicestershire, and North Staffordshire coalfields form the marginal outcrop; 3. South Lancashire and Cheshire Basin, of which the coalfields of South Lancashire and Flintshire form the marginal limits, the southern margin being concealed; 4. Yorkshire, Derbyshire, and Nottingham Basin, of which the eastern margin is concealed; 5. Northumberland and Durham Basin, of which the eastern and southern margins are concealed; 6. Cumberland Basin, of which the eastern and western margins are concealed.

- Map 20.—The Death-rate map gives for each county the death-rate in 1881, in figures, and shows graphically by colour the groups of highest and lowest death-rates, and so by inference the healthiest and unhealthiest counties. A list is also given, with the death-rate, of twenty large English towns.
- Map 21.—Registration Divisions and Counties. This is an index map to the Census Tables of England and Wales, and to the publications of the Local Government Board. By means of red lines and numerals, the divisions in which the counties are grouped for the numbering of the people and the registration of births and deaths are shown. The consecutive numbering of the counties is also given in red figures.
- Map 22.—The Parliamentary Representation map shows the parliamentary divisions of the counties; gives the names of all the parliamentary boroughs; and indicates by the character of the writing the number of representatives returned by each. One inset map shows the boroughs in the hardware country, and another the closely packed boroughs in South Lancashire. A complete list of all

## NOTES ON THE MAPS,

#### INTRODUCTORY AND EXPLANATORY.

Map 1.—The Geological Map of Great Britain was prepared by Sir Andrew C. Ramsay, F.R.S.; it contains as much and as accurate information on the geological structure of the country as can possibly be condensed into so small a compass.

Map 2.—It is accompanied by an Orographical map on the same scale, for comparison, whereby it may be seen how the harder rocks form the mountains and the softer rocks the plains and rolling downs. A light green tint shows the corn and garden land, the plains and lowlands that lie below the 250 feet contour. A dark green tint indicates the wood and pasture land, the hill country that, rising over the lowlands, does not exceed 500 feet above the sea. A brown tint shows the heath and moorland, the hills and mountains that, rising above the contour of 500 feet, reach the 2,000 feet line. Finally, a red tint indicates the tourist land, the mountains that rise above the 2,000 feet level.

Map 3.—The River Basin map has been reduced from the Ordnance Survey publication, and is supplemented by a complete list of all the River Basins marked on the map, showing the length of each principal stream and the area of drainage of each basin. The River Basins are grouped in their respective oceanic watersheds, and the total area of drainage of each great watershed is also given from official sources.

Maps 4 to 15.—Rainfall and Temperature—a series of climatic maps showing the temperature of the air and of the sea, the rainfall, and the barometric pressure, for each month of the year. The Temperature maps have been constructed by Alexander Buchan, Esq., F.R.S., and are illustrated by him in explanatory text. The Rainfall maps have been prepared from the Rainfall Tables, 1866-1880, issued by the Meteorological Council, compiled from the records of 366 stations, by G. J. Symons, Esq., F.R.S. The mean of fifteen years' uninterrupted observation is here for the first time graphically represented. Each inch of rain is indicated by a zone of colour. These maps will be found useful as well as interesting; a very cursory examination, for instance, will make the tourist hesitate before selecting the Lake District in September, and will serve as a warning against autumn manœuvring on Dartmoor. The details for Sea Temperature, which is added to the Air Temperature maps, have been copied from the returns issued by the Meteorological Council; unfortunately they are very meagre, the observers being so few and far between. The observations extend in some cases over very short periods, and therefore the results are not very reliable: they are even in one or two instances contradictory. This is much to be regretted; but as there is no better information at present to be had, it has been thought well to issue the maps in their present form, rather than to leave this interesting subject without illustration. The air pressure has also been copied from the publications of the Meteorological Council; the Isobaric lines give the mean monthly pressure deduced from observations extending over long periods.

the parliamentary counties and divisions, and the boroughs and their divisions, accompanies this map.

Map 23.—The Diocesan map gives the names of the dioceses, shows the counties and parts of counties of which they are composed, and marks the sites of bishops' sees and the cathedral towns. It gives also the population and the number of ecclesiastical parishes or separate benefices in each diocese.

The County Maps, 24 to 86, are all drawn on a uniform scale, and in accordance with usage are arranged in alphabetical order, but they are also numbered in agreement with the foregoing general Registration map, agreeing with the Census Tables and Poor Law publications. They show by red hard lines the parliamentary divisions of the county, and by red shading or ruled lines the limits of the parliamentary boroughs. Where a borough extends into a neighbouring county, as in the case of Bristol, the ruled lines are extended into such county, but the tint used for the county is confined to the county proper. Again, where a portion of the county under inspection is included in a parliamentary borough situated in a neighbouring county, the portion so included is shown by ruled red lines, and a thin outline of red, also with ruled red lines, indicates the extent in the neighbouring county of such parliamentary borough.

The names of towns and villages are engraved in various types, indicating by size and character the relative population. Railways and stations, canals and locks, and other particulars, are duly entered; all known British and Roman remains, such as camps, castles, and roads, are engraved in a special type easily recognisable, and the following particulars are given by means of script letters attached within brackets to the names of the cities and towns:—C. County Town; B. Municipal Borough; A. Assize Town; Q. Quarter Session; + Cathedral Town; M. Military Headquarters; P. Port of Entry. Other particulars are also given, as C.G.S., for Coast Guard Station; Lt. Ho., Light House; Light Vessels and Lifeboat Stations are also marked and named.

A scale of miles is engraved around the borders of all the County maps, by which a sufficiently accurate estimate of any distance within the county can be made readily by the eye without recourse to compasses or pencil.

London.—Maps of London will be found following the County map of Middlesex. The first shows the parliamentary boroughs and divisions of boroughs created by the Act of 1885 that lie within the Metropolis Local Management Act Area; the second gives on an enlarged scale the topography of Central London, and shows also the new parliamentary boundaries; the third gives the distribution of population, showing the density by colours and degrees of colour, and is accompanied by a list of all the registration districts and subdistricts, with their population.

Plans of all the Borough towns in England that return more than two members to Parliament, with their divisions into single-membered constituencies, will also be found following their respective counties.

Isle of Man, 87, drawn on the same scale as the County maps, and identical in the particulars of information given and abbreviations used.

Channel Islands, 88 and 89, three times the scale of the County maps, and very nearly the scale of the General map of London, No. 51.



























#### RAINFALL & BAROMETRICAL PRESSURE FOR JANUARY








#### AIR TEMPERATURE & SEA TEMPERATURE FOR FEBRUARY






AIR TEMPERATURE & SEA TEMPERATURE FOR MARCH





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




AIR TEMPERATURE & SEA TEMPERATURE FOR AUGUST






# AIR TEMPERATURE & SEA TEMPERATURE FOR DECEMBER










### DISTRIBUTION OF POPULATION.





































July.—The isothermals show that the influence of the ocean in moderating the heat of summer is distinctly felt for a long way inland. Thus Barrow-in-Furness has a mean temperature as low as that of Berwick, Pembroke about as low as Hexham, and Penzance as low as Lincoln. The highest summer temperatures occur not in the lowest latitudes of England, but in the district round London, where the mean temperature rises to about 64°. If a line be drawn from London northward through the central districts of the eastern slopes of England, it marks an elongated region where the summer temperature is warmer than over the districts to east and west of it in the same latitudes, thus showing in a striking manner the influence of the land in bringing about a higher temperature in the warm months of the year.

August.—In August the disturbing influence of the land and water on the lines is less pronounced than in July. The sea is warmer and the land colder. The fall of temperature begins most markedly about the middle of the month. Hence in Scilly temperature is 0°·2 higher than it is in July, but in London it is 1°·1 lower. Thunderstorms become less frequent.

September.—The lines now assume a truer east and west direction than in any other month. The slight curving downwards in the central districts, and the uptilting of the isothermals in the extreme east, point respectively to the more rapid cooling of the land and the slower cooling of the sea during the great annual fall of temperature now going forward. As compared with July, while temperature has fallen 5°·3 at Oxford, it has fallen only 2°·4 in Scilly. Further, the lines indicate a higher temperature in the North Sea than in the Atlantic in the same latitudes. This month and the first half of October rank with May as the healthiest periods of the year.

October.—The conserving influence of the ocean is strikingly seen in the relatively high temperatures in the east and west, which it is to be noted are nearly equal latitude for latitude, thus differing essentially from what obtains in the strictly winter months. On the other hand, the depressing influence of the land on the temperature, as the nights now exceed the days in length, is conspicuously illustrated by Central England, where temperatures are about a degree lower than on the coasts to the east and west. Another noteworthy feature is the great distance inland to which the influence of the sea is felt.

November.—The winter arrangement of the isothermals is now all but accomplished, the crowding of the lines in the south-western counties and their protrusion northwards through the region of the Irish Sea being very remarkable features. This great change in the distribution of the temperature is impressively seen on comparing Dover with Scilly; in October the temperature of Dover is only 1°·3 lower than that of Scilly, but in November it is 5°·5. Among the noteworthy features of the meteorology of the month are a greater prevalence of light easterly and northerly winds, with frequent calms and dense fogs. Owing to the low temperature, the mortality from diseases of the respiratory organs shoots up with great rapidity, the greatest fatality occurring among young children.

December.—The grouping of the isothermals closely resembles that of January, with the important difference that temperature is still about 2° higher than in that month. The climate of London is now 8° colder than that of Scilly, while, on the other hand, the temperature of Silloth and of Lerwick is as high as that of London. South-westerly winds acquire their maximum prevalence, which is maintained through the winter, and this, combined with the falling temperature, results in raw disagreeable weather, very inimical to the general health of the people.

## THE TEMPERATURE OF ENGLAND.

January.—The highest mean temperatures in England during January are in the south-western counties, and the lowest in the north-eastern, from the Wash to the Tweed.

The temperature of the Lands End is about 45°, and of the plain of York a little under 38°, the difference being thus 7°. The isothermals do not run east and west, as would happen if the sun alone ruled the distribution of temperature, but, roughly speaking, from north to south, which point to the prevailing W.S.W. winds from the warm waters of the Atlantic as being the most powerful influence in determining the winter distribution of the temperature. Over the whole of the east, or over the extensive region to the eastward of the isothermal of 39°, the difference of temperature is extremely small, but in the south it rapidly rises from Dover to the Lands End, and in the west from Liverpool to the Lands End; the increase in each case being about 5°. The isothermals show in a striking manner how the ocean tends to maintain a relatively high temperature at this season, and how extensive land surfaces, particularly on the east side of the watershed, are characterised by colder winters.

February.—The temperature now starts on its great annual march from winter to summer. The increase is least in the south-western counties, being the region most completely within the influence of the Atlantic, which in February falls to the minimum temperature of the year, and greatest in the eastern and south-eastern counties. Thus, while in Scilly the temperature has only risen half a degree, at York and Leicester it has risen 2°.

March.—The isothermals take a W.N.W. and E.S.E. direction, being thus intermediate between the winter and summer directions, so that not the Atlantic but the sun is now chiefly concerned in the distribution of the temperature. The influence of the Atlantic is still powerfully felt, for while the temperature of London is 4°·6 above that of January, that of Scilly is only 0°·6.

April.—The isothermals lie now nearly east and west, and they cross the country in a more regular manner, or are less thrown out of a straight course by the disturbing influences of land and water than in any other month <sup>5</sup>except September. The downward droop of the lines in the east points to the influence of the North Sea in maintaining a lower temperature during the warmer months of the year along the eastern seaboard.

May.—The influence of the land in raising the temperature in the summer months and of the sea in lowering it is now markedly seen. In this month temperature is more equally distributed over all England than at any other season of the year; indeed if a small portion of Northumberland be excluded, two isothermals suffice to show its distribution. The increase of temperature is greatest in the central districts in the south, where it is as high as in Cornwall. As the month advances east winds diminish and thunderstorms increase in frequency. Except as regards nervous diseases May is the healthiest month of the year.

June.—The lines now assume their summer positions, showing, by the closed isothermals in Central England, the influence of the land in bringing about a high summer temperature. The depressing effect of the sea is best seen in this month. The high temperatures of 60° and upwards raise the mortality from bowel and allied complaints with startling suddenness among children, to whom indeed the summer season proves to be the most fatal.



## BERKSHIRE.

#### SECOND REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 462,210 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 218,363 persons (males 108,431, females 109,932), giving 0.47 persons to an acre, and 2.12 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 107,883 persons, or 98 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was an undivided parliamentary constituency, and it contained one entire represented borough, and the chief parts of three others, besides small parts of two others, which are situated in adjoining counties. It comprises twenty hundreds, the municipal boroughs of Abingdon, Maidenhead, Newbury, Reading, Wallingford, and Windsor, and part of the city of Oxford.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into eleven Petty Sessional Divisions. All the municipalities above mentioned have Commissions of the Peace; all, except Maidenhead and Wallingford, have separate Courts of Quarter Sessions; and, with the exception of Wallingford, they all maintain their own police. The County Police Divisions are nearly identical with the Petty Sessional Divisions. There are seven Lieutenancy Subdivisions for militia purposes; and seven Highway Districts have been formed.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 193. Parts of eight parishes extend into adjoining counties, viz. Chilton Foliat, Hungerford, and Shalbourn into Wilts; St. Aldate (Oxford), Sonning, and Whitchurch into Oxon; Stratfield, Mortimer, and Stratfieldsaye into Hants. Almost the whole county is in the diocese of Oxford. See Oxfordshire.

This County has an area of 477,151 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 176,323 persons (males 86,840, females 89,483), giving 0.37 persons to an acre, and 2.71 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 68,191 persons, or 63 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was an undivided constituency, and it contained three represented boroughs, the greater part of a fourth, and a small part of another. The limits of the parliamentary borough of Aylesbury were extended in 1868. The county comprises eight hundreds, and the municipal boroughs of Buckingham and Chipping Wycombe. The hundreds of Stoke, Burnham, and Desborough are known as the "Chiltern Hundreds."

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into twelve Petty Sessional Divisions. Both the municipalities have Commissions of the Peace, and the borough of Buckingham has also a separate Court of Quarter Sessions. For police purposes the county has been divided into five divisions, exclusive of the two boroughs, which maintain their own police. There are twelve Lieutenancy Subdivisions for militia purposes. No Highway Districts have been formed.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 224. Parts of four parishes extend into an adjoining county, viz. Ibstone, Ickford, Kingsey, and Lewknor into Oxon. The county is almost entirely in the diocese of Oxford.

### BEDFORDSHIRE.

#### THIRD REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 294,983 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 149,473 persons (males 70,354, females 79,119), giving 0.51 persons to an acre, and 1.97 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 86,080 persons, or 134 per cent. The number of inhabited houses in 1881 was 31,509.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was an undivided parliamentary constituency, and it contained one represented borough. It comprises nine hundreds and the municipal boroughs of Bedford, Dunstable, and Luton, this last having been incorporated in 1876.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into seven Petty Sessional Divisions. The boroughs of Dunstable, Luton, and Bedford have Commissions of the Peace, and the last has a separate Court of Quarter Sessions. All the boroughs maintain their own police. The Petty Sessional Divisions are nearly identical with the County Police Divisions. There are eight Lieutenancy Subdivisions for militia purposes; and five Highway Districts have been formed.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 134. Parts of two civil parishes, viz. Caddington and Studham, extend into the adjoining county of Herts. The whole county is in the diocese of Ely. See Cambridgeshire.

## CAMBRIDGESHIRE.

#### THIRD REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 524,935 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 185,594 persons (males 91,277, females 94,317), giving an average of 0.35 persons to an acre, and 2.83 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 96,248 persons, or 108 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was an undivided constituency, and it contained the represented borough and university of Cambridge. The limits of the parliamentary borough of Cambridge were extended in 1868. The county comprises seventeen hundreds, and the municipal boroughs of Cambridge and Wisbech. The hundreds of Ely, Wisbech, and Witchford (North and South parts), with the borough of Wisbech, constitute the Liberty of the Isle of Ely.

There are two Courts of Quarter Sessions, viz. one for the county and one for the Isle of Ely, the latter having also a separate Commission of the Peace, a gaol, a treasurer, and making its own levy in the nature of a county rate. The county is divided into ten Petty Sessional Divisions, four of which, and also the borough of Wisbech, are within the Isle of Ely. The borough of Cambridge has a Commission of the Peace and a separate Court of Quarter Sessions, and the borough of Wisbech has a Commission of the Peace.

The County Police Divisions are identical with those for Petty Sessions, the Isle of Ely having a separate police force. The boroughs of Cambridge and Wisbech maintain their own police. Only one Highway District has been formed in this county. There are eleven Lieutenancy Subdivisions.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 172. Parts of seven parishes extend into adjoining counties, viz. Helion Bumpstead into Essex; Outwell, Upwell, Welney into Norfolk; Royston into Herts; Papworth, St. Agnes, and Standground into Hunts. The county is almost entirely in the diocese of Ely, which also comprises the entire counties of Bedford and Huntingdon, the greater part of Suffolk, and smaller portions of other counties, and has a total population of 512,747.



# CHESHIRE.

## EIGHTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County Palatine has an area of 657,123 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 644,037 persons (males 311,188, females 332,849), giving an average of 0.98 persons to an acre, and 1.02 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 451,732 persons, or 235 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into East Cheshire, including the borough of Macclesfield and such parts of the boroughs of Ashton-under-Lyne, Stalybridge, and Stockport as are in this county; Mid Cheshire, including the part of the borough of Warrington in this county; and West Cheshire, including the borough of Birkenhead and part of the city of Chester. The parliamentary limits of Chester extend into Flintshire. Stalybridge was constituted a parliamentary borough in 1868. The limits of the parliamentary boroughs of Chester and Macclesfield were extended in 1868. The county comprises seven hundreds, the city of Chester, the municipal boroughs of Birkenhead, Congleton, Crewe, Hyde, and Macclesfield, and parts of the boroughs of Stalybridge, Stockport, and Warrington. The principal part of Warrington and parts of Stalybridge and Stockport are in Lancashire. The boroughs of Birkenhead and Crewe were incorporated in 1877, that of Hyde in 1881.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into fourteen Petty Sessional Divisions. The city of Chester (a county of itself) has a Commission of the Peace and a separate Court of Quarter Sessions; and the boroughs of Birkenhead, Congleton, Crewe, Macclesfield, Stalybridge, and Stockport have Commissions of the Peace. For police purposes the county is divided into ten Divisions. The city of Chester and all the municipal boroughs, except Crewe and Hyde, have their own police. There are twelve Lieutenancy Subdivisions, and twelve Highway Districts have been formed.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 504. Parts of five parishes extend into adjoining counties, viz. Barthomley into Staffordshire; Doddlestone and Threapwood into Flintshire; and Malpas and Whitchurch into Salop. Most of the ancient parishes are large, and are divided into townships. With the exception of parts of the parishes of Mottram, Threapwood, and Whitchurch, the county is in the diocese of Chester, which comprises also portions of adjoining counties, and has a total population of 646,031.







# CORNWALL.

## FIFTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 863,665 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 330,686 persons (males 155,115, females 175,571), giving 0.38 persons to an acre, and 2.61 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 138,405 persons, or 72 per cent. The number of inhabited houses in 1881 was 69,790.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided for parliamentary representation into East Cornwall, including the boroughs of Bodmin, Launceston, and Liskeard; and West Cornwall, including the boroughs of Helston, Penryn and Falmouth, St. Ives, and Truro. The limits of the parliamentary borough of Penryn and Falmouth were extended in 1868. The county comprises nine hundreds, the Scilly Islands, and the municipal boroughs of Bodmin, Falmouth, Helston, Launceston, Liskeard, Penryn, Penzance, St. Ives, and the city of Truro.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into sixteen Petty Sessional Divisions. All the boroughs, except Launceston, have Commissions of the Peace; and Helston and Penzance have separate Courts of Quarter Sessions. The mainland of the county comprises six Police Divisions. The boroughs of Falmouth, Helston, Launceston, Liskeard, Penryn, Penzance, St. Ives, and Truro, have their own police. Five of the Scilly Islands are inhabited, and the constables of these islands are appointed at the Petty Sessions held at St. Mary. The jurisdiction of the Court of the Vice-Warden of the Stannaries extends over the counties of Cornwall and Devon, to all companies formed to work mines of metallic minerals within the two counties, and over all transactions connected therewith. There are sixteen Lieutenancy Subdivisions for militia purposes, which are nearly identical with the Petty Sessional Divisions; the general law regulating the militia does not apply to the miners of Cornwall and Devon, the Stannaries in that respect being governed by 42 Geo. III. c. 72.

There are eighteen Highway Districts in the county. The Scilly Islands constitute one district, the roads therein being kept in repair by waywardens annually chosen at Vestry meetings and appointed by the magistrates.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 218. Part of the parish of Boyton extends into Devon. The county is in the diocese of Truro, which comprises also part of Devon, and has a total population of 330,766.

In all registration and census matters Cornwall is regarded as forming part of the Fifth Registration Division, and the population of every parish in the several Superintendent Registrars' Districts, or Poor Law Unions, is given in the Table relating to that Division.

# CUMBERLAND.

## TENTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 970,161 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 250,647 persons (males 124,746, females 125,901), giving 0.26 persons to an acre, and 3.87 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 133,417 persons, or 114 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into East Cumberland, including the represented city of Carlisle; and West Cumberland, including the represented boroughs of Cockermouth and Whitehaven. The county comprises five wards and the city of Carlisle.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into ten Petty Sessional Divisions. The city of Carlisle has a separate Court of Quarter Sessions and Commission of the Peace. There are two Police Divisions for the county, and the city of Carlisle and borough of Kendal maintain their own police. There are seven Lieutenancy Subdivisions for militia purposes; and three Highway Districts have been formed.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 208. With the exception of the parish of Alston, which is in the diocese of Durham, the whole county is in the diocese of Carlisle, which comprises also the entire county of Westmoreland, and part of that of Lancashire, and has a total population of 401,280.





## DERBYSHIRE.

#### SEVENTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 658,624 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 461,914 persons (males 232,504, females 229,410), giving 0.7 persons to an acre, and 1.43 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 300,347 persons, or 186 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into East, North, and South Derbyshire; and it contains one represented borough, the limits of which were extended in 1885. The county comprises six hundreds and the municipal boroughs of Chesterfield, Derby, and Glossop, with part of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent, the greater part of which is in Staffordshire.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into thirteen Petty Sessional Divisions. The borough of Derby has a Commission of the Peace and a separate Court of Quarter Sessions; and the boroughs of Chesterfield and Glossop have Commissions of the Peace. The Police Divisions are nearly identical with those for Petty Sessions. The boroughs of Chesterfield, Derby, and Glossop maintain their own police. There are six Lieutenancy Subdivisions for militia purposes; and at the Census of 1871 one Highway District had been formed, but it has since been dissolved.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 322. Many of the ancient parishes in this county are large, and are divided into Townships. Parts of eight parishes extend into adjoining counties, viz. Appleby, Packington, and Ravenstone, into Leicester; Pinxton into Nottinghamshire; Burton-upon-Trent, Clifton Campville, Croxall, and Scropton, into Stafford. The county is in the diocese of Southwell, with the exception of parts of the parishes of Appleby, Hartshorn, and Packington, and the parish of Boundary. See Nottinghamshire.





## DEVONSHIRE.

#### FIFTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 1,655,208 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 603,595 persons (males 285,340, females 318,255), giving 0.36 persons to an acre, and 2.74 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 263,287 persons, or 77 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into East, North, and South Devon, and it contained six represented cities and boroughs. It comprises thirty-three hundreds, the city of Exeter, and the municipal boroughs of Barnstaple, Bideford, Dartmouth, Devonport, Honiton, Plymouth, South Molton, Tiverton, Torrington, and Totnes.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into twenty-two Petty Sessional Divisions. The city of Exeter (a county of itself), and the boroughs of Barnstaple, Bideford, Dartmouth, Devonport, Plymouth, South Molton, Tiverton, and Totnes have Commissions of the Peace and, with the exception of Totnes, separate Courts of Quarter Sessions. The jurisdiction of the Court of the Vice-Warden of the Stannaries extends to all companies formed to work mines of metallic minerals within the counties of Devon and Cornwall, and over all transactions connected therewith.

There are thirteen Police Divisions in the county, each consisting of one or more Petty Sessional Divisions. The city of Exeter, and the boroughs of Barnstaple, Bideford, Devonport, Plymouth, South Molton, Tiverton, Torrington, and Totnes have their own police. There are twenty-three Lieutenancy Subdivisions, one comprising the city of Exeter; the other twenty-two being mostly identical with Petty Sessional Divisions. The Highway Act has only been partially adopted in this county. Of the twenty-five Highway Districts fifteen are identical with Petty Sessional Divisions, the remaining ten Districts being comprised within five of such divisions.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 483. Parts of three parishes extend into adjoining counties, viz. Axminster into Dorset, Boyton into Cornwall, and Exmoor into Somerset. The whole county is in the diocese of Exeter, except parts of certain parishes which are in the dioceses of Salisbury and Truro. The total population of the diocese of Exeter is 603,211.



## DORSETSHIRE.

#### FIFTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 627,265 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 191,028 persons (males 93,736, females 97,292), giving 0.3 persons to an acre, and 3.28 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 76,576 persons, or 67 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was an undivided constituency, and it contained six represented boroughs. It comprises thirty-four hundreds, twenty-two liberties, and the municipal boroughs of Blandford, Bridport, Dorchester, Lyme Regis, Poole, Shaftesbury, and Weymouth and Melcombe Regis.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into nine Petty Sessional Divisions. The borough of Poole, a county of itself, has a Commission of the Peace and a separate Court of Quarter Sessions; the boroughs of Bridport, Dorchester, Lyme Regis, and Weymouth and Melcombe Regis, have Commissions of the Peace; and the town of Wareham, as an old corporate borough, holds Annual General Sessions. For police purposes the county is divided into nine Divisions. The boroughs of Blandford, Dorchester, Poole, and Weymouth and Melcombe Regis, have their own police. There are nine Lieutenancy Subdivisions, and nine Highway Districts have been formed.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 288. Part of the parish of Tollard Royal is in Wiltshire, part of Axminster in Devon, and part of the parish of Hampreston has hitherto been regarded as being in Hants, but the Clerk of the Peace considers that the whole parish is now in Dorset. The whole county is in the diocese of Salisbury. See WILTSHIRE.







Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into North and South Durham, and contained one represented city and six represented boroughs. It comprises four wards, the city of Durham, and the municipal boroughs of Gateshead, Hartlepool, Jarrow, South Shields, Stockton, Sunderland, and Darlington. The municipal borough of Sunderland was enlarged in 1867.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into nine Petty Sessional Divisions. The city of Durham and all the municipal boroughs have Commissions of the Peace. There are twelve Police Divisions. The Police Divisions of Darlington and Stockton respectively include the boroughs of the same name. The city of Durham, and the boroughs of Gateshead, Hartlepool, South Shields, and Sunderland have their own police. There are four Lieutenancy Subdivisions, and ten Highway Districts have been formed.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 269. Part of the parish of Sockburn is in Yorkshire. The whole county is in the diocese of Durham, which includes also a small part of the North Riding of Yorkshire, and has a population of 867,427.



#### FOURTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 987,032 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 576,434 persons (males 288,180, females 288,254), giving 0.58 persons to an acre, and 1.71 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 348,752 persons, or 154 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into East, South, and West Essex, and it contained three represented boroughs. It comprises nineteen hundreds, the Liberty of Havering-atte-Bower, the municipal boroughs of Colchester, Harwich, Maldon, and Saffron Walden, and part of the borough of Sudbury (the principal part being in Suffolk).

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the County, and it is divided into eighteen Petty Sessional Divisions. The Central Criminal Court has jurisdiction over certain parishes in this county. The Liberty of Havering-atte-Bower has a separate Court of Quarter Sessions; the boroughs of Colchester, Maldon, Saffron Walden, and Sudbury have Commissions of the Peace and Courts of Quarter Sessions; and Harwich has a Commission of the Peace. Brightlingsea is a member of the Cinque Port of Sandwich in Kent; but the Justices of Essex have a concurrent jurisdiction therein, and it forms part of the Winstree and Lexden Petty Sessional Division. For the purposes of the county rate, the Liberty of Havering-atte-Bower, which comprises the parishes of Havering-atte-Bower, Hornchurch, and Romford, is separately rated; and the remainder of the county is divided into an Eastern Division and a Western Division. There are ten Police Divisions of the county; but the parishes of Barking, Chigwell, Chingford, Dagenham, East Ham, Little Ilford, Loughton, Low Leighton, Waltham Abbey, Walthamstow, Wanstead, West Ham, and Woodford, are within the Metropolitan Police District. The boroughs of Colchester and Maldon have their own police.

The Highways Act has been partially adopted in this county, eight districts having been formed. There are sixteen Lieutenancy Subdivisions for militia purposes.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 412. Parts of four parishes extend into adjoining counties, viz. Helion Bumstead into Cambridge; Bures (St. Mary), Haverhill, and Kedington into Suffolk. The county is entirely in the diocese of St. Albans. See Hertfordshire.
















# GLOUCESTERSHIRE.

#### SIXTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 783,699 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 572,433 persons (males 269,470, females 302,963), giving 0.73 persons to an acre, and 1.37 acres to a person. Since the first census in 1801 the population has increased by 321,710 persons, or 128 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into East and West Gloucestershire, and contained two represented cities and four represented boroughs and part of a fifth (viz. Cricklade in Wilts). It comprises twenty-nine hundreds (including the Duchy of Lancaster), the city of Gloucester, the greater part of the city of Bristol, and the municipal boroughs of Cheltenham (incorporated in 1876) and Tewkesbury. The remainder of Bristol is in Somersetshire.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into twenty-four Petty Sessional Divisions. The cities of Bristol and Gloucester, which are counties of themselves, and the borough of Tewkesbury, have Commissions of the Peace and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions.

The County Police Divisions, of which there are eleven, are mostly conterminous with groups of Petty Sessional Divisions. The city of Bristol has its own police. There are nineteen Lieutenancy Subdivisions for militia purposes; and twenty-one Highway Districts, which comprise, however, only a part of the county.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 392. Parts of five parishes extend into adjoining counties, viz. Broughton Poggs into Oxon; Ilmington, Walford, and Weston-on-Avon, into Warwick; and Overbury into Worcester. The county is partly in the dioceses of Gloucester and Bristol, Hereford, Oxford, and Worcester. The diocese of Gloucester and Bristol includes also parts of the counties of Somerset and Wilts, with smaller portions of adjacent counties, and has a total population of 695,952.



















### HAMPSHIRE.

#### SECOND REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 1,037,764 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 593,470 persons (males 293,050, females 300,420), giving 0.57 persons to an acre, and 1.75 acres to a person. Since the first census in 1801 the population has increased by 374,180 persons, or 170 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county formed three divisions, viz. North Hants, South Hants, and the Isle of Wight. It (including the Isle of Wight) comprises thirty-eight hundreds, the twelve liberties of Alverstoke and Gosport, Beaulieu, Bentley, Breamore, Dibden, Havant, Lymington, Portsea, The Soke, West Stour, East Medina and West Medina, the city of Winchester, and the boroughs of Andover, Basingstoke, Lymington, Newport, Portsmouth, Romsey, Ryde, and Southampton. Ryde was incorporated in 1868.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into fourteen Petty Sessional Divisions. The city of Winchester and the boroughs of Andover, Portsmouth, and Southampton (a county of itself) have Commissions of the Peace and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions; and the boroughs of Basingstoke, Newport, Romsey, and Ryde-have Commissions of the Peace. In the borough of Lymington the mayor and ex-mayor are magistrates, and the County Justices have concurrent jurisdiction. The Police Divisions are identical with those for Petty Sessions, except that the Droxford Petty Sessional Division is, for Police purposes, united to the Fareham Division. The city of Winchester, the town of Southampton, and the boroughs of Portsmouth, Basingstoke, Newport, and Ryde, have their own police. There are seventeen Lieutenancy Subdivisions, and nineteen Highway Districts.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 351, and there are in addition parts of five parishes which extend into adjoining counties, viz. Bramshaw, West Dean, Steep, Stratfield Mortimer, and Stratfieldsaye. The county is almost entirely in the diocese of Winchester, in which are also included the Channel Islands, part of the county of Surrey, and smaller portions of adjacent counties; its total population is 847,370.



### HEREFORDSHIRE.

#### SIXTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 532,918 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 121,062 persons (males 59,809, females 61,253), giving 0.23 persons to an acre, and 4.40 acres to a person. Since the first census in 1801 the population has increased by 32,626 persons, or 37 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was an undivided parliamentary constituency, and contained the represented city of Hereford, the borough of Leominster, part of the borough of Ludlow, and part of the Radnor district of boroughs. It comprises eleven hundreds, the city of Hereford, and the municipal borough of Leominster.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into eleven Petty Sessional Divisions. The city of Hereford has a Commission of the Peace and a separate Court of Quarter Sessions; and the borough of Leominster has a Commission of the Peace. The Police Divisions are identical with those for Petty Sessions. The city of Hereford and the borough of Leominster have their own police. There are eleven Lieutenancy Subdivisions, and ten Highway Districts, which, however, do not comprise the whole of the county.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 258. Parts of ten parishes extend into adjoining counties, viz. Bockleton, Brampton Bryan, Bucknell, Cwmyoy, Leintwardine, Ludford, Old Radnor, Presteigne, Richards Castle, and Stoke Bliss. The county is mostly in the diocese of Hereford, but partly also in the dioceses of Llandaff and Worcester. The diocese of Hereford likewise comprises parts of the counties of Salop, Worcester, Radnor, and Montgomery, and has a total population of 229,609.





#### FIRST AND SECOND REGISTRATION DIVISIONS.

This County has an area of 995,392 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 977,706 persons (males 478,653, females 499,053), giving 0.98 persons to an acre, and 1.02 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 669,039 persons, or 217 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into East Kent, including the city of Canterbury, and the boroughs of Dover, Hythe, and Sandwich; Mid-Kent, including the city of Rochester and the boroughs of Chatham, Gravesend (enfranchised 1868), and Maidstone; and West Kent, including part of the borough of Greenwich, the remainder of which is in the East Division of Surrey.

Kent is divided into five lathes; and comprises seventy-three hundreds, the Cinque Port Liberties of Dover, Hythe, and New Romney, and parts of the Cinque Port Liberties of Hastings, Sandwich, and the ancient town of Rye, the Sessional Liberty of Romney Marsh, the cities of Canterbury and Rochester, and the municipal boroughs of Deal, Dover, Faversham, Folkestone, Gravesend, Hythe, Maidstone, Margate, Sandwich, and Tenderden.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into sixteen Petty Sessional Divisions, exclusive of the liberty of Romney Marsh, which has Petty and General Sessions under its charters. The Central Criminal Court has jurisdiction over certain parishes in this county. The city of Canterbury (a county of itself), the city of Rochester, and the boroughs of Gravesend, and Maidstone, have Commissions of the Peace and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions, as have also the ports and boroughs of Deal, Dover, Faversham, Folkestone, Hythe, Margate, Sandwich, and Tenderden. The ancient borough of Queenborough has a Recorder and a Court of Quarter Sessions, with a separate jurisdiction limited to misdemeanors; summary cases are dealt with by the mayor and magistrates in Petty Sessions. The corporate towns of Fordwich, Lydd, and New Romney are governed by old charters. Part of Kent is within the Metropolitan Police District, viz. all those parishes any part of which is within twelve miles of, and not more than fifteen miles distant (in a straight line) from, Charing Cross. The part of the county beyond the limits of the Metropolitan Police District is, for police purposes, divided into twelve districts, which are generally identical with the Petty Sessional Divisions. The cities of Canterbury and Rochester, the boroughs of Deal, Dover, Faversham, Folkestone, Gravesend, Hythe, Maidstone, Margate, Sandwich, and Tenderden, and the towns of Ramsgate and Tunbridge Wells, have their own police. The county contains seventeen Lieutenancy Subdivisions, exclusive of the Cinque Ports and the liberty of Romney Marsh; and thirteen Highway Districts, exclusive of the part within the district of the Metropolitan Board of Works. The vestry of the parish of Woolwich exercises therein the powers of a District Board of Works; the remaining Metropolitan parishes in this county are included in the districts of Greenwich, Lewisham, and Plumstead, each having a District Board The London School Board District, which is identical with the District of the Metropolitan Board of Works, extends into Kent.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 437, and there are parts of six parishes which extend into adjoining counties, viz. Broomhill, St. Paul Deptford, Frant, Hawkhurst, Horsemonden, and Lamberhurst. Excepting portions of the parishes of Frant and Hawkhurst, the county is within the dioceses of Canterbury and Rochester. The diocese of Canterbury includes also some portions of the counties of Surrey and Sussex, and has a total population of 653,269; that of Rochester comprises parts of the same counties, and has a population of 1,594,402.



THE PARLIAMENTARY DIVISIONS OF LIVERPOOL.










THE PARLIAMENTARY DIVISIONS OF MANCHESTER & SALFORD.





## LANCASHIRE.

#### EIGHTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County Palatine has an area of 1,208,154 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 3,454,441 persons (males 1,669,864, females 1,784,577), giving 2.86 persons to an acre, and 0.35 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 2,780,955 persons, or 413 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into North Lancashire, including the borough of Preston; North-east Lancashire, including the boroughs of Blackburn, Burnley, and Clitheroe; South-east Lancashire, including the city of Manchester and the boroughs of Bolton, Bury, Oldham, Rochdale, and Salford, and the parts of the boroughs of Ashton-under-Lyne, Stalybridge, and Stockport in this county; and South-west Lancashire, including the boroughs of Liverpool and Wigan, and the part of the borough of Warrington in this county. The county comprises six hundreds, the cities of Liverpool and Manchester, the municipal boroughs of Accrington, Ashton-under-Lyne, Barrow-in-Furness, Blackburn, Blackpool, Bolton, Bootle-cum-Linacre, Burnley, Bury, Clitheroe, Heywood, Lancaster, Oldham, Over Darwen, Preston, Rochdale, St. Helens, Salford, Southport, and Wigan, and parts of the boroughs of Stalybridge, Stockport, and Warrington; the principal parts of Stalybridge and Stockport, and a small portion of Warrington, being in Cheshire. Barrowin-Furness and Southport were incorporated in 1867, Bootle-cum-Linacre in 1868, St. Helens in 1869, Blackpool in 1875, Bury in 1876, Accrington and Over Darwen in 1878, and Heywood in 1881.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into thirty-three Petty Sessional Divisions. The cities of Liverpool and Manchester, and the boroughs of Bolton and Wigan, have Commissions of the Peace and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions; and the boroughs of Accrington, Ashton-under-Lyne, Blackburn, Bootle-cum-Linacre, Burnley, Bury, Clitheroe, Lancaster, Oldham, Preston, Rochdale, Salford, Southport, and Warrington, have Commissions of the Peace. For police purposes eighteen Divisions have been formed: the cities of Liverpool and Manchester, and all the municipal boroughs, except Blackpool, Bootle-cum-Linacre, Burnley, Bury, Clitheroe, Heywood, Over Darwen, and St. Helens, have their own police. There are sixteen Lieutenancy Subdivisions and ten Highway Districts, which latter, however, include only part of the county.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 455, and there are parts of five parishes which extend into adjoining counties, viz. Burton-in-Kendal, Mitton, Rochdale, Thornton-in-Lonsdale, and Whalley. The county is comprised in the dioceses of Liverpool, Manchester, Chester, Carlisle, and Ripon. The total population of the diocese of Liverpool is 1,085,634; that of the diocese of Manchester, which also embraces parts of Cheshire and Yorkshire, 2,297,015.



## LEICESTERSHIRE.

#### SEVENTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 511,907 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 321,258 persons (males 155,881, females 165,377), giving an average of 0.62 persons to an acre, and 1.59 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 191,176 persons, or 147 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into North Leicestershire and South Leicestershire, the latter including the borough of Leicester, the only parliamentary borough in the county. Under the Act named the county is now divided into four Parliamentary Divisions, and the parliamentary borough is still maintained. The county comprises six hundreds and the municipal borough of Leicester.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into nine Petty Sessional Divisions. The borough of Leicester has a Commission of Peace and a separate Court of Quarter Sessions. The County Police Divisions are nearly identical with those for Petty Sessions. The borough of Leicester has its own police. There are nine Lieutenancy Subdivisions, and nine Highway Districts have been formed.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 331. Many of the ancient parishes of this county are large, and are divided into townships. The county is almost entirely in the diocese of Peterborough (see Northamptonshire), and contains parts of eight parishes which extend into adjoining counties, viz. Appleby, Claybrooke, Hinckley, Merevale, Packington, Ravenstone, Stoke Dry, and Theddingworth.

## RUTLANDSHIRE.

#### SEVENTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 94,889 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 21,434 persons (males 10,764, females 10,670), giving 0.23 persons to an acre, and 4.43 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 5134 persons, or 32 per cent.

Under the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, Rutlandshire is the sole undivided county constituency in England, and it contains no represented borough. It comprises five hundreds, but contains no municipal borough.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county; it is not, however, subdivided either for Petty Sessional or Lieutenancy purposes. There are three Police Districts, two of which consist respectively of the towns of Oakham and Uppingham; the third district comprising the remainder of the county. The Highways Act has not been adopted.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 57, and part of another parish, namely, Stoke Dry, extends into Leicestershire. The county is in the diocese of Peterborough. See Northamptonshire.









Stanford's Geographical Estat



## LINCOLNSHIRE.

## SEVENTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 1,767,879 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 469,919 persons (males 235,219, female 234,700), giving '27 persons to an acre, and 3.76 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 261,294 persons, or 125 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into North Lincolnshire, including the borough of Great Grimbsy; Mid Lincolnshire, including the city of Lincoln; and South Lincolnshire, including the boroughs of Boston and Grantham, and the part of the borough of Stamford in this county.

Lincolnshire is divided into three divisions, viz. the parts of Holland, the parts of Kesteven, and the parts of Lindsey; and comprises thirty-one wapentakes, hundreds, liberties, and sokes, the city of Lincoln, the municipal boroughs of Boston, Grantham, Great Grimsby, and Louth, and the principal part of the municipal borough of Stamford, the remainder being in Northamptonshire

Each of the three divisions of the county has a separate Court of Quarter Sessions. The parts of Holland are divided into two Petty Sessional Divisions; the parts of Kesteven into four Petty Sessional Divisions; and the parts of Lindsey into thirteen Petty Sessional Divisions. The city of Lincoln, a county of itself, and the boroughs of Grantham and Stamford, have Commissions of the Peace and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions, and the boroughs of Boston, Great Grimsby, and Louth have Commissions of the Peace.

The parts of Holland are, for the purposes of the county rates, divided into a Northern and a Southern Division. The Police Divisions of the county are identical with those for Petty Sessions, except that for police purposes the Petty Sessional Divisions of Market Rasen and Wragby are united. Three Highway Districts have been formed. The city of Lincoln, and the boroughs of Boston, Grantham, Great Grimsby, Louth, and Stamford have their own police. Of the thirteen Lieutenancy Subdivisions two are in the parts of Holland five in the parts of Kesteven, and six in the parts of Lindsey.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 751, and there are parts of three parishes which extend into adjoining counties, viz. Crowle, Flawford, and Central Wingland. The county is in the diocese of Lincoln, which also embraces parts of Norfolk and of the West Riding of York; its total population is 471,319.





# MIDDLESEX.

### FIRST AND THIRD REGISTRATION DIVISIONS.

This County has an area of 181,317 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 2,920,485 persons (males 1,367,692, females 1,552,793) giving 16:11 persons to an acre, and '06 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 2,102,356 persons, or 257 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was an undivided constituency, and it contained seven represented cities and boroughs. It comprises six hundreds and the city of London.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into seventeen Petty Sessional Divisions, exclusive of the city of London, which is a county of itself. The Central Criminal Court also has jurisdiction over the entire county of Middlesex, as well as over certain parishes in the counties of Essex, Kent, and Surrey.

The city of London has a separate police force. The remainder of Middlesex is within the Metropolitan Police District, as are also all those parishes in Hertford, Essex, Kent, and Surrey, any part of which is within twelve miles of, or not more than fifteen miles distant (in a straight line) from, Charing Cross. Of the twenty Police Divisions nine are entirely in Middlesex, two are partly in Middlesex and Hertford, two are partly in Middlesex and Essex, two are partly in Kent and Surrey, and four are entirely in Surrey. The Thames Police constitute the remaining division. The district within the jurisdiction of the Central Criminal Court is not so extensive as the Metropolitan Police District.

The District of the Metropolitan Board of Works comprises parts of the counties of Middlesex, Surrey and Kent, and is nearly identical with the district which, by the Poor Law and other authorities, is now deemed to be "London," and for which a weekly return of births and deaths is prepared and published by the authority of the Registrar-General.

In the city of London the Commissioners of Sewers exercise the powers of a District Board of Works; in twenty-three Metropolitan parishes the Vestries exercise similar powers; the remaining Metropolitan parishes are united into fifteen districts, each of which has a Local Board of Works.

The county is divided into eighteen Lieutenancy Subdivisions, of which the City of London is one; the seventeen other Subdivisions being identical with the Petty Sessional Divisions. The militia of the City and of the Tower Hamlets is distinct from the County Militia, and is raised and regulated under special statutes.

The London School Board District is identical with the District of the Metropolitan Board of Works.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 222. With the exception of that part of Stanwell civil parish which is in the diocese of Oxford, the county is in the diocese of London, which likewise includes part of the county of Hertford and has a population of 2,920,362.

# HERTFORDSHIRE.

### THIRD REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 405,141 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 203,069 persons (males 98,792, females 104,277), giving 0.5 persons to an acre, and 2.0 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 105,676 persons, or 108 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was an undivided constituency, and it contained one represented borough. It comprises eight hundreds, the city of St. Albans, and the municipal borough of Hertford.

There are two Courts of Quarter Sessions, one for the county, and one for the liberty of St. Albans, which liberty has also a separate Commission of the Peace, a gaol, a treasurer, and makes its own levy in the nature of a county rate. The county is divided into fourteen Petty Sessional Divisions, four of which, and also the city of St. Albans, are within the liberty of St. Albans. The boroughs of Hertford and St. Albans have Commissions of the Peace.

The following parishes in Herts are within the Metropolitan Police District, namely, Aldenham, Bushey, Cheshunt, Chipping Barnet, East Barnet, Elstree, Northaw, Ridge, Shenley, and Totteridge. The remainder of the county, including the liberty of St. Albans, is under the county constabulary, and has been divided by the chief constable into eleven Police Districts. The city of St. Albans and the borough of Hertford have their own police. There are nine Lieutenancy Subdivisions for militia purposes, and seven Highway Districts have been formed.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 138. Parts of three parishes extend into adjoining counties, viz. Caddington and Studham into Bedford, and Royston into Cambridge. The whole county is in the diocese of St. Albans, which likewise includes the whole of the county of Essex, and has a population of 778,586.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into twelve Petty Sessional Divisions; the boroughs of Monmouth and Newport have Commissions of the Peace. There are four Police Districts, and the boroughs of Monmouth and Newport have their own police. There are eight Highway Districts and Twelve Lieutenancy Subdivisions.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 145, and there are parts of four parishes which extend into adjoining counties, viz. Bedwas, Cwmyoy, Machen, and Michaelstoneyvedw. The county is in the diocese of Llandaff (see Glamorganshire).

## NORFOLK.

## FOURTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 1,356,173 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 444,749 persons (males 215,266, females 229,483), giving '33 persons to an acre, and 3.05 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 171,270 persons, or 63 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into North Norfolk; South Norfolk, including the city of Norwich; and West Norfolk, including the borough of King's Lynn. It comprises thirty-three hundreds, the city of Norwich, the municipal borough of King's Lynn, and the principal parts of Great Yarmouth and Thetford, both of which boroughs extend into Suffolk.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into twenty-five Petty Sessional Divisions. The city of Norwich, a county of itself, and the boroughs of King's Lynn, Great Yarmouth, and Thetford, have Commissions of the Peace and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions. There are twenty-nine Lieutenancy Subdivisions; no Highway Districts have been formed. For police purposes the county is divided into fifteen Districts. The city of Norwich and the boroughs of King's Lynn and Great Yarmouth have their own police.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 736, and there are parts of nine others which extend into adjoining counties, namely, Brandon, Mendham, Outwell, Rushford, St. Cuthbert (Thetford), St. Mary (Thetford), Upwell, Welney, and Central Wingland. With the exception of the parish of Emneth, part of the parish of Brandon, and part of the ecclesiastical district of St. John Little Ouse, which are in the diocese of Ely (see Cambridgeshire), and part of Central Wingland in the diocese of Lincoln (see Lincolnshire), the county is in the diocese of Norwich. The diocese of Norwich likewise includes the whole county of Suffolk and part of that of Cambridge, and has a population of 685,805.







## THIRD REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 629,912 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 272,555 persons (males 135,662, females 136,893), giving '43 persons to an acre, and 2.31 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 141,030 persons, or 107 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into a Northern Division, including the parts of the city of Peterborough and of the borough of Stamford that are in this county; and a Southern Division, including the borough of Northampton, and the part of the borough of Banbury in this county. It comprises nineteen hundreds, the liberty of Peterborough or hundred of Nassaburgh, part of the city of Peterborough, the municipal boroughs of Daventry and Northampton, and part of the borough of Stamford (the greater part being in Lincolnshire).

There are two Courts of Quarter Sessions, one for the county, and the other for the liberty or soke of Peterborough, which has a Commission of the Peace, a Gaol, and a Treasurer, and makes its own levy in the nature of a county rate. The county is divided into nine Petty Sessional Divisions, exclusive of the liberty of Peterborough, which constitutes a separate Division. The boroughs of Northampton and Stamford have Commissions of the Peace and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions. The boroughs of Daventry and Higham-Ferrers (in each of which the mayor and ex-mayor are magistrates) form parts of the Petty Sessional Divisions of Daventry and Wellingborough, the County Justices having concurrent jurisdiction. For police purposes the county is divided into nine Divisions, exclusive of the liberty of Peterborough, which has a separate police force. The city of Peterborough and the boroughs of Daventry and Northampton have their own police. There are ten Highway Districts, which comprise the whole of the county except the liberty of Peterborough and the above-mentioned boroughs, and ten Lieutenancy Subdivisions.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 345, and there are parts of five parishes which extend into adjoining counties, viz. Luddington-in-the-Brook, Lutton, Theddingworth, Thurning, and Winwick. The county is almost entirely in the diocese of Peterborough, which likewise includes the entire counties of Leicester and Rutland, with parts of counties adjacent, and has a population of 612,725.

## THIRD REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 229,515 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 59,491 persons (males 29,195, females 30,296), giving 0.26 persons to an acre, and 3.86 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 21,923 persons, or 58 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was an undivided constituency, and it contained one parliamentary borough and part of the represented city of Peterborough. It comprises four hundreds and the municipal boroughs of Huntingdon, Godmanchester, and St. Ives.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into five Petty Sessional Divisions. The two boroughs of Huntingdon and Godmanchester are included in the Petty Sessional Division of Leightonstone, and the borough of St. Ives in that of Hurstingstone. The Police Divisions and the Highway Districts of the county are, as regards their boundaries, identical with the Petty Sessional Divisions. There are four Lieutenancy Subdivisions for militia purposes.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 104. Parts of six parishes extend into adjoining counties, viz. Luddington-in-the-Brook, Lutton, Papworth, St. Agnes, Standground, Thurning, and Winwick. The whole county is in the diocese of Ely. See Cambridgeshire.



# NORTHUMBERLAND.

### TENTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 1,290,312 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 434,086 persons (males 215,882, females 218,204), giving '34 persons to an acre, and 2.97 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 266,008 persons, or 158 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into North Northumberland, including the borough of Berwick-upon-Tweed and part of the borough of Morpeth; and South Northumberland, including the boroughs of Newcastle-upon-Tyne and Tynemouth, and the other part of Morpeth. It comprises nine Wards, and the municipal boroughs of Berwick-upon-Tweed, Morpeth, Newcastle-upon-Tyne, and Tynemouth.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into thirteen Petty Sessional Divisions. The boroughs of Berwick-upon-Tweed and Newcastle-upon-Tyne (each a county of itself) have Commissions of the Police and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions; and Tynemouth has a Commission of the Peace. For police purposes the county is divided into six Districts, besides which the boroughs of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, Berwick-upon-Tweed, and Tynemouth, and the district of the River Tyne, have their own police. There are nine Lieutenancy Subdivisions. The Highways Act has been only partially adopted, nine Districts having been formed.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 542. The county is in the diocese of Newcastle, which includes also part of the county of Cumberland, and has a total population of 438,707.





# NOTTINGHAMSHIRE.

## SEVENTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 527,752 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 391,815 persons (males 190,778, females 201,037), giving 0.74 persons to an acre, and 1.35 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 251,465 persons, or 178 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into a Northern Division, including the boroughs of East Retford and Nottingham; and a Southern Division, including the borough of Newark. It comprises six wapentakes, and the municipal boroughs of East Retford, Newark, and Nottingham.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into seven Petty Sessional Divisions. The borough of Newark and the borough of Nottingham (which is a county of itself) have Commissions of the Peace and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions, and the borough of East Retford has a Commission of the Peace.

The Police Divisions are identical with those for Petty Sessions. The boroughs of Newark and Nottingham have their own police. There are eight Lieutenancy Subdivisions; and eight Highway Districts have been formed.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 275, and there are parts of six parishes which extend into adjoining counties, viz. Blyth, Finningley, Flawford, Misson, Pinxton, and Wallingwells. The county is almost entirely in the diocese of Southwell, which includes also the county of Derby; its total population is 852,179.





# OXFORDSHIRE.

### THIRD REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 483,621 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 179,559 persons (males 88,025, females 91,534), giving 0.37 persons to an acre, and 2.69 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 67,582 persons, or 60 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was an undivided constituency, and it contained five represented boroughs or parts of boroughs. It comprises fourteen hundreds, the municipal boroughs of Banbury and Chipping Norton, and the greater part of the city of Oxford (the remainder being in Berkshire).

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into ten Petty Sessional Divisions. The borough of Banbury and the city of Oxford have Commissions of the Peace and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions. The ten Police Divisions of the county are identical with the Petty Sessional Divisions. The city of Oxford and the borough of Banbury have their own police. There are eight Lieutenancy, Subdivisions, and nine Highway Districts have been formed,

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 293, and there are parts of nine parishes which extend into adjoining counties, viz. Broughton Poggs, Cropredy, Ibstone, Ickford, Kingsey, Lewknor, St. Aldate (Oxford), Sonning, and Whitechurch. The county is almost entirely in the diocese of Oxford, which likewise includes the entire counties of Berks and Bucks, with portions of counties adjacent, and has a population of 577,196.



## SHROPSHIRE.

#### SIXTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 844,565 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 248,014 persons (males 124,157, females 123,857), giving 0.29 persons to an acre, and 3.41 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 78,766 persons, or 46 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into North Shropshire, including the borough of Shrewsbury; and South Shropshire, including the boroughs of Bridgnorth and Wenlock, and the part of the borough of Ludlow in this county. It comprises fourteen hundreds, and the municipal boroughs of Bridgnorth, Ludlow, Oswestry, Shrewsbury, and Wenlock.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into nineteen Petty Sessional Divisions. All the boroughs have Commissions of the Peace and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions. For police purposes the county is divided into six Districts. The boroughs of Bridgnorth, Ludlow, and Shrewsbury have their own police. There are twenty-six Lieutenancy Subdivisions; and fourteen Highway Districts, which comprise the entire county.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 253, and there are parts of nineteen others which extend into adjoining counties, viz. 

## SOMERSETSHIRE.

#### FIFTH REGISTRATION DISTRICT.

This County has an area of 1,049,812 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 469,109 persons (males 220,582, females 248,527), giving 0.45 persons to an acre, and 2.24 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 195,532 persons, or 71 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into East Somerset, Mid Somerset, and West Somerset. It comprises forty hundreds, two liberties, the cities of Bath and Wells, part of the city of Bristol, and the municipal boroughs of Bridgwater, Chard, Glastonbury, Taunton, and Yeovil. The principal part of the city of Bristol (which is a county of itself) is in Gloucestershire.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into twenty-two Petty Sessional Divisions; the cities of Bath and Bristol and the borough of Bridgwater have Commissions of the Peace and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions; and the city of Wells and the borough of Yeovil have Commissions of the Peace. For police purposes there are fourteen Divisions; the cities of Bath and Bristol, and the boroughs of Bridgwater and Chard, have their own police. The city of Wells and the boroughs of Yeovil and Glastonbury are empowered to have police forces of their own; but by special arrangement they are at present under the supervision of the county police. There are sixteen Lieutenancy Subdivisions; and eighteen Highway Districts, which comprise the entire county, have been formed.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 490, and there are parts of three others which extend into adjoining counties, viz. Maiden Bradley, Stourton, and Exmoor. The county is mostly in the diocese of Bath and Wells, which has a population of 423,705.

















## STAFFORDSHIRE.

#### SIXTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 748,433 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 981,013 persons (males 492,009, females 489,004), giving 1.31 persons to an acre, and 0.76 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 738,320 persons, or 304 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into East Staffordshire, including the city of Lichfield, the boroughs of Walsall and Wednesbury, and the part of the borough of Tamworth in this county; North Staffordshire, including the boroughs of Stoke-upon-Trent and Newcastle-under-Lyme; and West Staffordshire, including the boroughs of Stafford and Wolverhampton, and the part of the borough of Dudley in this county.

Staffordshire comprises five hundreds, the city of Lichfield, the municipal boroughs of Burslem, Hanley, Longton, Newcastle-under-Lyme, Stafford, Stoke-upon-Trent, Walsall, and Wolverhampton, and parts of the boroughs of Burton-upon-Trent and Tamworth.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into twenty-two Petty Sessional Divisions; the city of Lichfield, a county of itself, and the boroughs of Hanley, Newcastle-under-Lyme, Walsall, and Wolverhampton, have Commissions of the Peace and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions; and the boroughs of Longton, Stafford, and Tamworth have Commissions of the Peace.

For police purposes the county is divided into the Mining, the Rural, and the Pottery Districts; and these are further divided into fourteen Divisions. The city of Lichfield, and the boroughs of Hanley, Newcastle-under-Lyme, Walsall, and Wolverhampton, have their own police. There are seventeen Lieutenancy Subdivisions.

No Highway Districts have been formed.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 246, and there are parts of twelve others which extend into adjoining counties, viz. Barthomley, Bobbington, Burton-upon-Trent, Clifton Campville, Croxall, Market Drayton (or Drayton in Hales), Mucklestone, Oldswinford, Pattingham, Scropton, Sheriff Hales, and Tamworth. With the exception of parts of certain parishes, which are in the diocese of Chester, Hereford, and Worcester, the county is in the diocese of Lichfield, which likewise embraces parts of Salop and Warwickshire, and smaller portions of adjoining counties: its total population is 1,104,611.



### SUFFOLK.

#### FOURTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 944,060 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 356,893 persons (males 174,606, females 182,287), giving 0.38 persons to an acre, and 2.65 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 142,489 persons, or 66 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into two constituencies, namely, the Eastern Division, which included the borough of Ipswich, and the Western Division, which included the boroughs of Bury St. Edmunds and Eye. It comprises twenty-one hundreds, the boroughs of Beccles, Bury St. Edmunds, Eye, Ipswich, and Southwold, and parts of the boroughs of Sudbury, Thetford, and Great Yarmouth.

There are two Courts of Quarter Sessions for the county, viz. one held at Ipswich for the Eastern Division, and one held at Bury St. Edmunds for the Western Division, and it is divided into nineteen Petty Sessional Divisions. Each of the boroughs, except Beccles, has a Commission of the Peace; and Bury St. Edmunds, Ipswich, Sudbury, Thetford, and Great Yarmouth have also separate Courts of Quarter Sessions.

The county is divided into eleven Police Divisions, and the boroughs of Ipswich, Southwold, and Sudbury have their own police. There are eight Lieutenancy Subdivisions; and three Highway districts, which, however, do not comprise the entire county.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 518, and there are parts of eight others which extend into adjoining counties, viz. Brandon, Bures (St. Mary), Haverhill, Kedington, Mendham, Rushford, Thetford (St. Cuthbert), and Thetford (St. Mary). Part of Suffolk (viz. the Deaneries of Blackburne, Thedwaster, and Thingoe, and parts of the Deaneries of Clare, Fordham, and Sudbury) is in the diocese of Ely (see Cambridgeshire); the remainder is in the diocese of Norwich (see Norfolk).





### SURREY.

#### FIRST AND SECOND REGISTRATION DIVISIONS.

This County has an area of 485,129 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 1,436,899 persons (males 683,228, females 753,671), giving 2.96 persons to an acre, and 0.34 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 1,168,666 persons, or 436 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into East, Mid, and West Surrey. It comprises fourteen hundreds, the borough of Southwark, and the municipal boroughs of Godalming, Guildford, Kingston-upon-Thames, and Reigate. Southwark is not regulated by the Act 5 and 6 Will. IV. c. 76, but is for certain purposes connected with the city of London.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into twelve Petty Sessional Divisions. The Central Criminal Court has jurisdiction over certain parishes in this county. The borough of Guildford has a Commission of the Peace and a separate Court of Quarter Sessions; the boroughs of Reigate and Kingston-upon-Thames have Commissions of the Peace; the borough of Southwark is included in the Petty Sessional Division of Newington; and the borough of Godalming, in which the Mayor and ex-Mayor are magistrates, forms part of the Petty Sessional Division of Guildford, the County Justices having concurrent jurisdiction.

Part of the county is within the Metropolitan Police District, viz. all those parishes any part of which is within twelve miles of, and not more than fifteen miles distant (in a straight line) from, Charing Cross. The part of the county beyond the limits of the Metropolitan Police District is divided into seven districts for police purposes. All the boroughs have their own police, except Kingston-upon-Thames and Southwark, which are within the Metropolitan Police District. There are twelve Lieutenancy Subdivisions for Militia purposes; and eleven Highway Districts, which, however, do not comprise all that part of the county outside the district of the Metropolitan Board of Works. In six of the parishes, which are within the Metropolis, the Vestries exercise the powers of District Board of Works; the remaining metropolitan parishes in Surrey are, with certain parishes in Kent, formed into five districts, each having a Local Board of Works.

The London School Board District, which is identical with the district of the Metropolitan Board of Works, extends into Surrey.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 152, and there are parts of two others which extend into adjoining counties, viz. Alfold and St. Paul Deptford. The county is almost entirely in the dioceses of Canterbury, London, and Winchester. See Kent, Middlesex, and Hampshire.

### SUSSEX.

#### SECOND REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 933,269 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 490,505 persons (males 232,331, females 258,174), giving 0.53 persons to an acre, and 1.90 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 331,034 persons, or 208 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into East Sussex, including the boroughs of Brighton, Hastings, Lewis, and Rye; and West Sussex, including the city of Chichester, and the boroughs of Horsham, Midhurst, and New Shoreham. It is divided into six Rapes; and it comprises sixty-eight hundreds, the liberties of Lodsworth and St. John, the city of Chichester, the municipal boroughs of Brighton and Arundel, the municipal borough and Cinque Port of Hastings, and the municipal borough and ancient town of Rye. The ancient town of Winchelsea not being regulated by the Municipal Corporations Reform Act, is included in the hundred of Guestling.

There are two Courts of Quarter Sessions for the county, one for the Eastern and the other for the Western Division. It is divided into eighteen Petty Sessional Divisions, of which eleven are in the Eastern and seven in the Western Division. The city of Chichester, and the boroughs of Brighton, Hastings, and Rye, have Commissions of the Peace and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions. The towns of Pevensey, Seaford, and Winchelsea are governed by old charters. There are, exclusive of the Cinque Ports, eighteen Lieutenancy Subdivisions, most of which are identical with the Petty Sessional Divisions. East Sussex and West Sussex have each a separate police force; the former being divided into eight, and the latter into seven Police Divisions. The city of Chichester, the boroughs of Arundel, Brighton, Hastings, and Rye, the town of Tunbridge Wells (the greater part of which is in Kent), and the parish of Hove, have their own police. Only three Highway Districts have been formed in the county.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 325, and there are parts of seven others which extend into adjoining counties, viz. Alfold, Broomhill, Frant, Hawkhurst, Horsemonden, Lamberhurst, and Steep. The county is almost entirely in the diocese of Chichester, which likewise contains part of Kent and has a total population of 489,550.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was an undivided constituency, and it contained one represented borough. It comprises four Wards, and the municipal borough of Kendal.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into five Petty Sessional Divisions; and the borough of Kendal has a Commission of the Peace. There are five Lieutenancy Subdivisions and two Police Divisions, one of which comprises the East and West Wards, and the other the Kendal and Lonsdale Wards. The borough of Kendal has its own police. The Highways Act has not been adopted.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 109, and there is one parish, viz. Burton-in-Kendal, which extends into an adjoining county (Lancashire). The county is in the diocese of Carlisle. See Cumberland.



### WILTSHIRE.

### FIFTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 866,677 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 258,965 persons (males 128,114, females 130,851), giving 0.30 persons to an acre, and 3.35 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 75,145 persons, or 41 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into North Wilts, including the boroughs of Calne, Chippenham, Devizes, Malmesbury, Marlborough, and a part of Cricklade; and South Wilts, including the city of Salisbury, the boroughs of Westbury and Wilton, and a part of Shaftesbury. The remainder of Cricklade is in Gloucestershire, and the remainder of Shaftesbury is in Dorsetshire.

Wiltshire comprises twenty-nine hundreds, the city of Salisbury (or New Sarum), and the municipal boroughs of Calne, Chippenham, Devizes, and Marlborough.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into fifteen Petty Sessional Divisions; the city of Salisbury and the borough of Devizes have Commissions of the Peace and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions, and the borough of Marlborough has a Commission of the Peace.

There are nine County Police Divisions, the city of Salisbury having its own police; ten Lieutenancy Subdivisions; and eleven Highway Districts.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 337, and there are parts of nine others which extend into adjoining counties, viz. Bramshaw, Chilton Foliatt, Coleshill, West Dean, Hungerford, Maiden Bradley, Shalbourn, Stourton, and Tollard Royal. With the exception of the Deaneries of Cricklade and Malmesbury, which are in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, and part of the parish of Hungerford, which is in the diocese of Oxford, the county is in the diocese of Salisbury, which likewise embraces the entire county of Dorset and portions of counties adjacent, and has a total population of 372,188.

# WORCESTERSHIRE AND WARWICKSHIRE. WORCESTERSHIRE.

### SIXTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 472,453 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 380,283 persons (males 184,205, females 196,078), giving 0.80 persons to an acre, and 1.24 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 233,842 persons, or 160 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into East Worcestershire, including the borough of Evesham, and parts of Dudley and Droitwich; and West Worcestershire, including the remainder of Droitwich, the city of Worcester, and the boroughs of Bewdley and Kidderminster. It comprises five hundreds, the city of Worcester, and the municipal boroughs of Bewdley, Droitwich, Dudley, Evesham, and Kidderminster. The borough of Dudley was incorporated in 1865.

There is one court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into seventeen Petty Sessional Divisions; the city of Worcester, a county of itself, has a Commission of the Peace and a separate Court of Quarter Sessions, and all the boroughs have Commissions of the Peace. For police purposes the county is divided into ten Divisions; the city of Worcester, and the boroughs of Bewdley, Droitwich, and Kidderminster have their own police. There are sixteen Lieutenancy Subdivisions and eight Highway Districts, which, however, include only a part of the county.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 244, and there are parts of four others which extend into adjoining counties, viz. Bockleton, Oldswinford, Overbury, and Stoke Bliss. The county is almost entirely in the diocese of Worcester, which likewise includes the whole of the county of Warwick, and part of that of Stafford, and has a total population of 1,124,688.

### WARWICKSHIRE.

### SIXTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 566,271 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 737,339 persons (males 357,146, females 380,193), giving 1.30 persons to an acre, and 0.77 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 530,541 persons, or 256 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was divided into North Warwickshire, including the borough of Birmingham, the city of Coventry, and the part of the borough of Tamworth in this county; and South Warwickshire, including the borough of Warwick. It comprises four hundreds, the city of Coventry, and the municipal boroughs of Birmingham, Leamington, Stratford-on-Avon, and Warwick, and part of the borough of Tamworth, the remainder being in Staffordshire.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into fourteen Petty Sessional Divisions; the boroughs of Birmingham and Warwick have Commissions of the Peace and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions, and the city of Coventry and the boroughs of Leamington and Stratford-on-Avon have Commissions of the Peace.

For police purposes the county is divided into the General District, the Aston District, the Milverton District, and the Mining District. The city of Coventry, the boroughs of Birmingham and Stratford-on-Avon, and the town of Leamington, have their own police. There are seven Lieutenancy Subdivisions, and four Highway Districts, which, however, do not comprise the entire county.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 256, and there are parts of eight others which extend into adjoining counties, viz. Claybrooke, Cropredy, Hinckley, Ilmington, Merevale, Tamworth, Welford, and Weston-on-Λvon. With the exception of parts of certain parishes which are in the dioceses of Gloucester and Bristol, Peterborough, Lichfield, and Oxford, the county is in the diocese of Worcester. See Worcestershire.

## YORKSHIRE.

#### NINTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 3,882,851 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 2,886,564 (males 1,420,001, females 1,466,563), giving 0.74 persons to an acre, and 1.35 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 2,027,431 persons, or 236 per cent.

Yorkshire has from an early period been divided into three Ridings, each of which has a Lord Lieutenant, a Commission of the Peace, and a separate Court of Quarter Sessions. The city of York, which is a county of itself, was, in the Abstracts of the Census of 1841 and in those of previous Censuses, set forth with the Ainsty as a separate Division of the county. In the Census Abstracts of 1851 and 1861 the City alone was thus separately set forth, the Ainsty being included in the West Riding. Both the City and Ainsty are now, for parliamentary purposes, included in the North Riding, for registration purposes in the East Riding, and for all other purposes in the West Riding.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the East Riding constituted a Division of the county, and it included the borough of Kingston-upon-Hull, part of the city of York, and part of the borough of Malton. The North Riding also constituted a Parliamentary Division, and it included the boroughs of Middlesbrough, Northallerton, Richmond, Scarborough, Thirsk, and Whitby, part of the city of York, and parts of the boroughs of Malton and Stockton. The West Riding constituted three Parliamentary Divisions: the Eastern Division containing the city of Ripon and the boroughs of Knaresborough, Leeds, and Pontefract; the Northern Division containing the boroughs of Bradford and Halifax; and the Southern Division containing the boroughs of Dewsbury, Huddersfield, Sheffield, and Wakefield.

The East Riding comprises six Wapentakes, and the municipal boroughs of Beverley, Kingston-upon-Hull, and Hedon, which was incorporated in 1860. The North Riding comprises eleven Wapentakes, the Liberties of East and West Langbaurgh, and Whitby Strand, and the municipal boroughs of Middlesbrough, Richmond, and Scarborough. The West Riding comprises nine Wapentakes, the city of Ripon, the municipal boroughs of Barnsley, Batley, Bradford, Dewsbury, Doncaster, Halifax, Huddersfield, Leeds, Pontefract, Rotherham, Sheffield, and Wakefield.

The East Riding comprises twelve Petty Sessional Divisions; the borough of Kingston-upon-Hull, which is a county of itself, has a Commission of the Peace and a separate Court of Quarter Sessions; and the borough of Beverley has a Commission of the Peace. The North Riding comprises nineteen Petty Sessional Divisions; the boroughs of Richmond and Scarborough have Commissions of the Peace and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions; and the borough of Middlesbrough has a Commission of the Peace. The West Riding comprises twenty-five Petty Sessional Divisions: the city of York (a county of itself), the boroughs of Bradford, Doncaster, Leeds, Pontefract, and Sheffield, and the liberty of Ripon (including the city), have Commissions of the Peace and separate Courts of Quarter Sessions; and the boroughs of Batley, Dewsbury, Halifax, Huddersfield, and Wakefield have Commissions of the Peace. For police purposes the East Riding is divided into twelve Divisions, the North Riding into

nine Divisions, and the West Riding into twenty-one Divisions. The cities of Ripon and York, and all the municipal boroughs, with the exception of Barnsley, Batley, Hedon, and Rotherham, have their own police. The liberty of Ripon is rated separately from the West Riding to the county rate.

Yorkshire comprises altogether forty-five Lieutenancy Subdivisions, of which thirteen are in the East Riding, nineteen in the North Riding, and thirteen in the West Riding. The number of Highway Districts formed in the county is twenty-three.

The ancient parishes of this county are large, and are divided into townships. The total number of civil parishes in the county is 1630. The following parishes are partly in the county of York, the remaining parts extending into adjoining counties:—Sockburn, Blyth, Crowle, Finningley, Awkley, Mitton, Rochdale, Thornton-in-Lonsdale, and Whalley. The East Riding is in the diocese of York; the North Riding, excepting part of the parish of Sockburn, is in the dioceses of York and Ripon; and the West Riding, excepting parts of four parishes, is in the dioceses of York, Ripon, and Manchester. The total population of the diocese of York is 1,287,029; that of Ripon 1,578,582.





#### ELEVENTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 460,158 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 57,746 persons (males 28,861, females 28,885), giving 0.13 persons to an acre, and 7.97 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 25,421 persons, or 78 per cent.

For parliamentary representation the county is an undivided constituency. It comprises six hundreds and the municipal borough of Brecknock.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into ten Petty Sessional Divisions; Brecknock borough has a Commission of the Peace, and maintains its own police.

For police purposes the county is divided into two divisions, and for the purposes of the Highways Act into seven Highway Districts. The borough of Brecknock maintains its own police. There are eleven Lieutenancy Subdivisions.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 91, and the county likewise contains part of the township of Glasbury, which extends into Radnorshire. With the exception of parts of the parishes of Llangattock and Llangunider, the county is in the diocese of St. David's. See Pembrokeshire.

This County has an area of 276,552 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 23,528 persons (males 11,939, females 11,589), giving '09 persons to an acre, and 11.75 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 4,393 persons, or 23 per cent.

For parliamentary representation the county is an undivided constituency. It comprises six hundreds, but contains no municipal borough.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into six Petty Sessional Divisions. The ancient borough of Radnor is governed by the provisions of an old Charter, and has a separate Court of Quarter Sessions.

There are seven Lieutenancy Subdivisions and five Highway Districts. The county is not divided for police purposes.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 60, and parts of four parishes extend into adjoining counties. The county is partly in the diocese of St. David's (see Pembrokeshire), and partly in the diocese of Hereford (see Herefordshire).

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was an undivided constituency. It comprises five hundreds, the three commots of Carnwallon, Iskennen, and Kidwelly, and the municipal boroughs of Carmarthen and Llandovery.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into eight Petty Sessional Divisions; the borough of Carmarthen (a county of itself) has a Commission of the Peace, a separate Court of Quarter Sessions, and maintains its own police. There are eight Lieutenancy Subdivisions, three Police Divisions, and thirteen Highway Districts.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 82, and there are parts of five others which extend into Pembrokeshire. The county is in the diocese of St. David's. See Pembrokeshire.



Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was an undivided constituency, and it contains the Carnarvon District of boroughs. It comprises ten hundreds and the municipal boroughs of Carnarvon, Conway, and Pwllheli.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into six Petty Sessional Divisions; the borough of Carnarvon has a Commission of the Peace. For police purposes the county is divided into five Divisions, and the borough of Pwllheli has its own police. There are four Lieutenancy Subdivisions; the Highways Act has not been adopted.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 75, and there are parts of five others which extend into the adjoining counties of Denbigh and Merioneth. With the exception of certain parishes which are in the diocese of St. Asaph, the county is in the diocese of Bangor, which also includes the entire counties of Anglesey and Merioneth, with part of that of Montgomery, and has a total population of 226,040.





#### GLAMORGANSHIRE.

#### ELEVENTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 516,959 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 511,433 persons (males 262,579, females 248,854), giving 0.99 persons to an acre, and 1.01 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 440,554 persons, or 622 per cent.

Prior to the Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885, the county was an undivided constituency. It comprises ten hundreds and the municipal boroughs of Aberavon, Cardiff, Neath, and Swansea.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into twelve Petty Sessional Divisions; each of the boroughs has a Commission of the Peace. There are four Police Divisions, and the boroughs of Cardiff, Neath, and Swansea have their own police. For the purposes of the Highways Act eleven Districts have been formed. There are twelve Lieutenancy Subdivisions.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 166, and there are parts of three others which extend into the adjoining county of Monmouth. The county is partly in the diocese of Llandaff, and partly in the diocese of St. Davids (see Pembrokeshire). The diocese of Llandaff likewise includes the whole of the county of Monmouth, and parts of those of Brecknock and Hereford, and has a population of 603,020.



#### MERIONETHSHIRE.

#### ELEVENTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 384,717 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 52,038 persons (males 26,269, females 25,769), giving 0.14 persons to an acre, and 7.39 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 22,532 persons, or 76 per cent.

For parliamentary representation the county is an undivided constituency; it comprises five hundreds, but contains no municipal or parliamentary borough.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into six Petty Sessional Divisions. It is not divided for police purposes. There is one Highway District. There are five Lieutenancy Subdivisions.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 33, and there are parts of four others which extend into adjoining counties. The county is partly in the diocese of Bangor (see Carnaryonshire), and partly in the diocese of St. Asaph. See Denbighshire.





#### PEMBROKESHIRE.

#### ELEVENTH REGISTRATION DIVISION.

This County has an area of 391,181 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 91,824 persons (males 43,449, females 48,375), giving 0.23 persons to an acre, and 4.26 acres to a person. Since the first Census in 1801 the population has increased by 35,544 persons, or 63 per cent.

For parliamentary representation the county is an undivided constituency. It comprises seven hundreds and the municipal boroughs of Haverfordwest,

Pembroke, and Tenby, and part of the borough of Cardigan.

There is one Court of Quarter Sessions for the county, and it is divided into seven Petty Sessional Divisions; the borough of Haverfordwest (a county of itself) has a Commission of the Peace and a separate Court of Quarter Sessions; and Pembroke and Tenby have Commissions of the Peace. For police purposes there are three Divisions, and the boroughs of Haverfordwest and Tenby have their own police. There are eight Lieutenancy Subdivisions and eleven Highway Districts.

The total number of civil parishes in the county is 155, and parts of five parishes extend into Carmarthenshire. The county is in the diocese of St. David's, which likewise comprises the entire counties of Brecon, Cardigan, Carmarthen, and Radnor, with part of that of Glamorgan, and has a population

of 482,245.





# ISLE OF MAN.





#### ISLE OF MAN.

The Isle of Man has an area of 145,325 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 53,558 (males 25,760, females 27,798), giving 0.36 persons to an acre, and 2.71 acres to a person. Since the Census of 1821 the population has increased by 13,477, or 33.6 per cent.

The island is divided into a Northern and Southern Division, each of which comprises three Sheadings.

The islands of Kitterland and the Calf of Man, situate at the southern extremity of the mainland, belong to the parish of Rushen.

Although Castletown is the capital of the island, Douglas is the more populous town, having recently become a favourite watering-place. The other towns are Peel and Ramsey.

The civil government is vested in the Sovereign, a Lieutenant-Governor and Council, and the House of Keys. The Council consists of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, the Attorney-General, the Clerk of the Rolls, the two Deemsters, the Receiver-General, the Water-Bailiff or Admiralty Judge, the Archdeacon, and the Vicar-General, who are ex officio members of that body. The House of Keys consists of twenty-four representatives of the people. The Lieutenant-Governor and Council, and the House of Keys, constitute the Court of Tynwald, by which all the public laws are enacted and promulgated. The principal Courts in the island, viz. those of Chancery, Exchequer, and Common-Law Procedure, sit at Castletown. The general gaol delivery takes place twice a year at Castletown. The Deemsters are the chief justices of the island: one, presiding over the Northern Division, holds his court weekly at Ramsey, Peel, or Michael; and the other, presiding over the Southern Division, holds his court at Douglas A Court of Admiralty, and Seneschals', Ecclesiastical, and or Castletown. Coroners' Courts are held as required. A High Bailiff is appointed for each of the towns of Castletown, Douglas, Peel, and Ramsey by commission from the Lieutenant-Governor, and is the conservator of the peace. A Coroner is also appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor for each of the six Sheadings or great Divisions of the island.

The island constitutes the diocese of Sodor and Man, in the Province of York. The inhabited houses and population of the several parishes in the island in 1881 are given below:—





#### JERSEY.

Jersey, the largest of the Channel Islands, has an area of 28,717 statute acres, and its population in 1881 was 52,445 (males 23,485, females 28,960), giving 1.83 persons to an acre, and 0.53 acres to a person. Since the Census of 1821 the population has increased by 23,845, or 83.4 per cent. Jersey is divided into twelve parishes, and contains the three towns of St. Helier, St. Aubin, and Gorey.

The "States" of Jersey consist of the Bailiff of the Royal Court (appointed by the Crown), who is President; the twelve Jurats of the Royal Court, elected for life by the ratepayers; the Rectors of the twelve parishes; the twelve Constables, elected every three years by the ratepayers; and fourteen Deputies, also elected every three years, of whom three represent the parish of St Helier, -each of the eleven other parishes being represented by one Deputy. The Attorney-General. the Solicitor-General, and the High Sheriff (vicompte) have seats in the "States," but do not vote; and the Clerk (greffier) of the Royal Court is, by virtue of his office, Clerk of the "Assembly of the States." The Lieutenant-Governor has a deliberative voice, but does not vote; he has, however, the power of veto. The Royal Court, composed of the Bailiff and the twelve Jurats, is the only tribunal in the island; and as a great variety of causes requiring different kinds of process are brought before this Court, it necessarily assumes four distinct characters, and, according to the functions which it has to discharge, is termed "La Cour d'Heritage," "La Cour de Catel," "La Cour du Billet," and "La Cour Extraordinaire," or "La Cour de Samedi." The constables are the principal magistrates in each parish, their office being similar to that of mayors of corporate towns in England. The Lieutenant-Governor grants commissions to the officers of the Militia, which is under his superintendence and control. The Militia consists of five regiments, one of which has two battalions. Each regiment is composed of a certain number of men furnished, in proportion to its extent, by a district comprising a certain number of parishes; all males between the ages of 17 and 65, who are medically fit, being bound to render personal service.

Jersey constitutes a deanery in the diocese of Winchester. The inhabited houses and population of the several parishes in the island in 1881 are given below:—

## GUERNSEY AND ADJACENT ISLANDS.

The total area of these islands is 19,605 statute acres, and their population at the Census of 1881 was 35,257 (males 16,836, females 18,421), giving 1.79 persons to an acre, and 0.55 acres to a person. Since the Census of 1821 the population has increased by 14,430 or 69.3 per cent.

The Island of Guernsey is divided into ten parishes, and it contains one town, viz. St. Peter Port. The legislative body, called the "States of Deliberation," is composed of the Bailiff, the twelve Jurats or Judges, and the Procureur or Attorney-General of the island, the beneficed Clergy, and the Delegates (constables and douzainiers) of the parishes, one representing each of the country parishes and six representing the town parish. The constables and officers of each parish have collectively only one vote. The Governor or Lieutenant-Governor has the right of addressing the "States," but does not vote. The Royal Court consists of a Bailiff appointed by the Crown, and twelve Jurats chosen by the members of the "States": the officers of the Court are the Queen's Procureur or Attorney-General, the Comptroller, whose office is similar to that of a solicitor-general, the Provost or Queen's Sheriff, the Greffier or Registrar, and the Queen's Serjeant. The Militia service, of which there are five regiments, is compulsory, every male inhabitant between the ages of 16 and 60 being obliged to serve. Clothing and accoutrements for the men, as well as the pay of the Adjutant-General, the adjutants of regiments, and the Staff, are provided by the Imperial Government.

The Island of Alderney forms part of the Bailiwick of Guernsey. The Judge and six Jurats, together with the Douzainiers, who are twelve men chosen by the commonalty as their representatives, compose the "Assembly of the States of the Island" wherein all ordinances for its government are proposed. But the Douzainiers have only a deliberative voice and do not vote, the Judge and Jurats alone deciding upon the expediency of any proposed measure. The Governor or Lieutenant-Governor has a seat in the Assembly, but does not vote. The civil jurisdiction is exercised by a Judge and six Jurats, the former being nominated by the Governor, subject to the approval of the Crown, and the latter by the commonalty; these, with the Queen's officer, viz. the Procureur or Attorney-General, and the Greffier or Registrar, compose the Court, the decisions of which are subject to an appeal to the Royal Court at Guernsey, and from that to the Queen in Council. The Court of Alderney has no criminal jurisdiction.

Sark and the adjacent isles are dependent upon and within the jurisdiction of the "States" of Guernsey. These islands are governed by the Seigneur, under whom a Seneschal carries out the laws and local regulations. A Court is held three times in the year for the purpose of enacting bye-laws for regulating the affairs of the islands, which are in force when carried by a majority of the tenants and confirmed by the consent of the Seigneur.

The Island of Herm is also within the jurisdiction of the Island of Guernsey. Guernsey and the adjacent islands constitute a deanery in the Diocese of Winchester and Province of Canterbury. The inhabited houses and population of the several parishes in these islands are given below:—
