BETTY UPRICHARD. H.T. See illustration. Carmine and salmon. A most satisfactory Rose, with all the good points of Radiance but totally different in form and color. In color it is in a class by itself with its beautiful, harmonizing shades of carmine and salmon rising from an orange base on firm, thick-textured petals that hold their form and color for a long time after the flowers are cut. The buds are long-pointed and open blooms are spicily fragrant. This is one of the most delightful of the standard Everblooming Roses. 75 cts. each.

AMI QUINARD. H.T. See illustration. Black-lustered red. This is the standard-bearer for the dark red Roses, with its alluring, richly colored petals of crimson-maroon that look like pieces of soft, luxurious velvet. Blackish buds open to semi-double flowers of velvety crimson-maroon with a soft black luster. It has rich old Rose fragrance. Strong, upright plant, almost matching the Radiances for vigor. \$1 each.
