

Hybrid Tea. (Meyer.) Plant Pat. App. For. From the first bud of spring to the last rose of summer, Portrait is a very appealing, pretty flower of soft but rich pink. We tried it out here in our own testing fields for its hybridizer, Carl Meyer, before entering it in the All-America trials. So we are well acquainted with its capabilities and are happy to recommend it highly.

Urn-shaped buds become large blooms with a satiny blush on the edge of the petals. Light golden tones wash over the open bloom, while the outside of the petals remains an even pink. High centered, about 4 inches in diameter, with over 50 petals. Lovely tea fragrance and stems of medium length. Extremely vigorous and free blooming, the plant is disease resistant, rugged and hardy.




Hybrid Tea. (Swim & Weeks.) Plant Pat. 2032. Smooth as satin,

firm as velvet, soft as silk! Flawlessly formed, extra large, heavily perfumed, Royal Highness is truly royal in every sense. The thick petals are of the softest baby pink, with darker pink in the center of the bloom. Flowers are enormous, with a perfect high center and long stiff stems. The large pointed buds open slowly and impressively, to form substantial, long-lasting blooms. Waxy, very dark and leathery leaves cover an average-height plant. Even in damp weather the flowers open easily and they stand rain unusually well. On their strong straight stems they stand proudly erect, as if in defiance of any bad weather.

This is the perfect rose for cutting and often a winner on show tables. When you plant Royal Highness you are sure to join its many fans. You'll find yourself watching every bud that forms, so as not to miss one day of this enchanting flower's beauty.

Grandiflora. (Swim & Weeks.) Plant Pat. 2371. With color as clear as a bell, light and glowing, this rose symbolizes the ideal . . . the land of Camelot.

The luminous coral-pink has a special shimmering beauty all its own, and rich spicy fragrance adds to its appeal. These are good-sized flowers with the popular high center at first, becoming more cupped as they open. Usually three or more are carried on one strong stem. They last well, and the plant blooms repeatedly.

Chicago Peace Hybrid Tea. (Johnston.) Plant Pat. 2037. This is a carbon copy of Peace so far as growing ability, hardiness and flower production are concerned, but with two characteristics of its own—a different color and oldfashioned fragrance. The color is rich pink with canary-yellow and sometimes coppery tones. The huge, high-centered flowers hold both their form and their color an unusually long time. They actually seem to bask in the admiration showered on them! Stems are thick and strong, foliage dark and crisp.

An exciting cut flower and garden rose, very popular ever since it was discovered as a sport of Peace in a Chicago garden.

Hybrid Tea. (Swim & Weeks.) Plant Pat. 2370. In our opinion, the greatest red blooms are exactly what you hope for in a lively red rose—very full and double, as much as 6 inches across, coming from firm, pointed buds. Wide petals curl back from a high center. In color it's a vigorous red in the flower and rich dark maroon in the bud.

And the fragrance is something special . . . deep and rich. The bush is tall and stately, covered with glossy leaves that are reddish at first and then a good dark green. Flowers are long lasting, and of course wonderful for cutting.

Hybrid Tea. (Lindquist.) *Plant Pat. App. For.* Here's a very bright, clear orange Hybrid Tea that's like a beacon in any garden. The outside of the petals is a lighter tone, merging to an almost pinkish orange. A substantial, medium-sized flower with 50 petals that curl back at the edges as the bloom opens. Nicely furled center and pleasing fragrance. Beautiful long buds, generally carried only one on a stem.

Big branching canes produce plenty of bloom. The plant is tall, very upright, with dark leaves.

John F. Kennedy Hybrid Tea. (Boerner.) Plant Pat. 2441. These pure white, 5 to 6-inch blooms hold their firm texture through all kinds of weather and enjoy a long life. The graceful buds are lemon-white, borne on long strong stems. In both bud and open stage the flowers are high pointed, showing a full but open center. They average 35 to 40 broad glossy petals, precisely arranged. Tea fragrance is especially noticeable.

The upright plant eventually reaches about 4 feet in height, with dark, healthy foliage. Individual leaflets are pointed and rather narrow. Strong canes are crowned with bloom clusters all season.



Roses . . . Everyman's Flower

Time was when a rose garden was a status symbol for a wealthy man with a big greenhouse and a gardener or two. Now all that's changed. Roses have happily been brought within reach of everyone who has even a small patch of reasonably good garden soil and the will to give them the simple care they ask for.



When cut and brought indoors too, the blooms last several days.

Each bloom opens wide, to show the beautiful large cluster of orange-gold stamens in the center.

The vigorous bush grows to moderate height, well branched and with strong canes. Foliage is large, thick and plentiful, of waxy deep glossy green that fairly shines.





Hybrid Tea. (Lens.) Plant Pat. 2592. A pleasing all-round white rose. Delicate-looking buds and highpointed flowers of soft creamy white with an ivory-yellow center. Blooms are medium large and double, with over 35 petals that curl back as they open. They never look cold or aloof, but are sweet and graceful. Every specimen is perfectly formed even in poor weather, with a high center that holds well.

The strong stems are excellent for cutting, and foliage is abundant. A tall plant, often over 4 feet high. You can't do better than Pascali if you are looking for a beautiful white rose, indispensable both in the garden and for cutting. Besides being so pleasing in itself, Pascali is the perfect companion for brightly colored roses.



King's Ransom Hybrid Tea. (Morey.) Plant Pat. 2103. Splendid, gleaming golden yellow blooms . . . big and lively. The tightly curled, medium long buds develop into 5-inch, fully double, golden flowers of excellent form, with full but open centers to show off the rose-red stamens. The 40 to 50-petaled blooms come singly on long stems and open without difficulty even in unfavorable weather. Ideal for cutting and arranging, with a nice lingering fragrance. An upright grower, medium tall, with strong heavy canes.

Highly recommended for every garden, for it always makes a wonderful appearance. Bloom production is best in spring and fall. The extra long stems will make you reach for the shears so that you can bring some of the flowers indoors.

Hybrid Tea. (The House of Meilland.) Plant Pat. 2691. The soft lavender color of Lady X is very delicate. It appeals strongly to those who like lavender roses... and even those who "don't care for" these new colors can rarely resist Lady X. Its exquisite, well-modeled form and lasting ability often put it among the blue-ribbon winners at shows. And in the garden too it gives a wonderful account of itself ... a tall grower and heavy producer. Perfect for cutting, lightly perfumed.

The upper side of the petals is orange-red and the underside a more rosy or "Indian" red, truly compelling and unforgettable. Double blooms, about 4 inches across, with 40 to 50 petals. They are carried like a crown at the top of great canes—6 to 8 in a cluster, or occasionally singly.

Leaves are very dark and thick, a beautiful reddish bronze in the early stage, becoming more leathery in texture as they grow. A tall and rangy plant, vigorous and free blooming all season, with strong flower stems. Even one bush is a garden spectacle.

Starburst Grandiflora. (The House of Meilland.) Plant Pat. 2974. Bright and colorful flowers atop a good sturdy bush . . . definitely twocolored. Buds are yellow at the base, blending to soft orange-yellow at the edge. On the inner surface the color is bright orange-red with pale yellow at the base. Buds are of short pointed form, beautifully furled when opening. Flowers about 3 inches wide, very bright, generally in clusters of three. Particularly lovely at the half-open stage when the orange-carmine color shows on the inside of the petals. Light fragrance.

Foliage is dark, glossy and healthy, covering the bush right down to the ground. Medium height; very floriferous.

Big Red literally named itself, for this is how we referred to it when it was still under test in our fields.

The bold red color is bright and strong, with a more rosy red tone on the underside of the petals. Thick, fat buds open to high-centered blooms with 50 to 60 petals. The petals curl slightly to form an exceptionally firm flower for one so large. Spicy fragrance. Tall and upright, but somewhat spreading.

Hybrid Tea. (Boerner.) Plant Pat. 2774. A good name for a superb new rose with rich pink colors. Flowers are lighter on the inner side and close to light red on the reverse. Satiny petals, altogether lovely, roll back from the spiraled center. Large, magnificent buds and flowers, almost too perfect to look real. Every one is a sensation as it opens.

Rated as a "show rose" but First Prize is also a winner in any home garden. The plant needs no more attention than any other rose. Excellent for cutting, lasting well and never discoloring. Medium tall, strong and upright.

A large, solid bloom with light tea fragrance, usually borne singly on a long stem but sometimes in candelabras of several. The lovely deep cool pink color is always fresh looking. Pointed buds of

AQUARIUS. Grandiflora. (Armstrong.) Plant Pat. App. For. Very pretty, well-formed buds of deep pink, almost every one perfect, and best of all, freely produced. Open flowers are lighter pink than the buds but pleasingly brushed with deep pink at the petal edges, to give a picotee effect. Blooms of medium size, mildly perfumed, one to a stem or in clusters. Tall, vigorous.

CONDESA DE SASTAGO. Hybrid Tea. (Dot.) A distinct bicolor, yellow on the outside and rose-scarlet within. Always bright and gay, with heavy perfume in addition to its warm colors. FRAGRANT CLOUD. Hybrid Tea. (Tantau.) Plant Pat. 2574. Named for its heavy, true rose perfume. Excellent to cut and bring into the house. Buds are rich dark red, becoming high-pointed, double blooms of perfect form, about 5 inches wide. Quite tall and very strong, with glossy dark leaves. Can stand moderate shade.

MONTEZUMA. Grandiflora. (Swim.) Plant Pat. 1383. Brilliant rosy salmon with a creamy sheen, extremely smooth and melting. Buds are rather short, but shapely. Very strong, free growth and bloom.
