## STECKLER'S ARTICHOKES

LARGE GREEN GLOBE. French grown. Culture-Planting time Southern States. Sow seed in seed bed from December to June, $11 / 2 \mathrm{oz}$. of seed to 150 feet of row 3 inches apart in the row and rows 1 foot apart (will produce 150 plants). Cover $1 / 2$ inch with earth. Transplant in October to open ground $11 / 2$ feet apart in rows and rows 3 feet apart. Crices Large Green Globe. LONG RED MANGEL. Flesh white with reddish tinge. Heavy yields, 18 to 24 inches long, about 6 inches in dismeter. We recommend this as the best variety of stock beet.
