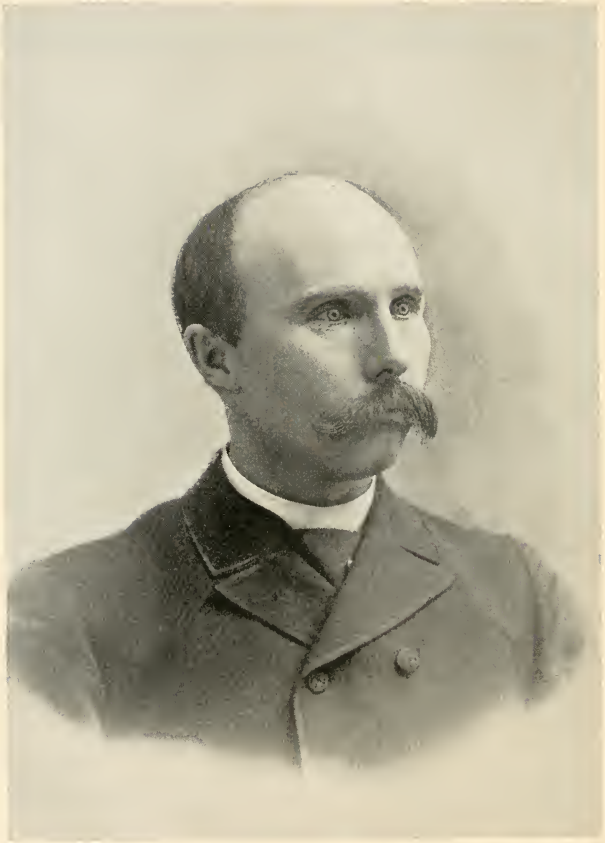

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PREFACE.

Some five years ago my interest was first awakened to the project of getting together the data for the genealogical history of the Clason family, by reading several articles in the American Magazine of History, written by Augustus W. Clason, Esq., of Goochland Co., Virginia. My correspondence with him revealed the fact that his family originally came from Stamford, Conn., and upon tracing mine back some four generations, I found that they also came from the same place. Soon after this in company with Dr. Samuel Webb Clason of New York City, Hon. John Clason and John W. Clason, Esq., of Stamford, we searched carefully all the records of that town, and had no difficulty, so full and complete were the records, to trace the descendants of Stephen Clason, who was married in Stamford, November 11, 1654, as long as they remained in that town. Those of the descendants living in Stamford and vicinity were easily traced out, and those living in other portions of our country were likewise traced up to the time their ancestor left Stamford. As many left there one hundred years or more ago, and settled in places where no records were kept, I have had to rely upon living representatives of this family, and what private records they might have, to complete the work. This has made many families incomplete, yet I have done the best I could. Aside from the inability of many to obtain

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the records they desired, many others have displayed an indifference that was truly discouraging and disheartening. With a desire to preserve what I have collected together, and feeling that if destroyed no one else of the family would be able, if they desired it, to duplicate the facts I have gathered together, I have placed all my material in the hands of Dr. Wm. B. Lapham of Augusta, Me., who has had much experience in this class of literary work, to arrange and publish. I am under great obligations to many of the family for their interest and assistance, and without enumerating any name, I thank you all for your favors, and hope this work will please you.

COMPILERS' PREFACE.

Other circumstances being the same, the collector of material for a family history can always arrange it with greater facility than can he who compiles it after it has been gathered by another. It requires years of time to gather data for a family history, and this gives the collector ample time to become thoroughly familiar with his subject. He becomes acquainted with his correspondents; becomes familiar with their history, their personal peculiarities and their handwriting, and though he has never personally seen them, he comes to feel that he knows them about as well as though he had enjoyed their companionship all his life long. On the other hand, the one who takes this material at second-hand, is forced to perform his work mechanically, and as he arranges families in their order, and records the names of persons composing them, to him these names have as little significance as though the persons they represent had never had an existence. Unfamiliar with their handwriting, errors in copying names and dates are more liable to creep in, and the whole make-up, and more especially, the personnel of the work is likely to be less satisfactory. The compiler hopes, however, that no more than the usual number of errors will be found in this work, for absolute accuracy in records of this kind has ever been vainly sought. In gathering this material, Mr. Clason has shown commendable zeal and perseverance. The family is widely scattered and difficult of

access. Indeed, it can hardly be called a New England family, for the patriarch settled in the extreme southern border, and the general direction of emigration has been west rather than north. The early families were not as prolific as the majority of New England families, and there was also in the earlier families, a remarkable preponderance of females. The posterity, therefore, bearing the name of the patriarch, is much less numerous than those of most settlers in New England who came at the same time. Though incomplete, and in some directions only fragmentary, it is believed that this little volume will enable all of this descent who bear the name of Clason, or any of its several variations, to connect themselves with Stephen Clason, who settled at Stamford, Conn., nearly two centuries and a half ago.

Explanations.

The Roman numerals opposite a name, indicate the position in the family with regard to age. The figures opposite names indicate position in the genealogy, and whenever a person is referred to, it is by his or her number. The number against a person as he stands in his father's family appears above his name in larger figures, when he has a family record of his own. This arrangement enables one to trace back their lineage with ease. The raised figure above the right of a Christian name, shows the generation to which such person belongs, and in each case where the head of a family is named, his line, in parenthesis, is traced back to the immigrant ancestor. Only few abbreviations are herein used; b. stands for born, m. for married, d. for died, and sometimes dau. is used for daughter.

CLASON MEMORIAL.

The town of Stamford, Connecticut, is in the extreme southwestern part of the State, and as originally laid out was almost a parallelogram, one side bounded by Long Island Sound and the other by New York. On the southwest, it is also bounded by New York. As originally granted, its dimensions were about eight miles wide and twenty miles long. Since that time portions of it have been set off to form other towns, so that the parent town is only about one-third of its former size. The first settlers were from Wethersfield, Connecticut, this town, as well as Stamford, being within the limits of the New Haven Colony. There were contentions in ancient Wethersfield, though the occasion is not now apparent, and some of the settlers desiring to be rid of the feuds which had made their lives unhappy, began to look about for a place to start new homes. The feud was concerning church matters, and several commissions which had visited them, reported that the disagreement was so positive as

not likely to be harmonized so long as the several factions should remain together.

The question of where to go, after they had decided to colonize again, became an all important one. All the territory to the west of them, until they should reach the settlements in New Netherlands, was an unbroken forest. At New Haven, and down the river toward the south, new settlements had been established, but offered no inducement to so large a colony as had decided to remove. On the Sound, companies of pioneers were just breaking ground for the sites of their new colonies, and everywhere else the savage still held sway. The New Haven Colony in its desire to keep on equal footing with the Connecticut Colony, whose headquarters were at Hartford, had just purchased through their agent, Captain Nathaniel Turner, a tract of land to the west of the present town of Norwalk, called Toquams, which they offered to the awaiting colony at Wethersfield. A committee of the colony or company, accepted the purchase, and soon arrangements were made for the formal occupation of the place. The action of the General Court of New Haven, held on the ninth day of September, sixteen hundred and forty, shows the title under which the colonists took possession of the new domain:

“Whereas, Andrew Ward and Robert Coe of Wethersfield, were deputed by Wethersfield men the thirtieth day of the eighth month, commonly called October (old style) 1640, to treat at New Haven about the plantation lately purchased by said town called Toquams, which being considered of, it was agreed upon by the said court and justices aforesaid, that they shall have the said plantation upon the terms following: first, that they shall repay unto the said town of New Haven all the charges which they have disbursed about it which comes to thirty-three pounds, as appears by a rate or schedule annexed; secondly, that they receive a fifth part of said plantation to be disposed of at the appointment of this court to such desirable persons as may be expected, or as God shall send hither, provided that if within one year such persons do not come to fill up those lots so reserved, that then it shall be free for the said people to nominate and report to this court some persons of their own choice which may fill up some of those lots so reserved, if this court approve of them; thirdly, that they join in all points with this plantation in the form of government here settled, according to agreement betwixt this court and Mr. Samuel Eaton about the plantation of Totokett. These articles being read, together with Mr. Samuel Eaton’s agreement in the hearing of the said parties or deputies, it was accepted by them, and in witness thereof they subscribed their names to the articles in the face of the court.”

Supplied with a place for their future homes, the people who were to be the founders of Stamford prepared at once to take possession. Twenty-eight men, most of them heads of families, became residents of the new plantation, during the summer of sixteen hundred and forty-one. They

went to work with that energy and perseverance which characterized all the early New England Colonies, to lay out land including house lots to settlers, to secure passable roads, and to erect a grist mill. At the end of sixteen hundred and forty-two, there were fifty-nine colonists who had settled in the new plantation. All of them were born across the water, and had come to the new world where they could enjoy more perfect religious liberty. They were Puritans or non-conformists, and many of them had been persecuted and some of them imprisoned on account of their faith and belief, in their native land. Some of them had first come to the Massachusetts Colony and after a short stay there had come here. Among the first settlers are the well known names of Mitchell, Ward, Coe, Reynolds, Bates, Sherman, Wood, Clark, Bell, Mead, Stevens, Hoyt, Smith, Rockwell, Schofield, Miller, Weeks, Fisher, and Weed, while among those not as common, are Slawson, Simkins, Armitage, Seiring, Jagger, Hustis, Pop, Pyne, Swead, Gildersleve, Crabb, and Raynor. As they had come to New England at different times, they came from various parts of Old England. Quite a large number of them settled first at Watertown, in the colony of the Massachusetts Bay, and some had resided there

six or eight years before coming to Connecticut. In sixteen hundred and forty-four, eighteen of the settlers with their families, on account of the limited franchise they enjoyed under the jurisdiction of the New Haven Colony, removed to Hampstead, on Long Island, which was then in possession of the Dutch. Living on the border, between the English and Dutch jurisdictions, the people of Stamford were subjected to many annoyances, and at one time were strongly urged to come under the jurisdiction of the Dutch. At another time they were threatened, but they could not be seduced from their loyalty to the English, or frightened into forswearing their allegiance. The town had not as yet received its name, but in April, one thousand six hundred and forty-two, Mr. Mitchell and John Whitmore were accepted from "Rippowam" as members of the New Haven court, and at this session the name of Stamforde was legally substituted for that of Rippowam.

The origin of the name Stamford, or the reason for applying it to this town, is somewhat in doubt. In his bi-centennial address delivered in eighteen hundred and forty-one, the orator of the day said the town was so called from Stamford in England, from which some of the early settlers came,

and yet careful investigation fails to trace a single one of the early families back to Stamford, England. In Allen's history of the county of Lincoln, England, there is an engraving of Stamford in that county, and those who have seen it and are also familiar with Stamford, Connecticut, are surprised at the striking resemblance between the landscape views of the two places. The engraving is a southerly view of the old town, and the five steeples or towers are almost literally reproduced in the modern engraving of the modern Stamford. Hills and intervalles wear the same contour and were cloven by not dissimilar river beds. The almost involuntary decision of those who look upon both pictures is that there need be no wonder why the founders called these hills and wooden slopes, another Stamford. If none of the early settlers came from the Lincolnshire Stamford, it is quite probable that some of them had seen the place, and it is possible that the similarity between the physical features of that ancient town and the New England plantation may have suggested the name.

Notwithstanding the early disaffection of some of the members of the plantation, and their departure for New Netherlands, and the serious trouble from time to time with the Indians who

still occupied large tracts of land in the vicinity, and notwithstanding the constant trouble between the New Haven and Connecticut Colonies in which the people of Stamford were more or less involved, the colony grew and thrived, and rapidly increased in population, wealth and importance. The founders of the town were men of religious principle as has already been shown. Their chosen leader was the minister of their religion. What became the first church of Stamford had already been organized at Wethersfield, and Rev. Richard Denten became the pastor when it was transferred to Stamford. Here as elsewhere the church edifice was one of the first buildings erected. Disagreement between pastor and people led to his dismissal before three years, but a young minister, Mr. Bishop, was soon found, whose pastorate continued for a period of twenty-eight years. The church grew and expanded, and at length the town was divided into parishes, and later these parishes were incorporated as towns. Meantime the trouble between the two colonies continued until one thousand six hundred and sixty-five, when the New Haven Colony became absorbed into that of Connecticut, and in due time the Colony of Connecticut became one of the thirteen original States of the Union, free, independent and sovereign.

It was in the year sixteen hundred and fifty-four, that mention is first made of a young man who came to Stamford, by the name of Stephen Clason. This is the way he spelled his name on documents still extant, but different town clerks, as they were in the habit of doing in colonial times, took liberties with the orthography, and we find it variously written "Clason" "Clayson," "Clauson," "Clawson," and "Closson." These different methods of spelling give us at least three distinct surnames. "Clauson" is a German name derived from *Klause*, a mountain defile, and is the name of a town in Germany. "Closson" is Dutch, and means the son of *Klaas*, the abbreviation of Saint Nicholas; *Klaas-son*, then, means in Dutch, the son of Nicholas. Of course, it is barely possible that Stephen Clason may have been of Dutch descent, and may have come to Stamford by the way of New Netherlands, but this is not in accordance with the traditions of the family, nor is it probable. There is a tradition in the family that Stephen and William McClay were forced to leave Scotland on account of their hostility to the Cromwell government; that they went to France and changed their name to Clayson or Clason the pronunciation of the two words being alike. The name *McClay* in Scotch, means

son of clay, and transposed would read Clayson. If this were true, it was certainly an ingenious device for disguising their name without essentially changing its etymology. Tradition further says that Stephen came to this country while William returned to Scotland. The tradition is given for what it is worth. The fact is, nothing certain is known about the matter at this time. It is only known that on the eleventh day of November, sixteen hundred and fifty-four, Stephen Clason was united in marriage with Elizabeth Periment. The records so give her name, which is an unusual one, and except in case of this woman, the name does not again appear on Stamford records. Mr. Clason appears to have been a quiet, well-disposed person. His name does not often appear on the records of the town, and never appears there to his discredit. Under date of December 18, 1695, the records state: "Per vote and outcry, the town doth sell the fort wood about ye meeting house to Stephen Clason for seventeen shillings and ninepence." Mention is made in the history of the New Haven Colony of a lawsuit in which Stephen Clason of Stamford was a party. His wife Elizabeth was tried at Fairfield, Connecticut, in sixteen hundred and ninety-two, for witchcraft. The Governor, Lieu-

tenant-Governor, and other officials were present, and in evidence it was shown that when bound with cords, hand and foot, and thrown into the river, she would float. She was fortunate enough to be acquitted. Brief mention is made of the family from time to time, indicating that some of them continued to remain in the town for more than two centuries. In the year seventeen hundred, Daniel "Cloisen" was a "viewer" for the Southfield. In the year sixteen hundred and ninety-nine, there were certain lots of land to be drawn, and among those who drew was Stephen "Clawsen." In a list of estates made out in seventeen hundred and one, are Daniel and Samuel "Closon." Among those of Stamford who served in the War of the Revolution, were Nathaniel, Isaac, Samuel and Stephen Clason. In the first Church of Christ records of Stamford, which were begun to be kept separate from the town records in seventeen hundred and forty-seven, are the names of Jonathan Clauson, and Elizabeth, his wife, and widow Abigail Clauson. In the year seventeen hundred and seventy-three, certain church rates were remitted to those who had become Baptists, and among others was Samuel Clason. In seventeen hundred and forty-four, Sergeant Jonathan Clason was a member of the

school committee. Solomon Clason became a physician and went West, where he was very successful. Seth Clason was a representative in eighteen hundred and thirty-eight; Solomon Clason in eighteen hundred and thirty-one; John Clason in eighteen hundred and fifty-four, and Sergeant Jonathan Clason was a representative for seven years, from seventeen hundred and forty.

The Clason name is not common in New England, and not as numerous anywhere as are many families of the same date of coming to this country. If our records are reliable, the early families were small, much smaller than most of the early New England families, and a much larger proportion are females. More or less of the male issues are unaccounted for in these records, and probably they are far from complete. The variations in writing the name, adopted by different families is troublesome, and in many cases, without tracing them back to the patriarch, it is impossible to determine whether they are of this family or not. The few of the name that survive are widely scattered, east, west, north and south. In these few pages an effort has been made to gather together and place upon record as many of

them as possible, in order that the connection between the Clasons of to-day, and the patriarch Stephen of Stamford, may not be lost.

STEPHEN CLASON¹, the patriarch, executed his will March fifteenth, sixteen hundred and ninety-nine. He gave his estate to his wife so long as she remained his widow; and no longer, to sons Samuel and David of Stamford, and Stephen of Bedford; names also grandson Stephen, son of Jonathan, and granddaughter Sarah, who lived with him. His children all born in Stamford, were as follows:

Here amid the struggles and privations of a new country she was converted, and with her husband united with the Presbyterian church at Florida, N. Y., and went seven miles through the woods to meeting whenever the weather would permit. In the fall of 1842, she came with her husband and little family to Wisconsin, and located at Clason Prairie on the farm upon which she spent her subsequent years. With a brave womanly heart, she cheerfully met the difficulties of the early days and took her part with her husband, laying the foundation of society. A Presbyterian organization called the Bloomfield Church, was founded in her house, and the Presbytery of Wisconsin held some of their first meetings there. The Clasons of this region have held reunions for several years, and the following brief account of the reunions of 1887 and 1891 are taken from a local paper. The reference to the ancestor of Stamford and his ancestors sounds a trifle mythical, and may or may not be true: "The third annual reunion of the Clason family was held at Lindenwood, Saturday, the 25th. The day was beautiful, and the time was agreeably spent in boating, skating, and other social pastimes. There were present about one hundred relatives and nearly the same number of invited guests. The Clason ancestry dates back to nearly the first settlement of the town and county, Reuben Clason, the grandfather of Wheeler and Monroe, two of our leading citizens, came to this town from Westchester county in the earlier years of the present century, where he continued to reside until his death about the year 1850. He was the father of seventeen children, most of whom arrived at the age of manhood and womanhood, and reared large families of children. They are of Scotch descent, and date back their history to the time when Cromwell was on the British throne. They were highlanders, and during the wars which the usurper waged with Scotland, their ancestor, who was chief of a highland clan, was defeated, driven from his native home, and obliged to seek refuge in America. His first settlement was at Stamford, Connecticut, where it is said the wife of one of his immediate descendants suffered martyrdom for the crime of witchcraft. There is one feature of the Clason family, interesting to the genealogical student—their remarkable fecundity. The offspring of this one pair in this and adjacent towns at the present time run up into the hundreds! Simultaneously with the settlement of the Clason ancestry there came the Raymond family, five brothers, all having wives and occupying conspicuous positions in town and society. Contrast the two. In searching the territory occupied by hundreds of the descendants of the Scottish Chief, we find but one lineal descendant of the Raymond ancestry."

*Dr. Pell R. Clason, whose serious sickness has been reported from time to time in these columns, died at his home on Harrison Avenue in this city on Sunday night last, of consumption, at the early age of 31 years. The deceased was born in Litchfield, July 13th, 1855. At the breaking out of the Rebellion, his father moved with his family to this city, which ever after was his home. The deceased was a student in all of our grade of schools, graduating from the High school in the class of 1872. In the fall of 1873, he entered the Fresh man's class of Bates College, from which institution he graduated in class of 1877. After graduating from college he taught for several years as principal of the Northwood Academy, Northwood, N. H., and in the years of 1878-9, as principal of the Gardiner High school. In 1882 he graduated from Bowdoin Medical School, and immediately after in June, 1882, commenced the practice of medicine in his adopted city, and with very flattering results. UNCLASSIFIED FAMILIES.

In searching for information relating to the descendants of Stephen Clason of Stamford, a few families were found manifestly not of this descent, and others where the matter is in doubt. It is thought best to insert the records thus obtained to close this little volume, in order that they may not be lost, and may be available should they ever be wanted to aid in a more complete history of the Clason family. The letters embracing family traditions accompanying the records are also given for what they are worth, it being understood that tradition, while it may often be useful in arriving at correct conclusions, is not to be regarded as history.

William Clayson of Toronto, Canada, writes under date of March 10, 1887, that he is sixty years of age, and that his father and mother are still living in England. He adds: "I think I can solve some of the mystery of the Clason, or Clayson family for you. I have often heard my father say that his forefathers fled from Scotland during the Reformation, and this Stephen you mention was one of two brothers who fled across the sea, while the other brother, a chieftain of the

Scottish clan called McClay, fled to England. You have belonged to the one who fled to America, and I to the one who fled to England. As a lawyer, you might ask how do I know that our forefathers were from Scotland; as I told you before, my father telling of the fact, and myself once being claimed by a Highlander, a Scotchman, as being a countryman of his. His argument convinced me at once; he said my name being Clayson, in Gaelic meant McClay, and the McClay clan in Scotland was once a very strong one. So that our runaway ancestors, Scottish Highlanders, just merely changed their name from the Gaelic McClay to the English of Clay's son, "which is Saxon or Clason." I have every reason to believe our dear dead ancestors of two centuries ago were political refugees, and so were the Pilgrim Fathers, "God bless them." So, dear coz, we can look back with some degree of pride to an ancestry that was never conquered. I may also state that I landed in the United States in 1851, lived in the country many years, am a naturalized citizen, have two sons married and settled in the States, but am at present living here, as I have a son and daughter married and settled here.

Walter B. Clason of Rutland, Vermont, under date of February 28, 1888, writes that his great grandfather named Jacob, was a tanner and lived in Putnam county, N. Y., and died at Pen Yan, Gates county, N. Y., about the year 1840; that he had six sons named Jacob, Harry, Mason, Wayne, Byron and Anson. Jacob, Jr. was the grandfather of the writer, and died June, 1859.

The following account of the Clawson family of South Carolina is dated, Spartanburg, South Carolina, Nov. 20, 1885, and is entitled "Facts relating to the Clawson family obtained by Mrs. J. S. R. Thompson (nee Mattie Clawson) from her uncle, Dr. Charles Lewis Clawson of Chester, South Carolina, now the eldest known living representative of the South Carolina branch (that is, child of Dr. Jacob Clawson of Sandsford, York county, South Carolina.")

"The Clawson family came to America at an early period, settled amongst the Pennsylvania emigrants; moved from thence to Jefferson county, Virginia, before the Revolutionary War. The first known (our paternal grandfather,) was named John Clawson, who had four and perhaps five children, viz:

John Clawson, born in Jefferson Co., Va., in 1754, married a Miss Massey Harris, whose

mother's name was Massey, and who had a brother, Dr. Jacob Harris of New Jersey. John Clawson had eight children, viz: Dr. Jacob Harris Clawson, Israel, William Harris, Isaac, John, and three daughters who married respectively, Mr. Dunn, Mr. Quick and Houghlin; descendants of last name still in Virginia. Dr. Jacob Clawson moved to South Carolina, married a Miss Thompson, a descendant of the famous Lewis family. They had:

The above are all dead except Dr. Charles Lewis Clawson. William Israel Clawson married a Miss Shinn, and lived and died in New Jersey. They had issue: Mollie Clawson, now living in Woodstown.

William Clawson, brother of the preceding, married Abbie Keene. He was Judge Clason, of Woodstown, N. J., and died there without issue.

Isaac Clawson, son of John, of Virginia, raised a large family, all of whom went westward many years ago. John Clawson, brother of Isaac, went west about 1800, and nothing was ever again heard from him by his family.

There is a Dr. J. R. Clauson of Philadelphia, and there are Claussons of Charleston, South Carolina. It is generally supposed that these are only variations of the same name.

I will add that William Israel Clawson had nine children, five of whom are living in Yorkville, South Carolina.

Another writer (E. S. H.) writes as follows: "I will add a few items to Mrs. Thompson's history. Our great grandfather, John Clawson, ran away from France at the time of the trouble with the Huguenots, and settled in Virginia. He married a Miss Massey, and had four sons, John, Jacob, William and Israel. Israel studied medicine, graduated, and went to New Jersey to practice with his uncle, Dr. J. Harris. He married Miss Charlotte, daughter of General Isaiah Shinn of

Woodstown, N. J. He was at one time Governor of New Jersey, and lived a long and useful life, respected by all who knew him. My brother, Wm. S. Clawson, was a lawyer and judge at the time of his death. My younger brother, Dr. I. D. Clawson, was a member of Congress two terms, and both he and brother William were poisoned in Washington at the time of the Buchanan inauguration, and William never entirely recovered from it. The Clawsons of New Jersey have been men of high standing—gentlemen in every sense of the word, and like their patron saint, have left a record of deeds of kindness and charity.”

“There are five of our family: my father, mother, brother William, sister Elizabeth, and myself. The sons live at home, are thirty-two and thirty-four years of age and unmarried. My sister married a man by the name of Ayers. My great grandfather's name was Mark Clayson, grandfather's, Thomas, and father's, William. My father had uncles in England named Isaac, Mark, William and Martin. William had two sons, Richard and Thomas. William went to sea and was not again heard from. Father has a half brother living in Elham, Kent Co.; England, and there are other persons in that town bearing the same name. My grandfather was a Methodist local preacher and my father is also.”

George W. Clason in early youth, gave promise of an active and useful life, which was more than realized during his subsequent years. After learning the printer's trade, in which he became a skilled and intelligent workman, he went to New York City and soon found employment. Quick to learn, pleasant in manners, and respectful to his superiors, he speedily gained the confidence of his employers and won their esteem and good will. Proving himself equal to any task expected of him, he was entrusted with work that required thought, carefulness, and good judgment. He it was who

set the type and read the proof, and prepared for the press, the first volume of William Cullen Bryant's Poems, and this work he executed with such precision and faithfulness, that he raised himself still higher in their estimation and became a necessity to the office. Still he was not content with his lot, a noble ambition moved him to enter a wider field, giving greater scope to his abilities and affording better opportunities for reaching a prominent position. About this time the offer of "The Warren Journal" was made him, which he purchased, and of which he was the editor and publisher during the long period of eighteen years. This paper he conducted with marked ability, and it soon became a power in the party to which he was attached, and gained a wide influence and a large circulation. Moved by the advice so often given in those days, "Young man, go West and grow with the country," he sold out his interest in the Belvidere paper, and removed to Dayton, Ohio, where he purchased "The Daily Dayton Empire," which he edited and published during the four succeeding years, at the expiration of which time he sold his paper and removed to Milwaukee, Wis., where he purchased the "Daily News," which, together with an able associate, he managed successfully during the period of seven years. In all these enterprises of nearly thirty years continuance in editorial life, he showed himself a man of marked ability, and fully equal to the work he had undertaken. As a citizen he was loved and respected; as a patriot he was esteemed and revered. No one loved his home or his country better, or made greater sacrifices for the public good. The firm stand he took at the first and maintained to the last, against the attempt to rend our common country in twain, and to secede from the Union, was equally honorable to his head and to his heart. His friends and countrymen fully appreciated his efforts, and were inspired to noble deeds by

his example, and by his thrilling and eloquent words. Many sacrifices for his country's good he himself also made. A much loved son he gave to crush the Rebellion, who never returned to gladden his home, and to cheer his declining years, but fell in battle and was numbered with the great company whom we delight to honor, and whose memory we cherish and hallow.

Mr. Clason filled many positions of honor and usefulness, in the gift of an intelligent and appreciative people. At one time he was Collector of the Port of Milwaukee, and as another represented his District in the Legislature of his State. In both these positions of trust he performed his duties well and gained much credit, and won the esteem and good will of all who knew him. As a public servant he was faithful, as a politician he was honest, as a citizen he was patriotic and generous, as a friend he was true and loyal, as a Christian he was earnest and sincere, and as a husband and father he was kind and loving, tender and affectionate. He has left behind him an untarnished name. We revere and cherish his memory, and recall with gratitude his loving words and his noble example.

Marshall B. Clason, son of George W. Clason, deserves more than a passing notice. The words, "He lived and died," do not comprise all that can be said of him. From a child he was noted for his studious habits, and for his ardent love of books. While those of his own age were at play, he was getting wisdom and instruction from every source within his reach. Nor were his efforts in this direction unrewarded. His parents saw the bent of his mind and gave him every advantage in their power. They sent him to the best schools their city afforded, and when well prepared, to the Ohio Wesleyan University, where he graduated with distinction, and reaped all the honors usually awarded to the diligent and faith-

ful student. After his return to his home he took up the study of law, and also assisted his father as Deputy Collector of the Port of Milwaukee, and in both these pursuits he exhibited all those characteristics which marked his youth. He was diligent in his studies, and faithful in performing every work entrusted to him. Soon after his father's removal from office by change of administration, he went to Cincinnati, where he continued to prosecute his law studies until his admission to the Bar, when he opened an office and commenced practice. As a lawyer he was successful, and in a short time acquired a business such as is awarded to but few young men after a much longer experience. His prospects for distinction in his chosen profession were of an unusually promising character, and confidently did he hope for success. Not long however did he continue in this, his chosen work. The country was in danger. There was great trouble in the land. The South was seceding and working mischief, and trailing in the dust the glorious flag hitherto honored and respected by all the nations of the earth. Even his own city was threatened with invasion, and the enemy intent on its destruction were approaching. At this juncture law books were thrown aside, and to his country's rescue he hastened. With a brave heart and a high resolve he heard the call to arms, and went forth to fight her battles. In the summer of A. D., 1862, he went out as Adjutant of the 121st Ohio, and from the first was identified with the Army of the Cumberland, and participated in all its struggles with the enemy, and in every instance of conflict, won the warm approval and hearty commendation of his superior officers for bravery and gallantry. Few there were that excelled him in their devotion to their country's cause. He proved himself a patriot in every sense of the word, and greater gifts and higher rewards were within his reach. He

wrote his name on the roll of fame, and there it is still engraved in characters that grow brighter and more resplendent as the years go by. Still his career was but of short duration. In the terrible assault of Davis' Division on the enemies' centre at Kenesaw Mountain, while at the head of his men, and with his face to the foe, he was killed on the morning of the 17th of June, A. D., 1864. Thus short but noble was his career. His sun went down in glory. His country lost a true friend and a loyal servant, his family a devoted son and brother, and his young and patriotic wife a true and gallant husband. And yet they have reason to be proud of their hero, so early winning the golden crown of commendation, because of the gift of his life for his country's good. We may judge something of the real nobleness of his heart and of his high resolve, from a letter written to his wife, amid all the hurry and confusion of camp life, only three days before his lamented death, which we are allowed to copy.

"I am sorry that you feel so desponding concerning our cause. I am hopeful. Indeed, I have complete faith in our final success. Too much blood has been shed for this struggle now to be abandoned. Every new sacrifice that has been made renders firmer the resolve of the loyal people, that this war shall be fought out as long as men and means are left to fight with. There will be no faltering of the people at this point. We are just as determined as the South is desperate. God cannot permit this contest to be a failure. All his attributes are on our side. His providence, his mercy, his justice, must all work for the destruction of a people who wish to perpetuate the iniquity of human bondage. Do not despond. Be cheerful, and never let your faith waver for a moment. We may come forth from the struggle with our young men dead, and our young women widows, but these things shall not deter us. We will fight to the end. May God bring it soon!

How noble these utterances! How patriotic these sentiments! How commendable these resolves! Of such men the country may well be proud. Their memory is worth preserving. Their noble words and deeds are worthy of a record in the hearts of all the friends of patriots."

A Milwaukee paper notices Mr. Clason's death as follows:

"George William Clason, a veteran journalist, and for thirty years a resident of this city, died last Saturday evening, aged 70 years, at No. 675, Marshall St. He read the proof of the first volume of Wm. Cullen Bryant's Poems, and in 1852 purchased and became the manager of the Milwaukee Daily News, which connection was maintained about seven years. One of his sons was killed at the Battle of Kenesaw Mountain, and the other, Geo. B. Clason, has for many years been connected with the St. Paul Railway. Mr. Clason was once Collector of the Port of Milwaukee, a member of the Legislature, and for years a prominent Democratic politician. He died widely known and universally respected."

A more extended newspaper notice is given below:

"The death of George William Clason, which occurred Saturday evening, was not an unlooked for event to many of his friends in this city. Mr. Clason was born in 1812, at Goshen, Orange Co., N. Y. He was a near neighbor and playfellow of Wm. H. Seward in his early boyhood. At the age of 12 he was apprenticed to Jacob Mann, of Morristown, N. J.; with him at that time was D. G. Felets, father of W. G. Felets, Esq., of this city. Mann's office at Morristown, it will be remembered, was one of the historical institutions, it being at that time a very important affair. After learning his trade, young Clason went to New York as journeyman printer, and when William Cullen Bryant published his first volume of poems, it was he who set the type and read the proof. At 25 years of age Mr. Clason was an active politician of the old school Democratic type, and published at Belvidere, N. J., "The Warren Journal," an organ of the party to which he was attached. Two years later he married Miss Charlotte W. Blair, daughter of Judge Peter W. Blair, of Hope, N. J. John J. Blair, the railroad mag-

nate, is of the same family, and a brother of the Judge. Mr. Clason continued as editor and publisher of "The Warren Journal" for some eighteen years, when he went to Dayton, Ohio, where for four years he was engaged in the publication of a well known party paper called "The Dayton Daily Empire." This he sold to Vallandigham, who afterwards made it one of the most notoriously rebel papers in the northern states during the first years of the war. In 1852 Mr. Clason came to this city and purchased "The Daily News," which he continued to manage for a period of seven years, in connection with Judge Benton, now of La Crosse. Under the administration of James Buchanan, Mr. Clason was made Collector for this Port, and in 1868 was a member of the State Legislature and gained considerable prominence from his active connection with important legislation. Notwithstanding his long and intimate association with New Jersey pro-slavery politicians, his sense of right and warm generous instincts made him thoroughly loyal to the Union, and his earnest patriotic utterances during the Civil War alienated him from life long party friends. One of his two sons fell in the discharge of a soldier's duty, at Kenesaw Mountain, acting as colonel of the 121st Ohio Regiment. His other son, Geo. B. Clason of this city, has for more than twenty years been connected with the Milwaukee & St. Paul Road. Mr. Clason, it will be seen, had lived out the full measure of the allotted period of "three score and ten years," and was able to take in as a part of his personal experience events that will make a luminous period of history. As a politician and journalist, he was called to consider and to act in reference to the agitations, changes and reforms that have affected the country's growth and character, and will influence civilization through all coming time. Until 1879 the tone of Mr. Clason's mind had indicated no impairment of vigor. About that time he retired from all active participation in the affairs of business. In the quietude of home, he was passing the evening of his days, among books and congenial friends, when like the abrupt turning of some smooth flowing stream, he was suddenly stricken with a malady from which he has enjoyed only short intervals of relief, until nature's

weakened forces were finally exhausted, and the struggle ended in absolute rest on Saturday evening."

PROBATE NOTES.

In the Probate Records of Fairfield, Connecticut, Volume 1675 to 1689, page 178, appears the following:

"An inventory of the Estate of Jonathan Clason lately "deceased in ye yeare 1685;" then follows in the record a number of items of real and personal estate amounting to about one hundred pounds, (100£) and after them the following:

"age of the children"

"one Sonn about four years old named Stephen one daughter one year old and halfe Sarah." This is a true inventory "taken by us townsmen as it was given in by his Father

"Test Daniel Ward

"Joshua Hoyt

"John Waterbury June yr 22th 1685"

On page 179 the order accepting the inventory shows that it was presented to the court by "Stephen Clason Father to "ye deceased Jona: Clason" and that Stephen Clason, Sr., and David Clason were appointed administrators of the estate. Further on on the same page is an entry beginning "The testimony of Elizabeth Clayson aged about 54 years concerning "the will of her sonn Jonathan Clason deceased." In her testimony she states that she heard him say that his house and home lot were to be his son Stephen's, and the balance of his estate to be divided equally between his son and daughter, Stephen and Sarah.

After which follows the decree of the county court sustaining and approving the "verbal will" of said deceased.

Will of David Clason, of the town of Stamford, recorded Fairfield Probate Records, Volume 1716-35, page 111, and

dated March 24th, 1721, gives to his "eldest daughter Mary Jane" all his "close" in Stamford between Miamas river and Stamford Mill River, and two acres of salt meadow in Rocky Nick so called.

To his daughter "Deborah" one-half of his home lot and all of his movable goods and cattle except one cow and calf and makes her his "Soul Executor."

To his "youngest daughter Hephzibah" one half of his home lot, and a cow and a calf.

To his grandson, Peter June, Jr., one acre in Rocky Nick, his father, Peter June, Sr., to have the custody of it until Peter Jr., comes of age, and if Peter, Jr. die, land to go to his oldest brother.

In Fairfield Probate Records, Volume 1716-35, Page 152, is found an inventory of the estate of Samuel Clason of Stamford, (Jonathan Clason administrator) amounting to 289£ 14s, following which is an order of the court dated November 19, 1723, directing the said estate to be distributed as follows :

"there being an only son namely Jonathan Clason who
 "acknowledgeth before the court that he hath already received
 "his full portion of his father's estate, there being eight
 "daughters namely Abigall, Sarah weight Still Hannah Mercey
 "Rebeckah Jemima and Cesia Clason unto whom the court
 "do order the above mentioned clear estate shall be dis-
 "tributed to each an equal share of portion thereof"

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
