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## INTRODUCTION.

THE three books of the Commentaries on the Civil War contain an account by Caesar himself of the contest between him and Pompey for the chief place in the Roman state. In the year 49 B.C., Pompey and Caesar were the two leading men of their time, and there was no independent authority competent to curb their rivalry. As neither could brook the superiority of the other, a conflict was inevitable, and their struggle for power involved their country in civil war.

Caesar begins his narrative by referring to a letter which he sent to the senate by the hands of Curio, in January, 49 B.C. In this letter it was proposed that both Pompey and Caesar should resign their provinces and disband their armies, and that Caesar should then go to Rome to stand for the consulship. The letter was read in the senate, but no resolution was moved upon it. A general discussion on the position of the state then took place, and finally a resolution was passed ordering Caesar to disband his army by a fixed day, under pain of being declared

a public enemy. Hereupon the magistrates were armed with dictatorial power and preparations for war commenced. On learning this Caesar advanced to Ariminum, thereby leaving his province and practically declaring war against the senate. He rapidly took possession of a large number of towns in Italy, and so great was the alarm at Rome that the consuls fled to Capua. Domitius made a brief stand at Corfinium, but the town soon yielded to Caesar. Thereupon Pompey went to Brundisium, whither he was followed by Caesar, who began to block up the harbour. Pompey, however, succeeded in embarking his troops secretly, and crossed to Greece. Caesar through want of ships was unable to follow. He accordingly, abandoning the pursuit for the present, proceeded to Rome, where he summoned the senate and made an ineffectual attempt to treat with Pompey. He then went to Gaul and afterwards to Spain to conduct operations there, and he ultimately got the better of Pompey's supporters in both those countries.

In Africa, however, he was less fortunate, as his lieutenant, Curio, who had crossed thither from Sicily, was worsted and slain after an energetic campaign.

Caesar, during his absence from Rome, had been named dictator, and by virtue of that office on his return in 48 B.C. he took steps to restore credit and

reestablish the public confidence which had been shaken by the war. Having carried out various measures with this view and presided over the elections, at which he was himself chosen one of the consuls, he resigned the dictatorship, and proceeding to Brundisium thence crossed to Greece. In the latter country the war was carried on with varying success for several months, until at last on August 9 (June 6 of the Julian calendar), 48 B.C., the two generals met on the field of Pharsalus. Here a decisive battle was fought in which Pompey was defeated and compelled to take to flight. He first escaped to Amphipolis and afterwards vainly sought safety at various places in Asia and the neighbouring islands. He finally determined to seek shelter in Egypt, but on attempting to land in that country he was treacherously slain by Achilles and Septimius, the advisers of the young king Ptolemy.

The present selections end with this tragic event, which practically left Caesar master of the Roman world. The few remaining chapters of the Commentaries describe the pursuit of Pompey, Caesar's arrival in Egypt and the commencement of the Alexandrine war.

The Tales here given are much abridged from the original, and the language has been somewhat simplified, especially in the earlier sections. The Exercises are based on the text, and it has not

been thought necessary to give an English-Latin Vocabulary, as most of the words used in each Exercise occur in the corresponding section of the text, except in the case of some very common words and of a few others which are supplied within brackets in the several Exercises.

The Vocabulary is divided into sections corresponding with those of the text, and each Latin word is explained in the Vocabulary on its first occurrence. When the same word recurs in a later part of the book its place in the Vocabulary may be found by means of the Index.

The Notes supplement the Vocabulary in the few cases where an explanation of the text is required in a form not suitable for a Vocabulary.

In preparing the Text and Notes I am chiefly indebted to Kraner and Hofmann's edition of the three books of the Commentaries. I have also derived some assistance from Malcolm Montgomrey's excellent edition of the first book.



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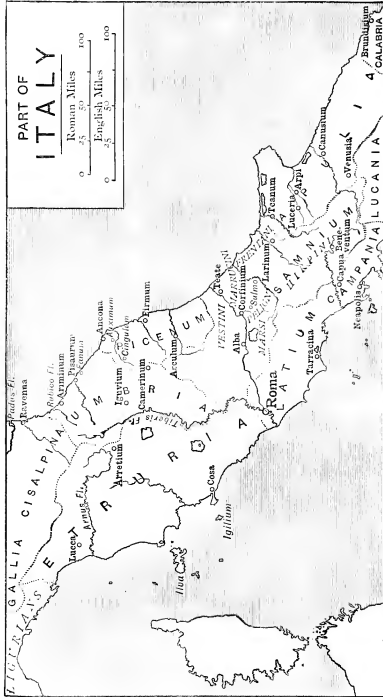

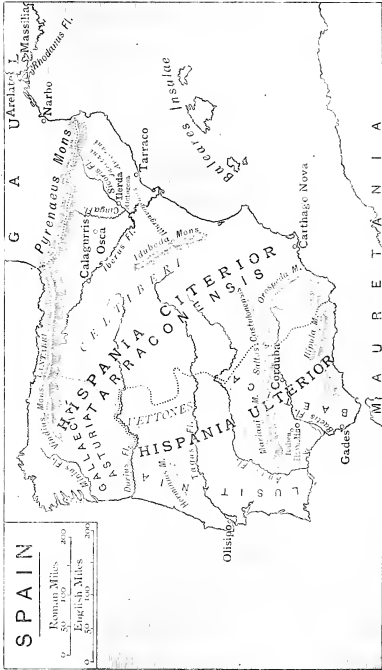

**11.** *Pompey's Lieutenants prepare to hold Spain.*

C. Fabium legatum cum legionibus tribus in Hispaniam praemittit celeriterque saltus Pyrenaeos occupari iubet, qui eo tempore ab L. Afranio legato praesidiis tenebantur.

17. *Caesar overtakes the Enemy. Both Sides encamp and send out Reconnoitring Parties.*

**13.** *Caesar makes a Detour over rough ground and by securing a Defile leading to the Ebro cuts the Enemy off from the River.*

Caesar omnes copias castris educit magnoque circuitu nullo certo itinere exercitum ducit. Nam quae itinera ad Hiberum atque Octogesam pertinebant, castris hostium oppositis tenebantur. Ac primo Afraniani milites visendi causa laeti ex castris procurrebant contumeliosisque vocibus prosequebantur nostros. Erat enim iter a proposito diversum, contrariamque in partem iri videbatur.

Sed ubi paulatim retorqueri agmen ad dextram conspexerunt iamque primos superare regionem castrorum animum adverterunt, conclamatur ad arma, atque omnes copiae exeunt rectoque ad Hiberum itinere contendunt. *19. Afranius surrenders after making an Unsuccessful Attempt to return to Herda.*

Erat occasio bene gerendae rei. Sed Caesar in eam spem venerat, se sine pugna et sine vulnere suorum rem conficere posse, quod re frumentaria adversarios interclusisset. Premebantur Afraniani pabulatione, aquabantur acre. Itaque magnus eorum cotidie numerus ad Caesarem perfugiebat. In his erat angustiis res. Sed ex propositis consiliis duobus explicitius videbatur Herdam reverti, quod ibi paulum frumenti reliquerant. Tarraco longius aberat; quo spatio plures rem posse casus recipere intellegebant.

Hoc probato consilio ex castris proficiscuntur. Caesar cum legionibus subsequitur. Pugnatur acriter ad novissimum agmen, compluresque milites interficiuntur. Tum vero consistunt necessario et procul ab aqua et natura iniquo loco castra ponunt. Tandem omnibus rebus obsessi, aquae, lignorum, frumenti inopia colloquium petunt. Venitur in eum locum quem Caesar delegit. Audiente utroque exercitu loquitur Afranius: Se perpressos omnium rerum inopiam; nunc vero neque corpore dolorem neque animo ignominiam ferre posse; itaque se victos confiteri. Ad ea Caesar respondit: Se nemini

nociturum. Provinciis excedere exercitumque dimittere iussit.

**20.** *Varro at first wavers, but finally sides with Pompey.*

M. Vario in ulteriore Hispania initio cognitis iis rebus, quae sunt in Italia gestae, diffidens Pompeianis rebus, amicissime de Caesare loquebatur neque se in ullam partem movebat. Postea vero, cum Caesarem ad Massiliam detineri cognovit, copias Petrei cum exercitu Afranii esse coniunctas, magna auxilia convenisse, atque haec ad eum latius atque inflatius Afranius perscribebat, se quoque ad motus fortunae movere coepit. Dilectum habuit tota provincia et bellum parabat. Ratio autem haec erat belli, ut se cum duabus legionibus Gades conferret, naves frumentumque omne ibi contineret. Progresso ei paulo longius litterae Gadibus redduntur, consensisse Gadi-tanos principes cum tribunis cohortium, quae essent ibi in praesidio, ut urbem insulamque Caesari servarent.

**21.** *He is deserted by one of his Legions and surrenders to Caesar. Caesar arrives at Marseilles and learns that he has been named Dictator.*

His cognitis rebus altera ex duabus legionibus ex castris Varronis, adstante et inspectante ipso, signa sustulit seseque Hispalim recepit. Quibus rebus perterritus Varro, cum itinere converso sese Italicam

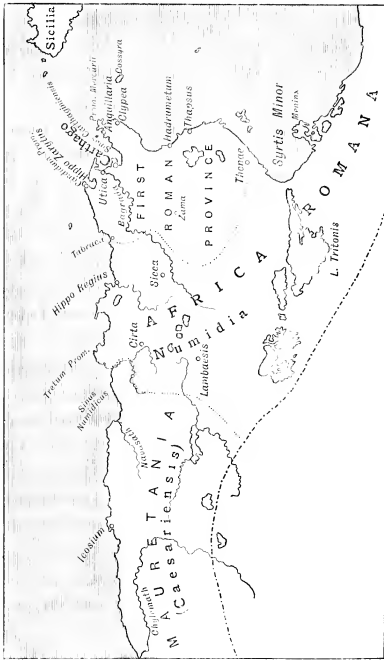
venturum praemisisset, certior ab suis factus est praeclusas esse portas. Tum vero omni interclusus itinere ad Caesarem mittit, paratum se esse legionem, cui iusserit, tradere. Ille ad eum Sextum Caesarem mittit atque huic tradi iubet.

Caesar, qui magistratus principesque omnium civitatum sibi esse praesto iusserat, contione habita omnibus gratias agit, biduumque Cordubae commoratus Gades proficiscitur. Provinciae Q. Cassium praeficit. Ipse Tarraconem et inde Narbonem atque Massiliam pervenit. Ibi legem de dictatore latam seseque dictatorem dictum a M. Lepido praetore cognoscit.

### 22. *Surrender of Marseilles.*

Dum haec in Hispania geruntur, C. Trebonius legatus, qui ad oppugnationem Massiliae relictus erat, duabus ex partibus aggerem, vineas turresque ad oppidum agere instituit. Sed tanti erant antiquitas in oppido omnium rerum ad bellum apparatus tantaque multitudo tormentorum, ut eorum vim nullae contextae viminibus vineae sustinere possent. Tandem autem Massilienses omnibus defessi malis, rei frumentariae ad summam inopiam adducti, his proelio navali superati, crebris eruptionibus fusi, gravi etiam pestilentia conflictati, sese dedere constituunt. Sed paucis ante diebus L. Domitius cognita Massiliensium voluntate naves tres comparavit.

**23.** *Curio's Campaign in Africa.*

Isdem temporibus C. Curio in Africam profectus ex Sicilia appellit ad eum locum, qui appellatur Anquillaria. Obsidere Uticam valloque circummunire instituit. Erat in oppido multitudo insolens belli diuturnitate otii. Itaque de deditioe omnes iam palam loquebantur. Haec cum agerentur, nuntii praemissi ab rege Iuba venerunt, qui eum adesse cum magnis copiis dicerent et de custodia ac defensione urbis hortarentur. Huic similtas cum Curione intercedebat, quod tribunus plebis legem promulgaverat, qua lege regnum Iubae publicaverat.

Ex perfugis quibusdam audit Curio Iubam revocatum finitimo bello restitisse in regno, Saburam, eius praefectum, cum mediocribus copiis missum Uticae appropinquare. His auctoribus temere credens proelio rem committere constituit. Equitatum omnem prima nocte ad castra hostium mittit ad flumen Bagradam, quibus praecerat Saburra. Equites missi nocte imprudentes atque inopinantes Numidas aggrediuntur et magnum eorum numerum interficiunt.

**24.** *Battle at the River Bagrada.*

Curio cum omnibus copiis quarta vigilia exierat. Progressus milia passuum sex equites convenit, rem gestam cognovit. Equites sequi iubet sese iterque accelerat. At illi itinere totius noctis confecti subsequi non poterant, atque alii alio loco resistebant. Iuba certior factus a Saburra de nocturno proelio duo milia equitum, et peditum eam partem, cui maxime confidebat, Saburrae submittit; ipse cum reliquis copiis elephantisque sexaginta lentius subsequitur.

Saburra copias equitum peditumque instruit atque his imperat, ut simulatione timoris paulatim cedant ac pedem referant. Curio hostes fugere arbitratus copias ex locis superioribus in campum deducit. Dat suis signum Saburra, aciem constituit et circumire ordines atque hortari incipit. Non deest negotio Curio suosque hortatur. Ne militibus quidem ut defessis, neque equitibus, ut paucis et labore confectis, studium ad pugnandum virtusque deerat; sed hi erant numero ducenti, reliqui in itinere substiterant.

**25.** *Defeat and Death of Curio. A few of his Troops escape to Sicily. The rest surrender, of whom many are put to death by Juba.*

His rebus cognitis Marcius Rufus quaestor in castris relictus a Curione cohortatur suos, ne animo deficient. Illi orant atque obsecrant, ut in Siciliam navibus reportentur. Pauci lenunculi ad officium imperiunq̄ue conveniebant. Sed tanta erat completis litoribus contentio, qui potissimum ex magno numero conscenderent, ut multitudine atque onere nonnulli deprimerentur, reliqui hoc timore propius adire tardarentur. Quibus rebus accidit ut pauci milites in Siciliam incolumes pervenirent.

Reliquae copiae missis ad Varum noctu legatorum numero centurionibus sese ei dediderunt. Quarum cohortium milites postero die ante oppidum Iuba conspicatus suam esse praedicans praedam magnam partem eorum interfici iussit, paucos electos in regnum remisit. Ipse diebus post paucis se in regnum cum omnibus copiis recepit.

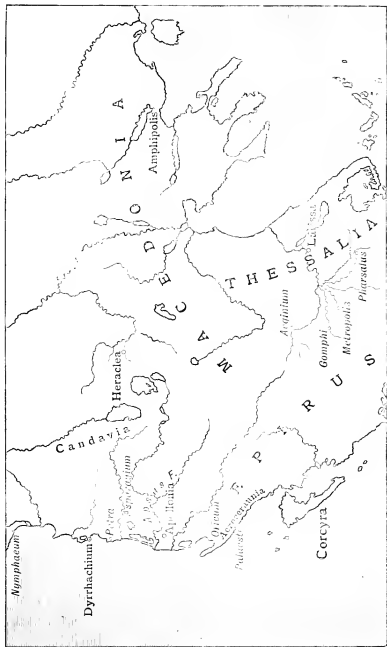
#### 26. *Caesar's First Dictatorship.*

Dictator habet comitia Caesar, consules creantur Iulius Caesar et P. Servilius. Cum fides tota Italia

esset angustior neque creditae pecuniae solverentur, constituit, ut per arbitros fierent aestimationes possessionum et rerum, quanti quaeque earum ante bellum fuisset, atque eae creditoribus traderentur. Hoc et ad timorem novarum tabularum tollendum minuendumque, qui fere bella et civiles dissensiones sequi consuevit, et ad debitorum tuendam existimationem esse aptissimum existimavit. Itemque nonnullos ambitus Pompeia lege damnatos illis temporibus, quibus in urbe praesidia legionum Pompeius habuerat, in integrum restituit. His rebus et feriis Latinis comitiisque omnibus perficiendis undecim dies tribuit dictaturaque se abdicat et ab urbe proficiscitur Brundisiumque pervenit.

**27.** *Caesar crosses to Greece with a part of his Troops.*

Eo legiones duodecim, equitatum omnem venire iusserat. Sed tantum navium repperit, ut anguste quindecim milia legionariorum militum, sexcenti equites transportari possent. Hoc unum Caesari ad celeritatem conficiendi belli defuit. Pompeius annum spatium ad comparandas copias nactus, quod vacuum a bello atque ab hoste otiosum fuerat, magnam classem coegerat, legiones effecerat civium Romanorum novem, frumenti vim maximam comparaverat. Hiemare Dyrrhachii, Apolloniae omnibusque oppidis maritimis constituerat, ut mare transire Caesarem prohiberet, eiusque rei causa omni





ora maritima classem disposuerat. Caesar, ut Brundisium venit, contionatus apud milites, conclamantibus omnibus, quodcumque imperavisset, se aequo animo esse facturos, naves solvit. Postridie terram attigit Cerauniorum saxa inter et alia loca periculosa quietam nactus stationem, et ad eum locum, qui appellabatur Palaeste, omnibus navibus ad unam incolumibus milites exposuit.

**28.** *He sends back his Ships for the rest of the Troops, but Bibulus meets and destroys many of them on the passage.*

Expositis militibus naves eadem nocte Brundisium a Caesare remittuntur, ut reliquae legiones equitatusque transportari possent. Sed serius a terra propectae naves neque usae nocturna aura in redeundo offenderunt. Bibulus enim Coreyrae certior factus de adventu Caesaris inanibus occurrit, et nactus circiter triginta omnes incendit eodemque igne nautas dominosque navium interfecit. Hoc confecto negotio litora omnia longe lateque classibus occupavit.

**29.** *Unsuccessful Attempt of Octavius to seize Salonae for Pompey.*

M. Octavius cum iis, quas habebat, navibus Salonas pervenit: oppidum oppugnare instituit. Est autem oppidum et loci natura et colle munitum. Sed cives Romani, cum essent infirmi ad resistendum propter paucitatem hominum, ad extremum auxilium descen-

derunt servosque omnes puberes liberaverunt. Octavius quinis castris oppidum circumdedit atque uno tempore obsidione et oppugnationibus eos premere coepit. Illi nacti occasionem meridiani temporis in proxima Octavii castra irruerunt et Octavium in naves confugere coegerunt. Iamque hiems appropinquabat et Octavius desperata oppugnatione oppidi Dyrrhachium sese ad Pompeium recepit.

**30.** *Caesar again attempts to treat with Pompey. Oricum and Apollonia open their Gates to Caesar.*

L. Vibullium Rufum, Pompei praefectum, pro suis beneficiis Caesar idoneum indicaverat, quem cum mandatis ad Cn. Pompeium mitteret, eundemque apud Cn. Pompeium auctoritatem habere intellegebat. Vibullius ad Pompeium contendit, ut adesse Caesarem nuntiaret. Pompeius erat eo tempore in Candavia iterque ex Macedonia in hiberna Apolloniam Dyrrhachiumque habebat. Sed re nova perturbatus maioribus itineribus Apolloniam petere coepit, ne Caesar orae maritimae civitates occuparet. At ille expositis militibus eodem die Oricum proficiscitur. Quo cum venisset, L. Torquatus, qui inssu Pompei oppido praecerat, portas aperuit et se atque oppidum Caesari dedit. Recepto Caesar Orico nulla interposita mora Apolloniam proficiscitur. Eius adventu audito Apolloniates ad Caesarem legatos mittunt oppidoque recipiunt.



**31.** *Caesar and Pompey encamp on opposite sides of the River Apsus.*

At Pompeius cognitis his rebus, quae erant Orici atque Apolloniae gestae, Dyrrhachio timens, diurnis eo nocturnisque itineribus contendit. Simul Caesar appropinquare dicebatur. Sed cum prope Dyrrhachium Pompeius constitisset castraque metari iussisset, Caesar praeoccupato itinere ad Dyrrhachium finem properandi facit castraque ad flumen Apsum ponit in finibus Apollonatum. Ibi reliquarum ex Italia legionum adventum expectare et sub pellibus hiemare constituit. Hoc idem Pompeius fecit et trans flumen Apsum positis castris eo copias omnes auxiliaque conduxit.

**32.** *Reinforcements from Italy land at Nymphaeum and succeed in joining Caesar.*

Multi iam menses erant et hiems praecipitaverat, neque Brundisio naves legionesque ad Caesarem veniebant. Ac nonnullae eius rei praetermissae occasiones Caesari videbantur. Quibus rebus permotus Caesar Brundisium ad suos severius scripsit, nacti idoneum ventum ne occasionem navigandi dimitterent. Illi administrantibus M. Antonio et Fufio Caleno nacti austrum naves solvunt atque altero die Apolloniam praetervehuntur. Nacti portum, qui appellatur Nymphaeum, eo naves introduxerunt.

Haec eodem fere tempore Caesar atque Pompeius cognoscunt. Diversa sibi ambo consilia capiunt: Caesar, ut quam primum se cum Antonio coniungeret; Pompeius, ut venientibus in itinere se opponeret, si imprudentes ex insidiis adoriri posset. Eodem die uterque eorum ex castris stativis a flumine Apso exercitum educunt, Pompeius clam et noctu, Caesar palam atque interdium. Pompeius idoneum locum nactus, ibi copias collocavit suosque omnes castris continuit ignesque fieri prohibuit, quo occultior esset eius adventus. Haec ad Antonium statim per Graecos deferuntur. Ille missis ad Caesarem nuntiis unum diem sese castris tenuit; altero die ad eum pervenit Caesar. Cuius adventu cognito Pompeius, ne duobus circumcluderetur exercitibus, ex eo loco discedit omnibusque copiis ad Asparagium pervenit atque ibi idoneo loco castra ponit.

**33.** *Operations at Asparagium. Pompey is cut off from Dyrrhachium and encamps at Petra.*

Caesar, postquam Pompeium ad Asparagium esse cognovit, eodem cum exercitu profectus, tertio die ad Pompeium pervenit juxtaque eum castra posuit et postridie eductis omnibus copiis decernendi potestatem Pompeio fecit. Ubi illum suis locis se tenere animum advertit, aliud sibi consilium capiendum existimavit. Itaque postero die magno circuitu difficili angustoque itinere Dyrrhachium profectus est,

sperans Pompeium aut Dyrrhachium compelli aut ab eo intercludi posse, quod omnem comteatum eo contulisset. Pompeius per exploratores certior factus postero die castra movit, brevior itinere se occurrere ei posse sperans. Quod fore suspicatus Caesar militesque adhortatus, ut aequo animo laborem ferrent, parva parte noctis itinere intermisso mane Dyrrhachium venit, cum primum agmen Pompei procul cerne-retur, atque ibi castra posuit. Pompeius interclusus Dyrrhachio, edito loco, qui appellatur Petra aditumque habet navibus mediocrem atque eas a quibusdam protegit ventis, castra communit.

**34.** *Caesar changes his Plans and determines to effect a Junction with Domitius in Macedonia. Pompey hastens in the same Direction to support Scipio. Domitius narrowly escapes falling into Pompey's hands and joins Caesar at Aeginium.*

Caesar a superioribus consiliis depulsus omnem sibi commutandam belli rationem existimavit. Itaque impedimenta omnia silentio prima nocte ex castris Apolloniam praemisit, ipse de quarta vigilia profici-scitur. Neque vero Pompeius moram ullam ad in-sequendum intulit. Caesari ad saucios deponendos necesse erat adire Apolloniam. Sed timens Domitio, ne adventu Pompei praeoccuparetur, ad eum omni celeritate et studio incitatus ferebatur. Pompeius quoque ad Scipionem properandum sibi existimabat; si Caesar iter illo haberet, ut subsidium Scipioni

ferret; si ab ora maritima discedere nollet, quod legiones ex Italia exspectaret, ipse ut omnibus copiis Domitium aggrediretur. His de causis uterque eorum celeritati studebat. Sed Caesarem Apollonia a directo itinere averterat; Pompeius per Candaviam iter in Macedoniam expeditum habebat. Accessit etiam ex improvise aliud incommodum, quod Domitius, cum dies complures castris Scipionis castra collata habuisset, rei frumentariae causa ab eo discesserat et Heracliam, quae est subiecta Candaviae, iter fecerat, ut ipsa fortuna illum obicere Pompeio videretur. Sed Allobroges, qui ad Pompeium perfugerant, conspicati in itinere exploratores Domitii, Caesaris profectionem, adventum Pompei docuerunt. A quibus Domitius certior factus vix quattuor horarum spatio antecedens hostium beneficio periculum vitavit et ad Aeginium, quod est obiectum Thessaliae, Caesari venienti occurrit.

**35.** *Caesar takes Gomphi by storm. Metropolis and the other Cities of Thessaly except Larissa submit to him.*

Coniuncto exercitu Caesar Gomphos pervenit, quod est oppidum primum Thessaliae venientibus ab Epiro. Eodem, quo venerat, die post horam nonam oppidum altissimis moenibus oppugnare aggressus ante solis occasum expugnavit et ad diripiendum militibus concessit statimque ab oppido castra movit et Metropolim

venit. Metropolitae casu civitatis Gomphensis cognito portas aperuerunt. Quibus diligentissime conservatis, collata fortuna Metropolitanum cum casu Gomphensium, nulla Thessaliae fuit civitas praeter Larisaeos, qui magnis exercitibus Scipionis tenebantur, quin Caesari parerent atque imperata facerent. Ille idoneum locum in agris nactus plenis frumentorum, quae prope iam matura erant, ibi adventum expectare Pompei eoque omnem belli rationem conferre constituit.

**36.** *Pompey enters Thessaly. His Party are confident of Victory.*

Pompeius paucis post diebus in Thessaliam pervenit contionatusque apud cunctum exercitum suis agit gratias, Scipionis milites cohortatur, receptisque omnibus in una castra legionibus suum cum Scipione honorem partitur. Auctis copiis Pompei duobusque magnis exercitibus coniunctis pristina omnium confirmatur opinio et spes victoriae augetur adeo ut, si quando quid Pompeius tardius aut consideratius faceret, unius esse negotium diei, sed illum delectari imperio et consulares praetoriosque servorum habere numero dicerent. Postremo omnes aut de honoribus suis aut de praemiis pecuniae agebant neque quibus rationibus superare possent, sed quemadmodum uti victoria deberent cogitabant.

**37.** *Each side tries to secure Vantage Ground for a Battle.*

Re frumentaria praeparata confirmatisque militibus temptandum Caesar existimavit, quidnam Pompeius propositi aut voluntatis ad dimicandum haberet. Itaque ex castris exercitum eduxit aciemque instruxit. Pompeius, qui castra in colle habebat, ad infimas radices montis aciem instruebat, semper, ut videbatur, exspectans, si iniquis locis Caesar se subiceret. Caesar nulla ratione ad pugnam elici posse Pompeium existimans, hanc sibi commodissimam belli rationem iudicavit, uti castra ex eo loco moveret et insolitum ad laborem Pompei exercitum cotidianis itineribus defatigaret. His constitutis rebus, signo iam profectionis dato animum adversum est extra cotidianam consuetudinem longius a vallo esse aciem Pompei progressam, ut non iniquo loco posse dimicari videretur. Tunc Caesar apud suos, ‘Differendum est,’ inquit, ‘iter in praesentia nobis et de proelio cogitandum. Animo simus ad dimicandum parati: non facile occasionem postea reperiemus’; confestimque expeditas copias educit.

**38.** *Battle of Pharsalia.*

Inter duas acies tantum erat relictum spatii, ut satis esset ad concursum utriusque exercitus. Sed

Pompeius suis praedixerat, ut Caesaris impetum exciperent neve se loco moverent aciemque eius distrahi paterentur. Sed nostri milites dato signo cum infestis pilis procucurrissent atque animum advertissent non concurriri a Pompeianis, usu periti ac superioribus pugnis exercitati sua sponte cursum represserunt et ad medium fere spatium constiterunt, ne consumptis viribus appropinquarent, parvoque intermisso temporis spatio ac rursus renovato cursu pila miserunt celeriterque, ut erat praeceptum a Caesare, gladios strinxerunt. Neque vero Pompeiani huic rei defuerunt. Nam et tela missa exceperunt et impetum legionum tulerunt.

**39.** *Pompey's Cavalry at first gain some Advantage, but are afterwards routed and driven to the Mountains. General Rout of Pompey's Forces.*

Eodem tempore equites ab sinistro Pompei cornu universi procucurrerunt. Quorum impetum noster equitatus non tulit, sed paulatim loco motus cessit, equitesque Pompei aciem nostram a latere aperto circumire coeperunt. Quod ubi Caesar animum advertit, quartae aciei, quam instituerat sex cohortium, dedit signum. Illae celeriter procucurrerunt infestisque signis tanta vi in Pompei equites impetum fecerunt, ut eorum nemo consisteret omnesque con-

versi non solum loco excederent, sed protinus incitati fuga montes altissimos peterent. Eodem impetu cohortes sinistrum cornu pugnantis etiam tum ac resistentibus in acie Pompeianis circumierunt eosque a tergo sunt adortae. Eodem tempore tertiam aciem Caesar, quae quiescens fuerat et se ad id tempus loco tenuerat, procurrere iussit. Ita cum recentes atque integri defessis successissent, alii autem a tergo adorirentur, sustinere Pompeiani non potuerunt atque universi terga verterunt.

**40.** *Pompey retires to his Camp. The Camp is taken, and Pompey, escaping with difficulty, makes his way first to Larissa and afterwards to the Sea-shore where he embarks on board a Corn Ship.*

Sed Pompeius, ut equitatum suum pulsum vidit atque eam partem, cui maxime confidebat, perterritam animam advertit, aliis quoque diffusus acie excessit protinusque se in castra equo contulit, summae rei diffidens et tamen eventum exspectans. Castra a cohortibus, quae ibi praesidio erant relictæ, industrie defendebantur. Neque vero diu, qui in vallo constiterant, multitudinem telorum sustinere potuerunt, sed confecti vulneribus locum reliquerunt, protinusque omnes ducibus usi centurionibus tribunisque militum in altissimos montes, qui ad castra pertinebant, con-



fugerunt. Pompeius, iam cum intra vallum nostri versarentur, equum nactus detractis insignibus imperatoris decumana porta se ex castris eiecit protinusque equo citato Larissam contendit. Neque ibi constitit, sed eadem celeritate paucos suos ex fuga nactus nocturno itinere ad mare pervenit navemque frumentariam conscendit.

#### 41. *Flight of Pompey.*

Caesar omnibus rebus relictis persequendum sibi Pompeium existimavit, ne rursus copias comparare alias et bellum renovare posset. Erat edictum Pompei nomine Amphipoli propositum, uti omnes eius provinciae iuniores, Graeci civesque Romani, iurandi causa convenirent. Sed utrum avertendae suspicionis causa Pompeius proposuisset, ut quam diutissime longioris fugae consilium occultaret, an novis dilectibus, si nemo premeret, Macedoniam tenere conaretur, existimari non poterat. Ipse ad ancoram una nocte constitit et vocatis ad se Amphipoli hospitibus et pecunia ad necessarios sumptus corrogata, cognito Caesaris adventu ex eo loco discessit et Mytilenas paucis diebus venit. Biduum tempestate retentus navibusque aliis additis actuariis in Ciliciam atque inde Cyprum pervenit. Ibi cognoscit consensu omnium Antiochensium civiumque Romanorum, qui illic nego-

tiarentur, arcem captam esse excludendi sui causa nuntiosque dimissos ad eos, qui se ex fuga in finitimas civitates recepisse dicerentur, ne Antiochiam adirent.

*42. Pompey arrives in Egypt and is there treacherously murdered.*

Quibus cognitis rebus, Pompeius, deposito ad eundae Syriae consilio, aeris magno pondere ad militarem usum in naves imposito duobusque milibus hominum armatis Pelusium pervenit. Ibi casu rex erat Ptolemaeus, puer aetate, magnis copiis cum sorore Cleopatra bellum gerens, quam paucis ante mensibus per suos propinquos atque amicos regno expulerat; castraque Cleopatrae non longo spatio ab eius castris distabant. Ad eum Pompeius misit, ut pro hospitio atque amicitia patris Alexandria reciperetur atque illius opibus in calamitate tegeretur. Sed amici regis, qui propter aetatem eius in procuratione erant regni, sive timore adducti, ut postea praedicabant, sollicitato exercitu regio, ne Pompeius Alexandriam Aegyptumque occuparet, sive despecta eius fortuna, ut plerumque in calamitate ex amicis inimici existunt, iis, qui erant ab eo missi, palam liberaliter responderunt eumque ad regem venire iusserunt: ipsi clam consilio inito Achillam, praefectum regium, singulari homi-

nem audacia, et L. Septimium, tribunum militum, ad interficiendum Pompeium miserunt. Ab his liberaliter ipse appellatus et quadam notitia Septimii productus, quod bello praedonum apud eum ordinem duxerat, naviculam parvulam conscendit cum paucis suis: ibi ab Achilla et Septimio interficitur.

1. Caesar sent messages to Pompey who was in winter quarters at Apollonia.
2. At the same time he set out for Oricum with all his troops.
3. Those who were in command of the town, opened the gates and surrendered to Caesar.
4. And when he had come thither (*say* whither when he had come), he began to advance on (*petere*) Apollonia by forced marches.

**31.**

1. But Pompey was said to be advancing thither, marching day and night.
2. He ordered the legions, whose arrival he had awaited, to winter there under canvas.
3. Accordingly (*itaque*) they laid out a camp by the river Apsus.
4. All the forces that (*qui*) Pompey had brought together did the same thing.

**32.**

1. About the same time Caesar learned that some legions had come from Brindisi.
2. Pompey adopted the plan of attacking (*say* that he should attack) the soldiers on the march.
3. He posted his forces in a suitable place in order that he might attack the enemy from an ambush on their arrival (*use part.*).
4. Pompey kept his forces in camp all day, that his design might be the better concealed.
5. Having found a suitable harbour, he ran his ships in thither.
6. They had neglected no opportunity of sailing.

**33.**

1. Accordingly they both set out for the same place next day.
2. Scouts informed Pompey that the enemy had moved their camp.

3. Caesar hoped that he could reach Dyrrhachium in the morning by a short cut.
4. When the ships were seen at a distance, the people of Apollonia (Apolloniates) thought they must adopt another plan.
5. The soldiers of Caesar bore toil cheerfully.
6. Pompey was cut off from the town to which (*say* whither, quo) he had brought together all his supplies.

**34.**

1. Caesar being baffled in his earlier design changed his whole plan of war and set out for Apollonia.
2. Pompey also hastened into Macedonia that he might attack Domitius.
3. But Caesar bore help to Domitius, fearing lest he should be exposed to danger.
4. Being informed by (*per*) scouts of the arrival of Pompey, he avoided the enemy.
5. When he had sent all his baggage forward to the town, he marched thither himself with all speed.
6. He was unexpectedly informed that Caesar had set out (*say* about the setting out of Caesar).

**35.**

1. On the same day that Caesar came to Gomphi he attacked the walls of the town.



2. The soldiers carried the town by storm and forthwith plundered it.
3. The people of Larissa were restrained by Scipio from opening their gates to Caesar.
4. He found the fields full of corn (*use pl.*), which the people of Gomphi said was nearly ripe.

**36.**

1. All things increased the hope of victory to such a degree that the soldiers of Pompey were now discussing their rewards.
2. Pompey thanked all the army and received both Scipio's soldiers and his own into one camp.
3. He was so pleased with authority that he did not share his honour with the ex-consuls.
4. He treated as slaves those with whom he ought to have shared his honours.

**37.**

1. Pompey could not be enticed out to battle because (*quod*) he considered the place to be unfavourable.
2. He drew up his army at the foot of the mountain that he might seem to be ready for fighting.
3. He advanced a long distance from the stockade in order that he might weary out the army of the enemy.

4. They did not easily find an opportunity of fighting.
5. When it was noticed that the enemy had advanced far from the camp, Caesar gave the signal for setting out.
6. He postponed his march and drew up his army in battle array.

**38.**

1. Pompey's men did not move from their position, but received the charge of our men, as Pompey had ordered.
2. Caesar did not order his men to check their course, but of their own accord they halted when they perceived a charge was not made by the enemy.
3. Caesar directed that they should hurl their javelins and afterwards quickly draw their swords.
4. And when the soldiers perceived this (*say* which things when, *quae cum*), they charged into the space that lay (*say* was) between the two lines of battle.

**39.**

1. The cavalry made an attack upon our line on the exposed flank.
2. When Caesar perceived this he ordered fresh men to take the place of those who were weary.
3. Six cohorts attacked the left wing in rear so that they could not withstand the attack.

4. Those who up to that time withstood every attack, took to flight and made for the mountains.

**40.**

1. Pompey put his chief trust in his cavalry, and when he saw that they were routed he fled for refuge to the camp.
2. He had left there certain cohorts as a garrison.
3. When the enemy were now within the stockade, those who were defending the camp burst forth from the decuman gate and made for Larissa at full gallop.
4. With the same speed a few others, having found horses, reached the sea by a night journey.

**41.**

1. Caesar pursued Pompey because he seemed (videor) to be again mustering forces and making fresh levies.
2. During two days he concealed his plan and lay at anchor.
3. No one could judge whether he had set out for Mytilene or was attempting to renew the war.
4. Many Romans go to Antioch to carry on business there.
5. When they heard that the citadel had been taken they left the place.

## 42.

1. Pompey abandoned the design of visiting Syria when he learned these things.
2. Cleopatra, the sister of King Ptolemy, was now carrying on war and had come to Pelusium.
3. She was trying (conor) to drive Ptolemy from the kingdom and had pitched her camp at no great distance from his.
4. Septimius from being a friend became an enemy, and along with Achilles, a man of conspicuous daring, put Pompey to death.

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
