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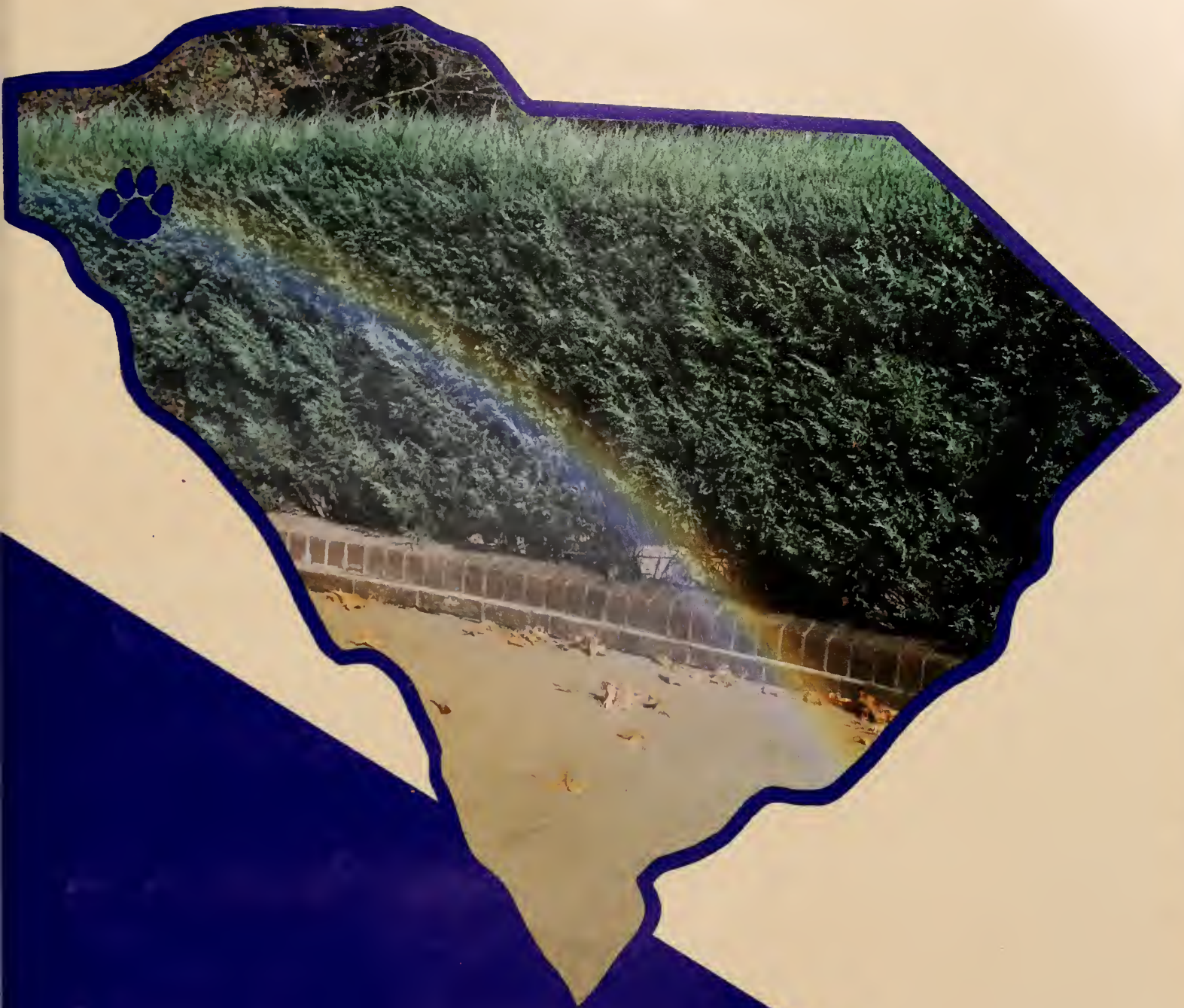

Approaching

In 1987 we were approaching the end, the end of an era, and the beginning of a new one. Clemson celebrated its ninety-ninth birthday this year and we remembered all of the changes that the original Clemson College went through. We wanted to dedicate this book to all of the achievements that Clemson University has made.

On April 16, 1888, now regarded as Founder's Day, Thomas Green Clemson bestowed \$80,000 "to establish an agricultural college which will afford useful information to the farmers and mechanics . . . therefore, it should afford thorough instruction in agriculture and the natural sciences. It should combine, if practicable, physical and intellectual education, and should be a high seminary of learning . . ." how true these words would later ring.

The first students, 446 of them, arrived on July 6, 1893 at the then all-male military academy. This tradition continued until 1955 when the first women were allowed. This was a truly historic year, as we also saw the school change from a military academy to a civilian college. In 1963 Harvey Gantt, the school's first black student was enrolled and "integration with dignity" came to South Carolina.

In 1964 Clemson became a fully accredited university and in the next twenty-plus years would make strides to become one of the South's truly great land-grant universities. By 1987 there were nine academic colleges offering 62 undergraduate and 61 graduate areas of

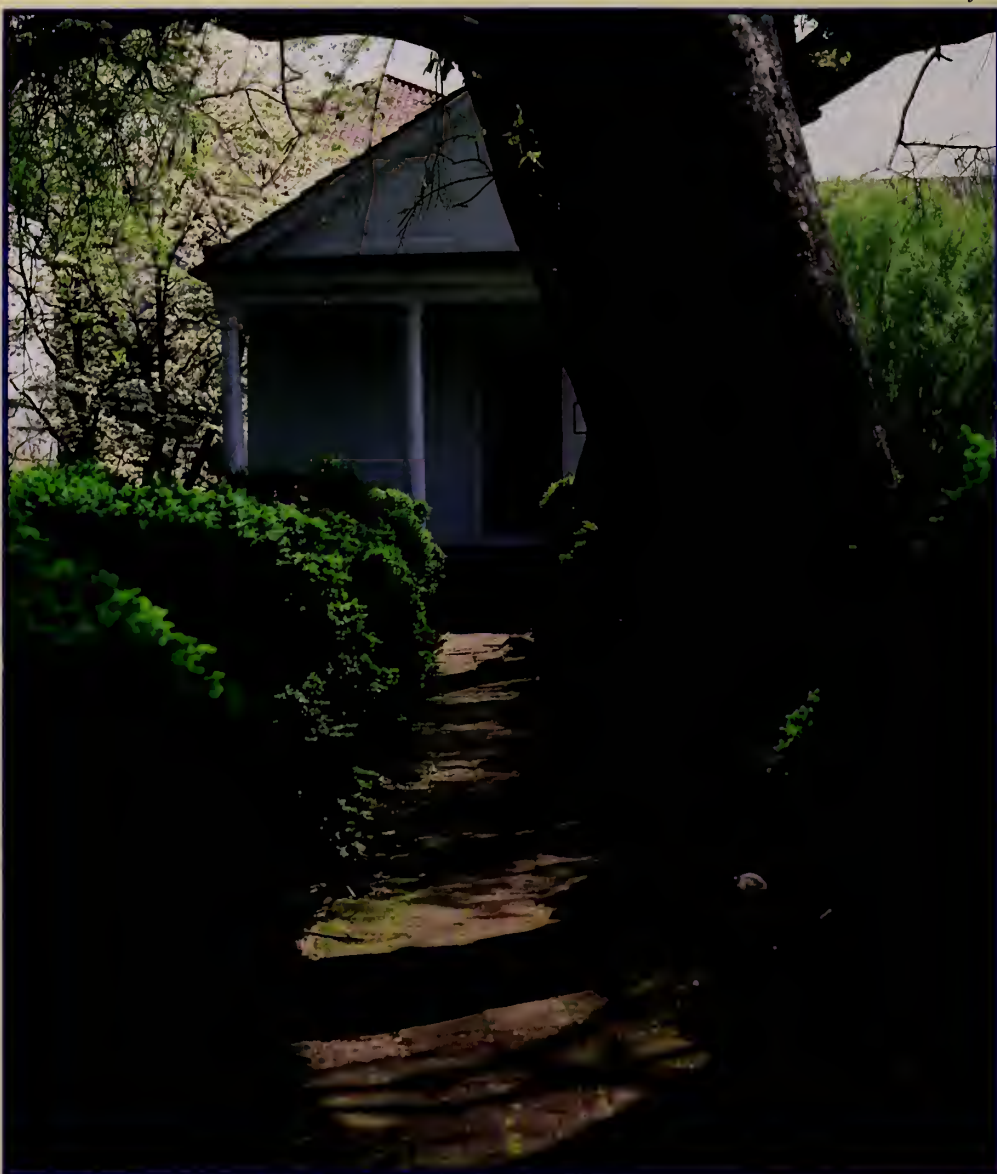

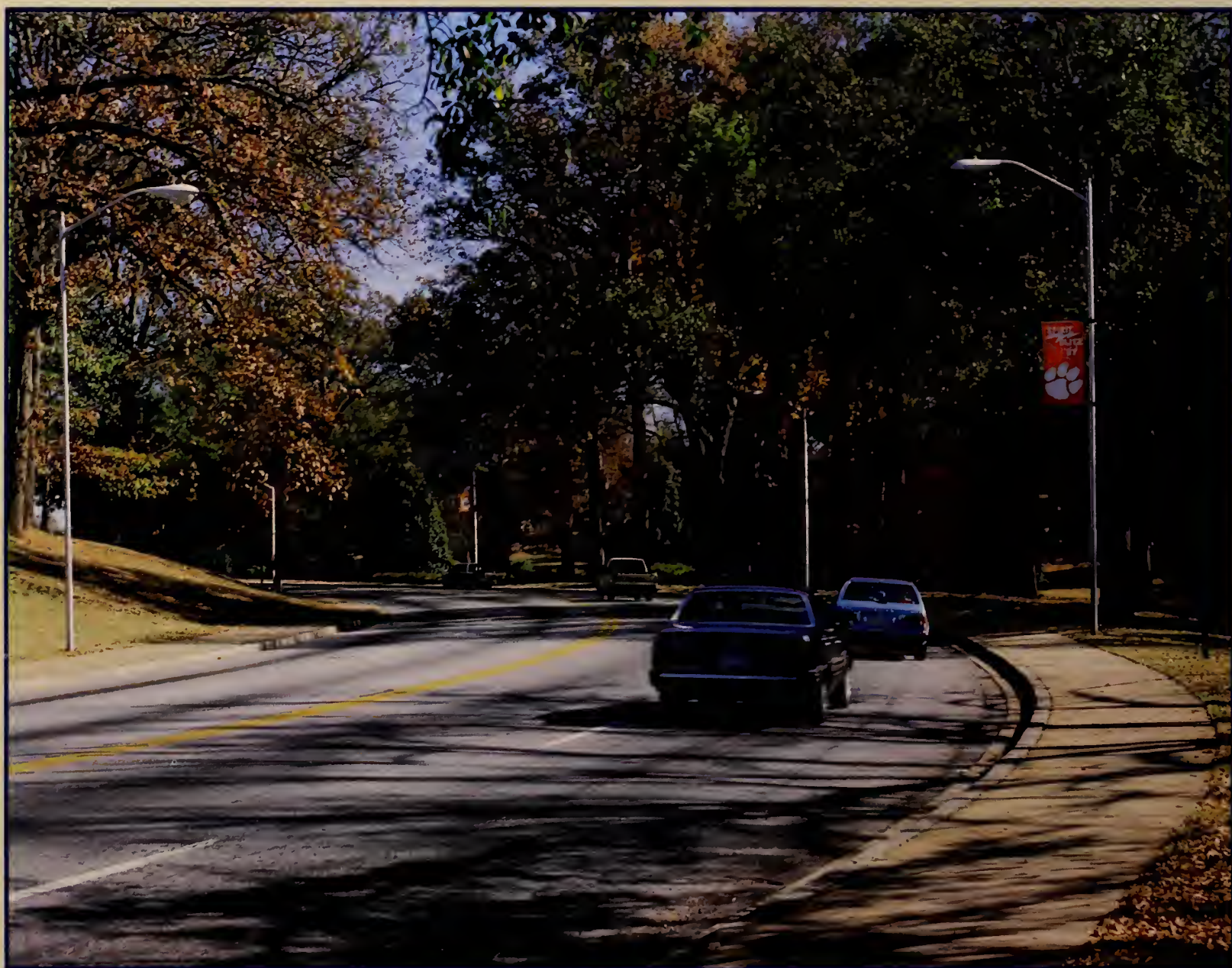

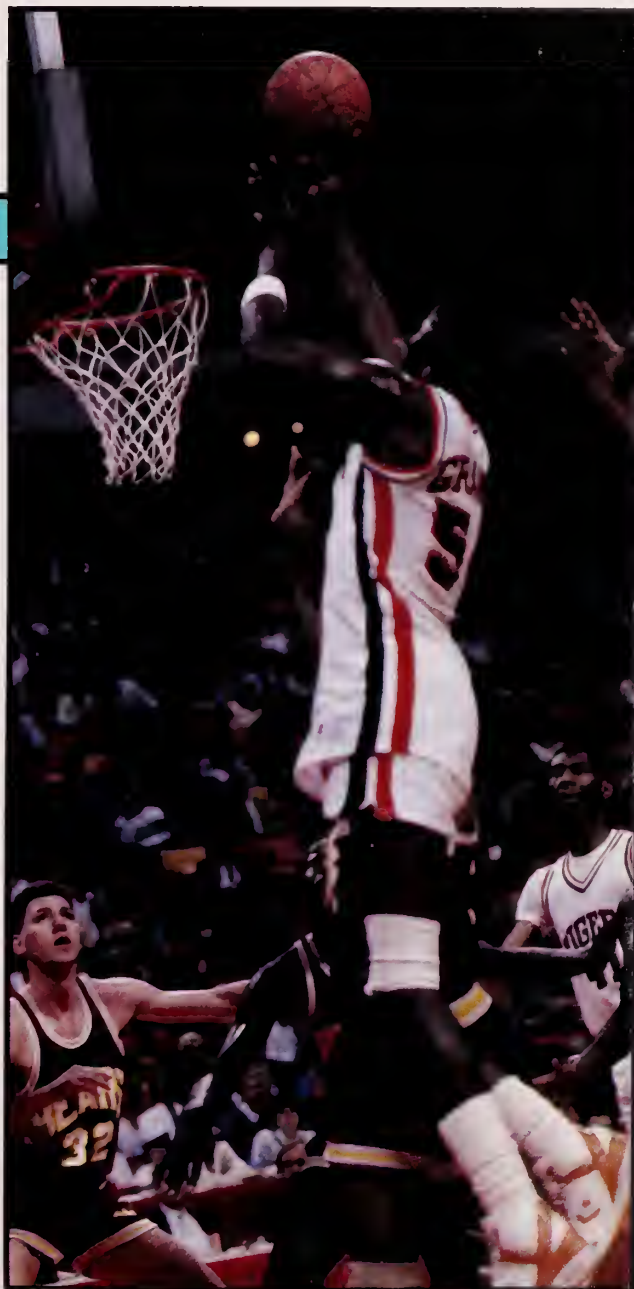

Working On The Chain Gang

Through part-time jobs on and off-campus, many Clemson University students gained valuable work experience. Students workers made important contributions to the work place and performed a variety of responsible tasks. Popular places of employment included the post office, library, police department, bookstore, and academic buildings. Local businesses also employed a large number of students. University students worked in restaurants, clothing stores, and grocery stores in downtown Clemson.

Dorisine Frazier, a sophomore political science major from Atlanta, Georgia, was employed at the University Post Office. Her responsibilities included forwarding mail and placing letters and announcements into student post office boxes. Frazier worked twelve hours a week and planned her work schedule around her class schedule in order to have spare time for studying and being with friends. Frazier enjoyed the sense of responsibility she received from working at the post office. "Although my parents give me spending money, I feel a certain satisfaction knowing I'm paying some of my expenses," she said.

Stephanie Harris, a junior accounting major from Ridgeway, S.C., was employed off-campus at Winn-Dixie in downtown Clemson. Harris worked 15-20 hours per week in the bakery/deli section. Her responsibilities included preparing food and attending the counter.

"In many aspects, working off-campus is a disadvantage because I have less versatility with my hours and I have to drive to work," she said. "On the other hand, I get paid more money and I have much more responsibility." Prior to her job at Winn Dixie, Harris



had never worked before. "When I first came to college, I decided to help my parents pay for some of my expenses."

"Working at the Book Store allows me the opportunity to meet interesting people each day," stated Pam Frick. Frick, a sophomore secondary education major from Chapin, S.C., was employed University Book Store. Frick worked 23 hours per week at the Information Desk with responsibilities including answering the telephone, helping students locate class materials, and answer questions on ordering special order items concerning Orange Aids.

University Union

The Clemson University Union was a volunteer organization of students working together with the Union's professional staff to provide co-curricular cultural, social and recreational activities for the total campus community. The Union also sponsored a variety of leisure activities for the campus. The Coffeehouse Committee offered musical entertainment for Edgar's Entertainment Center. Performers such as Carl Rosen, Rick Kelley, Dave Wopat and Brian Huskey have performed folk, rock and bluegrass music at Edgar's. The College Bowl Committee sponsored academic matches, which required participants to correctly answer a series of questions covering a broad spectrum of knowledge. Intercollegiate matches were held throughout the Southeast with competition between regional colleges and universities. In preparation, the College Bowl Commit-

tee organized local campus competition to choose a team to represent Clemson. The Cultural Committee hosted the annual Performing Artist Series. Committee members attended showcases to preview and select programs in theater, dance and drama. In the past Dizzy Gillespie and the Charleston Ballet Company have performed at the University. Committee members negotiated contracts with the performers, sent out publicity, and assisted with production. The Films and Video committee selected the films shown in the Union Theater, Edgar's Entertainment Center, the Alumni Video Theater and at special outdoor film festivals. They were also responsible for theater operations, ticket sales and concessions.

The Outdoor Recreation Committee sponsored action-packed excursions such as tubing on the Chattooga River, bicycling on the Blue Ridge Parkway,

rafting, skiing, and horseback riding. Public Relations Committee promoted the Union as an organization by publicizing Union Board events such as Welcome Back Week and Organizations Day. The committee also assisted other committees with publicity for their events. Short Course Committee coordinated more than 80 noncredit mini-courses each year. Committee members decided which courses to offer, contracted instructors to teach them, and publicized the curriculum. Courses ranged from breadmaking, woodworking, resume writing and ballroom dancing. Special Events Committee programmed events that didn't fall under the jurisdiction of the other committees. Events such as sidewalk chalk artists, hypnotists, giant banana splits and tie-dying have been sponsored by the Special Events Committee. The Travel Committee planned and organized ex-

cursions to out-of-town football games, shopping trips to Atlanta and New York, and scenic trips to famous attractions like Biltmore House. The Travel Center provided students with information on national and international travel, made hotel reservations, and sold luggage tags and travel maps. The Travel Center also sponsored shuttles to and from the Greenville-Spartanburg Jetport for University holidays and conducted trips and tours to places like New York City, Fort Lauderdale and the Carribean Islands. Central Dance and Concert Committee brought contemporary musical entertainment to campus. They sponsored performances at Littlejohn Coliseum, outdoor concerts, and concerts in Tillman Auditorium and Edgar's Entertainment Center. In the past, artists such as Kenny Rogers, Dolly Parton, Sting, Bob Hope, REM and Fleetwood Mac have appeared.

Providing Help

Kick Off The New Season

Clemson University celebrated First Friday, the beginning of the 1987 football season, with a parade, a pep rally, the crowning of the first "Miss First Friday," and an outdoor rock concert.

The parade, sponsored by Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity and the Central Spirit Committee, honored President Emeritus Walter Cox.

Cox, who retired from the university in April, served as the parade's grand marshal which featured the Tiger

Band, Miss Clemson, Wanda Connelly, the university cheerleaders and more than 30 floats and marching units.

The parade route began at Mills Road and proceeded down Highway 93 and ended in front of Sikes Hall. "CAT-ASTROPHE 87" was the theme of the parade, referring to the Western Carolina Catamounts, the University's Saturday football opponents.

After the parade, the Rally Cats, cheerleaders, and Tiger Band held a

pep rally in the amphitheater with event organizers crowning Miss First Friday. Each participating organization nominated a contestant to participate in the pageant. The winner was chosen by students casting a penny per vote and proceeds were donated to Helping Hands of Clemson.

Kelly Cockfield, a member of Alpha Chi Omega Sorority, was named "Miss First Friday." During the ceremony, Grand Marshall Walter Cox handed

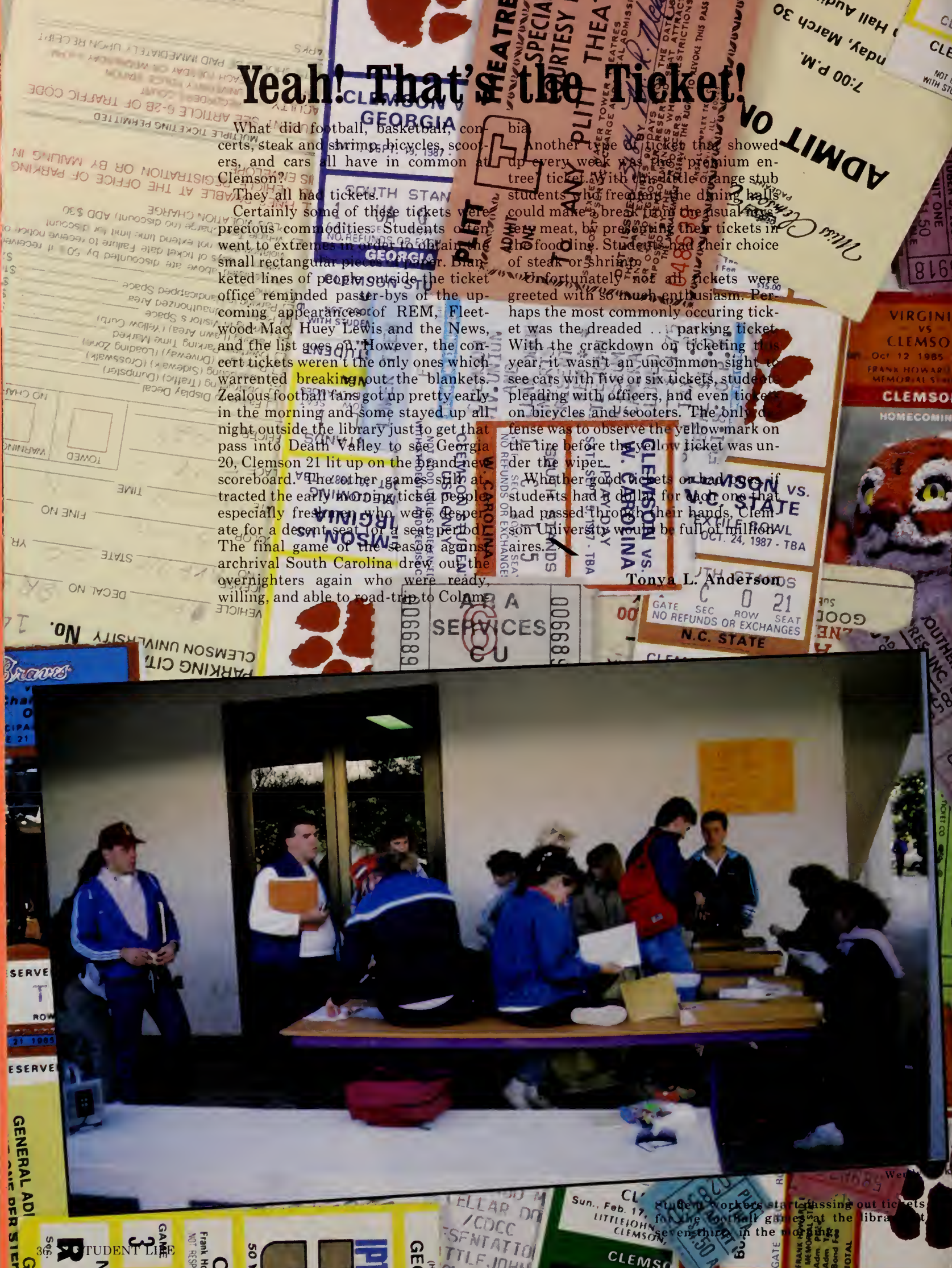

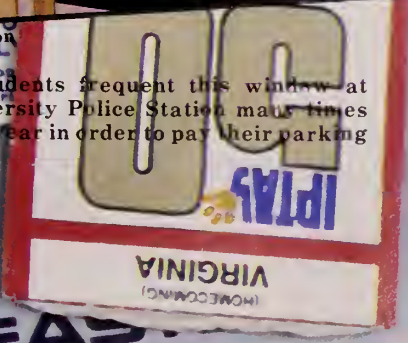

Playing the Field

Bowman Field, the expanse of land in front of Tillman Hall, has been the center of the Clemson campus since the beginning. Bowman Field was an integral part of many student's lives as evidenced by the many people enjoying the various recreational activities and the perpetual trails marking the most popular routes to class.

While Clemson was still a military school, Bowman Field was the site for military parades and drills. Keeping with that tradition, ROTC units practiced marching, took helicopter rides and participated in various ceremonies on Bowman Field. Pershing Rifles practiced their routines and even the Tiger Band Flag Corps used Bowman Field as an opportunity to practice without the entire band.

Until 1916, Bowman Field was the home of Clemson football and baseball. Spectators sat on the ground or in their carriages because only a few portable bleachers were available. Up until a few years ago, fans were allowed to tailgate on Bowman Field on game day. During the week before Homecoming, Bowman Field turned into a giant party, as the fraternities worked day and night on their floats.

Although the Tigers played their games in Memorial Stadium, Bowman

Field was still the site of many informal football games. Sometimes only two or three students would go out and toss the ball around, while other times bunches of people would play just for fun or try to get in a little practice before the next intramural game.

It was almost impossible to cross the field without having to worry about being hit by a frisbee. One of the most popular activities, frisbee sometimes involved a few people, but often large groups would gather for a chance to play Ultimate.

Springtime brought the sun and warmer weather and many students braved the threat of a misguided frisbee for a chance to relax and work on their tans. Other students brought their books, hoping the fresh air would inspire them to study. The sprinkler trucks watered the grass, particularly right before or after a rainstorm and students sloshed across the field in the mud.

The site of many activities ranging from sports to military drills to Homecoming floats to sledding in the snow, Bowman Field was a part of every student's life as it has been for the past one hundred years.

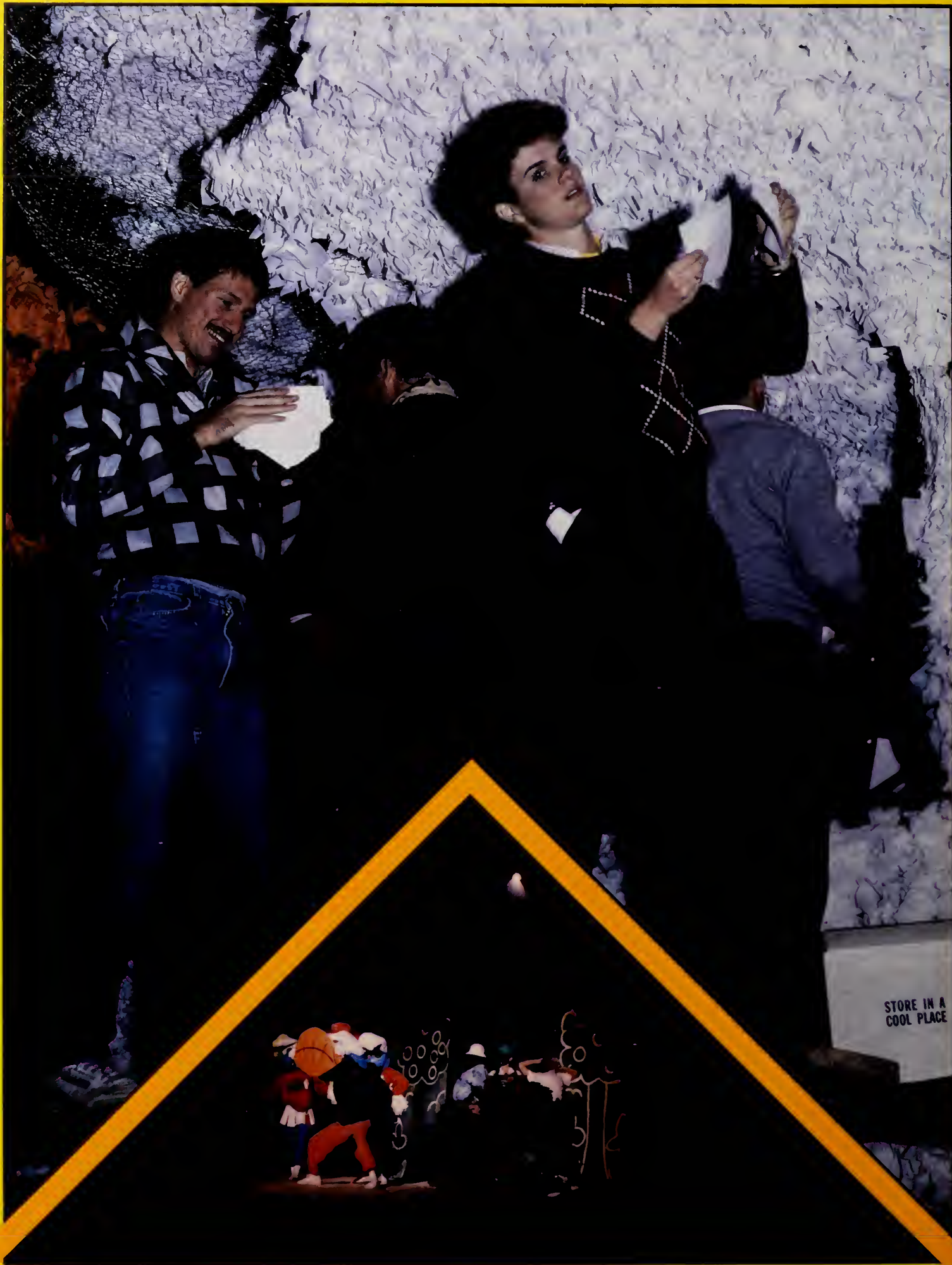

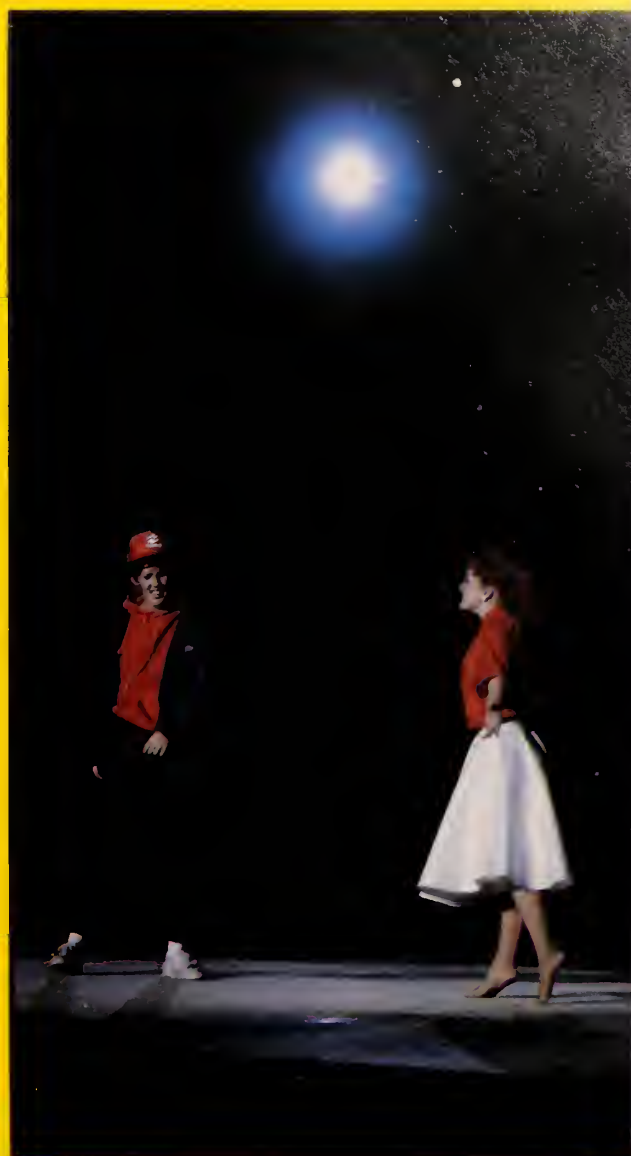

Eleven finalists were chosen from the pageant by judges selected by Student Government; then the voting was turned over to the students. The most visible contributions to Homecoming were the floats created by the various organizations on campus. Omega and Phi Delta Theta took second and third place respectively in the moving float competition.

Chi Psi's "Clemson and the ACC Salute the Olympics" display won their fourth consecutive first place finish in the still display competition. The Sigma Phi Epsilon float took second place and the Kappa Sigma float was third.

A pep rally raised the fans' spirit Friday night before Tigerama. The theme of Tigerama was "Daytime TV." Sponsors Blue Key and WSBF allowed non-Greek organizations to participate in the skit competition for the first time ever. The University Chorus made a great first endeavor by placing in the six finalists who performed at Tigerama. Pi Kappa Alpha captured first place with their skit, "Bragnet." The Sigma Nu's came in second and Alpha Delta Pi sorority took third.

The excitement didn't end with the skits. One particular fan even found Tigerama the perfect place to propose marriage, having hosts Russ Cassell and Jane Robelot play his and his girlfriend's role over the speakers while he

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The College Bowl Committee sponsored year-round intramural academic competitions. College Bowl was a question and answer game played between two teams made up of four players each. The teams scored points for correctly answering questions asked by a moderator. The team with the most points at the end of the game was the winner.

The committee held timed matches every week in the Student Senate Chambers. Competition was open to faculty, staff and students at the university. College Bowl wasn't only for the "brains" — sororities, fraternities and assorted groups of friends formed teams. At these timed matches, participants answered a series of questions covering a broad spectrum of questions including art, history, science, math, literature and music. Verified by the *Reader's Digest Association*, the answers to the College Bowl questions were known by only a few people.

College Bowl involved two types of questions — toss-up questions and bo-

nus questions. Toss-up questions were worth ten points and the first person to signal was given the opportunity to answer the question. If the player answered incorrectly, the other team was given a chance to answer. A correct answer gave the team an opportunity to answer a bonus question. Bonus questions were worth a variable amount of points ranging from 20 to 35 based on the complexity of the subject matter. The entire team could discuss the question for ten seconds, whereas a toss-up question could not be discussed among team members.

In the spring, intercollegiate matches were held throughout the Southeast with competition between regional colleges and universities. In 1987, the Clemson University College Bowl Team traveled to the University of Tennessee for the Southeastern Regional Competition.



The second play of fall semester was *Living Together*, which ran from November 17-21. Written by the English playwright Alan Ayckbourn and direct-

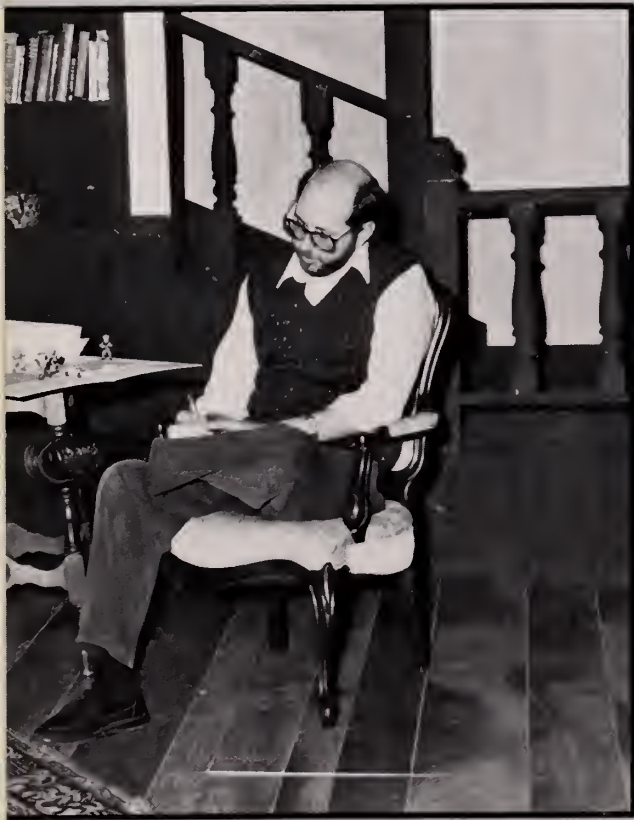

Serving the students, faculty, and the community of Clemson University, the Student Police performed many valuable services such as ticket writing, directing traffic in peak hours, guarding the campus, and working special events such as receptions and programs.

The University Student Police Department was respected by the University Police and the City of Clemson Police because they performed many activities that allowed the regular officers to patrol the campus.

The student police were criticized the most because of their duty to write tickets on the weekends. "The importance of this duty", according to Thea McCrary, "is to insure that if there was a fire at the dormitories, firefighters would be able to get to the fire without waiting for illegally parked vehicles to be moved."

The student police were also responsible for directing traffic during the early morning rush hour before classes began and as employees came to work. The service proved to be invaluable as 3000 cars arrived each day. And during the lunch hour, the students were directing traffic to ensure that all employees made it safely back to their jobs.

During the special events such as football games, concerts, and basketball games, the student police maintained barricades to insure protection against vandals. They also were responsible for assisting the University Police Department with the safety of leading figures such as Strom Thurmond and George Bush.

Another important task performed for the students was the bike registration. This task was extremely helpful in

preventing the number of bike thefts on the university campus.

The management of the organization was different from the other organizations in that there were six student supervisors who governed the group. The highest level of rank was a lieutenant who supervised the other students activities, was responsible for billing the various departments for the services and coordination of activities.

The student police required dedication to complete the long seemingly, endless hours of duty. Sometimes, their work assignments had them working at 2:00 am and ending shift at 5:00 am. However, the student police never failed the University in providing honorable and courteous service.

On September 17, 1987 the Constitution of the United States celebrated its two hundredth anniversary. The extreme importance of this fact was that the Constitution is the oldest, written document in America. It is the basis of which our country is maintained and serves justice for all individuals in America.

Clemson University, in collaboration with the University of Maryland and Penn State, began in the early summer the celebration activities for the Constitution's anniversary. One of the numerous activities for the celebration was a Constitutional Forum held on July 13, 14, 16, 17 in Daniel Auditorium. Several members of the panel included Archibald Cox, leading authority on constitutional and labor law; Arthur Schlesinger, Jr., Chancellor of the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters; Charles "Mac" Mathias, Jr., Senator of Maryland (retired); and Carl T. Rowan, syndicated columnist for the Chicago Sun Times for 19 years and presently for the News America Syndicate. These four gentlemen were the main speakers not only at Clemson University but also at the University of Maryland and Penn State.

Other Discussion Panelists included Kermit Hall, Professor of History at the University of Florida; Stanley Kutler, Professor of History, University of Wisconsin; William Lasser, Assistant Professor of Political Science, Clemson University; John Johnson, Professor of History, Clemson University; Daniel Wueste, Assistant Philosophy of Philosophy, Clemson University; James Hite, Alumni Professor of Agricultural Sciences, Clemson University; and Lyle

Denniston, Supreme Court Reporter, The Baltimore Sun.

According to Professor John W. Johnson, "The true value of the constitution is exhibited daily by men and women freely discussing matter of interest to them without fear of censorship or punishment." The Constitutional Forum was developed "to help people learn about constitutional issues and challenge them to work for positive legal change," stated Johnson. The Constitution was celebrated nationally and the celebration was organized by Chairman Warren Berger. Clemson was in collaboration with the South Carolina Historical Society and the Commission on Humanities.

According to Daniel Wueste, Assistant Professor of Philosophy at Clemson University, the original intent of the forum was to "identify the theory of Constitutional History and interpret it in an understandable manner and logic." "I think it is very important to rec-

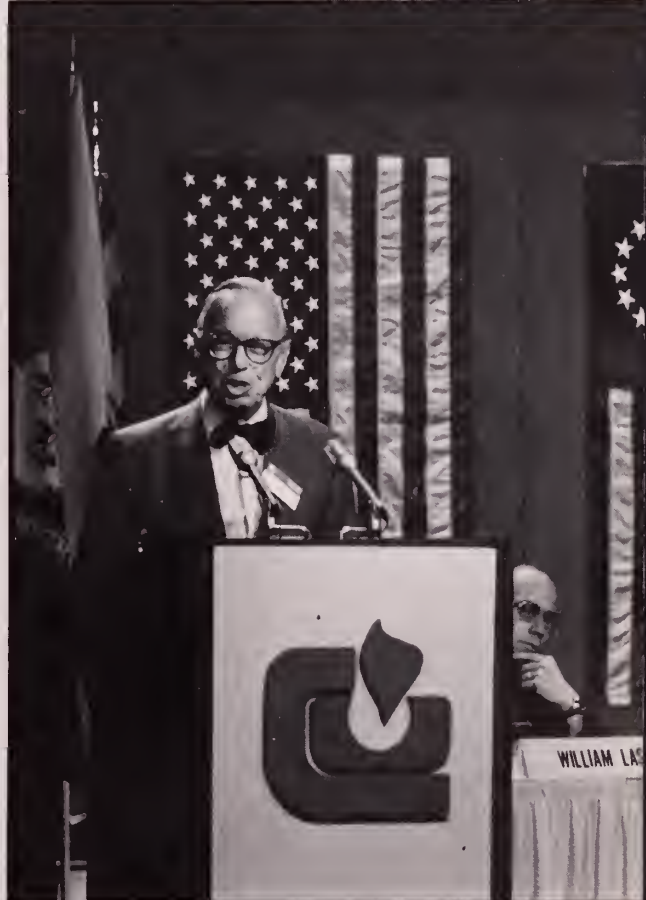

As part of the R.C. Edwards Science and Technology Lecture Series, Dr. Garth Wood, former registrar of adult psychiatry at the Prior Hospital in London, presented the principles involved with "The Myth of Neurosis: A Case of Moral Therapy".

Dr. Wood based many of his principles on the works of Freud. He stated that Freud was responsible for the focus on the unconscious mind with hidden motives, the importance of childhood with early experiences, the importances of talking things out, and the increased use of intellect vs. action as a problem-solver.

Wood presented a case against psychoanalysis because unhappiness has been medicalized and normal unhappiness, depression, and anxiety is seen as abnormal and a demand for treatment. "Psychiatrists do not know anymore than an average person," stated Wood.

On the case of sex as an obsession, Wood stated that AIDS, venereal disease, and infidelity are a by-products of Freud's strong emphasis on sex. Also, Wood believed that psychoanalysis does not work and is expensive and even does harm to the patient. He stated that therapy should be controlled like medications are by the FDA. He presented an interesting topic in an interesting manner leaving the audience to question his discussion after the speech.

The Ultimate Challenge

The Campus Placement Office has been in existence since 1955. It was first organized by Greg Hughes, who was the director until 1975. Al Mathiasen took over as second director and is now the current director.

The Placement Office was not only used by Clemson students but also area high school students interested in a particular major's job opportunities. The advice offered to any student with regard to a major was to choose a major which you enjoy and then find a job.

The Placement Office helped many seniors get interviews with prospective employers. To do this, a student must attend one of sixteen placement orientation sessions offered each semester. The office averaged around 1500 seniors this year registered with the office. Of these 1500 students, fifty-eight percent got interviews on campus. Only two percent were still looking for a job after being out of school for eight months.

One big advancement for the Placement Office was that it had been computerized and was one of the most automated placement offices in the country. Students used this program to research potential employers. Students who logged on to the main computer system had access to this system. It was very helpful in showing students potential employers for their particular major. There were approximately 350 companies registered with the Placement Office. Besides the computer programs, the literature and videos were used to aid in writing a resume or developing interviewing skills.

Among the seniors who were waiting to interview, most expressed feelings of apprehension, tension, and anxiousness. All the students felt the Placement Office helped them in their job search and prepared them for their in-

Such activities included Tiger Drill Meet, a state-wide competition for ROTC high school units, Dining-Out, and the Joint Army Air Force Parade. Also during AFROTC Week, there was a POW/MIA exhibit in the loggia, a formal retreat ceremony on Bowman Field, and a F-16 flyover during the half-time of the Homecoming game. Special projects included escorting Helping Hands children to the football games, flights spending afternoons with the kids, and helping them out with their store. Various parties were thrown throughout the year like the great Halloween Bash.

Over the years, physical fitness has

proven to be essential for Air Force officers. For instance, a 1.5 mile aerobic run and PFT (sit-ups, pull-ups, broad jump, and 600 yard dash) were given each semester. Also, there were intercorps athletics such as volleyball, ultimate frisbee, football, and racquetball. Others included the Field Day Extravaganza and a Fun-Run, co-sponsored by the College of Nursing and CU Wellness Fitness Program.

Some of the key speakers included David O. Cooke, the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense under Administration. Also, both Lt. Clebe McCleary and Dr. William Wentworth, a sociology professor at Clemson, spoke on their experiences in Vietnam.

AFROTC's primary organization, Arnold Air Society, was a national, honorary, professional, and service organization. The Major Rudolph Anderson, Jr. Squadron of Arnold Air Society was commanded by Cadet Andy Chamblee,

a sophomore majoring in Psychology. The membership enrollment was 54. AAS won the following Area V and VI awards for 1986-1987: the Maryland Cup for the #1 large squadron, Lemay Ohio Award, Samuel E. Anderson Award, A.T. Reid Crimson Glory Award, Ciccoli Joint Operations Award, and the Colonel Hall Freedom Cup Award. Also on the National Level, AAS won the LeMay Ohio Award for outstanding support of the Air Force Association, the parent organization of Arnold Air Society. Their activities included POW/MIA awareness programs, Girl Scout Derby Day, celebrity auction, and blood drive.

AFROTC looked forward to continuing its community involvement, as well as recruiting, training, and commissioning the Air Force leaders of tomorrow.

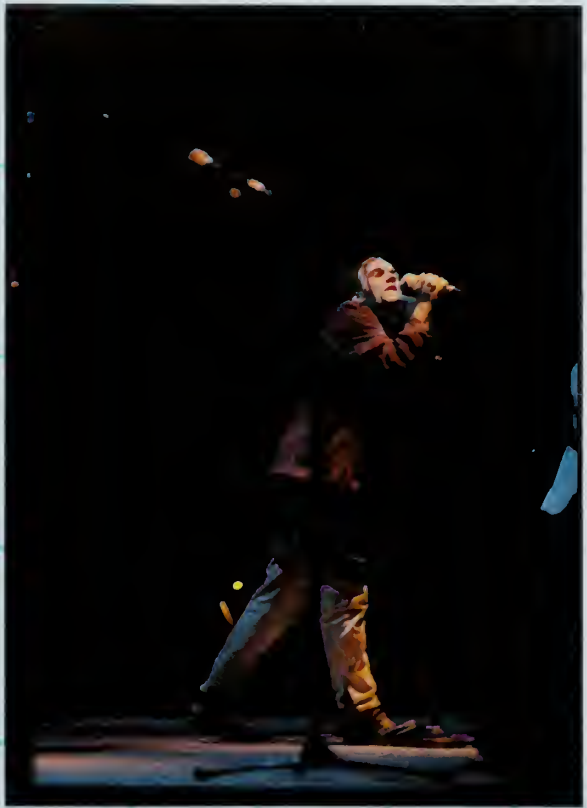
PROGRESSIVE ROCKERS HIT CLEMSON

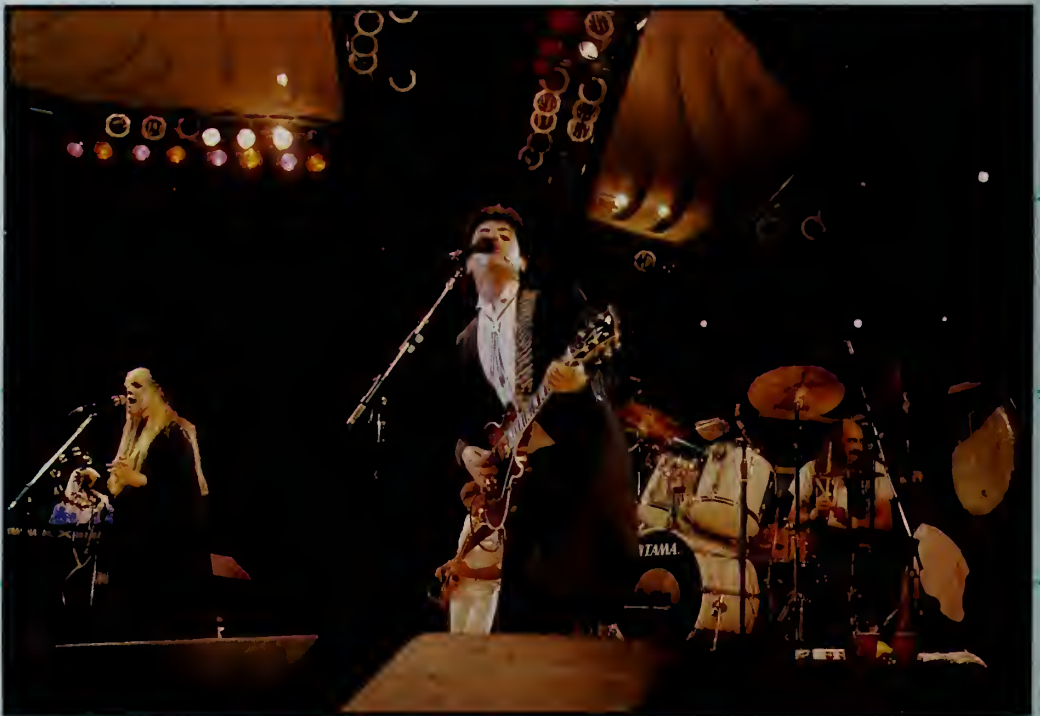

Clemson welcomed two deans to its faculty in 1987. The College of Nursing and the College of Sciences were headed by the new deans, Opal Hipps, who replaced Dean of Nursing, Mary Lohrm, and Bobby Wixson, who replaced Dean of Sciences, Henry Vogel.

Opal Hipps returned to Clemson's College of Nursing after an eight year absence. She was a member of the nursing faculty at Clemson from 1969 to 1979.

Among Dean Hipps' goals for the College of Nursing were plans for insuring that the curriculum was as strong as possible for both graduate and undergraduate programs. She also cited plans for fund raising efforts to increase research and the college's endowment.

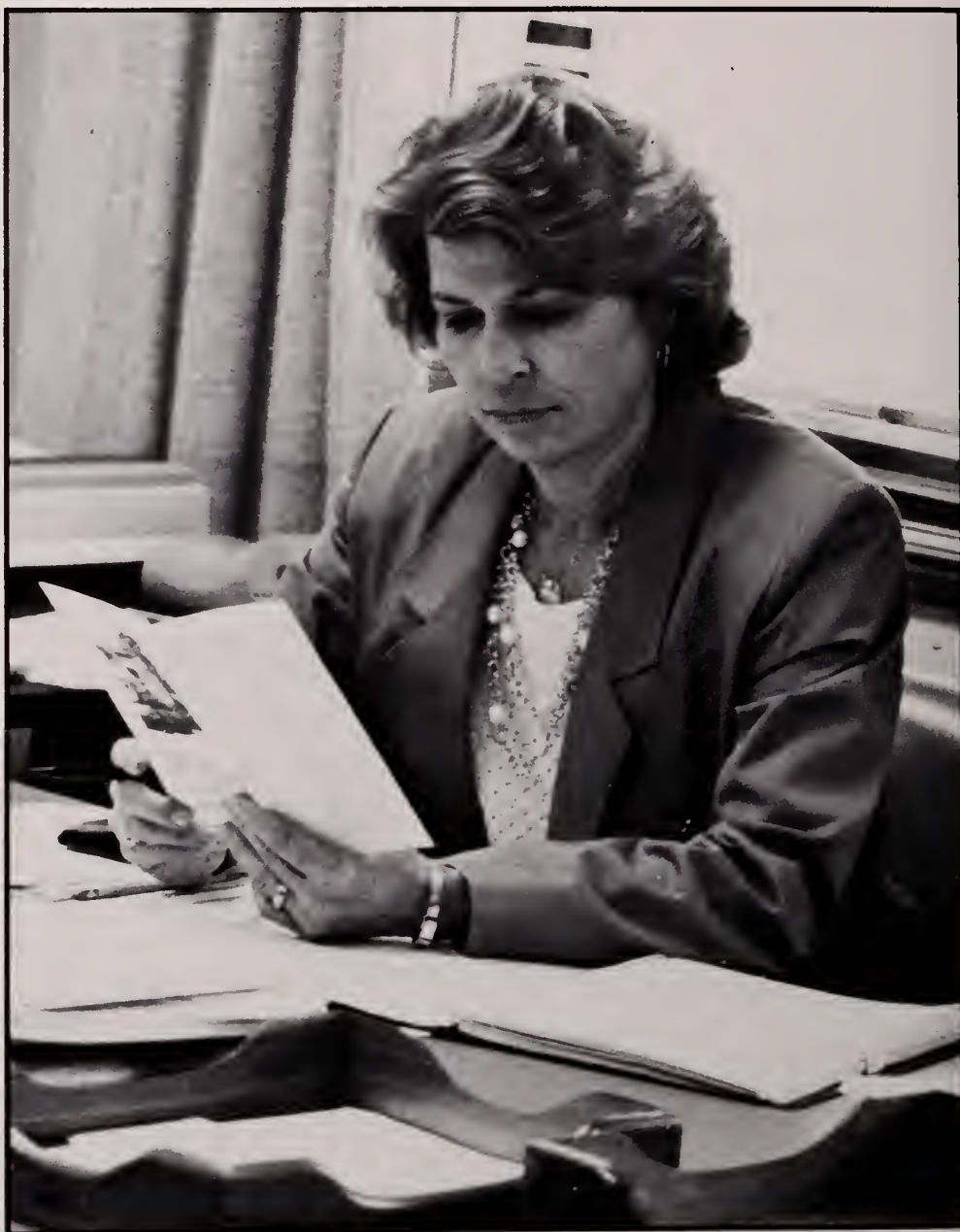
Although Hipps said, "Education is our primary mission," she added that the College of Nursing "can and should develop in the areas of promoting the health of the community and taking its leadership role in the Upstate."

Hipps obtained her bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and held a doctorate in health education administration from the University of South Carolina.

Bobby Wixson took over the post of Dean of the College of Sciences on August 17, 1987. His experience with other land-grant institutions like Clemson was one of the assets Dean Wixson brought to the college. He was anxious to help in the transition Clemson was making to upgrade its programs and

research.

Dean Wixson's goals for the College of Sciences included a reward system for the faculty, which was designed to best develop the faculty and staff. He sought to get the faculty more involved in industry, the community, and in travel. One of his main objectives focused on the assessment of where the College of Sciences stood and how to best utilize its resources for the future.

Dean Wixson ran an "open door policy" for students, often talking to them to learn their views and suggestions. As he put it, "If the students were not here, we wouldn't be here."

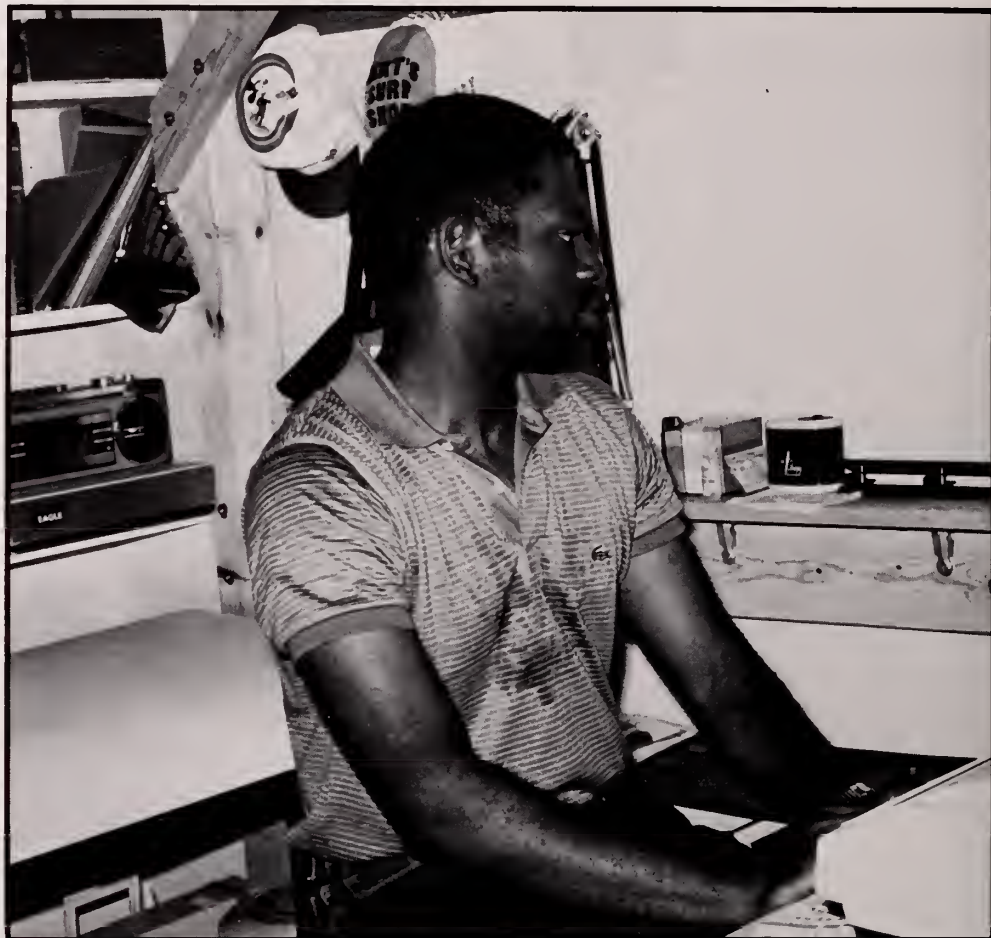

The Calhoun College honors program presented the best students, faculty, and curricula Clemson had to offer. The twenty-five year old program continued to grow in 1987 with 487 honors students, compared to 1983's 210 students. Each of the University's nine colleges were represented in the honors program.

Calhoun College had several key features of attraction for its students. These included smaller classes of about twenty or fewer students. The smaller classes offered more individual attention for each student, as well as allowing the course to be taught at an appropriate level for the honors students. The honors classes were taught only by Clemson's best faculty. Honors classes were never taught by graduate students.

Another feature of the college was the honors seminars. Each year speakers and dignitaries were brought to Clemson to meet and discuss events with the Calhoun scholars. The Calhoun College lectures for 1987-88 featured such speakers as Dr. Ferrol Sams, an author of two novels and owner of a medical clinic in Georgia.

Dr. Sams spoke on "Creative Writing

in Your Dotage." Psychiatrist Dr. Garth Wood presented "the principles of moral therapy" to Calhoun Scholars in his speech, "The Myth of Neurosis: Overcoming the Illness Excuse."

The 1988 President's Honors Colloquium featured Moorhead Kennedy, a State Department official who was one of the Iranian hostages held 444 days in 1979. Mr. Kennedy spoke on "The Great Satan: The Terrorist View of America." These lectures were open to the public free of charge.

Calhoun Scholars were chosen by several criteria. The incoming high school student was required to have a 1200 on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), as well as be in the top ten percent of his graduating class. The incoming transfer student, entering the honors program, had to have a 3.4 or higher grade point ratio (GPR), a higher GPR than is required for most college honors programs. The student also had to have been predicted, by the admissions office, to earn a 3.0 or better GPR while at Clemson.

The Clemson House provided the fifth and sixth floors for residences for 137 of the Calhoun Scholars. The housing provided for a community feeling

between the honors students. The honors program fostered the feeling with a sports team, Honors Council Meetings, and picnics.

A new project for the college was the South Carolina Junior Scholars. It was officially titled the "Summer Science and Engineering Program" and was operated in cooperation with South Carolina high schools. Eighth grade students were allowed to take the SAT and the top six percent scorers were named Junior Scholars for high school. The distinction allowed them to participate in the summer program and was an advantage for those who would be seeking admission to Clemson at a later date.

For those students completing the honors program at Clemson, there were senior departmental honors awarded the evening before graduation. Students achieving the honors received an honors medallion made of bronze. To be considered for Senior Departmental Honors, the student had to have completed the university's requirements with a GPR of 3.4 and completed ap-

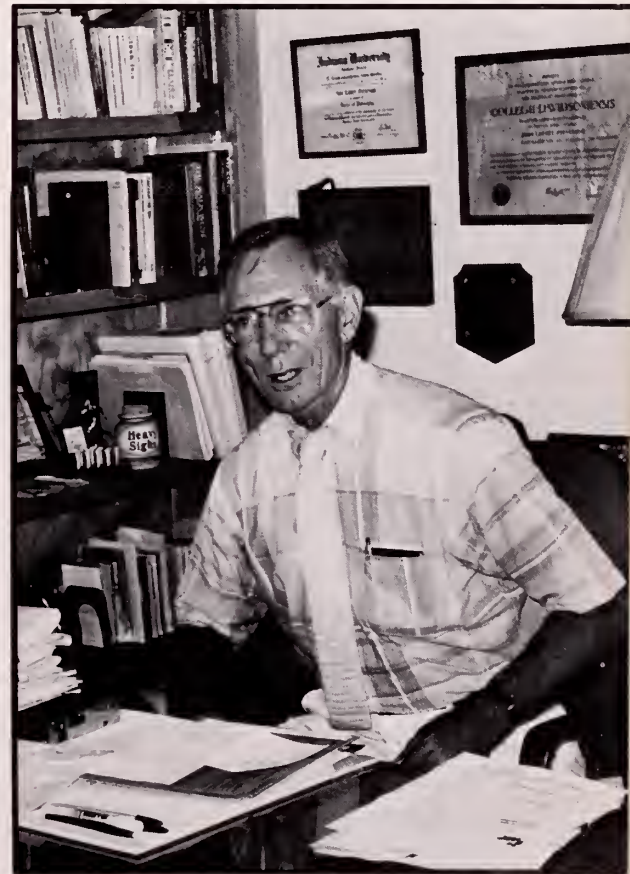


proved departmental honors courses at the 300 or 400 level. The student had to have earned twelve hours credit of the honors courses and have earned at least a B in each course. Students who worked toward Senior Departmental Honors started working toward the goal as early as the end of their sophomore year.

Calhoun College not only accepted bright, diligent, and creative students, but also helped them to focus their resources to become quality graduates of Clemson. Dr. Jack Stevenson, Director of Calhoun College, said about his job, "I like my job. I feel I have the best job on campus!"

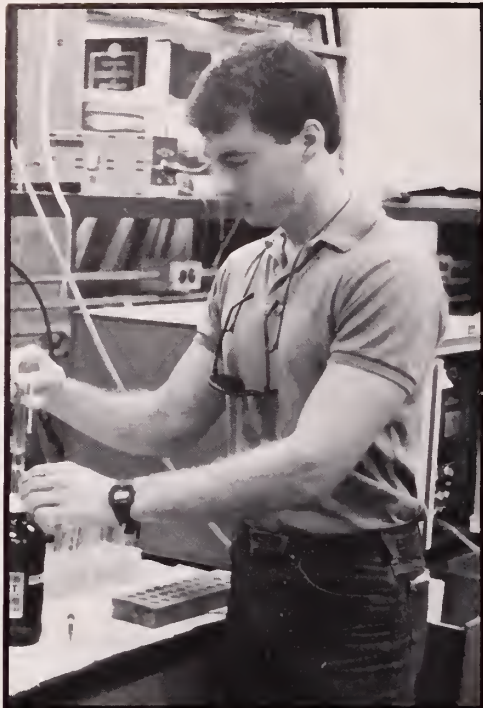

The Graduate School at Clemson occupied a vital niche in university life. Graduate students not only were students, but acted as teaching assistants, tutors, and researchers. The Graduate School aimed to provide comprehensive teaching in special fields, offer instruction in the methods of independent investigation and to foster the spirit of research scholarship among its students.

Students in the graduate program had to have obtained a four year degree from an acceptable university and have the approval of the department or program head. The student also had to show evidence he or she would benefit from study in a graduate program. International students, in addition to having to pass the graduate record exam (GRE), had to pass the test of English as a Foreign Language, unless English was their native language. Those seeking professional degrees often were required to have professional

experience and/or credentials, depending on the college awarding the degree.

Clemson University offered three research degrees, a Master of Arts, a Master of Science, and a Doctor of Philosophy. The university also offered courses for sixteen professional degrees: Doctor of Education, Specialist in Education, Master of Agriculture, Master of Agricultural Education, Master of Architecture, Master of Building Science and Management, Master of Business Administration, Master of City and Regional Planning, Master of Education, Master of Engineering, Master of Fine Arts, Master of Forestry, Master of Industrial Education, Master of Nutritional Sciences, Master of Parks, Recreation and Tourism Management, and Master of Professional Accounting.

Students who were working for a Master's degree were required to complete nine semester hours of graduate credit in one semester or two consecutive summer sessions or fifteen semester hours of graduate credit, six hours of which were research, in a twelve month period. Students who wished to obtain a Doctor of Philosophy degree were required to have twelve to twenty-four hours worth of graduate level courses and eighteen hours of doctoral research. Before graduation, the student was also required to pass a final oral exam. Students seeking Doctor of Education degrees had the same requirements as Doctor of Philosophy students, in addition to serving an internship. All graduate students were required to maintain an overall B average.

When asked why she chose Clemson's graduate program, Sashi Asirvatham, an international student, said, "It was my kismet. I am having fun!" she added with a smile.

The Graduate Student Association provided a spirit of comradery for the graduate students while addressing problems or issues that concerned its members. The organization provided support and an academic and cultural atmosphere for its members by providing better communication between departments and students.

Keeping up with the future

The latest stir in the Computer Department at Clemson was the new Computer Operations Center. The Operations Center could be found eight miles from campus at the Clemson Research Park, a 210 acre industrial park.

The new center had been in the university's plans for the last few years, but difficulties in building on campus encouraged the university to look into innovative ways to gain space. In October of 1986, ground breaking ceremonies were finally held with completion plans scheduled for December 1987. As luck would have it though, the construction ran ahead of the completion schedule and the Computer Center planned to move into the 40,000-square-foot facility by Thanksgiving.

The building was designed especially to house the university's mainframe computer and informational systems development group, a move which vacated an entire floor of Martin and some vital space in the Poole Agricultural Center. Computer consultants, already on campus, remained. Since the building was designed to house a computer, there were several features such as a raised floor for cooling the computers. Also, the wiring was run under the flooring. The building featured several backup systems in case of power failure. One backup system was battery operated, while another was a diesel system.

With all the special features of the building came extra costs. Half of the cost incurred was in support systems for the computer. These financial concerns, along with building costs, were defrayed by a private developer, the South Carolina Research Authority. Clemson leased the facility from the developer since that method was faster and more cost efficient than building on campus. Students did not notice much difference in their operations with the computer, although each student was assigned a new computer identification code.

It was hoped the research park would attract "new industries to the area with interests in electronics, fiber and poly-

mer materials, advanced engineering fibers and composite materials, crop genetics, biomaterials, farm machinery, forestry products and robotics" according to the Clemson News Services. Industries such as these relied on Clemson research and were to be charged a fee for computer use. This allowed for any additional budget strains to be lightened.

As Dr. Christopher Duckenfield said the Computer Operations Center was a showcase for Clemson University and was a necessary addition to the university's plans to expand and to keep up with modern technology.

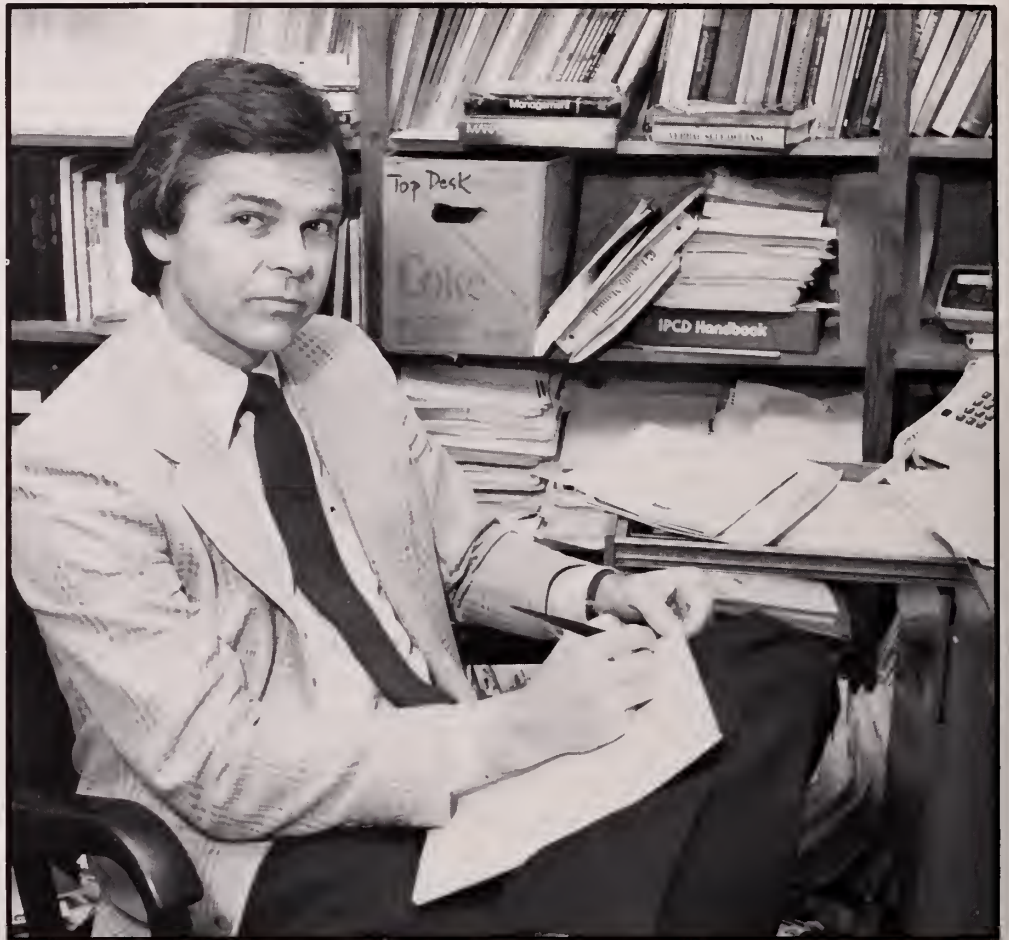
Alumni Master Teacher 1987

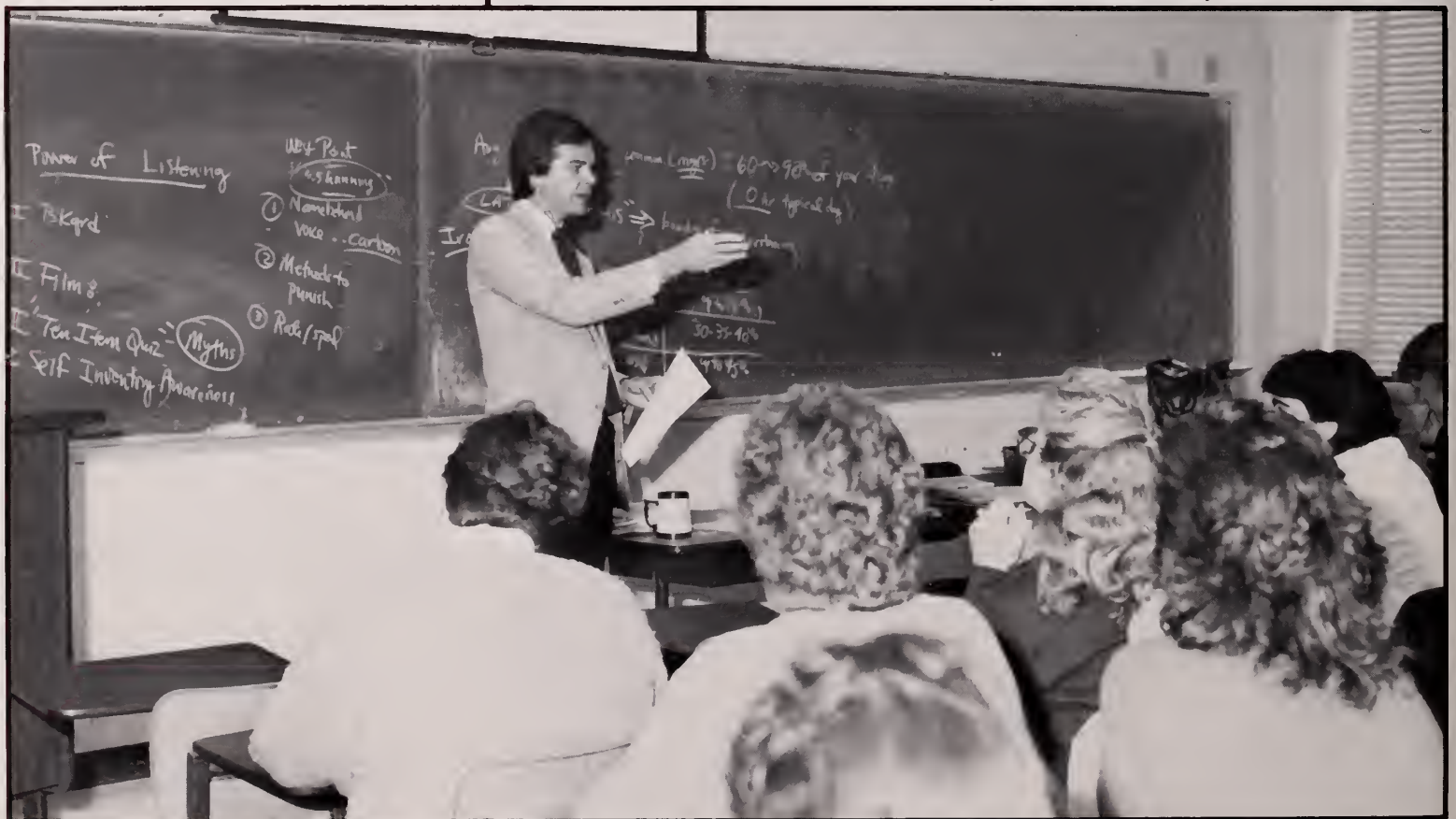

Getting paid for an education

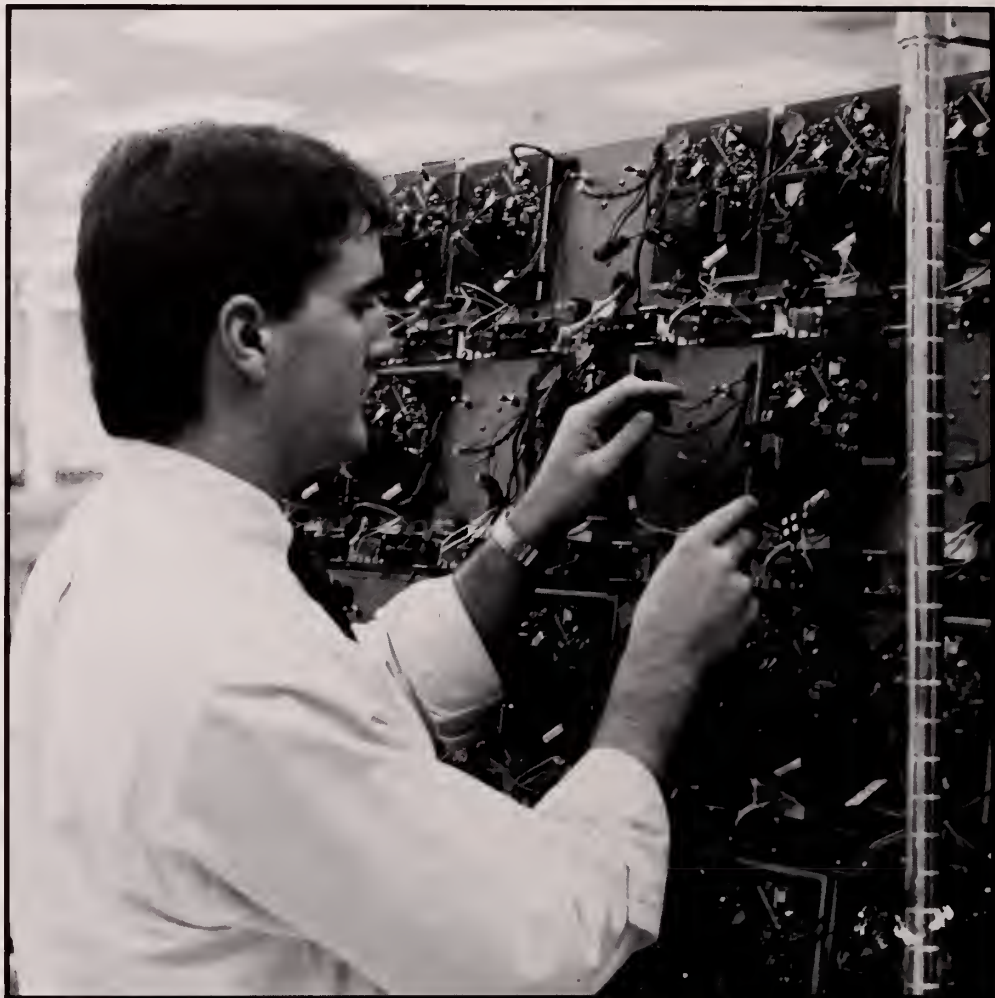
About 500 students each year decided to combine working toward a degree and get a salary doing it. Beginning after their freshman year, students alternated semesters at school with semesters co-oping for businesses, industries, and the government. To complete the co-op requirement, students worked a minimum of three work periods with the same employer.

Students worked with the Cooperative Education staff to initiate their co-op experience. After the application procedure and orientation for the students, the staff worked with students to find the right job opportunity for them. Director of Cooperative Education Marty Williams said, "Students postpone graduation for the opportunity to co-op. We try to get to know each student individually and make co-oping a valuable experience."

For their efforts, students gained valuable work experience that made their curriculum more meaningful, improved prospects for permanent employment, reinforced career choices, and sharpened their career focus. Com-

panies had the advantage of looking at prospective employees for an extended work period. Often, students who co-oped were looked at favorably for permanent employment.

Most students who co-oped were in the Engineering and Computer Science fields. A Federal grant provided by more students to co-op in the areas of Accounting, Forestry, and Textiles. The primary employers for students were Dupont, Milliken, IBM, and Duke Power. Graphic Communication major Karen Lott described her co-op experience, "Co-oping was one of the best educations I could get. I encountered the "Real World" situations that could not be taught in the class room. The contacts that I made will be an asset as I begin my career after graduation. The financial supplement was an incentive. Earning extra money helped when returning to campus."

Wellness challenges students

More people crowded into aerobics classes and joggers lined the sidewalks as increasing numbers of Clemson students and faculty not only joined the fitness craze, but adopted an entire wellness lifestyle.

According to Lynn Lesley, Wellness Coordinator at the Nursing Center, the concept of wellness went beyond simple physical fitness to encompass an entire philosophy of life. The wellness lifestyle incorporated emotional and spiritual well-being, environmental awareness and good nutrition along with physical fitness.

In order to educate people about wellness and encourage them to adopt a wellness lifestyle, the Nursing Center, along with other university departments, sponsored many wellness-related activities. A series of mini-lectures known as "Wellness Wednesday" included discussions on exercise, nutrition, time management and relaxation. Several walking groups were organized to encourage everyone to start an exercise program.

These owners were the proud participants of the first Wellness Challenge. Each of the 759 participants came to the Nursing Center for health screening at the beginning of the program. Everyone participated in an aerobic activity, such as swimming, walking or aerobics for at least thirty minutes three times a week for nine weeks. At the end of nine weeks

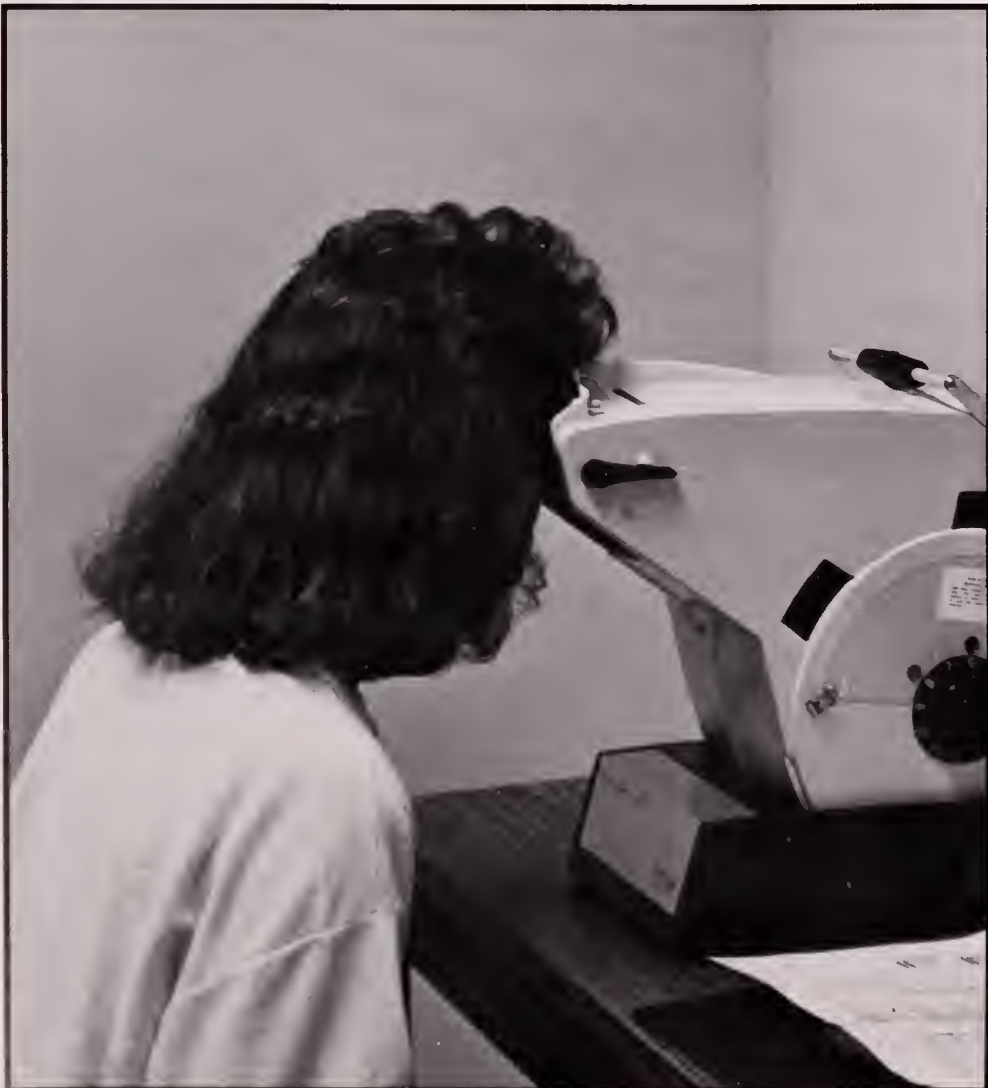

the same measurements were taken again. Most participants were able to observe a decrease in their percent body fat along with an increased feeling of well-being.

Q — Do you like what is happening in nursing that points to the future?

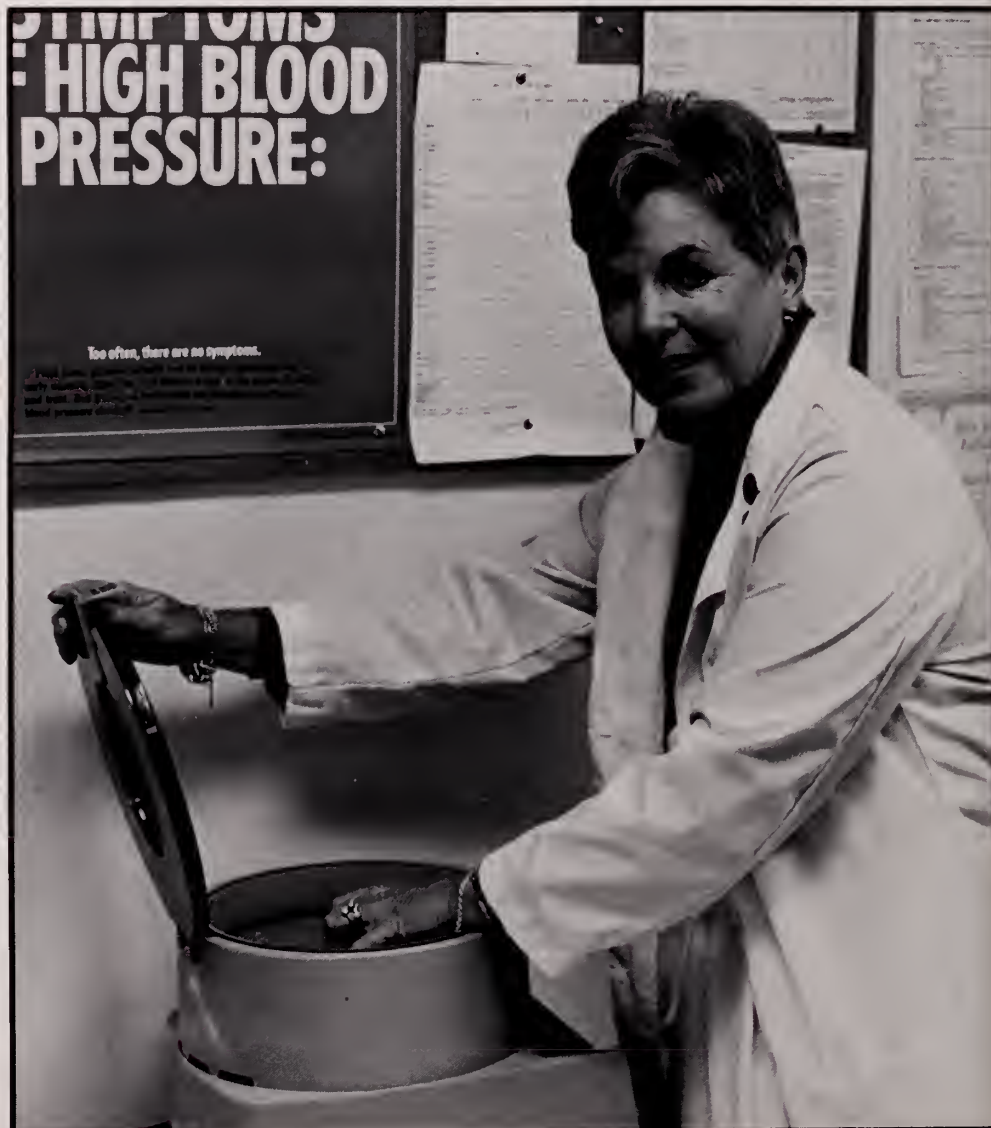

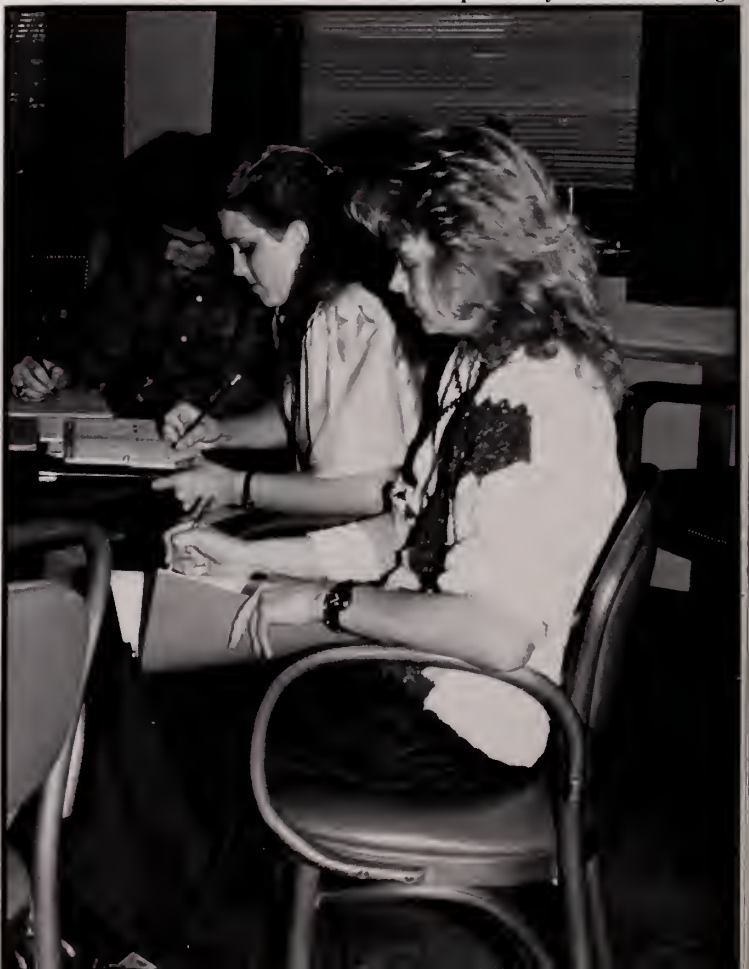

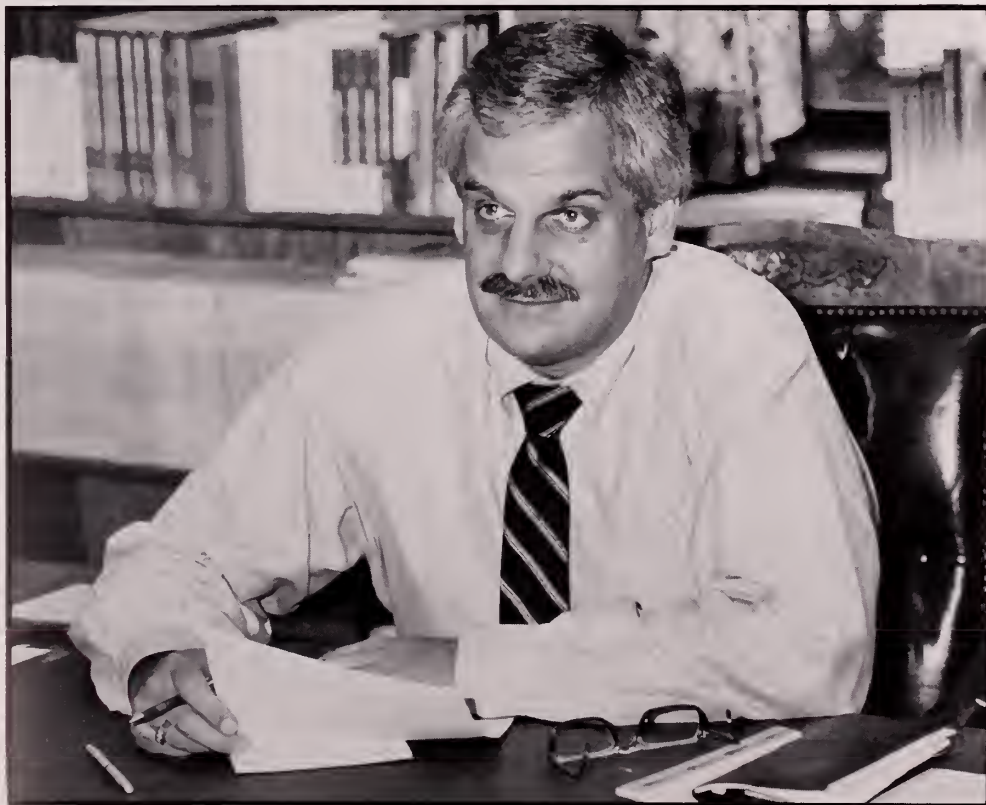

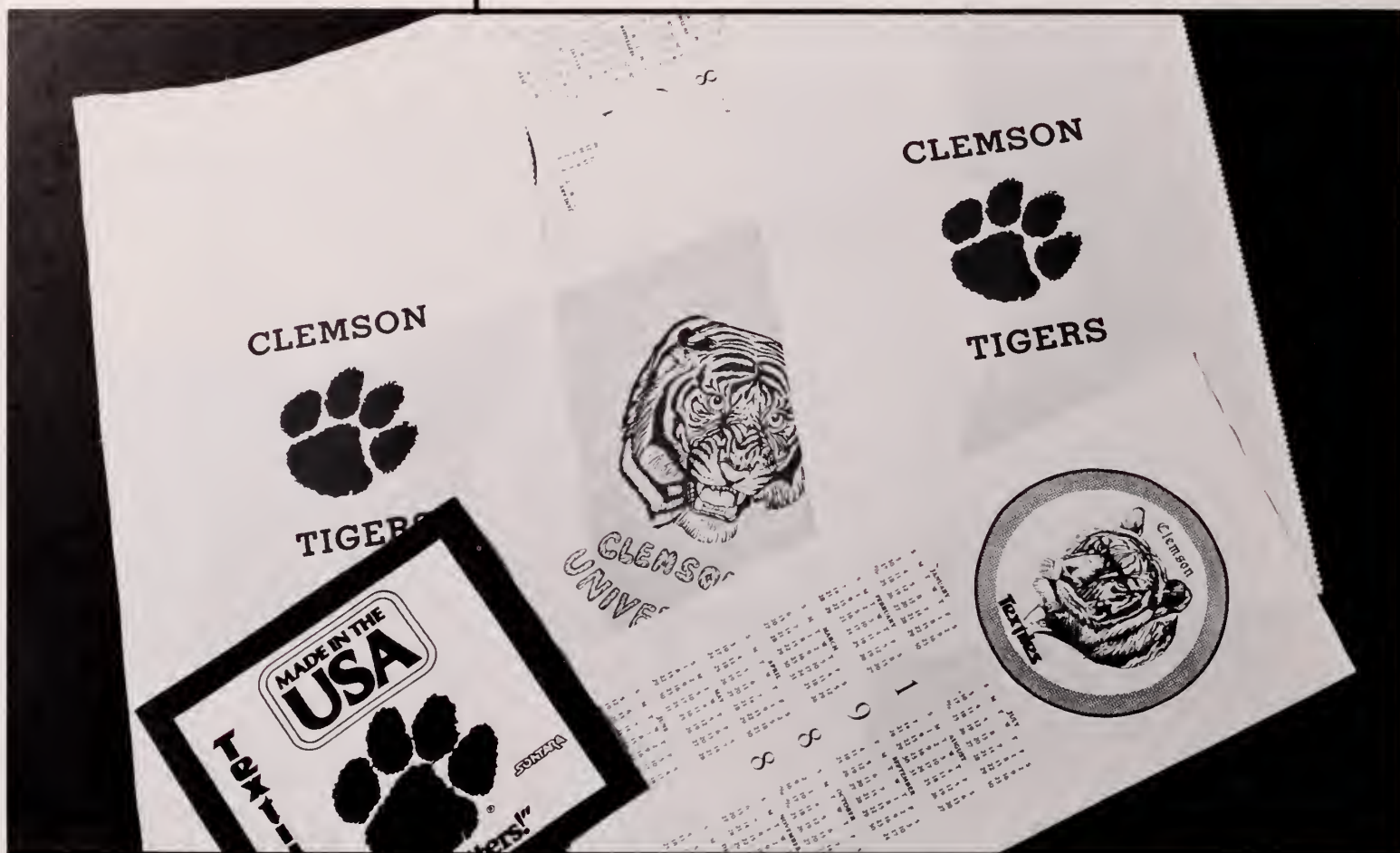

Undergraduate labs

A fact of life

Labs have always been and always will be a part of life at college. Almost every student, whether they are in the college of liberal arts, sciences, or engineering, had to take a lab at some point during their college career. About 10,000 students were enrolled in at least one of the approximately 800 labs offered.

Most students began their lab experience as freshman when they were required to take one year of science with a lab. They could choose between such courses as chemistry, astronomy, physics, or biology. Other freshman labs included language labs and computer labs. Most freshman claimed that the labs at college were a lot different than their labs at high school. Freshman lab students Susie Cooper and Stacy Todd

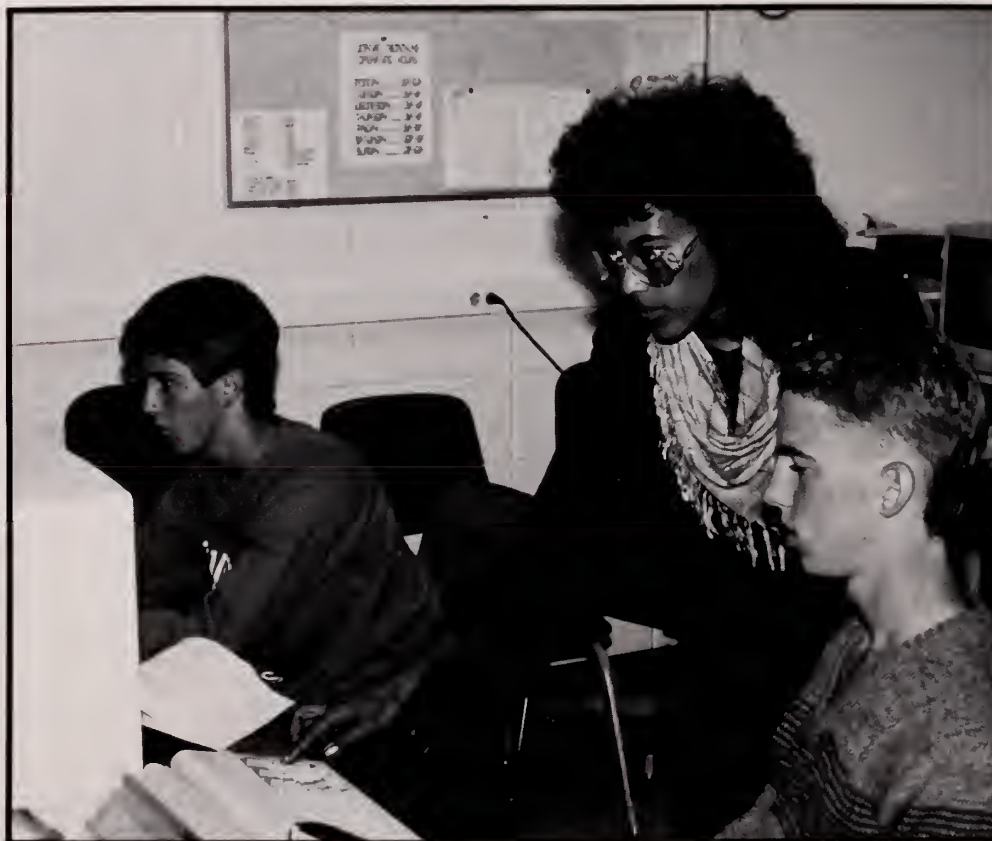

said "Labs at college were a lot more involved but also a lot more interesting than they were in high school."

According to schedule coordinator David Fleming, due to the increased size of the incoming freshman class, this was the first time that all the laboratory seats in basic science were filled.

As a student continued his/her education the labs became more difficult and more time consuming. Most science majors found that they averaged three labs each semester until they graduated. Nursing students had clinicals which required them to spend time working at local hospitals. They were required to complete three clinical assignments a semester during their junior and senior years.

Architecture and engineering students also found themselves spending a lot of time in the laboratory. Architecture labs consisted of students working on design projects, such as texture, light, and acoustics. Engineering labs included unit operations labs where not only safety glasses but hard hats were required, circuit labs and various design labs.

One of the most common complaints about labs was that much more time was put into the lab than the awarded amount of credit reflected. Students received between one and three hours of credit for their efforts with some basic science labs receiving no credit as they were considered part of an accompanying lecture.

New to Clemson was the ten dollar fee for all classes designated as labs. Members of such organizations as Tiger Band and Chorus were also required to pay lab fees. Money collected from these fees would be used to purchase new equipment and supplies which would improve the quality of the labs for students.

The Universe Beyond

The door to the room did not look any different. It was just a regular classroom-type door with a black plate labeling it. Kinard room 112 was different though. It held a special magic, for it was from there you could see the universe. Clemson's planetarium brought the unknown "out there" close to the students. Almost close enough to touch.

Built in 1961, the planetarium's dome was twenty-four feet in diameter with a height of nineteen feet at the center. Probably, the most important feature of the room was not the magnificently white dome, but rather the projector that sat at eye level in the room's center. The projector consisted of a large ball, at one end, with holes and lenses to allow light from an arc lamp to produce the array of stars that dotted the ceiling.

The room could hold forty-five adults. The size limited the planetarium's regular use by astronomy classes since the classes usually had around sixty students. The astronomy classes and labs did meet at least once a semester in the planetarium, but astronomy professors have to juggle the large class-

es to allow students more lecture time in the room.

"There is little noticeable change in the shapes of the constellations in the past one thousand years," said Professor Thomas Collins as the lights dimmed, giving the eyes time to adjust. There are two major changes in the night sky from time to time. The position of the planets and the position of the moon depend on the time of day, and the time of year.

Professor Collins said there was some slight distortion in viewing the stars in the planetarium due to the curved nature and small size of the dome. Three to four thousand stars are visible in the night sky and about half of those could be projected for viewing. The stars formed a sky with familiar constellations such as the Big and Little Dippers along with less familiar ones such as Pegasus, Andromeda, the dolphin, and the swan constellations. The Milky Way could also be seen with its couple hundred billion stars. The Milky Way's neighboring galaxy, composed of perhaps five hundred billion stars, appeared as a small fuzzy blot on the oth-

erwise black, velvety sky.

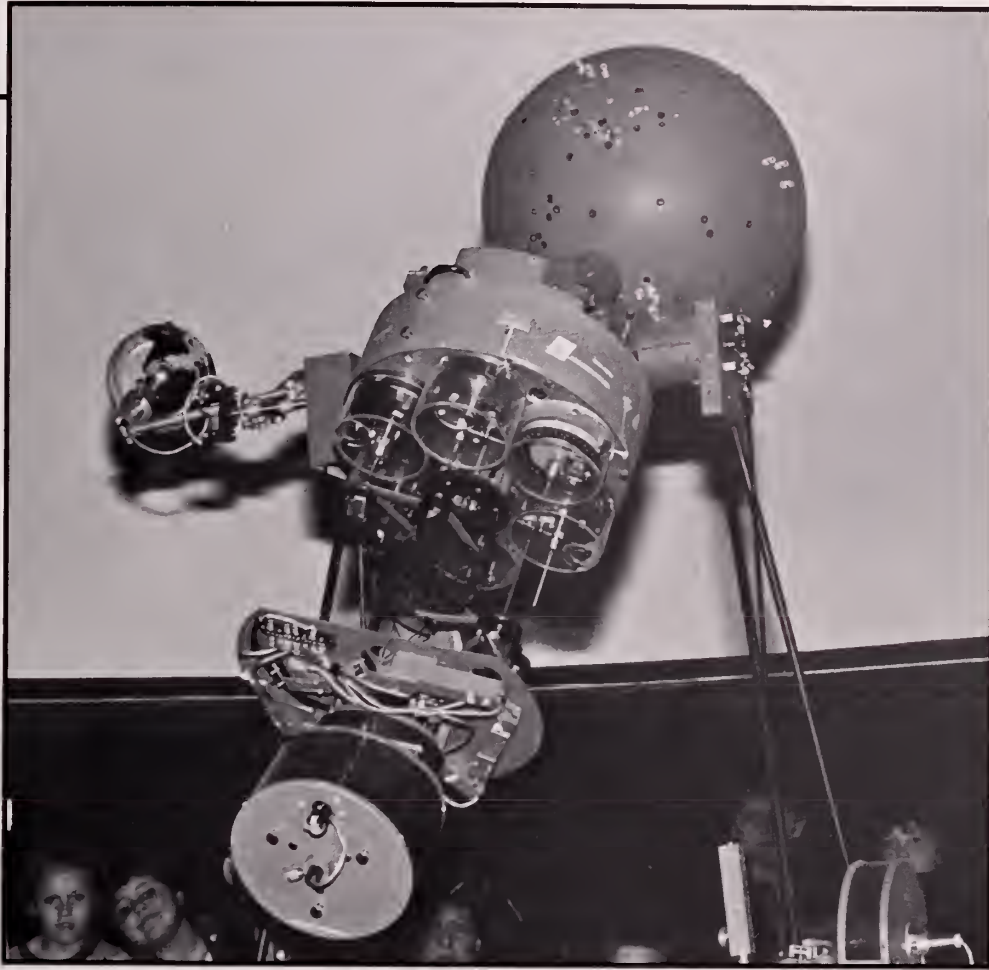
Professor Collins projected the ecliptic line, a line with the months of the year marked off, along the top of the dome. Any date during the year, the night sky could be observed by finding the month on the line and rotating the projector to that point on the line. Plates with red lights marked North, South, East and West along the walls of the planetarium. Every twelve hours, due to the earth's rotation, the stars appear to move one-hundred and eighty degrees from their starting positions.

The planetarium was not exclusively for the use of astronomy students. Presentations were made for any "reasonably size groups" which were most often elementary or high school students or occasionally senior citizen groups. Commentary for the presentation was geared toward the age level of the

group. A slide program was presented before each demonstration. The slide show was often about the solar system.

Demonstrations were not regularly scheduled for the public, which often accounted for lack of knowledge about the planetarium. Professor Collins and Dr. Phil Flower did hold regular open house when Halley's Comet passed through our part of the solar system. The main push against open houses was time according to Professor Collins. In earlier long range plans, the Department of Physics and Astronomy requested a new planetarium that would be thirty feet in diameter, but with the school budget, the new building was not forthcoming.

The Learning of Art

Approved in the spring of 1987 by the Commission on Higher Education, a new degree was added to the College of Architecture. The charter students enrolled under the specialized Bachelor of Fine Arts Program which emphasized visual arts. The program began during the first summer session of 1987.

The curriculum for the new degree called for students to take fifty percent of their classes in studio arts or related areas, and the remaining half of their studies to be a well-balanced combination of general, non-art classes. With the studio arts portion of the curriculum, students learned about eight areas of visual arts including painting, drawing, graphic design, ceramics, print-making, photography, and sculpture. Courses were not limited to "strict" art. The varied curriculum would "permit the student to develop his or her individual talents," said Dr. John T. Acorn, professor in the college of Architecture.

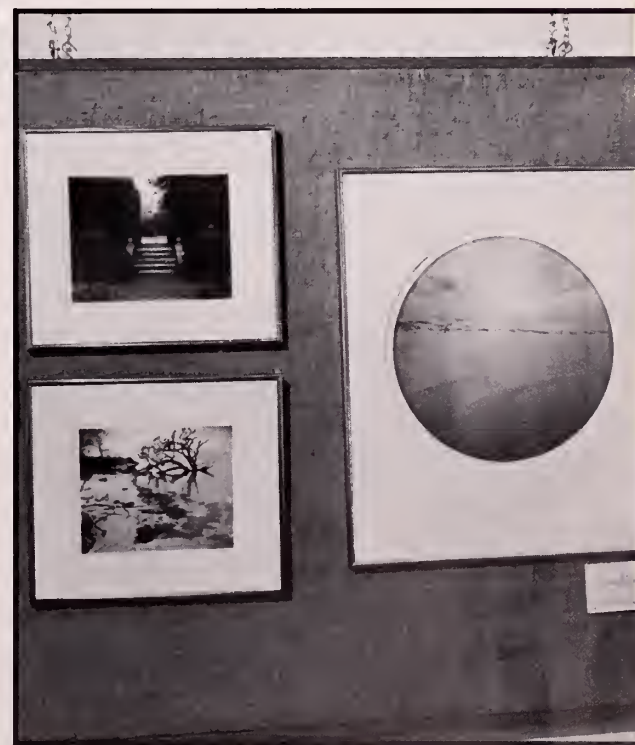

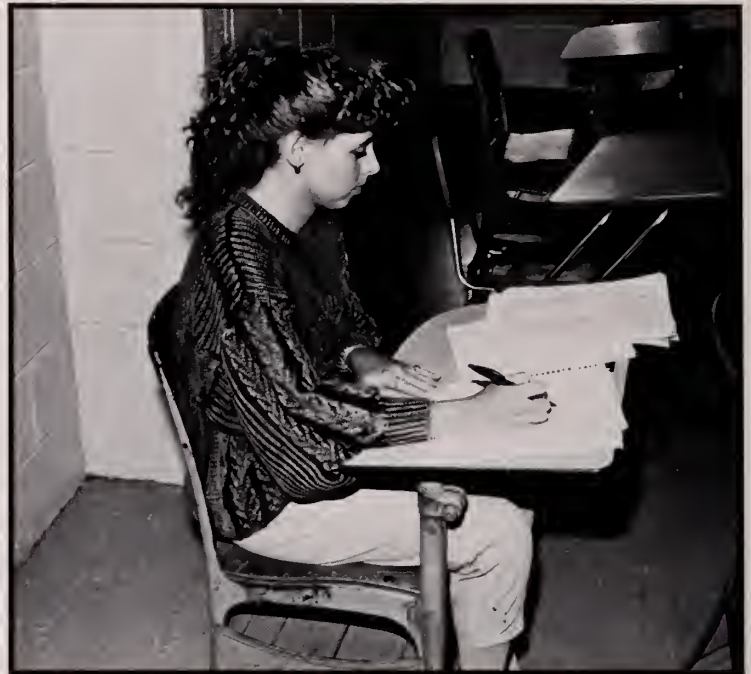


A Different Kind of Classroom

Shifting roles from being the student to being the teacher was an adjustment for students as they entered the student teaching phase of work toward certification as a teacher. Sixty full, consecutive days of supervised teaching were required of students seeking a degree in education or certification in teaching.

Twelve full weeks were scheduled for student teaching to meet requirements of state law. For three weeks before beginning student teaching, students took a course in diagnostic reading. Students must have completed 95 hours including prerequisite classes. A minimum grade point ratio was also required to begin the program.

In the fall 57 students completed their student teaching and 125 students taught in the spring of 1987. Most student teachers were placed in Anderson, Pickens, and Oconee county schools. A few students did their teaching in

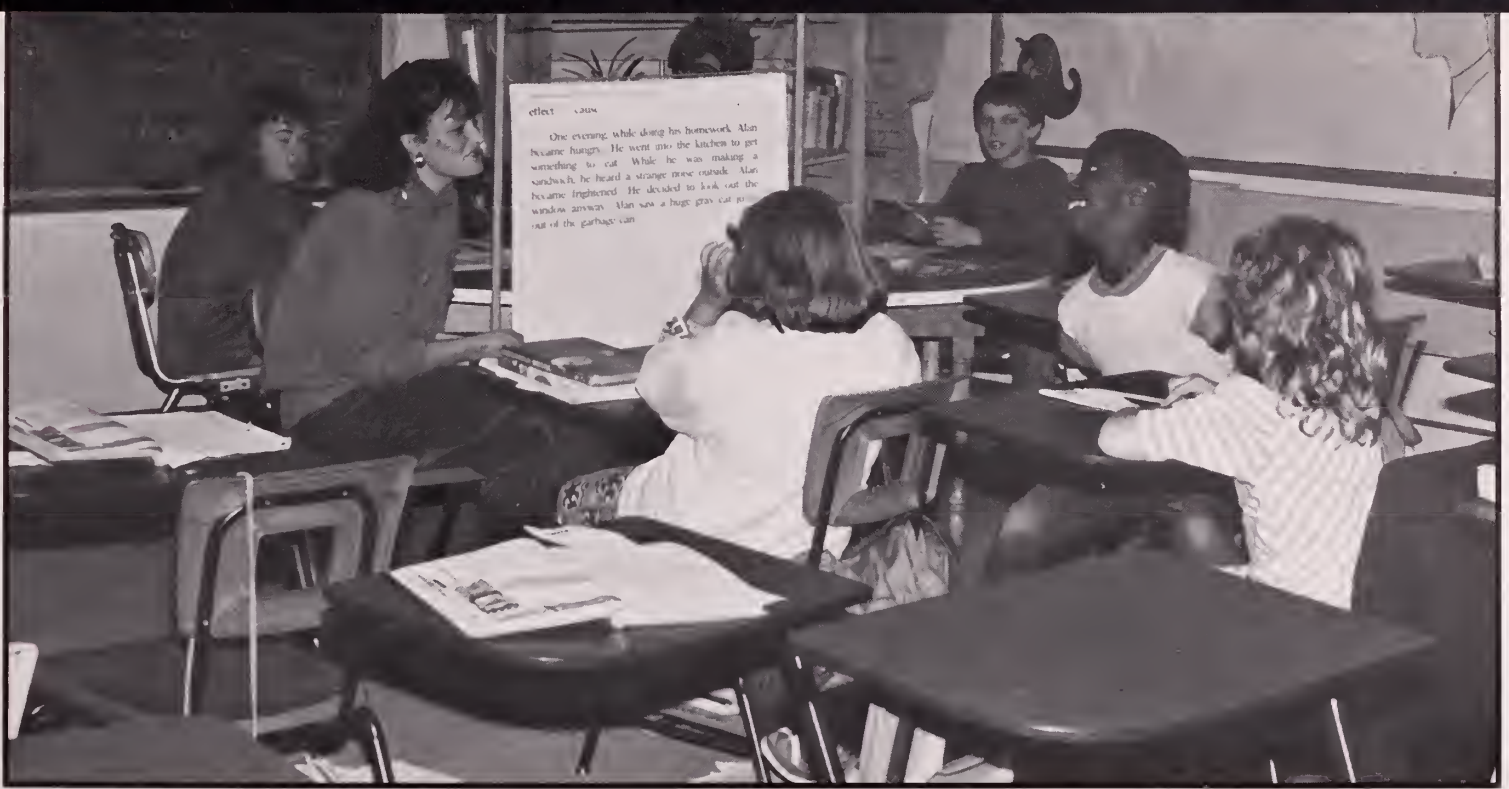

Greenville county. Student teachers switched roles and began preparing lessons to teach students, managing students in the classroom, and evaluating students. According to Dr. Carolyn Briscoe, who supervises student teachers, "student teaching provides practice, practical experience, direct contact with students, responsibility of managing a classroom of students, and actual teaching experience."

State law mandated much of what students did during their student teaching experience. Students must have taken two professional knowledge tests before beginning student teaching. The Educational Improvement Act established the Assessment of Performance Teaching (APT) as a uniform means of evaluation for the test.

Students teaching was a step toward becoming a regular classroom teacher. Performance in student teaching was as important as transcripts and grades in the classroom to schools hiring teachers. Student teaching became an important transitional period from being a student to being a teacher.

Hold the Presses

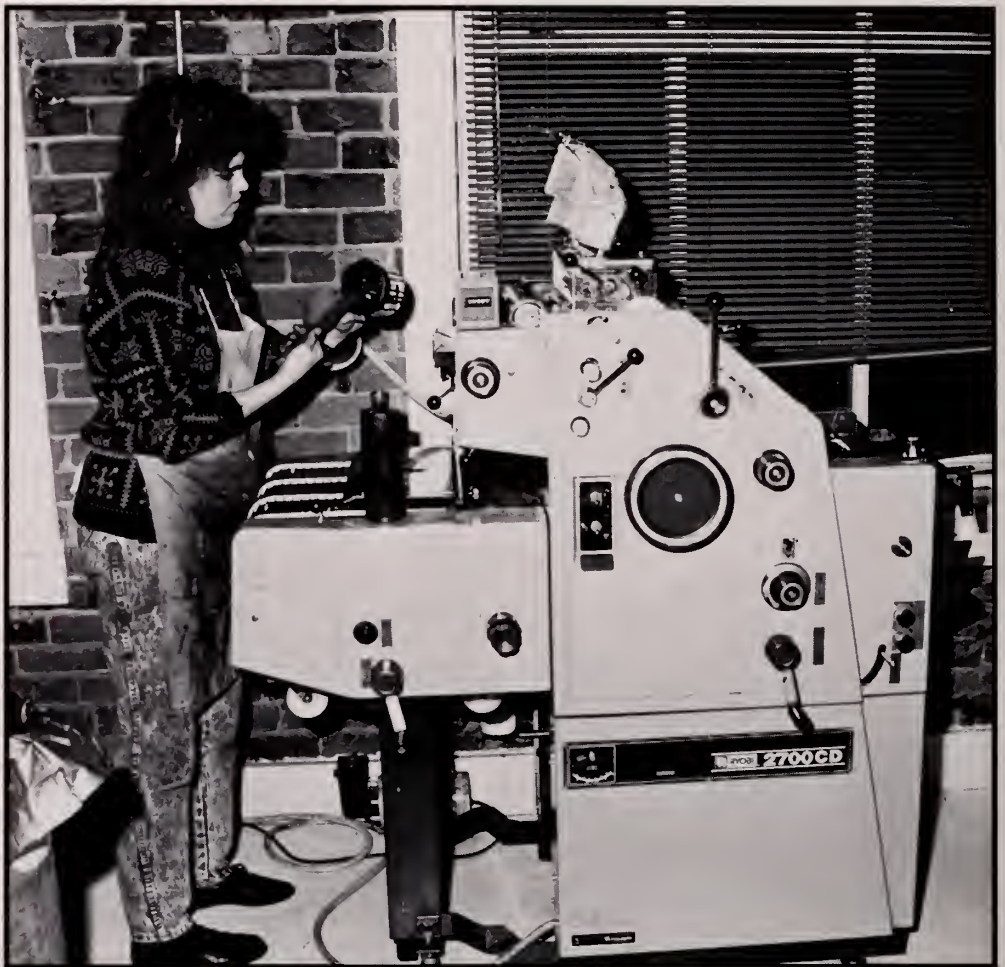
"Free at Last" was a term used when the NCAA probation ended for Clemson and the term was used again among the graphic communications students and faculty when they began to occupy new space in Godfrey Hall at the front door of the Clemson Campus. For years the graphic communications program had grown within very tight confines in Freeman Hall until the seams burst. In August, after several years of planning, delays, and redesigns, the Godfrey Hall facility was occupied for the first time by the graphic communications laboratories.

The entire main floor was divided into three areas to teach the fundamentals all the way to the latest technologies in the preparation and mass production of print media.

It was indeed high-tech in a traditional environment and was a fun place to teach and learn. The building, a landmark on the Clemson campus, originally constructed in 1898 and renovated numerous times in its history, was

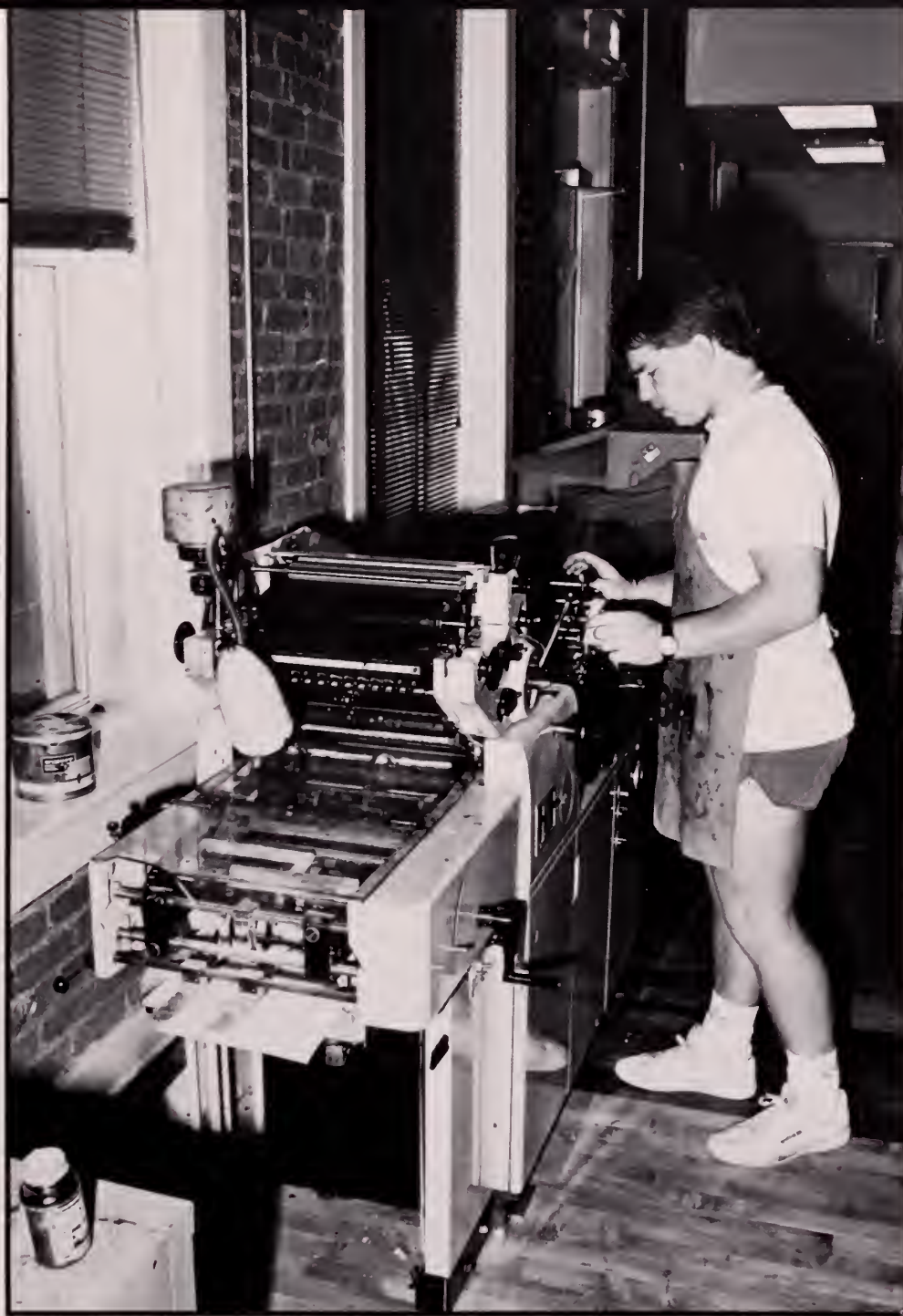
A graphic communications student cleans the press after printing her offset lithography project.

partially restored to the extent that original hand brick has been exposed through the graphics laboratories along with the original floor. The large floor to ceiling windows loomed around the north end of the building, which was where the presses were located. It provided a very open base, which made it easy to work and learn. This facility which was sometimes referred to as a "graphic learning factory," was an education/industry partnership effort with many hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of equipment provided by the industry as an investment in future professionals to help lead its way. Nowhere else in the United States, if not the world, housed one press room with operating equipment in all of the major printing methods — gravure, screen printing, offset lithography, and flexography. There were both sheet and web

(roll-fed) presses and single and multi-color equipment. The students in this program were learning to go into what were called the "people people professions" in the printing industry, but the method used by Clemson was unique in that every student designed and manufactured products from beginning to end with his or her own hands. This method of preparing people not only developed their ability to think and solve problems and communicate with others, but possibly most important was the development of a real empathy and appreciation for the complexities within each of these processes. The Clemson student worked among technical specialists who were very good at what they did and made the most complex sometimes appear quite simple. It was the "appreciation" of this element that made the difference for many

Clemson graduates.

In addition to printing equipment, all of the preparatory equipment and facilities were available too. Godfrey Hall had two color separation electronic scanners which were very sophisticated devices that analyze, use a number of computers to process the information from color originals, and output via lasers to photographic film the images ready for color proofing and printing. In addition to the photographic processing equipment available in the past, there were three additional process cameras, including one which was interfaced to a computer for analysis of the originals and automatic input to the camera controls.

The list of equipment could go on and on, but its purpose was met as it served nearly 200 graphic communications majors as well as the substantial Master's degree program in Industrial Education.

Industry used this learning factory, too, with a full time person devoted to running courses for industry both on and off campus. Since learning of the facilities, there have been numerous requests from industry for Clemson to conduct experimental work, primarily in the area of product testing. This proved to be another promising source of support in the future for both undergraduate and graduate students. All of these activities have been good for the Clemson graphic communications graduate as well as students in the course of their preparation since the internships and demand for graduates have grown along with the facilities.

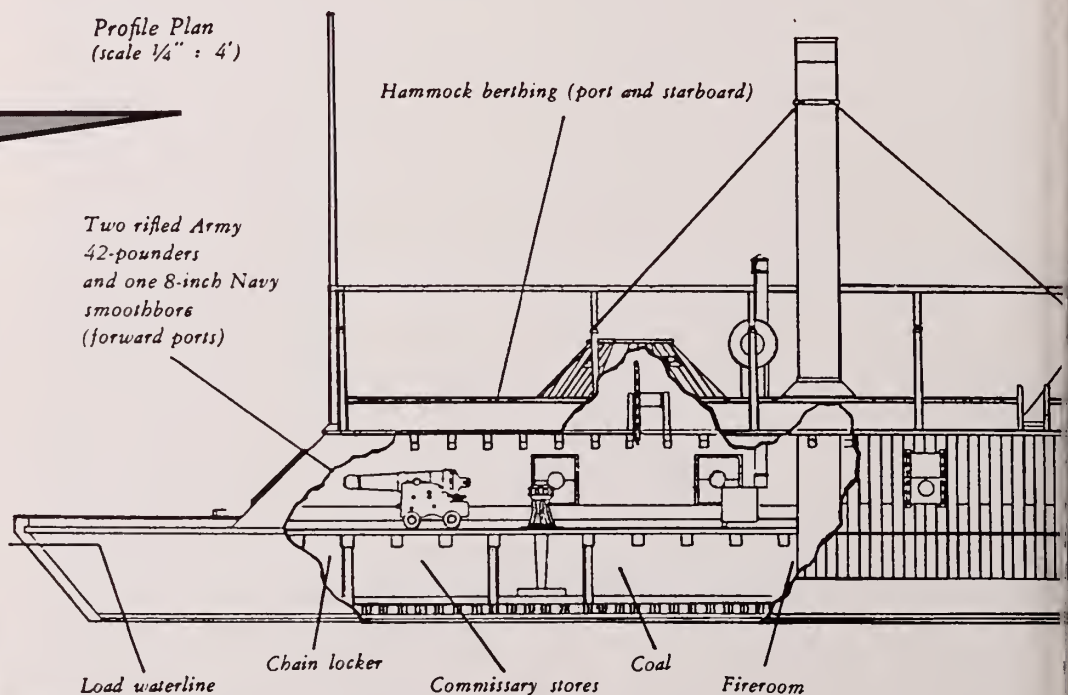
Back in the Spotlight

U.S.S. CAIRO

The U.S.S. Cairo was constructed in 1861 at Maud City, Illinois. From January 1862 to December 1862, the vessel served the Union forces in the Civil War. A Confederate torpedo (mine) in the Yazoo River sunk the gunboat. The boat remained on the bottom of the river near Vicksburg, Mississippi until it was discovered in 1956.

By 1960, the first items were raised, including a gunport, the pilot house and navel cannon. The vessel itself was not raised until 1964. As objects were brought up, necessary preservation for wood was done. The gunboat itself, however, was not preserved. The bulk of the remains of the boat were left in a shipyard in 17 large wooden sections.

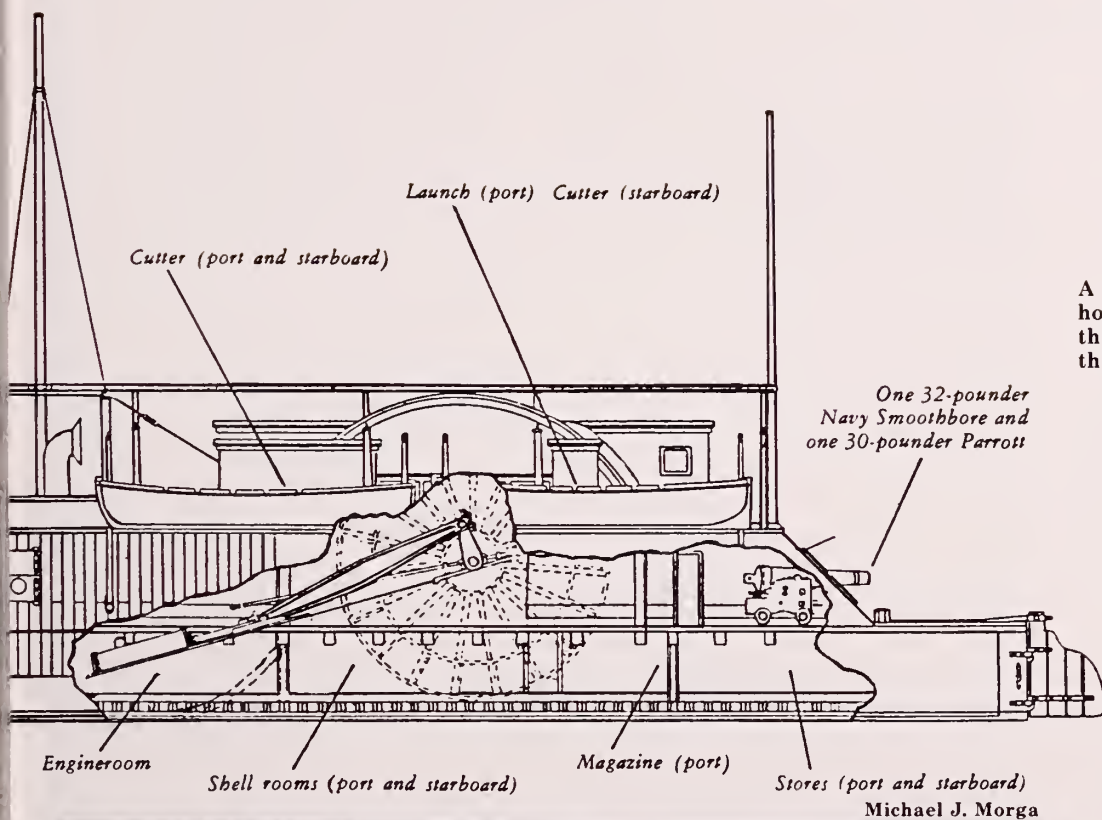
Until 1977 the wooden fabric of the gunboat was left untreated. In 1977 the vessel was moved to the National Military Park in Vicksburg.

Due to being submerged, the boat's material was very waterlogged. The wood began to deteriorate rapidly when the wood was exposed to air. The potential loss of up to 70 percent of the volume of wood prompted a joint project by the National Parks Service and the Department of the Interior to study and make recommendations for preservation of the U.S.S. Cairo. An inspection revealed that most wooden surfaces had deteriorated significantly.

Two groups from the University were called on to assist in the project. Saving the remains of the boat required the expertise of the architecture and forestry departments. Dr. Witherspoon of the College of Architecture and Dr. David Hon, a professor in the College of Forest and Recreation Resources headed teams from the University who worked on the boat. Studying the design of the boat and the structure of the wood fabric were part of the preservation process.

Critical and permanent damage was done to the gunboat, however many in-

valuable artifacts were recovered from the vessel. These included a photograph of an unidentified women and child, probably the wife and daughter of a crew member. Other objects recovered were, a thirty pounder Parrot rifle, comb, watch, pocket knife, and several utensils marked with the owners' initials. The deterioration continued to proceed due to weathering and environmental factors. Efforts were made to preserve the "ironclad's" condition. Lost in battle after one year of service, the U.S.S. Cario was saved to serve for many years as a teacher of history.

Constructive destruction

Fire was one of man's earliest blessings and worst enemies. When fire and forest occurred in the same sentence, it usually meant disaster and mass destruction for acres of forests and thousands of animals. As Dr. David Van Lear of Clemson's College of Forestry pointed out, controlled forest fires not only were used by early Indians and settlers, but also served many purposes for man and offered more benefits for nature.

Prescribed burning was the term given for controlled forest fires. It served the Southern landowner in an economical sense by clearing underbrush and undergrowth of a forest cheaper than by mechanical means or herbicides. This clearing was desired to help keep down the growth of hardwood trees since pine was a more economical crop. The burnings were done in a range of every four years to ten years. Keeping down the hardwoods but not eliminating them from the burned area was accomplished by a type of prescribed burning called low intensity burning. In a low intensity fire, the flames averaged

less than four feet high. Prescribed burning also served man by improving an area used for grazing. After the fire, new plant shoots grew which served as a valuable nutrient food for cattle and other domestic animals.

The natural benefits of prescribed burning were also great. Since low intensity burnings usually are done at a slow rate, most wildlife had time to escape the approaching flames. The wildlife benefited in much the same way as domesticated animals. New hardwood sprouts provided a more nutritious food source for some species. Burning was not carried out during the nesting seasons to help reduce wildlife mortality. Another benefit to wildlife was that the burned areas became sites for seedlings and natural seeding especially for mixed pine and hardwood forests.

The environmental effects of prescribed burning were not as detrimental as the effects of chemical or mechanical methods. Dr. Van Lear said there was "no increase of sediment or nutrients in the water quality." Two to three million acres of Southern forests are pre-

scribed burned each year. This burning led to less destruction in the event of wildfires since it eliminated the fuel buildup on the forest floors. Prescribed burning did not lead to soil erosion since the root systems of plants were left intact and a floor of ash helped hold top-soil. The ash also provided a type of natural fertilizer for the new growth occurring.

"Air pollution from large scale prescribed burning," according to Dr. Van Lear, was the biggest problem with the procedure. This problem can be overcome if foresters work more closely with the Weather Service and burn only under proper atmospheric conditions to facilitate the dispersal of the smoke.

Forestry students, in an outdoor lab, learned how to properly ignite and control the prescribed burning on a low

intensity scale for undergrowth control. High intensity fires were used to clear an area after harvesting of the trees. Students were taken to the Sumter National Forest to view the effects of high intensity burning.

Dr. Van Lear commented that prescribed burning was "essentially the same thing" that the American Indians did to help clear hardwood growth and making living off the land easier. The cleared forests helped draw game in close to the villages. White settlers of the 1700's described magnificent forests clear of undergrowth. This was probably due to prescribed burning by Indians. The settlers continued the practice that made surrounding forests more pleasant and safe for hunting and working. The vegetation of these forests adapted to the frequent burnings. The pine trees developed thick bark and high crowns, both resistant to low intensity fires. The Indians burned mainly in the winter months and after rains to help control the fires.

With the exception of machinery, prescribed burning has changed little over the past few decades. Dr. Van Lear, in "Prescribed Fire — Its History, Uses, and Effects in Southern Forest Ecosystems," wrote, "Abuse of the practice is the best way to lose it, and forestry can little afford the loss of such a valuable tool."

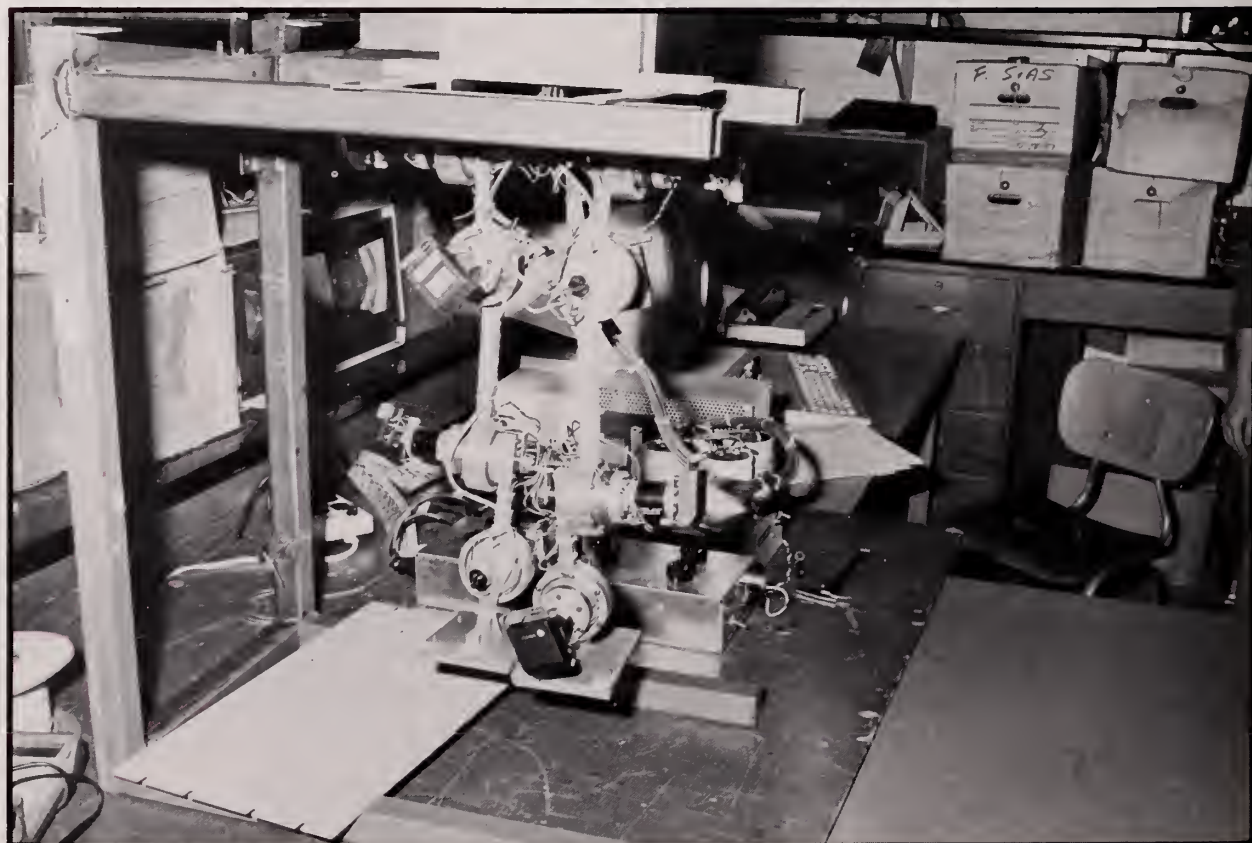
CURBi moves forward

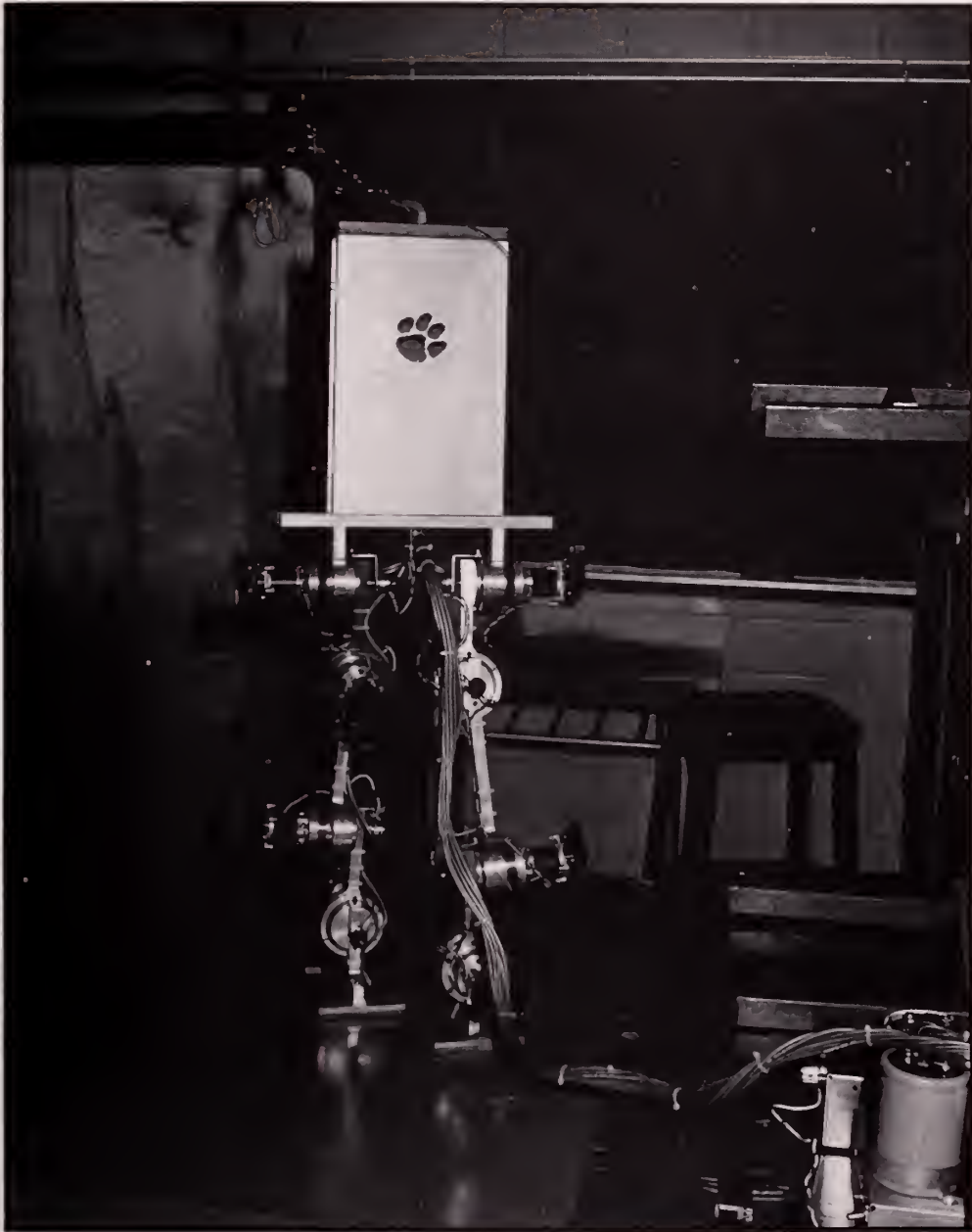
Yuan Zheng, associate professor of electrical and computer engineering, helped Clemson University get a head start in the field of robotics with the development of CURBi. CURBi stood for Clemson University Robot Biped. CURBi was special because it was the first robot to walk on two legs.

The purpose for developing CURBi was two-fold. First, to develop a robot that could travel in confined areas with uneven terrain. Robots that have wheels or multiple legs needed large areas with even floors to operate. However, many places, like a nuclear power station, did not fit these conditions.

This is why it was important to develop a bipedal robot that could travel anywhere. Savannah River Laboratory was helping to fund the project because further development of CURBi could produce a robot well suited to work in high risk areas of a nuclear power plant.

The second reason CURBi was developed was to aid in the study of human locomotion. This could help in the development of walking devices to replace wheelchairs. Another benefit would be the development of mechanical braces to help people regain mobility lost to injury or illness.

CURBi was the first step in the development of bipedal robotics. Zheng's work with bipedal robotics earned him the Presidential Young Investigator Award for 1987 which was given by the National Science Foundation. Graduate students also worked on the project which gave them good hands-on practice and experience. CURBi's development has caught the attention of many people. It was reported on by many publications including *USA Today*, *Popular Mechanics* and *Robotics World*.

With flat surfaces already conquered by CURBi Zheng hoped that as early as the summer of 1988 that CURBi would be moving up slopes and climbing stairs. CURBi's continued development will mean a bright future for Yuan Zheng and Clemson's electrical and computer engineering department.

The only clean room on campus

In the basement of Riggs Hall, a class 100 clean room was constructed. Class 100 meant that every cubic foot of space in the room contained less than one hundred particles greater in size than 0.5 microns. An average office room was considered class 100,000 with many large particles floating around in the air. An air handling unit was used to filter outside air as it entered the room. The air inside the room was recycled and only a small amount of air from the outside was admitted at a time. The temperature in the room was not allowed to vary more than two degrees and the humidity was kept constant at forty percent. The room used the same type of filter system as a hospital operating room but it was necessary to keep the room cleaner than an operating room because of the sensitivity of fabricating integrated circuits for which the room was used. The room was also used to fabricate special test structures for the Center for Semiconductor Device Reliability Research.

The room's use mainly consisted of the fabrication of semi-custom integrated circuits because that type of circuit could be fabricated much quicker than normal integrated circuits. This was important because undergraduate students needed to learn how to make the circuits they had designed. Normal integrated circuits took seven months to make, while the semi-custom integrated could be fabricated in the limited time of a semester.

Work began on the clean room in May 1987 and was finished in February 1988. The construction of this room required special construction techniques and materials. The clean room was needed because the features of an integrated circuit were so small that dust could make the connection of transistors, with a metal line only five microns in size, impossible.

Construction of the room to produce semi-custom integrated circuits is almost completed.

The clean room is located on campus in the basement of Riggs Hall.



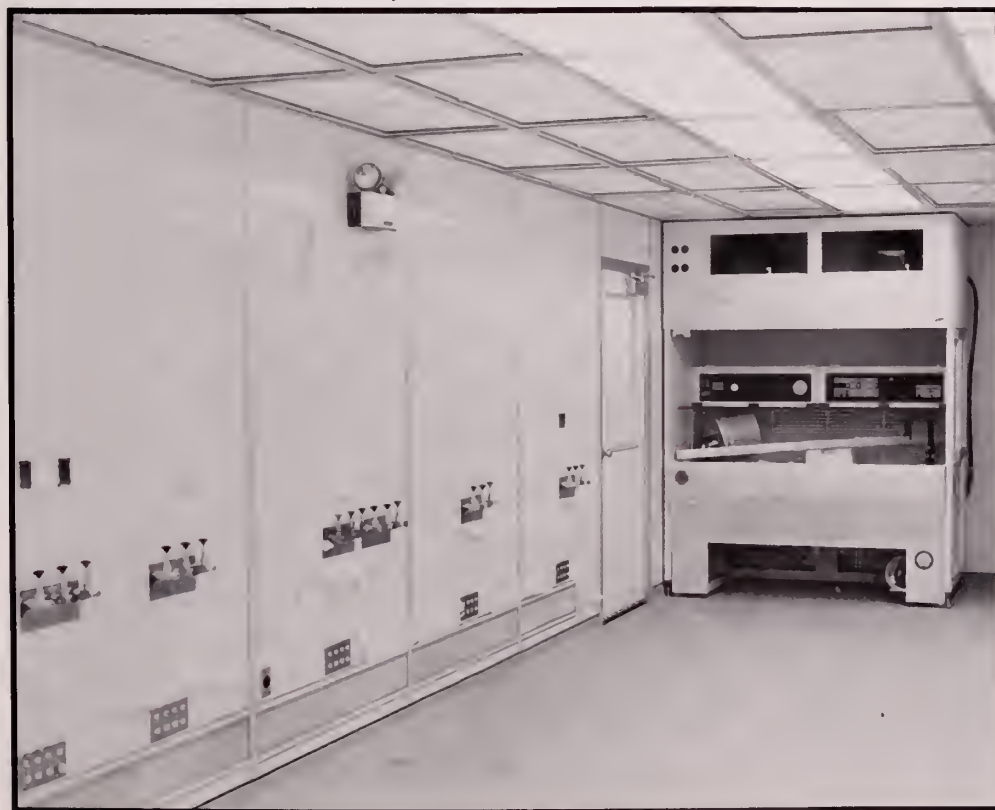

One reason the psychology department got the space was that, because of

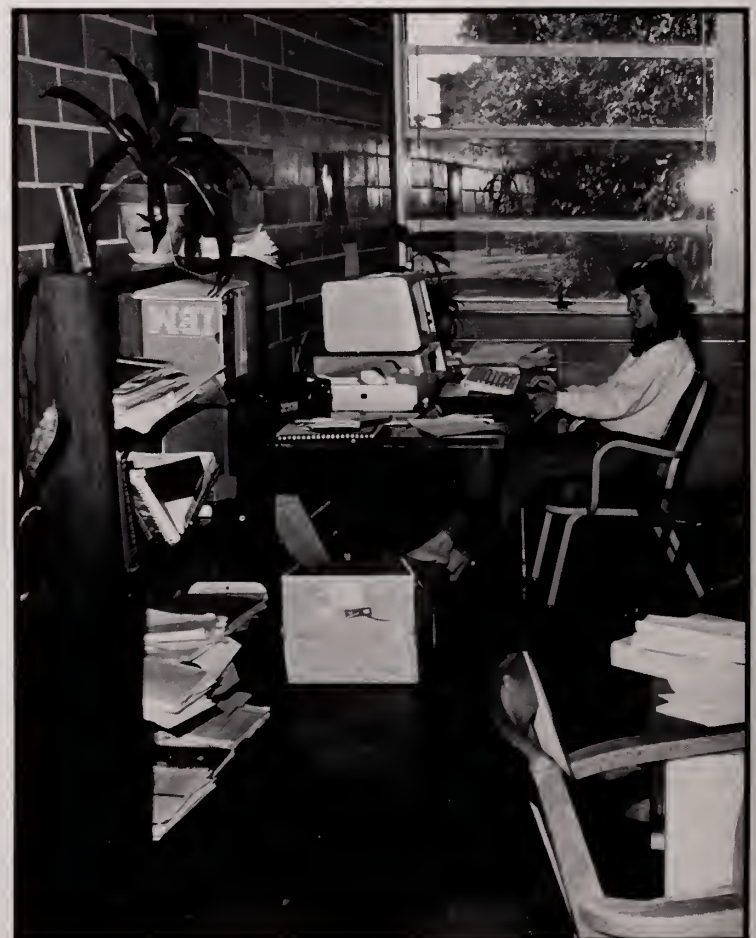

the growth of the department, they were desperate for space. In 1982, the department had 129 majors and, by 1987, the number had grown to 300. The classrooms that the psychology department occupied in the basement of Hardin Hall were small and poorly lighted. The faculty had no room to conduct research and all psychology labs were forced to use the same room. The fact that space was so limited had slowed the fast growth of the department.

The department was extremely pleased with its new location in Brackett Hall. Even though the building was designed to house the Chemistry Department, the psychology department found that it suited their needs very well. They occupied three floors of the west wing, had labs on the second floor of the north wing and offices in the south wing. The Psychology Department had 17 faculty members, so much

space was needed for offices. In Hardin Hall the offices were so small the professors almost literally had to back out of them. The new offices in Brackett Hall were much larger and more comfortable. The department felt that the new space in Brackett Hall should satisfy their need for space for the next five to ten years depending on the growth of the department. The faculty gained enough space to set up long term research projects. The biggest benefit of the expanded space was to the labs.

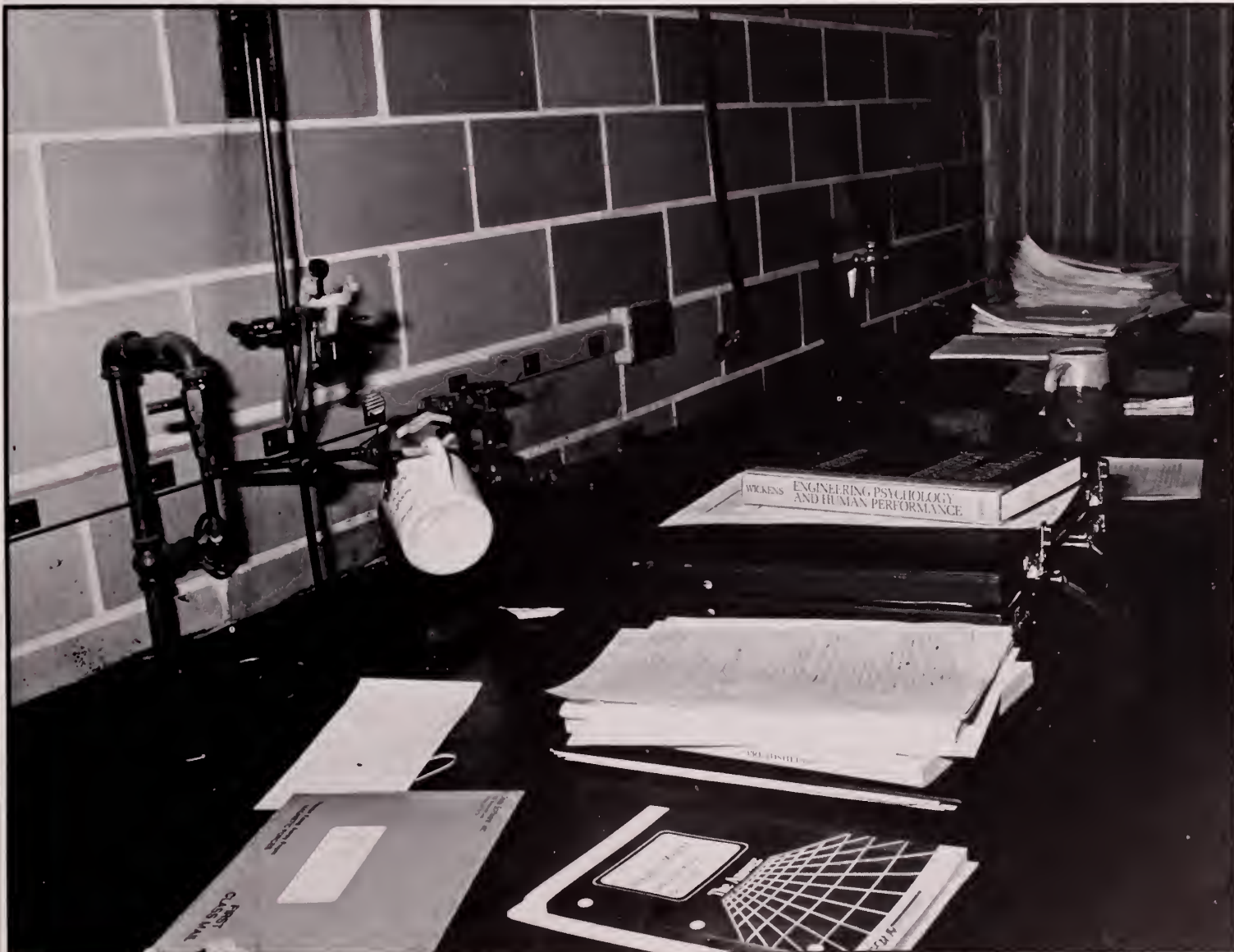
Some of the old chemistry lab rooms were vacant and were not available for use until the building could be completely renovated. Renovation of the building was expected to be complicated by the presence of asbestos which would have to be removed. Because of this, only limited changes could be made to the building when the Psychology Department moved in. The building held great potential for the future.

When renovated, there was expected to be 64,000 square feet of usable space in the building.

The Psychology Department moved into Brackett Hall between the spring and fall semesters of 1987. Because they were able to move between semesters the move was not very disruptive to students or the faculty. Dr. Eugene Galluscio, head of the Psychology Department, said they were "absolutely delighted with the support received from the physical plant" during the moving process. The Psychology Department was pleased to be able to call Brackett Hall home.

Animal research with a twist

It sounded like a science fiction movie set or some farm of the future. The star of this feature was not a figment of someone's imagination though or from the distant future. Clemson's "cow with a window" drew a lot of attention from interested students, researchers, and most of all, farmers anxious to increase the efficiency of digestion by their cattle and other ruminants. Dr. Thomas C. Jenkins was one of Clemson's researchers of ruminant digestion.

Dr. Jenkins' research involved one of several cows and three sheep with the special "windows." The openings took only one hour to implant into the animal's side and opened into the rumen or small intestine. One sheep had two openings, one to each area. The rumen is a specialized area, one of four compartments of all ruminant stomachs. In the rumen could be found many types

of bacteria aiding in the breakdown of plant cellulose. The openings to the digestive tract areas did not adversely affect the animal in any way. The animal did not experience a shorter life span than would have been otherwise expected. According to Dr. Jenkins, "the animals did not mind the sample being taken" from the rumen or small intestine. The windows were only large enough to insert an arm for collecting samples and were closed with a cap to the outside.

Dr. Jenkins' research centered on the bacteria that could be found in the rumen. He collected samples of partially

digested food and bacteria from the rumen which he used in experiments concerning phospholipids. He was interested in improving the fermentation process by increasing the number of phospholipids in the stomach. Phospholipids are composed of fatty acids, a glycerol molecule, and a phosphate group. It was hoped that a feeding program could be developed that would help the animal get more energy out of the hay it digested. Dr. Jenkins was also interested in how the lipid digestion by the bacteria affected the growth and function of the ruminant.

Before he came to Clemson, Dr. Jen-

kins worked at Ohio State. There he helped find a new method that allowed ruminants to be fed high fat diets without upsetting their digestive systems. The process was patented. The diet kept the high fat concentration from killing the rumen bacteria that were usually not tolerant of high fat concentrations. The extra fat produced more energy for the ruminant to utilize from a smaller amount of food. The diet stressed higher levels of fat-containing foods such as whole cotton seeds and soybeans.

Dr. Jenkins was one of the professors at Clemson doing regular research with ruminant digestion. His research with the "windowed animals" held much promise for improving the cost/benefit ratios for the smaller farmer and large-scale cattle industries, and eventually the consumer. It was hoped Clemson could learn much from its collection of "specially equipped" research animals.

History lives on Fort Hill

Nestled in the center of campus where students learn about and experience future-oriented technological advances, is Fort Hill, rich in historical depth concerned with not only the college and its beginnings, but with the country and its past leaders and events.

Fort Hill once dominated the campus, which was then an 1100 acre plantation that overlooked the Seneca River. The first owner was James McElhenny, the Presbyterian minister of Old Stone Church. He built the original house around 1802. It was then called Clergy Hall. Mrs. John Ewing Calhoun purchased the home in 1824, and presented it to her daughter, Mrs. John C. Calhoun. The house was renamed Fort Hill in honor of Fort Rutledge, an old fort which had been built on the land in 1776 as protection from the Indians. John Cadwell Calhoun, who served as a US Congressman and

Senator, Secretary of War and State, and finally Vice-president, lived at Fort Hill with his wife from 1825-1850. It was during this time that the house was enlarged to its present size of fourteen rooms.

Four years after the death of John C. Calhoun, in 1854, his wife sold Fort Hill to their son, Andrew Pickens Calhoun. When he died in 1865, he still had not paid for it, so the plantation was eventually passed to Mrs. Calhoun's oldest heir, Anna Calhoun Clemson, wife of Thomas Green Clemson. The home was special to the Clemsons because it was where they were wed in 1838. While living at Fort Hill, Thomas G. Clemson was active in the Pendleton Farmers Society, which sparked the idea for beginning an agricultural college. Before Mr. and Mrs. Clemson's deaths, they willed the plantation to the state of South Carolina stipulating an agricul-

tural college to be built there. Mr. Clemson's will provided that Fort Hill should always be preserved as a historical shrine. At least three rooms were to be open to the public and in the sale of household goods, sufficient furniture be reserved to furnish these rooms.

Fort Hill was opened to the public on March 1, 1931. Miss Ida Calhoun was the first caretaker. The house was filled with original furnishings that were kept at Fort Hill by Clemson's request. Other items in the house were original pieces that were donated by descendants of the Calhouns and Clemsons. Probably the most famous piece in the house is the Constitutional sideboard. It was made of mahogany paneling ac-

quired from the frigate Constitution before dismantling was stopped by public objections. It was originally given to Henry Clay, who gave it to John C. Calhoun after a speech defending the frigate Constitution. Many portraits by Clemson hang in Fort Hill, including a self-portrait and a work entitled, "Madonna and Child." Calhoun set up the garden for his crippled daughter Camellia, who loved flowers. The east side row of cedars on the estate were a gift from Daniel Webster.

Fort Hill was designed as a national landmark in 1975, qualifying it for matching federal grants for preservation of the structure. The university and the John C. Calhoun division of the Daughters of the Calhoun division of the Daughters of the Confederacy set up the Fort Hill Endowment as another financial resource to ensure that Thomas Clemson's will is carried out.

April 30, 1987 marked the end of fifty years of service to Clemson for the university's tenth president, Walter T. Cox. To honor President Emeritus and Dean Cox, the university established a scholarship in his name. The scholarship was to be granted to students on the basis of their academic performance and potential.

In addition to the lasting tribute to Dean Cox, a celebration was held on September 5, 1987. The festivities consisted of a public barbecue dinner and program which followed the First Friday football game against Western Carolina. Approximately 500 people attended the dinner, which raised money for the scholarship bearing Dean Cox's name. The dinner raised \$50,000 for the fund.

Walter T. Cox graduated from Clemson in 1939 and returned as an Assistant Coach and Athletic Business Manager in 1940. Ten years later he was promoted to Director of Public Relations and Alumni Affairs and Assistant to the president. In 1955, he took the position of Vice-President of Student Affairs, a position he held until July 1985. From July 1985 until March 1985, Cox served as Clemson's tenth president. From July of 1986 until March 1987, he served as Vice President for Institutional Advancement. Cox retired from full-time employment at Clemson on April 30, 1987, but continued to serve the university on a part-time basis as a consultant to President Lennon and the institutional advancement division.

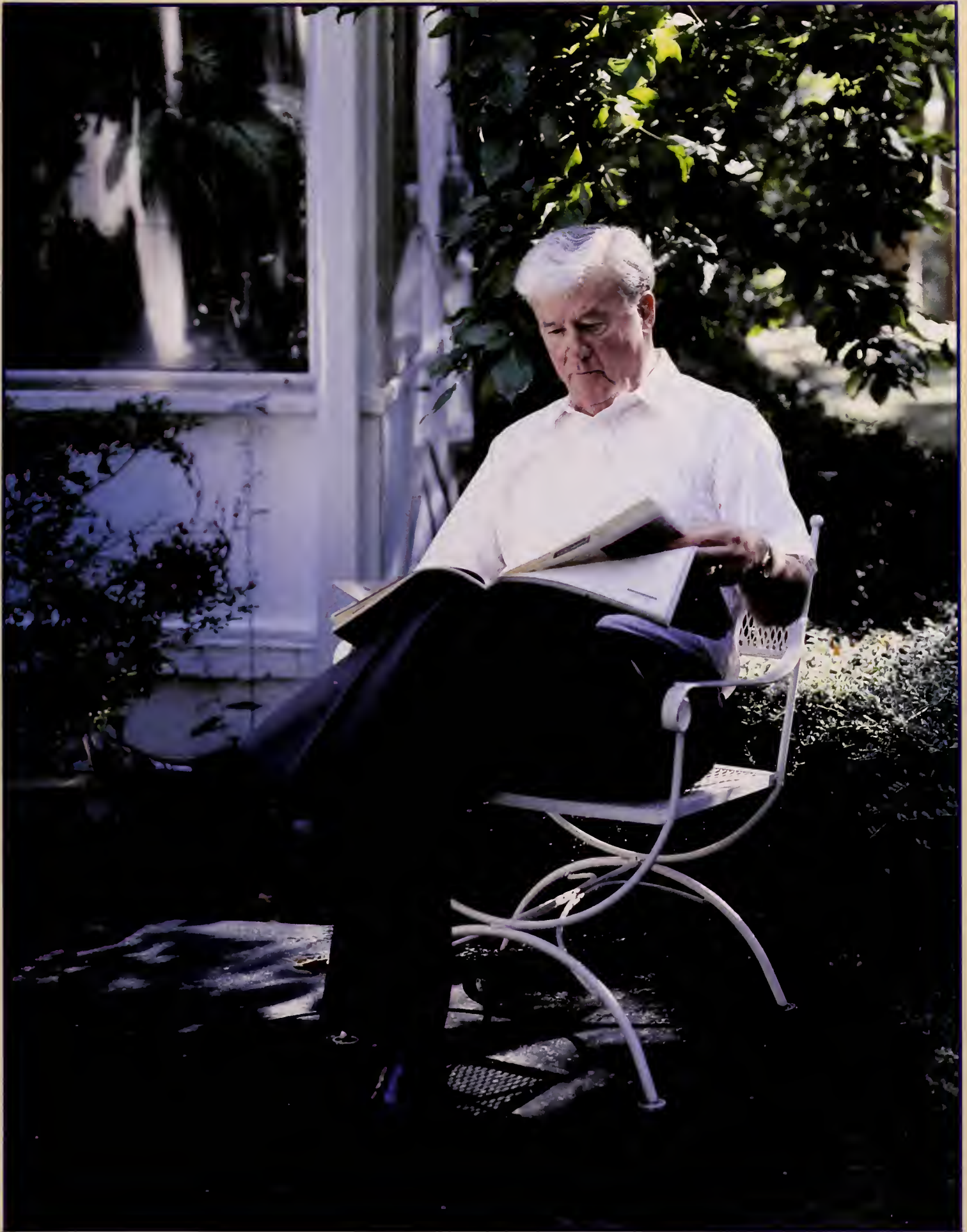

Clemson University officially heralded the opening of a new \$11.9 million laboratory on April 28, 1987. The Howard L. Hunter Chemistry Laboratory housed a 230 seat auditorium and a main building plans also called for a research wing to be added at a later date.

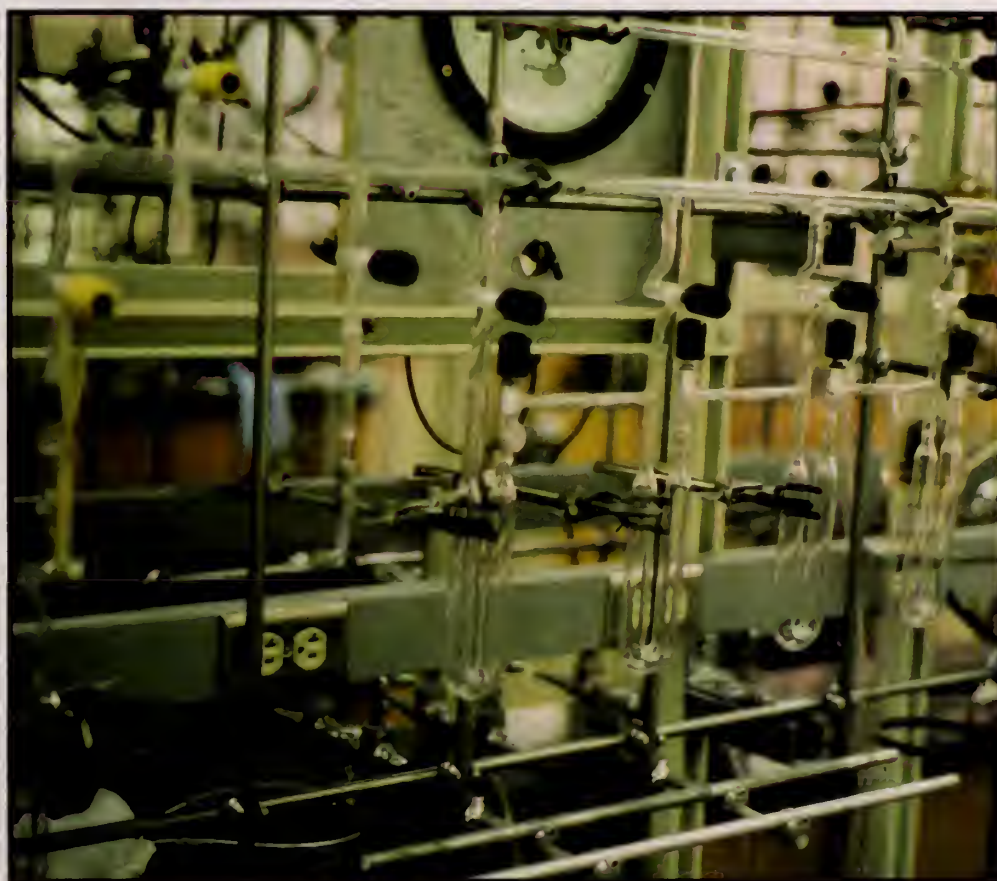

Tiger Golfers Capture The ACC Title

In his fourth year of coaching Clemson golf, Coach Larry Penley continued to strengthen and improve the university golf program. With a team roster including the return of three starters from the 1986 team and three powerful freshmen, the year was bound to be explosive from the beginning.

Placing second of twenty teams in their first tournament, the Seminole Classic, and winning the next two, the Palmetto Classic and the Gamecock Invitational, the Tiger golfers set a winning precedent at the start of the season. Next came a fifth-place finish at the Homberg Intercollegiate Tournament. It was two more tournaments before the team captured another first-place finish, the coveted ACC Championship. The Tiger golfers then traveled to the Schenkel Invitational where they placed fifth of eighteen teams. The season ended with a trip to

the NCAA Tournament, where the Tigers captured eleventh-place among thirty-three teams.

The team, as a whole, improved by recording better statistics than those set in the previous year. Kevin Johnson set a Clemson freshman record for stroke average in 1986 with a 73.74 and lowered his average as a sophomore to 71.88, the lowest on the team. Johnson's leading average beat Brad Clark's lowest team average of 73.32 the preceding year. Coach Penley said of this aspiring young golfer, "Kevin Johnson is one of the best collegiate golfers in the country. His desire and determination set him apart. He is a real competitor who could excel in any sport."

Collectively, the Tigers shot under par thirty-seven times out of nine tournaments. The team average was 72.46 strokes per round and Kevin Johnson held the low

score of the season with a 65. The team had three first-place finishes as a team and had three team members finish first in various tournaments. Chris Patton and Kevin Johnson tied for first-place in the Gamecock Invitational, and Jason Griffith finished first in the Palmetto Classic.

Coach Penley said, "This is the most talented team that I have ever coached."

Clemson Baseball Has Record Season

The Clemson baseball team just keeps getting better. In 1986, the team tied the record for most wins in a season with 42. In 1987, they smashed that record with a 54-14-1 season. It was the first time Clemson has had a 50-win season in any sport.

This year's team was strong in almost all areas. With five fifth-year seniors on the roster, experience was one of the team's greatest strengths. The Clemson offense also proved strong the team had a .320 batting aver-

age. In addition, five Tigers made the All-ACC baseball team. Bert Heffernan, Steve Baucom, Bill Spiers and Randy Mazey made first-team All-ACC, and Henry Threadgill made second-team All-ACC. Pitcher Brian Barnes also contributed to Clemson's strength, posting 12 wins — the most by a Tiger in over 10 years.

Against a Top Ten Miami team at Miami, the Tigers won two games and tied the third. Against a highly regarded South Carolina team, the Tigers swept all four games.

The ACC Tournament started off well for the Tigers. The tournament was held in Greenville, South Carolina for the first time, and the support for the Tigers was tremendous. Unfortunately, the support wasn't enough as the Tigers won games against Wake Forest,



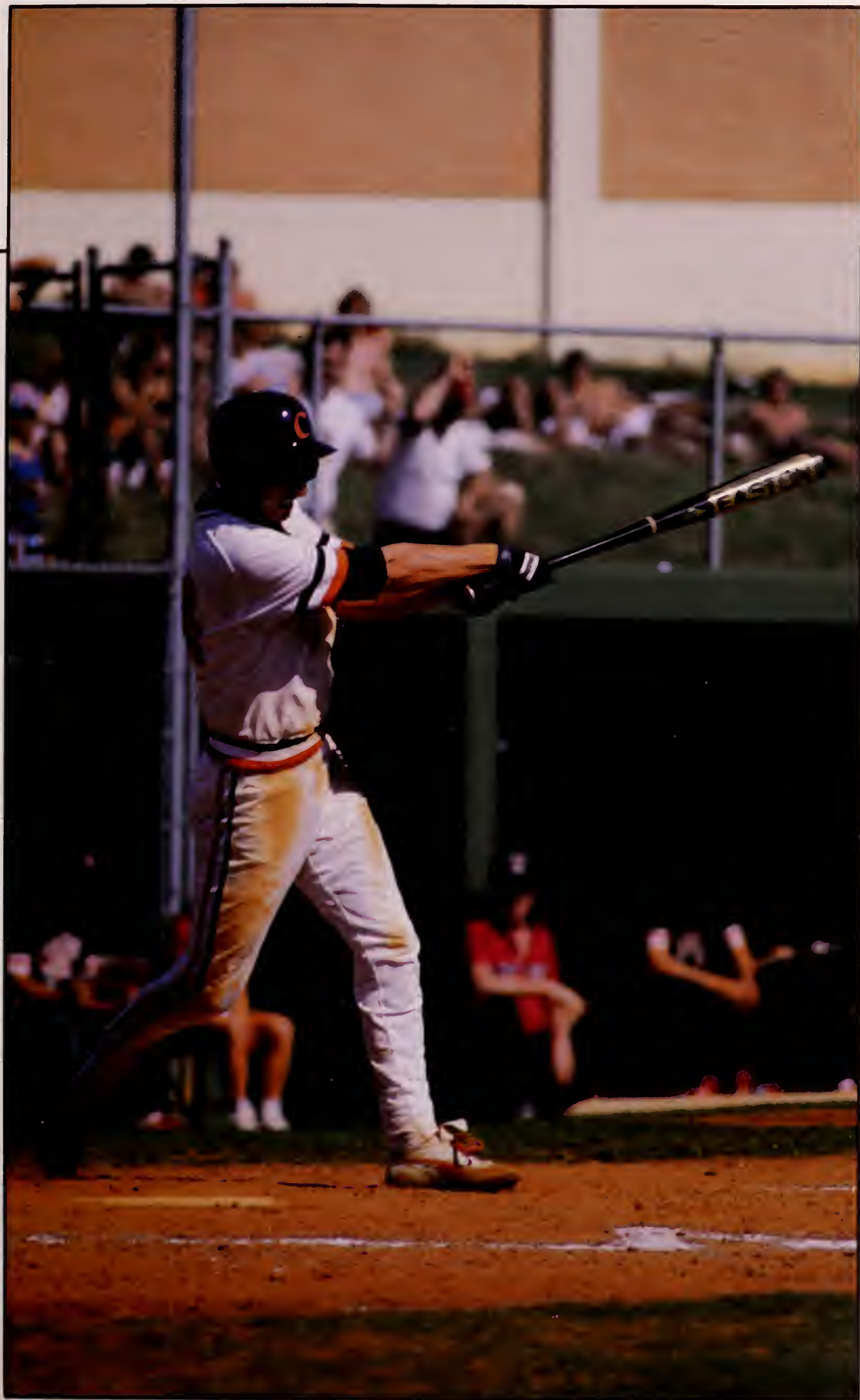

Clemson Netters Continue Success

The men's tennis team continued its success by having its eleventh consecutive winning season. The schedule pitted Clemson against many of the best college teams in tennis today. The team faced twenty-one teams ranked in the Top 20 over the course of the season. Consequently, none of the team's losses came against unranked teams.

The Tigers played well in several tournaments with their strongest showing at the National ITCA Indoor Championships. The team defeated three ranked teams including number-two Southern Methodist. Unfortunately, the team lost to number-one Southern California in the finals and had to settle for runner-up.

There was no Atlantic Coast Conference Tourna-

ment in 1987, but the Tigers were still crowned ACC Champions for the fifth consecutive year. The tournament was cancelled due to inclement weather. Thus on the strength of their 6-0 regular season ACC record, the Tigers were awarded the championship.

The team also made a ninth straight appearance in the NCAA Tournament which was held in Athens, Georgia. The team started off with a strong showing in defeating Kansas by a score of 6-1. The Tigers then faced host Georgia and had to settle for an early trip home.

Individually, several players captured post-season honors. The team placed four members on the All-ACC team and four on the All-American team. The Clemson representatives on

both teams were Craig Boynton, Kent Kinnear, and Vince Van-Gelderan. Brian Page also made All-ACC, and John Sullivan gained All-American honors.

The Lady Tigers had a good season by retaining their ACC title and finishing in the nation's Top 20. The team's overall record was 18-13 and 5-1 in the ACC with the only setback coming in a late season loss to North Carolina.

Though the team's overall record may appear somewhat mediocre, one must consider the caliber of the opponents the team played. Of the thirty-one teams the Lady Tigers played, seventeen were ranked in the top 25 at the time of the match. The record is also more impressive in that the team only played eleven matches

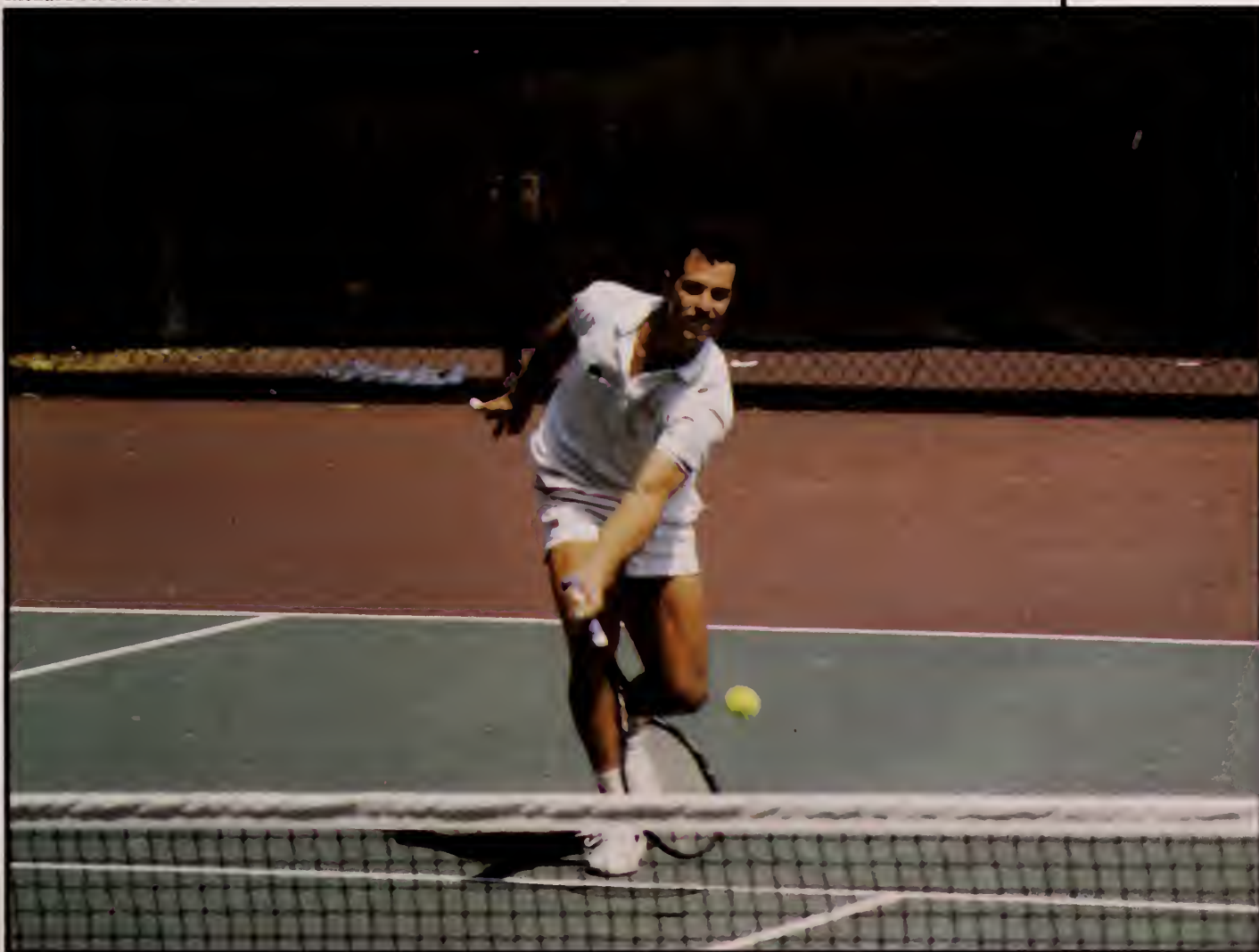

Soccer Season Brings Pleasant Surprise

It was to be rebuilding year for Clemson soccer. You know, one that doesn't really count. In fact the main thing head coach I.M. Ibrahim was thinking about building before the season started was his new 4,000 seat stadium. It was a good recruiting year, but winning would have to take a back seat for a few years, while the young talent improved. However, someone forgot to tell this to senior Bruce Murray. On a team full of freshmen, it was it's elder statesman Murray that made sure the season counted as the Tigers finished 13-5-1 in the regular season and went to the NCAA tournament, where they pulled off upset after upset.

"Bruce Murray is going to be the player that makes us or breaks us," said Ibrahim before the season started. "He's really our best player, but we do have an outstanding group of seniors returning. They are the ones that are going to make this team successful."

Murray had been an All-American since he stepped on the campus four years earlier, and this year he was being touted for the highest honor given to a soccer player, the Herman Award. Murray led the Tigers with 17 goal and eight assists, while the Tigers matured into a national contender.

Injuries kept the Tigers from going to the NCAA tournament the previous year, despite that team's top 20 finish, and the program had fallen behind some of the others in the Southeast such as Duke, South Carolina and North Carolina. "If we have the rash of injuries

we had last year, I don't think we will have a decent season," Ibrahim said about the challenge he faced in naving to face ACC competition with so many freshmen. But he was not shy about attacking with the ball as he knew the physical competition his team would face during the year. He said that the team would play a high intensity defense which was contrary to most of the players' styles. And, Ibrahim unveiled his team's new style as well as his new stadium with an 8-0 win over UNC-Asheville. The new stadium was something that Ibrahim had wanted for years and when it opened up, it filled to near-capacity. The Tigers then went on to defeat UNC-Greensboro and the College of Charleston in two very challenging contests.

The Tigers then got their first taste of ACC competition in their next match as they faced physical North Carolina. The Tigers took it on the chin against the Tar Heels as goalkeeper Chris Dudley allowed the first two goals of the season for the Tigers in their 2-1- loss. Ibrahim had the officiating to blame as the Tigers squeaked by Georgia State 3-2 in their next contest. The Tigers raised their conference record to 1-1 with a 3-1 win over Wake Forest and then avenged a loss to Furman a year earlier with a 3-1 win over the Paladins in their next contest.

In their next contest against Duke, the Tigers dominated every phase of the game but the scoreboard, as the Blue Devils took a 2-0 victory. After the loss Ibra-

him expressed pleasure in the progress that the team had been making despite the loss. The Tigers made good on their chances to score in their next two matches against St. Louis and George Mason in the Umbro Invitational Tournament. The Tigers defeated St. Louis 5-1 and dispatched George Mason 2-0 to win the tournament and get rid of some of the frustration that had been haunting them throughout the season. However, the team would not see many more easy wins. In their next match against Berry College they won 1-0 despite outshooting Berry 23-4 and having three shots hit off the goal.

Probably the highlight of the season was when the tigers knocked off the second-ranked Gamecocks of USC 2-1 on Riggs Field in front of over 6,000 fans. "I have a bottle of Dom Perrignon, and it has been chilling the entire year," Ibrahim said after watching his team improve to 10-2 on the year. "And I assure you I will open it tonight."

After a 2-1 win over Coastal Carolina in their next match, the Tigers faced N.C. State with an NCAA bid in the balance. The Tigers tied the Wolfpack 2-2 to keep their hopes for a bid alive, and Ibrahim just hoped that his Tigers could hang on to receive an invitation to the tournament after suffering numerous injuries in recent matches. Ibrahim was finally given a night he could relax in the Tigers' next match against Erskine. The Tigers defeated the Flying Fleet 5-0, and the big win could not

Soccer Team Defeats San Diego State For National Championship


It was to be a year of rebuilding for the Clemson soccer team. Coach I.M. Ibrahim dreamed of much but "realistically" expected less than that as he faced a season with his youngest team ever. There were times during the season when the coach and his team doubted that they would even get a bid to play in the NCAA tournament. They had a disappointing 1-5-1 record in the ACC and lost to UNC in the first round of the ACC tournament. But the Tigers were given the benefit of the doubt and won one of the last two spots given in the tournament. San Diego State won the other one.

In the first round of the tournament Hermann Award winner Bruce Murray kicked in the winning goal from 35 yards away to lead Clemson to a 2-1 win over

Evansville. Evansville coach Fred Schmalz called Murray's kick "the best free kick I've ever seen in college soccer." The team then went on to dethrone top-ranked Indiana 2-1. Murray kicked his second winning goal of the tournament to lead the Tigers. Clemson's next victim was Rutgers. Murray scored two second half goals to set up the 3-2 win.

Clemson was chosen to host the final four, where they would face UNC in the semifinals. The Tarheels had beaten them twice during the regular season, but, this time the Tigers totally dominated and beat the Tarheels 4-1 in front of a crowd of 6,000 people. The Tigers had now beaten four top-twenty teams on their march to the final game. And now they faced San Diego State. The last two teams chosen for the

NCAA tournament were about to do battle for the top spot in college soccer.

The Tigers came into the game determined to accomplish what was thought to be impossible. At one point, they held SDSU without a shot for 36 minutes. They were in control throughout the game, as Paul Rutenis and Richie Richmon each scored to give the Tigers a 2-0 win in front of a crowd of more than 8,000 fans. It was a very proud moment for Coach Ibrahim, as his young team had skillfully crafted themselves into what no one believed they could be anytime soon ... a national championship team. Rollercoaster Year On The Gridiron

For a season that was predicted to bring so much joy, it brought so much pain. For a year that was supposed to bring so much success, it brought relatively few wins. It was nine wins to be exact, the most by a Clemson football team since 1983. The wins came by big margins and they came by small margins, mostly small. Late drives were the rule, and David Treadwell was the man most looked at when the final minutes were ticking away. The offense would be a sore spot, as Ford had made clear before the season started. But when he was complaining about the offense as they prepared for South Carolina in late November, he did so with only one loss against him. And he knew that as unimpressive as his offense was at times, his defense was just as spectacular, having much to do with most of the Tigers' wins. The defense was dominant in the Tigers' first victory over Western Carolina as they defeated the Catamounts 43-0. They limited Western Carolina to only 105 total yards. And an impressive showing by two freshmen and a first-year runningback at the tailback slot topped off the day for Ford. Wesley McFadden a sophomore in his first game at tailback rushed for 64 yards, while freshmen Joe Henderson and Terry Allen ran for 80 yards and 76 yards, respectively. Each of them also had a touchdown in the Tigers' victory.

McFadden rushed for 226 yards including touchdown runs of 44 and 89 yards the next week to lead the Tigers to a 22-10 win over Virginia Tech. However, it was the

defense that stole the spotlight from McFadden as they limited Tech to 60 total yards in a game that was sweet revenge for the Tigers after the Hokies had embarrassed them the previous year in Death Valley. The win set up a showdown the next week in Death Valley between the Tigers and Georgia. The game would be the last between the two schools until 1990, and neither team

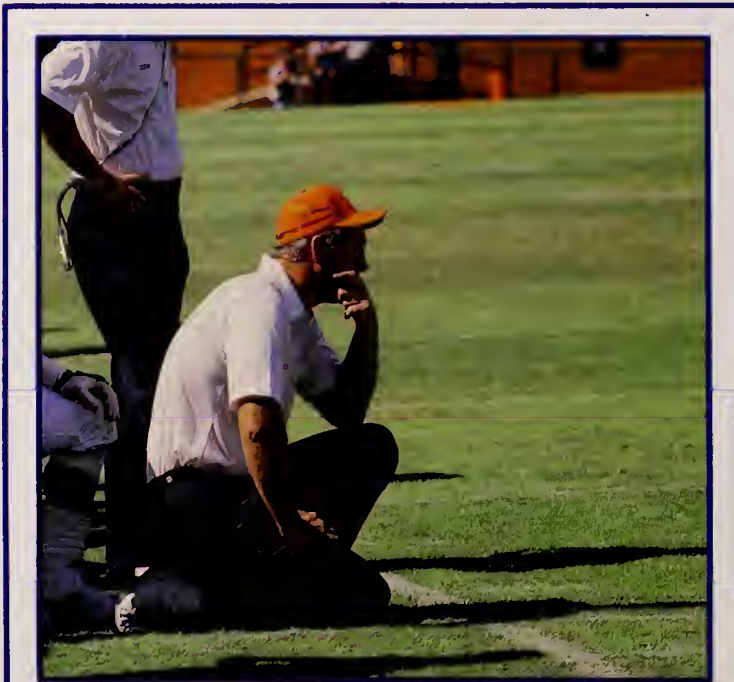
left in the game to bring the Tigers within two points at 20-18, and forced a free kick. The offense proceeded to drive the ball 53 yards in nine plays to set up a Treadwell fieldgoal from 21 yards with two seconds left to win the game 21-20. "I'm very happy for our football team, and I think we were very fortunate to win," said Ford. "But we found a way to win, whether it was one point,

low Jackets were limited to only 41 yards on the ground and 160 yards in the air while Tech quarterback Rick Strom was sacked six times. Donnell Woolford returned a punt 78 yards in the first quarter for a touchdown and Joe Henderson returned a kickoff 95 yards for a score in the third quarter. The Tigers totalled 227 yards in punt returns to set a new team record.

The offense finally had their day in the sun in the Tigers' next game against Virginia, as they had scoring drives of 80, 76, 76, and 74 yards in 38-21 win over the Cavaliers. Allen rushed for 183 yards and McFadden had 119 as the Tigers put the ball in the endzone on three of their first four possessions.

The offense scored on two long drives despite not getting anything else all afternoon to defeat Duke 17-10 in the next game. The game was tied 10-10 with just over 11 minutes left in the game, and the Tigers had the ball on their own 3-yard line. But the offense then proceeded to march 97 yards on their most impressive drive of the day for the winning touchdown.

The Tigers' lackluster play finally caught up with them in their next game as they went down 30-0 in the first half to N.C. State and could not quite come back, as they ended up losing 30-28. Rodney Williams threw an NCAA record 46 passes in the second half as they attempted a miracle comeback, but in the end, all hopes for a national championship were vanquished. The Tigers played their hearts out in the second half. However, their

wanted to think about losing this game for that long. After David Treadwell had kicked a 46-yard field goal in 1986 to win the game for the Tigers, there was surely no way the game could get any more tenseful or exciting. But then the defense stepped into the picture and decided to create a big finish. So they nailed Bulldog quarterback James Jackson for a safety with 5:38

half a point . . . I don't even know what the score was."

The Tiger defense continued to ignite the team in their next game against Georgia Tech. The Yellow Jackets came into the game boasting one of the top passing attacks in the ACC, but when they left Death Valley, they barely had their pride intact after a 33-12 shellacking by the Tigers. The Yel-

28 points were too little too late against a team that would lose to East Tennessee State University two weeks later.

The next week on Halloween, Wake Forest jumped out to a 17-10 half-time lead, holding the Tigers to a field goal and punt return for a touchdown by Donnell Woolford. But, Rodney Williams came in in the second half after Chris Morocco had started the first half and lead the Tigers to three second half touchdowns to give them a 31-17 win.

The win set up a showdown between the Tigers and UNC for the ACC championship. Once again, it was Treadwell who made the day for the Tigers. He hit a 30-yard field goal with 30 seconds left to give the Tigers a 13-10 win. The Tigers clinched the ACC title and a Citrus Bowl bid with a 45-16 pelting of Maryland the next week in Death Valley. It was complete domination, from the 355 yards rushing to the two long touchdown passes from Williams to Gary Cooper. There was no doubt the Ti-

gers had put it all together.

Early in the second half, most of the Tigers' thought turned to their next opponent, South Carolina. The Gamecocks came into the game with a 7-2 record. The Tigers scored on their first possession with a 91 yard drive, but they were shut out for the rest of the game. Carolina scored on a pair of field goals, an offensive touchdown and a intercepted pass return for a touchdown. The loss ended what was to be a magical season for the Tigers at 9-2. The high hopes of the preseason were dashed at the N.C. State game and pounded into the ground in Columbia. "We're thankful that we have an opportunity to end the season on a different note," Ford said after the game as he accepted the invitation to play in the Citrus Bowl. "I thought that our guys played very well this season in that we're 9-2. We didn't accomplish everything that we wanted to accomplish, but we have nothing to be ashamed of."

Citrus Bowl Brings a Sweet Finale To a Sweet and Sour Season

It was the magic that fans, coaches, and players had anxiously awaited all season. But it really only seemed like magic on New Year's Day for the Tigers. What it really boiled down to was a solid game plan and the excellent talent to execute it. After having a month to think about their disappointing loss to South Carolina, the Tigers charged onto the field for the 42nd Citrus Bowl game and stunned the crowd of over 53,000 fans. The Tigers took control of the game from the beginning and handed the Penn State Nittany Lions a 35-10 loss, PSU head coach Joe Paterno's worst bowl defeat ever.

Paterno had voiced his concern over Clemson's kick return ability; his concerns were legitimate. On the opening kickoff, Clemson's Wesley McFadden returned the ball 42 yards to the Clemson 44-yard line. Then the Tigers did what no one ever dreamed they would do. On the first play from scrimmage, quarterback Rodney Williams dropped back and threw his first pass of the

game to Keith Jennings for a 34-yard gain. Seven plays later, Tracy Johnson took it in from seven yards out for Clemson's first touchdown. David Treadwell added the extra point to give Clemson a 7-0 lead.

The score remained unchanged until early in the second quarter when Penn State was given good field position by a 36-yard punt return. An interception by Donnell Woolford was nullified by an offsides penalty against Clemson, giving Penn State the opportunity to tie the game on a 39-yard pass to Michael Alexander from Matt Knizer. But the Tigers quickly answered with a 72-yard drive that took only eight plays. Terry Allen had a 31-yard run, and Williams found Jennings for a 31-yard pass play to help set up the score. Johnson capped it off again with a six yard touchdown run. Treadwell connected to make it 14-7 in Clemson's favor.

Penn State opened the second half with a 28-yard Eric Etze field goal. But Clemson answered quickly again with

a 70-yard touchdown drive. The drive was highlighted by a 23-yard pass from Williams to Gary Cooper and a 22-yard run by Alen that carried the ball to the PSU 8-yard line. Johnson went in for the touchdown from the 1-yard line, giving Clemson a 21-10 lead. Johnson rushed for 88 yards in the game, and his three touchdowns set a new school record.

Moments later, Clemson linebacker Dorian Mariable intercepted a PSU pass at the Clemson goal line and returned it 46 yards. That was the fourth and last time in the game that PSU penetrated the CU ten-yard line. Twice they scored and twice they turned the ball over. Mariable's interception coupled with Tony Stephens' recovery of a PSU fumble at the CU nine-yard line cost Penn State two possible scores. Mariable's interception won him the defensive MVP award of the game.

Clemson scored again on a 26-yard run by Allen, who ran for a total of 105 yards. Allen's score and Treadwell's extra point gave Clemson a

28-10 lead. In the final seconds of the game, Clemson took it into the endzone again. Joe Henderson's 45-yard run to the PSU six-yard line gave Clemson first and goal. Moments later Henderson took it in from the four-yard line. Treadwell's fifth connection gave Clemson a final score of 35-10.

The Tigers played a near perfect game and were led by Rodney Williams' superb passing game. Williams completed 15 of 24 passes for 214 yards. He was named MVP of the Citrus Bowl for his performance. The game was what the Tigers had searched for all season, and it certainly pleased head coach Danny Ford. "We happened to have the hot hand today," said Ford. "We played very, very well. Our guys just played great."

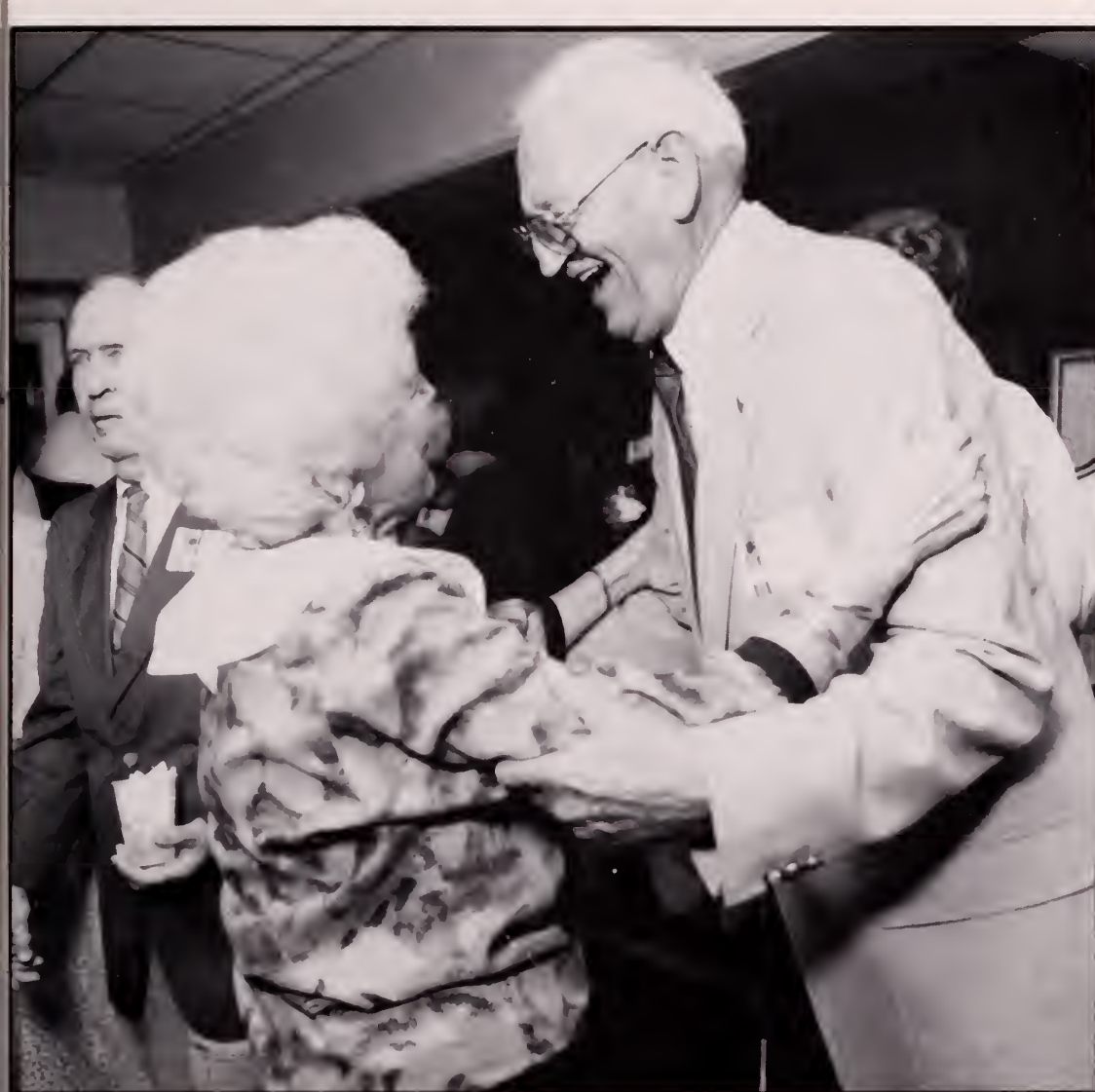
Clemson University has always had a tradition of excellence in sports. In the 1986-87 school year, Clemson captured seven ACC crowns and had 10 Top 20 national finishes. Thousands of very dedicated athletes have represented Clemson well in its history. And, several of those athletes have made exceptional efforts to make Clemson the best in college sports. So, to honor such athletes, the university may elect to retire their jerseys, which means that those jersey numbers will never be worn again by any other player in the future. On September 19, 1987, at the pre-game ceremonies of the Georgia football game, Clemson University proudly honored former Tiger All-American Banks McFadden by

retiring not only one but two of his jerseys. Banks McFadden was a football, basketball and track star when he attended Clemson. He was named the nation's most versatile athlete for 1939-40, after having won All-American honors in both football and basketball in 1939. He is the only person in Clemson's history to be named All-American in two sports in the same calendar year. As a track team member, he led the team to a state championship. McFadden wore football jersey number 66 and basketball jersey number 23. He is only the fourth person in Clemson's history to have his or her jersey retired. The jerseys of basketball greats Tree Rollins and Barbara Kennedy and football great Steve Fuller have

also been retired. According to the Clemson Athletic Council, in order for consideration to be given to the retirement of an athlete's jersey, the athlete must be a Clemson graduate of at least five years who has had a substantial impact on the sports program and who has brought national/international attention to Clemson. He or she must have demonstrated leadership abilities and have had the respect of his or her teammates.

In honor of his tremendous achievements and efforts that have helped in creating a tradition of athletic excellence at Clemson University, the 1988 TAPS staff salutes Banks McFadden.

Tennis and Soccer Facilities See Million Dollar Improvements

The past year produced some definite improvements in two of Clemson's athletic facilities. The two sports which received the largest amount of attention were tennis and soccer. Both of these areas have been in need of improvements for some time.

The new indoor tennis center will definitely aid Clemson in both recruiting and bringing top-ranked teams from across the country to have matches here. The center will also help the players by allowing them to practice year-round and during inclement weather.

The tennis center cost approximately \$1.04 million and was funded through IP-TAY and the athletic department. The center contains four tennis courts with divider curtains. There are also offices for both the mens' and womens' coaches, as well as an equipment room. Restrooms and a canteen are also available for use during soccer games. All together, the tennis center provides Clemson with a top-notch facility which will undoubtedly help the Tigers remain with the country's most elite in college tennis.

The soccer field also expe-

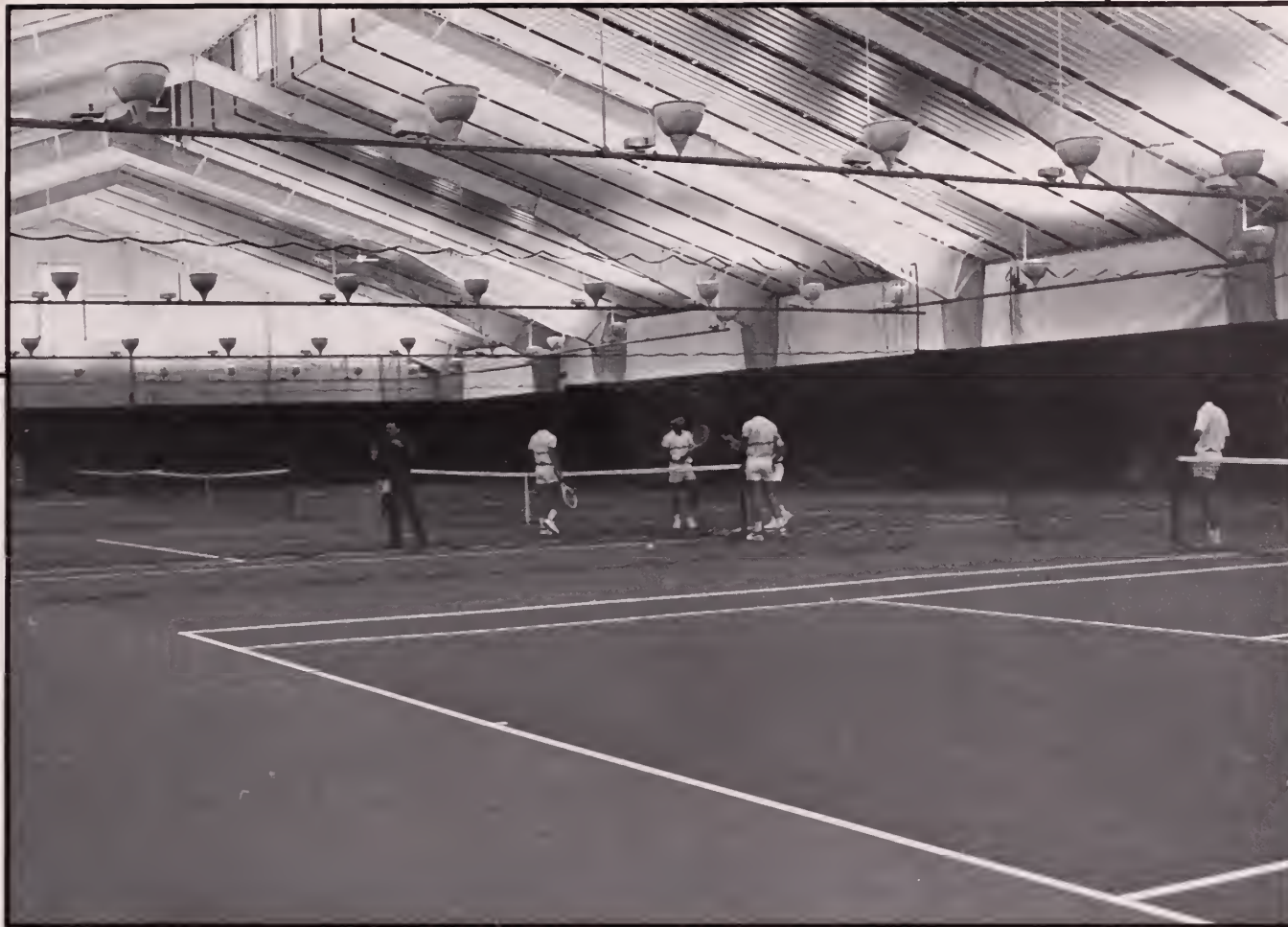

At a cost of \$1.1 million, the soccer stadium features a press box, lights for night games, and locker rooms for both teams. The men's track team had a fantastic season as the 1986-87 Tigers set twenty-one Clemson track bests. Most of these were set at either the Florida State University-Tenneco Relays or at the South Carolina State Meet. The Tigers also placed first in the ACC in indoor track and second in outdoor track.

The Florida State University-Tenneco Relays were held on March 21, 1987, and the Tigers ran well. Ten school records were set — including one by Terrance Herrington in the 800 meters

which qualified him for the National Collegiate Athletic Association Outdoor Meet. Several others Tigers also set records — Delton Hall, John Everett, George Milton, and Larry Clark.

At the South Carolina State Meet held in April, the Tigers turned in another fine performance. Although they finished second by eight points to the University of South Carolina, the team set twelve Clemson school records. Records were set by Shelton Boyer, Marcus Black, Terrance Herrington, George Milton, and John

Boobas. Additional records were set by Frank Crossen, Mike Spiritoso, Darwin Rencher, and Shawn Parker.

The women's track team also had a good year. The Lady Tigers had several top performers that spring. Michelle Kalikan ran a school record 17:05 in the 5000 meter run at the Dogwood Relays. Teammates Elsa Breit and Jeannie Burris also set records. Breit set records in the 1500 meters and 800 meters while Burris set records in the discus and shotput.

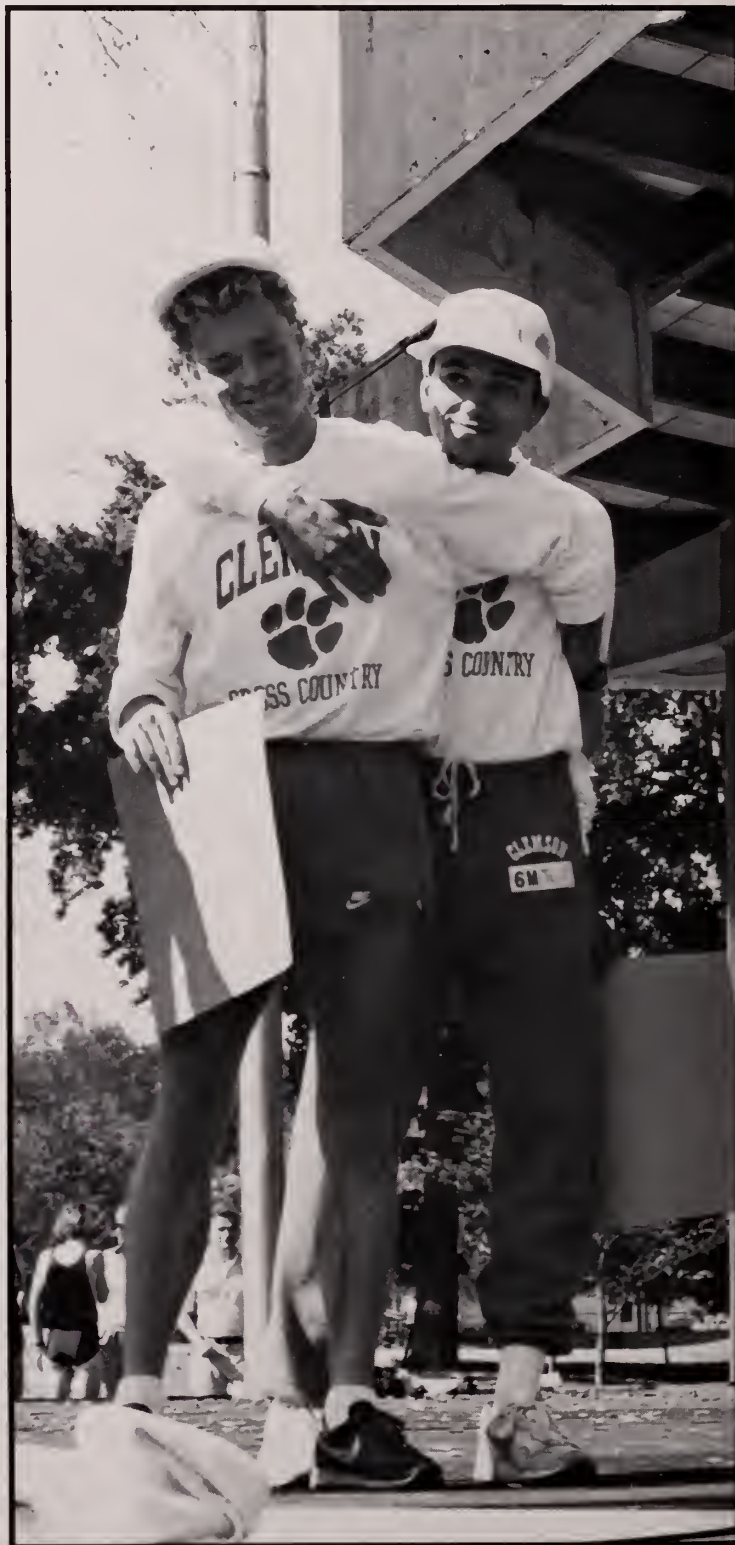
CROSS COUNTRY

Equestrian Team Wins Top Honors

Many opportunities for students to compete in various sports were available at Clemson University, but a unique one that offered the possibility of competing on the national level was the Clemson University Equestrian team. Sponsored by the Block and Bridle Club, the team competed in a region which included the College of Charleston, University of Georgia, University of South Carolina, University of Florida, Converse College, and St. Andrews Presbyterian College.

Though most of the teams received funding for lessons, had practice requirements for their members, and several even had horses for use by their riders, the Clemson team riders were responsible for their own instruction and many did not even get to ride except at the shows. In spite of these disadvantages, the team qualified four riders in five classes for the Regional

competition last season. Of the four that qualified, all won their classes and advanced to the National Intercollegiate Show in Indianapolis, Indiana, where Sally Ford won a second and fourth in her two classes. Carol Anne Buteil placed sixth, and Lisa Crouch and Krista Harrelson also put in fine performances.

Intercollegiate competition offered both Stockseat and Huntseat divisions and had levels ranging from Walk-trot for the beginner to the Open division for riders experienced enough to compete on the national level in other horse organizations' shows. While Stockseat was only shown "on the flat," huntseat riders could compete both "on the flat" and "over fences," which ranged in height and width as much as three feet six inches.

What was probably the greatest challenge of showing intercollegiately was the fact

that riders rode a horse that they had never ridden before and were given no practice time before they went into the ring to be judged. The riders' only chances to know what to expect of his or her mount were watching the horse being warmed up before the show and reading a very brief description of the horse in the program. Horses were assigned to riders by a random draw in order to be as fair as possible.

With many new riders and the talent of returning competitors, the Clemson Equestrian team hoped to have another season of excellence by sending many of its riders on to compete at the regional and national levels.

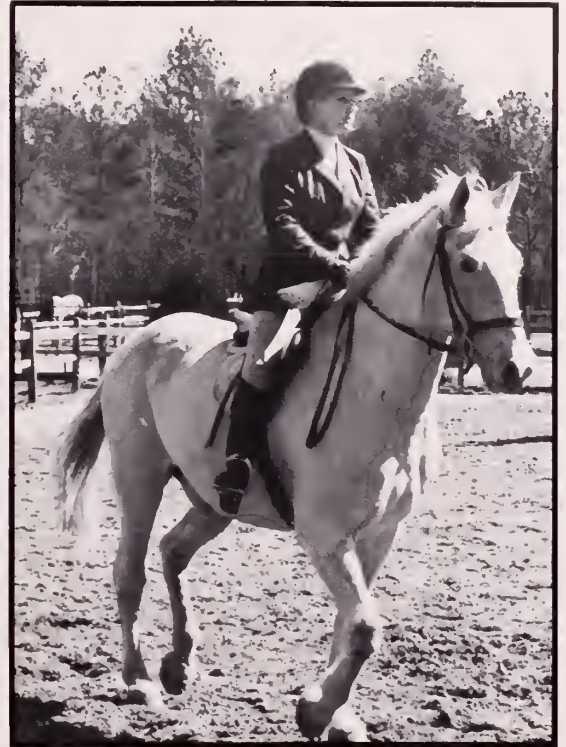

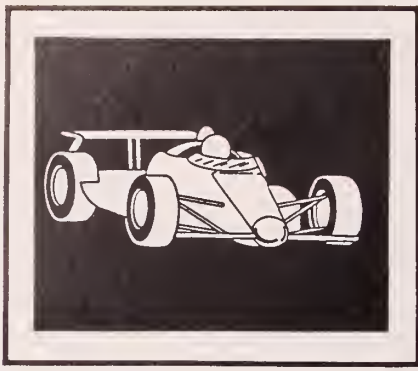

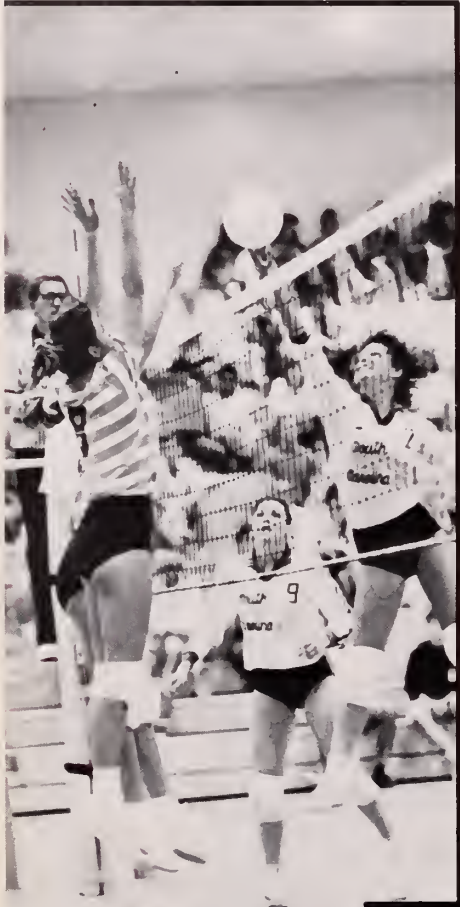

Swimmers Enjoy Success

When the swimming season began Head Coach Bob Boettner expected many great things from both of his teams. The Lady Tigers finished 5th in the NCAA tournament in the previous season and had seven All-Americans or honorable mention All-Americans returning for the 1987-88 season. Coach Boettner could not be disappointed. The opening meet for the Lady Tigers began a winning streak that would go on to prove how strong a national contender the women's squad was. Led by All-American Pam Hayden, the Tigers dominated the Virginia Cavaliers and won 165-103. Hayden won the 200-meter freestyle and fly events and the 500-meter freestyle, and Jill Bakehorn won the 100 and 200-meter backstroke and the 200-meter individual medley. One day later, Hayden led the team to its second victory of the season over Virginia Tech.

After an impressive first place finish in the Clemson Intercollegiate Invitational, the Tigers faced Furman. Jan Kemmerling won two swimming events, and Mandy Meek won both diving events to pace the women to a 140-64 win over the Paladins. Ranked fifth nationally, the Lady Tigers went on to win several more meets by very impressive margins. Ruth Grodsky set two season best times in the 100- and 200-meter breaststroke and Hayden set a season best in

the 100-meter freestyle, as the Lady Tigers beat UNC 164-100. Hayden led the team again in a win over Wisconsin-Stevens Point, Maryland and N.C. State were the Lady Tigers' next victims. Mitzi Kremer came back in this meet after a shoulder injury to win the 200- and 500-yard freestyle events, leading the Tigers to a 166-90 win over the Terrapins. Kremer swam well against N.C. State, where she won the 100- and 1,000-yard freestyle events. Freshman Denise Coniglio swam a 2:02.87 in the 200-yard backstroke, qualifying herself for both the NCAA championships and the Olympic trials. The Lady Tigers went on to defeat the Wolfpack 163-104. The women then faced 13th-ranked South Carolina. Kemmerling, Hayden, Bakehorn, and Grodsky each recorded wins that helped pace the team to a 150-116 victory over the Gamecocks.

The men faced the ACC defending champion Virginia in their opening meet. Davey Stevens won the 200-meter individual medley and Dave Hrovat won the 1- and 3-meter springboard events, but the Tigers were not able to overcome Virginia and lost by a score of 131-86. The Tigers regained their confidence the next day against Virginia Tech. Led by Stevens, who had three first place finishes, and Mark Bridgers, who had two victories, the Tigers won the

meet 62-40. The men went on to place first in the Clemson Intercollegiate and second in the Tennessee Relays.

Their next match was against Furman. Mark Weber won two freestyle events and Dave Hrovat won both diving events to give the men a 133-65 win. Despite season — best performances by Weber and Brett Jones against North Carolina, the Tigers could not overcome the Tar Heels and lost the meet 87.5-129.5. Jose Tarrío gave a fine performance in the next meet to pace the team past Wisconsin-Stevens Point. The win gave the team a 3-2 overall record and a 0-2 record in the ACC. The team then went on to win two close meets against Maryland and N.C.State that raised their record to 5-2 overall and 2-2 in the ACC. Weber and Tarrío, along with the freestyle relay team of Steve Patnode, Steve Helderman, Weber, and Bridgers helped clinch a 116-99 win over the Terps. The freestyle relay team of Patnode, Weber, Bridgers, and Stevens won the last race of the day to give the Tigers a 111-104 victory over the Wolfpack. One week later, the 22nd-ranked Tigers dropped a meet against USC despite the fine performances of Weber, Jones, and Tarrío.

Tiger Teams Undergo Transitions

What a difference a year made! Last year Clemson basketball had its best season ever at 25-6, but this year the team barely had half that many, finishing the season with a 14-13 record.

The major reason for this year's disappointing season was youth, which the Tigers had in abundance. This year's team had only one senior and one junior. In addition, the team also had various off-the-court problems. Before the season began, the Tigers lost guards Michael Tait to hardship and Michael Brown to disciplinary reasons. A few games into the season, guard Chris Duncan left the team for personal reasons, with walk-on Chris Boozer quitting soon after. Donnell Bruce broke his hand and missed several games, and, late in the season, Sean Tyson and Elden Campbell were suspended for violating NCAA rules.

Being the only senior on the team, Grayson Marshall provided leadership on the team. Marshall was also counted on to handle the ball in most game situations, especially close ones. While Grayson had been a leader for the past few years, this year he also became one of the best assist men in college basketball. During the year's first meeting with Georgia Tech, Grayson became the all-time ACC career assist leader, breaking Tyrone Bogues record of 781.

Even though the Tigers suffered through injuries and adversity at the guard position, the frontcourt consisting of Elden Campbell, Jerry Pryor, and Dale Davis played consistently well. Campbell was second on

Clemson's all-time blocked shots list and had a good chance of breaking Tree Rollin's record of 450. He was also Clemson's leading scorer and rebounder this season.

Jerry Pryor exhibited strong rebounding skills on both the offensive and defensive ends of the court, while Dale Davis was first among freshmen in rebounding and led the team with 23 points in the upset win over Duke.

The Tigers started the sea-

Mississippi was the first home-court loss to a non-conference opponent in 33 games. The Tigers rebounded with a win over Augusta before losing again to a top-twenty Michigan team, 93-88. After an easy win over Florida International, the Tigers got ready to attack the conference. Unfortunately, the conference was ready for them, as the Tigers lost their first three games in a span of five days. Inexperience proved to be their downfall. Against N.C. State, they blew a 10 point lead late in the game, and, against Virginia, they allowed John Johnson to score the winning lay-up with one second left.

The team then returned home to start a four game winning streak, starting with an 83-48 victory over Rider. The Tigers then scored their first ACC victory by defeating Wake Forest 75-62. Next came the in-state rivalries. Clemson emerged victorious over Furman and South Carolina, which according to Cliff Ellis was "the Tigers' second best game of the season."

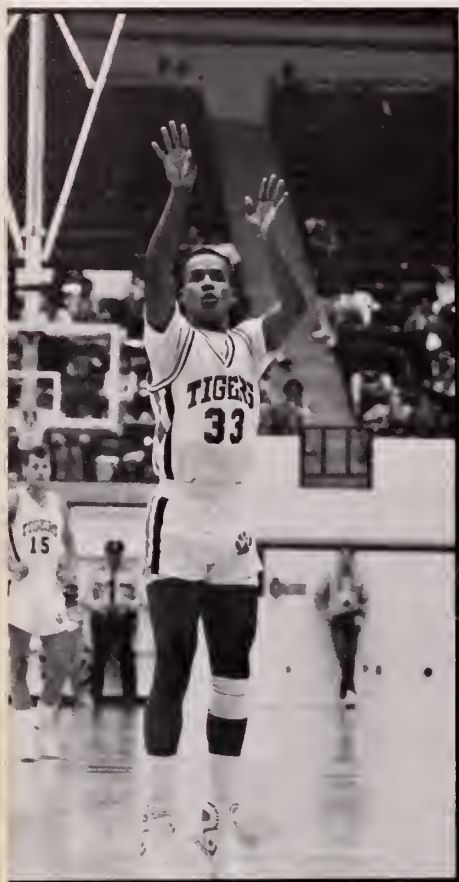
The next game was a trip to Atlanta to play Georgia Tech, and while Grayson Marshall broke the ACC assist record, it was not enough, as the Tigers started a six-game losing streak. After the Yellow Jackets, they proceeded to lose to Duke, UNC, South Carolina, and N.C. State before snapping out of it with a 65-62 last second win over Virginia. Wake Forest then avenged its earlier loss to Clemson by claiming a 79-73 victory. The second meeting with UNC proved to be similar to the first, with the Tar Heels

son halfway around the world in Taiwan with two exhibition games against the Taipei All-Stars and a regular season win over Oregon State. Unfortunately, the Tigers didn't maintain that momentum throughout the season. Despite some relatively easy victories over Baptist, Townson State, Mercer, and Coastal Carolina, the Tigers also played some tough competition in Southern Mississippi, Michigan, and, of course, the ACC.

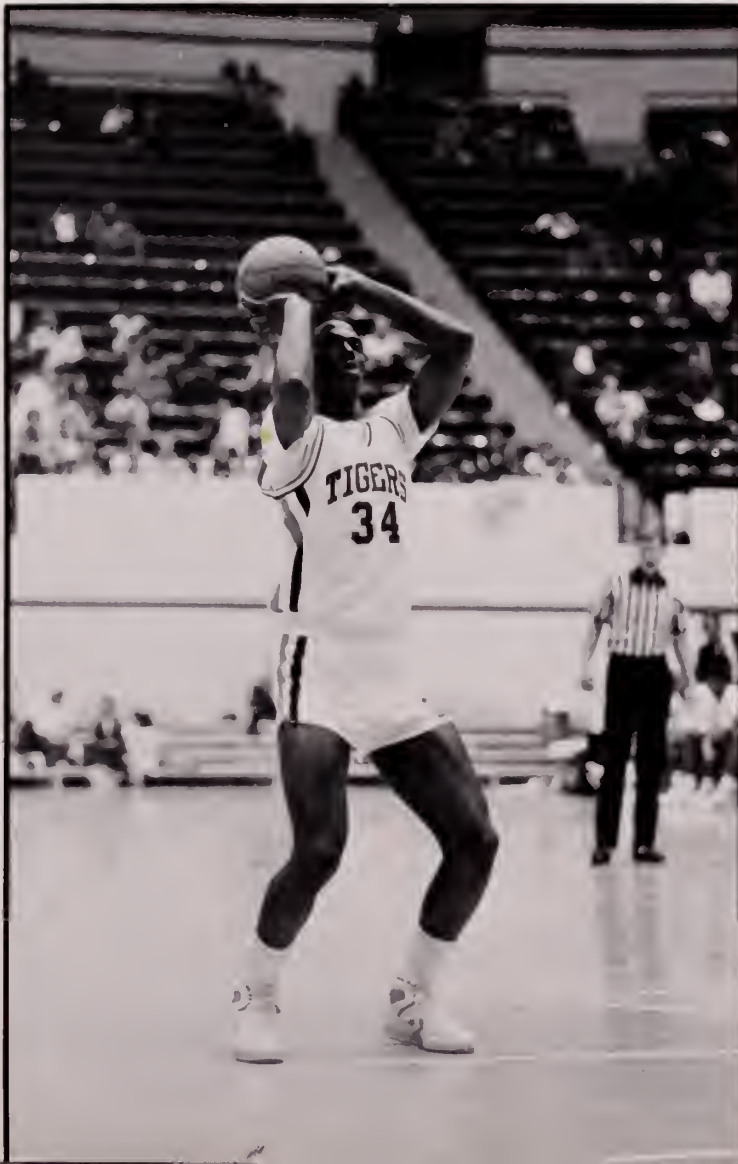

claiming an 86-53 victory. Next came the Duke game at home, where the Tigers pulled off their biggest upset of the year with a 79-77 win. The Tigers finished the regular season with a double overtime 79-76 win over Georgia Tech.

First year head coach Jim Davis began the season with the Lady Tigers full of optimism. And, his optimism became reality. He took the 7-21 record from the previous season and almost literally turned those numbers around for this season's record of 20-7. But the returning talent was the key to the team's success. In his first year, Davis enjoyed having nine letter winners from last season, two Kodak Junior College All-Americans, and an honorable mention prep All-American.

When Coach Davis took his team to the court for the first time, they won, and, they kept on winning. In fact they won eight of their first ten games. The season began on the road at the Georgia Southern Thanksgiving Tournament, where the Tigers defeated Southern Mississippi and Georgia Southern to win their first regular season tournament since the 1984-85 season. Louise Greenwood was named the MVP of the tournament, and teammates Michelle Bryant and Susan Fehling were named to the all-tournament team. Led by the scoring of Karen Jenkins, Cheryl Nix, and Michelle Bryant, the team went on to beat S.C. State, N.C. State, UNCC, and Southern Alabama before losing a close one to New Orleans.

The Tigers resumed action after Christmas with a big win over Boston University. Jenkins contributed 20

points in the win, and Louise Greenwood had 10 rebounds. But, the Tigers came up short against unbeaten and ninth-ranked Duke and lost 68-61. The next three matches were ACC games. Bryants' scoring efforts helped lead the team to its second win over N.C. State, but the team

then dropped games to Maryland and Wake Forest, giving them an ACC record of 2-3.

The team regained their confidence in their next six games and recorded big wins against Radford, North Carolina, and Georgia. The next contest was against USC.

The Tigers won it 62-60 on Ramona O'Neal's free throws in the final seconds of the game. The Tigers then avenged its loss to Duke from earlier in the season with a decisive 78-65 victory over the Blue Devils. The ladies defeated Georgia Tech in its next game but then lost to

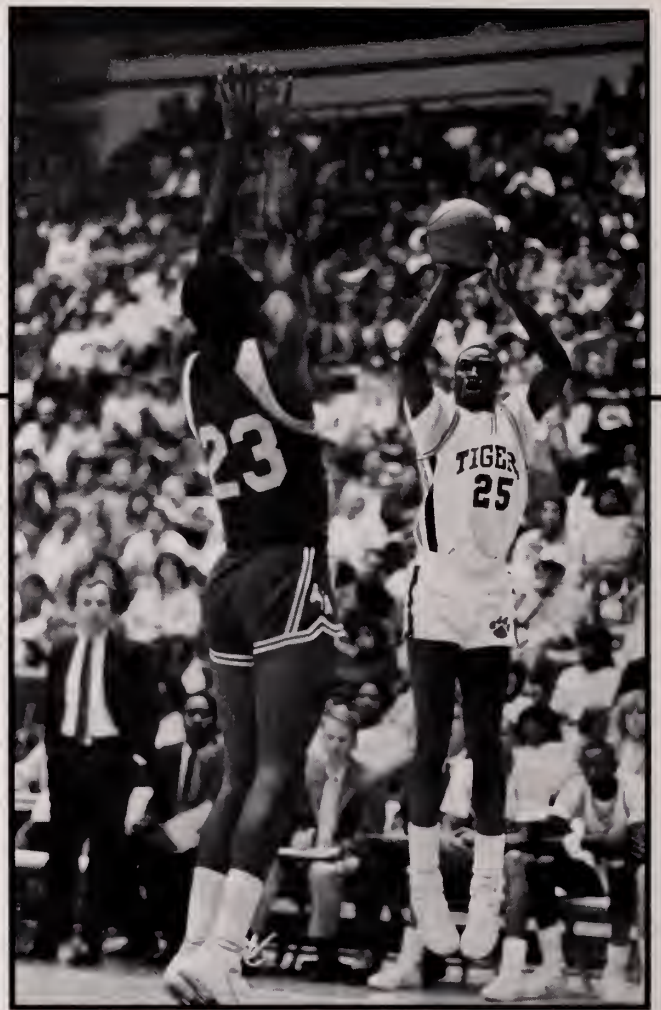

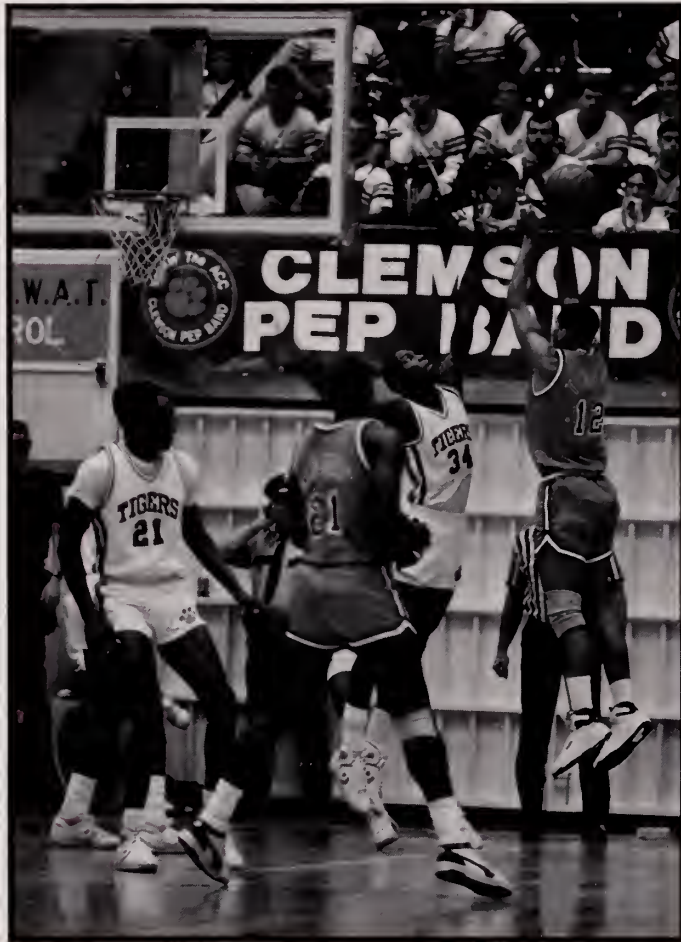

raised more than \$2,000.

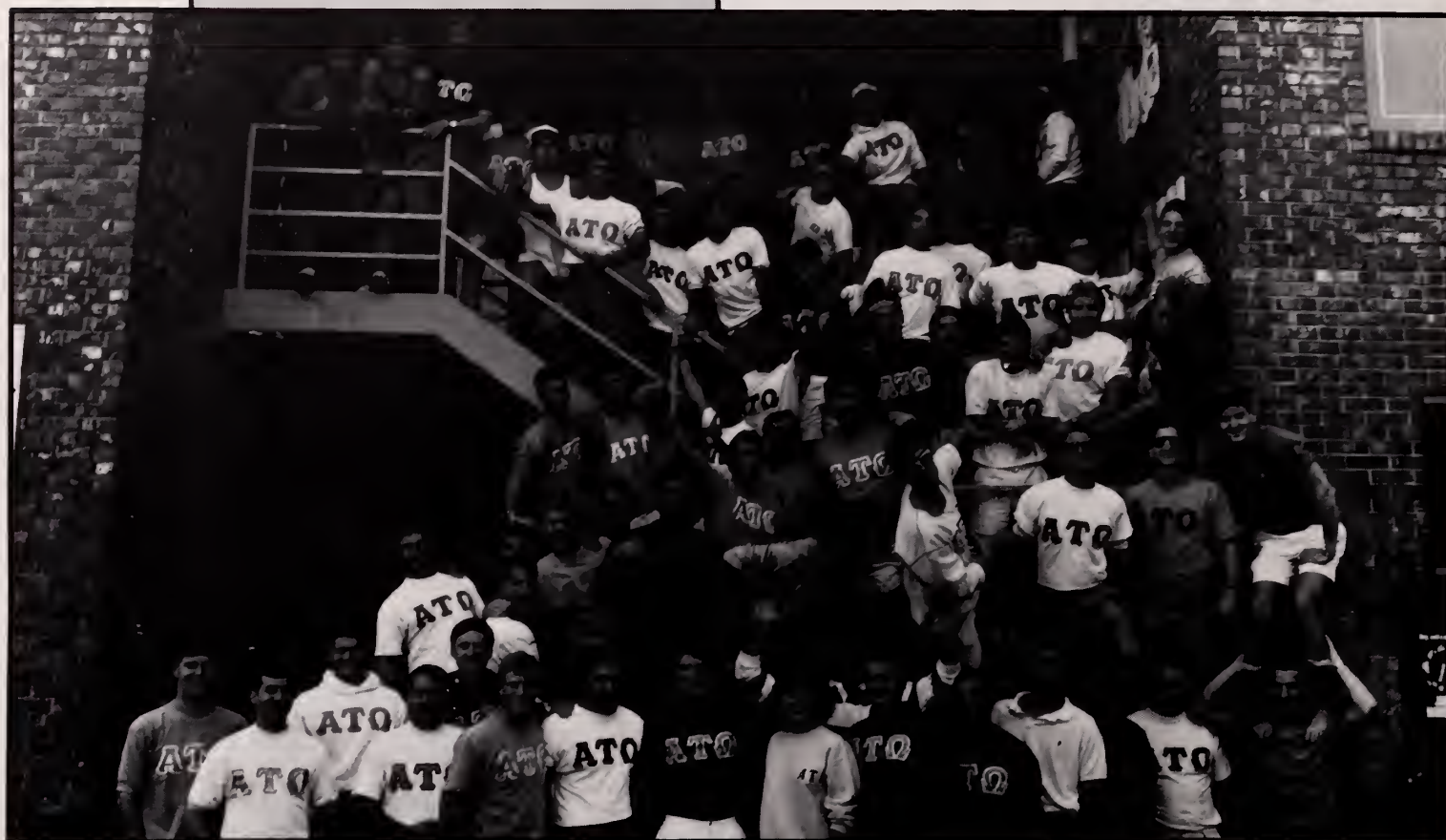

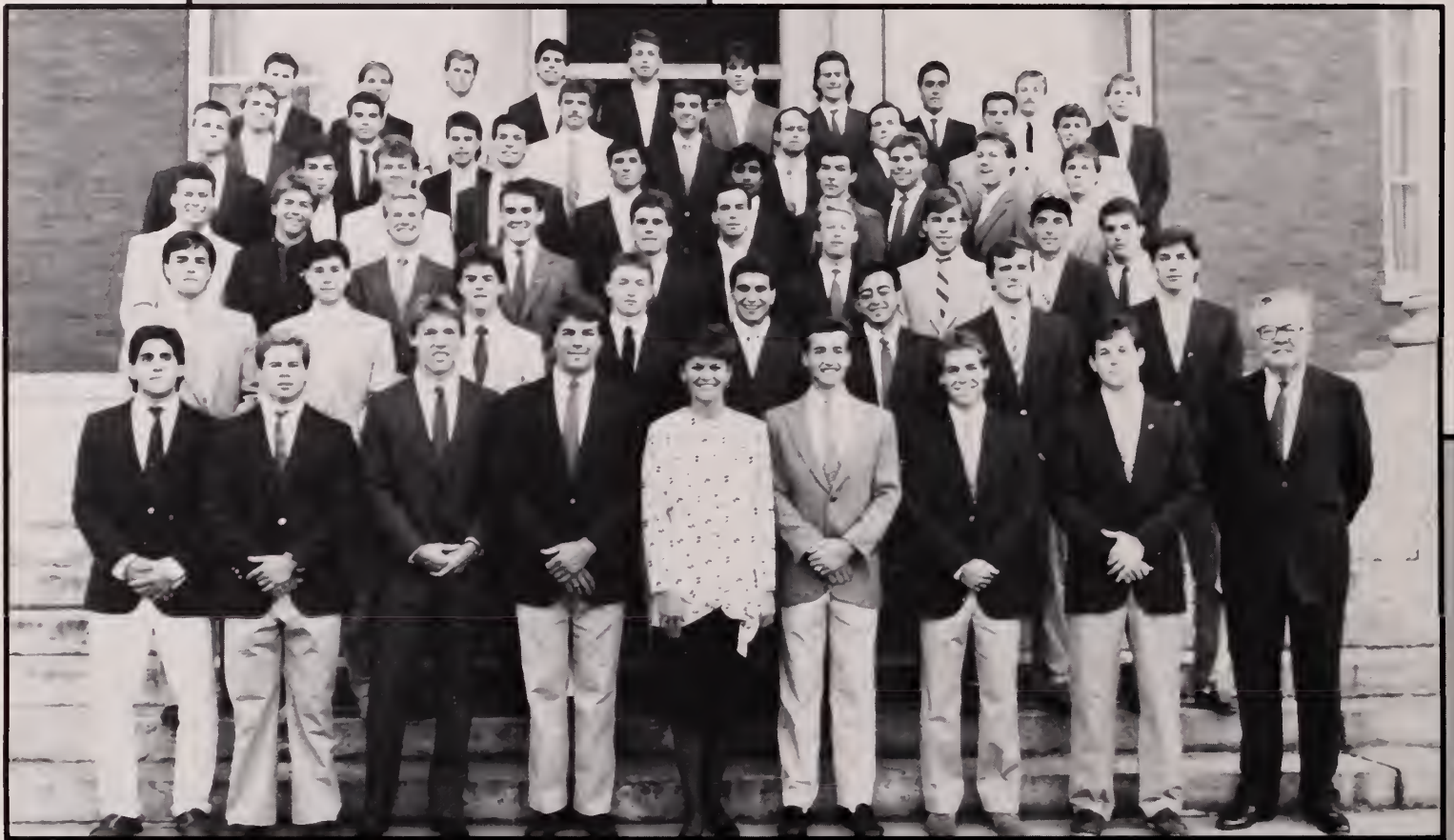

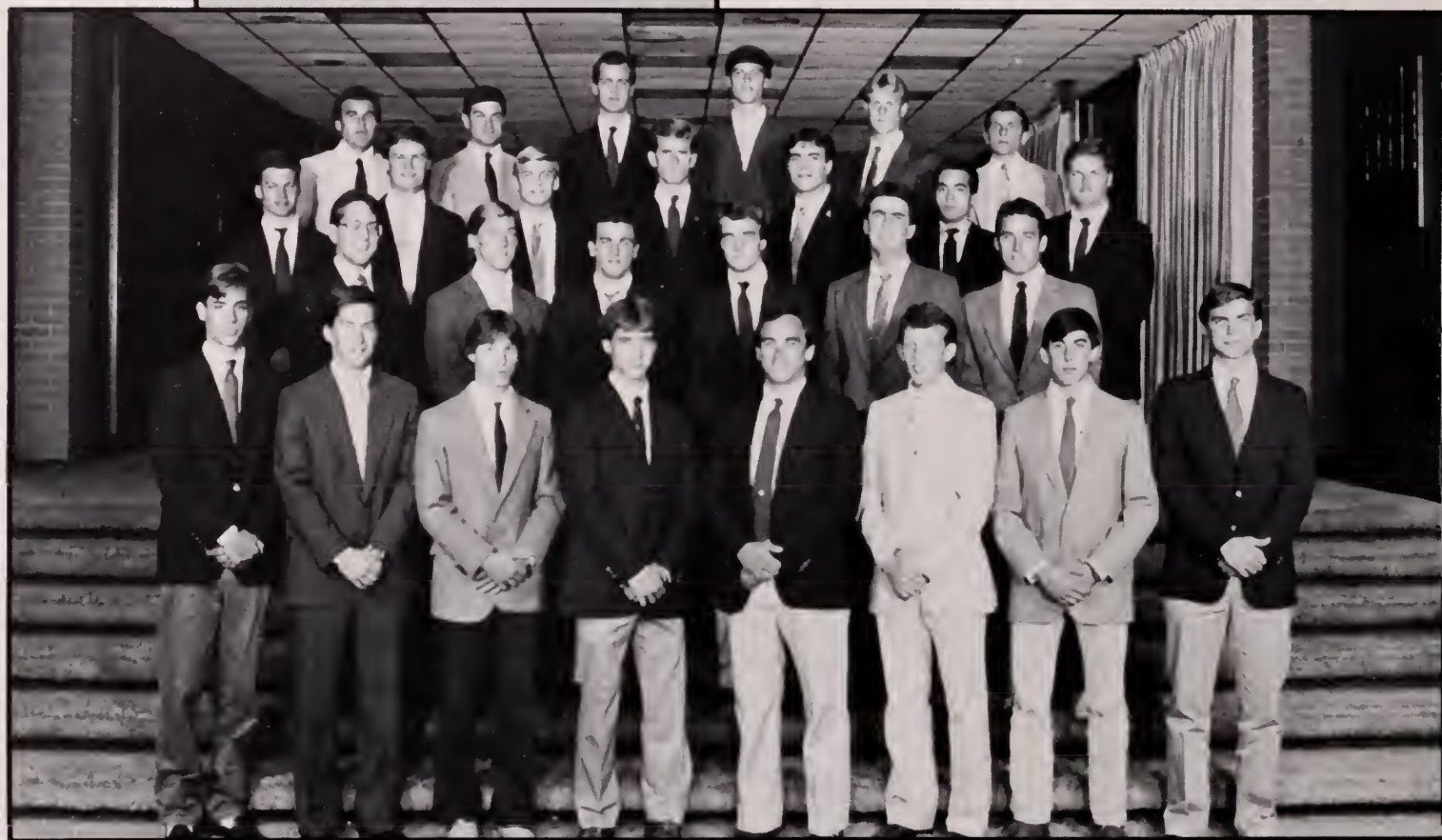
INTER- FRATER- NITY COUNCIL

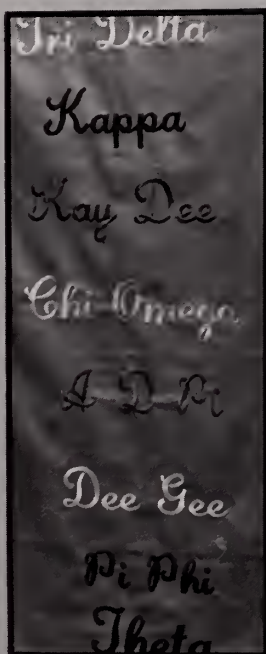
A GREEK'S GALLERY OF NECESSITIES

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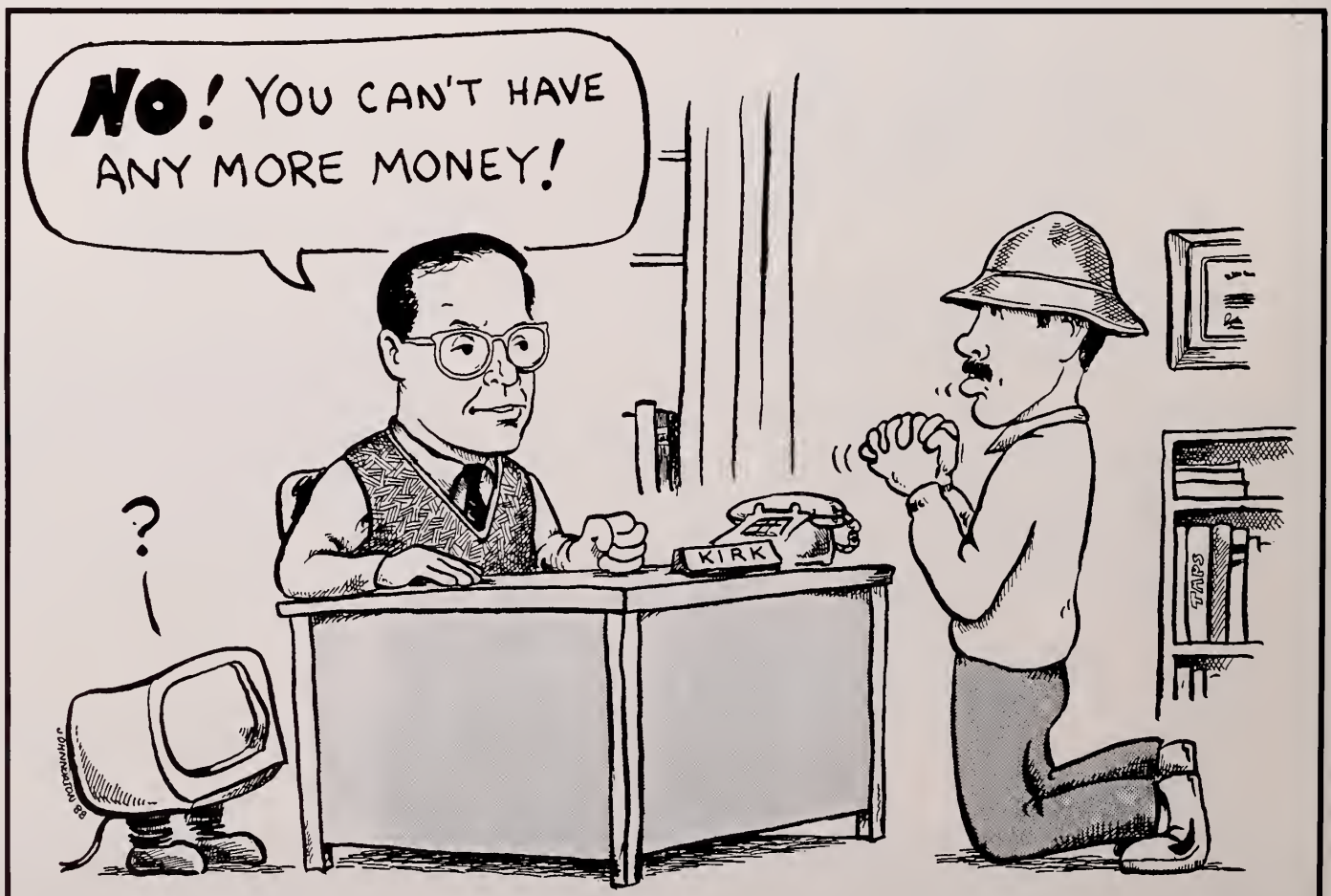
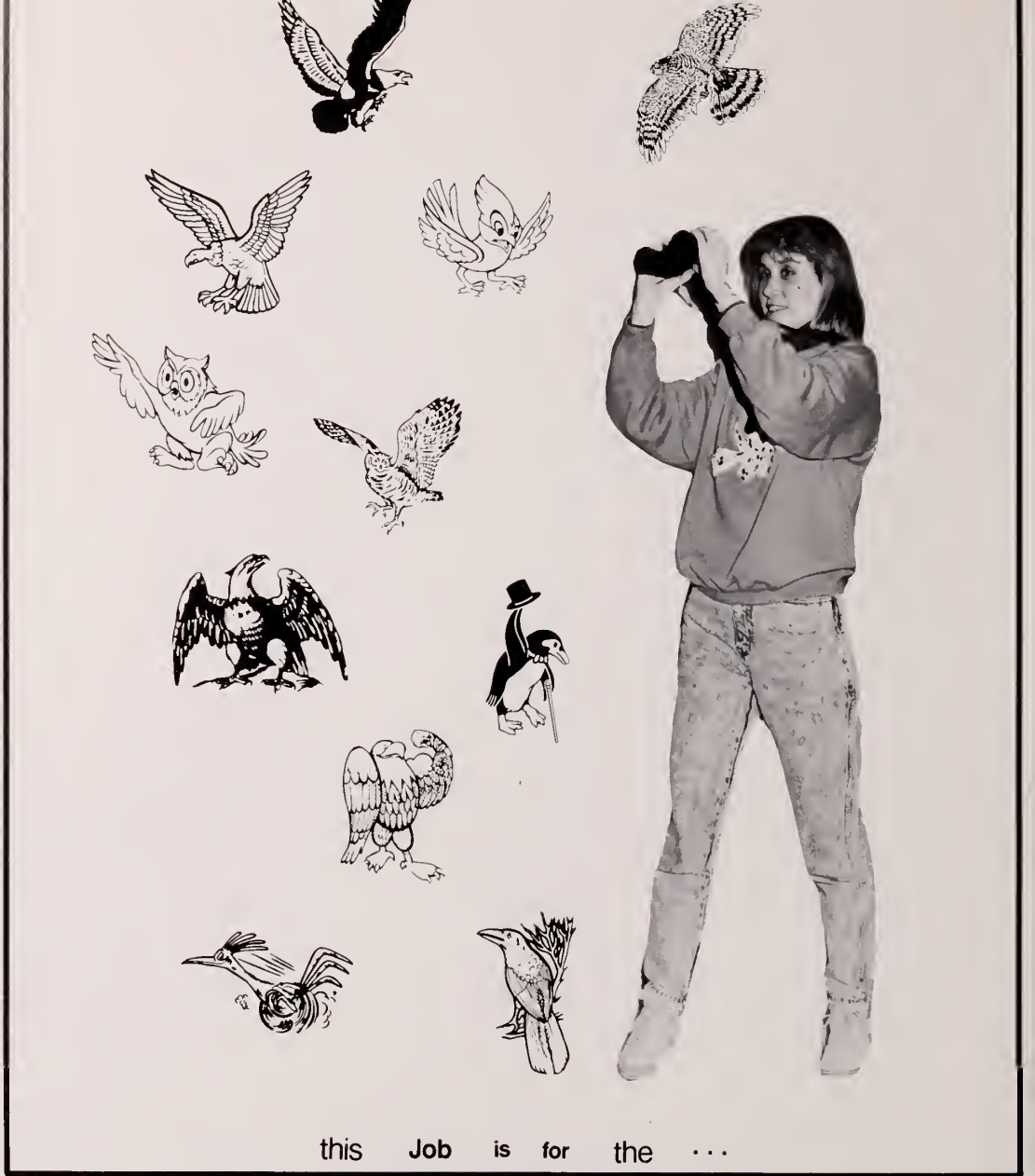


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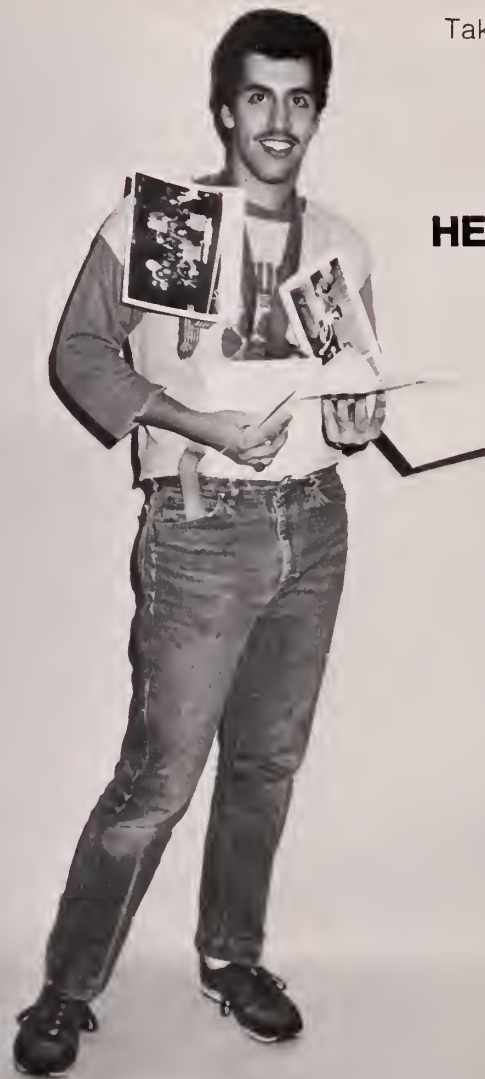


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The End Of A Year And The End Of An Era

Potential Clemson students (in about ten years) get a bird's eye view of the amphitheater and reflection pond.



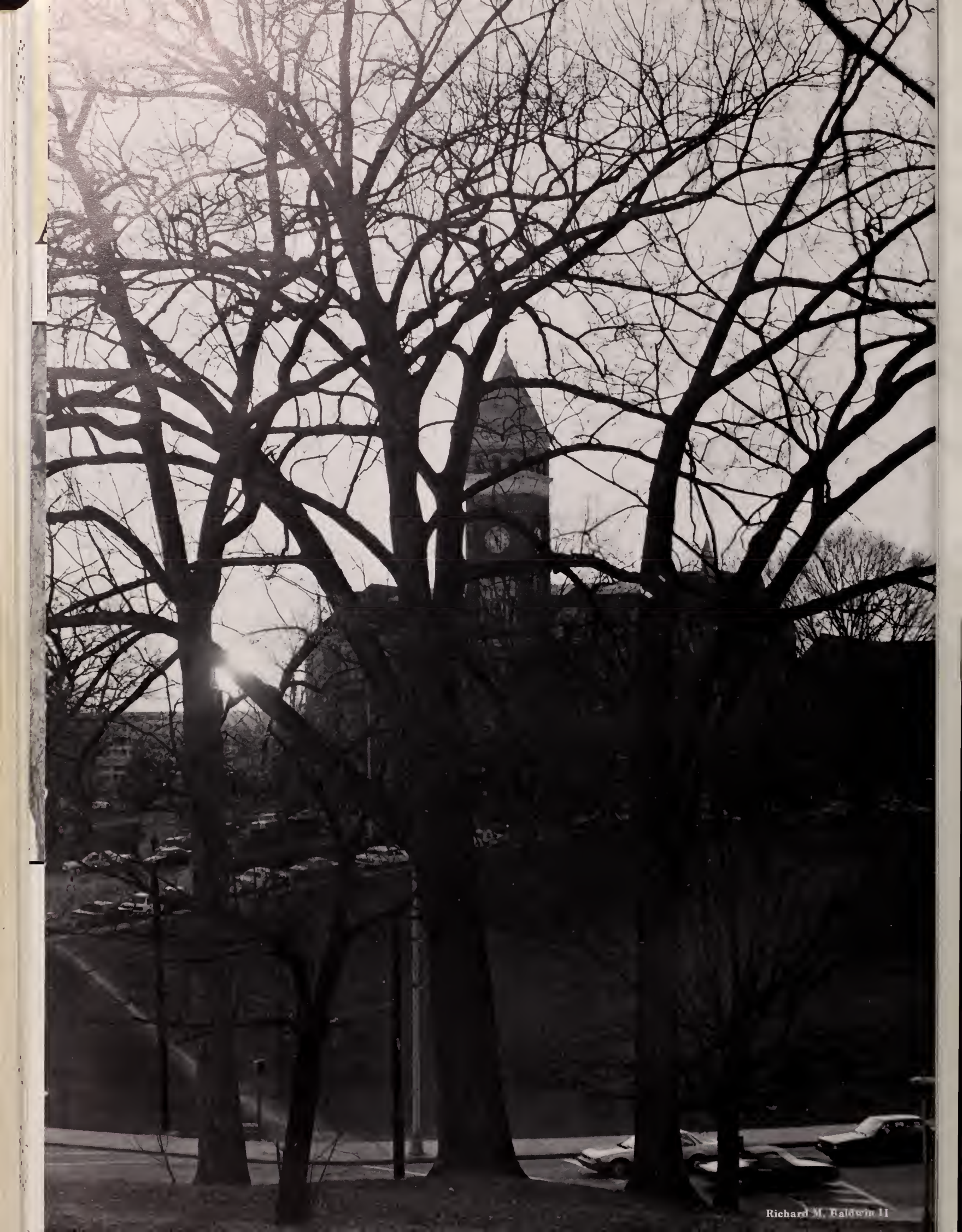
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
