DON'T DRINK AND DRIVE!

Every hour a teenager dies in an alcohol or drug-related motor vehicle accident.

Mixing alcohol or drugs and driving results in the deaths of about 8,000 teenagers a year in this country. In fact, drinking and driving is the leading cause of death among teenagers.

Drivers aged 16-24, who represent only 22 percent of all drivers, cause 44 percent of all nighttime alcoholrelated accidents.

The death rate for teenage drunk drivers is higher because the effects of alcohol are greater on young people, and because they are more inexperienced drivers.

Your chances of getting caught are better than ever with Illinois' new drunk driving law. If convicted, you will lose your driving privileges for at least one year and your insurance rates will soar.

Don't let someone talk you into wasting your life or others. Resist the pressure to drink and drive and urge your friends to do the same.

THE FACTS:

• Young adults in Illinois are convicted for driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs (DUI) more than any other age group.

• In Illinois, a person is legally considered to be under the influence when the alcohol concentration is .10 percent or more, based on a ratio of alcohol to blood or breath.

• <u>Any amount of alcohol</u> may impair the ability to drive safely.

• Since Illinois' tough new law went into effect, DUI arrests by the Illinois State Police in 1983 increased 86% over 1981 arrests. DUI convictions on 1983 arrests increased 81% over 1981 arrests and convictions. Illinois traffic deaths decreased by about 300, or 17%, in 1983 compared to 1981.

FAKE ID's

It is now a federal offense to make or use fake identification cards. The penalties for making a fake ID are: Maximum fine of \$25,000 and possible jail for five years. ITTE LITEUTU.

 Alcohol is a drug. It is absorbed into the bloodstream and quickly carried to the brain and other parts of the body.

• After alcohol reaches the bloodstream, its actions are irreversible.

• Long before the obvious signs of intoxication appear, alcohol use can produce these common physiological and psychological changes that affect driving:

Impulsive responses & risk taking. Reduced tolerance to glare.

Reduced muscle coordination and reaction time.

Underestimation of speed and glare.

Exaggeration of any emotional instability.

Reduced attentiveness, increased drowsiness.

Inability to clearly see objects in motion.

Reduced peripheral vision.

• There is no shortcut to sobering up. Coffee and cold showers only create a wide-awake, wet, cold drunk.

Driving under the influence (DUI) means that a driver is unable to safely operate a vehicle as a result of the influence of alcohol, another drug, or a combination of the two.

Persons convicted of DUI in Illinois face these penalties:

Loss of drivers license for at least one year.

- Possible imprisonment up to a year.
- Maximum fine of \$1,000.

In addition to the criminal penalties, persons convicted of DUI can expect to pay about \$1,000 to \$5,000 or more. Costs and insurance vary depending on age, location, and other factors.


