## YOU ARE INTITED

Ruth Jensen Somers, who divides her time between Telegraph Hill and her new home in Aspen, Colorado, designed by our George Rockrise, invites Dwellers to look her up if they visit Aspen. Her address is Box 977, Aspen and the phone is listed in the local phone directory.

On October 1, 1957, the Dwellers made a formal request of the San Francisco Board of "upervisors to have placed underground poles fd wires on certain streets and areas of Telegraoh H117. Due to the $z \frac{1}{2}$ mile per year limit, which is required of the Utilities Companies, there is not much mileage available after main city projects such as redevelopment and boulevard widening, etc. ere cared for. In order to avoid refusal to consider our request because of an excessive mimount of milaage, we broke down the proposal into five stages (and expressed willingress to take what ever fraction of muleage which might be available at any time). By dint of eternal vigilance and persistence on our part, the Public Works Department agreed to place our request on a calendar program.

At last, our objective is ghoul to be realized, and work on the first stage is about to be started (May) and finished by September (??) 1962. The total program of 5 steges is scheduled to be finished by 2964.

Strents in Stage I are Telegraph H 111 Plaza dd Boulevard; Lombard from Kearny to Columb T1s; Kearny from Lombard to Chestmut; and onestnu: from Winthrop to Grent Avenue.

Underground service is installad ot the curb line. Pfoperty owners are responsible for the connection from there to their premises. The Hill Dwellers have ascertained that Grandi Electric--WAlnut 1-2i.41, Suoreme Electric Co--YUkon 2-44.21 and Emi]. J. Weber Electric Co-MGinlock 1-6961 will be interested in making bids on this work. The Deellees cannot assurie any responsibility for any arrangements made betwean these companies and the individual owners.

Also being installed in the service trench w111 be a oonduit for MTV Gommanications Signal Corp", 990 Filbert Street (Mr. Ircopi) ORdivay 3-6900. You might, be interested in improving your TV reception by making provision for their relay service.

## THE TIBURON BRIDGE

On Jamuary 2\%h, your Zoning Comnittee was stunned to learn that our State Legislature had appropriated $\$ 500,000$ for a study of a second Marin crossing, the San Francisco Terminus to be between Sansome and Stockton Stroets. This bill was launched by State Senator I. Bugene Mcateer.

According to the San Franoisco Main Crosaing Progress Report of February 1962, the bridge approaches were to start from the Embarcadero, rising suif'tly alonp the Northerly and Sasterly slopes of Telegraph Hill to the vicinity of Kearny and Chestnut Streets, then asoend over Pier 37 and thence to Tiburon with ane leg on Angel Island. The portion ahchored to Telegraph Hill would be at, such a height that the ramainins residences in the vicinity would be laft aringing in the dark shadows with a view of the bottom of the bridge deck.

The San Frenctsoo Dlanning Commission unanimously opposed the buildink of the bridge in this location. Vour Comittee alerted our rembers to urite to Senator MoAteer, opoosing this bridge proposel. Unon hearing of this opoosition, Senatior McAteer helted all further tests and studies and recommended the return of the unsvent funds amounting to $\$ 300,000$ to the generel fund and presented a resolution to the State Senate calling for an overall study of transportetion needs of the Byy Area. The bridge is forestalled for the present pending the outcome of the overall stady. However, we stitil must contimue to be on our fuard.

McAteer says, "there are several persuasive reasons for stopoing the plans to take borings and conduct a finenoial gtudy of the second crossing. One of the most compelling is the strong feeling of lonp-time residents of Telegraph Hill that a hridge, anchored in that area, no matter how beautifully constructed, sould impair the Hill's scenic value. Reaching a solution to our city's urgent transoortation problems mast be weighed agajnst. the equally vital mattar of preserving its natural beauty,"

## NORTHERN WATERFRONT

The Height Limftation for the Northern Waterfront is still being considered by the Boend of Supervisors. A new scheme of Iand coverage has been presented by those opposed to the 40 -foot limitation and the Planning Department is studying this proposal. No definite action has been taken to date and it will require about six weeks to complete the study.

Your Board of Directors, acting on the recommendation of the Zoning Conmittee, voted to Engage Patrigia Carson (Mrs. Robert Maior) as ccunsel to reoresent the Dwellers at future hearings on this problem.
