Telephone and City Directories in the Library of Congress: A Finding Guide

The Library of Congress makes available to the public an extensive collection of current and non-current telephone, city, and reverse telephone (crisscross) directories for the United States and many foreign countries. These directories are available in a variety of formats and locations. For information on a particular type of directory, consult the table of contents below and then refer to the appropriate page of the finding guide. For further information, please consult the reference librarians in the Local History and Genealogy Reading Room (LJ G42) or in the Main Reading Room (LJ 100).

Current Directories

U.S. TELEPHONE DIRECTORIES

Current U.S. telephone directories (white and yellow pages) are located on Deck 46, which is entered through Alcove 4 in the Main Reading Room. They are arranged alphabetically by state, shelved before the city and reverse telephone directories for that state.

Since many of these directories contain listings for more than one community, you may need to consult two reference tools in order to determine which telephone book contains the listings for a particular community. The first tool to examine is Phonefiche's *Community Cross-Reference Index*, found on the consulting table adjacent to the U.S. directories. It consists of two sections: a "Community Index" which identifies the directory in which a specific community's listing can be found; and "Directory Coverage," a list of all the communities covered by a specific directory. If you cannot find a listing for a community in the *Cross-Reference Index*, consult the card catalog, which is located near the directory collection. The labels on the catalog drawers are color coded for easy identification: **blue** is for the U.S. telephone directory catalog.

U.S. CITY DIRECTORIES

The latest editions of city directories are located on Deck 46, which is entered through Alcove 4 in the Main Reading Room. They are arranged alphabetically by state, shelved after the telephone directories and before the reverse telephone directories for that state.

Since many of these directories contain listings for more than one community, you should examine the card catalog, which is located near the directory collection on Deck 46, to determine which city directory contains the listings for a particular community. The labels on the catalog drawers are color coded for easy identification: **pink** is for the city directory catalog.

City directories often provide additional information about individuals such as place of employment and name of spouse. The entries are arranged alphabetically by last name and also by address and telephone number. City directories are compiled through door-to-door surveys and are published at irregular intervals.

Researchers should be aware, however, that there are no current city directories for many major U.S. cities—among them Washington, D.C., New York City, Chicago, and Los Angeles. Therefore, some editions shelved on Deck 46 may be many years out-of-date.

U.S. REVERSE TELEPHONE DIRECTORIES

Current U.S. reverse telephone directories are located on Deck 46, which is entered through Alcove 4 in the Main Reading Room. They are arranged alphabetically by state, shelved after the telephone and city directories for that state.

A list of current reverse telephone directories is found in the card catalog, located near the directory collection on Deck 46. The labels on the catalog drawers are color coded for easy identification: **green** is for the reverse telephone directory catalog.

Reverse telephone directories (often called street address or crisscross directories) are usually published annually for major metropolitan areas. Listings are based on telephone directories and are arranged both by address and telephone number. There is no listing by name.

FOREIGN TELEPHONE DIRECTORIES

Many current foreign telephone directories are located on Deck 46, which is entered through Alcove 4 in the Main Reading Room. They are arranged alphabetically by country, and are shelved following the United States directories.

An incomplete list of current foreign telephone directories is found in the card catalog, located near the directory collection on Deck 46. The labels on the catalog drawers are color coded for easy identification: **yellow** is for the foreign telephone directory catalog.

Some recent foreign directories are available in the appropriate area studies reading rooms.

FOREIGN CITY DIRECTORIES

The Library has a few current foreign city directories. Unlike the directories described in previous sections, they are housed in the closed stacks and have call numbers. To determine whether the Library has a directory for a certain city, search in the Main Catalog and the Library of Congress Online Catalog using the following search strategy: NAME OF CITY AND SUBDIVISION DIRECTORIES. Then request the directory in the Main Reading Room or the Local History and Genealogy Reading Room by filling out a call slip as indicated on the sample below:

One should be aware, however, that for many foreign city directories the latest edition may be many years out-of-date.

Canadian City Directories

Directories for most Canadian cities are treated differently from other foreign directories. Although they are housed in the closed stacks, they do **NOT** have call numbers and should be requested by filling out a call slip as indicated on the sample below:

U.S. AND FOREIGN TELEPHONE DIRECTORIES ON THE INTERNET

An alternative to searching current telephone directories is provided by numerous online databases searchable over the Internet. For the U.S., try *Switchboard.com* or *Anywho.com*. A site called *Telephone Directories on the Web (teldir.com)* provides links to many online foreign directories.

Non-Current (Old)

U.S. TELEPHONE DIRECTORIES ON MICROFICHE (PHONEFICHE)

Anyone who is interested in U.S. telephone directories dating from 1976 through 1995 should make use of *Phonefiche*, a ProQuest microfiche product housed in the Microform Reading Room (LJ 107). This self-service collection consists of yellow and white pages telephone directories for most U.S. cities and towns. For most years, there is a published guide to the collection titled *Community Cross-Reference Index*. These guides, shelved on top of the cabinets housing the microfiche, identify the directory in which a specific community's listing can be found.

U.S. TELEPHONE DIRECTORIES ON PAPER

To examine non-current U.S. telephone directories (white and yellow pages) for years not included in the set of *Phonefiche*, one may request the paper copies in the Local History and Genealogy Reading Room by filling out a call slip as indicated on the sample below:

You should be aware, however, that pre-1976 directories for fourteen states, the District of Columbia, and Chicago have been microfilmed by the Library of Congress and can only be requested in the Microform Reading Room (LJ 107). Additional information about this microfilming project is contained in the following section.

U.S. TELEPHONE DIRECTORIES ON MICROFILM

A major project is underway to microfilm the Library of Congress's collection of telephone directories from the pre-*Phonefiche* period (before 1976). At present, directories for Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, the District of Columbia, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Iowa, Maryland, Pennsylvania, and the city of Chicago can be requested in the Microform Reading Room (LJ 107). A guide to the holdings for each locality is kept at the Reference Desks in the Local History and Genealogy Reading Room and the Main Reading Room.

If you are interested in telephone directories for New York City and the surrounding area published from 1878–1959, you should consult a self-service microfilm collection in the Microform Reading Room.

U.S. REVERSE TELEPHONE DIRECTORIES

Non-current editions of U.S. reverse telephone directories (often titled street address or crisscross directories) are housed in the closed stacks. They can be requested in the Local History and Genealogy Reading Room by filling out a call slip as indicated on the sample below:

Reverse telephone directories are usually published annually for major metropolitan areas. Listings are based on telephone directories and are arranged both by address and telephone number. There is no listing by name. An inventory of these directories can be found in a binder at the Reference Desk in the Local History and Genealogy Reading Room.

U.S. CITY DIRECTORIES ON MICROFICHE

All United States city and state directories up to and including 1860 are included in a self-service microfiche collection housed in the Microform Reading Room (LJ 107). Dorothea Spear's *American Directories Before 1860* (Z5771.S7 LH&G and Z5771.2.S68 1978 MRR Ref Desk) is a guide to this collection.

U.S. CITY DIRECTORIES ON MICROFILM

A large self-service collection of U.S. city directories on microfilm is available in the Microform Reading Room (LJ 107). More than 1,200 U.S. cities and towns are represented in the collection, which continues to grow. The years of coverage are primarily 1861 through 1960. For information on the cities included and the years available for those cities, consult the *City Directory Finding Guide* kept at the Reference Desk in the Local History and Genealogy Reading Room.

U.S. CITY DIRECTORIES ON PAPER

Many U.S. city directories in the Library of Congress are available only on paper. To identify which communities are represented and the years of coverage, consult the *City Directory Finding Guide* kept at the Reference Desk in the Local History and Genealogy Reading Room. The information in this guide comes primarily from James Neagles' *The Library of Congress: a Guide to Genealogical and Historical Resources* (Salt Lake City, Ancestry, 1989. 381 p.). To request a city directory on paper, fill out a call slip as indicated on the sample below:

FOREIGN CITY DIRECTORIES ON PAPER

To determine whether the Library has a directory for a certain city, search in the Main Catalog and the Library of Congress Online Catalog using the following search strategy: NAME OF CITY AND SUBDIVISION DIRECTORIES. Then request the directory in the Main Reading Room or the Local History and Genealogy Reading Room by filling out a call slip as indicated on the sample below:
