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The Nock or Knox Family.

HE Nock or Knox family, which was quite numerous in Dover, N. H., a hundred and fifty years ago, has entirely disappeared from that ancient town, and there is nothing but faded and almost illegible records, and a marsh which still, as it was two hundred years ago, is known as "Nock's marsh," are found to indicate that families of this name ever lived there. Oyster River, now the town of Durham, and Cocheco, now Dover, were settled very early. Many of the early settlers landed and resided for a time in Boston, before removing to Cocheco. Most of the early settlers were English, though there was a mixture of Scotch, and some from the Channel Islands. Agriculture seemed to be the chief object and employment of the early settlers, though some engaged in fishing, in trade and navigation, and, to a limited extent, in manufactures. Lumber was essential to the success of the settlement, and so lumber mills were erected as soon as materials for their construction could be had. The Indians were quite friendly when the settlement in the region of Dover was begun, and continued so for many years, with few exceptions, to the breaking out of King Philip's war in 1675. After that and for nearly three-quarters of a century after, the settlers were terribly harrassed by them; houses were pillaged and burned, many of the settlers were either killed or carried into captivity, and there were times when it seemed that the place must be entirely abandoned. But a few hardy men remained and fought it out, living for the most part in garrison houses, and carrying their arms with them wherever they went. The fall of Quebec put an end to French influence in this country, and a stop to Indian depredations in New England forever.

Among the quite early settlers of Dover was a man called Thomas

Nock. This was the way he wrote his name and his original signature may yet be seen in the archives of Rockingham county at Exeter. He was a young man when he came to Dover, and was a farmer. From what country he came is not known, though presumably from England or Scotland. His posterity varied the orthography of the paternal name in a variety of ways, and among old documents and records it is found variously written "Nock," "Nocke," "Knock," "Nox," "Noax," and "Knox." It is now invariably written Knox, and this may have been the correct spelling. If we could be sure of this, all doubt respecting his nationality would be removed, for Knox is a Scotch name, though it sometimes comes to this country by way of the north of Ireland. It is quite probable that the patriarch's name was Knox, but for some reason which does not now appear, he chose the orthography which we find in the old records. Just when he came or in what ship is unknown. If he stopped in Boston, he left no record there. He was taxed in Dover in 1662-5, but he had doubtless then been there some years and had married. Among those whom young Knox found at Cocheco, was Henry Tibbetts,* who had a family of grown up sons and daughters. One of these, Rebecca Tibbetts, became the wife of Thomas Knox. The year they were married is not known. Thomas Knox had a grant of land in 1652. He died as the result of an accident, October 29, 1666, leaving a widow and five children, the youngest being only about eight months old. Three years later, that is, September 28, 1669, his widow married Philip Benmore,† and died a widow March 30, 1680.

The descendants of Thomas Knox, with few exceptions, continued to reside in Dover and vicinity for nearly a century. Dover once embraced a much larger territory than it now has, the towns of Durham and Somersworth, including Rollinsford, having been taken off and made separate towns. Some of the early families of Knox lived in Durham, and some in Somersworth, while some crossed the Salmon Falls river into Maine. They also settled in Rochester, and several of them were original proprietors of that

^{*}Henry Tibbetts had a grant of a house lot at Dover Neck in 1643. In 1656 he had a large grant "between St. Albans and Quamphegan." He was taxed in Dover in 1675. In 1679 "widow Tibbet and her son Jeremy," were taxed instead. He left a large family and has a numerous posterity scattered throughout New England.

[†]Philip Benmore was taxed at Dover Neck, 1670-75. His will, dated May 20, 1676, and proved June 27, 1676, gives all his property to his wife, Rebecca (Nock) Benmore. His kinsmen, John Evans and Richard Rich, are named executors.

town. From about the year 1750, the Knox, Tibbets, Ricker and some other families, crossed into Maine like an invasion, settling in Kittery, Berwick, Coxall now Lyman, Lebanon, Shapleigh and Newfield. A few Knox families went up the river on the New Hampshire side, and settled in Milton, Wakefield, Wolfborough and Farmington. From these towns, after a few years, they went to various places, some to the coast towns of Eastern Maine and some to the far West. As a general thing, they have been farmers and mechanics, and have had little to do with public affairs. One branch of the family settled in Saco, and Chaplain George Knox of one of the Maine regiments during the late war, who was killed by a fall from his horse while at the front when his regiment was engaged, was of this branch. He was an able as well as a brave man. George William Knox of Washington, D. C., proprietor of Knox's Express, and probably the largest private express enterprise in the country, was of another branch of the family. His business career will be further described hereafter. The Knox family has ever been patriotic. In the French and Indian wars they were conspicuous, and in the war for independence many of them entered the service, some serving three or four terms of enlistment. In the war of the rebellion, too, the Knox race was not wanting in patriotism and devotion to the cause of the Union.

In and around Dover the Knox families have frequently intermarried with the Wentworths, the Lords, the Rickers and other leading families. The following record embraces only a few families, such as could readily be obtained, but it is hoped that this may stimulate some one to undertake a more extended genealogy. Although there is some doubt as to the orthography of the name, yet as the spelling "Knox" has been generally adopted, this method will be used in the following pages. It is not an easy matter to obtain family records, including dates, in the vicinity of Dover, and one reason is that many of the early records were burned by the Indians. The house of Rev. John Buss, minister at Oyster River, was burned about 1694, and all his records of marriages and baptisms were destroyed. This was a serious loss, and is still felt by those interested in family records. The names and dates in the following pages have been chiefly gleaned from town records, from deeds and wills; a few from church records, and a few from Master Tate's Journal, Tate having been a famous school-master in Somersworth in the olden time. Still many dates are wanting and can

never be supplied. The compiler is under obligation to C. W. Tibbetts and Dr. J. R. Ham of Dover, for assistance in gleaning the material for this work.

Thomas' Knox, Jr. (Thomas') made his will February 15, 1676. He bequeathed to his brother Sylvanus twenty acres of land formerly granted his father, and lying next to Thomas Beard's land, and between Cocheco and the marsh commonly called Nock's marsh, and two steers. To his sister Rebecca, twenty acres of land. To his brother Henry, twenty acres of land, his musket and bible. To his uncle Jeremy Tibbetts, his sheep. His mother, Rebecca, is named as sole executrix. Nock's marsh is so called at the present time.

Sylvanus² Knox (Thomas¹), was taxed at Dover, N. H., in 1677. For first wife he married, April 20, 1677, Elizabeth, daughter of James Emery of Kittery, and moved to that part of Kittery now Berwick. He was a member of the Grand Jury at a court holden at York, February 24, 1690. His wife died June 6, 1704, and for second wife he married Esther (Philbrook) widow of Joseph Beard of Dover. He returned to Dover and there made his will, March

^{*}Charles Adams, born about 1624, was taxed in Dover in 1648. He lived at Oyster River. He was killed by the Indians in 1694. His wife's name was Temperance. His son Charles was administrator, and was the father of Sarah, born 1671, married Henry Nock, and second, Eleazer Wyer.

HENRY KNOX (Thomas 1) married, January 10, 1791-2, Sarah, daughter of Charles Adams. His will is dated in 1713, and proved the year following. He mentioned his wife Sarah, whom he made sole executrix, his brother Sylvanus and his "cosins," doubtless the sons of his brother Sylvanus. No issue of his own is mentioned in his will, and they probably had no children. His widow married Eleazer Wyer of Somersworth, and a few years later she conveyed to her son-in-law, Eleazer Wyer, Jr., the land in Dover, left her by her former husband, Henry Nock.

George left four sons and five daughters, and Maturin two sons and two daughters. They have a large posterity.

[†]Captain Philip Cromwell was taxed at Dover in 1656, and at Oyster River from 1664 to 1672. Eliphalet, born Nov. 12, 1716, was the son of Samuel and Rachel Cromwell, and probably a grandson of Philip.

James' Knox (Sylvanus', Thomas') married near 1700, Abigail, daughter of James Thomas. He was known as "Elder" Nock, being ruling elder of the church at Oyster River, now Durham, N. H., of which Rev. Hugh Adams was pastor. His tragic death is thus stated by Rev. Mr. Adams in his diary: "On Friday, May 1, 1724, our worthy and desirable Elder, James Nock, was most surprisingly shot (from his horse) dead, and scalped by three Indian enemies. Oh that Christ Emanuel may speedily avenge his blood upon them!"

At one time when he was returning with his cows from the pasture, he was beset by a large band of Indians, but he fought his way through them, reached his house and taking one child himself and his wife another, they reached the woods and made their way to the nearest

He then determined to leave the paternal home and go out into the great world to seek his fortune. In the early spring of 1846, he left Belgrade and walked to Hallowell, where he took passage in the old steamer "Huntress" for Boston. There was sharp competition at that time between the boats plying on the Kennebec, and he secured his ticket for the small sum of twenty-five cents. He landed in Boston on the 6th day of April, and for a time worked at odd jobs, never turning away any kind of work that would pay. He worked a while as brakeman and then as freight conductor on the Fitchburg railroad, but two years later he was back in Maine and driving piles in Back Cove, Portland. He remained in this vicinity for about five years, engaged in various contracts, when he again struck out and found employment as conductor of a train running between Wilmington, Del., and the Peninsula. In 1856, he went westward and engaged in the lumber business in Iowa, and here he lost all his accumulations. He then returned and found employment as conductor of a sleeping car running between Philadelphia and Washington. It was in the sleeper conducted by him that President-elect Lincoln made his famous trip to Washington to assume the duties of his office in the spring of 1861. During the first three years of the war, Mr. Knox travelled either as sleeping car conductor or as mail agent.

The immense development and gigantic proportions of the express business during the war, suggested to Mr. Knox the possibilities in this line, and in 1864, he gave up railroading and started a small express business with a single team that cost about a hundred and twenty-five dollars. He subsequently took a partner with a similar outfit, but being dissatisfied with the work of his partner, he soon left him and continued business alone. There was plenty of hard work connected with the business, but Mr. Knox was a stalwart man and ever ready to put his own shoulder to the wheel. time the business grew upon his hands beyond his most sanguine expectations. Government work came to him easily and he has done some of the heaviest transportation jobs ever undertaken in Washington. He handled all the granite for the completion of the Washington monument, and most of the material for the State, War and Navy department buildings. In the adornment and embellishment of the National Capitol during the last twenty-five years, Mr. Knox has done nearly all the heavy transportation required. He has had the handling of nearly every statue erected, has moved the heavy monumental work to the National cemetery at Arlington, put in position the great safes used in the various departments, and for hauling safes and putting them in position, he constantly employs three gangs of men. His place of business in the near northwesterly foreground from the National Capitol, on B and Second streets, occupies nearly a city square. It is built of brick and is a very imposing structure. Here he has a storage room of vast proportions, and his business is fully equal to its capacity.

Over the east branch in the District, and Prince George's County, Mr. Knox has a farm of nearly two hundred acres, all underdrained with tile and furnished with comfortable buildings in New England style. He has three large barns in which he stores annually, two hundred and fifty tons of hay. His farming operations are extensive, and in improved farm implements, he keeps abreast of the times. His Washington stables supply an almost unlimited amount of dressing, and by this means the highest degree of fertility is He gives employment to hundreds of reached and maintained. men, and his business requires the labor of nearly two hundred horses. He has his own blacksmith and carriage shop, and taken altogether, his is a very large establishment, much the largest private express establishment in the country. He is well known by everybody at the National Capitol and is deservedly popular. He does a square business, and enjoys the fullest confidence of his numerous patrons, including the governmental departments, whose transportation is almost exclusively entrusted to him. He does not forget his native State, but makes occasional visits to the valley of the Kennebec and the home of his boyhood days in the good old town of Belgrade. He seeks out Maine citizens temporarily residing in Washington and delights in showing them courtesies in various ways. He has but few Knox relations now residing in Maine. Of his father's children numbering nine, only two survive beside himself, and both of these are with him in Washington. Of his mother's family, the Sherburnes, he has several uncles and aunts living in Maine.

PATRIOTIC RECORD.

Sergeant James Nock belonged to a scouting party, and three times during the year 1723, he was allowed sums on muster rolls of his company which he presented to the Council. The largest of these amounted to £61-2-6.

In 1712, Zachariah Nock was in Captain Gerrish's Scouting Company.

In August, 1745, James Nock was Sergeant of Captain Joseph Hanson's troop of scouts.

In the list of train soldiers in Somersworth in 1746, were Samuel, Henry, Nathaniel, Drisco and James Nock.

In 1740, Ebenezer Nock was a member of a scouting company in Somersworth in command of Capt. Tristram Coffin.

Jonathan Nock served in the expedition to Canada in 1758, and died in the service.

In the Revolutionary war, quite a number of persons bearing the name of Nock served more or less in the Continental army. Residing near the New Hampshire line, many of them belonging in Maine served in New Hampshire regiments, and were carried on the rolls as residence, "transient." Most of them served subsequently in Massachusetts organizations, and their names are found on the original rolls now on file at the State House in Boston.

In Captain Stephen Hodgdon's company at Kittery Point, Nov. 5, 1775, were Joseph Nock and Drisco Nock.

In Captain Ford's company at Kittery Point, Nov. 5, 1775, were Eleazer Nock and Nathaniel Nock.

In Captain Moses Yeaton's company at Pierce's Island, Nov. 5, 1775, was John Nock.

In Captain Emerson's company of Colonel Joseph Cilley's regiment, in the "Jerseys" and at Valley Forge, &c., were Jonathan Nock and Jedediah Nock.

Jonathan and Jedediah Nock, "transient," also served in Colonel Webster's New Hampshire regiment.

In Captain Joseph Badger's company of Colonel Evans' regiment (Canada Expedition), was John Nock.

In Capt. Ebenezer Frye's company of Colonel Cilley's regiment, was Samuel Nock.

The following Nocks served in Massachusetts regiments:

David Nock, age 17, 5 feet 6 inches, ruddy complexion, residence Berwick. Eleazer Nock, age 26, 5 feet 8 inches, dark complexion, residence, Lebanon, Maine, served in Captain Waterman's company of Colonel Greenleaf's regiment.

Zachariah Nock, age 27, 5 feet 8 inches, light complexion, residence, Berwick. Also the following from Berwick: Nicholas, Stephen, John, James and Jonathan, and Sylvanus Nock, residence Biddeford.

WAR OF THE REBELLION.

NOTES.

James Nock (11) was chosen deacon and overseer and church warden of the church in Loveland precinct of Durham, N. H., April 20, 1721. He was ordained to these several offices by the laid on hands of Rev. Samuel Moody, Rev. Hugh Adams and Elder Sayward of York. This same James Nock was doubtless the Sergeant James Nock of a scouting party spoken of farther along. He was killed by the Indians in 1724, and his son James, Jr. (39) was probably the Sergeant James Nock of Captain Hanson's scouting party.

In February, 1733-4, Captain Samuel Tibbetts, aged 67, testified that he had lived in Dover all his life; that he never knew old Mr. Thomas Nock, but had heard his mother say he was killed by a cart before he (Tibbetts) was born, etc.

In 1731, Job Emery of Berwick, sold to Zachariah Nock (12) of Somersworth, housewright, two whole rights of the common lands in Berwick. Job Emery was a son of James Emery, and a brother to the wife of Sylvanus Nock (3).

In his will Drisco Nock (17) of Somersworth, bequeaths among other articles, silver knee buckles and shoe buckles and a white coat, the latter valued at £14.

June 27, 1733, Mary (34) daughter of Elder James Nock deeded to John Crommett all her interest in house and lands where her father once lived, situated in Durham, on the east side of the road leading from Exeter to Dover meeting house.

Joseph Simons married Elizabeth Nock, Feb. 8, 1727-8. She was probably the daughter of Elder James Nock.

There was a William Knox in Conway, N. H., who was reported able to bear arms in 1775. He was probably of the Scotch-

Irish family which settled early in Londonderry or Antrim, N. H., and has representatives in Chester and Pembroke, N. H.

Jedediah Nock (51) of Portsmouth, N. H., son of Samuel of Somersworth, was a prominent soldier in the Revolutionary war and served several enlistments in New Hampshire regiments. He and Jonathan Nock (127) served under General Washington through the most of the war.

The compiler is not certain whether the Thomas Nock who married Sarah Scates and was drowned in Little River, was the son of Ebenezer (14) or of Nathaniel (22). Each had a Thomas born about the same time.

Thomas Nock of Berwick, deceased prior to 1809. His wife Lydia was appointed administratrix and the estate was proved to be insolvent. In the settlement of the estate, Jonathan Nock acted as attorney for the widow. Among the creditors were Jonathan and Moses Nock. This Thomas Nock was a farmer and also a manufacturer of gun powder. He was probably Thomas (47).

Daniel Nock (126) was a farmer and resided in Lebanon. He enlisted in the patriot army in the Revolutionary war when less than seventeen years of age and served through most of the war. In 1812 though long since exempt from service on account of age, he entered the army as a substitute for a neighbor of his who happened to be drafted and did not wish to serve. He served until the close of the war.

Ada Knox, family not known, married George Gerrish and resided in Lebanon, near Milton, N. H. After her husband's death, she gave to the Congregational church in Lebanon the sum of three hundred dollars, and to the parish in Milton, five hundred dollars. She was a sister of George Knox.

Zachariah Nock (12) was the owner of mills near Quampahegan, in Berwick and deeded the same to his sons, Joshua and Benjamin. He also deeded to them lands in Berwick in 1769.

The Sherburne Family.

HE Sherburnes of New Hampshire, have ever been among the most noted families of that State. They have been noted in war, in politics, in business and in social life. In the early Indian wars, they bore a prominent part, and in the war for independence they were a very patriotic race. They have intermarried with other leading families, and in and around Portsmouth, have always been conspicuous. They are said to have sprang from a distinguished English family, from one Richard Sherburne of Stoney Hurst, who in 1543, was called upon to furnish his quota of men to fight against the Scotch under the Duke of Somerset, and who was knighted on the field on the 11th day of May, 1544, when only twenty-two years of age. He married Mand, the fifth child of Sir Richard Bold, time of King Henry Sir Richard died in prison and was succeeded by his son, also Sir Richard, who dying without issue, the estate and title passed to his brother Sir Nicholas Sherburne, Bart, who married Catherine, daughter of Sir Edward Charlton. It was from this family, that the emigrant Henry' Sherburne is said to have sprang. He came to Strawberry Bank, now Portsmouth, N. H., in 1631, under the patronage of Captain John Mason, the proprietor of New Hampshire. He married at Portsmouth, Rebecca, daughter of Ambros Gibbins who died in 1667. He died in 1680.

John Sherburne (John Samuel Henry) son of the preceding, is said to have moved from Hampton, N. H., to Epping. 1759, Henry Dearbon, John Sherburne Jr. and Henry Dearborn Jr. all of Epping, sold land to Joseph Sweat of Kingston. In 1783, John Sherburne of Epping and wife Miriam, sold land to Samuel Morrill. These items sufficiently indicate his long residence in Epping, but he has no family record there. He certainly had the three children here given and probably others. A Lincoln county record at Wiscasset states that "Job Sherburne of Epping, in consideration of three hundred pounds paid by my honored father, John Sherburne of Epping, yeoman," sold land in Winthrop, county

of Lincoln, Me., in the third range of lots from Hallowell line, &c.


