

When we saw some quiet strangers


Putting up a nice, clean tent.



Want to go and hear them preach.



And they were all amazed, insomuch that they questioned among themselves, saying, What thing is this? what new doctrine is this?" Mark 1:27.


Thus we sat there every evening,

Of the certain judgment day.



As they meet to pool their issues,


And resist a common foe!

From their present sorry plight.


[&]quot;From that time many of his disciples went back, and walked no more with him." John 6:66.

'Rose and stood upon their feet.


Then they gave an invitation


Unto all who would obey,

For the promised, coming Saviour


They are watching day by day,
