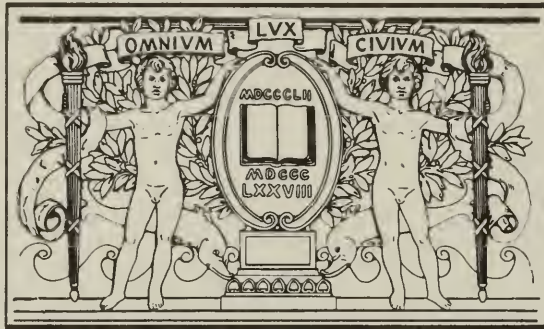


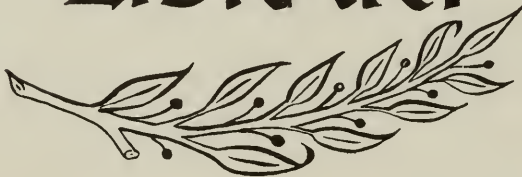

PREFACE.

PRIDE and interest, the rightful heritage of the Tiffany family, have prompted many of its members to entertain a feeling that they would like the family records compiled for publication. From my childhood I remember having heard this subject discussed.

Dr. Tiffany of Hamilton, Ontario, Canada, more than forty years ago, undertook a partial compilation ; but at his death the matter was dropped. The manuscripts drifted to England, and subsequently came into the hands of Charles L. Tiffany of New York City, who, prompted by the desire to secure a complete record of his own branch, employed a person he believed qualified to prepare such a work. In tracing the family tree, its branches were found to be so extended that Mr. Tiffany decided to make the record general, and to take in, as far as possible, the American branch of the family. The work extended far beyond his expectations, involved much labor, and a large expenditure of money, far in excess of the amount he could hope to realize from the sale of the book to members of the family at a nominal price. Disappointed in the help he had employed to complete the work, Mr. Tiffany found himself compelled to suspend preparation, and the records lay untouched for about six years, Mr. Tiffany's many business interests preventing him from again taking up the compilation. During this time, I had several conversations with Mr. Tiffany in regard to pushing the genealogy forward, with the result that, more than a year ago, he placed the work, manuscripts, and records in my hands, under a promise that I would do my best to bring it to completion. This book is the result. I realize fully its defects and its omissions ; and I know that, at best, it is merely a foundation for a future and a better work, which I trust will be undertaken by a more capable member of the Tiffany family. The records, as they came into my hands, were incomplete ; many threads were missing, the copy supplied was nearly worthless, whole generations were, seemingly, purposely left out or extracted from the copy ; every

line had to be gone over, corrected and verified. This was too much for a busy business man to undertake with any hope of a satisfactory result.

After a long and tedious effort, I found in the person of Miss Marian De Forest the ability and the temperament to get the Tiffany genealogy in shape for publication. But for Miss De Forest's interest and intelligent devotion to the work it would again have been suspended. Her training in newspaper and magazine writing qualified her, in a marked degree, for the task of picking up the loose and straggling threads and broken ends and weaving them into this completed volume. I herewith make public acknowledgment to her, and express my hearty appreciation of the intelligent and persistent interest she has manifested during her connection with the work. She has taken the matter in hand from manuscript preparation to proof-reading, and I feel sure knows more about the Tiffany family than any member of it.

To Charles L. Tiffany of New York is due the publication of the book. But for his liberal contributions of money, before and since it came into my hands, its publication would not have been possible.

Craving your indulgence for the shortcomings which I fully appreciate are to be found in this volume, and hoping it will form the groundwork for a full and complete history of the Tiffany family, to be compiled by some later generation, I subscribe myself,

EXPLANATION.

The following abbreviations are used in this work :

b.—born.	dau.—daughter.
d.—died, dead or deceased.	wid.—widow.
m.—married or marriage.	S. P.—without issue.

By the method used in this work, the line of descent from the original ancestor is easily traced. With the exception of the chapter classified under the head of "Miscellaneous Tiffanys," the members of the family are traced back to Squire Humphrey Tiffany, the original settler in this country, to whom all the Tiffanys in America are supposed to owe their origin.

For instance, suppose the following appears in the records of the genealogy—1430 John White Tiffany (1040 Archibald Tiffany, 832 John Tiffany, 420 Ephraim Tiffany, 5 James, 2 James, 1 Humphrey)—the descent can be traced by following from John White Tiffany to, 1040, Archibald Tiffany, the father of John White, whose descent, in turn, goes back to his own father, John Tiffany. Following the numbers down, the student will trace back to Ephraim Tiffany, from Ephraim to James, from James to his father James, and from the second James to Humphrey Tiffany, the original settler in America, from whom the others descended. In the miscellaneous Tiffanys, the line of descent is traced back to the first known ancestor, numbered as 1.

In the male line, the descendants are brought down to the present day, with each one given a separate space for his own family. In the female line, the descent stops with the births and deaths of the grandchildren of the female Tiffany. She and her children are numbered in rotation, but her grandchildren are designated alphabetically. It was impossible to continue the descent of the female Tiffanys beyond the third generation from the male ancestor, as it would require several volumes to complete the records were all this additional data given in the genealogy.

The Latin numerals I, II, III, IV, V, etc., are used to designate the seniority of the children in the rotation of birth, and the ordinary numerals are used in tracing from the original ancestor.

The form in which this genealogy is traced is considered the simplest and best by the leading genealogists of both this country and England, and was adopted for this work after a careful investigation of several forms. It is so simple that a very little study will make it clear; and it is possible, by a careful attention to the instructions herewith given, to easily and quickly trace every member of the family included in the volume back to the original ancestor.

TIFFANY COAT OF ARMS.

IT IS to Charles Lewis Tiffany of New York that the publisher of this work is indebted for the Tiffany coat of arms which forms the frontispiece to this volume.

The heraldic design is rarely beautiful and the coat of arms in colors is extremely artistic.

On February 3, 1900, Charles Lewis Tiffany of New York sent to Nelson O. Tiffany the following description of the family crest :

The crest consists of a greyhound's head with a stag's foot in the mouth. The coat of arms is composed chiefly of a shield with a chevron between three lions' heads. On a ribbon beneath the shield appears the motto, "Patria Fidelis," meaning "Faithful to the Fatherland." The above description is from Burke's "General Armory," the recognized English authority on heraldry. It is given under Tiffin, which is synonymous with Tiffany.

The chevron referred to is one of the honorable ordinaries, and, according to some writers, is supposed to represent the rafters of a house ; by others, the front view of a saddle.

The lions' heads erased (or torn off) denote strength and courage. Their ensanguined hue and mangled condition, together with the fragment of the house, also red, would indicate a mortal struggle for some loved object, the silver shield (symbolized by white) being the metal that denotes love.

The crest or conizance yields in honor to none of the heraldic insignia. It originated in the necessity of distinguishing one chief from another, making him known upon the battle field, as, the visor of the helmet being closed, the face of the wearer could not be seen.

The origin of this crest is obscure, as the greyhound does not hunt the stag. Most likely, it is a perversion from the deerhound, and it would seem to indicate that the bearer varied the sterner duties of life by indulgence in the chase.

The "lambrequin" was a leather covering, to protect the shield from rust, etc., and in the course of time received many sword cuts and incisions, which modern heralds have formed into ornament and painted with the principal tincture and metal found in the arms.

The coat of arms to be appreciated should be seen in colors. We have been presented with a handsomely illuminated copy, suitable for hanging, by Mrs. Elizabeth P. Farnham, connected with the Brewster-Bradford Company of Hannibal, N. Y. (Coats-of-Arms, Puritan and Pilgrim Publications and Engravings), and we have no hesitation in pronouncing it the most beautiful thing of its kind we have ever seen.

INTRODUCTION.

ALTHOUGH the most diligent search has been made, both through the records of this country and of Europe, it has been impossible to ascertain the exact date at which the original Tiffany came to America. The lists of emigrants to America have been carefully studied; also other records, including many of the genealogies published in this country and across the water. Several names that might be construed to mean Tiffany appear, but, as there is so much doubt concerning them, they have not been used in the compilation of data for this work.

The earliest Tiffany mentioned in colonial history is Squire Humphrey, who is undoubtedly the ancestor of the majority of Tiffanys in America. Squire Humphrey Tiffany probably went to Massachusetts Bay about the year 1660. Authentic records show that the town of Rehoboth, Mass., was incorporated in 1645, and, as originally incorporated, contained the present towns of Seekonk, Rehoboth, Attleboro, parts of Swansea, Mass., and Pawtucket, R. I. In the records of the town of ancient Rehoboth, Bayliss' History of New Plymouth, Vol. I., page 209, under date of January 22, 1663, states, "Humphrey Tiffany permitted to be a sojourner and to buy or hire." At this date, therefore, Humphrey Tiffany became a citizen of the town. In Savage's Genealogical History of New England Families who came to America before May 1692, on page 300, Vol. IV., under the heading of Tiffany, appears the following:

Tiffany, Humphrey, Rehoboth, 1663, b. w. Elizabeth, had Sarah, b. sixth July, 1683, was I think inhab. of Dover for some time, but k. 15, July 1685, on the journey betw. Swansea and Boston, by a stroke of lightning.

Savage is mistaken about Humphrey having lived in Dover, N. H. Thorough search of Dover records and all other sources of information concerning the county of Rockingham, in which Dover lies, fails to reveal that any member of the Tiffany family lived in Dover.

What is now Swansea, Mass., was part of the original town of Rehoboth. In the Plymouth Colony Records, among the Swansea items appears the following:

Sarah, the dau. of Humphrey Tiffany, and Elizabeth his wife, was born sixth of July 1683.

This shows that two years before Humphrey's death he was living in Swansea, Mass., and not in Dover, N. H. Further proof that he was a resident of Swansea at the time of his death is given on page 88, Vol. V., fifth series, Publications of the Massachusetts Historical Society, in the Diary of Samuel Sewell, as follows :

Wednesday, P. M., July 15, 1685. Very dark and great thunder and lightning. One Humphrey Tiffany and Frances Low, daughter of Antony Low, are slain with the lightning and thunder about a mile or a mile and a half beyond Billinges Farm, the horse also slain, that they rode on, and another Horse in Company slain and his rider who held the garment on the Maid to steady it at the time the Stroke a coat or cloak, stounded but not killed. Were coming to Boston. Antony Low being in Town the sad Bill was put up with (regards) of that solemn judgment of God ; Fast-day Forenoon, July 15, 1685, 2 persons 2 horses.

This gives the date of Humphrey Tiffany's death in a satisfactory manner, and shows that he was on his way from the direction of Swansea toward Boston at the time he was killed.

Another record states that Humphrey Tiffany was killed by lightning between Swansea and Boston, and that for a long time a metal tablet was affixed to a large tree, beneath which he sought shelter during the storm and was killed. The word tree was used to rhyme with Tiffany in the inscription on the tablet, setting forth the incident in which Humphrey Tiffany and his companion were killed. The inscription concluded with the following :

Squire Humphrey Tiffany
And Mistress Low,
By a stroke of lightning
Into Eternity did go.

Further proof of his residence is found on pages 51-54, Plymouth Colony Records, Vol. IV., also in the Court Orders contained in Vol. VI., in which the following appears :

Att a General Court of this holden att plimouth Oct. 27, 1685. Before Thomas Hinckley, Esq., Gouvern and others.

Administration is granted by this Court to Elizabeth, the relict of Humphrey Tiffany, deceased, on all the goods and chattells of sd. Tiffany, she bringing in a true inventory thereof, and glueing bond with two sufficient sureties for her administring according to law. Major John Walley is ordered by the Court to give ye oath to the inVENTORY of sd. Tiffany, and to deliver her the letter of administration granted by the Court, she haueing giuen in bond as above said.

Mistress Elizabeth Tiffany qualified before the General Court as executrix of her husband's estate. From the time Humphrey Tiffany is first heard of, he is found to be a resident of the Plymouth Colony of Massachusetts Bay, and especially of that part known as Swansea, so named

because it was originally settled by emigrants from the town of Swansea in Wales.

Records of the present town of Swansea give the names of Squire Humphrey Tiffany's children and some of his grandchildren. In the town book appears the following :

Hezekiah the son of Humphrey Tiffance and of Elizabeth his wife was drowned in Swanzey River on the 4th of December near night Anno. 1685.

This was the same year in which Humphrey Tiffany was killed.

The children of whom there is actual proof are the following, all of whom are numbered the second generation :

- 2 JAMES.
- 2 THOMAS.
- 2 EBENEZER.
- 2 CONSIDER.
- 2 SARAH, b. July 6, 1683.
- 2 HEZEKIAH, d. December 4, 1685.

There were possibly other children, but there is no positive proof, and it is more than likely that the Tiffanys classed under miscellaneous are descendants from them.

In the records of Swansea, Mass., it is learned that James Tiffany went to Attleboro', Mass.; Thomas first to Bristol and then to Ashford, Conn.; Ebenezer to Barrington, R. I. The Swansea records also contain the following data concerning the early descendants of Humphrey Tiffany :

- ELIZABETH, daughter of James and Bethiah Tiffany, b. April 11, 1689.
- ELIEZER, son of Thomas and Hannah Tiffany, b. April 13, 1690.
- EBENEZER, son of Ebenezer and Elizabeth Tiffany, b. February 2, 1695.

- EBENEZER, son of Ebenezer and Elizabeth Tiffany, b. July 3, 1702.

- HEZEKIAH, son of Ebenezer and Elizabeth Tiffany, b. July 27, 1697.
- KATHERINE, daughter of Ebenezer and Elizabeth Tiffany, b. March 5, 1698, or '99.
- RECOMPENSE, son of Thomas and Hannah Tiffany, b. March 11, 1693, or '94; m. 2d Ann (b. Swansea, Mass., 1698; d. Barrington, R. I., June 27, 1721).
- THOMAS, son of Thomas and Hannah Tiffany, b. May 22, 1692.
- SETH, son of Ebenezer and Elizabeth Tiffany, b. June 4, 1705.

SARAH, daughter of Ebenezer and Elizabeth Tiffany, b. June 13, 1707.

WILLIAM, son of Ebenezer and Elizabeth Tiffany, b. August 29, 1710.

The descendants of some of these it has been impossible to trace. Others probably had no children. Some died unmarried. Among those classed as "Miscellaneous Tiffanys" there are doubtless many who may rightly claim descent from Squire Humphrey Tiffany, but the records have been lost or destroyed, and it has been impossible to make the connection; therefore, they have been added to this history in the hope that some future generation may take up the work and supply the missing links in the chain connecting all the 'Tiffanys in America with the parent stock.

The four great branches of the Tiffany family, whose descent is unquestioned, are James, Thomas, Ebenezer, and Consider, sons of Squire Humphrey Tiffany, and it is with them and their descendants that this history deals.

Before, however, taking up the threads, it is appropriate to devote a little space to the Tiffanys of Europe.

TIFFANYS OF EUROPE.

ALTHOUGH Charles L. Tiffany decided that it was best to limit this history to the American branch of the family, it is well to give some little data which has come, in the natural course of research, into the author's hands, as to the ancient lineage of the family in Europe. The exact origin of the Tiffany family is difficult to ascertain, but the author's theory is that the name and the family originated in Italy about the time of the early crusades, and that some member of the house, returning, settled in Brittany, France. Following the conquest of the English by the Normans, and continuing down to about the year 1730, the English left Brittany at different periods, and it is from some of these English Tiffanys that the Americans of that name are descended. Squire Humphrey probably came from Yorkshire; the Irish Tiffanys were an overflow from England, and from there came to America. As far as has been ascertained, it is thought that none of the American Tiffanys originated in Italy, France, or any continental country. The name exists in Italy and France. In Brittany and Normandy it is frequently found. There are also many Tiffanys in England and Ireland.

The first mention of the name Tiffany in England is found in Longstaffe's "Richmonshire, its Ancient Lords and Edifices," pages 142 and 143:

William de Coningsby
Came out of Brittany,
With his wife Tiffany
And his maid Maufrass,
And his dogge Hardigrass.

In "English Surnames, Their Sources and Significations," by Charles W. Bardsley, M. A., second edition, published in London, in 1875, on pages 71 and 72, appears the following:

The Normans liked their women to be, however modest, none the less light-hearted, gay, and spirited, and in the synonyms of mirth, gladness, and sportiveness they would delight in fixing on their newly-born children that which they hoped would be in the future an index of the real character. Theophania was anything but unpopular, but its length made it unavoidable but that it should be mutilated or put in an abbreviated or nicknamed form and thus it has arisen our Tiffany, whence, of course, the surname of to-day.

In January, 1900, David R. Downer of Newark, N. J., who married Adelaide Tiffany, daughter of Helim W. and Anna E. Tiffany, sent to the writer an interesting account of the Tiffany family, compiled by himself. All the data was gleaned by Mr. Downer from reliable sources. In the course of his letter Mr. Downer writes: "According to an authority on English surnames, the name Tiffany is a corruption of Theophania. This I found in a book in the New York Genealogical Society Library. I believe it to be correct. The statement found elsewhere that the name is derived from a thin cloth is unreasonable." Considerable space is devoted in some books on English surnames to proving that the name Tiffany was taken from Epiphany, with reference to the Feast of the Epiphany, the church festival, also called Twelfth Day, concluding the Christmas holidays. The name as applied to a silk would thus mean Epiphany silk, that is, holiday silk, and tiffanies is given in some English books as meaning a kind of thin silk gauze.

In tracing the origin of the name through early English history and literature, the writer has come across many interesting uses of the word. Boyle, on "Colours," gave it as an equivalent for "taffeta, a fine, smooth, silken stuff, remarkably glossy."

In olden days, in England, the most celebrated females of a pack of hounds were frequently named Tiffany; but the word is used in so many different senses that it is difficult, if not impossible, to ascertain in what manner it gradually developed into the English surname now borne by thousands in this country and in Europe.

PHYSICAL CHARACTERISTICS.

It is thought best to trace the history of the *Tiffanys* from their earliest known English origin. The American branch is made up of English, Irish and Scotch. The family has inherited, to a marked degree, the sturdy, determined characteristics of these three nationalities. The *Tiffanys* are, as a rule, physically strong, from medium to large stature, many being over six feet in height. They are too high-spirited and active to take on a superabundance of flesh, are stately in bearing, erect in carriage, quick and clear-cut in movement, and have large heads, the upper brain developed in excess of the base.

The head is well carried on a sturdy neck. The chest is deep, the lungs large and full, the body and limbs round, well knit, closely jointed. The shoulders are inclined to droop, with the arms carried close to the body. Skin and hair are fine in texture, nails are thin, giving evidence of a sensitive and somewhat nervous organization, the mental predominating over the physical. The faces are comely, with nose straight or slightly

arched, nostrils large, indicating strong and full lung capacity, and the line from the nostril to the corner of the mouth, known as the line of success, is sharply defined. During the author's connection with the genealogy of the Tiffany family it has been his good fortune to meet many of its members, and he has never seen a mentally or physically small Tiffany. The complexion is usually dark, but not swarthy, the eyes are brown, dark blue, or dark gray. A blonde Tiffany is practically unknown. Probably the most marked physical characteristic of the Tiffanys is the expression of the eye, which is as positive and distinct as the Maximilian lip is said to be. It is claimed that any person having a drop of Maximilian blood in his veins has full and red lips. The Tiffany eye is the first feature to attract the attention of a close observer. It is bright, giving evidence of temperate habits. Its expression changes rapidly with the mood, indicating health and buoyancy, sympathy, grief, determination, or anger, with quickness and unerring certainty. It is a Tiffany mark. The Tiffanys are good liver, and are fastidious in dress. As a race, the Tiffanys are long-lived, retaining their mental faculties unimpaired to a good old age. Palmer C. Tiffany, who died in July, 1900, was over ninety at the time of his death, and less than a year before that event he contributed an interesting series of articles to one of the Mount Pleasant, Iowa, newspapers, giving an account of the pioneer settlement of Iowa. These articles were vigorous, showing an extraordinary memory, and a familiar acquaintance with the history of this Western State. Nelson Arnold Tiffany, father of Nelson Otis Tiffany, when in his eighty-second year, was the youngest of five brothers and sisters in his family living at that time, two of whom died after passing ninety-three. Charles Lewis Tiffany, founder of the famous house of Tiffany & Co., although in his ninetieth year at this writing, goes regularly to his business daily, giving it his close and intelligent attention. He has remarkable vision and is able to read with the naked eye as well as can most of his employes with the use of glasses.

DESCENDANTS OF SQUIRE HUMPHREY TIFFANY.

2 JAMES (1 HUMPHREY). Son of Squire Humphrey and Elizabeth Tiffany; m., first, Bethiah — she d. Attleboro, Mass., February 27, 1711; m., second, Elizabeth — she survived him and was the executor of his will; March 16, 1734, she was m. to Andrew Grover of Norton, Mass.

For a short time after his first marriage, James lived in Swansea, Mass.; but, about 1690, he moved into Attleboro, and there secured the farm on which he built the old house that stood until within a few years, in which many generations of Tiffanys were born and died. The exact date of James Tiffany's death is not known; but it was between June 28, 1732, when he made his will, and July 26th of the same year, when it was probated.

Following is a copy of the will:

In the name of God Amen; the twentieth-eighth day of June 1732.

I James Tifny of the Town of Attleborough "in the" in the County of Bristol in his Majesties province of the Massachusetts Bay; being very sick and weak in body but of perfect mind and memory thanks to be given to god therefor, calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to dye; do make and ordain this my last will and Testament.

That is to say principally and first of all I give and Recommend my soul into the hands of god that gave It and my body I recommend to the earth to be buried in decent "Christian Burial" at the discretion of my executors: Nothing doubting but at the General Resurrection I shall receive the same again by the mighty power of god.

And as touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased god to bless me in this life, I give demise and dispose in the "followin" manner and form.

Imprimis: I give and bequeath to Elizabeth my dearly beloved wife, accordin as the laws of our province hath provided that is to say the income of the third part of my estate: together with the use of any Room in my dwelling house.

And I do constitute make and ordain Elizabeth my dearly beloved wife together with my Son John Tifnye both joyntly to be executrix and executor of this my last will and Testament.

Item. I give to my well beloved son Joseph "Tifnie" ten Shillings.

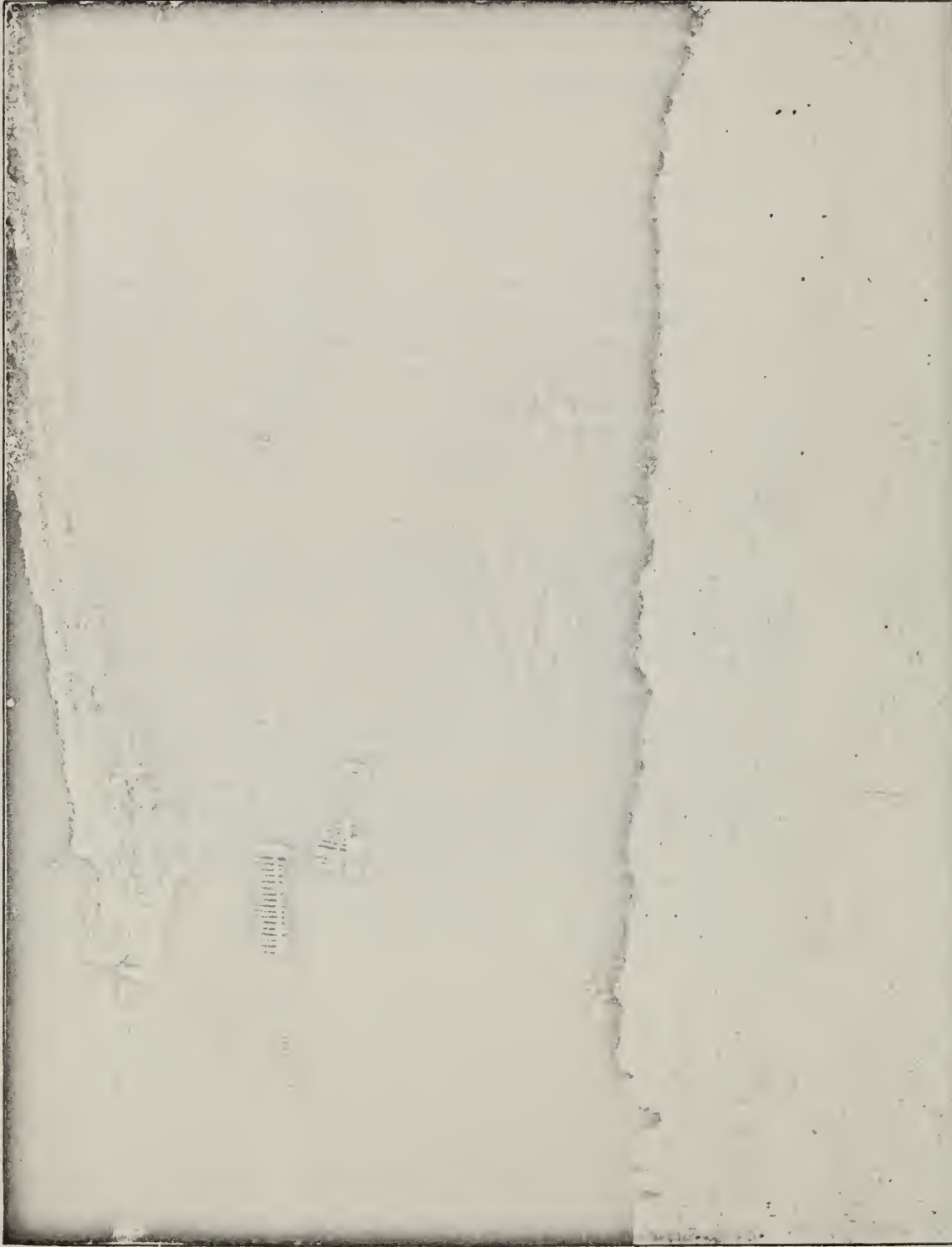
Item. I give to my well beloved Son James Tifnye the sum of ten shillings.

Item. I give unto my well beloved son Samuel Tifnie the sum of ten shillings:

the Reason why I give unto these my Sons no more of my estate now is "because" they had the greater part of their portion before.

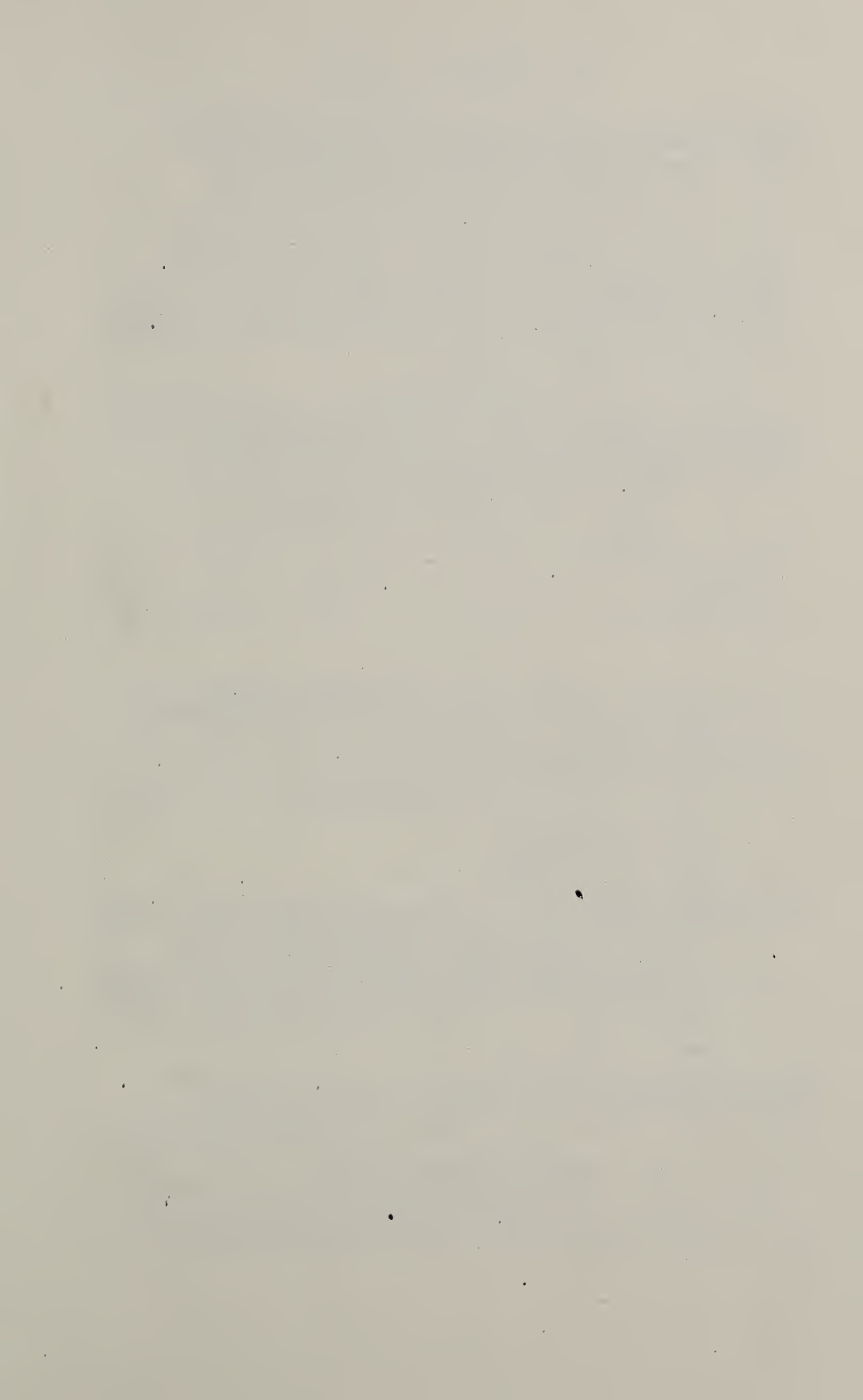
Item. I give unto my well beloved Son Benjamin "Tifnye" A hundred Acres of land in Ashford in the Colony of Connecticut

Item. I give unto my daughter Elizabeth's Children the sum of five pound six Shillings and eight pence

Lyman Tiffany passed most of his life in Boston, Mass., where he was well known in the early part of the century. He founded the firm of Tiffany, Sayles & Hitchcock, afterwards Sayles, Merriam & Brewer, then Merriam, Brewer & Co., then Gardner, Brewer & Co., then J. L. Brewer & Co., the present name of the firm. For many years Mr. Tiffany was senior partner. He was one of the five who organized the Amoskeag Manufacturing Company, with mills at Manchester, N. H. This is at the present day one of the prominent and prosperous manufacturing corporations of the United States. After a successful mercantile career, Mr. Tiffany retired from active business at the age of fifty-five and lived to be ninety years old.

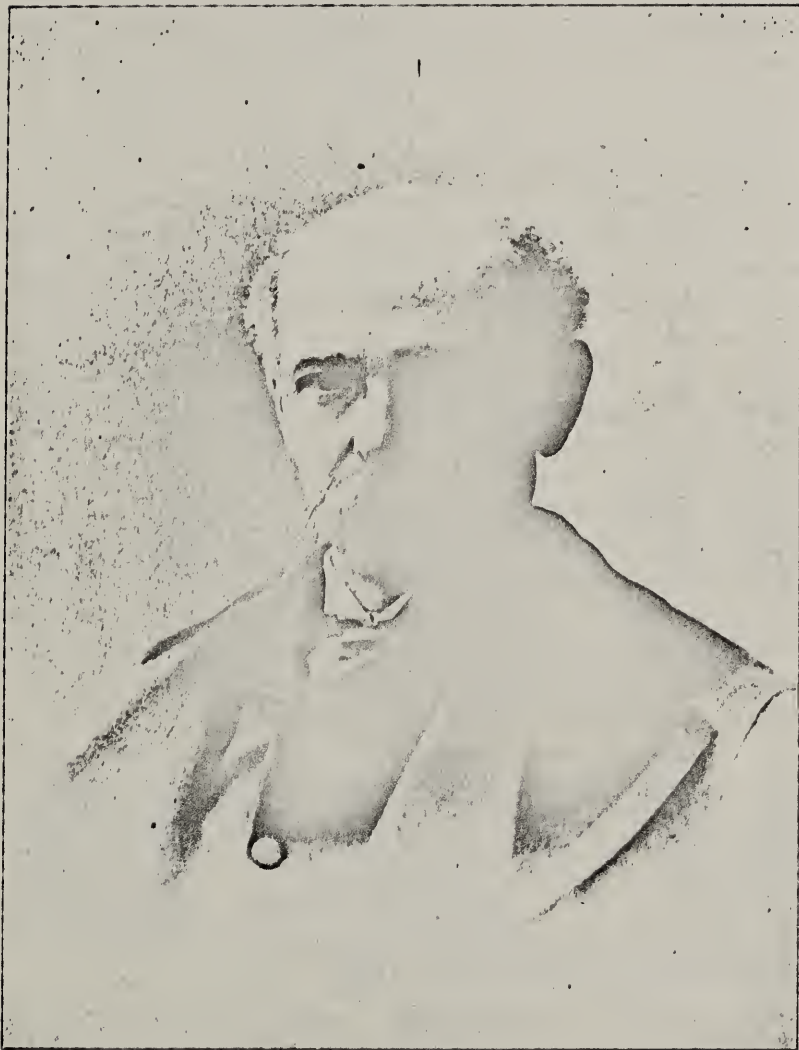

Lyman Tiffany spent the early years of his life at the Fox homestead, West Farms, now Borough of the Bronx, New York City. His parents had made their home there for many years. It was the country place of his grandfather, William W. Fox, the surrounding land having been for nine generations the property of his grandmother's ancestors. With his older brother, George Fox Tiffany, Lyman Tiffany was sent to St. Paul's School, College Point, Long Island. He was afterward employed by the firm of Hutchinson & Tiffany, of which his father was a partner. Later, he entered mercantile life on his own account in the firm of Deming & Tiffany. His business was closed out in 1865, and, as he had inherited a competence from his mother's parents, he moved permanently to Washington, where, in 1889, he built a home from his own plans. He has spent much time in travel and has made a large collection of curios and works of art. Mr. Tiffany served in the militia of his native State both in home defense and during the Civil War. He was quartermaster of the 8th New York Regiment at the breaking out of the so-called "Sepoy War" at quarantine, and served efficiently during the regiment's encampment on Staten Island. He reëntered the 7th New York Regiment later, and on the call of President Lincoln for troops for the protection of the national capital, at the breaking out of the Civil War, was one of those greeted by the President and Gen. Scott from the steps of the capitol. He served the full period of three enlistments, and, on retirement, was elected captain of Company G, 7th Regiment, Veteran Corps. He is a member of Lafayette Post, G. A. R., of Kane Lodge, F. A. M., and of several civic societies and clubs.

Pennsdale, Pa., December 23, 1841), dau. of Josiah Dow Chase (b. Weare, N. H., November 13, 1811; d. there February 19, 1892) and Mary Chase Breed (b. Weare, N. H., October 1, 1811; d. there December 12, 1886).

Mr. Tiffany was graduated from Yale in 1864, with the degree B. Ph., from the Sheffield Scientific School. While a student at Yale, the Civil War broke out and he was one of the first to leave his studies and volunteer for service in the Union army. He enlisted with the 7th New York, N. G., and spent the term of his enlistment with the regiment in and near Washington. Twice afterward he left college to go with his regiment when it was called out, serving each time the full period, yet he was graduated with his class. With the exception of a brief experience with mercantile business in New York, not having followed the profession of civil engineering, which he acquired at college, he has devoted his active life to attending to the large property interests of his family, particularly in the development of unimproved land surrounding the homestead, now in a thickly-settled portion of the city. He has thus taken a conspicuous part in opening the real-estate market north of the Harlem River, erecting buildings, and acting as trustee and executor of several estates. He has also been greatly interested in marine architecture, studying the subject for several years. He put his theories to proof in his yacht "Ventura," which he built in 1890 on the Bronx River, the scene of his childish nautical adventures. The yacht was seventy-five feet over all, and bore a close similarity to the principles of construction now adopted in building the most successful yachts. Mr. Tiffany lives in the Fox Homestead, the ninth in descent from one of the original patentees of the tract included in "Ye West Farms of the Borough town of Westchester," conveyed to his ancestors in 1661. He is a member of the Yale Club, the New York Yacht Club and the North Side Board of Trade.

His first business enterprise was with Samuel Slater in Pawtucket, R. I., where he was superintendent of the first mill in this country in which cotton was spun by water power. He afterward sold his interest in the mill to Mr. Slater, and with the proceeds established the commission house of Tiffany, Wyman & Co. of Baltimore, in 1821. The same year he sold out his interest in the Baltimore firm, which was continued under the old name. In the same year, 1821, he established the house of B. Tiffany & Co. in New York, which was changed, in 1829, to Tiffany, Hutchinson & Anderson. 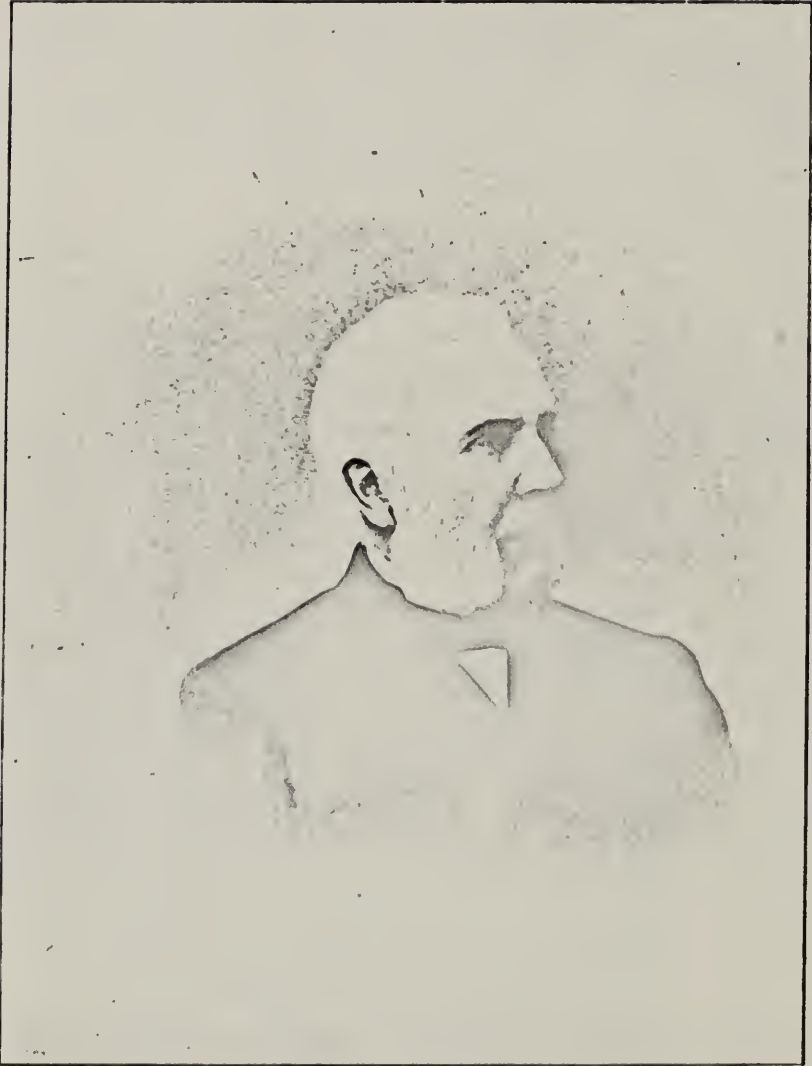

Salem Howe Wales, son of Captain Oliver Wales and Lucy Tiffany, descends from Puritan ancestry, his forefathers emigrating to Boston with Richard Mather in 1635. After a brief mercantile experience, Mr. Wales bought an interest in the *Scientific American*, forming a partnership with O. D. Munn in the publication of that journal, then in its infancy. For twenty-three years Mr. Wales was its managing editor. In 1855, he was appointed by Governor Horatio Seymour commissioner for the State of New York to the Paris Exposition. During the Civil War he was an active member of the executive committee of the Christian Commission. In 1867, he revisited Europe, attending the Paris Exposition and traveling extensively in Great Britain and on the continent. Mayor Havemeyer of New York appointed him commissioner of the Department of Public Parks, of which he was chosen president. Otis Henry Tiffany prepared for college at the University of Maryland, and, in 1842, he entered the junior class of Dickinson College, Carlisle, Pa., where he was graduated in 1844. He was first appointed a tutor there and then adjunct professor of mathematics and civil engineering. In 1848, he was admitted to the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, an elder in 1850, after which he filled circuit appointments in Maryland for some time. Without change of ecclesiastical relationship, he served as pastor of the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church, Baltimore. In 1859, the degree of D. D. was conferred upon him by Dickinson College, and the degree of LL. D. in 1886. In 1860, he became pastor of the First M. E. Church in Chicago; was then transferred to the First M. E. Church of Evanston, Ill.; and, in 1864, he was given the pastorate of Grace Church, Chicago, where he remained three years. 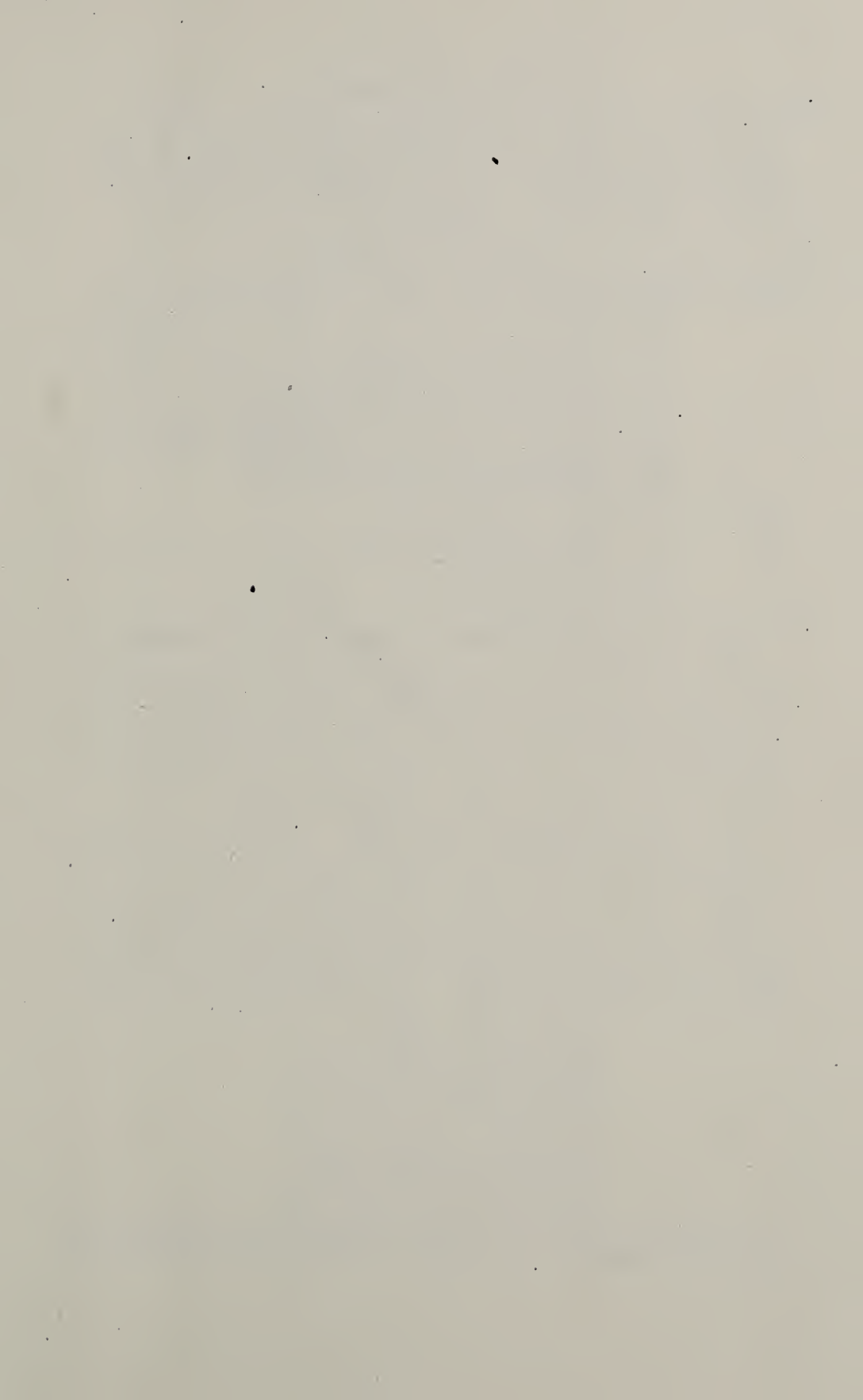
Ebenezer Young was one of the notable public men of the State of Connecticut in his time, was graduated from Yale in 1806, was elected a State senator in 1823, and for two succeeding terms. He was for two years president of the Connecticut Senate, and was a member of the national House of Representatives from 1829-1835.

Mr. Tiffany was educated in the public schools and the Plainfield and Brooklyn, Conn., Academies. In 1837, he went to New York and started in business, at 259 Broadway, under the firm name of Tiffany & Young. In 1841 the firm name changed to Tiffany, Young & Ellis, and in 1853 it became Tiffany & Co. Half a century ago, in 1850, the first branch house of Tiffany & Co. was established in Paris. In 1866, the firm established a second branch. This was in London. In 1870, the growing business of Tiffany & Co. necessitated removal to larger quarters in New York, the firm removing to the block corner Union Square and Fifteenth Street. As diamond and gem merchants and as manufacturers and dealers in the richest jewelry, silverware, bronzes and other artistic and costly articles, Tiffany & Co. are famous throughout the world. Foreign governments have bestowed many honors upon Mr. Tiffany. In 1878, he was made a Chevalier of the Legion of Honor of France. The Czar of Russia presented him with the gold medal *Præmia Digno*. Tiffany & Co. have been appointed jewelers and silversmiths to the Queen of England; the Czar and Czarina of Russia; the Emperors of Austria, Germany and Brazil; the Prince and Princess of Wales; the Kings of Belgium, Greece, Italy, Spain, Denmark, and Portugal; the Shah of Persia; the Khedive of Egypt, and other royal personages. Sarah Dean's parents died when she was about three years old. She was soon after adopted by Rev. Joseph Avery, with whom she lived until the time of her marriage to Rev. Mr. Farrar. After the latter's death, she returned to Mr. Avery. After her marriage to Dr. Tiffany, she and her husband continued to reside with Mr. Avery. On March 7, 1764, Mr. Avery, who was pastor of the first Church of Norton, deeded his farm to Dr. Tiffany for the consideration that he should be cared for in his old age. Dr. and Mrs. Tiffany remained with Mr. Avery until his death.

Dr. Gideon Tiffany was a practicing physician in Norton and in Attleboro; but after the death of Mr. Avery, in 1770, he sold the farm and went to Keene, N. H. In Norton he was assessor in 1766, tithing man and warden in 1769, and on April 20, 1776, he marched as a minute man after the Lexington alarm to Concord. About 1782, Dr. Tiffany went from Keene to Hanover, N. H., and from there he moved to the State of New York, remaining there for some years, and finally moving to Ancaster, Canada, where he died.

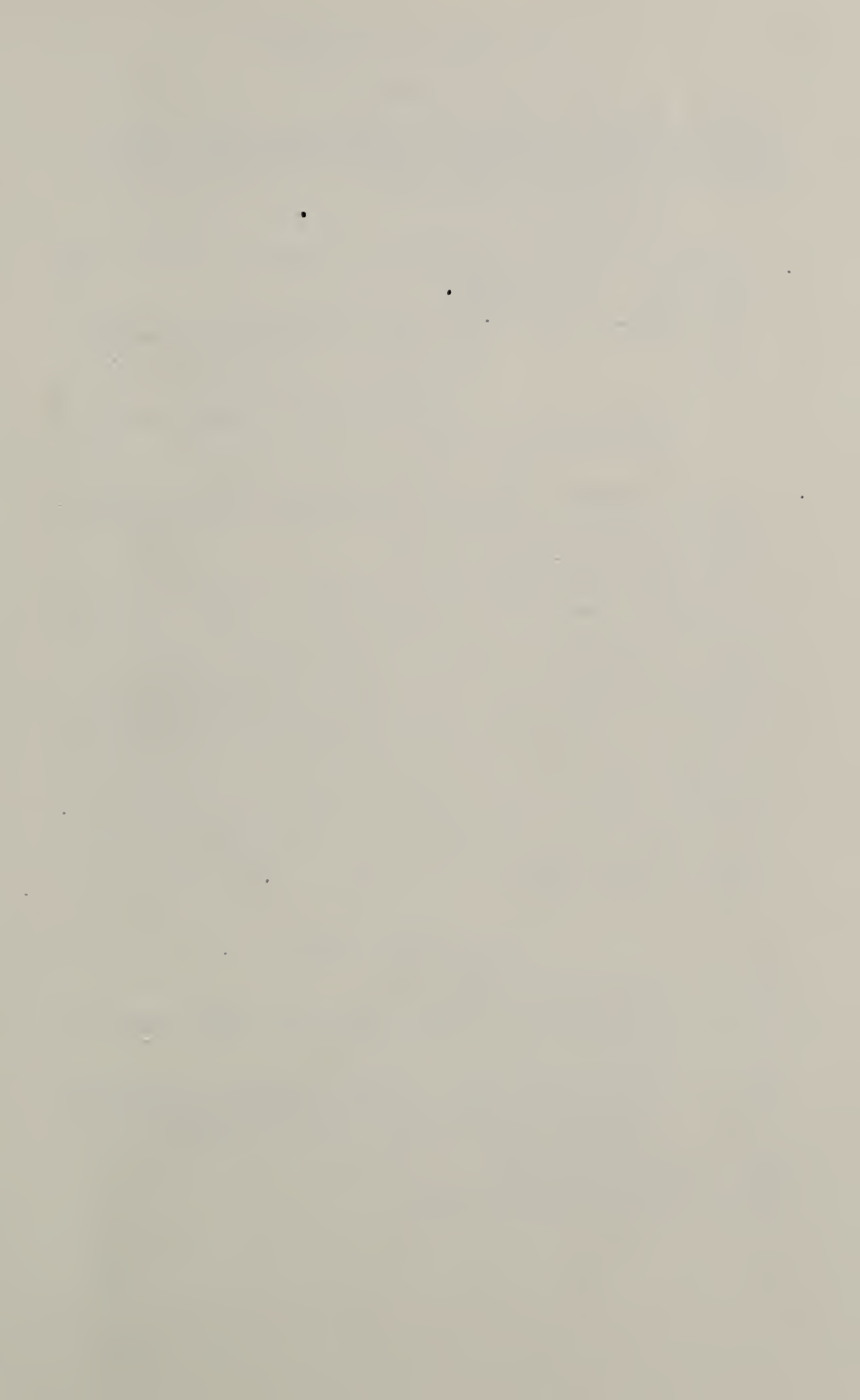

When Albert Tiffany was an infant in his mother's arms, a party of Indians entered his father's cabin, demanding something to eat. Mrs. Tiffany said she had no provisions for them, whereupon the chief sprang in front of her, and, bringing his tomahawk down with lightning speed, grazed her head and buried the blade in the back of the old-fashioned chair in which she sat. Mrs. Tiffany remained motionless, gazing unflinchingly at the savages. The chief exclaimed in admiration, "Heap brave squaw," and, turning, left the cabin with the braves, who never molested the Tiffanys again. When less than twelve, Albert Tiffany was a mail carrier, and was frequently chased by wolves in the forest through which he had to travel. He studied medicine with his uncle, Dr. Oliver Tiffany, but subsequently took to farming.

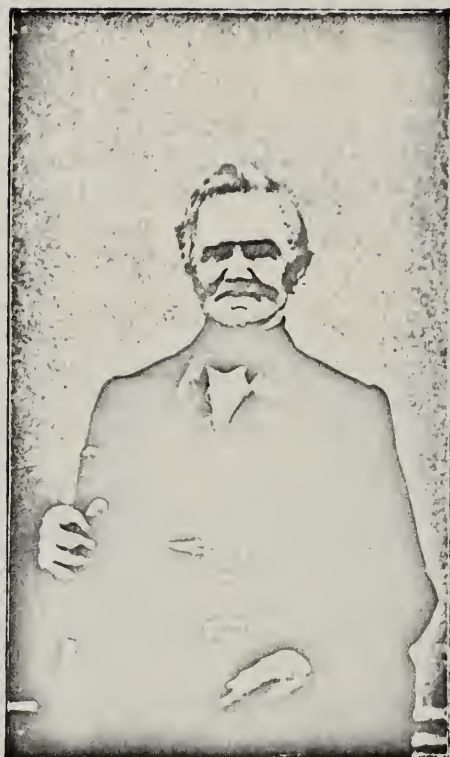

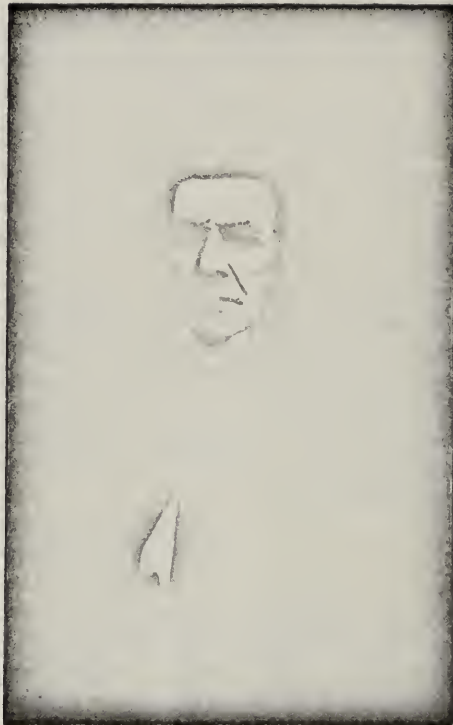

He served as a private in Captain Isaac Hodge's company of Norton, Mass., drafted for nine months' service in Rhode Island (see Massachusetts Revolutionary Rolls, Vol. XX., page 57), and in Captain Seth Smith's company of Norton, Mass. (see Massachusetts Revolutionary Rolls, Vol. XXIII., page 65), and later as sergeant in Captain Samuel Richard's company, Colonel John Stark's regiment (see New Hampshire Revolutionary Rolls, Vol. I., page 55). He was also a surgeon in the command of General Stark.

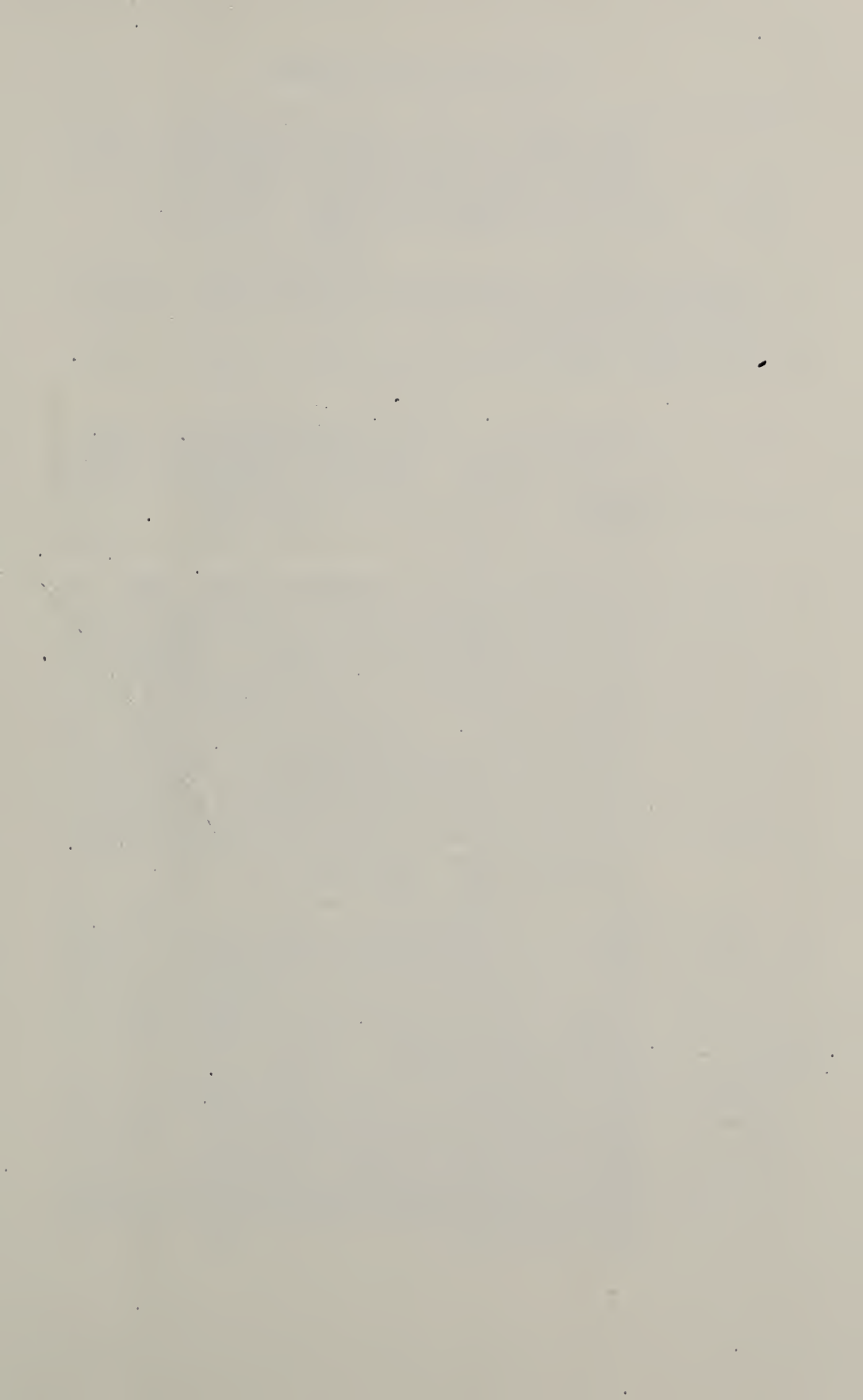

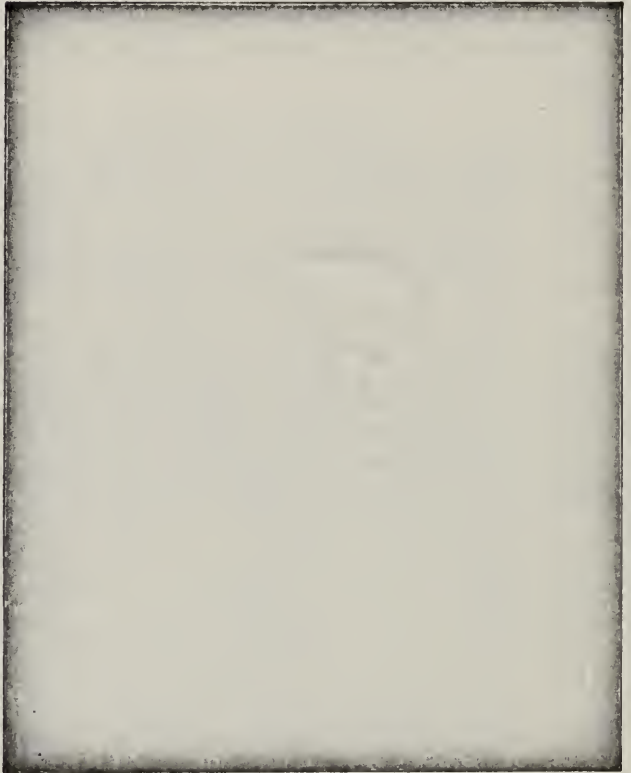
Mr. Tiffany was for some years a commercial traveler, and later a farmer. He learned the trade of distiller and worked at it during his early manhood; but on being urged by his employer to put a poisonous "strengthening" drug into the liquor, he refused, threw the poison away and gave up the trade forever. He lived in several places in Canada and in New York State, finally settling at Randalia, Ia., where he died. He possessed great force of character and was a man of high integrity. He had a commanding presence, and was of fine personal appearance, standing six feet two inches, and well proportioned. In his younger days he was a noted athlete.

Andrews & Co., extensive manufacturers of school and church furniture. He then returned to Buffalo and took a scholarship in the medical department of the University of Buffalo. After a year of study, he was urged to take the secretaryship and general

HOSEA TIFFANY BRANCH.

Hosea Tiffany was the leader of the men who went from Attleboro, Mass., to Pennsylvania, and settled there, giving the name of Tiffany prominence in Susquehanna and other counties of the State. Hosea Tiffany was a remarkable man. He served with the colonists in the revolution. His record, taken from the Massachusetts Revolutionary Rolls, is as follows: "In Captain Stephen Richardson's company, in Colonel George Williams' regiment, who marched from Attleboro, September 25th, and were discharged October 29, 1777, on a secret expedition to Rhode Island, were Sergeant Hosea Tiffany, Corporal Thomas Tiffany, Privates Daniel and John Tiffany." On the 27th of April, 1789, Hosea Tiffany, with a number of other men from Attleboro, Mass., started westward to make homes for themselves in what was then a wilderness. On May 18th they reached Beaver Meadow, where they built a rude bark cabin. It was the first cabin erected by white men in Harford, Pa. In February, 1792, after these early pioneers had gone back and forth between what is now Susquehanna County, Pa., and Attleboro, Mass., preparing during their stay in the wilderness homes for their families, Hosea Tiffany, his wife and his children, Hosea, Jr., Nancy and Amos, with others from the same town, left Attleboro with oxen, sleds, cows, etc., and journeyed to what is now the site of Harford, Pa., reaching there in March. The Tiffanys and others in their party were the first white women to visit the place. The first sawmill was built there in 1800 by Hosea Tiffany and two other early settlers. In January, 1808, Harford was incorporated, and Hosea Tiffany's dwelling house became the election precinct. Hosea Tiffany was the first justice of the peace; was appointed in 1799, and held the commission until 1812.

March 5, 1718, Thomas Tiffany was admitted a freeman of Ashford, and on this date he, with his son Thomas, James Tiffany, and others, drew each 200 acres by lot of the undistributed public lands, the citizens having, at a town meeting on January 11, 1718, voted to distribute among themselves the surplus land by drawing lots. Records show that he bought a great deal of land in Ashford, was a man of substance and, for those times, a large land holder. From 1735 to 1741 he was a selectman and town clerk, and, with the exception of two years, was town clerk from 1721 to 1748.

In 1855 he went to the Territory of Minnesota, voting while there to create the new State of Minnesota. In 1859, he crossed the plains with oxen to the State of California. In 1860, he went to the territory of Utah, now the State of Nevada, where his vote helped to create another State, and where he devoted his energies to developing the rich mines of the Comstock Lode at Virginia City. In 1866, he moved to California, since which time he has been surveyor and land agent for timber and land companies in Nevada, California and Washington. In an article entitled "Among the Summits of the Sierras," Mr. Tiffany is thus described by the *Reno Weekly Gazette* of Nevada:

"Perhaps the one man who knows the Sierra Nevada Mountain Range most intimately, from the south range of Lake Tahoe to the Sierra Valley, is the well-known surveyor and explorer, William B. Tiffany, who is as familiar with the most distant and inaccessible parts as most men are with their town. Mr. Tiffany is a Rhode Island man and left his native State for the wild West, where, in 1859, he settled in Galena, near Washoe City. He was one of the first to raise potatoes and other vegetables east of the mountains on

desert land by irrigation, and, although laughed at by his neighbors, his product was of a very superior quality. In April, 1860, he discovered the Willow Creek Mine. His wife joined him in 1864, and in 1866 the family moved over the line into California and settled in Truckee, where up to the present time Mr. Tiffany has been engaged as surveyor and explorer for the timber and lumber firms. His busy life has not made him forget the beauties of nature, and the grandeur of the mountains is as impressive to him as to the most enthusiastic tourist. But the years have not brought sunshine only. Beside the little mountain home is the grave of his only boy, who was born in White's Canyon the week President Lincoln was assassinated."

CONSIDER TIFFANY BRANCH.

2. CONSIDER (1 HUMPHREY). Records are not clear as to which of Humphrey Tiffany's sons Consider Tiffany was; but he was twice married. The name of his first wife is not known; but the names of some of her children have been preserved. The probability is, that he and his brother Ephraim Tiffany were the founders of the Tiffany branches, with descendants now living in Lyme, Hadlyme, Salem, Somers, Hartland and other places near these towns. Consider Tiffany married, second, in Lyme, Conn., January 23, 1753, Mary Davis. There is little known of Consider Tiffany except that he was a landholder and a farmer. A much-mutilated deed, which has been preserved, identifies Sergeant Consider Tiffany as his eldest son. The deed is dated Lyme, Conn., July 13, 1756.

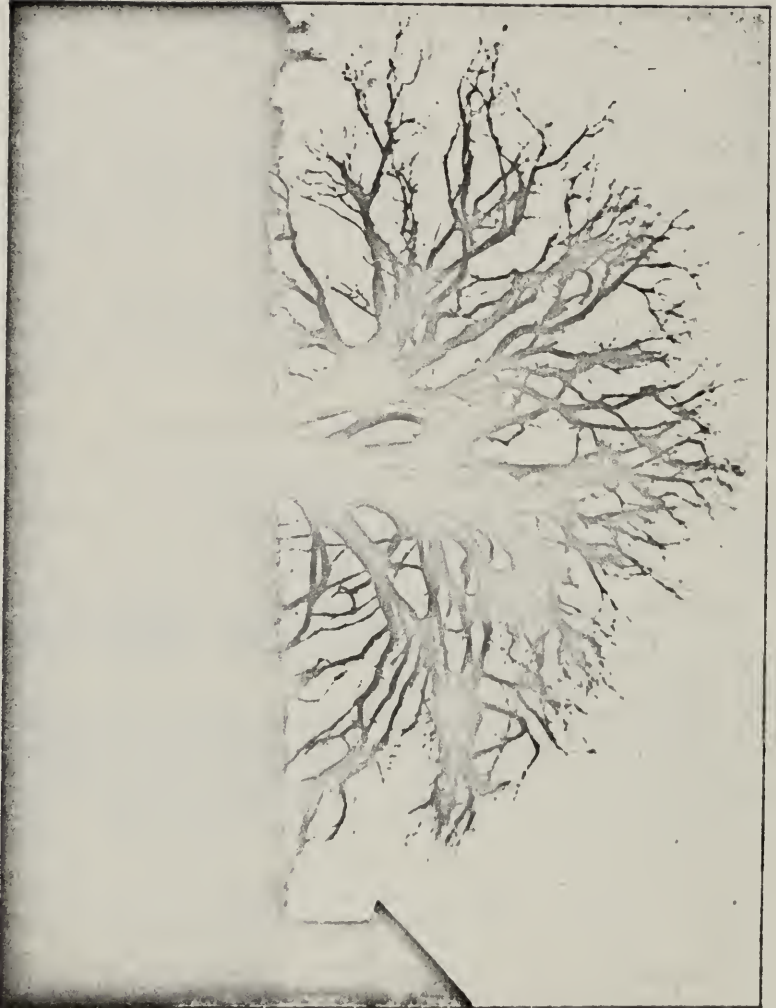

2131. CONSIDER (2 CONSIDER, 1 HUMPHREY). Married, in Lyme, Conn., Sarah Wilder (b. Lyme, Conn., August 13, 1738; d. Hartland, Conn., November 7, 1818).

Consider Tiffany lived in Lyme, Conn., until after the birth of his first three children. He was a farmer and also carried on a small business as storekeeper. At Hartland, where his other children were born, he was engaged in the same business, but on a much larger scale. Many interesting documents of his have been preserved. He was a vigorous man, transacting a great deal of business and was always careful to enforce his rights. He was a member of the Church of England and had little patience with the dissenting sects. He was at one time a schoolmaster, and when he entered upon this work, it is said, it was the first time he had ever been in school; but he was a good teacher, so tradition states, and he was a close student. During the Revolutionary War, he was not alone loyal to the English church but loyal to the English crown. He was something of an astronomer, and is said to have calculated an almanac, but no copy of it has been found. He was a writer of prose and of poetry. He kept diaries, in

which he recorded his daily adventures, one of which covers the period of one of the French and Indian wars, in 1756. While this diary is in many places illegible, enough has been deciphered to make it of interest. It begins on July 28, when the company marched from Lyme, where it was recruited, to Wallingford, Conn., a distance of thirty-six miles. Here the company lodged at Mr. Cuthbert's. On July 30, the men marched from Wallingford to Waterbury, through Chester, and on the 31st to Westbury. From this point the diary is as follows :

Sunday, Aug 1, we marched from Mr. Scott's at Westbury, part of Waterbury, to Gonseys on the north part of West-bury, about 9 miles from said Scotts Tavern. After breakfast, we marched to Litchfield, and dined at one at Mr. Buells, about 13 miles from the last said Gonseys; then it being late in the afternoon, we then marched from Mr. Gonseys, one mile and a half to Mr. Waddons, at Goshen. Ye 2nd. day of Aug. we marched thence from Mr. Waddons to Goshen to Mr. Shagguicks at Canaan about 9 miles from Goshen. We then marched after dinner from Goshen to the west part of Canaan, to Mr. Rogers, about 8 miles from said Sedgewicks. We traveled that day, about 17 miles, from Waddons to Robbins. Tuesday, ye 3rd day of Aug. then marched from said Robbins at Canaan, to Mr. Bemis's at the "oblongs," about 14 miles from Canaan, and dined at said Bemis's—Then marched after dinner from Mr. Bemis's at "Oblongs," to Mr. Jacob Daker's at Leveningston's Manner about 10 miles from Mr. Bemis's. We marched that day, fully 24 miles. Wednesday Ye 4th day of Aug. we marched from Anthrum's or the "Manner," to one Mr. Church's about 9 miles from Mr. Dakers, and went to breakfast there—then marched after breakfast, about 17 miles to Cloverwack, and dined at one, Mr — Sunday: at Hutsons River. That 4th day, Aug. we marched 20 miles from Anthrums, Aug. 5, 1756, we then marched or took water, and sailed from the above said Sunday at Cloverwark, into the City of Albany, about 40 miles from Sunday at Cloverwark, — 40 miles we went that day, and the 6th day Aug. the day after I arrived at Albany, I went to see two poor criminals executed, which were most shamefully hanged, for the sin of murder, and we continued at Albany, from the 5th day of Aug. to the 22nd day of same instant. Sunday: Ye 22nd day of Aug. was ordered to guard some cannon, and about 40 wagons to Fort Edward, and marched that day, to the "Half-Moon," from Albany, fully 12 miles. Monday: Ye 23rd day Aug. we marched with our two cannon, and the above said wagons, into ye Stillwaters, about 13 miles from the "Half Moon." Tuesday, ye 24th day Aug. we then marched from Stillwaters, about 15 miles to Saratoga, and tarried there that night, and Wednesday, the 25th, we arrived to Fort Edward, about 16 miles from Saratoga, at a — o'clock in the afternoon. Thursday, we was ordered to guard some waggons down to Saratoga, then tarried at Saratoga one day, and the 28th we went down to Scantecock, about 19 miles from Saratoga and about 4 miles from Stillwaters, and returned up to Saratoga again. It being Sunday, the 29th day of Aug. we rested, and refreshed ourselves, until Wednesday, the first day of Sept.—then we was ordered to guard Col Burthen down to Stillwater, and from there, to Cantercock, and I arrived there that night, Aug. 3rd, returned from Cantercock to Saratoga. We rested that day at Saratoga, until the 8th day of Sept., when we guarded waggons up to Fort Edward, then returned on the 9th down to Saratoga, with the waggons, and the next day was 10th Sept, we went down to Cantercock, to guard some mowing men, for about 20 days, for this our order was.

Saturday: 11th day of Sept.— Saturday, Sent out detail of about 8 men under Sergt. Lee, to make some discovery, but made none. Saturday, ye 19th day of Sept, I was with

16 more, sent out towards Hoosuck, for there we was shot at by about 20, but had none killed, but three slightly wounded. Monday : ye 20th day of Sept. we returned to Canttercock, much beat out by a hard travel, and want of water. Tuesday : 21, we rested at Canttercock. Wednesday, I with 25 men, sent up to Saratoga, to make our return to Col. Burttn. We arrived there, about 9 o'clock at night, and the next day, we tarried there, waiting for orders. Sept. 23rd, I received orders to go down to Stillwater, to guard 98 waggons down there, then go over the river to Canttercock, to the rest of our company.

This day, the 25th Sept, and one of our men, was a walking in the fields and saw two Indians, making preparations in ye grass, to shoot us, but through Goodness, towards us, we espied them before we come in shot of them, and returned as fast as we could to our Barracks, and notified our men of ye news, of which our Licutenant draws off 27 men and proceeds after them, but found them not, but we saw tracks of about six Indians, where they had gone along that morning, we followed them, near 7 miles, in the wead and small brush. We returned back about half-past four in ye afternoon. Sunday, Sept. 26, I was this day, commander of the waggon guard, from Canttercock to Stillwater, this day, we carried 40 waggon loads to the river. At night, I was taken very poorly. Monday, Sept. 27, felt much better than last night. The men seemed to be all overcome with much duty, and scarce able any of them, (30) to guard the mowing men.

Sept. 28, I received a letter from my wife, dated, ye 9th of this present, which rejoiced me to hear from her, and of other relatives at home. This afternoon, I was taken with the Camp distemper. 29th Sept. I was scarcely able to leave my possock, and grew poorly apace. Sept. ye last, we all went up to Saratoga, for we had done haying. I was so weak, that I went up by water. Friday, Oct. 1st. This day, I felt weaker than yesterday, and not able to leave my possock. This second day, in the afternoon, Col. Bueton ordered all our men up to Fort Edward,— I being poorly, and could not go with them, with six more, was left for weak and sick, and two that was well to take care of us. 3rd of Oct. felt some better than for some days past 4th Oct. three of the men died, not long from one another. 18th Oct. Dr. Colmer,— Doctor of the 48th Regiment, thought if I could get a chance in the waggon, it was best for me to get home, to New England, and gave a pass from under his own hand. The 19th Oct. I set out for New England, in company with Sergant Lee, we rode that day down to Stillwater, and 20th, we got to the "Half Moon," the 21st, This day being Wednesday, we crossed the river at ye Half Moon, to go down on the east side of ye Hutson, for fear of a small-pox at Albany. This night, we slept between ye mountains, about two miles below — Plain, had like to froze. This Thursday, 22nd Oct. I got to Green Bashed, tarried there three days. Monday, ye 25th, we set out to cross the Cantihook wood, but could not get to the Half-way House. and was obliged to lie in the woods this night. This day, Tuesday, ye 26th of Oct, we had fortun to get a horse, which was to be sold and bought him, giving \$3. for him, to carry our packs upon, but was so poor, that he could not travel so fast as we could. From Tuesday, ye 26th day Oct. I omitted to remark, we walked fast until Oct. ye 28th. Nov. ye first, we got to Harrentown. Ye 5th, we got home. Blessed be God, for his goodness towards me, in preserving me, in time of danger, and strengthening, to undergo, which was to, the eye of reason, beyond my expectation. Amen !"

The following is a letter written in camp by Consider Tiffany to his parents :

Honorable Father and loving Mother,

My duty to you, and my love to all my brothers and sisters. I take this opportunity to let you know, that I and my brother is well, and well contented, all but being absent from

you. I write to inform you that Captain Rogers has been out and brought in three prisoners, and the Stockbridge Indians has brought in two scalps. We expect to come up home this fall, if nothing extraordinary happens. I desire to be remembered, my duty to you and my love to all my brothers and friends. No more at present. I remain,

Your dutiful and obedient son.

Sept. 30, 1756.

In another part of this diary are several pages of accounts with various persons, chiefly for rum, cider and various bottles of milk punch, sold to these persons, which lead us to believe that in addition to the store which Consider Tiffany ran, many of the accounts of which have been preserved, he also sold liquor.

The following is contained in a small book with diary, and is a list of the company of which he was sergeant, and with which he made the afore-said campaign, composed of the following :

Sergeant Consider Tiffany evidently had some direful experience of the charges of the law, for he gave vent to his feelings in the verses which follows :

CONNECTICUT LAW.

A lawyer's bill of costs you'll see,
From A. B. C. to N. O. P.

To giving my advice at first,
Full forty shillings ; have I must,
For drawing your complaint, ten more ;
For writ and summons, give me four.

For two citations I did give,
Give me ten more, or I can't live ;
And for my travel and my fee,
Give me 12 pounds, deducting three.

For writing of an evidence,
Your worship must allow ten pence,
For answering when you did call,
Give me one pound or none at all.

And for my plea of abatement,
Give me ten shillings and I'm content
For pleading of the real cause,
Ten shillings give me, that's your laws.

For reading you the jury's voice,
Give me sixteen pence, and I'll rejoice.
For making N's account complete,
Give me eighteen pence, — I wrote one sheet.

For O's account, which I corrected,
 Give me one pound, as I've expected.
 For P's attendance and expense,
 I think 'tis worth two hundred pence.

His travel is about four mile,
 Allow two shillings for his toil.
 For any attending on this court,
 Give me five pounds for my support.

And five pounds more, as does appear
 In putting off it, the last year.
 The whole sum total, I receipt,
 Is eighteen pounds, for it I wait.

Besides twelve shillings more I add,
 This bill is small, which makes me *mad*.

Consider Tiffany had an extensive library for those times, keeping a list of his books. After returning from the campaign of 1756 he apparently joined another military company, as a document has been preserved, addressed to "ye honorable county court at Hartford to be held ye Olst Tuesday of November, 1757." This document is inserted. The company probably

had its headquarters at Preston. An interesting period of Sergeant Consider Tiffany's life is connected with the Revolutionary War. During the War of Independence, some time in 1778, Consider Tiffany was confined to his farm in the town of Hartland, Conn., because of his outspoken Toryism. After being confined for fifteen months there, learning that an effort was being made for his release, he addressed the following letter to the chairman of the committee :

Mr. Ensign — I understand that the committee are about to release me, being ashamed of their depriving me of that liberty they did 15 months ago.

I can answer the pretended committee that I never did anything that I am sorry for, more than that I have done too much in favor of the United States against genuine reason and the dictates of conscience, and the unerring Scriptures, which error I am unfeignedly sorry for. I am, and always was a sincere friend of America. But if I had the same opinion of the United States as I have of poor Hartland, I should think it my duty to do my utmost to have them subdued. Sir, I suppose there may be two reasons that induce the committee to release me without my asking them, The first, a guilty conscience for abusing me without a cause, the second, to dismiss me so that I can be drafted. But, that be as it may this I will assure you, and all men, that I never intend to go into the camps, and if I am forced thither, I intend to fight for that side that I think I ought to. I would further tell you that I retain the same principles that I had five years ago. Don't mean to hurt any man, and am contented to remain in my own business and happy in not seeing the face of my implacable enemies.—Therefore please so use your endeavors that I may remain happy as I now am, and you will oblige your old friend.

CONSIDER TIFFANY.

Hartland, March 8th, 1780.

During the Revolutionary War, Consider Tiffany kept a diary of the events that were passing. On his death he left this diary to his eldest son, with the instructions that it was to be transmitted from eldest son to eldest son as an heirloom. It is now in the possession of Henry Tiffany, of Clyde, Ohio. It forms a valuable contribution to the revolutionary history of the country, written, of course, from the Tory standpoint. It is in a bad state of decay, and it is to be hoped that the diary will be copied and preserved. He had a great contempt for the dissenting church, and it is said that a minister of the parish in which he resided said to Consider Tiffany one day that it was rather hard for him to have to pay for the support of preaching which he never heard. To this the staunch Church of England man responded, "It would be much harder to have to hear it." Many anecdotes are extant showing his learning and his cleverness. A chair still exists which he whittled out with his jackknife, with his name and the date elaborately carved on the back. This rugged old farmer and scholar, in addition to making his living as a storekeeper and a farmer, was a brave soldier, a good churchman, a writer of prose and poetry, and

an astronomer. He was one of those characters who rise above their fellows, no matter how low their position in life, nor how adverse their circumstances. Consider Tiffany's will is a characteristic document, and to his great grandson, F. B. Tiffany, the author of this genealogy is indebted for a complete copy. This copy has been made to correspond with the line numbering as written by Consider Tiffany himself, and shows the erasures and interlineations that are in the original. The spelling and the use of capitals has also followed the original. On the back of the will appears the following :

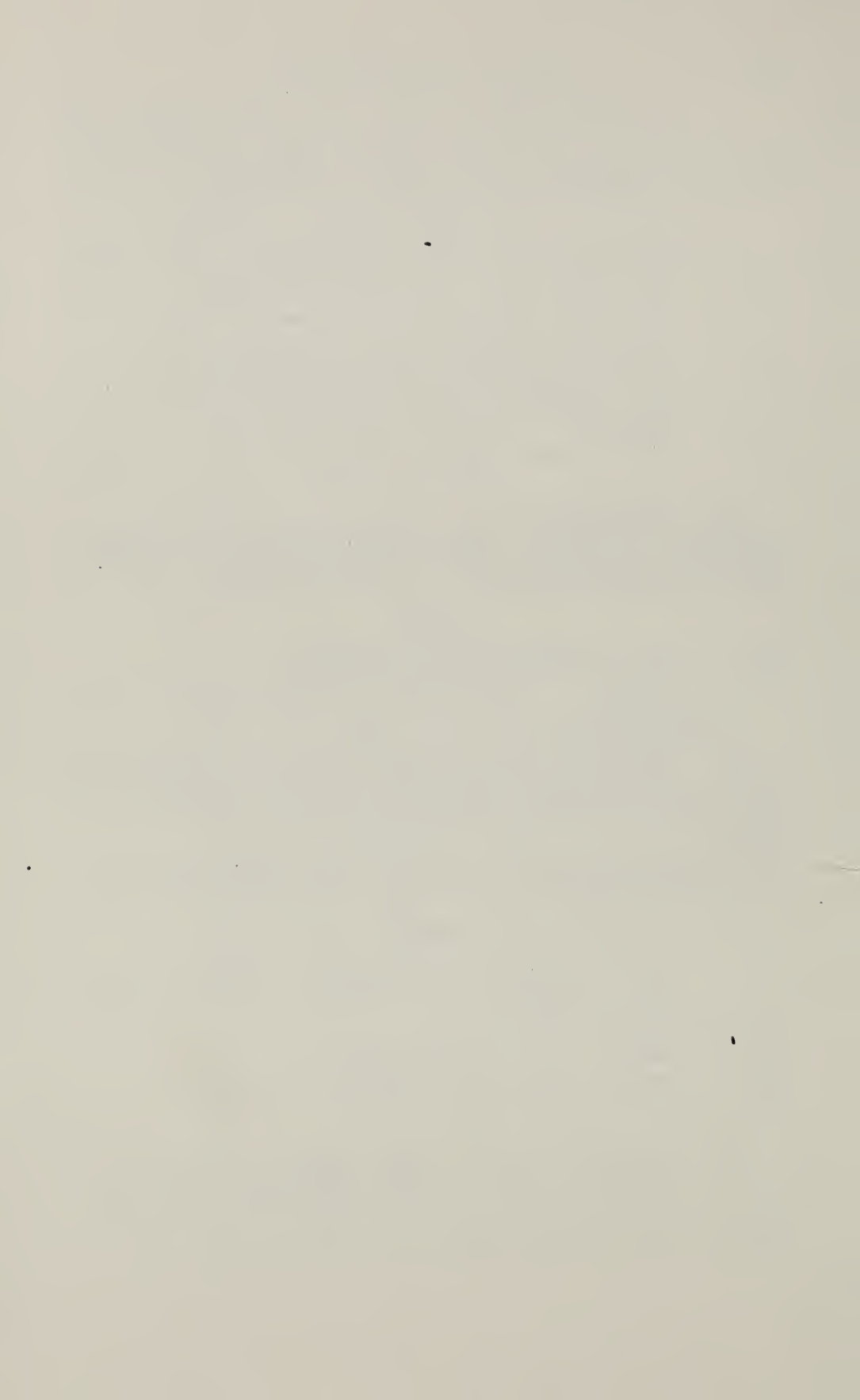

In 1831, Mr. Tiffany entered the law office of William G. Williams, New Hartford, Conn. The following year he went to Ohio, where he resumed the study of law at Medina, and was admitted to the bar in 1834. He later gave up his law practice to devote his time to religious matters. In 1861 he went to Albany, N. Y., where he published, through W. C. Little, a work on "Trusts and Trustees." In 1863 he published "Practice Under the New York Code." He also digested the "New York Justices' Court of Appeals Code," which was published. In 1866-67 he wrote a work on "Government and Constitutional Law," as applicable to the United States and to the several States. He was appointed by Gov. Fenton reporter of the Court of Appeals. During his three years' term of office he reported twelve volumes of Court of Appeals reports, known as "Tiffany Records." He was a believer in spiritualism, and one of the earliest exponents of that faith.

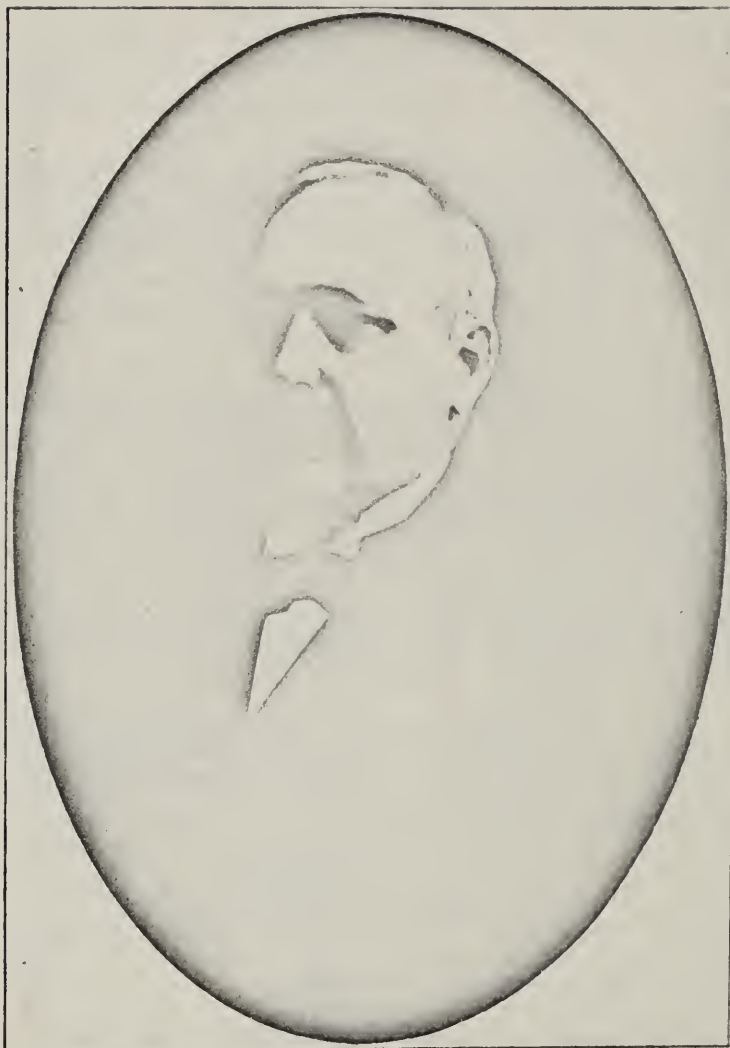

Hon. Fayette B. Tiffany acquired his early education at the district school in his native town; entered Amherst College in 1868, where he remained until almost the close of his sophomore year, when he was compelled to leave his studies because of serious illness. He lived for a time in Bristol, Conn., where he engaged in the lumber business. In 1878, he moved to Nebraska, where he studied law and was admitted to the bar at Brownville, Neb., in 1879. He began the practice of law at Albion, Boon County, Neb., in 1880, and met with much success in his profession. In November, 1881, he was elected county judge, and in March, 1883, he was appointed district judge by the governor of Nebraska to fill a vacancy. In November, 1883, he was elected to the same position for a full term of four years, and in 1887 was re-elected for another four-years' term. At the end of his second term he resumed the practice of law at Omaha, removing to Colorado Springs, Col., in 1891, where he has since practiced successfully. His record as a judge is a credit to the Tiffany name.

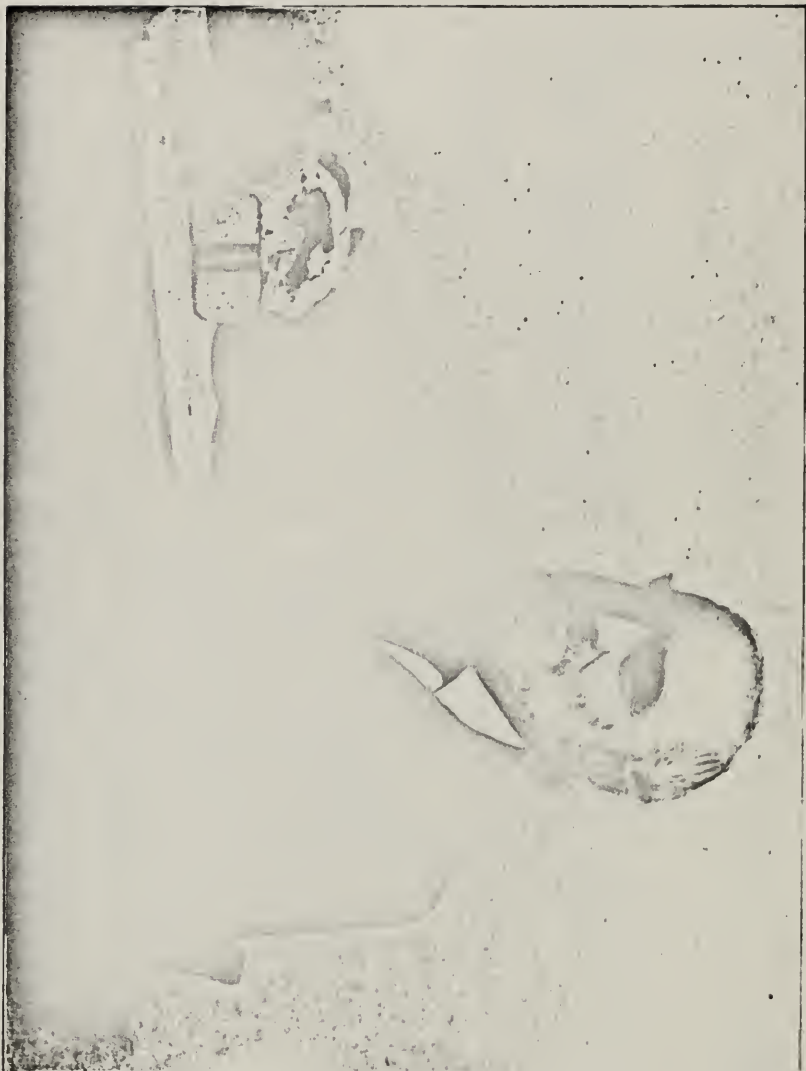

When Dr. Tiffany was three years old his father moved to the Adirondack Mountains. Two years later, his mother died and his father married again. Subjected to harsh treatment, the boy, at the age of eleven, went out among strangers and found a home with a farmer, where he was kindly treated. At eighteen, he went to Albany, where he learned the trade of harness making. Three years later, he started in business for himself, and from that time worked for no one but himself. In 1844, he began a grocery business, moving to Rock Island in 1854, and engaged in the same business in Davenport, Ia., two years later. He also conducted a tobacco and cigar business in Davenport, which he closed out in 1868. He early developed a liking for reading and literature, preferring works on history, mechanical arts and medicine. He became greatly interested in geology, and after he retired from business he devoted his entire time to this study. He made a collection and study of fossils of the paleozoic age, and in Davenport he had a larger collection of local fossils than any other private collector. He published several pamphlets on the science. In 1878, he joined the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and in 1889, when the Geological Society of America was organized, he became a member. He was also a member of the Sons of the Revolution.

MISCELLANEOUS TIFFANYS.

Under this head the author has sought to group many bearers of the Tiffany name whose descent cannot be traced back to the sons of Humphrey Tiffany, from whom it is supposed all the Tiffanys in America have sprung. It is hoped that in including these Tiffanys in the work some missing threads may be taken up by a future generation and that the line of descent may in each instance be traced.

In some cases the records were sufficiently exact to leave little question of the descent; but where a doubt existed, it seemed better to classify under the miscellaneous chapter, and leave it to future Tiffanys to search the records again, and, assisted by the genealogies that are being published of late years, to trace every bearer of this honored name back to the original ancestor in this country, a man who founded a sturdy, brave, and successful race in the New World.

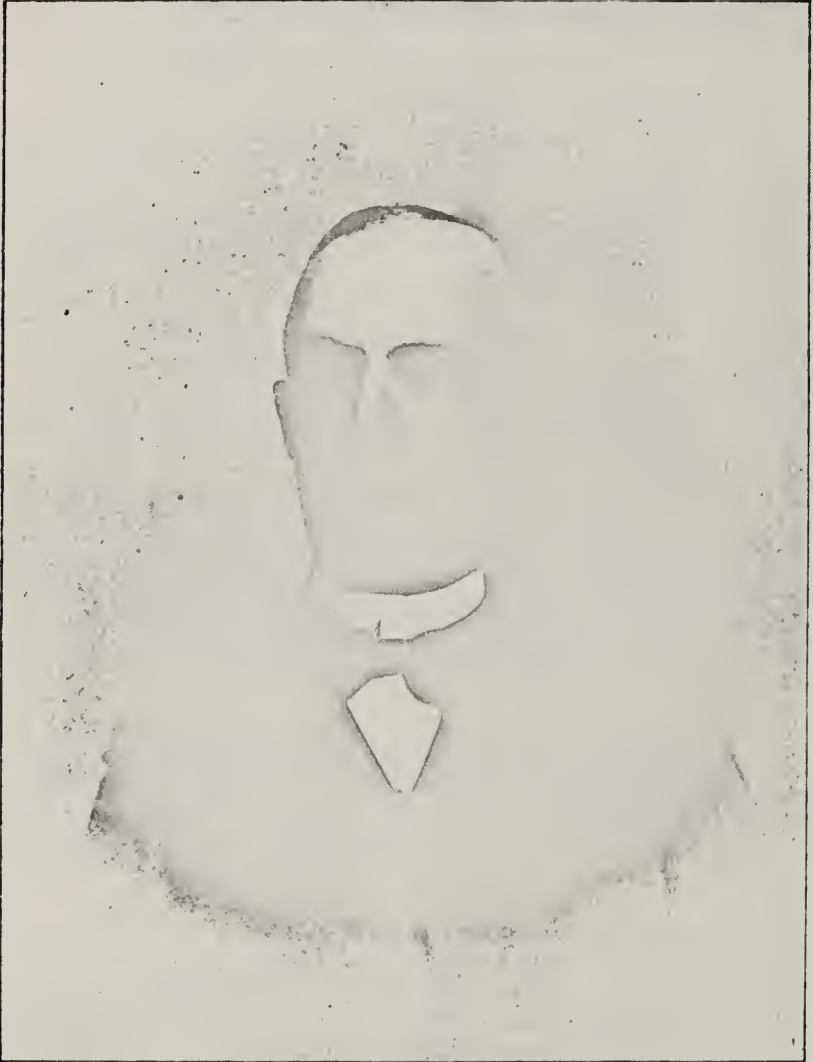

1. **ELEASAR.** He was a soldier in the Revolutionary War and was closely associated with Gen. Washington. In later life, Eleasar Tiffany drew a pension from the Government, and when he went to Springfield, Mass., where his pension was paid, he would entertain his grandchildren with stories of the Revolutionary War, and especially of the great commander, whom he revered, as did every soldier who had the honor to serve under Gen. Washington. No definite date concerning his marriages has been obtained, but he is said to have married twice. His two sons, of whom records are given, were children by his first wife.

Under this head the compiler has embodied some data about descendants of Joseph Waddington Tiffany. To Frank Tiffany of Leeds, England, and to J. Alfred Tiffany of Syracuse, N. Y., herein mentioned, the author is indebted for much valuable information concerning the Tiffanys, and especially their early history over the sea.

OTHER REFERENCES.

In the natural course of research, the author has come upon many interesting anecdotes of the Tiffany family, and has found the name connected with the early history of New England in a manner not easy to extract for use in the introduction or in shape to be embodied with the reference records of the Tiffany family; but, in connection with the chapter on Miscellaneous Tiffanys, it seems expedient to insert a portion of what has been gleaned from other genealogies and from many histories, especially of New England towns. A part of this is included in records published elsewhere in the book, but the following are extracts taken from the various volumes to which reference is made above.

WALPOLE TIFFANYS.

In "Walpole As It Was and As It Is," containing the complete civil history of the town, from 1749 to 1879, together with a history of all the church organizations; also a history of 150 families that settled in the town previous to 1820, with biographical sketches of a large number of its prominent citizens; and also a census of the town taken April 1, 1878, by George Aldrich, printed by the Claremont Manufacturing Company, of Claremont, N. H., in 1880, appears the following:

Pages 308, 309. Amasa Tiffany came to Walpole, from Ashford, Conn., in some of the last years of the eighteenth century. He married Sally, the sister of Dr. Stephen Johnson, and had three sons and one daughter, who came with their parents. He was born in 1764 and died April 17, 1850. His wife was born in 1771, and died February 8, 1868, being ninety-seven years old. He was a butcher, it is said, and lived at one time in the Walton Mead house, and owned the rabid dog that bit David, the son of John Livingstone, mentioned heretofore, in 1815.

Stephen, the oldest of the children, was born February 22, 1792, and died August 19, 1877. He married Maria, daughter of Dr. Stephen and Percy (Webber) Johnson, October 18, 1818, who was born April 13, 1795, and died March 31, 1872. Stephen Tiffany was a soldier in the War of 1812, and went to Portsmouth, N. H., in the company that went from Walpole with Colonel Josiah Bellows; he was also captain, at one time, of the rifle company organized here. He lived to be eighty-five years of age, possessing a robust constitution, although he never in his lifetime ate but a very small quantity of meat. His course of life was smooth and even, and he died without an enemy. Children: 1st, Harriet M., b. November 20, 1821; m. Ephraim A. Watkins, March, 1841, and has two children living. 2d, Sarah Ann, b. January 22, 1826; m. Frederick Watkins, September, 1845, and has two daughters. 3d, Stephen Johnson, b. May 16, 1830; m., first, Mary S., daughter of Levi and Susannah (Foster) Hall, who d. May 29, 1864; m., second, Emily Buffum of Keene, N. H. 4th, Percy I., b. June 10, 1834; m. William Hall, January 27, 1852; d. January 24, 1866.

TIFFANYS IN WALES.

In "An Address delivered in Wales on October 5, 1862, being the centennial anniversary of the municipal organization of the town, with

additions and extensions upon some matters needful to bring the history of the town down to January 1, 1866, to which is annexed a roll of honor, being a catalogue of the names, etc., of soldiers from this town who served in the armies of our Government in the late Civil War, by Absalom Gardner, published by request, Springfield, Samuel Bowles & Company, printers, 1866," appears the following in reference to the Tiffany family :

Page 27. The Tiffany families next command attention. James Tiffany, senior, came to this place from Douglas in or about 1780, continued here until 1795, then left. James Tiffany, Jr., son of the first James, came here with his father, was here married, in 1781, to Mary Howe, succeeded Captain Winchester as owner and occupant of the Royce Place, and also in merchandising or storekeeping upon a small scale thereon ; and died here March 25, 1823, aged sixty-two. His sons, Dexter, Lyman, Bela, and Loring all became noted here and elsewhere in the world of business and trade, manufacturing, merchandising, and otherwise.

Bela Tiffany, Esq., son of James, junior, was here in childhood and youth, and till 1808 ; was then off elsewhere in business till 1825, at which time he returned hither with his family, and here tarried till 1830, when he left again. He died in August, 1851, aged sixty-six, his death being the result of an injury in being thrown from his wagon as he was returning from Palmer to his home in Southbridge. Though he was not faultless, more than others, yet, as the originator of the first manufacturing establishment in this town, he is entitled to the honored and grateful remembrance of all desirers of our town's prosperity. We have now no right to say there would be at this time any cloth manufactories in this town had it not been for the start and impetus given by him to that branch of industry ; and he must be a dolt, indeed, who does not understand in some good degree the benefits by our town derived from the manufacturing business done in this place.

Page 29. Under the list of practicing physicians who have lived in Salem appears the name of Dr. Daniel Tiffany, from 1812 to 1822.

Page 31. Dr. Daniel Tiffany was not of the family, but a relative of the other Tiffanys that have been herebefore named ; had his residence here two years, 1792-93, then left ; returned in 1812, claiming to be of the medical brotherhood, continued here till 1822, then removed to Webster. When here, he abode in different localities, but mostly in the outskirts of the town, and, when not professionally engaged, gave his attention to agricultural pursuits. He was not regarded as superlatively smart or skillful, and did not have an extensive practice.

In the "Champion Genealogy, a History of the Descendants of Henry Champion of Saybrook and Lyme, Connecticut, together with some account of other families of the name," by Francis Bacon Trowbridge, published for the author, in New Haven, in 1891, appears the following references to the Tiffany family :

Pages 52, 53. Hepzibah Champion (Lynde 24, Henry 11, Henry 6, Henry 4, Henry 1), born in 1803 in Green River, N. Y. ; died 20 August, 1853, in Arcadia, N. Y. ; was married in Hillsdale, N. Y., 9 October, 1831, to Major Tiffany, son of Benjamin and Elizabeth Tiffany, born 23 June, 1804, in Austerlitz, N. Y. ; died, 1863, in Litchfield, Mich.

Mr. Tiffany acquired the name Major from the fact that he was one of four boys who were all born in his neighborhood on the same day, each of

whom was christened Major. His parents came to this country from Ireland, bringing three children, Mary, William, and Elizabeth. William was captured by the Indians at the age of twelve, but escaped in a canoe six years later, although dressed at the time for marriage with a chief's daughter.

Mr. Tiffany continued to reside on his farm in his native town until 1833, when he removed to Arcadia, Wayne County. The latter years of his life were passed in Litchfield, Mich. He was by religion a Methodist and politically a Republican. Some account of him is contained in the chapter devoted to Miscellaneous Tiffanys.

JULIAETTE POTTER, b. 17 July, 1836 ; m., first, 12 April, 1860, William Henry Tiffany, who d. in 1872. Children : Emmett, b. 2 February, 1861, is a lawyer in New York City ; Earl Potter, b. 8 June, 1863 ; d. 17 April, 1868. She m., second, 16 June, 1875, R. N. Vanevera (b. 28 October, 1827), a merchant in New York City. Child : Potter, b. 12 September, 1877. Juliaette Vanevera, M. D. (New York Medical College, 1872), has been for seven years professor of children's diseases in the New York Female Medical College, and staff physician in the Hospital for Women.

ERRORS IN THE BOOK.
