

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chichester in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chichester on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of current year taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$320.00 for support of the Concord Hospital. (At request of the hospital.)
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$300.00 for the improvement and development of the "Carpenter Memorial Center", so called. (At request of the Chichester Planning Board.)
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$2,000.00 for the construction and outfitting of two (2) restrooms in the Town Hall. This to include necessary water and sewerage.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the Town Library (At request of the Library Trustees.)

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept monies for which the Town may be entitled from the Economic Opportunity Agency or other such Federal Funds.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Planning Board to approve or disapprove, in its discretion, plats showing new streets or the widening thereof, or parks, and upon adoption of this article it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to file with the Registry of Deeds of the County of Merrimack a certificate or note showing that the said Planning Board has been so authorized, giving the date of authorization, as provided in Sections 19-29 inclusive, Chapter 36 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.
- 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Polls will be open until 6:00 P.M.

All articles except No. 1 above will be taken up at 7:00 P.M.

1964 LIBRARY REPORT

Down the curving staircase of the Town Hall 5,073 books were taken home to read or study by children, youth and grown-ups from January 11th through December 31st. Such convincing evidence of the usefulness of the library is very enheartening to the trustees and librarian. To give proper expression to all the pleasant things that have happened this year would take pages and pages but this costs money. So the library report will include only the highlights minus the merited words of praise and gratitude.

Highlights: a \$200. grant-in-aid from the State Library for the purchase of reference books; the loan of books from the State Library and the counsel of bookmobile personnel; the formation of the Friends of the Library Association and their activities; several gifts of used books in good condition that are of sufficient worth to include in the library. These highlights are interdependent, like the branches, leaves and blossoms of a healthy plant, made possible by the vigor of the root which, in this case, consists of the forward thinking and high effort of the trustees, the adequate financial support of the town and the increasing vitality of the book circulation.

REPORT OF CHICHESTER VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

During the year 1964 the Fire Dept. responded to a total of 10 calls of which only 4 were in town. This included one car fire, one grass fire, one oil burner, and one barn fire. Six calls were to assist neighboring towns of which two were for building fires and four brush fires.

Chichester has been very fortunate not to have any local property losses.

Since last year's report the department has received a new Howe combination pumper and tank truck. The department is very proud of our new piece of equipment, and many thanks go to the citizens and taxpayers of Chichester for the foresight to purchase such a piece of equipment.

With our present equipment, housing, and training of our Volunteer Dept. I feel we can be of great service to the community.

During the coming year the firemen are undertaking a project to add to the fire station additional room, to house the old truck presently under the town hall. This we hope to do without any cost to the taxpayers, however, any volunteer assistance will be appreciated.

I would also remind home owners within the two mile distance from the fire station to contact your insurance agent for a reduction in fire coverage rates.

May the people of Chichester be as fire conscious in the future as in the past making fire prevention a prime objective.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy - both industrial and recreational — is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area — 4,350,000 acres — is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

- 1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.
- 2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.
- 3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3)

smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the Sixth day of March 1965, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to complete projects involving the new addition and add an activity room to the elementary school, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000 for this purpose; and to authorize the school board to borrow on the credit of the district under the Municipal Finance Act, or other enabling authority, a sum to pay for all or any portion of the sum or sums so appropriated; and authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes and/or bonds shall be issued; and take any other action incidental to or in connection with the foregoing.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to complete projects connected with the new addition to the elementary school, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000. for this purpose; and to authorize the school board to borrow on the credit of the district under the Municipal Finance Act, or other enabling authority, a sum to pay for all or any portion of the sum or sums so appropriated: and authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes and/or bonds shall be issued: and take any other action incidental to or in connection with the foregoing.
- 11. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF CHICHESTER SCHOOL BOARD 1964 - 1965

During the past year, your School Board has attempted to provide the children of our town with a modern educational plant and curriculum.

As in all other fields of endeavor, methods of teaching are constantly changing. To keep abreast of the times, it will be necessary to purchase some new text books. We are also recommending that provisions be made in our next year's budget to purchase books for the teaching of modern math in Grades 7 and 8. Eventually this new mathematics should be taught in all grades. In addition to regular class work, physical education and music appreciation are being taught in our school. An improved school lunch program has been made possible this year through more adequate kitchen facilities. A library is being developed in the new section of the school through the cooperation of the Parent-Teachers Association.

The budget which we are submitting for the next year shows a substantial increase over that of the previous year, due primarily to more tuition students and an increase of \$80.00 in the tuition rate of Concord High School. Also, the budget provides for an additional teacher.

The new addition to the building has been completed in so far as funds were available. We were unable to construct the building according to plans submitted at our last school district meeting because of the lack of funds. This came about because the \$78,000 bond issue, as requested, was based on an estimated bid received in February of 1964. When the plans were completed and the job put out to bid in April, prices had risen so much that our lowest bid was \$90,000. Therefore, it became necessary to revise plans as originally

submitted and to leave some portions of the project uncompleted.

However, we can report on the following progress:

One new classroom is now in use with plans for the other to be used next year. A maintenance and heating facility has been installed, adequate for a sixteen-room school when and if additional rooms are needed. The new heating plant uses No. 4 fuel oil which has cut the cost of heating. There is a new kitchen and a storage room, along with storage facilities for the custodian. A room has been set aside for a library. New toilets have been partially completed. A new 310-foot artesian well was drilled and a new pump and water storage facilities installed.

Jobs to be done to complete the present building are: installation of a septic tank and drainage fields; paving of the driveway; equipping the eighth classroom and completing the kitchen.

Various approaches might be employed in completing the building. One would be to finish the uncompleted jobs with 100 per cent school district funds, stretching the jobs out over a period of years. Another method would be to complete the jobs immediately through borrowing \$10,000 with principal to be amortized 70 per cent by the district and 30 per cent by the state, under the school building aid program. Still another method would be to combine these uncompleted projects and other improvements with the construction of a multi-purpose room through the issuance of a \$50,000 bond issue, also to be amortized 70 per cent by the district and 30 per cent by the state. This latter plan would also give the school district the most modern school plant possible at this time.

A study committee worked diligently throughout the year with committees from other towns, looking toward

the possibility of our school district combining with Salisbury, Boscawen, Canterbury, Loudon, and Penacook in a school cooperative. However, it was decided that it would not be practical for Chichester to join such a cooperative, both from a standpoint of cost and geographical location. We strongly recommend, however, that the committee explore the possibilities of forming a cooperative nearer to Chichester.

In summary, we should like to say that our town can be very proud of the fine school building which it now has, the school curriculum, and the excellent school staff.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Chichester:

Since our last report the elementary school addition has been completed and is being used and enjoyed by the pupils and teachers.

This is a very much needed enlargement of the school facilities, and provides adequate classroom space for a growing school population.

Your school board, together with the planning committee, gave thought to present needs and to possible future needs in their recommendations of a year ago. As a result of this foresight, the community now has a suitable basic unit to which additional classrooms may be added as the need arises.

An additional teacher was added to the faculty this year, making it possible for grades one through six to be in separate classrooms with one teacher for each grade. This provides a more favorable educational opportunity for each pupil in these grades.

The new school budget provides for a division of the present combination of grades seven and eight, so that each of these grades will have the same opportunities as are now provided in the other grades.

Evidence of the rapid growth of the Chichester school population may be found in the fact that four class-rooms have been added over a relatively short period of time. Each of these rooms will be occupied during the coming school year.

The members of the school board, the planning committee and the community are to be commended for their efforts to provide adequate educational facilities for Chichester children.

This calendar provides for 181 school days. Only full school days are scheduled. It is mandatory that all schools complete 180 full days of instruction. Graduations are to be after the completion of the 180 days. Any district taking more than one of the optional days will be required to make up the day at the close of the school year in June.

This is in accordance with policy of the State Board of Education.

REPORT OF CHICHESTER PLANNING BOARD — 1965

Activities of the Chichester Planning Board this past year have consisted largely of following up on the recommendations of the Board's 1964 report.

A summary follows:

- 1. Road Planning. Conferences were held with Floyd Avery and George Stohrer of the Secondary Roads Division of the New Hampshire Department of Public Works & Highways regarding a priority plan of meeting road needs in our town. These gentlemen made an onthe-spot survey of our roads and have recommended that our Class V roads be improved on the basis of the following priority:
- (1) Road Inventory No. 72 King Road from end of 1965 TRA section and continuing towards the Loudon town line approximately .67 of a mile.
- (2) Road Inventory No. 78 Hilliard Road entire length of this road from old N. H. 28 westerly .45 of a mile.
- (3) Road Inventory No. 61 Staniels Road entire length from Horse Corner Road to Pembroke town line a distance of approximately .72 of a mile.

These three roads' combined total is 1.84 miles in length and should be constructed with TRA Funds in the above priority. These will take some time to construct at Chichester's Annual TRA apportionment rate. It is not recommended to attempt a bigger program because when these three roads are finished to TRA standards the entire picture could have changed.

2. Sub-division Control. Conferences were held with the Department of Resources & Economic Development of the State of New Hampshire regarding the type of sub-division control which might best serve our town. The Board feels that some type of control is needed since there are indications that housing developments may be started in Chichester in the near future. It is important both to the developers and the town that sub-divisions be located where best use can be made of land from the standpoint of sewerage disposal, construction of access roads, and overall planning of the town. Otherwise, poorly planned developments could become a real financial burden to our town. We recommend that the Planning Board be empowered to approve plats and locations before such sub-divisions are established.

- 3. Town Cemetery, Park and Forest. A sub-committee of our Board has conferred with the Selectmen regarding use of the 50 acres deeded to the town by Charles Batchelder. Part of this land could be used as an addition to the existing cemetery in North Chichester and the rest as a town park and forest. In connection with this project and possibly others, Mr. Charles Whittemore, Director of the New Hampshire Office of Economic Opportunity, was invited to speak at an open meeting of our Planning Board on federal aid available to communities. An appropriation of \$300.00 is suggested to start development of the addition to the cemetery and the park, with the possibility that Chichester might qualify for assistance from the Federal Government under the Economic Opportunity Act on a 90-Federal and 10-Town matching basis.
- 4. Tax Relief. The Planning Board has initiated action should an increase in Foundation Aid for schools not be approved by the State Legislature this year. In such case, Chichester should continue to receive a special legislative grant as in the past two years as one of the twenty poorest towns in the state from a taxable property basis. We plan to coordinate our activities with the other nineteen towns concerned.

- 5. Pollution Control. At the request of our Board, Representative Henry Stevens of Epsom has introduced a bill into the Legislature to move ahead the classification date of the Suncook River by the Water Pollution Board. This is the first step which must be taken in an attempt to clean up the Suncook River into which the raw sewerage of Pittsfield is dumped. If this river is cleaned up, it will enhance the value of our town and all other communities along the Suncook.
- 6. Regional Planning. As a representative of the Planning Board, your Chairman has attended two meetings of the recently revitalized Merrimack Valley Region Association and has been elected a member of its executive committee. He has also represented the Planning Board at meetings of the Concord regional planning group and the Merrimack County Rural Area Development Committee.
