

To the inhabitants of the Town of Clarksville in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Clarksville on Tuesday, the 14th day March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

5. To see if the town will vote to raise \$400.00 to buy a power mower to be used mowing the cemeteries.
6. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board and Citizens of the Clarksville School District:

It is interesting to note that although there is no abatement in the general demand for a further shortening of the already greatly shortened work week, more and more is being heard about the need for "Johnny" to spend both more hours each day and more days each year in school. It is noted, also, that in spite of less and less being heard about the craftsmanship of his dad in this age of automatism, there is an increasing demand that this boy, particularly if he is gifted, be made to confine his work more to the so-called solid subjects, and that he be given a real rough time even with the stretch in hours. In light of what he certainly is going to observe as contrasted to what he is being told, the question might well arise to what extent is it going to be possible to convince this youngster that it is good.

When one stops to ponder over the stated means by which it is said better schools will result, old time basic educational principles of long standing come to mind. In particular, the focusing of the attention primarily upon intellectual training to the utmost ability rather than upon the "whole child" stands out. Recognition, too, that the rare qualities of character such as aspiration, determination, and purpose are perhaps caught as much as, if not more than, taught indicates a greater awareness of the imponderables and intangibles in human behavior. And the growing conviction that there is no substitute for challenging work whether done in the classroom or at home in developing ability to think, points to the urgency of the provision of schools with a balance that will hang on to that which has continued value, delete that which is unessential, and emphasize that which is most vital.

Teachers

As has been cited again and again, we are extremely fortunate in having veteran teachers in our school year after year. This is especially true as the shortage of elementary teachers has continued now for an extended period. Mrs. Kate Lord, who received her training at Plymouth Teachers College, and who has had several years of experience, teaches Grades 5-8. Mrs. Alma B. Chappell teaches Grades 1-4.

School Nurse — Health

With ever more conclusive evidence gathered to the effect that with other things being equal, the effectiveness of work done in school by the pupil is directly proportional to his or her overall

health, the importance of the stellar work done by our school nurse, Mrs. Ethel S. Sturgis, becomes increasingly more apparent.

Aided as she is with modern up-to-date equipment and the "know how" through many years of experience, such professional services are rendered as the administering of periodic immunizations, the giving of complete physical examinations every four years, and the conducting of annual x-ray and pre-school clinics as well as the many and varied constant checkups conducted from time to time during the year.

Building — Equipment

Thanks to the generosity of the voters at the annual district meeting, it was possible during the summer vacation to cover the outside of the building with siding. The addition of this material, gray in color, has greatly improved the appearance of the building, and provided additional insulation which should contribute to both greater comfort in the classrooms and a decrease in the cost of fuel.

It is believed that it should be mentioned at this point, also, that the heating of the building has been substantially further improved by the replacement of the oil burner in the furnace with a new one. This exchange of heating units was made by heating contractor, Harold Plante, from whom the furnace was originally purchased, at only the nominal expense of the labor involved to the district. As a result of this change, more uniform heat has been provided while at the same time it has been possible to cut down on the consumption of oil.

As will be noted, a special article has been included in the warrant to consider the advisability of further insulating the building by the purchase and installation of double windows which it is believed would result in still an additional saving in fuel cost and even greater comfort for the pupils and teachers.

With the continued practice of keeping the equipment in a good state of maintenance, most items purchased during the past year have been confined to those customarily obtained for instructional purposes.

Enrollment and Attendance

For the seventh consecutive year the number of pupils enrolled in our school has increased, as there are at the time of this writing 44 as compared to 42, 40, 39, 33, 26, and 25 respectively, for each of the preceding years. The average percentage of attendance during the past year was 96.49 for Grades 1-4, and 94.40 for Grades 5-8, while for the same groups taken in the same order the average number of tardinesses per pupil was .16 and .00.

In contrast to the continued increase in the number of pupils attending school within the district, there is a decrease this year in

the number attending outside, as there are 9 now in comparison to 13 a year ago. This number, however, except for last year and the third preceding year is the same as it has been for the past six years. Of the present number of tuition pupils, seven are at Pittsburgh High School and two are at Colebrook Academy.

Notes on the Budget

The School Board's Budget for 1961-62 is \$20,200.00 in comparison to \$18,328.00 for the current year. This amount is reduced by anticipated state aid of \$3,000.00 plus an estimated balance of \$500.00 which leaves a balance of \$16,700.00 to be raised by taxes by the town as compared to the \$15,328.00 plus the \$1,000.00 raised for the siding to make a total of \$16,328.00 for this year. Examination of the budget breakdown found on subsequent pages of this report will show that provision for higher tuition costs, for the most part, explains the increase in the budget.

Conclusion

May I again express my deep appreciation to the members of the School Board, parents, teachers, and citizens for all the assistance and cooperation received as we have worked together in an effort to provide the best possible education for our boys and girls. It is only with the help of you all that high standards can be achieved and maintained.
