### TOWN WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Salisbury in the county of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: (L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Salisbury on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next, to act upon the following subjects: Voting from one p. m. to nine p. m. Business meeting seven p. m.:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
  - 3. To elect one Selectman for three years.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.
- 5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the Town Budget.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on notes of the Town in anticipation of taxes.
- 7. To hear reports of agents, auditors and officers heretofore chosen.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the control of White Pine Blister Rust (Estimate \$100.00).
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit. (Estimate \$200.00).
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$150.00 for the Franklin Hospital.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to use \$2,500.00 of the Capital Reserve Fund interest for road maintenance in the flood control basin.

- 12. To see if the Town will vote to pay Police Officer \$50.00 a year as salary.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to take over the Heights School building, or do anything in relation thereto.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to plow individual and business driveways. If necessary to facilitate such service to hire an individual owner of a plow suitable for such driveways. Any damage to property by said plow is at the property owners risk. An annual fee of \$5.00 is to be charged each property owner.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to take over and maintain the road leading from Whittemore Road to the new school as A Class V Highway.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to have the assessed property valuations printed in the town report once in four years instead of once every year.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 for a new truck. This sum of money to be issued by five serial notes of \$1,100.00 each, one note to mature in 1960, and one note for the next four consecutive years.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$25.00 to be expended in cooperation with New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission for the opening and maintaining of trails and old roads for forest fire protection. The New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission to provide a matching sum not in excess of \$25.00 for this purpose.
- 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note: 58% or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10% or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple —

- 1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
- 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
- 4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles use your ash tray.
- Don't burn at home Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Salisbury qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 16th day of March, 1960, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon to act on the following subjects:

Polls will be open from 6:30 pm to 9:30 pm.

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payments of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sources as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive in the name of the district such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or any department thereof or any state agency.

At the time and place mentioned in the warrant, the legal voters of the School District met and transacted business as follows:

At 6:30 P. M. the Clerk declared the polls open for balloting for election of officers under Articles 1, 2, 3 and 4 in the warrant.

The business meeting was called to order at 8:00 P. M. by the Moderator, Frederick L. Adams, who read the warrant.

- Art. 5. A motion was made and seconded that the salaries of the School Board and other officers of the district remain the same. The Moderator declared the voice vote in the affirmative.
- Art. 6. Voted on motion made and seconded that the reports of officers be accepted as printed in the town report. Vote in the affirmative.
- Art. 7. Voted on motion made and seconded that the School Board be authorized to appoint any necessary agents, auditors and committees. Moderator declared the voice vote in the affirmative.
- Art. 8. It was voted to pass over this article until action had taken on the remaining articles in the warrant.
- Art. 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made and seconded that this article be accepted as read. Moderator declared the vote carried in the affirmative.
- Art. 10. After much discussion and several suggestions for the use of the two present school buildings the following action was taken:

A motion was made and seconded that, "We, the people of Salisbury, authorize the School District to sell the South Road School Building and Land to Bartlett Grange for one dollar." The Moderator declared the voice vote carried in the affirmative.

Art. 12. A motion was made and seconded that this article be accepted as read. The Moderator declared the voice vote in the negative.
