

Lemoine's New Hardy Hybrid Gladiolus.

The odd and fantastic markings of these Gladiolus, and

their beautiful shape, resemble the fascinating beauty of that rarest of all flowers, the Orchid. Yellow, crimson, white, brown, pink, green, etc., are blended together, producing an effect seen in no other flower. They are of recent introduction, therefore new and quite unknown. It is useless to attempt to describe their real beauty, for it cannot be done. They must be seen. Besides their gay colors and odd markings, they have two very important points of superiority over other sorts. First they bloom two or three weeks earlier and are in full perfection before others appear; and secondly, they are hardy, and may be left in the ground over winter, from year to year, without lifting in the autumn; yet we do not advise this plan, as we think it better to lift them in the fall and store them in the cellar, that they may be planted out in fresh mellow soil in spring.
